- 21 YOU PREVENTED A LOT OF KIDS FROM ENDING UP IN OUR SYSTEM. YOU
- 22 ARE COMMITTED NOT ONLY TO GOD BUT TO THE COMMUNITY. AND IT IS
- 23 AN HONOR TO HAVE YOU HERE TODAY. AND I REALLY THANK YOU FOR

- 3 RICARDO HERRERA, WITH US THIS MORNING. WE'RE RECOGNIZING HIM
- 4 BECAUSE HE'S DONE SOME INCREDIBLE WORK FOR THE IMMIGRANT
- 5 COMMUNITY AT LARGE IN NOT JUST LOS ANGELES COUNTY BUT I
- 6 BELIEVE IN THE ENTIRE STATE OF CALIFORNIA. RICARDO HAS BEEN
- 7 DOING A GREAT DEAL OF WORK WITH OUR IMMIGRANT COMMUNITIES ON

- 14 I'M VERY PLEASED TO KNOW OF THE SERVICES THAT THEY HAVE BEEN
- 15 PROVIDING NOW FOR I THINK THIS NEW EFFORT HAS JUST BEEN
- 16 INSTITUTED TO EXPAND SERVICES BECAUSE WE HAVE, I THINK BY FAR,
- 17 THE LARGEST CONCENTRATION OF MEXICAN NATIVES THAT LIVE HERE IN
- 18 THE STATE, BUT ALSO IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY. SO IT IS INDEED
- 19 ALMOST LIKE A SECOND HOME FOR THEM. BUT RICARDO HERRERA WAS
- 20 BORN ON OCTOBER 22ND, 1984, IN PUEBLA MEXICO. HE'S HERE TODAY
- 21 WITH HIS WIFE AND CHILD, WHO'S JUST FIVE MONTHS OLD. OKAY,
- 22 WELCOME. IN 2009 HE OBTAINED A LAW DEGREE WITH THE
- 23 SPECIALIZATION IN INTERNATIONAL LAW FROM THE UNIVERSIDAD DE
- 24 LAS AMERICAS IN PUEBLA. IN 2014, HE OBTAINED A SPECIALTY IN
- 25 POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL SECURITY AT THE UNIVERSIDAD ANAJUAC



- I IN THE STATE OF MEXICO. DURING 2011 AND 2012 HE SERVED AS A
- 2 PRIVATE SECRETARY OF THE SYSTEM 689 INTEGRAL DEVELOPMENT OF
- 3 THE FAMILY AND THE STATE OF PUEBLA. IN MARCH OF 2013 HE WAS
- 4 ALSO NAMED HEAD OF OFFICES ABROAD OF THE PUEBLA STATE OFFICE
- 5 FOR INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS AND MIGRANT SUPPORT. FOR THOSE THAT
- 6 ARE NOT AWARE, THE STATE OF PUEBLA IS ONE OF THE STATES IN
- 7 MEXICO, ADJACENT TO VERACRUZ WHERE MY FATHER COMES FROM OR WAS
- 8 FROM. BECAUSE OF HIS EXCELLENT PERFORMANCE, IN FEBRUARY OF
- 9 2015, HE WAS TRANSFERRED TO BE THE HEAD OF THE OFFICE OF MI
- 10 CASA ES PUEBLA IN LOS ANGELES, SAYING THAT MY HOUSE IS HERE IN
- 11 LOS ANGELES, IT'S PUEBLA. SO IT WAS A WAY OF WELCOMING NATIVES
- 12 FROM MEXICO FROM THAT PARTICULAR STATE. MI CASA ES PUEBLA IS A
- 13 NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION THAT IS FUNDED BY THE MEXICAN
- 14 GOVERNMENT. THE SERVICES THEY PROVIDE INCLUDE OBTAINING
- 15 OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS FOR MIGRANTS AND ASSISTING IN THE
- 16 REUNIFICATION OF SEPARATED FAMILIES, SOMETHING THAT I THINK
- 17 ALL OF US COULD LEARN FROM. MR. HERRERA AND MI CASA ES PUEBLA
- 18 IS DOING AMAZING WORK FOR THE COMMUNITY AND FOR THE MANY
- 19 THOUSANDS, HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS, THAT LIVE IN LOS ANGELES
- 20 COUNTY. SO PLEASE JOIN ME, MEMBERS, IN RECOGNIZING MR.

- 10 IMMIGRATION. THERE WILL BE A POWERPOINT PRESENTATION BY
- 11 SEVERAL COUNTY STAFF.

- 13 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT. SHALL WE PROCEED? MIGHT
- 14 IT BE ESTABLISHED WHO IS GOING TO LEAD IN TERMS OF THE
- 15 PRESENTATION?

- 17 FESIA DAVENPORT: GOOD MORNING, SUPERVISOR AND CHAIR. GOOD
- 18 MORNING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. FESIA DAVENPORT,
- 19 ASSISTANT CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER. AND I HAVE HERE WITH ME
- 20 ALSO THE ACTING CHIEF INFORMATION OFFICER. AND WE WILL SOON BE
- 21 JOINED BY MISS DEBRA DUARDO, SUPERINTENDENT OF LOS ANGELES
- 22 COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION. AND WE HOPE TO ALSO HAVE A
- 23 REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT THAT WILL JOIN US
- 24 SHORTLY.



- 1 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: I SEE THE MOST ABLE REPRESENTATIVE
- 2 OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IS HERE, SHERIFF MCDONNELL, DO YOU
- 3 WISH TO PRESENT? AND IF SO, PLEASE JOIN US IN OUR COLLECTIVE
- 4 PRESENTATION. MS. DAVENPORT, PLEASE PROCEED.

- 6 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO, WHILE WE ARE, I THINK, WORKING OUT OUR
- 7 TECHNOLOGICAL ISSUES, LET ME JUST REMIND THE BOARD WHY WE ARE
- 8 HERE THIS MORNING. ON DECEMBER 6, 2016, THIS BOARD ADOPTED A
- 9 MOTION. THE TITLE OF THE MOTION WAS "PROTECTING COUNTY
- 10 RESIDENTS, REGARDLESS OF IMMIGRANT STATUS." IN THAT MOTION,
- 11 THE BOARD INSTRUCTED SEVERAL DEPARTMENTS TO REPORT BACK ON
- 12 SEVERAL ISSUES. THERE WERE FIVE ISSUES DIRECTED AT BOTH THE
- 13 C.E.O.'S OFFICE AND THE C.I.O.'S OFFICE, AND THERE WERE A FEW
- 14 OTHERS DIRECTED TO L.A.C.O.E., COUNTY COUNSEL AND THE
- 15 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. SO WITH REGARD TO THE DIRECTIVES FOCUSED
- 16 ON THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE, THERE WERE FIVE THINGS. THE FIRST WAS
- 17 TO CONVERT OUR EXISTING D.A.C.A. TASKFORCE INTO A DIFFERENT
- 18 TASKFORCE, ONE THAT WAS FOCUSED ON PROTECTING COUNTY RESIDENTS
- 19 WHO HAPPEN TO BE IMMIGRANTS AND ALSO TO FOCUS ON ADVANCEMENT
- 20 ISSUES SURROUNDING THOSE RESIDENTS. THE SECOND WAS TO DEVELOP
- 21 A COUNTY-WIDE STRATEGY FOR PROTECTING THE RIGHTS OF
- 22 IMMIGRANTS. THE THIRD DIRECTIVE WAS TO ANALYZE THE FEASIBILITY
- 23 OF CREATING AN ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE WITHIN THE COUNTY
- 24 RELATED TO IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS. THE FOURTH DIRECTIVE TO THE
- 25 C.E.O.'S OFFICE WAS TO CONDUCT AN ASSESSMENT OF THE POTENTIAL



- 1 IMPACT ON THE RECEIPT OF FEDERAL FUNDING SHOULD THERE BE A
- 2 CHANGE IN FEDERAL LAW REQUIRING LOCAL JURISDICTIONS AND STATES
- 3 TO ASSIST IN THE ENFORCEMENT OF IMMIGRATION EFFORTS, IN THE
- 4 VEIN OF DEPORTATION AND THINGS OF THAT NATURE. AND THE FIFTH
- 5 DIRECTIVE DIRECTED TO THE C.I.O.'S OFFICE WAS TO DEVELOP A
- 6 PLAN FOR PROTECTING THE CONFIDENTIALITY IN THE DATA OF COUNTY
- 7 RESIDENTS. AND THAT'S DATA MAINTAINED BY THE COUNTY OF LOS
- 8 ANGELES. SO I'M GOING TO FIRST TALK ABOUT THE D.A.C.A.
- 9 TASKFORCE. YOU MAY RECALL THAT IN 2012 PRESIDENT OBAMA ISSUED
- 10 AN EXECUTIVE ORDER. AND IN THAT EXECUTIVE ORDER, IT PROVIDED
- 11 RIGHTS FOR CHILDREN WHO ARRIVED HERE IN THE UNITED STATES
- 12 WITHIN AN UNDOCUMENTED STATUS. AND IT ESSENTIALLY DEFERRED
- 13 ACTIONS THAT MIGHT BE OTHERWISE TAKEN TO TAKE EFFORTS TO
- 14 DEPORT THOSE CHILDREN. AND SO THAT'S WHAT THE ACRONYM STANDS
- 15 FOR, D.A.C.A. ONCE THAT EXECUTIVE ORDER WAS ISSUED, THIS BOARD
- 16 IMMEDIATELY WENT INTO ACTION AND REQUIRED THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE
- 17 TO CONVENE A TASKFORCE TO HELP FIGURE OUT WHAT NEEDS TO BE
- 18 DONE IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES TO IMPLEMENT D.A.C.A. AND SO
- 19 THE D.A.C.A. TASKFORCE WAS CONVENED AND THEY WERE ESSENTIALLY
- 20 AN OPERATIONAL BODY. AND WHAT I MEAN BY THAT IS THEIR FOCUS
- 21 WAS TO DEVELOP PLANS AND TO FIGURE OUT HOW TO IMPLEMENT PLANS
- 22 RELATED TO D.A.C.A. SO THE D.A.C.A. TASKFORCE, WORKING CLOSELY
- 23 WITH THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE, CREATED A REPORT. THAT REPORT
- 24 CONTAINED RECOMMENDATIONS. AND THOSE RECOMMENDATIONS WERE
- 25 PRESENTED TO AND ULTIMATELY ADOPTED BY THE BOARD. KEY AMONG



- 1 THOSE RECOMMENDATIONS WAS ONE, PROVIDING FUNDING FOR THE
- 2 PUBLIC DEFENDER'S OFFICE TO HIRE ADDITIONAL STAFF, TO HELP
- 3 PROVIDE TRAINING AND INFORMATION TO PUBLIC DEFENDERS WITHIN
- 4 THAT OFFICE RELATED TO IMMIGRATION ISSUES. ANOTHER
- 5 RECOMMENDATION FROM THAT TASKFORCE WAS TO DEVELOP A COUNTY-
- 6 WIDE WEBSITE WHICH WOULD SERVE AS AN EASY-TO-ACCESS AND SINGLE
- 7 POINT OF INFORMATION FOR FOLKS WHO MIGHT OTHERWISE BE
- 8 INTERESTED IN D.A.C.A. TO SECURE INFORMATION ABOUT THEIR
- 9 RIGHTS UNDER THE NEW D.A.C.A. PROGRAM. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT
- 10 WE HAVE FOUND IN OUR ASSESSMENT IS-- WELL LET ME START OFF BY
- 11 FIRST SAYING, SO WE COMPLIED WITH THE BOARD'S DIRECTIVE. WE
- 12 HAVE CONVERTED THE D.A.C.A. TASKFORCE INTO A NEW BODY. WE
- 13 ISSUED A LETTER IN LATE DECEMBER AND WE SHARED WITH THE
- 14 EXISTING MEMBERS THAT WE WILL BE CONVENING A MEETING SOON AND
- 15 THAT MORE DIRECTION WILL BE COMING SHORTLY. ONE OF THE THINGS
- 16 THAT WE HAVE REALIZED, HOWEVER, IS THE CURRENT D.A.C.A.
- 17 TASKFORCE IS COMPRISED PRIMARILY OF COUNTY DEPARTMENTS. AND SO
- 18 WE DO NOT FEEL THAT WE HAVE THE RIGHT MIX AND BALANCE BETWEEN
- 19 PUBLIC AND PRIVATE ON THE TASKFORCE. SO ONE OF THE
- 20 RECOMMENDATIONS IN OUR REPORT, WHICH WILL BE FORTHCOMING, IS
- 21 TO REQUIRE THAT ADDITIONAL STAKEHOLDERS BE ADDED TO THE
- 22 TASKFORCE. THE SECOND THING THAT WE WILL ALSO RECOMMEND IN OUR
- 23 REPORT ON THE 20TH IS THAT THE-- THIS NEWLY CONSTITUTED
- 24 WORKGROUP, THE PURPOSE SHOULD BE REFOCUSED. AND SO RATHER THAN
- 25 FUNCTIONING SOLELY AS AN OPERATIONAL BODY, THAT THEY SHOULD



