14 SPIRITUAL DOCTRINES FROM 1975 TO THE PRESENT, HAS A B.A. IN
15 SPEECH COMMUNICATION THEORY FROM CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY
16 LONG BEACH. SHE'S WORKED FOR THE COUNTY, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC
17 SOCIAL SERVICES, FOR THE PAST 15 YEARS AND SHE'S STILL THERE,
18 WORKING WITH US AND WE REALLY APPRECIATE HAVING YOU HERE WITH

6 GONZALES ATTENDED RIO HIGH SCHOOL IN EL MONTE AND RIO HONDO
7 COMMUNITY COLLEGE. HE PRESENTLY LIVES IN EL MONTE AND WE THANK

7 GOOD TO SEE YOU. TODAY, WE ARE SAYING GOOD-BYE TO THE CONSUL-
8 GENERAL OF TURKEY, THE HONORABLE ENGIN ANSAY, WHO HAS SERVED
9 AS CONSUL-GENERAL IN LOS ANGELES SINCE APRIL OF 2003. CONSUL-
10 GENERAL ANSAY HAS BEEN A VALUED MEMBER OF THE CONSULAR CORPS
11 FOR THE PAST FOUR YEARS, LENDING HIS EXPERIENCE AS A HIGHLY
12 RESPECTED SENIOR DIPLOMAT AND AMBASSADOR IN THE TURKISH
13 FOREIGN SERVICE. CONSUL-GENERAL ANSAY, THANK YOU FOR WORKING
14 CONTINUOUSLY TO STRENGTHEN AND NURTURE THE RELATIONSHIPS
15 SHARED BY OUR TWO COUNTRIES. YOU REPRESENTED YOUR COUNTRY WELL
16 AND I'M SURE THAT THE TURKISH COMMUNITY HERE IN LOS ANGELES --
17 LOS ANGELES COUNTY APPRECIATES ALL THAT YOU'VE DONE DURING
18 YOUR TENURE. I WANT TO PRESENT YOU, ON BEHALF OF THE ENTIRE
19 BOARD, WITH THIS PLAQUE, WHICH EXTENDS OUR BEST WISHES, OUR
20 THANKS FOR YOUR SERVICE HERE IN THE COUNTY AND OUR BEST WISHES
21 IN YOUR FUTURE ENDEAVORS AS YOU MOVE ONWARD AND UPWARD IN THE
22 FOREIGN SERVICE AND IN YOUR PERSONAL LIFE. CONGRATULATIONS AND

2 **THE HONORABLE ENGIN ANSAY:** HONORABLE CHAIRMAN YAROSLAVSKY,
3 DISTINGUISHED MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, THANK YOU
4 VERY MUCH. I HAD ALMOST 30 YEARS OF MY PUBLIC SERVICE OF 40
5 YEARS IN THIS BLESSED COUNTRY OF YOURS BUT I MUST SAY, MY
6 FAMILY AND I, WE HAVE PROFITED AND ENJOYED, HAD THE BEST YEARS
7 OF OUR ADULT LIVES BUT THE LAST FOUR YEARS, WHEN I HAD THE
8 HONOR OF SERVING IN CALIFORNIA AND 11 OTHER STATES AS THE
9 CONSUL-GENERAL OF MY COUNTRY, WAS THE CROWNING POINT IN MY
10 SERVICE. SO, ON BEHALF OF MY COUNTRY, ON BEHALF OF MY CONSULAR
11 STAFF AND ON MY OWN BEHALF, I'D LIKE TO EXTEND TO YOU AND TO
12 THE GREAT PEOPLE OF CALIFORNIA MY PROFOUND THANKS AND
13 GRATITUDE AND WISH YOU THE BEST IN YOUR ENDEAVORS. THANK YOU
14 VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE]

16 **THE HONORABLE ENGIN ANSAY:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH INDEED.

17

18 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, YOU'RE UP
19 NEXT.

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS, IT'S AN OPPORTUNITY TO
22 RECOGNIZE BRYCE YOKOMIZO, WHO IS OUR DIRECTOR OF DEPARTMENT OF
23 PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES UPON HIS RETIREMENT, ALTHOUGH IT'S ONLY
24 GOING TO BE TEMPORARY BECAUSE HE'S GOING TO BE ONE OF THE
25 JUNIOR DEPUTY C.A.O.'S RUNNING AROUND HERE IN HIS NIKE SUITS



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1 AND I TOLD HIM HE'S PROBABLY GOING TO GO OUT TO THE ANTELOPE
2 VALLEY FOR THE FIRST FIELD OFFICE TO BE BUILT IN A HIGH-RISE
3 BUILDING BUT, BESIDES THAT, BRYCE HAS SPENT 33 YEARS IN OUR
4 COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. HE STARTED BACK IN 1974 AND THEN HE
5 WENT ON A FAST TRACK WHERE HE WENT THROUGH 18 PROGRESSIVELY
6 CHALLENGING ASSIGNMENTS, ENDING AS THE CHAIRMAN AND DIRECTOR
7 OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES IN MARCH OF 2002.
8 THROUGH HIS LEADERSHIP, THEY HAVE REDUCED THE FOOD STAMP ERROR
9 RATE TO THE LOWEST IT HAS EVER BEEN. FOR THE FIRST TWO MONTHS
10 OF FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2007, THERE IS A ZERO PERCENT ERROR
11 RATE, WHICH IS AN INCREDIBLE FEAT AND WE APPRECIATE THAT
12 LEADERSHIP. THEY'VE ALSO WORKED TO COORDINATE WITH OTHER
13 AGENCIES. AN EXAMPLE OF THIS IS THEIR LEAD ROLE IN ASSEMBLING
14 THE SKID ROW OUTREACH TEAM, AS WELL AS THE DEVELOPMENT OF
15 SEVERAL WORTHWHILE PROGRAMS TO HELP THE HOMELESS, SUCH AS THE
16 CALWORKS HOUSING LOCATOR, THE 12-MONTH RENTAL SUBSIDY AND THE
17 GENERAL RELIEF HOUSING SUBSIDY AND CASE MANAGEMENT PILOT.
18 KEEPING WITH TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCES, THE IMPLEMENTED THE
19 CUSTOMER SERVICE CENTER ON JANUARY 16TH OF THIS YEAR. THIS
20 CENTER WILL UTILIZE HIGHLY TRAINED REPRESENTATIVES WHO ADDRESS
21 SPECIFIC CASE INQUIRIES AND ANSWER GENERAL QUESTIONS THROUGH A
22 CENTRALIZED STATE-OF-THE-ART INFORMATION AND TRACKING SYSTEM.
23 AND, IN KEEPING WITH THAT PHILOSOPHY OF PERFORMANCE-BASED
24 MANAGEMENT, BRYCE HAS COMMITTED THE DEPARTMENT TO ACHIEVE THE
25 GOALS OF WORKFORCE EXCELLENCE BY PROVIDING EDUCATIONAL



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1 OPPORTUNITIES FOR HIS EMPLOYEES. THIS INCLUDES HELPING THOSE
2 WITH THE UNDERGRADUATE DEGREES, CREATION OF ON-SITE MASTER'S
3 IN PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION DEGREE PROGRAM AND PERSONAL SUPPORT
4 OF STAFF PARTICIPATION AND MANAGEMENT TRAINING PROGRAMS
5 OFFERED WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN
6 RESOURCES AND THE SOUTHERN AREA CONSORTIUM OF HUMAN SERVICES.
7 THE DEPARTMENT HAS ALWAYS BEEN AT THE TOP OF THE CHART FOR
8 AMOUNT OF CONTRIBUTION IT ELECTS FOR CHARITABLE GIVINGS. AND,
9 NOW AT THIS TIME, BRYCE, WE'RE GOING TO GIVE YOU OUR ACADEMY
10 AWARD, PLUS HE'S PROBABLY THE WITTIEST, MOST ENTERTAINING
11 MASTER OF CEREMONIES, JOKESTER, A GOOD MAN AND WE APPRECIATE

3 **SUP. BURKE:** I HAVE NO OBJECTION TO THAT. I HAVE A REVISED
4 MOTION THAT I'D LIKE TO PASS OUT. AND, PRIMARILY, IT CLARIFIES
5 THE-- ACTUALLY WHAT WAS PASSED IN SAN FRANCISCO IN A LITTLE
6 BIT MORE TECHNICAL TERMS. AND WHAT THEY BECAME WAS THE FIRST

12 OUR OCEAN AND UP AND DOWN OUR STREETS THAN WE REALLY NEED. WE
13 NEED TO LOOK AT THIS ISSUE. NOW, HOW DOES IT SOLVE AND HOW DO
14 WE SOLVE IT? I'D LIKE TO FIRST BRING UP SOMEONE FROM PUBLIC
15 WORKS? MR. WILFRED, WOULD YOU COME FORWARD? MY MOTION REALLY
16 ASKS THAT THERE BE A STUDY OF THE ALTERNATIVES TO ALLOWING OUR
17 PRESENT POLICY OF OPENING, JUST OPEN USE OF PLASTIC BAGS. I
18 KNOW THAT RALPHS GIVES 5 CENTS IF YOU RETURN AND USE YOUR OWN
19 BAG. AND TRADER JOE'S DOES THAT. THEY ALLOW 5 CENTS ON YOUR
20 BILL IF YOU BRING YOUR OWN BAG. THESE ARE THE KIND OF THINGS
21 THAT I THINK ARE VERY POSITIVE THAT WE CAN LOOK AT AND THAT WE
22 CAN ENCOURAGE THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY, NOT ONLY WITH JUST THE
23 LARGE CHAINS BUT WITH OTHERS. BUT THERE'S SOME OTHER THINGS
24 THAT HAVE COME TO OUR ATTENTION. APPARENTLY, THAT THERE ARE
25 BAGS THAT ARE NOT NECESSARILY POLYETHYLENE-BASED. THERE ARE



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1 BAGS THAT ARE CORN STARCH-BASED THAT ARE BIODEGRADABLE. AND
2 SO, IN THIS DAY AND TIME, WE CAN'T JUST SAY OKAY, EVERYTHING'S
3 GREAT. WE NEED TO LOOK AT OTHER ALTERNATIVES. I KNOW THAT, IN
4 MY BLUE CAN, I LIVE IN THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, SO, IN MY BLUE
5 CAN, IT SAYS "DON'T PUT PLASTIC BAGS." NOW, I CAN PUT PLASTIC
6 BOTTLES. I CAN PUT THINGS LIKE THAT BUT I CAN'T PUT PLASTIC
7 BAGS IN MY RECYCLABLES. SO THAT, OBVIOUSLY, THERE IS A REAL
8 CONCERN IN TERMS OF THE RECYCLING INDUSTRY AS IT RELATES TO
9 THOSE BAGS. WHAT I WOULD WANT TO SEE IS THAT WE LOOK AT
10 SOMETHING GOOD FOR LOS ANGELES. WE CAN'T FOLLOW SAN FRANCISCO,

12 EVERYTHING'S GREAT AND WE DON'T WANT TO LOOK AT ANYTHING ELSE.
13 AND I WOULD LIKE TO GET SOME INPUT FROM THE DEPARTMENT ON
14 EXACTLY HOW THIS IS BEING TREATED IN TERMS OF PLASTICS GOING
15 INTO OUR-- THEY'RE GOING INTO OUR LANDFILLS MOSTLY, AREN'T
16 THEY?

