- 4 SUP. SOLIS, CHAIR: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. AT THIS TIME, WE WILL
- 5 HEAR FROM SHERIFF VILLANUEVA, WHO HAS REQUESTED TO ADDRESS THE
- 6 BOARD ON ITEMS 16 AND 73-F, AND HE WILL HAVE THREE MINUTES.
- 7 PLEASE BEGIN, SHERIFF.

- 9 SHERIFF VILLANUEVA: THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR SOLIS. ITEM NUMBER
- 10 16. I BELIEVE MEASURE J WAS FOUND TO BE UNCONSTITUTIONAL IN
- 11 THE COURT RULING, HERE IN SUPERIOR COURT. HOWEVER, NOW YOU ARE
- 12 CHANGING THE NAME FROM MEASURE J TO A... WHAT IS THIS CALLED?
- 13 A CARE FIRST AND COMMUNITY INVESTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE,
- 14 INSTEAD OF THE MEASURE J ADVISORY COMMITTEE. HOWEVER, CHANGING
- 15 THE NAME OF IT DOES NOT CHANGE THE NATURE OF IT. THIS ACT IS
- 16 NOT THERE'S NOT ANY MOMENTUM BEHIND CARE FIRST AND JAIL LAST.
- 17 THERE'S MOMENTUM BEHIND TAKING CARE OF THE HOMELESS CRISIS
- 18 THAT'S ENGULFING THE COUNTY. THERE'S MOMENTUM BEHIND GETTING
- 19 RID OF THE ILLEGAL MARIJUANA GROWS IN THE HIGH DESERT
- 20 DISPENSARIES IN THE SOUTHLAND. THERE'S MOMENTUM BEHIND TRYING
- 21 TO FIND A WAY TO SOLVE OUR SURGE IN HOMICIDES. IT IS NOW A 70%
- 22 INCREASE IN HOMICIDE VICTIMS, COMPARED TO LAST YEAR AT THE
- 23 SAME TIME. THAT IS WHERE THE MOMENTUM IS AT. THAT IS PUBLIC
- 24 SAFETY. SO THE \$100 MILLION THAT WAS REMOVED FROM THE
- 25 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT BUDGET AND PUT IN A PROVISIONAL FUNDING

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- 1 UNIT, TO THEN HAND IT OVER TO THE MEASURE J, ALL YOU ARE DOING
- 2 IS CHANGING THE NAME, BUT IT IS THE VERY SAME PROBLEM. AND I
- 3 LOOKED THROUGH THIS ENTIRE ITEM, NUMBER 16, AND IT LOOKS LIKE
- 4 A "BUREAUCRATIC ORGY OF WOKENESS" IS THE BEST WAY TO DESCRIBE
- 5 THIS THING. OH, MY GOD. AND RACE-BASED APPOINTMENTS TO A 24-
- 6 MEMBER ADVISORY COMMITTEE? THAT'S-- I DON'T KNOW. DO YOU EVEN
- 7 CLEAR THIS THROUGH COUNTY COUNSEL, THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF
- 8 THIS? IT SOUNDS... I DON'T KNOW. IT IS HARD TO EVEN DESCRIBE
- 9 THIS, AND I FIND I AM RATHER EDUCATED ON PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION
- 10 AFFAIRS. I READ THROUGH THIS ENTIRE MOTION, AND ALL IT IS IS A
- 11 GIVEAWAY OF TAXPAYER FUNDS. IT BELONGS IN PUBLIC SAFETY TO
- 12 KEEP PEOPLE ALIVE, AND YOU ARE GOING TO GIVE IT TO 501(C)(3)S
- 13 THAT YOU CONTROL, AND THEY ARE YOUR FRIENDS. AND THAT IS THE
- 14 SAME HOMELESS INDUSTRIAL COMPLEX NATURE OF THE SERVICE
- 15 PROVIDERS. ALL THIS MONEY IS GOING TO BE SPENT WITH ZERO
- 16 ACCOUNTABILITY, ZERO OVERSIGHT, AND JUST LIKE WITH THE
- 17 HOMELESS INITIATIVE: \$6.5 BILLION OVER TEN YEARS TO SEE THE
- 18 PROBLEM DOUBLE. SO NOW THAT WE HAVE DESPERATE NEED FOR PUBLIC
- 19 SAFETY FUNDS TO ADDRESS THESE MAJOR THREATS THAT WE ARE
- 20 FACING, I HAVE HOMICIDE INVESTIGATORS STRETCHED TO THE LIMIT,
- 21 TRYING TO MAKE DUE WITH A STAGGERING CASE LOAD. THEY CAN'T
- 22 KEEP UP WITH IT. AND WE ARE ROBBING PETER TO PAY PAUL, JUST TO
- 23 SATISFY ALL THE DEMANDS OF OUR CUSTODY ENVIRONMENT. AND THAT
- 24 \$100 MILLION, YOU SHOULD REALLOCATE IT BACK TO PUBLIC SAFETY,
- 25 WHERE IT BELONGS, SO WE CAN KEEP PEOPLE ALIVE AND SAFE IN L.A.

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- 1 COUNTY. AND THEN YOU CAN START "REIMAGINING" THINGS, WHEN
- 2 PEOPLE ARE SAFE. BUT THEY ARE NOT GOING TO DO IT THE WAY YOU
- 3 HAVE DONE IT SO FAR, AND THIS MEASURE, I THINK, IS A FRAUD.
- 4 THE WHOLE THING. AND THIS ENTIRE CARE FIRST, JAIL LAST, YOU
- 5 NEED TO START RETHINKING IT, REAL QUICK. THANK YOU.

- 12 WE ARE STILL AT ONLY A SMALL FRACTION-- LESS THAN 15 PERCENT--
- 13 OF OUR C.O.V.I.D. CENSUS THAT WE EXPERIENCED OVER THE WINTER.
- 14 ON THE NEXT SLIDE, SLIDE 6, I WANT TO GO INTO A LITTLE BIT
- 15 MORE DETAIL ABOUT THE DATA OF WHAT WE'RE SEEING AND WHO IS
- 16 ADMITTED TO THE HOSPITAL WITH C.O.V.I.D. SINCE MID-JUNE,
- 17 D.H.S. HAS CARED FOR NEARLY 300 PATIENTS WHO ARE CONSIDERED TO
- 18 BE A C.O.V.I.D.-19 ADMISSION. THIS IS DEFINED AS SOMEONE WITH
- 19 A POSITIVE C.O.V.I.D. TEST DURING THEIR STAY, OR ANY POSITIVE
- 20 C.O.V.I.D. TEST IN THE 30 DAYS LEADING UP TO THEIR STAY, OR
- 21 SOMEONE WITH AN I.C.D.-10 DIAGNOSIS FOR A CORONAVIRUS
- 22 INFECTION. THAT DISTINCTION, THOUGH, DOESN'T NECESSARILY
- 23 DIFFERENTIATE BETWEEN SOMEONE WHO IS IN THE HOSPITAL FOR
- 24 C.O.V.I.D., I.E. DUE TO THE COMPLICATIONS FROM THE VIRUS
- 25 ITSELF, VERSUS JUST SIMPLY SOMEONE WHO HAS HAD C.O.V.I.D., OR

- 1 RECENTLY HAD C.O.V.I.D., BUT IS IN THE HOSPITAL FOR SOMETHING
- 2 ELSE: FOR A CAR ACCIDENT, FOR CANCER TREATMENT, OR FOR
- 3 SOMETHING ELSE. SO WHEN WE DIVE INTO THE DETAILS OF THESE
- 4 CASES, OF THESE NEARLY 300 INDIVIDUALS OVER THE PAST TWO
- 5 MONTHS, ONLY 5 PEOPLE WERE FULLY VACCINATED AND ADMITTED TO
- 6 THE HOSPITAL DUE TO C.O.V.I.D. INFECTION AND THE COMPLICATIONS
- 7 OF C.O.V.I.D. OF THESE 5 INDIVIDUALS, ONE WAS SEVERELY
- 8 IMMUNOCOMPROMISED AND WAS A TRANSPLANT PATIENT. ALL OF THE
- 9 REMAINING, MORE THAN 95 PERCENT OF ALL OF THE PEOPLE ADMITTED
- 10 FOR C.O.V.I.D., WERE AMONG THOSE PATIENTS WHO WERE NOT FULLY
- 11 VACCINATED. AND I THINK THIS UNDERSCORES, REALLY, THE KEY
- 12 POINT: THAT THE VACCINE SAVES LIVES. IT REDUCES THE RISK OF
- 13 INFECTION; IT REDUCES THE RISK OF SPREADING THE VIRUS TO
- 14 OTHERS; AND CRITICALLY, IN DOING SO, IT REDUCES THE RISK OF
- 15 THOSE INDIVIDUALS SERVING AS A PETRI DISH, REALLY, IN WHICH
- 16 THE VIRUS CAN CONTINUE TO MUTATE INTO PROGRESSIVELY MORE
- 17 DANGEROUS FORMS THAT PUT EVERYONE AT RISK. AS HEALTHCARE
- 18 PROVIDERS, MANY OF WHOM IN PUBLIC COMMENT YOU HEARD FROM THIS
- 19 MORNING, INCLUDING SEVERAL D.H.S. STAFF, I HEAR OFTEN ABOUT
- 20 HOW IT IS REALLY EMOTIONALLY DIFFICULT AND CHALLENGING TO CARE
- 21 FOR PATIENTS WHO HAVE C.O.V.I.D. AND COMPLICATIONS OF
- 22 C.O.V.I.D., WHO HAVEN'T CHOSEN TO GET VACCINATED, BECAUSE IT
- 23 REALLY IS AN AVOIDABLE AND PREVENTABLE SITUATION. I WILL SHIFT
- 24 NOW TO THE NEXT SLIDE ON TESTING. YOU CAN SEE ON THIS SLIDE,
- 25 SLIDE 7, THE DOTS SHOWING ALL OF THE LOCATIONS IN WHICH PEOPLE