- 1 ACTUALLY FOCUS AS A STRATEGIC ADVISORY BODY RELATED TO THE
- 2 ONGOING WORK THAT WILL BE CONDUCTED, RELATIVE TO THE ISSUE OF
- 3 IMMIGRANT RIGHTS AND PROTECTION OF THOSE RIGHTS. THE NEXT
- 4 DIRECTIVE THAT WAS DIRECTED TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE WAS TO
- 5 DEVELOP A COUNTYWIDE STRATEGY THAT HAD DEPARTMENT-SPECIFIC
- 6 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF IMMIGRANT RIGHTS.
- 7 ALTHOUGH WE HAD A VERY SHORT TIME PERIOD IN WHICH WE HAD TO
- 8 START OR COMPLETE THIS WORK, WE THAT UNDERSTANDING WHAT'S
- 9 CURRENTLY GOING ON IN A COUNTY AS LARGE AS LOS ANGELES IS KEY,
- 10 AND IT'S FOUNDATIONAL TO ANY WORK THAT WE'RE GOING TO DO FROM
- 11 THIS POINT FORWARD. SO THE C.E.O. CONDUCTED AND ISSUED 3
- 12 SURVEYS FROM LATE DECEMBER TO EARLY JANUARY. WE DID A SURVEY
- 13 ON SERVICES PROVIDED BY SELECT DEPARTMENTS. WE DID ANOTHER
- 14 SURVEY ON FEDERAL FUNDING RECEIVED FROM DEPARTMENTS WITHIN THE
- 15 COUNTY. AND THEN THE LAST SURVEY WE DID WAS A SURVEY REGARDING
- 16 DATA, WHERE WE ENQUIRED ABOUT THE TYPE OF DATA MAINTAINED IN
- 17 DEPARTMENTAL CASE MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS AND WHETHER THAT DATA WAS
- 18 SPECIFIC TO IMMIGRATION RIGHTS-- IMMIGRATION STATUS OF A
- 19 CLIENT SERVED BY THOSE DEPARTMENTS. SO FOR ALL THREE SURVEYS,
- 20 THE ANALYSIS AND THE ASSESSMENT IS ONGOING. WE CONTINUE TO GET
- 21 INFORMATION, REFINE INFORMATION AND CLARIFY INFORMATION BUT WE
- 22 DO HAVE SOME PRELIMINARY FINDINGS. WITH REGARD TO SERVICES, WE
- 23 ISSUED SURVEYS TO 18 DEPARTMENTS, AND WE HAD 100 PERCENT
- 24 RESPONSE RATE, EVEN OVER THE HOLIDAY PERIOD. AND ONE OF THE
- 25 THINGS THAT WE FOUND IS MAJORITY OF THE DEPARTMENTS THAT WE



- 1 SURVEYED DID NOT REQUIRE OR EVEN ENQUIRE ABOUT IMMIGRATION
- 2 STATUS. WE HAD A FEW DEPARTMENTS THAT DID ENQUIRE AND/OR
- 3 REQUIRE INFORMATION ABOUT IMMIGRATION STATUS IN OUR ACTING
- 4 C.I.O. PETER LOO WILL DISCUSS THE FINDINGS FROM THOSE
- 5 DEPARTMENTS IN A LITTLE MORE DETAIL LATER. THE SECOND SURVEY
- 6 WE SENT OUT I MENTIONED WAS THE FUNDING SURVEY. AND THE
- 7 QUESTION THAT WE WERE TRYING TO FIND THERE IS: WHAT IS THE
- 8 AMOUNT OF FEDERAL DOLLARS FLOWING THROUGH THE COUNTY OF LOS
- 9 ANGELES, NOT ONLY DIRECTLY FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, BUT
- 10 ALSO THAT IS FUNNELED THROUGH THE STATE. THIS IS WHAT'S
- 11 PROBABLY ONE OF THE MORE DIFFICULT SURVEYS IN THAT THERE WAS
- 12 MUCH BACK AND FORTH CONVERSATIONS WITH THE DEPARTMENT TO MAKE
- 13 SURE THAT WE WERE TALKING ABOUT THE SAME THING AND TO MAKE
- 14 SURE THAT WE WERE CLARIFYING THAT WE WERE UNDERSTANDING THE
- 15 INFORMATION AS THEY PROVIDED IT. SO WHAT WE INTEND TO DO IS IN
- 16 OUR WRITTEN REPORT ON THE 20TH, WE THINK THAT WE HAVE SOME
- 17 PRELIMINARY INFORMATION BUT WE KNOW THAT THAT THAT INFORMATION
- 18 NEEDS TO BE CONFIRMED AND VETTED AND WE WILL INCLUDE SPECIFIC
- 19 NUMBERS IN OUR WRITTEN REPORT ON THE 20TH. THE THIRD SURVEY WE
- 20 CONDUCTED WAS A SURVEY ABOUT DATA. AND IN THIS SURVEY AS I
- 21 MENTIONED EARLIER, WE ASKED A COUPLE OF QUESTIONS. WE WANTED
- 22 TO KNOW THE CASE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM THAT IS USED BY THE 18
- 23 DEPARTMENTS, DO YOU CAPTURE, DO YOU RECORD INFORMATION ABOUT
- 24 IMMIGRATION STATUS? THAT WAS ONE OF THE QUESTIONS THAT WE
- 25 ASKED. ONE OF THE OTHER QUESTIONS THAT WE ASKED IS: IS YOUR



- 1 CASE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM PART OF A LARGER SYSTEM, LIKE A
- 2 STATEWIDE SYSTEM? ANOTHER QUESTION WE ASKED WAS: WHO FUNDS THE
- 3 DEVELOPMENT AND THE MAINTENANCE OF YOUR CASE MANAGEMENT
- 4 SYSTEM? IS THERE ANY FEDERAL FUNDING FLOWING TO YOUR
- 5 DEPARTMENT, POSSIBLY THROUGH THE STATE, TO MAINTAIN AND
- 6 DEVELOP THAT CASE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM? AGAIN, WE HAD 100 PERCENT
- 7 RESPONSE RATE ON THIS SURVEY. AND THE OVERWHELMING MAJORITY OF
- 8 THE DEPARTMENTS THAT RESPONDED RESPONDED IN THE NEGATIVE. THEY
- 9 DIDN'T CAPTURE THE DATA. THEY DID NOT MAINTAIN THAT DATA. THEY
- 10 WERE NOT PART OF A LARGER STATEWIDE SYSTEM, AND THEY DID NOT
- 11 RECEIVE FEDERAL FUNDING RELATIVE TO THE DEVELOPMENT AND THE
- 12 MAINTENANCE OF THAT SYSTEM. HOWEVER, THERE WERE A FEW
- 13 DEPARTMENTS THAT INDICATED YES TO ONE OR MORE OF THOSE
- 14 QUESTIONS. AND IN A COUPLE OF SLIDES, OUR ACTING C.I.O. PETER
- 15 LOO, WILL DISCUSS THOSE RESPONSES MORE SPECIFICALLY. RELATIVE
- 16 TO THE WORK THAT'S UNDERWAY, THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE RECOGNIZES
- 17 THAT THERE IS A CERTAIN LEVEL OF UNCERTAINTY, BUT WE ALSO
- 18 RECOGNIZE THAT THERE IS A PRESSING NEED TO ACT. WE KNOW THAT
- 19 THE PRESIDENT-ELECT HAS MADE REPRESENTATIONS AND PROMISES
- 20 AROUND WHAT STATEMENTS OF INTENT OF WHAT HE INTENDS TO DO ONCE
- 21 HE TAKES OFFICE. ONE OF OUR CHALLENGES WAS WHEN WE WERE TRYING
- 22 TO WORK WITH DEPARTMENTS TO ASK THEM TO HELP DEVELOP A COUNTY-
- 23 WIDE STRATEGY, THERE WAS NOT SOMETHING VERY SPECIFIC TO REACT
- 24 TO. HOWEVER, THE FACT THAT THE PLAYING FIELD MAY NOT BE AS
- 25 SPECIFIC AS WHAT ONE MIGHT DEEM NECESSARY TO DEVELOP A WELL



- 1 VETTED, SPECIFIC, REFINED PLAN, THERE IS WORK UNDERWAY. THE
- 2 COUNTY IS CURRENTLY PARTNERING WITH THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES
- 3 AND THE PHILANTHROPIC COMMUNITY ON THE JUSTICE FUND. THERE IS
- 4 WORK ALSO UNDERWAY IN TERMS OF LOOKING AT THE D.A.C.A.
- 5 WEBSITE. WE KNOW THAT THAT WEBSITE WILL NEED TO HAVE DIFFERENT
- 6 AND MORE SPECIFIC CONTENT THAT WILL BE MUCH BROADER THAN JUST
- 7 D.A.C.A. AND SO THERE ARE THINGS THAT WE BELIEVE ARE IN THE
- 8 WORKS. WE KNOW THAT THE C.E.O.'S INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS
- 9 UNIT IS ALSO WORKING WITH YOUR OFFICES TO VET IDEAS ABOUT
- 10 PROPOSALS REGARDING STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE POLICY AND
- 11 PROPOSALS THAT THIS BOARD MAY WANT TO ADOPT. ONE OF THE OTHER
- 12 THINGS THE BOARD REQUESTED WAS THAT FOR THE C.E.O. TO GIVE AN
- 13 ASSESSMENT OF THE FEASIBILITY OF CREATING AN ORGANIZATIONAL
- 14 STRUCTURE WITHIN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES RELATED TO
- 15 IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS. THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE CONDUCTED A SURVEY. AND
- 16 WE SURVEYED THREE CITIES, LOS ANGELES, NEW YORK AND SAN
- 17 FRANCISCO, AND WE LOOKED AT WHERE THEIR OFFICES WERE SITUATED.
- 18 AND ALMOST IN EACH CASE THE OFFICE WAS SITUATED IN A MAYOR'S
- 19 OFFICE, AS YOU CAN SEE WITH THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES AND THE
- 20 CITY OF NEW YORK. THEIR MISSIONS WERE ALSO VERY SIMILAR. IN
- 21 CONDUCTING THAT WORK, WE ALSO ENQUIRED ABOUT THEIR STAFFING
- 22 AND THEIR BUDGET LEVELS THAT YOU WILL SEE ON THE SECOND SLIDE.
- 23 AS YOU'LL SEE, THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES HAS-- THEY ACTUALLY
- 24 HAVE THREE POSITIONS. TWO ARE BUDGETED AND I BELIEVE THE THIRD
- 25 POSITION IS A FELLOW POSITION WITH ONE OF THE LOCAL



- 1 UNIVERSITIES. THE CITY OF NEW YORK INDICATED THAT THEY HAVE 24
- 2 POSITIONS AT A BUDGET OF \$776,000. AND THE CITY OF SAN
- 3 FRANCISCO, WE WERE-- THIS IS OUR BEST ESTIMATE. WE WERE ABLE
- 4 TO IDENTIFY 7 POSITIONS, AND WE BELIEVE THAT THEY ARE BUDGETED
- 5 AT AROUND \$350,000. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT WE WANTED TO SHOW
- 6 WITH THIS CHART IS, IN RESPONDING TO THE QUESTION ABOUT
- 7 WHETHER IT'S FEASIBLE TO HAVE THIS ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE
- 8 WITHIN THE COUNTY, THE ANSWER IS YES. AND THE QUESTION IS:
- 9 WHERE IS THE BEST FIT? AS WE LOOK AND SURVEYED VARIOUS
- 10 DEPARTMENTS, WE KEPT COMING BACK TO THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER
- 11 AND BUSINESS AFFAIRS. AND ONE OF THE REASONS WHY THAT OCCURRED
- 12 IS, AS YOU WILL SEE FROM THIS CHART, THE CHECKMARKS REPRESENT
- 13 SERVICES AND FUNCTIONS THAT ARE PROVIDED BY THE OFFICES OF
- 14 IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS AND OTHER JURISDICTIONS THAT ARE ALSO
- 15 PROVIDED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER AND BUSINESS AFFAIRS.
- 16 AND SO WE THOUGHT IT MADE GOOD FISCAL-- IT WOULD BE GOOD AND
- 17 FISCAL SOUND POLICY TO ADD THIS RESPONSIBILITY AND THIS AREA
- 18 TO AN EXISTING DEPARTMENT THAT IN SOME WAYS IS ALREADY
- 19 PROVIDING MANY OF THE SERVICES THAT ARE PROVIDED BY SIMILAR
- 20 OFFICES. THERE ARE OTHER AREAS IN THE CHART WHERE YOU SEE
- 21 COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. THAT FOURTH COLUMN., WHERE IT SAYS "NOT
- 22 APPLICABLE." THAT MEANS THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER AND
- 23 BUSINESS AFFAIRS IS NOT NECESSARILY PROVIDING THAT SERVICE
- 24 CURRENTLY. BUT OUR RECOMMENDATION IS FOR US TO WORK WITH
- 25 D.C.B.A. TO FIGURE OUT HOW THAT SERVICE COULD BE PROVIDED. SO



- 1 WITH THAT, I'M GOING TO TURN OVER THE PRESENTATION TO OUR
- 2 ACTING C.I.O., PETER LOO, TO TALK A LITTLE BIT MORE ABOUT THAT
- 3 THIRD SURVEY REGARDING DATA AND THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE
- 4 INFORMATION THAT WE ACQUIRED.

- 6 PETER LOO: GOOD MORNING, SUPERVISORS. FROM THE SURVEY
- 7 QUESTIONS THAT WE PRESENTED AND RESULTS COMING BACK, WE
- 8 IDENTIFIED FOUR DEPARTMENTS OF THE 18 THAT WERE SURVEYED THAT
- 9 A PERSON'S DOCUMENTED STATUS-- I'M SORRY? CAN YOU HEAR?

- 11 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: WE CAN HARDLY HEAR YOU. INTO THE
- 12 MIC, SIR.

- 14 PETER LOO: OKAY, THANK YOU. FROM THE SURVEY THAT WE CONDUCTED
- 15 BACK IN DECEMBER OF 2016, WE IDENTIFIED, OF THE 18 DEPARTMENTS
- 16 WE SURVEYED, FOUR DEPARTMENTS RESPONDED THAT THEY PROVIDED
- 17 ELIGIBILITY OF SERVICES BASED ON THE DETERMINATION OF
- 18 DOCUMENTED STATUS FOR THOSE SERVICES. FIVE OF THOSE
- 19 DEPARTMENTS ALSO-- THIS IS A LITTLE TYPO IN THE PRESENTATION
- 20 HERE-- BUT FIVE OF THE DEPARTMENTS ALSO REPORTED THAT THEY
- 21 MAINTAINED DATA REGARDING A CLIENT'S IMMIGRATION STATUS IN
- 22 THEIR RESPECTIVE CASE MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS, OF WHICH ONLY TWO OF
- 23 THOSE DEPARTMENTS IDENTIFIED THAT THE INFORMATION WAS
- 24 ACCESSIBLE BY STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES. AND ONLY
- 25 ONE IDENTIFIED THAT THEY HAVE REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS TO



- 1 PROVIDE ACCESS TO FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AGENCY TO THEIR CASE
- 2 MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS THAT CONTAINED CERTAIN IMMIGRATION STATUS
- 3 ABOUT THEIR CLIENTS.

