### **TRANSMITTAL OF THE COUNTYWIDE INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN FIVE-YEAR REVIEW REPORT**

Pursuant to State law (Section 41822 of the Public Resources Code and Section 18788, Title 14, of the California Code of Regulations), on June 23, 2004, Public Works submitted the Five-Year Review Report of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan (CoIWMP) to the California Integrated Waste Management Board (Waste Board) for approval (copy attached). The Waste Board has 90 days to review the Report and at a public hearing, approve or disapprove it. The CoIWMP consists of the following planning documents--Source Reduction and Recycling Element, Household Hazardous Waste Element, and Non-disposal Facility Element (one of each element for each of the 88 cities in the County and one for the County of Los Angeles), the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Summary Plan (Summary Plan), and Countywide Siting Element (Siting Element).

The five-year review addressed a variety of issues including changes to the County's demographics, changes in quantities of waste generated within the County, waste diversion program implementation status, and changes in available markets for recyclable materials. Based on these issues, the Five-Year Review Report recommended that the Siting Element and Summary Plan be revised. A primary consideration for revising the Siting Element is to remove the Elsmere and Blind Canyon's sites from the Siting Element's list of potential new landfill sites as directed by your Board on September 30, 2003. Moreover, the Summary Plan's goals and policies need to be reevaluated since over half of all jurisdictions in the County of Los Angeles have received Waste Board-approved time extensions to meet the State-mandated waste diversion goals.



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# Los Angeles County Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan Five-Year Review Report



June 2004

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## Executive Summary

The County of Los Angeles, with the assistance of the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Task Force, has conducted the five year review of the Los Angeles County Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan (CoIWMP). The resulting Five-Year Review Report summarizes the County's findings and recommendations.

In summary, the County of Los Angeles is recommending that the Los Angeles County Countywide Siting Element (CSE) and Los Angeles County Countywide Integrated Waste Management Summary Plan (CSP) be revised for the following reasons:

- A total of 45 jurisdictions in Los Angeles County have received approval from the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) for a Time Extension to meet their Assembly Bill 939 diversion goals. Thus, the goals and policies of the CSP will need to be re-evaluated to ensure achievement of AB 939's waste diversion goals.
- Changes in the Countywide solid waste management system have occurred since adoption of the CoIWMP which will need to be reflected in the CoIWMP. For example, on January 13, 2004, the CIWMB approved the formation of the Los Angeles Integrated Waste Management Authority Regional Agency (LARA).
- On September 30, 2003 the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted a motion (see Appendix A) to remove the Elsmere Canyon Landfill and Blind Canyon Landfill sites from the Los Angeles County Countywide Siting Element's (CSE) list of potential new landfills. Additionally, BFI, the owner of the Elsmere Canyon Landfill site, sent letters to the County of Los Angeles Departments of Public Works (February 10, 2004) and Regional Planning (May 5, 2004) withdrawing their application for a Conditional Use Permit to develop a landfill at the site (see Appendix B). Removal of these two sites will necessitate an amendment of the CSE. Also, the goals and policies of the CSE will need to be re-evaluated to ensure their continued applicability and efficacy.
- The implementation of the C&D/Inert Debris Regulations, Phase II, may result in some previously "unpermitted" facilities (facilities which were not previously required to obtain a SWFP) being required to obtain either a Registration Permit or Full SWFP. Should these changes occur, the affected facilities will be required to be listed in the CSE.
- Jurisdictions in Los Angeles County are intensifying their efforts in promoting and developing facilities, including pilot facilities, utilizing conversion technologies as exemplified by the requirements imposed by the County of Los Angeles on the land use permit for the Puente Hills Landfill. The CSE's discussion on alternative disposal technology will need to be revised to address the specific permitting needs for conversion technology facilities and current status of development of these technologies.

The update to the CSE and CSP is anticipated to be completed by October 2006.

To assist jurisdictions in the County of Los Angeles in complying with AB 939, the County recommends that the CIWMB evaluate the feasibility of adopting a programmatic approach to determine a jurisdiction's compliance with AB 939, with less emphasis on strict disposal quantity measurement, and for jurisdictions to use the State's Disposal Reporting System as a means to measure the effectiveness of their programs. This was also recommended by the Senate Bill 2202 (Chapter 740, 2000 Statutes) Working Groups and discussed in the SB 2202 Report to the Legislature entitled, "A Comprehensive Analysis of the Integrated Waste Management Act Diversion Rate Measurement System. If adopted, it would redirect towards implementing more diversion programs the significant efforts and resources that local governments are currently spending to track, verify and correct misallocated disposal tonnages, to conduct new studies, and other mathematical compliance-related activities.

The County also recommends that the CIWMB promote and provide additional incentives for the development of alternatives to landfills, including conversion technologies. These technologies have the potential to enhance recycling of materials in California and manage residual wastes that would otherwise be sent to landfills or incinerators. The latest draft regulations pertaining to conversion technologies would create barriers instead of incentives, proposing requirements for conversion technologies more stringent than those needed for developing new landfills. Valid scientific analysis and a level playing field would allow these technologies to develop into a viable and much-needed solid waste management option for California.

In addition, the County recommends that the CIWMB do more to enhance market development activities in response to global market factors. One of the greatest barriers to increasing recycling of materials in California is a lack of adequate markets and scrap value for recyclable materials. The State could have a significant impact on the recycling market through procurement policies and other regulations.

## Introduction

Los Angeles County has the largest and most complex solid waste management system in the State and possibly in the country. In order to understand the complexity of the solid waste management issues, planning strategies, and challenges faced by the County, it is essential to fully comprehend the County's size, population, number of jurisdictions, public/private relationships, political and economic structure, as well as the dynamic nature of its solid waste management system.

Los Angeles County covers an area of approximately 4,100 square miles and consists of 88 Cities and more than 150 unincorporated County communities (see attached map of Los Angeles County, Appendix C). Home to nearly 10 million people (January 1, 2003), Los Angeles County is the most populous county in the nation, larger in population than 41 states and 162 countries. One out of every three California residents lives in Los Angeles County. The County's population is estimated to have increased by over 1 million since 1990 and is expected to increase by an additional 2 million residents by the year 2020<sup>1</sup>. This vigorous growth, coupled with comparable increases in economic activity, has had a major impact on the solid waste management infrastructure in the County, and continues to require a major concerted effort by all jurisdictions in the County to provide for the waste management needs of their residents.

Los Angeles County is also the nation's largest international trade center and second largest manufacturing center. The Port of Los Angeles has one the world's largest artificial harbors, is one of the nation's chief fishing ports, and houses one the world's largest fish-canning centers. The Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach are the leading gateway for trade between the United States and Asia.<sup>2</sup> If it were a separate country, Los Angeles County would be the 19th largest economy in the world.<sup>3</sup>

Los Angeles County was once the number one farm county in the nation. But over the last 50 years, agricultural importance has given way to rapid urban and industrial expansion. Now, Los Angeles County is a national leader in many industries including retail and wholesale distribution, apparel, aerospace and defense, finance and business services, oil-refining, international trade, tourism, and entertainment. The entertainment industry has always been an important component to the economy and history of Los Angeles County.

The strong economic growth of the County in the last few decades has been aided in part by having one of the most efficient and economical waste management systems in the nation. The County's current challenge lies in protecting the health, safety, and economic well-being of its residents while continuing to provide an environmentally safe, efficient, and economic solid waste management system.

### **Current Solid Waste Management Situation**

The solid waste management system in Los Angeles County is highly dynamic and requires responsible planning to protect public health and safety, conserve our natural resources, and protect the environment. Solid waste management service is an essential public service which must be made available without interruption to all residents and businesses. Los Angeles County relies on a unique mixture of publicly and privately owned and operated facilities to maintain a competitive environment for waste collection, recycling, and disposal. Solid waste is collected by more than 100 private waste haulers and several city governments. After collection, the waste is either hauled directly to 12 Class III landfills, 2 waste-to-energy facilities, or 5 permitted inert waste landfills; or indirectly through any of the 24 large-volume transfer stations/materials recovery facilities, and numerous recycling and composting facilities located throughout the County.

### **Recycling Condition**

The 89 jurisdictions in Los Angeles County are aggressively implementing a myriad of waste prevention, recycling, and composting programs to meet the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (Assembly Bill 939, as amended) 50 percent waste reduction mandate. Jurisdictions which do not comply with AB 939, may be subject to penalties of up to \$10,000 per day. It is estimated that the jurisdictions in Los Angeles County are collectively spending more than \$100 million per year on programs to comply with AB 939. These programs include a variable can rate system, standard curbside collection of recyclable and green waste materials, innovative school programs, aggressive outreach efforts to both residential and commercial sectors, and many others. Moreover, the County of Los Angeles has implemented the largest public household hazardous waste/electronic waste collection program in the nation serving the needs of all 10 million residents Countywide. As a result, more waste has been diverted in the County than any other region in the State -- more than 50 million tons since AB 939 was enacted. That is equivalent to filling 42 pyramids at Giza. Additional discussion of Los Angeles County jurisdictions' efforts to divert waste from disposal can be found on page 62.

In addition, the County and the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Task Force has actively promoted the development of conversion technologies to reduce our dependence on landfills and incinerators, including supporting State legislative Bills (Assembly Bills 2067 and 1939 in 2000 [which would have provided full diversion credit to conversion technologies] and the June 13, 2002 version of Assembly Bill 2770, Chapter 740 of 2002 Statutes [a study bill]). In addition, the Task Force recently formed a special panel of experts (i.e., Alternative Technology Advisory Subcommittee) whose sole responsibility is to investigate, promote, and implement conversion technologies. This panel is currently working with the County of Los Angeles to evaluate potential conversion technology facilities best suited for Southern California. The County and the Task Force believes that conversion technologies will complement and significantly enhance current recycling efforts, and given due credit for their environmental benefits while retaining environmental safeguards, they have the potential to fundamentally change how solid waste is managed.

### **Disposal Capacity Condition**

Through the effective planning and coordinated efforts of the jurisdictions within the County, the County of Los Angeles, and the County Sanitation Districts, the foundation has been set for ensuring long-term disposal capacity to address the needs of all residents and businesses Countywide. The Countywide Siting Element, which was adopted in 1998 by a majority of the cities, the County Board of Supervisors and the State, is the current long-term planning document to provide for the County's solid waste disposal needs (approximately 35,000 tons/day) for the residual waste remaining after undergoing all recycling and other waste diversion efforts. Since adoption of the Siting Element, much progress has been made in permitting in-County disposal capacity, which has helped maintain disposal capacity at nearly the same level as in 1997. Approximately 80 million tons of permitted in-County Class III landfill capacity remained as of January 1, 2003. Due to the lack of suitable sites for new in-County landfills, the Siting Element identified the long-term need to secure out-of-County disposal capacity, particularly through waste-by-rail, and other alternatives to manage the residual waste, including the utilization of conversion technologies. To date, the Sanitation Districts has committed millions of dollars to developing the local and remote waste-by-rail infrastructure, including developing facilities that can serve as the locations for loading waste into rail compatible containers. The Sanitation Districts has also secured waste-by-rail disposal capacity outside of the County by purchasing the Mesquite Regional Landfill in Imperial County and by entering into a purchase agreement for the Eagle Mountain Landfill in Riverside County. Each of these projects is capable of providing for waste-by-rail disposal of up to 20,000 tons per day of refuse for a period of 100 years.

Thus, while it is very important to develop substantial out-of-County disposal capacity as soon as possible and the in-County infrastructure necessary to access such capacity, jurisdictions in the County of Los Angeles must concurrently continue to intensify their efforts to encourage development of conversion technologies to manage the solid waste generated. For example, granting diversion credit for solid waste managed by means of such technologies could provide a needed boost to their development without the use of limited taxpayer dollars.

### **The Los Angeles County Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan**

To assure that the waste management practices of the cities and counties are consistent with the hierarchy of waste management practices defined Section 40051 of the Public Resources Code (i.e., in order of priority – source reduction, recycling and composting, and environmentally safe transformation and land disposal), counties are required to prepare and submit to the California Integrated Waste Management Board a Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan (ColWMP). The ColWMP is a set of solid waste planning documents prepared by cities and the County. The Los Angeles County ColWMP was approved by the Waste Board on June 23, 1999 in accordance with State Law (i.e., Sections 40051, 40052, and 41822 of the Public Resources Code).

The Los Angeles County CoIWMP is comprised of the following documents:

- 89 Source Reduction Recycling Elements (one for each jurisdiction)
- 89 Household Hazardous Waste Elements (one for each jurisdiction)
- 89 Non-Disposal Facility Elements (one for each jurisdiction)
- The Los Angeles County Countywide Integrated Waste Management Summary Plan (conditionally approved by the Waste Board on June 24, 1998 with final approval June 23, 1999. The Summary Plan, which is prepared and administered by the County, describes the steps that will be taken by jurisdictions, acting independently and in concert, to achieve the 50 percent waste diversion mandate)
- The Los Angeles County Countywide Siting Element (approved by the Waste Board on June 24, 1998. The Siting Element, which is prepared and administered by the County, is the long-term planning document that addresses the disposal capacity needs of all the cities and unincorporated areas within the county for a 15-year planning period)

The Los Angeles County CoIWMP, specifically:

- Establishes countywide objectives for integrated solid waste management;
- Describes the current countywide system of solid waste management and the governmental solid waste management infrastructure; and,
- Summarizes the types of programs and strategies aimed towards reducing, reusing, recycling and diverting solid waste generated within Los Angeles County.

### **Five-Year Review of the CoIWMP**

Section 41822 of the Public Resources requires each city and county to review its Source Reduction and Recycling Element or the CoIWMP at least once every five years to correct any deficiencies in the plan, comply with the source reduction and recycling requirements established under Section 41780 of the Public Resources Code, and revise the document as necessary. Since the Los Angeles County's CoIWMP was adopted on June 23, 1999, the County's first five-year review report must be submitted to the CIWMB by June 23, 2004.

The purpose of the Five-Year Review Report of the CoIWMP is to assure that the county's waste management practices remain consistent with the State's waste management hierarchy (Section 40051 of the Public Resources Code) which is:

1. Source reduction;
2. Recycling and composting; and,
3. Environmentally safe transformation and land disposal.

### **Five-Year Review Report of the CoIWMP**

Section 18788, Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations also identifies the minimum issues which must be addressed in the CoIWMP's Five-Year Review Report. The minimum issues are:

- Changes in demographics in the county;
- Changes in quantities of waste within the county;
- Changes in funding sources for administration of the Countywide Siting Element and Summary Plan;
- Changes in administrative responsibilities;
- Programs implementation status;
- Changes in permitted disposal capacity and quantities of waste disposed of in the County;
- Changes in available markets for recyclable materials; and,
- Changes in the implementation schedule.

### **Five-Year Review Report Timeline**

Section 18788, Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations outlines the process of the Five-Year Review Report. The process is as follows:

1. Prior to the fifth anniversary of Waste Board approval of the CoIWMP, the local task force must submit written comments on areas of the CoIWMP which require revision to the County and the Waste Board.
2. Within 45 days of receipt of comments, the county must determine if a revision is necessary and notify the local task force and the Waste Board of its findings in a Five-Year Review Report of the CoIWMP.
3. Within 90 days of receipt of the Five-Year Report of the CoIWMP, the Waste Board must review the county's findings and, at a public hearing, approve or disapprove the county's findings.

### **The Los Angeles County Department of Public Works**

Representing the County of Los Angeles, Public Works is responsible for:

- Advising the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors on solid waste management issues.
- Preparation and administration of the Countywide Siting Element, and the Countywide Summary Plan.
- Preparation and implementation of the County's unincorporated area Source Reduction and Recycling Element, Household Hazardous Waste Element, and Nondisposal Facility Element.
- Participating in the permitting and land use processes related to all solid waste facilities in the unincorporated County areas and enforcement of permit requirements under the purview of Public Works.
- Developing and operating numerous waste reduction and diversion programs including, but not limited to, the Countywide Yard Waste Program, the

Countywide Waste Tire Recycling Program, the Southern California Rubberized Asphalt Concrete Technology Center, the County's Business and Residential Recycling and Public Education Programs, the Countywide Environmental Hotline and Environmental Resources Internet Outreach, the Countywide Youth Education/Awareness Programs, and the Countywide Household Hazardous/Electronic Waste Management and Used Oil Collection Programs.

