I am writing to address the meeting on Tuesday, April 28, 2020.

The first item I want to address is No. 14: Workers' Protection

The care of thoroughbred race horses at Santa Anita, and every track in the world, takes skill, care and a special knowledge of how to work around 1000-1200 pound animals who are lightning quick and dangerous at any moment in time. These are generally trained, domesticated animals, but the nature of a horse is flight when scared or suddenly surprised. They may go from tame to scared in a second depending upon noise or movements not telegraphed. As a result, it takes incredible attention to detail and attention to each individual horse when in close quarters (like a stall or shedrow or even on the racetrack) to be aware of a horse's tendencies and patience and tolerance to sudden changes in the horse's periphery vision and very acute hearing. The handlers of the horses at the racetrack are especially adept at anticipating and "feeling" a horse's extra sensory movements; they must be acutely aware because horses in training at racetracks are highly strung and ready to "go" in a moments notice.

These handlers live at the racetrack in quarters either above, or next to, the stalls where the horses live. Horses are paradoxically fragile yet powerful. The handlers have one eye closed and the other eye half open but their ears are on alert 24/7. Any unusual noise coming from any stall is investigated immediately. At night, a horse may colic and as a result, roll around and thrash their stall. A handler will be there immediately to alert the trainer and try to comfort the horse. These handlers, many in fact, have been taking care of thoroughbred horses for 30 years or more. They do not own their own homes. They live at the racetrack. They must live at the racetrack for the reasons mentioned above.

Without live horse racing, the horse racing industry will collapse. When horses run in races, purse money is distributed to the owners who in turn pay the trainer who pays the handlers. Without any one of these stakeholders living in harmony and earning wages, the industry cannot survive. To protect these handlers, the races must be allowed to continue under the strict protocols introduced by Santa Anita and approved by the health experts. Without racing, there is no money to operate the racetrack and there is no money to support the trainers and the handlers. Horse racing supports and huge cast of business people in all walks of life. Without racing, the horse racing industry and all vendors and suppliers will go bankrupt and the industry will not survive or return.

Please protect the horse handlers by allowing racing to continue at Santa Anita immediately which will generate wages to thousands of stakeholders providing services for the industry. Thank you.

The second item I want to address is No. 19: Safely reopening Santa Anita for live horse racing with the grandstand empty.

For the reasons stated above, it's all about people and their ability to feed their families and support the entire industry so that it doesn't collapse.

Santa Anita has provided the most extensive health protocols relative to any other business you will address. The complex relationship of people in horse racing is even more acute with the addition of living animals who need to be cared for 24/7, which makes your granting the reopening of Santa Anita for live racing all the more important. It's critical! It's life or death, frankly. We are dealing with live animals who are helpless without the human touch and caring.

Please think of the animals and the people who care for them. It's about them. Please be passionate for their survival! Think about this: if the industry collapses, where will the horses go. There are not enough after-care farms to take nearly any of the 2500 horses in Southern California. It would be a moral disaster to allow horse racing to collapse.

Please allow Santa Anita to reopen for live racing for the survival and lives of people and horses! We call on the L.A.County Board to make the correct affirmation for thousands of people and animals. Thank you for your passionate decision!

This comment is in regards to your Tuesday Meeting, April 28, 2020 regarding Item 14 - Worker Protections; Item 19 - Safely Reopening LA County and Item 20 LA County Roadmap to Economic Recovery.

As you already know, there are ZERO reports of positive COVID-19 infections at Santa Anita (where hundreds are employed to care for the livestock - i.e., horses) and Los Alamitos, Orange County, which is a strong indicator that appropriate measures and protocols are in place already at those facilities.

The benefit of resuming live racing is that the revenue from T.V. exposure and betting transactions (online) is that it helps defray some of the costs that owners and trainers are experiencing in paying employees caring for these animal athletes. Board of Supervisors-

The County of Los Angeles has a responsibility to represent all citizens of Los Angeles county. You have failed at doing your elected jobs by allowing the LA County Arboretum to remain open, while Santa Anita Race track has been forced to close by your office. Since you haven't taken the time to come out to Arcadia to see firsthand what is happening to the citizens you represent, I would like to share with you the experience that I have witnessed, in hopes that you make the time to hop on your helicopter and take a quick flight to see what is going on. The Arboretum is operated by the County of Los Angeles, you have an elected and civil responsibility to uphold social distancing standards in guidelines at the Arboretum. You have failed to do so. Thousands of people are lining up daily to attend events at this location. The parking lot is packed, you don't have enough staff on hands to control the venue, and many people are on site without wearing proper PPE. You have decided that for whatever reason, this garden will remain open, meanwhile many other statewide parks and beaches are closed. I am not going to attempt to understand your reasoning on keeping the Arboretum open, but I do question why Santa Anita Park, located a few hundred feet away, is not allowed to operate their business. There are 750 employees living at Santa Anita, that without racing, they will not have a job or a place to live if Santa Anita is not allowed to open. Santa Anita has gone above and beyond to not only meet social distancing guidelines but exceed them. In fact, you could probably learn a thing or two from Santa Anita, simply putting their plan in place at Arboretum would make it a safer venue for your staff and the citizens of Los Angeles county. Santa Anita is not open to the public, unlike the Arboretum, as a result there is a much lower risk of the spread of Covid-19 at Santa Anita. The track has put a plan in place with addresses any outstanding concerns the county has with the park reopening. 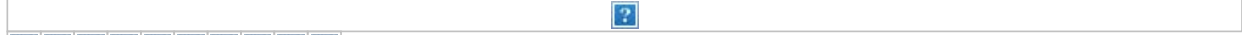

As a strong advocate of the County's efforts to stop the COVID-19 spread, I still must say I'm dismayed at two policy inconsistencies that seem to disregard common sense.

Namely, that the Los Angeles County Arboretum remains open to "members" (and sold out crowds backing up onto Baldwin) while COVID-19 free backstretch workers are locked in at Santa Anita, without live racing that functioned well without fans and in danger of destroying one of the few industries that can keep operating and generating funds without spreading the virus.

