Finding Words

You can use the Find command to find a complete word or part of a word in the current PDF document. Acrobat Reader looks for the word by reading every word on every page in the file, including text in form fields.

To find a word using the Find command:

- 1. Click the Find button (**Binoculars**), or choose Edit > Find.
- 2. Enter the text to find in the text box.
- 3. Select search options if necessary:
 - Match Whole Word Only finds only occurrences of the complete word you enter in the box. For example, if you search for the word *stick*, the words *tick* and *sticky* will not be highlighted.
 - Match Case finds only words that contain exactly the same capitalization you enter in the box.
 - Find Backwards starts the search from the current page and goes backwards through the document.
- 4. Click Find. Acrobat Reader finds the next occurrence of the word.

To find the next occurrence of the word:

Do one of the following:

Choose Edit > Find Again

Reopen the find dialog box, and click Find Again. (The word must already be in the Find text box.)

Copying and pasting text and graphics to another application

You can select text or a graphic in a PDF document, copy it to the Clipboard, and paste it into another application such as a word processor. You can also paste text into a PDF document note or into a bookmark. Once the selected text or graphic is on the Clipboard, you can switch to another application and paste it into another document.

Note: If a font copied from a PDF document is not available on the system displaying the copied text, the font cannot be preserved. A default font is substituted.



To select and copy it to the clipboard:

1. Select the text tool T, and do one of the following:

To select a line of text, select the first letter of the sentence or phrase and drag to the last letter.

To select multiple columns of text (horizontally), hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option (Mac OS) as you drag across the width of the document.

To select a column of text (vertically), Hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option+Command (Mac OS) as you drag the length of the document.

To select all the text on the page, choose Edit > Select All. In single page mode, all the text on the current page is selected. In Continuous or Continuous – facing mode, most of the text in the document is selected. When you release the mouse button, the selected text is highlighted. To deselect the text and start over, click anywhere outside the selected text. The Select All command will not select all the text in the document. A workaround for this (Windows) is to use the Edit > Copy command.

- 2. Choose Edit > Copy to copy the selected text to the clipboard.
- 3. To view the text, choose Window > Show Clipboard
 In Windows 95, the Clipboard Viewer is not installed by default and you cannot use the
 Show Clipboard command until it is installed. To install the Clipboard Viewer, Choose
 Start > Settings > Control Panel > Add/Remove Programs, and then click the Windows
 Setup tab. Double-click Accessories, check Clipboard Viewer, and click OK.

- 16 FOR HOUSING SEARCH ASSISTANCE. PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES HAVE
- 17 AN UNTOLD NUMBER OF BARRIERS WHEN SEEKING HOUSING. WE
- 18 EXPERIENCE ARCHITECTURAL, COMMUNICATION AND ATTITUDINAL
- 19 BARRIERS WHEN SEEKING HOUSING. TO REMEDY THIS, PARTICIPANTS

- 9 BECAUSE THEY'VE CREATED SEVERE PROBLEMS. ENGAGING THE PUBLIC
- 10 IN DECISION MAKING IS THE BEST WAY OF RESOLVING THESE
- 11 LOCATIONS AND CITING THEM AND THAT'S WHY THE AMENDMENT ALLOW
- 12 THE COMMUNITY TO HAVE A VOICE IN HAVING THIS HEARD BEFORE
- 13 THEIR ELECTED BODY. SUPERVISOR KNABE?

- 15 SUP. KNABE: MR. MAYOR, THERE HAVE BEEN SOME ADDITIONAL
- 16 CONCERNS AND I KNOW THEY WERE DISCUSSED AT THE PLANNING
- 17 COMMISSION LEVEL. I HAVE AN AMENDMENT AS WELL, TOO. MOST OF
- 18 IT'S IN REGARD TO SOME ISSUES AS IT RELATES TO THIS ORDINANCE
- 19 AND BEING ON-SITE AND I THINK MY STAFF IS PASSING OUT THE
- 20 MOTION AS WE SPEAK. BASICALLY, YOU KNOW, LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 21 PERSONNEL HAS BROUGHT THESE ISSUES TO OUR ATTENTION. ONE IS
- 22 THAT THE ORDINANCE BE AMENDED TO BAN THE SALE AND DISPLAY OF
- 23 DRUG PARAPHERNALIA WITHIN A DISPENSARY; AND, TWO, THAT WOULD
- 24 PROHIBIT THE SALE OF CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL AT THE DISPENSARY;
- 25 AND, THREE, A FULL UNDERSTANDING THAT THERE ARE THOSE THAT DO



- 1 NOT SMOKE DOPE BUT AT LEAST REQUIRE THAT ANY REFRESHMENT
- 2 BEVERAGE EDIBLE, PRODUCED OR SOLD ON-SITE BE PROPERLY
- 3 IDENTIFIED AS CONTAINING MARIJUANA. AND I WOULD ADD THOSE
- 4 THREE CONDITIONS TO THIS ORDINANCE.

5

- 6 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: OKAY. DO YOU WANT TO VOTE SEPARATELY
- 7 ON EACH OF THE AMENDMENTS OR...

8

9 SUP. MOLINA: CAN I ASK A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS?

10

11 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: LET ME ASK SUPERVISOR KNABE...

12

- 13 SUP. KNABE: WELL, I THINK WE CAN JUST DO THE AMENDMENTS
- 14 SEPARATELY, I THINK.

15

- 16 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: WE'LL DO SEPARATE VOTES. THAT'S FINE.
- 17 SUPERVISOR MOLINA?

18

- 19 SUP. MOLINA: BUT COULD I ASK A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS? LET ME
- 20 UNDERSTAND THIS CORRECTLY. RIGHT NOW, YOUR REPORT SAYS THAT WE
- 21 SHOULD APPROVE WITH WHAT? WHAT KIND OF A PERMIT?

22

23 LEONARD ERLANGER: A MINOR CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT.



- 1 SUP. MOLINA: OKAY. IF THERE IS AN APPEAL PROCESS IN THAT, HOW
- 2 DO THEY APPEAL?

3

- 4 LEONARD ERLANGER: THE APPEAL WOULD BE-- WELL, FIRST OF ALL,
- 5 THE DIRECTOR WOULD MAKE THE DECISION IF THERE ARE LESS THAN
- 6 TWO REQUESTS FOR PUBLIC HEARING AFTER NOTIFICATION...

7

8 SUP. MOLINA: IF THERE ARE LESS.

9

10 **LEONARD ERLANGER: ...** OF THE SURROUNDING PROPERTY.

11

- 12 SUP. MOLINA: SO IF THERE ARE TWO PEOPLE THAT APPEAL, THEN WHAT
- 13 HAPPENS?

14

- 15 LEONARD ERLANGER: THEN THE HEARING OFFICER WOULD BE THE
- 16 DECISION MAKER AND THE HEARING OFFICER'S DECISION COULD BE
- 17 APPEALED TO THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION.

18

19 SUP. MOLINA: RIGHT.

20

- 21 LEONARD ERLANGER: NOW, THE CONCERN IS THAT THE PLANNING
- 22 COMMISSION, SHOULD IT BE THE FINAL DECISION MAKER OR NOT?

- 24 SUP. MOLINA: I UNDERSTAND. SO, UNDER THAT KIND OF A PROCESS,
- 25 UNDER THAT KIND OF APPEAL, HOW LONG WOULD IT TAKE?



1

- 2 LEONARD ERLANGER: THE INITIAL DIRECTOR'S DECISION, WE FOUND
- 3 WITH THE NONCOMMERCIAL WIND TURBINES TAKES APPROXIMATELY SIX
- 4 WEEKS, SOMETIMES...

