SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WELL, THANK YOU VERY MUCH. WE 6 7 PROCEED WITH A SPECIAL PRESENTATION THIS MORNING. WE RECOGNIZE 8 THE CONSUL GENERAL OF MEXICO, THE HONORABLE DAVID FIGUEROA ORTEGA. MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, I'M 9 10 PLEASED TO ASK THE HONORABLE DAVID FIGUEROA ORTEGA, THE CONSUL GENERAL OF MEXICO, TO BE HERE WITH US THIS MORNING. FOR THE 11 PAST TWO YEARS, CONSUL GENERAL ORTEGA HAS HEADED A CONSULATE 12 THAT WAS FIRST ESTABLISHED IN LOS ANGELES NEARLY 127 YEARS 13 AGO. IT IS A GIVEN THAT ANY MEXICAN CONSULATE IN CALIFORNIA 14 WILL BE VERY, VERY ACTIVE, WITH DUTIES THAT INCLUDE EVERYTHING 15 16 FROM CULTURAL AND ECONOMIC DIPLOMACY TO ISSUING CONSULAR IDENTIFICATION CARDS. AND HIS JURISDICTION COVERS SEVEN 17 18 CALIFORNIA COUNTIES FROM ORANGE COUNTY IN THE SOUTH, TO SANTA 19 BARBARA COUNTY AND FRESNO IN THE NORTH AND HE HEADS ONE OF THE LARGEST STAFFS IN THE CONSULAR CORPS ANYWHERE TO BE FOUND. HE 20 IS THE SON OF A MEXICAN LABORER WHO PICKED STRAWBERRIES IN 21 22 NORTHERN CALIFORNIA. FROM AN EARLY AGE, HE WAS RAISED IN 23 MEXICO AND WENT ON TO EARN A BACHELOR'S DEGREE IN BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AND AN M.B.A. IN HUMAN RESOURCES, BOTH AT 24 25 MEXICAN UNIVERSITIES. WHEN WE WELCOMED HIM TWO YEARS AGO, WE



NOTED THAT BEFORE HE TOOK UP HIS POST, HE WAS AN ELECTED 1 OFFICIAL WHOSE CAMPAIGNS AGAINST DRUG DEALERS WERE SO 2 3 SUCCESSFUL THAT THERE WERE TWO ATTEMPTS TO CHALLENGE HIS VERY EXISTENCE. I'M GLAD TO NOTE THAT HE HAS SPENT A MUCH MORE 4 5 PEACEFUL TIME WITH US HERE IN LOS ANGELES. AND ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND OUR MORE THAN 10 MILLION 6 RESIDENTS, I WISH TO THANK YOU FOR YOUR UNTIRING LEADERSHIP 7 8 AND TO EXTEND TO YOU OUR SENSE OF FRIENDSHIP AND GRATITUDE. WE EXTEND OUR HEARTFELT WISHES FOR YOUR CONTINUING SUCCESS AS YOU 9 AND YOUR WIFE AND TWO YOUNG DAUGHTERS DEPART FROM THIS POST 10 11 HERE WITH US. BUT WE WANTED YOU TO KNOW THAT WE HAVE APPRECIATED VERY, VERY MUCH YOUR BEING HERE. LADIES AND 12 GENTLEMEN, OUR CONSUL GENERAL, THE ONE AND ONLY DAVID FIGUEROA 13 14 ORTEGA. [APPLAUSE.]

16 DAVID FIGUEROA ORTEGA: HONORABLE SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, SUPERVISOR ZEV 17 18 YAROSLAVSKY, SUPERVISOR DON KNABE, SUPERVISOR MICHAEL 19 ANTONOVICH, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, GOOD MORNING. THANK YOU FOR YOUR DISPOSITION AND OPENNESS TO MEET WITH ME TO TALK ABOUT MEXICO AND THE 24 MEXICAN COMMUNITY LIVING IN THE COUNTY. I FOUND OUR MEETINGS 25



VERY PRODUCTIVE AND INFORMATIVE. I AM ALSO GRATEFUL THAT I WAS 1 ABLE TO BUILD FRIENDSHIPS WITH YOU OVER THOSE TWO YEARS THAT I 2 3 SERVED MY COUNTRY IN LOS ANGELES. DURING MY TENURE, OUR CONSULATE DEVELOPED NEW RELATIONSHIPS AND STRENGTHENED ITS 4 5 INVOLVEMENT WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES, ELECTED OFFICIALS AND LEADERS OF COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AND BUSINESSES. NEEDLESS TO 6 SAY, I ALWAYS FOUND GREAT APPRECIATION FOR MEXICO AND 7 8 MEXICANS. I BELIEVE THE WELCOMING, DIVERSE AND FRIENDLY ENVIRONMENT IN LOS ANGELES PLAY A BIG ROLE IN OUR ABILITY TO 9 REACH OUT TO THE COMMUNITY AND FOR WORKING TOWARDS THE 10 11 EMPOWERMENT. THAT ENVIRONMENT IS PROMOTED BY INDIVIDUALS LIKE YOU WHO ARE LEADERS OF THIS WONDERFUL COMMUNITY. AS SOME OF 12 YOU MAY KNOW, I AM GOING BACK TO MEXICO TO WORK ON A NEW 13 CHALLENGE IN MY CAREER. PLEASE DO NOT HESITATE TO CONTACT ME 14 IF YOU VISIT SONORA, WHERE YOU WILL HAVE A FRIEND. THANK YOU 15 16 SO MUCH. [APPLAUSE.]

18 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, MEMBERS OF 19 THE BOARD, WE TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO PROCLAIM MAY AS "OLDER AMERICANS RECOGNITION MONTH" IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. AND 20 WE WANT TO GIVE A BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF 21 22 COMMUNITY AND SENIOR SERVICES FOR THEIR WORKING FOR OLDER 23 AMERICANS IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. WE HAVE WITH US TODAY MR. OTTO SOLORZANO. AND HE REPRESENTS THAT DEPARTMENT. AND IT 24 WAS IN APRIL OF 1963, THAT THEN PRESIDENT JOHN FITZGERALD 25



KENNEDY PROCLAIMED MAY AS "SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH." WHEN THIS 1 MONTH WAS ESTABLISHED, ONLY 17 MILLION LIVING AMERICANS HAD 2 3 REACHED THE AGE OF 65. TODAY, THERE ARE SOME 40 PLUS MILLION SENIORS NATIONWIDE, 17 IN 1963, OVER 40 TODAY. NOW IN THE LOS 4 5 ANGELES COUNTY AREA, SENIORS COMPRISE 11 PERCENT OF THE COUNTY'S POPULATION. SENIORS MAKE COUNTLESS CONTRIBUTIONS AS 6 7 ACTIVE PARTICIPANTS IN OUR COMMUNITIES BY VOLUNTEERING IN 8 PARKS, SCHOOLS AND FAITH-BASED AND SERVICE ORGANIZATIONS. LOCAL 721 LAUNCHED THE 14 INNOVATIONS PROJECT CONTEST. THE INNOVATIONS PROJECT CONTEST 15 16 ASKED STAFF TO SUBMIT INNOVATIVE IDEAS FOR IMPROVEMENT IN ONE OF FOUR AREAS: THE FIRST, CUSTOMER SERVICE AND PATIENT 17 18 SATISFACTION; THE SECOND ONE IS CLINICAL QUALITY; THIRD, 19 OPERATION EFFICIENCY AND COST CONTROL; AND, FINALLY, HUMAN RESOURCES. THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES AND S.E.I.U. 20 21 SELECTED 16 PROJECT TEAMS AS INNOVATIONS AWARDS WINNERS, WHICH 22 INCLUDED GRANT FUNDS PROVIDED BY THE BLUE SHIELD OF CALIFORNIA 23 FOUNDATION TO SUPPORT PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION. THE TOP FOUR PROJECTS WERE IDENTIFIED AS LUMINARY AWARD WINNERS, AND THEY 24 ARE HERE WITH US TODAY. MAY I THEN CALL FORWARD HARBOR 25



U.C.L.A. MEDICAL CENTER. GIVE THEM A ROUND OF APPLAUSE, 1 PLEASE, THE HARBOR U.C.L.A. MEDICAL CENTER? [APPLAUSE.] DR. 2 3 LOREN MILLER IS HERE TO REPRESENT THE DEPARTMENT OF INFECTION PREVENTION AND CONTROL. THAT TEAM DID EXCEEDINGLY WELL WITH A 4 5 FULL RANGE OF PEOPLE, WITH NURSES AND DOCTORS WORKING TOGETHER TO DISTINGUISH THEMSELVES, THEREFORE THEY ARE HERE BECAUSE 6 7 THEY IMPLEMENTED A PROJECT CALLED PROVIDING FEEDBACK OF HAND 8 HYGIENE ADEOUACY TO FRONTLINE PROVIDERS. INFECTION CONTROL 9 EXPERTS AGREE THAT THE MOST IMPORTANT WEAPON AGAINST HEALTHCARE-ASSOCIATED INFECTIONS IS HAND HYGIENE. SO BE 10 11 CAREFUL WHO YOU SHAKE HANDS WITH OUT THERE. THE GOAL OF THE PROJECT WAS TO ACCESS ADEOUACY OF HAND HYGIENE AMONG CLINICAL 12 STAFF AT HARBOR U.C.L.A., REPORT THE RESULTS TO THE FRONTLINE 13 PROVIDERS AND PROVIDE POCKET HAND SANITIZERS AND BUTTONS TO 14 RAISE AWARENESS AND IMPROVE HAND HYGIENE. THE TEAMWORK WAS 15 16 EXTRAORDINARY. TOOK RANDOM SAMPLES OF GERM CULTURES FROM STAFF AND FOUND A 49 PERCENT DECREASE IN GERM COLONY COUNTS ON THE 17 18 HANDS OF STAFF IN THE FIRST WEEK. SO, PLEASE, AGAIN, JOIN ME 19 IN CONGRATULATING HARBOR U.C.L.A., THE DEPARTMENT OF INFECTION PREVENTION AND CONTROL, FOR THEIR SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF 20 THEIR PROJECT AS INNOVATORS. A BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE. 21 22 [APPLAUSE.] [LAUGHTER.] ALL RIGHT. THE SECOND GROUP IS MID VALLEY COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH CENTER. DR. LACEY WYATT, DOCTOR OF 23 FAMILY MEDICINE; AND MARY JOAN SANTINA, SUPERVISING NURSE FOR 24 THE CLINICS. DR. WYATT IS HERE WITH A GROUP OF NURSES AND 25



OTHER TEAM MEMBERS. THEIR GOAL WAS TO INCREASE MEDICATION 1 ADHERENCE THROUGH THE USE OF PILL ORGANIZERS AND SMALL TOTE 2 BAGS. THEY HAD A BUDGET OF \$2,526. THE TEAM TARGETED PATIENTS 3 THAT TAKE MORE THAN THREE MEDICATIONS DAILY. THE PROVIDERS 4 5 WOULD SIT DOWN WITH PATIENTS AND TEACH THEM ABOUT MEDICATIONS THEY WERE TAKING. AFTERWARDS, THE PROVIDERS WOULD GIVE THE 6 PATIENTS PILL BOXES AND TOTES SO THAT THEY COULD KEEP THEIR 7 8 PILLS ORGANIZED. THE PATIENTS WERE VERY, VERY HAPPY TO RECEIVE 9 THE PILL BOXES BECAUSE IT HELPS THEM TO UNDERSTAND WHAT MEDICATIONS THEY ARE TAKING AND WHY THEY ARE TAKING EACH 10 MEDICATION AND HOW TO TAKE THEM. SO PLEASE JOIN ME IN 11 CONGRATULATING THE TEAM FROM MID VALLEY HEALTH CENTER FOR 12 HELPING TO ORGANIZE THOSE PILLS IN THE RIGHT BOXES. GIVE THEM 13 A BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE. [APPLAUSE.] WISH I HAD MY PILL 14 ORGANIZER WITH ME HERE TODAY TO SEE IF IT WAS ALL THAT IT 15 16 SHOULD BE. HOW ABOUT THOSE FROM COASTAL HEALTH CENTERS? COMPRISED OF LONG BEACH COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH CENTER, 17 18 BELLFLOWER HEALTH CENTER AND WILMINGTON HEALTH CENTER? A BIG 19 ROUND OF APPLAUSE FOR THEM. [APPLAUSE.] DONNA, WE'RE GLAD THAT YOU'RE HERE WITH US AND LILLIAN, WE APPRECIATE YOUR BEING 20 21 HERE. IS VANESSA AND DOROTHY HERE, AS WELL? OUT IN THE 22 AUDIENCE. GIVE THEM A SHOUT OUT IN THE AUDIENCE. IMPLEMENTATION, EACH FACILITY'S WALLS WERE MOSTLY BARE. THE 1 COASTAL CENTER'S TEAM WORKED TOGETHER TO DEVELOP DECALS WITH 2 3 PICTURES OF ANIMALS, TREES, FLOWERS, GAMES AND THE LIKE TO PLACE ON THOSE WALLS. THE PATIENTS COMMENTED HOW MUCH THEY 4 5 LOVE AND APPRECIATE THE IMPROVEMENTS MADE ON THE DECOR AND THE COLORS ON THE WALLS. WORK ENTERPRISES PROVIDED 20 A PLACE FOR CLIENTS TO PRACTICE BUILDING APPROPRIATE WORK 21 22 HABITS AND SKILLS SO THEY CAN ENGAGE IN MEANINGFUL WORK 23 ACTIVITY IN A STRUCTURED AND ADAPTED ENVIRONMENT. SAMPLE ACTIVITIES INCLUDED PHOTO EDITING, CONSTRUCTION, SANDING, 24 JEWELRY MAKING AND CERAMICS. THE PROGRAM HELPED CLIENTS GAIN, 25



ONE, SELF-ESTEEM; TWO, CONFIDENCE; AND, THREE, A SENSE OF 1 PURPOSE, WHICH IN TURN EMPOWERS THEM TO TAKE THE NEXT STEP 2 3 TOWARD COMMUNITY REINTEGRATION. SO LET'S GIVE A BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE TO THE RANCHO WORKS ENTERPRISE FOR THE WORK THAT 4 5 THEY'VE DONE IN RESTORING A SENSE OF DIGNITY TO THEIR PATIENTS. A BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE FOR ALL OF THEM. THANK YOU.

GRADUATED FROM SOUTHWESTERN OREGON COLLEGE WITH AN A.A. IN 1 FIRE SCIENCE. SHE STARTED IN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, LOS 2 3 ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IN SEPTEMBER 2007, SHE GRADUATED THE ACADEMY IN 2008 AND WAS ASSIGNED TO CENTURY 4 5 REGIONAL DETENTION FACILITY IN LYNWOOD, WHICH IS HER PRESENT ASSIGNMENT. ON APRIL 27, 2013, THAT'S JUST A FEW WEEKS AGO, 6 7 DEPUTY UNDERWOOD-NUNEZ WAS HAVING DINNER WITH HER FAMILY IN 8 THE SILVERWOOD LAKE CAMPGROUND IN SAN BERNADINO COUNTY WHEN SHE HEARD SCREAMING COMING FROM THE LAKE. NATHAN, AGE 3, AND VANNA AGE 2; SOON TO BE THREE CHILDREN. SHE 1 IS 6-1/2 MONTHS PREGNANT. THIS IS WHAT I'VE BEEN TOLD. IT'S 2 REALLY NONE OF ANYBODY'S BUSINESS, BUT SINCE IT'S IN MY 3 TALKING POINTS, I GUESS I'M SUPPOSED TO SAY THAT. HER 4 5 GRANDPARENTS I THINK ARE HERE. AND GLAD TO HAVE YOU HERE. SO WE WANTED TO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY, YOU KNOW, YOU READ A LOT 6 OF STUFF ABOUT OUR PUBLIC EMPLOYEES WHICH ARE NOT 7 8 COMPLIMENTARY, BUT THE FACT IS THAT MORE OFTEN THAN NOT, FAR MORE OFTEN THAN NOT, OUR PUBLIC EMPLOYEES DO THE KINDS OF 9 THINGS THAT JENNA DID AND ARE WILLING TO PUT THEMSELVES AND 10 11 THEIR LIVES AT RISK IN ORDER TO SAVE SOMEONE ELSE. HISTORICAL EXPERIENCE. LULA AND HER HUSBAND, IRWIN, FOUNDED 1 THE COMPANY IN 1980 AS A CREATIVE OUTLET FOR MINORITY DANCE 2 3 ARTISTS IN THE INNER CITY. AND TODAY THE COMPANY HAS DANCED IN MORE THAN 150 U.S. CITIES AND ABROAD IN GERMANY, SPAIN, 4 5 KOSOVO, MEXICO, CANADA, CHINA AND RUSSIA. IN 1983, LULA ESTABLISHED HER OWN DANCE SCHOOL TO PROVIDE LOW COST AND FREE 6 7 DANCE CLASSES TO NEIGHBORHOOD CHILDREN THROUGH AN AFTER SCHOOL 8 PROGRAM CALLED "I DO DANCE, NOT DRUGS". OVER ITS THREE 9 DECADES, THE LULA WASHINGTON DANCE CENTER SCHOOL HAS PRODUCED A CADRE OF HIGH OUALITY PROFESSIONAL DANCERS WHILE ALSO 10 11 TREATING THOUSANDS OF OTHERS TO THE JOYS OF DANCE. THE JOHN ANSON FORD AMPHITHEATER 2013 SEASON OPENS ON JUNE 7 WITH A 12 DIVERSE LINEUP OF PERFORMANCES THAT CELEBRATE THE VIBRANT 13 ARTISTIC PRACTICES, CULTURES AND COMMUNITIES OF LOS ANGELES 14 COUNTY. COAUTHORED THE LEGISLATION THAT ALLOWED LOCKHEED TO SELL THE 1 BOB HOPE AIRPORT, BURBANK, TO PASADENA, GLENDALE, AND BURBANK. 2 3 AS A RESULT, THAT AIRPORT IS ONE OF OUR VITAL TRANSIT CENTERS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. ALSO, A FRIEND OF MANY OF US, STEVE 4 5 KINNEY, WHO PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 69. HE SERVED IN THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE AND THEN STARTED PUBLIC OPINION 6 7 STRATEGIES, RUNNING THE FIRM'S CALIFORNIA OFFICE AND WAS THE 8 REPUBLICAN NATIONAL COMMITTEE'S REGIONAL POLITICAL DIRECTOR. AND HE PASSED AWAY WITH CANCER. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE, 9 CINDY. FANNIE LOUISE HOLDEN PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 78. SHE 10 11 IS THE MOTHER OF ASSEMBLY MEMBER CHRIS HOLDEN AND A MEMBER OF THE SCOTT UNITED METHODIST CHURCH. AND WE'LL HAVE ALL MEMBERS 12 ON THAT. IN ADDITION TO CHRIS, SHE LEAVES BEHIND HER SON, 13 REGGIE; AND HER SISTERS, ANNIE AND MAXINE. NEIL SALISIAN 14 PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 84, MEMBER OF THE TOURNAMENT OF 15 16 ROSES, SERVING ON 19 DIFFERENT COMMITTEES DURING HIS 45 YEARS OF SERVICE. AND HE WAS HE WAS QUITE INVOLVED IN THE COMMUNITY. 17 18 DONALD ROSS, LONGTIME RESIDENT OF LANCASTER, WAS DEPUTY 19 DIRECTOR OF THE ROCKET PROPULSION LABORATORY AT EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE FOR 12 YEARS. RETIRED AFTER 35 YEARS 12 WITH THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. GLADYS 13 MCKNIGHT-PURVIS PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 91. LONGTIME 14 RESIDENT OF THE ANTELOPE VALLEY. JANET ARNERICH PASSED AWAY AT 15 16 THE AGE OF 104, FORMER DENTAL HYGIENIST, IS SURVIVED BY HER 17 SON, TOM; AND HER GRANDDAUGHTER, DR. CHRISTI. FRANK DENHARTOG, 18 LONGTIME BUSINESS OWNER OF SIR JAX MEATS AND DELI, SURVIVED BY 19 HIS WIFE OF 51 YEARS, FROM THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY. ERIC PREVEN AND GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL. MR. PREVEN? 14 15 ERIC PREVEN: LET ME JUST GET ORGANIZED BEFORE YOU START. 16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ALL RIGHT. WE'RE MOVING AS 17 18 EXPEDITIOUSLY AS WE CAN FOR THE BALANCE OF THE AGENDA. YOU CAN 19 PROCEED. 20 21 ERIC PREVEN: WHY HAS IT BEEN REDUCED TO TWO MINUTES, SIR? 22 23 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: I JUST GAVE YOU AN EXPLANATION. 24 PROCEED, PLEASE. 25

