6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** NOVEMBER 8, 2011 MEETING OF THE LOS
7 ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WILL BEGIN. FIRST WE'RE
8 GOING TO BE LED IN PRAYER BY ARTIS GLASS, JR. OF THE LEAP OF
9 FAITH COMMUNITY BAPTIST CHURCH IN INGLEWOOD. AND OUR PLEDGE OF
10 ALLEGIANCE WILL BE BY NESTOR CASILLAS, A MEMBER OF POST NO.
11 272, MONTEBELLO, OF THE AMERICAN LEGION. IF THE AUDIENCE WOULD

14 **PASTOR ARTIS GLASS, JR:** IT HAS BEEN WELL SAID BLESSED IS THE
15 NATION WHOSE GOD IS LORD. HEAVENLY FATHER, WE COME AT THIS
16 HOUR THANKING YOU FOR THY GREATNESS. WE COME ASKING YOUR
17 BLESSING UPON THIS UNITED STATES AND OUR PRESIDENT AND OUR
18 GOVERNMENT LEADERS. WE ARE THANKING YOU FOR THIS GREAT
19 SUPERVISOR DISTRICT THAT HAS AUTHORITY OVER US THAT YOU
20 CONTINUE TO BLESS THEM WITH WISDOM AND KNOWLEDGE FROM ON HIGH.
21 WE KNOW THAT THOU ART POWERFUL AND THAT THOU ART MERCIFUL.
22 CONTINUE TO GUIDE THEM IN THE DIRECTION THEY WOULD GO AND WITH
23 WISE COUNSEL, WITH INTEGRITY AND HONOR IN WHICH THEY SO
24 GREATLY EARNED AND HAVE IN YOUR NAME. AND WE GIVE YOU ALL THE
25 PRAISES AND THE GLORY. BLESSING THE VETERANS, WE REMEMBER

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** OKAY. SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS?

9 **SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS:** THANK YOU, MR. MAYOR AND COLLEAGUES. WE'RE
10 PLEASED TO HAVE WITH US TODAY PASTOR ARTIS GLASS, JR. AS YOU
11 KNOW, HE'S THE PASTOR OF THE LEAP OF FAITH COMMUNITY BAPTIST
12 CHURCH. AND HE SERVES THERE AS A CO-PASTOR WITH HIS WIFE. THEY
13 FOUNDED LEAP OF FAITH MINISTRIES IN 1992. HE HAS SERVED AS
14 PASTOR OF SEVERAL CONGREGATIONS, BEGINNING IN SAN ANTONIO AND
15 THEN SEVERAL PARTS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, HAWTHORNE, EL
16 SEGUNDO, INGLEWOOD. HE WAS LICENSED TO PREACH IN THE EARLY
17 1970S. AND THIS CONGREGATION, THIS MINISTRY SINCE 1998. AND IT
18 HAS EXPERIENCED SIGNIFICANT GROWTH IN ITS MEMBERSHIP. WE'RE
19 DELIGHTED THAT HE IS WITH US TODAY. HE ATTRIBUTES ALL OF HIS
20 WORK TO HIS FAITHFULNESS TO HIS COMMISSION. AND DELIGHTED THAT
21 HE IS HERE AND HE SALUTES THE FACT THAT HIS WIFE AND HE HAVE
22 SIX CHILDREN AND SIX GRANDCHILDREN. AND I BELIEVE I'VE KNOWN
23 PASTOR GLASS FOR QUITE A BIT OF TIME AND IF MY NOTES ARE
24 CORRECT -- HE'S BOLD ENOUGH TO SAY THERE'S ANOTHER CHILD ON
25 THE WAY. AND SO WE THANK HIM FOR BEING HERE TODAY AND WE'LL

9 HAS SERVED AS A CORPORAL WITH THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS
10 FROM 2003 TO 2007 IN IRAQ. HIS IMPRESSIVE COMMENDATIONS
11 INCLUDE THE MARINE ACHIEVEMENT MEDAL, A GOOD CONDUCT MEDAL,
12 THE NATIONAL DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL, AN IRAQ CAMPAIGN MEDAL, AS
13 WELL AS AN OVERSEAS DEPLOYMENT MEDAL AND A SEA SERVICE MEDAL.
14 WE WANT TO EXTEND OUR GRATITUDE FOR YOUR HONORABLE AND
15 COURAGEOUS SERVICE IN MILITARY SERVICE TO OUR COUNTRY. THANK

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** FIRST WE HAVE A CONSUL GENERAL. IT'S A
18 GREAT HONOR TO BRING TO US A NEW RESIDENT TO THE COUNTY OF LOS
19 ANGELES, AND THAT'S THE CONSUL GENERAL FOR ITALY. TODAY WE
20 HAVE GIUSEPPE PERRONE, WHO IS THE NEW CONSUL GENERAL. HE BEGAN
21 HIS DIPLOMATIC CAREER IN 1980 AFTER EARNING HIS DEGREE IN
22 POLITICAL SCIENCE WITH A SPECIALIZATION IN INTERNATIONAL
23 AFFAIRS FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF TURIN. HE ATTENDED THE
24 DIPLOMATIC INSTITUTE TRAINING COURSE, AND BEGAN WORKING IN THE
25 OFFICE FOR THE EUROPEAN UNION IN THE MINISTRY OF FOREIGN



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1 AFFAIRS. HIS FIRST OVERSEAS POST WAS IN ALGIERS AS FIRST
2 SECRETARY AT THE ITALIAN EMBASSY. HE THEN CAME TO THE ITALIAN
3 EMBASSY IN WASHINGTON, D.C. AS THE CULTURAL ATTACHE. HE
4 RETURNED TO FOREIGN MINISTRY HEADQUARTERS AS DEPUTY DIRECTOR
5 FOR THE MIDDLE EAST AND THEN MOVED ON TO THE OFFICE OF THE
6 PRESIDENT AS A DIPLOMATIC ADVISER. IN 2006 HE RETURNED TO
7 WASHINGTON, D.C. AS THE COORDINATOR OF THE POLITICAL OFFICE OF
8 THE ITALIAN EMBASSY. AND THEN HE HAS NOW BEEN POSTED IN LOS
9 ANGELES COUNTY. SO ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY, WE WOULD LIKE TO
10 GIVE YOU THIS SEAL OF THE COUNTY. AND THEN ALSO I WOULD LIKE
11 TO PRESENT TO YOU -- THIS IS A SPECIAL DRAWING OF THE MISSION
12 OF SAN GABRIEL, WHICH IS THE BIRTHPLACE OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY
13 WHICH THE MISSIONARIES FROM SPAIN BUILT COMING IN 1771. AND
14 BERNIE, OUR ARTIST IN OUR GRAPHIC DEPARTMENT HAS DONE THIS. SO
15 WE WOULD LIKE TO GIVE YOU AS THE FIRST ONE TO RECEIVE THIS, AS
16 WELL.

17

18 **HON. GIUSEPPE PERRONE:** THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.]

19

20 **HON. GIUSEPPE PERRONE:** THANK YOU, MR. MAYOR, MEMBERS OF THE
21 BOARD. I AM VERY GLAD TO BE HERE IN THE SEAT OF LOS ANGELES
22 COUNTY. I AM VERY NEW IN LOS ANGELES, BUT THE PRESENCE OF
23 ITALY IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES IS BASED QUITE A LONG TIME
24 AGO. OUR FIRST MISSION HERE WAS OPENED IN 1901. SO 110 YEARS
25 AGO. AND SINCE THEN, OUR RELATIONSHIP GREW STRONGER AND



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1 STRONGER. OUR RELATIONSHIP IS MADE EVEN STRONGER BY THE
2 PRESENCE OF A VERY ACTIVE AND LARGE COMMUNITY OF ITALIAN-
3 AMERICANS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY THAT HAVE GIVEN A GREAT AND
4 IMPRESSIVE CONTRIBUTION TO THE PROGRESS AND DEVELOPMENT OF
5 THIS COUNTY AND HAVE LEFT INCREDIBLE LANDMARKS FROM THE
6 WATCHTOWERS IN LOS ANGELES TO THE ARCHITECTURE IN SANTA
7 BARBARA TO ITALIAN HALL IN DOWNTOWN, IN HISTORIC LITTLE ITALY
8 IN LOS ANGELES. AND THE SAME LOS ANGELES COUNTY MUSEUM OF ART,
9 WHICH WAS ACTUALLY DESIGNED BY AN ITALIAN ARCHITECT. SO
10 THERE'S A VERY STRONG PRESENCE. AND IT'S A PRESENCE THAT IS
11 ENRICHED MORE AND MORE TODAY WITH THE PRESENCE OF SO MANY
12 ITALIAN PROFESSIONALS THAT HAVE COME TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY, TO
13 SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA IN SECTORS THAT ARE MOSTLY HIGH TECHNOLOGY
14 ONES. AND WE HAVE AN INCREDIBLE COOPERATION. AND IT'S A
15 COOPERATION THAT IS ALL THE MORE VALUABLE BECAUSE IT RELATES
16 TO AREAS WHERE -- THAT RESONATE VERY WELL WITH THE LOS ANGELES
17 AND SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA LIFESTYLE, WHICH ARE LIKE FASHION OR
18 ARTS, ARCHITECTURE, DESIGN, FOOD AND ALL OF THAT, SPORTS,
19 AREAS WHERE THE ITALIAN ECONOMY IS VERY STRONG AND PRODUCES
20 ITS BEST. AND THESE ARE SOME OF THE AREAS WHERE I WOULD LIKE
21 TO CONTINUE TO STRENGTHEN THE RELATIONSHIPS IN BETWEEN THE
22 COUNTY AND MY COUNTRY. SO I THANK YOU FOR THIS VERY WARM
23 RECEPTION, FOR THIS WELCOME, AND I LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING
24 WITH YOU IN THE MONTHS AND YEARS TO COME. THANK YOU.

2 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS? THE
3 ARTIST IS JEANINE MARIN, WHO DID THE ETCHING OF THE MISSION.
4 SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS, ANY PRESENTATIONS?

6 **SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS:** I HAVE NO PRESENTATIONS FOR TODAY, MR.
7 MAYOR.

8

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** YAROSLAVSKY?

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU, MR. MAYOR. IF I COULD ASK THE
12 MARINES TO JOIN ME HERE. WE DO THIS PRESENTATION EVERY YEAR
13 ABOUT THIS TIME. AND IT'S A PRIVILEGE FOR ME TO MAKE THIS
14 PRESENTATION ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD AGAIN. ON NOVEMBER 10,
15 1775, THE CONTINENTAL CONGRESS DECLARED "LET THERE BE TWO
16 BATTALIONS BE RAISED AND THAT THEY BE CALLED MARINES." SINCE
17 THEIR INCEPTION THEY HAVE SERVED AS SHARP SHOOTERS FROM SHIPS'
18 RIGGINGS IN CLOSE BATTLES EARNING THE WELL-DESERVED REPUTATION
19 AS RIFLEMEN. SINCE THE UNITED STATES TOOK ITS PLACE AS A WORLD
20 POWER, MARINES MARCHED IN STEP, GUIDING AND LEADING THE
21 COUNTRY, AND ASSERTING "WE WILL BE THE FIRST TO FIGHT," AND
22 CONFRONTING TROUBLE IN ANY CLIME AND ANY PLACE. THEY HAVE
23 SERVED WITH HONOR AND DISTINCTION FROM THE HALLS OF MONTEZUMA
24 TO THE SHORES OF TRIPOLI. TODAY MARINES MAY BE FOUND
25 THROUGHOUT THE WORLD IN PEACE TIME AND WAR, WHERE THEY ARE



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1 PROUDLY KNOWN AND CHERISHED AS AMERICA'S 911. IN LOS ANGELES
2 MORE THAN 60 YEARS AGO, MARINES SHOWED ANOTHER CARING SIDE BY
3 LAUNCHING THE TOYS FOR TOTS PROGRAM TO ENSURE THAT NEEDY

7 **ERIC PREVEN:** GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS ERIC PREVEN AND I AM THE
8 COUNTY RESIDENT FROM DISTRICT 3. I HAVE SOME GREAT CONCERNS
9 ABOUT PARKING. AT THE LAST HEARING, WE HEARD FROM A NUMBER OF
10 LOCAL RESIDENTS ABOUT HOW EVEN IN THE CURRENT CONFIGURATION,
11 IT'S EXTREMELY DIFFICULT TO FIND A PARKING SPACE IN FRONT OF
12 SOME OF THESE RESIDENCES, SUPERVISOR THOMAS. ONE OF THE
13 QUESTIONS THAT I HAVE IS, THE LANGUAGE IN THIS DOCUMENT SAYS
14 THAT THE PARKING PERMIT NO. 20010008-2 TO AUTHORIZE SHARED
15 TANDEM AND RECIPROCAL PARKING SPACES IN LOTS 1 AND 2 BETWEEN
16 TWO LOTS. WE'RE NOT SURE WHAT THAT MEANS, TO BE HONEST. AND
17 ONE OF THE BIGGEST CONCERNS LAST WEEK, OR WHEN WE CONFRONTED
18 YOU ON THIS OR WHEN SOME OF THE RESIDENTS DID, THE RESPONSE
19 SEEMED TO BE VERY CLEARLY THERE WILL BE NO REDUCTION IN
20 PARKING SPACES, WHICH WE ARE NOT STUPID. NATURALLY WE'RE NOT
21 CONCERNED ABOUT REDUCTION; WE'RE CONCERNED ABOUT WHERE ARE THE

10 **MR. PREVEN:** THEN I WON'T CEDE MY MINUTE, I'LL CONTINUE. YES,

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** FIRST OF ALL, SUPERVISOR THOMAS WILL
14 RECOGNIZE HIMSELF.

