6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SUPERVISORS, WE'RE GOING TO BEGIN WITH PRAYER
7 AND THEN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND THEN WE'RE GOING TO HAVE
8 A SPECIAL ACTION AS A RESULT OF AN ADMINISTRATIVE PROBLEM THAT
9 OCCURRED IN THE REGISTRAR-RECORDER'S OFFICE SO THAT, PRIOR TO
10 10:00, WE CAN TAKE ACTION ON CERTIFICATION OF THE ELECTION
11 RESULTS BECAUSE, AT 10:00 THROUGHOUT THIS COUNTY AND A NUMBER
12 OF OUR CITIES, ELECTED OFFICIALS FROM MAYORS, SCHOOL BOARD
13 MEMBERS ARE BEING SWORN IN AND THEN WE'LL MAKE THE
14 PRESENTATION TO THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE REPRESENTATIVE FROM
15 THE AMERICAN LEGION WITH HIS PROCLAMATION. SO WE WILL CALL THE
16 MEETING TO ORDER AND SUPERVISOR DON KNABE WILL LEAD US IN
17 PRAYER AND THEN WE'LL DO THE PLEDGE.

19 **SUP. KNABE:** IF YOU WILL JOIN ME IN AN ATTITUDE OF PRAYER,
20 PLEASE. OUR MOST KIND AND GRACIOUS HEAVENLY FATHER, WE COME
21 BEFORE YOU ONCE AGAIN THIS MORNING TO THANK YOU FOR THE
22 BOUNTIFUL BLESSINGS YOU'VE BESTOWED UPON EACH OF US. AS WE
23 HAVE CELEBRATED THE HOLIDAY OF THANKSGIVING AND ENJOYED THOSE
24 DAYS TOGETHER WITH FAMILY AND FRIENDS, WE ARE ALSO VERY AWARE
25 OF THOSE THAT WERE WITHOUT. AND AS WE BEGIN A CELEBRATION OF



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1 THE HOLIDAY SEASON, AT THE TIME OF JOY-- IT'S A TIME OF JOY
2 FOR EVERYONE, FOR FAMILY, FRIENDS BUT IT'S ALSO A TIME OF NEED
3 FOR EVERYONE AND WE WOULD JUST ASK YOUR BLESSINGS OVER THOSE
4 THAT, WE AS A COMMUNITY AND A COUNTY, CAN COME TOGETHER TO
5 ASSIST THOSE IN NEED. AND, GOD, WE JUST ASK YOUR BOUNTIFUL
6 PRAYER AND BLESSINGS OVER THIS GATHERING TODAY AND OUR MEETING
7 AND OUR BUSINESS OF THE DAY, NOT ONLY THAT WE TRY TO DO THE
8 RIGHT THING BUT WE DO THE GOOD THING. AND WE ASK YOUR
9 CONTINUED BLESSINGS AND ALL GOD'S PEOPLE SAID AMEN.

11 **KIM DEBERRY:** WOULD YOU PLACE YOUR HAND OVER YOUR HEART AND

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WE'LL CALL EXECUTIVE OFFICE AND THEN WE'LL
15 ASK COUNTY COUNSEL TO GIVE US THE AUTHORIZATION AND
16 RECOMMENDATION. AND THEN SUPERVISOR BURKE CAN MAKE HER
17 PRESENTATION.

19 **CLERK ROBIN GUERRERO:** OKAY, WE HAVE JUST RECEIVED THIS MORNING
20 THE OFFICIAL ELECTIONS RESULTS FROM THE REGISTRAR-
21 RECORDER/COUNTY CLERK. IN ORDER THAT THESE ELECTION RESULTS
22 CAN BE CERTIFIED, IT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE FOR THE BOARD TO
23 TAKE THE FOLLOWING ACTION: MAKE A FINDING THAT THE OFFICIAL
24 RESULTS OF THE ELECTION AND RECOMMENDATION OF THE REGISTRAR-
25 RECORDER/COUNTY CLERK CERTIFYING THOSE RESULTS CAME TO THE

2 AND THERE IS A NEED TO TAKE IMMEDIATE ACTION FOR APPROVAL OF
3 THE REGISTRAR-RECORDER/COUNTY CLERK'S RECOMMENDATION TO
4 DECLARE OFFICIAL THE RESULTS OF THE SPECIAL STATEWIDE AND
5 CONSOLIDATED ELECTION HELD NOVEMBER 8TH, 2005. IT WOULD BE
6 APPROPRIATE AT THIS TIME TO MAKE A MOTION.

20 DEBERRY IS A MEMBER OF THE AMVETS POST NUMBER 48 IN LONG
21 BEACH. HE SERVED IN THE MILITARY FROM 1979 TO 1981 AS A PETTY
22 OFFICER THIRD CLASS IN THE UNITED STATES NAVY ASSAULT CRAFT
23 UNIT 2 IN NORFOLK, VIRGINIA. HIS DECORATIONS ARE THE NAVY GOOD
24 CONDUCT MEDAL, NAVY EXPEDITIONARY MEDAL AND THE NATIONAL
25 DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL. KIM HAS LIVED IN THE FOURTH DISTRICT



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1 FOR SOME FOUR YEARS AND, MOST IMPORTANTLY, HE WORKS AT HARBOR
2 UCLA AS A CHEF AT THE HOSPITAL, SO WE WANT TO THANK YOU FOR
3 TAKING THE TIME OUT OF YOUR BUSY DAY TO JOIN US HERE AND LEAD
4 US IN THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND WISH YOU A JOYOUS HOLIDAY

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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** OKAY. THIS MORNING WE'RE GOING TO WELCOME TO
2 THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES BOLIVIA'S NEW CONSUL-GENERAL, THE
3 HONORABLE FERNANDO LAZCANO TO OUR COUNTY. HE WAS ACCREDITED BY
4 THE UNITED STATES STATE DEPARTMENT ON APRIL 25TH OF THIS YEAR.
5 A NATIVE OF BOLIVIA, HE JOINED THE BOLIVIAN FOREIGN SERVICE IN
6 1982. HE'S HELD VARIOUS POSITIONS, INCLUDING DEPUTY CONSUL-
7 GENERAL IN MIAMI, FLORIDA. HE STUDIED LANGUAGES AT THE
8 UNIVERSITY OF MUNICH IN GERMANY, HOLDS A DEGREE IN
9 INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS FROM INSTITUTE OF RESEARCH AND
10 INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS FROM FLORENCE, ITALY. WE ARE VERY
11 PLEASED TO WELCOME YOU, CONSUL. WE HAVE OVER, AS YOU KNOW, 90
12 CONSUL-GENERALS REPRESENTING THEIR COUNTRIES IN OUR COUNTY AND
13 WE HAVE A VERY DYNAMIC COUNTY WHERE BASICALLY IT'S A UNITED
14 NATIONS, WHERE EVERY CITIZEN OF THE WORLD HAS A RELATIVE
15 LIVING HERE AND MANY OF THEM HAVE GOVERNMENTS OF THEIR NATIVE
16 COUNTRIES POSTED HERE AS WELL. SO, CONSUL-GENERAL, WELCOME TO
17 OUR COUNTY. WE LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH YOU. OUR SHERIFF
18 IS DIRECTLY INVOLVED WITH YOU AS OUR PROTOCOL OFFICE AND OUR
19 BOARD, WE WELCOME YOU AND LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH YOU. [
20 APPLAUSE]

21

22 **THE HONORABLE CONSUL-GENERAL FERNANDO LAZCANO:** GOOD MORNING,
23 LADIES AND GENTLEMEN. I'VE PREPARED SOMETHING SMALL PIECE LIKE
24 _____ OF _____ SO HOPE YOU DON'T GET
25 BORED WITH THIS. IT IS AN HONOR FOR ME TO BE HERE THIS MORNING