17

18 **DON WOLFE:** YES, SUPERVISOR. DON WOLFE, DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC
19 WORKS. IT IS A VERY INTERESTING AND A VERY CHALLENGING PROBLEM
20 THAT WE HAVE. PLASTIC BAGS ARE A MAJOR SOURCE OF POLLUTION,
21 BASICALLY, WITH TRASH STREWN IN OUR PUBLIC WAYS AND ON PRIVATE
22 PROPERTY AND A VERY IMPORTANT ISSUE WITH RESPECT TO WATER
23 QUALITY IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY BECAUSE OF THE NUMBER OF THESE
24 BAGS THAT WIND UP IN THE RECEIVING WATERS. AND THEY'RE A BIG
25 FACTOR OF THE ISSUE OF DEALING WITH THE TRASH TMDL THAT THE



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1 REGIONAL BOARD HAS IMPOSED FOR BIONA CREEK AND THE L.A. RIVER.
2 MANY THINGS YOU SPOKE ABOUT, THE FACT THAT YOU CANNOT CO-
3 MINGLE WITH RESPECT TO RECYCLING THE BIODEGRADABLE BAGS AND
4 THE PLASTIC BAGS AND SEPARATING THEM ARE VERY DIFFICULT SO
5 THAT DOES CREATE A CHALLENGE TO RECYCLING WHAT'S LEFT OF THE
6 PLASTIC BAGS AND SOME OF THE ISSUES COULD BE TO COME UP WITH
7 PROGRAMS TO ENCOURAGE PEOPLE NOT TO USE THE PLASTIC BAGS AND
8 USE OTHER FORMS OF CONTAINERS AND A LOT OF OTHER AGENCIES DO
9 THAT. AND, ALSO, IN OTHER COUNTRIES I'VE NOTICED THAT THEY
10 HAVE ENCOURAGEMENTS THAT ARE VERY EFFECTIVE IN TURNING PEOPLE
11 AWAY FROM THE USE OF PLASTIC BAGS BUT NOT PROHIBITING THEIR
12 USE. SO WE WOULD LOOK AT THIS, IF THE BOARD PASSES THIS
13 MOTION, AS A REAL CHALLENGE TO LOOK AT ALL OF THE PLUSES AND
14 MINUSES AND COME BACK WITH A REPORT TO THE BOARD TO GIVE YOU
15 OPTIONS FOR A POLICY FOR L.A. COUNTY THAT WOULD WORK FOR THE
16 COUNTY AND NOT HAVE THOSE REPERCUSSIONS THAT UNFORESEEN
17 CONSEQUENCES THAT SUP. ANTONOVICH WAS TALKING ABOUT, SO THAT
18 WE GET A WIN/WIN ON BOTH THE RECYCLING ISSUE AND THE WASTE
19 REDUCTION ISSUE.

20

21 **SUP. BURKE:** WELL, OBVIOUSLY, WE HAVE TO WORK WITH THE GROCERS.
22 AND ALSO NOT JUST THE GROCERS, THE OTHER RETAILERS, YOU KNOW?
23 WE HAVE RETAILERS IN OUR DEPARTMENT STORES. EVERY ONE THAT AT
24 THIS POINT DEPEND UPON PLASTIC BAGS. AT THE SAME TIME, I KNOW
25 SOME OF US HAVE BEEN RELUCTANT TO USE PAPER BECAUSE WE THOUGHT



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1 THAT, IF WE WERE GOING TO USE PAPER, IT WAS A MATTER THAT WE
2 WERE GOING TO REALLY CAUSE TREES TO BE DESTROYED SO THAT THERE
3 WAS A RELUCTANCE AND SOME OF US WENT TO PLASTIC BECAUSE WE
4 THOUGHT THAT WAS THE MOST ADVISABLE. BUT, AT THIS POINT, WE
5 HAVE TO LOOK AT MAYBE SOME OTHER ALTERNATIVE, TO LOOK AT
6 METHODS OF WHERE WE CAN ENCOURAGE PEOPLE TO BRING THEIR OWN
7 BAGS, RETURN THEIR BAGS BUT TO DO SOMETHING THAT WE CAN MOVE
8 FORWARD. AND I HOPE THAT WE CAN LOOK VERY SERIOUSLY AT THESE
9 BIODEGRADABLE BAGS THAT ARE BASED ON-- WITH CORN STARCH AND
10 ENCOURAGE SOME OF THE COMPANIES TO LOOK AT THOSE IF, IN FACT,
11 THEY WORK. I DON'T KNOW WHETHER THEY WORK OR NOT. I DON'T KNOW
12 WHETHER THEY GO INTO THE LANDFILL AND THEY ARE DEGRADED THERE
13 OR NOT BUT I THINK THAT WE NEED TO LOOK AT THAT AND TO FIND
14 OUT.

15

16 **DON WOLFE:** WE WILL WORK WITH THE C.A.O.'S OFFICE AND INTERNAL
17 SERVICES AND COME BACK WITH OPTIONS FOR YOUR BOARD AND THE
18 PLUSES AND MINUSES OF EACH ONE OF THE OPTIONS.

19

20 **SUP. MOLINA:** MR. CHAIRMAN?

21

22 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** MISS MOLINA?

23

24 **SUP. MOLINA:** YOU KNOW, I THINK COSTCO IS THE ONE THAT'S GOT IT
25 RIGHT. THEY JUST GIVE YOU BOXES AT THE END OF THE COUNTER AND



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1 YOU JUST PACK UP ALL YOUR STUFF IN THE RECYCLED BOXES. THEY DO
2 IT ALL THERE. ANYWAY, IT MAKES A HECK OF A LOT OF SENSE. BUT
3 LET ME ASK A QUESTION ABOUT JURISDICTION. I DON'T KNOW IF OUR
4 LAWYER NEEDS TO ANSWER THIS AS WELL. IF WE WERE TO IMPOSE
5 SOMETHING LIKE THIS, DOES THIS ONLY FUNCTION AND OPERATE IN
6 OUR COUNTY UNINCORPORATED AREAS THAT WE PULL TRASH IN WHERE WE
7 HAVE JURISDICTION OVER GROCERY STORES OR COULD THIS BE A
8 COUNTYWIDE ISSUE BECAUSE WE ALSO HAVE, I MEAN, THE LANDFILL IS
9 IN OUR AREA? WE ARE TAKING IN MOST OF THE TRASH FROM THOSE
10 AREAS. SO, JURISDICTIONALLY, COULD WE HAVE A LARGER IMPACT
11 THAN JUST THE UNINCORPORATED GROCERY STORES?

12

13 **RAYMOND G. FORTNER, JR., COUNSEL:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE
14 BOARD, THIS IS A QUESTION WE HAVE BEEN LOOKING AT AND THE
15 ANSWER IS NOT ABSOLUTELY CLEAR YET BUT I BELIEVE THAT, WHILE
16 THE COUNTY'S POLICE POWER DOES EXTEND JUST TO THE
17 UNINCORPORATED AREA OF THE COUNTY, IT IS A PRINCIPLE THAT YOUR
18 BOARD IS VERY FAMILIAR WITH, THERE ARE A NUMBER OF AREAS, AS
19 YOU POINT OUT, INVOLVING TRASH AND RECYCLING ACTIVITIES THAT
20 EXTEND INTO INCORPORATED AREAS OR EVEN BEYOND THE BOUNDARIES
21 OF THE COUNTY. AND I BELIEVE THAT IT MAY WELL BE POSSIBLE
22 BECAUSE OF THE IMPACT HERE, THAT THERE COULD BE SOME
23 REGULATIONS THAT WOULD APPLY ON A COUNTYWIDE BASIS RATHER THAN
24 LIMITED MERELY TO ACTIVITIES THAT OCCUR WITHIN THE
25 UNINCORPORATED AREA. BUT, AS I SAY, MY STAFF IS COMPLETING A



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1 REPORT ON THAT AND WE HOPE TO HAVE THAT VERY QUICKLY TO RETURN
2 WITH THE ALTERNATIVES.

3

4 **SUP. MOLINA:** SO THAT WILL BE PART OF THE ANALYSIS IS OUR
5 JURISDICTIONAL CAPABILITY?

6

7 **RAYMOND G. FORTNER, JR.:** YES, THAT'S CORRECT.

8

9 **SUP. BURKE:** ONE THING IS I THINK THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES HAS
10 INDICATED THEY WOULD WORK WITH US. THEY CONSIDERED THIS AND I
11 THINK THEY WENT TO A RECYCLING SYSTEM. I DON'T KNOW HOW IT
12 WORKS BECAUSE I HAVE NOT REALLY RECEIVED THE INFORMATION AS A
13 CITY RESIDENT EXACTLY HOW YOU RECYCLE THE PLASTIC BAGS.