Furthermore, county golf courses also remain closed even though the sport can easily spread players out through the property by well-spaced tee time management. See below for my public comment on the following agenda items for Tuesday's meeting.
Agenda Item

14. "Worker protections."

Why should LA County waste critical PPE on non-essential businesses?!

15. "Testing in congregate living environments."

There are no cases of COVID-19 at the racetracks because there is no active testing. Again-using precious resources on testing non-essential workers. These tests should all be used for first responders, police officers, firefighters, hospital workers, food service workers, grocery store workers, etc. NOT a frigging racetrack. Persons can be asymptomatic carriers. This is not a quarantined environment. People and horses come and go from every track.

19. "Safely reopening LA County."

There is no safe way to race horses, especially during a high contagious and deadly pandemic. The Governor does not want mass gatherings until there is a vaccine and we have herd immunity. He defines "mass gatherings" starting with people numbering in the 100s. SANTA ANITA HAS OVER 700 PEOPLE working there, plus people coming and going.

Best Practices Guidelines for Equestrian Facilities

It is necessary to act in a manner that incorporates Governor Newsom's Executive Orders to prevent the spread of the coronavirus and protect California families and communities. To that end, the CDFA recommends the following:

Limit the number of personnel on the farm at any one time to ensure physical distancing.
Use an online sign-up form to limit the number of individuals at the barn at anyone time to no more than 10 individuals.

All individuals must stay 6 feet apart and must not congregate.

It will be a detriment to the horses, if they do not race in a live racing setting. They are bred to race and not just exercise and do gallops and workouts, which is all that is allowed right now. The racehorses are equine athletes and training for training's sake does not help them as athletes. If they are not racing in races, their development as racehorses are stunted and they will not progress to the next level as racehorses. This is especially true of 2 year olds. If the 2 year old racehorses are not allowed to run in their 2 year old races, they don't learn how to become racehorses. They don't learn from their mistakes in a race, where a jockey can try to correct them during the race and then post race, the jockey and trainer can get together to try to fix the mistakes, so the horse learns for the next time in both training and then for his or her next race. A promising 2 year old will never learn how to blossom into his or her potential, if all he or she is doing is just being allowed to train and train and not allowed to race. A three year old will not progress to becoming a potential Kentucky Derby prospect, etc. These horses need to race.

Live racing needs to resume because the purse money that comes from the betting provides income for the backstretch workers. Even with no spectators, millions and millions of dollars are bet on tracks operated with no spectators, like Oaklawn Park in Arkansas. The backstretch works receive their income, health insurance and a place to live, all because of live racing. It is imperative that these workers get back to work. After all, other tracks like the aforementioned Oaklawn Park and Gulfstream Park in Florida could find ways to safely operate without fans, I don't see why Santa Anita can not.

The Los Angeles County Arboretum, which is across the street from the racetrack is allowed to be open and have visitors. However, Santa Anita Racetrack which was operating with NO SPECTATORS and was taking strict safety precautions in the first place, got shut down by the L.A. County Health Department on March 27th, due to a "complaint." The fact that the Arboretum is open, albeit with social distancing rules, but Santa Anita Racetrack, which was operating with NO SPECTATORS, is not, is not a good look, either.

I ask you to re-open Santa Anita for LIVE racing WITHOUT spectators.

Its time to understand the logistics here.....

1. Currently training is taking place daily.....afternoon racing 4 days a week (Thurs - Sun) would not be much different than training in the morning hours 7 days a week. *There really isn't much difference and I would **strongly urge you to allow for racing to commence immediately**.....protocols are already in place and have been successful.*
2. **The County owned Arboretum across the street from Santa Anita Park is currently OPEN to the public**.....since this is open, there is no reason for racing (without the public) not to commence immediately.....what's good for the goose is good for the gander! *(The optics are such that you are discriminating against Santa Anita Park!)*
3. The handle through betting (online) helps to fund the backstretch employee's health care services. **Without racing, this is directly affecting the ability to keep necessary healthy care services running.**

