There was no sanitary drinking water in 5800. Every water fountain in that dorm was broken and the inmates had fixed one spout using a plastic straw. Deputies confirmed there was no open work order on the drinking fountains at the time of my observation (again, they were all broken). I asked the watch commander to place an emergency work order to fix the water.

I asked deputies why they were unaware the water was not working, since they walk the dorm every 15 minutes because it is Moderate Observation Housing. They said it was not the intent of the walks to check facilities, because the walks are intended for checking inmate welfare and safety. I suggested that having access to running water is essential to inmate welfare and safety. There was some disagreement there so I asked the watch commander and watch sergeants about this and they confirmed it is the inmate's responsibility to bring these facilities issues to deputy's attention. I found this contradicted by facts because inmates were eager to tell me about these issues. The house mouse at 5800 told me there was a culture of retaliation in the dorm. (For example, deputies will disable the phones and turn the TV's off for the remainder of the shift after an inmate resists a transfer).

5800 and 5900 had high temperatures close to 80 degrees (according to a thermometer on the wall, which could easily be inaccurate, but it was definitely warm.) There was a large industrial fan in 5900 to cool things down and it was still very warm. Deputies told me there were fights happening in these dorms every day, always in the afternoon shift. I asked if they thought it might have something to do with the elevated temperature. They shrug. Again, I asked the watch commander to put an emergency work order to fix the air circulation there.

I was accompanied by Joan Hubbell during this inspection. Hubbell said she appreciated walking CJ with me. She said she appreciated the impetus of getting out of her office/ off her computer. I got the impression that she was learning new things about these dorms. She took notes on specific complaints from certain inmates related to their complaints about access to medical and methal health services. One complaint from an inmate stated that he had been waiting to see a psychiatrist since April 2022. An email from Hubbell stated that the supervising psychiatrist said thi was a "typical wait with the current shortages."