14 COMMENT IS WHEN U.S.C. HAS A FOOTBALL GAME, WE'RE EXCITED
15 ABOUT PROVIDING PARKING. BUT WHEN RESIDENTS IN THE
16 NEIGHBORHOOD ARE BEING KIND OF ENCOURAGED TO ACCEPT A

22 **ROGER MOLIERE:** THANK YOU. ROGER MOLIERE WITH METRO. WE'RE VERY
23 PLEASED OF COURSE TO BE A CO-APPLICANT AND TO SUPPORT WHAT WE
24 THINK IS A VERY FINE TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT. THE WHOLE
25 IDEA BEHIND OUR PROGRAM HAS BEEN TO INCREASE OUR RIDERSHIP BY



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1 MAKING THE AREAS AROUND OUR STATIONS MUCH MORE ATTRACTIVE AND

11 THE CRENSHAW LINE COMES TO THAT SAME STATION. WE'RE VERY
12 PLEASED TO SUPPORT IT. THE PEOPLE HERE THAT HAVE DONE THE
13 TECHNICAL WORK WILL ADDRESS, I'M SURE, DIRECTLY, THE PARKING
14 QUESTION. BUT WE WORKED VERY CLOSELY WITH THE DEVELOPER TO
15 MAKE SURE THAT THERE WAS NO DIMINUTION OF PARKING, NUMBER ONE.
16 AND SECONDLY TO WORK WITH CAL TRANS TO EVENTUALLY WORK TOWARD
17 THE TRANSFER OF THE TITLE AND OWNERSHIP OF THAT PARKING LOT.
18 WE DON'T OWN THE LOT. WE ARE REALLY A TENANT AT THIS POINT. SO
19 WE'RE UNABLE TO DO A LOT OF THINGS THAT WE WILL BE ABLE TO DO
20 ONCE WE GET TITLE TO THAT LOT DOWN THE ROAD. SO PLEASED TO
21 ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS THAT THE BOARD MAY HAVE. AND TO FURTHER
22 TALK TO ENCOURAGE YOU TO PASS THIS VERY IMPORTANT PROJECT.

23

24 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. YES, SIR.

25



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1 **JOHN KOPPELMAN:** HELLO, MY NAME IS JOHN KOPPELMAN. I'M THE
2 PRESIDENT OF THE DEL AIRE NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION. AND I'M
3 HERE TODAY TO SPEAK IN SUPPORT OF THIS PROJECT. WE'VE WORKED
4 VERY CLOSELY OVER THE LAST TWO YEARS WITH THE DEVELOPER,
5 BETWEEN THE DEVELOPER AND SUPERVISOR THOMAS'S OFFICE. AND IT'S
6 BEEN A VERY RESPECTFUL AND VERY PRODUCTIVE NEGOTIATIONS, IF
7 YOU WILL. THIS DEVELOPER HAS MADE A NUMBER OF CHANGES AND
8 NUMEROUS CONCESSIONS TO THE COMMUNITY THAT ARE VERY
9 SIGNIFICANT. AND WE'RE SATISFIED THAT WE'VE GOTTEN THE BEST
10 DEAL FOR THE COMMUNITY FROM OUR WORK. AND I JUST WANT TO THANK
11 SUPERVISOR THOMAS AND HIS STAFF FOR THE WORK THAT THEY'VE DONE
12 WITH OUR COMMUNITY. AND ALSO THE DEVELOPER.

13

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU, SIR. YES, MA'AM.

15

16 **PATRICIA MULCAHEY:** I STILL OPPOSE IT. HOW MUCH INVESTIGATION
17 WAS DONE ON THE TAP WATER, SO FORTH AND SO ON? THIS IS
18 PATRICIA MULCAHEY. AND AGAIN IF YOU FEEL LIKE YOUR
19 CONSTITUTION IS BEING STEPPED UPON BY THIS GOVERNMENT, YOU
20 GIVE ME A CALL BACK. MY NUMBER IS 213-884-6475 AND/OR 661-476-
21 5571. HOW MUCH OF INVESTIGATION DID YOU DO FOR THE WILDLIFE
22 AND SO FORTH AND SO ON BEFORE THE DEVELOPMENT EVEN STARTED?
23 AGAIN, THE NUMBER IS 213-884-6475, 661-476-5571. AND AGAIN IF
24 YOU FEEL LIKE YOUR CONSTITUTION'S BEING STEPPED UPON BY THIS
25 GOVERNMENT, DO GIVE ME A CALL BACK. BECAUSE OUR GOVERNMENT IS



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1 SUPPOSED TO BE WE THE PEOPLE NOT AS CROOKED POLITICIANS UP IN
2 WASHINGTON, D.C. YOUR JOB IS JUST TO PUSH WASHINGTON'S AGENDA
3 AND COVER UP CHILD ABUSE. YOU DO NOT CARE ABOUT THE CHILDREN
4 THAT HAS DIED. YOU DO NOT CARE ABOUT THE 187S. YOU DO NOT CARE
5 ABOUT SEXUALLY ABUSED. YOU SIT THERE AND EAT YOUR FOOD. AND
6 YOU DO NOT CARE ABOUT CIVIL RIGHTS BEING VIOLATED. YOU DO NOT
7 CARE ABOUT THE \$45 MILLION THAT WAS STOLEN IN REGARDS TO THE
8 QUEENS OF ANGELS HOSPITAL. YOU DO NOT CARE ABOUT ANYTHING. AND
9 BY LAW, I'M ENTITLED TO NOT GO WITH MY CANCER TREATMENT. I'M
10 NOT GOING TO GO SEEK CANCER TREATMENT. OKAY? THERE'S NOTHING
11 YOU CAN DO ABOUT IT. AND HOW MANY RAPE KITS ARE NOT PROCESSED
12 RIGHT NOW? HOW MANY CHILDREN ARE MISSING HERE IN CALIFORNIA?
13 HOW MANY KIDS ARE BEING RAPED RIGHT NOW? AND YOU JUST LET IT
14 GO? YOU DO NOT CARE. YOU'RE JUST FACADE PUSHING WASHINGTON'S
15 AGENDA AND COVERING UP CHILD ABUSE.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. COULD YOU RESPOND TO THE
18 PARKING ISSUES THAT WERE RAISED BY THE WITNESS?

19

20 **CAROLINA BLENGINI:** YES. SO IN REGARDS TO THE PARK AND RIDE FOR
21 THE METRO, THERE WILL NOT BE A REDUCTION ON THE CURRENT NUMBER
22 OF PARKING SPACES. SO THAT WILL BE UNTOUCHED. SO REGARDING THE
23 PROJECT ITSELF, THE RETAIL AND GUEST PARKING STANDARDS ARE AS
24 PROPOSED BY OTHER ZONES IN THE CODE, HOWEVER THE MIXED USE
25 ZONE HAS NO SPECIFIC STANDARDS FOR PARKING AND ALLOW THE



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1 HEARING BODY, YOUR BODY, TO DETERMINE STANDARDS THAT ARE
2 APPROPRIATE FOR EACH SPECIFIC DEVELOPMENT. SO THIS PROPOSED
3 DEVELOPMENT HAS PARKING STANDARDS, PROPOSED PARKING STANDARDS
4 THAT WHEN COMPARED TO OTHER ZONES, HAS A REDUCTION IN PARKING.
5 HOWEVER, CONSIDERING THAT THIS IS A TRANSIT-ORIENTED
6 DEVELOPMENT, THE REDUCTION IN PARKING IS JUSTIFIED.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS?

9

10 **SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS:** MAYOR, COLLEAGUES, HAVING ALREADY
11 ESTABLISHED THE PREAMBLE OR THE PREDICATE FOR THE MOTION, LET
12 ME JUST MOVE TO THE WHEREASES. THEREFORE CLOSE THE PUBLIC
13 HEARING AND CERTIFY THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT INCLUDING
14 THE DRAFT E.I.R., THE FINAL E.I.R. AND MITIGATION MONITORING
15 AND REPORTING PROGRAM AND ADOPT THE ENVIRONMENTAL FINDINGS OF
16 FACT AND STATEMENT OF OVERRIDING CONSIDERATIONS FOR THE SAID
17 PROJECT. SECONDLY, INDICATE THE BOARD'S INTENT TO APPROVE THE
18 GENERAL PLANNED AMENDMENT, NUMBERS SPECIFIED, ZONE CHANGE
19 SPECIFIED, VESTING TENTATIVE TRACT MAP NUMBER SPECIFIED,
20 CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT AND PARKING PERMIT AS INDICATED IN THE
21 MOTION. FINALLY TO DIRECT COUNTY COUNSEL TO PREPARE THE FINAL
22 FINDINGS AND CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL FOR THIS PROJECT TO BRING
23 BACK TO A FUTURE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETING FOR THE BOARD'S
24 CONSIDERATION. MAY I ALSO INDICATE THANKS TO PLANNING STAFF.
25 GOOD WORK. AND TO THE COMMUNITY RESIDENTS WHO ARE DIRECTLY



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1 IMPACTED WHO HELPED MAKE THIS PROJECT BETTER, WE THANK YOU FOR
2 YOUR DILIGENCE IN COMING FORWARD TO TESTIFY, TO SHARE WITH THE
3 PLANNING STAFF YOUR VIEWS AND WITH THE BOARD YOUR VIEWS ON
4 THIS MATTER. AND WITH THAT, MR. MAYOR, I MOVE ADOPTION OF THE
5 ITEM BEFORE US.

6

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** OKAY. MOTION BY SUPERVISOR MARK
8 RIDLEY-THOMAS. SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR KNABE. WITHOUT
9 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

11 **SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS:** THANKS, JOHN.

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** ANY OTHER ISSUES, SUPERVISOR?

14

15 **SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS:** THAT CONCLUDES MY ITEMS, THANK YOU.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY?

18

19 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** CALL UP ITEM NO. 3. SOMEBODY WAS HOLDING IT.
20 I DON'T KNOW WHO WAS.

21

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** ITEM NO. 3 IS GEORGE ABRAHAMS, FRAN
23 REICHENBACH AND ANTONIA RAMIREZ.