- 1 CAN RECEIVE COMMUNITY-BASED TESTING ACCESS. THERE'S A VARIETY

- 3 AS A NUMBER OF ADDITIONAL COMMUNITY PARTNERS. TESTING IS
- 4 WIDELY AVAILABLE. AS YOU WILL SEE ON SLIDE 8, WE HAVE FIXED
- 5 TESTING SITES AND POP-UP TESTING SITES. THE UTILIZATION RATE
- 6 WHICH HISTORICALLY HAD BEEN RUNNING AROUND 10 OR 15 PERCENT
- 7 HAS CLIMBED UP OVER THE PAST COUPLE OF WEEKS; BUT STILL, ALL
- 8 OF OUR FIXED AND POP-UP TESTING SITES ARE STILL RUNNING AT

- 2 24,805 ACROSS THE COUNTY. WE SHARE OUR DEEPEST CONDOLENCES
- 3 WITH ALL THOSE WHO ARE GRIEVING THE LOSS OF FRIENDS, LOVED
- 4 ONES, AND FAMILY, AND WE WISH YOU HEALING AND PEACE. WE ARE
- 5 ALSO REPORTING 2,622 NEW CASES TODAY, BRINGING THE TOTAL
- 6 NUMBER OF CASES IN L.A. COUNTY TO 1,331,859. YESTERDAY, OUR
- 7 DAILY AVERAGE CASE RATE, WITHOUT THE 7-DAY LAG, WAS 24 CASES
- 8 PER 100,000 PEOPLE. THIS IS A SMALL INCREASE FROM LAST
- 9 TUESDAY'S SAME-DAY CASE RATE OF 21 NEW CASES PER 100,000
- 10 PEOPLE. ALTHOUGH YESTERDAY'S RATE WILL LIKELY CHANGE SOMEWHAT
- 11 OVER THE COMING DAYS, AS ADDITIONAL TEST RESULTS ARE REPORTED,

- 22 TUESDAY'S SAME-DAY TEST POSITIVITY RATE OF 6.6 PERCENT.
- 23 YESTERDAY, THERE WERE 1,437 PEOPLE HOSPITALIZED WITH
- 24 C.O.V.I.D.-19, AND OVER THE LAST WEEK, THAT'S AN INCREASE OF
- 25 164 PEOPLE. WE ALSO HAVE 239 OPEN INVESTIGATIONS AT

- 1 RESIDENTIAL CONGREGATE SETTINGS AND NONRESIDENTIAL SETTINGS,

- 3 DOUBLING OF OUR OUTBREAK INVESTIGATIONS IN A MONTH. WE CAN
- 4 TAKE THE NEXT SLIDE. THREE WEEKS AGO, AT THE TIME OF OUR
- 5 HEALTH OFFICER ORDER THAT REQUIRED UNIVERSAL MASKING INDOORS,
- 6 OUR CASES WERE DOUBLING EVERY TEN DAYS. WHAT WE ARE SEEING NOW
- 7 IS A SLOWING DOWN IN THE INCREASE IN CASES, WHICH IS WHAT WE
- 8 WOULD HOPE FOR AFTER IMPLEMENTING AN EFFECTIVE PUBLIC HEALTH
- 9 MEASURE. THIS DOES REMIND US ALL THAT MASKING REMAINS AN
- 10 EFFECTIVE WAY TO REDUCE TRANSMISSION. IT IS ALSO VALUABLE TO

- 5 DEATHS, BY VACCINATION STATUS, ALL OF WHICH HELP ILLUSTRATE
- 6 WHY WE PLACE SUCH HIGH PRIORITY ON VACCINATING AS MANY L.A.

- 19 BE CHILDREN BETWEEN THE AGES OF ZERO AND 4, REPRESENTED HERE
- 20 BY THE BLUE LINE. CASES ARE RISING FASTER AND TO HIGHER LEVELS
- 21 AMONG OLDER CHILDREN. CHILDREN AGED 5 TO 11, REPRESENTED BY
- 22 THE ORANGE LINE, AND THOSE AGED 12 TO 17, REPRESENTED BY THE
- 23 GREEN LINE, HAVE SIMILAR CASE RATES. LOOKING BACK AT THE
- 24 DISTRIBUTION OF CASES AMONG THESE AGE GROUPS DURING OUR
- 25 WINTERTIME SURGE, YOU CAN NOTE THAT CHILDREN IN THE OLDEST AGE

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- 1 GROUP, 12 TO 17, HAD RATES OUITE A BIT HIGHER THAN THOSE OF
- 2 YOUNGER CHILDREN. WITH OLDER CHILDREN, CURRENTLY, THE ONLY
- 3 PEDIATRIC AGE GROUP ELIGIBLE FOR VACCINES, WE ARE NOW SEEING
- 4 TRANSMISSION WITHIN THIS OLDER AGE GROUP SUBSTANTIALLY
- 5 DIMINISHED. ALTHOUGH THEY ARE NOT SHOWN HERE, CASE RATES IN
- 6 VACCINATED CHILDREN YOUNGER THAN 18 ARE LOWER THAN THE LOWEST
- 7 LINE ON THIS GRAPH, WHILE CASE RATES IN UNVACCINATED CHILDREN
- 8 TRACK CLOSELY WITH RATES IN VACCINATED ADULTS AGED 18 TO 49.
- 9 WE WILL TAKE THE NEXT SLIDE. ON THIS NEXT SLIDE, WE CAN LOOK
- 10 AT INFORMATION ON HOSPITALIZATIONS BY VACCINATION STATUS. AS
- 11 YOU CAN SEE, THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE NUMBERS OF
- 12 UNVACCINATED AND VACCINATED PEOPLE HOSPITALIZED IS MUCH LARGER
- 13 THAN WE WERE JUST LOOKING AT CASES. IN LATE JULY, ABOUT 94
- 14 PEOPLE NEWLY ADMITTED TO THE HOSPITAL EACH DAY WERE POSITIVE
- 15 FOR C.O.V.I.D. OF THESE, 83, OR SLIGHTLY UNDER 90 PERCENT,
- 16 WERE UNVACCINATED. WE CAN TAKE THE NEXT SLIDE. WHEN WE LOOK AT
- 17 WHO IS NOW GETTING HOSPITALIZED BY AGE GROUP, WE CAN SEE THAT
- 18 THE HIGHEST HOSPITALIZATION RATE IS AMONG OLDER UNVACCINATED
- 19 ADULTS, REPRESENTED HERE BY THE DASHED ORANGE LINE. THESE ARE
- 20 OUR HIGHEST-RISK RESIDENTS, BECAUSE OF THEIR AGE, LIKELIHOOD
- 21 OF HAVING COMORBIDITIES, AND LACK OF VACCINE PROTECTION. AND
- 22 SADLY, HOSPITALIZATIONS IN THIS GROUP ARE RISING VERY QUICKLY.
- 23 HOSPITALIZATIONS IN YOUNGER UNVACCINATED ADULTS, REPRESENTED
- 24 HERE BY THE SOLID ORANGE LINE, ARE ALSO RISING. RELATIVE TO
- 25 THESE TRENDS, HOSPITALIZATION RATES AMONG VACCINATED ADULTS OF

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- 1 ALL AGES REMAIN, AS YOU CAN SEE, NEARLY FLAT, EVEN AMONG THOSE
- 2 OLDER ADULTS. WITHOUT VACCINATION, THE ORANGE LINES ON THIS
- 3 GRAPH WOULD LIKELY BE 60 TO 100 PERCENT HIGHER, SO WE ARE
- 4 EXTREMELY GRATEFUL TO EVERYONE WHO HAS HELPED REDUCE POTENTIAL
- 5 TRANSMISSION BY GETTING VACCINATED. TREND LINES LIKE THESE ARE
- 6 WHY WE FEEL SO CERTAIN THAT THE VACCINES ARE DOING EXACTLY