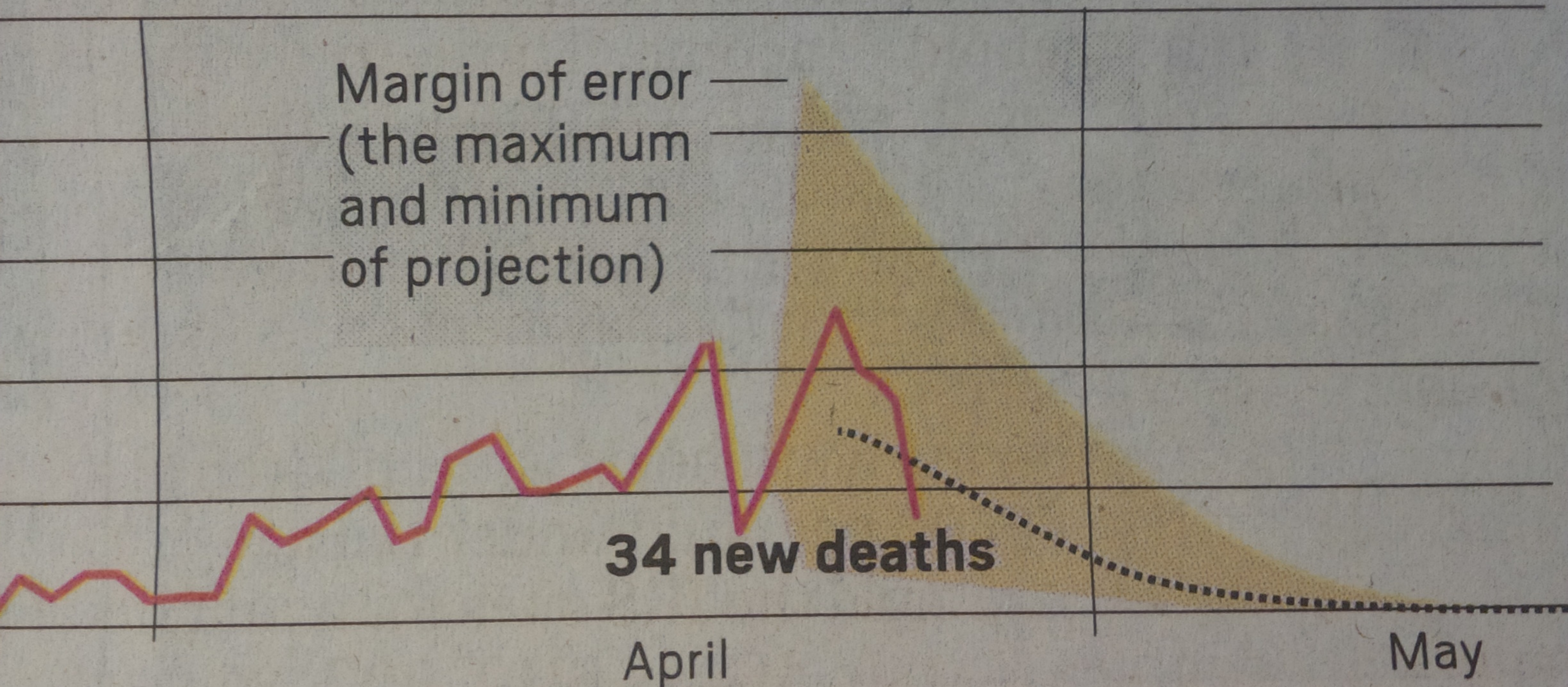

As an owner and fan of horse racing. I feel its important for the board to know my feelings regarding the stoppage of horse racing at Santa Anita Park.

If the real reason for the stoppage is for protecting the health of LA County residents, I feel the track can run horses without the detriment of health to the people involved in live racing, which ultimately will have zero impact on county residents.

During this pandemic, racing has continued at Los Alamitos, 22 miles from Santa Anita with zero cases of the Covid-19 having been diagnosed or reported.

Furthermore, I wish to address the following items:

Item 14-Workers Protection

There have been zero infections at Santa Anita among the backstretch workers since the pandemic has started. 95% of the work in horse racing is performed by stable workers who have been working during this crisis. Horses are living creatures who are fed and looked after, much like the pets you may have at home. Upon arriving at work, offsite worker's temperatures are taken, they are required to wear masks and gloves, and they are required to sign in and have their identification easily visible. Santa Anita also has a medical clinic on site which is available to all workers. The workers who reside on the backside are in a self quarantined environment, posing zero risk to the people of LA County.

Item 19-Safely Reopening LA County

There are close to 800 back stretch workers who risk losing income, housing, and health benefits without the financial support that racing provides. There have already been numerous union jobs lost due to the stoppage of racing at Santa Anita. It is a greater threat to the well being of these workers and their families to lose this income, than to the county's health risk. The public health of LA county people will be at a greater risk having more people homeless and without the medical care being offered by the track, if they were to lose their jobs.

Item 20-LA County Roadmap to Economic Recovery

All—

With regard to Agenda items 14, 19 & 20, I ask that you please carefully consider a myriad of reasons why live racing should resume at the earliest possible date at Santa Anita Park in Arcadia.

As you know, we have approximately 1,700 horses training here on a daily basis and their 24/7 needs are addressed by a Stable Area work force of about 750 people. Since the LA County Dept. of Public Health ordered us to cease live racing on March 27, there has been zero money generated through pari-mutuel wagering to assist in the care and sustenance of our backstretch workers. Although their wages are paid by the individual trainers that employ them, the owners of these horses will undoubtedly be removing the horses from our Stable Area and relocating to tracks that are currently running, or to farms, leaving many of these workers unemployed.

The urgent need to resume “spectatorless” racing is upon us. Revenue generated from pari-mutuel racing on Santa Anita’s races FULLY funds our Stable Area medical clinic, which provides FREE medical and dental benefits to all licensed workers and their families at no taxpayer expense.

Additionally, the 750 people that reside and work in our Stable Area are the definition of an at-risk population in terms of potential homelessness. Approximately 90 percent are Hispanic, many are recent arrivals and with limited skills and resources, will be forced live on the streets of LA County if live racing is not resumed soon.

I beg of you to please, please come to Santa Anita and inspect the entire facility for yourself. As has been recently documented in the LA Times and elsewhere, you will see that our entire work force is using masks, maintaining strict social distancing and that dozens of hand sanitizers are now located throughout the entire facility—Stable Area and frontside Grandstand.

We occupy 320 acres, directly across Baldwin Ave. from the LA County Arboretum, and we operate for the most part, outdoors.

I am writing to you as a very concerned citizen. I was born and raised in Los Angeles, CA and in my many years, have never seen anything the likes of what is happening right now with the COVID19 virus. I have experienced symptoms myself and am horrified knowing that people as well as businesses are not adhering to the Stay At Home orders from our governor. The number of deaths due to this killer virus has doubled in just this past week.

Governor Newsom has a Stay at Home order in place for a reason. Businesses that continue to run are ESSENTIAL and crucial to our survival. Santa Anita race track is a NON ESSENTIAL business. In other words, NOT crucial for our survival and NOT an absolute necessity.

Yes, Santa Anita Park can tell you that there are no active cases of the virus but then I must argue that there is no active testing, and rightly so. The small number of tests that exist should be used on those who are on the frontline: first responders, police officers, firefighters, hospital workers, food service workers, grocery store workers, etc. In addition, I would like to remind you that anyone can be an asymptomatic carrier.

There is absolutely no safe way to race horses, especially during a highly contagious and deadly pandemic. The Governor is requesting that mass gatherings stop until there is a vaccine. Santa Anita Park has over 700 people working there, many of whom commute. That number is beyond the number he defines as mass gathering (people numbering in the 100's).

Ladies/ Gentlemen;

We are former breeders of racehorses and current owners of a racehorse in training at Santa Anita Park. Therefore, we have high emotional and financial interest in the subject of reopening live racing at Santa Anita Park. However, we are quite elderly and have specific vulnerabilities to virus, therefore we are unable to attend the meeting on April 28, 2020 in person. This email describes our concerns relative to Items # 19, 20, 14.