5

6 SUP. MOLINA: MY STAFF SAYS IT WOULD TAKE LONGER.

7

- 8 LEONARD ERLANGER: ...UP TO EIGHT WEEKS. NO. AND THEN, IF THERE
- 9 ARE PROTESTS AND IT'S KICKED UP TO A PUBLIC HEARING, IT COULD
- 10 TAKE A FEW TO SEVERAL MONTHS TO RESOLVE AT A PUBLIC HEARING
- 11 SETTING.

12

- 13 SUP. MOLINA: AND, UNDER THE PROCESS OF GRANTING A FULL
- 14 CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT, HOW LONG WOULD THAT TAKE?

15

16 LEONARD ERLANGER: THAT'S OFTEN A SIX-MONTH PROCESS.

17

18 SUP. MOLINA: FROM BEGINNING TO END?

19

20 **LEONARD ERLANGER: RIGHT.**

- 22 JULIE MOORE: SUPERVISOR MOLINA? JULIE MOORE WITH THE STAFF.
- 23 THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A MINOR C.U.P. AND A FULL C.U.P. IS
- 24 DEFINITELY TIME. IT TAKES LONGER TO DO THE FULL C.U.P. IT'S
- 25 PROBABLY HALF THE TIME TO DO THE MINOR C.U.P. AND THE-- WITH



- 1 THE MINOR C.U.P., THERE'S A NOTIFICATION RADIUS. IF THERE'S
- 2 TWO PROTESTS, IT AUTOMATICALLY THROWS THE PROJECT INTO A
- 3 PUBLIC HEARING PROCESS.

4

- 5 SUP. MOLINA: I'M TRYING TO UNDERSTAND. I FEEL LIKE, MR.
- 6 YAROSLAVSKY, THAT WE'VE BEEN KICKING THIS AROUND FOR A LONG
- 7 TIME BUT I'M NOT SURE THAT WE'RE GETTING THE FULL INFORMATION
- 8 AS TO WHICH-- IF, UNDER A FULL CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT, IS IT A
- 9 SHORTER, MORE COLLAPSED TIME IN ORDER TO GET FROM POINT "A" TO
- 10 POINT "B"?

- 12 JULIE MOORE: IT COULD BE SHORTER IF THERE AREN'T TWO PROTESTS
- 13 UNDER THE MINOR C.U.P.

14

- 15 SUP. MOLINA: OKAY. SO WAIT JUST A SECOND. SO THEN IT IS TRUE
- 16 THAT IT TAKES-- IF TWO PEOPLE PROTEST OR THREE, IT TAKES
- 17 LONGER TO GET...

18

19 JULIE MOORE: IT TAKES LONGER.

20

21 SUP. MOLINA: I THINK THAT'S AN IMPORTANT ISSUE HERE.

22

23 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: WHY DOES IT TAKE LONGER?



- 1 SUP. MOLINA: THAT'S WHAT I DON'T UNDERSTAND. THAT'S WHAT I'M
- 2 TRYING TO SORT THIS OUT.

3

- 4 RICHARD WEISS: SUPERVISOR, MIGHT I TRY? THERE IS AN EXISTING
- 5 MINOR CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT PROCEDURE IN TITLE 22, SO IT'S
- 6 NOT A NEW CONCEPT. UNDER THE MINOR CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT
- 7 PROCESS, AS CURRENTLY EXISTING, NOTICE IS REQUIRED TO A RADIUS
- 8 OF 300 FEET AND, IF THERE ARE TWO OR MORE PROTESTS, THEN THE
- 9 DIRECTOR CANNOT GRANT THE PERMIT ON HIS OWN, THEN IT MUST BE
- 10 SET FOR A PUBLIC HEARING. THAT IS TRUE EVEN UNDER THE MINOR
- 11 CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT.

- 13 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THE QUESTION IS, WHY WOULD, UNDER THAT
- 14 SITUATION, WHY WOULD THIS PROCESS BE LONGER THAN A NORMAL
- 15 CONDITIONAL USE THAT WASN'T A MINOR CONDITIONAL USE. THAT'S
- 16 THE QUESTION SHE'S ASKING.

17

18 RICHARD WEISS: IT OUGHT NOT TO BE. A TYPICAL C.U.P...

19

20 SUP. MOLINA: IT OUGHT NOT TO BE BUT DOES IT?

- 22 RICHARD WEISS: NO. I WOULD SAY THAT, IN MOST INSTANCES, AND I
- 23 CAN'T THINK OF AN EXCEPTION, THE REGULAR CONDITIONAL USE
- 24 PERMIT PROCESS WOULD BE LONGER THAN A MINOR C.U.P. PROCESS.
- 25 THE MINOR C.U.P. PROCESS WILL BE LONGER THAN IT OTHERWISE



- 1 WOULD BE IF THERE ARE TWO OR MORE PROTESTS BECAUSE THEN IT HAS
- 2 TO GO TO PUBLIC HEARING, EVEN IN THAT SCHEME.

- 4 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THE MAJOR C.U.P. WOULD AUTOMATICALLY HAVE TO
- 5 GO TO A PUBLIC HEARING PROCESS BEFORE A COMMISSION...

6

7 RICHARD WEISS: CORRECT.

8

- 9 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: AND IT'S APPEALABLE TO THE FULL BOARD OF
- 10 SUPERVISORS, SO IT'S GOT TO BE LONGER.

11

12 RICHARD WEISS: IT IS LONGER.

13

14 SUP. MOLINA: WELL...

15

- 16 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: IT INVOLVES THE COMMUNITY MAKING THEIR
- 17 VOICE HEARD ON AN ISSUE THAT DIRECTLY IMPACTS...

18

- 19 SUP. MOLINA: BUT THEY STILL HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE THEIR
- 20 VOICE HEARD. THAT'S NOT EXCLUDING IT.

21

22 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: BUT NOT BEFORE AN ELECTED BODY.

- 24 SUP. MOLINA: WELL, AGAIN, THERE IS A PROCESS THAT WE'VE PUT IN
- 25 PLACE AND THE ISSUE IS, IS THAT THEY DO GET A HEARING. BUT I



- 1 JUST-- ARE YOU SURE? YOU ARE TELLING ME THAT IT IS A SHORTER
- 2 PERIOD OF TIME TO GO UNDER A MINOR THAN IT IS TO GO...

3

4 LEONARD ERLANGER: OF COURSE.

5

- 6 MI KIM: YES. IF I CAN-- SUPERVISORS, MY NAME IS MI KIM. I'M
- 7 WITH THE ORDINANCE CITY SECTION.

8

9 SUP. MOLINA: WHAT IF YOU GET APPEALED, IS IT LONGER?

10

11 MI KIM: YES. SO MINOR C.U.P....

12

- 13 SUP. MOLINA: SEE, THAT'S THE WHOLE THING. SO THREE PEOPLE WITH
- 14 APPEAL IT AUTOMATICALLY, IT WILL BE LONGER?

15

- 16 RICHARD WEISS: BUT, SUPERVISOR, I'M SORRY, EVEN UNDER A
- 17 REGULAR C.U.P., ONCE THE FIRST HEARING IS HELD, IT CAN BE
- 18 APPEALED TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OR TO THE COMMISSION IF
- 19 IT'S A HEARING OFFICER. SO THE APPEAL -- THE APPEAL TIME FRAME
- 20 IS PRESENT IN EITHER OF THE TWO FRAMEWORKS.

21

22 SUP. MOLINA: I UNDERSTAND.



- 1 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: EXCEPT THAT ONLY ONE IS APPEALABLE TO THE
- 2 COMMISSION AND THE OTHER IS APPEALABLE TO THE BOARD OF
- 3 SUPERVISORS AFTER IT GOES TO A COMMISSION.

4

- 5 SUP. MOLINA: AND MY STAFF-- MY STAFF SAYS A MINOR TAKES LONGER
- 6 THAN A FULL CONDITIONAL, BECAUSE IT ALREADY-- IT SETS IT UP
- 7 AND THAT'S THE STANDARD.