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1 AT THE OFFICE OF THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WITH THE
2 HONORABLE MICHAEL ANTONOVICH, YVONNE BURKE, DON KNABE AND ZEV
3 YAROSLAVSKY, WHO HAVE CORDIALLY INVITED ME FOR THIS
4 PRESENTATION AS THE NEWLY APPOINTED CONSUL-GENERAL OF BOLIVIA
5 IN THIS GREAT CITY. FIRST, I WOULD LIKE TO EXPRESS MY SINCERE
6 GRATITUDE TO ALL THE SUPERVISORS AND I SEND MY WARMEST REGARDS
7 TO THE AUDIENCE PRESENT HERE TODAY. AFTER MORE THAN TWO
8 DECADES, MY GOVERNMENT HAS DECIDED TO REOPEN THE OFFICE OF THE
9 CONSUL-GENERAL HERE IN LOS ANGELES FOR SEVERAL IMPORTANT
10 REASONS. FIRST, THE BOLIVIAN COMMUNITY HAS RECENTLY BEEN
11 GROWING IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA DUE TO THE FACT THAT THIS
12 WONDERFUL STATE REPRESENTS ONE OF THE LARGEST ECONOMIES IN THE
13 WORLD AND HAS BECOME A FOCAL POINT FOR VARIOUS BOLIVIAN
14 ENTREPRENEURS, LEADING TO STRONG COMMERCIAL TIES AS WELL AS
15 THE DEVELOPMENTAL OF TRADE AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE. IN ADDITION,
16 BOLIVIA HAS THE LARGEST MINERAL RESERVE OF NATURAL GAS IN THE
17 REGION, WHICH EXCEEDS APPROXIMATELY 56 TRILLION CUBIC FEET.
18 THE POSSIBILITIES ARE SUBSTANTIAL ONCE THE HYDROCARBON LAWS
19 ARE PUT INTO PLACE. WHEN THIS OCCURS, IT IS BOLIVIA'S
20 INTENTION TO EXPORT NATURAL GAS TO CALIFORNIA, WHICH WOULD BE
21 BENEFICIAL TO BOTH COUNTRIES. THANK YOU ONCE AGAIN FOR
22 ALLOWING ME TO SERVE WITH YOU. [APPLAUSE]

24 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I'D LIKE TO CALL UP DR. JONATHAN FIELDING.
25 IS DR. FIELDING HERE? AND MARIO PEREZ, BETTY D'AUGUSTINE AND



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1 RICKIE ROSALES. MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, THIS PROCLAMATION TODAY
2 IS FOR WORLD A.I.D.S. DAY AND ASKS THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES
3 TO PROCLAIM DECEMBER 1ST, 2005, THIS THURSDAY, AS WORLD
4 A.I.D.S. DAY. AN ESTIMATED 57,000 PERSONS ARE LIVING WITH
5 H.I.V./A.I.D.S. IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY ALONE. 85% OF A.I.D.S.
6 CASES CONTINUE TO BE AMONG GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN AND AN
7 ESTIMATED 75% OF ALL NEW CASES OF H.I.V. INFECTIONS OCCUR
8 AMONG PEOPLE OF COLOR. AND THUS THERE ARE NOW MORE LATINOS
9 LIVING WITH A.I.D.S. IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY THAN ANY OTHER
10 RACIAL OR ETHIC GROUP, AND AFRICAN-AMERICAN WOMEN AND MEN ALSO
11 CONTINUE TO BE DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECTED IN THIS COUNTY BY
12 THE VIRUS. WORLD A.I.D.S. DAY PROVIDES AN OPPORTUNITY TO FOCUS
13 ATTENTION ON H.I.V. INFECTION AND A.I.D.S. AND TO CONTINUE
14 POLICY COMMITMENTS TO ADDRESS THE H.I.V./A.I.D.S. PANDEMIC AND
15 TO REACH OUT TO THOSE AT RISK FOR INFECTION AND RENEW OUR
16 EFFORTS TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF H.I.V. THROUGH EDUCATION AND
17 FOCUS PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND TO PROVIDE TREATMENT AND CARE TO
18 THOSE IN NEED. THE WORLD A.I.D.S. DAY 2005 THEME, "STOP
19 A.I.D.S., KEEP THE PROMISE," REMINDS GOVERNMENT LEADERS AT A

4 HOMELESS AND THEY'RE NOT-- THEY USUALLY DO NOT BECOME
5 PARTICIPATING, CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY. AND I DO
6 BELIEVE THAT THIS IS NOT BY CHANCE. I DON'T WANT TO SAY IT'S A
7 CONSPIRED EFFORT BUT I DO BELIEVE THAT IT IS AND I WANT TO
8 EXPOSE THAT. THE CHILDREN THAT WOULD LIKE TO SPEAK, AS WELL AS
9 THE PARENTS, THE CHILDREN ARE THEN MEDICATED, THEY'RE LABELED
10 IMBALANCED, ATTENTION DEFICIT DISORDER SUFFERERS, CHILDREN
11 THAT HAVE ANGER MANAGEMENT PROBLEMS. WELL, OF COURSE, BECAUSE
12 THEY'RE BEING ABUSED, JUST LIKE PARENTS ARE WHO HAVE BEEN
13 FALSELY ACCUSED BECAUSE WE DO NOT HAVE OUR CHILDREN TO JUSTIFY
14 THE MAINTENANCE OF THIS CLASS SYSTEM. CHILDREN THAT ARE ABUSED
15 ARE NOT ABLE TO WORK AND EXPRESS THEMSELVES AND FUNCTION ON
16 THE SAME LEVEL OF MOST CHILDREN FROM MIDDLE AND UPPER CLASS
17 FAMILIES AND BETTER ENVIRONMENTS. SO, LIKE I SAID, THAT WAS
18 JUST FOR THE RECORD. WE'VE STATED THAT PROBABLY HUNDREDS OF
19 TIMES IN THE LAST TWO YEARS, ALL TO NO AVAIL, BUT, AGAIN, THIS
20 IS PROBABLY GOING TO BE ONE OF THE FINAL STATEMENTS THAT I
21 MAKE REGARDING THAT ISSUE. ABOUT THE HOMELESS, I THINK THAT,
22 YES, IT'S VERY NICE TO HAVE A PROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT DAY,
23 SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY, I THINK IN ALL ALTRUISM. BUT I THINK
24 THAT THE REAL-- I MEAN, I LIVE DOWNTOWN. I SEE A LOT OF THE
25 HOMELESS, AND I SEE THAT THEY ARE BEING PROBABLY USED IN A LOT



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1 OF EXPERIMENTS PERPETRATED BY MICHAEL MALONEY, WHO IS A COUNTY
2 COMMISSION PSYCHIATRIST. THEY NEED JOBS, THEY NEED
3 DETOXIFICATION AND THEY NEED SOME PROGRAMS TO MAKE THEM
4 CONFIDENT THAT THEY CAN BE FUNCTIONAL. I THINK THEY'RE BEING
5 USED IN EXPERIMENTS FOR THEIR MELANIN, INTERFERON OR JUST, YOU
6 KNOW, SOME TYPE OF DEMOGRAPHIC EXPERIMENTS. I LIVE HERE AND I
7 TALK TO THEM, OKAY? THEY'RE TOXIC, THEY'RE ON MEDICATION,
8 THERE'S SOMETHING POSSIBLY IN THE FOOD, WHO KNOWS, THAT KEEPS
9 THEM AT A LEVEL OF UNCONSCIOUSNESS WHERE THEY DO NOT WANT TO
10 DO ANYTHING. AND IF IT WASN'T FOR THE LORD, I'D BE THERE. LIKE
11 I SAID, BECAUSE OF THIS CONSPIRED EFFORT AND I'M NOT PARANOID,
12 I WOULDN'T BE HERE AND EMPLOYED, WORKING FOR MYSELF, DESPITE
13 THE ENTRAPMENTS, LIES AND LOOK-ALIKES, TODAY, EVEN POLICEMEN
14 APPEARED AT MY DOOR FOR SOMEONE WHO HAD LIED AND SAID THAT I
15 WAS ATTACKING SOMEONE WHO HAD BEEN HARASSING ME, SIMPLY
16 BECAUSE WE'RE VOCAL, I BELIEVE. SO I KNOW WE'RE IN THE
17 LIMELIGHT AND WE'RE IN THE LINE OF FIRE. BUT, AGAIN, I THINK
18 THESE MONEYS SHOULD BE USED TO REALLY EXPOSE WHAT'S HAPPENING
19 IN THE MAINTENANCE OF THIS CLASS SYSTEM. THANK YOU.