Relative to Item # 19, 20, 14 – Reopening L.A. County, Economic Recovery, Worker Protection

The racehorse industry in California starts with the approximately 2,000 thoroughbred racehorses that are bred in California every year. Contrary to opinions of most outside of our industry, few of those are being raced by multimillionaires. Most that are eventually raced are owned by people like us who sacrifice other pursuits to have one (like us), a fraction of one, or a few racehorses. We depend on the wealthy owners to bring their horses to our racetracks to attract the fan patronage so that the sport remains financially viable in our state. As the requirement to cease live racing endures, the wealthy simply take their fan favorite horses to other states where tracks are capitalizing on the situation, and attracting the patronage of those horses. That is a very expensive venture which few of us can afford. But, as other states see this successful example, we who depend on California racing will see our industry recede.

The example these racetracks in other states are benefiting from was pioneered by Santa Anita Park. The process of racing without audiences was invented, and proven viable here.

We can attest to the rigor of the process Santa Anita initiated. Since we bred, and have maintained a close affiliation with our horse, we make the 100 mile trip to Santa Anita to see her whenever we can. The occasion of her third race was days after Santa Anita first closed the doors to owners. Like all other racing fans, we watched from home. We felt that was a sacrifice, but we were aware of the environment that it was instated in by the track. In that environment it was clearly the right decision by the track. Since that time, Santa Anita has continued to add rigor to it's protection process. Now the process is so rigorous that employee photographers cannot enter the track to create photos or videos that owners can substitute for visits to there horses. Like 10s of thousands of racing fans in California, we watch the racing in other states on television and realize that they continue to be successful with much less rigorous processes than Santa Anita has instituted.

We are ready to endure these rigorous processes because we can easily project the alternatives. We do not have the financial resources to maintain a racehorse that has no possibility of earning at least a part of it's keep. We have tried to find disposition after racing for horses that we have raced. In spite of expenditures in retrainin that approach those of racing, those attempts have been futile. The longer the application of these processes is delayed, the more owners like us that will be forced from

the track. As we leave, the demand for stable employees will recede and the homeless in Los Angeles will increase. The trainers with the least wealthy of clients will be the first to lose those employees. Those experienced and talented caregivers to horses will be lost to whatever remains of our industry. Again, those of us owners with the least resources, mostly Californians will be most impacted by their loss if we are ever able to reenter the industry.

Like all of our relatives, friends and neighbors we worry every day about economic recovery in California and the U.S. We are not sufficiently expert in economics to estimate how much local industry in Los Angeles is supported by Santa Anita. We know that maintaining horses is expensive. We have bought feed and hired veterinarians for decades. How much of that sort of thing is required to maintain 2,000 horses must keep a lot of jobs in Los Angeles. When we consider how any industry is going to reopen in this uncertain recovery stage of the pandemic, there are few that can do that with as little risk as California horseracing without live audiences. In fact it is hard to think of one. That approach has already been proven a viable process elsewhere. Why not here?

Good afternoon,

Firstly, let me thank you for taking the time to read and consider this email request. I can appreciate how incredibly busy you are during these unprecedented and challenging times.

I'm emailing in regards to the suspension of live racing at Santa Anita Park in which I implore you to reconsider. **This is about the health and welfare of the many men and women caring for the horses. Without the financial support that live racing provides, they risk losing income, housing and health benefits.**

Your department is dedicated to improving the health and well-being of the citizens of this county. Yet **your decision to close the racing operations of Santa Anita Racetrack is one which has a debilitating economic effect and, in turn, a massive health effect on a 750 person community that lives and works at that track.** Safe, live racing and the income that comes from online wagering, is a vital part of the ecosystem and removing it creates instability for those in the community who can least afford it.

The majority of the wages paid to those working on the backstretch and the financial resources to care for horses come directly from the earnings that are made when horses race. For the backstretch employees, the racing element of the ecosystem allows Santa Anita Park to provide safe and secure housing, **enables the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation to offer critical health care services** at the dedicated, onsite medical clinic equally for those with or without insurance and ensures these employees have access to no-cost critical support services.

The point of closing non-essential businesses during a pandemic is to prevent the gathering of crowds to spread the disease. Close contact must be avoided. But you closed Santa Anita racing operations when there were no crowds, no members of the public – or even horse owners permitted. This is contrary to the spirit of Governor Newsom's ban on gatherings since there were no gatherings to shut down. The reality is that **racing under these conditions presents NO higher risk of exposure to COVID-19 for backstretch employees or the community at large.**

In the interest of all the 750 individuals who work and/or live at Santa Anita Racetrack, I urge to you re-evaluate your decision on the basis that the track, with its current and evolving social distancing and other safety practices including banning public attendance, is compliant with the Governor's order regarding public gatherings and that **a continuance of that ban will lead to devastating economic burdens** on the grooms, hotwalkers, caregivers, and their families that depend on racing revenues for their health and wellbeing.

There exist in medical circles many different viewpoints regarding the Corona Virus 19 (Covid19). All of these viewpoints have some truth. A Stanford University study conducted in Santa Clara County concluded that the mortality rate was between .0012% and .0020% of the people "exposed" to the virus. The high estimate of covid-19 mortality was estimated to be 1/5 of 1% of those exposed, per this study.

Currently, because of the Covid-19 pandemic; the future of Santa Anita Racetrack and the 1,700 jobs directly created by it, are in jeopardy. As a Thoroughbred race horse owner, I am writing to appeal the closure of active horse racing at Santa Anita Park.

Allowing the continuation of live racing does not present a health risk to the 1000 + workers on the backstretch who live in dormitories at the track and must be at the track every day to support live training of 1700 horses every day.

Daily training for these horses has already been determined to be an “essential activity” as required animal care and exercise.

The revenue generated from continued live racing at Santa Anita is critical for the Thoroughbred ecosystem to keep these backstretch workers employed. If there is a prolonged period of no racing many of these jobs will certainly be eliminated and up to 1000 people could be added to the current LA homeless problem.

We urge the county to send their inspectors to the Track to witness firsthand the safety precautions in place.

What we are seeking is not extreme or without precedent. All other counties in California where live racing is conducted have accepted these arguments and are allowing live racing to continue under the strict safety precautions that we also have at Santa Anita.