- Operating the largest Disposal Reporting System in the State, directly serving the disposal reporting needs of 89 local jurisdictions in Los Angeles County as well as hundreds of others throughout California, and accounting for approximately one-third of the State's solid waste disposal.
- Operating seven Garbage Disposal Districts, which include portions of the City of Malibu.

### **The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force**

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared by the County and the 88 cities in Los Angeles County, including the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Summary Plan and Countywide Siting Element. The Task Force's structure was approved by the majority of cities containing a majority of the incorporated population in Los Angeles County, as well as the County Board of Supervisors. Additional details regarding the Task Force, including a roster of current members, can be found in Section 3 of this Report.

### **Overview of Activities Surrounding The Five-Year Review Report**


Below is a summary of major milestones in preparation of the Five-Year Review Report.

- (1) On October 9, 2003, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works forwarded a letter to the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Task Force indicating its intent to commence the five-year review of the CoIWMP.
- (2) On October 16, 2003, Public Works provided an overview of the process to the Task Force that the five-year review of the CoIWMP will be commencing.
- (3) On November 13, 2003, Public Works, acting on behalf of the County and the Task Force, forwarded a survey to every city in Los Angeles County requesting information for inclusion in the Five-Year Review Report (see Appendix D). This information is needed to complete the Waste Board's Five-Year Review Report guidelines.
- (4) As of March 31, 2004, only 75 cities and the County unincorporated areas responded to the above survey despite multiple follow-up attempts. The delays in the cities' responses were mainly attributed to some cities experiencing frequent staff changes.

- (5) On April 1, 2004, Public Works met with staff from the California Integrated Waste Management Board to discuss possible alternatives to proceed with finalization of the Five-Year Review Report in compliance with the Waste Board's guidelines despite the missing data. Based on that discussion, Public Works proceeded with drafting the Five-Year Review Report utilizing Waste Board supplied data.
- (6) On May 20, 2004, the Task Force considered the draft Five-Year Review Report. The Task Force letter containing its written comments on the draft Five-Year Review Report is contained in Appendix E.
- (7) On June 21, 2004, the Task Force re-considered the revised draft Five-Year Review Report based on the comments made by the Task Force at its May 20 meeting. The Task Force letter concurring with the draft Five-Year Review Report is provided in Appendix F.
- (8) On June 23, 2004, on behalf of the County of Los Angeles, Public Works forwarded the Five-Year Review Report to the Waste Board for consideration.

## **Analysis**

Forty-five jurisdictions have received approval from the CIWMB for a Time Extension to meet their AB 939 diversion goals. Five Jurisdictions are on Compliance Order, one of which was fined a monetary penalty. Thirty-nine jurisdictions have met the 50 percent waste diversion goal or have received a Good Faith Effort from the CIWMB.

## **Additional Information**

(e.g., recent regional agency formation, newly incorporated city, etc.)

- On January 13, 2004, the Waste Board approved a Joint Powers Agreement between the Cities of Artesia, Beverly Hills, Duarte, Hidden Hills, Los Angeles, Lynwood, Manhattan Beach, Pomona, Rancho Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rosemead, Sierra Madre, South Gate, and Torrance to form of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority Regional Agency. A copy of the Waste Board Agenda staff report along with the final resolution is attached in Appendix G.
- The City of Lakewood is the only jurisdiction in Los Angeles County with a Waste Board-approved alternative diversion rate (42%).
- On September 16, 2003, the City of Gardena was fined \$70,000 for achieving a 13 percent waste diversion rate in 2000.

## **SECTION 3.0 LOCAL TASK FORCE REVIEW**

### **Overview**

Pursuant to Chapter 3.67 of the Los Angeles County Code and Assembly Bill 939, the Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared by the County and the 88 cities in Los Angeles County. The Task Force typically conducts its meeting on the third Thursday of every month to discuss, consider and make recommendations regarding solid waste management issues affecting Los Angeles County.

The Task Force's structure was approved by the majority of cities containing a majority of the incorporated population in Los Angeles County, as well as the County Board of Supervisors. The Task Force membership includes representatives of the League of California Cities (Los Angeles County Division), the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, the City of Los Angeles, the waste management industry, environmental groups, the public, and a number of other governmental agencies, including the South Coast Air Quality Management District.

The Task Force:

- Represents the interests of local governments, representing one-third of the population of the State and responsible for one-third of all diversion occurring in the State;
- Reviews all major solid waste planning documents prepared by the County and the 88 cities in Los Angeles County prior to their submittal to the California Integrated Waste Management Board;
- Identifies and projects the need for solid waste disposal, transfer and processing facilities; and,
- Facilitates the development of multi-jurisdictional marketing arrangements for diverted materials.

The Task Force has formed three subcommittees dedicated to specific tasks, as follows:

- Facility and Plan Review Subcommittee – advises the Task Force on Countywide planning documents and reviews facility requests for findings of conformance
- Public Education and Information Subcommittee – responsible for publishing the Inside Solid Waste quarterly newsletter, circulated countywide.
- Alternative Technology Advisory Subcommittee – evaluates and promotes the development of conversion technologies to reduce dependence on landfills and incinerators.

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Works serves as staff to the Task Force.

## **SECTION 4.0 SUMMARY OF FINDINGS**

As the lead solid waste management agency for the County of Los Angeles, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works has prepared the Five-Year Review Report of the Los Angeles County CoIWMP. Public Works contacted each city in the County to notify them of the start of the 5 Year Review process as well as to survey each city for relevant information. Public Works has also relied on the comprehensive information contained on the Waste Board's website, as well as the strong working relationship with cities and the Task Force to complete the Five-Year Review Report.

Based on the 2001 Annual Reports submitted by Los Angeles County jurisdictions, the County finds that all Source Reduction and Recycling Elements, Household Hazardous Waste Elements, and Non-Disposal Facility Elements, as updated through the associated Annual Reports, continue to fulfill the goals of AB 939 and thus do not need to be revised at this time. Furthermore, consistent with the CIWMB's draft Five-Year Review procedures:

- Jurisdictions continue to use their Annual Reports to the Waste Board to update program information (e.g., selected, implemented, alternative, planned programs).
- Compliance orders or plan of corrections can serve as updates to the Source Reduction and Recycling Element or Household Hazardous Waste Element (in terms of program implementation) when a jurisdiction is on compliance or has a Time Extension or Alternative Diversion Rate, respectively.
- Corrections to or approved new base years can serve as updates to the Solid Waste Generation Study component of the Source Reduction Recycling Element.
- Amendments to Nondisposal Facility Elements are reviewed by the Local Task Force, and by the CIWMB through the NDFE review and permit approval processes.

However, the goals, policies, and objectives of the Los Angeles County Countywide Integrated Waste Management Summary Plan and the Los Angeles County Countywide Siting Element will need to be updated to further assist local jurisdictions in Los Angeles County to meet AB 939 waste diversion goals and to reflect new solid waste management policies, funding sources, and administrative changes.

In particular, with the Waste Board's recent approval of the formation of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority Regional Agency on January 13, 2004, the County recommends that the Summary Plan's goals, policies, and programs be updated, in coordination with the Task Force, to reflect this new development, as well as to determine how best to assist local jurisdictions in Los Angeles County to meet the AB 939 waste diversion goals since 45 jurisdictions have received Waste Board-approved Time Extensions.

In addition, Elsmere Canyon Landfill and Blind Canyon Landfill will need to be removed from the Countywide Siting Element's list of potential new landfills. The removal of Elsmere Canyon Landfill will comply with the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors unanimous motion of September 30, 2003 (see Appendix A) directing Public Works to remove the sites from the Countywide Siting Element. Also, the removal of Blind Canyon Landfill is necessary since the site has not been made consistent with the County General Plan at the time of this Five-Year Review (see page 8-4 of the Los Angeles County Countywide Siting Element, copy enclosed in Appendix H).

Furthermore, the implementation of the C&D/Inert Debris Regulations, Phase II, may result in some previously "unpermitted" facilities (facilities which were not previously required to obtain a SWFP) being required to obtain either a Registration Permit or Full SWFP. Should these changes occur, the affected facilities will be required to be listed in the CSE. Also, jurisdictions in Los Angeles County are intensifying their efforts in promoting and developing facilities, including pilot facilities, utilizing conversion technologies as exemplified by the requirements imposed by the County of Los Angeles on the land use permit for the Puente Hills Landfill. The CSE's discussion on alternative disposal technology will need to be revised to address the specific permitting needs for conversion technology facilities, potential location for these facilities and current status of development of these technologies.

Therefore, the County finds that the Countywide Siting Element be revised to accommodate the removal of these two landfills. In addition, as the Countywide Siting Element is being revised, the goals and policies of the Countywide Siting Element would need to be re-evaluated to ensure adequate solid waste management services are provided over the 15-year planning period as well as to account for recently adopted/considered regulations that may impact the management of residual solid waste, including but not limited to conversion technologies.

**SECTION 5.0 TITLE 14, CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS  
SECTION 18788 (3)(A) THROUGH (H)**

The subsections below address not only the areas of change specified in the regulations, but also provide specific analysis regarding the continued adequacy of the planning documents in light of those changes, including a determination as to whether each necessitates a revision. A copy of the relevant sections of State law and regulations pertaining to the five-year review process is included in Appendix I.

**SECTION 5.1 CHANGES IN DEMOGRAPHICS IN THE COUNTY**

The following tables document the demographic changes in the county since 1990. The analysis addresses the adequacy of the planning documents in light of these changes and the need, if any, for revision.

- The residential/non-residential generation percentages have not changed significantly since the preparation of the planning documents, specifically the Solid Waste Generation Study (SWGS).
- The residential/non-residential generation percentages have changed significantly since the preparation of the original planning documents. The following table documents the new percentages and the data source.

## **Analysis**

- These demographic changes alone do not warrant a revision to any of the countywide planning documents. The basis for this determination is provided below.
- These demographic changes warrant a revision to one or more of the Countywide planning documents.

The County as a whole experienced a 7.4 percent growth in population between 1990 and 2000 countywide (see Table 5.1.2). The population growth has been significant in some cities while minimal to a notable decrease in others. The population growth has caused similar increases in housing units throughout the County. The Northern region of Los Angeles County saw some of the highest growth rates in population, with the population in the Cities of Lancaster, Palmdale, and Santa Clarita increasing by 22 percent, 69 percent, and 36 percent, respectively. Since this region is the least densely developed of the County, it has solid waste management issues that are different from the rest of the County.

Countywide employment increased 6 percent between 1990 and 2000. Employment numbers are indicators of employment trends and are not absolute counts of individuals (see Table 5.1.3).

Taxable sales growth throughout the County varied from city to city (see Table 5.1.4), but most cities followed the Countywide trend, increasing total taxable sales by double digit percentages. Taxable sales figures are the total taxable transactions (reported in thousands of dollars) for sales subject to sales and use taxes. Excluded are sales for resale, sales of nontaxable items such as food for home consumption and prescription medicines, and taxable sales disclosed in audits by the State Board of Equalization.

The County believes that these changing demographics are not significant to warrant revision to the planning documents. Most jurisdictions have had little and/or steady and predictable changes in demographics. Those jurisdictions experiencing more pronounced changes in demographics have responded to these changes by modifying their programs to achieve their AB 939 goals. Existing planning documents are sufficiently flexible to manage these changes, and therefore they do not warrant revision.

**SECTION 5.2 CHANGES IN QUANTITIES OF WASTE WITHIN THE COUNTY;  
AND CHANGES IN PERMITTED DISPOSAL CAPACITY AND WASTE DISPOSED IN  
THE COUNTY**

*1. Changes in Quantities of Waste within the County (as it relates to diversion program implementation)*

Table 5.2.1 below documents the changes in reported disposal figures from 1990, and 1995 through 2002. In addition, Table 5.2.2 compares the original Source Reduction and Recycling Element's projected 2000 disposal tonnages versus actual 2000 disposal tonnages. Additionally, the Biennial Review findings for each jurisdiction is provided in Table 5.2.3 below to demonstrate progress in implementing the SRRE and achieving diversion mandates. The analysis at the end of this section addresses how these changes are being addressed (e.g., how existing, new or planned programs deal with the reported changes in the quantities of waste) relative to the jurisdictions' ability to meet and maintain the diversion goal and the need, if any, for a revision to one or more of the planning documents.

**DISPOSAL**

The following table provides disposal data for Los Angeles County from the solid waste generation studies (1990) and each jurisdiction's Annual Reports (1995 through 2002).

### **Discussion**

Differences between the projected and reported disposal numbers are largely a reflection of the significant underestimated tonnage measured by jurisdictions in Los Angeles County when first measuring their base year disposal and waste

generation rates. The Waste Board acknowledged this discrepancy in 1998 when they approved a method proposed by the County to correct this discrepancy, also known as the "L.A. Fix." The Waste Board has also approved a number of new base year requests by Los Angeles County jurisdictions. These requests accompany new generation studies that take into account a better understanding of the solid waste management system improved data collection and analysis. Changes in the way disposal and diversion is counted also affected the reported numbers relative to the projected numbers. For further information, please refer to the analysis on page 65.

**DIVERSION**

The Biennial Review findings for the 89 jurisdictions in Los Angeles County is listed in Table 5.2.3 to demonstrate each jurisdiction's progress in implementing its Source Reduction and Recycling Element and achieving the mandated waste diversion requirements. Additionally, following this table is an explanation of any significant changes in diversion rate trends (e.g., report year tonnage modification, new or corrected solid waste generation studies, newly implemented programs).

**Explanation of Diversion Rate Trends (if applicable)**


The diversion performance for the county and each city is identified in Table 5.2.3.

- These changes in quantities of waste, as they relate to meeting and maintaining the mandated diversion goals, do not warrant a revision to any of the countywide planning documents. The basis for this determination is provided in the analysis section below.
- These changes in quantities of waste, as they relate the meeting and maintaining the mandated diversion goals, warrant a revision to one or more of the countywide planning documents.

**Analysis**

Jurisdictions in the County of Los Angeles have made tremendous progress in diverting waste from disposal since 1990 in an effort to meet the requirements of the Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939). The 88 cities within the County and County of Los Angeles have implemented a vast array of waste diversion programs which include some of the most comprehensive, successful and creative waste diversion programs in the country with an annual cost in excess of \$100,000,000. Appendix K provides a detailed account of various jurisdictions' recycling and other waste diversion programs. The results of these efforts are reflected in the significant reduction in the area's per capita disposal rate: at the end of 1980's, the per capita disposal rate was

3,200 lbs/person/year. As of 2002, this figure had dropped to 2,300 lbs/person/year. This is further highlighted by the figure below which shows a downward trend in the per capita disposal rate for the County of Los Angeles. Between 1990 and 2003, these diversion efforts have kept more than 50 million tons of Los Angeles County's waste from being disposed. This improvement is all the more significant in light of an 11% population increase in Los Angeles County from 1990 to 2003.



Los Angeles County jurisdictions continue to educate residents to help change the throwaway culture. As a result, area residents are taking more responsibility in protecting and preserving the environment. Waste that was traditionally disposed of in landfills is now being converted to other more useful products. New outreach programs stressing the message “Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle” continue to be implemented. This is augmented with programs offering incentives to reduce waste along with mandatory requirements, where appropriate.

These programs have resulted in a changing way of life and a new way of doing business in the County. Residential curbside recycling programs along with buy-back and drop-off recycling centers have become ubiquitous throughout the County. Green waste materials are recycled into mulch, natural fertilizers, or alternative daily cover. Household Hazardous Waste and E-Waste collection events welcome many thousands of people every year to help them properly dispose of these dangerous waste materials, preventing them from ending up in our landfills or, worse yet, dumped illegally.

The County continues to monitor landfill capacity and disposal rates to ensure that disposal services are available to residents and businesses in the County without interruption. The remaining landfill capacity and the rate of depletion of that capacity give an indication of the ability of jurisdictions in the County to meet the solid waste disposal needs of their residents and businesses, thereby protecting public health and safety and the environment. As a result of diversion efforts, the disposal rate at County

landfills has shown a gradual reduction. By having everyone do their part, including State agencies and school districts, we can protect our environment for future generations.