24



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1 **GEORGE ABRAHAMS:** HI, I'M GEORGE ABRAHAMS, DIRECTOR OF
2 BEACHWOOD CANYON NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION. WE'RE THE AREA
3 DIRECTLY UNDER THE HOLLYWOOD SIGN KNOWN AS THE MOUNT LEE AREA.
4 WE HAVE A TERRIBLE PROBLEM WITH HELICOPTER TRAFFIC AND I
5 WANTED TO OUTLINE THE PROBLEM. IF YOU LOOK AT THE DISTRIBUTED
6 MATERIALS, YOU'LL SEE THAT HELICOPTERS MAY BE OPERATED AT LESS
7 THAN THE MINIMUM PRESCRIBED ALTITUDE, SPECIFIED AS 1,000 FEET.
8 AND SO THEY ACTUALLY HAVE NO LIMIT AT ALL. THEY CAN BUZZ OUR
9 RESIDENTIAL AREAS AND WE HAVE PRACTICALLY NO RELIEF BECAUSE
10 EVEN IF WE TRY TO PETITION THEM FOR FLIGHT RULES, IF YOU LOOK
11 ON THE SECOND PAGE, YOU SEE THEY HAVE A WAY OUT. AND THEY SAY
12 THAT IF WE DETERMINE THE ISSUES YOU IDENTIFIED IN YOUR
13 PETITION HAVE MERIT, OR BUT DO NOT ADDRESS THE IMMEDIATE
14 SAFETY CONCERN OR CANNOT BE ADDRESSED BECAUSE OF OTHER
15 PRIORITIES OR RESOURCE CONSTRAINTS, WE MAY DISMISS YOUR
16 PETITION. THAT'S ROUTINELY WHAT HAPPENS TO ALL EFFORTS. IN
17 1995, THE ENCINO HOMEOWNERS' ASSOCIATION SUBMITTED A PETITION.
18 AND THEY WERE DENIED. WE CURRENTLY HAVE A PETITION UNDER
19 CONSIDERATION. AND THAT HAS AN UNCERTAIN FATE. WE DO NEED THE
20 LEGISLATION, H.R.2677, TO FORCE THE F.A.A. TO MAKE RULES SO
21 THAT WE CAN OBTAIN RELIEF.

22

23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU, SIR. YES, MA'AM.

24



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1 **FRAN REICHENBACH:** HI. MY NAME'S FRAN REICHENBACH, I'M WITH
2 BEACHWOOD CANYON NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION. IF YOU CAN
3 CIRCULATE THESE? WHO DO I GIVE THIS TO? AS GEORGE MENTIONED,
4 WE DO HAVE A QUITE INTENSE ISSUE WITH HELICOPTER, COMMERCIAL
5 HELICOPTER TRAFFIC OVER OUR HEADS IN THE MOUNT LEE AREA. WHAT
6 YOU'RE GETTING RIGHT NOW IS A COPY OF BROCHURE WHICH IS JUST A
7 SAMPLE OF WHAT THE COMMERCIAL TOURISM BUSINESS DISTRIBUTES AND
8 HOW THEY GET SUCH VIBRANT BUSINESS AT THE EXPENSE OF THE
9 NEIGHBORHOODS BELOW THE HOLLYWOOD SIGN AND AROUND THE ENTIRE
10 MOUNT LEE AREA. WHAT WE'RE LOOKING AT IN THAT BROCHURE IS THE
11 FACT THAT AFTER 15 MINUTES TRAINING, THIS PARTICULAR BUSINESS
12 IS OFFERING THAT YOU CAN JUST HOLD ON THE REINS YOURSELF. YOU
13 CAN GO UP AND THEY'LL HAND OVER THE CONTROLS OF THE HELICOPTER
14 TO YOU. MEANWHILE AS GEORGE MENTIONED, THERE ARE NO
15 REGULATIONS THAT TELL THEM THAT THEY MUST FLY HIGH AND SAFE.
16 THE HELICOPTER PILOTS SWEAR THAT THEY'LL FLY FRIENDLY. THIS IS
17 JUST LIP SERVICE. FROM WHAT WE EXPERIENCE ON A DAILY BASIS, WE
18 ARE REALLY DEPENDING ON THIS BERMAN ACT, THIS BERMAN BILL TO
19 BE SUCCESSFUL. WE HOPE THAT YOU WILL SUPPORT IT TODAY, WE
20 REALLY DO. THANK YOU.

21

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. MISS RAMIREZ.

23

24 **ANTONIA RAMIREZ:** GOOD MORNING, I AM ADAMANTLY IN OPPOSITION ON
25 ANY RESTRICTIONS PLACED ON THE L.A. RESIDENTIAL HELICOPTERS



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1 UNDER THE HELICOPTER NOISE RELIEF ACT 2011, UNDER I BELIEVE,
2 HOWARD BERMAN. YOU ARE PLACING MORE NONSENSE RESTRICTIONS AND
3 ADDING MORE STUPID CUMBERSOME REGULATIONS, WHEN THEY ARE
4 FLYING EITHER I.F.R. OR V.F.R. ON TOP OF ALL THE F.A.A.
5 REGULATIONS. DON'T BE DREADFUL. REMEMBER, TOO, THEY ARE LAW
6 ENFORCEMENT CHOPPER PILOTS, WHETHER THEY ARE POLICE AND/OR
7 SHERIFFS OR TOURISM CHOPPER, THEY ARE BRILLIANT, HOT MAMA
8 CHOPPER PILOTS. GOD, THEY'RE GOOD. THEY'RE JUST GREAT.
9 FURTHERMORE, WHEN YOU START DICTATING LOW AND HIGH STRINGENT
10 ALTITUDE LEVELS YOU ARE PLACING THESE GREAT AND RAW TALENTED
11 PILOTS IN GREAT DANGER, BECAUSE EVERY DAY BRINGS A SET OF NEW
12 CIRCUMSTANCES, WHETHER IT IS DANGEROUS, WIND SHEARS,
13 HURRICANES, VOLCANIC ASHES, FLIGHT OF BIRDS, UNPREDICTABLE
14 WIND GUSTS, TORRENTIAL RAINS, AND/OR PRESIDENT OBAMA IS IN
15 TOWN, THEN THE AIR SPACE IS CLOSED AND CATEGORIZED
16 ACCORDINGLY. AND THESE HIGH PERFORMANCE COMMONSENSICAL AND
17 HIGHLY COORDINATED PILOTS MUST RESPOND ACCORDINGLY AND

25 ARE A PUBLIC AND PRIVATE TOXIC NOISE POLLUTION. LISTEN TO



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1 THEIR DREADFUL CARS WITH BOOM BOXES. THAT IS AIR POLLUTION AND
2 NOISE POLLUTION. AGAIN, PILOT SAFETY IS A PRIORITY. AND AGAIN,
3 I'D LIKE TO DEDICATE THIS SONG TO MY WONDERFUL PILOTS. PLAY
4 THAT FUNKY MUSIC, WHITE BOY BY WILD CHERRY. THANK YOU VERY
5 MUCH. GOD I LOVE YOU MILITARY. LOVE YOU, LOVE YOU, LOVE YOU,
6 AND PILOTS.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY?

9

10 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. MAYOR, I MOVE APPROVAL OF THIS POSITION.
11 CONGRESSMAN BERMAN HAS PROPOSED THIS LEGISLATION WHICH WOULD
12 GIVE THE F.A.A. THE AUTHORITY TO PLACE RESTRICTIONS ON
13 AIRCRAFT FLIGHTS. THIS HAS BEEN A PROBLEM IN MANY PARTS OF OUR
14 COUNTY. IT'S BEEN A PROBLEM FOR OUR OWN COUNTY FACILITIES, THE
15 HOLLYWOOD BOWL AND JOHN ANSON FORD THEATER. AND THE HELICOPTER
16 COMMUNITY HAS BEEN REALLY BRAZEN ABOUT IT AND BRAGGING ABOUT
17 IT AND ADVERTISING THAT WE'LL TAKE YOU LOW AND YOU CAN SEE
18 WHAT'S GOING ON AT THE THEATER AND LOOK IN PEOPLE'S BACK
19 YARDS. IT'S BEEN REALLY -- IT'S GOTTEN BEYOND THE TIPPING
20 POINT. AND CONGRESSMAN BERMAN HAS INTRODUCED LEGISLATION WHICH
21 APPEARS TO HAVE SOME LEGS THAT WOULD GIVE THE F.A.A. THE
22 AUTHORITY WHICH THEY CURRENTLY DON'T HAVE TO IMPOSE SOME

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SECOND WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

5

6 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I'M NOT HOLDING ANYTHING ELSE, MR. MAYOR.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR KNABE?

9

10 **SUP. KNABE:** I BELIEVE I'M HOLDING, IS IT 22? 22? ITEM 22. I
11 FOUND THIS VERY UNUSUAL, VERY SIGNIFICANT BECAUSE AS I
12 UNDERSTAND IT, THERE ARE 22 SEPARATE CONTRACTS UP TO 4.2
13 MILLION? I'D LIKE TO HAVE THE DEPARTMENT RESPOND TO THAT, THAT
14 WOULD NOT COME BACK FOR BOARD APPROVAL. YOU'RE ASKING FOR
15 APPROVAL FOR 22 CONTRACTS UP TO 4.2 MILLION EACH WITHOUT --

16

17 **SPEAKER:** YES.

18

19 **SUP. KNABE:** THAT WAS A DUET. BUT I GUESS MY ISSUE, IT GOES
20 BACK. I MEAN THESE THINGS KEEP COMING. THAT'S 88 PLUS MILLION
21 DOLLARS, OKAY? WHAT DOES THE BOARD KNOW AFTER WE JUST SAY IT
22 TODAY, YOU GO AHEAD AND DO IT? WHAT IS THE REPORTING
23 REQUIREMENT?

24



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1 **SPEAKER:** WELL, QUARTERLY THE J.O.C. PROJECTS ARE REPORTED TO
2 THE BOARD EACH QUARTER.

3

4 **SUP. KNABE:** AFTER THEY HAPPEN.

5

6 **SPEAKER:** AFTER THEY'RE DONE. ALSO, IN ADVANCE OF EACH PROJECT
7 BEING PERFORMED, EACH PROJECT IS SUBJECT OF A BOARD LETTER FOR
8 APPROVAL OF THAT PROJECT THAT COMES TO THE BOARD.

9

10 **SUP. KNABE:** SO THERE IS A BOARD LETTER?

11

12 **SPEAKER:** YES.

13

14 **SUP. KNABE:** BECAUSE THE ONES WE APPROVED LAST WEEK, THERE WAS
15 NO BOARD LETTER. SO WE'RE GETTING A DIFFERENT STORY. ON THE
16 J.O.C.S LAST WEEK I WAS TOLD THERE WAS NO BOARD LETTER. TODAY
17 THERE IS A BOARD LETTER?

18

19 **SPEAKER:** ON ALL CAPITAL PROJECTS, THERE IS ALWAYS AN ACTION BY
20 THE BOARD TO APPROVE THE PROJECT BUDGET. AND IF THERE IS
21 ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BOARD TO
22 EITHER CERTIFY OR ADOPT. AT THAT POINT WE BRING THE MATTER TO
23 YOUR BOARD'S ATTENTION THAT WE PLAN TO EXECUTE THE WORK
24 THROUGH JOB ORDER CONTRACTING. I BELIEVE LAST WEEK A MAJORITY
25 OF THE WORK THAT PARKS AND RECREATION WAS TALKING ABOUT WERE



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1 DEFERRED MAINTENANCE ITEMS. THOSE ITEMS DO NOT TYPICALLY COME
2 TO YOUR BOARD.

3

4 **SPEAKER:** BECAUSE THEY'RE NOT CAPITAL PROJECTS.

5

6 **SUP. KNABE:** WELL, I'M JUST READING WHAT THIS SAYS HERE.
7 DOESN'T SAY ANYTHING ABOUT CAPITAL PROJECT. DOESN'T SAY
8 ANYTHING ABOUT COMING BACK TO THE BOARD. IT SAYS MAINTENANCE,
9 REPAIR, AND REFURBISHMENT PROJECTS.

10

11 **SPEAKER:** MAINTENANCE, REPAIR AND REFURBISHMENT PROJECTS MORE
12 THAN \$100,000 ARE CAPITAL PROJECTS. AND WE DEFINITELY, THROUGH
13 C.E.O.'S AUTHORIZATION COME TO YOUR BOARD TO SEEK
14 AUTHORIZATION FOR THE PROJECT BUDGET. AND THE LISTS OF
15 PROJECTS THAT WE'VE COMPILED, ALSO ALL OF THEM ARE CAPITAL
16 PROJECTS. THERE ARE, ONCE IN A WHILE, SOME MINOR MAINTENANCE
17 PROJECTS THAT WE MAY ACCOMPLISH; BUT FOR ALL PRACTICAL
18 PURPOSES, ALL CAPITAL PROJECTS DO COME TO YOUR BOARD FOR
19 AUTHORIZATION PRIOR TO US EVEN ATTEMPTING TO PUT IT ON ANY
20 LIST TO GET ACCOMPLISHED THROUGH JOB ORDER CONTRACTING.

