WE WELCOME YOU TO THE REGULARLY SCHEDULED MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES 6 7 COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. TODAY IS TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 4TH, 8 2020. PLEASE NOTE THAT SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS WILL NOT 9 BE IN ATTENDANCE TODAY. THE INVOCATION WILL BE LED BY FATHER CLAUDE WILLIAMS, SAINTS PETER AND PAUL SCHOOL IN THE FOURTH 10 11 DISTRICT, FOLLOWED BY THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE LED BY CELESTINO CHORA, FORMER SPECIALIST IN THE CALIFORNIA ARMY 12 NATIONAL GUARD IN THE CITY OF NORTH HOLLYWOOD FROM THE GREAT 13 THIRD DISTRICT. WOULD YOU ALL PLEASE STAND. 14 15 16 FATHER WILLIAMS: GOOD MORNING, LET'S BOW OUR HEADS. OH, GOD, YOU HAVE TAUGHT US TO CALL YOU THE HOLY ONE, AND SO WE INVOKE 17 18 YOU THUS THIS DAY. MINDFUL OF OUR LIMITATIONS AND GRATEFUL FOR 19 THE COUNTLESS BLESSINGS YOU HAVE BESTOWED UPON US AND UPON THOSE DEAR TO US, ESPECIALLY FOR THE PRICELESS GIFT OF YOUR 20 FORGIVENESS FOR OUR PAST TRANSGRESSIONS, OH, LORD, WE ENTREAT 21 22 YOU THAT IN YOUR ABUNDANT MERCY, YOU GRANT TO US LEADERS AFTER 23 YOUR OWN HEART. WE BESEECH YOU THAT IN YOUR GREAT KINDNESS, YOU GRANT US THOSE RESOURCES NEEDED TO ACCOMPLISH YOUR WILL 24 AND THAT YOU RAISE UP AMONG US LEADERS WHO, BY THEIR ZEAL FOR 25

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1 OUR PROSPERITY ON EARTH AND GLORY HEREAFTER, MAY BE PLEASING 2 TO YOU. HE THEN WENT ON TO 23 EARN HIS MASTER'S DEGREE IN THEOLOGY AND DOGMATICS FROM THE PONTIFICAL UNIVERSITY OF ST. THOMAS AQUINAS IN ROME. FATHER 24 CLAUDE HAS MINISTERED IN SEVERAL SETTINGS, INCLUDING AS VICE 25

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DEAN OF STUDENTS AND INSTRUCTORS AT SAINT MICHAEL'S 1 PREPARATORY HIGH SCHOOL IN SILVERADO AND AS CHAIR OF LITURGY 2 3 FOR THE NATIONAL BLACK CATHOLIC CONGRESS. IN AUGUST 2018, HE WAS NAMED RECTOR OF SAINTS PETER AND PAUL SCHOOL IN 4 5 WILMINGTON. AND WE'RE GOING TO BE HONORING THAT SCHOOL'S 75TH ANNIVERSARY LATER IN OUR BOARD MEETING. FATHER CLAUDE, THANK 6 7 YOU SO MUCH FOR LEADING US IN THAT INVOCATION. THANK YOU FOR 8 YOUR LEADERSHIP IN HELPING EDUCATE CHILDREN. YOU HAVE A GREAT 9 VOICE, MUCH BETTER THAN MINE THIS MORNING. THANK YOU. 10 11 FATHER WILLIAMS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE]. 12 13 SUP. KUEHL: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. OUR PLEDGE TODAY WAS LED

BY CELESTINO CHORA. HE WAS A SPECIALIST IN THE CALIFORNIA ARMY 14 NATIONAL GUARD FROM 2007 TO 2016. HE SERVED AS A CANNON CREW 15 16 MEMBER AND WAS DEPLOYED IN SUPPORT OF THE KOSOVO AND BAJA CALIFORNIA BORDER MISSIONS. HE WAS AWARDED THE AIR FORCE 17 18 ACHIEVEMENT MEDAL, KOSOVO CAMPAIGN MEDAL, OVERSEAS SERVICE 19 MEDAL, NATIONAL DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL, GLOBAL WAR ON TERRORISM MEDAL AND ARMY SERVICE RIBBON. HE IS NOW AN INTERMEDIATE 20 TYPIST CLERK FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY 21 22 SERVICES AND IS TAKING CLASSES AT L.A. VALLEY COLLEGE. PLEASE 23 JOIN ME IN THANKING SPECIALIST CELESTINO CHORA. [APPLAUSE]. 24

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SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR SOLIS, YOU WANTED TO 1 ACKNOWLEDGE SOME STUDENTS IN THE AUDIENCE? 2 3 SUP. SOLIS: I DON'T THINK THEY ARE HERE YET. 4 5 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY, THEN WE WILL DO THAT AFTER BOARD 6 7 PRESENTATIONS. WE ARE GOING TO TAKE UP CLOSED SESSION 8 IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE BOARD PRESENTATIONS, AND WE'RE GOING 9 TO BEGIN WITH THE BOARD PRESENTATION, BEGINNING WITH ME, AND THEN WE WILL GO ON TO SUPERVISOR HAHN. IT IS A LONG-STANDING 10 11 TRADITION OF THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO WELCOME OUR NEW CONSULS GENERAL TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY. I AM GRATEFUL 12 FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO PRESENT OUR FIRST CONSUL GENERAL OF THE 13 YEAR THIS MORNING. I AM PLEASED TO WELCOME AMBASSADOR AHMED 14 SHAHEEN, CONSUL GENERAL OF EGYPT IN LOS ANGELES. LET'S GIVE 15 16 HIM A ROUND OF APPLAUSE. AMBASSADOR SHAHEEN RECEIVED A BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE IN FROM CAIRO UNIVERSITY FACULTY OF 17 18 COMMERCE IN 1988. PRIOR TO HIS APPOINTMENT IN LOS ANGELES, HE 19 SERVED AS SECRETARY GENERAL OF THE EGYPTIAN AGENCY OF PARTNERSHIP FOR DEVELOPMENT. DURING HIS TENURE, THE AGENCY 20 IMPLEMENTED MORE THAN 120 CAPACITY-BUILDING PROGRAMS FOR MORE 21 22 THAN 4,000 AFRICAN TRAINEES. UNDER HIS LEADERSHIP, THE AGENCY 23 DISPATCHED EXPERTS TO 11 AFRICAN COUNTRIES AND PROVIDED HUMANITARIAN AND DEVELOPMENTAL ASSISTANCE. IN PREVIOUS 24 ASSIGNMENTS, AMBASSADOR SHAHEEN SERVED AS EGYPT'S CONSUL 25

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GENERAL IN GENEVA AND MILAN. FROM 1992 TO 2010, HE WAS A 1 MEMBER OF THE EGYPTIAN EMBASSY, REPRESENTING HIS COUNTRY IN 2 3 BERLIN, TOKYO, KUALA LUMPUR, PYONGYANG, AND KABUL. AMBASSADOR SHAHEEN, MY COLLEAGUES AND I CONGRATULATE YOU ON YOUR 4 5 APPOINTMENT AS CONSUL GENERAL OF EGYPT IN LOS ANGELES. WE WISH YOU SUCCESS DURING YOUR MISSION AND LOOK FORWARD TO TO WORKING 6 7 WITH YOU ON ISSUES THAT UNITE OUR COUNTRIES IN FRIENDSHIPS AND 8 PEACE. WELCOME. [APPLAUSE].

18	PETER AND PAUL SCHOOL WAS FOUNDED IN 1944 IN WILMINGTON BY THE
19	FRANCISCAN SISTER OF CHARITY AND PENANCE. IN 1951, THE SISTERS
20	OF ST. JOSEPH OF CLOONEY ARRIVED TO CONTINUE THE WORK OF THE
21	FRANCISCAN SISTERS AND THUS BEGAN AN INCREDIBLE 58 YEARS OF
22	SERVICE. SO I HAVE REPRESENTED WILMINGTON AND THE SCHOOL IN
23	ALL MY LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT TO WHICH I HAVE BEEN ELECTED, BOTH
24	IN THE CITY COUNCIL, BOTH IN THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS, AND
25	NOW AS COUNTY SUPERVISOR. SO THE SCHOOL HAS GIVEN ME GREAT

MORE THAN EVER, OUR YOUTH IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY ARE EXCITED ABOUT CIVIC 20 ENGAGEMENT. I'M PROUD TO CELEBRATE SOME OF OUR YOUNG COMMUNITY 21 22 MEMBERS FOR THEIR COMMITMENT AND PARTICIPATION IN AN 23 INNOVATIVE PROGRAM THAT GIVES THEM INSIGHT INTO THE JUSTICE SYSTEM. MORE THAN 2,500 4 5 MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS PRESENTED THE FICTIONAL CASE OF PEOPLE V. MOSSIMOTO AT THE STANLEY MOSK COURT HOUSE, THIS 6 7 CASE FEATURED AN ALLEGED MURDER. ONE PARTY IS THE FOUNDER OF A 8 TECH STARTUP THAT DEVELOPS SELF-DRIVING VEHICLES AND IS 9 CONFRONTED WITH A CONTROVERSY WHEN THEIR PARTNER STARTS AN ADVOCACY ORGANIZATION CALLED PARENTS AGAINST AUTONOMOUS 10 11 DRIVING. THE STUDENTS ARE TASKED WITH DECIDING IF THE DEATH OF THE ADVOCATE WAS AN ACCIDENT OR IF THE TECH FOUNDER KILLED THE 12 ADVOCATE OF THE GROUP TO PREVENT THE GROUP FROM TAKING DOWN 13 THE TECH COMPANY. TO PREPARE FOR THE BIG TRIAL, STUDENTS HAD 14 TO LEARN ALL ASPECTS OF THE CRIMINAL COURT CASE. WHEN THE 15 16 COMPETITION DAY COMES, THEY ARE ALL PREPARED TO ACT AS ATTORNEYS, WITNESSES, BAILIFFS, AND CLERKS. EACH YEAR, THE 17 18 FOUNDATION CREATES A NEW MOCK TRIAL CASE BASED ON IMPORTANT 19 ISSUES FACING AMERICA'S YOUTH. THROUGH THE COMPETITION, STUDENTS GAIN SKILLS IN COMMUNICATION, COLLABORATION, AND 20 ANALYTICAL THINKING. MOCK TRIAL PARTICIPANTS SAY THEIR TIME IN 21 22 THE COURTROOM TRULY HELPED THEM SOLVE PROBLEMS AND THINK ON 23 THEIR FEET IN THEIR FUTURE CAREERS. THERE WERE MORE THAN 150 SCHOOLS REPRESENTED IN THIS YEAR'S COMPETITION, AND OUR 24 HONOREES TODAY CAME OUT ON TOP. CONGRATULATIONS TO THE 25

5 DEANA LA BARBARA: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS DEANA LA BARBARA. I'M A COACH FOR THE ST. MEL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL MOCK TRIAL TEAM. 6 7 I HAVE BEEN WORKING IN MOCK TRIAL FOR A LONG TIME. I'M AN 8 ATTORNEY. AND WE JUST STARTED UP OUR PROGRAM 5 YEARS AGO. THIS 9 IS OUR 5TH YEAR. AND TO HAVE REACHED THIS LEVEL IS VERY EXCITING, AND HOLY FAMILY DID A GREAT JOB. WE HAD AN 10 11 INCREDIBLE FINAL ROUND. AND THIS IS A KITTEN, BUT, LIKE FOXY, WE HAVE 24 MANY OLDER CATS THAT ARE LOOKING FOR FOREVER HOMES. AND IF 25

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YOU'RE NOT READY TO ADOPT, IF YOU WANT TO FOSTER ONE OF OUR

[APPLAUSE]. 4 5 6 **PERFORMERS:** HAPPY NEW YEAR! 7 8 SUP. SOLIS: ALL RIGHT. YAY! WOW. LET'S HEAR IT FOR THE 9 IMMORTALS FROM MONTEREY PARK! (OFF-MIC COMMENTS). HAHA, OKAY. 10 SO, AS WE BEGIN OUR PRESENTATION, I JUST WANT TO REMIND 11 EVERYONE AGAIN THAT WE'RE CELEBRATING THE LUNAR NEW YEAR, AND IT IS ONE OF THE MOST CELEBRATED HOLIDAYS IN MANY ASIAN AND 12 PACIFIC ISLANDER CULTURES. MANY OF THEM LIVE IN THE FIRST DISTRICT, WHICH INCLUDES LITTLE TOKYO, CHINA TOWN, HISTORIC FILIPINO 17 18 TOWN, THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY, AND ALSO POMONA REGION. I'D LIKE 19 TO USE THESE CELEBRATIONS OFTEN TIME TO CELEBRATE SOME OF THE LEADERS THAT COME OUT OF THE A.P.I. COMMUNITY, AND TODAY I 20 HAVE THE PRIVILEGE OF INTRODUCING TO YOU STEPHEN CHEUNG, THE 21 22 EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY ECONOMIC 23 DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION AND PRESIDENT OF THE WORLD TRADE CENTER LOS ANGELES. STEPHEN IS A LONG-TIME FRIEND AND HAS BEEN 24 A GREAT SUPPORTER OF THE FIRST DISTRICT. FROM HIS TIME AS A 25

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SECRETARY GENERAL OF INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND FOREIGN AFFAIRS 1 FOR MAYOR ERIC GARCETTI TO HIS CURRENT ROLE AS A W.T.C. L.A., 2 STEPHEN HAS BROUGHT IN A NEW ERA OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT TO 3 THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. HE ORGANIZED INTERNATIONAL TRAIDE 4 5 MISSIONS TO MEXICO, CHINA, KOREA, JAPAN AND USHERED NEW BUSINESSES AND PROJECTS HERE IN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF LOS 6 ANGELES. STEPHEN IMPLEMENTED THE CITY'S STRATEGIC PLAN TO MAKE 7 8 L.A. THE GLOBAL CAPITAL FOR CLEAN ENERGY AND INFRASTRUCTURE. 9 HE HELPED TO CREATE JOBS, BETTER THE ENVIRONMENT, AND FOSTER ECONOMIC GROWTH FOR ALL. AND I'M HAPPY TO HONOR HIM TODAY AS 10 11 ONE OF OUR HEROES FOR THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES AS WE CELEBRATE THE LUNAR NEW YEAR. THANK YOU, STEPHEN. OUR NEXT 12 13 HONOREE IS THE U.C.L.A. LABOR CENTER, AND THAT IS OUR GOOD FRIEND AND DIRECTOR KENT WONG. HE IS HERE TO ACCEPT THIS ON 14 BEHALF OF HIS STAFF AND THE MANY OF THE PEOPLE THAT WORK WITH 15 16 HIM FOR U.C.L.A. I HAVE KNOWN KENT FOR MANY MANY YEARS. HE RUNS THE U.C.L.A. LABOR CENTER. AND HE'S DONE MANY TREMENDOUS 17 18 THINGS. UNDER HIS LEADERSHIP, THE CENTER'S RESEARCH HAS BEGUN 19 BY HELPING TO ORGANIZE AND CREATE POLICY THAT LIFTS WORKERS UP IN DIFFERENT INDUSTRIES AND CREATING GOOD PAYING JOBS, 20 STRENGTHENING WORKERS AND IMMIGRANT RIGHTS AND PROTECTIONS, 21 22 WAS PARTICULARLY INFLUENTIAL IN ESTABLISHING THE DREAM 23 RESOURCE CENTER, AND MANY OF YOU ARE FOLLOWING THE DISCUSSION AROUND DEFERRED ACTION FOR CHILDREN, KNOWN AS D.A.C.A. HE HAS 24 BEEN VERY INTERESTED IN THAT ISSUE AT U.C.L.A. AND MANY OF US 25

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KNOW THAT THERE ARE SO MANY THINGS THAT THESE YOUNG PEOPLE 1 WILL HELP CONTRIBUTE TO OUR COUNTRY IF AND WHEN THEY ARE 2 GRANTED PERMANENT STATUS HERE IN THE COUNTRY. SO WE APPRECIATE 3 ALL THE WORK THAT THE DREAM RESOURCE CENTER HAS BEEN DOING, 4 5 ALSO FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP, MR. WONG, FOR EVERYTHING THAT YOU'VE DONE TO HELP INCREASE WORKFORCE PARTICIPATION AND ECONOMIC 6 7 DEVELOPMENT, BUT ALSO ON BEHALF OF ALL THE SOCIAL JUSTICE 8 ISSUES THAT YOU HAVE TAKEN ON, SINGLE-HANDEDLY, WITH YOUR 9 TEAM. I CANNOT THANK YOU ENOUGH FOR ALL THE WORK THAT YOU DO. YOU ARE A TREMENDOUS ASSET TO THE ENTIRE COUNTY OF LOS 10 11 ANGELES. PLEASE GIVE THE U.C.L.A. CENTER A ROUND OF APPLAUSE, THE LABOR CENTER. I ALSO WANT TO HONOR, ALONGSIDE WITH ME, THE 12 CHINATOWN COMMUNITY FOR EQUITABLE DEVELOPMENT, AND THAT IS MR. 13 KING CHENG. HE IS HERE TO ACCEPT RECOGNITION ON BEHALF OF HIS 14 STAFF AND FRIENDS. I WANTED TO HIGHLIGHT THEIR WORK IN 15 16 PARTICULAR BECAUSE THEY'RE A GRASSROOTS ORGANIZATION AND ACTIVISTS WHO ADVOCATE ON BEHALF OF CHINATOWN RESIDENTS, AND 17 18 WE ARE STEPS AWAY FROM CHINATOWN, BUT UNFORTUNATELY, SOME OF 19 YOU KNOW, THE AREA HAS FACED GENTRIFICATION, AND MANY WHO HAVE LIVED IN THE COMMUNITY FOR DECADES ARE FACING DISPLACEMENT. IT 20 IS A PROBLEM NOT JUST THERE BUT AROUND THE COUNTY OF LOS 21 22 ANGELES, AND IT IS A GROUPS LIKE THIS THAT WILL DEMAND EQUITY 23 AND CULTURAL PRESERVATION WHEN NEW PROJECTS ARE BEING PROPOSED IN CHINATOWN. THEY'LL KEEP THE PRESSURE ON BY MARCHING AND 24 MOBILIZING, WHICH I'VE SEEN THEM DO VERY EFFECTIVELY. IN FACT, 25

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THEY WERE AT THE CHINATOWN PARADE THIS PAST WEEKEND CONTINUING
 TO ADVOCATE FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE RESIDENTS AND TO SPEAK TRUTH
 TO POWER. PLEASE JOIN ME IN HONORING THEM. I WILL ASK EACH OF
 THEM TO SAY A FEW WORDS. YES. [APPLAUSE].

THAT, I GET TO DO EVERY SINGLE DAY OF 15 16 MY LIFE, AND THAT'S ALREADY ENOUGH. AND TO BE RECOGNIZED FOR THE WORK THAT WE DO, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE COUNTY, IS REALLY 17 18 SOMETHING ELSE. AND IT MAKES ME VERY THANKFUL AND VERY 19 GRATEFUL TO BE IN THE REGION AND THE COUNTY THAT HAS THE LEADERS WHO CAN RECOGNIZE PEOPLE WHO ARE DIFFERENT AND TO ALSO 20 CELEBRATE DIVERSITY. AND FOR THAT, I WANT TO THANK THE 21 22 SUPERVISORS FOR THEIR LEADERSHIP IN MAKING SURE THAT LOS 23 ANGELES CONTINUES TO BE A BEACON OF HOPE TO THE REST OF THE WORLD AS WE ARE LOOKING TO WORK WITH THE INTERNATIONAL 24 COMMUNITY TO MAKE SURE THEY UNDERSTAND THAT LOS ANGELES IS A 25

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PLACE TO DO BUSINESS AS WELL AS A GREAT PLACE TO BE FOR YOUR
 HOME AND FOR YOUR FUTURE. THANK YOU FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP, AND I

LABOR CENTER HAS A 50+ YEAR HISTORY OF 8 ADVANCING WORKER RIGHTS, RACIAL JUSTICE, AND IMMIGRANT RIGHTS. 9 AND WE ARE A VITAL INSTITUTION THAT SERVES THE ENTIRE COMMUNITY OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. AND THIS YEAR OF THE RAT AND 10 11 THE LUNAR NEW YEAR, WE HAVE TWO SPECIAL THINGS TO CELEBRATE. FOR THE FIRST TIME IN HISTORY, THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA-12 LOS ANGELES IS LAUNCHING A VERY FIRST LABOR STUDIES MAJOR AND 13 WILL BE GRADUATING THE FIRST CLASS THIS SPRING. SO THAT'S A 14 15 HUGE ACCOMPLISHMENT, THE FIRST TIME NOT ONLY ON U.C.L.A. 16 CAMPUS, BUT IN THE SYSTEM-WIDE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, NINE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM. IN ADDITION, THE U.C.L.A. LABOR CENTER IS 17 18 PLANNING TO PURCHASE OUR BUILDING, LOCATED RIGHT ACROSS FROM 19 MACARTHUR PARK, SO WE WILL BECOME A PERMANENT INSTITUTION THAT WILL SERVE THE NEEDS OF WORKING PEOPLE HERE IN THE LOS ANGELES 20 COUNTY. SO WE WANT TO THANK SUPERVISOR SOLIS AND THE OTHER 21 22 MEMBERS OF THE SUPERVISORS FOR THIS GREAT HONOR TODAY, AND WE 23 PLEDGE TO WORK WITH ALL OF YOU TO ENSURE THAT WE HAVE A FUTURE FILLED WITH WORKER JUSTICE AND WITH SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC 24 FAIRNESS FOR ALL. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE]. 25

CHINATOWN IS A COMMUNITY OF LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS AND 10 11 IMMIGRANTS. AND SO WE HOPE THAT WE CAN WORK WITH THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT WITH SUPERVISOR SOLIS TO BUILD AFFORDABLE HOUSING 12 FOR THE RESIDENTS OF CHINATOWN, AND WE ALL WANT CHINATOWN TO 13 HAVE A BRIGHT FUTURE. THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE]. 14

I WANT TO BRING 17 18 UP ERIC CONTRERAS AND HIS FAMILY, OFELIA ROBLES, HIS FATHER, 19 AND PARENTS HERE. THANK YOU. THANK YOU FOR COMING. COME HERE, ERIC. I WANTED TO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO RECOGNIZE ERIC 20 CONTRERAS, ALSO KNOWN AS ERIC ETSY, WHO HAS JOINED US HERE 21 22 WITH HIS MOTHER AND FATHER AND SON, OKAY. ERIC IS A PROUD 23 RESIDENT OF SOUTHEAST LOS ANGELES AND THE FOUNDER OF WHAT IS KNOWN AS OPEN MIC NIGHT CALLED ALIVIO, THE SPANISH WORD FOR 24 RELIEF. ERIC CREATED THIS SPACE AFTER REALIZING THAT EVERY 25

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TIME HE WANTED TO SHARE HIS POETRY OR LISTEN TO SOMEONE SING 1 OR APPRECIATE A PAINTING, HE ALWAYS NEEDED TO EXTRACT HIMSELF 2 3 FROM HIS OWN COMMUNITY. HE WANTED TO STOP LEAVING HIS NEIGHBORHOOD TO FIND SPACES THAT HARVESTED ART AND CULTURE. 4 5 WHILE ERIC KNEW MANY TALENTED ARTISTS FROM THE SOUTHEAST LOS ANGELES AREA, THERE WASN'T A PLATFORM IN THE COMMUNITY FOR 6 7 THEM TO COME TOGETHER AND SHARE THEIR WORK WITH VARIOUS 8 NEIGHBORS IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD. AFTER BEING INSPIRED BY A 9 CONVERSATION HE HAD WITH A FRIEND, ERIC WAS CERTAIN THAT HE COULD CULTIVATE A GRASSROOTS CULTURAL SPACE INSIDE THE GARAGE 10 11 OF HIS PARENT'S HOME FOR STORYTELLING, ARTS EXHIBITION, MUSICAL PERFORMANCES, POETRY FOR THE COMMUNITY. IN 2012, ERIC 12 AND HIS FRIENDS HOSTED THE FIRST OPEN MIC CALLED MICROPHONO 13 LIBRE. NEARLY A HUNDRED PEOPLE ATTENDED THE EVENT TO SHARE 14 THEIR DREAMS, THEIR GOALS, THEIR TALENTS, AND VOICES. A FEW 15 16 MONTHS LATER, IN JANUARY 2013, ERIC HOSTED THE FIRST ALIVIO EVER OPEN MIC. REMEMBER, ALIVIO MEANS GETTING WELL. SINCE 17 18 2013, ALIVIO OPEN MIC HAS NOT LET UP. FROM DOCUMENTARIES BEING 19 FILMED AT ALIVIO, TO HOSTING A COMMUNITY OF VENDORS EACH MONTH, TO L.G.B.T.Q. NIGHTS, AND ALL WOMEN'S POETRY NIGHTS, 20 ERIC HAS ENGAGED THE SOUTHEAST LOS ANGELES COMMUNITY IN AN 21 22 ORGANIC GRASSROOTS WAY THAT HAS NEVER BEEN DONE BEFORE. LAST 23 MONTH, ALIVIO OPEN MIC CELEBRATED ITS 6 YEAR ANNIVERSARY. BY WAY OF THE SPACE, LIKE-MINDED PEOPLE, ARTISTS AND COMMUNITY 24 MEMBERS, HAVE MET, COLLABORATED, AND CONTINUE TO CREATE 25

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ARTISTIC MAGIC OUTSIDE THE FOUR WALLS OF HIS PARENT'S GARAGE. 1 AS A HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER FOR HACIENDA LA PUENTE UNIFIED SCHOOL 2 3 DISTRICT, ERIC IS CONSISTENTLY PUSHING HIS STUDENTS TO JOIN THE SCHOOL'S POETRY CLUB, WHICH HE OVERSEES, AND ENCOURAGES 4 5 THEM TO EXPRESS THEMSELVES BY WRITING AND SHARING POETRY. OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS, ERIC HAS DEVOTED HIMSELF TO ORGANIZING THE 6 7 ARTS IN THE SOUTHEAST LOS ANGELES BY CREATING THE FIRST-EVER 8 ART WALK IN THE CITY OF BELL AND PRODUCING THE SOUTHEAST LOS 9 ANGELES ARTS FESTIVAL IN THE L.A. RIVER. RECENTLY, ERIC MADE HIS DREAM COME TRUE BY PUBLISHING HIS FIRST POETRY BOOK 10 11 ENTITLED "FROM MY BLOOD." WE FEATURE ARTISTS FROM THE COMMUNITY THAT DON'T HAVE SPACES AND MUSEUMS, BUT WE HAVE MADE OUR 12 GARAGE A MODERN-DAY TEMPLE. WE HAVE MADE OUR GARAGE OUR 13 MODERN-DAY MUSEUM. IT IS A MUSEUM THAT CAME FROM WHERE WE USED 14 TO PARK A CAR. BUT THROUGH THAT SPACE, SO MANY OTHER PEOPLE 15 16 HAVE MET AND CREATED OTHER COLLECTIVES TO ATTACK DIFFERENT ISSUES IN OUR COMMUNITY. SO THAT JUST TELLS ME, ALL WE NEED IS 17 18 A SPACE, AND WE'LL FIND PEOPLE, AND OUR BRAINS WILL MESH AND 19 COLLAGE AND CREATE OTHER BEAUTIFUL THINGS IN OUR COMMUNITY. 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THAT WE SHOULD NOT BE VIGILANT, AND WASHING YOUR HANDS, YOU 1 SHOULD WASH YOUR HANDS ALL THE TIME. BUT, YOU KNOW, I JUST 2 3 WANT TO THANK MY COLLEAGUES BECAUSE WE ACTUALLY HAVE BEEN DISCUSSING THIS FOR WEEKS, TRYING TO GET INFORMATION OUT IN 4 5 ALL LANGUAGES. I THINK IT IS IMPORTANT IN ALL LANGUAGES. SUPERVISOR SOLIS AND I ATTENDED THE PARADE IN CHINATOWN ON 6 7 SATURDAY. AND CLEARLY, THE ATTENDANCE WAS DOWN, BUT IT'S 8 IMPORTANT FOR US TO RECOGNIZE THE DOS AND DON'TS AND EDUCATE 9 THE PUBLIC ABOUT THIS. BUT, MORE IMPORTANTLY, I WOULD ASK THE PUBLIC TO ACT RESPONSIBLY. DO NOT PROFILE. I'VE HEARD 10 11 INSTANCES ON NEXTDOOR WHERE INDIVIDUALS ARE BEING CALLED OUT AND TOLD -- AND BEING REPORTED WHERE THEY'RE SHOPPING AND ALL. 12 TOTALLY, TOTALLY, INAPPROPRIATE. SO, WITH THAT, YOU KNOW, I 13 WANT SUPERVISOR SOLIS TO TALK, AND THEN I WOULD LIKE YOU TO 14 GIVE AN OVERVIEW. BUT WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT THIS DOES NOT 15 16 CREATE A SITUATION WHERE WE'RE PUTTING PEOPLE'S LIFE IN JEOPARDY AS WELL IN TERMS OF PROFILING AND ASSUMING THAT 17 18 BECAUSE YOU ARE FROM, MAYBE, CHINA, MAYBE THE PHILIPPINES, 19 THAT YOU ARE INFECTED WITH THE CORONA VIRUS. SO WITH THAT, SUPERVISOR SOLIS? 20