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ERIC PREVEN: OKAY. ITEM NO. 60, YES, OF COURSE, THIS IS THE 1 2 C.E.O.'S -- YEAH IT WAS ALREADY STARTED. DON'T WORRY, SIR. 3 THEY'RE REDUCING. I APPRECIATE THAT. YOU'RE A GOOD MAN. 4 5 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: PROCEED. 6 ERIC PREVEN: THANK YOU. THIS IS THE FOSTER FAMILY AGENCY, 7 8 THAT'S AN F.F.A. AND THIS IS BASICALLY IN ADVANCE OF THE FINAL BUDGET CHANGES, WE'RE HAVING A DISCUSSION ABOUT WHETHER OR NOT 9 IT'S A GOOD PLAN TO PUT INTO PLACE SEVEN NEW POSITIONS THAT 10 SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY AND THE D.C.F.S. HAVE EARMARKED FOR THE 11 ROLE OF MONITORING THESE FACILITIES THAT HAVE NOT BEEN LIVING 12 UP TO THE STANDARDS THAT WE EXPECT. THE PROBLEM IS AND IT'S A 13 KEY CENTRAL PROBLEM DOWN HERE AT L.A. COUNTY HALL IS THAT THIS 14 IS MORE SELF REVIEW. YOU SAY NO, NO, THE COUNTY WILL BE 15 16 LOOKING AT THESE PROVIDERS. IT'S NOT SELF REVIEW. BUT THESE ARE D.C.F.S. FOLKS. AND D.C.F.S. IS A STORIED UNIT HERE IN 17 18 L.A. COUNTY. IT HAS AN ENORMOUS \$1.8 BILLION BUDGET. IT HAS 19 OVER 7,000 EMPLOYEES. THEY SERVICE ROUGHLY 35,000 YOUNG PEOPLE. AND, BELIEVE IT OR NOT, THERE IS A SUBSTANTIAL CONCERN 20 21 THAT THIS DIVISION THAT INARGUABLY DOES SOME GOOD BY 22 INTERVENING WHERE CHILDREN HAVE BEEN IN HARM'S WAY OR ABUSED 23 IS ALSO A DEVASTATING FAILURE IN THE WAY THAT IT'S SET UP. THERE IS CONSTANT, MEANINGLESS COURT HEARINGS THAT GO AROUND 24 IN CIRCLES. IT FEEDS A MILL THAT ABSORBS TREMENDOUS LEGAL 25



DOLLARS. RICHARD DROOYAN, WHO WILL BE REPORTING TO THE BOARD 1 IN A MOMENT ON THE CITIZENS COMMISSION ON JAIL VIOLENCE, IS 2 3 ALSO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE BOARD OF CHILDREN, SOMETHING, NETWORK, WHICH IS THE LEGAL AID GROUP THAT PROVIDES 4 5 AID FOR BASICALLY YOUNG PEOPLE WHO HAVE NO REPRESENTATION, WHICH IS ALL OF THEM, BECAUSE THEY'RE ALL IN A VERY DIFFICULT 6 STRUGGLE TO EITHER BE PUT BACK INTO THE HOME WHERE THEY'RE 7 8 SUPPOSED TO BE OR TAKEN CARE OF. IT'S GOING VERY BADLY, TO BE 9 HONEST. AND I'M CONCERNED THAT BY ADDING SEVEN PEOPLE OF A SENIOR LEVEL IN D.C.F.S. TO THAT MIX TO MOVE AROUND SOME 10 11 OTHERS, WE ARE SIMPLY MOVING AROUND THE PIECES. I SUGGEST AN OUTSIDE OVERSIGHT ENTITY. 12

14 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: MR. PREVEN, SUPERVISOR KNABE
15 REMINDS ME THAT YOUR TIME HAS EXPIRED.

17 ERIC PREVEN: SUPERVISOR KNABE MAY BE CORRECT.

19 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: MAY I OFFER YOU THIS INSIGHT, 20 YOU DID GET THE EXPLANATION AS TO WHY S-1 WAS CONTINUED, DID 21 YOU NOT HEAR IT? S-1?

23 ERIC PREVEN: WHAT ABOUT IT, SIR?

16	SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: DR. CLAVREUL? WOULD YOU RESTRAIN
17	MR. PREVEN, PLEASE? THAT'S YOUR NEW ASSIGNMENT.

21	DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL: GOOD AFTERNOON, BOARD OF SUPERVISORS,
22	DR. GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL. I THINK IT IS THE FIRST TIME I SPEAK
23	ON AN ITEM HAVING TO DO WITH FOSTER CARE AND THE CHILDREN AND
24	SO ON BECAUSE I'M SO UPSET ABOUT IT. I USUALLY DON'T WANT TO
25	EVEN ADDRESS IT. I WAS A PERSON WHOSE TWO CHILDREN WERE



KIDNAPPED BY HER HUSBAND. AND I COULD NOT GET THE FOSTER CARE 1 TO HELP IN ANY WAY. AND THEY ALWAYS MADE THE CHILDREN LIE. SO 2 3 THAT'S WHY I DO NOT ADDRESS THAT ISSUE. I'M SURE, YOU KNOW, I'VE BEEN MONITORING THE BOARD SINCE 1999. I CANNOT BELIEVE 4 5 THAT ALL THE PARENTS WHO HAVE COME HERE EVERY TUESDAY HAVE LIED. I THINK BY CHANCE ALONE MANY OF THEM HAVE BEEN TELLING 6 7 THE TRUTH. IF YOU ARE GOING TO USE SEVEN PEOPLE TO REVIEW THE 8 D.H.S., WHAT I WOULD ADVISE IS THAT YOU HAVE THEM AS A 9 SEPARATE ENTITY, VERY MUCH LIKE A QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM OF HOSPITAL WHERE THOSE SEVEN INDIVIDUALS WILL REPORT TO YOU 10 DIRECTLY OF WHAT'S GOING ON WITH D.H.S. 20 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY,
21 DR. CLAVREUL. ALL RIGHT. LET'S PROCEED WITH THE ITEM.
22 SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY, IF YOU WISH TO BE HEARD, THE FLOOR IS
23 YOURS. IS THE DEPARTMENT HEAD HERE BY ANY CHANCE SO THAT WE

SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: I THINK THEY ARE. I THINK THEY ARE HERE.
 THERE HE IS. MR. CHAIRMAN, I DON'T HAVE -- WELL, I DON'T HAVE
 ANY QUESTIONS, BUT PERHAPS MR. BROWNING HAS SOMETHING HE WANTS
 TO IMPART. I'M READY TO MOVE ON THIS. BUT, MR. BROWNING, DO
 YOU HAVE JUST A SUCCINCT SUMMARY OF WHAT THIS THIS ITEM MEANS
 TO YOUR DEPARTMENT, WHAT THE REASON FOR YOUR REQUEST WAS?

8 PHILIP BROWNING: I THINK THIS WAS AN ISSUE THAT HAD BEEN 9 DISCUSSED WITH THE BOARD A COUPLE TIMES. WE PREPARED DOCUMENTATION. WE TALKED ABOUT IT FOR ABOUT 25 MINUTES LAST 10 11 WEEK. WHAT WE DID WAS TO GO BACK TO THE CLUSTER AND HAVE A FAIR AMOUNT OF TIME SPENT PROVIDING CLARIFICATION. I THINK THE 12 CHAIR ASKED THAT WE TAKE THIS BACK THROUGH THE CLUSTER. I 13 BELIEVE ALL THE QUESTIONS, TO MY KNOWLEDGE, HAVE BEEN ASKED. 14 15 WE'VE SENT WRITTEN RESPONSES BACK ON ALL OF THEM, I BELIEVE, 16 WITH THE EXCEPTION OF MAYBE ONE. THE BOTTOM LINE IS: THIS WILL ASSIST US IN ENSURING THAT STATE-LICENSED FOSTER HOMES AND 17 18 GROUP HOMES ARE MONITORED TO THE SAME LEVEL AS THE FOSTER 19 FAMILY AGENCIES, WHICH I THINK WE ALL BELIEVE WILL BE A WAY TO MORE SYSTEMICALLY ADDRESS THE ISSUE OF ABUSE AND NEGLECT. 20

22 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THIS UNIT IN THE DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN CUT
23 BACK OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS, IS THAT CORRECT? WHAT WAS
24 THE SIZE OF THE UNIT AT ITS PEAK AND WHAT IS IT NOW?



PHILIP BROWNING: IF WE LOOK BACK TO 2003, WE HAD ABOUT 50, 51 1 PEOPLE DOING THE SAME THING. WE HAVE 36 PEOPLE DOING THAT 2 TODAY. SO WE'VE TAKEN A CUT OF 15 STAFF PERSONS OVER THE LAST 3 10 YEARS. AND, FRANKLY, STAFF CUTS DO HAVE AN IMPACT. AND SO I 4 5 THINK AT ONE POINT THERE WAS A BELIEF THAT WE NEEDED TO MOVE AS MANY PEOPLE AS POSSIBLE BACK TO THE LINE. THAT WAS DONE. 6 BUT I THINK THERE ARE SOME CONSEQUENCES ANY TIME THOSE KIND OF 7 8 DECISIONS ARE MADE. AND SO AT THIS TIME WE'RE REQUESTING THE 9 SEVEN ADDITIONAL STAFF, NOT AS THE TOTAL SOLUTION. THERE'S A MOTION, I THINK, THAT WE'RE WORKING ON ABOUT HOW WE COULD MORE 10 11 SYSTEMICALLY ADDRESS THE MONITORING ISSUE GLOBALLY FOR THE DEPARTMENT. THERE ARE OTHER DEPARTMENTS WHICH HAVE SIMILAR 12 ISSUES IN TERMS OF MONITORING CONTRACTS. WE'VE REACHED OUT TO 13 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, TO THE CASEY FOUNDATION AND TO SOME 14 OTHER ENTITIES TO SEE WHAT'S BEING DONE THAT WE MIGHT 15 16 REPLICATE HERE. WE'VE ALSO REACHED OUT TO SOME PRIVATE FIRMS THAT WE THINK MIGHT BE ABLE TO PROVIDE SOME ASSISTANCE TO US 17 18 IN PERFORMING THIS TASK. BUT THOSE ARE LONGER-TERM SOLUTIONS. 19 THOSE ARE NOT SHORT-TERM, TOMORROW KIND OF SOLUTIONS. BUT THEY ARE ONES THAT WE'RE GOING TO COME BACK AND PUT IN THE REPORT 20 THAT'S DUE TO THE BOARD WITHIN A VERY SHORT PERIOD OF TIME, 21 22 ALTHOUGH I WOULD JUST BE HONEST AND SAY WE PROBABLY NEED MORE 23 TIME THAN JUST THAT 30-DAY MOTION PROVIDED.

SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: OKAY. BUT AS TO THIS ITEM, THESE SEVEN 1 POSITIONS, YOU BELIEVE THAT THE SOONER YOU GET MOVING ON THEM, 2 3 THE BETTER? 4 5 PHILIP BROWNING: YES, SIR. 6 7 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: I WON'T TAKE ANYMORE TIME, MR. CHAIRMAN. 8 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ON THAT NOTE, I THINK IT SHOULD 9 BE CLEAR THAT THIS MOTION SEEKS NOT TO BE EXHAUSTIVE WITH 10 RESPECT TO THE ISSUES BEFORE US. THE WAY I INTERPRET THIS 11 MOTION IS THAT WE CAN'T HAVE IT BOTH WAYS: ONE, TO ON THE ONE 12 HAND TO CLAIM THAT THESE PROBLEMS CONTINUE AND WE DO NOTHING 13 ABOUT IT. THIS IS AN ATTEMPT TO DO SOMETHING ABOUT THE PROBLEM 14 15 BY INCREASING THE RESOURCES, HUMAN RESOURCES, THAT THE 16 DEPARTMENT HAS TO ADDRESS THIS IN A MORE PROACTIVE AND THOROUGH MANNER. NOW, THE CRITIQUE HAS BEEN OFFERED THAT IT IS 17 18 STAFF. AND STAFF IS THE PROBLEM. NO. I TAKE THIS MOTION TO 19 BELIEVE THAT STAFF SHOULD BE CAUSED TO MEET EXPECTATIONS BY VIRTUE OF THE POSITIONS BEING FILLED. I DO NOT THINK THIS IS 20 21 AN ATTEMPT TO PRECLUDE ANY OTHER; THAT IS, INDEPENDENT OR 22 OUTSIDE WORK THAT MAY BE WARRANTED. IT IS WORTH NOTING THAT 23 THERE IS A UNIT THAT THE DEPARTMENT; THAT IS, THE BOARD DID ESTABLISH, C.S.I.U., THAT HAS A ROLE THAT IS INDEPENDENT OF 24 THE DEPARTMENT IN TERMS OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES-25



RELATED ISSUES. ITS SCOPE IS NARROW. BUT NONETHELESS 1 INDEPENDENT. SO THIS MOTION SEEKS TO ADDRESS AT LEAST A PART 2 3 OF THE PROBLEM WHERE THE DEPARTMENT IS SHORT-HANDED. AND I WILL REPEAT THE POINT. WE CAN'T CAUSE THE DEPARTMENT NOT TO 4 5 FUNCTION AT THE CAPACITY THAT IT NEEDS TO FUNCTION AND THEN CONTINUE TO CRITICIZE, THAT IS, HAMMER THE DEPARTMENT FOR WHAT 6 IT IS AND IS NOT DOING. I THINK THAT'S THE SPIRIT OF THE 7 8 MOTION, IS IT NOT SUPERVISOR? 9 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: MR. CHAIRMAN, I COULDN'T HAVE SAID IT BETTER 10 11 MYSELF. 12 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ALL RIGHT. SO THEN THE SEPARATE 13 SET OF ISSUES, TAKE NOTE OF THE FACT THAT SUPERVISOR KNABE 14 15 MAKES A MOTION AMENDMENT, KUMBAYA. 16 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: CONDITIONED ON YOU'RE ABLE TO PRONOUNCE MY 17 18 NAME. 19 20 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WELL, THEN WE'RE IN DEEP TROUBLE 21 TODAY, OBVIOUSLY. THERE ARE A SET OF QUESTIONS THAT ONE BOARD 22 MEMBER HAS RAISED THAT ARE INCOMPLETE. ANGELES. AND THAT EFFORT WAS -- THANK YOU. THAT EFFORT WAS LED 1 BY SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH AND W3 VERY MUCH APPRECIATE IT. AND I 2 3 ALSO THANK SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY FOR HIS INTEREST IN DOING SOMETHING TO ALLEVIATE THE CONDITIONS IN THE COUNTY JAILS THAT 4 5 PREVENT THE MENTALLY ILL INMATES FROM RECEIVING THE TREATMENT THEY NEED AND THE SECURITY AND PROTECTION THAT THEIR ILLNESS 6 7 DEMANDS. A.B.1421, KNOWN AS LAURA'S LAW, IF FULLY IMPLEMENTED 8 COULD GREATLY REDUCE THE NUMBER OF MENTALLY ILL PEOPLE WHO GET 9 ARRESTED AND JAILED IN THE FIRST PLACE. THIS WOULD GREATLY REDUCE COSTS TO THE COUNTY FOR HOSPITALIZATIONS AND 10 11 INCARCERATIONS BECAUSE IT WOULD SHIFT THE TREATMENT COSTS OF MEDI-CAL AND MENTAL HEALTH FUNDING. LAURA'S LAW HELPS PEOPLE 12 13 GET INTO TREATMENT IN COMMUNITY TREATMENT CENTERS FOR SEVERE MENTAL ILLNESS BEFORE THEY DETERIORATE TO THE POINT OF BEING 14 INCARCERATED OR HOSPITALIZED. SUCH OUTPATIENT COMMUNITY 15 16 TREATMENT SAVES MONEY. I HAVE HERE A COPY OF A STUDY OF NEW YORK'S SIMILAR KENDRA'S LAW THAT SHOWS THAT IN THE FIRST YEAR 17 18 OF IMPLEMENTATION, THE PROGRAM WAS COST-NEUTRAL. AND OVER THE 19 FOLLOWING YEARS, THE STATE OF NEW YORK ACTUALLY SPENT MUCH LESS ON INCARCERATION AND HOSPITALIZATION. IN FACT, THE 20 INCARCERATION RATES FOR MENTALLY ILL PEOPLE WERE REDUCED BY 21 22 ABOUT 80 PERCENT, AS WERE HOSPITALIZATION RATES. IN ADDITION 23 TO THOSE COSTS, SCIENTISTS NOW KNOW THAT THE SOONER SOMEONE RECEIVES TREATMENT, LESS BRAIN DAMAGE IS INCURRED BY PEOPLE 24 WITH SCHIZOPHRENIA. AND THEY WILL HAVE A BETTER OUTCOME. THERE 25



