The Chief Administrative Officer's attached recommendation to approve a Board policy authorizing all County departments, in their normal course of operation and interaction with the public, to continue to accept the Matricula Consular Identification Card for identification purposes only; authorizing the Chief Administrative Officer to approve acceptance of other foreign consulate identification cards as valid photo identification, based on established criteria; and instructing the Chief Administrative Officer to advise the Board of any such additional identification cards accepted.

Ambassador Martha Lara, Consul General of Mexico, Louis Gray, representing the Los Angeles Police Department, Miriam Galicia Duarte, representing Wells Fargo, Janice L. Maurizi, District Attorney's Office, and Genevieve Clavreul addressed the Board.

After discussion, Supervisor Molina made a motion that the Board adopt the Chief Administrative Officer's aforementioned recommendation regarding the Matricula Consular Identification Card.

Supervisor Knabe made a suggestion that Supervisor Molina's motion be amended to also instruct the Chief Administrative Officer to perform an annual review in the use of the card by Departments, including in the report the training that has gone into the project as well as any potential problems that have been identified, and report back to the Board in one year. Supervisor Molina accepted Supervisor's Knabe's amendment.

MATRICULA CONSULAR IDENTIFICATION CARD PILOT PROJECT (ALL DISTRICTS AFFECTED) (3 VOTES)

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:

1. Approve a Board policy: authorizing all County departments, in their normal course of operation and interaction with the public, to continue to accept the Matricula Consular Identification Card for identification purposes only; delegating to the Chief Administrative Officer the authority to approve acceptance of other foreign consulate identification cards as valid photo identification, based on established criteria; and instructing the Chief Administrative Officer to advise your Board of any such additional identification cards accepted.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

On June 11, 2002, on motion by Supervisor Molina, your Board instituted a six-month pilot project authorizing all County departments, in their normal course of operations and interaction with the public, to accept the Matricula Consular Identification Card (MCIC) issued by the Consulate of Mexico as valid identification. Moreover, your Board instructed the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to 1) report back in six-months with findings on the progress of the pilot program, and 2) report back on similar policies for acceptance of identification cards issued by other consulates.



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Consistent with your Board's request, the CAO administered two questionnaires to County departments, contacted over 80 foreign consulates, and conducted research on other government agencies that have recently adopted ordinances or policies accepting the MCIC or other foreign consulate cards as valid photo identification. Based on the positive responses from County departments to accepting the MCIC as a valid form of identification, the negligible costs associated with accepting the MCIC, and the interest of other foreign consulates to have their identification honored by County departments, we are recommending that a Board policy be approved with the following major components:

- The MCIC is permanently accepted as valid photo identification for County programs/services; and
- The CAO is delegated the authority to approve acceptance of other foreign consulate identification cards, based on standards that ensure that any foreign consulate identification card accepted requires the applicant to provide reliable identifying information to obtain the card, and that the card has features reasonably designed to protect against fraud and counterfeit reproduction.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

This action supports the following County Strategic Plan Goals and Strategies:

Goal: **Service Excellence** – Provide the public with easy access to quality information and services that are both beneficial and responsive.

Strategy: Develop standards for user-friendly service.

Goal: **Organizational Effectiveness** – Ensure that service delivery systems are efficient, effective, and goal-oriented.

Strategy: Improve internal operations.

FISCAL IMPACT

Based on responses from departments, there appears to be no significant fiscal impact to accepting the MCIC as valid identification for County services/programs. The majority of departments responded there was either no impact or fiscal impact could not be determined because the MCIC had not been presented during the six-month pilot project.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS

Implementation and Impact of Pilot Project

The CAO evaluated the implementation and impact of the pilot project by administering two questionnaires. The first questionnaire was distributed to all departments at the beginning of the six-month pilot project to obtain information on: 1) programs/services where the MCIC could be utilized; 2) programs/services requiring proof of citizenship/legal residence where the Matricula could not be accepted; and 3) initial concerns and issues regarding the acceptance of the MCIC. Attachment I provides a matrix of all responses from departments. The following are highlights from the responses:

- Of the 39 County departments sent the initial questionnaire, 28 indicated they could utilize the MCIC as part of their normal operations. Examples of how the MCIC could be utilized ranged from verifying identification of a person to cash a personal check to opening a County library account.
- Six County departments indicated they have programs/services requiring proof of citizenship or legal residence where the MCIC alone would not suffice. These included the Departments of Children and Family Services, Community and Senior Services, Health Services, Probation, and Public Social Services, and the Community Development Commission. These programs/services include subsidized housing programs, full-scope Medi-Cal and Health Families programs, food stamps, and General Relief.
- Four County departments expressed initial concerns regarding the acceptance of the MCIC. Two departments had concerns regarding staffs' ability to recognize legitimate IDs, one department was concerned with the possibility of increased identity theft, and another department mentioned that Notary Publics would not accept the MCIC as a valid form of identification.