14

15 **SUP. MOLINA:** MISS BURKE, I WAS GOING TO RECOMMEND, AND I DON'T
16 KNOW HOW YOU FEEL ABOUT IT, THAT ONE OF THE THINGS YOU MIGHT
17 LOOK AT AS WELL, IS MAYBE TAKING A LEADERSHIP ROLE WITHIN THE
18 COUNTY AND TRYING TO ENCOURAGE THE CITIES TO JOIN WITH US. AND
19 IF WE WERE ALL COLLECTIVELY TOGETHER, THIS IS AN AWFULLY LARGE
20 COUNTY OF 10 MILLION RESIDENTS THAT HAVE UNBELIEVABLE PROBLEMS
21 WHEN IT COMES TO LANDFILLS AND LOOKING AT OPTIONS THAT MIGHT
22 BE AVAILABLE TO US. I THINK INSTEAD OF EVERY CITY MAYBE DOING
23 IT BUT LOOKING AT ALL THE CITIES AND THEN SEEING IF WE CAN
24 COME UP WITH A COMBINED SOLUTION SO THAT IT WORKS FOR THE
25 CITIES, AS WELL. THERE MIGHT BE DIFFERENT APPROACHES THAT WE



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1 MIGHT USE AND IT MIGHT ADDRESS SOME OF THE ISSUES ABOUT-- THAT
2 MR. ANTONOVICH IS RAISING, AS WELL. BUT I JUST THINK IT WOULD
3 BE-- TO DO IT IN ISOLATION IS ONLY LIKE ONE PART OF THE
4 SOLUTION. IF WE COULD PROVIDE A LEADERSHIP ROLE AND MAYBE LOOK
5 AT THE OTHERS, I'M SURE THAT MANY OF THE OTHER CITIES WOULD
6 ALSO WANT TO DO SOMETHING LIKE THIS. BUT THE SOLUTION HAS TO
7 BE-- IT COULD BE INCENTIVES BUT IT'S PROBABLY ENCOURAGING THE
8 GROCERY STORES TO LOOK AT HOW THEY THEMSELVES CAN TAKE IT ON.
9 LIKE I SAID, COSTCO DOES IT ALL BY ITSELF. MOST OF US ARE
10 PACKING OUR OWN GROCERIES NOWADAYS. THEY DON'T HAVE PACKERS
11 ANY MORE LIKE THEY USED TO IN MOST PLACES. AT LEAST, THE
12 GROCERY STORES THAT I SHOP IN. WE ALL GO TO THE EDGE AND START
13 PACKING OUR OWN STUFF INTO PLASTIC BAGS. BUT IF THEY PROVIDED,
14 YOU KNOW, OTHER BAGS, PAPER OR IF THEY PROVIDED BOXES, WE
15 COULD DO THAT, AS WELL. SO I'M JUST TRYING TO THINK THE
16 SOLUTION MIGHT BE MORE COUNTYWIDE AND WE MIGHT WANT TO INVITE
17 SOME OF THE CITIES TO JOIN WITH US IN LOOKING AT WHAT KIND OF
18 ORDINANCE, WHAT KIND OF RULE MAKING OR WHAT KIND OF INCENTIVES
19 WE WOULD CREATE IN ORDER TO GET RID OF THE PLASTIC BAGS IN OUR
20 LANDFILLS.

21

22 **SUP. BURKE:** I REALLY AGREE WITH THAT. I THINK WE DO HAVE TO
23 WORK WITH THE CITIES. SOME CITIES, OF COURSE, ON THEIR OWN,
24 MALIBU HAS TAKEN ACTION. SO WE NEED TO WORK WITH THEM. AND I



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1 THINK THAT, IF WE COME UP WITH SOMETHING, WE'LL BE ABLE TO
2 WORK BETTER WITH THE CITIES IN DOING THAT.

3

4 **SUP. MOLINA:** SO WE MIGHT WANT TO ENCOURAGE YOU TO REALLY LOOK
5 AT A WAY THAT YOU MIGHT BRING IN THE CITIES INTO THIS
6 DISCUSSION AND SEE WHAT KIND-- SOME WHO HAVE ALREADY DONE IT,
7 HOW THEY DO IT AND WHAT THEY'RE DOING. BUT ALSO-- BECAUSE I
8 KNOW THAT, IN SOME OF THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS, WE HAVE SOME
9 MARKETS BUT MOST OF OUR CHAINS ARE OUTSIDE OF MANY OF THE
10 UNINCORPORATED AREAS.

11

12 **DON WOLFE:** WE WILL DO THAT, SUPERVISOR, BECAUSE YOU'RE
13 CORRECT. UNLESS WE'RE ALL IN IT TOGETHER IN DOING THE SAME
14 THING OR SIMILAR THINGS, WE'RE NOT GOING TO HAVE A BIG IMPACT.

15

16 **SUP. BURKE:** ALL RIGHT, I'LL MOVE IT AS AMENDED.

17

18 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** ALL RIGHT. IT'S MOVED AS AMENDED,
19 I'LL SECOND IT. AND WITHOUT OBJECTION? UNANIMOUS VOTE.

20

21 **CLERK SACHI HAMAI:** AND THAT ALSO INCLUDES SUPERVISOR
22 ANTONOVICH'S...?

23



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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** YES, IT DOES. SUP. ANTONOVICH'S
2 AMENDMENT WAS AGREED TO. ALL RIGHT. MIKE, DO YOU HAVE ANY
3 OTHERS?

4

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THAT'S IT. THANK YOU.

6

7 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** ALL RIGHT. SUPERVISOR MOLINA, DO
8 YOU HAVE ANY ADJOURNING MOTIONS?

9

10 **SUP. MOLINA:** YES, I DO. I HAVE TWO OF THEM.

11

12 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** YOU'RE UP. OH, I'M SORRY. HANG ON,
13 HANG ON. DR. CLAVREUL, YOU WANTED TO SPEAK? WELL, DO YOU WANT
14 TO SPEAK ON IT? WE'LL RECONSIDER IT. NO, IT'S NOT TOO LATE. IF
15 YOU'D LIKE TO SPEAK, WE'LL RECONSIDER IT. OKAY, ALL RIGHT. I
16 APOLOGIZE. THERE WERE THREE PEOPLE WHO WANTED TO BE HEARD. I'M
17 GOING TO ASK THAT WE...

18

19 **SUP. BURKE:** ALL RIGHT. I'LL MOVE TO RECONSIDER.

20

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** MOVE TO RECONSIDER. I'LL SECOND
22 IT. WITHOUT OBJECTION, IT'S BACK BEFORE US. WE HAVE ALL THE
23 AMENDMENTS BEFORE US. EVERYBODY NOW HAS THE BENEFIT OF THE
24 DISCUSSION OF THE BOARD. JENNIFER, IS IT FORKISH? AND EVELYNE
25 MICHAUT? I WANT TO KNOW HOW CLOSE I CAME TO THE PRONUNCIATION



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1 ON THAT ONE. I EITHER HIT THE JACKPOT OR I BUTCHERED BOTH OF
2 YOUR NAMES.

3

4 **JENNIFER FORKISH:** NO, YOU GOT FORKISH RIGHT.

5

6 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** FORKISH I GOT RIGHT. HOW ABOUT IS
7 IT EVELYNE?

8

9 **EVELYNE MICHAUT:** EVELYNE MICHAUT.

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** EVELYNE MICHAUT?

12

13 **EVELYNE MICHAUT:** THAT'S RIGHT.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** I WAS HALF RIGHT. ALL AHEAD, MISS
16 FORKISH.

17

18 **JENNIFER FORKISH:** ALL RIGHT, GOOD MORNING, MEMBERS OF THE
19 BOARD, MY NAME IS JENNIFER FORKISH AND I AM THE DIRECTOR OF
20 LOCAL GOVERNMENT RELATIONS FOR THE THE CALIFORNIA GROCERS
21 ASSOCIATION, A STATEWIDE TRADE ASSOCIATION REPRESENTING
22 APPROXIMATELY 500 RETAIL MEMBERS OPERATING OVER 6,000 STORES
23 IN CALIFORNIA AND NEVADA AND APPROXIMATELY 300 GROCERY
24 SUPPLIER COMPANIES. ON BEHALF OF THE CALIFORNIA GROCERS '
25 ASSOCIATION, I WANT TO EXPRESS A GENERAL CONCERN WITH THE



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1 MOTION BEING PUT FORWARD THIS MORNING. FIRST, CGA REQUESTS
2 THAT TWO FACTUAL INACCURACIES IN THE MOTION BE CORRECTED. THE
3 SECOND PARAGRAPH OF THE MOTION STATES, "IN OUR COMMUNITY, THE
4 PREVALENCE OF PLASTIC GROCERY BAGS, ESPECIALLY ONES MADE OF
5 PETROLEUM-BASED POLYETHYLENE, HAVE A LONG TRACK RECORD OF
6 ENVIRONMENTAL DEGRADATION." THIS STATEMENT IS MISLEADING.
7 GROCERY RETAILERS ARE NOT THE SOLE DISTRIBUTORS OF PLASTIC
8 BAGS, AS YOU'VE ALREADY DISCUSSED THIS MORNING. A WIDE VARIETY
9 OF RETAILERS UTILIZE PLASTIC BAGS. WE THEREFORE ASK THAT THE
10 STATEMENT BE AMENDED TO READ "PLASTIC CARRYOUT BAGS", A TERM
11 THAT HAS BEEN USED IN PRECEDING LEGISLATION AND THAT FURTHER
12 REFERENCES BE AMENDED AS SUCH. THE FIFTH PARAGRAPH OF THE
13 MOTION READS "SAN FRANCISCO RECENTLY BECAME THE FIRST
14 MUNICIPALITY IN THE NATION TO JOIN A GLOBAL TREND TO BAN THE
15 USE OF NON-RECYCLABLE PLASTIC BAGS IN GROCERY CHAINS AND
16 RETAIL STORES." IN FACT, SAN FRANCISCO BANNED THE USE OF ALL
17 RECYCLABLE PLASTIC BAGS. IT IS IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT THE SAN
18 FRANCISCO ORDINANCE MANDATES CERTAIN RETAILERS WHO USE PLASTIC
19 BAGS TO NOW USE PLASTIC BAGS THAT ARE COMPOSTABLE. AND THAT'S
20 SORT OF A TECHNICAL ISSUE WITH THAT. SO WE REQUEST THAT THIS
21 PORTION OF THE MOTION BE AMENDED SO THAT IT ACCURATELY
22 REFLECTS...

23

24 **SUP. BURKE:** WE HAVE DONE THAT.