IS A MUCH REDUCED INCIDENCE OF HOSPITALIZATION OF PEOPLE WHOSE
 TREATMENT IS BEING RIGOROUSLY MONITORED. OUR CURRENT PRACTICE
 OF ALLOWING PEOPLE TO DETERIORATE ON THE STREETS IN FILTH AND
 VIOLENCE TO THE POINT WHERE THEY DIE OR ARE ARRESTED IS

GINA CLAYTON AND I AM THE RESEARCH AND POLICY ASSOCIATE FOR
THE LOS ANGELES REGIONAL REENTRY PARTNERSHIP, WHICH IS A BODY
OF MORE THAN 125 PUBLIC AND PRIVATE ORGANIZATIONS AND AGENCIES
FOCUSED ON THE SUCCESSFUL REINTEGRATION OF FORMERLY
INCARCERATED INDIVIDUALS TO INCREASE PUBLIC SAFETY AND REDUCE



RECIDIVISM. THE LOS ANGELES REGIONAL REENTRY PARTNERSHIP IS IN 1 SUPPORT OF SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY'S MOTION, CALLING FOR 2 3 ANALYSIS OF JAIL CONSTRUCTION OR RENOVATION THAT LOOKS INTO WHETHER INSTEAD OF MERELY REPLACING MEN'S CENTRAL WITH A \$1 4 5 BILLION NEW JAIL FACILITY, WHETHER IT MAKES SENSE TO REPLACE SOME OF THE MEN'S CENTRAL FACILITY WITH AN INTEGRATED INMATE 6 7 TREATMENT CENTER AND WHETHER THIS WOULD BETTER SERVE THE 8 COMMUNITY'S INTERESTS. THE ISSUE OF APPROPRIATELY HOUSING AND 9 PROVIDING MEDICAL TREATMENT TO THE LARGE PERCENTAGE OF PERSONS IN JAIL WITH MENTAL ILLNESS AND MEDICAL CONDITIONS IS AN 10 11 INCREDIBLY IMPORTANT ONE. IT IS AN ISSUE OF PUBLIC SAFETY, HUMANE TREATMENT AND USING TAXPAYER PUBLIC SAFETY DOLLARS IN A 12 MANNER THAT IS EFFICIENT, EFFECTIVE AND EVIDENCE-BASED. THE 13 HOUSING OF MENTALLY AND MEDICALLY ILL INMATES WITH THE GENERAL 14 POPULATION RESULTS IN UNNECESSARY HARM AND TRAUMA TO 15 16 INDIVIDUALS AND AN EXACERBATION OF SYMPTOMS AND COSTS THE COUNTY DOLLARS AND OUTCOMES. WHILE L.A.R.P., THE LOS ANGELES 17 18 REGIONAL REENTRY PARTNERSHIP IS NOT CURRENTLY TAKING A 19 POSITION ON JAIL CONSTRUCTION OR RENOVATION, WE ADAMANTLY SUPPORT THAT WHICH LEADS TO LOWER RECIDIVISM, COORDINATED 20 21 SERVICE DELIVERY, AND IMPROVED PUBLIC SAFETY. SUPERVISOR 22 YAROSLAVSKY'S MOTION HELPS CHART THAT COURSE. THEREFORE 23 L.A.R.P. SUPPORTS THIS MOTION. AND FINALLY, RESPECTFULLY PLEADS WITH THIS BODY THAT REGARDLESS OF JAIL CONSTRUCTION OR 24 RENOVATION PLANS, THIS BOARD FOCUS ON AND MOVE FORWARD WITH 25



THE IMPLEMENTATION OF PRETRIAL RELEASE AND ALTERNATIVES TO
 INCARCERATION. WE NEED TO BE PRIORITIZING ALTERNATIVES TO
 INCARCERATION AND PRETRIAL RELEASE AND BE EXPEDITIOUS ABOUT

HOWEVER, AT THIS TIME, I BELIEVE THAT 13 THERE IS AN URGENCY TO DO SOMETHING FOR THE MENTALLY ILL 14 INCARCERATED IN JAIL MENTAL HEALTH IN TOWER 1 OF LOS ANGELES 15 16 COUNTY. MY SON HAPPENS TO BE INCARCERATED THERE. AND I HAVE LEARNED THAT ALTHOUGH THE GENERAL POPULATION IN TWIN TOWERS 17 18 HAS ACCESS TO WHAT'S CALLED THE EDUCATIONAL-BASED 19 INCARCERATION PROGRAM WHERE THEY CAN TAKE ALL KINDS OF CLASSES, COMPUTER CLASSES, OCCUPATIONAL TRAINING, G.E.D., ET 20 CETERA, ET CETERA, THAT IS NOT AVAILABLE TO INMATES IN JAIL 21 22 MENTAL HEALTH. AND I HAVE SPOKEN IN FRONT OF THE MENTAL HEALTH 23 COMMISSION. AND I'M ASKING THEM TO GET IN TOUCH -- OR TO GET A 24 MEETING GOING WITH JAIL MENTAL HEALTH AND THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH AND THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AS WELL AS THE 25



E.B.I. PROGRAM AND SIT DOWN AND TALK ABOUT WHAT CAN BE 1 IMPLEMENTED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. THERE IS NOTHING FOR THESE 2 3 MEN TO DO. I KNOW THAT BECAUSE I KNOW WHAT'S HAPPENING WITH MY SON. THEY HAVE AT MOST ONE GROUP A DAY FOR 32 INMATES ON EACH 4 5 POD. I FEEL THERE'S AN URGENCY OF NOW BECAUSE OF COURSE I CARE ABOUT MY SON AND I DON'T WANT HIM TO GET SICKER, WHICH HE HAS 6 SINCE HE'S BEEN INCARCERATED, GOTTEN SICKER, ALMOST DIED AND 7 8 HAD TO BE RUSHED TO THE HOSPITAL. I'M SORRY, I'M VERY 11 PASSIONATE ABOUT TRYING TO HELP MENTALLY ILL PEOPLE THAT ARE INCARCERATED IN OUR COUNTY. THANK YOU. 12

BRITTNEY WEISSMAN: HELLO, I'M BRITTNEY WEISSMAN, I'M EXECUTIVE 17 18 DIRECTOR OF N.A.M.I., LOS ANGELES COUNCIL. N.A.M.I. IS A 19 GRASSROOTS VOLUNTEER-DRIVEN ORGANIZATION DEDICATED TO IMPROVING THE LIVES OF THOSE WHO ARE IMPACTED BY MENTAL 20 ILLNESS. WE ALSO SUPPORT THIS MOTION. I'M JOINED TODAY BY 21 22 THESE THREE LADIES WHO ARE REPRESENTATIVES OF N.A.M.I., AND 23 N.A.M.I. IS A COUNTY-WIDE ORGANIZATION. WE HAVE 12 AFFILIATES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY. I SERVE AS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE 24 COUNTY COUNSEL WHICH REPRESENTS ALL OF THE 12 AFFILIATES. 25

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WE'RE HAPPY TO BE HERE. WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF THIS 1 MOTION. AND I'LL LET MY COLLEAGUES SPEAK TO MORE DETAILS. 2 3 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. NEXT 4 5 SPEAKER, PLEASE. I'M GOING TO PAULA PEARLMAN, PETER ELIASBERG. 6 7 JULIA ROBINSON SHIMIZU: I'M JULIA ROBINSON. OH, SORRY. EXCUSE 8 ME. I'M JULIA ROBINSON SHIMIZU. AND I REPRESENT N.A.M.I. SAN FERNANDO VALLEY. WE ARE A VOLUNTEER-DRIVEN ORGANIZATION. WE ASK TO BE INCLUDED IN THE DISCUSSION PROCESS AS THIS MOVES FORWARD BECAUSE WE ARE THE ONES WHO ARE 12 THERE WITH OUR LOVED ONES EVERY DAY. AND WE CAN BRING AN 13 UNDERSTANDING TO THIS DISCUSSION. AND WE APPRECIATE YOUR 14 15 EFFORT. THANK YOU. 16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. WE 17 18 APPRECIATE YOUR TESTIMONY. MA'AM, THE FLOOR IS YOURS. 19 GAIL EVANGUELIDI: I'M GAIL EVANGUELIDI, I HOPE YOU CAN ENJOY 20 21 WHAT I'M SAYING, MY VOICE HAS BEEN BAD LATELY. I STARTED THE 22 DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH N.A.M.I. L.P.S. CONSERVATORSHIP 23 MENTORING TEAM IN WHICH WE HELP FAMILIES TO BE ABLE TO GET THEIR LOVED ONES IN TREATMENT AND IN VOLUNTARY TREATMENT. I'M 24 GOING TO READ A STATEMENT. I WISH HOSPITALS WOULD EVALUATE 25



PATIENTS ON SOME OTHER MEASURE THAN JUST WHAT THE PATIENT 1 SAYS. I WAS RELEASED FROM SO MANY HOSPITALS WHEN I WAS AT THE 2 3 HEIGHT OF MY BREAKS WITH NO MEDICATIONS. IT WAS HORRIBLE AND MADE MY SITUATION SO MUCH WORSE. IN OTHER WORDS, 4 5 INCARCERATION. I REALLY WISH THEY WOULD HAVE KEPT ME. THIS WAS WRITTEN BY A YOUNG LADY WHO IS NOW ORGANIZING LARGE BENEFITS 6 FOR NONPROFITS WHO IS PRESENTLY UNDER AN L.P.S. 7 8 CONSERVATORSHIP IN INVOLUNTARY TREATMENT. THE COST OF A 9 HOSPITAL BED EACH DAY IS \$1400. A MENTAL HEALTH JAIL CELL IS \$490 A DAY. AND AN I.M.D. WHERE THEY CAN GET SOME PRETTY GOOD 10 11 TREATMENT IS ONLY \$148 A DAY. WE SERIOUSLY NEED MORE M.D. BEDS, I.M.D. BEDS. AND I'VE REQUESTED THAT MANY TIMES WITH 12 EVERY ONE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS BECAUSE WE CAN GIVE YOU 13 GREATER RESULTS. WE HAD A STUDY DONE BY CAL STATE NORTHRIDGE 14 AND LOS ANGELES IN WHICH THEY FOUND BY TREATING 26 PEOPLE, 15 16 THEY SAVED \$852,000 PER YEAR, WHICH IS PRETTY SUBSTANTIAL. WE DON'T HAVE ADEQUATE FACILITIES. IF WE HAD ADEQUATE FACILITIES, 17 18 WE CAN SUBSTANTIALLY REDUCE THE COST IN TREATING MENTALLY ILL. 19 WE NEED A STATE-OF-THE-ART MENTAL HEALTH HOSPITAL THAT RAISES THE BAR ON MENTAL HEALTH. HOW DO YOU GET TREATMENT FOR A 20 PERSON WHO HAS A NEUROLOGICAL BRAIN DISORDER THAT DOESN'T KNOW 21 22 THAT THEY'RE ILL? IT'S EXTREMELY DIFFICULT. AND I HOPE NONE OF 23 YOU EVER HAVE TO WALK THAT ROAD BECAUSE IT'S ABSOLUTELY 24 LUDICROUS TRYING TO DO THAT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

5 PAULA PEARLMAN: GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS PAULA PEARLMAN. I'M THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE DISABILITY RIGHTS LEGAL CENTER. 6 AND I'M ALSO A VISITING ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF LAW AT LOYOLA 7 8 LAW SCHOOL, TEACHING DISABILITY RIGHTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION LAW. AND I'M HERE TO SPEAK ABOUT THIS PROPOSITION, THIS 9 PROPOSAL. I ALSO LOOKED AT THE AMENDMENT WITH ASKING THIS 10 CONSTRUCTION COMPANY -- FOR THE COUNTY TO INCLUDE THE 11 DEPARTMENTS OF THE SHERIFF AND MENTAL HEALTH. I THINK THAT'S A 12 REALLY GOOD IDEA. IT'S HARD FOR ME TO UNDERSTAND HOW A 13 CONSTRUCTION COMPANY IS GOING TO UNDERSTAND THE APPROPRIATE 14 15 TREATMENT FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE EXPERIENCING MENTAL ILLNESS. I 16 ALSO IN ANY SUCCESSFUL STRUCTURAL CHANGE THAT I'VE BEEN A PART OF, ANY COMMITTEE, I THINK YOU NEED STAKEHOLDERS AT THE TABLE, 17 18 TOO. AND SO YOU HAVE THE OTHER SPEAKERS, MYSELF, A.C.L.U. IS HERE, AS WELL, WHERE THESE ARE ORGANIZATIONS AND ENTITIES WHO 19 ARE REALLY DEALING WITH PEOPLE WHO ARE EXPERIENCING MENTAL 20 21 HEALTH CONDITIONS. THE OTHER SIDE OF IT IS WE'RE SUING YOU 22 WHEN YOU'RE NOT DOING THINGS RIGHT. YOU KNOW, WE HAVE A 23 FAIRNESS HEARING TODAY IN ONE OF OUR CASES AGAINST THE COUNTY ON EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS. WE'VE SUED YOU TO KEEP RANCHO LOS 24 AMIGOS HOSPITAL OPEN. SO THIS IS THE KIND OF WORK THAT WE DO. 25



I'D LIKE TO DO THIS WORK ON THE FRONT END AND NOT THE BACK 1 2 END. I DON'T WANT TO BE HERE LATER SAYING "LOOK, WE ASKED YOU 3 TO INCLUDE COMMUNITY GROUPS. LOOK, YOU REALLY NEED TO CONSIDER THE ALTERNATIVES TO SENTENCING." I HAVE VOLUNTEERS IN MY 4 5 OFFICE RIGHT NOW WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED MENTAL HEALTH CONDITIONS THAT ARE FROM FEDERAL COURT WHO WERE IN A DIVERSION PROGRAM. 6 YOU KNOW, THERE ARE WAYS TO GET PEOPLE TO PREVENT THEM FROM 7 8 SPENDING TIME IN JAIL. AND I APPLAUD YOU FOR THINKING ABOUT THIS AND CHANGING THE LANDSCAPE. MAYBE, YOU KNOW, I DON'T 9 REALLY BELIEVE IN A LOCKED FACILITY. I UNDERSTAND THAT WE NEED 10 11 THOSE OPTIONS AVAILABLE. BUT I THINK THERE'S OTHER THINGS THAT WE CAN DO AND WE'VE OUTLINED THEM IN OUR LETTER ABOUT TRYING 12 TO LOOK AT THE ISSUE DIFFERENTLY. AND I OFFER YOU OUR 13 EXPERTISE AND OUR TIME AND OUR GOOD WILL. THANK YOU. 14

16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY.
17 WE'LL PROCEED TO THE NEXT SPEAKER.

19 PETER ELIASBERG: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN. SUPERVISOR
20 YAROSLAVSKY, THE A.C.L.U. ALSO WANTS TO THANK YOU FOR THIS
21 MOTION AND FOR THE OPPORTUNITY IT PRESENTS TO OPEN UP A
22 CONVERSATION AND LOOK AT WAYS TO REFORM THE WAY THAT PEOPLE
23 WITH MENTAL ILLNESS WHO ENTER INTO THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM
24 HAVE BEEN DEALT WITH. THE POSSIBILITIES FOR THE COUNTY FOR
25 LOWER COSTS AND BETTER MENTAL HEALTH OUTCOMES ARE THINGS THAT



EVERYONE IN THIS COUNTY SHOULD BE LOOKING FOR AND EXCITED 1 ABOUT. THE ONLY CONCERN I HAVE ABOUT THE MOTION IS IT DOES 2 3 STILL FOCUS ON THE IDEA OF SOME KIND OF WHAT APPEARS TO BE, ALTHOUGH THERE ARE NOT A LOT OF DETAILS, BUT I HOPE THAT WHAT 4 5 IS EXPLORED IS NOT JUST A KIND OF BETTER JAIL MODEL. IN 1997, THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE MADE A SERIES OF BLISTERING FINDINGS 6 ABOUT THE TREATMENT OF THE MENTALLY ILL IN THE LOS ANGELES 7 8 COUNTY JAILS. IN 2008, DR. TERRY COOPER MADE A SERIES OF FINDINGS THAT WERE ALMOST THE SAME, SHOWING THAT NO CHANGE HAD 9 COME ABOUT. AND I THINK AN IMPORTANT THING TO RECOGNIZE IS IN 10 THOSE YEARS, TWIN TOWERS WAS OPENED, AND TWIN TOWERS WAS 11 PROMISED TO BE THE BETTER TREATMENT OF MENTALLY ILL. THE 12 REALITY IS THERE ARE GOING TO BE SOME PEOPLE WHO ARE MENTALLY 13 ILL IN THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM WHO NEED TO BE IN QUITE A 14 SECURE FACILITY. BUT THE VAST MAJORITY OF THEM DO NOT. AND 15 16 WHAT WE'VE SEEN OVER THE YEARS IS THIS MERRY GO ROUND OF INTO THE JAILS, BACK TO SKID ROW, INTO EMERGENCY ROOMS, BACK INTO 17 18 THE JAILS AGAIN, AT GREAT COST TO THE COUNTY, HORRIBLE COST TO 19 FAMILIES AND PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESS. AND THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE, IN LARGE PART, BEEN IN CHARGE OF THIS MODEL ARE D.M.H. 20 21 AND THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, THE SAME 22 PEOPLE WHO ARE NOW BEING ASKED TO EVALUATE ALTERNATIVES. SO I 23 WANT TO ECHO MISS PEARLMAN'S STATEMENT. I VERY MUCH HOPE WE CAN EXPAND THIS. OF COURSE WE NEED D.M.H. AND L.A.S.D. TO BE 24 INVOLVED IN THIS EVALUATION. I HOPE WE CAN BRING STAKEHOLDERS, 25