8

- 9 LEONARD ERLANGER: I'M SORRY. THAT'S NOT THE CASE BECAUSE OF
- 10 THE SITUATION WHERE THE APPEAL...

11

- 12 SUP. MOLINA: OKAY. GOOD. AS LONG AS YOU'RE ASSURING ME IT IS
- 13 NOT THE CASE.

14

- 15 **LEONARD ERLANGER:** IT'S NOT THE CASE BECAUSE THE APPEAL TO THE
- 16 BOARD WOULD TAKE LONGER FOR A MAJOR CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT.

17

- 18 SUP. MOLINA: ALL RIGHT. AS LONG AS YOU ASSURE ME THAT IT'S
- 19 NOT-- AS LONG AS YOU ASSURE ME THAT'S NOT THE CASE. COULD WE
- 20 CHECK THIS AFTER SIX MONTHS TO SEE IF, IN FACT, WHAT HE SAYS
- 21 IS ABSOLUTELY CORRECT? BECAUSE I DON'T WANT TO BE MISLEADING
- 22 THE PUBLIC ON IT.

- 24 SUP. BURKE: I THINK THAT'S FAIR. THE PROBLEM IS, THE C.U.P.,
- 25 ONCE YOU GET BEFORE PLANNING, THEY DON'T GET AN AGENDA



- 1 THROUGH. IT GOES OVER AND OVER. IT'S, LIKE, SIX, EIGHT MONTHS
- 2 JUST TO GET A QUORUM SO THAT YOU CAN HEAR THE C.U.P.

3

- 4 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: THE PROBLEM IS NOT TIMING, IT'S
- 5 REPRESENTATION AND HAVING A VERY SENSITIVE ISSUE APPLIED TO A
- 6 COMMUNITY NEIGHBORHOOD OUGHT TO INVOLVE THE ABILITY OF THAT
- 7 NEIGHBORHOOD TO APPEAL TO THEIR ELECTED BODIES FOR A FAIR
- 8 HEARING, THAT THEY MAY FEEL WAS NOT THE CASE BEFORE A
- 9 NONELECTED BODY. SO, OKAY, WE'LL VOTE ON BOTH AMENDMENTS.

11 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: HANG ON. I HAVE QUESTIONS.

12

13 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY?

14

- 15 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: I JUST WANT TO UNDERSTAND A COUPLE OF
- 16 THINGS. WHAT IS THE DEFINITION OF "DRUG PARAPHERNALIA"?

17

- 18 LEONARD ERLANGER: WE HAVE A DEFINITION IN THE ORDINANCE. IT'S
- 19 FROM THE STATE CODE AND I COULD READ THAT TO YOU.

20

- 21 SUP. KNABE: I MEAN, IT'S DIRECTLY FROM THE STATE CODE. YOU
- 22 HAVEN'T CHANGED ANYTHING, THEN.



- 1 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: IS IT IN THE ORDINANCE NOW? IS THERE A
- 2 DEFINITION IN THE ORDINANCE THAT'S BEFORE US ON DRUG
- 3 PARAPHERNALIA?

4

5 LEONARD ERLANGER: THERE IS. I'M LOOKING FOR THAT NOW.

6

- 7 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: WHY IS IT EVEN IN THE ORDINANCE IF THERE'S
- 8 AN AMENDMENT NECESSARY TO...

9

- 10 LEONARD ERLANGER: IT'S IN THE ORDINANCE TO ENSURE CONSISTENCY
- 11 WITH STATE LAW. STATE LAW DEFINES PARAPHERNALIA AND THEN SAYS
- 12 THAT MINORS CAN'T GO INTO A PLACE THAT SELLS THAT WITHOUT AN
- 13 ADULT, OKAY, BUT THIS WOULD-- THE MEDICAL MARIJUANA STATE LAW
- 14 PREEMPTS THAT BY ALLOWING PARAPHERNALIA. AND, WITHIN SB-420,
- 15 THERE IS A DEFINITION OF PARAPHERNALIA. IT DEFINES
- 16 PARAPHERNALIA AS CERTAIN TOOLS THAT WOULD FACILITATE THE
- 17 INGESTION OF MEDICAL MARIJUANA.

18

- 19 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: SO, TWO QUESTIONS. ONE, ARE WE PRECLUDED BY
- 20 STATE LAW FROM BANNING THE SALE OF THESE PARAPHERNALIA AT SUCH
- 21 A FACILITY?

- 23 RICHARD WEISS, COUNSEL: SUPERVISOR, WE BELIEVE YOU ARE NOT
- 24 PROHIBITED FROM BANNING PARAPHERNALIA AT THESE FACILITIES. I
- 25 MIGHT ADD THAT THE ORDINANCE CONTAINS A DEFINITION OF DEVICES



- 1 FOR INHALATION AND, WITHIN THAT DEFINITION, THE TERM
- 2 "PARAPHERNALIA" IS USED.

3

- 4 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: IS THE-- IF THE BOARD DECIDES NOT TO BAN
- 5 DRUG PARAPHERNALIA IN THESE FACILITIES, WOULD THE-- THE STATE
- 6 LAW REQUIRE THAT ANY MINOR BE ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT BUT WHEN
- 7 GOING-- WHEN GOING INTO SUCH A FACILITY?

8

- 9 RICHARD WEISS: THE-- I BELIEVE STATE LAW SPECIFIES THAT MINORS
- 10 CANNOT OBVIOUSLY BE GIVEN ANY MEDICAL MARIJUANA UNLESS THEY
- 11 ARE QUALIFIED PATIENTS. OUR ORDINANCE, I BELIEVE, ADDRESSES
- 12 AND REPEATS THE SAME THING, THE FACT THAT, WHETHER YOU
- 13 PROHIBIT IT OR NOT, DEVICES FOR INHALATION DOESN'T
- 14 AUTOMATICALLY RESULT IN ANYTHING WITH REGARD TO THE PRESENCE
- 15 OF MINORS.

16

- 17 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: LET ME UNDERSTAND ABOUT THESE FACILITIES.
- 18 CAN I AND THE STAFF-- HELLO-- CAN I JUST-- I DON'T KNOW YOUR
- 19 NAME, SO I WANT TO...

20

21 **LEONARD ERLANGER:** MR. ERLANGER.

- 23 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: MR. ERLANGER. THANK YOU. ARE THESE
- 24 FACILITIES PLACES WHERE INDIVIDUALS GO TO INGEST OR INHALE THE
- 25 MEDICAL MARIJUANA?

2 LEONARD ERLANGER: THAT'S CORRECT.

3

- 4 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: IS IT ALSO A PLACE WHERE YOU CAN GO TO
- 5 PURCHASE IT AND TAKE IT HOME AND DO IT OR ARE YOU REQUIRED
- 6 UNDER THE LAW TO DO IT AT THIS FACILITY?

7

- 8 LEONARD ERLANGER: YOU CAN TAKE IT HOME EXPECT YOU CANNOT SMOKE
- 9 IT WITHIN A THOUSAND FEET OF ANY SENSITIVE USE. SO IF YOUR
- 10 HOME IS LOCATED-- WELL, YOU CAN SMOKE IT IN YOUR HOME, I TAKE
- 11 THAT BACK BUT...

12

- 13 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: DO MOST PEOPLE WHO AVAIL THEMSELVES OF THIS
- 14 SERVICE DO THIS AT THE FACILITY AND NOT AT THEIR HOME?

15

- 16 LEONARD ERLANGER: THEY DO BOTH. DISPENSARIES COMMONLY ALLOW
- 17 INGESTION EITHER BY EDIBLES OR BY SMOKING.