4

- 5 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: MR. CHAIRMAN, IS IT APPROPRIATE TO ASK A
- 6 QUESTION?

7

- 8 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: I THOUGHT WE'D MOVE THROUGH ALL THE
- 9 QUESTIONS AND TRY TO AGGREGATE THEM. A SIMILAR QUESTION WAS
- 10 POSED BY ANOTHER MEMBER. I THINK IF WE CAN DO THAT, WE'LL GET
- 11 THROUGH IT MORE EXPEDITIOUSLY. PROCEED. AND IT'S OKAY TO PICK
- 12 UP THE PACE.

14 **PETER LOO:** SURE.

16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: THANK YOU.

17

- 18 PETER LOO: SO BASED ON THIS INFORMATION, WE BOTH HAVE
- 19 DETERMINED THAT MUCH OF THE ACCESS BY STATE AND FEDERAL
- 20 AGENCIES OF THIS CLIENT INFORMATION IN THE CASE MANAGEMENT
- 21 SYSTEMS ARE ALSO GOVERNED BY STATE AND FEDERAL REGULATORY
- 22 REQUIREMENTS. AND COUNTY COUNSEL IS PREPARED TO ADDRESS THIS
- 23 ISSUE MORE SPECIFICALLY.



- 1 ATTORNEY: AT THIS POINT, SUPERVISORS, WE DO HAVE TWO MORE
- 2 PRESENTATIONS, ONE FROM L.A.C.O.E. AND ONE FROM THE SHERIFF'S
- 3 DEPARTMENT. SORRY.

- 5 DEBRA DUARDO: GOOD MORNING, SUPERVISORS, PLEASURE TO BE HERE.
- 6 AT L.A.C.O.E., OUR PRIMARY MISSION IS MAKING SURE IN PUBLIC
- 7 SCHOOLS THE CHILDREN ARE GETTING AN EDUCATION, REGARDLESS OF
- 8 THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS. ALL CHILDREN, INCLUDING CHILDREN
- 9 THAT ARE UNDOCUMENTED, HAVE A CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHT TO A FREE
- 10 PUBLIC K-12 EDUCATION. THIS IS RECOGNIZED AS VITAL TO OUR
- 11 DEMOCRACY, AND WE ENSURE THAT WE ARE HERE TO PROTECT EXISTING
- 12 LAWS TO MAKE SURE THAT OUR CHILDREN FEEL SAFE AND PROTECTED AT
- 13 SCHOOL. WE'VE SURVEYED ALL 80-- WE SENT OUT A SURVEY TO ALL OF
- 14 OUR 80 SUPERINTENDENTS ASKING THEM HOW CHILDREN AND FAMILIES
- 15 ARE HANDLING THE CONSEQUENCES OF THE ELECTION AND HOW THEY'RE
- 16 FEELING. WE HAVE NOTICED, DEFINITELY BEEN REPORTED AN INCREASE
- 17 IN ANXIETY AND FEAR IN OUR STUDENTS ATTENDING SCHOOL AND THEIR
- 18 FAMILIES. WE HAVE POLICIES IN PLACE TO ENSURE THAT OUR SCHOOLS
- 19 ARE SAFE. WE DO NOT ASK ANY INFORMATION REGARDING
- 20 DOCUMENTATION STATUS. WE DO NOT ASK QUESTIONS REGARDING THAT.
- 21 WE DO NOT KEEP THAT TYPE OF DATA. WE LET OUR FAMILIES AND OUR
- 22 CHILDREN KNOW THAT ALL CHILDREN ARE WELCOMED WITH OPEN ARMS,
- 23 AND WE ARE DOING EVERYTHING POSSIBLE TO SUPPORT ALL 80 SCHOOL
- 24 DISTRICTS WITH INFORMATION, WITH RESOURCES FOR FAMILIES SO
- 25 THAT THEY KNOW WHERE THEY CAN GO IF THEY HAVE QUESTIONS. IN



- 1 TERMS OF SHARING INFORMATION, TRAINING, TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE,
- 2 TRAINING OUR STAFF, WE DON'T EXPECT POLICIES TO CHANGE IN
- 3 TERMS OF OUR ROLE, WHICH IS REALLY PROTECTING THE EXISTING
- 4 LAW, PRESERVING CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS, AND MAKING SURE
- 5 THAT WE HAVE ANTI-BULLYING AND SAFETY PLANS IN PLACE IN ALL OF
- 6 OUR SCHOOLS. WE AT L.A.C.O.E. ARE COMMITTED TO SERVING OUR
- 7 STUDENTS AND FAMILIES AND WORKING WITH THEM TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 8 THEIR EDUCATION IS A PRIORITY. THANK YOU.

- 10 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: PARDON ME FOR JUST A MOMENT. I'M
- 11 GOING TO ASK THE SERGEANTS TO DO THEIR JOB. LADIES AND
- 12 GENTLEMEN, ANYONE WHO IS BOOING OR ANYTHING OR HISSING OR
- 13 ANYTHING OF THAT SORT, LET ME JUST SIMPLY SUGGEST TO YOU THAT
- 14 THIS IS NOT THE VENUE IN WHICH THAT CAN HAPPEN. SO IF YOU WILL
- 15 RESPECT THOSE WHO ARE SPEAKING, I WILL ENSURE THAT THEY
- 16 RESPECT YOU WHEN YOU HAVE THE MICROPHONE. NEXT SPEAKER PLEASE,
- 17 SHERIFF?

- 19 SHERIFF JIM MCDONNELL: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THANK YOU TO
- 20 DISCUSS ONE OF THE MOST CRITICALLY IMPORTANT ISSUES THAT OUR
- 21 COUNTY IS FACING TODAY. THE PUBLIC DIALOGUE AROUND IMMIGRATION
- 22 AND THE ROLE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT IS BECOMING DANGEROUSLY
- 23 MISLEADING. THE FACT IS: LOS ANGELES COUNTY IS ONE OF THE MOST
- 24 DIVERSE COUNTIES IN OUR NATION. AS SHERIFF, I'M SWORN TO
- 25 PROTECT ALL COMMUNITIES. THERE ARE MORE THAN 10 MILLION



- 1 RESIDENTS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY. AND WE HAVE FEWER THAN 10,000
- 2 DEPUTIES TO POLICE A VARIETY OF RESPONSIBILITY IN A COUNTY
- 3 OVER 4,000 SQUARE MILES. IF PEOPLE DO NOT COME FORWARD TO
- 4 REPORT CRIMES, BEAR WITNESS TO CRIMES AND COOPERATE WITH LAW
- 5 ENFORCEMENT TO KEEP THEIR FAMILIES AND COMMUNITIES SAFE, THEN
- 6 WE WILL HAVE MORE TO WORRY ABOUT AND FEAR THAN THE WORDS
- 7 SPOKEN ON THE PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN TRAIL. CRIMINAL PREDATORS
- 8 WILL BE EMBOLDENED AND OPERATE WITH ABANDON AND FEED OFF THE
- 9 FEARS OF IMMIGRANTS IN THEIR OWN COMMUNITIES. THESE PREDATORS
- 10 WILL SAY ANYTHING TO INTIMIDATE POTENTIAL WITNESSES, INCLUDING
- 11 THE EMPTY LIES SUCH AS "GO TO THE POLICE AND THEY WILL DEPORT
- 12 YOU." HERE IS WHAT I WANT ALL COMMUNITIES TO KNOW. MY DEPUTIES
- 13 WILL NOT INITIATE ANY POLICE ACTIVITY NOR ARREST ANYONE BASED
- 14 SOLELY ON THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS. IT'S OUR PROMISE, IT'S
- 15 WRITTEN IN OUR DEPARTMENT POLICY, AND IT'S THE LAW. HOWEVER,
- 16 FOR THOSE WHO PREY ON OTHERS IN OUR COMMUNITIES, WE WILL USE
- 17 ALL AVAILABLE RESOURCES TO BE ABLE TO PROTECT ALL OF OUR
- 18 COUNTY'S RESIDENTS. AS A POLICE ORGANIZATION, COMMUNITY TRUST
- 19 IS OUR CURRENCY. WE HAVE TO WORK IN PARTNERSHIP WITH ALL OF
- 20 THE COMMUNITIES THAT WE SERVE TO BE SUCCESSFUL. THE SHERIFF'S
- 21 DEPARTMENT DOES NOT HAVE THE LEGAL AUTHORITY TO ENFORCE
- 22 FEDERAL IMMIGRATION LAWS. THIS APPLIES TO OUR PATROL SERVICES
- 23 AS WELL AS THE INMATES IN OUR CUSTODY. OUR POLICIES ARE GUIDED
- 24 IN PART BY TWO LAWS. THEY ARE THE TRUST ACT OF 2014 AND THE
- 25 TRUTH ACT OF 2016. THESE LAWS PROTECT UNDOCUMENTED INMATES IN



- 1 OUR CUSTODY. THERE'S A RIGOROUS VETTING PROCESS WHICH IS IN
- 2 PLACE THAT LIMITS I.C.E. AGENTS TO DEPORT ANY INMATE. WE WILL
- 3 PRESENT MORE DETAILS ABOUT THE PROCESS IN A MOMENT AND SUBJECT
- 4 TO YOUR QUESTIONS. I'M JOINED HERE BY ASSISTANT SHERIFFS KELLY
- 5 HARRINGTON AND EDDIE RIVERO WHO CAN DRILL DOWN IN GREATER
- 6 DEPTH. PRESIDENT-ELECT TRUMP HAS TALKED ABOUT DEPORTING 2 TO 4
- 7 MILLION PEOPLE NATIONWIDE. THIS HAS CERTAINLY BEEN THE SOURCE
- 8 OF MUCH ANXIETY. HOWEVER DURING PRESIDENT OBAMA'S
- 9 ADMINISTRATION-- (DISRUPTION OF AUDIENCE).

- 11 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: PARDON US JUST FOR A MOMENT. WOULD
- 12 YOU PLEASE PARDON US JUST FOR A MOMENT. (AUDIENCE DISRUPTION,
- 13 YELLING).

14

- 15 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, HOLD ON FOR A
- 16 MOMENT. NO, NO, NO, NO, NO. HOLD ON FOR A MOMENT. WE WILL
- 17 ESTABLISH THE APPROPRIATE PROTOCOLS AND ORDERS IN THE MEETING
- 18 AND I'M GOING TO ASK EVERYONE IF THEY WOULD JUST RESPECT THE
- 19 INSTRUCTIONS OF THE DEPUTIES. SHERIFF, PLEASE PROCEED.

- 21 SHERIFF JIM MCDONNELL: PRESIDENT-ELECT TRUMP HAS TALKED ABOUT
- 22 DEPORTING 2 TO 4 MILLION PEOPLE NATIONWIDE DURING THE
- 23 CAMPAIGN. AND THIS HAS CERTAINLY BEEN THE SOURCE OF MUCH
- 24 ANXIETY. HOWEVER DURING PRESIDENT OBAMA'S ADMINISTRATION, 2-
- 25 1/2 MILLION INDIVIDUALS WERE DEPORTED OVER A SIX-YEAR PERIOD.



- 1 THE COMPARISON IS MEANT TO PROVIDE SOME CONTEXT IN THE NUMBERS
- 2 THAT ARE BEING DISCUSSED. MY DEPARTMENT IS COMMITTED TO THE
- 3 COMMUNITIES WE SERVE. WE WHOLEHEARTEDLY VALUE THE TRUST WE'VE
- 4 DEVELOPED WITH OUR IMMIGRANT COMMUNITIES. EVERYONE, VICTIM,
- 5 WITNESS, PARENTS, TEACHERS, WORKERS FROM EVERY FIELD SHOULD
- 6 NEVER HESITATE IN REPORTING CRIME. EACH ONE OF US HAS TO BE
- 7 PART OF THE PARTNERSHIP WE VALUE SO HIGHLY IN ORDER TO KEEP
- 8 OUR COMMUNITIES SAFE. MEMBERS OF MY STAFF WILL NOW ADDRESS, IF
- 9 YOU GIVE US THE TIME, TO BE ABLE TO GIVE YOU MORE DETAILED
- 10 INFORMATION ON OUR POLICIES, OUR PRACTICES AND OUR PROTOCOLS.

- 18 FESIA DAVENPORT: SUPERVISOR, WE ALSO HAVE DR. MARK GHALY FROM
- 19 THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES.

- 21 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: LET'S MOVE TO HEALTH SERVICES.
- 22 MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, IF YOU HAVE FURTHER QUESTIONS WITH
- 23 RESPECT TO THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, LET'S POSE THEM WHEN WE
- 24 CONCLUDE THE FIRST ROUND FOR ALL SPEAKERS. IS THAT ACCEPTABLE?
- 25 ALL RIGHT. DR. GHALY.

- 2 DR. MARK GHALY: THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES, FIRST AND
- 3 FOREMOST, WE DO NOT MAINTAIN RECORDS ON A PATIENT'S
- 4 IMMIGRATION STATUS. THE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES TO WORK TOWARDS
- 5 PROVIDING ALL LEVELS OF CARE REGARDLESS OF PAYER STATUS,
- 6 IMMIGRATION STATUS AND ABILITY TO PAY. SO THAT INCLUDES
- 7 EMERGENCY ROOM AND HOSPITALIZATIONS AND PRIMARY CARE, WHICH WE
- 8 THINK IS VITAL TO KEEPING L.A. AS HEALTHY AS POSSIBLE. NEXT
- 9 SLIDE. WE CONTINUE TO WORK TO PROVIDE PRIMARY OUTPATIENT
- 10 SERVICES TO ALL INDIVIDUALS SEEKING THEM, AS WE BELIEVE THAT
- 11 IS BOTH THE MOST EFFECTIVE AND EFFICIENT WAY TO PROVIDE
- 12 SERVICES AND KEEP FAMILIES INTACT AND THE COUNTY AS HEALTHY AS
- 13 POSSIBLE. WE RECOGNIZE THAT WE DO HAVE SCARCE RESOURCES, AND
- 14 WE BELIEVE THAT OUR CONTINUED INVESTMENT IN THE PRIMARY CARE
- 15 INFRASTRUCTURE THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY IS AN IMPORTANT STRATEGY
- 16 TO DELIVER SERVICES TO ALL INDIVIDUALS SEEKING THEM. WE PLAN
- 17 TO CONTINUE IN THIS APPROACH. AND AS WE HAVE HISTORICALLY, WE
- 18 SEEK REIMBURSEMENT AFTER THE FACT AND AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE
- 19 WHENEVER POSSIBLE, WE DO SEEK REVENUE EITHER THROUGH FEDERAL
- 20 OR OTHER PROGRAMS. AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO THAT AS WE MOVE
- 21 FORWARD IN THIS PERIOD OF QUESTION AND UNCERTAINTY, WE DON'T
- 22 BELIEVE ANYTHING WITHIN D.H.S. WILL CHANGE FOR THE TIME BEING.