21

22 **SUP. KNABE:** I'M HAPPY TO HEAR THAT. THEN MY NEXT QUESTION
23 OBVIOUSLY THEN, WHY DO YOU NEED A J.O.C. CONTRACT FOR THAT?

24



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1 **SPEAKER:** JOB ORDER CONTRACTING IN GENERAL IS A LOW BID,
2 COMPETITIVE PROCUREMENT. A REGULAR PROJECT THAT WOULD GO
3 THROUGH LOW BID ACTIVITIES TYPICALLY TAKES ABOUT FOUR MONTHS
4 TO GO THROUGH THE BIDDING PROCESS. JOB ORDER CONTRACTING
5 ALLOWS US TO PROCURE THESE AS NEEDED, ON-THE-SHELF CONTRACTS.
6 AND ONCE A PROJECT IS READY TO BE EXECUTED, IT TYPICALLY TAKES
7 US ABOUT A MONTH TO A MONTH AND A HALF TO BRING IT TO
8 CONSTRUCTION. THIS THEREFORE STREAMLINES THE PROJECT AND SAVES
9 US SOME TIME.

10

11 **SUP. KNABE:** OKAY. AND ALSO IN HERE, AND AGAIN JUST READING
12 FROM THE BOARD LETTER, YOU'RE ASKING FOR 22 SEPARATE CONTRACTS
13 BUT YOU'RE AWARDING SOMETHING WITHIN HERE, THE ANGELES
14 CONTRACTOR, MACKONE, NEW CREATION, PUB CONSTRUCTION, TORRES
15 CONSTRUCTION, AND IT SAYS SELECTED CONTRACTORS, SO WHAT DOES
16 THAT MEAN? OF THE 22, ARE THEY --

17

18 **SPEAKER:** THERE IS 22 CONTRACTS. WE WENT TO SOLICIT 22
19 CONTRACTS. AND THOSE WHO BECAME THE LOW BID RESPONSIBLE
20 CONTRACTORS, WE BROUGHT IT TO YOUR BOARD FOR AUTHORIZATION.
21 AND THERE IS 22 TOTAL CONTRACTS. AND AS YOU CAN SEE, THERE ARE
22 A NUMBER OF CONTRACTORS THAT ARE BEING AWARDED THESE
23 CONTRACTS.

24



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1 **SUP. KNABE:** SO THERE'S FIVE CONTRACTORS BEING AWARDED UP TO
2 4.2 MILLION, IS THAT IT?

3

4 **SPEAKER:** EACH, YES.

5

6 **SPEAKER:** EACH.

7

8 **SUP. KNABE:** SO IT'S NOT 22 CONTRACTORS UP TO 4.2 MILLION?

9

10 **SPEAKER:** THAT'S CORRECT.

11

12 **SUP. KNABE:** AND ANYTHING OVER \$100,000 WOULD COME BACK TO THE
13 BOARD?

14

15 **SPEAKER:** CORRECT. ALL CAPITAL PROJECTS NEED TO COME TO THE
16 BOARD FOR YOUR BOARD'S APPROVAL.

17

18 **SUP. KNABE:** OKAY, THANK YOU. GOT IT.

19

20 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHAT DOESN'T COME BACK TO THE BOARD?

21

22 **SPEAKER:** IF A PROJECT IS LESS THAN \$100,000 AND CHIEF
23 EXECUTIVE OFFICER HAS BUDGETED --

24



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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHAT I WAS REALLY ASKING IS WHAT PROJECTS OF
2 OVER \$100,000 DON'T COME BACK TO THE BOARD? I THOUGHT THIS
3 WHOLE CONCEPT WAS NOT TO BRING IT BACK TO THE BOARD?

4

5 **SPEAKER:** FOR EXAMPLE, IF WE NEED TO VIDEOTAPE INSIDE AN
6 EXISTING SEWER LINE TO CHECK THE CONDITION OF THE SEWER LINE?
7 BECAUSE IT IS MORE OF A MAINTENANCE-TYPE ACTIVITY, THAT TYPE
8 OF ACTIVITY TYPICALLY DOESN'T COME TO YOUR BOARD, IT'S TAKEN
9 CARE OF THROUGH THE OPERATIONAL BUDGET OF THE PARTICULAR
10 DEPARTMENT. BUT IF IT'S A PROJECT OVER \$100,000, DEFINITELY IT
11 COMES.

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO I'M LOOKING AT THESE UPCOMING J.O.C.
14 PROJECTS THAT YOUR DEPARTMENT SUPPLIED TO ME. MARINA SEA WALL
15 REPAIR, \$4 MILLION. VIRGINIA ROBINSON GARDENS, \$4 MILLION.
16 OBREGON PARK POOL, \$2 MILLION. ET CETERA. WHAT ARE THESE? THIS
17 DOESN'T SOUND LIKE --

18

19 **SPEAKER:** THOSE ARE CAPITAL PROJECTS THAT WOULD COME TO THE
20 BOARD FOR APPROVAL.

21

22 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO WHAT WE'RE APPROVING TODAY IS GIVING YOU
23 THE AUTHORITY ON NONCAPITAL PROJECTS?

24



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1 **SPEAKER:** NO. TO AWARD CONTRACTS FOR J.O.C. THAT WOULD BE USED

2 --

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS?

5

6 **SPEAKER:** FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS, AND IN A VERY SMALL WAY FOR
7 SOME MAINTENANCE-TYPE ACTIVITIES LIKE WE MENTIONED.

8

9 **SUP. KNABE:** AND TO LIKE FIVE SPECIFIC CONTRACTORS?

10

11 **SPEAKER:** IF I MAY?

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHEN YOU SAY THAT THE CAPITAL PROJECT COMES
14 TO THE BOARD FOR APPROVAL, ARE YOU TALKING ABOUT THE
15 AUTHORIZATION FOR THAT PROJECT?

16

17 **SPEAKER:** THAT'S CORRECT.

18

19 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** BUT NOT THE CONTRACT. NOT THE CONSTRUCTION
20 CONTRACT?

21

22 **SPEAKER:** CORRECT.

23



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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO HERE IS MORE THAN \$80 MILLION WORTH OF
2 CONTRACTS THAT YOU GUYS ARE GOING TO APPROVE. AND WE'LL NEVER
3 SEE THEM OTHER THAN A QUARTERLY REPORT AFTER THE FACT?

4

5 **SPEAKER:** YOUR BOARD -- THE WAY AT LEAST THE J.O.C. PROCESS HAS
6 BEEN SET UP WOULD WORK IS THAT YOUR BOARD APPROVES THE BUDGET
7 FOR THE PROJECT AS WELL AS THE ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION OR
8 ANY OTHER NECESSARY ACTION. IN ADDITION, WE PROCURE, AS
9 NEEDED, ON THE SHELF TYPE JOB ORDER CONTRACTING THAT YOUR
10 BOARD ALSO APPROVED. THESE ARE LOW BID COMPETITIVE CONTRACTS.
11 ONCE THE PROJECT GETS TO A STAGE WHERE IT'S READY TO BE GOING
12 TO CONSTRUCTION AND BIDDING, THEN WE WILL PULL ONE OF THESE
13 CONTRACTS THAT ARE ON THE SHELF THAT YOUR BOARD HAS ALREADY
14 APPROVED AND WE IMPLEMENT THE PROJECT THROUGH THOSE CONTRACTS.

15

16 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHEN DOES THE LOW BID -- WHEN DOES THE BID
17 TAKE PLACE? THE BIDDING PROCESS?

18

19 **SPEAKER:** THE CURRENT 22 CONTRACTS THAT ARE IN FRONT OF YOUR
20 BOARD TODAY, THAT ACTIVITY HAS OCCURRED. THAT'S WHY WE ARE
21 HERE SEEKING YOUR AUTHORIZATION.

22

23 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO MARINA SEA WALL REPAIR, JUST TO PULL ONE
24 OFF THE TOP HERE, THAT HAS BEEN TO THE BOARD ALREADY?

25



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1 **SPEAKER:** IT SHOULD HAVE BEEN, YES.

2

3 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** AND IT WAS APPROVED BY THE BOARD?

4

5 **SPEAKER:** CORRECT.

6

7 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WAS THERE A PRICE TAG ASSOCIATED WITH IT?

8

9 **SPEAKER:** THERE WAS. THERE SHOULD HAVE BEEN A BUDGET ASSOCIATED
10 WITH IT, YES. NOT A PRICE TAG BUT A BUDGET FOR THE OVERALL
11 PROJECT.

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** AND THIS \$4 MILLION IS -- REPRESENTS THAT
14 PRICE TAG? OR DOES IT REPRESENT --

15

16 **SPEAKER:** REPRESENTS THE CONTRACT LIMIT. AND IT'S ANNUAL. IT
17 EXPIRES EACH YEAR.

18

19 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO HOW MUCH WILL THE MARINA SEA WALL REPAIR
20 COST IN ITS ENTIRETY? I'LL PICK ANOTHER ONE.

21

22 **SPEAKER:** I'M SORRY, WHAT THE SUPERVISOR IS ASKING IS THE
23 ANTICIPATED AMOUNTS THAT HE'S LOOKING AT, THOSE ARE ACTUAL
24 PROJECT COSTS. WHAT JACOB WAS TALKING ABOUT IS THE CONTRACT
25 CAPACITY OF \$4.2 MILLION.



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1

2 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I UNDERSTAND THE CONTRACT CAPACITY. WHAT I'M
3 TRYING TO FIGURE OUT IS WHEN -- HOW MUCH DOES THE BOARD SEE OF
4 THIS BEFORE IT'S A DONE DEAL? THAT'S WHAT I'M TRYING TO FIGURE
5 OUT. AND WITH ALL DUE RESPECT, YOU'RE NOT ZEROING IN. SO LET
6 ME TRY ONE MORE TIME, BECAUSE MAYBE I'M NOT ASKING IT. DO YOU
7 DO YOU HAVE A PROJECT AUTHORIZATION ANTICIPATED AMOUNT \$4
8 MILLION? WE APPROVED THAT PROJECT. WE DIDN'T APPROVE A
9 CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION. WE APPROVED THAT PROJECT. YOU THEN
10 SAID THAT AFTER WE APPROVED THAT PROJECT, YOU GO OUT TO SOME
11 KIND OF COMPETITIVE BID, IS THAT CORRECT?

12

13 **SPEAKER:** CORRECT.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** ON THAT PROJECT?

16

17 **SPEAKER:** NOT ON THAT PROJECT. IF WE ARE DOING IT THROUGH JOB
18 ORDER CONTRACTING, JOB ORDER CONTRACT, CONTRACTS WILL BE
19 SOLICITED. WE BRING IT TO YOUR BOARD INDEPENDENTLY WITHOUT THE
20 ACTUAL PROJECT. JUST LIKE YOU HAVE IN FRONT OF YOUR BOARD
21 TODAY THE 22 CONTRACTS. THESE CONTRACTS --

22

23 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHAT DO YOU BID OUT? WHAT IS A BIDDER
24 SUPPOSED TO BID ON?