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU. OKAY, MR. WILLIAMS.

22

23 **WARREN WILLIAMS:** YOU KNOW, THERE'S A PROBLEM IN OBSERVING THE
24 BOARD MEETING OF LAST WEEK. I NOTICE HOW THE VISUAL IS SHOWING
25 THE ONE NUMBER IN WHICH YOU HAVE US SPEAKING UNDER AND



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1 MICHELLE AND I BOTH ADDRESS, LIKE OTHER PEOPLE HAVE IN THE
2 PAST, AND THAT'S COMPLETE REPRESENTATION, BECAUSE MOST PEOPLE
3 CAN'T FOLLOW ALL THE OTHER AGENDA ITEMS THAT I AM GOING TO
4 ADDRESS NOW. AND IF THEY'RE GOING TO FORCE US TO SPEAK ON ALL
5 THESE AGENDA ITEMS, THEN THEY NEED TO STOP THAT TAPE FROM
6 RUNNING THAT'S SAYING WE'RE TALKING ABOUT ONE AGENDA ITEM SO
7 PEOPLE CAN INTERPRET AND COMPREHEND THAT WE'RE NOT JUST
8 TALKING ABOUT THAT ONE AGENDA ITEM. CONTINUING FORWARD WITH
9 THAT IN MIND, I'M ALSO ASKING FOR A WRITTEN RESPONSE TO EVERY
10 ITEM THAT I BRING UP, AS WELL AS I BROUGHT UP IN THE PAST OF
11 LAST WEEK, BECAUSE THOSE ISSUES STILL RELEVANT AND THEY RELATE
12 TO THESE ITEMS. ON NUMBER 85-A, THE PROJECT HOMELESS
13 CONNECTION DAY, WHAT TYPE OF CONNECTION ARE WE MAKING WITH THE
14 HOMELESS WHEN, AGAIN, WE NEED TO BE ELIMINATING HOMELESSNESS
15 IN L.A. COUNTY? HOMELESSNESS IS KIND OF LIKE THE VOICES OF
16 FOSTER YOUTH. YOU PARADE A COUPLE OF PEOPLE ON THE STAGE AND A
17 LOT OF PEOPLE WHO ARE MAKING A LOT OF MONEY OFF THE CHILDREN
18 AND THEN ALLEGE THAT THESE CHILDREN HAVE SUCH WONDERFUL
19 VOICES, WHEN A LOT OF CHILDREN IN THE SYSTEM ARE COMPLAINING
20 ABOUT BEING ABUSED, RAPED. MACLAREN HALL IS STILL A VERY LIVE
21 ISSUE FOR PEOPLE LIKE MYSELF, PROVING THAT THIS COUNTY IS
22 GUILTY OF CHILD MOLESTATION. THIS BOARD IS GUILTY OF MURDER,
23 OF WRONGLY MEDICATING CHILDREN, DESTROYING FAMILIES AND A LOT
24 OF OTHER CRIMES. AND, YOU KNOW, YOU PARADE THEM ON AND SAY
25 VOICES OF YOUTH IS LIKE THE VOICES OF THE HOMELESS. YOU SEE



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1 THE HOMELESS OUT HERE EVERY DAY WITH THIS COUNTY, IT'S A
2 FAILURE THEN BECAUSE IT IS NOT SOLVED, THERE'S HOMELESS ISSUES
3 AFTER ALL THESE MANY YEARS. ON ITEM NUMBER 18, DELIVERING
4 SUBPOENAS, I PERSONALLY HAVE EXPERIENCED FRAUD IN THAT SYSTEM
5 WHERE THEY ALLEGE THEY SENT ME NOTICE WHEN THEY DIDN'T. WHEN
6 YOU MAKE THIS LEGAL BINDING AND PAY PEOPLE DO IT, THEN THEY'RE
7 USING THE LEGAL PROCESS OF SIMPLY SUGGESTING THAT THEY HAVE
8 FILED NOTICE. THAT DOESN'T MEAN THAT THEY HAVE. IN MY
9 SITUATION, THEY SENT A COMMUNICATION WITHIN THE OFFICE ITSELF
10 AND THEN LIED AND SAID THAT THEY SENT IT TO ME IN SOME TYPE OF
11 MAIL TELEGRAM PROCESS, BUT THE NUMBER TO IDENTIFY WHEN THEY'RE
12 ALL NUMBERS. SO ALL THESE THINGS, I OPPOSE AND NONE OF THEM
13 SHOULD BE FUNDED BECAUSE WE DO THE NEUTRAL ENTITIES AND NOT
14 JUST THE COUNTY PEOPLE ABLE TO COVER UP ITS WRONGDOING. ON
15 ITEM NUMBER 19, THE SAME THING EXISTS, THE URINE SAMPLES AND
16 THE DRUG AND ALCOHOL TESTING SHOULD BE DONE BY OTHER ENTITIES
17 AND NOT JUST FUNDING ONE TO DO IT. ON NUMBER 21, WHAT ARE WE
18 DOING? HIRING THE UNTOUCHABLES ALL OVER AGAIN? TALKING ABOUT
19 3-1/2 MILLION PLUS DOLLARS TO HAVE A SPECIAL GROUP LIKE, YOU
20 KNOW, TO ADDRESS FRAUD IN THE COUNTY AND SO ON AND SO FORTH?
21 WELL, WHO IS DEALING WITH THE FRAUD, AGAIN, OF SOCIAL WORKERS,
22 LAW ENFORCEMENT AND OTHERS? SO IT SHOULDN'T BE FUNDED. REQUEST
23 FOR PROPOSALS SHOULD DEFINITELY BE FOCUSED ON MAJOR REQUEST
24 PROPOSALS THAT ARE CITIZEN FRIENDLY. YOU THROW THESE THINGS
25 OUT HERE, YOU'RE NOT ADVERTISING IN A LOT OF BLACK NEWSPAPERS