PEOPLE WHO WORK WITH THESE COMMUNITIES AND ARE KNOWLEDGEABLE 1 ABOUT THESE COMMUNITY TREATMENTS AND THESE DIVERSIONS TO BE 2 3 PART OF THIS PROCESS. BECAUSE D.M.H. AND THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT HAS RUN THIS PROCESS SINCE 1997, AND WE KNOW WHAT 4 5 THE RESULTS HAVE BEEN. WE NEED TO BROADEN AND GET DIFFERENT VOICES INVOLVED IN THIS EVALUATION. THANK YOU. 6 7 8 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. 9 SUP. ANTONOVICH: MR. CHAIRMAN, IF THE AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES 10 11 UNION WOULD SUPPORT THE LEGISLATION THAT HAS BEEN OFFERED TIME AND TIME AGAIN IN SACRAMENTO TO REOUIRE THE MENTAL HEALTH 12 13 TREATMENT FOR THE MENTALLY ILL, THEY WOULDN'T BE IN JAIL. THEY'D BE IN HOSPITALS AND BE REHABILITATED AND RESTORED TO A 14 NORMAL LIFE. BUT BY ALLOWING THESE INDIVIDUALS TO REMAIN ON 15 16 THE STREETS AND TO GET INTO PROBLEMS IS CREATING THIS BIGGER PROBLEM THAT WE HAVE. SO THAT LAW HAS TO BE CHANGED SO THAT 17 18 THEY REOUIRE THE MEDICAL TREATMENT FOR THE MENTALLY ILL. AND 19 THE A.C.L.U. COULD CHANGE THEIR POSITION AND GO A LONG WAYS IN HELPING THOSE WHO ARE MENTALLY ILL. 20

14	DIANA ZUNIGA: MY NAME IS DIANA ZUNIGA, I AM REPRESENTING
15	CALIFORNIANS UNITED FOR A RESPONSIBLE BUDGET. WE DO SUPPORT
16	THE FURTHER ANALYSIS OF THE MENTAL HEALTH COMMUNITY, BUT DO
17	WANT TO URGE THE BOARD TO FOCUS ON ALTERNATIVES TO
18	INCARCERATION THAT CAN BE IMPLEMENTED FOR THOSE WITH SUCH
19	ISSUES OUT OF THE JAIL SYSTEM. WE APPLAUD THE BOARD FOR
20	LOOKING INTO THE ISSUES OF THE MENTAL HEALTH COMMUNITY, BUT
21	THIS HAS ENDED UP MAKING LOS ANGELES COUNTY JAILS THE LARGEST
22	MENTAL HEALTH HOSPITAL IN THE UNITED STATES. AND WE DO THINK
23	THAT ADDITIONAL CONSTRUCTION IS NOT THE ANSWER OR CONTRACTING,
24	AGAIN, WITH THE CONSTRUCTION FIRM WILL ACHIEVE THE RESULTS
25	THAT THE COMMUNITY NEEDS. LIKE PETER ELIASBERG JUST SAID, TWIN



TOWERS WAS ALSO ALREADY CONSTRUCTED AS A MENTAL HEALTH 1 FACILITY, SO HOW DO WE EXPECT THAT THIS ADDITIONAL FACILITY 2 WILL SERVE THE POPULATION WITH THE SUPPORTIVE SERVICES THAT 3 THEY NEED? WE ALSO KNOW THAT CONTINUOUS IMPRISONMENT ONLY 4 5 CAUSES TRAUMA AND WORSENS THE CONDITIONS OF THOSE SUFFERING FROM MENTAL HEALTH DIAGNOSIS. WE ALSO WONDER HOW MUCH A.B.109 6 7 FUNDING IS BEING ALLOCATED FOR ALTERNATIVE PLACEMENTS FOR THE MENTAL HEALTH COMMUNITY AND HOW THESE 3,400 BEDS ARE BEING 8 9 FUNDED AND WHERE THE PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE IN REGARDS TO THIS. WE REALLY URGE THE BOARD TO FOCUS ON THE IMPLEMENTATION 10 11 OF LAURA'S LAW, THE FUNDING THAT CAN GO INTO ALTERNATIVES TO INCARCERATION AS WELL AS HOW THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IS 12 BUDGETING THEIR ALLOCATED A.B.109 FUNDING, WHERE THE SURPLUS 13 FROM THE LAST TWO YEARS IS GOING. I KNOW TODAY UNFORTUNATELY 14 THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT BUDGET IS GOING TO -- IS NOT GOING TO 15 16 BE OPEN TO THE PUBLIC. SO WE ARE REALLY ASKING THE BOARD TO FOCUS ON THAT A.B.109 FUNDING. IS IT GOING TO THE ALTERNATIVES 17 18 TO INCARCERATION THAT NEED TO BE IMPLEMENTED FOR THE MENTAL 19 HEALTH COMMUNITY AND FURTHER REDUCING THE POPULATION AS OPPOSED TO EXPANDING THE CURRENT SYSTEM. AGAIN, WE NEED TO 20 FOCUS ON SUPPORTIVE SERVICES TO EXPAND COMMUNITY-BASED 21 22 TREATMENTS, REDUCE THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE INSIDE OF THE LOS 23 ANGELES JAILS, IMPLEMENT THIS PRETRIAL PROGRAM THAT WE HAVE 24 TALKED ABOUT CONTINUOUSLY AND USE GOOD TIME CREDITS THAT HAVE

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1	BEEN USED IN OTHER COUNTIES TO FURTHER REDUCE THE POPULATION.
2	THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME.

16	POINTS. SERGEANT? THANK YOU. SIR?

19	MAIZLISH, A MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPIST AND FOR SEVEN YEARS

21	DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES. I'M ALSO A CURB
22	MEMBER AND I'M SPEAKING IN BOTH CAPACITIES NOW. I'M VERY GLAD
23	TO SEE THIS MATTER BEING TAKEN UP BY THE BOARD. AND IN THE
24	SAME WAY THAT I ASKED SHERIFF BACA WHEN HE TALKS ABOUT
25	EDUCATION-BASED INCARCERATION OR MS. MCDONALD WHO TOLD ME THAT



SHE'S TRYING TO EXTEND THE DRUG TREATMENT IN THE JAILS, I SAY: 1 YES. THE PEOPLE WHO ARE HELD IN CUSTODY MUST BE. IT'S AN 2 3 ETHICAL AND A LEGAL OBLIGATION, PROBABLY, ALSO, TO GIVE THEM THE VERY BEST TREATMENT. BUT FOR HOW MANY PEOPLE DO WE GIVE 4 5 THAT VERY BEST TREATMENT? TO DISCUSS CREATING PROGRAMS AND ESPECIALLY BUILDING OR PREPARING SPACE TO DO THAT IN, WE 6 REALLY NEED TO HAVE A GOOD LOOK AT THE NUMBERS, AT THE 7 8 PROJECTIONS. I'VE SAID THIS BEFORE, AND MANY OTHERS HAVE, TOO, YOU HAVE DR. AUSTIN'S REPORT FROM LAST YEAR ABOUT REPLACEMENT 9 OF MEN'S CENTRAL NOT BEING NECESSARY PROVIDED A FEW SIMPLE 10 MEASURES THAT DON'T EVEN REQUIRE STATE LAW CHANGES TO BE MADE. 11 SO THESE THINGS ARE AVAILABLE IN 2011 REPORT, DEVERE INSTITUTE 12 SAID THAT PREBOOKING DIVERSION OF LOW LEVEL MENTALLY ILL 13 PEOPLE COULD BE DONE AND SAVE TREMENDOUSLY ON THINGS. EVEN 14 EARLIER THAN THAT, IT'S BEEN MENTIONED BY A COUPLE OF THE 15 16 SPEAKERS AND SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH REFERRED TO IT, I'VE GOT IN MY HANDOUT AN ANALYSIS OF THE COST EFFECTS OF USING THINGS 17 18 LIKE LAURA'S LAW, WHICH THIS BOARD HAS ENDORSED BUT HAS USED 19 VERY MUCH LESS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY THAN IN SOME OTHER COUNTIES. IT IS A LEGAL PROCESS IN COURTS. PEOPLE ARE NOT 20 BEING ASSIGNED RANDOMLY OR IN ANY KIND OF LIGHT WAY TO CARE. 21 22 THEY USUALLY ACCEPT THE JUDGE'S RECOMMENDATIONS RATHER THAN 23 COURT ORDERS. LET'S EMPLOY THIS FULLY. WE'LL HAVE AN IDEA OF THE SPACE NEEDS, THE NUMBERS NEEDS AND OF COURSE BE ABLE TO 24 USE A LOT OF TREATMENT OUTSIDE OF JAILS. 25

ON SKID ROW ARE MENTALLY ILL. MOST OF THOSE PEOPLE WILL SPEND
 SOME TIME, SOME PART OF THEIR LIFE IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY JAIL.
 WE NEED TO FIND A BETTER SOLUTION TO STOP THE REVOLVING DOOR
 BETWEEN SKID ROW AND TWIN TOWERS SO THAT WE COULD HAVE
 COMMUNITY-BASED TREATMENT THAT WOULD PROVIDE HOUSING,
 HEALTHCARE AND JOBS, THEREFORE REDUCED RECIDIVISM AND KEEP

I'M A PROUD INMATE OF THE SHERIFF'S. 1990, JULY 14, 17 18 SATURDAY. READ ALL ABOUT IT IN THE JULY 15 COPY OF THE L.A. 19 TIMES. I WAS ARRESTED ON ORDERS OF MAYOR BRADLEY, WHO I STILL LIKE AS A PERSON, AT THE OPENING OF THE BLUE LINE. AND 20 21 ARRESTED. I HAD MARKS ON MY WRISTS FOR ABOUT THREE OR FOUR 22 DAYS. OF COURSE, IF THE SHERIFFS REALLY WANT TO CLAMP DOWN, 23 YOU'LL HAVE SCARS ON YOUR WRIST FOR YOUR ENTIRE LIFE. SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: MR. CHAIRMAN, I'D ASK ASSISTANT SHERIFF MCDONALD TO JOIN US AT THE CENTER TABLE. LET ME JUST THANK THE PEOPLE WHO TESTIFIED THIS MORNING, MR. CHAIRMAN. THIS IS --AND ALL OF THE SUGGESTIONS THAT HAVE BEEN MADE AND CRITIQUES THAT HAVE BEEN MADE ARE WELL MADE AND OUGHT TO BE TAKEN TO



HEART HAS WE GO FORWARD. THE INTENT OF THIS MOTION IS TO THROW 1 THIS KIND OF APPROACH INTO THE MIX OF THE STUDY THAT IS NOW 2 BEING DONE PURSUANT TO THE MOTION THAT SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH 3 MADE SOME WEEKS AGO. IN MY CONVERSATIONS WITH THE SHERIFF'S 4 5 PERSONNEL, PARTICULARLY TERRI MCDONALD AND HER TEAM HAS CONVINCED ME THAT THIS IS SOMETHING THAT WE OUGHT TO AT LEAST 6 LOOK AT AND SEE IF THERE COULD BE SOMETHING THAT CAN BE MADE 7 8 OF THIS THAT WOULD BE A GAME CHANGER AS FAR AS THE WAY WE 9 TREAT OR DEAL WITH PEOPLE WHO COME INTO OUR CUSTODY WHO HAVE MENTAL ILLNESS ISSUES OR SUBSTANCE ABUSE ISSUES OF ONE SORT OR 10 ANOTHER. AND IT SOUNDS SIMPLE BUT IT CERTAINLY ISN'T SIMPLE. 11 AND I THINK THERE'S A WHOLE -- NOT ONLY DOES OUR CULTURE AS 12 PUBLIC POLICYMAKERS HAVE TO CHANGE SOMEWHAT, BUT YOUR 13 DEPARTMENT'S CULTURE IS GOING TO HAVE TO CHANGE. BECAUSE EVEN 14 IF YOU FIND A WAY TO DO THIS KIND OF AN APPROACH, TO DO A 15 16 BUILDING THAT PUTS AS MUCH OF A FOCUS ON TREATMENT AS IT DOES ON INCARCERATION, THE ABILITY TO DO THE JOB RIGHT, LET'S 17 18 STIPULATE THAT THERE ARE SOME PEOPLE THAT SHOULDN'T EVEN BE 19 THERE. BUT FOR THOSE WHO ARE REQUIRED TO BE THERE, TO DO THE JOB RIGHT, THE MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS AND THE PERSONNEL 20 OTHER THAN THE SHERIFF'S PERSONNEL WHO ARE THERE NEED TO HAVE 21 22 SOME RUN OF THE PLACE SO THAT THEY CAN DO THEIR THING. THEY 23 CAN DO WHAT THEY'RE TRAINED TO DO. AND YOUR SHERIFF'S PERSONNEL ARE GOING TO HAVE TO BE TRAINED TO, A LITTLE BIT IN 24 WHAT THOSE MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS ARE TRAINED IN SO THAT 25



THEY CAN WALK A MILE IN THE OTHER PERSON'S SHOES AND NOT JUST 1 SAY "YOU'RE NUTS, AND WE'RE GOING TO SHUT YOU OFF AND YOU 2 3 CAN'T DO WHAT YOU'RE PROPOSING TO DO. IT'S NOT IN KEEPING WITH THE REGULATIONS THE WAY WE RUN OUR JAIL," ET CETERA. I'M KIND 4 5 OF -- I'M JUMPING AHEAD OF THE GAME BECAUSE I THINK THERE IS AN APPETITE ON OUR BOARD TO TAKE A LOOK AT THIS. AS I SAID TO 6 7 YOU WHEN WE MET, AND I'VE SAID TO THE SHERIFF, I'M NOT 8 INTERESTED IN SPENDING A BILLION DOLLARS ON ANOTHER JAIL. I JUST THINK THAT'S A COLOSSAL WASTE OF MONEY. AND I KNOW THAT 9 THE COMPLEXITIES WE'RE FACING. BUT UNTIL WE RAISE IT TO A 10 11 CRISIS LEVEL AND ALMOST BLOW THE WHOLE SYSTEM UP, WE'RE NOT GOING TO GET ANYBODY'S ATTENTION ABOUT THE ABSURDITY OF 12 SPENDING 1.4 BILLION, WHICH WAS THE ORIGINAL NUMBER THAT WAS 13 PROPOSED, 1.3 BILLION, TO TEAR DOWN AN EXISTING JAIL AND BUILD 14 15 A NEW ONE TO REPLACE IT. BUT I AM OPEN, AS A POLICY MAKER AND 16 AS A TAXPAYER, TO DOING SOMETHING THAT COSTS MONEY IF IT STANDS A CHANCE OF ACTUALLY PRODUCING RESULTS AND GETTING GOOD 17 18 PRODUCT OUT THE DOOR AND NOT JUST WAREHOUSING PEOPLE WHO HAVE, 19 FOR ONE REASON OR ANOTHER, FOUND THEMSELVES IN OUR CUSTODY. AND IT'S A VERY SIMPLE ASPIRATION THAT I THINK EVERYBODY COULD 20 21 AGREE WITH. BUT THE DEVIL IS MOST CERTAINLY IN THE DETAILS OF 22 THIS. AND THAT'S WHAT I'M INTERESTED IN HEARING FROM YOUR 23 CONSULTANT, OUR CONSULTANT, AND FROM US AND FROM THE STAKEHOLDERS. I THINK IT'S APPROPRIATE -- IF IT'S NOT 24 APPROPRIATE TO HAVE THEM DESIGN A PROGRAM, A FACILITY, IT'S 25



CERTAINLY APPROPRIATE TO VET IT THROUGH THEM SO THAT SOME OF 1 THESE FOLKS WHO MAY HAVE A CONTRARIAN POINT OF VIEW TO OUR OWN 2 3 OR TO YOUR OWN BUT ACTUALLY TOIL IN THE VINEYARDS AS MUCH AS ANY OF US DO MIGHT ACTUALLY HAVE A GOOD IDEA, AS SHOCKING AS 4 5 THAT MIGHT BE. SOME OF THESE FOLKS DO HAVE GOOD IDEAS FROM TIME TO TIME. AND I THINK THEY'VE COME HERE IN THAT SPIRIT TO 6 HELP MAKE THIS, WHATEVER WE DECIDE TO DO, TO HELP MAKE IT AS 7 8 GOOD AS POSSIBLE AND AS SUCCESSFUL AS POSSIBLE. SO THAT'S WHAT 9 I'M INTERESTED IN SEEING US DO. I DON'T KNOW WHETHER THIS IS GOING TO GO ANYWHERE. I DON'T KNOW THAT ANY OF US DO. BUT I 10 11 THINK YOU WANT TO GIVE IT A SHOT. AND I KNOW THE SHERIFF WANTS TO GIVE IT A SHOT. AND I THINK IT DESERVES TO BE LOOKED AT AS 12 SERIOUSLY AS ANY OF THE OTHER ALTERNATIVES THAT HAVE BEEN 13 KICKED AROUND. BUT I JUST WANTED TO SHARE THESE OTHER CONCERNS 14 THAT I HAVE THAT WE NEED TO BE THINKING NOT JUST ABOUT THE 15 16 BRICKS AND MORTAR AND HOW WE'RE GOING TO ORGANIZE THE FACILITY, BUT HOW IT'S GOING TO OPERATE, AND HOW WE CAN 17 MINIMIZE THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO EVEN HAVE TO GO INTO SUCH A 18 19 FACILITY AND HOW WE CAN TREAT SOME OF THE LESS ACUTE CASES. I'LL CALL IT AN OUTPATIENT BASIS TO REFER THEM TO THE MENTAL 20 21 HEALTH PROVIDERS THAT WE HAVE, THAT WE PARTNER WITH ALL OVER 22 THE REGION. AGAIN, IT'S A LOT EASIER SAID THAN DONE AND IT'S 23 NOT CHEAP. BUT IT'S A HELL OF A LOT CHEAPER THAN BUILDING A 24 BILLION \$400 MILLION JAIL WHICH DOESN'T EVEN BEGIN TO ADDRESS



1 IT. SO I'D LIKE TO ASK YOU, TERRY, AND SHERIFF, TO SPEAK TO IT2 AND SHARE WITH US ANY THOUGHTS YOU MAY HAVE.

TERRI MCDONALD: CERTAINLY. THANK YOU SO MUCH. TERRI MCDONALD, 4 5 ASSISTANT SHERIFF, CUSTODY DIVISION, SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, ACCOMPANYING THE SHERIFF TODAY. THANK YOU, FIRST OF ALL, FOR 6 YOUR MOTION, MR. SUPERVISOR. ONE OF THE THINGS THAT I REALIZED 7 8 WHEN I STARTED TOURING THE JAILS WAS WE REALLY ARE CHALLENGED WITH PHYSICAL PLANT OF THE JAILS IN L.A. COUNTY. WE'RE 9 CHALLENGED BOTH FOR TREATMENT SPACE AND INDIVIDUAL PROVIDER 10 SPACE BUT ALSO CAPACITY IN GENERAL. THERE'S APPROXIMATELY 2700 11 MALES IN TWIN TOWERS TODAY OR IN GENERAL POPULATION WHO ARE IN 12 THE MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM OR NEED TO BE IN THE MENTAL HEALTH 13 PROGRAM. AND WE'VE BEEN MONITORED BY DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE IN 14 15 THE TREATMENT AND SERVICE PROVISION FOR THOSE OFFENDERS, AND 16 WE HAVE NOT BEEN HITTING THE MARK. AND SO AS WE LOOK AT, REALLY, THE NEED TO STOP UTILIZING MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL AND 17 18 BUILD ADDITIONAL CAPACITY, IT MAKES SENSE FROM MY PROFESSIONAL 19 JUDGMENT TO ADDRESS OTHER ISSUES FACING THE COUNTY JAIL SYSTEM. AND ONE OF THE HIGHER RISK POINTS FROM MY PERSPECTIVE 20 21 IS MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT. THERE'S OTHER AREAS THAT WE REALLY 22 COULD ADDRESS THROUGH CONSTRUCTION, WHICH IS A.D.A., AMERICANS 23 WITH DISABILITIES ACT, A NEED FOR BED CAPACITY. WE HAVE A LAWSUIT PENDING FOR US THERE. SO I WELCOME THE OPPORTUNITY TO 24 FURTHER DISCUSS THE ISSUE. I WELCOME THE OPPORTUNITY TO WORK 25