However, to measure a jurisdiction's compliance with AB 939 waste diversion mandates, the Waste Board developed the Disposal Reporting System to track the quantities of solid waste disposed by each jurisdiction. Mathematical compliance with the fifty-percent waste reduction mandate of AB 939 still eludes a majority of the jurisdictions in Los Angeles County. 45 jurisdictions have received approval from the Waste Board for a Time Extension to meet the goal, while an additional five are under Waste Board-issued Compliance Orders. Reviewing the status of Los Angeles County jurisdictions as a whole, it is clear that the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Summary Plan will need to be re-evaluated to ensure it remains adequate to meet the needs of Los Angeles County's jurisdictions in achieving AB 939's waste diversion goals.

Additionally, since inception of the DRS in 1995, local jurisdictions have expressed concern to the Waste Board regarding the accuracy of the DRS in determining and quantifying the waste by jurisdiction of origin. This problem is particularly acute in Los Angeles County with 88 cities and more than 150 unincorporated communities.

Therefore, the County recommends that the CIWMB:

- (1) Evaluate the feasibility of adopting a programmatic approach to determine a jurisdiction's compliance with AB 939 waste reduction mandates which places less emphasis on strict disposal quantity measurement.
- (2) Allow jurisdictions to use the State's Disposal Reporting System as a means to measure the effectiveness of their programs.
- (3) Promote and provide additional incentives for the development of alternatives to landfills (including conversion technologies).
- (4) Enhance market development activities in response to global market factors.

The preceding mirrors recommendations made by the Senate Bill 2202 (Chapter 740, 2000 Statutes) Working Groups and discussed in the Waste Board's SB 2202 Report to the Legislature entitled, "A Comprehensive Analysis of the Integrated Waste Management Act Diversion Rate Measurement System." If adopted, it would redirect towards implementing more diversion programs the significant efforts and resources that local governments are currently spending to track, verify an correct misallocated disposal tonnages, to conduct new studies, and other mathematical compliance activities

## 2. *Changes in Permitted Disposal Capacity and Quantities of Waste Disposed in the County*

The following addresses whether changes in permitted disposal capacity and waste quantities (both imported from out of county and generated in the county) affect Los Angeles County's ability to maintain 15 years of disposal capacity and includes a determination regarding the need for planning document revision.

- The county continues to have adequate disposal capacity (i.e., greater than 15 years). Supporting documentation is provided. See discussion below.
- The county will not have 15 years remaining disposal capacity. The analysis below provides the strategy for obtaining 15 years remaining disposal capacity. Attached is a revision schedule for the CSE.

*Analysis of Changes in Permitted Disposal Capacity and Quantities of Waste Disposed in the County*

The County Department of Public Works monitors landfill capacity and disposal rates to ensure that disposal services are available to residents and businesses in the County without interruption. The remaining landfill capacity and the rate of depletion of that capacity give an indication of the ability of jurisdictions in the County to meet the solid waste disposal needs of their residents and businesses, thereby protecting public health and safety and the environment. As a result of diversion efforts, the disposal rate at County landfills has shown a slow but gradual reduction over the last four years.

The County of Los Angeles has made significant strides towards permitting the landfill expansion capacity identified in the CSE. Since 1995, the following disposal facility expansions have been permitted:

- Antelope Valley Landfill
- Bradley Landfill
- Lancaster Landfill
- Pebbly Beach Landfill
- Puente Hills Landfill
- Southeast Resource Recovery Facility (SERRF)
- Sunshine Canyon Landfill

Thanks to the successful permitting of most of the landfill expansion capacity identified in the Countywide Siting Element, the remaining permitted in-County disposal capacity at the end of 2000 was nearly the same as in 1990 (98.7 million tons remaining in 1990 vs. 97.0 million tons remaining in 2000).



The County continues to support the development and expansion of in-County processing capacity, including recycling and materials recovery facilities, to divert materials from disposal and safely and efficiently manage solid waste generated by Los Angeles County jurisdictions. In addition, the County has recognized the need for the fast-track development of a waste-by-rail system to out-of-county remote landfills and has required, through the land use permit for the Puente Hills Landfill expansion, that the County Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County (CSD) meet specific deadlines for developing the waste-by-rail system. Failure to meet these deadlines would result in reductions in the daily permitted disposal capacity at the Puente Hills Landfill. With the recent purchase by the CSD of the Mesquite Regional Landfill (a fully-permitted landfill in Imperial County with a total disposal capacity of 600 million tons), the County of Los Angeles would have the equivalent of more than 50 years of disposal capacity at the current disposal rate.

Furthermore, jurisdictions in Los Angeles County are making significant efforts to promote the development of conversion technology facilities. The CSD has agreed, as a condition of approval of the land use permit for the Puente Hills Landfill, to provide up to \$100,000 per year for ten years to fund studies of conversion technologies and has committed to consider additional funding for a pilot facility should a viable conversion technology be identified. The City of Los Angeles is also spurring the development of conversion technologies. The City recently approved a contract to develop a conversion technology facility to manage the City's residual waste stream as a way to reach their goal of eliminating disposal at landfills within the City by 2006.

Despite these efforts, the County's permitted disposal capacity for in-County facilities is expected to drop in the future due to the limited availability of sites suitable for expansion of landfill capacity or new landfill development. Also, utilization of the capacity at remote landfills is dependent upon and potentially affected by a number of factors, including possible waste shed restrictions that may be imposed, daily tonnage limitations, use of the facilities by other jurisdictions, and most importantly, permitted and operational infrastructure capable of collecting, processing and delivering waste to the landfills safely and efficiently.

As a result, the County will continue to expand its efforts to divert materials from disposal at landfills and transformation facilities to the maximum extent feasible.

The following figures provide the status of all solid waste landfills within the County.



The Los Angeles County Countywide Siting Element identifies goals, policies, and strategies to maintain adequate permitted disposal capacity through a 15-year planning period. To provide this needed disposal capacity, the Siting Element identifies areas/sites within Los Angeles County which may be potentially suitable for development of new Class III landfill facilities or expansion of existing facilities. To provide for the long-term disposal needs of the County of Los Angeles as a whole, the Siting Element also includes goals and policies to facilitate the utilization of out-of-County/remote disposal facilities as well as to foster the development of innovative conversion technologies as alternatives to landfill disposal. In addition, the Siting Element identifies out-of-County disposal facilities that may be available to receive waste generated in Los Angeles County for disposal, and identifies conversion technologies that should be explored as an alternative to disposing of waste in landfills or transformation facilities. By pursuing all the above alternatives simultaneously, jurisdictions in the County of Los Angeles ensure that solid waste disposal service, an essential public service, is provided without interruption through the 15-year planning period, thereby protecting the health and safety of residents in the County. The Siting Element has been kept current through the County's annual report. The goals and policies in the CSE have served as a useful tool for meeting the mandates of AB 939.

The 2002 Countywide Siting Element Annual Report (the latest available report) demonstrated how Los Angeles County would be able to provide for 15 years of disposal capacity (see Appendix J). However, as indicated in the Annual Report, the County is recommending a revision to the Countywide Siting Element to remove Elsmere Canyon and Blind Canyon from the list of potential future landfill sites. This is in response to the County Board of Supervisors unanimous motion of September 30, 2003, requesting these sites be removed from the Countywide Siting Element's list of potential future landfill sites (see Appendix A) during the five-year review of the CoIWMP.

### **Blind Canyon**

The Countywide Siting Element identified Blind Canyon as a "tentatively reserved" landfill site. This site will be removed from CSE since the law requires that, should a "tentatively reserved" landfill site not be brought into consistency with the local jurisdictions' General Plan by the time of the five-year revision of the CoIWMP, it must be removed from the CSE. Blind Canyon has not been brought into consistency with the County of Los Angeles' General Plan.

### **Elsmere Canyon**

The Countywide Siting Element identified Elsmere Canyon as "reserved" landfill site. This site is located in areas designated as Non-Urban and Open-Space in the County General Plan. Solid waste landfill is one of the uses allowed in these areas and for the purposes of the Countywide Siting Element it was considered to be consistent with the County General Plan. However, in compliance with the County Board of Supervisors motion, and since the owner of the site (Browning-Ferris Industries, Inc.) has withdrawn its application for a Conditional Use Permit for the proposed Elsmere Canyon Landfill (see Appendix B), this site will be removed from the Countywide Siting Element.

The County has been able to demonstrate that it can adequately provide for the solid waste disposal needs of all 88 cities and the County unincorporated communities through the 15-year planning period without the use of the Elsmere and Blind Canyon sites (see 2002 Annual Report, Appendix E-2, Scenario VI).

The County recommends that the goals and policies of the Countywide Siting Element be re-evaluated to ensure their continued applicability and efficacy in providing for the long-term disposal needs of the County.

### **SECTION 5.3 CHANGES IN FUNDING SOURCE FOR ADMINISTRATION OF THE COUNTYWIDE SITING ELEMENT (CSE) AND SUMMARY PLAN (SP)**

#### **Analysis of Changes in Funding Source for Administration of the CSE SP:**

#### **Discussion**

While changes in funding source administration of the Countywide Siting Element and the Countywide Summary Plan do not on their own merit revision of planning documents, the County recommends that these issues be re-evaluated as these documents are revised in order to ensure funding sources are robust and adequate to continue to meet AB 939 waste diversion goals.

### **SECTION 5.4 CHANGES IN ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSIBILITIES**

#### **Analysis**

#### **Discussion**

Los Angeles County has not experienced significant changes in its administrative responsibilities as outlined in the current ColWMP. The County of Los Angeles continues to administer and implement Countywide programs such as:

- The Countywide Yard Waste Program
- The Countywide Waste Tire Recycling Program and the Southern California Rubberized Asphalt Concrete Technology Center
- The Countywide Environmental Hotline (1(888)CLEAN LA) and Environmental Resources Website ([www.888CleanLA.com](http://www.888CleanLA.com)) Internet Outreach
- The Countywide Youth Education/Awareness Programs
- The Countywide Household Hazardous/Electronic Waste Management and Used Oil Collection Programs

Each of the 88 cities, as well as the County of Los Angeles, continues to be responsible for their own programs. With the recent formation of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority Regional Agency, regionwide programs will need to be coordinated with other programs. This coordination will be addressed during the Summary Plan amendment process.

## **SECTION 5.5 PROGRAMS THAT WERE SCHEDULED TO BE IMPLEMENTED BUT WERE NOT**

### 1. Progress of Program Implementation

**Discussion**

Nearly all selected programs have been implemented. The programs not implemented in their scheduled year had either an extension, or have been supplemented with a contingent diversion strategy. The PARIS reports for each jurisdiction is contained in Appendix K. Moreover, since June 23, 1999, the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Task Force has reviewed and commented on the following non-disposal facility element amendments:

Goals are the key features of a vision of an integrated waste management future. Many goals are common to certain groups of jurisdiction. Many cities and the County of Los Angeles formed Joint Powers Authorities (JPAs) or other regional groups to develop

their SREEs and HHWEs. A number of these groups continue to work together after the planning documents were completed, indicating that inter-jurisdictional cooperation is successful.

## **SECTION 5.6 CHANGES IN AVAILABLE MARKETS FOR RECYCLABLE MATERIALS**

The following discusses any changes in available markets for recyclable materials including a determination as to whether these changes affect the adequacy of the ColWMP such that a revision to one or more of the planning documents is needed.

### **Discussion**

While the County's population and economy continues to grow and generate greater amounts of solid waste, jurisdictions in the County have made tremendous efforts in the area of recycling which has slowed down the rate of depletion of the County's valuable landfill capacity. But still many barriers exist in implementing effective and efficient waste diversion programs. The greatest barrier continues to be a lack of adequate and stable markets for recovered materials. The lack of adequate markets for recyclables directly correlates to higher collection and processing costs which, in turn, result in higher costs to residents and a lack of public and private sector participation. The County recommends that the State continue to:

- Address the need for sufficient State-wide market development to balance the local recovery of recyclable materials; and,
- Take a leadership role in the expansion of markets for recycled products since a variety of factors at the regional, national, and global levels can positively or adversely affect the markets for recycled products.

Another possible market for targeted materials includes the utilization of conversion technologies. Given proper incentives and with the elimination of unnecessary and burdensome barriers, conversion technologies are likely to be developed and convert unwanted residual solid waste into renewable and environmentally benign fuels, chemicals, and sources of clean energy (including electricity). In turn, conversion technologies would reduce our dependence on landfills, incinerators, imported fossil fuels, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Conversion technologies can open new and very significant energy, fuel, and chemical markets for residual materials. The County's waste management practices could greatly improve by utilizing those technologies. Unfortunately, many barriers exist which hamper the introduction of conversion technologies into the system.

For example, the lack of diversion credit has hampered the introduction of conversion technologies. Funding limitations due to absence of proven technology demonstration and usage plays another major role in conversion technologies skepticism. Public and private sectors are unwilling to take the risks since development costs are high and

there is lack of public-private partnerships to create funding. In addition, conversion technologies were not perceived as economically competitive under current market conditions since they are expensive in comparison to land disposal. Lack of knowledge on part of public and elected officials regarding the benefits of conversion technologies is yet another barrier. There is confusion among the public about the difference between conversion technologies and transformation facilities (a.k.a. waste-to-energy incinerators), which leads to limited awareness about capabilities and benefits of conversion technologies.

On May 20, 1999, the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Task Force adopted recommendations to address a number of issues that had arisen over the years regarding AB 939. These recommendations included promoting and developing alternatives to landfills and incinerators, such as conversion technologies. The Task Force recognized that conversion technologies have the potential to revolutionize the way we manage solid waste in California by creating additional markets for waste materials that are currently disposed of in landfills or transformation facilities. The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors subsequently adopted the recommendations of the Task Force on July 27, 1999. Since then, the County and the Task Force have taken an active role in promoting the development of alternative technologies, such as introducing a legislative proposal sponsored by the County (AB 1939, 2000). The analysis in Section 5.2 describes some of these efforts in greater detail.

However, the Waste Board is currently proposing regulations to regulate conversion technology facilities. As currently drafted (August 1, 2003 version), the proposed conversion technology regulations would impede the realization of such projects because it creates a process more restrictive and expensive than required for any solid waste disposal facility (including landfills). The County recommends that the Waste Board revise the proposed regulations so as not to impede the research and development of conversion technologies.

## **SECTION 5.7 CHANGES IN THE IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE**

Below is a discussion of changes in the implementation schedule and a determination as to whether these changes affect the adequacy of the CoIWMP such that a revision to one or more of the planning documents is necessary.

### **Discussion**

Nearly all programs selected in the CIWMP have been implemented on schedule. Some changes in the implantation schedule have occurred, but have not been significant. Program implementation status is reported individually by local agencies in each jurisdiction's Annual Report. The PARIS program listing for each of the 89 jurisdictions within Los Angeles County is included in Appendix K.

## **SECTION 6.0 OTHER ISSUES**

The following addresses any other significant issues/changes in the county and whether these changes affect the adequacy of the CoIWMP such that a revision to one or more of the planning documents is needed.

### **Discussion**

In addition to the issues raised by the Task Force in its letter to the Governor dated January 15, 2004 (see Appendix L), other issues facing Los Angeles County are the following:

### **Finding of Conformance Process**

The Finding of Conformance (FOC) process contained in the Countywide Siting Element was selected by jurisdictions in Los Angeles County as the mechanism to ensure that all new solid waste disposal facilities and expansions of existing solid waste disposal facilities are consistent with the Countywide Siting Element and its siting criteria. The FOC process is an important tool in ensuring that solid waste disposal facilities in Los Angeles County are properly sited and operated in conformance with the cities' and the County's solid waste management plans, as well as providing an essential public service to protect public health and safety, the environment, and the economic well-being of Los Angeles County. The FOC process is implemented under the auspices of the Task Force and provides a forum in which the public, local jurisdictions, public and private organizations, and other interested parties may voice their opinions regarding each individual project. The Task Force was convened pursuant to AB 939 and its membership includes representatives of the County, the cities, the solid waste industry, environmental organizations, and the general public.

