#### S-1. Report on Safety Concerns at County Juvenile Halls and Probation Camps

Report from the Los Angeles County Office of Inspector General on the results of its investigations into client and staff safety concerns at the County's juvenile halls and probation camps, as directed by the Board on December 18, 2018. (19-0797)

Eric Preven, Antonia Ramirez, Hans Liang, Jim Schengarth, Debra Lars, Kim McGill, Jacob Jackson, Lupita Caballo, Daisy Gonzalez, Phal Sok, Kent Mendoza, Joseph Maizlish and George Buzzetti addressed the Board.

Dan Baker, Chief Deputy, Office of Inspector General, and Cathleen Beltz, Assistant Inspector General, made a presentation and responded to questions posed by the Board. Sachi A. Hamai, Chief Executive Officer, Ricardo Garcia, Public Defender, Terri McDonald, Chief Probation Officer, and Sheila Mitchell, Assistant Chief Probation Officer, addressed the Board and responded to questions. Sergio Perez, Special Assistant, Office of Inspector General, and Saul Sarabia, Chair, Probation Reform and Implementation Team, were also present.

Supervisors Ridley-Thomas and Hahn introduced a joint motion to:

- 1. Instruct the Probation Reform and Implementation Team (PRIT), housed within the Executive Office, to hold a special hearing (Hearing) on the "Report Back on Ensuring Safety and Humane Treatment in the County's Juvenile Justice Facilities" and safety concerns in Los Angeles County's (County's) juvenile justice facilities, and report back to the Board with any recommendations; with the hearing to include discussion of how the County and the Probation Department can collect and share metrics moving forward that measure use of force, safety and well-being in the County's juvenile justice facilities, including quantifiable metrics to measure trends, demographic data to assess any disproportionalities, incident level analysis to assess compliance issues and necessary remedial action, and steps to consistently and publicly share the data;
- Instruct the Inspector General and Chief Probation Officer to report back to the Board in writing in 30 days with updated data on pepper spray and use of force, and to make this information available at the PRIT Hearing;

- 3. Within 60 days following the PRIT Hearing, instruct the Chief Probation Officer to obtain feedback from the PRIT, Chief Executive Officer, County Counsel, Inspector General, Director of Mental Health, other relevant departments, impacted labor groups, and community stakeholders, and report back to the Board in writing with an implementation plan for recommendations laid out in the Inspector General's "Report Back on Ensuring Safety and Humane Treatment in the County's Juvenile Justice Facilities" as well as recommendations made by the PRIT, including in the areas of staffing, training, accountability, mental health resources, culture, policies, data collection and dissemination, and the future use of pepper spray, with a goal of improved safety and well-being for staff and youth and a return to the mandate for rehabilitation;
- 4. Instruct the Director of Mental Health, in coordination with the Chief Probation Officer, Inspector General, and community stakeholders, to report back to the Board in writing in 60 days with an assessment of the mental health needs in the juvenile facilities, including areas to improve trauma-informed approaches and reduce use of force; and
- 5. Instruct the Inspector General to do a follow up report on safety concerns in juvenile facilities outlined in the "Report Back on Ensuring Safety and Humane Treatment in the County's Juvenile Justice Facilities" and report back to the Board in 180 days.

Supervisor Ridley-Thomas moved to adopt Recommendation No. 1 of his joint motion with Supervisor Hahn; and to place Recommendation Nos. 2 through 5 on the agenda of February 19, 2019 at 1:00 p.m.

After discussion, on motion of Supervisor Ridley-Thomas, seconded by Supervisor Solis, the report was received and filed; and the Board instructed the Probation Reform and Implementation Team (PRIT), housed within the Executive Office, to hold a special hearing (Hearing) on the "Report Back on Ensuring Safety and Humane Treatment in the County's Juvenile Justice Facilities" and safety concerns in the County's juvenile justice facilities, and report back to the Board with any recommendations;

with the hearing to include discussion of how the County and the Probation Department can collect and share metrics moving forward that measure use of force, safety and well-being in the County's juvenile justice facilities, including quantifiable metrics to measure trends, demographic data to assess any disproportionalities, incident level analysis to assess compliance issues and necessary remedial action, and steps to consistently and publicly share the data; and introduced Recommendations Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5 of Supervisors Ridley-Thomas and Hahn's motion for discussion, and placed them on the agenda of February 19, 2019 at 1:00 p.m. for consideration.

## 1-H. Nueva Maravilla Family Public Housing Development Plumbing Project Construction Contract

Recommendation: Approve the proposed Nueva Maravilla Family Public Housing Development Plumbing Project and adopt the plans and specifications for the project to complete epoxy coating of existing copper pipes and associated work in 347 dwelling units located at 4919 East Cesar Chavez Avenue in unincorporated East Los Angeles (1); award a construction contract to Pipe Restoration Inc., the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, in the amount of \$4,495,835 to complete the project, and authorize the Executive Director of the Housing Authority to execute the contract following receipt of the acceptable Faithful Performance and Labor and Material Bonds and insurance filed by the contractor; determine that the proposed project is exempt from the application of the County's Local Targeted Worker Hire Policy because it is wholly funded with Federal funds, which prohibit geographic preferences; find that the approval of the contract and the proposed project are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act; and authorize the Executive Director to take the following related actions:

Amend the contract or terminate the contractor's right to proceed with the performance of the contract or terminate the contract for convenience, if necessary;

Approve contract change orders not to exceed \$899,167, which represents 20% of the \$4,495,835 contract amount, for unforeseen project costs; and

Fund the contract and contingency with a total project cost of \$5,395,002, comprised of \$1,000,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds allocated to the First Supervisorial District by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), \$1,653,256 in Capital Fund Program funds allocated by HUD and \$2,741,746 in net sale proceeds of a Housing Authority administrative building and included in the Housing Authority's Fiscal Year 2018-19 amended budget approved on September 11, 2018. #### 3. Implementing a Community-Based Mental Health Incubation Academy

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Hahn and Ridley-Thomas: Accept the recommendations contained in the Chief Executive Officer's report submitted to the Board on September 14, 2018; authorize the Director of Mental Health to enter into an agreement with a third party administrator (Administrator) as outlined in the previous report back in order to support, develop and operate the Mental Health Incubation Academy (Academy) that will provide capacity-building and

Outreach and community engagement efforts for program recruitment by the Administrator, including the number of organizations that applied by Supervisorial Districts and a summary of the trends identified for applicants that were denied;

Performance of the community-based organizations participating in the Academy, amounts awarded, their progress in the Academy and summary of their Prevention and Early Intervention proposals;

Summary of challenges that prevented community-based and grassroots organizations from either participating in or successfully completing the Academy;

Listing of community-based organizations that were able to apply for and receive subsequent Department of Mental Health funding;

Identification of additional funding streams in support of the Academy; and

Within the final report, the development of best practices and lessons learned to support the replication of incubation academies within other County Departments. (19-0801)

## 11. Optimization of Los Angeles County's Workforce and Economic Development Systems