WITH VANIR AND THE STAKEHOLDERS, I AGREE WITH YOU, MR. 1 SUPERVISOR, THEY PROVIDE VALUABLE INPUT TO US. AND I AM ALWAYS 2 3 WELCOME TO LISTEN TO OTHER PEOPLE'S IDEAS. AND SO WE LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH THE BOARD AND WITH PROVIDERS AND WITH 4 5 VANIR IN COMING FORWARD WITH A PROPOSAL. 6 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THANK YOU. SHERIFF? 7 8 9 SHERIFF LEE BACA: WELL, WE CERTAINLY KNOW THAT THE VISION FOR DOING A BETTER JOB IS IN FRONT OF US NOW WITH YOUR PROPOSAL. 10 AND I THINK IN THE DESIGN PHASE, WE'LL HAVE TO DO SOME 11 SIGNIFICANT PLANNING TO ACCOMMODATE THE SECURITY ASPECT ALONG 12 WITH THE MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT ASPECT. I THINK THAT WE WILL 13 WORK CLOSELY WITH THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE AND WE'LL WORK CLOSELY 14 WITH OUR MENTAL HEALTH PARTNERS THAT ARE WITHIN THE COUNTY'S 15 16 EMPLOY AS WELL AS ALL THOSE WHO ARE OUTSIDE. I'M ON THE BOARD OF THE SALVATION ARMY. THE BELL SHELTER HAS PURPOSEFULLY 17 18 DESIGNED ITSELF AROUND MENTALLY CHALLENGED OFFENDERS WHO ARE 19 IN RECOVERY OF VARIOUS LEVELS, WHETHER IT'S PSYCHOLOGICAL OR ADDICTIONS THAT ARE CHEMICALLY INDUCED OR ALCOHOL-INDUCED. SO 20 21 THIS IS REALLY THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE WE HAVE RELATIVE TO THE 22 QUALITY OF WHAT'S GOING ON INSIDE THE JAILS BESIDES MINIMIZING 23 VIOLENCE. SO I THINK THAT WE'RE ON AN OPPORTUNITY HERE WITH YOUR PROPOSAL. AND WE WOULD LIKE TO WORK OUT THE DETAILS IN A 24 MANNER THAT SATISFIES THE ECONOMIC ASPECT OF THIS, AS WELL. AS 25



YOU KNOW, STAFFING DOES COST IN A MEDICAL ENVIRONMENT A LITTLE 1 MORE. BUT WE CAN WORK THIS OUT. I THINK THAT THERE'S A KEY TO 2 DEEMPHASIZING FOR THOSE THAT CAN BE TREATED IN THE COMMUNITY, 3 THE ASPECT OF MENTAL HEALTHCARE EXCLUSIVELY IN THE JAIL ALONE. 4 5 I DON'T THINK IT SHOULD BE ON A CONTINUUM. DARRELL STEINBERG, THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM OF THE SENATE, HAS BEEN HERE. HE IS THE 6 ONE WHO LED TO FUNDING FOR CONTINUUM OF CARE FOR MEDICINE 7 8 AFTER THEY GOT OUT. THAT MONEY DRIED UP. WE'VE GOT TO LOBBY 9 THE STATE WITH THEIR EXTRA REVENUE TO GET THAT PIECE BACK IN PLACE SO THAT THE CONTINUUM OF CARE GOES ON FOR THOSE THAT ARE 10 11 MENTALLY IN NEED OF PHARMACEUTICAL SUPPORT. SO I HAVE A LOT OF ENTHUSIASM ABOUT YOUR PROMOTION, OBVIOUSLY. BECAUSE OF THE 12 NATURE OF WHAT IS REAL IN TERMS OF A MENTALLY CHALLENGED 13 INDIVIDUAL, IT IS NOT SIMPLE EVEN AFTER RELEASE FROM THE 14 COUNTY JAIL TO THINK THAT THAT PERSON IS GOING TO BE STABLE. 15 16 THE CONTINUUM OF CARE ALLOWS FOR THE STABILITY. THE DESIGN OF THE INSTITUTION WILL FACILITATE THEIR PARTICULAR MALADY. IT IS 17 18 REALLY -- HAS MANY MORE POSITIVE ASPECTS THAT I CAN'T EVEN 19 COMMENT ON NOW. AND I JUST THANK YOU FOR YOUR WILLINGNESS TO TAKE THIS ISSUE AS SERIOUSLY AS YOU HAVE. AND WE WANT TO MAKE 20 21 IT WORK. THANK YOU.

WE WISH TO TAKE UP THAT ITEM, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE. WE DO 9 10 NOTE THE SPEAKER TO BE HEARD ON THIS, PATRISSE CULLORS, IF YOU WOULD COME FORWARD. MADAM EXECUTIVE OFFICER? 11 12 13 SACHI HAMAI, EXEC. OFFICER: SHERIFF BACA? 14 15 SHERIFF LEE BACA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. 16 SACHI HAMAI, EXEC. OFFICER: MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE 17 18 BOARD, IT WOULD BE APPROPRIATE TO RECESS THE REGULAR BOARD 19 MEETING IN ORDER TO TAKE UP THE ORAL TESTIMONY FROM THE SHERIFF FOR THE ADJOURNED SPECIAL BUDGET HEARING MEETING 20 21 RELATED TO THE RECOMMENDED BUDGET OF 2013/14. 24 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ON THE MATTER OF THE BUDGET
25 THAT'S BEFORE US, THIS IS YOUR OPPORTUNITY TO BE HEARD ON THAT



ITEM, SHERIFF BACA. AND SO IF YOUR STAFF IS HERE, WE CAN 1 2 PROCEED ACCORDINGLY. AND AS YOU PREPARE, I'M SORRY? AS YOU PREPARE, COME FORWARD, AND MISS CULLORS, PLEASE PROCEED. 3 4 5 PATRISSE CULLORS: GOOD MORNING, THANK YOU. MY NAME IS PATRISSE CULLORS. I'M THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF DIGNITY AND POWER NOW 6 AND THE FOUNDER AND LEAD ORGANIZER OF THE COALITION TO END 7 8 SHERIFF'S VIOLENCE IN L.A. JAILS. OUR ORGANIZATION STRONGLY AGREES WITH THE PERSONS BATTLING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS AND 9 PERSONS BATTLING WITH DRUG ADDICTION SHOULD BE GIVEN 10 SPECIALIZED TREATMENT. BUT WE DISAGREE WITH THE MOTION TO PUSH 11 FURTHER JAILING OF OUR LOVED ONES. MY BROTHER WAS DIAGNOSED 12 INSIDE L.A. COUNTY JAIL'S TWIN TOWERS, AND HIS HEALTH 13 DETERIORATED INSIDE THE JAILS. NOT ONLY WAS HE NOT ADEQUATELY 14 TREATED, HE WAS CONSISTENTLY ABUSED BY SHERIFF DEPUTIES. I 15 16 ASKED HIM IF HE EVER RECEIVED ANY PROPER TREATMENT, AND HE SAID NO. HE WAS USUALLY OVERLY MEDICATED AND NEVER GIVEN THE 17 18 OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK WITH A THERAPIST ON A REGULAR BASIS. OUR 19 ORGANIZATION HAS MET WITH DOZENS OF FAMILIES WHOSE LOVED ONES HAVE SUFFERED FROM ABUSE BY THE SHERIFFS AND ALSO A LOT OF 20 THEIR LOVED ONES SUFFERED FROM MENTAL ILLNESS. WE BELIEVE THE 21 22 MONEY YOU ARE SUGGESTING TO GIVE TO THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT 23 SHOULD BE GIVEN TO COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS. AND WE NEED TO CENTER THE CONVERSATION ABOUT WELLNESS AND HEALTH AT THE 24 FOREFRONT OF THE CONVERSATION ABOUT FOLKS WITH MENTAL 25



ILLNESSES AND DRUG ADDICTION. WE ARE URGING THE BOARD TO LOOK
 FOR ALTERNATIVES TO INCARCERATION. THANK YOU.

BUT IN YOUR 15 16 DIRECTION, I WILL FOLLOW THAT LEAD IF THAT'S WHAT YOU CHOOSE. IF NOT, THEN I THINK THAT THERE'S A NODDING TO GO FORWARD THAT 17 18 WE DON'T NEED TO RECOVER OLD GROUND.

20 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: I THINK WE'VE HAD THE
21 PRESENTATION BEFORE AND WE ARE IN PRETTY GOOD SHAPE UNLESS
22 THERE'S A SENTIMENT OTHERWISE FROM MEMBERS OF THE BOARD.
23 [SILENCE.] SEEING NONE, PROCEED, SHERIFF.

SHERIFF LEE BACA: OKAY. THE KEY POINT IS THAT WE'VE BEEN IN 1 COMMUNICATION WITH THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE. THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE 2 3 HAS PROPOSED A PARTIAL ELIMINATION PLAN OF THE CARPING PROBLEM THAT WE HAVE. IN DISCUSSING WITH MY STAFF HOW WE WOULD DO 4 5 THIS, WE INTEND TO END, AS BEST AS WE CAN, THE CARPING PROBLEM IN THE PATROL STATIONS THAT AFFECT THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS. 6 I'VE LISTENED TO EACH BOARD MEMBER REGARDING THE 7 8 UNINCORPORATED PRIORITY THAT THEY HAVE. YES, THIS ENDED IN ANOTHER TRAGEDY. 17 18 AT SHERIFF STATIONS ALL OVER THE COUNTY, OUR DETECTIVE BUREAUS 19 HAVE CASELOADS PILED HIGH, CURRENT CASES UNTOUCHED, AND THEY'RE TOO BUSY WORKING THEIR SECOND JOB. IT'S CALLED 20 CARPING. AS THE DETECTIVES REPORT THEIR BACKLOGS EACH AND 21 22 EVERY WEEK, THEY CONTINUE TO BE PULLED FROM THEIR DESK TO WORK 23 PATROL ASSIGNMENTS AT LEAST ONCE A WEEK TO KEEP THE MINIMUM CONTRACTED POSITIONS FILLED. IT IS UNSAFE FOR EVERYONE AND IS 24 UNACCEPTABLE. WHY DOES SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT HAVE TO SUFFER 25



THESE UNSAFE STAFFING LEVELS? I'M ASKING YOUR HELP ONCE AGAIN. 1 PLEASE DO NOT LET THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN YOU AND THE SHERIFF 2 CONTINUE BECAUSE THE RESULT IS UNSAFE STAFFING LEVELS. THE 3 COMMUNITY SHOULD BE SAFE, THE DEPUTIES SHOULD BE SAFE AND DO 4 5 NOT DESERVE TO BE PAWNS IN THIS POLITICAL CONTEST. I KNOW EACH AND EVERY ONE OF YOU -- I KNOW EACH AND EVERY ONE OF YOU WILL 6 7 DO THE RIGHT THING BY THE COMMUNITY AND YOUR BOARD SHOULD 8 START IMMEDIATE ACTION WHICH I NOTICED YOU DID THIS MORNING TO 9 START ADDING ADDITIONAL FUNDS AND RESOURCES TO THE UNINCORPORATED AREA. THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT NEEDS MILLIONS 10 OF DOLLARS TO RESTORE THE INADEQUACIES OF PERSONNEL TO COVER 11 THE GROWING DEMANDS. WE NEED MORE SWORN PERSONNEL ON PATROL 12 FOR BACKUP AND TO SERVE THE COMMUNITY THAT WE TOOK AN OATH TO 13 PROTECT. YES, I KNOW THAT'S A LOT OF MONEY. BUT I'M SURE IT 14 WILL MAKE THE COUNTY MUCH MORE SECURE AND SAFE. THERE ARE 15 16 RESOURCES YOU CAN IDENTIFY TO PROVIDE RELIEF AND WE URGE YOUR BOARD TO TAKE ACTION THAT WOULD RESTORE THE SHERIFF'S 17 18 DEPARTMENT FUNDING IMMEDIATELY. I HAVE A COPY OF THE RADIO 19 TRANSMISSIONS OF THE EVENT THAT OCCURRED IN YOUR DISTRICT, MR. RIDLEY-THOMAS. I'M SURE YOU WOULD LOVE TO HEAR IT. I'M SURE 20 THE REST OF YOU WOULD LIKE TO HEAR IT. IT'S ABOUT 10 MINUTES 21 22 LONG. AND I DID BRING IT WITH ME. I WILL GIVE IT TO SERGEANT 23 AT ARMS GIRARD. AND TAKE THE TIME TO LISTEN HOW LONG THESE DEPUTIES FOUGHT AND TRIED TO MAINTAIN CONTROL WITHOUT HAVING 24 TO USE DEADLY FORCE. ABOUT SIX MINUTES INTO IT, YOU'LL HEAR 25

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WHERE THEY ASKED FOR MUTUAL AID FROM EAST L.A. STATION AND
 SOUTH STATION. THIS IS DANGEROUS. IT'S A DANGEROUS JOB. WE
 KNOW IT IS. BUT WE NEED THE FUNDING. AND PLEASE SET THE THINGS
 ASIDE. THANK YOU ALL THIS AFTERNOON FOR YOUR VERY VALUABLE
 TIME.

7 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR
8 TESTIMONY. WE'LL MOVE TO THE NEXT PERSON WISHING TO BE HEARD.

11 JOHN WALSH: JOHN WALSH BLOGGING AT HOLLYWOODHIGHLANDS.ORG. COME AND SEE THE THROAT-SLITTING. AS FAR AS VIOLENCE IS 12 CONCERNED, AS YOU KNOW I ONLY SPENT FOUR HOURS AS A GUEST OF 13 THE SHERIFF'S IN MY LIFE. AND I DIDN'T SEE ANY VIOLENCE THERE. 14 I THINK ONE OF THE PROBLEMS THE VIOLENCE IS HIGH IS THE FOOD 15 16 BECAUSE IF YOU FEED PEOPLE TRASH, THEY WILL ACT TRASHY. IN MY ENTIRE LIFE, I'VE EATEN MANY MEALS. I'M ALMOST 70 YEARS OLD. 17 18 IT'S THE ONLY MEAL I EVER ATE WHERE I HAD NO IDEA WHAT IT WAS. 19 IT DIDN'T TASTE BAD. IT WAS TASTELESS. BUT I HAD NO IDEA WHAT IT WAS. WAS IT A SOUFFLE? I THINK THAT THE CRIME -- I MEAN, 20 LET'S FACE IT. THERE ISN'T A JAIL IN THE WORLD THAT ISN'T RUN 21 22 BY THE PRISONERS. LET ME REPEAT THAT. THERE IS NO JAIL IN THE 23 HISTORY OF THE WORLD, YOU CAN GO BACK TO ATHENS, THAT ISN'T ESSENTIALLY RUN BY THE PRISONERS BECAUSE THEY OUTNUMBER THE 24 GUARDS. AND LET'S FACE IT, THINGS ARE PRETTY BAD AT THIS 25



FACILITY. AND THAT'S WHY, I REALLY THINK WHAT WE REALLY NEED
 IS TO HAVE ERIC GARCETTI COME IN AS THE MAYOR AND TRY TO SCORE
 POINTS OFF YOU AND TO MAKE THIS A NATIONAL ISSUE AND TO DO
 SORT OF LIKE AN ANTONIO VILLARAIGOSA THING WHILE HE MEDDLES IN
 EVERYTHING. OR YOU CAN VOTE FOR WENDY GREUEL, WHO WILL STAY
 OUT AND MIND HER OWN BUSINESS. HOLLYWOODHIGHLANDS.ORG. SEE
 WHAT WE HAVE.

9 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY
10 AND THAT CONCLUDES THOSE WHO WISH TO BE HEARD ON THIS ITEM.
11 I'LL ASK FOR MR. DROOYAN TO COME FORTH AT THIS POINT AND THEN
12 WE WILL PROCEED WITH HIS PRESENTATION. HE DOES INDICATE THAT
13 IT'S IN SUMMARY FASHION. FROM THAT POINT, I THINK WE WILL MOVE
14 TO PUBLIC COMMENT. MR. JOHNSON, STAY TUNED. WELCOME MR.
15 DROOYAN, YOU MAY PROCEED.