18

- 19 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: SO IF A SIGNIFICANT PERCENTAGE OF THE PEOPLE
- 20 WHO ARE INGESTING OR INHALING AT THESE DISPENSARIES ARE DOING
- 21 SO THERE, THEN DOESN'T IT MAKE SENSE THAT PARAPHERNALIA THAT
- 22 WOULD ALLOW THEM TO DO THAT BE MADE AVAILABLE? OTHERWISE,
- 23 WOULDN'T WE BE ENCOURAGING PEOPLE TO TAKE ALL OF THEIR STUFF
- 24 HOME OR TO OTHER NONREGULATED ENVIRONMENTS?



1 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: IF THEY WERE DRIVING, IT WOULD BE.

2

- 3 LEONARD ERLANGER: WELL, THE CONCERN MIGHT BE THAT THEY HAVE TO
- 4 GO ELSEWHERE, LESS CREDIBLE SOURCES TO GET THE PARAPHERNALIA
- 5 TO USE.

6

- 7 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: AND IT IS YOUR UNDERSTANDING THAT UNDER THE
- 8 STATE LAW IF WE DID NOT BAN THE SALE OR DISPLAY OF DRUG
- 9 PARAPHERNALIA IN THESE DISPENSARIES, THAT A MINOR COULD NOT GO
- 10 IN THERE WITHOUT AN ADULT, UNDER THE CURRENT STATE LAW,
- 11 CORRECT?

12

13 **LEONARD ERLANGER: RIGHT.**

14

- 15 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: ALL RIGHT. SO I WOULD SUGGEST THAT ITEM
- 16 NUMBER 1 ON MR. KNABE'S MOTION IS PROBABLY NOT-- I STAND TO BE
- 17 EDUCATED ON THIS BUT IT SOUNDS TO ME THAT IT DOESN'T SERVE THE
- 18 PURPOSE OF THE CORE OF THE ORDINANCE. AND SINCE MINORS ARE THE
- 19 ISSUE AND MINORS ARE-- WE DO HAVE CANCER PATIENTS WHO ARE
- 20 MINORS WHO COME IN AND ALSO AVAIL THEMSELVES OF THESE, SO THEY
- 21 WOULD HAVE TO BE UNDER THE SUPERVISION AND AUTHORITY OF THEIR
- 22 PARENT OR GUARDIAN, CORRECT?

24 **LEONARD ERLANGER: CORRECT.**



- 1 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THE SECOND POINT, PROHIBIT THE SALE OR
- 2 CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL AT A MARIJUANA DISPENSARY. ARE THERE
- 3 MARIJUANA DISPENSARIES THAT SELL ALCOHOL-- FIRST OF ALL, TO
- 4 SELL ALCOHOL AT A-- SHHH! PLEASE. YOU'RE NOT HELPING YOUR
- 5 CAUSE. JUST TRYING TO GET TO THE FACTS. IF I OWNED A MEDICAL
- 6 MARIJUANA DISPENSARY AND I WANTED TO SELL ALCOHOL, WOULD I
- 7 HAVE TO GET A SEPARATE CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT TO SELL ALCOHOL?
- 9 LEONARD ERLANGER: YES, YOU WOULD.
- 11 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: OKAY. AND IS THAT A MINOR CONDITIONAL USE
- 12 PERMIT OR WOULD THAT BE A FULL-FLEDGED CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT?

- 15 "B", AS STAFF MENTIONED, THE EXISTING FIVE-ACRE SITE, WHICH IS
- 16 FIVE ACRES, HENCE THE NAME, IS ON MOUNTAIN VIEW STREET. IT HAS
- 17 BEEN THERE SINCE 1926 AND SEEN THE NEIGHBORHOOD GROW UP AROUND
- 18 IT. IT IS CONNECTED TO THE SCHOOL BY AN INTERNAL WALKWAY. THE
- 19 CHILDREN WALK FROM FIVE ACRES TO THE SCHOOL ON AN INTERNAL
- 20 GATED WALKWAY. THEY DO NOT GO OUT TO THE STREET. BOTH OF THOSE
- 21 SITES ARE GOVERNED BY 1988 C.U.P. THAT LIMITS THE NUMBER OF
- 22 STUDENTS TO 84. THERE IS NO CHANGE IN THAT REQUEST TODAY. THE
- 23 PROJECT BEFORE YOU IS A MODEST SUPPORT CENTER WITH ADDITIONAL
- 24 PARKING ON A .84-ACRE LOT ACROSS THE STREET THAT FIVE ACRES
- 25 HAS OWNED SINCE 1997. THE PURPOSE OF THE PROJECT IS TWOFOLD:



- 1 TO PROVIDE MUCH NEEDED SUPPORT SPACE FOR EXISTING PROGRAMS
- 2 AND, TWO, ADDITIONAL PARKING TO AUGMENT THE EXISTING PROGRAM.
- 3 WE WILL DISCUSS TODAY HOW IT HAS BEEN SIGNIFICANTLY DOWNSCALED
- 4 WITH INPUT FROM THE COMMUNITY AND THE REGIONAL PLANNING
- 5 COMMISSION PROCESS, WHICH WE'VE ALREADY DISCUSSED ON THE
- 6 EARLIER ITEM, CAN BE QUITE LENGTHY. FOR US, IT'S BEEN A TWO-
- 7 YEAR REVIEW PERIOD. I'D LIKE NOW INTRODUCE BOB KETCH,
- 8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, WHO WILL VERY BRIEFLY DESCRIBE THE
- 9 PROGRAM, BECAUSE WE CAN TALK ABOUT IT AT LENGTH AND WE WILL
- 10 NOT, AND THE NEED FOR THE SUPPORT PROJECT. WE'D LIKE TO
- 11 RESERVE SOME TIME FOR REBUTTAL OR FOR QUESTIONS AFTER THE
- 12 TESTIMONY. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

14 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: THANK YOU.

16 BOB KETCH: I'M BOB KETCH. I'M THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF FIVE

- 17 ACRES. I'VE BEEN AT FIVE ACRES FOR 29 YEARS AND I'VE BEEN
- 18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR 22. WE WERE FOUNDED TO RESCUE HOMELESS
- 19 CHILDREN OFF THE STREETS OF LOS ANGELES 118 YEARS AGO. TODAY,
- 20 WE PROVIDE AN ARRAY OF SERVICES, INCLUDING RESIDENTIAL
- 21 TREATMENT AND ADOPTIONS AND COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES. OUR GOAL
- 22 OF OUR PROGRAM IS TO TRY TO HELP CHILDREN BE ABLE TO BE SAFE,
- 23 BE SECURE, WORK THROUGH THEIR PROBLEMS AND BE ABLE TO LIVE
- 24 WITH FAMILIES, EITHER THEIR OWN OR THROUGH ADOPTION OR A LEGAL
- 25 GUARDIAN. WE'VE BEEN ABLE TO PROVIDE THIS OUTSTANDING PROGRAM