SUP. SOLIS: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR FOR BRINGING THIS UP. I'M
HAPPY THAT WE'RE ABLE TO DISCUSS THIS AS AN ONGOING ISSUE.
LAST WEEK, I ATTENDED A PRESS EVENT WITH ASSEMBLY MEMBER CHOU
TO TALK SPECIFICALLY ABOUT THIS, ABOUT THE HYPERSENSITIVITY

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AND THE FACT THAT THERE'S MISLEADING INFORMATION THAT WAS PUT 1 OUT. I'M NOT SURE WHO THAT WAS, BUT I HOPE THAT WE CAN LEARN 2 3 HOW WE CAN PREVENT THAT FROM HAPPENING OR AT LEAST TRACKING DOWN WHO THE PEOPLE ARE THAT ARE PUTTING OUT INFORMATION THAT 4 5 USES OUR LOGO AND USES OTHER SYMBOLS, C.D.C., PUBLIC HEALTH, WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION, SOMETHING THAT REALLY LOOKS LIKE IT 6 7 IS LEGITIMATE. AND IT CLEARLY IS STIRRING UP FEAR, RACIAL 8 BIAS, AND IT DOES TARGET HERE PLACES THAT PEOPLE SHOULD NOT GO 9 SHOPPING AT, SO SUPERMARKETS AND THINGS OF THAT NATURE. IT IS DIRECTED TO CONSTITUENTS IN CARSON, BUT ALSO IT LAYS OUT OTHER 10 11 ADDRESSES IN TORRANCE. MY CONCERN IS THAT NOW THERE PROBABLY WILL BE COPYCATS, AND WE REALLY NEED TO ALSO USE WHATEVER 12 RESOURCES WE CAN TO GO AFTER THE INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE 13 PROMOTING THIS, I WOULD THINK, NUMBER ONE, AND THEN NUMBER TWO 14 IS THE WHOLE RACIAL STEREOTYPING AND BIAS THAT IS HAPPENING, 15 16 AND WE KNOW THAT THAT'S A REAL CONCERN. AND I WANTED TO HEAR MORE ABOUT WHAT THE ACTUAL C.D.C., FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S, 17 18 APPROACH IS, BECAUSE THERE'S SO MANY QUESTIONS NOW WHERE 19 PEOPLE WILL BE QUARANTINED WHEN THEY ENTER THE COUNTRY, IF THEY'RE FROM, SAY, A FOREIGN COUNTRY, OR CHINA, WHERE THEY'LL 20 21 BE PLAINED, WHAT DO WE HAVE IN PLACE TO HELP PEOPLE UNDERSTAND 22 WHAT THIS MEANS, AND WHAT OUR LIABILITY, IF ANY, IS, AND THEN 23 ALSO MAKING CLEAR THAT WE HAVE INFORMATION AVAILABLE TO ALL OUR SCHOOL DISTRICTS. I MEAN, IT IS UNHEARD OF. I HEARD THIS 24 FIRST MENTIONED AT THE PRESS EVENT WITH ASSEMBLY MEMBER CHOU. 25

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IT IS SOMEBODY THAT SAID ALHAMBRA PARENTS OR SOMEONE WERE 1 CIRCULATING PETITIONS TO CLOSE THE ENTIRE SCHOOL DISTRICT 2 3 DOWN. SO THESE THINGS ARE SPREADING LIKE WILDFIRE, SO TO SPEAK, BUT I THINK WE NEED TO DO MORE AND CALM PEOPLE AND ALSO 4 5 MAKE CLEAR WHAT THEY SHOULD BE LOOKING FOR AND WHAT THEY SHOULDN'T BE LOOKING FOR. I MEAN, THE FACT THAT THERE'S ALSO 6 7 PEOPLE THAT ARE VERY WORRIED ABOUT OBTAINING MASKS, WE 8 UNDERSTAND THAT, AND WE WILL PROBABLY HEAR FROM YOU, AND 9 DOCTOR DAVIS, IF HE'S HERE, ABOUT WHAT THAT MEANS AND WHAT IT DOESN'T MEAN AND HOW WE MOVE FORWARD. SO THERE'S A LOT OF 10 11 ISSUES OUT THERE, AND I APPRECIATE WHAT YOU'RE DOING, BARBARA FERRER. YOU HAVE BEEN EXCELLENT IN HELPING US FEND OFF. BUT I 12 DO THINK THE MORE YOU CAN DO TO WORK WITH OUR SCHOOL 13 DISTRICTS, OUR COMMUNITY CENTERS, EVEN ELDERLY COMMUNITY 14 CENTERS FOR A.P.I. INDIVIDUALS, COULD BE VERY HELPFUL. SO I 15 16 THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR, FOR ALLOWING US TO HEAR THIS 17 DISCUSSION.

19 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. AND I ECHO EXACTLY WHAT YOU
20 SAID, SUPERVISOR SOLIS. SUPERVISOR HAHN, YOU WANTED TO SPEAK?
21

SUP. HAHN: YEAH, I JUST WANTED TO HAVE A FEW QUESTIONS SO THAT YOU CAN ANSWER THEM IN YOUR PRESENTATION. I UNDERSTAND YOU HAD A CONFERENCE CALL WITH THE CITIES, BUT SOME OF MY CITIES ARE WONDERING HOW THEY CAN GET BETTER INFORMATION. SO MAYBE YOU

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CAN TALK ABOUT HOW WE'RE TO COMMUNICATE WITH OUR CITIES. IS 1 THERE A NUMBER? IS THERE A HOTLINE? AND, IF THERE IS, ARE WE 2 3 ABLE TO PUT THAT ON THE SCREEN RIGHT NOW THAT PEOPLE CAN CALL? AND THEN, I HAVE BEEN ASKED, WHEN WILL LOCAL PHYSICIANS HAVE 4 5 CORONA VIRUS TESTING KITS AVAILABLE INSTEAD OF NEEDING TO SEND THEM TO C.D.C. AND I THINK I'VE GOTTEN A LOT OF-- SINCE L.A.X. 6 7 IS IN MY DISTRICT, A LOT OF CONCERNS ABOUT THE EVACUATION 8 FLIGHTS AND HOW ARE WE MAKING SURE THAT THOSE EVACUATION 9 FLIGHTS, AND THEY'RE AMERICANS THAT WE ARE EVACUATING FROM CHINA THAT ARE MAYBE COMING THROUGH L.A.X., HOW ARE WE MAKING 10 11 SURE THAT THEY ARE BEING TESTED BEFORE THEY EVEN EXIT THE PLANE. SO THOSE ARE A COUPLE THINGS THAT I HOPE YOU CAN 12 ADDRESS THAT I HAVE BEEN GETTING QUESTIONS ABOUT, THANK YOU. 13 14

15 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: SO ON THAT, ON THE PHONE NUMBER, CAN YOU -16 - WHEN YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT THAT, I KNOW WE TALKED ABOUT 211 17 IS BEING USED, BUT THERE WAS SOME ISSUES WITH SOME OF THE 18 CITIES, AND THEY HAD A CONCERN ABOUT 211'S ABILITY TO PROPERLY 19 RESPOND. SO CAN YOU GIVE US AN UPDATE ON THAT AS WELL? THANK 20 YOU, DR. FERRER.

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DR. FERRER: THANK YOU, EVERYONE, AND THANK YOU SUPERVISORS. I
REALLY APPRECIATE ALL YOUR LEADERSHIP AND, AGAIN, FEEL REALLY
BLESSED THAT WE'RE IN A COUNTY WITH SUCH TREMENDOUS
LEADERSHIP. I THINK THIS IS AN EXAMPLE WHERE YOUR LEADERSHIP

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MAKES A HUGE DIFFERENCE AND HAS MADE A HUGE DIFFERENCE, YOUR 1 ABILITY TO BE OUT FRONT TO PARTICULARLY ADDRESS HEAD ON THE 2 3 ISSUES AROUND STIGMA AND DISCRIMINATION ARE EXTRAORDINARILY IMPORTANT BECAUSE THERE IS A LOT OF FEAR AND MISINFORMATION, 4 5 BUT YOU ARE TRUSTED IN YOUR COMMUNITIES, AND PEOPLE ARE LISTENING TO YOU, AND YOUR LEADERSHIP SPEAKS VOLUMES AND 6 7 REALLY HELPS US GET TO WHAT ARE THE IMPORTANT ISSUES AND 8 REALLY CREATING A SYSTEM HERE IN L.A. COUNTY THAT PROTECTS EVERYONE WITHOUT STIGMATIZING ANYONE, WHICH IS REALLY THE TASK 9 AT HAND. I THOUGHT I WOULD DO THREE THINGS, FIRST, I GIVE YOU 10 11 AN UPDATE ON THE SPREAD OF NOVEL CORONA VIRUS AND WHAT WE KNOW TO DATE ABOUT TRANSMISSION. AND THEN, I WANTED TO FOCUS ON THE 12 FEDERAL DIRECTIVES THAT WERE ISSUED AND WHAT EXACTLY THAT 13 MEANS, AND NOT JUST FOR L.A. COUNTY, BUT REALLY FOR THE UNITED 14 15 STATES. AND THEN, I WANTED TO TALK ABOUT SOME ACTION STEPS 16 THAT WE'RE TAKING HERE, AND HOPEFULLY I ANSWER ALL THE QUESTIONS. I THINK I WILL, BUT IF I DON'T, PLEASE REMIND ME, 17 18 AND I WILL ADDRESS THEM. I ALSO WANTED TO START BY REALLY 19 THANKING BOTH THE STAFF IN MY DEPARTMENT, WHO HAVE NOW WORKED EXTRAORDINARILY LONG HOURS TRYING TO BE RESPONSIVE AND TRYING 20 TO CREATE SYSTEMS THAT WORK. AND I ALSO, I KNOW KEVIN MCGOWEN 21 22 IS HERE FROM O.E.M., AND I REALLY WANT TO THANK HIM. HE AND 23 HIS TEAM HAVE JUST BEEN AN ENORMOUS SOURCE OF SUPPORT. THEY'VE MADE CONNECTIONS WITH OTHER DEPARTMENTS FOR US. THEY'VE WORKED 24 A LOT WITH I.S.D. AND, YOU KNOW, I WANT TO JUST THANK OUR 25

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COUNTY FAMILY, ALL WHO HAVE BEEN REALLY HELPFUL ON SORT OF 1 MOUNTING THE APPROPRIATE RESPONSE FOR THE COUNTY. BUT LET ME 2 START WITH THE UPDATE ON NOVEL CORONA VIRUS. SO I WANTED TO 3 JUST START WITH WHAT'S HAPPENING LOCALLY, ONE CASE. WE STILL 4 5 ONLY HAVE ONE CASE, AND THAT ONE CASE IS A TRAVELER WHO LIVES -- WHO LIVES IN WUHAN CITY. WE DON'T HAVE ANY OTHER CASES. ALL 6 7 OF THE CLOSE CONTACTS FOR THAT ONE CASE WERE IDENTIFIED AND 8 ARE BEING FOLLOWED, AND NONE OF THEM HAVE DEVELOPED ANY 9 SYMPTOMS AS OF THIS POINT. AND THEY'LL BE CLOSING OUT, REMEMBER THAT INCUBATION PERIOD IS 14 DAYS THAT WE WILL BE 10 11 FOLLOWING THEM. BUT I WANT TO REMIND EVERYONE, WE ONLY HAVE ONE CASE IN L.A. COUNTY. CALIFORNIA HAS SIX CASES. THEY'RE 12 13 SPREAD OUT. THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES, THERE ARE ONLY 11 CASES. SO WE HAVE 11 CONFIRMED CASES IN THE UNITED STATES, 14 WASHINGTON STATE, AS YOU KNOW. OUTSIDE OF CHICAGO, THERE'S A 15 16 CASE, AND THEN WE HAVE OUR SIX CASES HERE IN L.A. COUNTY. IN TWO INSTANCES, IN THE 11 CASES, 9 OF THOSE FOLKS ACTUALLY 17 18 TRAVELED FROM WUHAN CITY AND WERE EXPOSED IN WUHAN. THERE ARE 19 TWO CASES WHERE WE HAVE TRANSMISSION, HUMAN-TO-HUMAN TRANSMISSION, IN THE UNITED STATES, BUT I WANT TO BE REALLY 20 21 CLEAR HAT THAT THAT HAPPENED WITH CLOSE CONTACTS, VERY 22 INTIMATE CASES. 23

24 SUP. HAHN: DID YOU SAY WE HAVE SIX CASES?

1 DR. FERRER: IN CALIFORNIA.

3 SUP. HAHN: OKAY.

4

5 DR. FERRER: SIX CASES IN CALIFORNIA, IN THE WHOLE STATE. INTIMATE CONTACT IS THE ROUTE OF TRANSMISSION IN THE TWO CASES 6 7 WE HAVE, AND THEY ARE LIKE HUSBAND AND WIFE SITUATIONS. I ALSO 8 WANT TO LET FOLKS KNOW THAT THERE ARE NOW 260 PERSONS THAT ARE BEING INVESTIGATED AS POSSIBLE CASES OF CORONA VIRUS, AND, OF 9 THOSE, ONLY 11 TESTED POSITIVE, 167 HAVE ALREADY HAD A TEST 10 11 THAT HAS BEEN NEGATIVE, AND THE OTHER 82 ARE PENDING. SO, AGAIN, THE VAST MAJORITY OF PEOPLE WHO ARE IDENTIFIED AS BEING 12 POSSIBLY SUSPECT CASES IN THE UNITED STATES, THE VAST MAJORITY 13 OF THEM END UP NOT HAVING NOVEL CORONA VIRUS. THEY HAVE THE 14 FLU OR SOME OTHER RESPIRATORY ILLNESS. BUT THE SITUATION IS 15 16 VERY DIFFERENT IN CHINA. CHINA HAS OVER 20,000 CONFIRMED CASES AND SLIGHTLY OVER 400 DEATHS. AND MULTIPLE HOSPITALS IN WUHAN 17 18 ARE OVERWHELMED WITH CARING FOR PEOPLE WHO WOULD LIKE TO GET 19 MEDICAL TREATMENT, AND THE NUMBERS HAVE DRAMATICALLY INCREASED ON A DAILY BASIS IN TERMS OF THE NUMBER OF CONFIRMED, INFECTED 20 21 PEOPLE IN CHINA. AND, WHILE WUHAN CITY AND THE PROVINCE OF 22 HUBEI REMAIN THE EPICENTER OF, WHAT THE C.D.C. CALLS THE HOT ZONE, OTHER PARTS OF CHINA HAVE ALSO SEEN AN INCREASE IN THEIR 23 NUMBERS. THERE IS, AGAIN, CONTINUES TO BE SMALL NUMBERS OF 24 PEOPLE THAT HAVE BEEN INFECTED AFTER PASSING THROUGH CHINA BUT 25

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ARE LIVING IN OTHER COUNTRIES. AND THERE'S A FIRST CONFIRMED 1 DEATH OF A PERSON WHO DID NOT LIVE IN CHINA. ALMOST ALL THE 2 3 DEATHS EXCEPT ONE HAVE BEEN FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE LIVING IN CHINA. BECAUSE THE SITUATION HAS CHANGED SO DRAMATICALLY IN 4 5 CHINA, ON FRIDAY NIGHT, THE WHITE HOUSE ISSUED SOME NEW DIRECTIVES. AND I JUST WANT TO GO OVER WHAT THOSE DIRECTIVES 6 7 ARE AND THEN I'LL TALK ABOUT HOW WE ARE RESPONDING, BUT THESE 8 ARE DIRECTIVES FOR EVERYONE, NOT JUST FOR L.A. COUNTY. SO THE 9 FIRST THING THAT THE PRESIDENT DID IS, HE'S ISSUED AN ORDER THAT ACTUALLY FORBIDS THE TRAVEL OF FOREIGN NATIONALS INTO ANY 10 11 PLACE IN THE UNITED STATES IF THEY HAVE RECENTLY TRAVELED ANYWHERE IN CHINA. SO FOREIGN NATIONALS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO 12 COME INTO OUR COUNTRY IF THEY'VE HAD A PREVIOUS VISIT ANYWHERE 13 IN CHINA. SO THIS ISN'T JUST CHINESE PEOPLE, THIS IS -- YOU'RE 14 GERMAN. YOU WERE IN CHINA FOR BUSINESS TWO DAYS AGO OR FOUR 15 16 DAYS AGO, YOU NOW CANNOT TRAVEL HERE FOR THE NEXT 14 DAYS. THE PRESIDENT HAS THE RIGHT AND ABILITY TO EXTEND THAT ORDER IN 17 18 14-DAY INCREMENTS AS HE CHOOSES. SO I JUST WANT TO SAY, 19 THERE'S A LOT LESS TRAVEL OF PEOPLE WHO MIGHT NORMALLY BE TRAVELING TO THE UNITED STATES EITHER FROM CHINA OR WHO HAVE 20 PASSED THROUGH CHINA. THE ONLY PEOPLE WHO ARE BEING ALLOWED TO 21 22 COME INTO THE UNITED STATES NOW WHO HAVE TRAVELED IN CHINA IN 23 THE LAST 14 DAYS ARE U.S. CITIZENS, THEIR CLOSE FAMILY MEMBERS, AND FOLKS WHO ARE EITHER ON A VISA, HAVE A GREEN 24 CARD, A RESIDENCY CARD, OR A PERMANENT RESIDENCE. YOU KNOW, 25

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THERE'S OBVIOUSLY SOME EXCEPTION CLAUSES THERE THAT THE STATE 1 -- THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE CAN USE, BUT, IN GENERAL, PEOPLE 2 3 WHO COME IN TO OUR COUNTRY, WHO HAVE RECENTLY BEEN IN CHINA, ARE U.S. CITIZENS AND THEIR CLOSE FAMILY MEMBERS. BUT EVERYONE 4 5 WHO COMES IN TO THE UNITED STATES, WHO IS A U.S. CITIZEN OR IS IN THAT CATEGORY WHERE THEY CAN ENTER, NOW HAS TO COME IN 6 7 THROUGH ONE OF 11 AIRPORTS. SO IF, ON YOUR PASSPORT, IT SHOWS 8 THAT YOU TRAVELED IN CHINA IN THE LAST 14 DAYS AND YOU'RE A U.S. CITIZEN, YOU WILL BE REBOOKED AND NEED TO FLY THROUGH ONE 9 OF 11 AIRPORTS WHERE THERE WILL BE BORDER CONTROL AND CUSTOMS 10 11 DOING SCREENING OF ALL TRAVELERS THAT ARE COMING IN. SO U.S. CITIZENS ARE WELCOME BACK. THEY CAN COME BACK IN THROUGH ONE 12 13 OF THOSE 11 AIRPORTS. THE GOVERNMENT IS ALSO REPATRIATING ANOTHER THOUSAND OR SO U.S. CITIZENS WHO ARE AFFILIATED WITH 14 THE GOVERNMENT THROUGH CHARTER FLIGHTS THAT WILL BE GOING INTO 15 16 FOUR MILITARY BASES. THAT'S THEIR ONLY WAY IN, THROUGH ONE OF 11 AIRPORTS OR YOU ARE ON A CHARTER FLIGHT GOING TO ONE OF THE 17 18 FOUR BASES. IF YOU COME INTO --

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20 SUP. SOLIS: CAN YOU NAME THOSE FOUR BASES?

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DR. FERRER: TWO ARE IN CALIFORNIA. ONE IS IN TEXAS. I'M NOT
SURE WHAT THE FOURTH IS. I CAN GET YOU THAT INFORMATION,
THOUGH. I DON'T HAVE IT ON THE TOP OF MY HEAD.

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SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: MARCH, FOR SURE. MARCH AIR FORCE BASE, FOR
 SURE.

DR. FERRER: YEAH, LET ME CHECK WHERE THE CHARTERS ARE COMING. 4 5 THERE ARE TWO DIFFERENT THINGS THAT ARE HAPPENING AT THE MILITARY BASES IN CALIFORNIA. ONE IS, THERE ARE TWO BASES THAT 6 7 ARE TAKING THESE CHARTER FLIGHTS THAT HAVEN'T LEFT YET FROM 8 CHINA BUT WILL COME WITH U.S. CITIZENS, MOSTLY PEOPLE WHO WORK 9 FOR THE GOVERNMENT OR ARE AFFILIATED WITH THE GOVERNMENT. AND THEN OTHER PEOPLE ARE COMING THROUGH THE AIRPORTS. SO LET ME 10 11 TALK ABOUT WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU'RE A U.S. TRAVELER, RECENTLY WAS IN CHINA, AND YOU SHOW UP AT ONE OF THESE 11 AIRPORTS 12 WHICH INCLUDES L.A.X. WE ARE ONE OF THE ENTRY POINTS. YOU WILL 13 GO THROUGH SCREENING AT BORDER CONTROL, AND THEY WILL -- THEY 14 WILL REALLY PLACE PEOPLE IN THREE DIFFERENT GROUPS. THE FIRST 15 16 GROUP OF FOLKS THAT THEY'RE SCREENING FOR ARE PEOPLE WHO HAVE SYMPTOMS OF RESPIRATORY ILLNESS AND THAT INCLUDES A FEVER, AND 17 18 THAT'S WHAT WE'VE BEEN DOING ALL ALONG. WE'VE BEEN SCREENING 19 FOLKS, ESPECIALLY FROM WUHAN CITY, THROUGH BORDER CONTROL, CUSTOMS AND BORDER CONTROL, AND WE'VE BEEN IDENTIFYING ANYBODY 20 WHO HAS FEVER AND RESPIRATORY ILLNESS, AND THOSE PEOPLE ARE 21 22 TRANSPORTED SAFELY AND SECURELY TO A MEDICAL FACILITY FOR 23 FURTHER SCREENING AND TESTING. THAT IS A VERY TINY NUMBER, TO DATE. VERY FEW PEOPLE HAVE SHOWED UP IN ANY OF THE AIRPORTS 24 WITH ANY SYMPTOMS THAT MAKES THEM SYMPTOMATIC AND IN NEED OF 25

ADDITIONAL SCREENING AND TESTING AT A MEDICAL FACILITY. THE 1 OTHER TRAVELERS WILL FALL INTO THE FOLLOWING TWO GROUPS. IF 2 3 YOU'VE BEEN ANYWHERE IN THE HUBEI PROVINCE, ANYWHERE, IN THE LAST 14 DAYS, YOU ARE SUBJECT TO A 14-DAY QUARANTINE. AND YOU 4 5 WILL BE TRANSPORTED SAFELY TO AN IDENTIFIED LOCATION WHERE YOU WILL BE KEPT UP TO 14 DAYS FROM YOUR LAST KNOWN EXPOSURE, 6 7 WHICH MEANS THE LAST TIME YOU VISITED ANY PLACE IN THE HUBEI 8 PROVINCE. IF YOU ARE -- THE OTHER GROUP THAT WILL BE SUBJECT 9 TO MANDATORY OUARANTINE IS IF YOU COME FROM ANYWHERE IN CHINA AND YOU HAD A CLOSE CONTACT WITH A CONFIRMED CASE OF SOMEBODY 10 11 WITH NOVEL CORON AVIRUS. SO IF YOU WERE A HOUSEHOLD MEMBER, OR YOU WERE A HEALTHCARE WORKER THAT CARED FOR SOMEBODY WHO HAS A 12 13 CONFIRMED CASE OF CORONA VIRUS, YOU, TOO, WILL NEED TO BE QUARANTINED FOR UP TO 14 DAYS. AND I'LL EXPLAIN WHAT HAPPENING 14 IN L.A., BUT I WILL PAINT THE PICTURE. THE LAST FOLKS THAT ARE 15 16 COMING ARE COMING FROM EVERYWHERE ELSE IN CHINA, WHO ARE, AGAIN, U.S. CITIZENS OR THEIR CLOSE FAMILY MEMBERS. THEY WILL 17 18 NEED TO GET SCREENED AT THE AIRPORT. INFORMATION WILL BE 19 COLLECTED. THEY WILL BE ALLOWED TO GO ON TO THEIR FINAL DESTINATION. REMEMBER, THESE ARE PEOPLE WITH NO SYMPTOMS. 20 THEY'VE JUST BEEN IN CHINA. THEY HAVEN'T BEEN A CLOSE CONTACT, 21 22 AND THEY AREN'T COMING FROM THE HUBEI PROVINCE WHERE THERE'S 23 THE MOST CASES. THEY'RE ALLOWED TO GO TO THEIR FINAL DESTINATION. THE LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT IN THEIR FINAL 24 DESTINATION WILL BE FOLLOWING UP WITH THEM FOR UP TO 14 DAYS 25

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FROM THEIR LAST EXPOSURE TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY ARE ACTIVELY 1 MONITORING THEMSELVES FOR ANY SIGNS OR SYMPTOMS OF DISEASE OR 2 3 ILLNESS. THAT INCLUDES THEY NEED TO TAKE THEIR TEMPERATURE TWICE A DAY AND RECORD IT, AND THEY NEED TO MONITOR THEMSELVES 4 5 FOR ANY RESPIRATORY ILLNESS SYMPTOMS. THEY WILL BE REPORTING TO THE LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT. AND AGAIN, I WILL TALK 6 ABOUT WHAT WE ARE DOING HERE, BUT THAT IS THE SYSTEM FOR THE 7 8 WHOLE COUNTRY. THAT WILL HAPPEN WHEREVER YOU ARE IN THE 9 COUNTRY IF YOU ARE A RETURNING TRAVELER FROM CHINA WHO HAS BEEN THERE IN THE LAST 14 DAYS. HERE, IN L.A. COUNTY, LET ME 10 11 TALK NOW SPECIFICALLY WHAT WE'RE DOING IN L.A. COUNTY IN TERMS OF TRAVELERS COMING INTO OUR AIRPORT. SO WE'RE WORKING 12 CLOSELY, AND WE HAVE BEEN FOR THE LAST TWO AND A HALF WEEKS, 13 WITH THE FOLKS AT THE QUARANTINE STATION AT L.A. COUNTY AND 14 ALL OF THE WORKERS AT L.A. AIRPORT AND, AGAIN, OUR O.E.M. 15 16 PARTNERS, BOTH AT THE CITY LEVEL AND AT THE COUNTY LEVEL. FOLKS ARE OBVIOUSLY, AS THEY'RE BEING SCREENED, THE SCREENERS 17 18 ARE USING APPROPRIATE PERSONAL -- USING PERSONAL PROTECTION 19 EQUIPMENT, SO THAT THERE AREN'T ANY UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES THERE OF EXPOSURES AS WELL. AND WE, TOO, HAVE A SYSTEM SET UP 20 TO IMMEDIATELY TRANSPORT TO A MEDICAL FACILITY IN L.A. COUNTY 21 22 ANYBODY WHO IS SYMPTOMATIC. IF FOLKS ARE NOT SYMPTOMATIC, AND 23 THEY HAVE BEEN IN THE HUBEI PROVINCE, WE HAVE A SYSTEM SET UP TO SAFELY TRANSPORT THOSE FOLKS TO MARSH AIR FORCE BASE IN 24 RIVERSIDE COUNTY. THE QUARANTINE ORDERS ARE ISSUED BY THE 25

