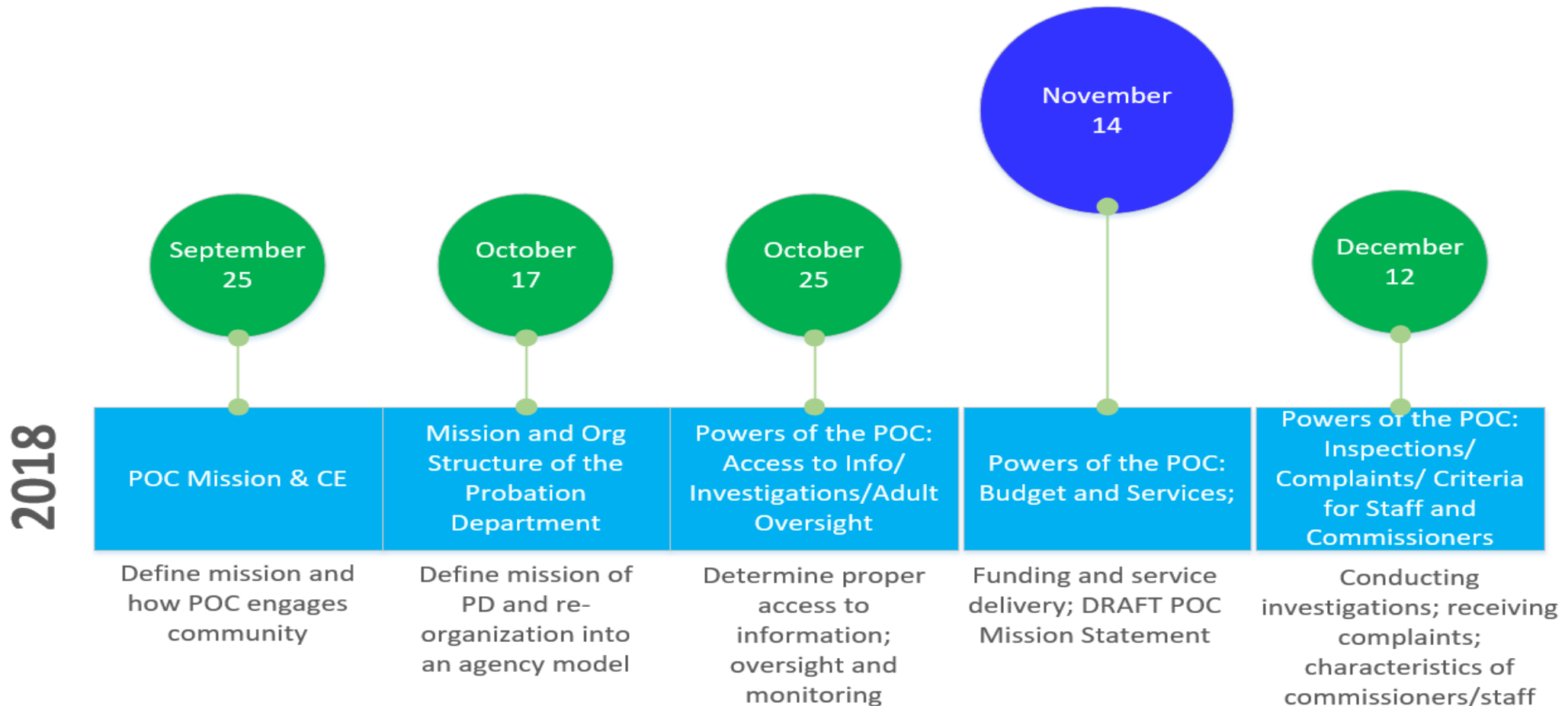

## **Mission Statement**

*The mission of the Probation Oversight Commission (“POC”) is to re-imagine probation services in the County of Los Angeles to achieve accountability, transparency, and healing of the people served by and working for the Probation Department. The POC shall create pathways for community engagement to foster trust and ensure the LA County Probation Department achieves the best outcomes for youth and adults on Probation. The POC will receive and investigate complaints to support the LA County Probation Department in carrying out its mission. Finally, the POC shall serve as an advisor to the Probation Department and the Board of Supervisors, and monitor its proper stewardship of public funds, adherence to the highest ethics, and the use of best practices in Probation.*