- 9 AND WHILE WE'VE SEEN CASES RISE AMONG VACCINATED PEOPLE, FAR
- 10 FEWER VACCINATED PEOPLE EXPERIENCE THE SEVERE ILLNESS THE
- 11 INFECTION CONTINUES TO CAUSE IN UNVACCINATED PEOPLE. THIS IS
- 12 WHY WE CONTINUE TO ASK EVERYONE ELIGIBLE TO GET VACCINATED:
- 13 BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT WE CAN PREVENT ALMOST ALL C.O.V.I.D.
- 14 HOSPITALIZATIONS AND DEATHS. IF EVERYONE ELIGIBLE WERE TO GET
- 15 VACCINATED, WE WOULD END UP AVOIDING SO MUCH OF THE ANXIETY
- 16 AND DISTRESS THAT COMES WITH HAVING A LOVED ONE HOSPITALIZED
- 17 WITH C.O.V.I.D., AND ALMOST NO ONE WOULD PASS AWAY FROM THIS
- 18 INFECTION. THIS IS AN ACHIEVABLE REALITY FOR US, IF EVERYONE
- 19 WHO IS ELIGIBLE GETS VACCINATED. NEXT SLIDE. AGAIN, ZOOMING
- 20 IN ON THE PEDIATRIC AGE GROUPS, YOU CAN SEE THAT
- 21 HOSPITALIZATIONS REMAIN RELATIVELY LOW, BUT THEY ARE
- 22 INCREASING VERY SLIGHTLY IN ALL AGE GROUPS. YOU CAN ALSO NOTE
- 23 THAT, ALTHOUGH RATES ARE LOW, THE PATTERN THAT HAS BEEN
- 24 PRESENT THROUGHOUT THE PANDEMIC IS STILL IN EFFECT.
- 25 HOSPITALIZATIONS END UP BEING HIGHEST AMONG THE YOUNGEST

- 1 CHILDREN, AGE 0 TO 4, REPRESENTED BY THE BLUE LINE; LOWER
- 2 AMONG CHILDREN AGED 12 TO 17, REPRESENTED BY THE ORANGE LINE;
- 3 AND LOWEST IN CHILDREN 5 TO 11, HERE ON THE GREEN LINE. I WANT
- 4 TO NOTE THAT THE ABSOLUTE NUMBERS HERE ARE GENERALLY IN THE
- 5 SINGLE OR LOW DOUBLE DIGITS, SO THESE SMALL CHANGES IN THE
- 6 NUMBERS RESULT IN A RELATIVELY LARGE INCREASE IN THE RATES. WE
- 7 CAN GO ON TO THE NEXT SLIDE. BECAUSE WE'RE VERY INTERESTED IN
- 8 UNDERSTANDING HOW WELL VACCINATION PROTECTS AGAINST SEVERE
- 9 OUTCOMES DUE TO C.O.V.I.D., WE ARE ALSO CLOSELY FOLLOWING
- 10 DIFFERENCES IN DEATHS BETWEEN FULLY VACCINATED AND NON-FULLY
- 11 VACCINATED PEOPLE. IN PEOPLE WHO DIE OF C.O.V.I.D. IN L.A.
- 12 COUNTY, AN AVERAGE OF 37 DAYS PASS BETWEEN THE DATE OF
- 13 DIAGNOSIS AND THE DATE THEY UNFORTUNATELY PASS AWAY. WITH OUR
- 14 CASE INCREASE HAVING BEGUN RELATIVELY RECENTLY, IT IS
- 15 THEREFORE TOO EARLY TO FULLY ASSESS THE IMPACT OF THIS LATEST
- 16 WAVE OF INFECTION ON C.O.V.I.D. DEATH RATES. NEVERTHELESS, I
- 17 DO WANT TO SHOW YOU WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT DEATHS DUE TO
- 18 C.O.V.I.D., BY VACCINATION STATUS. AS THE SLIDE SHOWS, BETWEEN
- 19 APRIL 1 AND JULY 24 OF THIS YEAR, 94 PERCENT OF ALL C.O.V.I.D.
- 20 DEATHS AMONG L.A. RESIDENTS-- THIS WAS 588 PEOPLE-- THAT SADLY
- 21 PASSED AWAY TOOK PLACE IN UNVACCINATED AND PARTIALLY
- 22 VACCINATED PEOPLE; AND THERE WERE 41 DEATHS, ABOUT 6 PERCENT,
- 23 AMONG FULLY VACCINATED PEOPLE. MANY OF THE FULLY VACCINATED
- 24 INDIVIDUALS THAT SADLY PASSED AWAY FROM C.O.V.I.D. HAD SERIOUS
- 25 COMORBIDITIES AND/OR COMPROMISED IMMUNE SYSTEMS. WE WILL TAKE

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- 1 THE NEXT SLIDE. GIVEN THE INCREASED EVIDENCE THAT FULLY
- 2 VACCINATED PEOPLE ARE GETTING INFECTED, WE DO CONTINUE TO
- 3 SHARE INFORMATION EACH WEEK ON VACCINE EFFECTIVENESS AND HOW
- 4 TO USE THIS INFORMATION TO BEST KEEP OURSELVES AND OTHERS
- 5 SAFE, AND TO GET BACK TO SLOWING TRANSMISSION. THIS SLIDE
- 6 SHOWS DATA FOR THOSE FULLY PROTECTED BY THE VACCINES TO SCALE.
- 7 THE LARGE GREEN BOX THAT YOU HAVE SEEN BEFORE REPRESENTS NOW
- 8 THE MORE THAN 5.1 MILLION RESIDENTS WHO ARE FULLY VACCINATED.
- 9 THE TINY PURPLE BOX IN THE LOWER LEFT CORNER OF THIS BOX
- 10 REPRESENTS THE 15,628 FULLY VACCINATED PEOPLE WHO TESTED
- 11 POSITIVE FOR C.O.V.I.D., AS OF AUGUST 3RD, 2021. THIS EQUATES
- 12 TO LESS THAN 1 PERCENT OF ALL THOSE WHO ARE FULLY VACCINATED
- 13 TESTING POSITIVE FOR C.O.V.I.D.-19. OF THOSE WHO TESTED
- 14 POSITIVE, 446 WERE HOSPITALIZED. THAT'S UP SLIGHTLY FROM 410
- 15 THE WEEK PRIOR. THIS TRANSLATES TO 0.009 PERCENT OF ALL FULLY
- 16 VACCINATED PEOPLE. DEATHS IN THIS GROUP OVER THIS INTERVAL
- 17 ALSO INCREASED VERY SLIGHTLY, FROM 35 TO 41, AND THAT MEANT
- 18 THAT WE'RE NOW AT 0.0008 PERCENT OF FULLY VACCINATED PEOPLE
- 19 TRAGICALLY PASS AWAY. THESE SMALL INCREASES, WHILE INDICATIVE
- 20 THAT FULLY VACCINATED PEOPLE DO BECOME INFECTED, AND THAT MORE
- 21 HAVE BECOME INFECTED DURING THE SUMMER SURGE THAN BEFORE, THEY
- 22 STILL PROVIDE COMPELLING EVIDENCE THAT FULLY VACCINATED PEOPLE

- 4 MILLION DOSES TO RESIDENTS 12 AND OLDER, INCLUDING NEARLY 6.3
- 5 MILLION FIRST DOSES, AND MORE THAN 5 MILLION SECOND DOSES.
- 6 OVERALL, 72 PERCENT OF L.A. COUNTY RESIDENTS 12 AND OVER HAVE
- 7 RECEIVED AT LEAST ONE DOSE OF THE VACCINE, AND 62 PERCENT ARE
- 8 FULLY VACCINATED. FOR RESIDENTS 65 AND OLDER, 80 PERCENT ARE
- 9 FULLY VACCINATED. FOR TEENS 12 TO 17, THE RATE OF VACCINATION,
- 10 UNFORTUNATELY, IS LOWER, WITH 45 PERCENT FULLY VACCINATED.
- 11 WE'LL GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE. WE HAVE CONTINUED TO SEE
- 12 CONSISTENT INCREASES IN VACCINATION OVER THE LAST FEW WEEKS.
- 13 BETWEEN JULY 26TH AND AUGUST 1ST, WE ADMINISTERED OVER 81,000
- 14 DOSES ACROSS THE ENTIRE COUNTY NETWORK. THIS, AGAIN, IS
- 15 ANOTHER INCREASE OF MORE THAN 7,000 FROM THE PREVIOUS WEEK. WE
- 16 ARE DEEPLY GRATEFUL TO EVERYONE IN THE COUNTY WHO IS
- 17 CONTRIBUTING TO OUR COLLECTIVE HEALTH BY GETTING VACCINATED,
- 18 AND WE ARE DEEPLY GRATEFUL TO ALL OUR VACCINATION PARTNERS.
- 19 NOW IS A PARTICULARLY CRITICAL TIME FOR US TO INCREASE
- 20 VACCINATION UPTAKE, AND WE ARE ALWAYS THANKFUL THAT WE SEE
- 21 SIGNS THAT WE'RE MOVING IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION. NEXT SLIDE.
- 22 WITH THESE INCREASES IN VACCINATION COUNTYWIDE, WE ARE NOW
- 23 SEEING BANDS OF HIGHER VACCINATION RATES, REPRESENTED BY THE
- 24 DARK GREEN ON THIS MAP, ACROSS THE SOUTHERN AND WESTERN
- 25 NEIGHBORHOODS OF THE CITY, IN PARTS OF THE SAN FERNANDO