25



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1 **JENNIFER FORKISH:** OKAY, GREAT. WHILE WE SUPPORT YOUR
2 WILLINGNESS TO INCLUDE OUR INDUSTRY IN AN ONGOING STUDY, FOR
3 TWO REASONS CGA BELIEVES THAT SUCH AN EVALUATION MAY BE
4 PREMATURE AT THIS TIME. FIRST, THE IMPACTS OF THE ORDINANCE
5 PASSED BY THE CITY OF SAN FRANCISCO ARE NOWHERE CLOSE TO BE
6 READY FOR EVALUATION, ESPECIALLY IN THE 90 DAYS CALLED FOR IN
7 YOUR MOTION. WHILE IT CAN BE EVALUATED SUPERFICIALLY, THE
8 IMPACTS ON THE ENVIRONMENT AND CONSUMERS, AS WELL AS THE TRUE
9 AND REAL IMPACTS ON INDUSTRY, ARE INCAPABLE OF BEING MEASURED
10 IN 90 DAYS. SECOND: ASSEMBLY BILL 2449 STATUES OF 2006
11 ESTABLISH A STATEWIDE RECYCLING PROGRAM FOR PLASTIC BAGS. AB-
12 2449 MANDATES THAT GROCERY RETAILERS WITH GROSS ANNUAL SALES
13 OF \$2 MILLION AND STORES OF 10,000 SQUARE FEET OR MORE WITH A
14 LICENSED PHARMACY PROVIDE A COLLECTION POINT FOR PLASTIC BAGS,
15 RECYCLE THE MATERIALS RETURNED BY CONSUMERS AND PROVIDE
16 REUSABLE CARRYOUT BAGS FOR CONSUMER PURCHASE BY JULY 1ST OF
17 2007. THEREFORE, THIS PROGRAM WILL NOT BE IN EFFECT DURING THE
18 TIME FRAME PRESENTED IN YOUR MOTION. THIS BILL GAINED REGIONAL
19 SUPPORT FROM SUCH LOCAL ENTITIES AS THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY
20 SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE, INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT
21 TASKFORCE WHO STRONGLY BELIEVES THAT AB-2449 WILL FURTHER
22 RECYCLING OF PLASTIC BAGS IN OUR COMMUNITY. WE STRONGLY
23 BELIEVE THAT THE SUCCESS OF THE NEW STATE PROGRAM HAS YET TO
24 BE SEEN SINCE THE IMPLEMENTATION DATE IS STILL THREE MONTHS
25 AWAY. MANY LOCAL RETAILERS, BOTH GROCERY AND NON-GROCERY, ARE



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1 CURRENTLY ESTABLISHING THE INFRASTRUCTURE TO COMPLY WITH THE
2 STATE LAW. GIVEN THAT THE IMPACTS OF THE SAN FRANCISCO PROGRAM
3 HAVE YET TO BE SEEN, AS WELL AS THE FACT THAT A STATEWIDE
4 RECYCLING PROGRAM FOCUSED SOLELY ON PLASTIC BAGS IS LESS THAN
5 THREE MONTHS FROM INITIATION, CGA ASKED THAT MEMBERS OF THE
6 LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DELAY A STUDY AT THIS
7 TIME. THANK YOU.

8

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** THANK YOU. MISS MICHAUT? AND DR.
10 CLAVREUL? YOU'LL PASS? OKAY. GO AHEAD.

11

12 **EVELYNE MICHAUT:** MY NAME IS EVELYNE MICHAUT. I'M HERE TO
13 REPRESENT NRDC, THE NATURAL RESOURCES DEFENSE COUNCIL. NRDC IS
14 A NATIONAL NONPROFIT ENVIRONMENTAL ORGANIZATION. WE HAVE
15 MEMBERS THROUGHOUT THE U.S. WE HAVE ABOUT 30, A LITTLE MORE
16 THAN 30,000 MEMBERS IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. SO I'M HERE
17 THIS MORNING TO SUPPORT THE COUNTY'S EFFORT TO ADDRESS THE
18 ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES THAT ARE CAUSED BY PLASTIC BAGS FROM
19 GROCERS OR, AS YOU POINTED OUT, ANY RETAILERS, ACTUALLY. I
20 THINK WE'RE ALL AWARE OF THESE ISSUES. A FEASIBILITY STUDY IS
21 A REALLY IMPORTANT AND NECESSARY STEP AND I WOULD LIKE TO
22 OFFER NRDC SUPPORT IN EXPLORING ALTERNATIVES FOR CARRY BAGS.
23 ONE COMMENT I'D LIKE TO MAKE IS THIS STUDY, I THINK, NEEDS TO
24 TAKE A SERIOUS LOOK AT THE EXISTING WASTE COLLECTION
25 INFRASTRUCTURE. THE REASON WHY THIS WAS DOABLE IN SAN



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1 FRANCISCO, AND WE'LL SEE THE RESULTS, BUT THEY HAVE AN
2 EXISTING FOOD WASTE COLLECTION AND A CITYWIDE COMPOSTING
3 SYSTEM THAT I'M NOT SURE EXISTS PROPERLY IN L.A., IN THE
4 COUNTY. SO IS THE GREEN WASTE COLLECTION HERE EFFECTIVE AND
5 COULD IT BE EXPANDED TO FOOD WASTE? IF IT IS EXPANDED TO FOOD
6 WASTE, WOULD THE COMPOSTING SYSTEM BE ABLE TO PROCESS THE BIO
7 BAGS? I'M TALKING, OF COURSE, IF WE'RE LOOKING AT BANNING
8 RECYCLABLE PLASTIC BAGS, PETRO PLASTICS AND INSTEAD GOING TO
9 BIO-BASED PLASTICS. SO THESE ARE DESIGNED, THIS IS PRETTY
10 TECHNICAL, THEY ARE DESIGNED TO COMPOST ONLY IN COMMERCIAL
11 COMPOSTING SYSTEMS. THEY ARE NOT GOING TO DECOMPOSE IN A
12 LANDFILL. THERE'S ANOTHER ISSUE ABOUT FINDING THOSE BIO-BASED
13 PLASTICS IF WE'RE REALLY TRYING TO MAKE ENVIRONMENTAL PROGRESS
14 HERE, BIO-BASED PLASTICS ARE WHERE THEY'RE COMING FROM. THEY
15 ARE COMING FROM DEDICATED CROPS, IN WHICH CASE, YOU'RE SETTING
16 AGRICULTURAL LAND ASIDE FROM FOOD PRODUCTION TO MAKE PLASTIC
17 BAGS. IT'S PRETTY RESOURCE-INTENSIVE. IS THAT WORTH IT? SO WE
18 DEFINITELY NEED TO LOOK AT A LOT OF ALTERNATIVES FOR CARRY

22 RETAILERS' EDUCATION AND THEN ENCOURAGING CANVAS BAGS,

19 **STAAV GOLDREICH:** YES, I'M MS. GOLDREICH.

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** OKAY. YOU'RE FIRST.

22

23 **STAAV GOLDREICH:** ALL RIGHT, I'M A SENIOR IN THE DANCE
24 DEPARTMENT OF L.A. COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE ARTS. I'VE BEEN
25 THERE ALL FOUR YEARS AND I'VE SEEN THE CHANGE THAT HAS



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1 OCCURRED FROM MY FRESHMAN YEAR TO MY SENIOR YEAR. THE FIRST
2 THREE YEARS I WAS AT THIS SCHOOL, TECHNIQUE WAS STRESSED. YOU
3 HAD TWO TECHNIQUE CLASSES A WEEK, THAT'S BALLET, AND THAT
4 PREPARED YOU FOR COLLEGE, FOR AUDITIONS, FOR JUST THE DANCE
5 WORLD IN GENERAL. THIS YEAR, I HAVE HAD ONE TECHNIQUE CLASS IN
6 THE BEGINNING OF THE YEAR AS AN ELECTIVE. AS THE YEAR
7 PROGRESSED, AND WE HAVE HAD TEACHERS WHO WERE PUSHED TO LEAVE,
8 FIRED OR LEFT ON THEIR OWN ACCORD BECAUSE OF THE
9 ADMINISTRATION, I'VE HAD TWO CLASSES A WEEK. THAT MEANS THREE
10 CLASSES I WAS SITTING OUT. NO TEACHER. OFTEN, THERE WAS NO
11 CLASS TO WORK IN. WE WERE KICK OUT OF THE ROOM BECAUSE THERE
12 WAS A COLLEGE CLASS THAT WASN'T ARRANGED PROPERLY. WE HAD TO
13 WORK OUT ON THE CONCRETE, WHICH IS VERY, VERY UNHEALTHY FOR
14 DANCERS. WE'VE-- THE TEACHERS WHO DIDN'T WANT TO PUT THEIR
15 DANCERS IN THIS KIND OF DANGER, THEY SACRIFICED THEIR CLASS SO
16 WE DIDN'T HAVE THAT PREPARATION FOR COLLEGE. AND, FOR SENIORS,
17 THIS YEAR IS THE MOST IMPORTANT. THIS IS THE YEAR WHERE YOU
18 COMPLETE YOUR TRAINING. I DIDN'T HAVE ANY OF THAT. SAFETY.
19 THIS CONCRETE ISSUE. BESIDES THAT, THROUGH OUR SHOWS, WE
20 FINALLY BOUGHT MARLEY FOR OUR STAGE. THE MARLEY WASN'T
21 PREPPED. WE HAD MANY PEOPLE FALLING. THERE COULD HAVE BEEN
22 SERIOUS INJURIES. AND WE'VE HAD A PROBLEM WITH THE CALL TIMES.
23 YOU KNOW, WE WEREN'T TOLD THE PROPER CALL TIMES. WE WERE
24 SITTING OUT IN THE COLD WITHOUT SUPERVISION BY OURSELVES FOR
25 MAYBE AN HOUR. WHEN WE TRIED TO SPEAK OUT ABOUT THESE ISSUES



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1 THAT HAVE COME UP THROUGH THE COURSE OF THE YEAR, WE WERE
2 THREATENED WITH PROBATION, NOT WALKING DURING GRADUATION. WE
3 WERE LIED TO BY THE ADMINISTRATION AND THAT'S WHAT LEADS ME TO
4 BELIEVE THAT THE ADMINISTRATION ISN'T DOING WHAT'S BEST FOR US
5 BUT WHAT'S EASIEST FOR THEM.

7 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** OKAY. SYLVIA AL MALIKI.

8

9 **SYLVIA AL MALIKI:** AL MALIKI.

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** OH, AL MALIKI. I'M SORRY.