- 1 WITH THE SUPPORT OF THE COMMUNITY AND POSITIVE RELATIONSHIP
- 2 WITH LOS ANGELES COUNTY. OUR CHILDREN COME FROM ALL OVER THE
- 3 COUNTY AND WE'RE SEEN AS A SPECIALIZED CENTER, HELPING
- 4 CHILDREN RESOLVE THEIR PROBLEMS AND GET BACK TO THE COMMUNITY.
- 5 WE HAVE IDENTIFIED, THROUGH THE YEARS, A NUMBER OF AREAS THAT
- 6 WE NEEDED TO INCREASE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PROGRAM AND,
- 7 THROUGH THAT, THROUGH ART THERAPY AND THROUGH MOVEMENT, DANCE
- 8 THERAPY AND OTHER SPECIALIZED SERVICES AND SERVICES TO PROVIDE
- 9 MORE OUTREACH TO FAMILIES AND FAMILIES FINDING. WE HAVE ADDED
- 10 STAFF TO SERVE THESE CHILDREN. WE'VE ALSO ADDED PARKING IN
- 11 RESPONSE TO THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY, WHICH WE HEARD. WE
- 12 ADDED PARKING THROUGH A LEASE PARKING SPACE ACROSS THE STREET
- 13 NEXT TO THIS PROJECT IS A JEHOVAH WITNESS CHURCH AND ALSO DOWN
- 14 THE STREET WHERE THERE'S A RENTED SPACE FROM THE SEVENTH DAY
- 15 ADVENTIS CHURCH. SO WE HAVE BEEN LISTENING TO THE NEIGHBORS
- 16 AND WE'VE BEEN FINDING ALTERNATIVE PARKING FOR STAFF BUT WE DO
- 17 NOT HAVE PARKING FOR VISITORS AND HAVING THOSE CHILDREN ON OUR
- 18 CAMPUS, IT IS IMPORTANT THAT WE HAVE LOTS OF VISITORS,
- 19 FRANKLY, NOT ONLY FROM THE COUNTY AND THE COUNTY'S SOCIAL
- 20 WORKERS, BUT FROM PARENTS AND RELATIVES, FROM PERSPECTIVE
- 21 ADOPTIVE PARENTS AND FROM EXTENDED-- FROM SIBLINGS, WHO
- 22 SOMETIMES ALSO IN PLACEMENT. SO THIS IS WHAT WE'RE LOOKING
- 23 FOR. WE'RE LOOKING FOR A PLACE FOR PARKING ACROSS THE STREET
- 24 FOR VISITORS AND VOLUNTEERS. WE WILL CONTINUE TO SHUTTLE OUR
- 25 STAFF TO OFF-SITE PARKING. AND WE ALSO NEED THE SPACE FOR



- 1 STORAGE, FOR PLACES, FOR BELONGINGS FOR CHILDREN AND OTHER
- 2 DONATIONS THAT WE GET IN THAT WE CAN USE FOR CHILDREN AND ALSO
- 3 SEASONAL PROJECTS. AS I SAID, WE HAVE VOLUNTARILY DEVELOPED
- 4 THIS PARKING PLAN. WE'VE LISTENED TO THE COMMUNITY. WE'VE
- 5 DOWNSIZED THE PROJECT AND WE THINK WE HAVE REALLY A BEAUTIFUL,
- 6 POSITIVE PLAN TO PRESENT AND WE ASK FOR YOUR SUPPORT.

- 8 LOREN MONTGOMERY: LET ME JUST QUICKLY-- THERE'S BEEN SOME
- 9 CONFUSION ABOUT THE PROJECT, SO LET'S OUICKLY RUN THROUGH WHAT
- 10 THE PROJECT IS. IT IS A 2,600-SQUARE-FOOT, 2,600-SQUARE-FOOT
- 11 RESIDENTIALLY STYLED BUILDING IN THE CRAFTSMAN STYLE. IT IS
- 12 DESIGNED TO BLEND IN WITH THE NEIGHBORHOOD. WITH INTERNAL
- 13 REMODELS, THIS COULD BE CONVERTED BACK TO A HOUSE AND THAT
- 14 CAME FROM LISTENING TO THE NEIGHBORS AND THE NEED TO PROTECT
- 15 THE RESIDENTIAL CHARACTER OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD. BELOW THE
- 16 HOUSE-LIKE STRUCTURE IS A UNFINISHED BASEMENT AND THAT WILL
- 17 SERVE FOR THE CRITICAL CHILDREN'S STORAGE MATERIALS THAT BOB
- 18 WAS TALKING ABOUT. AS A CONDITION OF THE C.U.P. AND ALSO WITH
- 19 INPUT FROM THE COMMUNITY, IT IS FORBIDDEN FOR ANYTHING ELSE
- 20 FOR SEASONAL CHILDREN'S STORAGE TO BE STORED THERE, SO THAT
- 21 WAS ANOTHER THING THAT CAME OUT OF THE PROCESS. WHAT ELSE IS
- 22 IT? IT IS 43 PARKING SPACES, WHICH IS MORE THAN ENOUGH TO
- 23 ACCOMMODATE ALL VISITORS AND VOLUNTEERS AT A PEAK TIME AND WE
- 24 DID REALLY CAREFUL CALCULATIONS AND THERE WILL BE NO MORE THAN
- 25 THAT AMOUNT OF VISITORS OR VOLUNTEERS AT A TIME, SO IT'S



- 1 PLENTY OF PARKING TO ACCOMMODATE EVERY SINGLE VISITOR AND
- 2 VOLUNTEER AND STAFF IN THE ADDITIONAL OFF-SITE LOTS THAT BOB
- 3 REFERRED TO. WHAT ELSE IS IT? IT HAS AN EXISTING RESIDENTIAL
- 4 HOUSE, A 1,000-SQUARE-FOOT HOUSE ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE
- 5 PROPERTY THAT WILL BE RETAINED. THAT WILL STILL BE USED AS
- 6 RESIDENTIAL AND LEASED OUT AND THAT WAS ANOTHER ACCOMMODATION
- 7 TO THE COMMUNITY. WHAT ELSE IS THE PROJECT? THE PROJECT IS
- 8 SUBSTANTIALLY LANDSCAPED. AS YOU SEE ON THE MAP, IT HAS OVER
- 9 25-FOOT LANDSCAPE BUFFERS ON THE FRONT, 50-FOOT LANDSCAPE
- 10 BUFFERS ON THE SIDE, THE WEST SIDE, 16-FOOT LANDSCAPE BUFFERS
- 11 ON THE OTHER SIDE AND SUBSTANTIAL LANDSCAPE BUFFERS IN THE
- 12 BACK. THIS IS WELL BEYOND CODE SETBACK REQUIREMENTS. IT
- 13 PROTECTS EVERY SINGLE NATIVE OAK TREE ON THE SITE. WE HAVE AN
- 14 OAK TREE PERMIT FOR TWO OAKS THAT ARE NOT NATIVE, THEY ARE THE
- 15 TWO ENGLISH NATIVES. ONE IS DEAD AND ONE IS DYING. IT HAS
- 16 SUBSTANTIAL GRASSCRETE TO GREEN UP THE SITE AND MAKE IT LOOK
- 17 AS RESIDENTIAL AS POSSIBLE. WHAT IS THE PROJECT NOT? THIS IS
- 18 NOT A WAREHOUSE, IT IS NOT A FACTORY. THIS REQUEST IS NOT A
- 19 ZONE CHANGE. THIS IS A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT, WHICH YOU JUST
- 20 SPENT A LOT OF TIME TALKING ABOUT, ON ANOTHER PROJECT. IT IS
- 21 CONSISTENT WITH THE NEIGHBORHOOD'S EXISTING R-1 ZONING.
- 22 THERE'S NO REQUEST TO CHANGE THE R-1 ZONING. IT IS ALLOWED TO
- 23 HAVE A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FOR GROUP HOME AND SUPPORT
- 24 FACILITIES AND THAT'S WHAT THIS IS. IF THIS USE WENT AWAY AS A
- 25 SUPPORT PROJECT FOR FIVE ACRES GROUP HOME USE, SO WOULD THE