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1 IN THE INNER CITY AND OTHER LOCATIONS SO PEOPLE ARE EVEN AWARE
2 OF WHAT TYPE OF OPPORTUNITY THEY HAVE IN GETTING FUNDING. I'VE
3 TALKED TO A GROUP OF PERSONS ON THE HOMELESS ISSUE. A LOT OF
4 PERSONS DO RESPOND AFTER SEEING THESE BOARD MEETINGS AND THEY
5 DO SUPPORT IT BUT THEY DON'T BELIEVE THIS COUNTY AND THIS
6 PARTICULAR BOARD CARES AND IS BEING RESPONSIBLE AND THEY HAVE
7 NO INTEREST OF COMING DOWN BECAUSE THEY SEE THE WAY MANY OF US
8 ARE DISRESPECTED IN COMING AND SPEAKING BEFORE YOU AND HOW YOU
9 DON'T FOLLOW THROUGH. THERE'S NEVER BEEN A TIME HERE THAT
10 YOU'VE ACTUALLY RESPONDED AND HAS SAID, "YOU KNOW, WARREN,
11 THAT MAKES SENSE, WE ACKNOWLEDGE WHAT YOU HAVE SAID AND WE'RE
12 GOING TO ACT UPON YOUR RECOMMENDATION." IT'S NEVER HAPPENED. I
13 HAVE RECEIVED A LETTER FROM YOU, ANTONOVICH, IN REGARD TO THE
14 MEN'S COMMISSION AND I COMMEND YOU FOR THAT BUT IT'S STILL AN
15 UNRESOLVED ISSUE. WE DON'T HAVE IT. AN AGENDA BIASED SYSTEM,
16 WE DO NEED A MEN'S COMMISSION. AND SUPERVISOR BURKE, I HAVE
17 RECEIVED A LETTER FROM YOU AND I COMMEND YOU FOR THAT,
18 SUPPORTING MY VIEWS DEALING WITH OUR CHILDREN, IN BOTH YOUR
19 DISTRICT AND THE DISTRICT OF L.A. HOWEVER, OUR CHILDREN ARE
20 STILL SUFFERING THESE PROBLEMS. THIS GOES WAY BACK BUT, IF WE
21 GO BACK TO JUST THE PROGRAM FUNDED 90044, THAT WAS ALMOST TWO
22 DECADES AGO AND YET THE SAME PROBLEM STILL EXISTS IN AREAS
23 LIKE SOUTH CENTRAL, NEW SOUTH CENTRAL, COMPTON, AND SO ON AND
24 SO FORTH. PEOPLE WHO HAVE LITTLE INCOME WHO ARE SUBJECTED TO
25 HOMELESS CONDITIONS OR OTHER ARE MORE LIKELY TO END UP IN THE



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1 SYSTEM BECAUSE THEY HAVE NO FORMIDABLE DEFENSE AGAINST BEING
2 ATTACKED. THE FINAL ISSUES, THE CRISES IS NUMBER 41, OF
3 EMERGENCY COUNSELING AND THINGS FOR THE EVACUEES FROM KATRINA.
4 WELL, HOW DO WE NOT END UP CONTINUING TO PRETEND THAT F.E.M.A.
5 DOESN'T EXIST WHEN THAT'S F.E.M.A.'S RESPONSIBILITY? WHAT IS
6 THE COUNTY DOING MAKING SURE FIRST THAT F.E.M.A. IS DOING ITS
7 JOB, BECAUSE A LOT OF PEOPLE HERE IN L.A. COUNTY NEEDS THOSE
8 FUNDS. THE REGIONAL FOOD BANK ANNOUNCED THAT A LOT OF PEOPLE
9 THAT WERE SHORT ON TURKEYS AND THINGS THIS YEAR, A LOT OF
10 PEOPLE ON THE STREET ARE COMPLAINING TO ME THAT THEIR NEEDS
11 ARE NOT BEING MET, EVEN DURING THIS HOLIDAY PERIOD. BUT, YET,
12 WHEN THEY CREATE SOMETHING LIKE KATRINA, THEN ALL OF THESE
13 ENTITIES ALL OF A SUDDEN ALL FOCUS ON THAT ONE THING AND THEY
14 NEGLECT PEOPLE THAT'S ALREADY BEEN NEGLECTED TOO LONG. SO,
15 AGAIN, WE WOULD LIKE A WRITTEN RESPONSE ON ALL OF THESE ITEMS.

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MOTIONED BY YAROSLAVSKY. SECONDED. WITHOUT
9 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** ITEM 79.

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** 79. THIS IS 85. 79. 79?

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IT WAS HELD FOR A MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** PETER BAXTER.

18

19 **PETER BAXTER:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF YOUR HONORABLE BOARD,
20 MR. JANSSEN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, MY NAME IS PETER BAXTER AND
21 I LIVE IN LOS ANGELES. IT IS RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED THAT THIS
22 AGENDA ITEM REFERS TO THE PROPOSED INCREASE OF A PORTION OF
23 THE FILING FEES WHICH ARE CHARGED FOR FILLING-- FILING CIVIL
24 LAWSUITS, WHICH FEES, IN PART, PAY THE EXPENSES OF THE LAW

13 FROM THE POLITICIAN WHOSE NAME IS ABOVE THE ENTRANCE IN THAT
14 COURTHOUSE ON MATTERS WHICH ARE BEFORE THE COURT? WELL, DO
15 THEY OR DON'T THEY? WHAT ARE THE IMPLICATIONS IN HAVING A
16 COURTHOUSE NAMED FOR A SITTING POLITICIAN? WE'RE NOT TALKING
17 ABOUT SOMEBODY WHO IS DEAD, WE'RE TALKING ABOUT A SITTING
18 POLITICIAN AND A VERY PROMINENT POLITICIAN IN THE COUNTY AND
19 IN THE STATE. IS THAT FACT SIGNIFICANT IN RAISING FUNDS FOR
20 THAT POLITICIAN? IF THAT POLITICIAN, WHEN HE PRESENTS HIS
21 CAMPAIGN, IS ABLE TO SAY HIS NAME IS ABOVE A COURTHOUSE, THAT
22 IS IMPRESSIVE. THAT IS REALLY IMPRESSIVE. WHEN YOU CAN GET
23 YOUR NAME ABOVE A COURTHOUSE, THAT'S A LITTLE MORE IMPORTANT
24 THAN HAVING YOUR NAME ABOVE A BANK. BUT IF YOUR NAME IS ABOVE
25 A BANK, YOU TELL THE PEOPLE IN THAT BANK WHAT TO DO. AND, IF



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1 YOUR NAME IS ABOVE A COURTHOUSE, HOW ARE WE TO KNOW THAT THIS
2 PARTICULAR POLITICIAN IS NOT TELLING THE JUDGES WHAT TO DO?
3 THE QUESTION REMAINS, IS IT LAWFULLY ACCEPTABLE FOR THE LAW
4 LIBRARY TO REQUEST A PORTION OF FILING FEES, BECAUSE THEY
5 OUGHT TO KNOW, IF ANYBODY DOES, ABOUT THE SITUATION, TO
6 REQUEST A PORTION OF FILING FEES TO BE CHARGED TO LITIGANTS
7 WHEN ALL SEVEN COUNTY OFFICERS, BEING THE BOARD OF THE LAW
8 LIBRARY TRUSTEES, ARE OF A PERSONAL AND PROFESSIONAL VIEW? FOR
9 ALL WE KNOW, THAT THE ANTELOPE COURTHOUSE MAY BE NAMED FOR A
10 COUNTY SUPERVISOR, IT MAY BE NAMED UNLAWFULLY. AND I THANK
11 YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN.

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU. MOTION BEFORE US IS THE L.A.
14 COUNTY LAW LIBRARY RECOMMENDATION.

15

16 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MOVE APPROVAL.

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YAROSLAVSKY. SECONDED. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
19 ORDERED.

20

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. CHAIRMAN, THERE WAS ONE OTHER PERSON ON
22 ON 85-A WHO WANTED TO BE HEARD, SO I'M GOING TO MOVE
23 RECONSIDERATION OF 85-A. I THINK JOEL ROBERTS WANTED TO SPEAK
24 IN FAVOR OF IT.