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FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, BY C.D.C. THEY ARE TRANSPORTED SAFELY AND 1 SECURELY TO THE BASE, AND THE BASE IS EQUIPPED TO DETERMINE 2 3 HOW LONG THAT QUARANTINE PERIOD IS GOING TO BE FOR, AND THEY ARE SET UP TO ACTUALLY ALLOW PEOPLE TO BE SAFELY OUARANTINED 4 5 AND MAKE SURE THEY'RE FED, AND IF THEY NEED MEDICAL ATTENTION, THEY ARE EASILY ABLE TO GET MEDICAL ATTENTION. OBVIOUSLY, WE 6 WORK CLOSELY WITH OUR PARTNERS AT THE RIVERSIDE COUNTY PUBLIC 7 8 HEALTH DEPARTMENT AND OUR WONDERFUL PARTNERS AT THE STATE 9 HEALTH DEPARTMENT, SO WE'RE ALL COORDINATED ABOUT INFORMATION SHARING THAT NEEDS TO BE SHARED, AND MAKING SURE THERE'S 10 11 ENOUGH SUPPORT AT THE BASE FOR FOLKS TO BE SAFELY CARED FOR DURING THE OUARANTINE PERIOD. FOR THOSE FOLKS WHOSE FINAL 12 13 DESTINATION IS L.A. COUNTY, AND THEY'RE NOT SUBJECT TO THE MANDATORY QUARANTINE, WE GET THEIR INFORMATION FROM THE BORDER 14 CONTROL FOLKS. WE SET UP A SYSTEM. WE MONITOR -- ACTIVELY 15 16 MONITOR THOSE PEOPLE FROM 14 DAYS FROM THEIR LAST EXPOSURE. AND THOSE FOLKS HAVE BEEN ASKED TO EXCLUDE THEMSELVES FROM 17 18 PUBLIC ACTIVITIES. SO, LET ME TALK ABOUT THAT FOR A SECOND. 19 EVERYBODY WHO HAS BEEN ANYWHERE IN CHINA, AND IS NOT OUARANTINED BECAUSE THEY CAME FROM THE HUBEI PROVINCE, THEY 20 NEED TO SELF-ISOLATE THEMSELVES FROM THE GENERAL PUBLIC FOR UP 21 22 TO 14 DAYS FROM THEIR LAST EXPOSURE AS THEY ARE BEING 23 MONITORED BY THEIR LOCAL PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT. THIS MEANS THAT THOSE FOLKS WHO ARE COMING IN NOW, THIS IS A MOVE-FORWARD 24 BASIS, THIS ISN'T FOLKS WHO CAME IN BEFORE THIS DIRECTIVE WAS 25

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ISSUED. THIS IS ON A MOVE-FORWARD BASIS. THOSE FOLKS ARE 1 GETTING NOTICED AT THE QUARANTINE STATION ABOUT THEIR 2 3 RESTRICTIONS. THE LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT WILL BE WORKING WITH THEM TO MAKE SURE THEY, TOO, WHILE THEY STAY HOME, HAVE WHAT 4 5 THEY NEED. SO WE NEED TO WORK WITH -- WITH PEOPLE WHO MAY NOT HAVE A GOOD WAY TO GET THEIR FOOD, ETC., SO THAT THEY CAN 6 REMAIN IN THEIR HOMES SAFELY. WE ARE ASKING SCHOOLS AND 7 8 EMPLOYERS TO ACCOMMODATE PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT ABLE TO NOW ATTEND 9 SCHOOL FOR UP TO 14 DAYS OR GO TO WORK FOR UP TO 14 DAYS. IF THERE ARE TELEWORK OPTIONS FOR SOME EMPLOYEES, WE SUGGEST 10 11 THAT. WE ARE TRYING TO MINIMIZE ECONOMIC HARDSHIP FOR FOLKS WHO ARE SUBJECT TO THIS RESTRICTION. AND OBVIOUSLY FOR FOLKS 12 WHO ARE IN SCHOOL, WE'D LIKE TO MAKE SURE THAT SCHOOLS ARE 13 ABLE TO PROVIDE THEM WITH THE MATERIALS THEY NEED CONTINUE 14 THEIR STUDIES IN A HOME ENVIRONMENT. THEY ARE NOT QUARANTINED, 15 16 HOWEVER. THEY ARE JUST ASKED TO EXCLUDE THEMSELVES FROM PUBLIC ACTIVITIES. AND WE ARE WORKING WITH THEM, OUR -- OUR PUBLIC 17 18 HEALTH NURSES ARE ASSIGNED TO FOLKS. SO WE -- EVERY PUBLIC 19 HEALTH NURSE IS ASSIGNED TO A GROUP OF PEOPLE THAT THEY MONITOR, AND THEY CHECK IN WITH THEM TO MAKE SURE THAT THIS 20 ALL WORKS AND THAT THEY ARE, IN FACT, ADHERING TO THE 21 22 RESTRICTION TO NOT CIRCULATE IN THE GENERAL PUBLIC. THE OTHER 23 THINGS WE NEED TO DO, AS YOU'VE NOTED AND THAT WE'RE IN THE PROCESS OF DOING, IS MAKING SURE PEOPLE HAVE REALLY GOOD 24 INFORMATION. SO, TODAY, WE WILL DO THREE MORE TELEBRIEFINGS, 25

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STARTING AT 2:00. ELECTED OFFICIALS, COUNTY DEPARTMENTS, WILL 1 BE DOING ONE, I THINK, AT 3:00 WITH CHILDCARE PROVIDERS IN K-2 12 SCHOOLS AND THEN ONE AT 5:00 WITH UNIVERSITIES AND 3 COLLEGES. WE'RE ALSO SETTING UP A CALL CENTER THAT WILL BE 4 5 SPECIFIC FOR ELECTED OFFICIALS, SCHOOLS, AND UNIVERSITIES, AND CHILDCARE CENTERS, AND OTHER COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS 6 7 THAT NEED ADDITIONAL INFORMATION. THEY HAVE OUESTIONS THAT 8 REALLY NEED A SPECIFIC PERSON TO ANSWER, AND IT IS NOT GOING 9 TO BE THE 211 OPERATORS. BUT THE 211 OPERATORS WILL STILL BE THE PLACE FOR PEOPLE TO GO FROM THE GENERAL PUBLIC. THEY HAVE 10 11 A LOT OF GOOD INFORMATION. THEY CAN REFER PEOPLE TO OUR WEBSITE. THEY CAN CONNECT PEOPLE WHO DON'T HAVE CARE AND ARE 12 13 LOOKING FOR CARE TO A CARE PROVIDER. WE ALSO CONTINUE TO UPDATE ALL THE GUIDANCE TO ALL OF THE PROVIDERS IN L.A. 14 COUNTY. WE ISSUE OUR -- OUR L.A. NETWORK ISSUES UPDATES. WE 15 16 WORK WITH ALL OF OUR HOSPITALS TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY, TOO, HAVE UPDATED INFORMATION AND CAN, IN FACT, MANAGE WHAT MAY BE 17 18 AN INFLUX OF FOLKS WHO ARE GOING TO BE SEEKING CARE.

5 DR. FERRER: WE CAN ADD THAT. I MEAN, WE KNOW THAT THERE'S A LOT OF CONCERN WHERE CHILDREN ARE. AND WE WANT TO ABSOLUTELY 6 MAKE SURE THAT NO SCHOOLS ARE CLOSING. THERE'S NO REASON FOR 7 8 ANY SCHOOL TO CLOSE. WE HAVE ONE CASE IN L.A. COUNTY, AND IT 9 IS NOT A RESIDENT CASE. THERE'S NO REASON FOR SCHOOLS TO CLOSE. THERE'S NO REASON FOR THAT LEVEL OF PANIC. PEOPLE CAN 10 11 REALLY GO ABOUT THEIR DAILY ACTIVITIES. THE ONLY PEOPLE THAT ARE IMMEDIATELY AFFECTED ARE RECENT TRAVELERS TO CHINA WHO ARE 12 U.S. CITIZENS. THE NUMBER OF 14 PEOPLE THAT ARE ANTICIPATED TO COME BACK IS NOT A VERY LARGE 15 16 NUMBER, ACCORDING TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. AND WE'RE AT THE AIRPORT. WE MONITOR THE FLIGHTS AS WELL. AND I JUST WANT TO URGE EVERYONE, IT IS SCARY WHAT'S HAPPENING IN CHINA, 20 BUT THAT'S NOT WHAT'S HAPPENING IN L.A. COUNTY. 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5 DR. FERRER: RIGHT NOW, WE ARE RELYING A LOT ON 211, AND 211 HAS A SET OF NUMBERS TO FORWARD CALLS TO ANOTHER NUMBER. SO, 6 7 FOR EXAMPLE, ANY PROVIDERS THAT CALL TO 211 ARE REDIRECTED TO 8 OUR PROVIDER LINE. SO WE HAVE ALREADY SET UP A LINE THAT IS 9 SPECIFIC FOR PROVIDERS. WE OBVIOUSLY DON'T GIVE THAT OUT TO EVERYONE BECAUSE THEY ONLY WANT MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS TO CALL 10 11 THAT LINE. THOSE ARE PROVIDERS CALLING ABOUT A PARTICULAR 14 PATIENT. WE'VE ADDED A LOT OF STAFF INTERNALLY TO HELP MAKE 15 16 SURE WE'RE HANDLING ALL THOSE CALLS. WE ALSO HAVE AN AFTER-HOURS CALL FOR HEALTHCARE FACILITIES AND FOR PROVIDERS. SO 17 THIS IS A 24/7 SERVICE THAT WE OFFER TO PROVIDERS. SO 18 19 REGARDLESS OF THE TIME OF DAY, THEY'RE ABLE TO REACH US. AND AS I SAID, WE'LL BE SETTING UP A SPECIAL HOTLINE FOR, YOU 20 KNOW, ELECTED OFFICIALS, YOU KNOW, UNIVERSITIES, COLLEGES, 21 22 FOLKS WHO HAVE A LOT OF LEGITIMATE QUESTIONS RIGHT NOW AND 23 REALLY NEED ATTENTION, MORE ATTENTION THAN THEY GET ON A TELEBRIEFING. BARGER, CHAIR: AND IF IT IS -- BECAUSE I AGREE WITH YOU. 14 IF IT BECOMES SUCH THAT THEY CANNOT --15 16 DR. FERRER: WE WILL COME UP WITH ANOTHER SOLUTION. 17 18 19 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: AND THEN WE WILL CREATE AN 800 NUMBER, WHICH WE MAY WANT TO THINK ABOUT DOING MOVING FORWARD. 20 21 22 SUP. HAHN: AND IT DIDN'T SEEM LIKE IT WAS THE CAPACITY THAT 23 WAS THE PROBLEM. SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THAT WAS WHAT THEY FIRST SAID THAT 1 SUPERVISOR SOLIS IS RIGHT. 2 3 SUP. HAHN: RIGHT. 4 5 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: IF THAT NUMBER IS NOW BEING GIVEN OUT AND 6 7 THEY CAN'T KEEP UP WITH IT, SO YOU'RE RIGHT. I MEAN THAT WAS 8 THE ISSUE YESTERDAY, BUT NOW I THINK IT IS MORE ABOUT 9 CAPACITY. DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL: YES, GOOD MORNING BOARD OF
SUPERVISORS, DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL. ONE GOOD THING, WE ARE IN
THE U.S., AND WE HAVE FANTASTIC SCIENTISTS, AND TONY FAUCI,
WHO IS THE HEAD OF N.I.A.I.D. FOR MANY, MANY YEARS. AND ONE
THING HE STRESSED WAS TO REALLY KEEP IN MIND THAT WE NEED TO



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

SUCCESSFUL 4 5 YOUTH COMMISSIONS OF ANY KIND ARE EXCEEDINGLY RARE ACROSS THE UNITED STATES AND RARER STILL, ANY COMPRISED OF YOUTH WHO ARE 6 7 ALUMNI OF FOSTER CARE OR JUVENILE JUSTICE. L.A.'S MODEL IS 8 TRULY INNOVATIVE IN ITS PROPOSED MEMBERSHIP, IN THE SUPPORTS 9 IT HAS BUILT IN TO ENSURE SUCCESS, IN ITS PLACE IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT, AND IN ITS EMPOWERMENT OF YOUTH TO HAVE DIRECT 10 11 IMPACT ON POLICIES AND PROGRAMS THAT AFFECT CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILIES IN OUR COUNTY. THIS COUNTY YOUTH COMMISSION WILL 12 LIFT UP VOICES THAT ARE TOO OFTEN NOT HEARD AT ALL. 13

15 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: NO, YOU CAN SUMMARIZE. OKAY, NEXT SPEAKER? 16

TAMARA HUNTER: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS TAMARA HUNTER, AND I'M 17 18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE COMMISSION FOR CHILDREN AND 19 FAMILIES. AS STATED BY DR. SMITH, THE COMMISSION THANKS YOU FOR INTRODUCING THIS MOTION AND FOR ENLISTING US TO LEAD THE 20 WORK THAT LED US TO THIS POINT. IN ASSESSING THE FEASIBILITY 21 22 OF ESTABLISHING A YOUTH ADVISORY BODY HERE IN L.A. COUNTY, WE 23 ENGAGED MORE THAN 170 YOUNG PEOPLE WITH LIVED EXPERIENCE AND REPRESENTATIVES FROM APPROXIMATELY 75 ORGANIZATIONS AND COUNTY 24 DEPARTMENTS THROUGH A VARIETY OF WAYS. THROUGH THESE EFFORTS, 25

IT BECAME EXCEEDINGLY CLEAR THAT THIS IS AN IDEA AND 1 INITIATIVE WHOSE TIME HAS COME. THE YOUTH COMMISSION WILL NOT 2 ONLY GIVE A POWERFUL VOICE TO THOSE IMPACTED BY THE CHILD 3 WELFARE AND JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEMS, BUT IT WILL ALSO PROVIDE 4 5 YOUR BOARD AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO BETTER LEVERAGE THE UNIQUE AND INVALUABLE EXPERTISE THAT CAN ONLY BE 6 7 DERIVED FROM LIVED EXPERIENCE. AND THIS EXPERTISE CAN BE 8 UTILIZED TO DRIVE SYSTEMS TRANSFORMATION AND IMPROVE LIFE 9 OUTCOMES FOR VULNERABLE CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILIES IN THIS 10 COUNTY. 11 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. 12 13

TIFFANY BOYD: HELLO AND GOOD AFTERNOON! MY NAME IS TIFFANY 14 BOYD. I STAND BEFORE YOU, NOT JUST AS A FOSTER YOUTH WHO WAS 15 16 EMANCIPATED OUT OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SYSTEM, NOT JUST AS A PROBATION YOUTH WHO CAME OUT OF THE LONG BEACH PROBATION 17 18 OFFICE, NOT JUST A COMMISSIONER ON THE COMMISSION FOR CHILDREN 19 AND FAMILIES, BUT I'M THE VICE CHAIR NOW, Y'ALL. SO THANK YOU TO SUPERVISOR HAHN FOR TAKING THE CHANCE TO PUT ME ON THE 20 COMMISSION. THESE ARE THE TYPE OF THINGS THAT HAPPEN WHEN YOU 21 22 PUT PEOPLE IN THE DRIVER SEATS TO THEIR LIVES. IN TWO YEARS, 23 NOT ONLY WAS I ABLE TO BECOME THE VICE CHAIR OF THE COMMISSION, WE CREATED AN ENTIRE NEW COMMISSION FROM UNDER 24 THAT. I WISH YOU WERE ALL THERE TWO YEARS AGO WHEN WE STARTED 25

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HAVING THE CONVERSATIONS. I WISH YOU GUYS WERE THERE TO SEE MY 1 FACE WHEN THEY TOLD ME THE COUNTY HAD ENOUGH COMMISSIONS, AND 2 3 THEY WOULD NEVER CREATE ANOTHER ONE. I WISH YOU COULD SEE MY FACE WHEN WE WERE TOLD THAT THERE ARE PLATFORMS FOR US THAT 4 5 CURRENTLY EXIST RIGHT NOW AND THAT WE CURRENTLY HAVE ACCESS TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, NOT THE TYPE OF ACCESS THAT WE 6 7 NEEDED. AND I THANK YOU ALL. AND ONE THING THAT I WANT TO 8 POINT OUT TO THIS BECAUSE I KNOW WE HAVE SPOKEN TO THE FACT OF 9 OUR BENEFIT TO THIS, BUT THIS IS VERY MUCH QUID PRO QUO.

14 WE ARE APPRECIATIVE.

4 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, GO AHEAD. NEXT SPEAKER.

CARMEN NOYOLA: GOOD AFTERNOON SUPERVISORS AND MEMBERS OF THE 6 7 PUBLIC. MY NAME IS CARMEN NOYOLA. I'M A FORMER 8 PROBATION/FOSTER YOUTH AND AN ARCHITECT OF THE YOUTH 9 COMMISSION. I FULLY SUPPORT THIS MOTION. THE YOUTH COMMISSION IS AN INTENTIONAL EFFORT TO IMPROVE L.A. COUNTY POLICIES AND 10 11 PRACTICES FOR SYSTEM IMPACTED YOUTH AND THEIR FAMILIES THROUGH THE INCLUSION OF THOSE WITH LIVED EXPERIENCE. I WOULD LIKE TO 12 13 THANK EVERYONE WHO HELPED THROUGHOUT THE PROCESS, ESPECIALLY THOSE WHO EXECUTED THE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PIECE. PAID 14 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNITY-BASED PARTICIPATORY 15 16 RESEARCH WERE PRACTICES THAT ALLOWED FOR REAL INPUT AND PARTNERSHIP. WHEN WE ACKNOWLEDGE YOUTH AS EXPERTS OF THEIR OWN 17 18 LIVES, WE BEGIN TO VALUE THEM AS PARTNERS IN THIS WORK. 19 PROVIDING A VOICE AND A PLATFORM ALSO GIVES COMMUNITIES THE SKILLS AND RESOURCES NEEDED TO HEAL THEMSELVES. SO THANK YOU 20 FOR YOUR WILLINGNESS TO SEE YOUTH AS VALUABLE PARTNERS IN 21 22 IMPROVING THE SYSTEMS THEY ARE CURRENTLY IN OR HAVE BEEN A 23 PART OF. I LOOK FORWARD TO ASSISTING THE YOUTH COMMISSION 24 DEVELOP INTO ITS FULLEST POTENTIAL.

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SUP. SOLIS: THANK YOU, I ALSO WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE LUCERA
 NOYOLA, WHO ALSO PARTICIPATED IN THE WORKING GROUP. SHE WAS
 INTERNING IN OUR OFFICE, AND I KNOW THIS MEANS A GREAT DEAL,
 NOT JUST TO HER, BUT TO SO MANY OF US. SO, THANK YOU FOR YOUR
 SERVICE. YES, NEXT SPEAKER, PLEASE.

I'M 8 ONE OF THE ARCHITECTS FOR THE YOUTH COMMISSION BOARD, AND I 9 WANTED TO SAY THAT I'M HONORED TO HAVE MY VOICE REPRESENT THOUSANDS OF YOUTH AND HELP TO CREATE CHANGE. THIS YOUTH 10 11 COMMISSION IS GOING TO IMPROVE THE LONG-TERM EFFECT AND SUCCESS FOR FOSTER YOUTH AND PROBATION YOUTH. SO I FULLY 12 SUPPORT EVERYTHING THAT WE'RE DOING AND THANK YOU GUYS AHEAD 13 OF TIME, BUT THIS IS IMPORTANT TO ME AND OUR ARCHITECTS AND 14 OTHER YOUTH IS BECAUSE WE ARE THE -- WE ARE THE ONES WHO WENT 15 16 THROUGH THE TRAUMATIC EFFECT IN THE FOSTER SYSTEM AND HAVE TO DEAL WITH OUR PROBLEMS BECAUSE OF THAT, AND WE ARE THE ONES 17 18 THAT CAN ONLY GET OURSELVES OUT OF IT. AND NOT ONLY THAT, BUT 19 SOME PEOPLE DON'T WANT TO REPRESENT THEMSELVES SO THAT WE'RE HERE AND THE YOUTH COMMISSION IS HERE FOR THAT, AND OUR VOICES 20 21 IS POWER, AND OUR POWER IS WHAT BUILDS SELF WORTH AND SELF 22 VALUE TO US BECAUSE OF WHAT WE WENT THROUGH. SO I THINK THAT 23 IS THE MAIN GOAL HERE.

25 SUP. SOLIS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

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1 2 MYRIAH SMILEY: THIS IS A HISTORICAL MOMENT. SO I THINK YOU 3 GUYS, AND WE WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE. 4 5 SUP. SOLIS: VERY GOOD. THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER, PLEASE. 6 7 JAE CANAS: GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS JAE CANAS. I AM WITH THE 8 D.M.H. U.C.L.A. CENTER OF EXCELLENCE. I'D LIKE TO THANK YOU, BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, SUPERVISOR HAHN AND KUEHL. AS A FORMER 9 FOSTER YOUTH, I AM INSPIRED BY MY LIVED EXPERIENCE TO 10 TRANSFORM THE FOSTER CARE SYSTEM THROUGH POLICY AND HIGH-LEVEL 11 SYSTEMS CHANGE. AND SO ARE MEMBERS WITH LIVED EXPERIENCE, 12 13 STORIES, LESSONS, AND ACHIEVEMENTS THAT CAN SHAPE POLICY, PROGRAMMING, AND SERVICE PROVISION. THIS -- THIS COMMISSION 14 ALLOWS THE OPPORTUNITY TO NOT ONLY AMPLIFY YOUTH VOICES, BUT 15 16 SHAPE THE FUTURE OF L.A. COUNTY COMMUNITIES AND RE-WRITE NARRATIVES FOR MANY OTHER UNHEARD VOICES. I SUPPORT THIS 17 18 MOTION AND THE POTENTIAL TO IMPACT THE LIVES OF THE WORKING 19 YOUTH BOARD AND THE THOUSANDS OF LIVES THAT WILL BENEFIT FROM THESE RECOMMENDATIONS. THIS WILL BE A CONTINUATION OF A 20 JOURNEY OF HEALING FOR SOME, BUT THE BEGINNING OF HEALING FOR 21 22 MANY OTHERS. THANK YOU.

SO WE WILL TAKE A FIVE-MINUTE RECESS. SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY, WE ARE BACK IN SESSION. AS CHAIR, AND UNFORTUNATELY THE INDIVIDUALS IN QUESTION WERE NOT HERE WHEN THE CODE OF CONDUCT WAS READ, BUT YOU ARE OUT OF ORDER AND DISRUPTIVE, AND THERE HAVE BEEN COMPLAINTS LODGED, THEREFORE, MR. ARNOLD SACHS: THANK YOU, AGAIN. ARNOLD SACHS. YOU HAVE IN 4 5 PLACE A YOUTH ADVISORY BODY WORK GROUP, AND YOU HAVE A YOUTH ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE TO INFORM PEOPLE. NOW YOU WANT TO CREATE 6 A YOUTH COMMISSION. IS THIS A NEW CLASSIFICATION WITH A SALARY 7 8 INCREASE? ALSO, NOT HEARD IN THIS ITEM IS A BUDGET FOR THIS 9 ITEM. AND WE HEARD SOMEBODY JUST TALK ABOUT UNHEARD VOICES. WELL, THERE'S A LOT OF UNHEARD VOICES. THE WAY YOU GET YOUR 10 11 VOICE HEARD IS YOU GO TO A MEETING, AND YOU SPEAK UP, THEN YOU GET YOUR VOICE HEARD. NOW, UNDER 18 REFERS TO YOUTH. I BELIEVE 12 THAT'S THE LAW. AND OVER 18, YOU'RE AN ADULT. THAT'S ALSO THE 13 LAW. SO YOUR COMMITTEE IS ONLY TO INFORM PEOPLE THAT ARE UNDER 14 18, WHICH MAKES THEM YOUTH. DOES THAT INCLUDE THEIR GUIDANCE 15 16 COUNSELORS OR WHATEVER? ANOTHER -- BY THE WAY, THE BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE THAT YOU HAD, BEFORE YOU WERE SUPERVISORS, WHAT WORK 17 18 DID THEY DO ON THIS PROBLEM?

20 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, MR. SACHS, AND AGAIN, THANK YOU 21 FOR YOUR PATIENCE. NEXT SPEAKER.

23 DIANA SAMERON: HI, GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS DIANA GAMA24 SAMERON.

8 DIANA SAMERON: GOOD AFTERNOON, MY NAME IS DIANA GAMA SAMERON, 9 AND I'M THE TRANSITION AGE YOUTH PROJECT COORDINATOR AT PUBLIC COUNSEL. OUR PROJECT ASSISTS CURRENT AND FORMER FOSTER CARE 10 11 AND PROBATION YOUTH TRANSITIONING OUT OF THESE SYSTEMS. THE TRANSITION FOR MANY OF THESE YOUTH MEAN BECOMING HOMELESS ON 12 THE DAY THEY TURN 21. FOR YOUNG PARENTS IN THESE SYSTEMS, IT 13 MEANS BEING OVER POLICED ON THEIR PARENTING PRACTICES, WHICH 14 TOO OFTEN LEAD TO THE REMOVAL OF THEIR OWN CHILDREN. MANY OF 15 16 THESE YOUNG PEOPLE SHARE THE SAME FEELING OF ANGER TOWARDS THESE SYSTEMS BECAUSE OF THE HARM AND TRAUMA INFLICTED ON THEM 17 18 AND THEIR COMMUNITIES. THIS ANGER BEGINS WHEN THEY ARE 19 SEPARATED FROM THEIR FAMILIES AND PLACED IN A SYSTEM THAT MOVES THEM AROUND FROM PLACEMENT TO PLACEMENT WITH NO REGARD 20 TO THE HARM CREATED. THIS ANGER DOES NOT END WHEN THEY EXIT 21 22 FOSTER CARE BECAUSE THEY ARE NOW LEFT WITH NO CONNECTION TO 23 THEIR FAMILIES OR COMMUNITIES AND MUCH LESS TO THE SYSTEM THAT, IN THE NAME OF PROTECTION, DID MORE HARM THAN PROTECT. 24 IT IS TIME FOR THESE SYSTEMS TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THE VOICES OF 25

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THOSE IMPACTED ARE THE MOST IMPORTANT VOICES, AND I'M HOPEFUL
 THE CREATION OF THE COUNTY WIDE YOUTH COMMISSION WILL MEAN
 THAT YOUNG PEOPLE DO NOT ONLY HAVE A PLACE TO BE HEARD, BUT
 THEIR VOICES AND CONCERNS TO LEAD TO ACCOUNTABILITY --

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SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, THANK YOU. THANK YOU. NEXT
SPEAKER.

DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL: GOOD AFTERNOON, BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. 9 DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL. I KNOW THAT BOTH SUPERVISOR HAHN AND 10 11 KUEHL CARE A LOT ABOUT THEIR YOUTH, AND I UNDERSTAND YOUR DESIRE TO CREATE A COMMISSION, BUT I AM CONCERNED WHEN I SEE 12 MANY OF THE COMMISSION WE HAVE NOW, MOST OF THE TIME, CANNOT 13 EVEN ESTABLISH A QUORUM. THAT IS CONCERNING TO ME. WE ARE 14 GOING TO ADD STAFF AND SO ON. I REALLY REQUEST, AND IF YOU ARE 15 16 GOING TO CREATE, AND I KNOW IT IS BECAUSE YOU CARE, SO DO I, BUT WHEN I HAVE SEEN MANY OF THE COMMISSIONS THAT I GO TO, 17 18 SOMETIMES IT IS SIX MONTHS BEFORE THERE'S A QUORUM, INCLUDING 19 W.G.I. AND SO I THINK, YOU KNOW, I UNDERSTAND THE INTENT, BUT PLEASE BE CAREFUL TO MAKE SURE IT FUNCTIONS THE WAY YOU HAVE 20 INTENDED TO. AND ALSO TELL THE GUARD NOT TO RETALIATE AGAINST 21 22 ME.



17 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. THANK YOU. THANK YOU. [
18 APPLAUSE]. NEXT SPEAKER.

