ANTICIPATED IMPACT TO THE COUNTY AS A RESULT OF A REDUCTION IN THE AWARD AMOUNT FOR THE LOS ANGELES/LONG BEACH URBAN AREA SECURITY INITIATIVE (UASI) GRANT

On July 24, 2007, by motion of Supervisor Michael Antonovich, your Board directed the Chief Executive Officer to provide notification "on the impact of the proposed reduction to the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI Program) on the County upon completion of the application in 14 days" (Attachment 1).

In 2006, Los Angeles County departments were awarded a \$17,337,267 UASI Grant to fund 25 separate projects (Attachment 2). The proposed 2007 UASI Grant application for Los Angeles County departments total \$11,194,889; a reduction of \$6,142,378 or 35.4 percent (Attachment 3).

Although the reduction in the total dollar amount is evident, the actual impact is difficult to measure. The process for completing the application is largely "project" based. Each project is assessed and approved based on its merit as opposed to making the awards to specific jurisdictions or disciplines.