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- 1 VALLEY, AND EAST L.A., AND BEYOND. IN THE LAST TWO WEEKS OF
- 2 JULY, NEARLY EVERY CITY AND COMMUNITY IN THE COUNTY HAD AN
- 3 INCREASE IN VACCINATION COVERAGE. 40 PERCENT OF THE CITIES AND
- 4 COMMUNITIES WITH THE BIGGEST LEAPS UPWARD WERE IN CENTRAL AND
- 5 SOUTH CENTRAL L.A. ALL OF L.A. COUNTY THANKS YOU FOR DOING
- 6 YOUR PART TO SLOW THE SPREAD. YOU CAN GO TO THE NEXT SLIDE.
- 7 ALTHOUGH WE DO CONTINUE, AS YOU CAN SEE HERE, CLEARLY, TO HAVE
- 8 LARGE GAPS IN VACCINATION BETWEEN AGE AND RACIAL AND ETHNIC
- 9 SUBGROUPS, THERE ARE PROMISING UPTICKS IN MANY OF THE GROUPS
- 10 WITH LOWER VACCINATION COVERAGE. THE NUMBERS ON THIS SLIDE ARE
- 11 NOW COLOR-CODED, SO YOU CAN SEE THE CHANGES IN THE PAST WEEK.
- 12 PROPORTIONS THAT INCREASED BY 1 POINT OVER THE PAST WEEK ARE
- 13 LISTED IN BLUE, THOSE THAT INCREASED BY 2 ARE LISTED IN GREEN,
- 14 AND THOSE THAT INCREASED BY 3 ARE LISTED IN PINK. PROPORTIONS
- 15 THAT DID NOT CHANGE AT ALL ARE IN WHITE. AND THE GOOD NEWS IS
- 16 THAT WE ARE NOT SEEING A LOT OF WHITE, PARTICULARLY AMONGST
- 17 YOUNGER AGE GROUPS. HOWEVER, AS YOU CAN QUICKLY SEE,
- 18 DISPROPORTIONALITIES REMAIN, ESPECIALLY AMONG TEENS AND YOUNG
- 19 ADULTS. AMONG OUR TEENS, ABOUT 1/3 TO 1/2 AS MANY BLACK AND
- 20 LATINX TEENS, AND ABOUT 2/3 TO 3/4 AS MANY WHITE AND AMERICAN
- 21 INDIAN/ALASKAN NATIVE TEENS HAVE BEEN VACCINATED AS THEIR
- 22 ASIAN COUNTERPARTS. FORTUNATELY, WITH THE START OF THE SCHOOL
- 23 YEAR APPROACHING, WE HAVE SEEN, AS YOU NOTICED, SIZABLE
- 24 INCREASES IN VACCINATION ACROSS ALL RACIAL AND ETHNIC
- 25 SUBGROUPS AMONG OUR TEENS. MEANWHILE, AMONG YOUNG ADULTS 18 TO

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- 1 29, AND 30 TO 49 YEARS OLD, WE ALSO SAW INCREASES ACROSS MOST

- 22 SLOWING TRANSMISSION NOT ONLY PROTECTS VULNERABLE UNVACCINATED
- 23 RESIDENTS, INCLUDING ALL OF OUR CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF 12,
- 24 IT ALSO REDUCES THE CHANCES OF MORE MUTATIONS THAT CAN RESULT
- 25 IN MORE INFECTIOUS VARIANTS THAT CAN EVADE OUR VACCINE

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- 1 PROTECTION. NEXT SLIDE. BECAUSE VACCINATION IS SUCH A CRITICAL
- 2 PART OF PROTECTING OUR HARDEST-HIT COMMUNITIES, WE ARE
- 3 TARGETING ADDITIONAL OUTREACH IN COMMUNITIES THAT ARE NEWLY
- 4 EXPERIENCING HIGH LEVELS OF TRANSMISSION. OUR COMMUNITY HEALTH
- 5 WORKER TEAMS HAVE ADDED FOCUSED OUTREACH IN SOME OF THESE
- 6 AREAS IN RECENT WEEKS, AND THIS INCLUDES VENICE, STUDIO CITY,
- 7 AND BEVERLY HILLS, AND THESE EFFORTS WILL CONTINUE OVER THE
- 8 COMING WEEKS. WE CAN GO ON TO THE NEXT SLIDE. AND AS OUR
- 9 COUNTY'S CHILDREN BEGIN RETURNING TO SCHOOL THIS MONTH, WE ARE
- 10 ALSO PARTNERING WITH SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO INCREASE ACCESS TO
- 11 VACCINES. HIGH SCHOOLS AND MIDDLE SCHOOLS ARE PLANNING MORE

- 14 THESE EVENTS ARE OPEN TO STUDENTS, STAFF, TEACHERS, PARENTS
- 15 AND, IN MANY INSTANCES, COMMUNITY RESIDENTS. THIS MAP SHOWS
- 16 THE SCHOOLS WHERE THESE VACCINE EVENTS ARE TAKING PLACE, AND
- 17 YOU CAN SEE THAT IT'S WIDELY DISTRIBUTED. BECAUSE VACCINATION
- 18 IS SUCH AN IMPORTANT PART OF OUR STRATEGY FOR KEEPING SCHOOLS
- 19 SAFE, WE ENCOURAGE EVERYONE ELIGIBLE FOR A VACCINE TO ATTEND
- 20 ONE OF THE SCHOOL EVENTS, IF YOU OR YOUR TEEN IS NOT YET
- 21 VACCINATED. IF [INAUDIBLE], THEY CAN REACH OUT TO US. OUR
- 22 MOBILE VACCINATION TEAMS REACH UNVACCINATED PEOPLE IN THE
- 23 NEIGHBORHOODS WHERE THEY LIVE AND WORK. THESE TEAMS ARE MAKING
- 24 NEARLY 400 VISITS, COUNTYWIDE. YOU CAN ALSO REACH OUT US TO US
- 25 TO REQUEST A MOBILE TEAM AT YOUR PLACE OF WORK OR IN YOUR

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- 1 COMMUNITY BY JUST GOING TO THE WEBSITE VACCINATELACOUNTY.COM.
- 2 NEXT SLIDE. WHILE THERE IS RELATIVELY HIGH COMPLIANCE WITH
- 3 INDOOR MASKING REQUIREMENTS AT MOST ESTABLISHMENTS, WITH
- 4 INCREASED COMMUNITY TRANSMISSION, WE CONTINUE TO SEE A RISE IN
- 5 OUTBREAKS AT PLACES WHERE PEOPLE WORK OR LIVE IN CLOSE
- 6 QUARTERS. LAST WEEK, WE OPENED 22 WORKSITE OUTBREAKS: 10
- 7 OUTBREAKS AMONG HOMELESS FACILITIES, AND FIVE IN FOOD
- 8 FACILITIES. WE ALSO HAD SMALLER NUMBERS OF OUTBREAKS ACROSS
- 9 SCHOOLS, CORRECTIONAL SETTINGS, AND HOUSES OF WORSHIP. PRIOR
- 10 TO OUR LATEST INCREASE IN INFECTIONS, THE LAST TIME WE SAW
- 11 UPWARD TRENDING RATES AT THESE LEVELS WAS BACK IN LATE
- 12 SEPTEMBER OF 2020. AT THAT TIME, OUTBREAKS STAYED AT THESE
- 13 LEVELS BEFORE THEY STARTED RISING DRAMATICALLY IN NOVEMBER AND
- 14 DECEMBER, SOMETHING WE HOPE WE WILL NOT SEE. I WILL GO ON TO
- 15 THE NEXT SLIDE. ALTHOUGH WE'VE ALSO HAD OUTBREAKS IN OUR
- 16 SCHOOL NURSING FACILITIES AND LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES, WHERE

- 21 WHILE THESE NUMBERS ARE NOT HIGH, THEY ARE BEGINNING TO CREEP
- 22 A LITTLE BIT, AND THEY SUGGEST THAT EVEN WITH WIDESPREAD
- 23 VACCINATION AND P.P.E. USE, HEALTHCARE SETTINGS ARE NOT IMMUNE
- 24 FROM OUTBREAKS, PARTICULARLY IF UNVACCINATED HEALTHCARE
- 25 PROVIDERS--