RICHARD E. DROOYAN: I WILL AS SOON AS IT COMES BACK UP ON THE 17 18 SCREEN. THERE IT IS. GOOD AFTERNOON. THIS IS MY SIXTH REPORT 19 TO THE BOARD. THIS IS GOING TO BE A RELATIVELY BRIEF REPORT. MOST OF THE ACTIVITY IN THIS LAST PERIOD OF TIME HAS BEEN 20 WORKING WITH THE DEPARTMENT TO PUT TOGETHER THEIR PROPOSALS 21 22 FOR VARIOUS ASPECTS THAT REQUIRE FUNDING FROM THIS BOARD, AND 23 I'LL TALK ABOUT THAT IN A SECOND. YOU'LL SEE IN THIS LAST PERIOD OF TIME THE DEPARTMENT HAS REALLY ONLY COMPLETED OR 24 PARTIALLY COMPLETED TWO MORE OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS. THE 25



NUMBER OF IMPLEMENTED RECOMMENDATIONS HAS REMAINED THE SAME, 1 BUT THE NUMBER OF PARTIALLY IMPLEMENTED HAS GONE FROM 15 TO 2 17. AND I'LL TALK ABOUT THAT IN A SECOND. BUT THAT SHOULD NOT 3 BE AN INDICATION THAT THERE HAS NOT BEEN PROGRESS. THERE HAS 4 BEEN A LOT OF WORK SORT OF BEHIND THE SCENES AND I'LL TALK 5 ABOUT THAT IN A SECOND. THE TWO RECOMMENDATIONS THAT HAVE BEEN 6 PARTIALLY IMPLEMENTED BY THE DEPARTMENT IS THE RECOMMENDATION 7 8 NO. 6.7 TO INCREASE THE USE OF CUSTODY ASSISTANTS TO DEPUTY 9 RATIO. THE DEPARTMENT HAS NOW GOTTEN THE PERMISSION TO FREEZE 81 POSITIONS, WHICH MEANS THAT THEY WILL START TO BE ABLE TO 10 11 HIRE CUSTODY ASSISTANTS TO REPLACE DEPUTIES TO ACHIEVE THE 35/65 RATIO THAT'S IN THE UNION'S CONTRACTS. THAT'S GOING TO 12 TAKE SOMEWHERE, I WOULD GUESS, BETWEEN 3 TO 6 TO 8 MONTHS NEXT 13 YEAR FOR THEM TO GET THOSE PEOPLE HIRED AND TO REPLACE THOSE 14 DEPUTIES WITH CUSTODY ASSISTANTS. ONCE THAT HAPPENS, THEN THE 15 16 DEPARTMENT WILL UNDERTAKE AN ASSESSMENT OF ALL OF THE POSITIONS IN THE DEPARTMENT TO DETERMINE HOW MANY ADDITIONAL 17 18 POSITIONS THEY CAN -- DEPUTY POSITIONS THEY CAN SUBSTITUTE 19 WITH CUSTODY ASSISTANTS TO ACHIEVE EVEN A GREATER RATIO AND SOME FINANCIAL SAVINGS TO THE DEPARTMENT WITHOUT IMPACTING THE 20 21 LEVEL OF SERVICE IN THE DEPARTMENT. THE OTHER AREA WHERE THE 22 DEPARTMENT HAS MADE SOME SIGNIFICANT IMPROVEMENTS AND 23 PARTIALLY IMPLEMENTED THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE C.C.J.V. IS IN THE HANDLING OF INMATE GRIEVANCES. THE DEPARTMENT HAS NOW 24 APPOINTED AN INMATE GRIEVANCE COORDINATOR TO TRACK ALL OF THE 25



INMATE GRIEVANCES, THE PROGRESS THAT'S BEING MADE IN THE 1 HANDLING OF THOSE GRIEVANCES AND THE PROCESSING OF THOSE 2 GRIEVANCES. THEY'VE ALSO DEVELOPED A PILOT PROJECT INVOLVING 3 THE USE OF IPADS TO TAKE AND TRACK INMATE GRIEVANCES THAT 4 5 THEY'RE GOING TO IMPLEMENT OVER THE NEXT SIX MONTHS. IF THEY'RE ABLE TO FULLY IMPLEMENT THAT PROGRAM BY THE END OF 6 DECEMBER OF 2014, THAT WILL BE A SIGNIFICANT IMPROVEMENT IN 7 8 THE WAY THEY HANDLE INMATE GRIEVANCES. THE ADDITIONAL 9 ACTIVITIES IN THIS LAST PERIOD OF TIME THAT WERE NOT REFLECTED IN THAT FIRST CHART ARE COMPLETING THE REVISIONS TO THE USE OF 10 11 FORCE MANUAL. THAT IS SUBSTANTIALLY COMPLETED. I'VE COME UP WITH A FEW ADDITIONAL SUGGESTIONS THAT I NEED TO DISCUSS WITH 12 THE DEPARTMENT. ONCE THOSE ADDITIONAL SUGGESTIONS HAVE BEEN 13 AGREED TO BY THE DEPARTMENT, THE MANUAL WILL BE READY FOR 14 PUBLICATION. I'VE SAID THIS BEFORE. I REMAINED OPTIMISTIC THAT 15 16 WE WILL HAVE IT PUBLISHED AND PRESENTED TO THIS BOARD BY THE NEXT TIME THAT I APPEAR HERE. IN THIS LAST PERIOD OF TIME, THE 17 18 CONSULTANTS AND I HAVE WORKED EXTENSIVELY WITH THE DEPARTMENT 19 WITH RESPECT TO THE REVAMPING OF THE INVESTIGATIVE AND DISCIPLINARY SYSTEM AND THE DEPARTMENT'S SUBMISSION FOR 20 21 ADDITIONAL FUNDING FOR I.A.B., THE INTERNAL AFFAIRS BUREAU, 22 AND I.C.I.B., THE INTERNAL CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU. THE 23 CONSULTANTS HAVE ADVISED ME THAT THERE IS NO DOUBT IN THEIR MIND THAT THE DEPARTMENT NEEDS ADDITIONAL INVESTIGATORS IN 24 I.A.B. AND IN I.C.I.B. THE QUESTION THAT WE HAVE BEEN 25



WRESTLING WITH OVER THE LAST MONTH, MONTH AND A HALF IS: HOW 1 MANY ADDITIONAL RESOURCES DOES THE DEPARTMENT NEED? THE 2 3 DEPARTMENT AND THE CONSULTANTS AND I HAVE LOOKED AT A NUMBER OF OTHER DEPARTMENTS. WE'VE LOOKED AT THE L.A.P.D. AND THE 4 5 DEPARTMENT HAS ANALYZED THE CASELOADS OF ITS INVESTIGATORS AND I'VE PREPARED A MEMO THAT I'VE SUBMITTED TO THE C.E.O.'S 6 7 OFFICE THAT TAKES ALL THE INFORMATION THAT'S BEEN GATHERED BY 8 THE DEPARTMENT AND THE EVALUATION BY THE CONSULTANTS AND THEIR 9 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ADDITIONAL RESOURCES AND THAT'S BEEN SUBMITTED TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE. IN ADDITION, THE DEPARTMENT 10 RESPONDED TO THE C.E.O.'S REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL INFORMATION 11 REGARDING THE COMPLIANCE LIEUTENANTS. THESE WOULD BE SEVEN 12 LIEUTENANTS WHO WOULD BE ASSIGNED TO ALL OF THE FACILITIES AND 13 ONE OF THE LIEUTENANTS WOULD BE ASSIGNED TO BOTH THE NORTH AND 14 SOUTH FACILITIES. SO THERE WOULD BE SEVEN COMPLIANCE 15 16 LIEUTENANTS FOR THE EIGHT FACILITIES. THEY WOULD BE RESPONSIBLE FOR CONDUCTING ADMINISTRATIVE INVESTIGATIONS OF 17 18 CERTAIN TYPES OF FORCE. THEY WOULD BE RESPONSIBLE FOR 19 MONITORING AND TRACKING THE USE OF FORCE INVESTIGATIONS. THEY WOULD ALSO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR EVALUATING, ASSESSING, USE OF 20 21 FORCE INCIDENTS IN EACH FACILITY TO LOOK AT TRENDS, AREAS OF 22 PROBLEMS, PARTICULAR DEPUTIES WHO POTENTIALLY ARE PROBLEMS, 23 AND THEY WOULD BE DOING THAT IN EACH OF THE FACILITIES. IN A MEETING THAT I ATTENDED WITH ASSISTANT SHERIFF MCDONALD, AND 24 MANY OF HER STAFF ALONG WITH THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE, SHE 25



EMPHASIZED THE IMPORTANCE OF THESE COMPLIANCE LIEUTENANTS AND 1 THE ROLES THAT THEY COULD PLAY TO ENHANCE THE INVESTIGATION, 2 3 MONITORING AND ASSESSMENT OF USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS. THE DEPARTMENT, UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF ASSISTANT SHERIFF 4 5 MCDONALD, HAS DONE A COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT OF THE SUPERVISORY NEEDS IN THE JAILS. THEY LITERALLY WENT THROUGH 6 EACH OF THE FACILITIES FLOOR BY FLOOR, MODULE BY MODULE, SHIFT 7 8 BY SHIFT, DAY BY DAY, ASSESSED WHAT THEIR SUPERVISORY -- THE 9 EXISTING SUPERVISORY RESOURCES ARE AND WHAT ADDITIONAL RESOURCES THEY NEED AND SHOWED IN A SPREADSHEET THAT THEY 10 SUBMITTED TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE EXACTLY WHERE THE ADDITIONAL 11 PERSONNEL WOULD BE LOCATED, WHAT SHIFTS AND WHAT DAYS. THAT 12 ASSESSMENT IS NOW BEING REVIEWED BY THE CONSULTANTS. THE 13 CONSULTANTS AND I HAVE REQUESTED SOME ADDITIONAL INFORMATION. 14 WE'RE WAITING TO GET THAT BACK FROM THE DEPARTMENT. I 15 16 ANTICIPATE OVER THE NEXT PERIOD OF TIME THAT THE DEPARTMENT AND THE CONSULTANTS AND I WILL HAVE FURTHER DIALOGUE REGARDING 17 18 THE DEPARTMENT SUPERVISORY ASSESSMENT. ONCE THE CONSULTANTS 19 HAVE HAD A CHANCE TO EVALUATE IT, I WILL PREPARE A SUBMISSION TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE ALONG WITH THE DEPARTMENT SUPERVISORY 20 ASSESSMENT AND THE CONSULTANT'S EVALUATION. AND MY GOAL IS TO 21 22 HAVE THAT TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE BEFORE I REPORT BACK TO THIS 23 BOARD NEXT MONTH. AND THE LAST THING WE DID AND SPENT A FAIR AMOUNT OF TIME IS WITH RESPECT TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE 24 INSPECTIONAL SERVICES COMMAND. AS YOU RECALL, THIS IS A 25



COMMAND TO DO INTERNAL AUDITS AND INSPECTIONS. IT'S SOMETHING 1 THE DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN LACKING. IT'S SOMETHING THAT THE 2 3 DEPARTMENT HAS HAD TO CREATE. AND FOR THE LAST FOUR MONTHS, THE DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN WORKING ON THIS, THEY HAVE BEEN 4 5 WORKING ON THIS WITH THE CONSULTANTS AND MYSELF. WE'VE HAD A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT MEETINGS. WE'VE GONE BACK AND FORTH TO 6 GIVE OUR INPUT TO THE DEPARTMENT. THE LAST THING THAT I 7 8 RECEIVED FROM THE DEPARTMENT WAS A SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT. I THOUGHT THEY HAD DONE A VERY, VERY GOOD JOB IN THINKING 9 10 THROUGH WHAT THEY NEEDED, THE TIMELINE FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION, WHEN THE RESOURCES WOULD BE NEEDED, AND WHAT THOSE RESOURCES 11 WOULD BE DOING. I NEED TO DO OVER THE -- THAT IS NOW ON MY 12 PLATE TO DO A FINAL ASSESSMENT AND TO SUBMIT THAT TO THE 13 C.E.O.'S OFFICE, WHICH WILL GET DONE IN THE NEXT TWO WEEKS. 14 BUT I WAS VERY IMPRESSED WITH THE WORK PRODUCT THAT WAS 15 16 DEVELOPED BY THE DEPARTMENT IN THE LAST PERIOD OF TIME. IT TOOK A LONG TIME BECAUSE IT WAS A VERY COMPLEX PROBLEM. BUT I 17 18 THINK THE DEPARTMENT REALLY GOT THEIR ARMS AROUND IT. AND 19 THAT'S SOMETHING THAT IS NOW ON MY DESK. I'M GOING TO REVIEW THE ASSESSMENT AND I WILL SUBMIT IT TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE 20 21 WITHIN THE NEXT COUPLE OF WEEKS. SO LOOKING FORWARD, BY THE 22 TIME I'M BACK BEFORE THIS BOARD WILL BE THE APPROVAL OF THE 23 REVISED USE OF FORCE MANUAL. I HOPE IN THE NEXT 30 DAYS THAT THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE WILL APPROVE THE FUNDING REQUEST FOR THE 24 CUSTODY DIVISION TRAINING BUREAU. THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE HAS 25



ADVISED ME THAT THEY'RE DOING A FINAL REVIEW OF THAT. AND I 1 THINK THEY'RE CLOSE TO APPROVING THAT REQUEST. THE C.E.O.'S 2 3 OFFICE IS REVIEWING THE I.A.B. AND I.C.E. RESOURCE REQUEST. I ANTICIPATE THAT THERE WILL BE SOME FURTHER GIVE-AND-TAKE. THE 4 5 C.E.O.'S OFFICE WILL LIKELY HAVE SOME ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS AND REQUEST ADDITIONAL INFORMATION FROM THE DEPARTMENT, BUT I HOPE 6 THAT WE CAN GET THAT COMPLETED IN THE NEXT 30 DAYS. MY OWN 7 8 VIEW IS WE'RE PRETTY CLOSE TO COMPLETING THE ANALYSIS OF THE 9 COMPLIANCE LIEUTENANTS. THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE MAY WANT SOME ADDITIONAL INFORMATION, BUT I THINK THAT SHOULD BE PRETTY 10 11 CLOSE TO COMPLETED WITHIN THE NEXT 30 DAYS. THE DEPARTMENT IS PROVIDING INFORMATION TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE REGARDING THE 12 DATA TRACKING SYSTEM. THE DEPARTMENT ENVISIONS, IN EFFECT, TWO 13 DIFFERENT SYSTEMS THAT WILL BE LINKED TOGETHER. ONE WILL BE 14 15 THE P.P.I. SYSTEM FOR TRACKING DATA ABOUT PERSONNEL, AND THE 16 SECOND WILL BE THE CART SYSTEM. THE CART SYSTEM WILL BE THE ENTRY POINT FOR ALL INCIDENTS, ACTIVITIES, EVENTS IN THE 17 18 CUSTODY DIVISION. SUPERVISORS, COMMANDERS AND THE LIKE WILL BE 19 INPUTTING DATA FROM THE CUSTODY DIVISION INTO CARTS. ALL DATA THAT IS OF A PERSONNEL NATURE WILL AUTOMATICALLY, THEN, BE 20 21 ROUTED INTO THE PERSONNEL PERFORMANCE INDEX SYSTEM, THE P.P.I. 22 SYSTEM, SO YOU WILL HAVE ONE SET OF DATA. IT WILL BE 23 CONSISTENT. AND FOR TRACKING PERSONNEL INFORMATION, IT WILL BE IN THE P.P.I.; FOR TRACKING ALL OTHER EVENTS, IT WILL BE IN 24 THE CART SYSTEM. AND HOPEFULLY IT WILL BE A FULLY INTEGRATED 25



SYSTEM. AND THE DEPARTMENT HAS MADE AN INITIAL FUNDING REQUEST 1 TO THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE, AND I ANTICIPATE OVER THE NEXT THREE 2 3 DAYS THAT WILL CONTINUE TO BE EVALUATED. I DON'T ANTICIPATE THAT WILL BE APPROVED BY THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE IN THE NEXT 30 4 5 DAYS. AND THEN, AS I SAID, OVER THE NEXT 30 DAYS, I WILL BE WORKING WITH THE CONSULTANTS ON THE DEPARTMENT'S FUNDING 6 7 REQUESTS FOR THE INSPECTIONAL SERVICE COMMAND AND ADDITIONAL 8 SUPERVISORS. THOSE HAVE NOT BEEN SUBMITTED TO THE C.E.O.'S 9 OFFICE, BUT HOPEFULLY WILL BE IN THE NEXT 30 DAYS. AND THAT COMPLETES MY REPORT. 10

12 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH
13 FOR YOUR REPORT, MR. DROOYAN. MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, ARE THERE
14 QUESTIONS FOR MR. DROOYAN? SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH?

15

16 SUP. ANTONOVICH: RELATIVE, MR. DROOYAN, THE GROUP'S 17 RECOMMENDATIONS --

18

19 RICHARD E. DROOYAN: I'M SORRY, SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, COULD
20 YOU SAY AGAIN?

21

SUP. ANTONOVICH: IT APPEARS THAT THE GROUP OF RECOMMENDATIONS ARE READY FOR FULL IMPLEMENTATION BUT ARE IN A HOLDING PATTERN BECAUSE THEY ARE CONTINGENT ON THINGS LIKE THE FINALIZATION OF THE USE-OF-FORCE MANUAL AND THE CREATION OF THE CUSTODY



1 TRAINING DIVISION. BASED ON THAT, SHOULD WE BE SATISFIED WITH 2 THE PACE AT WHICH THE RECOMMENDATIONS ARE BEING IMPLEMENTED? 3

RICHARD E. DROOYAN: YES, I THINK SO. I MEAN, YOUR BOARD 4 5 APPOINTED ME IN DECEMBER. SO THIS IS FIVE MONTHS. OVER HALF OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS HAVE BEEN FULLY IMPLEMENTED. OVER THREE 6 7 OUARTERS OF THEM HAVE BEEN EITHER FULLY IMPLEMENTED OR 8 PARTIALLY IMPLEMENTED. THOSE THAT HAVE NOT BEEN IMPLEMENTED ARE, AS YOU INDICATED, SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, THINGS THAT THE 9 DEPARTMENT IS WORKING ON NOW, THEY'RE WORKING ON THEM WITH 10 11 MYSELF AND WITH THE CONSULTANTS. AND SOME OF THEM DO NOT REQUIRE FUNDING. THE USE OF FORCE MANUAL, THAT GETS APPROVED, 12 13 THAT'S ANOTHER SEVEN RECOMMENDATIONS. THE CUSTODY TRAINING BUREAU, WHICH IS IN THE FINAL STAGES OF REVIEW BY THE C.E.O.'S 14 15 OFFICE, THAT WILL IMPLEMENT ANOTHER SEVERAL RECOMMENDATIONS. 16 AND ALL OF THESE THINGS ARE ACTIVELY BEING WORKED ON BY THE DEPARTMENT AND BEING DEVELOPED. SO I AM VERY MUCH PLEASED WITH 17 18 THE PACE OF THE IMPLEMENTATION.