- 24 FESIA DAVENPORT: SUPERVISORS, THAT CONCLUDES THE PRESENTATIONS
- 25 FROM THE C.E.O., C.I.O. AND THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND



- 1 HEALTH SERVICES. AND WE ARE NOW PREPARED TO TAKE YOUR
- 2 QUESTIONS.

- 4 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT. WE HAVE A GROUP OF
- 5 QUESTIONS THAT HAVE BEEN POSITIONED. SUPERVISOR KUEHL, YOU
- 6 FIRST GOT MY ATTENTION. SUPERVISOR SOLIS, IF YOU WOULD FOLLOW.
- 7 AND THE OTHER MEMBERS AS YOU DEEM APPROPRIATE. SUPERVISOR

- 10 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MR. CHAIRMAN. FIRST OF
- 11 ALL, LET ME GENERALLY PRAISE THE APPROACHES TAKEN BY ALL FOUR
- 12 OF, LET'S SAY, OUR DEPARTMENTS BECAUSE OF COURSE THE SHERIFF
- 13 IS HIS OWN, THE C.I.O. IS NOT A DEPARTMENT, OUR AGENCY AT
- 14 L.A.C.O.E. BUT I'M VERY HEARTENED TO SEE THE WAYS IN WHICH WE
- 15 HAVE ALREADY BEGUN TO COMPORT WITH THE STATE LAW, WHICH OF
- 16 COURSE IS REQUIRED OF US, BUT IN MANY WAYS WE HAVE OUR OWN
- 17 PROCESSES. AND THOSE ARE THE ONES I KIND OF WANT TO ASK
- 18 GENERALLY ABOUT. AND I WONDER IF I MIGHT START WITH THE
- 19 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. BECAUSE THERE IS A LOT OF INFORMATION
- 20 GIVEN TO US, OBVIOUSLY, ON EVERY SIDE ON MANY ISSUES THAT THE
- 21 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, LET ME PUT IT THIS WAY, THAT I.C.E. IS
- 22 AWARE OF OUR INMATES AND THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS. AND IT'S
- 23 NOT CLEAR TO ME AT WHICH POINT IN TIME, FOR MY FIRST QUESTION,
- 24 THEY CAN BE OR ARE MADE AWARE OF THE IMMIGRATION STATUS OF
- 25 THOSE IN OUR CUSTODY. WHEN PEOPLE ARE BROUGHT INTO OUR



- 1 CUSTODY, WHAT IS THE PROCEDURE THAT LEADS TO I.C.E. BEING
- 2 AWARE OF THEIR BEING IN CUSTODY AND POTENTIALLY ASSESSING
- 3 THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS?

- 5 KELLY HARRINGTON: GOOD MORNING. LET'S SEE WHICH ONE OF THESE
- 6 WORKS.

7

- 8 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: THEY ALL WORK WHEN THEY SEE YOU IN FRONT OF
- 9 ONE ACTUALLY.

- 11 KELLY HARRINGTON: KELLY HARRINGTON, ASSISTANT SHERIFF OVER AT
- 12 THE CUSTODY DIVISION. WHAT OCCURS WHEN AN INMATE IS FIRST
- 13 BOOKED INTO THE JAIL FACILITY, THEY'RE FINGERPRINTED. AND THEN
- 14 AT THAT POINT IN TIME THEY'RE SCANNED. AND THEN THE PRINTS
- 15 AUTOMATICALLY ARE SENT TO CAL D.O.J., WHICH THEN SHARES THEM
- 16 WITH THE F.B.I., WHICH IS A CHECK FOR CRIMINAL HISTORY AND
- 17 OUTSTANDING WARRANTS. AT THAT TIME F.B.I. AUTOMATICALLY SHARES
- 18 FINGERPRINTS WITH D.H.S. AND I.C.E. TO CHECK FOR PRIOR
- 19 CONTACTS. IF THERE'S A PRIOR DETAINER THAT IS ALREADY PLACED
- 20 ON THE INDIVIDUAL, I.C.E. IS NOTIFIED BY F.B.I. AND I.C.E.
- 21 WOULD NOTIFY US AT THAT POINT IN TIME. IF THERE'S NOT A
- 22 DETAINER, THEN IT'S UP TO I.C.E. NOW AT THIS POINT IN TIME,
- 23 BASED ON THE TRUTH ACT, THEY HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO GO ON TO
- 24 THE COUNTY WEBSITE OR THE SHERIFF'S WEBSITE AND LOOK FOR THE
- 25 INDIVIDUALS THAT THEY BELIEVE THEY HAVE INTEREST IN. JUST LIKE



- 1 ANY OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY OR ANYBODY ELSE. AND SO WE'RE
- 2 NOT PROVIDING THEM ANY LONGER WITH ANY LIST OF INDIVIDUALS
- 3 THAT ARE BEING RELEASED. IT'S UP TO THE I.C.E. AGENTS TO VET
- 4 THROUGH THAT PROCESS. AND THEN THEY WOULD IDENTIFY THOSE
- 5 INMATES THAT THEY HAVE INTEREST IN.

6

- 7 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: OKAY. SO TO SOME EXTENT YOU SKIPPED FROM
- 8 THEIR INITIAL ENTRY INTO YOUR CUSTODY, WHICH I UNDERSTAND YOU
- 9 PROVIDE FINGERPRINTS FOR EVERY SINGLE PERSON BROUGHT INTO
- 10 CUSTODY TO CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE WHO THEN PROVIDES
- 11 THEM TO THE F.B.I. AND THE F.B.I. UNDOUBTEDLY PROVIDES THEM TO
- 12 OTHER FEDERAL AGENCIES. BUT YOU ARE NOT IN CONTACT WITH ANYONE
- 13 AT THAT POINT BUT THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

15 **KELLY HARRINGTON:** CORRECT.

16

- 17 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: AND EVERYONE IS REPORTED, FINGERPRINTS ARE
- 18 PROVIDED.

19

20 **KELLY HARRINGTON: RIGHT.**

- 22 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: THEN YOU WENT TO THE ISSUE OF DETAINER, THE
- 23 TRUST ACT, THE TRUTH ACT AND RELEASE, AND A DATABASE THAT
- 24 I.C.E. THEN ACCESSES , A SHERIFF'S DATABASE, TO ASCERTAIN WHO
- 25 IS BEING RELEASED, IS THAT WHAT YOU SAID?

- 7 SO ANYBODY, ANY OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY, THE PUBLIC,
- 8 I.C.E.

- 10 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: AND YOU POST THE NAMES MUCH THOSE WHO WILL
- 11 BE RELEASED IN 7 DAYS OF THE DATE OF POSTING, IS THAT CORRECT?

12

- 13 KELLY HARRINGTON: NO. THAT USED TO BE THE PRACTICE. NOW IT

- 23 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: SO A PERSON'S ATTORNEY COULD ACCESS THAT
- 24 AND KNOW WHEN THE RELEASE DATE IS, A PERSON'S FAMILY, EVEN
- 25 THOUGH IT'S A PRETTY BIG WEBSITE?

- 23 PAY ANY ATTENTION TO THE TRUTH ACT AND THE TRUST ACT? OR THEY
- 24 JUST GO AFTER EVERYBODY WHO'S BEEN ARRESTED?



- 1 KELLY HARRINGTON: NO, THEY DO PAY ATTENTION TO IT. AND THEY
- 2 NORMALLY GIVE US INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE UNDER THE TRUST ACT,

- 15 I.C.E.

- 17 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: I THINK THAT WE ARE GENERALLY IN SYNC WITH
- 18 YOU ABOUT COMPORTING WITH THE TRUTH ACT. THE PROBLEM, THOUGH,
- 19 WHEN I LOOK AT THE DATA AND I THINK WE MAY NEED A FOLLOW UP
- 20 MEETING ABOUT THIS EITHER IF I'M RIGHT OR WRONG, WHICH MEANS
- 21 IN ANY CASE, IS THAT SOME OF THE PEOPLE THAT ARE ALLOWED TO BE
- 22 RELEASED TO I.C.E. ARE NOT THE KIND-- HAVEN'T BEEN CONVICTED
- 23 OF THE KIND OF CRIMES THAT WE'VE BEEN READING, FOR INSTANCE,
- 24 SHERIFF, YOU HAVE SPOKEN ABOUT IN THE PAPER. BUT I BELIEVE

- 6 PENAL CODE SECTION THAT WE CAN GIVE YOU THERE. AND THERE'S A
- 7 WIDE VARIETY OF CRIMES. BUT THEY'RE SERIOUS OR VIOLENT
- 8 FELONIES.

- 10 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: I UNDERSTAND. BUT I THINK UNDER THE TRUTH

- 23 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: YOU KNOW, UNLESS WE GET THE INFORMATION,
- 24 THERE'S NOTHING WE CAN DO ABOUT THIS, SO IF YOU WOULDN'T MIND
- 25 LETTING US HAVE IT. (AUDIENCE SCREAMING).

- 13 OF PEOPLE IN THE AUDIENCE-- [APPLAUSE.]

- 17 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: AND A NUMBER OF THE PEOPLE WHO FEEL JUST

- 4 KELLY HARRINGTON: WELL, DEPENDING ON WHEN I.C.E. WANTS TO TAKE
- 5 THE INDIVIDUAL TO THEIR OFFICE. SO IF THEY'RE RELEASED FROM
- 6 OUR CUSTODY, THEN I.C.E., JUST LIKE ANY OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 7 AGENCY THAT WE'D RELEASE A WARRANT TO, WILL TAKE THE
- 8 INDIVIDUAL TO THEIR OFFICE AT THAT POINT IN TIME.

9

- 10 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: OKAY, THANK YOU. I WILL HAVE MORE QUESTIONS
- 11 OVER THE COURSE OF THE COUPLE WEEKS. I WANTED TO ASK MISS
- 12 DAVENPORT. IN THE REPORT FROM THE C.E.O., WHEN YOU TALKED
- 13 ABOUT THE SURVEY OF DEPARTMENTS OR WHEN YOU BOTH TALKED ABOUT
- 14 THE SURVEY OF DEPARTMENTS, IT WAS INDICATED THAT TWO
- 15 DEPARTMENTS REPORT THAT FEDERAL AGENCIES DO ACCESS THEIR
- 16 DATABASE. I'M ASSUMING IT'S BY STATUTE, BUT IT WOULD BE VERY
- 17 HELPFUL IF I KNEW THOSE TWO DEPARTMENTS? SO WE COULD PERHAPS
- 18 EVALUATE WITH THE COUNTY COUNSEL WHO'S FOLLOWING THE LAW AND
- 19 WHO'S FOLLOWING THE LAW TOO MUCH SOMETIMES?

- 21 FESIA DAVENPORT: SO WE DO HAVE THE TWO DEPARTMENTS. THOSE
- 22 DEPARTMENTS WERE D.C.F.S. AND THE CHILD SUPPORT SERVICES
- 23 DEPARTMENT. AND I DO BELIEVE THAT WE DID ASK FOR THE STATUTORY
- 24 OR REGULATORY AUTHORITY FOR THE SHARING OF THAT INFORMATION
- 25 AND THE ACCESS TO THAT INFORMATION.

- 2 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: AND THE ONE DEPARTMENT THAT REPORTED THAT
- 3 THE IMMIGRATION STATUS INFORMATION IS SHARED, IS THAT A

- 6 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES. THAT DEPARTMENT WAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC

9 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: BECAUSE THEY HAVE ALL THOSE FEDERAL FUNDS.

- 13 SUP. SHEILA KUEHL: ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN, VERY
- 14 MUCH.

- 16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR KUEHL.
- 17 SUPERVISOR SOLIS, THE FLOOR IS YOURS.