19

20 DR. MELLO DESIRE: SO THIS COMMISSION IS A LONG TIME COMING, 21 AND I'M GLAD THAT IT IS COMING TO FRUITION. THE AGE SHOULD BE 22 16 NOT 18. IF YOU ARE SNATCHING KIDS AT AN EARLY AGE, THEY 23 HAVE WAY MORE EXPERIENCE THAN YOU THINK WHEN THEY ARE STUFFED 24 IN ABUSIVE FOSTER CARE SYSTEMS. THEY GROW UP FAST. 14 YEARS 25 OLD WAS WHERE I WOULD START BECAUSE, AT 14, YOU HAVE SOME OF

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THEM GETTING PREGNANT. SO, IF THEY CAN GET PREGNANT, THEY CAN 1 DEFINITELY ADVISE THEIR OPINION ON WHAT BETTER TO SUIT THEM 2 3 AND SERVE THEIR FAMILIES. I AM, RIGHT NOW, HAVING TO SERVE AN EULOGY BECAUSE A MOTHER WHO WAS TRYING TO GET FUNDING, TRYING 4 5 TO GET HOUSING FOR HER TWO KIDS THAT D.C.F.S. SNATCHED IS NOW DEAD. SO LET'S HOPE THAT THIS IS DOING SOMETHING GREAT, BUT 6 7 LET'S START WITH THE 16-YEAR-OLDS. 8 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. 10 DOVONTRAY FARMER: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS DOVONTRAY WITH 11 YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION, AND I'M EXCITED TO BE HERE TO CREATE 12 L.A.'S COUNTY FIRST COMMISSION. I GREW UP IN LOS ANGELES 13 MYSELF. GROWING UP IN L.A., EVEN AS A BABY, I WAS AFFECTED BY 14 THIS. WHY? BECAUSE ME GROWING UP WITHOUT MY FATHER, BEING 15 16 LOCKED AWAY IN CHAINS IN JAIL, IT DID SOMETHING TO ME AND AFFECTED ME IN A REAL WAY. AND WHEN HIGH SCHOOL CAME, POLICE WERE PRESSED UP ON 21 22 ME AND MY FRIENDS BECAUSE OF MY TATTOOS AND JUST BECAUSE OF 23 WHO I HANG AROUND WITH. THEY LOOKED AT US AS IF WE WERE MONSTERS IN HOW WE LOOKED AND DRESSED. I DON'T KNOW, THEY JUST 24

11	CHANCEY, KIM MCGILL, LUPITA CARBALLO, MAGDELENA MIRELES, MARY

13	CORTEZ, RONALDO VILLEDA, WAYNE SPINDLER, YAHNIJE BRIDGES.
14	PLEASE COME FORWARD AND STAFF WILL ASSIST YOU.

16	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: NEXT SPEAKER.
17	
18	SPEAKER: THANK YOU ALL FOR YOUR TIME. I'M HERE IN FAVOR FOR
19	THIS. I KNOW AS A FORMER FOSTER YOUTH, THE IMPACT THAT FOSTER
20	YOUTH CAN HAVE IS NEGATIVE, BUT WITH THE RIGHT PEOPLE
21	INVESTING IN US, FOSTER CARE CAN BE A BLESSING. I WAS IN
22	FOSTER CARE FROM 4 YEARS OLD TO 21 YEARS OLD, AND I'M STANDING
23	HERE IN FRONT OF YOU WITH SO MUCH EXPERIENCE FROM WORKING WITH
24	THE CHILDREN'S LAW CENTER, P.B.S., PENNY LANE, AND SO MANY
25	OTHERS. WE ARE MORE THAN JUST TRAUMA. WE ARE HERE TRYING TO

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PAVE A WAY FOR OTHER FOSTER YOUTH TO SUCCEED AND HAVE THE 1 GUIDANCE THAT MAYBE MY GENERATION IN FOSTER CARE DIDN'T HAVE. 2 3 BUT, YOU KNOW, IT IS ALL ABOUT CHANGE AND JUST HAVING THIS CONVERSATION IS CHANGE. SO IN ORDER TO BETTER COMMUNITIES, WE 4 5 NEED TO INVEST IN THE YOUTH, AND A BUNCH OF OUR YOUTH ARE IN FOSTER CARE. SO IMPROVING FOSTER CARE STARTS WITH TALKING TO 6 7 FOSTER YOUTH. THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME. 8 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. 10 11 JACOB JACKSON: HOW ARE YOU DOING? MY NAME IS JACOB JACKSON, AND I'M WITH THE YOUTH JUSTICE COLLATION, AND IT IS AN HONOR 12 TO CREATE THE FIRST L.A. YOUTH COMMISSION. GROWING UP IN LOS 13 ANGELES, A POLICE STOP AFFECTED ME BEFORE I WAS BORN DUE TO MY 14 BROTHER BEING SHOT AND KILLED BY L.A.P.D. IN 1994. MY MOTHER 15 16 WAS NEVER THE SAME. SHE WAS DEPRESSED, HANDLED THINGS TO HERSELF, AND BECAME VERY HYPERALERT FOR MY SAFETY GROWING UP 17 18 IN MY COMMUNITY. I WAS SEEN BY POLICE AS A THREAT TO THEM, 19 ALWAYS GETTING STOPPED, PATTED, FRISKED, AND QUESTIONED WITH THE FIRST LINE, "WHERE IS THE GUN AT?" AT THE AGE OF 16, I WAS 20 AFFECTED BY THE SCHOOL TO JAIL TRACK, PUSHED OUT OF SCHOOLS 21 22 INTO THE STREET. THAT LED ME TO BE ARRESTED, DETAINED, AND ON 23 PROBATION. I AM NOW WITH YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION HIGH SCHOOL AND SET TO GRADUATE. MY EXPERIENCES, OUR EXPERIENCES, HAVE TO 24 BE PART OF THIS COUNTY GOVERNMENT. AND SO, THE YOUTH, I FEEL 25

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LIKE, ME, WE NEED TO BE IN THIS. WE NEED TO PRIORITIZE OUR OWN
 VOICES. AND DON'T BELITTLE US OR ADULTISM BECAUSE I FACE THAT
 EVERY DAY, AND I KNOW A LOT OF PEOPLE NEED MORE OPPORTUNITIES.

6 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. PLEASE, INSTEAD
7 OF CLAPPING, IF YOU WANT TO RAISE YOUR HANDS. NEXT SPEAKER.

DAVID TURNER: HEY, GOOD AFTERNOON, EVERYONE. MY NAME IS DAVID 9 TURNER, AND I'M THE MANAGER OF THE BROTHERS, SONS, SELVES 10 11 COALITION, THE YOUTH ORGANIZING COALITION FOR BOYS AND YOUNG MEN OF COLOR ACROSS L.A. COUNTY. WE ARE PROUD TO BE HERE TO 12 SUPPORT OUR PARTNERS, THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION, IN TO 13 ESTABLISH L.A. COUNTY'S FIRST YOUTH COMMISSION. I WANTED TO 14 JUST TO PROVIDE SOME STATISTICS FROM OUR B.S.S. SAFETY AND 15 16 YOUTH JUSTICE SURVEY. WE SURVEYED OVER 3700 YOUNG PEOPLE ACROSS L.A. COUNTY, AND WE FOUND SOME THINGS THAT I THINK ARE 17 18 GOING TO BE IMPORTANT AND ARE GOING TO HELP TO SHAPE POLICY. 19 WHEN WE SURVEY YOUNG PEOPLE WHO ARE IN THE SYSTEMS IMPACTED, WE HAD 200 CASES WHERE YOUNG PEOPLE SAID THEY ARE ARRESTED OR 20 THEY WERE DIRECTLY IMPACTED BY THE SYSTEM. I'M GOING TO READ 21 22 TO YOU SOME OF THEIR STATS. 85 PERCENT OF THOSE YOUNG PEOPLE 23 WANT RESTORATIVE JUSTICE CIRCLES IN THEIR COMMUNITY. 92 PERCENT OF THOSE YOUNG PEOPLE, RIGHT, WANT TO INVEST IN 24 RESOURCES IN JOBS AND EMPLOYMENT. 91 PERCENT OF THOSE PEOPLE 25

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WANT LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES IN THEIR COMMUNITY. WHEN WE ARE
 LED BY SYSTEMS IMPACTED YOUTH, WE GET BETTER RESULTS. WE NEED
 TO FOLLOW THEIR LEAD, AND WE NEED TO ESTABLISH THIS YOUTH
 COMMISSION. PLEASE VOTE YES FOR THIS OPPORTUNITY. THANK YOU.

6 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

8 PATRICIA MCALLISTER: PATRICIA MCALLISTER. I TAUGHT IN THE 9 CAMPS, CENTRAL JUVENILE, KILPATRICK, KIRBY, I CAN GO ON AND ON, FOR 7 YEARS. AT THAT TIME, MOST OF THE YOUTH WERE AFRICAN-10 11 AMERICAN. NOW IT IS ABOUT 90 PERCENT HISPANIC, LATINO, ASIAN, AND FILIPINO. AND SO, NOW YOU WANT A COMMISSION. I THINK IT IS 12 A GOOD IDEA TO HAVE A COMMISSION. I CAN SAY THAT WHEN IT WAS 13 MOSTLY AFRICAN-AMERICAN, THERE WAS NO VIOLENCE. WE DIDN'T HAVE 14 VIOLENCE. MAYBE SOME OF THE BOYS JUST DIDN'T WANT TO BE THERE, 15 16 BUT WE FELT SAFE, THE TEACHERS. IT WASN'T UNTIL WE GOT A LOT OF HISPANICS AND LATINOS WHEN IT GOT VIOLENT, AND THE DRUG 17 18 PROBLEMS REALLY -- I MEAN I WAS HIT IN THE BACK WITH A CHAIR. 19 ONE TEACHER WAS PARALYZED ALMOST. I MEAN IT WAS REALLY BAD. SO WHAT I'M SAYING IS WE NEEDED A COMMISSION MAYBE BACK THEN 20 21 BECAUSE THOSE ACTS WERE COMMITTED BY HISPANICS, ME BEING HIT 22 WITH A CHAIR AND ALL OF THAT. SO I'M SAYING NOW WE -- THE 23 YOUTH NOW ARE MORE VIOLENT BECAUSE THEY ARE GANG MEMBERS. A LOT OF THEM ARE ON DRUGS. SO DON'T TRY TO MINIMIZE PROBATION 24 BECAUSE IF IT WASN'T FOR PROBATION, SITTING OUT IN FRONT OF 25

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1	OUR CLASSROOMS, A LOT OF TEACHERS WOULD HAVE LEFT A LONG TIME
2	AGO.

4	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

6	MARY JACOBS: FIRST OF ALL, I'M EMBARRASSED BY WHAT MY SO-
7	CALLED FRIENDS DID TO THE LADIES HERE, AND I SAID, YOU WOULD
8	NEVER DO THAT TO A MAN. SO I THINK WE SHOULD SIT AND THINK
9	ABOUT HOW WE CALL NAMES, AND I MEAN IF YOU ARE GOING TO SAY
10	SOMETHING BAD ABOUT SOMEBODY, DON'T BE SEXUALLY INCORRECT OR
11	SEXUALLY ABUSIVE. I WANTED TO SAY ABOUT THIS SIGN BECAUSE THIS
12	SORT OF MADE ME THINK ABOUT SIGNS, WHEN I HAD THE SIGN ON MY
13	PROPERTY

15	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: CAN YOU REMAIN ON TOPIC?
16	
17	MARY JACOBS: YES, IT IS. I SAID [EXPLETIVE] THE D.C.F.S. I'M
18	SORRY TO USE THAT WORD.

20	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: YOU'RE NOT ON TOPIC.
21	
22	MARY JACOBS: NO, NO, IT IS. THE D.C.F.S. IS CONNECTED TO THE
23	CHILDREN THAT ARE FOSTER CHILDREN. AND

1	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: PLEASE STAY ON TOPIC OR WAIT FOR PUBLIC
2	COMMENT.

4	MARY JACOBS: THIS IS THE TOPIC. THE REASON IS IMPORTANT. IS IT
5	BECAUSE I SAID F-U-C-K (OFF MIC COMMENTS) FOR COMPLAINING

8	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: YOU ARE NOT ON TOPIC.

10	MARY JACOBS: THAT IS THE TOPIC.
11	
12	SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: YOUR TIME IS EXPIRED, NEXT SPEAKER. NEXT
13	SPEAKER. THAT IS YOUR SECOND THAT IS YOUR FIRST WARNING,
14	ACTUALLY.
15	
16	JOSHUA HAM: HOW ARE YOU GUYS DOING TODAY? MY NAME IS JOSH. I'M
17	REALLY EXCITED TODAY. I THINK A LOT OF THIS STUFF IS OVER DUE.
18	THE COMMUNITY MEMBERS HAVE CAME HERE AND TALKED ABOUT THIS
19	STUFF TIME AND TIME AGAIN. I THINK IT IS TIME TO INVEST IN THE
20	YOUNG PEOPLE AND MAKING SURE THAT THEY HAVE THE RESOURCES AND
21	STUFF THAT THEY NEED. A LOT OF THIS STUFF THAT WE'VE BEEN
22	TALKING ABOUT, PEOPLE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT FOR A LONG TIME,
23	DECADES, TO GET THE YOUNG PEOPLE THE RESOURCES TO BE ABLE TO
24	HAVE A DECISION TO HAVE CONTROL OF THEIR OWN FUTURES. I'M FROM
25	SOUTH CENTRAL LOS ANGELES, IN A TARGETED AND MARGINALIZED

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COMMUNITY, AND THINK IT IS TIME TO GIVE THOSE YOUNG PEOPLE 1 ACCESS TO STUFF LIKE THIS. WE SHOULDN'T HAVE TO COME HERE AND 2 TALK ABOUT THESE THINGS AGAIN. IT'S OBVIOUS. LOVE ON THE YOUNG 3 PEOPLE, SUPPORT THE YOUNG PEOPLE. PEOPLE THAT HAVE SEEN ME 4 5 HERE BEFORE, WE NEED TO LOVE AND SUPPORT OUR YOUNG FOLKS AND MAKE SURE WE HAVE SOME COMPASSION FOR OUR YOUNG PEOPLE, 6 7 ESPECIALLY KIDS THAT ARE LIVED IN DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES. 8 WE HAVE SEEN IT. WE HAVE SEEN IT IN MEDIA. WE HAVE SEEN IT IN 9 REAL LIFE. YOU GUYS HAVE SHARED SPACES WITH THESE YOUNG FOLKS, SO LET'S NOT COME HERE NO MORE AND TALK ABOUT GETTING THE 10 11 PEOPLE YOUNG ACTIONS THEY NEED. WE ARE STARTING TO SOUND LIKE BROKEN RECORDS. SO LET'S GET THESE YOUNG PEOPLE THE THINGS 12 THAT THEY NEED. THANK YOU. 13

15 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. WELCOME.

PHAL SOK: CAN YOU TURN THE MIC BACK ON? I CAN BE LOUD ENOUGH 17 18 WITHOUT IT, ANYWAY. PHAL SOK WITH THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION. 19 I THINK WE HAVE GOT ENOUGH YOUNG PEOPLE RIGHT HERE TO CREATE A COMMISSION RIGHT HERE RIGHT NOW. RIGHT? THAT'S THE REAL TALK. 20 AND I WILL NOMINATE MY LITTLE SISTER, LUPITA CARBALLO, TO BE 21 22 THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THAT COMMISSION, REAL TALK. BUT I 23 SAY THESE THINGS BECAUSE OF THE PEOPLE THAT HAVE BEEN IMPACTED. THESE ARE THE YOUNG PEOPLE THAT KNOW WHAT SITUATIONS 24 CAUSE AND WHERE THEY COME FROM, THE ROOTS OF THOSE THINGS, BUT 25

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THE THING I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT IS WHAT ABOUT THE YOUNG PEOPLE 1 THAT ARE STUCK IN HALLS IN THE CAMP. HOW ARE THEY GOING TO 2 INTERACT WITH THIS COMMISSION? HOW CAN THEY BE A PART OF IT? 3 HOW CAN THEY SPEAK TO WHAT REALLY DRIVES THEM TO FILL A BED 4 5 INSIDE OF A CONCRETE CAGE THAT IS NOT HELPING THEM AT ALL. SO THAT'S JUST A OUESTION I WANT TO LEAVE WITH YOU ALL TO THINK 6 7 ABOUT THOSE THINGS. I REALLY GOT TO GO. SORRY. I GOT ANOTHER 8 APPOINTMENT AT SOUTHWESTERN LAW. I'VE GOT TO GO TALK TO SOME 9 STUDENTS. PEACE OUT.

11 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

13 ERICA MONTELONGO: HI. MY NAME IS ERICA. I'M WITH THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION. THERE ARE 160 COUNTY COMMISSIONS AND NONE 14 HAVE A YOUTH REPRESENTATION. SO HAVING A YOUTH COMMISSION IS 15 16 VERY IMPORTANT, ESPECIALLY IF IT IS CENTERED WITH SYSTEM IMPACTED YOUTH. THEIR VOICE IS CRUCIAL INTO MAKING DECISIONS 17 18 AFFECTING THEM. SO THIS PROVIDES THEM WITH BEING A PART OF A 19 POLITICAL PROCESS AND HAVING COMMUNITY INPUT. AND ALSO THE SAME SYSTEM IMPACT YOUTH CAN PUSH FOR YOUTH DEVELOPMENT, THANK 20 21 YOU.

23 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. WELCOME.

JOSE CANIZAL: HELLO, MY NAME IS JOSE CANIZAL. I'M RAISED IN LA 1 PUENTE, AN ENGINEERING MAJOR AND CURRENTLY INTERNING AT F.Y.I. 2 3 HAVING HAD 18 YEARS OF PERSONAL EXPERIENCE IN THE JUVENILE AND THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM, LIKE MANY OTHERS HERE, I CAN SAY 4 5 THAT I HAVE FIRST HAND EXPERIENCED THE HARDSHIPS AND THE HOPE, THE GOOD AND THE BAD, OF THE WELFARE SYSTEM. SO IN SAYING THAT 6 7 WE, WE YOUTH, WE KNOW THE DIFFERENT CRACKS THAT WE NEED TO 8 FILL. LET US BE YOUR HAMMER TO BE ABLE TO BREAK THE CYCLE OF 9 OPPRESSION THAT THIS VULNERABLE POPULATION FACES. AND MOST IMPORTANTLY, GIVE US THE OPPORTUNITY TO BE ABLE TO ADVOCATE 10 11 FOR OURSELVES, OUR WELL BEING, AND MOST IMPORTANTLY, OUR FUTURE. IF I AM NOT UP FOR IT, THEN THERE IS OBVIOUSLY 35,000 12 OTHER CURRENT AND FORMER FOSTER YOUTH IN L.A. COUNTY ALONE 13 THAT CAN DO THE 15 COMMISSION YOUTH COMMITTEE. THANK YOU. 14

16 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

JARED O'BRIEN: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS JARED O'BRIEN WITH THE 18 19 YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION, AND I'M ONE OF THE ARCHITECTS OF THE L.A. COUNTY YOUTH COMMISSION. WE ARE FINALLY HERE TO PUSH FOR 20 THE L.A. COUNTY YOUTH COMMISSION, SOMETHING THAT IS LONG OVER 21 22 DUE FOR YOUTH IN L.A. COUNTY. FOR YEARS UPON YEARS, DECISIONS 23 HAVE BEEN BEING MADE FOR YOUTH AND ABOUT YOUTH, BUT WE HAVEN'T BEEN INVOLVED IN THE DECISION MAKING. WHEN I WAS 16, GOING ON 24 17, I WAS LOOKING AT 9 YEARS IN STATE PRISON. I WAS HOMELESS, 25

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AND I WAS HUNGRY. I DIDN'T HAVE ACCESS TO MONEY OR RESOURCES 1 AND DIDN'T GET ANY HELP WITH FOOD OR SCHOOL. THEY FOUND OUT 2 3 THERE WAS NO EVIDENCE ON ME AND GAVE ME PROBATION WITH TIME SERVED, BUT MY PROBATION OFFICER NEVER OFFERED ANY RESOURCES, 4 5 EVEN THOUGH I WAS GOING THROUGH THE SAME CIRCUMSTANCES OF BEING HOMELESS AND HUNGRY. ME AND MY BROTHER WAS HERE IN THIS 6 7 COUNTRY ALONE BECAUSE WE DIDN'T KNOW ANYONE IN THIS COUNTRY. 8 FIGHTING FOR SOMETHING LIKE THIS L.A. COUNTY YOUTH COMMISSION 9 IS GOING TO GIVE A VOICE, A SAY, IN WHAT HAPPENS IN L.A. 10 COUNTY.


ANTHONY ROBLES: HI, MY NAME IS ANTHONY ROBLES WITH THE YOUTH 14 JUSTICE COALITION. I WAS KICKED OUT LAST WEEK. BUT YOUTH, 15 16 YOUTH, SO ONE THING THAT GETS LOST IN YOUTH DEVELOPMENT IS YOUTH EMPOWERMENT. AND YOUTH EMPOWERMENT IS ONE OF THE MOST 17 18 IMPORTANT THINGS, IF NOT THE MOST IMPORTANT THING FOR YOUTH 19 DEVELOPMENT. YOUNG PEOPLE SHOULD HAVE A SAY AND MAKE DECISIONS ABOUT WHAT AFFECTS THEIR OWN LIVES, AND THAT INCLUDES, IN THIS 20 CASE, SYSTEM IMPACTED YOUTH HAVING THE DECISIONS OVER THE 21 22 POLICIES AND BUDGETS TO THE FOSTER CARE SYSTEM AND OVER 23 PROBATION AND OVER THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, AS WE KNOW, GETS OVER 40 PERCENT OF THE COUNTY'S 24 DISCRETIONARY BUDGET, AND THE YOUTH COMMISSION AND YOUNG WHO 25

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ARE AFFECTED BY POLICING AND SUPPRESSION SHOULD HAVE A SAY AND 1 HAVE DECISION-MAKING POWER OVER THE POLICIES AND BUDGETS OF 2 3 NOT JUST FOSTER CARE AND PROBATION BUT ALSO THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND EVERY COUNTY ISSUE BECAUSE IT AFFECTS YOUNG 4 5 PEOPLE. SO, YEAH, THANK YOU. 6 7 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. 8 9 ANTHONY ROBLES: I WANT TO APOLOGIZE TO ABSOLUTELY NOBODY FOR LAST WEEK, [LAUGHS]. 10 11 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. 12 13 KENNETH CHANCEY: HELLO, SUPERVISORS, AND THANK YOU FOR YOUR 14 TIME. MY NAME IS KENNETH CHANCEY. I'M THE POLICY MANAGER WITH 15 16 NATIONAL FOSTER YOUTH INSTITUTE. I JUST WANT TO START OFF BY THANKING ALL FOUR OF YOU FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP IN TAKING ON THIS 17 18 MOTION. I KNOW TWO OF YOU ARE ON THE MOTION, BUT I KNOW ALL 19 FOUR OF YOU ARE CHAMPIONING IT. SO I APPRECIATE THE EFFORT, AND I THANK YOU. THIS IS A TRAIL BLAZING MOMENT FOR L.A. 20 COUNTY, AND YOU ARE GOING TO SET AN EXAMPLE FOR THE ENTIRE 21 22 UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. BUT I ALSO WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE IN 23 ADDITION TO YOUR LEADERSHIP, THE LEADERSHIP OF THE PEOPLE THAT HAVE BEEN MEETING CONSISTENTLY OVER THE PAST YEAR, LED BY 24 TIFFANY, A STRONG WOMAN AND A POWERFUL LEADER AND A POWERFUL 25

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MEETINGS AT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. IT CAME THROUGH YOUTH 1 SPEAKING UP AND SPEAKING OUT, SPEAKING TRUTH TO POWER. AFTER 2 3 YEARS OF DREAMING AND ORGANIZING AND LIVING UNDER THE CUSTODY AND SUPERVISION OF THE FOSTER CARE SYSTEM AND THE JUVENILE 4 5 INJUSTICE SYSTEMS, YOUNG PEOPLE WILL FINALLY HAVE A VOICE WITHIN COUNTY GOVERNMENT. IMAGINE IF L.A. COUNTY HAD A 6 7 COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN WITH ONLY MEN REPRESENTING, 8 OR A COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF AFRICAN-AMERICANS, BUT ONLY 9 WHITE PEOPLE ARE APPOINTED TO SERVE ON IT. IN 2020, I DON'T THINK THAT WOULD BE TOLERATED, BUT EVERY DAY FROM L.A. COUNTY 10 11 TO THE STATE CAPITAL TO CONGRESS, POLICIES, BUDGETS, AND PROGRAMS ARE PLANNED FOR YOUTH WITHOUT ANY OFFICIAL YOUTH 12 13 INPUT. A YOUTH COMMISSION IS ESPECIALLY ESSENTIAL IN A COUNTY THAT LEADS THE WORLD IN INCARCERATION AND IN THE PUSHING OF 14 YOUNG PEOPLE INTO FOSTER CARE. 15

17 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, KIM. THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

19 RENE AVILA: HELLO, GOOD EVENING. MY NAME IS RENE AVILA. I AM A 20 POLICY ASSOCIATE WITH THE ANTI RECIDIVISM COALITION AS WELL AS 21 A MEMBER AND COORDINATING MEMBER OF THE L.A. YOUTH UPRISING 22 COALITION. SO I'M HERE TO SPEAK AND LET EVERYBODY IN THIS ROOM 23 KNOW THAT I MYSELF AM NOT BORN OR RAISED IN L.A. COUNTY, 24 HOWEVER I RESIDE HERE NOW AND CAN SEE THE OBVIOUS STRUGGLES 25 THAT THE YOUTH ARE GOING THROUGH, PROJECTING THEIR CONCERNS

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AND LETTING THE ADULTS KNOW WITHIN THE POWER OF PUTTING THINGS 1 OUT THERE THAT WE HAVE A LOT TO SAY. I HAVE A LOT OF 2 3 EXPERIENCE WITH THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM. FROM 12 YEARS OLD TO 21, I WAS INCARCERATED IN JUVENILE HALL, D.J.J., AND 4 5 PRISON. I WAS ON PROBATION, ON PAROLE STILL CURRENTLY AND AM DOING GREAT, ALL BECAUSE I TOOK THE INITIATIVE TO SPEAK UP AND 6 7 VOICE MY CONCERNS AND OBJECTIVES TOWARD PEOPLE OUT THERE IN 8 THE COMMUNITY AS WELL AS PEOPLE OF YOUR POSITION. THANK YOU. 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. 10 11 EZEKIEL NISHIYAMA: HELLO AND GOOD AFTERNOON, MY NAME IS 12 EZEKIEL NISHIYAMA. I'M 18 YEARS OLD AND A YOUTH POLICY INTERN 13 AT THE ANTI RECIDIVISM COALITION. I WANT TO FIRST START BY 14 THANKING SUPERVISORS JANICE HAHN AND SHEILA KUEHL FOR BRINGING 15 16 THIS MOTION FORWARD. AFTER SPENDING THREE YEARS INCARCERATED AND CURRENTLY BEING ON PROBATION, I KNOW HOW IMPORTANT IT IS 17 18 FOR YOUTH WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED OUR SYSTEM OF INCARCERATION TO 19 HAVE A VOICE. I'M HERE TODAY ON BEHALF OF THE A.R.C. AND THE L.A. UP COALITION IN SUPPORT OF THE CREATION OF THE COUNTY 20 WIDE YOUTH COMMISSION. THE CREATION OF THIS BODY IS OVERDUE, 21 22 HOWEVER IT IS CRUCIAL FOR L.A. COUNTY TO CREATE IT AND INVEST 23 IN IT TO BETTER UNDERSTAND THE YOUTH LIVING IN THIS COUNTY, HAVE BETTER GUIDANCE ON HOW TO APPROACH AND ADDRESS YOUTH 24

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RELATED ISSUES, AND ULTIMATELY PROVIDE A VOICE FOR YOUTH. 1 THANK YOU AND HAVE A GREAT DAY. 2 3 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. 4 5 MAGDELENA MIRELES: HI, MY NAME IS MAGDELENA MIRELES. I'M THE 6 7 SENIOR PROGRAM MANAGER FOR CAPACITY-BUILDING AT LIBERTY HILL 8 FOUNDATION WHERE I COORDINATE OUR COMMISSION'S TRAINING 9 PROGRAM WHICH PREPARES GRASSROOTS LEADERS TO SERVE ON LOCAL COMMISSIONS. WE KNOW THAT INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE DIRECTLY 10 11 IMPACTED BY COUNTY SERVICES, IN THIS CASE, YOUTH WITH EXPERIENCE IN FOSTER CARE, THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM, 12 HOMELESSNESS, AND MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS, HAVE THE EXPERTISE 13 NEEDED TO SHAPE POLICIES AND PROVIDE CRITICAL OVERSIGHT. 14 THAT'S WHY LIBERTY HILL SUPPORTS THIS YOUTH COMMISSION. TO AID 15 16 THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE MOTION, WE FUNDED MULTIPLE YOUTH FOCUS GROUPS, CO-CONVENED LISTENING SESSIONS, AND CONDUCTED A 17 18 NATIONAL LANDSCAPE ANALYSIS EXAMINING BEST PRACTICES. WE'RE 19 HAPPY TO SEE THAT THE YOUTH LEADERS VOICES AND THEIR RECOMMENDATIONS ARE REFLECTED IN THIS MOTION AND THAT IT IS 20 21 INDEED A FULL COMMISSION AND NOT AN ADVISORY COMMITTEE. IN 22 ADDITION TO SUPPORTING THE MOTION BEFORE YOU, WE ENCOURAGE THE 23 BOARD TO SEE THIS AS JUST ONE IMPORTANT STEP TOWARDS A LARGER VISION OF A YOUTH DEVELOPMENT SYSTEM IN LOS ANGELES. 24

JULIE MCCORMICK: GOOD AFTERNOON, JULIE MCCORMICK FROM THE 3 CHILDREN'S LAW CENTER OF CALIFORNIA. I REPRESENT THEM AS AN 4 5 ATTORNEY AND A POLICY ASSOCIATE. WE REPRESENT ALL THE CHILDREN AND YOUTH UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE DEPENDENCY COURT IN 6 7 LOS ANGELES COUNTY, WHICH IS ABOUT APPROXIMATELY 30,000 YOUTH, 8 AND WE UNDERSTAND THE IMPORTANCE OF YOUTH VOICE. WE THANK 9 SUPERVISORS HAHN AND KUEHL AND ALL OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FOR THIS IMPORTANT MOTION, FOR PUTTING IT FORTH, AND COMMEND 10 THE COMMISSION FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES FOR BEING ON THE 11 FOREFRONT OF THE ISSUE. I WANT TO SECOND A FEW OF THE SPEAKERS 12 13 UP HERE. WE ARE SO THANKFUL FOR THE YOUTH VOICES THAT HAVE ALREADY BEEN INCORPORATED IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF THIS 14 COMMISSION, THE YOUTH VOICES THAT HERE, AND THE YOUTH THAT 15 16 WILL SERVE ON THIS COMMISSION. WE STRONGLY SUPPORT THIS MOTION. WE ARE VERY SUPPORTIVE OF L.A.'S COMMITMENT TO 17 18 INCORPORATE THE YOUTH VOICE, AND SPECIFICALLY TO LOOK TOWARDS 19 SYSTEMIC CHANGE. SO WE URGE THE BOARD'S SUPPORT OF THIS MOTION AND THANK YOU. 20

24 SPEAKER: GOOD AFTERNOON, I WANT TO THANK SUPERVISORS HAHN AND25 KUEHL FOR THIS MOTION. AND THIS YOUTH DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

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IS A NEW STEP, A NEW WAY OF LIFE, FOR US YOUTH TO SAY WHAT WE 1 NEED AND WHAT WE COULD DO IN OUR COMMUNITIES AND HOW WE COULD 2 3 HELP OUT BECAUSE, AS YOUTH, WE NEED TO BE HEARD, AND WE NEED TO BE ADDRESSED BECAUSE YOU NEVER KNOW WHAT A YOUTH IS 4 5 SUFFERING OR GOING THROUGH IF YOU DON'T ADDRESS THE ISSUE OR EVEN KNOW HOW TO COMMUNICATE WITH THE YOUTH. SO I WANT TO 6 7 THANK YOU ALL FOR REALLY DOING THIS, AND I'M IN FULL SUPPORT. 8 SO THANK YOU. 9

10 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

LUPITA CARBALLO: GOOD AFTERNOON, MY NAME IS LUPITA WITH THE 12 YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION. FINALLY, WE'RE HERE TO CREATE L.A. 13 COUNTY'S YOUTH FIRST COMMISSION. GROWING UP IN L.A. BEYOND 14 BAIL, THE AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM WAS MY BABYSITTER. THE PROGRAM 15 16 WAS SO UNDER BUDGET THAT WE HAD ONE PROGRAM COORDINATOR FOR EACH GRADE. THEY REALLY DIDN'T CHECK IF WE DID OUR HOMEWORK 17 18 AND HARDLY DID ANY EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES. WE HAD A LOT 19 OF FREE TIME. WE WOULD EITHER BE PLAYING AROUND AT THE PLAYGROUND OR SITTING DOWN WAITING FOR TIME TO PASS BY. L.A. 20 21 NEEDS TO STOP BEING THE LARGEST SPENDING IN SHERIFF, 22 PROBATION, JAIL SYSTEMS, JUVENILE HALLS, COURT SYSTEMS IN THE 23 WORLD. THANK YOU.