20 SUP. ANTONOVICH: AND THE LAST QUESTION, YOUR RECOMMENDATION,
21 4.11 STATES THAT MANAGEMENT SHOULD BE ASSIGNED AND ALLOCATED
22 BASED ON UNIQUE SIZE AND NEEDS OF EACH FACILITY. YOUR REPORT
23 STATES THAT THE DEPARTMENT'S ANALYSIS OF THIS RECOMMENDATION
24 HAS TAKEN LONGER THAN EXPECTED AND OUGHT TO BE COMPLETED BY
25 OCTOBER. SO ARE THERE ANY SPECIFIC REASONS WHY THE ANALYSIS IS

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1	BEING DELAYED? AND DID THE DEPARTMENT UNDERESTIMATE THE SCOPE
2	OF THE ANALYSIS?
3	
4	RICHARD E. DROOYAN: IT'S YOUR SECOND POINT. THEY
5	UNDERESTIMATED THE SCOPE OF THE ANALYSIS. THEY NEED TO LOOK AT
6	EVERY SINGLE MANAGEMENT POSITION IN EVERY FACILITY, ASSESS
7	EXACTLY WHAT THAT PERSON IS DOING, WHETHER THAT PERSON IS
8	REDUNDANT IN THAT PARTICULAR FACILITY OR WHETHER THAT PERSON
9	NEEDS HELP IN A PARTICULAR FACILITY. THEY JUST UNDERESTIMATED
10	THE AMOUNT OF WORK THAT WAS REQUIRED.
11	
12	SUP. ANTONOVICH: THANK YOU. THANK YOU, MR. CHAIR.
13	
14	SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: SUPERVISOR KNABE, SUPERVISOR
15	YAROSLAVSKY? QUESTIONS? TO THE C.E.O., AT OUR LAST MEETING'S
16	PRESENTATION BY MR. DROOYAN, YOU MAY RECALL THAT I REQUESTED A
17	REPORT BACK AT TODAY'S MEETING ON THE STATUS OF THE
18	OUTSTANDING RECOMMENDATIONS THAT REQUIRE ADDITIONAL FUNDING.
19	THE QUESTION IS: HAS THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE ESTABLISHED A
20	TIMETABLE TO BRING TO THE BOARD'S ATTENTION; THAT IS, IT'S
21	ANALYSIS OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS THAT THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT
22	INDICATES WILL REQUIRE ADDITIONAL FUNDING IN ORDER TO BE
23	IMPLEMENTED?

24

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BRENCE CULP: YES, SIR. THE 14 ORIGINAL REQUESTS THAT REQUIRED 1 2 FUNDING, AS YOU KNOW, FOUR HAVE BEEN IMPLEMENTED WITHOUT 3 FUNDING USING EXISTING RESOURCES. YOUR BOARD HAS APPROPRIATED FUNDING FOR TWO OF THE ITEMS. AS MR. DROOYAN MENTIONED, WE'RE 4 5 WORKING TOWARDS SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET ADJUSTMENT TO FUND FOUR MORE OF THE REQUESTS. AND WE BELIEVE ANOTHER FOUR WILL REMAIN, 6 7 INCLUDING THE FUNDING FOR THE O.I.G. 8 9 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU. WE'LL NEED TO SEE -- THE BOARD WILL NEED TO SEE A WRITTEN STATEMENT TO 10 11 THAT EFFECT IN TERMS OF WHAT IS TO COME FORWARD, THE TIMELINE AND THE LIKE. THAT WOULD BE HELPFUL. AND IF WE COULD GET THAT 12 IN RELATIVELY SHORT ORDER, WE COULD CONTINUE TO DO WHAT WE 13 14 NEED TO DO. 15 16 BRENCE CULP: WE WOULD BE HAPPY TO PREPARE THAT. 17 18 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU, MS. CULP. AS IT 19 RELATES TO THE SHERIFF OR THE ASSISTANT SHERIFF I SEE NEITHER OF THE TWO HERE, BUT FOR THE RECORD, LET IT BE KNOWN --20 21 22 TERRI MCDONALD: RIGHT HERE. 23 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: I'M SORRY. I SEE YOU NOW. COME 24 25 FORWARD, PLEASE, JUST FOR A MOMENT.

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2 TERRI MCDONALD: GOOD AFTERNOON.

SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. GOOD AFTERNOON TO THE 4 5 BOTH OF YOU. RECOMMENDATION 3.9 STATES THAT INMATE GRIEVANCES SHOULD BE TRACKED ON THE P.P.I. BY NAMES OF THE L.A.S.D. 6 PERSONNEL. IN LAST MONTH'S PRESENTATION WE DISCUSSED WHETHER 7 8 THE DEPARTMENT HAD IDENTIFIED ANY TRENDS REGARDING THE INMATE GRIEVANCE PROCESS AND THE DEPARTMENT DID NOT HAVE THAT 9 10 INFORMATION AVAILABLE AT THE TIME, AS YOU'LL RECALL. THE OUESTION STANDS BEFORE US AT THIS JUNCTURE. HAVE ANY TRENDS 11 REGARDING THE INMATE GRIEVANCES BEEN IDENTIFIED? IF YOU WISH 12 TO ANSWER THAT QUESTION IN THE CONTEXT OF YOUR PRESENTATION, 13 THAT WOULD BE IN ORDER. 14

16 TERRI MCDONALD: YES, SIR. WE'RE PREPARED TO DO THAT. TERRI 17 MCDONALD, ASSISTANT SHERIFF. IF YOU WOULDN'T MIND, I'VE GOT A 18 POWER POINT, I CAN COVER PRETTY MUCH EVERYTHING IN A COUPLE OF 19 MINUTES.

21 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: EXCELLENT.

23 TERRI MCDONALD: SO WHEN WE HAD MET LAST TIME, WE TALKED ABOUT,
24 AND IT'S FROM THE MERRICK BOBB REPORT, BUT IT'S AN IMPORTANT
25 DISCUSSION AND WE TALKED ABOUT THE CAMERAS. AND THE QUESTION

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WAS ASKED LAST TIME WE WERE HERE HOW MUCH IT WOULD COST TO DO 1 STATIONARY -- TO FINISH STATIONARY CAMERAS WITHIN THE ENTIRE 2 3 JAIL SYSTEM. AND SO IF THE COUNTY WAS ABLE TO WORK WITH THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE TO PUT CAMERAS EVERYWHERE THE COUNTY, THE 4 5 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WOULD LIKE TO DO IT, IT'S APPROXIMATELY \$26.7 MILLION. TO DO THE LAPEL VEST CAMERAS, IN LIEU OF THE 6 FIXED CAMERAS IS OVER \$66 MILLION. AND SO WE'LL CONTINUE TO 7 8 WORK WITH THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE ON HOW WE'D LIKE TO PROCEED FORWARD WITH THE CAMERA ITEMS. 9 10 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU FOR THAT FEEDBACK. 11 12 TERRI MCDONALD: MOVING ON, IF YOU DON'T MIND, GIVE A QUICK 13 14 OVERVIEW ON FORCE, YOU WANT ME TO JUST KEEP ROLLING, SIR? 15 16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: I'D APPRECIATE IT VERY MUCH. 17 ROLLING, ROLLING, ROLLING. 18 19 TERRI MCDONALD: YOU SHOULD HAVE A POWER POINT PRESENTATION IN FRONT OF YOU BEFORE THEY PULL UP THE POWER POINT. ESSENTIALLY 20 21 WHAT WE'VE FOUND IS THAT THE BEST NEWS IS THAT FORCE THAT'S

22 RESULTED IN A SERIOUS OR SIGNIFICANT INCIDENT TO THE OFFENDER,
23 WE'VE HAD NONE OF THOSE INCIDENTS SINCE WE LAST MET. SINCE
24 APRIL 1 OF THIS YEAR, NO OFFENDER HAS RECEIVED AN INJURY THAT
25 REQUIRED HOSPITALIZATION, FRACTURES, ANY MAJOR EVENT, WHICH IS



VERY, VERY POSITIVE. IT SHOWS THAT THE STAFF ARE USING GOOD 1 2 RESTRAINT DURING COMPLEX FORCE SITUATIONS. THE ONE THING THAT 3 IS NOTED IS THAT FORCE IS UP. IT'S TRENDED UP SLIGHTLY FROM THIS PERIOD LAST YEAR. AND I THINK I MENTIONED LAST TIME I 4 5 WOULD HAVE EXPECTED THAT. BECAUSE WHAT WE'RE FINDING IS, IS THAT WHAT I'LL CALL GUIDING FORCE, PHYSICAL STRENGTHS AND HOLD 6 TYPE OF FORCE WASN'T PREVIOUSLY REPORTED UNLESS THERE WAS AN 7 8 INJURY, AND IT HAS BEEN. SO AS A RESULT, FORCE IS UP SLIGHTLY 9 OVER LAST PERIOD. AND I THINK THE NEW BASELINE REALLY WILL BE JANUARY 1 OF 2013 BECAUSE THAT'S WHEN THE FORCE POLICY 10 CHANGED. YOU'RE NOT ABLE TO FIND IT? OKAY. SO WE'VE HAD SOME 11 COMPUTER PROBLEMS. SO I'M JUST GOING TO MOVE ALONG IN THE 12 POWER POINT. AND I'M ON PAGE 8 OF THE POWER POINT. HOPEFULLY 13 YOU HAVE IT IN FRONT OF YOU. 14

16 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ALL RIGHT. PAGE 8, WE HAVE IT.
17

18 TERRI MCDONALD: SO YOU HAD ASKED LAST TIME ABOUT THE GRIEVANCE 19 PROCESS.

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21 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: CORRECT.

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23 TERRI MCDONALD: AND, FRANKLY, I'M PLEASED TO LEARN THAT WE
24 ALREADY HAVE PLANS IN PLACE TO DEAL WITH THE GRIEVANCE
25 PROCESS, BECAUSE IT'S BEEN ONE OF THE MOST CHALLENGING



UNDERSTANDINGS I'VE TRIED TO EMBARK ON SINCE I'VE GOTTEN THE 1 JOB. I ASKED THE TEAM TO LOOK AT A TREND OF GRIEVANCES, AND 2 3 THEY WENT BACK TO MARCH OF 2012 UP TO FEBRUARY OF 2013, BECAUSE THAT'S WHEN THEY FINISHED. ONE OF THE CHALLENGES, WHEN 4 5 WE ASKED ABOUT WHAT ARE THE INMATES GRIEVING. THE INMATES USE THE SAME FORM FOR A GRIEVANCE AS THEY WOULD FOR A REQUEST. SO 6 A GRIEVANCE WOULD BE SOMETHING LIKE "THE FOOD IS COLD", OR 7 8 "I'M NOT GETTING CARE," WHEREAS A REQUEST IS "I'D LIKE TO GO 9 TO E.B.I.". SO ONE OF THE CHALLENGES WE HAVE IS REALLY STANDARDIZING HOW WE MEASURE, HOW WE REPORT THESE AND HOW WE 10 TRACK THEM. THERE WERE ALMOST 9,000 COMBINED REQUESTS AND 11 GRIEVANCES THAT HAD BEEN ENTERED INTO THE FACILITY AUTOMATED 12 FAST SYSTEM, WHICH I DON'T CONSIDER REMARKABLY HIGH FROM MY 13 PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE IN CORRECTIONS. I THINK IT'S ABOUT 14 15 STANDARD ON WHAT YOU'D FIND IN A CORRECTIONAL ENVIRONMENT, THE 16 PERCENTAGE TO TOTAL. OF COURSE IN ANY ENVIRONMENT, YOU FIND THERE ARE SOME OFFENDERS WHO TEND TO USE THE GRIEVANCE SYSTEM 17 18 MORE ROBUSTLY. WE FOUND THAT 40 INMATES HAD 10 OR MORE. AND 19 ONE PARTICULAR INMATE HAD 55 REQUESTS. AND, AGAIN, THAT'S NOT AN UNUSUAL EVENT, FROM MY PERSPECTIVE. PAGE 9 KIND OF SHOWS 20 21 SOME TREND ANALYSIS LOOKING AT POPULATION AGAINST THE NUMBER 22 OF GRIEVANCES. AND AS ONE WOULD EXPECT, AS THE POPULATION GOES 23 UP, GRIEVANCES GO UP. AS THE POPULATION GOES DOWN, GRIEVANCES GO DOWN. YOU DO NOTE THE MARCH 10 TO FEBRUARY 11, THE NUMBER 24 OF GRIEVANCES TO TOTAL POPULATION IS LOWER THAN MARCH 12 TO 25



FEBRUARY 13. I DON'T SEE THAT AS A NEGATIVE. THAT CAN ACTUALLY 1 BE A POSITIVE, WHERE IT'S SHOWING THAT INMATES HAVE MORE 2 3 ACCESS TO GRIEVANCE FORMS, WHERE WE'RE RESPONDING TO GRIEVANCES. SO, AGAIN, IT IS A MECHANISM BY WHICH MANAGEMENT 4 5 AND CUSTODY ENVIRONMENTS RESOLVE PROBLEMS AT THE LOWEST LEVEL. DEPARTMENT-WIDE, SLIDE NO. 10 WILL SHOW YOU KIND OF WHAT ARE 6 THE INMATES GRIEVING? THAT'S AN IMPORTANT MANAGEMENT OUESTION 7 8 THAT ANYBODY WOULD ASK. THE NUMBER ONE GRIEVANCE ITEM IS INMATE PROGRAMS. AND THAT'S A PRETTY BIG BUCKET OF STUFF THAT 9 GETS BOUND ALL TOGETHER. AND THAT'S WHY IT'S IMPORTANT THAT WE 10 11 CREATE A NEW SYSTEM THAT MORE CLEARLY DEFINES WHAT PROGRAMS IS. BUT PROGRAMS CAN BE YARD TIME. IT CAN BE ACCESS TO 12 RELIGIOUS SERVICES. IT CAN BE CLOTHING. SOMETIMES THEY GET ALL 13 BUCKETED TOGETHER. AND IF YOU LOOK ALL THE WAY OVER TO THE FAR 14 15 RIGHT HAND SIDE, YOU'LL SEE THAT ON AN AVERAGE MONTH, WE GET 16 174.2 GRIEVANCES FROM INMATES IN THE PROGRAM, OR, AGAIN, REQUESTS FOR SERVICES. THE SECOND BIGGEST ITEM IS MEDICAL 17 18 SERVICES. AND, FRANKLY, YOU WOULD KIND OF EXPECT THAT WHEN 19 YOU'RE PUTTING REQUESTS FOR SERVICES IN WITH GRIEVANCES. AND SO AS WE GET THIS BETTER DEFINED, IT WILL BE INTERESTING TO 20 21 SEE WHETHER OR NOT THERE ARE ACTUAL COMPLAINTS ABOUT THE 22 MEDICAL SERVICES THEY ARE OR AREN'T RECEIVING OR SIMPLY THAT 23 THEY NEED A MEDICATION RENEWAL. INMATES, THE THIRD MOST TOPICAL EVENT IS INMATE WORK ASSIGNMENTS, WHICH IS GOOD. IT'S 24 TELLING YOU THAT THE INMATES DON'T WANT TO BE IDLE, THAT 25



THEY'RE ASKING TO BE ENGAGED IN PROGRAMS. SO I SEE THAT AS A 1 POSITIVE. THE FACT IT TRENDED UP, THOUGH, AT THE END OF 2 3 FEBRUARY AND INMATE PROGRAMS TRENDED DOWN TELLS ME WE'RE COUNTING BOTH OF THOSE ISSUES IN THE SAME AREA AND IT'S AN 4 5 AREA WE NEED TO BE MORE ARTFUL ABOUT. AGAIN INMATE SERVICES PROGRAMS, VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS IS THE FOURTH. AND COMPLAINTS 6 AGAINST STAFF IS THE FIFTH. AND IF YOU LOOK ON THERE, IT WAS 7 8 MUCH HIGHER IN MARCH OF 2012 THAN IT WAS TOWARDS THE END OF 9 THE YEAR. ON AVERAGE WE RECEIVE ABOUT 43.5 COMPLAINTS AGAINST STAFF PER MONTH. MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL RECEIVED THE MOST NUMBER 10 11 OF COMPLAINTS OF ANY OF OUR JAILS. AND SO IT HAS A SLIDE ON SLIDE NO. 11. THE NO. 1 ISSUE AT MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL WAS 12 PROGRAMS. AND MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, THE LINEAR DESIGN OF IT 13 MAKES IT VERY DIFFICULT TO RUN PROGRAMS IN THERE. BUT IT'S 14 GOOD THAT THE INMATES ARE ASKING. AND YOU CAN SEE WHERE 15 16 EDUCATION-BASED INCARCERATION INCREASING AROUND OCTOBER/NOVEMBER OF '12 DECREASED THE AMOUNT OF REQUESTS OR 17 18 COMPLAINTS ABOUT NOT GETTING IT. AND, AGAIN, YOU CAN ALSO SEE 19 WHERE WE'RE NOT BEING VERY SPECIFIC BETWEEN PROGRAMS AND WORK ASSIGNMENTS, BECAUSE YOU CAN SEE IN DECEMBER THE COMPLAINT ON 20 21 PROGRAMS GOES DOWN, INMATE WORK ASSIGNMENTS GOES UP. I BELIEVE 22 THAT WE'RE COUNTING THEM IN BOTH LOCATIONS. THIRD GROUP IN 23 THERE IS INMATE SERVICES SCHOOL VOCATION. FOURTH IS HOUSING LOCATION RECLASSIFICATION. YOU WOULD EXPECT, BECAUSE OF THE 24 DESIGN OF MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL, YOU WILL GET COMPLAINTS ABOUT 25



THE DORM ENVIRONMENT THERE. AND THEN JUSTICE DELAYS. TRYING TO 1 GET THE COURT, THERE'S A LOT OF PRESENTENCE OFFENDERS IN MEN'S 2 3 CENTRAL JAIL. THE FEMALE FACILITY, C.R.D.F., SLIDE NO. 12, HAS THE HIGHEST COMPLAINTS AGAINST STAFF PERCENTAGE TO TOTAL. AND 4 5 THAT'S AN AREA IN WHICH I HAVE CONCERNS ABOUT. MOST COMPLAINTS ARE NOT FORCE COMPLAINTS; THEY'RE ACTUALLY COMPLAINTS ABOUT 6 RUDENESS. AND SO TEACHING THE DEPUTIES HOW TO COMMUNICATE WITH 7 8 OFFENDERS IN A WAY THAT DOESN'T FEEL CONFRONTATIONAL IS AN AREA IN WHICH WE NEED TO IMPROVE. THE OTHER COMPLAINTS YOU CAN 9 SEE ARE RELATIVELY LOW, AVERAGING ANYWHERE FROM REALLY 1.8 PER 10 MONTH TO 1.3 PER MONTH FOR CLOTHING, MEDICAL, FACILITY 11 CONDITION AND MISCELLANEOUS. TWIN TOWERS, THERE ARE A 12 PRIMARILY MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY. 13 14

15 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: MAY I ASK YOU A QUESTION?
16

- 17 TERRI MCDONALD: YES, SIR.

19 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ABOUT 12? THE COMPOSITION OF THE
20 WORKFORCE, DOES IT DIFFER DRASTICALLY IN THAT CONTEXT THAN
21 FROM MEN'S CENTRAL AND/OR TWIN TOWERS?