- 18 HIGHEST-RISK POPULATIONS FOR C.O.V.I.D. INFECTIONS SINCE THE
- 19 BEGINNING OF THE PANDEMIC. AS P.P.E. BECAME MORE WIDELY
- 20 AVAILABLE, AND VACCINATION INCREASED AMONGST THESE WORKERS, WE
- 21 SAW THEIR INFECTION RATES DECLINE EARLIER THIS YEAR. HOWEVER,
- 22 WITH INCREASED COMMUNITY TRANSMISSION, WE ARE NOW SEEING
- 23 TRANSMISSION RISE AGAIN. BETWEEN JULY 25TH AND THE 31ST, 268
- 24 HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FIRST RESPONDERS TESTED POSITIVE FOR
- 25 C.O.V.I.D. WE KNOW HEALTHCARE WORKERS ARE NOT UNIFORMLY

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- 1 VACCINATED, AND WHILE CONSISTENT USE OF RESPIRATORS AND OTHER
- 2 P.P.E. REDUCES THE LIKELIHOOD OF TRANSMISSION WITHIN
- 3 HEALTHCARE SETTINGS, THESE WORKERS ARE STILL AT RISK OF BEING
- 4 INFECTED IN THEIR COMMUNITY, WHEN COMMUNITY TRANSMISSION IS
- 5 CAUSED. THE TREND LINES ON THIS SLIDE-- AND WE CAN GO ON TO
- 6 THE NEXT SLIDE-- SHOW THE SETTINGS WHERE HEALTHCARE WORKERS
- 7 WITH C.O.V.I.D. HAVE WORKED OVER THE COURSE OF THE PANDEMIC.
- 8 AND DURING THE SURGE, THE HIGHEST NUMBERS OF INFECTED
- 9 HEALTHCARE WORKERS WERE WORKING IN HOSPITALS, AND THAT'S THE
- 10 SAME IN THIS PAST WEEK. NEARLY HALF OF ALL OF THE INFECTED
- 11 HEALTHCARE WORKERS ARE WORKING IN OUR HOSPITALS. AN ADDITIONAL
- 12 47 WORK IN SKILLED NURSING OR LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES; 23
- 13 ARE IN OUTPATIENT FACILITIES; 43 WORK IN E.M.S., AS FIRST
- 14 RESPONDERS, OR IN CORRECTIONS; AND 16 WORKED IN HOME HEALTH,
- 15 WITH 147 WORKING ACROSS ALL OF THE OTHER HEALTHCARE SETTINGS.
- 16 WHILE CASES AMONG HEALTHCARE WORKERS REMAIN RELATIVELY LOW,
- 17 THEY ARE CONCERNING, BECAUSE MANY HEALTHCARE WORKERS HAVE
- 18 CLOSE CONTACT WITH VERY VULNERABLE PATIENTS. IT IS THEREFORE
- 19 PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT TO PREVENT INFECTION IN OUR HEALTHCARE
- 20 WORKERS. THE BETTER PROTECTED THEY ARE, THE SAFER ARE THE
- 21 VULNERABLE PEOPLE TO WHOM THEIR CARE IS SO IMPORTANT, AND THE
- 22 EASIER IT IS TO ENSURE THAT OUR HEALTHCARE FACILITIES ARE ABLE
- 23 TO REMAIN FULLY STAFFED DURING THE PANDEMIC. MOVE ON TO THE
- 24 NEXT SLIDE. GIVEN THE NEED TO PROTECT HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND
- 25 THE POPULATIONS THEY CARE FOR, THE STATE HAS ISSUED SEVERAL

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- 1 HEALTH OFFICER ORDERS OVER THE PAST TWO WEEKS, WITH THE GOAL
- 2 OF PREVENTING C.O.V.I.D. TRANSMISSION WITHIN HEALTHCARE
- 3 FACILITIES. ON JULY 26TH, THE STATE ISSUED A HEALTH OFFICER
- 4 ORDER MANDATING TESTING FOR MOST HEALTHCARE WORKERS. THIS
- 5 HEALTHCARE ORDER REQUIRES VALIDATION OF VACCINATION STATUS BY
- 6 HEALTHCARE FACILITY. AND THEN, FOR ALL UNVACCINATED EMPLOYEES,
- 7 RESPIRATORY PROTECTION WITH MEDICAL-GRADE MASKS, OR IDEALLY
- 8 RESPIRATORS, AND TESTING ONCE OR TWICE A WEEK IS REQUIRED,
- 9 DEPENDING ON THE FACILITY TYPE. THIS HEALTH OFFICER ORDER TOOK
- 10 EFFECT YESTERDAY, AND IT ALSO APPLIES TO INDIVIDUALS EMPLOYED
- 11 AT JAILS, HOMELESS SHELTERS, AND SENIOR CARE FACILITIES. ON
- 12 AUGUST 5TH, THE STATE ISSUED A SECOND HEALTH OFFICER ORDER
- 13 MANDATING HEALTHCARE WORKER VACCINATIONS WITH TWO DOSES BY
- 14 SEPTEMBER 30TH, WITH EXCLUSION ONLY FOR QUALIFIED MEDICAL
- 15 REASONS OR RELIGIOUS EXEMPTIONS. AND THEN THERE'S A TESTING
- 16 REQUIREMENT FOR THOSE WITH APPROVED EXEMPTIONS. MOST
- 17 INDIVIDUALS WORKING IN HEALTHCARE FACILITIES ARE COVERED BY
- 18 THIS ORDER. MEANWHILE, UNTIL SEPTEMBER 30TH, THE JULY 26TH
- 19 ORDER REMAINS IN EFFECT, REQUIRING, AS OF TODAY, TESTING FOR
- 20 UNVACCINATED WORKERS. ALSO, ON AUGUST 5TH, THE STATE ISSUED A
- 21 HEALTH OFFICER ORDER MANDATING THAT VISITORS TO HEALTH
- 22 FACILITIES, INCLUDING VISITING STAFF, SHOW PROOF OF FULL
- 23 VACCINATION OR OF A NEGATIVE TEST RESULT IN THE PRIOR 72 HOURS
- 24 UPON VISITATION/ THIS APPLIES AT ACUTE CARE HOSPITALS, SKILLED
- 25 NURSING FACILITIES, AND INTERMEDIATE CARE FACILITIES. THIS

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- 1 ORDER ALSO MANDATES MASKING, REGARDLESS OF VACCINATION STATUS,
- 2 AND RECOMMENDS A MEDICAL-GRADE OR DOUBLE MASK BE USED. OUR
- 3 STATE IS NOT THE ONLY ENTITY MANDATING VACCINES. VACCINE
- 4 MANDATES HAVE BEEN ISSUED BY PRIVATE EMPLOYEES, INCLUDING
- 5 HOSPITALS AND LARGE CORPORATIONS. UNIVERSITIES THROUGHOUT THE
- 6 STATE HAVE ALSO ISSUED VACCINE MANDATES, AS HAVE LOCAL,
- 7 STATEWIDE, AND OTHER CITY AND COUNTY GOVERNMENTS ACROSS THE
- 8 COUNTRY. YESTERDAY, OFFICIALS IN WASHINGTON STATE ANNOUNCED
- 9 THE VACCINATION MANDATE FOR ALL STATE WORKERS AND HEALTHCARE
- 10 WORKERS. MANY COUNTRIES NOW REQUIRE VACCINE PROOF TO ENTER.
- 11 NEXT SLIDE. IN THE HEALTHCARE ORDER WE INTEND TO ISSUE LATER
- 12 THIS WEEK, WE WILL ALIGN WITH THE STATE IN MANDATING
- 13 VACCINATION FOR HEALTHCARE WORKERS IN OUR COUNTY, BY SEPTEMBER
- 14 30TH. OUR ORDER WILL ALSO INCLUDE THREE ADDITIONAL GROUPS OF
- 15 HEALTHCARE WORKERS: EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS AND
- 16 PARAMEDICS, HOME HEALTHCARE WORKERS, AND DENTAL PRACTICE
- 17 EMPLOYEES. OVER THE COMING WEEKS, WE WILL WORK COLLABORATIVELY
- 18 AND CLOSELY WITH OUR HEALTHCARE AND LABOR PARTNERS TO DEVELOP
- 19 AN EFFECTIVE EDUCATION AND IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY, AND WE
- 20 THANK EVERYONE FOR THEIR ASSISTANCE WITH THIS. WE CAN GO TO
- 21 THE NEXT SLIDE. WE FAVOR C.O.V.I.D. VACCINATIONS FOR EVERYONE
- 22 ELIGIBLE, BECAUSE OF THE MOUNTING EVIDENCE THAT THESE VACCINES
- 23 ARE EFFECTIVE AND SAFE, AND PROVIDE THE MOST POWERFUL TOOL FOR
- 24 ENDING THE PANDEMIC. IN A STUDY CONDUCTED IN THE UNITED
- 25 KINGDOM DURING THEIR SURGE OF DELTA VARIANT INFECTIONS, PFIZER