- 1 CONDITIONAL USE AND IT WOULD REFER BACK TO RESIDENTIAL USE. SO
- 2 HOW HAS THE PROJECT EVOLVED AS A RESULT OF THIS TWO-YEAR-LONG
- 3 COUNTY PROCESS? AS STAFF MENTIONED, WE'VE BEEN THROUGH FOUR
- 4 PUBLIC HEARINGS. DURING THAT TIME, 495 LETTERS AND CARDS OF
- 5 SUPPORT CAME IN FOR OUR PROJECT. DESPITE THIS OVERWHELMING
- 6 SUPPORT, THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION LISTENED VERY
- 7 CAREFULLY TO THE HANDFUL OF OPPONENTS AND THEY SUBSTANTIALLY
- 8 CONDITIONED THE PROJECT. AS A RESULT OF THE REGIONAL PLANNING
- 9 COMMISSIONERS, THEY REQUESTED THAT FIVE ACRES GO BACK AND
- 10 CHANGE THE USE OF THE PROJECT. THE ORIGINAL USE WAS FOR
- 11 MAINTENANCE SUPPORT FACILITIES, WHICH IS CRITICAL TO WHAT FIVE
- 12 ACRES DOES AND CRITICAL TO MAINTAINING THE FACILITIES. THE
- 13 REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION ASKED THAT THOSE FACILITIES THAT
- 14 THEY THOUGHT WERE POTENTIALLY IMPACTFUL SHOULD GO BACK ACROSS
- 15 THE STREET TO THE INTERNAL LARGE FIVE ACRE SITE AND THEY ASKED
- 16 THAT ONLY SUPPORT ADMINISTRATIVE USES AND STORAGE BE AT THIS
- 17 SITE. IT IS NOW FIVE OFFICES, FOUR CUBICLES, A FILE ROOM AND
- 18 STORAGE. THAT IS WHAT THE PROJECT IS, AND THAT IS WHAT THE
- 19 REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION REQUESTED OF FIVE ACRES. WHAT
- 20 ELSE DID THEY REQUEST? THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION
- 21 REQUESTED ONE OF THE MOST STRINGENT PARKING MANAGEMENT PLANS
- 22 I'VE SEEN IN MY 10 YEARS OF DOING THIS. IT HAS SUBSTANTIAL
- 23 REOUIREMENTS FOR A PARKING OMBUDSMAN, MAINTENANCE OF 197
- 24 SPACES TO SUPPORT FIVE ACRES USE, THAT'S WELL BEYOND CODE, IN
- 25 TWO OFF-SITE LOTS AND THEN ON-SITE, THEY WOULD HAVE 131



- 1 SPACES. AGAIN, BEYOND WHAT'S REQUIRED BY CODE. THIS PARKING
- 2 MANAGEMENT PLAN, WHICH IS THE LAST TAB IN YOUR PACKETS, WILL
- 3 TAKE A LOT OF STAFF TIME AND ENFORCEMENT BY FIVE ACRES. AGAIN,
- 4 THEY'RE COMMITTED TO DO IT. AT EVERY TURN, THEY'VE ACCEPTED
- 5 THE REQUIREMENTS, THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION LISTENED TO
- 6 THE COMMUNITY AND MADE THE CHANGES. FINALLY, HOW HAS THE
- 7 PROJECT CHANGED FROM INPUT FROM THE COMMUNITY? THE ORIGINAL
- 8 PROJECT, BACK IN 1998, WAS MORE THAN DOUBLE THE SIZE. THAT IS
- 9 OFF THE TABLE AND HAS NOT BEEN ON THE TABLE FOR THE LAST TWO
- 10 YEARS. WHAT IS ON THE TABLE IS WHAT'S IN FRONT OF YOU WITH
- 11 SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES FROM THE COMMUNITY THAT CAME OUT OF OUR
- 12 NUMEROUS COMMUNITY MEETINGS. FOR INSTANCE, THE COMMUNITY ASKED
- 13 FOR THE BUILDING TO BE REDESIGNED AND TURNED ON ITS AXIS SO
- 14 THAT THE SHORTER END FRONTS, AS STAFF POINTED OUT. THIS WAS
- 15 THREE DAYS BEFORE OUR FINAL HEARING. WE TALKED TO THE
- 16 COMMUNITY ABOUT IT, WE WENT OVER EVERY PROPOSED CONDITION BY
- 17 COUNTY STAFF, TOOK 14 RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE COMMUNITY,
- 18 EVERY ONE FIVE ACRES ACCEPTED. THEY AGREED TO ROTATE THE
- 19 BUILDING, RECOMMENDED THAT; AGREED TO ADDITIONAL SUBSTANTIAL
- 20 GRASSCRETE TO MAKE THE ENTRANCE MORE GREEN; AGREED TO
- 21 PROHIBITING ANY SIGNAGE WHATSOEVER TO INDICATE IT'S A FIVE
- 22 ACRES' FACILITY OTHER THAN ADDRESS NUMBERS; AGREED TO LIMITING
- 23 THE NUMBERS OF CONSTRUCTION; THE HOURS OF CONSTRUCTION; AND
- 24 APPOINTING A CONSTRUCTION LIAISON. AGREED TO A LOCKED, CLOSED,
- 25 CONTROLLED ACCESS GATE AT THE ENTRANCE; AGREED TO LIMITING THE



- 1 LIGHTING AND THE SCALE OF THE LIGHTING POLES; AND, AGAIN,
- 2 AGREED TO RETAIN THE EXISTING HOUSE ON THE SIDE OF THE
- 3 PROPERTY FOR RESIDENTIAL USE. TO SUM UP, WHAT'S IN FRONT OF
- 4 YOU IS TRULY THE MINIMUM NEEDED TO SUPPORT TO WHAT EVERYONE
- 5 AGREES IS A WONDERFUL PROGRAM. AT EVERY STEP, WE LISTENED TO
- 6 INPUT AND AGREED TO CHANGES. YOU WILL HEAR TODAY FROM MANY
- 7 SUPPORTERS. AN ADDITIONAL 200 LETTERS HAVE COME IN IN THE LAST
- 8 TWO MONTHS SINCE THIS PROJECT CAME BEFORE THE BOARD OF
- 9 SUPERVISORS. 50 PEOPLE ARE HERE IN SUPPORT TODAY. IN THE
- 10 INTEREST OF TIME, THEY'RE NOT GOING TO ALL SPEAK BUT I'D LIKE
- 11 TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE OVERWHELMING AMOUNT OF SUPPORT. DESPITE
- 12 THIS SUPPORT, WE UNDERSTAND THERE IS STILL SOME OPPOSITION AND
- 13 YOU WILL HEAR FROM THEM AS WELL. WE HAVE WORKED WITH THEM, WE
- 14 WILL CONTINUE TO WORK WITH THEM AND WE'RE PROUD OF THE
- 15 PROCESS. WE'RE PROUD OF THE DIALOGUE THAT HAS EMERGED FROM
- 16 THIS LONG PUBLIC PROCESS, THE GREAT PROJECT AND THE INCREDIBLE
- 17 SET OF OPERATING CONDITIONS WHICH FIVE ACRES WILL ADHERE TO
- 18 FROM HERE ON OUT IF THIS PROJECT IS APPROVED. WE LOOK FORWARD
- 19 TO CONTINUED COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT AND CONTINUING ATTENDING
- 20 EVERY SINGLE ALTADENA TOWN COUNCIL MEETING AND WORKING CLOSELY
- 21 WITH NEIGHBORS. WE APPRECIATE YOUR TIME AND LOOK FORWARD TO
- 22 ANSWERING ANY QUESTIONS.