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23 TERRI MCDONALD: THE GLOBAL STAFFING NUMBER, TWIN TOWERS HAS A
24 HIGHER INMATE-TO-STAFF RATIO. THE TYPE OF EMPLOYEES ARE ABOUT
25 THE SAME. TWIN TOWERS DOES GET ENHANCED TRAINING FOR HANDLING



MENTALLY DISORDERED OFFENDERS BECAUSE THAT'S WHERE THE BULK OF 1 OUR MENTALLY ILL OFFENDERS ARE. BUT THE STAFF ARE LARGELY, YOU 2 3 KNOW, ON AVERAGE FOUR TO FIVE-YEAR DEPUTIES, RELATIVELY INEXPERIENCED FROM MY PERSPECTIVE, WHO REQUIRE A GREAT DEAL OF 4 5 TRAINING IN HOW YOU HANDLE COMPLEX OFFENDERS. 6 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: SO THE COMPOSITION OF THE STAFF 7 8 AT C.R.D.F. IS NOT SIGNIFICANTLY DIFFERENT FROM A DEMOGRAPHIC 9 POINT OF VIEW THAN WOULD BE AT MEN'S CENTRAL? 10 11 TERRI MCDONALD: YES. THE COMPOSITION OF STAFF AT C.R.D.F. IS SUBSTANTIALLY DIFFERENT THAN THE MALE FACILITY. IT'S PRIMARILY 12 13 FEMALE DEPUTIES AT C.R.D.F. 14 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: DO YOU HAVE MORE CONCERNS ABOUT 15 16 RUDENESS IN THAT CONTEXT? DID I HEAR YOU SAY THAT THAT'S --17 18 TERRI MCDONALD: THERE'S A UNIQUENESS TO MANAGING FEMALE 19 OFFENDERS TO MALE OFFENDERS. I'M PROBABLY AM NOT SAYING ANYTHING SHOCKING HERE. MEN AND WOMEN ARE DIFFERENT AND THEY 20 21 RESPOND DIFFERENTLY. 22 23 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: YES. AND WE'VE BEEN TOLD FOR 24 MOST OF MY CAREER THAT ONE OF THE REASONS FOR HAVING WOMEN IN



LAW ENFORCEMENT -- HOLD ON FOR A MOMENT -- IS THEY'RE MORE
 EFFECTIVE IN DEFUSING PROBLEMS.

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4 TERRI MCDONALD: I'M SORRY?

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SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: FOR THE LENGTH OF MY CAREER IN 6 7 PUBLIC OFFICE, THE REASON THAT HAS BEEN OFFERED FOR MORE WOMEN 8 IN LAW ENFORCEMENT IS THEIR EFFECTIVENESS IN DIFFUSING 9 PROBLEMS WHEN COMPARED TO THEIR MALE COUNTERPARTS. SO I FIND THIS TO BE INTERESTING THAT YOU ARE SUGGESTING THAT YOU'RE 10 11 HAVING MORE COMPLAINTS OF A CERTAIN SORT IN C.R.D.F. COMPARED TO MEN'S CENTRAL, FOR EXAMPLE. I'M JUST TRYING TO PULL THAT 12 13 FORWARD FOR SOME COMMENTARY.

14

TERRI MCDONALD: I AGREE WITH YOU. I THINK PEOPLE GENERALLY 15 16 EXPECT FEMALE DEPUTIES WOULD BE BETTER COMMUNICATORS. BUT FEMALE OFFENDERS NEED A MUCH LARGER, MUCH MORE PROTRACTED TIME 17 18 OF COMMUNICATION THAN A MALE OFFENDER DOES. YOU CAN TELL A 19 MALE OFFENDER GENERALLY NO, AND THEY'LL GO ABOUT THEIR WAY. A FEMALE OFFENDER YOU GENERALLY HAVE TO TAKE SOME TIME TO 20 EXPLAIN WHY. AND IF YOU DON'T HONE YOUR COMMUNICATION SKILLS, 21 22 YOU GET GRIEVANCES. SAME IN THE STATE PRISON SYSTEM. IT'S NO 23 DIFFERENT.

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INTERESTING OBSERVATION WHICH WE'LL BE PAYING CLOSE ATTENTION 2 3 TO ON A GO-FORWARD BASIS. PLEASE PROCEED NOW. 4 5 TERRI MCDONALD: AND LUCKILY I'M A WOMAN SO I CAN SAY IT LIKE I'VE SAID. I'M NOT SURE MR. DROOYAN WOULD GET AWAY WITH IT AS 6 HEALTHY AS I WAS. IT'S AN AREA NEED TO WORK ON. 7 8 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WE'LL SEE. 9 10 TERRI MCDONALD: SO I HAD -- THE NEXT SLIDE IS TWIN TOWERS. 11 TWIN TOWERS IS OUR PRIMARILY MENTAL HEALTH. THE LARGEST 12 COMPLAINTS ARE COMPLAINTS AGAINST STAFF. IT'S AN AREA AGAIN IN 13 WHICH WE NEED TO CONTINUE TO WORK WITH HANDLING MENTALLY ILL 14 OFFENDERS. AND SO WE'LL CONTINUE TO HONE THOSE SKILLS. NOTHING 15 16 I SAW IN HERE THAT I FOUND REMARKABLY ALARMING FROM OVERALL HOW THEY STAND AGAINST THE OTHER JAILS. AND THEN OUR LARGEST, 17 18 NUMBER 14, OUR LARGEST GENERAL POPULATION JAIL UP AT PITCHESS 19 DETENTION CENTER, WE HAVE NEARLY 4,000 INMATES AND THERE ARE A VERY LOW NUMBER OF COMPLAINTS. THE HIGHEST ONE COMPLAINTS 20 AGAINST STAFF. BUT 1.5. THIS WOULD, THOUGH, CAUSE ME TO MAKE 21 22 SURE THAT WE'RE PICKING UP GRIEVANCES AND GRIEVANCES ARE 23 AVAILABLE BECAUSE IT'S A PRETTY LOW NUMBER OF GRIEVANCES. SO IT'S AN AREA IN WHICH I WANT TO MAKE SURE THOSE FORMS ARE 24 AVAILABLE TO THE OFFENDERS. AND THEN THE REST OF THE 25

SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WELL WE FIND THIS TO BE A VERY



FACILITIES WE KIND OF PUT ALL ONTO ONE SLIDE BECAUSE THEIR 1 TOTAL NUMBER OF COMPLAINTS FOR THAT ENTIRE YEAR PERIOD WAS 2 3 VERY LOW. SO THE RECEPTION CENTER HAD ONLY HAD 12 COMPLAINTS, WHICH WOULD GENERALLY BE NORMAL. THEY'RE ONLY THERE FOR LESS 4 5 THAN 24 HOURS. NORTH HASN'T BEEN OPEN THE ENTIRE YEAR, SO IT'S NOT A FULL YEAR. AND THEN SOUTH AND EAST BOTH RUNNING 37 TO 42 6 7 TOTAL COMPLAINTS FOR THE YEAR. AGAIN, I DON'T -- I'M NOT HERE 8 CELEBRATING THAT NUMBER. I THINK WE NEED TO BE MINDFUL THAT THE GRIEVANCES ARE OUT THERE, THAT WE'RE RESPONDING TO THEM, 9 THAT WE'RE TRACKING THEM. I DON'T WANT TO ASSUME THAT THIS IS 10 AS ACCURATE AS I'D LIKE IT TO BE. 11

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#### 13 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: ALL RIGHT.

14

TERRI MCDONALD: AND THEN I KIND OF WANTED TO TALK A LITTLE BIT 15 16 ABOUT COMPLAINTS AGAINST STAFF BECAUSE THE GRIEVANCE SYSTEM IS A BAROMETER AND MECHANISM BY WHICH WE CAN LOOK THROUGH TO SEE 17 18 IF WE'RE GETTING ANY ALLEGATIONS OF EXCESSIVE OR UNNECESSARY 19 FORCE THAT AN OFFENDER DIDN'T BRING FORWARD IN ANOTHER MECHANISM. SO DURING THAT YEAR PERIOD WE HAD 522 COMPLAINTS 20 21 AGAINST STAFF, REPRESENTED ABOUT 6 PERCENT OF THE TOTAL 22 COMPLAINTS. OF THOSE 522, 19 OF THEM RESULTED IN SOME KIND OF 23 A CORRECTIVE ACTION WITH THE EMPLOYEE. IT COULD BE ADDITIONAL TRAINING. IT COULD BE A LETTER OF CORRECTION. 6 COMPLAINTS 24 WERE REFERRED OVER FOR FORMAL INVESTIGATION, WHETHER IT WAS AN 25



INTERNAL AFFAIRS OR CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION. LOOKING AT IT, WE 1 LOOKED FOR TRENDS OF ANY PARTICULAR DEPUTY, CUSTODY ASSISTANT, 2 3 ASSISTANT SHERIFF THAT HAD ANY COMPLAINTS AGAINST THEM. THREE OF THEM HAD -- 11 OF THEM HAD THREE OR MORE COMPLAINTS. 41 HAD 4 5 TWO OR MORE COMPLAINTS. AND THEN WE HAD ONE CLINICIAN WHO HAD 10 COMPLAINTS. AND WHEN WE LOOKED AT THAT PARTICULAR ISSUE, IT 6 7 WAS A FORM OF COMMUNICATION THAT WE NEEDED TODAY WORK WITH THE 8 CLINICIAN ON HOW THEY INTERACT WITH OUR OFFENDERS IN A WAY 9 THAT'S MORE PRODUCTIVE. I MENTIONED WHEN I STARTED OUT THAT GRIEVANCES WAS AN AREA IN WHICH I BELIEVE WE NEED TO FOCUS 10 SOME EFFORT ON. AND SO PAGE 17 KIND OF BRINGS OUT WHAT I FIND 11 TO BE THE CHALLENGE OF IT. THERE WAS A REAL LACK OF 12 CONSISTENCY IN HOW WE TRACKED, RESPONDED TO AND RESTORED 13 GRIEVANCES ACROSS THE JAILS. THE SOLUTION TO THAT, FROM MY 14 PERSPECTIVE, IS THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE LIEUTENANTS THAT MR. 15 16 DROOYAN SPOKE ABOUT EARLIER WHO SERVE NOT ONLY AS USE OF FORCE -- AS INVESTIGATORS, USE OF FORCE ANALYSTS, USE OF FORCE 17 18 TRACKERS, BUT ALSO GRIEVANCE TRACKERS AS WELL AS WE 19 ESTABLISHED A DIVISION-WIDE INMATE GRIEVANCE COORDINATOR WHO WORKS FOR ME LOOKING FOR TRENDS, LOOKING FOR PROBLEMS AS WE 20 GO. THE SECOND ONE IS JUST THE I.T. SYSTEM'S INABILITY TO 21 22 PRODUCE THE TYPE OF REPORTS THAT WE NEED TO PRODUCE. AND SO 23 THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT HAS ALREADY BEEN WORKING ON THIS AS IT RELATED TO THE CARTS THAT MR. DROOYAN TALKED ABOUT AND THE 24 PERSONNEL PERFORMANCE INDEX. AND I BELIEVE THE ESTABLISHMENT 25

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OF THOSE AND IMPROVEMENT OF THOSE I.T. SYSTEMS WILL ACTUALLY
 RESOLVE THE CHALLENGES ASSOCIATED WITH HERE. SO I THINK WE
 HAVE WORK TO DO HERE. WILLING AT ANY POINT TO COME BACK AND
 TALK ABOUT HOW WE'RE DOING IN THE FUTURE. IT DOES HAVE MY
 COMMITTED ATTENTION.

6

SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY
AND YOUR PRESENTATION. MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, ARE THERE
QUESTIONS FOR THE ASSISTANT SHERIFF? THAT CAUSES ME TO BELIEVE
THAT YOU HAVE DONE A THOROUGH PRESENTATION OR OTHERWISE WE ARE
EXHAUSTED. [LAUGHTER.]

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13 TERRI MCDONALD: THANK YOU SO MUCH.

KEVIN JAMES IS A RACIST. HE IS ONLY BROUGHT OUT 4 5 FOR THE RACIST VOTE THAT WERE OUT THERE NEAR PLAYA DEL REY AND HE'S WITH A RACIST REPUBLICANS. IF YOU ARE TO THE LEFT OF 6 KEVIN JAMES, THEN YOU MUST VOTE DEMOCRATIC. DON'T BE FOOLED BY 7 8 THIS GUY. HE'S A RACIST. AND HE GOES TO BED AND GETS UP, KEVIN 9 JAMES AND ERIC GARCETTI ARE IN BED TOGETHER. IT'S PRETTY SICKENING. HOLLYWOODHIGHLANDS.ORG. 10

DENISE PAZ: HI. I'M DENISE PAZ, MUCH HAS BEEN SAID ABOUT 14 CHALLENGES FACING THE FOSTER CARE SYSTEM AND FOSTER CHILDREN 15 16 THEMSELVES. IT SEEMS THOSE CHALLENGES DON'T END WHEN KIDS TURN 18. FOSTER KIDS AGE OUT OF THE FOSTER CARE, HAVE TO FIND JOBS 17 18 AND HOUSING THROUGH THEIR OWN EFFORTS. THEY HAVE A FEW 19 RESOURCES TO FALL BACK ON. CORRECTING THE HOMELESS YOUTH SHOULD BE THE BEST ALTERNATIVE. TRANSITIONAL HOUSING AVAILABLE 20 FOR FORMER FOSTER KIDS UNTIL THE AGE OF 21. THAT'S BASICALLY 21 22 SUBSIDIZED HOUSING WHICH IS SIMILAR TO SECTION 8. THE STATE 23 STEPS IN AND EXPECTS LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO ALLOW D.C.F.S. TO DO A BETTER JOB FOR THE CHILDREN WHO ARE 24 BEING EXPOSED TO ABUSE, BUT INSTEAD, D.C.F.S. OF LOS ANGELES 25



COUNTY ARE CONTRIBUTING TO THE DEATHS TO THESE CHILDREN. 1 FOSTER KIDS MOVE PLACEMENT SOMETIMES THROUGH 10 PLACEMENTS OR 2 3 MORE OVER THE COURSE OF THEIR TIME IN FOSTER CARE. SO THAT MEANS MOVING SCHOOLS, THEY DON'T -- THEY CAN'T JOIN A 4 5 BASKETBALL TEAM. THEY CAN'T GO TO PROM. THEY HAVE TO START ALL OVER. WHEN KIDS GO OFF TO COLLEGE, MOST KIDS WHO DON'T COME 6 FROM FOSTER CARE BACKGROUNDS, WITH THEY GO OFF TO COLLEGE, 7 8 MANY KIDS GO BACK TO THEIR PARENTS' HOME FOR THE SUMMER. AND KIDS MOVING BACK TO THEIR PARENTS' HOPE. SO THEY'VE GOT A 9 SAFETY NET. FOSTER KIDS DON'T HAVE THAT. THEY DON'T HAVE 10 FAMILY SUPPORT TO GO TO. THOSE CHILDREN END UP HOMELESS. THEY 11 END UP IN SHELTERS. THEY END UP EATING DINNER AT OUR OUTREACH 12 CENTERS. THEY END UP ON FOOD PANTRIES, FOOD STAMPS AND SLEEP 13 UNDER BRIDGES. 60 PERCENT OF FOSTER YOUTH HAVE AN EPISODE OF 14 15 HOMELESSNESS. D.C.F.S. ARE NOT USING GOOD JUDGMENT WHEN MORE 16 THAN HALF OF OUR CHILDREN END UP HOMELESS. THANK YOU.

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18 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU, MS. PAAS. FINAL
19 SPEAKER MISS SIGMUND, YES.

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21 TERRY SIGMUND: YES, HELLO. I JUST WANTED TO ADDRESS -22 ACTUALLY IT WAS INTERESTING THAT THE OTHER SPEAKER WAS SAYING
23 THAT THERE'S SUCH A HIGH SUICIDE RATE IN TEENAGERS. IN FACT,
24 STATISTICS HAVE SHOWN THAT THE SUICIDE RATE IS EXTREMELY HIGH
25 AMONG TEENAGERS WHO DON'T HAVE RELIGIOUS FAITH. AND HERE MY



CHILDREN ARE BEING TOTALLY DENIED RELIGIOUS FREEDOM WHEN I 1 HAVE PARENTAL RIGHTS AND CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS THAT YOU 2 3 APPARENTLY SEEM TO THINK NOT MUCH OF, HAVE BEEN COMPLETELY VIOLATED. HERE IT SAYS IN YOUR OWN PAMPHLET THAT YOU'VE GOT 4 5 THE RIGHT TO GO TO RELIGIOUS SERVICES AND THE KID HAS A CHOICE. IN ALMOST THREE YEARS, MY CHILDREN HAVEN'T GONE TO ANY 6 RELIGIOUS ACTIVITIES, LET ALONE THE ONE OF WHAT WE BELIEVE IN, 7 8 SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS. I DON'T UNDERSTAND HOW YOU CAN SIT HERE, IGNORE AND ACTUALLY PRETTY MUCH NOT EVEN LISTEN TO WHAT 9 I HAVE TO SAY TO YOU AS YOU ALL SEEM TO BE IN YOUR OWN WORLD 10 11 WHILE I'M TALKING. WHICH IS SO NICE BECAUSE I WAITED HOURS TO GET YOUR ATTENTION BUT THAT'S NOT REALLY IMPORTANT, YOU'RE 12 BUSY, RIGHT. 13

15 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS, CHAIRMAN: MAKE NO MISTAKE ABOUT IT, MISS
16 SIGMUND, YOU HAVE OUR ATTENTION.

17

18 TERRY SIGMUND: I DIDN'T HAVE YOUR ATTENTION. YOU GUYS ARE ALL 19 TALKING. SO WHILE I'M TALKING ABOUT HOW YOU'RE STAMPING ON MY SON'S CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS, YOU COULDN'T CARE LESS BECAUSE 20 IT'S JUST THE CONSTITUTION OF THIS COUNTRY, I GET THAT. BUT 21 22 EITHER WAY, I WONDER WHY YOU ALWAYS SENT ME TO MR. ALDAMARINE 23 WHO IGNORES THAT ALSO. EVEN AS SEVERE AS WHEN LAST TIME I POINTED OUT TO HIM, YOU HAVE BEEN DENYING MY SON TO BE LOSING 24 WEIGHT. YOU PUT IN WRITING THAT MY SON IS NOT LOSING WEIGHT 25



THAT MY WORRIES ABOUT IT IS JUST STRESSING OUT MY CHILDREN, 1 THEY'RE NOT REAL. I CAME WITH THESE CHARTS. I SHOWED YOU 2 3 THEY'RE UNDERWEIGHT. NOW YOU'RE CHARGING ME, THIS IS A PETITION TO CHARGE ME WITH EMOTIONAL DAMAGE. AND LISTEN TO 4 5 WHAT IT SAYS. THE CHILD EXHIBITS ANXIETY IN THE FORM OF LOSING WEIGHT.