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- 1 VACCINES WERE FOUND TO REDUCE SYMPTOMATIC DISEASE DUE TO
- 2 C.O.V.I.D. BY 88 PERCENT. DURING A WAVE OF DELTA VARIANT
- 3 INFECTIONS IN ISRAEL, THE VACCINE REDUCED HOSPITALIZATIONS AND
- 4 SEVERE ILLNESS THERE BY 93 PERCENT. IN COLORADO, AS DELTA
- 5 STRAIN SPREAD STATEWIDE IN MAY AND JUNE, VACCINATIONS WERE
- 6 ESTIMATED TO REDUCE SYSTEMATIC DISEASE BY 89 PERCENT
- 7 STATEWIDE. WE ARE ALSO SEEING SIGNALS THAT VACCINATION IS FAR
- 8 MORE PROTECTIVE AGAINST DELTA VARIANT INFECTION THAN A
- 9 PREVIOUS INFECTION IS. IN A STUDY CONDUCTED RECENTLY AMONG
- 10 RESIDENTS IN KENTUCKY THAT HAD BEEN INFECTED AT AN EARLIER
- 11 POINT IN TIME, UNVACCINATED PEOPLE HAD MORE THAN TWO TIMES'
- 12 GREATER CHANCE OF A REPEAT C.O.V.I.D. INFECTION THAN
- 13 VACCINATED PEOPLE DID. WE HAVE SO MUCH DATA SHOWING HOW SAFE
- 14 THESE VACCINES ARE. 346 MILLION DOSES OF C.O.V.I.D. VACCINES
- 15 HAVE BEEN GIVEN IN THE UNITED STATES SO FAR, AND THE C.D.C.
- 16 AND F.D.A. HAVE MONITORED ALL OF THEM FOR ADVERSE EFFECTS. AS
- 17 A RESULT OF THIS CAREFUL MONITORING, 3 VERY RARE AND TREATABLE
- 18 HEALTH EFFECTS OF THESE VACCINES HAVE BEEN NOTED. ONE,
- 19 ANAPHYLAXIS, IS A RARE ALLERGIC REACTION THAT OCCURS WITHIN 30
- 20 MINUTES OF TAKING THE VACCINE, AND IT HAPPENS WITH THESE THREE
- 21 VACCINES, AS WELL AS A HOST OF OTHER MEDICATIONS. ANOTHER IS A
- 22 SYNDROME INVOLVING BLOOD CLOTS AND LOW PLATELETS THAT HAS
- 23 AFFECTED A VERY SMALL NUMBER OF WOMEN AGE 18 TO 49. THIS VERY
- 24 UNCOMMON EVENT IS ALSO TREATABLE. A THIRD ADVERSE EFFECT SEEN
- 25 VERY INFREQUENTLY IN YOUNG MEN IN THE DAYS AFTER RECEIVING THE

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- 1 SECOND DOSE OF VACCINE IS INFLAMMATION OF HEART TISSUES. THIS
- 2 CAN ALSO BE TREATED WITHOUT ANY MEDICATION. THESE HEALTH
- 3 PROBLEMS ARE EXTREMELY RARE SIDE EFFECTS OF THE VACCINE. WHAT
- 4 IS MORE COMMON ARE THE EXPECTED VACCINE SIDE EFFECTS, WHICH
- 5 USUALLY MANIFEST AS ONE TO TWO DAYS OF FLU-LIKE ILLNESS. MANY
- 6 PEOPLE HAVE THESE SIDE EFFECTS, BUT THEY ARE MANAGEABLE WITH
- 7 OVER-THE-COUNTER FEVER-REDUCING MEDICATIONS, AND THEY GO AWAY
- 8 WITHOUT ADDITIONAL TREATMENT. THESE ARE THE FACTS THAT COME TO
- 9 US FROM BOTH GOVERNMENT AND NONGOVERNMENT STUDIES, BUT THEY
- 10 CAN BE HARD TO ACCESS WHEN MISINFORMATION ABOUT VACCINES IS
- 11 EVERYWHERE. FOR PEOPLE WITHOUT GOOD ACCESS TO HIGH-QUALITY
- 12 HEALTH INFORMATION THEY FEEL THEY CAN TRUST, IT CAN BE VERY
- 13 HARD TO FIND THE TRUTH. EVERYONE CAN HELP BY POINTING PEOPLE
- 14 WITH QUESTIONS TOWARDS ACCURATE INFORMATION. OUR WEBSITE IS A
- 15 GOOD PLACE TO START. FROM OUR C.O.V.I.D. PAGE, YOU CAN NOW
- 16 CLICK "VACCINE" ON THE BLUE BAR ACROSS THE TOP, AND THEN CLICK
- 17 "MISINFORMATION" AND CHECK YOUR FACTS ABOUT SOME OF THE MOST
- 18 COMMON VACCINE RUMORS. TALKING WITH YOUR HEALTH PROVIDER IS
- 19 ALSO A GREAT OPTION FOR THOSE WITH QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS. GO
- 20 ON TO THE NEXT SLIDE. WE DO CONTINUE TO HAVE HIGH TRANSMISSION
- 21 OF C.O.V.I.D. IN L.A. COUNTY. WERE WE BACK IN THE DAYS OF
- 22 HAVING A BLUEPRINT, WE WOULD BE BACK IN THE PURPLE TIER. BUT
- 23 WE ALSO HAVE MANY STRATEGIES FOR MANAGING THE SPREAD OF THIS
- 24 INFECTION. THE MORE OF THESE WE USE, THE SAFER WE ALL ARE.
- 25 THINK ABOUT IT THIS WAY: SOMEONE WHO WEARS A SEAT BELT, DRIVES

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- 1 AT A SAFE SPEED, AND HAS AIRBAGS, IS SAFER THAN SOMEONE WHO
- 2 DOES ONLY ONE OF THESE THINGS. IN SOME WAYS, IT'S THE SAME AS
- 3 USING MULTIPLE PREVENTION STRATEGIES TO PROTECT ALL OF US FROM
- 4 C.O.V.I.D. FOR PRIMARY PREVENTION-- THAT'S WHAT WE CALL
- 5 REDUCING THE RISK OF TRANSMISSION -- WE HAVE SEVERAL IMPORTANT
- 6 TOOLS, OF WHICH VACCINATIONS ARE BY FAR THE MOST POWERFUL.
- 7 THAT IS WHY WE ARE WORKING SO HARD TO ENSURE BARRIER-FREE
- 8 ACCESS TO VACCINATION, AND WE ROLL OUT MOBILE VACCINATION
- 9 TEAMS, SCHOOL VACCINATION EVENTS, AND COLLABORATIONS WITH SO
- 10 MANY VACCINATION PARTNERS, COUNTYWIDE. THIS IS ALSO WHY WE
- 11 FAVOR TARGETED VACCINATION MANDATES, SINCE THIS IS THE TOOL
- 12 THAT OFFERS US THE MOST PROTECTION FROM SPREAD OF C.O.V.I.D.
- 13 SO MANY HEARTACHES CAN BE PREVENTED IF THOSE ELIGIBLE FOR
- 14 VACCINATION GET THEIR VACCINES. HIGH RATES OF VACCINATION
- 15 ALLOW US TO REMAIN FULLY OPEN, AND THEY PROTECT THOSE NOT YET
- 16 ELIGIBLE OR ABLE TO GET VACCINATED. BECAUSE UNFETTERED
- 17 TRANSMISSION THREATENS OUR RECOVERY, WE ALSO NEED TO USE
- 18 MASKING, DISTANCING, AND INFECTION CONTROL TO BLUNT THE SPREAD
- 19 OF THE VIRUS. UNIVERSAL INDOOR MASKING PROVIDES AN ADDITIONAL
- 20 LEVEL OF PROTECTION TO BOTH UNVACCINATED AND VACCINATED
- 21 PEOPLE, WHILE DISTANCING WHERE POSSIBLE HELPS AVOID THE
- 22 CROWDING THAT CAN FACILITATE TRANSMISSION. AND INFECTION
- 23 CONTROL PRACTICES, LIKE HANDWASHING AND DISINFECTING SURFACES,
- 24 CONTINUES TO REDUCE THE SPREAD OF THE INFECTION THROUGH HAND
- 25 TO MOUTH OR NOSE CONTACT. WE ALSO HAVE MITIGATION MEASURES