25



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1 **SPEAKER:** THE BIDDERS ARE BIDDING A SPECIFIC UNIT PRICE BOOKS,
2 WHICH OUTLINES, IF I MAY MAKE AN EXAMPLE, IF YOU GET INTO AN
3 ACCIDENT, THE ADJUSTER COMES AND LOOKS AT THE CAR AND SAYS
4 "YOU NEED A BUMPER. YOU NEED A FENDER. YOU NEED A LIGHT" AND
5 LOOKS IN THE BOOK AND SAYS EACH ONE OF THESE COSTS SO MUCH.
6 AND THERE IS SO MUCH HOURS OF LABOR THAT IS NEEDED. AND BASED
7 ON THAT, TALLIES THE OVERALL AND SAYS THIS ACCIDENT WILL COST
8 \$2,000. JOB ORDER CONTRACTING ESSENTIALLY PUTS TOGETHER THE
9 INFRASTRUCTURE FOR THAT TYPE OF A SERVICE, THE LINE ITEMS ARE
10 IDENTIFIED, THE PRICE IS IDENTIFIED, THE SPECIFICATION IS
11 IDENTIFIED. THE CONTRACTORS BID AN ADJUSTMENT FACTOR BASED
12 UPON THE PRICING THAT WE'VE PUT IN THE BOOK, THAT OUR
13 CONSULTANTS HAVE PUT IN THE BOOK. THEY ARE BIDDING THE BID
14 FACTOR WHICH ESSENTIALLY SAYS, "I WILL ACCOMPLISH THE TASK AT
15 95 PERCENT OR 96 PERCENT OF THE PRICES THAT YOU HAVE IN THE
16 BOOK." THAT'S WHAT GETS BIDDED. THAT'S HOW WE ISSUE THE
17 CONTRACT. WHEN A PROJECT SUCH AS MARINA, SEA WALL OR ANY OTHER
18 PROJECT COMES IN FRONT OF THEM, THEN THEY WILL TAKE THESE LINE
19 ITEMS THAT THEY ALREADY HAVE. THEY BREAK DOWN THE PROJECT INTO
20 THOSE LINE ITEMS. WE CHECK THE QUANTITIES AND MAKE SURE THE
21 QUANTITIES ARE CORRECT. THE PRICES ARE AUTOMATICALLY PUT
22 TOGETHER BASED ON THE BID THAT THEY PREVIOUSLY PUT TOGETHER.
23 AND THAT'S HOW WE COME UP WITH THE OVERALL CONTRACT PRICE FOR
24 THAT PARTICULAR PROJECT. THEREFORE, IT IS CONCEIVABLE THAT A



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1 CONTRACT THAT IS \$4.2 MILLION MIGHT ACCOMPLISH 3, 4 OR 5
2 PROJECTS, NOT JUST ONE. AND IN SOME CASES ONLY ONE PROJECT.

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** AND IN TERMS OF THE -- WHAT HAPPENS IF THEY
5 CAN'T MAKE THAT 95 PERCENT OF THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST? WHAT
6 IF IT EXCEEDS THAT?

7

8 **SPEAKER:** THE CONTRACTS ARE WRITTEN IN A MANNER THAT THE COUNTY
9 IS UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO GIVE THE CONTRACTOR ANY WORK. SO IF
10 THEY DO NOT ABIDE BY THE TERMS OF THEIR CONTRACT, WE
11 ESSENTIALLY WILL NOT USE THAT CONTRACT AT ALL. WE PUT THAT
12 CONTRACT TO SLEEP. AND WE MOVE ON TO THE NEXT CONTRACTOR.

13

14 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** OKAY, THANK YOU.

15

16 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** WE HAVE ONE PUBLIC SPEAKER. THANK YOU.
17 MR. PREVEN?

18

19 **ERIC PREVEN:** MY NAME IS ERIC PREVEN. I AM THE COUNTY RESIDENT
20 FROM DISTRICT 3. AND BOTH SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY ARE IN THE
21 EXACT SAME AREA I'M IN, WHICH IS, IF FOR 95 PERCENT OF THE
22 CONTRACT, IF THEY BID 95 PERCENT OF THE CONTRACT, AND THEY
23 START THE WORK AND THEN LO AND BEHOLD, BECAUSE THOSE OF US WHO
24 HAVE BEEN TO MORE THAN ONE OF THESE MEETINGS, HERE COMES
25 PUBLIC WORKS WITH A LITTLE NOTE THAT IS VIRTUALLY



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1 INDECIPHERABLE BUT NONETHELESS IT SEEMS TO SAY WE'RE OVER BY
2 15 PERCENT ON THIS, SO LET'S PUSH IT THROUGH. AND THE BOARD,
3 TYPICALLY SUPERVISOR KNABE, WILL THROW HIS HANDS UP AND SAY
4 GUYS, WHAT'S GOING ON HERE? AND THEN I'LL COME UP AND SAY THIS
5 IS OUTRAGEOUS. AND THEN THAT CONTRACTOR, AS FAR AS I CAN TELL,
6 SUPERVISOR MOLINA, WILL GET THE ADDITIONAL UPCHARGE. WE ALL
7 ASSUME IT'S GOOD FAITH EXTRA WORK, NEEDED TO BE DONE. BUT ONE
8 OF THE THINGS THAT I'VE BEEN VERY CONCERNED ABOUT IN THIS
9 BIDDING PROCESS IS THAT BIDDING IS ESSENTIALLY WISE BIDDERS
10 BID LOW AND COME BACK LATER. AND NONE OF US REMEMBER. AND WE
11 OUGHT TO STEP UP AND GET INTO THIS. GORDIAN, IN ITEM 21, WHICH
12 IS THE COMPANY THAT PROVIDES THE SOFTWARE FOR ALL THIS, TAKES
13 1.95 PERCENT OF EVERY PUBLIC WORK DOLLAR THAT'S BID OUT THIS
14 WAY. NOW, IT SHOULD BE .65 BASIS POINTS FOR STARTERS, MR.
15 FUJIOKA. SO I WOULD RE-NEGOTIATE THAT ONE. BUT IF YOU LOOK AT
16 THE OVERALL SCOPE OF HOW MUCH MONEY YOU SPENT WITH PUBLIC
17 WORKS, WHICH I WOULD ESTIMATE IS PROBABLY CLOSE TO A BILLION
18 DOLLARS, GORDIAN FOR RUNNING THAT SOFTWARE IS MAKING A
19 FORTUNE. PUBLIC WORKS HAS, I DON'T KNOW. IT MAY BE 10,000
20 EMPLOYEES, OR NO IT'S NOT THAT MANY. WELL IT'S A HIGH NUMBER
21 OF EMPLOYEES. CERTAINLY MORE THAN 5,000. AND I'M CONCERNED
22 THAT A LOT OF GOOD COUNTY TAX DOLLARS ARE GETTING SIFTED OUT
23 IN THIS PROCESS.

24

25 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU.

2 **ERIC PREVEN:** SO I WOULD TAKE A GOOD LONG LOOK AT IT. YOU'RE ON
3 THE RIGHT TRACK. THANKS.

4

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR? IS THIS YOUR MOTION? DO
6 YOU HAVE A MOTION?

7

8 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THIS IS A STAFF REPORT.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** PUBLIC WORKS REPORT? JUST A REPORT?
11 ACTION? DO WE HAVE SUPPORT FOR THAT? SECONDED WITHOUT
12 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. DON? ON 44-B, I WANT TO AMEND IT TO
13 INCLUDE FROM SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY, ALEXANDER BUSANSKY,
14 SENATOR JOE L. DUNN, LARRY FELDMAN, TOM RUTTEN. AND I WOULD
15 LIKE TO BRING IN THOMAS BROWN AND BILL COURTICE. AND I'VE BEEN
16 TOLD THAT FORMER GOVERNOR DEUKMEJIAN MAY NOT BE AVAILABLE, BUT
17 I KNOW HE WILL BE AVAILABLE AS A RESOURCE PERSON FROM TIME TO
18 TIME IF NEEDED. SO ANYBODY SIGNED UP ON THIS ITEM? SO MOVED.
19 SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
20 ORDERED. LET ME REPORT THAT THE C.C.J.C.C.'S REPORT ON THE
21 18TH, THE FIRST MONTH OF THE RE-ALIGNMENT ISSUE WAS ISSUED
22 YESTERDAY. THERE ARE SOME ISSUES. I WOULD RECOMMEND THAT
23 DURING NEXT WEEK'S BOARD, THAT WE HAVE THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE
24 ARRANGE THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH, PROBATION AND SHERIFF
25 REPRESENTATIVES TO GIVE US AN UPDATE ON THAT REPORT. SO THAT



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1 WILL BE FOR NEXT TUESDAY. HELD ITEMS? DR. MITCHELL KATZ ON S-

4 **JOHN SCHUNHOFF:** IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NEW HOSPITAL AT
5 L.A.C.+U.S.C. THIS IS THE INTERIM OR THE EVERY-OTHER -- THE
6 FIRST REPORT OF THE MONTH, WHICH HAS THE LIMITED AMOUNT OF
7 INFORMATION IN IT. THERE IS NO MAJOR TRENDS THAT ARE REFLECTED
8 THROUGH THIS IN TERMS OF UP OR DOWN. THEY'RE ESSENTIALLY
9 CONSISTENT WITH THE PREVIOUS REPORTS.

10

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** OKAY. WE HAVE THREE PUBLIC SPEAKERS
12 REQUESTS. DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL, PATRICIA MULCAHEY AND
13 ANTONIA RAMIREZ. COULD YOU ALSO TALK ON ITEM 9 AND 44-C?

14

15 **ANTONIA RAMIREZ:** COULD YOU REPEAT THAT?

16

17 **DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL:** GOOD MORNING, BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, I
18 WILL CONTINUE TO OBJECT TO HAVE ALL ITEMS CALLED AT THE SAME
19 TIME. I THINK THAT'S A TOTAL VIOLATION OF THE SPIRIT OF THE
20 BROWN ACT. AND I THINK THAT'S APPALLING THAT YOU ARE DOING
21 THAT. BUT, ANYWAY, ON S-1, WE CONTINUE TO HAVE VIOLATION ON
22 STAFFING ISSUE AT ALL THE HOSPITALS IN THE COUNTY. AND
23 RECENTLY DR. KATZ, DR. FINLEY DELVECCHIO TO BE THE C.E.O. OF
24 HARBOR-U.C.L.A. I WONDER IF THOSE POSITIONS WERE EVEN POSTED
25 AT ALL. AND YOU KNOW WE HAVE TWO POSITIONS RECENTLY WERE



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1 FILLED WITH PEOPLE FROM U.C. SAN FRANCISCO. AND I UNDERSTAND
2 THAT DR. KATZ WANTS TO BRING HIS FRIENDS FROM U.C. SAN
3 FRANCISCO, BUT I THINK THAT IT WOULD BE NICE TO CHECK IF THOSE
4 POSITIONS WERE EVEN POSTED. AND I HAVE RECEIVED NUMEROUS
5 LETTERS FROM SAN FRANCISCO TELLING ME THAT THE REPUTATION OF
6 DR. FINLEY IS NOT SO PRISTINE. SO I THINK -- I WAS HOPING THAT
7 YOU WOULD HAVE DONE DUE DILIGENCE ON THAT INDIVIDUAL. ON ITEM
8 NO. 9, HAVING TO DO WITH REBROADCASTING, MANY TIMES THE ENTIRE
9 BOARD IS NOT REBROADCAST IN ITS ENTIRETY. AND BEFORE YOU SIGN
10 A CONTRACT AGAIN, YOU COULD MAKE SURE THAT IT IS BROADCAST
11 TOTALLY. AND SINCE I DON'T HAVE THE TIME TO SPEAK TO THE THIRD
12 ITEM, I WON'T SPEAK TO IT BECAUSE THE BROWN ACT SAID YOU
13 SHOULD HAVE THE TIME TO INTELLIGENTLY DEAL WITH THE ISSUE. AND
14 SINCE YOU ARE NOT GIVING ME THAT TIME, SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH,
15 I WON'T SPEAK TO IT. AND I WILL CITE YOU FOR A VIOLATION OF
16 THE BROWN ACT AGAIN.

9 WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. I THEN NOW DEMAND THAT YOU
10 CONDUCT A FULL BACKGROUND INVESTIGATION ON THE EAST L.A.
11 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WHICH INCLUDES THE MENTAL, COGNITIVE AND
12 PERFORMANCE HYPOTHETICAL SCENARIOS ON THE FOLLOWING OVERTLY

9 **ERIC PREVEN:** ANYBODY WANT TO PASS THE HAT? MY NAME IS ERIC
10 PREVEN AND I'M THE COUNTY RESIDENT FROM DISTRICT 3. PERHAPS WE
11 SHOULD PASS THE HAT TO CONSIDER SENDING MISS RAMIREZ TO
12 ARIZONA? I'M IN. OKAY. THE NUMBERS THAT I WOULD LIKE TO SPEAK
13 ON INCLUDE: ITEM 1. THE ECONOMY AND EFFICIENCY COMMISSION,

7 SECONDED WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

9 **CLERK SACHI HAMAI:** THANK YOU.

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** ITEM NO. 42 I'LL MOVE. SECONDED BY
12 SUPERVISOR KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION. OH, THERE'S ADDITIONAL
13 SPEAKERS. OKAY. RICHARD ROBINSON? MR. ROBINSON?