As an element of the former Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Plan (CoSWMP), the FOC process has existed in Los Angeles County since the late 1970s. The FOC process was approved by the former California Solid Waste Management Board in lieu of provisions of the Government Code (Sections 66780.1 and 66796.32) for incorporation of new and expansion of existing solid waste management facilities into the CoSWMP.

Upon Waste Board approval of the CoIWMP in 1999, the CoIWMP superseded the CoSWMP. Under the process established in the Countywide Siting Element of the CoIWMP, new solid waste disposal facilities, expansions of existing solid waste disposal facilities, or existing solid waste disposal facilities that institute a "significant change" to their operation must obtain an FOC with the Countywide Siting Element granted by the Task Force. "Significant change" is defined as any change in the land use permit or Waste Discharge Requirements which requires compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act, any revision to the Solid Waste Facility Permit, or any increase in the daily permitted capacity.

In its review, the Task Force considers a project in relation to the goals, policies, and objectives of the Siting Element/CoIWMP, the siting criteria in the Countywide Siting Element, the policies of the Waste Board, and the policies in the local jurisdictions' General Plans. The Task Force also receives comments from the local jurisdiction where the project is located and adjacent jurisdictions (including comments on project implementation, proposed transportation routes, planned end uses, etc.), and examines the project with regard to potential Countywide or region-wide impacts.

Considering the time and effort required in preparation and certification of the necessary documents required pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act, obtaining approval by a majority of the cities with a majority of the cities' population ("double majority") and to comply with all other relevant requirements of the law for a Countywide siting element amendment, there is a need for the Waste Board to consider an alternative mechanism to address the concerns that may arise from the subject changes in a landfill's boundaries. The most important of these concerns are protecting public health and safety, public involvement, and avoiding unnecessary expenditures which for the County of Los Angeles are estimated to be in excess of \$250,000. The County recommends that, as an alternative to amending the Countywide Siting Element, the Waste Board utilize the FOC process that has been in existence for over 25 years in Los Angeles County since it would streamline the incorporation of needed solid waste facilities into the local waste management plans. The use of this process was approved by the former California Waste Management Board, used by the Waste Board in the past, and addresses the concerns of residents and neighboring jurisdictions.

### **Waste-by-Rail Projects**

Since the preparation of the Countywide Siting Element, much progress has been made in expanding permitted in-County disposal capacity, which has helped maintain the current remaining permitted disposal capacity above the level it was in 1990. However, there are few remaining disposal sites with potential for expansion and it is unlikely that new landfills will be developed due to lack of in-County sites suitable for landfill development. As regional disposal facilities close, there is an increasing need for regional transfer facilities to efficiently transport solid waste generated to more distant processing facilities and/or landfills. These transfer facilities are essential for the cities in Los Angeles County and the unincorporated communities to be able to properly manage solid waste to protect public health and safety and meet the requirements of AB 939.

Anticipating these developments, the Countywide Siting Element identified the long-term need to secure out-of-County disposal capacity and the in-County infrastructure needed to access such capacity, particularly through "waste-by-rail," and other alternatives to manage residual solid waste. Waste-by-rail is an alternative means of transporting solid waste (via trains) which could provide jurisdictions in Los Angeles County with access to a greater array of landfills that would otherwise be inaccessible or extremely expensive. In concept, the waste-by-rail system has the potential to reduce

labor, equipment and vehicle costs, and the amount of time typically associated with transportation of waste to out-of-County landfills by truck.

To date, the County Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County (CSD), which is a confederation of independent special districts whose Board of Directors is composed of City Mayors and the Chairperson of the County Board of Supervisors, has committed millions of dollars to developing the local and remote waste-by-rail infrastructure, including facilities that can serve as the locations for loading waste into rail-compatible containers. The Sanitation Districts has also secured waste-by-rail disposal capacity outside the County by purchasing the Mesquite Regional Landfill in Imperial County and by entering into a purchase agreement for Eagle Mountain Landfill in Riverside County. Each of these projects is capable of providing for waste-by-rail disposal of up to 20,000 tons per day of refuse for a period of 100 years.

To provide further impetus to the development of waste-by-rail, the County of Los Angeles, through the land use permit for the Puente Hills Landfill, imposed strict timelines for the CSD to develop a waste-by-rail system. Failure to meet these deadlines would result in reductions in the daily permitted disposal capacity at the Puente Hills Landfill.

### **A Growing Concern: Electronic and Universal Waste**

In 1988, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors established the Countywide Household Hazardous Waste Management Program. The mainstay of the Program is a year-round series of collection events staged every Saturday throughout the County. This is a free and convenient way for residents to manage their unwanted household hazardous waste (including paint, chemicals, batteries, etc.).

Electronic waste generation has dramatically increased over the past few years and is a matter of concern due to its toxicity and the inability of the existing infrastructure to manage this new "category" of waste. This has created a dilemma for local jurisdictions. For example, in Los Angeles County more than 2,000 computers become obsolete every day. Additionally, State regulations regarding the management of "universal waste" (such as mercury thermostats, florescent lamps, batteries, etc.) have added an additional burden on local jurisdictions to safely manage these wastes, especially the disposal ban of these materials at landfills (February 8, 2006) without implementing workable plans for alternative management. Recognizing that there was a need to address this new waste stream, in early 2002, the Countywide Household Hazardous Waste Management Program was expanded to collect cathode ray tubes (televisions and computer monitors) and consumer electronic devices due to their potential toxicity and reluctance of the electronic industry and the State to manage this category of waste. The collection program is considered one of the largest municipal electronic waste collection programs in the country. Every year, approximately 72 household hazardous waste collection events are conducted, of which 20 are conducted in partnership with the City of Los Angeles. In addition, the City of Los Angeles, in

partnership with the County of Los Angeles, operates permanent collection centers open to all residents countywide.

The Countywide HHW/E-Waste Management Program has given residents unparalleled access to free HHW/E-Waste management options in the vicinity of their community each year. However, funding the collection of electronic waste is expensive – totaling hundreds of thousands of dollars per year.

To financially assist local governments to manage a category of electronic waste (i.e., cathode ray tubes, such as computer monitors and televisions), the State passed a major electronic waste bill, Senate Bill 20 (Chapter 526) in 2003. SB 20 requires a recycling fee (between \$6 and \$10) be assessed on each cathode ray tube sold in the State. While SB 20 and its subsequent regulations partially addressed the electronic waste problem, the County recommends that additional legislation be passed to fully refund local jurisdictions costs in managing the remaining categories of electronic waste.

### **Impact of Construction and Demolition Regulations**

The Waste Board's Phase II construction and demolition debris regulations, adopted on September 17, 2003 and became effective February 24, 2004, may impact jurisdictions' diversion rate achievement and significantly impact the County in relation to ensuring the consistency of these facilities with the Siting Element and other Countywide planning documents. Some facilities which previously held a Solid Waste Facility Permit may now fall into the Enforcement Agency Notification tier if they met specified requirements. Conversely, some facilities which were previously "unpermitted" (i.e., did not possess an SWFP) may now require an SWFP or may fall into the Registration Permit tier which requires compliance with disposal reporting system regulations and would necessitate inclusion of the facilities into the Countywide Siting Element, thus requiring a revision to the Element. The full scope of this impact is not known at this time, pending the LEA evaluations of existing inert waste landfills.

This impact is similar to the affect of the Phase I C&D/Inert debris regulations, which resulted in some facilities that had previously been considered recycling facilities that may now fall within the new tiered permitting structure and may need to be incorporated into the NDFE of the relevant jurisdiction. The County of Los Angeles Department of Public Works and the Task Force will work with the Waste Board and the LEAs to encourage the timely evaluation of existing inert waste landfills and identification of those which will be placed in the Registration or Full Solid Waste Facility Permit tiers.

## **SECTION 7.0 ANNUAL REPORT REVIEW**



The following statement was entered into the record for Supervisor Antonovich:

“On May 27, 2003, the Board instructed the Director of Public Works to investigate the process for removing the Elsmere Canyon site from the Countywide Siting Element’s list of future landfill sites. Elsmere Canyon is an environmentally sensitive area of magnificent natural beauty, a natural and cultural treasure worthy of protection for the enjoyment and use of future generations. Browning-Ferris Industries, Inc., the owner of the site, has indicated publicly its intent to donate a portion of the site to the County for use as open space.

“On June 24, 2003, the Director of Public Works reported back to the Board regarding its findings. Based on these findings, the most cost-efficient means of removing Elsmere Canyon from the Siting Element is during the five-year review of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan.

“As required by State law, the Department of Public Works is about to commence the five-year review of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan to determine if it needs to be updated to reflect current disposal and recycling conditions. Should the Board decide to remove Elsmere Canyon at a later date after the five-year review and revision process is completed, the removal could take two more years at an additional cost of up to \$500,000.

“Moreover, I have recently been informed that Blind Canyon will need to be removed from the Siting Element at the time of the five-year review and revision of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan unless the site is made consistent with the County General Plan. Blind Canyon is located in the Santa Susana Mountains in the western part of the County in a significant ecological area. Furthermore, the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy already has acquired most of the site for use as parkland. This site is also worthy of preservation and should be removed from the Siting Element.”

Therefore, at the suggestion of Supervisor Antonovich and on motion of Supervisor Yaroslavsky, seconded by Supervisor Molina, unanimously carried (Supervisors Knabe and Antonovich being absent), the Director of Public Works was instructed to:

1. Take all necessary steps to remove Elsmere Canyon and Blind Canyon from the Countywide Siting Element's list of future landfill sites during the required five-year review of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan; and
2. Report back to the Board on the progress every 60 days.


### **ELSMERE CANYON**

On behalf of the Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force, I am hereby submitting the Task Force's comments on the draft Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan Five-Year Review Report.

Pursuant to Sections 41770 and 41822 of the California Public Resources Code and Section 18788, Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, the County must review the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan every five years to ensure that the County's waste management practices remain consistent with the State's waste management hierarchy (the anniversary date for the first five-year review of the CoIWMP is June 23, 2004). As part of this review process, the Task Force is required to provide written comments to the County on the areas of the CoIWMP which require revision.

We appreciate the efforts of Public Works' staff in putting together this extensive report and would like to thank Public Works for providing regular updates to the Task Force on its progress in conducting the five-year review since October 2003. The draft Five-Year Review Report was presented to the Task Force on May 20, 2004. The Task Force comments and recommendations on the draft Report are summarized below and listed in more detail in Enclosure A.

1. The Task Force would like to emphasize the critical importance of conversion technologies as an emerging option for solid waste management in California. Both the City and County of Los Angeles are implementing studies to consider the

development of such technologies in Southern California. For example, the County Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County has agreed, as a condition of approval of the land use permit for the Puente Hills Landfill, to provide up to \$100,000 per year for ten years to fund studies of conversion technologies and has committed to consider additional funding for a pilot facility in Southern California should a viable conversion technology be identified. Additionally, the City of Los Angeles recently approved a contract to develop a conversion technology facility to manage the City's residual waste stream as a way to reach their goal of eliminating disposal at landfills within the City by 2006.

The Task Force urges the California Integrated Waste Management Board to support scientific analysis of the impacts and benefits of these technologies, remove unnecessary barriers, and support policies that promote the development of these technologies including diversion credit for residual solid waste taken to such facilities that would otherwise be disposed in landfills or incineration facilities.

2. The Task Force would like to emphasize ongoing concerns about the effect of the Construction and Demolition/Inert Debris regulations promulgated by the Waste Board. Some facilities which were previously "unpermitted" (i.e., did not possess a Solid Waste Facility Permit) may now require an SWFP or may fall into the Registration Permit tier which requires compliance with disposal reporting system regulations and would necessitate inclusion of the facilities into the Countywide Siting Element thus requiring a revision to the Siting Element. Similarly, as a result of the Phase I C&D/Inert Debris regulations, some facilities that had previously been considered recycling facilities may now fall within the new tiered permitting structure and may need to be incorporated into the Nondisposal Facility Element of the relevant jurisdiction.

In order to mitigate the above potential impacts, the Task Force has requested the Waste Board compile the anticipated changes in the permitting status for facilities and operations in the County of Los Angeles and evaluate the impact of those changes as well as develop procedures to mitigate this impact and to help facilities/operations that will now fall under different classifications to transition into their new requirements (see Enclosure B).

3. The Task Force urges the Waste Board to develop and implement a programmatic approach to determine a jurisdiction's compliance with AB 939 waste reduction mandates. Nearly a decade of data has shown that substantiating mathematical compliance is at best a rough estimate, and errors in the Disposal Reporting

System are unavoidable in a metropolitan area such as the County of Los Angeles. The variability of the data is demonstrated in Enclosure C which includes a table showing projected and reported data in comparison to "actual" disposal data for the County of Los Angeles' jurisdictions for a sample year of 2001.

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5. As the two-year, quarter-million dollar revision process for the CoIWMP and its Siting Element gets underway, there is a need for the Waste Board to consider an alternative mechanism to address future incorporation of new conversion technology facilities into the Siting Element. Considering the time and effort expended in the preparation and certification of the environmental documents required pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act, obtaining approval by a majority of the cities with a majority of the cities' population ("double majority"), and complying with all other relevant requirements of the law for a Siting Element amendment, we urge the Waste Board to consider and support changes in legislation and regulations that would enable the use of the Finding of Conformance process as a means of incorporating into the Siting Element and ensuring consistency of new or expanded solid waste management facilities with the Siting Element in a reasonable and cost-effective manner.
6. It is important that the Report note the efforts of the County of Los Angeles in securing additional in-County disposal capacity (e.g., Puente Hills Landfill) while having the foresight to, through land use permit requirements, fast-track development of waste-by-rail to remote, out-of-County disposal facilities in addition to promoting the development of conversion technology facilities to handle residual waste which would otherwise be destined for incineration and land disposal.



The variability of the data is demonstrated in Enclosure C which includes a table showing projected and reported data in comparison to "actual" disposal data for the County of Los Angeles' jurisdictions for a sample year of 2001.

#### I. ISSUE/PROBLEM STATEMENT

In a letter to the Board dated January 30, 2003 (see Attachment 1), the City of Los Angeles announced the formation of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority, a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) currently representing its members and requested Board staff to prepare an agenda item for the Board to consider approving the Los Angeles Regional Agency (LARA). (see Attachment 2)

Based on discussion and comments raised at the November 18-19, 2003 Board meeting, Chair, Linda Moulten-Patterson, directed staff to work with the LARA representatives address and resolve concerns raised by Board members and staff. On December 18, 2003, Board staff met with representatives from the City and jurisdictions that were proposed as part of the regional agency (LARA). Also in attendance at that meeting were Board Members Steve Jones and Carl Washington. Concerns were discussed and a consensus was reached regarding resolution of the issues.

As a result of the consensus reached at the December meeting, Board staff is recommending approval of the proposed LARA.

#### II. ITEM HISTORY

The Board has approved all of the documents that comprise the Regional Agency Integrated Waste Management Plan, including the Source Reduction and Recycling Element (SRRE) and Household Hazardous Waste Element (HHWE) for each jurisdiction listed in the JPA member roster.

An item was prepared for the July 15-16, 2003 Board Meeting. In considering the item and testimony provided at the meeting from the JPA Manager, the Board continued the item until the August Board Meeting and directed staff to provide additional clarification and detail on legal matters pertaining to the Board's authority to disapprove formation of a regional agency, conditional approvals, and distribution of fines to regional agency members. An item was scheduled for the August 12-13, 2003 Board Meeting, that included an addendum prepared by Board legal staff to answer the Board's questions (see Attachment 3). Prior to the August Board Meeting the JPA Manager requested that the item be pulled.

At the November 18 -19, 2003 Board meeting, this item was heard by the Board at the request of the JPA Manager. Board staff raised concerns about the formation of the LARA and was directed by the Board Chair to continue to have discussions with the representatives from the City to see if those concerns could be resolved. On December 18, 2003, Board staff, along with Board Members Jones and Washington, met with members of the City and

local jurisdictions that are part of the proposed LARA to discuss and resolve the concerns raised by Board staff.

### **III. OPTIONS FOR THE BOARD**

1. The Board may approve the formation of the LARA between the fourteen participating cities.
2. The Board may deny the request to approve the LARA.
3. The Board may direct the staff to analyze additional information, as determined by the Board, and provide a revised recommendation at a future Board meeting.