5 THE PROJECT Y!IMBY CONNECT DAY, ALONG WITH THE COUNTY OF LOS
6 ANGELES AND WE'RE JUST VERY GRATEFUL FOR PROCLAIMING DECEMBER
7 8TH AS PROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT DAY. AS YOU KNOW, THE PUBLIC
8 AND THE MEDIA ARE ONCE AGAIN DISCUSSING THE ISSUE OF
9 HOMELESSNESS IN OUR COMMUNITIES AND WE'RE JUST THANKFUL THAT
10 THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES IS TAKING THE LEADERSHIP TO ADDRESS
11 THE PLIGHT OF MANY OF OUR CITIZENS WHO LIVE ON OUR STREETS.
12 YOUR LEADERSHIP IN INVESTING MORE MONEY INTO HOMELESS
13 SERVICES, IN GUIDING THE CURRENT TEN-YEAR PLAN TO END
14 HOMELESSNESS AND NOW BACKING PROJECT Y!IMBY CONNECT DAY, WHICH
15 MEANS YES! IN MY BACKYARD, IS COMMENDABLE. PROJECT Y!IMBY IS
16 PART OF THE SOLUTION TO ENDING HOMELESSNESS IN LOS ANGELES
17 COUNTY. IT IS A MODEL TO MOBILIZE LOCAL COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT
18 THE COUNTY TO USE THEIR OWN RESOURCES TO ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS
19 ON A LOCAL LEVEL. IT IS A MODEL WHERE WE CONNECT PEOPLE WHO
20 ARE HOMELESS INTO SERVICES AND HOUSING AND WE USE THE LOCAL
21 COMMUNITY THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY AND SO WE HOPE THAT
22 COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY WILL USE PROJECT Y!IMBY TO
23 ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS IN THEIR LOCAL COMMUNITY. SO I'M VERY
24 THANKFUL FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP IN HELPING TO ADDRESS
25 HOMELESSNESS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

23 SAN GABRIEL VALLEY. AND STANLEY HAHN, WHO WAS A PRACTICING
24 ATTORNEY IN THE PASADENA, WAS ALSO, AS I SAID, THE FORMER
25 PRESIDENT OF THE TOURNAMENT OF ROSES. SECONDED BY KNABE.

18 TREATMENT AT L.A. COUNTY MEDICAL CENTERS AND TO REPORT ON THE
19 STATUS AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE HOMELESS SERVICE ACTION PLAN
20 AS DEVELOPED IN JULY OF 2004, WITH QUARTERLY PROGRESS REPORTS
21 TO THE BOARD ON STRENGTHENING HOMELESS SERVICES IN THE COUNTY
22 HEALTH FACILITIES. THAT WOULD BE A MOTION AND FOR THAT, COULD
23 WE PASS THAT TODAY? BECAUSE IT'S ASKING FOR...
24



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1 **RAYMOND G. FORTNER, JR.:** YES, MR. MAYOR. IT'S ESSENTIALLY IN
2 THE NATURE OF A REPORT BACK, SO YOU CAN ADOPT THAT TODAY.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO I'LL MOVE IT, SECONDED BY BURKE. WITHOUT
5 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. ON ITEM NUMBER 1-H, IF WE COULD HAVE
6 THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENTS. ALSO, WHILE THEY ARE
7 COMING UP, LET ME ALSO MOVE THAT WE ADJOURN IN MEMORY OF JOHN
8 EDWARD RICE. MANY OF YOU MAY HAVE SEEN JOHN AND HIS BROTHER ON
9 TELEVISION AND, AS YOU KNOW, BILLY BARTY WAS A GOOD FRIEND OF
10 OURS, GODFATHER TO MY CHILDREN AND SERVED AS MY COMMISSIONER
11 ON THE DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED COMMISSION AND DID A LOT FOR
12 LITTLE PEOPLE. JOHN RICE WAS BORN AND HE AND HIS WIFE-- AND
13 BROTHER, I SHOULD SAY, WERE DWARF TWINS ABANDONED AT THE
14 HOSPITAL BY THEIR PARENTS BUT ADOPTED BY A WONDERFUL COUPLE
15 AND THEY GREW TO BE 2-FEET-10, 2 FEET, 10 INCHES AND WHAT
16 THEY'RE ABLE TO DO IS VERY, VERY REMARKABLE AND A GOOD ROLE
17 MODEL. THEY WERE ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN THE BOY SCOUTS, THEY
18 CARRIED THEIR BACKPACKS AS ANY OTHER SCOUT AND THEY CONTINUED
19 WITH THEIR LOVING FAMILY DOING WELL BUT THEN THE MOTHER DIED
20 IN THE EIGHTH GRADE AND THE FATHER DIED WHEN THEY WERE IN THE
21 TENTH GRADE. BUT THEY CAME INTO THE WORLD SMALL AND THEY WERE
22 AN INSPIRATION. IN THEIR COUNTY, MIAMI, FLORIDA, THEY FLEW THE
23 FLAGS AT HALF-MAST LAST WEEK BECAUSE THEY WERE SUCH AN
24 INTEGRAL PART OF THE COUNTY. THEY WERE SUCCESSFUL, BECAME
25 MULTIMILLIONAIRES IN REAL ESTATE AND MOTIVATIONAL PROGRAMS.



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1 AND AGAIN, TWO FEET 10 INCHES AND THEY WERE ABLE TO OVERCOME
2 ALL OF THESE PROBLEMS AND BE A SUCCESS AND SHOW HOW YOU COULD
3 BECOME SUCCESSFUL BY ACHIEVING YOUR EDUCATION AND PURSUING
4 YOUR DREAMS. AND HE DIED TRAGICALLY. HE HAD A BROKEN LEG. THEY
5 TOOK HIM TO THE HOSPITAL, AND HE DIED WHEN THEY WERE GIVING
6 HIM THE ANESTHESIA. THEY PROBABLY GAVE HIM, YOU KNOW, ENOUGH
7 FOR A 6-FOOTER INSTEAD OF 2-FEET 10 INCHES, AND IT'S JUST
8 INCREDIBLE THAT HE WAS BILLED AS SUCH A GIANT AND THE IMPACT
9 HE SERVED ON THE, I BELIEVE, THE PLANNING COMMISSION FOR HIS
10 COMMUNITY, JUST A GOOD ROLE MODEL. SO ALSO WE ADJOURN IN
11 MEMORY OF HIM. SECONDED BY KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
12 ORDERED. MY QUESTIONS ON THIS CONTRACT, HOW MANY POTENTIAL
13 BIDDERS WERE NOTIFIED FOR THIS CONTRACT?

14

15 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WE MAILED OUT-- I'M SORRY. 30 BIDDERS WERE
16 NOTIFIED. IN ADDITION, WE WENT ON THE INTERNET AND NOTIFIED AN
17 ADDITIONAL 10 BIDDERS ABOUT THE POTENTIAL FOR THIS CONTRACT.

18

19 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO HOW WAS THE INFORMATION ABOUT THE CONTRACT
20 POSTED ON THE COUNTY'S WEBSITE?

21

22 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WE POSTED IT, AS REQUIRED, FOR THE MINIMUM OF
23 15 DAYS. AS WELL, WE PUBLISH IN NINE NEWSPAPERS, COMMUNITY
24 NEWSPAPERS.

25



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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND HOW MANY BIDDERS ATTEND THE PRE-BIDDERS
2 CONFERENCE?

3

4 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WE HAD SIX ATTEND THE PRE-BID CONFERENCE.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND HOW MANY PROPOSALS DID YOU RECEIVE?

7

8 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WE RECEIVED ONE.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** DID C.D.C. STAFF INTERVIEW THE VENDORS WHO
11 ATTENDED AND DID NOT, YOU KNOW, SUBMIT...

12

13 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WE WERE ABLE TO CONTACT FOUR OF THE FIVE WHO
14 DIDN'T SUBMIT BIDS AND THEY HAD VARIOUS REASONS AS TO WHY THEY
15 DIDN'T SUBMIT BIDS. PART OF IT IS THAT THEY FELT THAT OUR
16 CONTRACT WAS TOO CUMBERSOME. ANOTHER ONE FELT THAT HE DIDN'T
17 HAVE TIME TO EVALUATE ALL THE ELEVATORS BECAUSE MOST OF THEM
18 ARE 20 TO 25 YEARS OLD ELEVATORS. WE ALSO REQUIRED FOR THEM TO
19 DISPOSE OF ANY WASTE MATERIAL THAT IS EMITTED FROM THE
20 ELEVATORS. THEY DIDN'T WANT TO BE IN COMPLIANCE WITH THAT
21 SO...