We encourage all County departments to review the responses of those departments providing feedback on the initial questionnaire to determine if there may be applicability to their operations.

The second questionnaire, which was distributed towards the end of the six-month pilot project, was sent to affected departments identified from the first questionnaire. This questionnaire focused on obtaining information on 1) advantages/disadvantages of accepting the MCIC, 2) fiscal savings/costs, and 3) overall operational impacts. Attachment II provides a matrix of all responses from affected departments. The following provides highlights of the responses:

- Of the impacted departments that responded to the follow-up questionnaire, most reported advantages to accepting the MCIC. The following are examples: the Department of Health Services responded that County hospitals identified the benefit of verifying birth dates and identification of patients, as well as verifying patient demographic information to add to their Health Information System; the Public Library identified the benefit of encouraging literacy by making it easier for families to obtain library cards; and the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) indicated the benefit of having another form of identification to assist staff in completing "Live Scan" searches (criminal clearances that are verified by the Department of Justice).
- According to the Sheriff's Department, the main benefit of accepting the MCIC is that a patrol deputy can avoid arresting a person for a traffic infraction in order to obtain a suspect's identity via fingerprinting. This would save time since the deputy could stay in the field instead of spending up to an hour for booking, as well as save in costs related to handling the person while in custody. However, the Sheriff's Department mentions that "there is no way to truly determine whether or not the ID was obtained fraudulently since no database exists to confirm the identity of those who have been issued the MCIC."
- The Child Support Services Department (CSSD) reported two disadvantages to accepting the MCIC: 1) California Law does not recognize the MCIC for acknowledgments, therefore, cannot be used for Notary Public purposes, and 2) concerns from staff that they are not trained in examining authenticity of MCIC.
- Most departments reported no fiscal impact to accepting the MCIC. The Public Library reported negligible costs in distributing staff instructions, providing staff training, and producing public relations materials about the program. DCFS reported fiscal savings accepting MCIC since more relative caregivers are being considered for kinship placement, which is less expensive than the cost of foster family agencies or group home care.

- Several departments have experienced positive impacts from the acceptance of the MCIC. According to CSSD's Spanish-speaking staff, case participants with MCIC have expressed feeling more comfortable providing or obtaining information about their cases. Also, the Public Library's staff has noticed the public has used the MCIC to register for library cards with increased ease.

Other Consulates Identification Cards

Consistent with your Board's instructions to report back on similar policies for acceptance of photo cards issued by other consulates, this office sent out a letter to over 80 foreign consulates in the greater Los Angeles area requesting information on identification cards they may issue similar to the MCIC. Of the consulates that responded, only three (Argentina, Guatemala, and Peru) currently issue identification cards. At their request, CAO staff met with the consulates of Argentina and Guatemala who wanted to discuss the County's pilot project and express their strong interest in having the County honor their consulate ID cards. Five other consulates (China, Ecuador, El Salvador, Honduras, and Korea) are either in the process or expressed interest in issuing consulate ID cards to their citizens in the near future.

Government Agencies Accepting Consulate Identification Cards

A number of government agencies have recently adopted policies accepting the MCIC as valid identification. Such agencies include the Counties of Santa Cruz, Santa Clara, and Ventura. The City of Los Angeles has established the acceptance of the MCIC cards as a pilot project similar to the one established by your Board's and is scheduled to take permanent action in the near future.

The City and County of San Francisco and the City of Oakland have adopted ordinances accepting any foreign consulate's identification card as valid identification upon meeting certain requirements. Both agencies have delegated to their respective head administrators the responsibility of establishing requirements and ensuring that foreign consulate identification cards accurately identify the person and have reasonably designed security features to protect against fraud and counterfeit reproduction.


Additionally, law enforcement agencies from the City of San Jose and the Counties of Orange, Sacramento, San Diego, and Santa Cruz have adopted policies accepting the MCIC and/or foreign consulate ID cards as a valid form of identification for law enforcement activities

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IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES

Based on responses from County departments, there is no indication that existing programs are being augmented due to the acceptance of consulate identification cards. The key impact on current services from accepting consulate cards appears be in terms of encouraging and facilitating access to County information and services to persons that do not have any other form of identification.