I understand that the Arboretum (across the street from Santa Anita) has been sold out for the past few days, with little care for social distancing. How can this happen, when Santa Anita is prepared and had already been practicing proper protocols?

I am writing in support of a proposal from The Stronach Group that would permit thoroughbred horse racing to resume at Santa Anita Park. As I reside in Orange County, I am not your constituent, but I have been a dedicated patron of horse racing at Santa Anita for many years, so I have contributed to the economic well-being of Los Angeles County.

The terms of the current orders related to the COVID-19 outbreak make clear that those involved in the care of animals are considered essential. It has thus been permitted that the staff required to care for the over 1000 horses housed at Santa Anita be able to continue their work, subject to appropriate precautions such as PPE and maintaining social distance. They have done this well, and maintained an excellent record concerning staying safe from infection. What may not be apparent to some who are not familiar with the practices of horse racing is that the number of people required to conduct racing in the afternoons is dwarfed by the number involved in horse care. Gate workers, riders, and trainers of horses racing amount to a few dozen people, most of them also involved in horse care in the mornings. There is very little if any incremental risk of the pandemic to conducting racing and horse care, compared to only horse care. It is also true that racing is the way that all involved in the enterprise of horse racing earn their living. In the absence of that income, I cannot fathom how we would begin to give racehorses the kind of care they deserve going forward.

I realize that TSG made a detailed proposal to the County concerning the terms and procedures of resuming racing, which likely goes into far more detail about how they believe they can do so safely. My opinions echo theirs, so I do not need to repeat their arguments, only to endorse them.

Here's wishing you and yours the best of health in this trying time.

1. Since March 15 the racetrack has been closed to the public and **zero positive cases** of COVID-19 have been found.
2. Incredibly **strict protocols** have been implemented limiting the amount of people on the backside in the morning and afternoon. And recently, **additional protocols were implemented** to limit the interaction the jockeys will have with others restricting them from backside access in the morning.

My name is Anne Sanguinetti, and I am a thoroughbred jockey and exercise rider who has worked at Santa Anita racetrack in Arcadia. I am writing to express my support for the resumption of spectator free racing at Santa Anita.

Hundreds of horses and, more importantly, humans depend on racing to survive, and the current shut down of racing endangers the health and well being of everyone at Santa Anita. Without racing, the owners and trainers of racehorses have no revenue coming in, yet their expenses remain fixed as horses require constant care and feeding regardless of what is happening in the outside world. The racetrack is a far more closed community than other workplaces, and the necessary care and exercising of the hundreds of horses stabled there has been ongoing without incident since the covid-19 crisis began. Spectator free racing likewise occurred successfully at the track for two weeks, and I believe that the resumption of racing is in the best interests of everyone.

There are far fewer people involved in putting on the races than there are involved in training every morning, so conducting the races does not in any way pose additional risks of virus transmission. It is my belief that the LA County Health Department relied on information from those who don't actually care about the affect it has on those who actually reside at Santa Anita, nor do they understand what's best for the thoroughbreds. Horses require exercise, which has been allowed. However, there is much more activity in the morning training sessions than in afternoon racing. Other tracks have successfully conducted live racing without spectators with absolutely no reported incidences of Covid-19.

Regarding Item 14, because of the protocols established by Santa Anita, there has not been a single occurrence of coronavirus infection, nor has there been at Orange County's Los Alamitos, where live racing has continued unabated. The workers living at Santa Anita have self-quarantined, practice social distancing, have sanitizers readily available, and wear masks as directed by California guidelines.

Who is going to be responsible for hundreds of back-stretch workers if they are unable to learn a living and lose health benefits (Item 19) in this pandemic? From a perspective of being in and around the area where race tracks exist, dealing with race tracks and in response to the Santa Anita Race Track being "quarantined" as stated in a recent AP story. This is from 40+ years of being observant in the race track environment.

There is absolutely now way to quarantine, quarantine workers, or safely say any "backside", working area or area where those working at a racetrack can be quarantined as is being called for by local, county, state and federal governments. People work in very close proximity with each other, they tend to live in close quarters, often in tack rooms or a stall where horses are kept. The barn areas offer room for the horses, not for people. To think the area where the workers work with horses is simply untrue.

The population that primarily works with the horses, those responsible for the care, cleaning, feeding, picking up after and being close to the horses are of a transient population. Not transient as you would think of a homeless person, rather the workers often move based on where they can find work or where racing is occurring. Be it Santa Anita, Del Mar, Los Alamitos, or any other race track in California, they often move where work is plentiful. How can quarantine happen if workers are moving from one place or another for work?

How clean are the conditions where those workers eat, sleep, congregate, wash up, shower or simply cleanse their hands for the recommended twenty seconds? Unsure, ask to see, my guess is that your request will be denied. Are cleaning supplies provided by employers, are employees made aware of best practices during the time of COVID-19? How can an area or place of business be safe or quarantined if these precautions aren't adhered to amongst its population or workforce.

Are employees asked about health problems, temperatures checked, asked about coughing or shallowness of breath? If not, how can an area as open as this be safe and referred to as an area that is quarantined? Safely, it cannot be.

Is social distancing taking place? How many people are sleeping to a room? A room the size of a horse stall, smaller, larger? It's unknown, each barn will be different and each employer will have a different set of rules and how they interpret the orders coming down from health professionals during this time of crisis.

I am reaching out to you regarding the suspension of racing at Santa Anita Racetrack due to Covid-19. I have several serious concerns about this action taken by the Los Angeles County health Department to protect individuals from the Virus. The Stronach group has taken several serious steps to protect the workers & horses at their facilities. I will outline those below. My background is as a Racehorse Trainer and Owner. Having been through the crash in 2009, I have seen some unbelievable things that happened in my barn. Namely horse owners abandoning horses at the racetrack because their companies failed. We are not in that situation yet but without racing, owners, trainers and grooms have no cash flow for feed, veterinarian care and farriers. We don't want to see horses shuttled off to other states at the detriment of their well-being and the destruction of our local industry putting trainers out of business, grooms homeless and the eco system that The Stronach Group has meticulously created to protect us and the horses from the Coronavirus shuttered.