- 19 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIR. I WANT TO COMMEND THE
- 20 STAFF FOR WORKING SO QUICKLY TO PUT THIS TOGETHER. I KNOW THAT

- 1 I'VE NEVER SEEN THE COUNTY WORK SO QUICKLY. AND I KNOW THERE'S
- 2 STILL WORK TO DO. SO I KNOW THAT THE QUESTIONS THAT MY
- 3 COLLEAGUE, SUPERVISOR KUEHL, IS ASKING, I'M ALSO WANTING TO
- 4 GET FURTHER INFORMATION, IN PARTICULAR WITH THE AGENCIES THAT
- 5 WERE JUST MENTIONED. THOSE WERE SOME OF THE QUESTIONS I WOULD
- 6 HAVE ASKED. WHO ARE THOSE AGENCIES THAT ARE ACCEPTING
- 7 INFORMATION ON IMMIGRATION STATUS AND HOW THOSE REFERRALS ARE
- 8 MADE BACK, SOME OF WHICH I DO UNDERSTAND AND SOME I WOULD HAVE
- 9 QUESTIONS HAVE BUT I WANT TO SAY THAT WE ARE HERE TODAY
- 10 BECAUSE WE HAD A DISCUSSION LAST MONTH TO TALK ABOUT HOW WE
- 11 COULD PROVIDE SERVICES FOR THE IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY. I REALLY
- 12 HOPE THAT PEOPLE UNDERSTAND THAT ONE OF THE REASONS WHY WE'RE
- 13 HERE TODAY IS BECAUSE THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES IS UNLIKE MANY
- 14 OTHER PLACES AROUND THE COUNTRY. IN FACT THOSE OTHER CITIES
- 15 THAT YOU OUTLINED IN YOUR REPORT HAVE PROBABLY A MINUSCULE OF
- 16 THE NUMBER OF IMMIGRANTS AND PEOPLE THAT DON'T HAVE STATUS
- 17 HERE IN THE COUNTRY THAT WE HAPPEN TO REPRESENT BY A FAR
- 18 LARGER NUMBER. AND I LOOK AT PLACES LIKE NEW YORK CITY, WHO
- 19 HAS INVESTED CLOSE TO A MILLION DOLLARS AND STAFFED UP TO 24
- 20 POSITIONS TO HELP PROVIDE THIS ASSISTANCE. AND MANY OF THE
- 21 GOALS ARE VERY SIMILAR, SO I COMMEND THE STAFF FOR PUTTING
- 22 THAT TOGETHER. AT LEAST IT GIVES US AN IDEA WHERE WE CAN BEGIN
- 23 TO GO WITH THIS DISCUSSION. I'M VERY HAPPY THAT THE STAFF CAME
- 24 UP MEETING WITH OTHER PEOPLE OUTSIDE OF THE COUNTY. SOME OF
- 25 THE STAKEHOLDERS TO COME UP WITH WHERE THIS PARTICULAR

- 2 THAT THE CONSUMER BUSINESS AFFAIRS WOULD BE ONE OF THE MOST
- 3 LEGITIMATE PLACES TO START. BUT THAT BY NO MEANS ENDS WHERE WE
- 4 GO IN TERMS OF HOW WE PROVIDE OUR SERVICES. AND I ESPECIALLY
- 5 WANT TO THANK MR. BRIAN STIGER FOR HIS HELP IN PROVIDING THE
- 6 KIND OF FRAMEWORK THAT HAS STARTED, THINK TWO YEARS AGO, WHEN
- 7 WE STARTED WITH D.A.C.A. AND WE STARTED TO ALSO PASS MOTIONS
- 8 HERE, LEGISLATION, TO ENFORCE WAGE THEFT, TO ENFORCE THOSE
- 9 INDIVIDUALS THAT WOULD TAKE ADVANTAGE OF OUR IMMIGRANT
- 10 COMMUNITIES, NOT JUST UNDOCUMENTED BUT IN TERMS OF EVERYBODY,
- 11 FRAUD, NOTARIOS, THINGS OF THAT NATURE THAT WE KNOW HAVE
- 12 PLAGUED OUR COMMUNITIES, NO MATTER WHERE YOU ARE IN THE
- 13 COUNTY. SO THAT, I THINK, IS VERY IMPORTANT FOR THE PUBLIC TO
- 14 UNDERSTAND THAT WE'RE NOT SOMEWHAT RECREATING THE WHEEL, BUT
- 15 WE'RE ENHANCING IT. AND THE SERVICES THAT ARE BEING PROVIDED,
- 16 I THINK ARE GOING TO BE VERY IMPORTANT. AND TO SUPERINTENDENT
- 17 EDUARDO, THANK YOU FOR YOUR INPUT IN OUR EFFORTS HERE. WE
- 18 ADOPTED SOME OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS THAT YOU PUT TOGETHER IN A
- 19 REPORT BECAUSE ONE OF THE THINGS THAT CAME TO LIGHT TO ME,
- 20 VERY SHORTLY BEFORE THE HOLIDAYS, THIS WAS THANKSGIVING IN
- 21 NOVEMBER, WAS WHEN WE SAW A NUMBER OF YOUNG PEOPLE THROUGHOUT
- 22 THE COUNTY AND OTHER PARTS OF CALIFORNIA THAT WERE OUTRAGED,
- 23 THAT WERE TREMBLING, THAT WERE FEARFUL OF NOT JUST THEIR
- 24 STATUS, BECAUSE MANY WERE UNCLEAR -- MANY OF THEM WERE YOUNG,
- 25 VERY YOUNG-- BUT OTHERS WERE FEARFUL THAT SOMEHOW GOING TO



- 1 SCHOOL WOULD SOMEHOW CREATE A PROBLEM FOR THEM STAYING WITH
- 2 THEIR FAMILIES OR IF GOING TO SCHOOL AND COMING HOME IN THE
- 3 AFTERNOON THAT THEIR PARENTS WOULD DISAPPEAR. AND I REALIZE
- 4 THAT'S AVERY REAL ISSUE FOR US. I KNOW A NUMBER OF SCHOOLS IN
- 5 MY DISTRICT CAME OUT AND PEACEFULLY DEMONSTRATED. THEY WANTED
- 6 THEIR VOICES TO BE HEARD. AND I THINK THAT WHERE WE ARE TODAY
- 7 IS BECAUSE WE HAVE HEARD AN OUTPOURING OF VOICES. NOT ALL OF
- 8 THEM MAYBE ON THE SAME ISSUE, BUT NONETHELESS, THIS COUNTY

- 23 THAT GOES FOR BEYOND JUST THE 3 MILLION IMMIGRANTS THAT LIVE
- 24 IN THIS COUNTY BUT THE 10 MILLION AND MORE. AND I AM VERY
- 25 PROUD OF THAT FACT THAT THIS DAY HAS COME. WHETHER WE HAVE OUR

- 7 THAT ARE GOING ON ABOUT WHO WILL BE OUR NEXT ATTORNEY GENERAL.
- 8 I CAN'T OPINE ON THAT. BUT I WILL SAY THAT I'M INTERESTED IN
- 9 WORKING WITH OUR NEWLY, HOPEFULLY MINTED AND CONFIRMED,
- 10 ATTORNEY GENERAL IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA. AND I WILL WANT
- 11 TO HAVE THIS BOARD, ENCOURAGE THIS BOARD TO WORK WITH HIM
- 12 FORMER CONGRESSMAN JAVIER BECERRA. AND ALSO TO WORK WITH OUR
- 13 STATE LEADERS, KEVIN DE LEON, OUR SENATE PRO TEM, AS WELL AS
- 14 ASSEMBLY SPEAKER RINDON, TO FIGURE OUT HOW WE CAN MANAGE WHERE
- 15 THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA GOES. I THINK ALL OF US NEED TO COME
- 16 TOGETHER. AND I HOPE THAT WE CAN DO THIS QUICKLY. I WILL DEFER
- 17 FOR THIS MOMENT BEFORE I READ IN MY MOTION BECAUSE I KNOW
- 18 THERE ARE OTHER OUESTIONS. BUT I WANT TO AGAIN THANK
- 19 SUPERVISOR KUEHL. I WANT TO THANK THIS BOARD. I WANT TO THANK
- 20 THE INDIVIDUALS THAT HAVE COME OUT HERE. AND I HOPE THAT WE
- 21 CONTINUE TO HAVE THIS DISCUSSION AND DEBATE BECAUSE IN A
- 22 DEMOCRACY, YOU HAVE TO HEAR ALL VOICES. THANK YOU.
- 24 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR SOLIS.
- 25 SUPERVISOR HAHN FOLLOWED BY SUPERVISOR BARGER. LADIES AND

- 19 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU. DR. EDUARDO. I REALLY APPRECIATED
- 20 YOUR BRIEF PRESENTATION. I THINK CERTAINLY THAT IS WHAT HAS
- 21 STRUCK ME THROUGH ALL OF THIS IS THE FEAR THAT IS BEING FELT
- 22 IN OUR SCHOOLS, OUR CHILDREN WHO ARE GOING TO SCHOOL. AND YOU
- 23 SAID IT IS NOTICEABLE. I MEAN TEACHERS ARE TALKING ABOUT IT.
- 24 IT IS SOMETHING THAT IS REAL. WE KNOW CHILDREN, YOU KNOW,
- 25 CAN'T LEARN IF THEY COME TO SCHOOL HUNGRY. WELL, I'M SURE

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- 1 COMING TO SCHOOL FEARFUL FOR ANY REASON IMPEDES A CHILD'S
- 2 ABILITY TO LEARN. I KNOW THAT YOU HAVE PUT FORTH SOME
- 3 INITIATIVES AND SOME IDEAS ABOUT HOW WE CAN DEAL WITH THIS BUT
- 4 I JUST THOUGHT YOU COULD TAKE A MINUTE AND DO OUR PARENTS KNOW
- 5 THE RIGHTS OF THEIR CHILDREN TO HAVE AN EDUCATION K THROUGH
- 6 12? IF NOT, HOW ARE WE NOTIFYING OUR PARENTS TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 7 THEY KNOW THEIR RIGHTS? AND JUST BRIEFLY, BECAUSE WE HAVE A
- 8 LOT MORE HERE, SO BRIEFLY TALK TO US ABOUT YOUR CONCEPT OF

- 16 CHILDREN BEING AFRAID TO BE SEPARATED FROM THEIR PARENTS IN
- 17 FEAR THAT THEY MAY COME HOME AND NOT FIND THEIR PARENTS AT
- 18 HOME. SOME OF THE THINGS THAT WE'RE LOOKING AT DOING ARE
- 19 PROVIDING WORKSHOPS, AS I MENTIONED. WE HAVE INFORMATION
- 20 POSTED ON THE COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION WEBSITE. ALL OF OUR
- 21 DISTRICTS ARE POSTING INFORMATION. THEY ARE HOSTING PARENT
- 22 MEETINGS. THEY ARE WORKING WITHIN THE SCHOOLS INTEGRATING SOME
- 23 OF THIS INFORMATION INTO THE CURRICULUM, ENHANCING
- 24 OPPORTUNITIES TO LEARN ABOUT CIVIC ENGAGEMENT, HOW TO HAVE
- 25 CONVERSATIONS THAT ARE RESPECTFUL AND EDUCATIONAL ABOUT HOW



- 1 DEMOCRACY WORKS AND HOW WE CAN MAKE SURE THAT EVERYBODY HAS AN
- 2 OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE A VOICE. WE ARE WORKING THROUGH P.T.A.S.
- 3 WE ARE WORKING THROUGH PARTNERS, IN TERMS OF THE CITY OF L.A.
- 4 WE HAVE OUR YOUTH SOURCE CENTERS, OUR FAMILY SOURCE CENTERS,
- 5 WE ARE OFFERING OPPORTUNITIES TO PRESENT THERE. WE REALLY ARE
- 6 LOOKING AT MAKING SURE THAT WE ARE GETTING THE WORD OUT
- 7 THROUGH OUR OFFICE OF COMMUNICATION AND THROUGH THE OFFICE OF
- 8 COMMUNICATION THROUGH ALL OF OUR 80 SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

9

- 10 SUP. JANICE HAHN: I DO KNOW THAT INFORMATION AND KNOWLEDGE IS
- 11 POWER. I MEAN, ULTIMATELY AGAIN I THINK THE PRIMARY MESSAGE IS
- 12 THAT IT IS THE OBLIGATION AND MISSION OF OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS TO
- 13 EDUCATE ALL CHILDREN REGARDLESS OF THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS.
- 14 THIS IS A RIGHT. THESE CHILDREN HAVE A RIGHT TO AN EDUCATION.
- 15 I THINK THE MORE THAT WE CAN PROMOTE THAT MESSAGE WITH ALL
- 16 PARENTS, NOT JUST PARENTS WHO MAY BE ASKING ABOUT IT, BUT ALL
- 17 PARENTS, ALL CHILDREN, THAT EVERYONE HAS A RIGHT TO AN
- 18 EDUCATION IN OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS. AND I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT
- 19 WE'RE DOING ALL WE CAN TO PROMOTE THAT MESSAGE IN THE BEST WAY
- 20 POSSIBLE.

11 FESIA DAVENPORT: THANK YOU FOR THAT QUESTION, SUPERVISOR.

12

13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THE LOSS OF FEDERAL?

- 15 FESIA DAVENPORT: YES, POTENTIAL. THE POTENTIAL IMPACT IN LOSS
- 16 TO FEDERAL FUNDING. THERE'S TWO ANSWERS TO THAT QUESTION. IN
- 17 TERMS OF WHAT'S LEGALLY PERMISSIBLE, WHAT'S REQUIRED AND
- 18 PROHIBITED AND ALLOWED UNDER FEDERAL LEGISLATION, OUR COUNTY
- 19 COUNSEL WILL BE BRIEFING THE BOARD ON THAT ISSUE. IT'S VERY
- 20 COMPLEX AND COMPLICATED. OUR PORTION OF THE REPORT WAS TO DO A
- 21 SURVEY OF THE AMOUNT OF FEDERAL FUNDING FLOWING THROUGH THE
- 22 VARIOUS COUNTY DEPARTMENTS EITHER DIRECTLY FROM THE FEDERAL
- 23 GOVERNMENT OR THROUGH THE STATE LEVEL. WE WERE NOT ABLE TO
- 24 COMPILE ALL OF THE INFORMATION. THERE IS STILL A COUPLE OF
- 25 DEPARTMENTS WHERE WE'RE TRYING TO CLARIFY INFORMATION. WE DO



- 1 ANTICIPATE HAVING A VETTED FIGURE IN OUR REPORT, THE WRITTEN
- 2 REPORT THAT WILL BE ISSUED ON THE 20TH.

3

- 4 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO, I MEAN, IT'S FAIR TO SAY, I MEAN, FOR
- 5 EXAMPLE -- AND DR. GHALY I'D LIKE TO ASK YOU THIS QUESTION --
- 6 UNDER D.H.S., AT LEAST WHEN I WAS WORKING ON D.H.S., WE
- 7 WEREN'T ALLOWED TO ASK IMMIGRATION STATUS. WE SERVED ANYBODY
- 8 THAT WALKED INTO OUR E.R. OR IN OUR CLINICS. IS THAT STILL THE
- 9 CASE?

10

11 DR. MARK GHALY: THAT IS THE CASE.

12

- 13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: AND WOULD H.I.P.A.A. ALSO PROTECT
- 14 PEOPLE'S RIGHTS OR PATIENTS COMING IN? SO WE DON'T KNOW THEIR
- 15 IMMIGRATION STATUS. BUT THEY ALSO FALL UNDER H.I.P.A.A. WHICH
- 16 PROTECTS THEIR PRIVACY. WHAT ARE YOU DISCUSSING?