25 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

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1 RONALDO VILLEDA: HELLO, MY NAME IS RONALDO VILLEDA. I'M 22 2 YEARS OLD. I'M A POLICY INTERN WITH THE ANTIRECIDIVISM 3 COALITION, AND I AM ALSO WITH L.A. YOUTH UPRISING. THIS IS A 4 HISTORIC MOMENT FOR L.A. COUNTY. YOU ARE CREATING A MECHANISM 5 WHICH ENSURES YOUNG PEOPLE ARE HEARD. YOU ARE GIVING YOUNG 6 PEOPLE A VOICE. NOT ONLY ARE YOU EMPOWERING YOUTH AND 7 8 ACKNOWLEDGING OUR WORTH, YOU ARE ACKNOWLEDGING OUR PLACE AT 9 THE TABLE, ALLOWING US TO PLAY A ROLE IN THE REHABILITATIVE PROCESS. AS A FORMERLY INCARCERATED YOUTH WITH LIVED 10 11 EXPERIENCE IN OUR SYSTEM, I CAN TELL YOU WHAT WORKS AND WHAT DOESN'T WORK. WHO BETTER TO CREATE THE MOST EFFECTIVE AND 12 13 HOLISTIC PROCESSES THAN THOSE THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM HAS FAILED? YOU HAVE FINALLY PUT THE POWER OF DECISION WHERE IT 14 BELONGS, WITH THE YOUTH. I STRONGLY URGE YOU TODAY TO VOTE YES 15 16 ON THIS MOTION, THANK YOU. 17 18 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. 19 SPEAKER: YES, KATHRYN BARGER, LAST TIME I WAS HERE, I SPOKE ON 20 AN ISSUE. YOU TOLD ME TO GO SPEAK TO ALDO --21

23 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: IS THIS REGARDING THIS ITEM?

SPEAKER: YES, I SPOKE TO ALDO, BUT SPEAKING TO ALDO WAS IS NOT 1 ENOUGH. I WANT US TO EXPECT RESULTS, OKAY? I WANT RESULTS. I 2 3 DON'T WANT TO JUST SPEAK TO ALDO AND GET NOTHING DONE, OKAY MS. BARGER? 4 5 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THAT IS RELATED TO THIS ITEM, IT IS -- WE 6 7 WILL HAVE SOMEONE FROM D.C.F.S. TALK TO YOU, IF YOU WALK BACK 8 THERE. 9 SPEAKER: EVERY TIME I TALK TO SOMEONE FROM D.C.F.S. NOTHING 10 HAPPENS. SO I JUST WANT RESULTS. IMMEDIATE RESULTS, JUST 11 12 RESULTS. 13 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY. WOULD YOU RAISE YOUR HAND BACK 14 15 THERE, AND THEN YOU WILL GIVE US AN UPDATE? THANK YOU. NEXT

18 RICHARD CORTEZ: HELLO, MY NAME IS RICHARD CORTEZ. I AM 23 19 YEARS OLD AND A MEMBER OF THE ANTIRECIDIVISM COALITION, I WOULD LIKE TO THANK JANICE HAHN AND SHEILA KUEHL FOR BEING 20 ABLE TO BRING FORWARD THIS MOTION. AS A MEMBER OF THE A.R.C., 21 22 WE BELIEVE IN SECOND CHANCES AND CONSIDERING THOSE WITH REAL 23 LIFE EXPERIENCE OF INCARCERATION LED TO THE DISCUSSIONS ON THE ISSUES RELATED TO THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM. YOUNG MEN AND 24 WOMEN YOUTH MUST HAVE A VOICE IN THE COMMITTEES LIKE THESE TO 25



BE ABLE TO SPEAK ON WHAT THEY FEEL AND BE ABLE TO EXPRESS WHAT 1 THEY ARE EXPERIENCING. THEY NEED TO HAVE A PLATFORM WHERE THEY 2 3 HAVE -- WHERE THEY CAN HAVE REAL POWER. BASED ON MY EXPERIENCE OF BEING A KID IN AND OUT OF THE JUVENILE SYSTEM, IT HAS 4 5 AFFECTED ME IN MANY WAYS. IT HAS CAUSED A LOT OF TRAUMA FROM ALL THE PAIN AND SUFFERING I CAUSED TO THE COMMUNITY, AND I 6 7 KNOW HOW IT IS NOT BEING ABLE TO BE A VOICE IN THE COMMITTEES 8 LIKE THESE. WE HOPE THE BOARD WILL CONTINUE TO INVEST IN THIS 9 BODY AND BE ABLE TO SUPPORT THE YOUTH.

SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. THANK YOU. IF YOU WANT TO LEAVE THOSE COMMENTS FOR -- WHAT YOU WERE NOT ABLE TO FINISH FOR THE RECORD, WE WOULD BE HAPPY TO TAKE IT. NEXT SPEAKER?

HERMAN HERMAN: DEAR MOMMY, DEAR MOMMY ON THIS YOUTH 15 16 COMMISSION, THAT OF ITEM 2 IN WHICH ALREADY COLON VERSUS THE UNITED STATES. HOW DARE WE DEPRIVE THE CHILDREN, MOMMY, THAT 17 18 RIGHT? THE RIGHT TO THE COUNTY DEPARTMENTS REGARDING SERVICES, 19 POLICIES, AND A BUDGET THAT REFLECTS YOUTH. NO MATTER WHO WE ARE, DISABLED ACTIVISTS, COMMUNITY ACTIVISTS, YOUNG PEOPLE 20 ACTIVISTS, BUT NO. I GET ATTACKED ON THIS ITEM 2 PRIOR TO ME 21 22 COMING HERE, PETITIONING YOU, MOMMY, PLEASE DON'T WARN ME ON 23 THE SECOND WARNING. AND LOOK WHAT YOU'VE DONE. YOU'VE COSTED ME PAIN AND SUFFERING, THE SAME YOU'VE DONE WITH THESE 24 CHILDREN IN THEIR LIVES. 25

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1 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, MR. HERMAN, NEXT SPEAKER. 2 3 EMILIO ZAPIEN: GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS EMILIO WITH THE YOUTH 4 5 JUSTICE COALITION, L.A. YOUTH UPRISING. THANK YOU FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF THE FIRST YOUTH COMMISSION IN THE HISTORY OF 6 7 L.A. COUNTY, FINALLY. WE ALL KNOW WE'RE BEHIND L.A. OUR 8 ADDICTION TO THROWING ANGELENO TAX DOLORS AT INCARCERATION, 9 CRIMINALIZATION, AND POLICING OF BLACK AND BROWN YOUTH HAS BLOCKED US FROM CREATING AN L.A. THAT LOVES ITS YOUTH. WE'VE 10 11 BEEN FIGHTING FOR THIS SPACE FOR OVER A DECADE NOW. THIS IS AN OPPORTUNITY TO TAKE IT ANOTHER STEP IN THE PROCESS OF 12 UPLIFTING THE YOUTH OF L.A. INSTEAD OF LOCKING THEM DOWN. 13 THANK YOU FOR RECOGNIZING THAT THIS BODY NEEDS TO BE MORE THAN 14 AN ADVISORY COMMITTEE. OUR YOUTH DON'T NEED TO GIVE ADVICE. IN 15 16 ORDER TO TRULY ADDRESS THE SYSTEMATIC HARM CAUSED BY THE MISUSE OF OUR TAX DOLLARS FOR DECADES, WE MUST CENTER THE 17 18 SYSTEM IMPACTED YOUTH AS LEADERS, DECISION MAKERS, POLICY 19 MAKERS, EXPERTS, FACILITATORS, ORGANIZERS, AND EMPLOYEES. WE ARE BEHIND, L.A. OTHER MAJOR CITIES HAVE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT 20 21 DEPARTMENTS FOR YEARS. WE ENVISION AN L.A. THAT 2, 5, 10, 20 22 YEARS FROM NOW HAS FREE PUBLIC YOUTH CENTERS AND SPACES, YOUTH 23 JOBS, AND INTERVENTION RESOURCES SO PEOPLE OF THIS GENERATION 24 HAVE A CHANCE TO GROW UP IN AN L.A. THAT LOVES ITS YOUTH.

3 WAYNE SPINDLER: IT'S WAYNE FROM ENCINO, FROM OUR NONPROFIT GROUP CALLED ABORT ME, JANICE. SO THAT'S WHAT WE WANT TO DO. 4 5 WE WANT TO TEACH YOUNG PEOPLE ABOUT THE FIRST AMENDMENT. WE WANT AN AGE LIMIT OF 15. YOU'RE 15. YOU'RE OLD ENOUGH TO BE ON 6 7 THIS COMMISSION. THE FIRST TIME THAT I WENT AGAINST MY FATHER, 8 I WAS 14 YEARS OLD. THAT'S WHEN I BECAME A MAN IN THE JEWISH WORLD, AND THANK YOU, SHEILA KUEHL, SHE NOTED THIS DOWN HERE. 9 10 SHE SAYS, WHEN YOU ARE [EXPLETIVE] -- (OFF-MIC COMMENTS).

SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: MR. SPINDLER, YOU ARE BEING DISRUPTIVE. 12 THAT IS YOUR SECOND WARNING. NEXT SPEAKER. ARE THOSE ALL THE 13 SPEAKERS? SUPERVISOR HAHN, DO YOU HAVE ANY CLOSING REMARKS? 14 SHE DOES. ANYONE ELSE WANT TO MAKE A CLOSING -- OKAY. SO ITEM 15 16 2 IS BEFORE US. THE MOTION BY SUPERVISOR HAHN, SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR KUEHL. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. ALL RIGHT. 17 18 NOW WE'RE GOING TO MOVE ON TO ITEM NUMBER 9, WHICH IS THE 19 STATUS REPORT ON THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHELTER CRISIS AND HOUSING INITIATIVE FOR INDIVIDUALS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS. 20 FOR THOSE LEAVING THE ROOM, IF YOU WOULD DO SO QUIETLY, I 21 WOULD REALLY APPRECIATE IT. AS EVERYONE GETS IN PLACE, WE WILL 22 HOLD ON A MINUTE. OKAY, ON ITEM 9, I WOULD LIKE TO THANK 23 C.E.O. SACHI HAMAI FOR WORKING SO DILIGENTLY TO PUT TOGETHER 24 WHAT WE HAVE BEFORE US TODAY. I KNOW IT WAS A LOT OF WORK BY 25

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YOU AND YOUR TEAM. THIS IS OUR SECOND TIME HEARING AN UPDATE 1 ON THE COUNTY'S URGENT EFFORTS TO MORE QUICKLY -- MOVE MORE 2 3 QUICKLY AND AFFORDABLY TO BRING HOMELESS HOUSING ONLINE. I WANT TO THANK SUPERVISOR HAHN FOR COAUTHORING THE URGENT 4 5 HOUSING INITIATIVE MOTION WITH ME BACK IN NOVEMBER. AND I WANT TO THANK ALL OF MY COLLEAGUES FOR YOUR SUPPORT. JUST A 6 7 REMINDER, THE FIRST TUESDAY OF EVERY MONTH WILL BE DEDICATED 8 TO DISCUSSIONS OVER THIS COMPLEX ISSUE. THIS IS REFLECTIVE OF OUR COORDINATED AND DEEP COMMITMENT AS A BOARD TO DOING BETTER 9 AS IT RELATES TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF HOUSING. I WOULD LIKE TO 10 11 GO AHEAD AND HEAR THE PRESENTATION TODAY SO WE CAN OPEN UP FOR OUESTIONS AND DISCUSSION. BUT, BEFORE I DO THAT, I HAVE TO 12 SAY, I WAS UP IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY LAST WEEK, AND WE TALK 13 ABOUT PIPELINE INTO GOOD PAYING JOBS. AND BOTH NORTHROP AND 14 LOCKHEED REACHED OUT TO ME BECAUSE THEY HAVE MORE JOBS THAN 15 16 THEY DO PEOPLE THAT ARE PROPERLY TRAINED, AND SO THEY'RE WORKING WITH A.B. COLLEGE TO COME UP WITH THE CURRICULUM TO DO 17 18 THAT. THEIR SECOND ISSUE IS, THEY ESTIMATE THEY NEED AT LEAST 19 7,000 HOMES OR 7,000 HOUSING UNITS TO COME ONLINE. THEY ARE HAVING A HOUSING SHORTAGE UP IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY, WHICH IS 20 21 CREATING A BARRIER TO PEOPLE WANTING TO APPLY FOR JOBS. SO, 22 YOU KNOW, IT IMPACTS -- HOUSING CAN IMPACT ALSO ON THE LABOR 23 SIDE. 



WE ACTUALLY PUT 3RD 2 3 DISTRICT MONEY INTO SOME OF THE -- ATTRACTING SOME OF THE PEOPLE WHO ACTUALLY STAFF THESE LOTS, AND IT MADE IT MORE 4 5 FAMILIAR, WE FOUND, TO PEOPLE IN THE DISTRICT WHEN THEY WOULD SEE SAFE PARKING LOT DIDN'T CAUSE A LOT OF TROUBLE OVER HERE. 6 7 SO MAYBE THEY COULD DO IT, TOO, AND IT MAKES IT EASIER TO SOME 8 EXTENT I THINK. I KNOW THAT WE EXPECT THAT OUR DEPARTMENTS AND OUR PROGRAMS WILL DO IT ALL, AND YOU ARE NOT WRONG TO EXPECT 9 THAT. I'M JUST SAYING THAT SOMETIMES, AS YOU KNOW, PEOPLE LIKE 10 11 TO HEAR FROM US THIS IS REALLY OKAY AND I WILL HELP YOU GET THIS FIRST ONE STARTED. AND, BECAUSE I'M, YOU KNOW, VERY PROUD 12 WHEN WE SAW THE MAP A COUPLE WEEKS AGO, THE FIRST AND SECOND 13 ARE DOING BETTER. THEY HAVE BEEN AT IT LONGER. THEY HAVE A LOT 14 15 OF PEOPLE ENGAGED FROM THE BEGINNING. IN THE 3RD, IT WAS A 16 LITTLE UNFAMILIAR. PEOPLE WERE -- WE WOULD SEE HOMELESS 17 ENCAMPMENTS, ESPECIALLY IN THE VALLEY AND ALONG THE RIVER, 18 GROWING AND GROWING, BUT IT WAS A LITTLE UNFAMILIAR TO DEAL 19 WITH IT. BUT A LOT OF PEOPLE, AS YOU KNOW, ALL OF YOU, THEY WILL CALL AND SAY, "WHAT CAN I DO? WHAT CAN I DO? WHAT CAN I 20 21 DO?" SO WE STARTED DEVELOPING AN ANSWER TO WHAT I CAN DO KIND 22 OF THING. AND IT IS ONE THING AT A TIME, BUT WE HAVE NOW GOT 23 MORE TRANSITIONAL HOUSING IN THE PIPELINE THAN EVER BEFORE, AND IT'S -- I THINK IT IS A PARTNERSHIP, HONESTLY. AND I THINK 24 25 STAFF, YOU KNOW, CAN ALWAYS DO MORE, AND I CAN ALWAYS DO MORE,

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AND I THINK WE SHOULD JUST KEEP GOING WITH WHERE WE'VE SEEN A 1 SUCCESS AND KIND OF LEARN FROM EACH OTHER AS WELL BECAUSE I 2 3 KNOW, IN MARK'S DISTRICT AND HILDA'S DISTRICT, THEY HAVE DONE SOME INNOVATIVE THINGS. AND THEY TRANSLATE IN THINGS THAT I 4 WOULD HAVE NEVER THOUGHT OF. I DIDN'T KNOW THAT YOU HIRED 5 SOMEONE TO RUN A SAFE PARKING LOT, YOU KNOW, I JUST IMAGINED 6 7 YOU OPEN IT UP, THEY COME AT NIGHT, ETC. BUT YOU HAVE TO HAVE 8 BATHROOMS, AND YOU HAVE TO HAVE SECURITY, AND WE WANT SERVICES 9 THERE BECAUSE IT IS JUST LIKE OUTREACH, EXCEPT THEY'RE RIGHT THERE, YOU KNOW. SO I DO THINK THAT IT IS A LEARNING CURVE, 10 11 AND IT IS -- I WILL JUST SAY, IT WAS FOR ME, BUT I'M VERY PLEASED AT THE WAY, ALL ACROSS THE DISTRICT, PEOPLE HAVE 12 RESPONDED IF, YOU KNOW, IF YOU GIVE THEM A WAY TO DO IT. I DO 13 AGREE, WE DON'T HAVE A DYNAMIC WAY FOR FINDING OUT WHAT'S OPEN 14 EVERY NIGHT. AND I DON'T KNOW WHETHER IT IS POSSIBLE FOR SAFE 15 16 PARKING BECAUSE THEY ARE NOT ALL SUPERVISED YET, BUT I THINK EVENTUALLY WE COULD. WE CERTAINLY HAVE DONE IT FOR PERMANENT 17 18 SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. YOU KNOW, THE ENTRY SYSTEM IS -- WAS PUT 19 IN PLACE, AND WE HAD TO FUND IT. SO WE MAY WANT TO DO IT FOR TRANSITIONAL HOUSING AS WELL, FOR BRIDGE HOUSING, AND FOR 20 21 PARKING. ALTHOUGH, PARKING IS --

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23 SUP. HAHN: CAN I JUST FOLLOW UP ON THAT AND SAY SO ALL THE
24 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING ON THIS MAP, WE KNOW IS FILLED.

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SUP. KUEHL: THAT THEY'RE OPEN AND WHEN THEY'RE OPEN, BUT IT IS 1 2 NOT JUST A NIGHTLY THING --3 SUP. HAHN: I'M NOT TALKING ABOUT NIGHTLY. I'M TALKING ABOUT 4 5 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, OF THESE SITES, WE KNOW THEY ARE ALL FILLED. SO IT DOESN'T DO US ANY GOOD. 6 7 8 SUP. KUEHL: THEY ARE NOT ALL FILLED, BUT I THINK WHEN THE 9 OUTREACH TEAMS HAVE A WAY OF ASCERTAINING IF SOMEONE IS 10 WILLING TO AND AVAILABLE AND THERE IS A UNIT, TRY TO MATCH 11 THEM. 12 SPEAKER: FOR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, THERE IS USUALLY 13 MINIMAL TURNOVER THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, BUT THERE'S A PROCESS IN 14 15 PLACE WHERE THERE'S A COMMUNITY QUEUE WHERE BASICALLY FOLKS 16 WHO HAVE BEEN MATCHED TO THAT RESOURCE ARE PULLED FROM SO THAT THEY ARE THEN, AS EXPEDITIOUSLY AS POSSIBLE, THEN MOVED INTO 17 18 THAT UNIT. I DID WANT TO PROVIDE ONE UPDATE REGARDING SAFE 19 PARKING IN THE FOURTH DISTRICT, OUR UNDERSTANDING IS THAT THERE IS A CITY OF LONG BEACH SITE THAT WILL BE COMING ONLINE 20 21 NEXT MONTH. SO THERE WILL BE ONE SAFE PARKING PROGRAM NEW IN 22 LONG BEACH IN THE FOURTH DISTRICT.


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24 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: HOW MANY SPACES?



SPEAKER: I DON'T HAVE THAT ANSWER, BUT WE CAN PROVIDE AN 1 2 UPDATE FOR YOU FOR THAT. 3 SUP. HAHN: I'M STILL CONFUSED IF SOMEBODY ACCESSED THIS MAP, 4 5 WHETHER OR NOT THEY WOULD BE ABLE TO TELL, EVEN ON THE HOUSING. IT SEEMS LIKE IT IS A SYSTEM THEY HAVE TO GO THROUGH. 6 7 THEY CANNOT JUST LOOK AT THE MAP. 8 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR SOLIS? 10 SUP. SOLIS: YES, WELL, I THINK ONE OF THE CONCERNS THAT I HAVE 11 IS THAT I RECENTLY READ THERE IS MONEY THAT WE ARE GOING TO BE 12 RETURNING TO H.U.D. \$30 MILLION AND THAT'S A REFLECTION OF OUR 13 INABILITY TO UTILIZE SOME BEDS, AND A GOOD NUMBER ARE IN THE 14 CITY OF L.A. IN MY DISTRICT. AND THAT REALLY CONCERNS ME. AND 15 16 I UNDERSTAND THAT NOT EVERYONE FROM MY DISTRICT WILL COME DOWNTOWN. THAT IS SOMETHING THAT IS VERY REAL. WHAT ARE WE 17 18 DOING TO RECTIFY THIS SO WE DON'T LOOK AS THOUGH WE ARE NOT 19 BEING RESPONSIBLE? AND I ASK EMILIO, MAYBE PERHAPS YOU CAN, I KNOW YOU HAVE SOMETHING TO DO WITH THIS, IF YOU COULD TELL ME 20 WHAT THE \$30 MILLION, IF YOU CAN, WHAT THAT TRANSLATES IN 21 22 TERMS OF BEDS OR SPACES BECAUSE I WANT TO HAVE A BETTER 23 UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT WE'RE LEAVING ON THE TABLE.

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TY OF LOS A NOTIFICATION OF THIS YEAR'S FUNDING AWARD FOR, THERE ARE DIFFERENT TIERS OF FUNDING THAT COMES THROUGH FROM H.U.D. TO THE CONTINUUM. WE ARE FULLY FUNDED FOR OUR TIER ONE PORTION OF OUR FEDERAL PORTION OF THE C.O.C. FUNDING OF THIS YEAR. I BELIEVE THAT CAME OUT TO ABOUT \$114, \$115 MILLION, AND WE EXPECT TO RECEIVE ADDITIONAL FUNDING IN THE TIER 2 IN THE D.B. BONUS AS WELL. SO HOW MUCH MONEY WILL STILL COME BACK THIS YEAR WILL BE ROUGHLY THE SAME AS WAS AWARDED TO THE CONTINUUM THE YEAR PRIOR. SUP. SOLIS: WHEN YOU DESCRIBE THE HOUSING, THAT'S WHAT YOU'RE SAYING, SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, YOU ARE TALKING ABOUT UNITS OF HOUSING, APARTMENTS, WHAT ARE WE TALKING ABOUT? SPEAKER: FOR THE PORTION THAT CORRESPONDS TO L.A.C.D.A., THESE

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15 16 ARE TENANT BASED CERTIFICATES THAT WORK VERY MUCH LIKE HOUSING 17 CHOICE VOUCHERS, WHERE IT IS A RENTAL SUBSIDY THAT IS 18 PROVIDED, AND THE INDIVIDUAL THEN SECURES HOUSING ON THE 19 PRIVATE RENTAL MARKET.

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21 SUP. SOLIS: WHAT WAS THE NEXUS HERE THAT THEY WERE UNABLE TO 22 UTILIZED?

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SPEAKER: IN OUR PARTICULAR CASE, THESE WERE EXPANSION GRANTS. 24 WE HAD AN EXPLOSION OF NEW FUNDING THAT CAME IN THE LAST TWO-25

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DON'T NECESSARILY EXPAND THE ENTIRE AMOUNT. YOU DON'T GET 2 3 INDIVIDUALS PLACED. ON AVERAGE, THIS TAKES SOME OF OUR CLIENTS, EVEN ON THE HOUSING CHOICE VOUCHER PROGRAM, IN EXCESS 4 5 OF 12 MONTHS TO SECURE AND FIND HOUSING ON THE PRIVATE RENTAL MARKET. SO THAT'S PART OF -- THAT IS PART OF THE DELAY. 6 7 8 SUP. SOLIS: IS THERE A WAY TO WORK WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT 9 SO THEY UNDERSTAND WHAT OUR DILEMMA IS HERE BECAUSE IT SOUNDS 10 VERY IMPRACTICAL, AND TO THE PUBLIC, THEY ARE GOING TO SAY, 11 WOW, YOU ARE RETURNING MONEY, AND WE ARE FIGHTING TO TRY TO 12 ESTABLISH HOUSING AND USAGE HERE. SO, I MEAN, IS THAT SOMETHING THAT YOU ALL WOULD RECOMMEND, MAYBE? 13 14 15 SPEAKER: PRESENTLY, L.A.H.S.A. IS WORKING WITH H.U.D. T.A. AS 16 WELL AS VARIETY OF SYSTEM PARTNERS, COUNTY PARTNERS, CITY AND COUNTY MAYOR'S OFFICES INVOLVED, HOMELESS INITIATIVE ON A 17 18 HOUSING CENTRAL COMMAND, WHICH IS BASICALLY A PROJECT TO WORK 19 ON ACTIVE SYSTEM MANAGEMENT OF OUR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING AS A RESOURCE TO MAKE SURE THAT RESOURCE IS UTILIZED 20 TO THE EXTENT POSSIBLE. PART OF THE FIRST STEP HAS BEEN, AS 21 22 SUPERVISOR BARGER MENTIONED EARLIER, FULLY UNDERSTANDING WHAT 23 THAT UNIVERSE OF THE AVAILABLE RESOURCE IS. THAT WAY WE KNOW EXACTLY WHERE COUNTY WIDE WHERE ALL OF THE UNITS ARE, HOW MANY 24 THERE ARE, AND THEN FROM THERE WORK ON ACTIVE UTILIZATION OF 25

YEAR PERIOD, AND SO AS FOLKS WORK THROUGH THE PIPELINE, YOU

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1 ALL OF THOSE. THOSE ARE EFFORTS THAT ARE CURRENTLY UNDER WAY 2 RIGHT NOW. WE HAVE OPEN MEETINGS AT L.A.H.S.A. WE COULD EXTEND 3 INVITATIONS TO YOUR STAFF OR YOURSELVES IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO 4 COME IN AND SIT IN ON THE MEETINGS. THEY HAPPEN EVERY DAY AT 5 L.A.H.S.A.'S OFFICE ON WILSHIRE.