- The SA racetrack has provided housing for hundreds, maybe a thousand employees. We are highly regulated. No one is allowed on the grounds except those licensees who have already been here with out sickness. No one, not even the local owners, or out of state owners, trainers or their staff that ships a horse to run at SA from out of state is allowed on the grounds. An out of state racehorse must be dropped off outside of the gate and the horse walked in by the staff of a resident Trainers and put in their charge. Only essential personnel, trainers, vets & farriers are allowed inside the gates and must have PPE as available. We are a family and are already sheltering in place with strict hygiene and social distancing rules. We are all learning and welcome any further recommendations by the LA County Health officials, but we understand the threat. We just don't want to be a victim of any activist political agenda and will strive to meet the local health rules as set out by LA County.

- Gambling drives this industry and is one of the few sports left for fans to embrace at home during this difficult time. All gambling at Santa Anita is done through online sports books. The entire SA facility is closed to the public. No one is present during the races except a groom, assistant trainer and the trainer and only during their race only and must return to their barn immediately after. It's my understanding that the TSG profits are being donated to the Coronavirus efforts to flatten the curve through the Governor's office. As an industry we can also contribute to the local efforts as well by providing entertainment to those who must stay home.

Please, we need live racing revenues to feed our horses, care for them and keep our trainers, including myself and our employees close at hand to protect the animals we love so much. We are sheltering in place, don't throw us out on the street.

14. Worker Protections

This is a great first step, but there also appears to be a disconnect between hospital/clinic administration and the frontline workers. One says that there's adequate equipment and the other say that's there's not enough; perhaps its time for both parties to sit down and speak together rather than at each other.

5. Ethnic and Hyperlocal Community Outreach

Great idea, but how does the County hiring freeze affect this item?

6. Prioritizing the Health and Safety of Those Living and Working in Skilled Nursing Facilities

It is good to see the County coordinating with the state on this issue. Let's ramp up inspections and get the all-appropriate regulatory agencies more actively involved. My name is Tom Ryan, I represent the racehorse ownership group SF Racing/SF Bloodstock, a global Thoroughbred investor, breeder, owner, and advocate. SF Racing is an avid supporter of horse racing in California with 40 horses actively training for the Californian racing program.

As a stakeholder in the Californian Thoroughbred industry, I am writing to you to request that you reinstate racing at Santa Anita Park.

The outbreak of Covid19 has presented an unprecedented challenge, not only for our country, but for the world. While slowing the spread of this virus through the use of social distancing should be the priority for all governing bodies, we should also be considering the economic and social implications of the restrictions that are being put in place as well as the efficacy and necessity of these restrictions.

To date, there have been no reported cases of Covid19 at Santa Anita Park. All workers have abided by strict precautionary measures and are committed to doing so going forward. Despite the successful efforts of race participants based at Santa Anita, on March 27th, 2020, live racing was suspended. Given that there were no Covid19 cases at the track prior to this suspension, and that there have been no cases as training continues, it defies logic to restrict an activity upon which so many livelihoods are reliant.

As an owner and fan of horse racing. I feel its important for the board to know my feelings regarding the stoppage of horse racing at Santa Anita Park.

If the real reason for the stoppage is for protecting the health of LA County residents, I feel the track can run horses without the detriment of health to the people involved in live racing, which ultimately will have zero impact on county residents.

During this pandemic, racing has continued at Los Alamitos, 22 miles from Santa Anita with zero cases of the Covid-19 having been diagnosed or reported.

Furthermore, I wish to address the following items:

Item 14-Workers Protection

There have been zero infections at Santa Anita among the backstretch workers since the pandemic has started. 95% of the work in horse racing is performed by stable workers who have been working during this crisis. Horses are living creatures who are fed and looked after, much like the pets you may have at home. Upon arriving at work, offsite worker's temperatures are taken, they are required to wear masks and gloves, and they are required to sign in and have their identification easily visible. Santa Anita also has a medical clinic on site which is available to all workers. The workers who reside on the backside are in a self-quarantined environment, posing zero risk to the people of LA County.

Item 19-Safely Reopening LA County

There are close to 800 back stretch workers who risk losing income, housing, and health benefits without the financial support that racing provides. There have already been numerous union jobs lost due to the stoppage of racing at Santa Anita. It is a greater threat to the well being of these workers and their families to lose this income, than to the county's health risk. Suicide has been a problem over the years and has risen over the years, I can see the public committing more suicides in the near future if something isn't done to put these people back to work. The public health of LA county people will be at a greater risk having more people homeless, in need of food and without the medical care being offered by the track, if they were to lose their jobs.

Item 20-LA County Roadmap to Economic Recovery

There is an excellent opportunity for horse racing to lead the responsible re opening of not only professional sports, but businesses in general. Santa Anita wishes to race without fans present to

protect the thousands of unionized jobs that keep our families safe and secure. Of all the sports, horse racing provides a best test case scenario for a responsible reopening of sports, as unlike other sports, our athletes are equines and cannot be infected or transmit the Covid-19 virus. My name is Heather Wilson, I live in Los Angeles. I have been a nurse for over 30 years (Nurse Anesthetist for almost 18 years) and have obviously never seen anything like this in my career. We cannot be too careful.

My comments, as a gravely concerned citizen of LA County and a health care professional:

14. "Worker protections."

LA County cannot afford to waste critical PPE on non-essential businesses.

Gambling and horse racing are NOT essential businesses. We must allocate resources to the real essential workers: Police, firefighters, first responders, health care professionals. These are the individuals on the front lines and they must have PPE.

Los Angeles County is still rising in the numbers of cases and fatalities.

With last weekend's heat wave, and thousands of people flocking to the beaches, it would be reasonable to predict another huge spike in cases over the next 2 weeks.

15. "Testing in congregate living environments."

There are no cases of COVID-19 at the racetracks *because there is no active testing*. Again- using precious resources on testing non-essential workers. These tests should all be used for first responders, police officers, firefighters, hospital workers, food service workers, grocery store workers, etc.- NOT "sports" or "entertainment." Persons can be asymptomatic carriers. Santa Anita and other racetracks are not quarantined environments. People and horses come and go from every track, this is very well documented. Racetracks are filthy places with hundreds of backstretch workers living in squalor. This is the perfect breeding ground for a virus.