### **IV. STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends the Board adopt Option 1

### **V. ANALYSIS**

#### **A. Key Issues and Findings**

##### Background

Jurisdictions form a regional agency by first creating a JPA as outlined in the California Government Code Sections 6500 et seq. The Board must then review the JPA agreement to determine that provisions required in PRC Section 40975 are established with a properly executed JPA.

In a letter to the Board dated January 30, 2003, the City of Los Angeles announced the formation of a JPA and requested Board staff to prepare an agenda item for the Board to consider approving the LARA. The letter described the purpose of LARA would be to report progress in meeting AB 939 diversion requirements as a single entity for members listed in the JPA. The LARA will be responsible for compliance with the waste diversion requirements set forth in the Public Resources Code, Article 1 of Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 41780).

The JPA Manager originally provided Board staff with a JPA roster that included fifteen jurisdictions and proof of each member's City Council actions to approve and execute the JPA. This information was brought to the Board at its July 15-16, 2003 Board Meeting, but the item was continued as the Board directed staff to research several legal issues.

The JPA Manager has recently requested that the Board consider the formation of the LARA for fourteen members instead of the fifteen that were originally included in the JPA membership roster previously provided to Board staff. The new JPA member roster omits the City of Gardena.

Based on the direction of the Board Chair, a meeting was held in Long Beach on December 18, 2003, to discuss issues and concerns regarding the formation of the LARA. The purpose of the meeting was to resolve those issues and bring the item back to the Board for further consideration.

At the December meeting the following was agreed to by the parties in attendance:

- the effective date of the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) submitted to the CIWMB for LARA formation be the same date that the CIWMB approves LARA as a Regional Agency;
- the initial membership of LARA will be 14 member cities, including Artesia, Beverly Hills, Duarte, Hidden Hills, Los Angeles, Lynwood, Manhattan Beach, Pomona, Rancho Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rosemead, Sierra Madre, South Gate, and Torrance;
- Gardena will not be included in the initial membership. If Gardena chooses to submit a letter of withdrawal to the CIWMB and other potential LARA members, then LARA members agree to waive any notification period as interpreted from the JPA. Gardena is welcome to join LARA in the future as they implement their Compliance Order/Penalty Order plan of action;
- LARA will submit one consolidated Electronic Annual Report (EAR) for all of its member jurisdictions by summarizing the program activities for its members;
- the jurisdictions on SB 1066 time extensions submit on-line time extension update reports as required;
- the jurisdictions on compliance orders will submit their quarterly compliance status reports as required;
- LARA members will continue to report tonnage disposed at landfill as individual jurisdictions;
- LARA members will continue to have the opportunity to correct inaccurate Disposal Reporting System information by preparing a Reporting Year Tonnage Modification Request for CIWMB staff review;
- CIWMB staff will have access to program data and diversion tonnages through hauler records or other detailed supporting documentations for verification of program effectiveness. On a case-by-case basis, CIWMB staff can request and LARA administrators will assist in obtaining this information from member jurisdictions; and,
- that upon the preparation of a base year study for LARA, generation data from individual jurisdictions will be provided to CIWMB staff as well as consolidated generation data to facilitate review.

There are 89 jurisdictions in Los Angeles County. All members of the JPA are located with Los Angeles County. Geographically the cities are non-contiguous with one city located in the western part of county, two in the San Gabriel Valley, two in the central area of the County, and the remainder in the South Bay Area.

#### Basis for staff's analysis

The following is a list of the required regional agency formation agreement provisions required by PRC Section 40975(b) and staff's analysis of how the JPA presents each of these provisions:

#### **A listing of the cities and counties, which are members.**

The JPA Manager has provided the Board with a new JPA member roster that excludes the City of Gardena and includes fourteen members from the previously submitted member roster, including: Artesia, Beverly Hills, Duarte, Hidden Hills, Los Angeles, Lynwood, Manhattan Beach, Pomona, Rancho Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rosemead, Sierra Madre, South Gate and Torrance.

In addition to the member roster listing, the JPA Manager has provided a declaration from each member jurisdiction that the JPA has been approved and executed by each member's City Council. Letters have also been provided by ten member jurisdictions agreeing to the establishment of LARA as discussed at the December 18, 2003 meeting.

**A description of the method by which any civil penalties imposed by the Board will be allocated among the member jurisdictions.**

The JPA, in Section 8.3, establishes the responsibility for any civil penalties incurred pursuant to AB939 shall be assigned to the regional agency. If the Board authorizes penalties against the regional agency, the JPA prescribes that penalties will be allocated to members based upon equal division of the monetary fine between all of the participating members. Any modification to this basis for determining the method that civil penalties will be allocated must be codified in the operating by-laws of the regional agency.

**A contingency plan, which shows how the member jurisdictions will comply with the requirements of the Integrated Waste Management Act in the event that the LARA is abolished.**

In the event that the JPA is terminated, individual Jurisdictions will assume responsibility for a share of any civil penalties incurred by the Agency during the term of the Jurisdiction as a Member. Jurisdictions will also be responsible individually for any civil penalties incurred individually. If this Agreement is terminated, each Jurisdiction will assume responsibility for compiling their own disposal information from haulers and facility operators for compliance with the monitoring and reporting system required pursuant to PRC Sections 41780 and 41821.5, unless a subsequent regional agency formation agreement is approved specifically for this purpose. Each member Jurisdiction is still responsible for the implementation of the programs described in their respective Source Reduction and Recycling Element.

**A description of the duties and responsibilities of each member jurisdiction.**

In addition to its role as a member of the LARA, the City of Los Angeles is designated as the administering agency for reporting and tracking solid waste diversion programs on behalf of the other members. The City designates its Bureau of Sanitation, to fulfill administrative functions.

- Each member will be responsible for funding and/or implementing programs recommended for implementation in their jurisdiction as adopted in their respective SRRE and for continued support of the associated programs as adopted in their respective HHWE.
- Each Member will also provide funding of the Agency for its operation in accordance with Section 9, the implementation of regional programs, and for preparing the annual regional diversion rate calculation for the progress made by the LARA.
- Each member shall provide the information required for annual report or new base year compilation to the Agency in a timely manner according to the format set forth by the Agency.

Board staff notes that since each member will be responsible for funding and implementing programs, the LARA annual report will need to provide information about each jurisdictions disposal and diversion program implementation activity. Board staff may request diversion program tonnage data to review the effectiveness of any individual members programs.

In addition many of the jurisdictions on the JPA roster are working on time extensions or compliance orders that have been approved by the Board. These jurisdictions will be required to report on their progress in implementing new or expanded programs that were agreed to in their plan approved or developed in conjunction with the Board. The Board may request specific diversion tonnage data to review the effectiveness of any individual jurisdictions programs.

The JPA Manager has also indicated in previous discussions with Board staff that jurisdiction disposal and diversion rates will be evaluated for each member jurisdiction to determine the effectiveness of programs and that individual member programs will be reported separately.

**A description of source reduction, recycling, and composting programs to be implemented by the regional agency which shall be at least as comprehensive as the programs chosen by the individual jurisdictions in their SRREs.**

Each Member of the Agency is responsible for and shall continue to implement diversion programs in their adopted and approved SRRE that are specific to their Jurisdiction. Failure to implement these programs will provide cause for termination of the member from the JPA.

**Any additional element as determined to be needed by the members of the LARA.**

The JPA agreement contains additional provisions desired by the member jurisdictions that are not directly related to the statutory requirements.

Staff notes that although not required for inclusion in the JPA agreement, procedures for adding or deleting members from LARA was included in the JPA and the JPA Manager requested that if the JPA recommends removal of a member that the Board promptly prepare an agenda item for the Board to consider the removal. Staff have discussed procedures with the JPA Manager and provided guidance in a letter from Board staff dated March 5, 2003, to instruct the JPA on needed Board approvals. To add or delete members, the JPA will need to inform Board staff of member changes so that a public meeting can be scheduled by the Board to consider member changes. Until the Board approves new or removed members, these changes to membership will not be considered part of the LARA in the Board's consideration of LARA's compliance with diversion requirements. Board staff will promptly bring member removal actions to the Board for consideration. The letter also acknowledges that requests to add or remove jurisdictions can be consolidated by the LARA to provide a single list of changes to LARA that could be considered by the Board each year.

To facilitate the ease of updating any Board database, the combined base year totals and outcomes of the Board's most recent consideration of each member of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority are listed below:

Findings

- 1. The LARA meets the requirements of PRC 40975(b)(1) which requires that it list all of the members of the Regional Agency because the amended JPA member roster now being presented does not include Gardena.*

Jurisdictions form a regional agency by first creating a JPA as outlined in the California Government Code Sections 6500 et seq. The Board must then review the JPA agreement to determine that provisions required in PRC Section 40975 are established within a properly executed JPA.

On December 18, 2003, Board staff in a meeting with representatives of the proposed LARA agreed that the formation of the JPA would be conditioned upon the approval of the Regional agency by the CIWMB. Those jurisdictions identified as members of the JPA at the time the Regional Agency is approved by the Board, would constitute the members of the JPA for purposes of the LARA. Any additional members or deletion of existing members as approved by the Board, would require approval by the Board at a future Board meeting.

Based upon the agreements reached at the December 18, 2003 meeting, Board staff concurs that LARA is a formal JPA with 14 members at the time the Board approves the regional agency.

- 2. Two members in the JPA have compliance orders and several other members are working on Board approved time extensions. Board staff are concerned that it continue to have individual members disposal, diversion and program data in order to evaluate that each member has not diminished its responsibilities to implement effective diversion programs and complete agreements with the Board.*

PRC section 40970 which describes Legislative intent regarding the approval of regional agencies provides that:

*“... It is not the intent of the Legislature in enacting this article to diminish the responsibility of individual cities and counties to implement source reduction, recycling, and composting programs as required by this part....”*

Board staff notes that JPA provisions describe that each member will be responsible for funding and implementing its own diversion programs, but will submit an Annual Report as a single entity. As noted in the LARA base year analysis table included in this item, upon formation the LARA as a whole would have a diversion rate of 58%. This could lead to the misconception that these jurisdictions would no longer need to implement the new or expanded programs previously deemed necessary to meet diversion requirements. This would be contrary to the express intent of the Legislature quoted above.

Two approved members of the JPA are on compliance orders, and nine other members are working on Board approved time extensions. Jurisdictions that are on a time extension or compliance order are required to report on their progress in implemented new or expanded programs that were agreed to in their Board approved plans. In addition to details of program implementation, staff will need to evaluate individual members disposal and diversion data in order to conduct a reasonable review of progress to correct previously identified deficiencies in meeting diversion requirements and compliance with member agreements with the Board.

If LARA is approved, the Annual Report will need to provide information about each jurisdictions disposal and diversion program implementation activity. This means that regardless of whether the regional agency is approved or not, jurisdictions should be prepared to describe the programs that are being implemented in their jurisdiction and maintain documentation to support the effectiveness of programs.

Based on discussions of reporting requirements at the December 18<sup>th</sup> meeting in Long Beach, the reporting issues raised by staff have been addressed. The representatives of LARA and it's member jurisdictions have agreed to provide the necessary information to monitor the progress of all its members, especially those on SB 1066 time extensions and on a compliance order.

Therefore, if the Board decides to approve LARA, staff recommends the Board place conditions on the approval of LARA to require that program activities specified in each member City's Board approved compliance order or time extension be completed and all programs fully implemented. The Board should also resolve that the Annual Report submitted by LARA should include detail of the individual members disposal information that is collected through the Board's Disposal Reporting System and program and program implementation information and data as needed to document the effectiveness of programs being implemented.

## **B. Environmental Issues**

Based on available information, staff is not aware of any environmental issues related to this item.

**C. Program/Long Term Impacts**

Statue allows the creation of regional agencies to reduce the cost of reporting and tracking of disposal and diversion programs and to increase the diversion of solid waste from landfills.

**D. Stakeholder Impacts**

Board authorization of a regional agency is provided in order to reduce costs through local coordination in reporting and program implementation activities. The JPA Manager has provided correspondence from ten jurisdictions that indicate that further delay in the Board’s consideration of the formation of a LARA will significantly affect the member’s ability to prepare timely 2002 Annual Reports as required.

Board staff notes that since each member will be responsible for funding and implementing programs that the LARA annual report will need to provide information about each jurisdictions disposal and diversion program implementation activity. This means that regardless of whether the regional agency is approved or not, jurisdictions should be prepared to describe the program that are being implemented in the jurisdiction and maintain documentation to support the effectiveness of programs.

In addition many of the jurisdictions on the JPA roster are working on time extensions or compliance orders that have been approved by the Board. These jurisdictions will be required to report on their progress in implemented new or expanded programs that were agreed to in the ir plan approved or developed in conjunction with the Board. The Board may request specific diversion tonnage data to review the effectiveness of any individual jurisdictions programs.

**E. Fiscal Impacts**

No fiscal impact to the Board results from this item.

**F. Legal Issues**

This item represents the process for implementing PRC Section 40970 that allows jurisdictions to form regional agencies for the purpose of meeting the mandates of the Integrated Waste Management Act. The agreement between the fourteen participating cities is both a JPA and a regional agency formation agreement, and was reviewed by Board staff and legal counsel for content requirements of PRC Section 40975.

In the Board’s previous consideration of the formation of LARA at its July 15-16, 2003, Board Meeting, the Board directed legal staff to provide additional clarification and detail on legal matters pertaining to the Board’s authority to disapprove the formation of a regional agency, various conditional approvals, and distribution of fines to regional agency members in recognition of recent pertinent legislation (See Attachment 3).

- **Environmental Justice Issues.** According to the JPA representative, the member jurisdictions are not aware of any environmental justice issues in their communities related to solid waste management.
- **Efforts at Environmental Justice Outreach.** Member jurisdictions use newsletters, cable ads, street banners, guidebooks and web based information to promote recycling to residential and commercial sectors. Some handouts are provided in Spanish and Chinese. In some cases, LARA will target specific neighborhoods. The goals are to enhance awareness of the need for waste reduction and recycling and to reach as many communities as possible. The LARA may be involved in community fairs and provide information on waste reduction and recycling to residents and businesses.
- **Project Benefits.** A regional agency creates a structure that has the potential to improve local coordination in reporting and program implementation activities that can include efforts to improve communication and services to all citizens and businesses located within the jurisdiction's of LARA members.

This letter serves to announce the formation of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority, also known as the Los Angeles Area Regional Agency (LARA), a Joint Powers Authority currently representing 14 jurisdictions in the Los Angeles County. The LARA members request that the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) schedule an item for the March 2003 Board meeting to approve the LARA as a Regional Agency as allowed per Public Resources Code Sections 40970 through 40975. With CIWMB approval, LARA will be the responsible agency to submit a consolidated AB 939 Annual Report for member jurisdictions, in order to reduce the cost of reporting and tracking of disposal and diversion. The LARA will also work towards the implementation of regional waste reduction and recycling programs for its members, to decrease the amounts of solid waste reaching disposal facilities.

Beginning in January 2002, jurisdictions in Los Angeles County have met several times to discuss and then draft the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) for formation of the LARA. After the JPA was drafted, it was distributed to all potential members for a 45-day review period. Comments were taken from many potential members and discussed in a public meeting, with consensus on final modifications. The final JPA was distributed to all potential members in August 2002. The twelve charter members have approved, signed, and returned the JPA to forward to the CIWMB for approval.


Our staff have consulted extensively with CIWMB staff, particularly Elliot Block who provided sample approved agreements and assisted in the development and review of the JPA. Steve Uselton of the Office of Local Assistance (OLA) participated in the initial formation meeting, and our staff will work closely with OLA to provide the tools and information needed for Annual Report review. CIWMB staff have provided much needed assistance to staff in the formation of the LARA.

each a municipal corporation, hereinafter also referred to individually as "Party" and collectively as "Parties".