# LOS ANGELES COUNTY PROBATION JUVENILE JUSTICE CRIME PREVENTION ACT (JJCPA) STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

## **Welfare and Institutions Code 749.22**

To be eligible for this grant, each county shall be required to establish a multiagency juvenile justice coordinating council that shall develop and implement a continuum of county-based responses to juvenile crime. The coordinating councils shall, at a minimum, include the chief probation officer, as chair, and one representative each from the district attorney's office, the public defender's office, the sheriff's department, the board of supervisors, the department of social services, the department of mental health, a community-based drug and alcohol program, a city police department, the county office of education or a school district, and an at-large community representative. In order to carry out its duties pursuant to this section, a coordinating council shall also include representatives from nonprofit community-based organizations providing services to minors. The board of supervisors shall be informed of community-based organizations participating on a coordinating council.





# LOS ANGELES COUNTY PROBATION

## JUVENILE JUSTICE COORDINATION COUNCIL (JJCC) JCC COMMUNITY AT LARGE (JJCC-CAC)

- March 22, 2017 Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council established a Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC) Community Advisory Committee (CAC). Chaired by At-Large representatives,
  - To make recommendations to the JJCC as to the composition of the Council and to further make recommendations as to community representation on the Council.
  - To examine and make recommendations as to the structure and scope of the JJCC in fulfilling its mission. The Community Advisory Committee shall consider other JJCC structures throughout the State of California when making such recommendations.
  - To make recommendations to the JJCC (through the Chair), and subsequently to the Council as to the nature of the programs, strategies and systems enhancements for at-risk youth and youth involved in the juvenile justice system in Los Angeles County.
  - To communicate all recommendations to the Chair of the JJCC after each Community Advisory Committee meeting

# LOS ANGELES COUNTY PROBATION

## SIGNIFICANT CHANGES TO JJCPA

### ■ Significant Changes FY 17/18

- **September 5, 2017** Board of Supervisor's approved Master Services Agreement (MSA) process which enabled the Department to begin expediting contract execution for service implementation.
- **November 2017** Eighty-one percent (81%) of one-time funds (\$29.8M) allocated to CBOs through Memorandum of Understandings (MOU) with County and City agencies
- **January 18, 2018** JJCC approved a minimum JJCPA allocation of \$3 million per year for four years, for youth diversion services, for a minimum total of \$12 million
- **January 26 and 30,** Department submitted intent to sole source with Foundations to build capacity and expedite contracting of funds.
- **March 28, 2018** Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council approved creation of AdHoc Committee to:
  - Develop a timeline and formalized ongoing planning process to redesign the Comprehensive Multiagency Juvenile Justice Plan (CMJJP)
  - Develop a revised strategy and spending plan for the CMJJP to be informed by RDA's evaluation findings and recommendations
- **March 28, 2018** JJCC approved Public Private Partnership (PPP) strategy for regranting and capacity building
- **March 31, 2018** Department removed School-Based Deputy Probation Officers at the middle schools as first phase to eliminating Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) 236.
- **April 30, 2018** Research Develop and Associates (RDA) completed Evaluation and Recommendations
- **May 15, 2018** Board of Supervisor's approved the revised Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC) Organizational Rules and appointed five (5) at-large representatives as recommended by the JJCC Community Advisory Committee
- **June 30, 2018** WIC 236 supervision terminated at high schools.