SUP. SOLIS: SO THE ONLY LAST THING I WOULD ADD IS THAT GIVEN 7 8 THE CONCENTRATION OF THIS FUNDING, I SEE IS DIRECTED, AT LEAST IN MY DISTRICT, MORE CENTRAL TO DOWNTOWN. AND WE DO HAVE A BIG 9 GAP ON THE MAP. JUST LOOK AT DISTRICT ONE I MEAN IN ANY OF 10 11 YOUR MAPS. SO I WOULD THINK THAT ONCE WE HAVE ANY -- REALLY GET A BETTER HANDLE ON ALL OF THIS, THAT WE COULD START TO 12 PLAN OUT WHERE THESE SPACES AND WHERE WE CAN ENLIST PEOPLE TO 13 GET INVOLVED. SO TO SUPERVISOR HAHN'S POINT ABOUT GETTING THE 14 STAFF ENGAGED, I THINK THAT IS REALLY CRITICAL. I KNOW OUR 15 16 STAFF WORKS REALLY HARD WITH YOU ALL, BUT WE NEED MORE EXPERTISE BECAUSE WE ARE FAILING, IN MY OPINION, AND IT 17 18 DOESN'T LOOK GOOD IF WE ARE NOT EXPLAINING OURSELVES WELL TO 19 THE PUBLIC IN TERMS OF WHY MONIES ARE BEING RETURNED. I'M NOT TRYING TO CRITICIZE OUR STAFF. I'M JUST SAYING HOW CAN WE GET 20 SOME BETTER SOLUTIONS TOWARDS THIS END? THANK YOU. 21

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23 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: AND SUPERVISOR SOLIS, I COMPLETELY AGREE.
24 AND I DON'T TAKE IT AS CRITICISM. I THINK THIS IS WHAT'S
25 NECESSARY IS COMMUNICATION BECAUSE AGAIN, ON ANY GIVEN

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TUESDAY, WE CAN BRING IN A MOTION, BUT WE DON'T LOOK AT THE 1 BIG PICTURE AND HAVE EVERYBODY HERE TO REALLY FLUSH OUT WHAT 2 3 SOME OF THE ISSUES ARE WITH H.U.D. WITH THE RETURNING OF THE MONEY WHICH IS A LITTLE -- THERE'S A LITTLE MORE OF A NUANCE 4 5 TO IT. BUT WHAT YOU SAID IS FINE. I THINK WE HAVE TO, AS A BOARD, LOOK AT WHERE THE NEED IS FOR US TO IMPROVE AND WHERE 6 7 WE NEED TO WORK WITH THE STATE AND THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO 8 ADJUST SOME OF THE BARRIERS. AND THAT REALLY IS THE PURPOSE, BUT THIS IS, LIKE, THE SECOND REPORT. PRIOR TO THIS, WE DIDN'T 9 EVEN KNOW, I COULD KIND OF TELL YOU WHERE THERE WAS A NEED IN 10 11 THE 5TH DISTRICT ONLY BECAUSE WE WORK UP IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY WITH THE SALVATION ARMY, AND WE ARE WORKING ON 12 KENSINGTON PLACE TO PUT IN THE PERMANENT HOUSING, EMERGENCY 13 HOUSING. BUT I DIDN'T REALLY KNOW HOLISTICALLY FOR THE ENTIRE 14 COUNTY WHAT WE ARE TALKING ABOUT. THAT'S WHAT HAS BEEN 15 16 MISSING, A LOT OF WORK TO DO. YOU TALKED ABOUT, SUPERVISOR HAHN, CALLING 211 TO TRY TO GET ACCESS FOR SOMEBODY DOWN IN 17 18 SAN PEDRO AND THE FRUSTRATION THAT YOU EXPERIENCED AND THE 19 INDIVIDUAL FINALLY TOOK OFF. THERE SHOULD BE, ON ANY GIVEN DAY, THE ABILITY TO HAVE AN APP WITH OUTREACH TO SAY WHERE ARE 20 THE BEDS AVAILABLE, AND IF THEY'RE NOT, THEN OBVIOUSLY THERE'S 21 22 PROBABLY A NEED IN THAT AREA, AND THEN WE NEED TO BE ABLE TO 23 QUICKLY RAMP UP SERVICES, WHETHER IT BE THE PARKING LOT, WHETHER IT BE A POP-SPRING SHELTER, OR WHETHER IT BE LONG-TERM 24 HOUSING. AND I SEE DR. GALEY, AND WE HAVE GOT PATIENTS IN OUR 25

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1 HOSPITAL THAT NEED A PLACE TO GO WHEN THEY'RE DISCHARGED SO
2 THEY DON'T END UP BACK ON THE STREET. THIS IS NOT A ONE SIZE
3 FITS ALL. THIS IS A VERY, VERY, VERY COMPLICATED ISSUE. BUT
4 WE, AS A BOARD NOW, HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO REALLY FLUSH IT OUT
5 AND FIND OUT WHERE WE ARE AND WHERE WE'RE FAILING AND WHERE WE
6 REALLY NEED TO ACCELERATE. SO I DO AGREE WITH YOU, 100

7 PERCENT, SUPERVISOR HAHN.

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9 SACHI HAMAI, C.E.O.: IF THERE'S NO OTHER QUESTIONS, I AM GOING
10 TO TURN IT OVER TO AMY BODEK, WHO WILL GO THROUGH THE
11 BARRIERS.

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AMY BODEK: MADAM CHAIR, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, THANK YOU VERY 13 MUCH. I THOUGHT MINE WAS GOING TO BE THE TOUGH PART OF THE 14 PRESENTATION. SO HERE WE GO. I WANT TO TALK TO YOU ABOUT 15 16 INTERIM AND PERMANENT HOUSING, AND I'M GOING TO BE TALKING TO YOU FROM THE PERSPECTIVE OF USUALLY THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS 17 18 ONLY, BUT I AM GOING TO REFERENCE SOME ISSUES WITH CITIES THAT 19 WE DO HAVE, BUT MOST OF MY TALK IS GOING TO BE REALLY DIRECTED TO THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS BECAUSE THAT'S WHAT WE HAVE 20 AUTHORITY OVER FROM A LAND USE PERSPECTIVE. SO I WANT TO TALK 21 22 TO YOU ABOUT FUNDING RESTRICTIONS, REGULATORY BARRIERS, AND SOCIAL BARRIERS, AND WE DID HIT UPON SOME OF THOSE TODAY. BUT 23 LET ME GIVE YOU A FLAVOR OF SOME FUNDING RESTRICTIONS THIS 24 TEAM AND YOUR STAFF FACE ON A DAILY BASIS. ONE SUCH EXAMPLE IS 25

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A SECTION 8 VOUCHER. THE SECTION 8 VOUCHER IS NOT FUNDED TO 1 THE FULLEST ALLOCATION, AND WE CANNOT USE ALL OF OUR 2 ALLOCATION BECAUSE OF THE COST OF MARKET RENTS WITHIN THE 3 COUNTY. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ESTABLISHES A SET CAP ON THE 4 5 AMOUNT OF MONEY THAT THEY GIVE THE COUNTY FOR SECTION 8. IN THIS CASE, IT GIVES US ABOUT \$25 MILLION FOR ALL OF OUR 6 7 SECTION 8 VOUCHERS. UNFORTUNATELY, OUR VOUCHERS COST MORE THAN 8 \$28 MILLION. SO WE ARE NOT ACTUALLY ABLE TO USE ALL OF OUR 9 SECTION 8 VOUCHERS BECAUSE WE DO NOT HAVE ENOUGH MONEY TO USE ALL OF THOSE VOUCHERS. THE RENTS IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY ARE 10 11 GOING TO BE VASTLY DIFFERENT THAN THE MARKET RENTS IN FLORENCE FIRESTONE, WHICH IS GOING TO BE DIFFERENT THAN THE RENTS IN 12 13 THE UNINCORPORATED SAN GABRIEL VALLEY, BUT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT DICTATES A SINGLE MARKET RENT FOR THE ENTIRE 14 COUNTY. AND, IF YOU ARE RENTING IN A HIGH-RENT AREA WITH YOUR 15 16 SECTION 8 VOUCHER, IT'S GOING TO COST YOU MORE, OR YOU MAY NOT BE ABLE TO BUY THAT UNIT OR RENT THAT UNIT BECAUSE YOUR 17 18 SECTION 8 VOUCHER IS NOT GOING TO BE FULLY-FUNDED. SO THAT IS 19 AN ISSUE WITH A LACK OF FUNDING. THAT IS REAL, AND THAT -- OUR STAFF AND L.A.H.S.A. AND L.A.C.D.A. ARE, FRANKLY, EXPLORING 20 WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. I'VE GOT SOME MORE EXAMPLES, AND 21 22 CERTAINLY MR. SALES CAN PROVIDE ADDITIONAL EXAMPLES OF SOME OF 23 THE STRUGGLES THAT WE HAVE RELATED TO LACK OF FUNDING FOR CAPITAL AND OPERATING EXPENSES BECAUSE, FRANKLY, THE AVAILABLE 24 DOLLARS DO NOT MATCH UP WITH THE ACTUAL NEED. IN TERMS OF USE 25

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OF FUNDS, AS DEVELOPERS ARE PROPOSING PROJECTS AND THEY ARE 1 GOING AFTER DIFFERENT TYPES OF FUNDS, THERE ARE MYRIAD 2 3 RESTRICTIONS ON THOSE FUNDS, DEPENDING ON WHAT KIND OF FUNDING YOU'RE GOING AFTER. FOR EXAMPLE, THE STATE'S A.H.S.C. GRANT 4 5 PROGRAM, WHICH STANDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES, IT IS THE NEWEST GRANT CYCLE WE ARE TRYING TO 6 7 ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN, AND IT IS FOR PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE 8 HOUSING IN T.O.D. AREAS. AS PART OF THAT FUND, IF YOU ARE 9 GRANTED AN AWARD OF FUNDS, YOU, AS A DEVELOPER OF A HOUSING DEVELOPMENT, HAVE TO MAKE INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS THAT IS 10 11 GOING TO RELATE TO MOBILITY AND INCREASING MOBILITY. SO THERE ARE RESTRICTIONS ON THE USE OF FUNDS THAT DO LIMIT HOW FAR 12 THOSE FUNDS CAN ACTUALLY GO. AND IT IS ALMOST A HIDDEN COST TO 13 APPLYING FOR THESE GRANTS. REGULATORY BARRIERS IS -- WE COULD 14 15 SPEND A WHOLE DAY JUST ON REGULATORY BARRIERS, FRANKLY, AND MY 16 DEPARTMENT IS RESPONSIBLE FOR A LOT OF THOSE REGULATORY BARRIERS, AND WE HAVE BEEN ATTEMPTING TO BREAK THOSE 17 18 REGULATORY BARRIERS DOWN, BUT THEY CLEARLY INVOLVE ENTITLEMENT 19 BARRIERS, ZONING BARRIERS, AND THEN ACTUALLY PERMITTING BARRIERS. ANOTHER BARRIER THAT IS, FRANKLY, A REGULATORY 20 BARRIER IS THE ZONING DEFINITIONS THAT ARE VERY LIMITED ON 21 22 WHAT TYPE OF HOUSING UNIT CAN GO WHERE. AND YOU, AS A BOARD, 23 HAVE BEEN VERY PROACTIVE IN PUSHING THAT ENVELOPE WITH US OVER THE LAST THREE YEARS, AND I'LL GET INTO SOME OF THOSE EFFORTS 24 ON HOW WE ARE TRYING TO BREAK THOSE BARRIERS DOWN RIGHT NOW. 25

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BUT THEN SOCIAL BARRIERS, AND YOU'VE ALREADY DISCUSSED THOSE 1 THIS MORNING AND THIS AFTERNOON. IT IS THE NIMBYISM, AND IT IS 2 3 THE YIMBYISM, AND IT IS EVERYTHING IN BETWEEN. WE HAVE A LIST OF ACRONYMS THAT DESCRIBE DIFFERENT REACTIONS. SOME OF THEM 4 5 ARE N.O.P.E., NOT ON PLANET EARTH. WE'VE GOT ACRONYMS TO DESCRIBE EVERY SINGLE TYPE OF PROJECT THAT GETS DENIED BY A 6 7 COMMUNITY BECAUSE OF CONCERN FOR CHANGE. I DO REALLY BELIEVE 8 THAT IT IS AN ISSUE WITH CHANGE, AND IT IS AN ISSUE WITH FEELING THAT THEIR NEIGHBORHOOD IS CHANGING IN A WAY THEY DO 9 NOT HAVE CONTROL OVER. AND, FRANKLY, COMMUNITY WILL IS A HUGE 10 11 BARRIER THAT WE, AS YOUR STAFF, DON'T HAVE THE ABILITY TO HANDLE. WE CAN ONLY OFFER ADVICE, BUT THAT REALLY IS A BARRIER 12 THAT, NO MATTER HOW MANY C.E.Q.A. EXEMPTIONS YOU HAVE OR YOU 13 GRANT TO US, THE SOCIAL BARRIERS ARE STILL GOING TO REMAIN. 14 15 NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO WHAT CAN AND SHOULD THE COUNTY DO? THIS 16 SLIDE COULD BE MUCH LONGER THAN IT CURRENTLY IS, BUT FIRST CERTAINLY YOU HAVE DECLARED IT TO BE AN EMERGENCY. AND LIKE 17 18 THESE MAPS, WE NEED TO TALK ABOUT THEM. AND WE NEED TO TALK 19 ABOUT THEM EVERYWHERE WITH EVERYONE, WHETHER THEY ARE WILLING TO LISTEN OR NOT. WE NEED TO PUSH THIS INFORMATION OUT AND NOT 20 WAIT FOR THIS INFORMATION TO BE SOUGHT BY OUR CONSTITUENTS. 21 22 THE ROLE THAT WE CAN ALL PLAY, BOTH AS STAFF AND AS A BOARD, 23 IS PARTNERSHIPS WITH THE CITY. I DON'T HAVE THE ABILITY, AS A DEPARTMENT HEAD, TO TELL A CITY HOW TO REZONE THEIR PROPERTY 24 AND HOW THEY SHOULD STREAMLINE. BUT I DO HAVE THE ABILITY TO 25

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


SLIGHTLY ENCOURAGE THEM TO THE BEST OF MY ABILITY, AND WE ARE

AND THIS HAS BEEN, SACHI, THIS IS NOTHING NEW TO THIS BOARD, OKAY? SO ALL OF THESE THINGS 10 11 ABOUT LEGISLATION AND ALL, IF WE DON'T KNOW WHAT THE BARRIERS ARE, WHAT WE ARE ASKING FOR BY NOW, WE ARE A SORRY BUNCH IF 12 THAT'S THE CASE. I MEAN I'M SERIOUS. THIS IS NOTHING NEW, 13 EXCUSE ME, AND IT HAS BEEN DISCUSSED AND DISCUSSED AND 14 DISCUSSED AND DISCUSSED AND DISCUSSED. AND I DIDN'T HEAR YIMBY 15 16 UNTIL SUPERVISOR HAHN BROUGHT IT UP ONE TIME. SO THAT IS NOTHING NEW TO KNOW, AND THEN THE NIMBY, I THINK WE'VE ALL 17 18 EXPERIENCED IT. YOU EXPERIENCED IT WITH SAN PEDRO. SO I GUESS 19 MY QUESTION IS, I'M CHANNELING JANICE BECAUSE SHE DOESN'T HAVE A VOICE, WE DON'T WANT A STAGNANT REPORT THAT TALKS ABOUT WHAT 20 WE ALREADY KNOW. WE WANT A ROAD MAP IN TERMS OF ACTION ITEMS. 21 22 WHEN I TALKED ABOUT THE NEED TO BRING IN SOMEONE TO OVERSEE 23 HOUSING AND HAVE THEM REPORT DIRECTLY TO THE BOARD, IT IS BECAUSE WE HAVE TO DO THIS IN REAL TIME. THE NUMBERS, YOU 24 KNOW, WE ARE WAITING FOR OUR NUMBERS TO COME BACK ON THE 25

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AMY BODEK: CERTAINLY, I WOULD LIKE TO TALK ABOUT AND REMIND 1 YOU OF THE ORDINANCES THAT WE ARE WORKING ON WHICH YOU WILL 2 3 SEE THIS YEAR. AND SO ONE OF THOSE IS THE INCLUSIONARY ORDINANCE WHICH WILL BE, FRANKLY, IT REOUIRES C.E.O.A. AND 4 5 THAT IS ONE OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASKS IS TO REALLY WORK WITH THE SACRAMENTO TEAM TO REDUCE OUR BARRIERS RELATED TO C.E.O.A. BUT 6 7 AS YOU KNOW, THE INCLUSIONARY ORDINANCE WILL BE PROCEEDING 8 THIS YEAR AND WILL BE AT YOUR BOARD FOR CONSIDERATION BY THE 9 END OF THIS CALENDAR YEAR. AND THAT WILL AFFECT ALL HOUSING PROJECTS THROUGHOUT THE UNINCORPORATED COUNTY. WE ARE ALSO 10 11 WORKING ON AN INTERIM AND SUPPORTIVE HOUSING IMPORTANCE THAT WILL ALLOW US TO DEVELOP THESE PROJECT BY RIGHT. AND THAT IS 12 NEW TO THE COUNTY. THAT IS VERY NEW TO THE COUNTY. THAT WILL 13 ALSO BE BEFORE YOU BY THE END OF THIS YEAR. WE ARE WORKING ON 14 15 A -- AN AFFORDABLE HOUSING PRESERVATION ORDINANCE, WHICH IS 16 ESSENTIALLY A NO-NET LOSS ORDINANCE. AGAIN, THAT WILL BE TO YOU BY THE END OF THIS YEAR. THAT WILL ALLOW US TO MAKE SURE 17 THAT THERE'S NO NET LOSS OF THE NATURALLY-OCCURRING AFFORDABLE 18 19 HOUSING. AND THEN --

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21 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: CAN THAT BY EXPEDITED? YOU SAY THE END OF
22 THE YEAR, IS THERE A REASON WHY IT TAKES LONGER?



AMY BODEK: C.E.Q.A. SHORT AND SIMPLE, C.E.Q.A. IF WE HAD
 C.E.Q.A. EXEMPTIONS FOR ALL OF THESE ORDINANCES, OUR LIFE
 WOULD BE IMMENSELY EASIER.

SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: I'M STILL TRYING TO FIGURE OUT HOW THIS -WE SUPPORTED SANTIAGO'S LEGISLATION, AND WE THOUGHT IT WAS
COUNTY, AND IT WAS FOR THE CITY.

9 AMY BODEK: I CAN TALK ABOUT THAT AS WELL. WE ARE ALSO DOING AN ACTUAL BY RIGHT ORDINANCE WHICH WILL ALLOW MULTIFAMILY IN 10 11 CERTAIN ZONES WITHOUT C.U.P.S AND, FRANKLY, WITHOUT HEARINGS. LAST WEEK, OR TWO WEEKS AGO, YOU APPROVED THE COMPACT LOT 12 SUBDIVISION, WHICH ALLOWS YOU TO DO A SMALL SUBDIVISION OF UP 13 TO 8 LOTS. WE HAVE REDUCED THE SIZE OF THE MINIMUM LOT. SO YOU 14 NO LONGER NEED A 5,000 SQUARE FOOT SINGLE FAMILY LOT. WE HAVE 15 16 REDUCED THAT SIZE TO TRY TO ENCOURAGE IN FILL IN SINGLE FAMILY NEIGHBORHOODS. WE HAVE THE DENSITY BONUS ORDINANCE YOU JUST 17 18 APPROVED, AND THEN WE HAVE SOME SPECIFIC PLANS THAT ARE ON 19 THEIR WAY, WHICH ARE ALSO ENCOURAGING MULTIFAMILY DENSITY UNITS IN T.O.D. AREAS. AND THEN LASTLY, OUR A.D.U. ORDINANCES. 20 AND I'M GOING TO SWITCH TO -- THAT IS ON LEGISLATIVE ASKS. I 21 22 AM GOING TO SWITCH TO OTHER ADDITIONAL STREAMLINING 23 APPROACHES. ONE IS FORM-BASED CODES. THIS WOULD TAKE A LITTLE BIT FOR US TO IMPLEMENT, BUT WE COULD THEORETICALLY PROPOSE A 24 FORM-BASED CODE THAT WOULD ALLOW SUPPORTIVE HOUSING 25

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DEVELOPMENTS IF THEY WERE WITHIN A CERTAIN ENVELOPE, A HEIGHT, 1 SET-BACK, AND DENSITY, TO JUST GET APPROVED WITHIN A SET TIME 2 3 FRAME. THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE COULD ABSOLUTELY LOOK AT. AND WE'RE LOOKING AT HOW WE CAN EXEMPT PROJECTS FROM TITLE 22. AS 4 5 A COUNTY, WE HAVE SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY ON OUR OWN PROPERTY OR ON OUR OWN PROJECTS. WE DO NOT HAVE THAT ABILITY TO EXEMPT OTHER 6 7 PROJECTS FROM TITLE 22. SO IF IT IS A PRIVATE DEVELOPER WHO IS 8 PROPOSING IT, THEY HAVE TO COMPLY WITH TITLE 22. IF THERE'S A 9 WAY THAT WE CAN LOOK TO EXEMPT THEM FROM THOSE REQUIREMENTS IF THEY CAN MEET CERTAIN BASE THRESHOLDS, WE WOULD BE LOOKING TO 10 11 DO THAT AS WELL. THAT'S THE SAME FOR ENVELOPE REQUIREMENTS. ESTABLISH THE ENVELOPE OF A DEVELOPMENT PROJECT, WHAT YOU PUT 12 IN IT, WE DON'T CARE, AND THAT WOULD KIND OF SPEED IT THROUGH 13 AND RELINQUISH SOME OF THOSE BARRIERS TO TITLE 22. ONE OF THE 14 THINGS THAT WE HAVE BEEN WORKING ON HAS BEEN GUARANTEED TIME 15 16 LINES ENTITLEMENTS AND PERMITS. WE CURRENTLY DO THAT FOR CERTAIN TYPES OF DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS, MOSTLY A.D.U.S. BUT 17 18 THERE IS NEW STATE LAW THAT WOULD EXPAND THAT TO OTHER TYPES 19 OF HOUSING, AND I THINK WE COULD GO FURTHER. PROVIDED THEY ARE IN THE RIGHT ZONE, WE SHOULD BE ABLE TO TURN THOSE PROJECTS 20 21 AROUND MUCH FASTER THAN WE DO NOW. ONCE AN A.D.U. FOR EXAMPLE, 22 ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT, NOW HAS TO BE APPROVED 60 DAYS THE 23 MINUTE THAT APPLICATION IS COMPLETED. SO WHEN THEY COME IN TO PLANNING, 60 DAYS LATER, THEY ARE DONE WITH US, THEN THEY HAVE 24 TO GO TO PUBLIC WORKS TO GET THEIR BUILDING AND SAFETY 25

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PERMITS, THEIR SEWER CONNECTIONS, THOSE SORTS OF THINGS. THEY 1 HAVE COMMITTED TO TIME LINES AS WELL FOR REVIEWING THESE 2 A.D.U. PROJECTS AND GETTING THE PERMITS ISSUED. ONE OF THE 3 IDEAS THAT DID COME UP SPECIFICALLY RELATED TO INTERIM HOUSING 4 5 AND SHELTERS IS TO COME UP WITH A MASTER AGREEMENT LIST FOR ON-CALL CONTRACTORS AND ON-CALL SERVICE PROVIDERS THAT WE 6 7 COULD HAVE THAT BENCH ESTABLISHED. SO WHEN A SHELTER SITE IS 8 LOCATED, WE JUST CAN PICK FROM THAT LIST THOSE PROVIDERS, AND 9 WE HAVE A CONTRACTOR ALREADY ON BOARD SO THAT WE DON'T HAVE TO START THIS PROCUREMENT PROCESS OVER AND OVER AGAIN EVERY 10 11 SINGLE TIME WE DECIDE TO DO A SHELTER OR INTERIM HOUSING PROJECT. GOING TO THE NEXT SLIDE, WHICH IS THE LEGISLATIVE 12 ASKS, THERE HAS TO BE AN ACKNOWLEDGMENT THAT ONE SIZE DOES NOT 13 FIT ALL IN L.A. COUNTY, AND I THINK THAT HAS BEEN A CHALLENGE 14 IN OUR STATE LEGISLATURE, AND, FRANKLY, THERE ARE TOO MANY 15 16 CONFLICTING STATE LAWS. JUST ON ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS ALONE, THERE WERE FIVE NEW STATE LAWS JUST ON A.D.U.S THAT 17 18 TOOK EFFECT JANUARY 1, AND ALL 5 OF THEM CONFLICT WITH EACH 19 OTHER. SO WHEN YOU HAVE A PLANNING DEPARTMENT TRYING TO STREAMLINE AND TRYING TO GET THESE THINGS OUT WITHIN 60 DAYS, 20 YET WE CANNOT FIGURE OUT WHICH LEGISLATION TAKES PRIORITY OVER 21 22 THE OTHER LEGISLATIVE BILL, IT IS A PROBLEM FOR US. WE HAVE 23 SPECIAL LEGAL COUNSEL RIGHT NOW WHO ARE WORKING THROUGH THESE ISSUES WITH US, BUT THAT IS JUST ONE EXAMPLE OF THE ASK THAT 24 WE HAVE OF SACRAMENTO. 25

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1 2 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: EXCUSE ME, AMY. 3 SUP. SOLIS: SO I HAVE A OUESTION, GIVEN WHAT IS HAPPENING IN 4 5 THE LEGISLATURE RIGHT NOW IN S.B. 50, DO ANY OF THESE CRITERIA 6 HELP US ACHIEVE? 7 8 AMY BODEK: S.B. 50 IS AN EXAMPLE OF ONE SIZE FITS ALL. IT 9 REALLY WORKS IN CERTAIN AREAS, BUT WOULD NOT WORK IN CERTAIN OTHER AREAS OF L.A. COUNTY. AND SO THAT HAS BEEN A CHALLENGE 10 11 FOR EVERYONE IN THE STATE TO GRAPPLE WITH AS TO HOW TO TAKE S.B. 50 AND IMPLEMENT IT WITHOUT HAVING UNINTENDED NEGATIVE 12 CONSEQUENCES FOR THE NEXT 50 YEARS FOR CERTAIN AREAS. S.B. 50 13 IS GREAT WHEN IT IS IN A MORE URBAN CORE. IT GETS A LITTLE 14 DICEY IN MY OPINION WHEN WE GET INTO THE SUBURBAN AREAS, BUT 15 16 IT CERTAINLY DOES NOT WORK FOR SOME OF OUR RURAL AREAS WITHIN THE COUNTY. 17 18 19 SUP. SOLIS: SO YOUR REMEDIES HERE --20 AMY BODEK: OUR REMEDIES HERE ARE TO, FRANKLY, WORK WITH THEM 21 22 TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THOSE THRESHOLDS NEED TO BE IN ORDER TO 23 HAVE SOMETHING LIKE S.B. 50 WORK. S.B. 50 HAD SOME FABULOUS CRITERIA IN IT THAT COULD HAVE BEEN A BOON TO THE COUNTY, BUT 24 IT COULD HAVE ALSO BEEN DISASTROUS TO CERTAIN OTHER AREAS OF 25