**Whereas**, Section 6500, et seq., of the California Government Code (Title 1, Division 7, Chapter 5, Article 1) provides for agreements between two or more public agencies to jointly exercise any power common to the contracting parties, subject to certain mandatory provisions contained therein; and

**Whereas**, the State of California has enacted the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939), California Public Resources Code § 40000 et seq., mandating that

municipalities and county unincorporated areas divert material from disposal, and has promulgated regulations promoting material reuse and recycling; and

**Whereas**, the foregoing Parties to this agreement have the power to provide waste management services including the storage, collection, recycling, and disposal of solid wastes within their respective jurisdictions; and

**Whereas**, the foregoing Parties desire and agree to form a regional agency to report as a single entity the annual regional compliance with AB 939 reporting requirements and to work towards the implementation of regional waste reduction and regional recycling diversion programs; and

**Whereas**, each of the foregoing Parties has a California Integrated Waste Management Board approved Source Reduction and Recycling Element, a California Integrated Waste Management Board approved Solid Waste Generation Study, a California Integrated Waste Management Board approved Household Hazardous Waste Element, and a California Integrated Waste Management Board approved Non-Disposal Facility Element; and

**Whereas**, on the date above, this agreement was entered into by the Parties to this agreement whereby the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority is established to be a "Regional Agency" entity to provide cooperative solid waste reporting and program activities to the participating parties; and

**Whereas**, the California Public Resources Code, Sections 40970 through Section 40975 allows cities and counties to form Regional Agencies to implement PRC Division 30, Part 2, Integrated

Waste Management Plans, in order to reduce the cost of reporting and tracking of disposal and diversion programs by individual jurisdictions and counties and to increase the diversion of solid waste from disposal facilities; and

**Whereas**, by this agreement, the parties hereto wish to enter into this agreement to form a Regional Agency for purposes of combining disposal and diversion quantities for determining compliance with the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 and to allow for the efficient operation of diversion programs on a region-wide basis; and

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

#### **Section 1. Definitions**

- A. **Agreement.** This agreement as it is now exists, or as it may be amended.
- B. **AB 939.** The California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989.
- C. **Agency/Regional Agency.** Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority, formed pursuant to California Public Resources Code Sections 40970 through 40975 and approved by the CIWMB.
- D. **Annual Report.** The report required by the State of California to measure compliance to the provisions of AB 939.
- E. **Board.** Body consisting of a representative designated by the governing body of each member.
- F. **Chair/Vice-Chair.** Members elected by a majority vote of the Board with responsibilities as stated in Section 10.3.

- G. **CIWMB.** California Integrated Waste Management Board.
- H. **Fiscal Year.** Any year beginning July 1 and ending June 30.
- I. **HHWE.** Household Hazardous Waste Element
- J. **Jurisdiction.** Incorporated Parties who may be Members of the Agency.
- K. **Manager.** Individual responsible for the administration of the Agency.
- L. **Member/Members.** Jurisdictions who are parties to the Agreement.
- M. **NDFE.** Non-Disposal Facility Element
- N. **SRRE.** Source Reduction and Recycling Element
- O. **Treasurer.** Member elected by the Board with duties as stated in Section 10.3.

## **Section 2. Purpose of Agreement**

This Agreement is made and entered into for the purpose of forming a Regional Agency pursuant to California Public Resources Code Sections 40970 through 40975, the Regional Agency being established for purposes of combining disposal and diversion quantities for determining compliance with AB 939, to allow for the efficient operation of diversion programs on a region-wide basis as allowed by Members under this agreement, and to allow for the development of Regional Integrated Waste Management Plans including a Source Reduction and Recycling Element, Household Hazardous Waste Element, and Non-Disposal Facility Element.

The Agency will pool together the resources of its Members as stated in this agreement to provide AB 939 compliance to the residents and businesses of all who participate under a single umbrella organization. The Agency will be responsible for preparing the annual regional diversion rate calculation for the Regional Agency, and submitting the report to the CIWMB.

The Members enter the agreement with the intent to benefit from the regional programs and regional reporting that the Agency will provide.

**Section 3. Term of Agreement**

The term of this agreement shall commence on \_\_\_\_\_, and shall continue until amended or terminated pursuant to the terms contained herein.

**Section 4. Powers of the Agency**

4.1 The Agency is authorized to perform the following functions as required by the terms of this Agreement and the by-laws of the Agency:

- a) to make and enter into contracts;
- b) to apply for and accept grants, advances and contributions;
- c) to make plans and conduct studies;
- d) to incur and discharge debts, liabilities and obligations;
- e) to hire agents and employees.

4.2 Such powers shall be exercised subject only to the limitations set forth in this Agreement, applicable law and such restrictions upon the manner of exercising such powers as are imposed by law upon the Members in the exercise of similar powers. In no event do these powers expressly granted restrict the individual power of each Member with regards to solid waste management under their jurisdiction. Furthermore, in no event shall the Agency be authorized to exercise any power not expressly granted by this Agreement. The Members hereby designate the City of Los Angeles as the Member required to be designated by Section 6509 of the California Government Code.

## **Section 5. Responsibilities of the Regional Agency**

- 5.1 This Agreement hereby creates and establishes an authority to be known as the “Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority”. The Authority shall constitute a Regional Agency pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 40973. Said Agency shall be responsible for compliance with the waste diversion requirements set forth in the Public Resources Code, Article 1 of Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 41780).
- 5.2 The Agency will be responsible for providing the following services for the benefit of the Members:
- a) The Agency will be responsible for preparing the Annual Report with collective information submitted by the Members and submitting the report to the CIWMB;
  - b) The Agency will prepare the annual collective diversion rate calculation for all Members;
  - c) The Agency will develop standardized database tools for monitoring, tracking, and evaluating implemented jurisdiction owned / operated diversion programs and make them available to all members;
  - d) The Agency will conduct a new “regional level” generation based diversion study when required by the CIWMB or when a study is needed for a new baseline for its Members;
  - e) The Agency will provide legislative and regulatory analysis on pending regulations and legislation for Members;
  - f) The Agency will seek grant funding for additional Regional Agency activities.
  - g) The Agency will evaluate and disseminate information to Members about innovative waste management/recycling technologies.

As directed by the Board and upon available funding, the Agency will conduct additional programs based on additional funding such as but not limited to: cooperative food waste donation for reuse, technical assistance for business recycling, investigate forming cooperative partnerships to develop additional capacity for processing and/or reuse of materials and/or to pool buying power of Members to lower the cost of recycled content products.

**Section 6. Duties and responsibilities of Member Jurisdictions**

- 6.1 Each Member will be responsible for funding and/or implementing programs recommended for implementation in their jurisdiction as adopted in their respective SRRE and for continued support of the associated programs as adopted in their respective HHWE.
- 6.2 Each Member will also provide funding of the Agency for its operation in accordance with Section 9, the implementation of regional programs, and for preparing the annual regional diversion rate calculation for the progress made by the Regional Agency.
- 6.3 Each Member shall provide the information required for annual report or new base year compilation to the Agency in a timely manner according to the format set forth by the Agency.

**Section 7. Approval of Agreement by the California Integrated Waste Management Board**

Pursuant to California Public Resources Code Section 40975(A), establishment of a Regional Agency requires authorization from the California Integrated Waste Management Board, if the Board finds that the formation of such a Regional Agency will not adversely affect compliance with PRC Division 30, Part 2. Integrated Waste Management Plans.

**Section 8. Agency Financial Requirements**

- 8.1 The Agency will follow the financial accounting requirements set forth in Government Code Section 6505, Section 6505.1, Section 6505.5, Section 6505.6, Section 6511, and Section 6512, herein incorporated by reference.
- 8.2 The Manager will prepare a budget for each fiscal year and present it to the Board before its approval by the City of Los Angeles. The assets, rights, debts, liabilities and obligations of the Agency shall not constitute assets, rights, debts, liabilities or obligations of any of the Members. However, nothing in this Agreement shall prevent any Member from separately contracting for or assuming responsibility for specific debts, liabilities or obligations of the Agency, provided for that both the Agency and the Member approve such contract or assumption.
- 8.3 Payment of Civil Penalties Imposed by the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) - The Members hereby agree that the responsibility for any civil penalties incurred pursuant to AB 939 shall be assigned to the Agency. Should a penalty be assessed against the Agency for non-compliance after all administrative remedies are exhausted, the Members hereby authorize the Agency to allocate responsibility to the Members based upon equal division of the monetary fine between all of the participating Members. Any modification to this basis for determining responsibility for any civil penalties will be codified in the operating by-laws.

**Section 9. Funding**

- 9.1 Members shall not be assessed the startup costs for the Agency of approximately \$150,000, which have been borne by the City of Los Angeles. As a Member, the City of Los Angeles

will contribute existing staff and resources totaling approximately \$300,000 per year to the Agency.

9.2 The City of Los Angeles will provide \$100,000 annually towards a new base year study to be prepared no less than three years but within five years from the commencement of this Agreement.

9.3 Funding will be provided by each additional Member jurisdiction at \$0.15 per ton of landfill disposal per year with the year 2000 as the base year, subject to adjustments as directed by the Board. This fee will be due at the beginning of each fiscal year.

#### **Section 10. Structure of the Agency**

10.1 **Manager.** Initially, the City of Los Angeles shall employ the manager who shall be the Chief Administrative Officer of the Agency. The Manager shall, upon direction by the Board, plan, organize, and direct the administration and operations of the Agency, shall advise the Chair/Vice Chair on policy matters, shall hire and discharge staff, shall develop Agency budgets, shall reply to communications on behalf of the Agency, shall approve payments duly authorized by the Board, shall attend meetings of the Board, and carry out other duties as needed.

10.2 **Board.** The Board of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority shall be comprised of a representative from each of the Member jurisdictions. The Board shall make all policy decisions on behalf of the Agency, review and approve budgets, and decide the disbursement of discretionary funds collected under Section 9.3.

10.3 The officers of the Board shall include a Chair and Vice-Chair elected by a majority vote of Members. Their duties are to: Preside over all meetings of the Board; Appoint all ad hoc

committees subject to ratification by the Board; act as ex-officio member of all standing ad hoc committees.

10.4 The officers of the Board shall include a Treasurer elected by a majority vote of Members. His/her duties are to lead in the preparation and submission of Agency budgets to the Board and monitor expenditures with the assistance of the Manager and Agency administrative staff.

10.5 Committees. Committees, subcommittees, and ad hoc committees shall be at the discretion of the Chair subject to ratification by the Board. The Chair may appoint any individual deemed qualified to serve on a Committee.

10.6 Meetings. The Board will hold regular meetings, at a minimum, on a quarterly basis. Special meetings of the Board may be called in accordance with the provisions of Section 54956 of the California Government Code.

10.7 All meetings of the Board shall be held subject to the provisions of the California Ralph M. Brown Act (Sections 54950 et seq. of the California Government Code) and other applicable laws of the State of California.

10.8 The Manager shall cause minutes of all meetings of the Board to be kept and shall, after each meeting, cause a copy of the minutes to be forwarded to each member.

## **Section 11. Addition of New Member Jurisdictions**

11.1 The Agency will have the authority through an action by the Board to add New Member Jurisdictions to the Agency without modification to the existing Agreement by the amendment of Attachment A. Attachment A shall list the Member Jurisdictions and contain additional signature pages for each New Member. Each New Member shall have equal rights and responsibilities of all Members.

- 11.2 New members must apply to the Board no less than 90 days before the end of each fiscal year to be considered for membership.
- 11.3 New Members will be assessed a prorated share of assets held by the Agency such as the reserve fund.

## **Section 12. Withdrawal and Termination**

- 12.1 Any Member may voluntarily withdraw from this Agreement by filing with the Agency a written notice to withdraw no less than one hundred eighty (180) days prior to the close of the Agency's fiscal year.
- 12.2 A Jurisdiction's participation and membership may be terminated by the Agency for non-performance of its responsibilities and/or duties required under Sections 6.1, 6.2 and 6.3 of this Agreement. A vote by a majority of the Members is needed to terminate the agreement with respect to a Jurisdiction. When terminated, the Jurisdiction and the CIWMB will be notified in writing of the action on behalf of the Agency and all funds received by the Agency for the remainder of the current fiscal year after termination will be refunded to the Jurisdiction.
- 12.3 With the written concurrence of a majority of the Members to this Agreement, this Agreement may be terminated at any time.

## **Section 13. Jurisdictional Responsibility Upon Termination**

In the event that this Agreement is terminated, individual Jurisdictions will assume responsibility for a share of any civil penalties incurred by the Agency during the term of the Jurisdiction as a Member. Jurisdictions will also be responsible individually for any civil penalties incurred individually. If this Agreement is terminated, each Jurisdiction will assume responsibility for

compiling their own disposal information from haulers and facility operators for compliance with the monitoring and reporting system required pursuant to PRC Sections 41780 and 41821.5, unless a subsequent regional agency formation agreement is approved specifically for this purpose. Each member Jurisdiction is still responsible for the implementation of the programs described in their respective Source Reduction and Recycling Element.

**Section 14. Member Jurisdiction SRRE Implementation**

Each Member of the Agency is responsible for and shall continue to implement diversion programs in their adopted and approved SRRE that are specific to their Jurisdiction. Failure to implement these programs will provide cause for termination of the Agreement with respect to that Jurisdiction.

**Section 15. Contact Persons**

**Section 16. Amendment**

This Agreement may be amended or modified at any time, in a manner consistent with and in furtherance of the purposes of this Agreement, with the written consent of a majority of the Member Jurisdictions within the Regional Agency.

**Section 17. Indemnification**

Pursuant to Government Code Section 895.4, the Parties agree as follows:

- 17.1 Each Member Jurisdiction shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City of Los Angeles, the other Member Jurisdictions, the Agency, and their officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, expenses, liability or damage arising out of injury to persons, loss of life, or damage to property which are attributable to any activity of that Member Jurisdiction or of any other person acting under authority of that Member Jurisdiction which results from activities conducted on behalf of the Agency.
- 17.2 The City of Los Angeles and the Agency shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless each Member Jurisdiction and its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, expenses, liability or damage arising out of injury to persons, loss of life, or damage to property which are attributable to any authorized activity of Agency, or of any other person acting under authority of Agency.

**Section 18. Miscellaneous Provisions.**

- 18.1 Successors and Assigns.** This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the respective Parties hereto, provided that no Party shall assign any rights, nor delegate any duties provided for hereby without the consent of the other Party.
- 18.2 Required Actions of the Parties.** The Parties hereto agree to execute all such instruments and documents and to take all actions as may be required in order to consummate the transactions herein contemplated.
- 18.3 Entire Agreement.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof, and thereby supersedes all prior understandings and agreements, if any, with respect thereto, whether written or oral. No addition or modification of any term or provision shall be effective unless set forth in writing, signed by the Parties hereto.
- 18.5 Time of the Essence.** Time is of the essence of each and every term, condition, obligation and provision thereof.
- 18.6 Notices.** All notices or other communications required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be delivered personally (including by means of professional messenger service) or sent by express mail or registered mail or certified mail, return receipt requested. Notices delivered personally or by express mail shall be considered given when received. Notices sent by registered or certified mail shall be considered given two (2) business days after deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the person to receive such notice.
- 18.7** Notices shall be addressed as appears below for the Agency, and as listed in Attachment A for each party, provided that if any party gives notice of a change of name or address,

## **ADDENDUM TO AUGUST BOARD AGENDA ITEM #1 (continued from July Agenda Item #24)**

During the Board's discussion of this item at its July monthly meeting several legal issues were raised regarding the Board's authority relating to Regional Agencies.

### **Background: Substantial Evidence Required to Disapprove Regional Agency**

As noted in the agenda item, the Board could disapprove a Regional Agency if it determined that approval would "diminish the responsibility of individual cities and counties to implement source reduction, recycling, and composting programs as required by [the Act]..." (PRC 40970). In order to do so, the Board would need to have substantial evidence in the record that supported this determination.

"**Substantial Evidence**" in this context describes the type of evidence that an agency may rely upon in making determinations. When used in this context, the term "substantial evidence" excludes the use of speculation, opinion, or conjecture as support for an agency's findings. As noted in numerous court cases, this requirement is intended to prohibit a governmental agency from acting in an arbitrary and capricious manner. More simply put, the Board must base its decision upon factual information.