14

15 **RICHARD ROBINSON:** FORMER SHERIFF BACA AND I HAD A COUPLE
16 CONVERSATIONS AND I CONSIDER SHERIFF BACA A FRIEND. THE
17 PROBLEMS AT THE JAIL ARE SYSTEMATIC WITH THE JAILS AND ARE NOT
18 THE FAULT OF THE SHERIFF. HE'S IN CHARGE, THOUGH, AND WHEN THE
19 OFFICERS RUN OUT OF PAPER CLIPS, HE GETS BLAMED. I WOULD LIKE
20 TO SAY THAT IT TOOK THE RAMPART SCANDAL TO UNCOVER THE
21 SYSTEMATIC FAILURE UNDER WILLIE WILLIAMS. SIMILARLY, WHEN THE
22 SHERIFF DISCOVERED THAT SOME OF HIS OFFICERS WERE -- I COME
23 FROM A LAW ENFORCEMENT FAMILY. FEDERAL, STATE, COUNTY AND
24 MUNICIPAL OFFICERS BACK IN MICHIGAN. THE THOUGHT THAT ONE
25 WOULD BELONG TO A GANG IN THAT MIDDLE CLASS NEIGHBORHOOD OF



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1 MINE WOULD HAVE BEEN UNTHINKABLE. BUT THIS IS LOS ANGELES, THE
2 LARGEST CITY IN THE WORLD. THE COUNTY IS HUGE. SO, THE LOS
3 ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT WAS PLACED UNDER A CONSENT DECREE
4 BECAUSE OF THE SYSTEMATIC FAILURE, PROBLEMS ARE BEING SOLVED.
5 AND WHEN WE STOP BLAMING INDIVIDUALS, I SAW BILLY BEING BLAMED
6 FOR SOME THINGS THAT WERE TOTALLY NOT -- MR. FUJIOKA, EXCUSE
7 ME, SIR -- WERE BEING BLAMED FOR PROBLEMS THAT WERE NOT HIS. I
8 JUST SIMPLY WANT TO SAY THAT SHERIFF BACA IS IN CHARGE. AND
9 THIS COMMISSION SHOULD BE AWARE WHEN ITS APPOINTED, -- THE
10 PROBLEM IS NOT SHERIFF BACA.

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** I'LL MOVE. SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR
13 KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. WE'RE GOING TO GO INTO
14 PUBLIC COMMENT NOW. BEFORE I CALL YOU, LET ME ALSO CALL UP
15 DECATUR MARSHALL WALKER, KENDELL SMITH AND ALEX LACEY, AND A
16 DAVID DWIGHT. OKAY. MR. ROBINSON?

17

18 **RICHARD ROBINSON:** I LEFT MY NOTES AT MY SEAT. BUT I HAD A
19 LITTLE TUFF AT CITY COUNCIL NOT LONG AGO. I SAID SOMETHING OFF
20 THE TOP OF MY HEAD, BUT I MEAN IT. I SAID TO A GROUP OF
21 CHRISTIANS, THIS PLANET IS NOT MY HOME. AND THE ROOF FELL IN

3 WE FIND THAT WRITTEN IN THE QUR'AN, INCIDENTALY. MOHAMMED WAS
4 BORN 530 YEARS AFTER DEATH AND HE SPOKE OF JESUS AS BEING

16 **DECATUR WALKER:** MY NAME IS DECATUR WALKER. AND LAST TIME I WAS
17 HERE WAS IN 2010, APRIL 13. I STATED THAT ON THE 14TH I WASN'T
18 GOING TO GET A FAIR HEARING WITH MY SISTER AND OUR ATTORNEY IN
19 THE COMMISSION HEARING. AND AFTER THAT TIME WHEN THEY APPROVED
20 THE PROJECT AND I HAD SIX OTHER HOMEOWNERS CONTESTING THE
21 DEVELOPMENT, IT WAS THE DEVELOPMENT. AND IT SEEMED LIKE THE
22 COMMISSION WAS MISLED THAT IT WAS A MODIFICATION HEARING. AND
23 SINCE THAT TIME I'VE BEEN TO THE CONTROLLER'S OFFICE AND THE

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. THANK YOU, MR. WALKER.

22 **DECATUR WALKER:** I WOULD HAVE TO GIVE PERMISSION. I DIDN'T GIVE
23 PERMISSION.

25 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU.

15 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** YOU LOST THE VOTE. [LAUGHTER.]

16

17 **DAVID DWIGHT:** HELLO. MY NAME IS DAVID DWIGHT. AND I'M A
18 PARTICIPANT OF FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH. KIND OF A LITTLE I GUESS
19 A LITTLE ISSUE GOING ON SAYING THAT PRETTY MUCH YOUR WE'RE
20 GETTING OUR HOUSING TAKEN WAY. SO I JUST WROTE A LITTLE
21 SOMETHING PRETTY MUCH STATING MY SIDE OF THE STORY AND HOW I
22 FEEL ABOUT THE SITUATION. TO WHOM THIS MAY CONCERN. HELLO. YOU
23 KNOW MY NAME IS DAVID DWIGHT. I'M WRITING THIS LETTER ON

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** OKAY. DO YOU KNOW THE SUPERVISOR? IS
22 THAT SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS'? ZEV, DO YOU GO TO MID-
23 WILSHIRE? THAT WOULD BE MARK? SECOND DISTRICT, OKAY. AFTER YOU
24 SPEAK, YOU GO ON THE SIDE, WE'LL HAVE A REPRESENTATIVE FROM
25 SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS' OFFICE TALK TO YOU. THE CHIEF



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1 OF STAFF IS RIGHT THERE. GOOD MAN. BEFORE YOU SPEAK, LET ME
2 ALSO CALL UP, DID I SAY ALEX LACEY? DAVID DWIGHT. LET ME ALSO
3 CALL UP STEPHANIE RODAS? AND LORRAINE JOHNSON. OKAY.

4

5 **ALEX LACEY:** HELLO. MY NAME IS ALEX LACEY. I'M HERE FOR THE
6 SAME REASON, TO TALK ABOUT THE SHUTDOWN OF OUR T.H.P. IT'S AN
7 EXCELLENT PROGRAM. IT HELPS US GET OUR DIPLOMA, FIND A JOB AND
8 HELP US BE INDEPENDENT. AND WITH THE PROGRAM SHUT DOWN, I
9 WOULD HAVE NOWHERE TO GO AND I WILL HAVE TO START OVER FROM
10 THE BEGINNING AND THAT WILL BE KIND OF HARD. SO I'M HERE JUST
11 TO SAY Y'ALL SHOULD REALLY THINK ABOUT SHUTTING THE PROGRAM
12 DOWN. THAT'S ABOUT IT.

13

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** OKAY.

15

16 **KENDELL SMITH:** GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS KENDELL SMITH. I'M
17 GLAD TO SAY I'M A PARTICIPANT IN T.H.P.P. PROGRAM. I'VE BEEN
18 LIVING IN THIS PROGRAM SINCE JULY 16, AND NUMEROUS PEOPLE,
19 INCLUDING MYSELF, HAVE SEEN GREAT CHANGES IN ME WHILE LIVING
20 IN THIS PROGRAM. T.H.P.P. HAS HELPED ME ON THEIR BUSY DAYS.
21 THEY MAKE SURE I HAVE EVERYTHING I NEED. BESIDES T.H.P.P., MY
22 SOCIAL WORKER AND MY O.P. COORDINATOR, NO ONE HAS TRIED TO
23 MAKE OR PUT AN EFFORT INTO MY NEEDS OR WANTS. T.H.P.P. TOOK ME
24 AND GIVE ME A CHANCE TO DEMONSTRATE TO NOT ONLY THEM BUT
25 EVERYBODY AROUND ME THAT I CAN BETTER MYSELF IN THIS SOCIETY.



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1 SO BEFORE ANY CHANGES HAPPEN, I JUST WANT YOU GUYS TO KNOW
2 THAT T.H.P.P. TOOK ME UP UNDER THEIR WINGS.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. I'VE ALSO BEEN APPRISED
5 THAT WE ARE AWAITING THE RESULTS OF AN EVALUATION OF THE
6 PROGRAM THAT THEY'RE MAKING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. WE
7 HAVEN'T RECEIVED THAT YET. BUT PLEASE. LET ME ALSO CALL UP
8 HEATHER WEINER AND STEPHANIE AYALA?

9

10 **LORRAINE JOHNSON:** HELLO, MY NAME IS LORRAINE JOHNSON AND I AM
11 ONE OF THE CASE MANAGERS FOR FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH. I AM
12 CONCERNED OF THE FUTURE OF THE YOUTH THAT I WORK WITH. THE
13 PROGRAM THAT I WORK FOR IS NOT JUST PROGRAM BUT A FAMILY FOR
14 THE YOUNG PEOPLE. WE PROVIDE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR THE YOUNG
15 PEOPLE TO ESTABLISH HEALTHY, LONG-TERM RELATIONSHIPS WITH
16 STAFF AND PEERS. THIS PROGRAM PROMOTES OBTAINING A HIGH SCHOOL
17 DIPLOMA, ATTENDING COLLEGE AND OBTAINING PART-TIME EMPLOYMENT.
18 AS A CASE MANAGER, I AM AFFORDED THE OPPORTUNITY TO CONNECT
19 WITH THE YOUTH EVERY DAY AND WATCH THEM MATURE INTO YOUNG
20 ADULTS. I TAKE PRIDE IN WATCHING MY YOUNG PEOPLE EXCEL,
21 SUCCEED AND ACHIEVE IN AREAS OF THEIR LIFE. FOREVER FAMILY IS
22 WHAT FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH MEANS TO THESE YOUNG PEOPLE. A
23 FAMILY STRUCTURE THAT IS SAFE AND SUPPORTIVE. THESE YOUTH HAVE
24 SUFFERED WITH LOSING IMPORTANT ROLE MODELS IN THEIR LIVES, AND
25 THIS PROGRAM HAS TAKEN THE PLACE FOR THE YOUNG PEOPLE BY



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1 ASSISTING THEM IN STRIVING TO BECOME BETTER INDIVIDUALS.
2 SUPPORT FROM A LOVING ENVIRONMENT IS WHAT YOU NEED TO BE
3 SUCCESSFUL IN LIFE. AND STRIPPING ANOTHER FAMILY STRUCTURE
4 WOULD JUST ADD TO THE NUMEROUS STRESSES THAT THE YOUTH ALREADY
5 ARE FORCED TO DEAL WITH. IN SPITE OF WHAT THE STATISTICS
6 SUGGEST FOR THE OUTCOME FOR THESE YOUTH, THIS PROGRAM
7 SURPASSES WHAT IS EXPECTED OF THEM BY SOCIETY. THIS PROGRAM IS
8 AMAZING FOR THESE YOUNG PEOPLE BECAUSE IT PROVIDES YOUTH AN
9 OPPORTUNITY TO LEARN AND TO LIVE INDEPENDENTLY. BEING A PART
10 OF THIS ORGANIZATION HAS GIVEN ME AN OPPORTUNITY TO WATCH
11 YOUTH CHANGE AND EXCEL LIKE NEVER BEFORE. THIS PROGRAM CHANGES
12 LIVES AND PROVIDES AN ALTERNATIVE FAMILY STRUCTURE FOR THESE
13 YOUNG PEOPLE. DON'T SEPARATE ANOTHER FAMILY. DON'T BREAK THE
14 HEARTS OF THESE YOUNG PEOPLE. AND DON'T STEAL THEIR JOY. LET'S
15 CONTINUE THIS PROGRAM AND PROVIDE A HEALTHY FAMILY STRUCTURE
16 FOR THESE YOUNG PEOPLE.

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. YES, MA'AM.