- 18 DR. MARK GHALY: SO UNDER H.I.P.A.A., WE HAVE PROTECTED HEALTH
- 19 INFORMATION OF ANYBODY THAT WE TREAT. AND INCLUDING IF THERE'S
- 20 ANYTHING IN THE NOTES OR THE PATIENT RECORD, NOT SPECIFICALLY
- 21 IN A FINANCIAL ELIGIBILITY FIELD THAT MIGHT ADDRESS AN
- 22 IMMIGRATION ISSUE. SO AS FAR AS WE'RE AWARE, WE HAVE NO
- 23 OBLIGATION TO SHARE ANYTHING IN THE RECORD BECAUSE OF
- 24 H.I.P.A.A. AND AS I SAID, WE DON'T DOCUMENT THE IMMIGRATION
- 25 STATUS OF ANY OF OUR CLIENTS WHEREVER THEY COME IN.

- 2 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO IF A DOCTOR IS WRITING SOMETHING DOWN
- 3 ABOUT PLACE OF ORIGIN OF AN INDIVIDUAL, KNOWING THAT THAT
- 4 PERSON IS NOT HERE IN THIS COUNTRY LEGALLY, THAT WOULD FALL
- 5 UNDER H.I.P.A.A.?

6

7 DR. MARK GHALY: THAT IS PROTECTED UNDER H.I.P.A.A.

8

9 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: ALL THAT WOULD FALL UNDER H.I.P.A.A.?

10

11 DR. MARK GHALY: YES.

12

- 13 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: OKAY. AND SHERIFF MCDONNELL, THE TRUST
- 14 ACT, WHICH I THINK YOU REFERENCED WHEN YOU WERE TALKING, THERE
- 15 ARE PROGRAMS LIKE THE U-VISA, WHICH ARE MEANT TO EASE TENSION
- 16 BETWEEN THE COMMUNITY AND THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. YOU
- 17 ELABORATE ON WHAT THIS U-VISA IS OR ONE OF YOUR STAFF MEMBERS
- 18 WANTS TO?

- 20 EDDIE RIVERO: YES, THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR. THE U-VISA PROGRAM
- 21 IS ADMINISTERED THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY.
- 22 AND WHAT THAT DOES IS IT GIVES A VICTIM OR WITNESS AN
- 23 OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE TEMPORARY LEGAL STATUS IF THEY ASSISTED
- 24 LAW ENFORCEMENT IN THE PROSECUTION OF A CRIME. SO THAT
- 25 TEMPORARY STATUS IS GIVEN UP TO FOUR YEARS AND AFTER THE THIRD

- 9 APPLICATIONS. EVERY STATION WITHIN OUR DEPARTMENT AND ALL
- 10 SPECIALIZED UNITS NOW HAVE A U-VISA COORDINATOR. AND THE
- 11 SHERIFF HAS APPOINTED ME AS THE DEPARTMENT'S U-VISA
- 12 COORDINATOR SO THAT WE CAN ASSURE CONSISTENCY THROUGHOUT THE
- 13 DEPARTMENT. JUST FOR THE RECORD, WHAT WE DO WHEN WE GET A U-
- 14 VISA APPLICATION IS WE EITHER CERTIFY IT THAT THE VICTIM OR
- 15 WITNESS ASSISTED US IN THE PROSECUTION OF THAT CRIME, WE
- 16 RETURN THE APPLICATION TO THE PERSON AND THEN THEY SUBMIT IT
- 17 THROUGH THEIR ADVOCATE OR LEGAL SERVICES DIRECTLY TO THE
- 18 DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY. SO WE DO NOT APPROVE THEM OR
- 19 DENY THEM. WE JUST CERTIFY THAT THEY ASSISTED IN THE
- 20 INVESTIGATION. AND WE CERTIFY 77 PERCENT OF ALL U-VISA
- 21 APPLICATIONS THAT WE RECEIVE WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT.

- 23 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: DO YOU PARTNER WITH THE-- I KNOW
- 24 SUPERVISOR SOLIS MENTIONED THE A FACT THAT THERE'S A LOT OF
- 25 NONPROFITS THAT ARE OUT THERE, THAT ARE WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP



- 1 TO HELP THE PEOPLE THAT ARE SEEKING SUPPORT WITH IMMIGRATION,
- 2 DO YOU WORK WITH THE NONPROFITS TO EDUCATE THEM ABOUT THIS
- 3 PROGRAM?

4

- 5 EDDIE RIVERO: AS A MATTER OF FACT, WE GAVE A SCROLL TO HENRY
- 6 ROMERO, AND HE IS RETIRING. SO ON HIS RETIREMENT DATE, I WILL
- 7 EFFECTIVELY TAKE OVER IN HIS POSITION. THE SHERIFF HAS
- 8 ELEVATED THE POSITION TO THE ASSISTANT SHERIFF RANK BECAUSE WE

- 16 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU. AGAIN I DON'T KNOW IF YOU WANT
- 17 TO ANSWER THIS, IF YOU WANT TO REFER THIS, BUT WE TALKED ABOUT
- 18 I.C.E. WHAT IS THE NUMERICAL DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE
- 19 INCARCERATED INMATES RELEASED FROM CUSTODY TO I.C.E. FROM THE
- 20 TIME PERIODS THAT PRE-DATE THE 287G AND OTHER STRICTER
- 21 ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS WITHIN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT TO DELAY
- 22 AFTER THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE TRUTH AND TRUST ACT? DO YOU
- 23 WANT ME TO SAY IT AGAIN?

25 KELLY HARRINGTON: YEAH, I'M SORRY, I MISSED IT.

- 4 TO I.C.E. FROM THE TIME PERIOD THAT PRE-DATED 287G AND OTHER
- 5 STRICTER I.C.E. ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS WITHIN THE SHERIFF'S
- 6 DEPARTMENT TO TODAY AFTER THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE TRUST AND

- 9 EDDIE RIVERO: SO I DON'T HAVE THOSE SPECIFIC NUMBERS PRIOR TO.
- 10 BUT IT WAS IN THE THOUSANDS.

12 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: RIGHT.

13

- 14 KELLY HARRINGTON: TO TODAY, OUT OF THE 120,000, 125,000
- 15 RELEASES, IT'S LESS THAN 1 PERCENT. IT'S ABOUT A FEW HUNDRED.
- 16 AT THE HIGH, IT'S ABOUT 111 A MONTH. AT THE LOW, I THINK IT'S
- 17 ABOUT 56. SO IT'S A VERY SMALL GROUP.

18

19 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: SO THAT NUMBER DROPPED CONSIDERABLY.

20

- 21 **KELLY HARRINGTON:** OH, YEAH, YES. IT'S PROBABLY ABOUT 1,200
- 22 OVER A YEAR'S PERIOD CONSIDERED THOUSANDS PRIOR TO.

23

24 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT?



- 1 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: ONE MORE QUESTION FOR L.A.C.O.E, I'M
- 2 SORRY. I'M APOLOGIZING TO THE AUDIENCE, FOR INTERRUPTING ME.
- 3 FOR L.A.C.O.E., YOUR RECOMMENDATIONS CALL FOR EDUCATION,
- 4 OUTREACH AND STAFF RESOURCES. HOW DO YOU SUPPOSE TO FUND THEM?
- 5 WILL FUNDS BE TAKEN OUT OF THE CLASSROOM OR OTHER PROGRAMS TO
- 6 IMPLEMENT? OR DO YOU EVEN KNOW?

7

- 8 DEBRA DURADO: SO WE DON'T KNOW YET, BUT WHAT WE'RE LOOKING AT
- 9 IS WORKING WITH ALL OF OUR 80 DISTRICTS AND HAVING THEM PLACE
- 10 SOME OF THIS FUNDING THROUGH THEIR L.C.A.P. AND THROUGH THEIR
- 11 BUDGETS AND THAT'S USING SOME OF THE RESOURCES THAT WE HAVE TO
- 12 TAKE A LEAD ON PROVIDING TRAINING TO THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS AND
- 13 HELPING THEM ORGANIZE AND SUPPORT SOME OF THESE EFFORTS.

- 15 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: ALL RIGHT. I ALSO WANT TO THANK THE STAFF
- 16 FOR PUTTING THIS REPORT TOGETHER. OBVIOUSLY I'M LOOKING AT IT
- 17 THROUGH A LITTLE DIFFERENT LENS. I AGREE WITH SUPERVISOR SOLIS
- 18 THAT THE GOAL IS NOT FOR PEOPLE TO WALK INTO THE CLASSROOM AND
- 19 BE IN FEAR THAT SOMEONE'S GOING TO KNOCK ON THE DOOR AND TAKE
- 20 THEM OUT OF THE CLASSROOM AND DEPORT THEM TO A COUNTRY THAT
- 21 THEY DON'T EVEN KNOW, OKAY. BUT AT THE SAME TIME, I ALSO
- 22 RECOGNIZE THAT ANY ACTIONS TAKEN BY THIS BOARD ARE CONTINUING
- 23 TO KEEP THESE PEOPLE IN THE SHADOWS VERSUS TAKING ACTION ON

- 5 CERTIFIED 579. WE DENIED 169.

- 7 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: DO WE KNOW, DO WE KEEP TRACK OF WHAT HAPPENS
- 8 AS A RESULT OF THAT? OR IS THAT THE END OF OUR INVOLVEMENT
- 9 THERE?

- 11 EDDIE RIVERO: WELL, THAT GOES OVER TO THE D.H.S. AND THE
- 12 APPROVAL PROCESS IS STRICTLY THROUGH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

- 14 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: IT COULD STILL CHANGE. IT COULD BE DENIED OR
- 15 APPROVED. ONCE IT LEAVES OUR OFFICES, THEN, THE JUDGMENT IS
- 16 MADE BY D.H.S.?

- 18 EDDIE RIVERO: CORRECT. AND I JUST WANT TO BE CLEAR. WE JUST
- 19 CERTIFY THAT THEY ASSISTED US BECAUSE WE DON'T HAVE THE LEGAL
- 20 AUTHORITY TO GRANT A PERSON TEMPORARY STATUS IN THIS COUNTRY.

- 22 SUP. HILDA SOLIS: AND ONE OF THE THINGS YOU DID MENTION WAS
- 23 THAT IN MANY WAYS, THIS INFORMATION IS THEN PROVIDED TO THEIR
- 24 LEGAL COUNSEL, TO THAT INDIVIDUAL. AND IN MANY CASES, PEOPLE
- 25 ARE NOT AFFORDED LEGAL COUNSEL AND THEY LOSE. I AM AWARE OF A



- 1 U-VISA BECAUSE WE'VE UTILIZED IT AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL IN
- 2 PROSECUTORIAL CASES REGARDING WAGE THEFT, IN FACT, HERE IN LOS

- 3 I.P.A.A. TASKFORCE, TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEVELOPING
- 4 STRATEGIES TO PROTECT IMMIGRANTS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY. THIS

- 25 PERHAPS THE LARGEST PERCENTAGE OF UNDOCUMENTED AND DOCUMENTED

- 2 COUNTRY. BASED UPON OUR CLOSE EXPERIENCE TO HOW REMARKABLE
- 3 THESE YOUNG PEOPLE ARE AND WHAT THEY CONTRIBUTED TO OUR
- 4 CAMPUS, OUR ECONOMY AND OUR COUNTRY, FOLLOWING THE ELECTION,
- 5 DAVID OXTERBY MOBILIZED ALMOST 600 PRESIDENTS AND CHANCELLORS
- 6 ACROSS THE COUNTRY IN A STATEMENT OF SUPPORT TO CONTINUE AND

- 20 SUPERVISORS, MY NAME IS ADELE ANDRADE STADLER. I AM A 12-YEAR
- 21 MEMBER OF BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR ALHAMBRA UNIFIED. I COME TO
- 22 SUPPORT SUPERVISOR SOLIS'S MOTION. AS A SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER, I
- 23 WITNESSED THE STUDENTS' RESPONSE TO THE PRESIDENT-ELECT'S
- 24 THREATS OF DEPORTATION OF MILLIONS OF FAMILIES. OUR KIDS
- 25 WALKED OUT OF THE CLASSROOMS. WE QUICKLY DEPLOYED OUR MENTAL



- 1 HEALTH COUNSELORS TO MAKE SURE THAT THE KIDS DID NOT LEAVE
- 2 SITE BUT DEFINITELY HAD OUR COUNSELORS WITH THEM SO THAT THEY
- 3 COULD YET STAY OUT OF CLASS AND ACTUALLY HAVE CONVERSATIONS
- 4 THAT NEEDED TO TAKE PLACE RIGHT THERE AND THEN. WE NEEDED TO
- 5 ENSURE THEM THAT NO ONE WOULD COME ON CAMPUS AND REMOVE THEM,
- 6 BUT WE COULDN'T ENSURE THAT PEOPLE COULD NOT COME TO THEIR
- 7 FAMILIES OR PARENTS. I WANT TO THANK SUPERINTENDENT DUARDO FOR

- 7 GOVERNMENT AND WORKERS AND UNDOCUMENTED PEOPLE IS LACK OF
- 8 EDUCATION, WHICH LEADS TO PRECONCEIVED PREJUDICE, WHICH CAUSES
- 9 A STASIS IN THE ADVANCEMENT OF IMMIGRANTS' RIGHTS. PEOPLE
- 10 DON'T KNOW WHAT CURRENT RIGHTS, LAWS OR REGULATIONS EXIST FOR
- 11 UNDOCUMENTED PEOPLE. D.A.C.A. PEOPLE ARE TREATED THE SAME AS
- 12 RUN-OF-THE-MILL UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS, WHEN THEY SHOULD ALL
- 13 BE TREATED THE SAME, YOU KNOW? BY HAVING THIS OFFICE, ALL
- 14 THESE DIFFERENT MYTHS ABOUT UNDOCUMENTED PEOPLE WOULD BE ABLE
- 15 TO BE DISPERSED ABOUT HOW UNDOCUMENTED PEOPLE DON'T PAY TAXES,
- 16 ABOUT HOW THEY STEAL JOBS WHEN IN REALITY THE IMMIGRANT JOBS
- 17 COMPLEMENT UNION WORKERS' JOBS. THIS PROBLEM SHOULDN'T BE A
- 18 DEMOCRATIC, REPUBLICAN, LEFT VERSUS RIGHT, PROGRESSIVE AGAINST
- 19 CONSERVATIVE ISSUE. IT COULD CREATE PROGRAMS THOUGH WHICH
- 20 IMMIGRANTS CAN BE HELPED AND THROUGH WHICH IMMIGRANTS CAN
- 21 CYCLE SOCIAL CAPITAL, AND MOMENTUM BE ASCERTAINED FROM THE
- 22 AFOREMENTIONED IN THE COMMUNITIES. THANK YOU.
- 24 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY.
- 25 WE'LL TAKE THE NEXT SPEAKER PLEASE.