- 1 WHICH WE SOMETIMES CALL SECONDARY PREVENTION. THESE ARE AIMED
- 2 AT IDENTIFYING NEW CASES AND STOPPING THAT CHAIN OF
- 3 TRANSMISSION, AND KEY ELEMENTS HERE IS TESTING. AND AS DR.
- 4 GHALY NOTED, FREQUENT TESTING OF PEOPLE AT HIGH RISK FOR
- 5 INFECTION, OR WHO HAVE SYMPTOMS, HELP US IDENTIFY POTENTIAL
- 6 SPREADERS OF AN INFECTION EARLY. AND IT PROVIDES OPPORTUNITIES
- 7 TO EDUCATE HOW PEOPLE CAN KEEP THEMSELVES SAFE, AND THEIR
- 8 HOUSEHOLD SAFE, SHOULD THEY BE INFECTED. AND FINALLY, OUR
- 9 ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE PRACTICES HELP US PREVENT SPREAD
- 10 THROUGH WHAT DOCTORS CALL SOURCE CONTROL: TEMPORARILY
- 11 RESTRICTING INFECTED PEOPLE FROM COMING INTO CONTACT WITH
- 12 OTHERS, UNTIL THEY ARE NO LONGER AT RISK FOR TRANSMISSION. ALL
- 13 OF THESE STRATEGIES ARE NECESSARY RIGHT NOW. GETTING FULLY
- 14 VACCINATED IS THE BEST PROTECTIVE ACTION ALL OF US CAN TAKE,
- 15 AND DURING THIS TIME OF HIGH TRANSMISSION OF A VERY INFECTIOUS
- 16 VARIANT, WE CAN TAKE CARE OF EACH OTHER BY ALSO WEARING MASKS
- 17 INDOORS AND LAYERING ON THESE OTHER PREVENTIVE STRATEGIES
- 18 WHENEVER POSSIBLE. EVERY ACTION HELPS, AND WE ARE SO GRATEFUL
- 19 TO ALL OF YOU WHO CONTINUE TO DO YOUR PART DURING THESE
- 20 CHALLENGING TIMES. THANK YOU AGAIN, SUPERVISORS, FOR YOUR
- 21 TREMENDOUS LEADERSHIP, AND I AM AVAILABLE TO RESPOND TO YOUR
- 22 QUESTIONS.

- 5 SUPERVISOR BARGER HAS ANY QUESTIONS. ON THIS ONE, S-1, WE'RE
- 6 GOING TO DELIBERATE ON THAT. THIS IS A RECEIVE-AND-FILE, BUT
- 7 WE CAN HAVE OUR DISCUSSION, AND THEN WE WILL MOVE ON TO ITEM
- 8 73-A. SO, I JUST HAVE THREE QUESTIONS. DR. FERRER, I AM REALLY

- 17 DR. BARBARA FERRER: THAT'S A GREAT QUESTION, AND THANK YOU SO
- 18 MUCH FOR ALL YOUR SUPPORT, SUPERVISOR SOLIS. ONE ISSUE THAT IS
- 19 GOING TO CONFOUND OUR CASE NUMBERS IS THAT WE ARE GOING TO BE
- 20 DRAMATICALLY INCREASING TESTING ACROSS THE COUNTY, AS ALL OF
- 21 OUR SCHOOLS ARE REOPENING, AND OUR UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES
- 22 ARE WELCOMING BACK THEIR STUDENTS AND FACULTY, AS WELL. MANY
- 23 OF THESE SITES HAVE REGULAR SCREENING/TESTING. MANY OF THEM
- 24 HAVE A TESTING REQUIREMENT UPON ENTRY, AND THAT MEANS THAT WE
- 25 WILL HAVE TENS OF THOUSANDS OF MORE PEOPLE GETTING TESTED

- 1 EVERY DAY. AND EVEN THOUGH WITH THAT MORE ROUTINE

- 3 STILL BE VERY LOW, IT WILL ADD CASES. AND WE ARE ALWAYS GLAD,
- 4 AS I'VE SAID SINCE THE BEGINNING OF THIS PANDEMIC, TO HAVE
- 5 PEOPLE TESTED AND IDENTIFIED EARLY ON AS POSITIVE FOR
- 6 C.O.V.I.D., BECAUSE THAT MEANS THAT WE CAN ISOLATE THEM AND
- 7 QUARANTINE THEIR CLOSE CONTACTS, AND CUT THAT CHAIN OF
- 8 TRANSMISSION. BUT IT DOES MEAN, FOR THE MONTH OF AUGUST AND
- 9 SEPTEMBER, WE ARE LIKELY TO SEE OUR CASE NUMBERS CLIMB. THE
- 10 HOPE HERE WILL BE THAT OUR TEST POSITIVITY RATE DOES NOT,
- 11 INDICATING THAT MUCH OF WHAT WE ARE SEEING IS A RESULT OF
- 12 INCREASED TESTING. BUT IT STILL WILL INDICATE TO ALL OF US
- 13 THAT WE HAVE WIDESPREAD TRANSMISSION. SO I IMAGINE THAT, FOR
- 14 THE MONTHS OF AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER, WE WILL CONTINUE TO NEED
- 15 EVERYONE WHO ISN'T VACCINATED TO GET VACCINATED AS QUICKLY AS
- 16 POSSIBLE, [INAUDIBLE] THAT WE'RE PROTECTING EACH OTHER FROM
- 17 ALL OF THIS TRANSMISSION.

- 19 SUP. SOLIS, CHAIR: AND, DR. FERRER, JUST BRIEFLY, ALSO, YOU
- 20 KNOW, YOU INDICATE THAT THE CASES OF GETTING REALLY ILL FROM
- 21 THIS NEW VARIANT ARE LOWER WITH PEOPLE THAT HAVE BEEN
- 22 VACCINATED, BUT I THINK WE ARE ALSO BEING HURT BY THE MEDIA
- 23 AND OTHERS REPORTING THAT THESE ARE SOMEHOW REALLY TREMENDOUS,
- 24 THAT THEY ARE GOING UP, AND THAT THAT, FOR SOME REASON, IS
- 25 ALARMING THE PUBLIC. AND I THINK IT IS ALMOST DISSUADING

- 1 PEOPLE, WHEN I'M OUT IN THE FIELD, TELLING ME THAT, "WELL, I

- 3 ARE STILL GETTING IT NOW, EVEN IF THEY HAVE BEEN VACCINATED."
- 4 SO, HOW ARE WE GOING TO REALLY BE ABLE TO MESSAGE THAT NOW, AS
- 5 WE ARE GOING INTO-- WE ARE ALREADY IN AUGUST, BUT SEPTEMBER?
- 6 HOW CAN WE HELP BREAK THROUGH THAT?

- 8 DR. BARBARA FERRER: I THINK, JUST CONTINUING AS WE TRY TO
- 9 SHARE ACCURATE INFORMATION. IF YOU LOOK AT EVERYBODY WHO IS
- 10 VACCINATED, YOUR CHANCES OF ENDING UP POSITIVE ARE LESS THAN
- 11 1%. SO, I MEAN, THAT'S THE FIRST THING THAT'S IMPORTANT TO
- 12 NOTE: THAT IF YOU GET VACCINATED, YOU'VE GOT A LOT OF
- 13 PROTECTION. YOU ARE HIGHLY UNLIKELY TO EVEN GET INFECTED. IF
- 14 YOU DO GET INFECTED, VERY FEW PEOPLE END UP IN THE HOSPITAL,
- 15 AND VERY, VERY FEW PEOPLE END UP PASSING AWAY. THE NUMBERS ARE
- 16 VERY SMALL. THEY ARE TRAGIC, BUT THEY ARE VERY, VERY SMALL. IF
- 17 YOU DON'T GET VACCINATED, YOUR CHANCES OF GETTING INFECTED ARE
- 18 FOUR TIMES GREATER, AND YOUR CHANCES OF ENDING UP
- 19 HOSPITALIZED, SHOULD YOU GET INFECTED, I THINK, ARE 19 TIMES
- 20 GREATER. EITHER 19 OR 20 TIMES GREATER. AND OBVIOUSLY, YOU
- 21 HAVE A MUCH GREATER CHANCE OF PASSING AWAY, SINCE 95 TO 96
- 22 PERCENT OF THE PEOPLE WHO ARE PASSING AWAY RIGHT NOW ARE
- 23 PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT VACCINATED. SO I THINK, WHILE IT IS TRUE
- 24 THAT THESE VACCINES ARE NOT 100% PERFECT, NO VACCINES ARE, AND
- 25 NO MEDICATIONS ARE. AND IF YOU LOOK AT SORT OF THE RISKS AND

- 15 DR. BARBARA FERRER: FOR ALL OF US WHO CARE DEEPLY ABOUT YOUNG
- 16 CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF 12, WHO CANNOT GET VACCINATED, THE
- 17 MOST IMPORTANT GIFT WE CAN GIVE THEM IS TO GET VACCINATED
- 18 OURSELVES, IF WE ARE ELIGIBLE. BECAUSE THAT'S WHAT WE MEAN
- 19 WHEN WE TALK ABOUT COMMUNITY IMMUNITY. WE MEAN WE SURROUND
- 20 THOSE THAT CANNOT GET VACCINATED WITH EVERYONE ELSE BEING
- 21 VACCINATED. SO, ONE THING TO JUST NOTE FOR EVERYONE WHO IS