19

20 **STEPHANIE AYALA:** MY NAME IS STEPHANIE. I AM 20 YEARS OLD. AND
21 I HAVE SUCCESSFULLY EMANCIPATED FROM T.H.P.P. I WAS IN THE
22 PROGRAM FOR TWO YEARS. IN THOSE TWO YEARS, I NOT ONLY ACHIEVED
23 MY EDUCATIONAL GOALS BUT I AM OFFICIALLY LIVING ON MY OWN. I
24 GOT MY HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA AND I WAS TAUGHT HOW TO MAKE A
25 PROFESSIONAL RESUME TO HELP ME GET A JOB WHERE I HAVE BEEN AT



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1 FOR A YEAR AND NOW BEING CONSIDERED FOR A MANAGERIAL POSITION.
2 T.H.P.P. HAS HELPED ME AND TURNED ME INTO AN ADULT. OF COURSE
3 NOTHING IN LIFE IS EASY. AND I AM NOT PERFECT. BUT THEY
4 CONTINUED TO GUIDE ME EVERY STEP OF THE WAY. I THANK THEM FOR
5 NOT GIVING UP ON ME, ON ONLY MAKING ME A STRONGER PERSON. I AM
6 NOW LIVING ON MY OWN. I AM SO GLAD I HAD THE PRIVILEGE TO BE
7 PART OF T.H.P.P. THEY GAVE ME A HEAD START TO BECOMING AN
8 ADULT RATHER THAN DEPENDING ON I.L.P., LIKE MY SOCIAL WORKER
9 WANTED. T.H.P.P. IS A GREAT PROGRAM BUT IT IS NOT FOR
10 EVERYONE. YOU NEED TO HAVE GOALS, BE DETERMINED TO MOVE
11 FORWARD AND HAVE A DESIRE TO DO SO. THE STAFF WAS THERE TO
12 KEEP ME ON TRACK AND STAY FOCUSED. FOR THIS, I AM VERY
13 GRATEFUL. I STRONGLY FEEL THAT BY CLOSING DOWN T.H.P.P., YOU
14 WOULD BE DENYING FUTURE FOSTER YOUTH THE OPPORTUNITY FOR THEM
15 TO LEARN HOW TO BE INDEPENDENT AND EXPLORE THEIR OPTIONS, NOT
16 ONLY EDUCATIONALLY BUT LIFELONG CHOICES ON HOW TO LIVE ON
17 THEIR OWN. THE MAJORITY OF FOSTER PARENTS DON'T PROVIDE THE
18 YOUTH WITH THIS TYPE OF INFORMATION. THEY ONLY CARE ABOUT THE
19 MONEY. THEY'RE NOT DOING IT GENUINELY. I SPEAK UPON THIS
20 BECAUSE I HAVE EXPERIENCED EVERY PART. THANK YOU.

21

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. LET ME ALSO CALL UP DOMINIC
23 AGBABIKA. AND I MENTIONED WE ALREADY HAD DANELLE WASHINGTON?
24 DANELLE WASHINGTON. AND HEATHER'S HERE?

25



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1 **HEATHER WEINER:** YES.

2

3 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** AND STEPHANIE IS HERE. OKAY. AND
4 KALISHA JAMES? OKAY.

5

6 **HEATHER WEINER:** HI, MY NAME IS HEATHER WEINER. I AM A CURRENT
7 PARTICIPANT OF FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING
8 PLACEMENT PROGRAM. I WAS PLACED AT 838 SOUTH SYCAMORE FOUR
9 MONTHS AND TWO DAYS AGO. BEFORE THAT, I HAD LIVED IN A LEVEL
10 12 RESIDENTIAL GROUP HOME FACILITY FOR ONE YEAR. A MYTH IS
11 THAT THOSE TRANSITIONING INTO T.H.P.P. FROM HIGHER-LEVEL CARE
12 STRUGGLE TO BE INDEPENDENT. WELL I AM PROOF THAT WITH THE
13 PROPER AID, YOU CAN TRANSITION EXCEPTIONALLY WELL. I WAS TOLD
14 THE MOMENT I RECEIVED MY HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA I WOULD NO LONGER
15 BE ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE SERVICES FROM MY GROUP HOME. I'M A RARE
16 STUDENT IN THAT I GRADUATED ON TIME AT THE AGE OF 17.
17 UNFORTUNATELY, THIS DID NOT SERVE ME WELL IN FOSTER CARE AS I
18 WOULD HAVE TO BE PLACED INTO A GROUP OR FOSTER HOME OR
19 EMERGENCY SHELTER UNTIL MY RELEASE FROM THE SYSTEM. A FIERCE
20 WOMAN AND FORMER FOSTER YOUTH HERSELF FROM L.A.U.S.D. TOLD ME
21 THAT WAS UNACCEPTABLE AND FOUND OUT ABOUT THE T.H.P. PROGRAM
22 FOR ME. SHE AIDED ME IN THE GRUELING APPLICATION PROCESS WHERE
23 I HAD TO WRITE A PERSONAL STATEMENT AND MAKE IT THROUGH THE
24 EXTREMELY NERVE-WRACKING INTERVIEW. I REALIZE MY FUTURE AS A
25 FOSTER YOUTH WAS RIDING ON THIS AND WAS VERY RELIEVED TO FIND



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1 OUT THE SAME DAY THAT I GOT ACCEPTED INTO TRANSITIONAL
2 HOUSING. OF COURSE IT IS STILL PLACEMENT AND THERE ARE RULES.
3 AND AS ANY YOUNG ADULT, I STRUGGLE TO COMPLY. BUT OVERALL, I
4 HAVE SEEN MAJOR PROGRESSION IN MY LIFE DUE TO THIS PROGRAM. I
5 AM ACTIVELY SEEKING EMPLOYMENT AND ATTENDING SANTA MONICA
6 COLLEGE PART-TIME. I ALSO ATTEND LIFE SKILLS MEETINGS
7 BIMONTHLY AND DRUG COUNSELING AT MY OLD PLACEMENT TWICE A
8 WEEK, SEEK MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES FROM ASIAN PACIFIC
9 COUNSELING AND VISIT BOTH SIDES OF MY FAMILY IN THE SAN
10 FERNANDO VALLEY EVERY WEEKEND. I HAVE AN OPEN INTERNSHIP
11 WAITING FOR ME AT THE MIRACLE THEATER PROJECT, A THEATRICAL
12 PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN WITH AUTISM. I HAVE THE BEST ROOMMATES
13 ANY GIRL COULD EVER ASK FOR. WE'RE ALL DIFFERENT, YET WE MESH
14 TOGETHER SO WELL. ONE IS EARNING HER HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA FULL-
15 TIME WHILE WORKING WEEKENDS AND THE OTHER IS APPLYING TO A
16 SCHOOL THAT WILL MAKE HER THE BEST SPECIAL EFFECTS MAKEUP
17 ARTIST YOU WILL EVER SEE. T.H.P.P. IS MY FAMILY AND MY HOME.
18 PROGRAM COORDINATOR IS A HUGE INSPIRATION TO ME AS WELL. HER
19 FIERY PASSION TO SAVE THIS PROGRAM HAS DRIVEN ME TO FIND AND
20 FIGHT FOR MY OWN PASSION BY TAKING ACTION FOR MYSELF. AFTER
21 ALL, I HAVE ONLY MYSELF TO DEPEND ON. I HAVE LEARNED HOW TO
22 PROPERLY TAKE CARE OF MYSELF, MY LIVING FACILITIES, MY
23 EXTREMELY BUSY SCHEDULE AND MY OFTEN CHAOTIC PERSONAL LIFE
24 WITH THE HELP AND SUPPORT OF T.H.P.P. AT AGE 17, I AM 100
25 PERCENT RESPONSIBLE FOR MYSELF, WHICH IS A VERY LIBERATING



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1 FEELING FOR THOSE WHO HAVE STRIVED TO BE INDEPENDENT FOR SO
2 LONG, LIKE I HAVE. MOST IMPORTANTLY, THROUGH THIS PROGRAM, I
3 HAVE LEARNED TO NEVER TAKE ANYTHING FOR GRANTED. I BELIEVE
4 THIS PROGRAM IS A TRUE STEPPING STONE FOR FOSTER YOUTH TRYING
5 TO EMANCIPATE OR GRACEFULLY AGE OUT AND I AM ASKING YOU TO
6 CONSIDER FROM A TRUE PARTICIPANT JUST HOW MUCH THIS PROGRAM IS
7 NECESSARY. I WAS ONCE TOLD THAT FOSTER YOUTH ARE THROW-AWAY
8 KIDS. MY PARTING MESSAGE IS WE ARE NOT THROW-AWAY KIDS.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MISS WEINER. LET
11 ME ALSO CALL UP IRENE PANG. IRENE PANG? MISS AYALA?

12

13 **STEPHANIE AYALA:** HELLO. MY NAME IS STEPHANIE AYALA, I AM 16. I
14 AM ONE OF THE YOUNGEST PARTICIPANTS IN TRANSITIONAL LIVING. I
15 AM ALSO HERE TO EXPRESS MYSELF HOW I FEEL ABOUT THE PROGRAM
16 CLOSING DOWN. I HAD WROTE A LETTER, BUT I THINK IT'S BETTER
17 SPEAKING THROUGH WORDS. THIS PROGRAM HAS HELPED ME A LOT. I
18 HAVE A JOB. I'M GRADUATING ONE YEAR AHEAD. THIS PROGRAM HAS
19 TEACHED ME HOW TO MANAGE MY MONEY, HOW TO MANAGE MY TIME, HOW
20 TO BE SOMEONE, HOW TO BE DETERMINED, TO WANT SOMETHING, AND
21 FOLLOW MY DREAMS. AND I AM NOT WILLING TO LET ANYONE CLOSE
22 DOWN THE PROGRAM AND SHUT DOWN WHAT I WANT TO BE. I'M
23 GRADUATING A YEAR BEFORE MY AGE. AND I THINK US FOSTER YOUTH
24 DESERVE A CHANCE TO SUCCEED AFTER OUR HARD TIME AS BEING IN
25 FOSTER HOMES AND PLACEMENTS. AND JUST HOW HEATHER SAID, I HAVE



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1 HEARD THAT SAYING, TOO, THAT FOSTER KIDS ARE JUST A WASTE OF
2 TIME. WELL WE'RE NOT. AND THAT'S WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO PROVE.
3 BUT WE NEED HELP. WE NEED SUPPORT. WE'RE THE FUTURE. SO, YOU
4 KNOW WE NEED HELP. WE ARE YOUR FUTURE.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** RIGHT. THANK YOU, MISS AYALA. YES,
7 SIR.

8

9 **DOMINIC AGBABIKA:** GOOD MORNING. THANK YOU, HONORABLE BOARD
10 MEMBERS FOR YOUR TIME. MY NAME IS DOMINIC AGBABIKA. I'M WITH
11 FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PLACEMENT PROGRAM.
12 AND I'M COMING BEFORE YOU GUYS TODAY OUT OF CONCERN FOR
13 TRANSITION-AGE FOSTER YOUTH. WE PROVIDE HOUSING FOR A NUMBER
14 OF THESE YOUTH WHO HAVE RECENTLY GONE INTO CRISIS UPON
15 LEARNING VERY CARELESSLY THAT THE T.H.P.P. IS SCHEDULED TO
16 SUNSET AT THE END OF DECEMBER. NOT ONLY IS THIS HIGHLY
17 DISTURBING NEWS TO THEM BUT IT BRINGS ABOUT FEELINGS OF
18 INSTABILITY, ONE OF THE SEVERELY DISTRESSING FACTORS FOSTER
19 YOUTH FACE WHILE LIVING IN THE CHILDCARE SYSTEM. BUT I DON'T
20 HAVE TO TELL YOU HOW THEY FEEL. THEY'RE HERE TO SPEAK FOR
21 THEMSELVES. I'M CURIOUS TO KNOW THOUGH WHY D.C.F.S. WOULD EVEN
22 WANT TO ELIMINATE A PROGRAM THAT PRODUCES HIGHER EDUCATIONAL
23 ACHIEVEMENT RATES. I CANNOT UNDERSTAND WHY D.C.F.S. WOULD
24 PREFER FOR FOSTER YOUTH TO CONTINUE TO UNDERACHIEVE IN THIS
25 AREA AT THEIR CURRENT RATE OF LESS THAN 50 PERCENT AND BY SOME