- 2 MARK MASAOKA: I'M MARK MASAOKA, POLICY DIRECTOR WITH THE
- 3 ASIAN-PACIFIC POLICY AND PLANNING COUNCIL. AND WE'RE AN
- 4 ASSOCIATION OF 45 ASIAN-PACIFIC ISLANDER NONPROFITS IN LOS
- 5 ANGELES COUNTY. ASIAN-PACIFIC ISLANDERS ARE THE FASTEST
- 6 GROWING IMMIGRANT POPULATION AND ALSO THE FASTEST GROWING
- 7 UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANT POPULATION, NOW NUMBERING 130,000
- 8 UNDOCUMENTED ASIAN AND PACIFIC ISLANDERS IN LOS ANGELES
- 9 COUNTY. AND THEY PLAY IMPORTANT ROLES IN SOME OF THE
- 10 INDUSTRIES THAT ARE HELPING MAKE THE LOS ANGELES REGION A
- 11 GLOBAL CENTER OF INNOVATION AND CULTURE AND INNOVATION. SOME
- 12 OF THESE FIELDS INCLUDE TECHNOLOGY, IMPORT EXPORT, THE GARMENT
- 13 FIELD, RESTAURANTS AND HOSPITALITY AND FOOD PROCESSING. MANY

- 17 HERE IN SUPPORT OF YOUR BOLD LEADERSHIP AS COUNTY BOARD OF
- 18 SUPERVISORS, PARTICULARLY SUPERVISOR SOLIS FOR URGING THIS
- 19 MOTION. WE'RE HERE BECAUSE WE SUPPORT THE OFFICE OF IMMIGRANT
- 20 AFFAIRS WHICH REQUIRES THAT ALL COUNTY DEPARTMENTS PROTECT THE

- 4 IMMIGRATION REFORM AND CONTROL ACT WAS SIGNED INTO LAW. DURING
- 5 2011, WHEN OUR COUNTRY WAS ATTACKED, I WAS ONE OF THE PROUD
- 6 SERVICE MEMBERS WHO WORE THEIR UNIFORM IN THE NAVY AND
- 7 PROTECTED OUR COUNTRY. YOU SEE, I AM A FACE OF MANY OTHER
- 8 SOLDIERS AND VETERANS WHO ARE PART OF THE IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY.
- 9 MY PARENTS ARE RESIDENTS NOW, BUT I STILL HAVE A LOT OF FAMILY
- 10 MEMBERS WHO ARE LIVING IN THE SHADOWS. VETERANS ARE COMING
- 11 BACK WITH A LOT OF ISSUES, INCLUDING MYSELF. WHEN I CAME BACK
- 12 FROM THE SERVICE, I WAS DEALING WITH P.T.S.D. I DIDN'T KNOW AT
- 13 THE TIME THE SERVICES THAT I NEEDED, AND UNFORTUNATELY, HAD A
- 14 SUICIDE ATTEMPT. IF IT WASN'T FOR MY FAMILY CALLING THE

- 15 GIVES AN IMMENSE AMOUNT OF PRIDE TO SAY THAT WE COME FROM
- 16 POMONA. THANK YOU FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP AND THE INITIATIVE OF
- 17 THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AS WELL. BUT I'M NOT HERE NECESSARILY
- 18 TO TALK ABOUT MYSELF. I'M HERE TO TALK MORE SPECIFICALLY ABOUT
- 19 THE WORK THAT WE DO. WE'RE A WORKER CENTER. WE SEE OURSELVES
- 20 AS THE POMONA OFFICE OF IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS IN POMONA. WE

- 24 EVERYBODY GETS UP AT 5, 6 IN THE MORNING, GOES OUT TO WORK TO
- 25 BRING FOOD TO THE TABLE. ALSO SOME OF THE WORK THAT WE DO, WE



- 1 DO A LOT OF LEGAL SERVICES AROUND NATURALIZATION AND
- 2 SPECIFICALLY D.A.C.A., AS WELL. AND I'M HERE TO SPEAK-- LIKE I
- 3 SAID, I'M NOT HERE TO SPEAK ABOUT NECESSARILY THE FEAR THAT I
- 4 HAVE AS NOW AN L.P.R., BUT SOME OF THE FEAR THAT SOME OF OUR
- 5 WORKERS ARE TALKING ABOUT, BECAUSE IT'S NOT SOMETHING THAT I'M
- 6 SAYING OR THE OTHER FOLKS THAT I MENTIONED ON THIS PANEL HAVE

- 25 FUNDING FROM THE GOVERNMENT HERE. WE DON'T NEED TO USE OUR TAX



- 1 DOLLARS TO FUND ILLEGAL ALIENS BEING SMUGGLED INTO THE UNITED
- 2 STATES. I'M ALSO AGAINST, STARTING JANUARY 1ST OF THIS YEAR,
- 3 THE LEGALIZATION OF CHILD PROSTITUTION. GOVERNOR BROWN SIGNED
- 4 A BILL, S.B.1322, THE CHILDREN CANNOT PROSTITUTE. THESE

- 24 DETAINED AND HAVE BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH MENTAL ILLNESSES IN
- 25 IMMIGRATION DETENTION. I CAN TELL YOU FROM MY EXPERIENCE THAT



- 1 THE I.C.E. HOLDS GETS PUT ON ALL OF THE CLIENTS THAT I'VE SEEN
- 2 GO THROUGH THE L.A. COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. THE AMOUNT OF
- 3 TIME THESE INDIVIDUALS SPEND IN IMMIGRATION DETENTION OFTEN IS
- 4 FAR LONGER THAN THE MAXIMUM SENTENCE THEY COULD HAVE RECEIVED.
- 5 FOR EXAMPLE, I JUST HAD A CLIENT RELEASED FROM IMMIGRANT
- 6 DETENTION, WHO WAS ELIGIBLE FOR LEGAL STATUS HERE IN THE
- 7 UNITED STATES, WHICH HE RECEIVED. HE WAS ARRESTED FOR A PETTY
- 8 THEFT. HE SPENT A WEEKEND IN JAIL AND HE SPENT ALMOST TWO
- 9 YEARS IN IMMIGRATION DETENTION. AND THIS INDIVIDUAL WAS
- 10 UNREPRESENTED FOR THE FIRST YEAR IN IMMIGRATION DETENTION
- 11 SUFFERING FROM A SERIOUS MENTAL ILLNESS.

- 17 BORDEN AND I WORK WITH SEVERAL IMMIGRANT ORGANIZATIONS HERE IN
- 18 TOWN. AND I'M ALSO SPEAKING TO YOU AS A CONSTITUENT. I'D LIKE
- 19 TO FIRST OF ALL THANK YOU FOR YOUR MOTIONS IN REGARDS TO THE

- 24 POPULATIONS AND THOSE WHO ARE IN DETENTION. WE THANK YOU FOR

- 24 SUP. KATHRYN BARGER: THANK YOU. BEFORE WE GO ON, I KNOW
- 25 SHERIFF JIM MCDONNELL HAS BEEN HERE FOR QUITE A WHILE TO



- 1 TESTIFY ON THIS. I'VE REALLY EXCITED AND HONORED TO BRING THIS
- 2 MOTION IN WITH SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS. HAVING WORKED ON THIS
- 3 WHEN I FIRST CAME INTO THE COUNTY AND WE STARTED THE MENTAL
- 4 EVALUATION TEAM, I SAW THE SUCCESSES. AND I BELIEVE IN
- 5 WATCHING WHAT'S GOING ON. OUT WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT RIGHT NOW,
- 6 THERE IS NO BETTER TIME AND NO GREATER NEED AND IN OUR NEW
- 7 DIRECTOR OF MENTAL HEALTH DIVISION, REALLY DOING PEER
- 8 COUNSELING IS EXCITING TO ME AS AN OPPORTUNITY, ESPECIALLY AS
- 9 IT RELATES TO VETERANS. SO WITH THAT, I'D LIKE TO HEAR FROM
- 10 SHERIFF MCDONNELL AND FROM DR. SHERIN.

- 12 SHERIFF JIM MCDONNELL: THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR, FOR THE
- 13 OPPORTUNITY. THE PURPOSE OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY MENTAL
- 14 EVALUATION TEAM, OR M.E.T. TEAMS AS WE CALL THEM IS TO HELP
- 15 SUPPORT PATROL STATIONS IN THEIR RESPONSE AND INTERVENTIONS
- 16 INVOLVING MENTALLY ILL RESIDENTS DURING A CRISIS. PARTNERS
- 17 FROM L.A.S.D. AND DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH CONSISTENTLY
- 18 OFFER COMPASSIONATE CARE, DEPLOYING KNOWLEDGEABLE STAFF WHO
- 19 ARE SKILLED AT RECOGNIZING PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESS, WELL
- 20 PRACTICED AND ABLE TO APPLY DE-ESCALATION TECHNIQUES TO HELP
- 21 EASE SOME OF THE MOST DIFFICULT, COMPLEX AND HIGH RISK
- 22 SITUATIONS PATROL DEPUTIES FACE DAILY. THESE TEAMS RESPOND TO
- 23 PATROL DEPUTIES' REQUESTS TO BACK THEM UP. M.E.T. CONDUCTS
- 24 PATIENT FIELD EVALUATIONS, ASSESSING THEIR MENTAL HEALTH
- 25 NEEDS, AND HELPING TO CONNECT PATIENTS WITH PUBLIC AND PRIVATE



- 1 COMMUNITY RESOURCES OR TREATMENT CENTERS, DIVERTING THEM AWAY
- 2 FROM THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM WHEREVER POSSIBLE. M.E.T.
- 3 TEAMS WERE SUCCESSFUL IN DIVERTING 99 PERCENT OF PATIENTS AWAY
- 4 FROM THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM FOR THE CASES THEY HANDLED
- 5 DURING THE PAST FISCAL YEAR, WHICH TRULY I BELIEVE IS AMAZING.
- 6 M.E.T. HAS THREE PRIMARY OBJECTIVES IN SUPPORT OF THE MISSION.
- 7 M.E.T. UNITS ATTEMPT TO DIVERT MENTALLY ILL CITIZENS AWAY FROM
- 8 THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM WHEREVER POSSIBLE BY SEEKING
- 9 APPROPRIATE REMEDY TREATMENT OPTIONS FOR PATIENTS VIA NETWORK
- 10 OF COMMUNITY RESOURCES SPECIALIZING IN THE TREATMENT OF MENTAL
- 11 HEALTH DISORDERS. M.E.T. REMAINS WITH EACH PATIENT AND SEES
- 12 THEM THROUGH THE PROCESS ENSURING THEY'RE PROPERLY CONNECTED
- 13 TO TREATMENT RESOURCES. THIS HELPS RELIEVE PATROL DEPUTIES OF
- 14 TIME CONSUMING TASKS, ALLOWING PATROL DEPUTIES TO RESUME
- 15 NORMAL OPERATIONS FOR HANDLING OTHER MATTERS IN THE COMMUNITY
- 16 AS M.E.T. ASSUMES COMPASSIONATE CARE OF THE INDIVIDUAL.
- 17 SUBSEQUENTLY, M.E.T. HELPS REDUCE THE RESPONSE TIME TO OTHER
- 18 EMERGENCY CALLS IN THE AREA BY FREEING UP VITAL PATROL
- 19 RESOURCES MORE OUICKLY. M.E.T. STAFF ARE SUBJECT MATTER
- 20 EXPERTS WHO ASSUME A LEADERSHIP ROLE IN HELPING INFORM, TRAIN,
- 21 BRIEF AND MENTOR THEIR PATROL COUNTERPARTS REGARDING
- 22 INTERACTIONS INVOLVING LAW ENFORCEMENT ENCOUNTERS WITH
- 23 MENTALLY ILL PEOPLE DURING A CRISIS. FROM 1991 TO 2016, L.A.
- 24 COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT M.E.T. TEAMS HAD FIVE CO-
- 25 DEPLOYMENT RESPONSE TEAMS FOR THE WHOLE COUNTY. AS OTHER



- 1 POLICE AGENCIES ADDED TEAMS OF THEIR OWN, L.A.S.D. HAS NOT
- 2 KEPT PACE IN GROWTH WITH THE ESCALATING NEEDS OF AN
- 3 UNDERSERVED POPULATION. THROUGH FUNDING BY THE OFFICE OF
- 4 DIVERSION, \$1.4 MILLION DOLLARS WAS INVESTED IN M.E..T THIS
- 5 FISCAL YEAR, ALLOWING FOR THE DOUBLING THE NUMBER OF CO-
- 6 RESPONSE TEAMS FROM 5 TO 10 UNITS COUNTY-WIDE. COVERAGE AREA
- 7 EXPANDED TO INCLUDE SANTA CLARITA AND THE ANTELOPE VALLEY. AND
- 8 AS SUCH, M.E.T. DEPUTIES ARE STARTING TO BE DEPLOYED THIS YEAR
- 9 REGIONALLY TO ALLOW EACH TEAM TO MORE CONSISTENTLY SERVE THEIR
- 10 ASSIGNED AREAS, TO BETTER GET TO KNOW THEIR POPULATIONS
- 11 SERVED. THE PROPOSED EXPANSION OF M.E.T. REPRESENTS WHAT
- 12 L.A.S.D. BELIEVES IS THE VERY MINIMUM RECOMMENDED NUMBER OF
- 13 STAFF AND TEAMS DEPLOYED FOR A COUNTY SO VAST IN SIZE AND
- 14 POPULATIONS SERVED. 25 L.A.S.D. STAFF WOULD BE ADDED. 19 MORE
- 15 DEPUTIES WOULD BE ADDED FOR A TOTAL OF 29 DEPUTIES AT M.E.T.
- 16 THIS WOULD ALLOW FOR UP TO 23 TEAMS COUNTY-WIDE, GREATLY
- 17 IMPROVING AVAILABILITY OF M.E.T. IN ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTY.
- 18 FOR THE FIRST TIME, M.E.T. WOULD BE AVAILABLE ON THE EARLY
- 19 MORNING SHIFT, STAFFING TO PROVIDE A 24/7 TRIAGE DESK AT THE
- 20 L.A. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS CENTER TO
- 21 COORDINATE M.E.T. DEPLOYMENT AND TO SUPPORT PATROL PERSONNEL
- 22 IN THEIR RESPONSE TO SUCH CALLS. FOUR ADDITIONAL SERGEANTS FOR
- 23 A TOTAL OF FIVE WOULD BE ADDED. AN ADDITIONAL INFORMATION
- 24 ANALYST TO COLLECT, ANALYZE AND REPORT ON CALL RESPONSE DATA
- 25 AND A SUPPORT STAFF MEMBER TO DEAL WITH THE LOGISTICS. M.E.T.