8	COMPLETED?

10	AMY BODEK: SO OUR A.D.U. ORDINANCE IS NULL AND VOID AS OF
11	JANUARY 1. SO THE A.D.U. ORDINANCE THAT WE BROUGHT TO YOU LAST
12	YEAR RESULTED IN, I WANT TO SAY, AROUND 600 A.D.U.S. OUR
13	VOLUME INCREASED SIGNIFICANTLY OVER THE LAST THREE YEARS.
14	
15	SUP. HAHN: WE HAVE 600 COMPLETED?
16	
17	AMY BODEK: YES.
18	
19	SUP. HAHN: ARE THEY ANYWHERE ON THE MAP?
20	
21	AMY BODEK: THEY ARE NOT. A.D.U.S ARE NOT ON THE MAP. WE CAN
22	CERTAINLY DO THAT AS WELL. WE DO HAVE THAT INFORMATION, WHERE
23	THEY WERE ENTITLED AND WHERE THEY WERE PERMITTED AND BY YEAR.
24	AND SO, WHEN WE FIRST WERE DOING A.D.U.S, WE WERE DOING MAYBE

YOU SUBMIT YOUR HOUSING ELEMENT NEXT YEAR. SO YOU BASICALLY 1 HAVE TO PRE-REZONE, AND, BECAUSE OF THAT, WE WILL HAVE TO DO A 2 FULL E.I.R. 3 4 5 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: OKAY. 6 7 AMY BODEK: HAPPY TO TALK TO YOU MORE ABOUT THAT ONE. 8 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: WHY DON'T WE GO AHEAD AND, IF YOU WANT TO WRAP IT UP --10 11 AMY BODEK: MONEY, ADVOCATE FOR MORE MONEY, AND MY PARTNERS 12 HERE CAN TALK ABOUT THAT BOTH AT THE STATE AND FEDERAL LEVEL. 13 I'M HAPPY TO ADDRESS DISCUSSION ITEMS ON BARRIERS AND WHAT WE 14 ARE DOING. WE ARE ACTUALLY DOING A LOT. YOU HAVE ACTUALLY 15 16 DIRECTED US TO DO A LOT. SO HOPEFULLY YOU WILL SEE THAT COME TO FRUITION THIS YEAR. 17 18 19 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. 20 SACHI HAMAI, C.E.O.: JERRY RAMIREZ IS GOING TO QUICKLY GO 21 22 OVER, IT IS JUST A ONE SLIDE, I THINK LAST TIME THERE WAS A 23 QUESTION ABOUT THE COST PER INTERIM HOUSING AND SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, SO HE WILL GO QUICKLY THROUGH THE SLIDE. 24 25

JERRY RAMIREZ: THANK YOU, SACHI. AS YOU CAN SEE, THERE ARE 1 FOUR TYPES OF HOUSING. WE HAVE INTERIM HOUSING, RAPID 2 REHOUSING, SUPPORTIVE HOUSING, PROJECT-BASED SUPPORTIVE 3 HOUSING, TENANT-BASED. AND WE JUST WANTED TO GIVE YOU AN 4 5 UPDATE ON THE AVERAGE COST FOR OPERATING AND FOR CAPITAL FOR EACH OF THE HOUSING TYPES. AS YOU CAN SEE FOR INTERIM HOUSING, 6 7 THE COST FOR AN INDIVIDUAL IS \$20,000 PER BED PER YEAR, AS 8 COMPARED TO A FAMILY, WHERE IT IS A LITTLE OVER \$31,000 PER 9 UNIT, PER YEAR TO HOUSE A FAMILY IN INTERIM SHELTER. FOR CAPITAL ONE TIME IF IT IS NEEDED TO BUILD THIS INTERIM 10 11 SHELTER, THE AVERAGE COST IS ABOUT \$75,000 PER UNIT. SO RAPID REHOUSING, WHICH IS PERMANENT HOUSING WITH TIME LIMITED RENTAL 12 SUBSIDIES AND SERVICES, THE OPERATING COST FOR AN INDIVIDUAL 13 IS ABOUT \$14,500 PER SLOT PER YEAR, AND FOR A FAMILY, IT IS A 14 LITTLE BIT OVER \$23,000 PER SLOT PER YEAR. THERE'S NO COST FOR 15 16 CAPITAL BECAUSE THESE FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS ARE RENTING UNITS IN THE OPEN MARKET. SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FOR PROJECT-17 18 BASED, AND THIS IS PERMANENT HOUSING IN DEDICATED UNITS, THE 19 OPERATING COSTS FOR AN INDIVIDUAL IS A LITTLE BIT OVER \$16,000 PER UNIT PER YEAR, AND THE CAPITAL ONE-TIME COST IS CLOSE TO 20 \$500,000. FOR A FAMILY, OPERATING COST IN PROJECT-BASED 21 22 SUPPORTIVE HOUSING IS \$25,000 PER UNIT PER YEAR, AND THAT 23 CAPITAL ONE-TIME COST IS \$564,000 PER UNIT. FOR SUPPORTIVE HOUSING TENANT-BASED, THIS IS PERMANENT HOUSING IN THE OPEN 24 25 MARKET, THE OPERATING COST FOR INDIVIDUALS IS A LITTLE BIT

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OVER \$16,000, AND FOR FAMILIES, IT IS A LITTLE BIT OVER
 \$25,000. AGAIN, THERE IS NO CAPITAL COST TO THIS, THE
 INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES ARE LOCATING UNITS IN THE OPEN
 MARKET. THAT'S ALL I HAVE FOR THIS SLIDE.

SACHI HAMAI, C.E.O.: THANK YOU. AND WE WILL GO TO THE FINAL 6 7 SLIDE, WHICH I THINK WAS REQUESTED LAST TIME ABOUT THE FUNDING 8 SOURCES FOR BOTH INTERIM AND SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. SO IN TERMS 9 OF THIS SLIDE, I WANT TO POINT OUT A COUPLE THINGS. NUMBER ONE, IT IS PRIMARILY '19/'20 FUNDS, AS I GO ALONG IN IT, I 10 11 WILL EXPLAIN. THE TOP SECTION, OPERATING SERVICE FUNDING FOR FISCAL YEAR '19, THIS IS THE MONEY THAT IS ALLOCATED FOR THE 12 SERVICES. IT IS NOT CAPITAL COSTS. SO, AS YOU CAN SEE, THERE 13 IS MONEY COMING IN FROM HEALTH SERVICES, L.A.H.S.A. THAT 14 SUPPORTS IT, MEASURE H. MONEY, MENTAL HEALTH MONEY, PUBLIC 15 16 HEALTH MONEY. AND THEN I WANT TO POINT OUT THAT FROM THE STATE, WE ALSO GET H.A.P. MONEY, WHICH IS ONE-TIME IN NATURE 17 18 BUT CAN GO TOWARD SERVICES. AND SO, FOR THIS -- FOR THIS 19 PERIOD, IT WOULD BE -- AND WE ARE GOING TO USE THIS MONEY FOR A THREE-YEAR PERIOD, IT IS ACTUALLY \$65 MILLION. BUT FOR EASE 20 OF THIS SCREEN, IT IS \$60.6 MILLION THAT IS GOING INTO INTERIM 21 22 AND PERMANENT HOUSING. THE OTHER FUNDS ARE GOING INTO OTHER 23 FUNDS, THE DELTA OF THAT WOULD GO INTO EMPLOYMENT. IN THE NEXT SECTION IS THE ONGOING CAPITAL FUNDS. AND THE NEXT SECTION IS 24 REALLY ABOUT THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST FUND, AND THIS IS 25

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THE MONEY WE ARE TRYING TO GET UP TO \$100 MILLION ONGOING 1 FUNDS EVERY YEAR. FOR FISCAL '19/'20, IT WAS ACTUALLY \$80 2 3 MILLION THAT WE HAD APPROPRIATED. HOWEVER, THE DOLLAR AMOUNT, \$63 MILLION, ACTUALLY REPRESENTS THE BOARD'S POLICY OF 75 4 5 PERCENT OF THAT \$80 MILLION GOING INTO THE TRUST FUND, AND THEN THE REMAINING \$17 MILLION IS RELATED TO OTHER THINGS, 6 7 LIKE, FOR L.A.C.D.A. HOUSING PRESERVATION, \$6 MILLION FOR AN 8 AFFORDABLE HOUSING ACQUISITION FUND, AND FOR SOME VERY MINIMAL 9 ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS. SO THAT IS THE SECTION, THE MIDDLE SECTION. AND THEN THE LAST SECTION IS THE CAPITAL FUNDING 10 11 SECTION, AND WE WANTED TO ADD IN BOTH '18/'19, AND '19/'20 BECAUSE PRIMARILY WHERE YOU SEE THE NO PLACE LIKE HOME, THE 12 SECOND BULLET, WHICH IS \$700 MILLION THAT WAS ALLOCATED FROM 13 THE STATE, THAT IS THE MENTAL HEALTH MONEY FOR HOUSING, AND 14 OUT OF THAT MONEY, WE HAVE ONLY RECEIVED FROM THE STATE SO FAR 15 16 \$194 MILLION TO DATE. SO IT IS OUR UNDERSTANDING THAT THE STATE WILL BEGIN ACTUALLY PROVIDING US, THE COUNTIES, WITH THE 17 18 ADDITIONAL FUNDS ON A OUARTERLY BASIS AS WE GO INTO THE OUT 19 YEARS, BUT THAT AMOUNT WAS DESIGNATED. THE LAST THING THAT WE DID NOT PUT ON THE SLIDE, AGAIN, I WAS JUST TRYING TO SHOW THE 20 '19/'20 BUDGET, BUT, AS YOU KNOW, THE GOVERNOR THIS YEAR 21 22 ALLOCATED \$750 MILLION OF ONE-TIME FUNDS. AND WE ARE CURRENTLY 23 WORKING WITH BOTH THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE AS WELL AS THE LEGISLATURE TO TRY AND GET THIS MONEY TO COME DIRECTLY TO THE 24 COUNTIES OR A COMBINATION OF THE COUNTY AND THE C.O.C.S AND 25

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RIGHT NOW, THE WAY IT IS DESIGNATED, IT WOULD GO TOWARD AN 1 2 OUTSIDE PROVIDER LIKE OUR BRILLIANT CORNER'S PROVIDER, VERSUS 3 THE COUNTY AND/OR THE C.O.C. SO JUST BE AWARE, WE ARE WORKING WITH THE LEGISLATURE AND THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE RIGHT NOW AS 4 5 THE STATE'S BUDGET PROCESS GOES THROUGH, BUT THIS IS JUST A SUMMARY OF, AGAIN, THIS YEAR'S BUDGET. AND, MADAM CHAIR, AND 6 7 THEN IF THERE'S NOTHING ELSE WITH RESPECT TO THE BUDGET, THE 8 LAST PIECE OF IT WAS JUST THE UPDATE ON THE PRIVATE SECTOR 9 HOUSING EXPERT AND ALSO THE COMMUNICATION AND OUTREACH COMPANY. AND SO I JUST WANTED TO LET YOU KNOW THAT WE HAD 10 11 POSTED THE REQUEST FOR QUALIFICATIONS ON JANUARY 9TH, AND WE CLOSED THAT ON JANUARY 31ST. WE HAVE RECEIVED 5 OUALIFICATION 12 PACKAGES, AND WE WILL GO THROUGH PUTTING TOGETHER A SELECTION 13 PANEL, AND BY THE NEXT UPDATE, FOR YOUR BOARD, WE'RE HOPEFUL 14 15 THAT SOMEBODY WILL BE SELECTED. AND WE COULD ANNOUNCE THAT AT 16 YOUR NEXT MEETING. AND THAT CONCLUDES OUR PRESENTATION, MADAM 17 CHAIR.

19 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. I'M GOING READ IN A MOTION ON
20 BEHALF OF SUPERVISOR HAHN, AND IT IS COAUTHORED WITH
21 SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS. IT IS GOING TO BE INCLUDED, AND THEN
22 WE WILL CALL PUBLIC SPEAKERS ON THIS ITEM. MOTELS HAVE BECOME
23 A CRITICAL REAL ESTATE COMPONENT OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY'S
24 EFFORTS TO TRANSITION INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES WHO ARE
25 CURRENTLY LIVING ON THE STREETS, IN CARS, AND RECREATIONAL



VEHICLES INTO SAFE INTERIM HOUSING. IN ORDER TO ENSURE THAT 1 THE COUNTY IS STRATEGICALLY UTILIZING THE AVAILABLE MOTEL 2 3 STOCK, MASTER LEASING IS ENVISIONED TO BE AN EFFICIENT, DEPENDABLE, AND COST EFFICIENT WAY OF FACILITATING ACCESS TO 4 5 THIS POTENTIAL SOURCE OF INTERIM HOUSING. HOWEVER TO DATE, FEW MOTELS HAVE BEEN MASTER LEASED NONPROFIT SERVICE PROVIDERS 6 7 PUTTING HOMELESS SERVICE PROVIDERS THAT HAVE CONTRACTED WITH 8 THE COUNTY OR LOS ANGELES HOMELESS SERVICE AUTHORITY FOR 9 INTERIM AND CRISIS HOUSING IN THE POSITION OF HAVING TO RENT HOTELS AT A HIGHER NIGHTLY RATE. AN OPPORTUNITY TO INCENTIVIZE 10 11 MOTEL OWNERS TO MASTER LEASE TO SERVICE PROVIDERS ALL OR A PORTION OF THEIR UNITS MAY BE TO PROVIDE GRANT FUNDING TO 12 13 COMPLETE NECESSARY -- YEAH. HABITABILITY AND DEFERRED MAINTENANCE IMPROVEMENTS THAT WILL MAKE THE PROPERTY SUITABLE 14 FOR INTERIM HOUSING. THIS COULD INCLUDE PAINTING, PEST AND 15 16 MOLD REMOVAL, UPDATING THE HEATING AND AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEMS, THE INSTALLATION OF NEW FLOORING, SECURITY FENCING, 17 18 AND OTHER RELATED IMPROVEMENTS THAT THE OWNER WOULD BE 19 INCLINED OR ABLE TO FINANCE INDEPENDENTLY. \$3 MILLION OF MEASURE H FUNDS WERE ALLOCATED IN FISCAL 2019/2020 TO SUPPORT 20 THE MASTER LEASE OF HOTELS FOR INTERIM HOUSING AND A PORTION 21 22 COULD BE ALLOCATED TO OPERATIONALIZE A CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT 23 PROGRAM FOR INTERIM HOUSING AT MOTELS TO FACILITATE THIS OBJECTIVE. WE, THEREFORE, MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS 24 DIRECT THE C.E.O.'S HOMELESS INITIATIVE IN COORDINATION WITH 25

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THE LOS ANGELES HOMELESS AUTHORITY AND ANY OTHER RELEVANT 1 COUNTY DEPARTMENTS TO CREATE A CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR 2 3 INTERIM HOUSING AT MOTELS TO FUND HABITABILITY AND DEFERRED MAINTENANCE IMPROVEMENTS CONTINGENT UPON THE MOTEL OWNER'S 4 5 COMMITMENT TO MASTER LEASE UNITS FOR THE PROVISION OF INTERIM HOUSING AND DEVELOP GUIDELINES AND FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 6 7 THE PROGRAM TO BE SUBMITTED AS A MEMO TO THE BOARD OF 8 SUPERVISORS BY MARCH 31, 2020, FOR POTENTIAL ADOPTION 9 THEREAFTER WHICH WOULD INCLUDE, BUT NOT BE LIMITED TO, A MAXIMUM PER UNIT INVESTMENT, SCOPE OF ALLOWABLE IMPROVEMENTS, 10 11 LEGAL FRAMEWORK FOR ENSURING THAT RECEIPT OF GRANT FUNDING IS CONTINGENT UPON MASTER LEASING THE UNITS FOR INTERIM HOUSING 12 13 FOR A MINIMUM TERM THROUGH A SERVICE PROVIDER THAT IS CONTRACTED THROUGH L.A.H.S.A. OR THE COUNTY TO PROVIDE SUCH 14 SERVICES AND THE PROPOSED PORTION OF AVAILABLE FUNDING FOR THE 15 16 PROGRAM AS WELL AS THE PROPOSED PORTION OF FUNDS RECOMMENDED TO BE SET ASIDE TO MASTER LEASE THE UNITS. THIS IS ON THE 17 TABLE AND CAN BE VOTED ON TODAY. IT IS A MOTION BY SUPERVISOR 18 19 HAHN AND SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS. OH, YOU WANT IT FOR NEXT WEEK? 20



BUT YOU HAVE GOT MY PEOPLE ON THE STREET, AFRICAN-AMERICANS. WE BUILT THIS COTTON PICKING NATION, AND YOU'VE GOT 12 THEM ON THE STREET SUFFERING. AND YOU ARE JUST TAKING YOUR 13 TIME, COMING IN HERE EVERY WEEK. OH, LET'S TALK ABOUT THIS. 14 15 THIS IS AN EMERGENCY. MY PEOPLE ARE ON THE STREET, AND THEY 16 ARE DYING. ONE DIED RIGHT ON THE STEPS OF CITY HALL RIGHT BEFORE NEW YEAR'S. A THOUSAND ARE DYING A YEAR ON THE STREET. 17 18 AND YOU KNOW IT IS COLD OUT THERE NOW, AND YOU KNOW THEY ARE 19 FREEZING. THEY ARE HUNGRY. AND YOU ARE SITTING UP HERE AND MEETING ONCE A WEEK, AND I'VE SEEN MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS IN THE 20 21 MOVIE THEATER DURING THE WEEKDAY DURING THE AFTERNOON. SO 22 YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE TO DO YOUR JOB. WE NEED AN INDEPENDENT 23 AUDIT OF THIS MONEY, WHERE ALL OF THIS MONEY IS GOING. I SAW A DISPLAY HERE, YOU WANT MORE MONEY FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. 24 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SHOULDN'T GIVE YOU ONE DIME. MY 25

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OUESTION IS, AND I KNOW THE ANSWER, HOW DID WE GET SO MANY 1 AFRICAN-AMERICANS ON THE STREET? WE GOT THEM ON THE STREET 2 3 BECAUSE THE SERVICE AGENCIES, P.A.T.H. AND THE REST OF THEM, THEY SENT AFRICAN-AMERICANS TO SKID ROW. THEY SENT EVERYBODY 4 5 ELSE TO THE COMMUNITIES. THAT'S HOW WE GOT SO MANY ON THE STREET, AND IT IS STILL GOING ON. YOU HAVEN'T DONE A DARN 6 7 THING ABOUT IT. PLUS, YOU CAN GO TO P.A.T.H. OR AGENCIES AND 8 FIND BEDS. THEY HOLD BEDS. I'VE GOT PROOF OF THIS. THEY HOLD 9 IT. THAT'S WHY THEY'RE NOT GOING TO -- SHE WAS ASKING WHY DON'T YOU PUT IT ON THE WEB WHAT IS AVAILABLE. THEY ARE 10 11 HOLDING IT. THIS IS A SICK SYSTEM YOU ARE RUNNING HERE, AND YOU GUYS NEED TO MEET AT LEAST TWICE A WEEK. YOU CANNOT SOLVE 12 THIS MEETING ONCE A WEEK, 7 OR 8 HOURS. 13

GLORIA MITCHELL: GOOD AFTERNOON, I'M DR. GLORIA SHELL MITCHELL 17 18 FROM JOY YOUTH SERVICES, A NONPROFIT THAT A LITTLE YEAR AGO, 19 OPENED MINISHELL, WHICH IS A TRANSITIONAL HOUSE FOR HOMELESS WOMEN. WELL, WHAT I DID WAS IT TOOK ME SIX MONTHS TO FIND A 20 PLACE. AND, IN FINDING THAT PLACE, I FOUND OUT THERE WERE LOT 21 22 OF PLACES AVAILABLE, AND I OPENED THE HOUSE, AND I HAVE BEDS 23 AVAILABLE. PEOPLE COME AND THEY LOOK. I GOT NO REFERRALS. I HAVE GOT EMPTY BEDS. AND MANY TIMES I GET THE PEOPLE THAT I 24 REALLY HOUSE RIGHT NOW ARE THOSE FROM RE-ENTRY AND SUBSTANCE 25



ABUSE AND CO-OCCURRING DISORDERS, BUT I ALSO HAVE SOME OTHERS 1 THAT I HAVE INVITED TO COME IN. THEY'VE COME IN OFF THE BUS 2 STOP AND OTHER PLACES, AND THEY SAY THAT THEY GO OUT LOOKING 3 FOR FUNDING BECAUSE THEY CAN'T AFFORD THE RENT. G.R. WILL NOT 4 5 ALLOW THEM TO BE ABLE TO PAY THE RENT, AND YET THEY'RE TOLD THERE ARE NO FUNDS AVAILABLE. THAT'S YOUNG PEOPLE, YOUNG WOMEN 6 7 WHO ARE IN THEIR 20S. THEY ARE CONSIDERED -- THEY'RE CALLED 8 T.A.Y. SO I UNDERSTOOD THAT THAT WAS A PRIORITY. I WENT OUT TO 9 HELP THEM, AND I NEED SOME HELP BECAUSE I HAVEN'T RECEIVED ANY FUNDING, SO I'M ASKING YOU TO MAKE THIS SYSTEM, WE AS 10 PROVIDERS, CAN -- [MULTIPLE PEOPLE TALKING]. 11

13 SUP. SOLIS: WHERE IS YOUR DISTRICT?

15 GLORIA MITCHELL: I'M IN DISTRICT TWO. I'VE CONTACTED KAREN 16 BASS AND OTHERS, OTHER SUPERVISORS, NOT JUST MY OWN. I'M 17 SAYING WE NEED SOME HELP, AND IT IS REALLY IMPORTANT THAT WE 18 GET IT. I HAVE 20 BEDS IN THIS FACILITY, A BRAND-NEW HOUSE, 19 AND WE REALLY WANT TO BE ABLE TO KEEP IT OPEN. AND MY 20 RETIREMENT FUNDS WON'T CONTINUE --



HERMAN HERMAN: SEE THE WHOLE PICTURE? THE WHOLE PICTURE IS IN 6 7 WORDS. TWO HOURS OF A PRESENTATION DOESN'T TELL NOTHING, 8 NOTHING MORE BUT A SORRY BUNCH OF HOPELESS INDIVIDUALS. AND YOU WANT ME TO STAND HERE AND BE POLITE AND SENSITIVE. WELL, 9 WHAT ABOUT MY RETRIBUTION TO THIS WORLD? WHAT HAVE YOU DONE 10 11 FOR ME, MS. HAHN? WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO FOR ME? I'M NOT THE ONE HERE WHO IS SICK. IT IS JEFF PROCTER WHO IS SICK, TALKING 12 ABOUT 59,000 PEOPLE WHO LIVE ON OUR STREETS DAILY, AND THAT 13 DOES NOT INCLUDE THE ONES THAT SLEEP IN THE VEHICLES, OR SLEEP 14 IN MY HOUSE, OR SLEEP IN THE PARK. I AM A HOMELESS PERSON AS A DIRECT RESULT OF THIS 11 ACTION AGAINST ME BECAUSE I WAS HELPING HOMELESS PEOPLE. WHEN 12 INDIVIDUAL PERSONS LIKE ME, OR THE LADY WAS SAYING THAT THERE 13 14 IS EMPTY BEDS, TRY TO DO SOMETHING TO HELP THE HOMELESS, NOT ONLY DO WE GET NO SUPPORT WHATSOEVER DESPITE THE BEGGING AND 15 16 PLEADING, DESPITE AND THE COMMON-SENSE PLAN TO JUST LET ME --17 GET MY PLUMBING WORKING, GET MY ELECTRICITY WORKING, LET ME 18 SAVE THE HOUSE, MY ENTIRE HOUSE EXCEPT FOR ONE PART OF IT WAS 19 DEMOLISHED. SO HERE I AM, FIVE MONTHS HOMELESS, AND I FOUND A PLACE TO LIVE, AND I CAN'T OUALIFY BECAUSE I'M BEING 20 21 CONSIDERED HOMELESS AND OBVIOUSLY A BAD RISK AND OBVIOUSLY, 22 OOH, SHE IS CARRYING ONE OF THOSE THINGS, THERE ARE PEOPLE 23 THAT HAVE BEEN HOMELESS FIVE MONTHS, EVEN THOUGH I HAVE A COLLEGE DEGREE, EVEN THOUGH I HAVE BEEN A HOME OWNER FOR 18 24 25 YEARS, AND BEFORE THAT, FOR ALL MY LIFE, I HAVE NEVER NOT

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OWNED A HOME, I CANNOT GET AN APARTMENT. ALL I NEED IS 1 SOMEBODY TO SIGN FOR ME, AND MY CHILDREN WON'T EVEN SIGN FOR 2 3 ME BECAUSE OF THE PREJUDICE AGAINST HOMELESSNESS BECAUSE I'M A LOSER. AND I FOUND OUT OUT OF THE \$3,200 PER MONTH APARTMENT, 4 5 IF YOU DIVIDE IT BY SIX PEOPLE, IT IS LESS THAN \$600 PER PERSON TO LIVE IN A PRIVATE, BEAUTIFUL APARTMENT. AND I WANT 6 7 TO DO IT. I CAN DO IT, AND GUESS WHAT? NOBODY WILL GIVE ME A 8 CHANCE BECAUSE THEY WILL NOT CO-SIGN FOR ME. THAT'S ALL I NEED. WHY DOESN'T THE COUNTY CO-SIGN FOR ME SO I CAN GET 9 PRIVATE APARTMENTS. AND OTHER PEOPLE CAN DO IT. SIX PEOPLE, 10 EACH GET \$550, THEY CAN DO IT. 11

15 ARNOLD SACHS: YES, THANK YOU. THAT WAS A QUICK 20 SECONDS. WHY NOT? THAT IS 21 22 MONEY THAT IS NOT BEING SPENT. WHY NOT? WHO HAS THAT MONEY? 23 YOU JUST GAVE AWAY \$500 MILLION FOR A HOSPITAL THAT YOU HAVE BEEN HOLDING ON TO FOR TWO YEARS, IN CASH NO LESS. THANK 24 GOODNESS MY BACKPACK WAS STOLEN A COUPLE MONTHS AGO. DO YOU 25



KNOW THE DATA IN THIS REPORT? I GOT THAT OUT OF A MAGAZINE 1 THAT WAS IN THE PLANNING DEPARTMENT RIGHT NEXT DOOR. I HELD ON 2 TO IT FOR -- I THINK I HAD IT IN JUNE. HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS TAKEN BY A TRUSTEE FOR FRAUDULENT CHARGES, NOW YOU WANT FEDERAL MONEY? 6 7 THAT'S WHY BEN CARSON CAME HERE. BEN CARSON CAME HERE BECAUSE 8 PEOPLE WERE TALKED TO. THEY SAID, "YOU KNOW JANICE HAHN?" I 9 SAYS, "I KNOW JANICE HAHN. I GREW UP WITH JANICE HAHN." WHAT ABOUT SEA BREEZE? I WANT YOU TO LOG ON TO IT, AND YOU WILL SEE ALL OF THE PAPERWORK 6 7 THAT WAS SUBMITTED FOR NOT ONLY APPLYING FOR HOMELESS FUNDING, 8 BUT THE FACT THAT PETER LYNN AND HEIDI MARSTEN TOOK ME OUT OF 9 THE CONTINUUM CARE ELECTIONS. DID YOU GUYS FORGET ABOUT THAT FOR AFRICAN-AMERICANS? I DIDN'T BECAUSE HAD I BEEN A CONTINUUM 10 11 OF CARE ELECTED OFFICIAL, I WOULD HAVE HAD MY SISTER LORETTA ANDREWS STILL WITH US. YOU GUYS DID NOT FUND ME FOR THE LAST 12 SIX YEARS BECAUSE I HAVE CASELOADS OF BLACK WOMEN THAT YOU 13 GUYS HAVE FORGOTTEN ABOUT, INCLUDING ME! AND ON FRIDAY, I 14 REFERRED HER TO H.O.P.I.C.S. FOR THE LAST TIME BECAUSE EVERY 15 16 PROGRAM DID NOT TAKE HER. SHE WAS TOO STRONG OF A VOICE, SOUNDS FAMILIAR, KICKED HER OUT BECAUSE SHE WASN'T ON METH. 17 18 SHE WAS ONLY AN ALCOHOLIC TRYING TO GET HOUSING FOR HER KIDS 19 BACK, AND ON FRIDAY SHE WENT TO H.O.P.I.C.S. AND JESSICA BROWN MASON AND VERONICA LEWIS TOLD HER NO, AND SHE GOT HIT BY A CAR 20 21 THAT NIGHT. SHE IS DEAD. A BLACK WOMAN WHO WAS LOOKING FOR 22 HOUSING IS DEAD. WHO IS GOING TO REMEMBER HER? I'M GOING TO 23 TELL YOU WHO, THE COUNTY, BECAUSE SHE IS BORN AND RAISED HERE, AND NOW HER 5 KIDS DON'T HAVE A MOTHER. THANK YOU D.C.F.S.. 24 THANK YOU HOUSING, THANK YOU L.A.H.S.A. YOU KEEP GIVING THE 25

SAME CLOWNS JURISDICTION OVER HOMELESS MONEY, AND THEY KEEP 1 2 FAILING, AND YET SHEILA KUEHL WILL GIVE PETER LYNN A 3 [EXPLETIVE] CERTIFICATE EVEN THOUGH HE HAS DONE NOTHING. 4 5 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: YOUR TIME HAS EXPIRED. THAT IS YOUR FIRST 6 WARNING. YOU ARE DISRUPTING THE BOARD MEETING. (OFF-MIC 7 COMMENTS). 8 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. THAT IS YOUR SECOND WARNING. 10 THANK YOU, DR. CLAVREUL? 11 DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL: YES, GOOD AFTERNOON, BOARD OF 12 SUPERVISORS, DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL. I HAVE 14 BEEN HOMELESS, BUT, FIRST, BECAUSE I FELL DOWN 21 CONCRETE 15 16 STAIRS, CRACKED MY ANKLE IN HALF, AND HAD TO MOVE TO LOW INCOME HOUSING, I LOST BOTH MY JOBS, BY THE WAY, I WAS EXPOSED 17 18 TO MOLD THEN DIAGNOSED WITH EPILEPSY ALL WITHIN THE SAME FEW 19 YEARS, RIGHT. I MADE A VALID COMPLAINT ABOUT THE MOLD. I WAS KICKED OUT ON THE STREETS BECAUSE I SAID SOMETHING. BUT WHEN I 20 21 WENT OUT TO THE STREETS AND I WENT TO A SHELTER, I WAS TREATED 22 LIKE AN OUTSIDER. AND ME, BEING THE PERSON THAT I AM, I HAVE 23 BEEN THROUGH A WHOLE LOT. AND I'M GOING TO BE HONEST WITH YOU GUYS. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE VICTIM, CHILD RAPE VICTIM, I HAVE BEEN 24 THROUGH A WHOLE LOT. IT IS HARD FOR ME TO DISCUSS THINGS, BUT 25

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COUNTY OF LOS ANOTHER THE BOARD SURERVISORS

JUST IMAGINE HOW PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESSES AND THE 1 INABILITY TO THINK COGNITIVELY, IMAGINE HOW THEY FEEL. SO WE 2 3 NEED A ONE-STOP SHOP FOR THE PEOPLE IN THE SHELTERS. SO THEY NEED A 6 7 PSYCHOLOGICAL EVALUATION TO ASSESS THESE PEOPLE. THEY NEED A 8 ONE-STOP SHOP WHICH IS INSIDE THE SHELTER OR BUILDING, HAVE A 9 D.P.S.S. OFFICER, SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICER --

11 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, YOUR TIME IS EXPIRED. THANK YOU. OKAY, WITH THAT, WE HAVE GOT ITEM 9 IS BEFORE US. I WILL 12 13 MOVE IT. SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR HAHN TO RECEIVE AND FILE. HAS RECENTLY CREATED AN AD HOC 23 COMMITTEE ON GOVERNANCE AS WELL AS A PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE 24 HOUSING CENTRAL COMMAND TO ADDRESS INTERNAL CHANGES, OR CHALLENGES, IN SERVICE DELIVERY. IN PARTNERSHIPS WITH THESE 25

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EFFORTS, IT IS NECESSARY FOR THE COUNTY TO ALSO UNDERTAKE AN 1 ANALYSIS OF CURRENT GOVERNANCE CHALLENGES AT L.A.H.S.A. 