- 17 VIRUS WE HAD LAST YEAR. WHAT I DO KNOW IS, I LOOKED AT THE
- 18 DATA FOR EVERY CITY IN YOUR DISTRICT, AND EVERY SINGLE CITY IN
- 19 YOUR DISTRICT HAS HAD A HUGE INCREASE IN THEIR CASE RATES
- 20 BETWEEN JUNE 15TH AND JULY 31ST-- I MEAN, EVERY SINGLE ONE--
- 21 WITH A BUNCH OF CITIES IN THAT DISTRICT ACTUALLY HAVING CASE
- 22 RATES THAT ARE OVER THE AVERAGE CASE RATE FOR L.A. COUNTY. AND
- 23 THIS INCLUDES PLACES LIKE MANHATTAN BEACH AND THE CITY OF
- 24 HERMOSA BEACH. SO I JUST WANT TO SAY, SOMETIMES IT FEELS LIKE
- 25 WE SHOULD REALLY BE DOING THINGS VERY DIFFERENTLY, BUT ACROSS

- 3 RIGHT NOW IS HELPING US DO A COUPLE OF THINGS: INCREASE
- 4 VACCINATION RATES, BECAUSE OBVIOUSLY, WITH THESE EXPLOSIONS IN

- 11 INCREASES, AND THEY INDICATE THAT ALL OF US TOGETHER NEED TO
- 12 DO SOME MORE TO SLOW THE SPREAD RIGHT NOW, AND THAT IS THE
- 13 INDOOR MASKING REQUIREMENT. SO, OBVIOUSLY, WE HAVE SPREAD, AND
- 14 WE HAVE SPREAD ACROSS EVERY-- PRETTY MUCH EVERY CITY ACROSS
- 15 THE ENTIRE COUNTY, AND I THINK THE SENSIBLE THING TO DO WITH
- 16 THAT IS TO ADD THIS OTHER LAYER. I MEAN, YOU SEE THIS

- 25 CHANGE OR NOT ENOUGH CHANGE. LIKE, NOT A POINT INCREASE. SO

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- 1 THERE COULD HAVE BEEN A LITTLE BIT OF CHANGE, BUT NOT ENOUGH
- 2 FOR US TO SEE IT MOVE. LIKE, FOR ASIAN RESIDENTS BETWEEN THE
- 3 AGES OF 18 AND 29, THESE ARE AT 79%, AND THERE MIGHT HAVE BEEN
- 4 A LITTLE BIT OF MOVEMENT, BUT NOT ENOUGH TO GO TO 80%.

- 20 SAW HOPE. WE SAW AS RESIDENTS, WEARY FROM THE LOCKDOWN, SHOWED
- 21 UP IN THE HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS IN THE PAST FEW WEEKS, EAGERLY
- 22 ROLLING UP THEIR SLEEVES TO GET A SHOT. OUR NURSES, OUR
- 23 DOCTORS, OUR TEACHERS, OUR GROCERY WORKERS, OUR ESSENTIAL

- 22 COMMITTEE, AND THE BOARD CHARGED THE COMMITTEE WITH DEVELOPING
- 23 SPENDING PROPOSALS FOR MEASURE J INVESTMENTS, USING A
- 24 TRANSPARENT AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY PROCESS. THE ADVISORY
- 25 COMMITTEE BEGAN MEETING PUBLICLY IN JANUARY OF THIS YEAR, AND

- 1 AS SUPERVISOR KUEHL POINTED OUT, THE ATTENDANCE AT THE
- 2 MEETINGS AND SUBCOMMITTEE MEETINGS WAS CONSISTENTLY ROBUST.
- 3 JUST A NOTE ON THE TIME FRAMES. AND THE TIME FRAMES WAS AN

- 9 PHASE, WHICH OCCURS IN APRIL OF EACH YEAR. BUT WE THOUGHT THAT
- 10 THE COMMITTEE MIGHT BE ABLE TO MAKE THE FINAL CHANGES BUDGET
- 11 PHASE, WHICH OCCURS IN JUNE OF EACH YEAR. IN ORDER TO MEET
- 12 THIS TIME FRAME, THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND SUBCOMMITTEES MET
- 13 FAITHFULLY, SOMETIMES PARTICIPATING IN MEETINGS LASTING HOURS.
- 14 THIS TIME CONSTRAINT IMPACTED THE PLANNING PROCESS, AND AS I
- 15 PREVIOUSLY STATED, IT WAS CALLED OUT IN THE ADVISORY
- 16 COMMITTEE'S REPORT AS A CONDITION THAT WAS LESS THAN IDEAL.
- 17 BUT AT THE END OF THE DAY, THE COMMITTEE WAS ULTIMATELY ABLE
- 18 TO SUBMIT THEIR PROPOSED PLAN ON JUNE 4TH, AFTER RECEIVING A
- 19 30-DAY EXTENSION FROM MY OFFICE. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THIS
- 20 SLIDE DETAILS SOME OF THE CHALLENGES THAT WERE CALLED OUT IN
- 21 THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE'S REPORT. I WON'T GO THROUGH ALL OF
- 22 THEM, BUT I WILL HIGHLIGHT SOME. THE CHALLENGES INCLUDED
- 23 LIMITED OUTREACH, WHICH IN TURN LIMITED OUR ABILITY TO HAVE
- 24 BROAD COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT. WE KNOW THAT THERE WERE TECHNICAL
- 25 GLITCHES THAT OCCURRED DURING SOME OF THE MEETINGS, AND THAT

- 8 CUMBERSOME, AND FOR SOME, IT WAS ACTUALLY NOT AS CLEAR AS IT

- 21 NEXT, WE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO STREAMLINE THE PROPOSAL
- 22 SUBMISSION PROCESS SO THAT PROPOSALS SUBMITTED BY THE
- 23 COMMUNITY, AND BY THE COUNTY DEPARTMENTS, ARE CONSISTENT. AND
- 24 THIS IS REALLY IMPORTANT, BECAUSE IT'LL MAKE IT EASIER FOR

- 1 AN UNNECESSARY BARRIER TO THE RESOURCES AVAILABLE AT OUR
- 2 LIBRARY FACILITIES, AND MANY TIMES ARE A FINANCIAL BURDEN THAT
- 3 KEEP THE COMMUNITIES THAT ARE MOST RELIANT ON LIBRARY SERVICES
- 4 FROM ACCESSING THEM FREELY. OVERDUE FEES DISSUADE PATRONS FROM
- 5 RETURNING TO THE LIBRARY, AND PREVENT THEM FROM USING ALL THE
- 6 SERVICES THAT ARE AVAILABLE TO THEM. WHILE OVERDUE FEES WERE
- 7 INITIALLY INTENDED TO INCENTIVIZE LIBRARY CARDHOLDERS TO
- 8 RETURN BOOKS AND MATERIALS, THE THREAT OF FINES AND FEES
- 9 ADDING UP BECAME A SIGNIFICANT BARRIER TO CARDHOLDERS FROM
- 10 RETURNING TO THEIR LOCAL LIBRARIES. THE LIBRARY HAS PUT FINE
- 11 FORGIVENESS AND FINE REDUCTION PROGRAMS IN PLACE, LIKE THE
- 12 GREAT READ AWAY, WHICH ALLOWED CARDHOLDERS 21 AND UNDER TO
- 13 REDUCE THEIR FINES BY USING LIBRARY SERVICES AND A STUDENT
- 14 LIBRARY CARD, WHICH PROVIDE A FINE-FREE MEMBERSHIP FOR
- 15 STUDENTS 17 AND UNDER. THEY WERE ALLOWED TO READ AWAY THEIR
- 16 FINES. THIS MOTION WILL EXTEND THESE BENEFITS PERMANENTLY TO
- 17 ALL LIBRARY CARDHOLDERS. WE ARE NOT MAKING EVERYBODY READ AWAY
- 18 THEIR FINES. IT IS NOT A BAD IDEA. AND ACROSS THE COUNTRY,
- 19 JUST FOR YOUR INFORMATION, MORE THAN 50 LIBRARY SYSTEMS HAVE
- 20 IMPLEMENTED THE FINE-FREE MODEL. IN CALIFORNIA ALONE, 23
- 21 LIBRARY SYSTEMS HAVE ADOPTED THIS MODEL, INCLUDING SOME HERE
- 22 IN L.A. COUNTY, LIKE LOS ANGELES PUBLIC LIBRARY, SOUTH
- 23 PASADENA PUBLIC LIBRARY, AND ALTADENA LIBRARIES. THESE
- 24 LIBRARIES HAVE REPORTED AN INCREASE IN CUSTOMER SATISFACTION,