22

23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** HOW MUCH IS THIS CONTRACT FOR?

24



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1 **CARLOS JACKSON:** IT'S A THREE-YEAR CONTRACT BUT RENEWABLE ON A
2 YEARLY BASIS. THE FIRST YEAR, I BELIEVE, IS A LITTLE BIT OVER
3 50,000. LET ME DOUBLE-CHECK ON THIS ONE, SIR. IT'S 52,000 AND
4 IT GOES TO 43,000. AND THEN A THIRD YEAR. I'M SORRY, THE FIRST
5 YEAR IS 52,000 AND THEN 53,000 AND THEN THE THIRD YEAR IS
6 54,000.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND WHAT DID THE ELEVATOR MAINTENANCE
9 SERVICES PROVIDE?

10

11 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WELL, WE HAVE 36 ELEVATORS AND THEY ARE
12 PREDOMINANTLY IN ALL OUR SENIOR COMPLEXES AND THEY MAKE SURE
13 THAT THEY'RE IN OPERATION AND COMPLIANCE WITH THE BILLING CODE
14 FOR OPERATIONAL. SEVERAL-- MAYBE ABOUT A MONTH AGO, WE CAME
15 HERE WITH AN EMERGENCY REQUEST TO REPLACE TWO ELEVATORS IN
16 KINGS ROW, WHICH IS IN THE THIRD DISTRICT. SO THEY MAINTAIN
17 THE OPERATION OF THE ELEVATORS, THE MAINTENANCE OPERATION OF
18 THE ELEVATORS.

19

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT I DON'T UNDERSTAND, THEY ENDED UP WITH
21 ONE BID AND IT JUST SEEMS THAT WE'RE NOT COMMUNICATING,
22 THERE'S SOME TYPE OF A DISCONNECT FOR THIS TYPE OF A CONTRACT
23 BECAUSE I WOULD ASSUME THESE VENDORS DO MORE THAN ONE AGENCY.

24



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1 **CARLOS JACKSON:** WELL, YOU KNOW, WE-- THAT'S AN ISSUE FOR US AS
2 WELL OF A CONCERN. HOWEVER, WE HAVE BASICALLY GONE BEYOND WHAT
3 IS NORMALLY REQUIRED AND WE DID EXTENSIVE OUTREACH BUT THE
4 HOUSING COMMISSION, THE ADVISORY COMMISSION HAS REQUESTED SOME
5 TIME AGO, I WOULD SAY AT LEAST 10 YEARS AGO, THAT WE PUBLISH
6 IT IN NINE DIFFERENT NEWSPAPERS, COMMUNITY NEWSPAPERS, TO GET
7 A LARGER PARTICIPATION IN THE BIDS. WE HAVE DONE THAT. WE DID
8 IT IN THE "L.A. TIMES". WE ATTEND MANY OF THE FAIRS,
9 CONTRACTORS' FAIRS TO PUBLICIZE THE OPPORTUNITIES THAT WE HAVE
10 FOR CONTRACTING. IT'S A DIFFICULT TIME FOR US BECAUSE WE'RE
11 COMPETING WITH THE PRIVATE SECTOR, WHO ARE MORE LUCRATIVE AND
12 LESS PAPERWORK THAN WE REQUIRE.

13

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** OKAY. THOSE ARE MY QUESTIONS. IT'S JUST THAT
15 WE'RE AWARDING A CONTRACT AND WHY OTHERS WEREN'T BIDDING AND
16 THOSE WHO WOULD ATTEND A PRE-CONFERENCE DON'T SUBMIT BIDS. I
17 WOULD...

18

19 **CARLOS JACKSON:** I MEAN, AS I SAY, WHEN WE DO HAVE ONE BID, WE
20 TYPICALLY GO BACK AND ASK FOR WHY CONTRACTORS DID NOT BID AND
21 WAS THERE SOMETHING THAT WE COULD DO DIFFERENTLY.

22

23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU. DO YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS?

24



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1 **SUP. KNABE:** NO. WE'RE SORT OF ON A RUN OF THESE THINGS RIGHT
2 NOW WHERE WE'RE NOT GETTING BIDDERS ON A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT
3 PROJECTS. I MEAN, THEY DON'T CHARGE US-- I MEAN, I DON'T KNOW
4 WHAT YOU MEAN TO SAY, THEY'RE MORE LUCRATIVE. THEY DON'T
5 CHARGE US ANY DIFFERENT THAN THEY WOULD IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR.
6 THE PROBLEM IS OUR SYSTEM AND THE PROBLEMS ARE SO CUMBERSOME
7 AND OUR TURNAROUND SOMETIMES AND PAYMENT, JUST NOT WORTH IT,
8 SO...

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MOVE THE ITEM. SECONDED BY BURKE. WITHOUT
11 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. ON ITEM 39, I WOULD LIKE TO AMEND IT.
12 AS WE KNOW, THE PUBLIC SAFETY PROJECT IS CRITICAL BECAUSE OF
13 THE CURRENT FIRE AND SHERIFF DEPARTMENT'S COMMUNICATIONS
14 SYSTEMS ARE ANTIQUATED AND THIS CONTRACT WITH THE RCC
15 CONSULTANTS REQUIRES THE COMPANY TO DEVELOP AND PROVIDE A
16 TECHNICAL SCOPE OF WORK FOR THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS.
17 HOWEVER, TO ACTUALLY PAY FOR THE COMMUNICATION SYSTEM, WHICH
18 IS GOING TO BE AN ESTIMATED HALF A BILLION DOLLARS, THE BOARD
19 NEEDS TO BE ADVISED OF ALTERNATIVE AND CREATIVE FINANCING
20 OPTIONS. SO I'D MOVE THAT THE BOARD DIRECT THE DIRECTOR OF
21 INTERNAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT TO WORK JOINTLY WITH THE C.A.O.
22 IN DEVELOPING A TASK FORCE TO FOCUS ON THE FINANCING ASPECT OF
23 THE REPLACEMENT ACQUISITION OF THE FIRE SHERIFF COMMUNICATIONS
24 SYSTEM, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE
25 LANGUAGE FOR INCLUSION IN THE R.F.P. THAT CALLS FOR



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1 ALTERNATIVE AND FREE THE FINANCING UP OPTIONS WHICH WILL ALSO
2 BE USED TO EVALUATE THE BIDS AND PROVIDE THE BOARD WITH
3 QUARTERLY REPORTS ON THIS PROPOSAL.

4

5 **SUP. KNABE:** LET ME LOOK AT IT. OKAY. I'LL SECOND.

6

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SECONDED BY KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
8 ORDERED. SENATOR GIL CEDILLO IS HERE WHO WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A
9 COMMENT RELATIVE TO THE HOMELESS ISSUE AND THE DUMPING ISSUE
10 THAT WAS RAISED. WELCOME. HOW ARE YOU?