19. "Safely reopening LA County."

There is no safe way to race horses, especially during a high contagious and deadly pandemic.

The Governor does not want mass gatherings until there is a vaccine and we have herd immunity. He defines "mass gatherings" starting with people numbering in the 100s.

SANTA ANITA HAS OVER 750 PEOPLE working there, plus people coming and going.

Furthermore- racing horses directly violates the Governor's orders.

Every single race is the same: the race horse is "ponied up" to the starting gate with a pony horse. The riders are tethered together!

Crowds gathered at the starting gate are far greater than 10, which exceeds the Governor's recommendation. In addition to the people on horseback, there are gate workers and other personnel, all in close proximity.

Santa Anita has not, to my knowledge, experienced any Co Vid virus cases, even though there are nearly 1000 people that work at the facility every day, caring for the horses.

Thank you for taking the time to read my letter, I am hoping for your help in any way possible.

My name is Wendy Ouriel, I am a cellular biologist, I the founder of a successful skin care company and (most importantly) I am a thoroughbred racehorse owner.

I am among the thousands who are personally involved and connected to the historic, beautiful and progressive Santa Anita Racetrack. The racetrack is not just a place of betting, it is an epicenter of history, and the last remaining vestige of classic Americana in an increasingly developed, commercialized land, bereft of culture.

The Great Race Place has earned its title because of its beautiful architecture, historic past, and its present innovation of horse racing. Santa Anita is to be commended for its adaptation to the times, and its quickness to make change for the health, safety and betterment of the athletes.

Our horses are our athletes and our champions. There is nothing on this earth more humane than horse racing because it is the only instance in existence that treats an animal like a person. We have an entire culture dedicated to our horses. From magazines, art, newspapers and websites dedicated to the horses. For the horse owner, trainer, fan or enthusiast, we view horses like any human athlete. We cheer them on, we have posters of them, we love them and we honor them.

If you walk the grounds of Santa Anita the beautiful statues of the champions of the past from Zenyatta to Secretariat to Sea Biscuit stand tall and proud. We hold them in the same high regards as a basketball fan does Michael Jordan, or a Baseball fan does Mickey Mantle. We call the first Raceday of the Breeder's Cup "The Rising Stars" because these young colts and fillies are on their way to becoming the stars of our sport. Each win for them is an apotheosis towards championship, greatness and history. They hold an important place in our hearts.

The honor and reverence we have for our horses is shared among everyone involved in the sport. But what is most strongly and deeply felt amongst us all is the profound care we have for our athletes.

My horses are my children, and there is not one thing I wouldn't do for my horses. Because of the abrupt and unwarranted closure of Santa Anita, I haven't been able to see my horses in a month. How would you like to be kept from your children for over a month? Keeping me away from my horses has been devastating and cruel.

My love for horses is not unique. Those who work at the track stay up all night to tend to their horses. They wake up at 4AM every day to tend to the horses needs. They would do anything

for them. When San Luis Rey Downs was burning, the grooms, owners and trainers risked their lives as they ran through the flames to set their horses free. We could have used some of these so called "animal-rights activists" during a time when a horses life was on the line, but they were nowhere to be found. They did not care enough about the horses to do something when they were trapped in their stalls with wildfire on all sides

We dedicate entire industry to finding horses careers when they are done racing, we need to have our own to find after careers for the horses, because animal rights activists do not offer any assistance on this matter. They just want to protest, get famous from the press, and shut our racing down so they can be "right." Once racing shuts down, the horses will die.

While our protocols and the protocols of our customer are very stringent, I've been extremely impressed with the measures that Aidan and the Santa Anita team have put in place and in play. The safety redundancies, isolation, and total buy-in by the staff, crew, and ownership teams defy any arguments that ANY business anywhere have a safer environment. We not only have an opportunity to feed, shelter, insure, and pay a working crew of well over 750 Los Angeles County residents by resuming racing, but we are able to safely contain and isolate a willing portion of the county's population to help prevent viral spread in the general population. If funding through racing isn't resumed, those residents scatter into the community with more movement than if contained and thereby increasing the chance of spread.

In regards to Items 19 on Safely Reopening LA County and 20 Roadmap to Economic Recovery: As stated earlier, resumption of racing at Santa Anita does NOT call for an increase of human traffic at the site. How many businesses can say that? The ONLY thing that suspension of racing ensured is that millions of dollars that would have flowed to a working population of LA County citizens desperate for that funding now flow out of state to operating racetracks in other parts of the country. While I am a racing fan first and a horseplayer second, I've definitely increased my active betting for two reasons: 1) For the distraction provided by the only sport still active anywhere and 2) to supplement my income during a time where I had to take a 20% pay cut due to the reduction of business in other parts of my company during the pandemic. This prevents me from having to apply for furlough unemployment compensation. I'd much rather keep my dollars in California. Instead, they're headed to Arkansas and Florida.

The parking lot is packed.

Due to the Covid 19 Virus, there has been an obvious loss of jobs in California as well as the entire United States. Santa Anita Race Track in Arcadia is just a small part of the statewide job losses suffered by race track employees. Job losses don't stop with the people that feed, groom, exercise and train the horses, but also include the mutuel clerks, management and staff, parking attendants, employees of the gift shops, concessions, restaurants, tip sheet sellers, printers of publication like the Racing Forms and Digest and then extends to other outside vendors that supply Santa Anita with food, etc.