12

13 **SYLVIA AL MALIKI:** AS YOU SAID, MY NAME IS SYLVIA AL MALIKI AND
14 I AM ALSO A SENIOR BUT I AM THE DANCE REPRESENTATIVE OF THE
15 DEPARTMENT AND I AM HERE TODAY BECAUSE THE ARTISTIC INTEGRITY
16 OF THE DANCE DEPARTMENT IS FALLING INTO DARKNESS AND PEOPLE
17 ARE EITHER NONCHALANT BECAUSE THEY DO NOT CARE OR THEY ARE
18 IGNORANT BECAUSE THEY HAVEN'T BEEN INFORMED. WE'VE HAD TWO
19 PEACEFUL PROTESTS WHICH THE STUDENTS WOULD WALK OUT DURING
20 THEIR ARTS TIMES AND THIS IS LIKE-- WE DIDN'T WANT TO DO IT
21 BUT WE WEREN'T BEING HEARD. WE HAD NO OTHER CHOICE. AND I WAS
22 PERSONALLY BLACKMAILED BY OUR PRINCIPAL, MR. GOTHOLD, WHO TOLD
23 US THAT, IF WE CONTINUED TO PROTEST, HE MIGHT NOT REWARD US
24 WITH OUR MEETING THAT WAS PROMISED TO US ON THE 24TH SO WE HAD
25 TO HAVE THE MEETING A DAY LATER WITH DAVID FLORES AND I HAD TO



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1 LEAVE BECAUSE OF AN APPOINTMENT. AND, ONCE I LEFT, IT WAS
2 CIRCULATED THAT SOMEONE TOLD DAVID FLORES THAT THE STUDENTS
3 DID NOT WISH TO MEET WITH HIM, WHICH WAS TOTALLY INCORRECT.
4 THE FIRST TIME WE WERE ACTIVE WAS AT A PARENT MEETING WHEN THE
5 STUDENTS WERE ASKED TO SPEAK BECAUSE, LIKE STAAV STATED, WE DO
6 NOT HAVE STRONG TECHNIQUE CLASSES AND, WITH OTHER PROFESSIONS,
7 YOU NEED CERTAIN CLASSES OR CERTAIN SKILLS IN ORDER TO BE THE
8 BEST YOU CAN BE AT THAT PROFESSION. SAME WITH DANCE. WE HAVE
9 NOT HAD THOSE CLASSES. AND SO WE WERE SPEAKING ABOUT IT,
10 SAYING OUR FUTURE IS AT RISK AND, WHILE THESE PARENTS ARE
11 BICKERING OR BEING BITTER, THAT OUR FUTURES ARE AT STAKE AND
12 WE WERE PHYSICALLY YELLED AT BY THE PARENTS FOR VOICING OUR
13 OPINIONS. IT'S ALSO BEEN SPECULATED THAT THIS IS A RACE ISSUE.
14 IT IS NOT A RACE ISSUE. TO PREVENT THE STUDENTS FROM GETTING
15 INTO ANY MORE DANGERS OF PROBATION, WE HAD T-SHIRTS THAT SAID
16 "PROTECT OUR LEGACY", WHICH WAS THE LEGACY OF THE DANCE
17 DEPARTMENT ITSELF AND NOT THE LEGACY OF AN INDIVIDUAL PERSON.
18 NOT ONLY DID THEY COMPLETELY MISINTERPRET WHAT THE "PROTECT
19 OUR LEGACY" MEANT BUT THEY ALSO SAID THAT NO STUDENTS OF COLOR
20 WORE THAT SO I BASICALLY THOUGHT APPARENTLY I MUST BE WHITE
21 BECAUSE I'M THE ONE THAT GOT ALL THE STUFF TOGETHER. AND NOT
22 JUST STUDENTS, AFRICAN-AMERICAN STUDENTS WORE THEM BUT ALSO
23 FILIPINOS, HISPANICS, MANY STUDENTS WROTE THAT SO THE LETTER
24 THAT WAS RECEIVED BY OUR DEPARTMENT HEAD WAS INCORRECT AND
25 WASN'T ACCURATE AT ALL. I'VE ALSO HELPED WITH THE LACHSA DANCE



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1 AUDITIONS AND IT SADDENS ME BECAUSE ALL THE GREAT THINGS THAT
2 WE ONCE HAD, COLLEGE CONNECTIONS AND STRONG CLASSES, ALL I
3 COULD TALK ABOUT AND INFORM THE PARENTS ABOUT WERE THINGS THAT
4 NO LONGER EXISTED AT THIS SCHOOL. AND I'M NO LONGER FIGHTING
5 HERE FOR MY RIGHTS BECAUSE I AM A SENIOR AND IT IS TOO LATE
6 FOR ME. I'M FIGHTING FOR THE FUTURE CLASSES SO THAT THEY CAN
7 HAVE A CHANCE AND STAND WHEN THEY GO TO COLLEGE SO THAT THEY
8 CAN FEEL PREPARED. BECAUSE, AT THIS MOMENT RIGHT NOW, WITHIN
9 FOUR YEARS, THERE WILL NOT BE A DANCE DEPARTMENT BECAUSE THE
10 PEOPLE THAT MADE THE DEPARTMENT SO GREAT ARE GONE. AND WE HAD
11 NINE TEACHERS. ONLY THREE OF THE ORIGINAL TEACHERS ARE THERE
12 AND ONE IS ABOUT TO QUIT. SO ONLY TWO ORIGINAL TEACHERS ARE
13 THERE. SO THIS IS A VERY SERIOUS ISSUE.

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** OKAY, THANK YOU. SUSAN GALEAS.
16 BEFORE YOU GO ON, IS JAMES SMITH HERE? JUSTIN WHEELER? TRICIA
17 THAYER? IS TRICIA HERE? NO? RHONDA? OH, YOU'RE HERE. COME ON
18 DOWN. OKAY. THAT'S ALL THERE IS THAT WE'LL CALL FOR NOW. OKAY,
19 MS. GALEAS.

20

21 **SUSAN GALEAS:** GOOD MORNING, COUNTY SUPERVISORS, MY NAME IS
22 SUSAN GALEAS AND I'M A PARENT OF A THIRD YEAR VOCAL MUSIC
23 STUDENT AT THE L.A. COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE ARTS, AS WELL
24 AS CO-PRESIDENT OF THE FRIENDS OF ARTS HIGH ORGANIZATION. I'M
25 HERE TODAY TO ELUCIDATE FOR YOU THE CURRENT SITUATION AT



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1 LACHSA. FIRST, I'D LIKE TO PAINT A PICTURE OF THE LACHSA
2 CULTURE, AS SEEN THROUGH THE EYES OF STEVE BARBER, A
3 FACILITATOR HIRED BY SUPERINTENDENT DARLENE ROBLES TO HELP
4 RESOLVE THE MULTIPLE ISSUES THAT ARE ADVERSELY AFFECTING THE
5 SCHOOL. FOLLOWING ARE STATEMENTS, VERBATIM, FROM A RECENT
6 DOCUMENT SENT TO US BY STEVE BARBER. "US VERSUS THEM PERMEATES
7 THE SCHOOL CULTURE. WE HAVE ENCOUNTERED A CULTURE OF CONFLICT
8 WHEREIN THE UNCONSCIOUS COMPETENCE OF ALL PARTIES EVOLVES TO
9 AN ANTAGONISTIC CRESCENDO IN SUCH A FASHION THAT ALL
10 ENGAGEMENTS, CONVERSATIONS AND ISSUES ARE EVALUATED THROUGH A
11 LENS OF SIDES." "IT BECAME APPARENT TO THE FACILITATORS THAT
12 THE APPLICATION OF PROCESS TO ADDRESS THE LONG-TERM SYSTEMIC
13 ISSUES WAS BEING MADE MORE DIFFICULT BY THE INTENSITY OF
14 EMOTION AND EMOTION-DRIVEN BEHAVIORS SUCH AS LANGUAGE,
15 SUSPICION AND ASSUMPTIONS, THAT AN IMMEDIATE STEP NEEDED TO BE
16 TAKEN TO ADDRESS THE EMERGENT ISSUE OF THE PRESENCE OF ONE OF
17 THE STAKEHOLDERS IN THE RELATIONSHIP. ACCORDINGLY, THE
18 FACILITATORS HAVE INITIATED A SECONDARY MEDIATION PROCESS TO
19 ADDRESS THIS ISSUE." WHILE THIS IS FANCY LANGUAGE, IT
20 NONETHELESS PAINTS A CLEAR PICTURE FROM AN OBJECTIVE
21 PERSPECTIVE THAT THIS IS A SCHOOL THAT HAS BECOME SEVERELY,
22 SEVERELY FRACTURED BY INCOMPETENCE AND ALONG THE LINES OF RACE
23 AND POSITION. THE TRUE MISSION OF THE SCHOOL SEEMS TO HAVE
24 BEEN FORGOTTEN AND OUR KIDS ARE SUFFERING. AND IN SPITE OF
25 WHAT YOU MAY HAVE HEARD, THEY AREN'T SUFFERING BECAUSE THE



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1 PARENTS ARE CREATING CHAOS. THEY'RE SUFFERING BECAUSE THEY
2 HAVE INADEQUATE SUPERVISION, LESS THAN ADEQUATE CLASSROOM
3 SITUATIONS AND, IN ONE DEPARTMENT THIS YEAR, LITTLE TO NO ARTS
4 INSTRUCTION. THIS IS NOT A PICTURE ONE WOULD EXPECT OF A
5 NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED, AWARD-WINNING ARTS HIGH SCHOOL, IS IT?
6 AS A PARENT, COMMUNITY PROFESSIONAL AND A TAXPAYER, I HAVE
7 PERSONALLY ASKED THE LACHSA ADMINISTRATION AND L.A.C.O.E. WHY
8 THIS IS HAPPENING AT OUR SCHOOL AND THE ANSWERS I HAVE
9 RECEIVED ARE ABYSMAL. I HAVE BEEN TOLD THAT THE PROBLEM LIES
10 WITHIN THE PARENTS BEING MEDDLESOME, OVERLY CONCERNED ABOUT
11 THE EDUCATION AND WELLBEING OF THEIR CHILDREN. SHOULD PARENTS
12 NOT BE CONCERNED AND ACTIVELY INVOLVED? I HAVE BEEN TOLD THAT
13 THE LONG LIST OF GRIEVANCES BROUGHT FORTH BY CONCERNED PARENTS
14 WERE MANUFACTURED DUE TO RACISM. I AM NOT A RACIST. TAYLOR,
15 STAND UP, PLEASE. THAT IS MY DAUGHTER. SHE IS BIRACIAL. THIS
16 IS NOT ABOUT RACE. HOWEVER, THANKS TO THE EFFORTS OF CERTAIN
17 INDIVIDUALS IN LACHSA'S ADMINISTRATION, THERE IS NOW A
18 PERCEPTION THAT THIS IS ABOUT RACE AND STUDENTS AND PARENTS
19 ARE NOW BECOMING DIVIDED ALONG THOSE LINES WITH STUDENTS
20 FIGHTING STUDENTS AND PARENTS FIGHTING PARENTS. THE REAL
21 ISSUES ARE DOCUMENTED AND FOUNDED AND THEY REVOLVE AROUND
22 COMPETENCY. EVEN L.A.C.O.E.'S DAVID FLORES ACKNOWLEDGED SOME
23 OF THEM IN HIS FEBRUARY REPORT. YET THE OTHER SIDE,
24 QUOTE/UNQUOTE, "HAS DONE A PRETTY GOOD JOB OF WATERING DOWN
25 THE REAL ISSUES WITH LOUD CRIES OF RACISM". I HAVE BEEN TOLD



