APPROVAL TO AMEND THE MEDICAL SCHOOL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT H-707735 WITH CHARLES R. DREW UNIVERSITY OF MEDICINE AND SCIENCE **EFFECTIVE DATE OF EXECUTION THROUGH JUNE 30, 2023** (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

Request approval to execute an amendment to the Medical School Affiliation Agreement H-707735 with Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science, to increase funding to support additional student enrollment.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- 1. Approve and instruct the Interim Director of the Health Agency (Director), or designee, to execute an amendment, substantially similar to Exhibit I, to the Medical School Affiliation Agreement (MSAA) with Charles R. Drew University (CDU) of Medicine and Science for the Pathways to Health, Meaningful Health Careers Academy (Academy) component, to support additional student enrollment, increasing the annual maximum obligation by\$319,770, from \$390,830 to \$710,600, effective date of execution for the period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2023; funded by the Department of Public Health (DPH) and the Department of Mental Health (DMH).
- 2. Delegate authority to the Interim Director, or designee, to execute amendments to the Academy component of the MSAA, that provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 10 percent above or below the revised annual base maximum obligation, effective upon amendment execution, and make corresponding service adjustments, as necessary, subject to review and approval by County Counsel and notification to your Board and the Chief Executive Office.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

In the summer of 2018, DPH and the DMH partnered with CDU in South Los Angeles and local community partners to launch an academic and community internship initiative to prepare young people for health careers. This led to the Academy, which focused on increasing the number of high school students of color that complete academic enrichment and internship opportunities to prepare them for meaningful health careers.

The inaugural cohort was comprised of 23 students, primarily from CDU-adjacent neighborhoods, who took part in a four-week summer academy at the CDU campus where the students completed an introductory public health college course and other college preparation courses. In the nine months after the summer program, students completed internships at community organizations primarily located in neighborhoods surrounding CDU. Aside from the internship, during Fall 2018, students were also able to take part in a Saturday Science Academy that expanded upon the community mental health content learned during the summer session; SAT preparation workshops; and ongoing mentorship. After participation in the Academy, 92 percent of the participants strongly agreed or agreed that they felt more confident and better equipped for college.

Approval of Recommendation 1 will allow the Health Agency to execute an amendment to the MSAA H-707735 with CDU to increase the maximum obligation to support additional activities for the Academy. The Health Agency currently has delegated authority to increase funding for this agreement; however, the recommended increase exceeds that authority. The additional funding will allow the Academy to increase its enrollment from 23 to 40 students, thus allowing more students to learn about and explore careers in public, mental, and behavioral health.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow the Health Agency to execute amendments to the Academy component of the MSAA to increase or decrease funding up to 10 percent above or below the revised annual base maximum obligation, effective upon amendment execution, and make corresponding service adjustments, as necessary.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support Strategy II.2, "Support the Wellness of Our Communities", III.1 "Continually Pursue Development of Our Workforce" and III.3, "Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability" of the County's Strategic Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total cost for the recommended increase to the Academy component of the MSAA, for the period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020, is \$710,600 consisting of \$355,300 from DMH and \$355,300 from DPH.

Funding for this increase has been included in DPH and DMH's fiscal year (FY) 2019-20 Recommended Budget and will be included in future FYs, as necessary.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On May 29, 2018, your Board approved execution of a MSAA with CDU, which included the Academy component.

In June 2019, an amendment was executed with CDU for the Academy component to continue for the remainder of the MSAA through June 30, 2023, and increase the annual maximum obligation by \$35,530 to \$390,830.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Given the nature and scope of the services provided by CDU under the MSAA, the Health Agency has determined that additional services should continue to be provided by CDU.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommendations will ensure a pipeline of students that represent the demographic and socioeconomic diversity of Los Angeles County and are interested in benefiting the County's medically underserved and vulnerable populations through a career in public, mental, and/or behavioral health.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, this Agreement is authorized under California Code, Government Code Section 31000 which authorizes the Board of Supervisors to contract for medical education and other related services; and

WHEREAS, on June 17, 2019, the parties executed an amendment to extend the term of the Pathways to Health, Meaningful Health Careers Academy (Academy) program and to increase the number of students participating in the Pathway to Health program located at Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science for an increase of 10% in the amount of \$35,530; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the parties hereto to execute an amendment to further increase funding by \$319,770 annually, and to increase the number of students participating in the Academy program; and

WHEREAS, the Agreement, Sub-paragraph 11.1 - Amendments provides that such changes may be made in the form of an Amendment which is formally approved and executed by the parties; and

WHEREAS, the County and the University believe that their missions are complementary and agree that it is in their best interests to continue to fulfill their respective missions through an affiliation.

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the parties agree to the following:

1. This Amendment shall be effective upon execution.

- 2. The Agreement is hereby incorporated by reference, and all of its terms and conditions, including capitalized terms defined herein, shall be given full force and effect as if fully set forth herein.
- 3. The Agreement Addendum A-3 (a) Purchased Services Performance Based Payments Pathways to Health, Meaningful Health Careers Academy located at Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science, shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced with Addendum A-3 (b) that shall be effective July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2023, which increases the cost in the amount of \$319,770 for a total annual Maximum Obligation of \$710,600.
- 4. Except for the changes set forth hereinabove, Agreement shall not be changed in any respect by this Amendment.

Pathways to Health, Meaningful Health Careers Academy Located at Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science

<u>Purpose – Provide oversight for Pathways to Health and administer the summer academy program</u>

- Manage the implementation of Pathways for Health; this includes coordinating efforts of key partners (e.g. Department of Mental Health (DMH), Department of Public Health (DPH), and Coachman Moore & Associates)
- Establish a 4-week summer academy program and complementary community-based internship for 40, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th grade students primarily from South LA and prioritizing population including but not limited to transitional aged youth (TAY) and students with mental health lived experience, interested in health careers, specifically in the fields of public, mental, and behavioral health; this includes recruiting and selecting students and faculty, mentoring student participants, and establishing meaningful educational experiences to prepare students for success in college.

- 4. At the sole discretion of the Health Agency Director or his designee, he/she may authorize University to make prospective budget adjustment within and/or between the Program Goals, once every six months. To effect such an adjustment, University shall submit a written request to adjust its budget to the Health Agency Director. The request must include a proposal narrative to support the request and revised budget. Subject to the Health Agency Director's, or his designee's sole discretion and approval, an amendment to the Agreement shall be mutually agreed upon, prepared by the County and executed by the parties.
- 5. University shall reconcile its expenditures under this Agreement annually, and provide a reporting of such to the County at the above-mentioned address and attention of the same addressee. All funds provided to University that are not encumbered by June 30th of a Contract Year and spent (i.e., all goods and/or services received and paid for) within 45 calendar days following the end of a CY, shall be refunded to DMH no later than 90 calendar days following the end of such CY. Notwithstanding, at the sole discretion of the Health Agency Director or his designees, he/she may authorize University to rollover unspent funds to the next fiscal year. To effect such a rollover, University shall submit a written request to rollover funding to the Health Agency Director no later than April 30 of each CY. The request must provide an explanation why the University will not be able to fully utilize funds in the current CY, as well as provide a proposal narrative and budget detailing how it will use the rolled over funds in the following CY. Subject to the Health Agency Director's, or his designee's sole discretion and approval, an amendment to the Agreement shall be mutually agreed upon, prepared by the County and executed by the parties.