11

12 **GILBERT CEDILLO:** GOOD MORNING, MR. SUPERVISOR AND SUPERVISORS.
13 I DIDN'T WANT TO LET THE OPPORTUNITY PASS THAT I COULD COME UP
14 AND SPEAK ENTHUSIASTICALLY IN SUPPORT OF A MOTION BY
15 SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH. THAT IN ITSELF WOULD SEEM TO BE
16 NOTEWORTHY AND NEWSWORTHY. LET ME COMMEND YOU AND THE
17 SUPERVISORS ON YOUR APPROACH AND OFFER SIMPLY OUR SUPPORT, THE
18 SUPPORT OF MY OFFICE. I AM WORKING WITH THE SPEAKER. WE ARE
19 PUTTING FORTH SOME PROPOSALS TO ADDRESS THE SITUATION THAT WE
20 HAVE AT SKID ROW. AT THIS POINT, WE APPEAR TO HAVE A CONSENSUS
21 AND WE APPLAUD YOUR MOTION, SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH. WE MUST,
22 WHILE THE RESOURCES-- WHILE MANY RESOURCES EXIST DOWNTOWN,
23 THERE ARE NOT SUFFICIENT RESOURCES TO ADDRESS THE CHALLENGES
24 THAT CONFRONT A REGION OF 13 MILLION PEOPLE, AND THAT IS
25 SIMPLY THE FACT OF THE MATTER. AND SO WE MUST END THE THOUGHT



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1 THAT WE CAN SIMPLY, EVERY CITY, ALL 88 CITIES AND THEN
2 SURROUNDING COUNTIES AND SURROUNDING STATES SHOULD SEND EVERY
3 PERSON WHO HAS MENTAL ILLNESS CHALLENGES, AND DRUG AND ALCOHOL
4 ABUSE CHALLENGE, FINANCIAL CHALLENGE, ET CETERA, SHOULD BE
5 SENT TO DOWNTOWN LOS ANGELES. THAT IS SIMPLY A STRATEGY AND A
6 POLICY THAT DOES NOT WORK. WE HAVE BEEN CONVINCED THAT THERE
7 MAY BE A NEED FOR ENHANCEMENTS FOR PEOPLE WHO PREY UPON THAT
8 COMMUNITY, PARTICULARLY LARGE DRUG DEALERS, AND WE ARE WORKING
9 WITH THE SPEAKER TO DEVELOP LEGISLATION THAT WILL CREATE
10 ENHANCEMENTS WORKING WITH L.A.P.D. ON THIS MATTER. WE ARE
11 WORKING WITH AND I SPOKE TO THE SHERIFF YESTERDAY ABOUT OUR
12 EFFORTS TO END THE RELEASE AND THE DUMPING OF PEOPLE.
13 OBVIOUSLY, WE WANT TO WORK WITH HIM AND FOLLOW HIS LEADERSHIP
14 ON THIS ISSUE. HE'S INDICATED THAT THAT IS NOT HIS DESIRE.
15 YESTERDAY, WE WERE FORTUNATE TO MEET WITH JUDGE TYNAN, WHO WE
16 ALL KNOW HIS PASSION FOR A COMMUNITY COURT AND FOR WORKING
17 WITH THOSE WHO HAVE MENTAL ILLNESS AND DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE
18 AND WE ARE COMMITTED TO GOING TO SACRAMENTO TO FIND RESOURCES
19 TO CREATE A PILOT FOR THE CHALLENGES THAT CONFRONT US IN THE
20 DOWNTOWN AREA. AND SO I AM HERE SIMPLY BECAUSE I READ OF YOUR
21 EFFORTS, YOUR MOTION AND WE WANT TO COMMIT THE RESOURCES FROM
22 OUR OFFICE AND FROM THE STATE AND THE SPEAKER WHO WILL RETURN
23 TO LOS ANGELES TOMORROW HAS BEEN WORKING WITH US AND OUR
24 OFFICES ARE WORKING TOGETHER AND WE WANT TO SUPPORT THE COUNTY
25 IN ITS EFFORTS. CLEARLY, WHAT WE HAVE DONE IN THE PAST IS NOT



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1 WORKING AND DOES NOT WORK AND, BEFORE WE CAN ADDRESS THE
2 ISSUES OF HOMELESSNESS AND POVERTY THAT EXIST DOWNTOWN, WE
3 MUST ELIMINATE THIS OPEN AIR SWAP MEET OF DRUG DEALERS THAT
4 EXISTS IN THE DOWNTOWN AREA. IT'S JUST INTOLERABLE AND
5 UNACCEPTABLE AND THAT IS OUR COMMITMENT TO WORK WITH YOU TO
6 ADDRESS THAT.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** GOOD. YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE SERIOUS PROBLEMS
9 IS TREATING THE MENTALLY ILL HOMELESS AND, WHILE FORMER
10 ASSEMBLYWOMAN ELLEN THOMPSON WAS ABLE TO MAKE SOME
11 MODIFICATIONS, THERE IS STILL AN URGENT NEED TO HAVE STATE LAW
12 TO REQUIRE TREATMENT FOR MENTALLY ILL HOMELESS. IN TALKING
13 WITH MAYOR VILLARAIGOSA, HE'S ALSO SUPPORTIVE NOW OF TREATMENT
14 FOR THESE INDIVIDUALS. SO HOPEFULLY WE CAN GET A BIPARTISAN
15 EFFORT TO CHANGE THE ACT TO LANDERMAN PETRO SCHWART ACT ENSURE
16 THAT MENTALLY ILL PEOPLE RECEIVE THE TREATMENT INSTEAD OF
17 REFUSING IT AND STAYING ON THE CURB OR...

18

19 **GILBERT CEDILLO:** WELL, THAT'S GOING TO BE THE-- YOU KNOW, FOR
20 ALL OF US, THAT'S GOING TO BE THE REAL RUB, THE LARGER
21 DISCUSSION. AS YOU KNOW, ASSEMBLYWOMAN HELEN THOMPSON PLAYED A
22 REAL LEADERSHIP ROLE IN THE STATE. WE HAD A TWO-YEAR
23 DISCUSSION SIMPLY ON THAT POINT UP AND DOWN THE STATE BUT THE
24 DISCUSSION AND THE WILLINGNESS TO CHANGE AT THAT POINT DID NOT
25 EXIST BUT WE ARE LOOKING AT A MOMENT, I THINK, SUPERVISOR,



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1 THAT THERE MAY BE A GREATER OPENNESS. OBVIOUSLY, THE MAYOR HAS
2 BEEN HELPFUL IN BEING OUTSPOKEN ON THIS. HIS STRONG TIES TO
3 THE A.C.L.U., MY STRONG TIES TO THE A.C.L.U., MANY OF OURS.
4 YOU KNOW, WE DO NOT COME TO THIS POINT EASILY BUT WE DO
5 RECOGNIZE THAT WE ARE CONFRONTED WITH A VERY DRAMATIC
6 SITUATION THAT WILL REQUIRE PARADIGM SHIFTS FOR MANY OF US IN
7 OUR THINKING ON HOW WE HANDLE THIS. WE ARE SEARCHING FOR THE
8 BALANCE, FOR SOMEONE LIKE MYSELF TO COME AND BE PREPARED TO
9 SUPPORT AND TO INTRODUCE ENHANCEMENTS. IT'S A LONG JOURNEY BUT
10 IT IS DICTATED BY THE DEMANDS OF THE SITUATION AND WE HOPE
11 THAT WE CAN DO SO...

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND OUR OFFICE WILL WORK WITH YOU ON THAT.

14

15 **GILBERT CEDILLO:** WE APPRECIATE IT.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND I KNOW HELEN THOMPSON, SHE'S NOW A
18 SUPERVISOR, WILL ALSO WORK WITH YOU BECAUSE SHE WAS HERE A
19 NUMBER OF TIMES AND WORKED WITH OUR BOARD AND OUR COMMUNITY
20 AND I WAS WITH HER AND JOINED ME IN A PUBLIC HEARING ON THIS
21 ISSUE. SO WE'RE WILLING TO HELP, GIL, AND LOOK FORWARD TO
22 DOING THAT.

23

24 **SUP. BURKE:** MR. CHAIRMAN?

25



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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SUPERVISOR BURKE.