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1 THAT L.A.C.O.E. IS ANGRY AT THE FRIENDS OF OUR TIE
2 ORGANIZATION BECAUSE OF A VOTE OF NO CONFIDENCE REGARDING A
3 DEPARTMENT CHAIR WAS PLACED ON THE FOA SECTION OF THE SCHOOL'S
4 WEBSITE. THIS AFTER YEARS OF BRINGING FORTH GRIEVANCES TO THE
5 SCHOOL'S PRINCIPAL WITH NO RESPONSE TO DATE AND MONTHS OF
6 BRINGING ISSUES TO L.A.C.O.E.'S ATTENTION WITH NO REAL
7 RESPONSE TO DATE. A LETTER THAT RESULTED FROM A VOTE THAT TOOK
8 PLACE IN A NOVEMBER MEETING IN WHICH THE ONLY NAY WAS THE VICE
9 PRINCIPAL AND THAT LETTER WAS SENT AS AN ADDENDUM TO THE
10 MINUTES TO THE PRINCIPAL AND THE VICE PRINCIPAL TWICE WITH NO
11 INDICATION THAT THERE WERE ANY PROBLEMS BEFORE IT WAS POSTED,
12 WHICH WAS CONSISTENT WITH HOW THE MINUTES HAD BEEN POSTED
13 PREVIOUSLY. THIS, IN AND OF ITSELF, IS A CLEAR INDICATION OF
14 THE SYSTEMIC ISSUES IMPACTING THE SCHOOL, WHEN NEITHER THE
15 PRINCIPAL NOR THE VICE PRINCIPAL HAVE EITHER THE TIME OR THE
16 INCLINATION TO READ AND RESPOND TO THOSE "MEDDLESOME PARENTS"
17 AND, ONCE THE LETTER WAS SEEN, WHAT DID L.A.C.O.E. DO BUT
18 SHOOT THE MESSENGER AND FIRE THE PARENTS. AND I'VE LEARNED
19 THAT THE PROBLEMS WE SHARED WITH YOU THROUGH THE INFORMATION
20 PROVIDED TO EACH OF YOUR OFFICES EARLIER THIS YEAR IN THESE
21 BINDERS, COMMUNICATED HERE AGAIN TODAY, HAVE OCCURRED OVER AND
22 OVER AND OVER AGAIN WITH EACH NEW PRINCIPAL. DID YOU KNOW THAT
23 LACHSA HAS HAD FOUR PRINCIPALS SINCE 2000? THAT'S FOUR
24 PRINCIPALS IN LESS THAN SEVEN YEARS. THAT'S A VERY CLEAR
25 INDICATION THAT SOMETHING IS TERRIBLY WRONG IN THE LAND OF OZ.



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1 I THINK YOU NEED TO ASK L.A.C.O.E. THE QUESTION OF WHY. WHY
2 CAN'T THEY HIRE AND KEEP A GOOD PRINCIPAL? I UNDERSTAND THAT
3 THE PRINCIPAL PRIOR TO THE CURRENT ONE WAS VERY WELL QUALIFIED
4 AND VERY WELL RESPECTED. WHAT HAPPENED WITH HER? PERHAPS
5 SOMEONE FROM THIS BOARD NEEDS TO ASK THE QUESTION AND DON'T
6 ASK L.A.C.O.E. BECAUSE YOU WON'T GET THE REAL ANSWER. IF YOU
7 DON'T BELIEVE ME OR THE STUDENTS HERE TODAY OR THE ALUMNI THAT
8 WILL SPEAK TO YOU IN A MOMENT, PLEASE CONTACT THE LACHSA
9 FOUNDATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS OR STAFF, MARSHA HOBBS, THE
10 BOARD CHAIR OF THE FOUNDATION, SHEILA BERGMAN, THE EXECUTIVE
11 DIRECTOR OF THE FOUNDATION. THEY CAN SHARE WITH YOU THEIR OWN
12 OBSERVATIONS ABOUT THE SCHOOL'S HISTORY AS WELL AS THE CURRENT
13 DAILY CHALLENGES AND THEY CAN'T BE ACCUSED OF BEING MEDDLESOME
14 PARENTS. THE TRUTH IS SIMPLE. LACHSA IS BROKEN.

15

16 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** I'M GOING TO ASK YOU TO FINISH IF
17 YOU CAN. I'VE GIVEN YOU A LOT MORE TIME.

18

19 **SUSAN GALEAS:** OKAY. AND IT NEEDS IMMEDIATE REPAIR. AND THERE
20 IS NO COMMUNICATION. I'LL SUBMIT THIS SO THAT YOU ALL HAVE IT
21 BECAUSE I HAVE ANOTHER PAGE. NORMALLY I TALK FAST. THE
22 SCHOOL'S ADMINISTRATION NEEDS A COMPLETE OVERHAUL. AND WE LOOK
23 TO YOU, ONE OF WHOM IS A FOUNDER OF LACHSA, DO THE RIGHT
24 THINGS BY THE STUDENTS. L.A.C.O.E. NEEDS TO ADDRESS THE ISSUES
25 AND QUIT BLAMING THE PARENTS.



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1

2 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** OKAY. IF WE CAN GET A COPY. STEVE,
3 WILL YOU GET A COPY OF THAT FROM MS. GALEAS?

4

5 **SUSAN GALEAS:** THANK YOU.

6

7 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** JUSTIN WHEELER?

8

9 **JUSTIN WHEELER:** YES, SIR. MY NAME IS JUSTIN WHEELER. I'M
10 ACTUALLY AN ALUMNUS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE
11 ARTS. I GRADUATED IN 1994 AND I ACTUALLY THIS THE HONOR OF
12 SHAKING A COUPLE OF YOUR HANDS DURING MY GRADUATION CEREMONY.
13 THIS SHOULD FEEL VERY FAMILIAR TO YOU. I ACTUALLY SPOKE IN
14 FRONT OF THIS BODY IN 1994. I WAS A LITTLE PIMPLELY-FACED 16
15 YEAR OLD KID BUT THIS SHOULD FEEL VERY FAMILIAR. THE ISSUES
16 THAT WE ARE FACING NOW AT THE ARTS HIGH SCHOOL, WHERE TEACHERS
17 AND STUDENTS ARE AFRAID TO SPEAK OUT, THEY HAVE TO SUBMIT
18 LETTERS ON CAMPUS UNDER A PSEUDONYM BECAUSE THEY'RE AFRAID
19 THAT, IF THEY SUBMIT LETTERS UNDER THEIR OWN NAME, THEY'RE
20 GOING TO BE TERMINATED FROM THE SCHOOL, IF THEY'RE A TEACHER,
21 OR THEY'RE GOING TO BE PREVENTED FROM WALKING IN GRADUATION,
22 IF THEY'RE A STUDENT. I FACED THAT SAME THING IN 1994. THE
23 PROBLEMS WERE THERE THEN. THEY'VE ACCELERATED DRAMATICALLY IN
24 THE LAST FIVE YEARS AT THE ARTS HIGH SCHOOL. IT'S REALLY A
25 TRAGEDY WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THAT SCHOOL. THE REASON THE BOARD



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1 OF SUPERVISORS IS HEARING ABOUT THIS TODAY IS BECAUSE WE'VE
2 TRIED TO GO THROUGH THE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION. WE'VE TRIED
3 TO GO THROUGH THE COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION TO ADDRESS THIS
4 ISSUE. WE HAVE SUBMITTED LETTERS REPEATEDLY OVER THE LAST
5 SEVERAL YEARS, FORMAL LETTERS OF COMPLAINT WHICH HAVE BEEN
6 SIMPLY IGNORED. WE HAVE BEEN LIED TO BY MEMBERS OF THE COUNTY
7 OFFICE OF EDUCATION, PEOPLE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE.
8 WE'VE BEEN STONEWALLED. THEY DO THIS PROCESS EVERY YEAR. EVERY
9 YEAR THERE'S A NEW CROP OF PARENTS THAT DON'T KNOW WHAT THE
10 PROBLEMS WERE THE YEAR BEFORE AND THEY JUST BRING THOSE PEOPLE
11 IN AND KEEP RUNNING THEIR LITTLE GAME. IT SEEMS LIKE A PRETTY
12 COOL SHOW THAT THEY DO BUT IT'S GOTTEN TO THE POINT WHERE IT'S
13 RIDICULOUS. MR. ANTONOVICH, YOU AND I HAD A PHONE CONVERSATION
14 IN 1994 AFTER MY GRADUATION. YOU PROBABLY DON'T REMEMBER IT.
15 BUT YOU ASKED ME AT THAT TIME, "I SEE THAT THERE ARE SERIOUS
16 PROBLEMS AT THIS SCHOOL. WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE? WHAT CAN BE
17 DONE?" AND, AS A 16-YEAR-OLD KID NOT KNOWING A LOT, I SAID,
18 "HEY, YOU KNOW WHAT? I THINK LACHSA NEEDS TO BE RE-CHARTERED.
19 IT SEEMS LIKE THE DIVISION OF ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION UNDER THE
20 COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION IS NOT WELL EQUIPPED TO MANAGE THIS
21 SCHOOL. IT'S SIMPLY STRUGGLING TO DO IT. MAYBE IT'S NOT THEIR
22 AREA OF EXPERTISE. THEY DO A LOT OF JUVENILE DELINQUENT
23 SCHOOLS AND COURT SCHOOLS. MAYBE THE COUNTY OFFICE OF
24 EDUCATION CAN ADMINISTRATE IT BUT THE DIVISION OF ALTERNATIVE
25 EDUCATION IS NOT THE RIGHT PLACE FOR IT TO SIT." I DON'T KNOW



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1 THE COMPLEXITIES OF THE BUDGET ISSUES AS TO WHY IT WAS PUT
2 INTO THAT DIVISION BUT THE SYSTEMIC PROBLEMS THAT RECUR YEAR
3 AFTER YEAR ARE SIMPLY THE EMPIRICAL EVIDENCE THAT YOU GUYS
4 SHOULD LOOK AT TO REALIZE THAT THIS PROBLEM CANNOT BE SOLVED
5 WITHIN L.A.C.O.E. WE'RE ASKING YOU GUYS, FROM THE OUTSIDE, TO
6 DO WHAT IT IS YOU GUYS NEED TO DO TO SAVE THIS SCHOOL AND
7 PROTECT IT BECAUSE IT REALLY IS SUFFERING. I HAVE A COUPLE OF
8 LETTERS THAT I'D LIKE TO SUBMIT. ONE IS FROM THE TREASURER
9 FROM THE FRIENDS OF ARTS HIGH AND ANOTHER IS AN ARTICLE THAT
10 WAS PUBLISHED BY A LACHSA TEACHER WHO, IN FEAR OF HIS JOB,
11 SUBMITTED THIS LETTER ANONYMOUSLY TO A LOCAL NEWSPAPER.