- 21 IT WAS SHOWN TO FOLKS WHO CAME TO-- AT THE LAST COMMUNITY
- 22 MEETING. THIS DESIGN, AS YOU CAN SEE BEHIND ME, WAS SHOWN TO
- 23 THE TOWN COUNCIL TWO YEARS AGO AND THEN WE CHANGED IT SINCE

- 23 LOREN MONTGOMERY: THE TOWN COUNCIL HAS NOT FORMALLY VOTED ON

- 25 ORGANIZATIONS THAT WE HAVE PERSONALLY AND I HAVE PERSONALLY



- 1 WORKED WITH AND HAVE BEEN FRIENDS WITH AND CONTINUE TO BE
- 2 INVOLVED IN A COMMUNITY THAT IS ONE OF THE STRONGEST
- 3 COMMUNITY-SPIRITED COMMUNITIES IN THE COUNTY. YOU HAVE DONE AN
- 4 INCREDIBLE JOB OVER THE LIFE OF THIS COUNTY AND YOUR
- 5 PARTICIPATION AND INDIVIDUALS TAKING TIME TO DEVOTE TO THEIR

- 2 CONTRARY TO THE POLICY OF THE DEPARTMENT AND CONTRARY TO THE
- 3 DIRECT INSTRUCTION TO STAFF, UNFIT MINORS WERE MOVED FROM THE
- 4 MORE SECURE COMPOUND AREA WITHIN BARRY J. JUVENILE HALL TO ONE
- 5 OF THE REGULAR UNITS IN A LESS SECURE UNIT OF G/H. THE UNFIT
- 6 MINORS, AS YOU KNOW, WERE THOSE THAT WERE BEING TRIED AS AN
- 7 ADULT AND ARE SOME OF THE MOST SERIOUS OFFENDERS THAT WE HAVE.
- 8 THIS ACTION WAS AN ACT OF MANAGERIAL NEGLIGENCE AND, AGAIN,
- 9 CONTRARY TO THE DIRECTION INSTRUCTION BY OUR SUPERIOR MANAGER.
- 10 THE MINORS WERE REPORTEDLY MOVED BECAUSE THEY WERE CODED AS
- 11 REQUIRING A HIGHER LEVEL OF SUPERVISION BECAUSE THEY WERE
- 12 EITHER PRONE TO SUICIDE RISK OR PRONE TO INJURING THEMSELVES
- 13 AND THEY WERE CODED AS LEVEL 2 BY MENTAL HEALTH. THIS REQUIRES
- 14 CONSTANT SUPERVISION BUT DOES NOT REQUIRE ONE-ON-ONE

- 3 TO ENSURE THAT ALL EMPLOYEES KNOW WHAT THE POLICIES ARE?

- 5 PAUL HIGA: FIRST, LET ME SAY THAT IT'S MY VIEW THAT THE

- 4 PAUL HIGA: YOU'RE CORRECT AND WE WILL TRY TO ADDRESS THAT IN
- 5 OUR RESPONSE TO YOU.

7 SUP. KNABE: OKAY. THANK YOU.

8

9 SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR: SUPERVISOR MOLINA.

10

- 11 SUP. MOLINA: IN THIS DEPARTMENT, THERE SEEMS TO BE A LOT OF
- 12 NUMBERS AND I GUESS MY STAFF AND YOUR STAFF ARE TRYING TO PUT
- 13 TOGETHER THESE NUMBERS ABOUT...

14

15 PAUL HIGA: YES.

16

- 17 SUP. MOLINA: ...HOW MANY, IF WE'RE SHORT OF PERSONNEL, BECAUSE
- 18 WE'VE BEEN INFORMED THAT THERE WASN'T AN OVERTIME NEED AND YET
- 19 THERE SEEMS TO BE AN EXCESSIVE OVERTIME AND HOPEFULLY WE CAN
- 20 GET TO THOSE NUMBERS. BUT LET'S ADDRESS THE ISSUE OF
- 21 MANAGEMENT AND SUPERVISION. HAVE YOU DONE ALL OF YOUR

- 22 BECAUSE YOU ISSUED IT, YOU KNOW, HOW DO YOU KNOW THAT THEY
- 23 FOLLOW UP ON IT? DO YOU CHECK? DO YOU HAVE MANAGEMENT MEETINGS
- 24 WHERE THEY DISCUSS THIS?



- 1 PAUL HIGA: THE PROCESS SHOULD HAVE BEEN THAT THEY HAD A UNIT
- 2 MEETING TO DISCUSS WITH THEIR STAFF AND HAVE THEIR STAFF, IN
- 3 FACT, SIGN OFF THAT THEY'VE READ AND UNDERSTOOD THE POLICY.

- 5 SUP. MOLINA: ALL RIGHT. WHAT I'M SAYING IS, IS THAT, I ALSO
- 6 APPLAUD THE FACT THAT YOU'RE DOING A QUICK INVESTIGATION. I'M
- 7 WAITING ON CHILDREN'S SERVICES FOR AN INVESTIGATION. I WAS

- 22 CHIEF THAT GAVE THE DIRECT INSTRUCTION AND I WENT OVER THAT
- 23 CONVERSATION WITH HIM SEVERAL TIMES, IT WAS CLEAR THAT IT WAS
- 24 A DIRECT INSTRUCTION.



- 1 SUP. MOLINA: WELL, YOU KNOW, IT'S LIKE ANYTHING ELSE, IS WHY
- 2 DO YOU THINK THEY DON'T FOLLOW THOSE PROCEDURES? I MEAN, HERE
- 3 THEY INTENTIONALLY VIOLATED A PROCEDURE. NOW, DID THEY DO IT

- 13 SUP. MOLINA: BUT WAIT A MINUTE. LET'S UNDERSTAND. THIS IS
- 14 DIFFERENT, THOUGH. DID THEY KNOW ABOUT THIS POLICY?

16 PAUL HIGA: IN TERMS OF THE...

18 SUP. MOLINA: THE REISSUED POLICY.

19

20 PAUL HIGA: PARDON ME?

21

22 SUP. MOLINA: THE REISSUED POLICY.

- 24 PAUL HIGA: THEY CERTAINLY KNOW THAT, IF THEY'RE ASSIGNED TO A
- 25 POST, THEY CANNOT ABANDON THEIR POST OF SUPERVISION.

- 2 SUP. MOLINA: SO BASICALLY THAT'S WHAT IT IS. IT ISN'T A
- 3 MATTER-- THEY JUST ABANDONED THEIR POST?

4

- 5 PAUL HIGA: THAT'S ONE ISSUE. THE OTHER ISSUE IS, WHEN A STAFF
- 6 CALLS MOBILE CONTROL AND SAYS, "I HAVE AN EMERGENCY, I NEED
- 7 SOME ASSISTANCE," THE FACT THAT SOMEONE IGNORES IT AND FAILS
- 8 TO SEND ANYBODY UP, THAT'S A FUNDAMENTAL ISSUE THAT I'M NOT
- 9 SURE IF I HAVE A POLICY THAT SAYS, YOU KNOW, YOU OBVIOUSLY

- 15 THAT MAKES COMMON SENSE TO ME, BUT, SOMEWHERE ALONG THE LINE,
- 16 I WANT TO KNOW, IS THIS A STANDARD, WHAT YOU JUST SAID? I
- 17 MEAN, I AGREE, I THINK FUNDAMENTALLY THERE'S SOMETHING WRONG
- 18 HERE.

19

20 PAUL HIGA: YES.

- 22 SUP. MOLINA: AND SO IS IT JUST ONE BAD EGG OR IS POLICY SO
- 23 OVERLOOKED IN THIS DEPARTMENT THAT PEOPLE ARE SAYING, OH,
- 24 HERE'S ANOTHER RULE, YOU KNOW, NOBODY PAYS ATTENTION TO THEM
- 25 ANYWAY. I MEAN, THINGS BECOME A STANDARD BECAUSE OF THE WAY



- 1 THE DEPARTMENT MANAGES ITSELF AND WHAT I GUESS THE ISSUE I'M

- 16 THAT WE SET OUT AS POLICY SHOULD NOT-- THERE SHOULDN'T BE AN
- 17 EXPECTATION THAT IT BE FOLLOWED FORTHWITH.

