STATEMENT OF PROCEEDINGS FOR THE MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 10, 2019 9:30 A.M.

1-D. Permanent Ordinance to Limit Rent Increases and Provide Tenant Protections

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Kuehl and Solis: Instruct the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority and the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, to return to the Board on November 12, 2019 with a permanent rent stabilization ordinance that: (Relates to Agenda Nos. S-1, 10 and 11)

Limits annual rent increases, as allowed under State law, to reflect the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the previous 12-month period, with a maximum of 8% overall and lesser permitted yearly maximums based on the CPI, such that: if CPI is 8% or higher, the annual maximum allowable rent increase will be 8%; if CPI is between 3% and 8%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be equal to CPI; if CPI is between 1% and 3%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be equal to 3%; if CPI is between -2% and 1%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be equal to CPI plus 2%; and if CPI is less than -2%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be zero;

Prohibits evictions without just cause;

Imposes limits on what constitutes just cause arising from an owner move-in and allows evicted tenants a right of return when no fault eviction requirements are not met;

Requires that a landlord provide a tenant with reasonable relocation assistance, including monetary payments, for tenants evicted without fault or who are temporarily displaced due to maintenance, rehabilitation, or repairs on the property, and in cases of tenant buy-outs, regardless of any conflicting language in the County Code pertaining to condominium conversions or otherwise;

Ensures landlords are able to receive a fair and reasonable return on their property;

Allows landlords to recoup the cost of major capital repairs that are not part

of regular maintenance, provided the recoupment does not result in a permanent rent increase;

Allows tenants to claim a downward adjustment in rent if a landlord reduces housing services or is noncompliant with the permanent ordinance;

Allows an additional 2% above CPI in annual rent increases, through December 31, 2023, for luxury market-rate units with two bedrooms or less, in buildings of 25 units or more, where the unit had a base rent of \$4,000 per month or more on September 11, 2018, subject to review and approval by the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs;

Requires owners of any housing unit held for rent to register the unit with the County and pay any applicable fee;

Ensures that landlords and tenants receive due process in the administration of the ordinance, including the ability to appeal certain decisions to a rent review board;

Requires landlords to provide information to the County that is necessary to ensure the administration and enforcement of the rent stabilization program;

Establishes reasonable and appropriate penalties for noncompliance with the permanent ordinance;

Allows a tenant to verify unit registration information submitted by the property owner, including the rental rate and amenities provided; and

Maximizes tenant protections when the landlord leaves the rental market business under the Ellis Act:

Instruct the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority and the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, to report back to the Board in 120 days on the feasibility of requiring landlords to offer relocation assistance to tenants who are economically displaced from rental units not covered by the permanent rent stabilization ordinance; and develop a Multilingual and Culturally Competent Education and Outreach Plan;

Direct the Chief Executive Officer, in consultation with the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority and the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, to identify funding for costs related to the activities described above, and authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute a Funding Agreement with LACDA, as may be necessary; and

Authorize the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority to execute a Funding Agreement with the County, as may be necessary, for funding for costs related to the activities described above and accept and incorporate the funds into LACDA's Fiscal Year 2019-20 budget and future Fiscal Year budgets. (19-5900)

3-D. Ocean Park Public Housing Development Unit Flooring Replacement Project Contract

Recommendation: Approve the proposed unit flooring replacement project at the Ocean Park public housing development located at 175 Ocean Park Boulevard in the City of Santa Monica and adopt the plans and specifications for the project (3); determine that the proposed project is exempt from the application of the County's Local Targeted Worker Hire Policy because it is wholly funded with Federal funds, which prohibit geographic preferences; find that the proposed actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act; and authorize the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority to take the following related actions:

Award and execute a contract and all related documents with Cybertech Construction Company, Inc., the apparent lowest responsive and responsible bidder for the project, following receipt of the acceptable Faithful Performance and Labor and Material Bonds and insurance filed by the contractor, in an amount up to \$178,777 using Capital Fund Program funds allocated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development;

Determine, as necessary and appropriate, to amend the contract, or terminate the contractor's right to proceed with the performance of the contract or terminate the contract for convenience;

Approve contract change orders not to exceed \$35,755, which represents 20% of the contract amount, for unforeseen project costs, using the same source of funds; and

Incorporate the contract and contingency amounts, totaling \$214,532, into the Los Angeles County Development Authority's approved Fiscal Year 2019-20 budget, as needed. (19-5825)

4-D. Elevator Maintenance and Repair Services Contract

10. Permanent Ordinance to Limit Rent Increases and Provide Tenant Protections

Recommendation as submitted by Supervisors Kuehl and Solis: Instruct the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority and the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, to return to the Board on November 12, 2019 with a permanent rent stabilization ordinance that: (Relates to Agenda No. S-1, 1-D and 11)

Limits annual rent increases, as allowed under State law, to reflect the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the previous 12-month period, with a maximum of 8% overall and lesser permitted yearly maximums based on the CPI, such that: if CPI is 8% or higher, the annual maximum allowable rent increase will be 8%; if CPI is between 3% and 8%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be equal to CPI; if CPI is between 1% and 3%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be equal to 3%; if CPI is between -2% and 1%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be equal to CPI plus 2%; and if CPI is less than -2%, the maximum allowable annual rent increase will be zero;

Prohibits evictions without just cause;

Imposes limits on what constitutes just cause arising from an owner move-in and allows evicted tenants a right of return when no fault eviction requirements are not met;

Requires that a landlord provide a tenant with reasonable relocation assistance, including monetary payments, for tenants evicted without fault or who are temporarily displaced due to maintenance, rehabilitation, or repairs on the property, and in cases of tenant buy-outs, regardless of any conflicting language in the County Code pertaining to condominium conversions or otherwise;

Ensures landlords are able to receive a fair and reasonable return on their property;

Allows landlords to recoup the cost of major capital repairs that are not part of regular maintenance, provided the recoupment does not result in a permanent rent increase;

Allows tenants to claim a downward adjustment in rent if a landlord reduces housing services or is noncompliant with the permanent ordinance;

Allows an additional 2% above CPI in annual rent increases, through December 31, 2023, for luxury market-rate units with two bedrooms or less, in buildings of 25 units or more, where the unit had a base rent of \$4,000 per month or more on September 11, 2018, subject to review and approval by the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs;

Requires owners of any housing unit held for rent to register the unit with the County and pay any applicable fee;

Ensures that landlords and tenants receive due process in the administration of the ordinance, including the ability to appeal certain decisions to a rent review board;

Requires landlords to provide information to the County that is necessary to ensure the administration and enforcement of the rent stabilization program;

Establishes reasonable and appropriate penalties for noncompliance with the permanent ordinance;

Allows a tenant to verify unit registration information submitted by the

property owner, including the rental rate and amenities provided; and

Maximizes tenant protections when the landlord leaves the rental market business under the Ellis Act;

Instruct the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority and the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer and County Counsel, to report back to the Board in 120 days on the feasibility of requiring landlords to offer relocation assistance to tenants who are economically displaced from rental units not covered by the permanent rent stabilization ordinance; and develop a Multilingual and Culturally Competent Education and Outreach Plan;

Direct the Chief Executive Officer, in consultation with the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority and the Director of Consumer and Business Affairs, to identify funding for costs related to the activities described above, and authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute a Funding Agreement with LACDA, as may be necessary; and

Authorize the Executive Director of the Los Angeles County Development Authority to execute a Funding Agreement with the County, as may be necessary, for funding for costs related to the activities described above and accept and incorporate the funds into LACDA's Fiscal Year 2019-20 budget and future Fiscal Year budgets.