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** THANK YOU. TRICIA THAYER. IS THIS
14 THE LAST OF THE LACHSA TESTIFIERS? THE LAST ONE THAT I HAVE, I
15 THINK. ALL RIGHT. I THINK WE NEED TO GET THE SUPERINTENDENT
16 DIRECTLY INVOLVED IN THIS. I DON'T KNOW WHAT TO PROPOSE RIGHT
17 OFF THE TOP OF MY HEAD AND I'M RELUCTANT TO SHOOT FROM THE HIP
18 OR THE LIP BUT I THINK WE OUGHT TO ENGAGE THE SUPERINTENDENT
19 DIRECTLY ON THE ISSUES THAT HAVE BEEN RAISED AND MAYBE NEXT
20 WEEK HAVE A DISCUSSION. I'LL GIVE HER A CALL MYSELF. I'M SURE
21 OTHER MEMBERS MAY WANT TO DO THAT. BUT WE'VE HAD-- THIS IS NOT
22 THE FIRST TIME WE'VE HAD IT HERE AND IT'S NOT THE FIRST TIME--
23 THIS IS NOT THE ONLY VENUE IN WHICH THESE COMPLAINTS HAVE BEEN
24 RAISED, AT LEAST WITH ME. SO I JUST THINK WE NEED TO GET IT AT
25 THE HIGHEST LEVELS. I'M NOT SAYING WHO'S RIGHT AND WHO'S WRONG



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1 BUT IT NEEDS TO GET AT THE HIGHEST LEVELS. SO WE'LL WORK ON
2 THAT. AND, UNLESS ANYBODY ELSE HAS AN ALTERNATIVE IDEA OR A
3 BETTER IDEA, I THINK WE NEED TO DO THAT. ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU
4 FOR BEING HERE AND FOR YOUR INTEREST IN THE SCHOOL. THE
5 SCHOOL'S ONLY AS GOOD AS ITS STUDENTS AND ITS PARENTS AND ITS
6 STAFF SO PARENTS ARE A VERY IMPORTANT PART OF THAT. APPRECIATE
7 IT. ALL RIGHT. TRICIA THAYER, RHONDA KING AND OLGA RAMIREZ?
8 TRICIA THAYER?

9

10 **TRICIA THAYER:** DO YOU WANT ME TO START?

11

12 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** YES.

13

14 **TRICIA THAYER:** YEAH, MY NAME IS TRICIA THAYER AND MY ADDRESS
15 IS 1572 HERBERT AVENUE, NUMBER 6. AM I SUPPOSED TO ADDRESS YOU
16 GUYS HONORABLE SUPERVISORS BECAUSE I NEVER DO-- SO, ANYWAY, I
17 HAVE A QUESTION FOR YOU AS TO WHETHER OR NOT, REGARDING THE
18 DEPARTMENT, AS TO WHETHER OR NOT YOU CONDONE THEM ENGAGING IN
19 CHICANERY AND LYING BECAUSE THAT'S WHAT THEY'RE UP TO. I WON
20 MY APPEAL BUT I DIDN'T HAVE HOUSING AT THE TIME FOR MY
21 CHILDREN. I KNOW YOU GUYS HAVE HEARD THIS STORY BEFORE BUT
22 APPARENTLY MICHAEL ANTONOVICH SAYS HE EXPECTS ME. I DON'T KNOW
23 WHAT THAT MEANS. ARE YOU GOING TO JUST, LIKE, KEEP MY KIDS SO
24 I CAN KEEP DRAGGING DOWN HERE? BUT, ANYWAY, SO I MADE A DEAL
25 WITH THE DEPARTMENT THAT, WHEN I GOT HOUSING, I WOULD GET MY



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1 KIDS BACK. NOT ONLY THAT BUT THEY WOULD HELP ME WITH HOUSING.
2 AND I'M ASKING YOU WHETHER OR NOT THEY'RE HONORABLE AND DO
3 THEY HONOR THEIR DEALS? AND SINCE YOU'RE OVER THE DEPARTMENT,
4 I'D LIKE TO TALK TO SOMEBODY BESIDES THE DEPARTMENT. I DON'T
5 KNOW WHY I SHOULD TALK TO THE DEPARTMENT ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT.
6 SO, ANYWAY, SO I PLED NO CONTEST TO A NEW PETITION IN
7 EXCHANGE, IN ADDITION TO WAIVING MY RIGHTS TO AN APPEAL, IN
8 EXCHANGE FOR HELP, QUOTE/UNQUOTE, WITH HOUSING. I EVEN HEARD
9 THE WORDS COME OUT OF JUDGE NANCY BROWN'S MOUTH HERSELF THAT,
10 "OH, YEAH, MAYBE THEY CAN PUT YOU AT THE TOP OF THE SECTION 8
11 WAITING LIST." BLAH, BLAH, BLAH. AND THEN, RON ROSS, AFTER TWO
12 MONTHS, YOU KNOW, I CALLED HIM AND IT IS ALL I COULD DO TO
13 TALK HIM INTO PUTTING ME ON THE WAITING LIST, WHICH I DON'T
14 EVEN KNOW IF HE DID THAT. SO, IN OTHER WORDS, I WAS LIED TO.
15 SO NOW I HAVE HOUSING. THE LEAST THE DEPARTMENT COULD DO IS
16 GIVE ME BACK MY KIDS LIKE THEY'RE SUPPOSED TO DO. YOU KNOW,
17 I'VE BEEN TOLD THAT FOR THREE YEARS AND THAT'S WHAT I TELL MY
18 CHILDREN. OTHERWISE, THEY'RE LYING TO ME. AND I WANT TO KNOW
19 IF YOU CONDONE THAT. WHAT THE DEPARTMENT HAS DONE TO ME AND
20 OTHER MOTHERS BECAUSE THE SYSTEM DOES NOT HELP MOTHERS IS
21 CRIMINAL. AND I'LL WRITE A BOOK ABOUT IT AND THEN YOU'LL KNOW,
22 OTHERWISE I DON'T HAVE TIME TO GO INTO IT. BUT I JUST WANT TO
23 KNOW IF THAT'S WHAT SOCIETY DOES TO MOTHERS IS DO THEY JUST
24 CAST THEM OUT THERE TO ROT?

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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** OKAY.

2

3 **TRICIA THAYER:** THAT'S ALL I HAVE TO SAY.

4

5 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** ALL RIGHT. SUP. MOLINA'S OFFICE IS
6 WORKING WITH YOU AND THEY'LL CONTINUE TO DO SO. RHONDA KING?

7

8 **RHONDA KING:** GOOD MORNING. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

9

10 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** GOOD MORNING.

11

12 **RHONDA KING:** FIRST OF ALL, I APOLOGIZE FOR BRINGING-- I GUESS
13 IT'S NOT PERSONAL BECAUSE YOU ARE OVER THE SHERIFF'S
14 DEPARTMENT. I AM A L.A. COUNTY SHERIFF'S EMPLOYEE. I WORK AT
15 THE TWIN TOWERS JAIL. I WILL HAVE 26 YEARS WITH THE COUNTY ON
16 APRIL 20TH. I'VE BEEN WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT 22 OF
17 THOSE YEARS. IN 2001, I FILED A FAIR HOUSING AND EMPLOYMENT
18 COMPLAINT AND LAWSUIT AGAINST A LIEUTENANT WITH THE SHERIFF'S
19 DEPARTMENT. I WON THAT COMPLAINT. I WAS MOVED FROM WHERE I
20 WORKED TO CARSON STATION. I WAS HARASSED BY DEPUTIES AT CARSON
21 STATION. I WAS MOVED BACK TO MEN' CENTRAL JAIL FROM WHERE I
22 STARTED, HARASSED THERE BY A CIVILIAN SUPERVISOR WHERE I HAD
23 TO TAKE OFF ON STRESS. MOVED AGAIN AFTER LEAVING, GOING BACK
24 ON STRESS, 2003, AND THEN COMING BACK, HARASSED AGAIN BY
25 DEPUTIES AND CIVILIAN PERSONNEL. I HAVE GONE THROUGH THE



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1 BUREAU OF COMPLIANCE, WHICH OVERSEES THE PROBLEMS OF THE
2 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. I WROTE YOUR BOARD LAST YEAR. OF THE
3 FIVE SUPERVISORS, SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, SUPERVISOR BURKE AND
4 SUPERVISOR MOLINA WROTE ME BACK AND SAID THAT YOU WOULD HAVE
5 THEN ROBERT TAYLOR, THE OMBUDSMAN FOR THE COUNTY, LOOK INTO MY
6 PROBLEM. ROBERT TAYLOR WROTE ME BACK AND SAID HE DID NOT
7 HANDLE THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT'S PROBLEMS AND REFERRED ME
8 BACK TO THE BUREAU OF COMPLIANCE, OKAY? IF THE DEPUTY CAN GET-
9 - THESE ARE THE DOCUMENTATION FROM THE BUREAU OF COMPLIANCE
10 SAYING THAT THEY WOULD NOT HELP ME. THEY FOUND NO FORMAL
11 INVESTIGATION, NO CAUSE FOR FORMAL INVESTIGATION. HERE'S THE
12 FOUR COPIES FOR EACH SUPERVISOR. KNABE'S NOT HERE. I KNOW
13 KNABE IS NOT HERE, I'M SORRY. AND SO THEY BASICALLY GAVE ME
14 THE RUNAROUND, THE BUREAU OF COMPLIANCE. I'M SORRY I HAVE TO
15 TAKE OFF FOUR HOURS FROM MY JOB TODAY TO COME HERE BUT I AM AT
16 MY WIT'S END. I HAVE GONE THROUGH THE BUREAU OF COMPLIANCE. I
17 HAVE GONE THROUGH LOCAL 660. LOCAL 660 REPRESENTED-- WANTED TO
18 REPRESENT ME AND HER SUPERVISOR MADE HER NOT REPRESENT ME ON A
19 MEETING WITH OUR CAPTAIN, MARCH 21ST. THAT WAS THE SECOND TIME
20 LOCAL 660 WOULD NOT REPRESENT ME REGARDING MY HARASSMENT AND
21 \$50 BEING TAKEN OUT OF MY CHECK EVERY DAY. I CANNOT AFFORD TO
22 LOSE MY JOB. I AM SUPPORTING A SON IN COLLEGE, WHO NEEDS MY
23 MEDICAL COVERAGE AT LEAST THREE MORE YEARS. I AM THE SOLE
24 PROVIDER OF MYSELF. I'M A SINGLE WOMAN. I AM BEING TAILED. I
25 STARTED GETTING TAILED AFTER MY COMPLAINT IN 2002. I GOT



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1 PULLED OVER WITH MY SON IN THE CAR BY THE DEPUTY-- WHEN I
2 FILED THOSE TWO COMPLAINTS AGAINST THE DEPUTIES AT CARSON
3 STATION FOR HARASSING ME, I GOT PULLED OVER BY HIS FRIEND WITH
4 MY SON IN THE CAR SAYING THAT I HAD A WARRANT ON MY ARREST,
5 FOR MY ARREST AT THAT ADDRESS. THERE WASN'T NO WARRANT FOR MY
6 ARREST. HE JUST PULLED ME OVER FOR HARASSMENT, OKAY?