- 19 SUP. MOLINA: OKAY. BECAUSE MY CONCERN IS IS THAT I HAVE, AS
- 20 YOU KNOW, TAKEN ISSUE WITH THIS DEPARTMENT ON VARIOUS
- 21 CONCERNS. HOW SOMEBODY GOES TO THE DENTIST AND TWO OF THEM
- 22 ESCAPE, RIGHT? AND EVERYBODY SAYS, WELL, I WAS OUT THERE
- 23 GETTING A SMOKE AND NOTHING HAPPENED TO THEM, THEY WENT BACK
- 24 INTO THE POPULATION THE LAST TIME. IT'S JUST CONSTANT ON THESE

- 9 PAUL HIGA: FIRST OF ALL, I THINK THAT THERE ARE SOME
- 10 STRUCTURAL ISSUES THAT, IN TERMS OF THE SPAN OF SUPERVISION,
- 11 QUITE FRANKLY, WE PROBABLY DON'T HAVE ENOUGH PEOPLE THAT CAN
- 12 HOLD OTHER PEOPLE ACCOUNTABLE. I THINK THAT'S A MAJOR ISSUE
- 13 AND THEN WE HAVE SUCH A SPAN THAT THEY ARE NOT-- AND WE ALSO
- 14 DON'T HAVE PEOPLE UNDERNEATH THEM THAT TAKE A DIFFERENT LEVEL
- 15 OF RESPONSIBILITY. WHEN WE HAVE THREE PEOPLE THAT ARE IN

- 22 PERSON AT THAT FACILITY THAT TAKES RESPONSIBILITY SO THAT WE
- 23 CAN GO TO ONE PERSON AND SAY, DID THIS TAKE PLACE THE WAY IT
- 24 WAS SUPPOSED TO BE ABLE TO BE? SO I THINK THERE ARE SOME
- 25 STRUCTURAL ISSUES BUT I ALSO BELIEVE, BEYOND JUST A STRUCTURAL



- 1 ISSUE, IT IS AN ISSUE OF HOW WE HAVE DEALT WITH DEFICIENCIES
- 2 IN THE PAST AND I DON'T BELIEVE THAT WE HAVE DEALT WITH THEM
- 3 IN THE WAY THAT THEY NEEDED TO, WHICH I THINK SENDS OUT A
- 4 DIFFERENT KIND OF MESSAGE IN TERMS OF ACCOUNTABILITY.

- 6 SUP. MOLINA: ON THE ISSUE OF THOSE STRUCTURAL PROBLEMS, IF YOU
- 7 WERE TO GIVE ME A TIMEFRAME, IF YOU WERE TO START WORKING ON
- 8 IT RIGHT NOW TO ELIMINATE THEM, HOW LONG WOULD IT TAKE?

9

- 10 PAUL HIGA: I BELIEVE IT WOULD TAKE ME SIX MONTHS TO BE ABLE TO
- 11 GET THAT DONE.

12

13 SUP. MOLINA: TO GET THAT DONE.

14

15 PAUL HIGA: YES.

16

- 17 SUP. MOLINA: IS THERE ANYTHING WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF
- 18 CARRYING OUT THAT WORK THAT YOU WOULD NEED FROM US IN ORDER TO
- 19 EMPOWER YOU TO TAKE CARE OF THAT?

- 21 PAUL HIGA: THERE ARE A COUPLE OF LAYERS OF ITEMS THAT HAVE--
- 22 AND NOT NECESSARILY HIGHER LEVEL ITEMS, ACTUALLY LOWER LEVEL
- 23 ITEMS THAT ARE CLOSER TO THE WORK THAT NEED TO BE MORE
- 24 DIRECTLY INVOLVED OF OVERSIGHT TO ENSURE THAT COMMUNICATIONS
- 25 OF POLICY ARE CORRECT, THAT THE ACCOUNTABILITY IS PUT IN



- 1 PLACE, THAT QA IS PUT IN PLACE, THAT IS A FAIRLY BASIC PROCESS
- 2 TO ENSURE THAT SOMETHING THAT SHOULD BE DONE IS, IN FACT,
- 3 BEING DONE IN THE WAY IT NEEDS TO BE DONE.

- 5 SUP. MOLINA: AND ARE THOSE THE KINDS OF THINGS THAT YOU CAN DO
- 6 ON YOUR OWN OR THAT WE HAVE TO EMPOWER YOU TO DO?

7

- 8 PAUL HIGA: I BELIEVE THAT WE'RE ALSO WORKING WITH THE C.A.O.
- 9 AND D.H.R. FOR THOSE ITEMS BECAUSE THOSE ARE CURRENTLY NOT
- 10 WITHIN OUR BUDGET BUT IT IS A PART OF A...

11

12 SUP. MOLINA: SO IT'S A BUDGET ISSUE?

13

- 14 PAUL HIGA: NO, I BELIEVE IT'S MORE THAN A BUDGET ISSUE BECAUSE
- 15 I BELIEVE THAT IT'S IMPORTANT ENOUGH THAT, IF WE HAD THE
- 16 ABILITY, WE WOULD BE ABLE-- WE WOULD CUT OTHER THINGS IN ORDER
- 17 TO BE ABLE TO GET THIS DONE, BECAUSE WE DO NOT WANT TO
- 18 CONTINUE EXACTLY HOW WE'RE GOING.

- 20 SUP. MOLINA: YOU SEE, IT'S HARD FOR ME TO UNDERSTAND THAT
- 21 BECAUSE I STILL DON'T GET MY ARMS AROUND WHAT IT IS THAT I
- 22 NEED TO DO TO MAKE SURE THAT PEOPLE FOLLOW OUR OWN POLICIES
- 23 AND PROCEDURES. THAT'S ALWAYS BEEN A TOUGH ONE FOR ME AROUND
- 24 HERE BECAUSE I LOOK AT THEM AND SO I'M ASSUMING, WHEN SOMEBODY

- 1 IT. NOW, I UNDERSTAND THERE ARE SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES BUT IT

- 3 SOME FORM OF DISCIPLINE. I DON'T KNOW IF YOU NEED TO BE FIRED
- 4 FOR IT BUT SOME FORM OF DISCIPLINE AND, IF NOBODY EVER GETS

- 9 PAUL HIGA: IN TERMS OF SOME SPECIFICS, LET ME GIVE YOU A

12 SUP. MOLINA: SURE.

13

- 14 PAUL HIGA: ONE WOULD BE THAT WE ARE GENERALLY A FAIRLY FLAT
- 15 MANAGERIAL ORGANIZATION.

16

17 SUP. MOLINA: I DON'T KNOW WHAT THAT MEANS.

18

- 19 PAUL HIGA: IT MEANS THAT, AT THIS POINT, THERE'S THE CHIEF,
- 20 THE CHIEF DEPUTY, BUREAU CHIEFS, LINE DIRECTOR AND THE
- 21 SUPERVISOR, SO VERY OFTEN...

22

- 23 SUP. MOLINA: DOESN'T LOOK FLAT TO ME. LOOKS LIKE A NICE
- 24 HIERARCHY.



- 1 PAUL HIGA: IT MAY WELL BE BUT, GIVEN THE NATURE OF THE KINDS
- 2 OF ISSUES THAT WE END UP HAVING TO DEAL WITH, DECENTRALIZED
- 3 AND MULTIPLE LOCATIONS, MANY OF THE ISSUES THAT ARE HANDLED AT
- 4 AREA OFFICE OR FUNCTIONAL LEVELS END UP BEING VERY QUICKLY
- 5 MOVED UP. SO PART OF WHAT OUR RESTRUCTURING WOULD REQUIRE
- 6 WOULD BE A LAYER OF ADDITIONAL STAFF THAT WOULD ENSURE, AT THE
- 7 LINE-- MORE AT THE LINE LEVEL THAT, IN FACT, THERE'S A FULLER
- 8 IMPLEMENTATION, A COMPLETE IMPLEMENTATION OF POLICIES AS WE

- 13 WOULD JUST SEEM TO ME THAT YOU DON'T NEED MORE PEOPLE TO TELL
- 14 PEOPLE WHAT TO DO. I THINK THAT PEOPLE SHOULD KNOW-- IF THEY
- 15 ARE SUPERVISING JUVENILES, THEY SHOULD UNDERSTAND THEIR OWN
- 16 POLICIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES. IF IT AIN'T YOUR JOB, THEN THEY