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1 ESTIMATES WELL BELOW THAT. I'M CONFOUNDED TO SEE THAT D.C.F.S.
2 WOULD PREFER TO SPEND MORE MONEY, OFTEN ALLOWING YOUTH TO
3 REMAIN IN PLACEMENT FACILITIES WITH MUCH HIGHER RATES THAN
4 T.H.P.P. AND I'M TOTALLY AT A LOSS TO IDENTIFY ANY PRE-
5 EMANCIPATION PROGRAM THAT SAVES ON AVERAGE OVER \$2700 TOWARD A
6 YOUTH'S TRANSITION FROM FOSTER CARE AND MOREOVER WHY ANYONE
7 WOULD WISH THAT TO STOP. BUT I'M TRULY DISAPPOINTED AND
8 ASTOUNDED IN THE ABSOLUTE RECKLESS AND HAPHAZARD MANNER IN
9 WHICH FOSTER YOUTH ARE BEING NOTIFIED ABOUT THE SUNSET OF A
10 PROGRAM WHOSE CONTRACTORS ARE NONE THE WISER AND WHOSE
11 MANAGERS CLAIM TO BE SUPPORTIVE. IT'S AMAZING. AS REPEATED
12 PROMISES TO THE STAKEHOLDERS, EXECUTIVE STAFF, AND OTHER
13 INTERESTED PARTIES CONTINUE TO BE ELUSIVE, I WANTED TO TAKE
14 THIS OPPORTUNITY TO ADDRESS YOU DIRECTLY TODAY. I'M HERE TO
15 LET YOU KNOW FIRSTHAND THAT MANY OF THE YOUTH THAT YOU HEAR
16 ABOUT, MANY OF THE MYTHS THAT YOU HEAR ABOUT IN T.H.P.P. ARE
17 SIMPLY NOT TRUE. IN ACTUALITY, SINCE 2006, OVER 77 PERCENT OF
18 OUR YOUTH HAVE GRADUATED WITH HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMAS, 91 PERCENT
19 WHEN REMAINING IN THE PROGRAM FOR SIX MONTHS OR MORE, OVER 85
20 PERCENT GO ON TO POST-SECONDARY OR VOCATIONAL EDUCATION, 16-
21 YEAR-OLDS PROVIDED FOR BY ASSEMBLY BILL 427 DO REMARKABLY
22 WELL, CONTRARY TO THE PREDISPOSED NOTION THAT THEY'RE TOO
23 YOUNG TO PARTICIPATE, OFTENTIMES OUTPERFORMING THEIR PEERS.
24 AND THERE HAVE BEEN NO MAJOR INCIDENTS OR DEATHS SINCE THE
25 INCEPTION OF THE PROGRAM IN 1998, NOT ONE. YET THESE YOUTH



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1 FACE A TUMULT OF INSTABILITY BECAUSE SOMEONE'S DECIDED THAT
2 THEY WANT TO CLOSE THE PROGRAM, LURE YOUTH INTO D.C.F.S.
3 OFFICES AND CONVINCED THEM AWAY FROM CAREGIVERS OR LEGAL
4 COUNSEL TO TAKE A T.H.P. BED NOW OR RISK BEING HOMELESS. I
5 URGE YOU PERSONALLY TO MEET WITH HOUSING PROVIDERS, PERSONALLY
6 HEAR FROM THE YOUTH. DON'T ALLOW D.C.F.S. TO CLOSE A PROGRAM
7 THAT PROVIDES SO MUCH FOR SO MANY. NOT ONLY SHOULD T.H.P.P.
8 NOT BE SUNSET BUT IT SHOULD BECOME A REGULAR PLACEMENT
9 AVAILABLE TO ALL FOSTER YOUTH IN LONG-TERM CARE, NOT JUST FOR
10 40 PEOPLE OUT OF THE 1500-PLUS EMANCIPATED ANNUALLY. WE ALSO
11 KNOW THAT MOST T.H.P. KIDS COME FROM PLACES WHERE THEY HAVEN'T
12 HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN T.H.P.P. SO PLEASE HELP
13 TO RESTORE A SENSE OF STABILITY FOR THESE VULNERABLE FOSTER
14 CHILDREN BECAUSE WE ABSOLUTELY OWE IT TO THEM.

16 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. SIR.

18 **DOMINIC AGBABIKA:** THANK YOU.

19

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** YES, MA'AM.

21

22 **DANELLE WASHINGTON:** GOOD MORNING. IT IS SUCH AN HONOR AND
23 PRIVILEGE TO BE HERE. THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR HAVING US. MY NAME
24 IS DANELLE WASHINGTON. I'M HERE TODAY ON BEHALF OF FIRST STEPS
25 FOR YOUTH TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PLACEMENT PROGRAM. IT'S A



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1 HOUSING PROGRAM CONTRACTED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND
2 FAMILY SERVICES THROUGH THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. OUR FOCUS
3 POPULATION IS TRANSITION-AGED FOSTER YOUTH, SPECIFICALLY 16 TO
4 19 YEARS OF AGE. WE ARE MORE THAN JUST A HOUSING PROGRAM, BUT
5 OUR CORPORATE STRUCTURE IN DEALING WITH THIS MARGINALIZED
6 POPULATION HAS CREATED A SENSE OF FAMILY AND PERMANENCY. IN
7 SOME CASES, OUR PROGRAM AND ITS AFFILIATES ARE THE ONLY SENSE
8 OF SUPPORT AND STRUCTURE SOME OF THESE YOUNG PEOPLE KNOW,
9 UNDERSTAND, EMBRACE AND REACT TO. I'M HERE TODAY TO SPARK MUCH
10 NEEDED AWARENESS OF THIS UNTAPPED RESOURCE. I'M HERE TODAY TO
11 ASK FOR THE SUPPORT AND REASSURANCE OF THE BOARD OF
12 SUPERVISORS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES
13 THAT THEY, TOO, TRULY AND SUBSTANTIALLY SUPPORT OUR YOUNG
14 PEOPLE. IT IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY AND OUR CHARGE AS A COMMUNITY
15 TO BEST PREPARE OUR YOUNG PEOPLE FOR THEIR TRANSITION OUT OF
16 FOSTER CARE. AND THAT IS EXACTLY WHAT T.H.P.P. HAS BEEN
17 CONTRACTED TO DO. WE UTILIZE THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND
18 FAMILY SERVICES, T.I.L.P. AND 709 CASE PLANS TO PROVIDE
19 INDIVIDUAL GUIDANCE AND SUPPORT TOWARD THE COMPLETION OF THEIR
20 INDIVIDUAL, EDUCATIONAL AND EMPLOYMENT GOALS. WE ALSO
21 EMPHASIZE AND ENCOURAGE SAFE AFFORDABLE HOUSING, SELF-
22 ADVOCACY, GENERAL AWARENESS THROUGH INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS.
23 THE OUTCOMES ARE T.H.P.P. PROVIDES FOR LOS ANGELES COUNTY
24 SURELY WOULD INDICATE THAT T.H.P.P. BE CONSIDERED AS A REGULAR
25 PLACEMENT OPTION FOR THIS POPULATION. FURTHERMORE, IT PROVIDES



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1 SUBSTANTIAL QUALITY SERVICES ON A FORESEEABLE BUDGET. AGAIN,
2 T.H.P.P. AS A UNIT IS REQUESTING THE REASSURANCE THAT THE
3 FOSTER YOUTH HERE HAVE TAKEN A LEAP OF FAITH ON THEIR OWN
4 ABILITIES AND HAVE TRUSTED THE DEPARTMENT AND THE BOARD OF
5 SUPERVISORS ONE, TO HOLD THEIR BEST INTERESTS AT HEART AND,
6 TWO, TO MAKE SMART, AFFORDABLE, LONG-TERM FISCAL DECISIONS
7 THAT SUPPORT REAL PROGRESS. THE POPULATION'S FOCUS, IN
8 CONJUNCTION WITH EXPERIENCE AND MAJOR HARDSHIPS SUFFER FROM A
9 NEGATIVE CONNOTATION. AS A RESULT OUR YOUTH ARE BEING
10 HARASSED, MISTREATED AND NOW I CAN SAY UNDERESTIMATED BY THE
11 VERY DEPARTMENT THAT HAS BEEN MADE TO PROTECT AND MOTIVATE
12 THEM. THEIR VERSION OF SUCCESS IS DIFFERENT THAN THEIR OWN
13 INDIVIDUAL DEFINITIONS WHICH DOES NOT NECESSARILY MEAN THAT
14 THIS YOUNG PERSON IN OUR PROGRAM IS NOT A PRODUCTIVE MEMBER OF
15 SOCIETY. LIKE MY CO-WORKER OVER HERE SAID OFTEN, STRIVE FOR
16 SUCCESS, NOT SETTLE FOR LESS. OUR PROGRAM POSSESSES A PASSION
17 AND UNDERSTANDING OF THIS POPULATION THAT I FIRMLY BELIEVE THE
18 DEPARTMENT OF D.C.F.S. DOES NOT. ARE THEY NOT INTERESTED? NOT
19 NECESSARILY. DO THEY NOT CARE? NOT NECESSARILY. BUT I WILL SAY
20 THAT THEIR UTILIZATION OF AVAILABLE, VIABLE AND REAL RESOURCES
21 FOR THIS POPULATION NEEDS TO BE REDIRECTED. WE NEED
22 SUBSTANTIAL REFORM. NOT IN THE BACK ROOM BUT IN THE PUBLIC.

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1 **DANELLE WASHINGTON:** AND MOST OF ALSO THAT OUR YOUNG PEOPLE'S

3 DIRECTLY, PROMPTLY AND REALISTICALLY. THANK YOU SO MUCH.

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. LET ME ALSO CALL UP ANTONIA
6 RAMIREZ AND EDEN ROSEN. YES, MA'AM.

8 **KALISHA JAMES:** HI, MY NAME IS KALISHA JAMES. I'M 19 YEARS OLD.
9 I'M A CURRENT PARTICIPANT IN FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH. I'VE BEEN
10 IN THE PROGRAM SINCE I WAS 16 YEARS OLD. I ATTEND EL CAMINO
11 COLLEGE, WHICH I'M MAJORING IN ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE. I
12 HAVE BEEN IF FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH SINCE I WAS 16 IN 11TH
13 GRADE. I GRADUATED FROM HIGH SCHOOL WITH A 3.5, WHILE IN THE
14 PROGRAM, OBTAINED THREE JOBS. I WORK FOR THE CITY OF TORRANCE,
15 EL CAMINO COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP OFFICE AND I WORK FOR AN
16 INSURANCE COMPANY. I RECEIVED MY DRIVERS LICENSE AND PURCHASED
17 A VEHICLE WITH THE HELP OF T.H.P. THIS PROGRAM IS A STEPPING
18 STONE TO SUCCESS. THEY DON'T PROVIDE A PATH, THEY HELP YOU
19 CREATE YOUR OWN. THIS PROGRAM HAS TAUGHT ME RESPONSIBILITY,
20 LIFE SKILLS, MONEY MANAGEMENT AND TRUST THAT THERE ARE GOOD
21 PEOPLE OUT THERE AND PROGRAMS WHO ARE IN THE BUSINESS IN ORDER
22 TO SEE THE YOUTH EXPAND FROM THEIR SITUATIONS OF THEIR PAST TO

9 FAMILY. WE'VE BEEN THROUGH SO MUCH AS YOUTH. I'VE BEEN IN THE

11 SECUREMENT I KNOW AND RELIABLE RESOURCE I HAVE? THANK YOU.

13 LIVE IN THE FIRST STEPS FOR YOUTH. RECENTLY MY SOCIAL WORKER

23 HAVE FINALS SOON AFTER THAT. I AM RESPECTFULLY REQUESTING A
24 LITTLE MORE TIME OR AT LEAST TO FINISH MY SEMESTER OFF AT
25 T.H.P.P. THEN I AM WILLING TO GO TO A PLACE THEY RECOMMEND FOR



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1 ME. I DO FEEL, THOUGH, THAT THE PRESSURE AND THE RUDE THREATS

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU, MISS CHAVEZ. SUPERVISOR
12 MOLINA HAS TWO ADJOURNMENT MOTIONS?

13

14 **SUP. MOLINA:** MR. CHAIRMAN, I'D LIKE TO ASK THAT WE ADJOURN IN
15 THE MEMORY OF DR. HARRY PETER PACHON. HE'S A DISTINGUISHED
16 PROFESSOR AND RESPECTED AUTHORITY ON LATINO POLITICS AND
17 POLICY. DR. PACHON'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS WERE VERY IMPRESSIVE. IN