### **Question 1: Can the Board approve a Regional Agency, but only approve some of the proposed members?**

#### **Answer: Not Directly**

Statute does not directly address this issue, but it appears that the Board would **not** have this authority. The Regional Agency statutes require that the Regional Agency be an independent legal entity (Joint Powers Authority - JPA) which has the authority and duties given to it by its members. As such, the JPA sets forth the structure, including financial provisions, for how it will accomplish its purpose. (Government Code section 6500 et seq.) In creating the JPA, municipalities are setting forth enforceable arrangements for doing so based upon each entities own police powers – it is essentially a contract between jurisdictions. Staff can not identify any legal authority that would allow the Board to re-write a joint powers agreement and to do so appears to be contrary to the authorizing statute. It could also result in a Regional Agency that is not capable of meeting its purposes due to the changes in its proposed membership.

**However**, if the Board determined that the inclusion of one or more members in the Regional Agency was a basis for disapproving it, it could disapprove the Regional Agency as a whole, indicating the reasons for the disapproval. The JPA would then have the option of revising its JPA to address the Board's reasons for disapproval and re-submit it to the Board. (Such a process would be consistent with the one used for review and approval of planning documents from individual jurisdictions (the Board states reasons for disapproval, and the jurisdiction can re-submit after revising the planning element – see PRC section 41810(b) and 41811).

**Question 2: How did recent changes to the Regional Agency statute affect how Regional Agencies can distribute fines among their members?**

**Answer: It did not change the basic requirement – it added due process protections for member jurisdictions if the Regional Agency chose to distribute fines based upon fault.**

Public Resources Code section 40974(b) was added by AB 1482 in 2002. This subsection provides that:

(b) (1) An agreement may provide that a city or county is subject to the portion of a penalty imposed upon a regional agency pursuant to Section 41850 that is in proportion to the city's or county's responsibility for failure to implement a source reduction and recycling element or household hazardous waste element, as determined by the regional agency.

(2) If an agreement provides for apportioning a penalty pursuant to paragraph (1), the regional agency shall provide the city or county with a written notice regarding the city's or county's responsibility, including the basis for determining the city's or county's proportional responsibility, and an opportunity for a hearing before the regional agency's governing body, before assessing the city or county a proportion of the penalty imposed by the board.

(3) This subdivision does not affect the authority of the board to impose a penalty pursuant to other provisions of this division.

Under the pre-existing law, a Regional Agency already had the authority to apportion fines based upon fault. Statute leaves the apportionment up to the members of the Regional Agency to decide, the only requirement is that the agreement provide some method for doing so. The Board has previously approved a number of Regional Agency agreements that apportion fines by fault. The primary change brought by this statute is to provide that if a Regional Agency decides to apportion fines by fault – it must do so through a process that provides notice and a hearing (i.e. due process).

In the case of the Los Angeles Area Regional Agency, the agreement does provide a method of apportioning fines – equal distribution. The Regional Agency's representative indicated at the July Board meeting that this method would be changed in its by-laws to one resembling the type described in this statute. Whether in the agreement, or in by-laws adopted pursuant to the agreement, such an arrangement is allowed by law. (A copy of the draft by-laws is attached).

### **Question 3: Can the Board approve the Regional Agency for a limited period of time?**

**Answer: Yes, if the Board had factual information showing the lack of a time limit would produce results contrary to the statute's intent.**

Statute does not directly address this issue. However, if there was substantial evidence in the record to allow the Board to disapprove a Regional Agency (discussed above), that same authority **could** be used to provide an approval for a limited period of time – **if the time period could be related to this potential reduction in programs.**

#### **Other Conditions**

In reviewing the issues discussed above, staff have also considered the possibility of other conditions besides a time limit. As above, other conditions could be placed on the approval if there were substantial evidence in the record that approval without the conditions of the Regional Agency would result in a reduction of diversion programs. For example, the current version of the Resolution for this item provides that the Regional Agency members must still implement their individual SB 1066 Plans of Correction or their Compliance Order Local Assistance Plans. It is not currently phrased as a condition of approval – but rather to clarify the Board's expectations about the effect of approving the Regional Agency. As worded, failure to implement those plans would result in a fine for the Regional Agency. However, these provisions could be revised to turn them in to conditions of approval so that failure to implement the plans would result in termination of the Regional Agency.

#### **Writing Conditions**

Assuming the Board has substantial evidence to conditionally approve the Regional Agency, there may be significant logistical problems with doing so. For example, if the Board approves the Regional Agency conditional upon its successful completion of the Time Extension/Compliance Order Performance Plans and these are not in fact successfully completed – at the moment that the Board makes this determination, the Regional Agency could be viewed as being terminated. This would raise a number of legal issues such as: Would the Board have to issue a new Compliance Order (i.e. start over again) because the Compliance Order was issued against the Regional Agency which no longer existed? What would be the status of the individual jurisdictions retroactively? How should the individual jurisdictions be treated moving forward?

Depending upon the condition proposed, these types of issues might be satisfactorily addressed. However, staff would need additional time to draft appropriate conditional provisions once it receives specific direction from the Board.

## *Los Angeles Area Regional Agency*

### **Bylaws of the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority**

#### **Section 1. Agency Structure and Meetings**

##### **1.1 Board.**

1.1.1 The Governing Board of Directors (Board) shall be comprised of a representative from each of the Member jurisdictions. Each Member shall have one voting seat on the Board.

1.1.2 Each Member shall designate a representative and an alternative representative for their voting seat on the Board. The designation will be submitted to the Los Angeles Area Integrated Waste Management Authority (Agency) on Member letterhead by the signature authority of the Member. Changes in representation of a Member must be submitted in writing to the Manager before the new representative has the right to vote.

1.1.3 Each Board representative attending the Board meetings will receive one vote. Board representatives may not vote for multiple jurisdictions.

1.1.4 Each Member who is current with annual membership dues will be entitled to vote.

##### **1.2 Officers**

1.2.1 The Officers of the Board shall include a Chair, Vice-Chair, and Treasurer elected by a vote of Members.

1.2.2 The Officers will be elected by written ballot for a one-year term by a simple majority vote. Officers may serve additional terms if elected.

**1.3 Committees.**

1.3.1 The Agency will have two standing subcommittees; Finance and AB939 Compliance. The Treasurer will serve as Chair of the Finance Committee and the Board Chair shall appoint the AB939 Compliance Chair.

**1.4 Meetings.**

1.4.1 The Board will hold regular meetings, at a minimum, on a quarterly basis.

1.4.2 Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Manager or Officers of the Board when necessary. Special meetings shall be held upon seven (7) days notice by first-class mail, E-Mail, and/or phone by the Agency. Notification will be made to the Member addresses as shown in the Agency's records.

1.4.3 Board meetings may be held through use of conferencing equipment if it does not conflict with the Ralph M. Brown Act. All members must be able to clearly hear each other and be able to be recorded in the minutes.

1.4.4 Voting on agenda items will take place if a quorum of the Board is present. A quorum is designated as a simple majority of Member voting representatives.

1.4.5 Agenda items may be approved by a majority vote of Members present at the Board meeting.

**Section 2. Regional Agency Annual Report**

2.1 Agency staff will prepare a "LARA Annual Status Report" and provide each Member a copy.

### **Section 3. Duties of the Board**

**3.1 The Board is responsible for the following:**

- 3.1.1 Selection of the Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary for each year.**
- 3.1.2 Development and approval of the Agency's annual budget and review of expenditures.**
- 3.1.3 Determination of the annual Membership fees and ensuring the collection of fees.**
- 3.1.4 Selection of any additional regional diversion projects for the benefit of Members.**
- 3.1.5 Participation in the implementation of regional projects in their jurisdiction.**
- 3.1.6 Participation in the development of Agency positions on proposed legislation and/or regulations for the benefit of Members and the Agency.**
- 3.1.7 Attendance at Board meetings.**
- 3.1.8 Ensuring that annual report information is forwarded to the Agency in a timely manner.**
- 3.1.9 Ratification of Committees and Sub-Committees of the Board.**

### **Section 4. Agency Financial Requirements**

- 4.1 The Agency shall have a separate account within the City of Los Angeles' Integrated Waste Management Fund. This account will be maintained and serviced by the City of Los Angeles as long as the City of Los Angeles remains a Member of the Agency.**
- 4.2 Should the City of Los Angeles withdraw from or be terminated by the Agency, the balance of the Agency funds and financial records will be turned over to the Board.**
- 4.3 Should the Agency be dissolved, the balance of Agency funds will be returned in proportion to the Members.**

**Section 5. Addition of New Member Jurisdictions**

- 5.1 The Agency will have the authority through an action by the Board to add New Member Jurisdictions to the Agency. Each New Member shall have equal rights and responsibilities of all Members.
- 5.2 Upon application for membership in the Agency, staff will prepare an agenda item which will include an assessment of:
- 5.2.1 The level of good faith implementation of the applicant's SRRE.
  - 5.2.2 Past, current, and if feasible future diversion rates of the jurisdiction and any potential impact on the Agency;
  - 5.2.3 Impact on the resources of the Agency to provide services, if any;
  - 5.2.4 Other factors that may impact Agency operations.
- 5.3 The Board will act at least 45 days before the end of the fiscal year on the membership application(s) received.
- 5.4 A majority vote of the Board is required to approve the new Member(s).
- 5.5 If an application is not approved by the Board, the Agency will provide a letter to the applicant describing the reasons for the action.
- 5.6 Upon action of the Board approving new Members, a request will be sent to the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) to place an agenda item adding the new members to the Agency.
- 5.7 New Members will be assessed the next annual fee and a prorated share of assets held by the Agency such as the reserve fund upon action of the Board. Voting status will be conveyed upon the payment of fees by the new Member.

## **Section 6. Withdrawal and Termination**

6.1 Any Member may voluntarily withdraw from this Agreement by filing with the Agency a written notice to withdraw no less than one hundred eighty (180) days prior to the close of the Agency's fiscal year.

6.2 A Jurisdiction's participation and membership may be terminated by the Board for non-performance of its responsibilities and/or duties. Termination may be for the following cause(s) as determined by the Board:

6.2.1 Non-payment of the required annual membership fee;

6.2.2 Lack of good faith implementation of the jurisdiction's CIWMB-approved SRRE;

6.2.3 Lack of good faith implementation of the jurisdiction's CIWMB-approved SB1066 Time Extension;

6.2.4 Lack of good faith implementation of the jurisdiction's CIWMB-approved Compliance Order Work Plan;

6.2.5 Lack of good faith implementation of the jurisdiction's HHWE;

6.2.6 Substantial lack of participation in Member reporting requirements;

6.2.7 Other action(s) by the jurisdiction which are substantially detrimental to the effectiveness and/or viability of the Agency;

6.2.8 Other action(s) not consistent with goals/objectives and/or spirit of AB939.

6.3 The Agency will notify the Members of the potential termination and the intent to place an agenda item on the next Board agenda for termination of membership. The

Member cited in the agenda item will be given a hearing at the full Board meeting before action of the Board.

6.3.1 A two-thirds vote of the Board will be necessary to terminate the membership of a Member of the Agency.

6.3.2 Upon termination, the affected jurisdiction will be refunded its contribution to the reserve fund.

6.4 Upon action of the Board terminating a Member's membership in the Agency, the jurisdiction so affected has (10) days to file a written appeal to the Board along with a plan of correction to remedy the cause(s) that formed the basis of the termination.

6.4.1 The Board has ninety days (90) to act upon an appeal under Section 9.4. After 90 days the previous Board action becomes final.

**Section 7. Payment of Civil Penalties Imposed by the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB)**

7.1 The Members hereby agree that the responsibility for any civil penalties incurred pursuant to AB 939 shall be assigned to the Agency. Should a penalty be assessed against the Agency for non-compliance after all administrative remedies are exhausted, the Members hereby authorize the Board to allocate responsibility to the Members.

7.2 In the event of civil penalties, the Manager shall prepare and submit a report to the Board analyzing the cause of the penalty including recommendations for apportioning penalties.

7.3 The Board shall impose civil penalties in proportion to a Member's failure to implement their Source Reduction and Recycling Element and/or Household Hazardous Waste Element.

7.4 Division of civil penalties must be acted upon by a two-thirds vote of the Board. Upon action of the Board, the Agency shall provide the Members written notice regarding their responsibility, including the basis for determining the Member's proportional responsibility. Any Member will be provided an opportunity for a hearing before the Board before the assessment of penalties takes place.

#### **Section 8. Name and Location of Agent for Service of Process**



Thank you and Board members Jones and Washington for hosting the December 18, 2003 meeting to resolve concerns and issues related to the formation of LARA raised in the November, 2003, CIWMB meeting. As you have requested, this letter is being sent to clarify the remaining CIWMB staff issues and questions in preparation for the January, 2004, CIWMB meeting. At this meeting the establishment of LARA as a Regional Agency will be considered.


As a potential LARA member, we agree to the following:

- 1) That the effective date of the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) submitted to the CIWMB for LARA formation be the same date that the CIWMB approves LARA as a Regional Agency;
- 2) That the initial membership of LARA will be 14 member cities, including Artesia, Beverly Hills, Duarte, Hidden Hills, Los Angeles, Lynwood, Manhattan Beach, Pomona, Rancho Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rosemead, Sierra Madre, South Gate, and Torrance;
- 3) That Gardena will not be included in the initial membership. If Gardena chooses to submit a letter of withdrawal to the CIWMB and other potential LARA members, then LARA members agree to waive any notification period as interpreted from the JPA. Gardena is welcome to join LARA in the future as they implement their Compliance Order/Penalty Order plan of action;

- 4) That LARA will submit one consolidated Electronic Annual Report (EAR) for all of its member jurisdictions by summarizing the program activities for its members;
- 5) That the jurisdictions on SB1066 time extensions submit on-line time extension update reports as required;
- 6) That the jurisdictions on compliance orders will submit their quarterly compliance status reports as required;
- 7) That LARA members will continue to report tonnage disposed at landfill as individual jurisdictions;
- 8) That LARA members will continue to have the opportunity to correct inaccurate Disposal Reporting System information by preparing a Reporting Year Tonnage Modification Request for CIWMB staff review;
- 9) That CIWMB staff will have access to program data and diversion tonnages through hauler records or other detailed supporting documentation for verification of program effectiveness. On a case-by-case basis, CIWMB staff can request and LARA administrators will assist in obtaining this information from member jurisdictions;
- 10) That, upon the preparation of a base year study for LARA, generation data taken from individual jurisdictions will be provided to CIWMB staff as well as consolidated generation data to facilitate review.

We urge the approval of LARA as a Regional Agency at the January CIWMB meeting. Thank you for your consideration.

**WHEREAS,** Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 40970 authorizes cities and counties to form regional agencies to implement the requirements of PRC 40900 et seq., to reduce the cost of reporting and tracking of disposal and diversion programs by individual cities and counties and to increase the diversion of solid waste from disposal facilities; and

**WHEREAS,** PRC Section 40975(a) requires any agreement forming a regional agency to be submitted to the California Integrated Waste Management Board (Board) for review and approval; and

**WHEREAS,** PRC Section 40975(b) requires the agreement to contain (1) a listing of the cities and counties which are member agencies of the regional agency, including the name and address of the regional agency; (2) a description of the method by which any civil penalties will be allocated among the member agencies; (3) a contingency plan which shows how each member agency will comply with the requirements in the event that the regional agency is abolished; (4) a description of the duties and responsibilities of each city or county which is a member agency of the regional agency; and (5) a description of source reduction, recycling, and composting programs to be implemented by the regional agencies; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cities of Artesia, Beverly Hills, Duarte, Gardena, Hidden Hills, Los Angeles, Lynwood, Manhattan Beach, Pomona, Rancho Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rosemead, Sierra Madre, South Gate, and Torrance have formed a Joint Powers Authority to comply with the requirements of PRC Section 40900; and

**WHEREAS,** all member agencies have approved and adopted the newly formed Joint Powers Agreement and submitted it to the Board for review in determining the formation of a regional agency, and a reasonable interpretation of any member that approved the JPA may be that the provisions related to withdrawal and termination are in effect; and

**WHEREAS,** Board staff received correspondence from the JPA Manager and a revised JPA member roster that omits the City of Gardena

**WHEREAS,** On December 18, 2003, Board staff met with representatives from the City of Los Angeles and jurisdictions of the proposed regional agency to discuss, clarify, and agree to provisions for the approval of the LARA; and

**WHEREAS,** The parties agreed that the effective date of the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) submitted to the CIWMB for LARA formation be the same date that the CIWMB approves LARA as a Regional Agency; and

(over)

**WHEREAS**, The initial membership of LARA will be 14 member cities and that Gardena will not be included in the initial membership; and,

**WHEREAS**, That LARA will submit one consolidated Electronic Annual Report (EAR) for all of its member jurisdiction beginning for the 2003 Annual Reporting year by summarizing the program activities for its members; and

**WHEREAS**, That the jurisdictions on SB 1066 time extensions submit on-line time extension update reports as required; and

**WHEREAS**, That the jurisdictions on compliance orders will submit their quarterly compliance status reports as required; and

**WHEREAS**, That LARA members will continue to report tonnage disposal at landfill as individual jurisdictions; and

**WHEREAS**, That LARA members will continue to have the opportunity to correct inaccurate Disposal Reporting System information by preparing a Reporting Year Tonnage Modification Request for CIWMB staff review; and

**WHEREAS**, That CIWMB staff will have access to program data and diversion tonnages through hauler records or other detailed supporting documentation for verification of program effectiveness, and on a cases-by-case basis, CIWMB staff can request and LARA administrators will assist in obtaining this information from member jurisdictions; and

**WHEREAS**, That upon the preparation of a base year study for LARA, generation data from individual jurisdictions will be provided to CIWMB staff as well as consolidated generation data to facilitate review; and

**WHEREAS**, The LARA does meet the requirements of PRC 40975(b)(1) which requires that it list all of the members of the regional agency

## 8.4 TENTATIVELY RESERVED LANDFILL SITES

The following sites are identified as "tentatively reserved" in this document, however, the areas not brought into consistency of the local jurisdictions' General Plan by the first five-year revision of the CoIWMP, or subsequent revisions, are required to be removed from the CSE. The local government having jurisdiction over the area may also remove "tentatively reserved" areas from the CSE by requesting the County to do so at the time of the next revision of the document.