2

3 **SUP. BURKE:** YES. I WAS IN THE LEGISLATURE WHEN THAT PASSED.
4 THE THING THAT WAS MISSING IS THAT THE REPRESENTATION MADE TO
5 THE LEGISLATURE AT THAT TIME WAS THAT THERE WOULD BE COMMUNITY
6 FACILITIES THAT WOULD ADEQUATELY PROVIDE FOR ALL OF THOSE
7 PEOPLE WHO WERE RELEASED FROM STATE INSTITUTIONS OR WHO WERE
8 NOT BEING HELD UNLESS THEY WERE A DANGER TO THEMSELVES OR TO
9 OTHERS. THOSE COMMUNITY FACILITIES NEVER CAME ABOUT. ALSO,
10 THERE WAS NEVER ANY MECHANISM TO MAKE SURE THAT PEOPLE
11 UTILIZED THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND, AS MANY OF US TALK TO
12 PEOPLE WHO PROVIDE SERVICES IN SKID ROW AND OTHER SERVICES FOR
13 THE HOMELESS, THEY FIND OFTEN THAT, IF THEY REQUIRE THAT THE
14 PERSON TAKE MEDICATION OR IF THEY REQUIRE THAT THE PERSON BE
15 DRUG-FREE TO REMAIN IN A FACILITY, MANY PEOPLE IN SKID ROW OR
16 PEOPLE WHO ARE HOMELESS WILL NOT REMAIN IN THOSE FACILITIES.
17 SO IT'S A VERY DIFFICULT ISSUE AND IT'S PROBABLY ONE OF THE
18 FEW PLACES WHERE THE A.C.L.U. AND REAGAN, OUR FORMER PRESIDENT
19 AND FORMER GOVERNOR, CAME TOGETHER IN PUSHING FORWARD THIS
20 APPROACH TO THOSE ISSUES OF MENTAL ILLNESS. BUT THE REACTION
21 TO WHAT'S HAPPENED FROM THAT LEGISLATION HAS NOT BEEN
22 POSITIVE. SO IT'S DIFFICULT BUT I DO THINK THAT WE ARE GOING
23 TO HAVE TO ESTABLISH SOME METHOD OF ASSURING THAT PEOPLE WHO
24 NEED HELP GET HELP.

25



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1 **GILBERT CEDILLO:** RIGHT, ONE OF THE THINGS IS THAT-- I MEAN,

15 SUNDAY EVENING AT AGE 90. HE WAS THE BELOVED FATHER OF FRED
16 KAHANE AND WHO IS WITH LINK HOUSING. THAT CONCLUDES MY
17 ADJOURNMENTS.

8 CASE. I SUSPECT COUNTY COUNSEL WILL OPPOSE RELEASING THE
9 D.C.F.S. O.I.R. REPORT, DESPITE SUPERVISOR MOLINA'S PLEDGE TO
10 DO SO, CITING ISSUES OF CONFIDENTIALITY. BUT, AS CALIFORNIANS
11 AWARE GENERAL COUNSEL, TERRY FRANK, NOTED IN A LETTER TO OUR
12 MAGAZINE, "THE STATED CONCERN FOR THE CHILDREN'S PRIVACY IS A
13 CRUEL, PERHAPS EVEN CYNICAL SHIELD FOR INTOLERABLE NEGLECT.
14 POSTMORTEM USED TO DENOTE A SEARCHING EXAMINATION OF WHAT

17 CORRECTIVE-- A CONSTRUCTIVE UNCOVERING OF THE FACTS, WE ARE

19 D.C.F.S. O.I.R. REPORT SHOULD EXPLAIN, NUMBER 1, WHY THE
20 CHILD'S ATTORNEY REMOVED SARA FROM HER LOVING FOSTER FAMILY IN
21 THE FIRST PLACE. THE GAY COMMUNITY IN PARTICULAR IS INTERESTED
22 TO SEE IF BIAS PLAYED ANY ROLE HERE. TWO, WHETHER D.C.F.S.

3 HAPPEN? IF SO, WHAT WENT WRONG AND WHY? RELEASING THE D.C.F.S.
4 O.I.R. REPORT COULD AT LEAST BE A FIRST STEP IN CORRECTING
5 SUCH TRAGIC SYSTEMATIC PROBLEMS. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU. WELCOME BACK, MR. ROSS. IT'S BEEN
8 AWHILE. GOOD TO SEE YOU.

9

10 **LARRY ROSS:** YEAH, IT'S BEEN A WHILE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. MY
11 NAME IS LARRY ROSS. WHAT I WILL SAY TODAY BEFORE THE COUNTY
12 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES WON'T BE
13 ANYTHING NEW FOR I HAVE BEEN REPORTING THE ABUSES AGAINST MY
14 SON'S FAMILY AND I SINCE THE EARLY '90S BUT I HAVE SEEN THE
15 NEED TO COME BACK TODAY TO CONTINUE FROM WHERE I LEFT OFF IN
16 NOVEMBER 2004, TO INFORM THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF LOS
17 ANGELES COUNTY THE CONSTITUTIONAL ABUSES HAVE CONTINUED

25 1991, A LAWSUIT WAS INITIATED AGAINST ABOUT EIGHT DEFENDANTS,



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1 AT LEAST 5 TO 6 WERE COUNTY FACILITIES. IN 1992, I BEGAN
2 COMING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETINGS. IN 1993, I BEGAN
3 PARTICIPATING, BY TELLING THE BOARD OF THE WRONGS BEING DONE.
4 AND I KEPT IT UP REGULARLY. EVERY CHANCE I GOT, I WOULD
5 EXPRESS, EXPOSE THE WRONGS. IN 1993 WAS MY SECOND FALSE
6 IMPRISONMENT BASED ON LIES. THEN MY THIRD FALSE IMPRISONMENT
7 OCCURRED IN APRIL 1994 THROUGH JUNE 1ST OF 1994. I WAS
8 SUBJECTED THERE TO A BOGUS PROCEEDING IN 1995. THEN, 1996,
9 FALSELY IMPRISONED FOR NEARLY 60 DAYS. IN 1998, FALSELY
10 IMPRISONED FOR 7-1/2 MONTHS. ALL OF THE ABOVE STEMMED FROM
11 GROSS VIOLATIONS OF MY CONSTITUTIONAL AND CIVIL RIGHTS. ALL
12 THE ABUSES WERE REPORTED AT BEFORE THIS BOARD, ALONG WITH MANY
13 OTHER VIOLATIONS AGAINST MY PERSON AND PROPERTY. IN 2002,
14 INTERFERENCES WITH MY RIGHTS TO MOVE FREELY WITHIN THE BORDERS
15 OF THIS NATION CAME UNDER ATTACK. SAME YEAR, UNSUSPECTED
16 DEATHS OF FAMILY MEMBERS BEGAN. IN 2003, I WAS THE VICTIM OF
17 AN ASSAULT AND BATTERY BUT I HAD TO STAND AT TRIAL AS THE
18 DEFENDANT BEFORE A KANGAROO COURT. IN 2004, THE BOARD WAS
19 BROUGHT UP TO DATE. SO TODAY I AM HERE INFORMING THE BOARD OF
20 SUPERVISORS THE ABUSES ARE CONTINUING, WITH THE ALARMING--
21 WITH AN ALARMING REGULARITY AND OBVIOUSNESS. THE PERPETRATORS
22 DON'T HAVE A LEGAL LEG TO STAND ON AND THE ONLY OFFICIAL
23 MANUFACTURED ONE IS DEFECTIVE. THEREFORE, ACCORDING TO
24 TRANSMISSIONS, THEIR WEAK DEFENSE WILL BE, HE DOESN'T KNOW
25 ENOUGH OR IT HAS BEEN TOO LONG OR HE WAITED TOO LONG. THAT



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1 WINDS UP WHAT I HAVE TO SAY. I DO APPRECIATE THE BOARD FOR
2 ALLOWING ME THE OPPORTUNITY TO COMPLETE WHAT I CAME HERE TO