7

8 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** I APPRECIATE IT. YOUR TIME IS UP.
9 BUT, MA'AM, GO AHEAD AND CONCLUDE.

10

11 **RHONDA KING:** TO CONCLUDE, SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY, I'M SORRY.

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** NO PROBLEM.

14

15 **RHONDA KING:** IN CONCLUSION, I WOULD JUST LIKE-- OKAY, I HAVE
16 CONTACTED THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, LEE BACA, I EMAILED HIM
17 TWO TIMES. HIS COMMANDER, ROBERTA ABNER, SHE'S SUPPOSED TO
18 HAVE LOOKED INTO THE SITUATION AND I NEVER HEARD FROM HER
19 AGAIN. THREE WEEKS AGO HIS NEW COMMANDER, TOM LANG, SAID HE
20 WAS GOING TO CALL ME BACK AND NEVER CALLED ME BACK. I AM BEING
21 HARASSED AT WORK. I AM BEING TAILED BY LONG BEACH P.D. WHEN I
22 LEAVE MY HOUSE. THIS IS ALL FOR A COMPLAINT AGAINST LIEUTENANT
23 AND TWO DEPUTIES AND RECENTLY BEING HIT BY THE ELECTRONIC GATE
24 IN THE TOWER 2. FILED A COMPLAINT AGAINST THE TOWER 2 GATE.
25 I'M SORRY TO BRING THIS TO THE BOARD'S ATTENTION BUT I'M AT MY



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1 WIT'S END BECAUSE I HAVE GONE THROUGH ALL THE AVENUES THAT I
2 CAN REGARDING THE SITUATION.

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** YEAH, AND HERE'S THE PROBLEM.
5 YOU'VE GONE TO ALL THE AVENUES AND THEY'VE ALL, I GUESS, SAID
6 THE SAME THING. THEY HAVEN'T TAKEN UP YOUR CASE.

7

8 **RHONDA KING:** YES.

9

10 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** WE'RE NOT GOING TO BE IN THE
11 POSITION-- I DON'T KNOW WHAT WE KNOW THAT YOUR UNION DOESN'T
12 KNOW, THAT THE OMBUDSMAN DOESN'T KNOW, THAT THE DEPARTMENT
13 DOESN'T KNOW, I WOULDN'T NECESSARILY TRUST ANY DEPARTMENT IN
14 THAT SITUATION, BUT THE OTHERS ARE CHARGED WITH THE
15 RESPONSIBILITY OF BACK STOPPING IT. SO I HONESTLY DON'T KNOW
16 WHAT WE CAN DO.

18 **RHONDA KING:** CAN I MAKE ONE SUGGESTION?

19

20 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** HANG ON A SECOND. SUP. MOLINA
21 ADVISED ME THAT HER OFFICE AND HER STAFF HAS BEEN WORKING WITH
22 YOU ON THIS. THE ONLY THING THAT WE COULD DO NOW IS START YOU
23 RUNNING THROUGH THE SAME THING AGAIN BUT I'M NOT INCLINED TO
24 SUGGEST THAT WE DO THAT. BOB TAYLOR AS AN OMBUDSMAN RAN A GOOD
25 SHOP. HE'S GOT A NOSE FOR PROBLEMS. AND I DON'T THINK HE WOULD



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1 HAVE OVERLOOKED THEM. THE UNION, LOCAL 660, IS A VERY
2 AGGRESSIVE REPRESENTATIVE OF ITS EMPLOYEES FROM WHERE I SIT.
3 SO I CAN'T BE THE JUDGE. I DON'T KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT WHAT YOU
4 SAID HERE TODAY.

5

6 **RHONDA KING:** AND THERE'S THE DOCUMENTATION THAT YOU GUYS BOTH
7 HAVE-- ALL HAVE. AND LIKE I SAID, AS THE SUPERVISORS OF LEE
8 BACA, BECAUSE I HAVE CONTACTED HIS OFFICE, HIS UNDERSHERIFF,
9 HIS COMMANDER.

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** WE ARE NOT THE SUPERVISORS OF LEE
12 BACA. WE DO NOT SUPERVISE LEE BACA.

13

14 **RHONDA KING:** WHO SUPERVISES LEE BACA?

15

16 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** THE PEOPLE OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY
17 ELECT HIM. HE'S AN ELECTED OFFICIAL.

18

19 **RHONDA KING:** BUT HE ANSWERS TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

20

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** NO, HE DOES NOT. HE ANSWERS TO THE
22 ELECTORATE.

23



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1 **RHONDA KING:** SO, IN OTHER WORDS, YOU CANNOT CONTACT HIS OFFICE
2 FOR HIS DEPUTIES TO STOP HARASSING ME ON THE JOB AND OFF THE
3 JOB?

4

5 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** WELL, WE CAN CERTAINLY TRY TO DO
6 THAT BUT I THINK, YOU TOLD ME YOU'VE ALREADY BEEN IN TOUCH
7 WITH HIM DIRECTLY, PERSONALLY.

8

9 **RHONDA KING:** AND IT STOPPED FOR ABOUT A MONTH AFTER HE EMAILED
10 ME BACK AND THEN, LIKE I SAID, I HAD TO CONTACT HIS OFFICE
11 AGAIN THREE WEEKS AGO.

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** ALL RIGHT. WELL, I'LL TRY TO GET--
14 NOT TRY, I WILL GET YOUR PACKAGE FORWARDED TO THEIR
15 DEPARTMENT, TO HIM AND SEE WHAT HAPPENS.

16

17 **RHONDA KING:** SIR, I WOULD LIKE A MONITOR ASSIGNED TO ME FROM
18 THE OFFICE OF AFFIRMATIVE ACTION AND COMPLIANCE FOR THE COUNTY
19 TO MONITOR MY SITUATION. I FEEL UNSAFE ON MY JOB AND OFF THE
20 JOB. I'M REQUESTING THAT.

21

22 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** I DON'T KNOW THAT WE HAVE THE
23 AUTHORITY TO DO THAT. CERTAINLY, WE DON'T HAVE THE AUTHORITY
24 TO DO THAT TODAY. BUT, SHARON? OR RAY? EITHER ONE OF YOU?

25



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1 **RAYMOND G. FORTNER, JR.:** I DON'T BELIEVE THERE WOULD BE
2 AUTHORITY TO ASSIGN A MONITOR BUT, IF SHE HAS NOT DONE SO, SHE
3 COULD PERHAPS FILE A COMPLAINT WITH DENNIS DEFOYA'S OFFICE.

4

5 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** YEAH, PERHAPS YOU CAN TALK TO HER
6 ON THE SIDE AND GIVE HER SOME...

7

8 **SHARON:** WE'LL TALK TO HER.

9

10 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN:** ...AND GIVE HER SOME ADVICE. THANK
11 YOU. MS. RAMIREZ. OLGA RAMIREZ.

12

13 **VOICE OF INTERPRETER:** GOOD MORNING. I'M MRS. OLGA RAMIREZ. I
14 HAVE BEEN VOLUNTEERING FOR SIX YEARS AT THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.
15 I AM PART OF THE COALITION OF LOS ANGELES _____ FOR
16 VOLUNTEERS. THIS IS THE SECOND TIME I'M HERE TO ASK HELP FROM
17 SUPERVISOR MOLINA. WE HAVE BEEN WORKING ON THIS PROBLEM FOR
18 ABOUT APPROXIMATELY ONE YEAR AND NOTHING HAS BEEN RESOLVED.
19 THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH CONTINUES TO ABUSE LATINOS. IN
20 THIS REPORT, WE HAVE REPORTED SEXUAL ABUSE. IN THIS REPORT, WE
21 HAVE REPORTED FRAUD, FEDERAL FRAUD. SHE ASKED ME FOR A REPORT
22 CONTAINING 33 PAGES, WHICH IS WHAT I HAVE ON HAND, WHICH WAS
23 ALSO SHARED WITH MARTHA JIMENEZ AND FOUR MEMBERS OF THE LATIN
24 COALITION. IT'S BEEN HARD WORK FOR ONE YEAR. UP TO NOW,
25 NOTHING HAS BEEN RESOLVED. THE COALITION GROUP HAS WORKED



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1 SHOULDER TO SHOULDER WITH PAPERS, PROMISES AND MEETINGS FOR A
2 WHOLE YEAR AND NOTHING HAS BEEN RESOLVED. WE'VE BEEN WORKING
3 HARD THIS WHOLE YEAR UNDER PROPOSITION 63. WE HAVE HAD
4 TRAINING, REIMBURSEMENTS, OFFICE, COMPUTERS. WE HAVE BEEN
5 FIGHTING FOR OUR RIGHTS. IT'S JUST BEEN A VERY HARD JOB FOR
6 THE WHOLE SIX YEARS INVOLVED AND NOBODY'S TAKING IT INTO
7 ACCOUNT AND THEY HAVE HAD NO RESPECT FOR THIS COALITION. THIS
8 GROUP, THIS COALITION IS ONLY ASKING THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL

11 AS I EXPLAINED TO YOU, A REPORT HAS BEEN DONE AND THERE'S A
12 CONTINUATION OF USES AND OUR PAPERWORK HAS BEEN PREPARED AND
13 UP TO NOW NOTHING HAS BEEN RESOLVED. ALL I'M ASKING IS
14 SUPERVISOR MOLINA TO UNDERSTAND THAT WE JUST WANT TO BE AN
15 INDEPENDENT COALITION OF AMERICANS. WE CAN GROW AND HELP THE
16 COMMUNITY.

17

18 **SUP. MOLINA:** (SPEAKING IN SPANISH)

19

20 **VOICE OF INTERPRETER:** MRS. RAMIREZ, WE HAVE BEEN INVESTIGATING
21 SINCE LAST YEAR AND I PROMISE YOU THAT WE WILL FIND AN ANSWER
22 FOR YOU. YOU RECEIVED SEE A RESPONSE FROM US AND WE KNOW
23 YOU'RE NOT HAPPY WITH IT. BUT WE ARE WORKING AND WE WILL
24 CONTINUE TO HELP YOU. IT IS VERY HARD DUE TO THESE
25 COMPLICATIONS.

2 **SUP. MOLINA:** WHAT I'VE SAID TO HER IS WE'VE BEEN WORKING WITH
3 HER SINCE SHE CAME LAST YEAR. WE OFFERED TO INVESTIGATE ALL OF
4 HER CLAIMS. WE INVESTIGATED ALL OF THE CLAIMS THROUGH THE

18 WHO WANT TO BE HEARD, WE'RE GOING TO GO INTO CLOSED SESSION.