Three sites, including the Sunshine Canyon Landfill expansion portion within the City of Los Angeles, have been identified in the CSE as "tentatively reserved." One of the sites may be potentially suitable as a new Class III landfill.

### Potential Expansion Sites

- Sunshine Canyon  
(City of Los Angeles portion,  
also see Section 8.5)
- Scholl Canyon

### Potential New Sites

- Blind Canyon

A detailed discussion of these sites is provided in Chapter 7 of the CSE. Tables 8-1 and 8-2 also provide an overview of the current status of each site listed above.

# **APPENDIX I**

## State Law and Regulations Relating to Five-Year Review Report

## **TITLE 14, CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS SECTION 18788**

18788. Five-Year Review and Revision of the Countywide or Regional Agency Integrated Waste Management Plan.

(a) CIWMP or RAIWMP Review. Prior to the fifth anniversary of Board approval of a CIWMP or RAIWMP, or its most recent revision, the LTF shall complete a review of the CIWMP or RAIWMP in accordance with Public Resources Code sections 40051, 40052, and 41822, to assure that the county's and regional agency's waste management practices remain consistent with the hierarchy of waste management practices defined in Public Resources Code, section 40051.

(1) Prior to the fifth anniversary of Board approval of the CIWMP or RAIWMP, the LTF shall submit written comments on areas of the CIWMP or RAIWMP which require revision, if any, to the county or regional agency and the Board.

(2) Within 45 days of receiving LTF comments, the county or regional agency shall determine if a revision is necessary, and notify the LTF and the Board of its findings in a CIWMP or RAIWMP Review Report.

(3) When preparing the CIWMP or RAIWMP Review Report the county or regional agency shall address at least the following:

(A) changes in demographics in the county or regional agency;

(B) changes in quantities of waste within the county or regional agency;

(C) changes in funding sources for administration of the Siting Element and Summary Plan;

(D) changes in administrative responsibilities;

(E) programs that were scheduled to be implemented but were not, a statement as to why they were not implemented, the progress of programs that were implemented, a statement as to whether programs are meeting their goals, and if not what contingency measures are being enacted to ensure compliance with Public Resources Code section 41751;

(F) changes in permitted disposal capacity, and quantities of waste disposed of in the county or regional agency;

(G) changes in available markets for recyclable materials; and

(H) changes in the implementation schedule.

(4) Within 90 days of receipt of the CIWMP or RAIWMP Review Report, the Board shall review the county's or regional agency's findings, and at a public hearing, approve or

disapprove the county's or regional agency's findings. Within 30 days of its action, the Board shall send a copy of its resolution, approving or disapproving the county's or regional agency's findings, to the LTF and the county or regional agency. If the Board has identified additional areas that require revision, the Board shall identify those areas in its resolution.

(b) CIWMP or RAIWMP Revision. If a revision is necessary the county or regional agency shall submit a CIWMP or RAIWMP revision schedule to the Board.

(1) The county or regional agency shall revise the CIWMP or RAIWMP in the areas noted as deficient in the CIWMP or RAIWMP Review Report and/or as identified by the Board.

(2) The county or regional agency shall revise and resubmit its CIWMP or RAIWMP pursuant to the requirements of sections 18780 through 18784 of this article.

(c) The county shall submit all revisions of its CIWMP to the Board for approval. The revised CIWMP shall be reviewed pursuant to the requirements of sections 18784 through 18786 of this article.

(d) The regional agency shall submit all revisions of its RAIWMP to the Board for approval. The revised RAIWMP shall be reviewed pursuant to the requirements of sections 18784 through 18786 of this article.

## **PUBLIC RESOURCES CODE SECTION 41822**

41822. Each city, county, or regional agency shall review its source reduction and recycling element or the countywide integrated waste management plan at least once every five years to correct any deficiencies in the element or plan, to comply with the source reduction and recycling requirements established under Section 41780, and to revise the documents, as necessary, to comply with this part.

Any revision made to an element or plan pursuant to this section shall be submitted to the board for review and approval or disapproval pursuant to the schedule established under this chapter.

#### **ASSEMBLY BILL 939 COMPLIANCE**

We are requesting your assistance to streamline the State's regulatory processes for solid waste management and to reduce the excessive regulatory burdens on local governments while maintaining sound environmental policies. The California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939) requires the cities and counties to divert 50 percent of their solid waste from disposal at landfills and incineration facilities through source reduction, recycling, and composting programs. Local governments may be exposed to a penalty of \$10,000 per day for failure to comply with AB 939.

For the past five years, the California Integrated Waste Management Board has often failed to consider the financial and administrative impact its decisions have on local governments and the economic well-being of California despite the local government's objections. These decisions have placed local governments in a difficult position of spending scarce dollars on fruitless "bean counting" activities which could be used for needed public safety and other programs. These decisions have a particularly severe impact in the County of Los Angeles with 88 cities and numerous unincorporated communities.

In light of the fiscal insecurity local governments are experiencing and the need to prevent wasting taxpayers dollars, the Los Angeles County Integrated Waste Management Task Force has formulated a list of recommendations which would address this problem. The Task Force is a Countywide body which was formed pursuant to AB 939. Its membership includes representatives of cities, the County, environmental organizations, the private sector, and the waste industry. These recommendations have been repeatedly expressed to the Waste Board since 1999, however, oftentimes no response is provided. These recommendations, among other things, include:

- Prohibiting the Waste Board from adopting rules, policies, guidelines and procedures which conflict with State law and regulations (“underground regulations”)
- Requiring the Waste Board to consider the limitations of data used in determining a local government’s compliance with Assembly Bill 939
- Prohibiting the Waste Board from adopting for conversion technology regulations which are more restrictive and bureaucratic than those for landfills and incineration facilities and which may impede the development of these promising technologies which would reduce the need for landfilling and incineration while producing new products and energy for the economic well being of California

The enclosure outlines in more detail the Task Force’s recommendations. Again, we urge your support and implementation of these recommendations. **1. Prohibit the Waste Board from Adopting Rules, Policies, Guidelines and Procedures Which Conflict with State Law and Regulations**

Changes in existing rules, policies, guidelines, and procedures have a major financial and administrative impact on regulated communities especially local governments. Currently, in most cases, the Waste Board does not consider these factors as part of its analysis and decision-making process. As such, the Waste Board should be prohibited from adopting any rules, policies, procedures and guidelines without first considering the economic impacts of such actions on the regulated communities, local governments and ultimately the end users (customers/residents). The economic analysis is to be conducted in concert with the impacted communities.

In addition, the Waste Board should revise the proposed Alternative Daily Cover regulations since they unfairly penalize local governments for an operator's alleged failure to comply with the State's regulations, and:

- The regulations fail to specify the procedure and criteria the Waste Board will use to determine if a facility operator has violated the ADC standards.
- The regulations fail to address the impact of the above standard on local governments' diversion efforts by reclassifying the amount of overuse as disposal.
- The regulations should be revised to include procedures and/or criteria the Waste Board will use to determine if an owner/operator violated the minimum standards for ADC material and beneficial reuse.
- The regulations should address the impact on local governments' ability to comply with the State waste reduction mandates when the Waste Board determines that an operator has abused or overused ADC material for beneficial reuse, and a revised Disposal Quantity Report is requested. Additionally, the regulation should state how the Waste Board will notify all the impacted local governments of its decision to require an operator to reclassify the amount of overuse as disposal.

**2. Require the Waste Board to Consider the Limitations of the Data Used In Determining a Local Government's Compliance with AB 939**

The Waste Board's current regulations, and rules, policies, guidelines and procedures (hereinafter referred to as "Underground Regulations") fail to consider the limitations of existing systems which are used to determine the quantities of waste generated, diverted and disposed. Most often, current Underground Regulations require local governments to spend inordinate amounts of time and resources tracking waste and diverted materials quantities

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to mathematically demonstrate achievement of the waste reduction mandates of AB 939. This level of scrutiny is not justified since the accuracy of the data collected is very limited and often unreliable.

As such, the Waste Board should:

- Focus more on waste diversion program implementation and less on mathematical accounting ("bean counting"). If needed, State legislation could be introduced to provide legislative clarification.
- Implement the recommendations contained in the Senate Bill 2202 (Chapter 740, 2000 Statutes) report titled "A Comprehensive Analysis of the Integrated Waste Management Act Diversion Rate Measurement System" which the Waste Board adopted in March 2002. The recommendations, which were drafted in consultation with municipalities, the waste management industry, and other stakeholders, would address many of the deficiencies of AB 939.
- Revise its Waste Diversion Measurement Guidelines to address the above-stated issue, Item 1.
- Revamp its *Enforcement Policy*, which is used to measure local government compliance with the AB 939 waste reduction mandates (first adopted in April 1995), to conform with the above-stated issues.
- Provide for a Finding of Conformance process that would streamline the incorporation of needed solid waste facilities into the local waste management plans. If needed, State legislation could be introduced to provide legislative clarification.
- Revise its definition of "Good Faith Efforts" in determining a local government's compliance with AB 939 waste reduction mandates. Currently, the Waste Board uses a "*discretionary*" process to define this term without any bounds and which varies based on political constraints.

**3. Require the Waste Board to Consider Cost-effectiveness and Ease of Implementation When Revising the Disposal Reporting System Regulations**

The Waste Board is proposing regulations to address deficiencies in the State's Disposal Reporting System. Any potential "fix" selected should be cost-effective and easy to implement. The Disposal Reporting System should be used as a "tool" to measure waste diversion/reduction programs performance and not to penalize local governments. Specifically, the Waste Board should:

- Utilize the Disposal Reporting System for the primary purpose of assisting local governments in evaluating the effectiveness of their waste diversion/reduction programs.

- Utilize a programmatic approach in determining a local government's compliance with the waste reduction mandates of AB 939.
- Develop margins of error for each of the following components of the compliance measurement methodology, and subsequently measure compliance based on these margins of errors:
  - Diversion Measurement
  - Adjustment Method
  - Disposal Reporting System

**4. Prohibit the Waste Board from Adopting Conversion Technology Regulations Which Are More Restrictive and Bureaucratic than Those for Landfills and Incinerators**

The Waste Board is proposing regulations to regulate conversion technology facilities. Conversion technologies have the potential to revolutionize solid waste management in California. If conversion technologies are allowed to be fully developed, it would convert unwanted residual solid waste into renewable and environmentally benign fuels, chemicals, and clean sources of energy (including electricity). In turn, it would reduce our dependence on landfills, incinerators, imported fossil fuels, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

However, as currently drafted, the proposed conversion technology regulations would impede the realization of such projects because it creates a process more restrictive, bureaucratic and expensive than required for any solid waste disposed facility (including landfills) and contradicts State law (e.g., diversion credit for gasification is not allowed even though it is explicitly provided for under Assembly Bill 2770 [Chapter 740, 2002 Statutes]). As such, the Waste Board should revise the proposed regulations to address these concerns.

In addition, State legislation should be introduced to promote the development of conversion technologies, including providing full diversion credit.

**5. Require the Waste Board to Develop Partnerships with Local Governments**

The Waste Board's regulations, rules, policies, guidelines, and procedures have a significant impact on local governments, yet local governments are not represented in the current structure of the Waste Board. This deficiency is clearly apparent when compared to the State Air and Water Boards which have their own regional boards. To begin addressing this issue:

- State legislation should be introduced to specifically designate a Waste Board seat for a local government representative.
- Local government representatives should be included in all Waste Board working groups.
- A local government advisory committee (to act as a liaison between the Waste Board and local governments) should be formed.

**6. Prohibit the Waste Board from Encroaching upon Local Government's Land Use Decisions, Particularly During the Permitting Process for Solid Waste Facilities**

Development of any solid waste facility requires applicants to obtain a number of discretionary and administrative permits from local, regional, State and Federal agencies. The State, specifically the Waste Board, should:

- Recognize that the land use decision is the sole responsibility of local governments and its authority must not be encroached.
- Ensure that all rules, regulations, policies, guidelines, and procedures are uniformly, and in a timely fashion, enforced by all Local Enforcement Agencies throughout the State.

**7. Require the Waste Board, the State Water Resources Control Board, and the Regional Water Quality Control Boards to coordinate their activities when implementing the Federal Clean Water Act and Assembly Bill 939**

To ensure full compliance with the requirements of the Federal Clean Water Act and State waste reduction mandates, the Waste Board and the State Water Resources and Regional Water Quality Control Boards should:

- Coordinate programs and regulations, including those for collecting trash/debris before it enters the waters of the State and its affects on waste diversion activities
- Develop cross-disciplinary working groups with responsibility and expertise from storm water pollution prevention, solid waste reduction, and related environmental issues to propose strategies for addressing the above issue.

- 8. Require the State Agencies within the umbrella of CalEPA to coordinate the implementation of uniform conversion technology regulations and electronic waste management regulations**

CalEPA integrates the State's multiple environmental policy and regulatory bodies. To avoid conflicting goals, the Waste Board, the State Water Resources Control Board and the Air Resources Board [and their respective regional boards/air pollution district (air quality management districts)] should coordinate with each other to ensure consistent implementation and application of conversion technology regulations impacting the design, operation, and monitoring of solid waste facilities, and electronic waste management regulations.

- 9. Remove municipalities' responsibilities from the CARB's Solid Waste Collection Vehicle Rule**

The California Air Resources Board should revamp its proposed regulations to reduce particulate matter emissions from diesel-fueled solid waste collection vehicles. While the Task Force supports the intent of the regulations, the CARB should not impose its responsibilities relating to waste collection vehicles upon municipalities simply because the municipalities contract with waste hauling companies. These regulations are being developed by the CARB and therefore should be implemented, managed, and enforced by the CARB.

It is also questioned whether the CARB has the authority to require municipalities to re-negotiate their waste collection agreements or encroach on their rate setting authority. In addition, the imposition of fines of up to \$10,000 per day on municipalities should be eliminated.

- 10. Require The State Agencies Within The Umbrella Of CalEPA To Coordinate The Implementation Of Uniform Environmental Justice Regulations**

Consistent with SB 89, CalEPA should integrate the State's multiple environmental justice policies developed among its regulatory bodies. To avoid conflicting goals, the Waste Board, the State Water Resources Control Board and the Air Resources Board [and their respective regional boards/air quality management districts] should coordinate the development, implementation and application of their environmental justice policies and strategies to ensure consistent strategic policies regarding solid waste facilities. Additionally, these policies should be developed in consultation with local governments and other stakeholders.