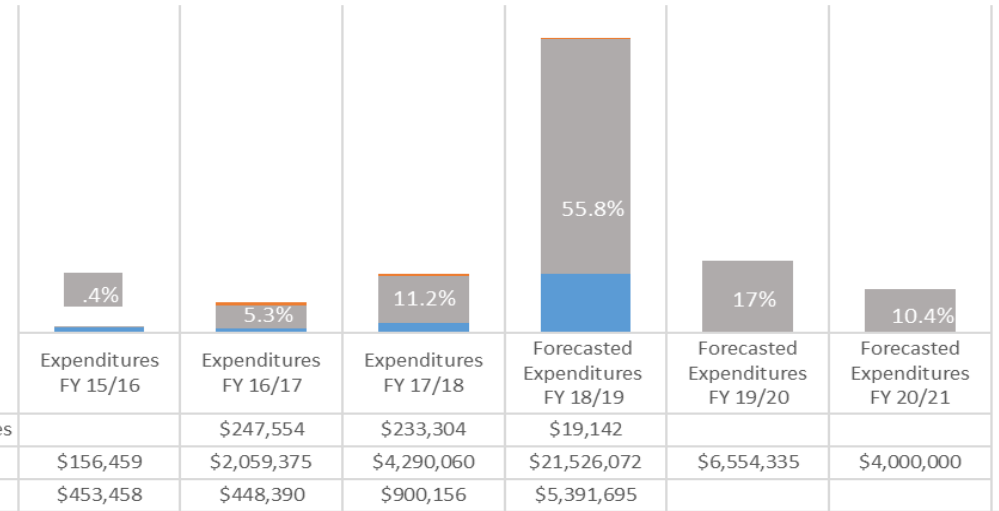

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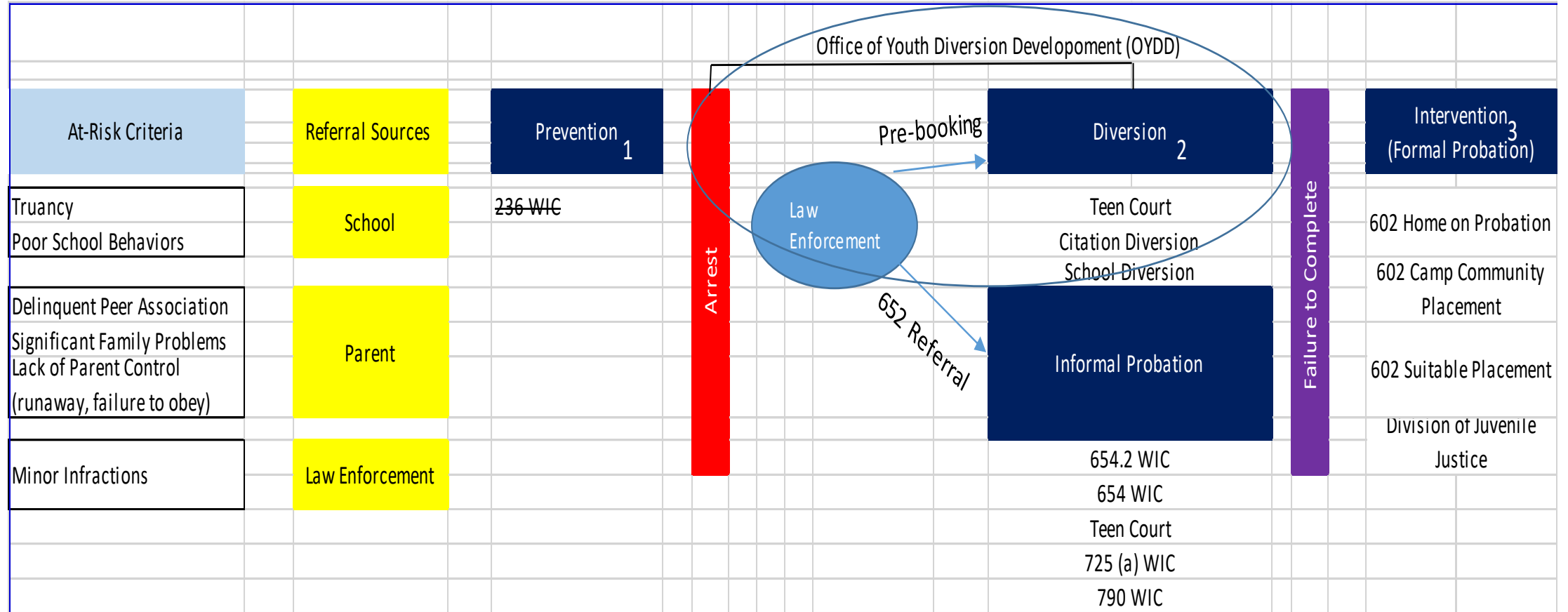