TO DEVELOP A LONG TERM STRATEGY 8 THAT FUNDS AND ADDRESSES THE H.I.V. AND S.T.D. EPIDEMICS ACROSS THE COUNTY. THIS CRISIS IS IMPORTANT TO ME BECAUSE, OUT 9 OF THE OVER 42,000 CLIENTS WE SEE MONTHLY AT THE CENTER, 10 11 THOUSANDS ARE YOUTH 24 YEARS OF AGE OR YOUNGER WHO ARE AT THE HIGHEST RISK OF EXPERIENCING S.T.I.S AND NEED TREATMENT. 20 DR. ROBERT BOLAN: HI, MY NAME IS DR. ROBERT BOLAN. I'M THE 21 CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER FOR THE LOS ANGELES L.G.B.T. CENTER. AND 22 I HAVE BEEN WORKING IN THE S.T.D. AND H.I.V. EPIDEMICS FOR THE 23 LAST 40 YEARS AND HAVE PUBLISHED NATIONALLY AND 24 INTERNATIONALLY ON THIS. THE L.A. L.G.B.T. CENTER CLINICS

25 DIAGNOSE AND TREAT AROUND 15 PERCENT OF THE GONORRHEA AND 21

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PERCENT OF THE SYPHILIS CASES IN LOS ANGELES. AND THE NUMBER 1 OF CASES HAS DOUBLED SINCE 2012. WE ARE THREATENED WITH AN 2 OVER \$1.2 MILLION SHORT FALL IN THE 2020 FUNDING FROM THE 3 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO CONTINUE THE IMPORTANT PUBLIC 4 5 HEALTH WORK WE DO ON ITS BEHALF. MOST S.T.D.S CAUSE NO SYMPTOMS, ESPECIALLY DURING THE EARLY STAGES WHEN THEY HAVE 6 7 THE GREATEST CHANCE OF BEING TRANSMITTED TO OTHERS. TESTING WILL 10 11 INCREASE S.T.D.S COMMUNITY WIDE. APPROXIMATELY HALF OF THOSE WHO ATTEND OUR TESTING CLINICS EITHER HAVE NO HEALTH 12 13 INSURANCE, DO NOT QUALIFY FOR, OR CANNOT AFFORD INSURANCE COVERAGE, OR WILL NOT USE THEIR INSURANCE S.T.D. COVERAGE. 14 15 16 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: IF YOU WANT TO SUBMIT THE REST OF YOUR COMMENTS IN WRITING, WE WILL SUBMIT THAT INTO THE RECORD. 17 18 19 DR. ROBERT BOLAN: OKAY, THANK YOU. 20 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. 21 22 23 PAUL CHAVEZ: GOOD AFTERNOON, SUPERVISORS. MY NAME IS PAUL CHAVEZ. I WORK AS THE MANAGER FOR OUTREACH AT THE LOS ANGELES 24 L.G.B.T. CENTER, AND I'M ALSO HERE TO ADVOCATE FOR MY 25

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COMMUNITY, FOR THE L.G.B.T. COMMUNITY, WHO MAY GO UNTREATED 1 FOR LIFE THREATENING SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES. I WOULD 2 3 LOVE TO URGE THE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO DEVELOP A LONG TERM STRATEGY THAT FUNDS AND ADDRESSES THE H.I.V. AND 4 5 S.T.D. EPIDEMIC ACROSS THE COUNTY. THIS CRISIS IS VERY PERSONAL AND IMPORTANT TO ME. SO THANK YOU 10 VERY MUCH.

EPIDEMICS AND IN SUPPORT OF FUNDING FOR INCREASED 20 SUPPORTIVE FUNDING FOR, SORRY, THESE PAST FEW SPEAKERS REALLY 21 22 GOT ME A LITTLE WORKED UP THERE A MINUTE THERE, AND I REALLY 23 DO FEEL FOR THEM. WE DO NEED THE COUNTY OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO DEVELOP A LONG TERM STRATEGY FOR FUNDS THAT ADDRESSES THE 24 H.I.V. AND S.T.I. EPIDEMICS ACROSS THE COUNTY. THE L.G.B.T. 25

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COMMUNITY IS ALREADY DISPROPORTIONATELY AFFECTED, AS MANY OF 1 YOU KNOW, BY THINGS LIKE H.I.V. AND S.T.I.S. PLEASE ENSURE THE 2 3 COUNTY'S PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT DEVELOPS A CULTURALLY COMPETENT LONG TERM PLAN TO ADDRESS THE S.T.I. AND H.I.V. 4 5 EPIDEMICS HERE IN L.A. COUNTY, ESPECIALLY AS THEY AFFECT THE L.G.B.T. COMMUNITY. THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME THIS MORNING. 6 7 8 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. 9 DARRYL HUNTER: THANK YOU, GUYS. MY NAME IS DARRYL HUNTER. I'M 10 11 A HEALTH EDUCATION SPECIALIST AT THE L.A. L.G.B.T. CENTER. AND I'M JUST HERE TO PROPOSE FOR WHAT'S GOING ON AT THE MOMENT. 12 I'M GOING TO JUST SPEAK FOR THE TENS OF THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE 13 WHO ARE GOING TO BE AFFECTED FOR UNDIAGNOSED, UNTREATED, AND 14 S.T.I.S OR WHATNOT. SO WHAT I WANT TO SAY IS HOW IMPORTANT IT IS FOR US TO KEEP THESE SERVICES BECAUSE 17 18 I'M AFRICAN-AMERICAN, AND I'M ALSO GAY, AND I GO TO THE CENTER 19 BEFORE I STARTED WORKING THERE AS AN EMPLOYEE TO RECEIVE MY SERVICES, AND I HAVE LOTS OF FRIENDS WHO GO THERE TO RECEIVE 20 SERVICES AND HOW IMPORTANT IT IS FOR US TO GET TESTED AND KNOW 21 OUR STATUS. ALSO THE L.G.B.T. CENTER IS A SAFE HAVEN FOR MOST 22 23 OF US TO GO THERE TO RECEIVE SERVICES. A LOT OF US DON'T FEEL COMFORTABLE WITH GOING TO OTHER MEDICAL FACILITIES TO RECEIVE 24

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THESE TYPE OF SERVICES SUCH AS H.I.V. SO I'M HERE TO PROPOSE 1 2 FOR THAT, AND THANK YOU FOR THE TIME. 3 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. PRIMARY CARE PROVIDER. I KNOW S.T.D.S 20 DEEPLY. I'VE BEEN TREATING THEM FOR DECADES. AND I AM HERE TO 21 22 TALK ABOUT THE RAGING EPIDEMICS THAT OUR COUNTY IS FACING. 23 MOSTLY, I WANT TO TALK TO YOU ABOUT MY 23-YEAR-OLD PATIENT WHO IS JUST LEARNING HOW TO BE A HEALTHY ADULT. WE HAVE AN 24 OPPORTUNITY WITH HIM. THROUGH NONJUDGMENTAL, LOW BARRIER CARE, 25

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WE CAN ENCOURAGE HIM AND OTHERS LIKE HIM TO TAKE CHARGE OF 1 THEIR SEXUAL HEALTH, TO SET POSITIVE LIFELONG BEHAVIORS THAT 2 3 WILL FINALLY BRING THESE EPIDEMICS IN CONTROL, OR WE CAN CREATE BARRIERS, HIGH COST, HIGH BUREAUCRACY, JUDGMENTAL CARE. 4 5 AND IF WE DO SO, HE WILL NEVER TEST AGAIN. AND OUR S.T.D. EPIDEMICS WILL BECOME WORSE. YOUR COMMUNITY PARTNERS ARE HERE. 6 7 WE'RE WITH YOU. WE ARE READY TO FIGHT. AND WE ARE FIRED UP. 8 PLEASE LET US. 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. WELCOME. 10 11 ROBERT GAMBOA: GOOD AFTERNOON, SUPERVISORS. MY NAME IS ROBERT 12 GAMBOA, AND I'M A SENIOR POLICY ADVOCATE FOR THE LOS ANGELES 13 L.G.B.T. CENTER. I ALSO ATTEND THE COUNTY'S H.I.V. COMMISSION 14 AND THE PUBLIC POLICY COMMITTEE. YESTERDAY AT THE PUBLIC 15 16 POLICY COMMITTEE, WE WERE TALKING ABOUT HOW THERE WAS \$30 MILLION THAT WAS ORIGINALLY APPROPRIATED OR ASKED FOR TO 17 18 RESPOND TO THE S.T.D. EPIDEMICS HERE L.A. COUNTY, AND ONLY \$5 19 MILLION WAS APPROPRIATED IN THIS LAST ROUND OF CONTRACTS. AND AS YOU KNOW, WE ARE AT DANGEROUS LEVELS WITH THIS S.T.D. 20 21 EPIDEMIC. WE HERE AT THE CENTER HAVE BEEN WORKING HARD WITH 22 THE COMMISSION AND THE COUNTY TRYING TO FIND SOME SOLUTIONS. 23 WE ALSO HELP LEAD A \$17 MILLION EFFORT FROM THE STATE BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT FUNDING HAS TO COME ELSEWHERE AS WELL. AND WE ARE 24 ALSO WORKING ON A \$40 MILLION FUNDING ASK FROM THE STATE TO 25

HELP RESPOND TO THIS TOO. WE HAVE BEEN A COMMUNITY PARTNER FOR 1 DECADES, AND WE ASK TO CONTINUE WORKING WITH THE COUNTY AND 2 3 D.P.H. TO FIND LONG TERM SUSTAINABLE SOLUTIONS FOR THIS PROBLEM. THANKS. 4 5 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER. 6 7 8 MARLON ROSASEN: HONORARY BOARD MEMBERS, GOOD AFTERNOON. MY 9 NAME IS MARLON ROSASEN. I'M HER TO ASK THE BOARD TO INVESTIGATE THIS CHILD ABDUCTION UNIT AT THE DISTRICT 10 11 ATTORNEY'S OFFICE. AND THEY ARE NOT LIKE CORONA VIRUS. THEY ARE HEAVILY CONCENTRATED IN DENSE 10 11 NODES OF UNDERSERVED POPULATIONS, SPECIFICALLY THOSE WHO ARE YOUNG, PEOPLE OF COLOR, HOMELESS, AND L.G.B.T.O. THESE GROUPS 12 13 ARE LESS LIKELY TO HAVE HEALTH INSURANCE AND ACCESS TO PREVENTIVE HEALTHCARE. THESE POPULATIONS ARE BEST REACHED BY 14 COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS LIKE THE LOS ANGELES L.G.B.T. CENTER 15 16 WHO LAST YEAR PROVIDED 300,000 H.I.V. AND S.T.D. TESTS, HALF OF WHICH WERE FUNDED BY L.A. COUNTY. THESE FREE AND LOW COST 17 18 SERVICES ARE NOW IN JEOPARDY. I URGE THE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF 19 PUBLIC HEALTH TO DEVELOP A LONG TERM STRATEGY THAT FUNDS AND ADDRESSES THE H.I.V. AND S.T.D. EPIDEMICS WE ARE CURRENTLY 20 21 FACING IN THE L.G.B.T. COMMUNITY AND ACROSS THE ENTIRE COUNTY. 22 THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

24 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

ANDREA MCPHERSON: HELLO, MY NAME IS ANDREA MCPHERSON. I'M A 1 2 CHAIR WITH THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE WITH L.A. CARE. WITH THAT, I 3 WANTED TO LET YOU KNOW I WAS DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, AND I SPOKE ABOUT THAT HERE AT THIS MEETING BEFORE, JUST TO LET YOU 4 5 GUYS KNOW THAT I NEED ASSISTANCE BECAUSE I AM BEING DISCRIMINATED AGAINST ON A REGULAR BASIS. EVERY TIME I SIT 6 7 DOWN AT THE CHAIR LIKE THE ONES YOU'RE SITTING IN, I GET SHUT 8 DOWN, ROLLED UP, AND EVERYTHING ELSE. SO IN ORDER FOR US, IN 9 ORDER FOR US TO WORK TOGETHER, THE PARLIAMENTARY PROCESS, WHATEVER THE CASE MAY BE, WE ALL NEED TO BE ABLE TO HAVE 10 11 ACCESS. WE ALL NEED TO BE ABLE TO HAVE A VOICE. BUT YET, FOR SOME STRANGE REASON, I'M NOT GETTING SUPPORT FROM SHEILA 12 KUEHL. BUT, WITH THAT BEING SAID, HOPEFULLY BY TODAY, SHE 13 WOULD GIVE ME ACCESS TO HER OFFICE AND ANYTHING ELSE I CAN DO 14 IN ORDER TO GET IN CONTACT WITH HER. 15

17 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER.

MARY JACOBS: MARY JACOBS, I WOULD LIKE TO THANK PATRICIA MCCALLISTER FOR HER STRENGTH. I JUST WANT TO REMIND YOU THAT I'M WHITE. GEORGE BUZZETTI IS WHITE, AND WE ARE BOTH CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIVISTS IN OUR WAY, AND YOU CAN GET HELP FROM PEOPLE OF DIFFERENT RACES THAT AGREE WITH YOU. THE L.A. COUNTY BEGAN THE WAR WITH ME AND MY HOUSE DIRECTLY AFTER MY BLACK LADY FRIEND, CLAIRE FAVIYAN, MOVED IN WITH HER BLACK CHILDREN AND



HER BLACK GRANDCHILDREN. WE HAD SIX BLACK PEOPLE PEOPLE LIVING 1 IN EAST L.A. OH MY GOD, THE NEXT THING YOU KNOW, WE GOT 2 3 ATTACKED. THEN I MOVED TO PANORAMA CITY. THEY HAD MEXICAN PEOPLE. THEY HAD ALL KINDS OF GYPSIES, YOU NAME IT. THEY GET A 4 5 GROUP OF BLACK PEOPLE, 18 OF THEM, AND IMMEDIATELY THE CITY WENT ON THEIR ATTACK. YES, THE BLACK PEOPLE ARE BEING 6 7 EXTERMINATED. YES, THEY ARE BEING POINTED AT. THEY ARE GETTING 8 MORE HOMELESS AND HOMELESS. YOU GO DOWN TO SKID ROW, EVERYBODY IS BLACK OR DISABLED. THIS IS A TRAVESTY, AND IT IS RACISM 9 10 BEYOND BELIEF.

12 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT SPEAKER.

JOSIAH EDWARDS: GOOD AFTERNOON, ALL. MY NAME IS JOSIAH 14 EDWARDS. I'M A MEMBER OF SUNRISE LOS ANGELES. THERE ARE MORE 15 16 MEMBERS OF OUR YOUTH-LED ORGANIZATION WHO ORIGINALLY CAME TO ADDRESS OUR CONCERNS DURING THE GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT. 17 18 UNFORTUNATELY BECAUSE THE BOARD WENT INTO CLOSED SESSION SO 19 EARLY, MOST OF OUR MEMBERS HAD TO LEAVE. WHEN THE BOARD GOES INTO CLOSED SESSION SO EARLY AND BEFORE GENERAL PUBLIC 20 COMMENT, YOU ARE NOT ENCOURAGING THE VOICES OF YOUR 21 22 CONSTITUENTS TO BE HEARD DURING SUPERVISORIAL MEETINGS. YOU 23 ARE DISCOURAGING, DEMEANING, AND, FRANKLY, INSULTING THEM. WE WANTED TO ADDRESS OUR CONCERNS ON FOSSIL FUEL MONEY TOWARD 24 PRIMARILY TWO SUPERVISORS UP FOR REELECTION, SUPERVISOR BARGER 25

AND RIDLEY-THOMAS, WHO REPRESENTS MY DISTRICT AND ISN'T EVEN 1 HERE. WE WANTED GO THROUGH THE NORMAL PROCESS IN ORDER TO 2 ENSURE THAT OUR VOICE IS PARTICULARLY THE VOICES OF POOR BLACK 3 AND BROWN CHILDREN THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY WERE HEARD, BUT OUR 4 5 FUTURES ARE FAR TOO IMPORTANT TO GAMBLE WITH. YOU CAN NOW EXPECT FAR GREATER ACTION IN THE FORM OF CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE 6 7 FROM SUNRISE LOS ANGELES IN THE NEAR FUTURE. THANK YOU. 8 9 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. 10 11 LARRY LAVEN: HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, MY NAME IS LARRY LAVEN. I'M FROM ENCINO. OUTDOOR JAILS, RECENTLY I HAVE BEEN 12 TALKING ABOUT CONCRETE JAILS AND CLAIM THAT QUONSET HUTS OR 13 DORMS BUILT FOR PRISONERS WHO CAN DO THEIR TIME OUTDOORS MIGHT 14 PROVIDE BETTER REHABILITATION THAN A CONCRETE CELL. I BELIEVE 15 16 THAT PEOPLE ARRESTED FOR MISDEMEANOR ASSAULT AND BATTERY SHOULD BE ALLOWED TO DO THEIR TIME OUTDOORS AS WELL AS 17 18 NONVIOLENT CRIMINALS. AT 18, I WAS PUT IN THE MEN'S CENTRAL 19 JAIL WHEN BEING PROCESSED INTO THE SYSTEM. I WAS ONLY IN THE CENTRAL JAIL FOR A FEW DAYS, BUT IT SEEMED LIKE A LOT LONGER, 20 LONG ENOUGH FOR ME TO COME TO THE CONCLUSION THAT I DID NOT 21 22 EVER WANT TO BE THERE AGAIN. FORTUNATELY FOR ME, I WAS TRANSFERRED TO PETER PITCH'S HONOR RANCH, WHERE I PLANTED 23 TREES, SHOVELED COW MANURE, MILKED COWS, AND WORKED IN THE 24 DINING ROOM. WE MARCHED EVERYWHERE. IF PRISONERS ARE MADE TO 25

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MARCH, THAT WOULD BE ENOUGH TO KEEP THEM BUSY. I WAS THERE FOR
 FOUR MONTHS AND REHABILITATED, THANK YOU.

ANTHONY HAYES, JR.: YEAH, MY NAME IS ANTHONY HAYES, JR. TUPAC 6 7 SHAKUR IS MY COUSIN, AND I STARTED MY OWN GOVERNMENT PROGRAM. 8 I'M THE C.E.O., THE PRESIDENT, OF THE BUREAU DEPARTMENT OF 9 REPARATION FOR NATIVE AMERICANS AND BLACK AFRICAN-AMERICANS, PENAL CODE \$1 TRILLION. MY SON ANTONIO KING HAYES IS A VICTIM 10 11 OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING BY YOUR EMPLOYEES. AND I FILED A CLAIM FOR DAMAGES JANUARY 8TH. I FILED A SMALL CLAIMS AT L.A. 12 SUPERIOR COURTHOUSE AGAINST THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IN L.A. 13 COUNTY, AND NO ONE APPEARED IN COURT. I FILED A SMALL CLAIMS 14 AGAINST COUNTY COUNSEL IN THE SMALL CLAIMS DEPARTMENT. NO ONE 15 16 APPEARED IN COURT. THIS IS A SERIOUS ISSUE THAT YOUR EMPLOYEES ARE IN VIOLATION OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF 17 18 AMERICA. THE NEXT THING THAT IS GOING TO HAPPEN, THE MILITARY 19 IS GOING TO START CORRECTING YOUR MISTAKES BECAUSE ONCE YOU VIOLATE SOMEONE'S CONSTITUTION RIGHTS, YOU ARE BREAKING THE 20 21 LAW. YOU CANNOT ENFORCE THE LAW AND THEN BREAK THE LAW AT THE 22 SAME TIME. THE LAW THAT YOU'RE BREAKING IS THE CONSTITUTION. 23

COMMUNITY AT RISK OF GOING UNTESTED, UNDIAGNOSED, AND UNTREATED FOR LIFE THREATENING SEXUALLY 12 13 TRANSMITTED DISEASES. WE NEED THE COUNTY'S DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO DEVELOP A LONG TERM STRATEGY THAT FUNDS AND 14 ADDRESS THE H.I.V. AND S.T.D. EPIDEMICS ACROSS THE COUNTY. 15 16 THIS CRISIS IS IMPORTANT TO ME BECAUSE, AS A YOUNG QUEER PERSON OF COLOR, I'M AT HIGH RISK OF CONTRACTING H.I.V. AND 17 THE PLACES IN THIS COUNTY I CAN SAFELY GET COMPREHENSIVE AND 18 19 ADEQUATE CARE FOR PREVENTION SERVICES AND TREATMENT ARE LIMITED, AND MANY PEOPLE ACROSS THE COUNTRY, YOUNG PEOPLE, 20 YOUNG QUEER PEOPLE OF COLOR, ARE COMING TO LOS ANGELES FOR 21 22 HOUSING AND ARE ALSO LOOKING FOR THESE SERVICES THAT THEY 23 NEED, AS WELL. PERSON, NOR AS AN IMMIGRANT, AT THE LOS ANGELES 10 11 L.G.B.T. CENTER'S HEALTH SETTINGS. I KNOW THAT I AM FORTUNATE AND LUCKY BECAUSE I CAN COUNT ON THIS NOW AS WELL AND MY 12 13 FRIENDS AND MY IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY FRIENDS IN THE L.G.B.T. COMMUNITY. I BELIEVE THAT FREE S.T.D. AND H.I.V. TESTING IS 14 IMPORTANT TO THE L.G.B.T. IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY, ESPECIALLY 15 16 BECAUSE IT IS A SAFE PLACE FOR EVERYTHING THEY ARE. THAT IS WHY TODAY I'M HERE TO ASK YOU PLEASE TO ENSURE THE COUNTY'S 17 18 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH DEVELOPS A LONG TERM STRATEGY TO 19 ADDRESS H.I.V. AND S.T.D. EPIDEMICS FOR THE L.G.B.T. COMMUNITY. THANK YOU. 20 21 22 SUP. BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. NEXT SPEAKER. 23 DANI MARZUKA: HI, MY NAME IS DANI MARZUKA. MY PRONOUNS ARE SHE 24

BARGER, CHAIR: THANK YOU. 10 11 ARNOLD SACHS: YES, THANK YOU, GOOD AFTERNOON, ARNOLD SACHS. 12 AND IN THIS BOOK THAT'S A GUIDE TO THE COUNTY, IT MENTIONED ON 13 PAGE 52 THAT YOU HAVE MANAGED HEALTHCARE SUCH AS L.A.  ON, SUPERVISOR BARGER?

AFTER SELLING HIS BUSINESS, HE 19 BEGAN A SECOND YEAR AS A COMMUNITY LEADER FIGHTING FOR CIVIL RIGHTS MORE THAN 40 YEARS AGO, WHEN HE JOINED THE NATIONAL 20 CONFERENCE OF CHRISTIANS AND JEWS, WHICH EVENTUALLY BECAME THE 21 22 CALIFORNIA CONFERENCE FOR EQUALITY AND JUSTICE. GENE NEVER 23 STOPPED FIGHTING FOR EQUAL RIGHTS FOR ALL. HE ONCE SAID IT IS AMAZING THAT WE CAN DO -- IT IS AMAZING WHAT WE CAN DO WHEN WE 24 WORK TOGETHER. IMPROVING HUMAN RELATIONS BEGINS WITH EACH ONE 25

OF US. GENE IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE, ANN, OF 68 YEARS, 1 BROTHER, GORDON, SONS, ALAN AND JAY, GRANDSON, DAVID, AS WELL 2 3 AS THE ENTIRE LONG BEACH COMMUNITY. THOSE ARE SUPERVISOR HAHN'S ADJOURNMENTS. AND MY ADJOURNMENTS, I MOVE THAT WE 4 5 ADJOURN TODAY IN MEMORY OF TED SHAW, A LONG TIME SOUTH PASADENA BUSINESS OWNER, WHO RECENTLY PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE 6 7 OF 75. HE WAS A BUSINESSMAN AND INVESTOR, A COUNCILMAN AND 8 MAYOR, AND A FUNDRAISER THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRE REGION. TED WAS 9 A GRADUATE OF ST. FRANCIS IN LA CANADA AND PROUD TROJAN FROM U.S.C. HE WAS COFOUNDER OF SHAW MOSES MENDENHALL AGENCY, A 10 11 LARGE REGIONAL INSURANCE BROKERAGE FIRM, AND HELPED ASSEMBLE PROPERTIES WITH PARTNERS IN SOUTH PASADENA THAT LED TO THE 12 DEVELOPMENT OF MANY OF THE NEWER COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS ALONG 13 FAIR OAKS.