- 1 WILL COLLECT AND PROVIDE QUANTIFIABLE DATA TO HELP MEASURE THE
- 2 TEAM'S EFFECTIVENESS AND IMPACT TO THE CITIZENS COUNTY-WIDE.
- 3 THE METRICS WOULD INCLUDE THE RESPONSE TIME TO CALLS FOR
- 4 M.E.T. COUNTY-WIDE. THE REDUCTION IN SEVERITY IN USE OF FORCE
- 5 WITH M.E.T. UNITS AVAILABLE TO RESPOND AND HELP INTERVENE MORE
- 6 QUICKLY AND A POTENTIAL REDUCTION IN LIABILITY IN CIVIL
- 7 LITIGATION SETTLEMENTS. THE NUMBER OF PATIENTS SERVED BY
- 8 REGION, PATROL DIVISION, STATION JURISDICTIONS, AS WELL AS THE
- 9 DAYS AND HOURS OF THE WEEK WHEN MOST PATIENTS ARE ENCOUNTERED
- 10 ON A REGIONAL BASIS, A REDUCTION OF CALLS IN SERVICE INVOLVING
- 11 THE SAME ADDRESS AND INDIVIDUAL AND A FINAL DISPO OF PATIENTS
- 12 WILL BE TRACKED WITH SIGNIFICANTLY MORE INDIVIDUALS BEING
- 13 DIVERTED AWAY FROM THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM INTO TREATMENT,
- 14 INSTEAD. SO ALL IN ALL, THIS IS AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO BE
- 15 ABLE TO STEP UP AND DO WHAT'S RIGHT, DO WHAT'S COMPASSIONATE
- 16 AND MUCH MORE EFFECTIVE USE OF RESOURCES THAN WE'VE BEEN ABLE
- 17 TO DO IN THE PAST. SO THANK YOU FOR THIS. THIS IS A GREAT STEP
- 18 FORWARD. BUT AS YOU CAN SEE WITH THE NEED THAT WE HAVE, THE
- 19 DEMAND OUTWEIGHS THE ABILITY TO MEET THOSE DEMANDS. SO THANK
- 20 YOU FOR THIS STEP.

- 22 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.
- 23 ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS OR COMMENTS BY ANY OF THE MEMBERS?

- 3 YOU ALSO FOR ALSO SUPPORTING ITEM 58-A WHICH IS ADJOINED WITH
- 4 THIS, AND KNOWING THAT WE CAN HAVE A TEAM SUCH AS IS ASSEMBLED
- 5 HERE TO HELP US MOVE FORWARD AND PROVIDING BETTER INFORMATION

- 14 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR SOLIS.
- 15 SUPERVISOR HAHN?

- 17 SUP. JANICE HAHN: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN. AND THANK YOU,
- 18 CHAIRMAN RIDLEY-THOMAS AND SUPERVISOR BARGER FOR OFFERING THIS
- 19 MOTION. I THINK THIS IS A GREAT MODEL. AND IT ABSOLUTELY IS
- 20 SUCCESSFUL. I THINK EVERYONE WANTS TO FIND OPPORTUNITIES TO

- 23 KNOWN THAT JUST, YOU KNOW, PUTTING LAW ENFORCEMENT IN THAT
- 24 SITUATION AND ARRESTING THEM AND ENDING UP IN JAIL IS NOT AS
- 25 GOOD AS WE CAN BE. AND THIS IS SUCH A GREAT WAY TO SOLVE THIS



- 1 PROBLEM. AND I'M COMPLETELY IN SUPPORT OF THIS. DR. SHERIN, I
- 2 WAS JUST GOING TO ASK YOU, BECAUSE I DO KNOW THAT THERE ARE
- 3 INSTANCES WHERE MAYBE PEOPLE DON'T WANT TO INVOLVE LAW
- 4 ENFORCEMENT. AND WE DO KNOW THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL
- 5 HEALTH HAS THE PSYCHIATRIC MOBILE RESPONSE TEAM THAT CAN
- 6 PROVIDE AID AT THE MOMENT AS OPPOSED TO NECESSARILY GETTING
- 7 LAW ENFORCEMENT INVOLVED. CAN YOU DESCRIBE TO ME WHAT THESE
- 8 MOBILE RESPONSE TEAMS ARE? AND MORE IMPORTANTLY, HOW DOES THE
- 9 PUBLIC ACCESS THESE TEAMS WHEN THERE IS AN INCIDENT WITHOUT
- 10 CALLING LAW ENFORCEMENT FIRST?

- 12 DR. JONATHAN SHERIN: YES, THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR, IT'S JON
- 13 SHERIN, DIRECTOR OF MENTAL HEALTH. THE PSYCHIATRIC MOBILE
- 14 RESPONSE TEAMS ARE A MORE CLINICALLY ORIENTED TEAM WITHOUT THE
- 15 LAW ENFORCEMENT PIECE. THEY ARE MADE UP OF TWO INDIVIDUALS,
- 16 TWO CLINICIANS, PROVIDED IN ADDITION TO AN IMMEDIATE RESPONSE
- 17 AND CLINICAL EVALUATION, CASE MANAGEMENT, FOLLOW UP AND
- 18 LINKAGE TO A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT SERVICES. THE WAY TO GET A
- 19 HOLD OF THESE TEAMS, REALLY, IS THROUGH OUR ACCESS CENTER,
- 20 WHICH CAN BE CALLED, THIS IS AN 800 NUMBER. IN ADDITION, WE DO
- 21 HAVE A WEBSITE WHICH HAS THE INFORMATION TO GET TO THESE
- 22 TEAMS. IT'S ALSO POSSIBLE TO GET TO THEM THROUGH 2-1-1,
- 23 THROUGH 9-1-1. ONE OF THE THINGS I WOULD LIKE TO MENTION HERE
- 24 IS THAT I'M VERY INTERESTED IN THE SYSTEMS HERE. THESE ARE TWO
- 25 SYSTEMS THAT REALLY HAVE SIMILAR ROLES, BUT THERE ARE



- 1 DISTINCTIONS. CALLS THAT COME IN, FOR EXAMPLE, TO 9-1-1 THAT
- 2 DON'T REQUIRE POLICE INTERVENTION, WHICH I THINK RELATES TO
- 3 THE PURPOSE OF YOUR QUESTION, OUGHT TO BE VERY SIMPLY HANDED
- 4 OFF TO A PSYCHIATRIC TEAM SO THAT THERE IS NO LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 5 PRESENCE IF IT'S UNNECESSARY. AND VICE VERSA. SO THOSE ARE
- 6 SYSTEMS THAT I LOOK FORWARD TO EXPLORING A BIT MYSELF WITH MY
- 7 TEAM AS WELL AS WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT.

- 9 SUP. JANICE HAHN: I THINK THAT'S RIGHT. OBVIOUSLY IF LAW
- 10 ENFORCEMENT IS NEEDED, WE ENCOURAGE OUR RESIDENTS TO CALL FOR
- 11 HELP IN THAT WAY, BUT I DO KNOW THERE ARE MANY SITUATIONS
- 12 WHERE THE FAMILY WOULD JUST AS SOON NOT GET LAW ENFORCEMENT
- 13 INVOLVED AND THE PSYCHIATRIC RESPONSE TEAM MIGHT BE A BETTER
- 14 CHOICE. MY OFFICE ACTUALLY TOOK A LOOK AT YOUR WEBSITE. THEY
- 15 THINK IT SHOULD BE A LITTLE MORE DETAILED ON THE SERVICES YOU
- 16 PROVIDE. AND ALSO WHILE YOU HAVE AN APP, THEY COULDN'T FIND A
- 17 LINK TO DOWNLOAD IT FROM YOUR WEBSITE. I THINK OVERALL THE
- 18 PUBLIC PROBABLY DOES NOT KNOW THAT THIS EXISTS IN CONJUNCTION
- 19 WITH WHAT LAW ENFORCEMENT CAN DO WHEN THEY CALL THEM. I REALLY
- 20 WOULD HOPE THAT YOU HAVE PLANS. MAYBE YOU CAN REPORT BACK TO
- 21 US ON PLANS TO MAYBE BETTER UPDATE YOUR WEBSITE OR SOMEHOW
- 22 MAKE THE PUBLIC AWARE THAT THIS IS AN ALTERNATIVE IF THERE'S A
- 23 SITUATION THAT REQUIRES IT.



- 1 DR. JONATHAN SHERIN: THANK YOU FOR THAT, SUPERVISOR. IF I MAY,
- 2 THE WEBSITE IS SOMETHING I AM FAMILIAR WITH. I ACTUALLY
- 3 STARTED LOOKING AT THIS BEFORE TAKING THIS POSITION, THIS
- 4 APPOINTMENT. I THINK IT REQUIRES A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF WORK
- 5 BOTH IN TERMS OF ITS NAVIGABILITY, WHICH FRANKLY IS AN ACCESS
- 6 PROBLEM, THE SIMPLICITY OF ITS USE AND SOME OF THE INFORMATION
- 7 THAT'S THERE. SO THIS IS SOMETHING THAT I'M WORKING ON NOW.
- 8 I'VE ALERTED MY TEAM. AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO. IN ADDITION,
- 9 WE BELIEVE THAT THERE'S A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE, FOR
- 10 EXAMPLE, APPS, IN ADDITION TO THE ONE YOU'RE REFERRING TO,
- 11 THAT CAN HELP PEOPLE ASSESS THEIR WELL-BEING STATE WHERE WE
- 12 CAN HAVE THE DELIVERY OF VIRTUAL MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES SO
- 13 THERE'S A LOT OF POTENTIAL ON THAT WEBSITE. AND I PLAN TO
- 14 OPTIMIZE THAT. I WOULD LIKE TO JUST IF YOU WOULDN'T MIND, I
- 15 KNOW IT'S BEEN A LONG DAY, BUT I HAD THE PLEASURE OF GOING OUT
- 16 ON A DRIVE-ALONG WITH THE SHERIFF ACTUALLY WITH THE D.A. WHO
- 17 SENT ME AN EMAIL AND SHE HAS A STATEMENT THAT I'D LIKE TO
- 18 READ. "LAST FRIDAY. I APOLOGIZE TO THE BOARD FOR MY ABSENCE.
- 19 LAST FRIDAY, I HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF RIDING ALONG WITH THE LOS
- 20 ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S MENTAL EVALUATION TEAM. THEY
- 21 RESPONDED TO TWO CALLS FOR SERVICE. I WATCHED AS THESE TEAMS,
- 22 COMPRISED OF DEPUTIES FROM THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND THE
- 23 DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH, SUCCESSFULLY HANDLED TWO
- 24 SITUATIONS INVOLVING TWO MEN WHO WERE IN THE MIDST OF A MENTAL
- 25 HEALTH CRISIS. THESE MATTERS RESULTED IN EACH MAN BEING



- 1 CONNECTED WITH A TREATMENT SYSTEM. THESE MEN TECHNICALLY COULD
- 2 HAVE BEEN ARRESTED, PLACED IN JAIL AND CHARGED WITH A CRIME.
- 3 THIS WOULD HAVE BEEN A WASTE OF RESOURCES AND AN INJUSTICE TO
- 4 MEN WHO SIMPLY NEED HELP. UNFORTUNATELY, MOST PEOPLE IN OUR
- 5 COUNTRY WILL NOT GET THIS BENEFIT BECAUSE OF THE NUMBER OF CO-
- 6 DEPLOYED TEAMS IS INSUFFICIENT TO MEET THE NEED. I SUPPORT THE
- 7 MOTION OF SUPERVISORS BARGER AND RIDLEY-THOMAS TO EXPAND THE
- 8 NUMBER OF CO-DEPLOYED TEAMS. THIS IS AN IDEA WHOSE TIME HAS
- 9 COME." AND TO AMPLIFY ON HER POINTS, ONE GENTLEMAN WAS
- 10 SWINGING A BASEBALL BAT AND WAS POTENTIALLY A VIOLENT PERSON
- 11 THAT NEEDED TO BE ASSESSED IN A SAFE ENVIRONMENT. A CLASSIC
- 12 FIRST BREAK PSYCHOTIC. ANOTHER PERSON WAS HAVING A MANIC
- 13 EPISODE AND HAD REPORTED A BOMB SCARE. THOSE ARE TWO SCENARIOS
- 14 WHERE YOU DO NOT WANT TO GO IN ALONE WITHOUT MENTAL HEALTH
- 15 BECAUSE YOU'RE NOT EQUIPPED TO SECURE THE ENVIRONMENT AND THEN
- 16 DELIVER THE TREATMENT.

- 4 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIR: MEMBERS AS WE TAKE THIS ITEM OFF
- 5 AFTER HEARING FROM THE SPEAKERS, WE'RE GOING TO ASSUME THAT
- 6 THE CRITICAL INCIDENT TRAINING THAT OUGHT TO BE A PART OF THE
- 7 ACADEMY'S PROTOCOL AND REGIMEN WILL SIMPLY BE INCORPORATED AND
- 8 THAT THE SHERIFF WILL COME BACK AND GIVE US A STATUS REPORT ON
- 9 THAT ISSUE. SO LET THE RECORD REFLECT THAT THAT'S AN
