17 DAY, WE GIVE THANKS. WE ARE GRATEFUL FOR THE MANY SACRIFICES
18 THAT HAVE BEEN MADE ON OUR BEHALF, FOR THE STRUGGLE, HARDSHIP,
19 VICTORY AND DEFEAT THAT HAVE BLAZED TRAILS ON WHICH WE NOW SO

24 VISION FOR US. SO WE SEEK THE COURAGE AND STRENGTH TO CONTINUE
25 TO MOVE TOWARDS A WORLD IN WHICH EVERY PERSON IS AFFORDED THE



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1 RIGHTS AND DIGNITY OF BEING A MEMBER OF HUMANITY: RIGHTS TO
2 AFFORDABLE, SAFE, AND FAIR HOUSING, EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES, AND
3 FOR MANY, FOR THE RIGHT TO MARRY THOSE WHOM THEY LOVE. WE ARE
4 THANKFUL FOR THOSE WHO HAVE ANSWERED A CALL TO PROTECT US AND
5 HAVE SACRIFICED TO DO SO. WE REMEMBER ESPECIALLY THE
6 FIREFIGHTERS FROM THIS COUNTY WHO GAVE THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE

13 AND EQUALITY AND THIS NATION AND EVERY NATION MAY LIVE IN THIS
14 CREATED REALM TOGETHER IN PEACE AND STUDY WAR NO MORE. BLESS
15 THOSE GATHERED HERE WHO HAVE ANSWERED A CALL TO LEADERSHIP. WE

9 WITH OTHERS. AND EXAMPLES OF THAT INCLUDE OUR JOINT RESPONSE
10 WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT. SO OUR SOCIAL WORKERS ARE GOING OUT WITH
11 LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS TO DO THEIR INITIAL INTERVIEWS. AND
12 ALSO, OUR PARTICIPATION IN THE FAMILY AND CHILDREN'S INDEX

4 WORKER DOESN'T HAVE TO FORWARD ANY EVIDENCE HE DOESN'T WANT

6 WORKER IN THE CASE, EVEN THOUGH SHE MISHANDLED THE RAPE, SHE
7 WAS STILL KEPT ON THE CASE FOR THREE MONTHS. I HAVE NOT HEARD
8 FROM MANAGEMENT OF D.C.F.S. ON WHAT THE STATUS OF DISCIPLINE
9 IS OR IF SHE'S EVEN BEEN SEEN. D.C.F.S. IS MUCH LIKE RAMPART
10 IN THE FACT THAT THEY MISHANDLE EVIDENCE AND THEY DECIDE HOW
11 THE COURT WILL HANDLE A CASE. THEY DECIDE THROUGH SOCIAL
12 ENGINEERING A SINGLE-FAMILY, A SINGLE PARENT FAMILY IS NOT
13 ALLOWED TO GET A CHILD. THEY ENCOURAGE NUCLEAR FAMILIES,
14 INCLUDING GIVING FALSE TESTIMONY, FALSE INTERVIEWS AND PLACE
15 CHILDREN AND HELP THE COURTS TO PERPETRATE THIS PROBLEM. I
16 HAVE CONTACTED ZEV YAROSLAVSKY'S OFFICE SEVERAL TIMES AND I
17 STILL HAVE NOT HEARD BACK ON MY COMPLAINTS, EVEN THOUGH ONE IS
18 OVER A YEAR OLD AND THE LAST ONE IS OVER SIX MONTHS OLD.
19 D.C.F.S. HAS REFUSED TO GIVE ME SERVICES. AND ON TOP OF IT, A
20 COURT ORDERED SECONDARY REPORT WAS NEVER COMPLETED. AND MY OWN
21 WITNESSES NEVER CAME TO COURT. THE SUBPOENAS I PAID \$500 FOR
22 NEVER APPEARED.