Los Alamitos Race Course in Orange County, as well as some tracks around the United States are allowed to run without the benefit of customers. I am not understanding the thought process in not allowing Santa Anita to race horses, especially considering Santa Anita (or Los Alamitos for that matter) has not had any reports of Covid 19 infections. 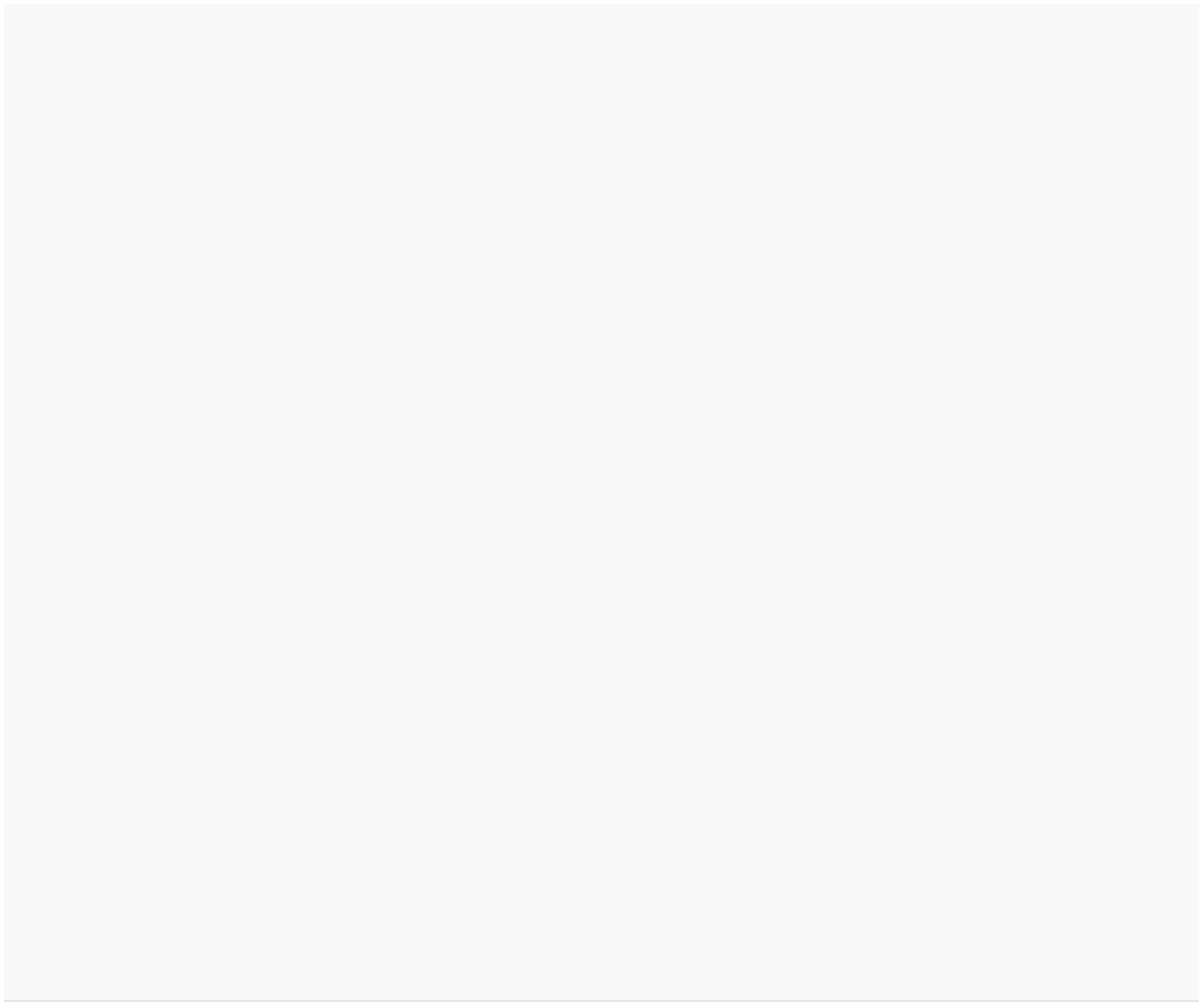

Dear Honorable Kathryn Barger,

We are contacting you on behalf of BizFed – the Los Angeles County Business Federation. We are an alliance of 190 business organizations who represent 400,000 employers with 3.5 million employees in Los Angeles County. We are writing to comment on items 19 and 20.

We applaud the Board's motions on "Safely Reopening" and the "Roadmap to Economic Recovery." Our member's first priority after the stay at home order lifts is being able to safely re-open their businesses and are prepared to take all the steps necessary to protect their employees, their customers and their families. BizFed also has a diverse group of industry sectors and size of employers already participating in our focused COVID-19 Economic Recovery & Jobs Task Force. This august group of over 100 businesses and business organizations are dedicated to helping all 88 cities and our county reopen as safely and effectively as possible. We are here to be a resource and believe that we can provide valuable ideas, insights and feedback as to how to safely and effectively open the economy.

Here are our initial thoughts.

Safely Reopening.

Business thrives when there is certainty. The COVID-19 emergency and the public agency response to it has created enormous uncertainty for every business in our region. It has also forced the closure of hundreds of thousands of businesses and the unemployment of 3 million persons (and climbing) in California.

How we get from today to our former days of nearly full employment and a booming economy, is the biggest uncertainty of all. While the discussion about reopening is only just beginning, there are few specifics being offered to bring any real hope to those who lost their jobs or closed their businesses.

We respectfully urge the County to act quickly to establish clear, seamless and uniform protocols, which don't differ from jurisdiction to jurisdiction within the County, that enable businesses to *safely* re-employ their workers and place LA County's economy and workforce on the road to recovery, reinvention, resilience and resurgence.

The President, the Governor, local officials, academics, and health officials have all outlined broad goals that aim to establish the criteria for re-starting our economy. Governor Newsom has said "expanded testing and doing contact tracing for those who test positive" is the first condition that needs to be met. It begs the question—how many tests is expanded testing—per day, per week, per month, total? How many testing centers? How many test kits? Who will do the tracing? How will it be done—in person or digitally? Who is responsible for buying the tests and conducting the testing? How much will it cost and when will we have the money? By what date will we meet the objective?

The Governor's second criteria states—"Being able to protect California's most vulnerable populations, including seniors, homeless individuals and those with compromised immunity." Is isolating or quarantining protecting? If not, what is—a vaccine? Can we not open our businesses until there is a vaccine? How do we decide when someone is protected? Who is going to determine the level of protection required? How many people are we talking about and do 100% of them have to be protected? Who is responsible for doing this and documenting the protection?

With those kinds of specifics, we can track our progress and all lean-in to do our part to achieve them. Protective equipment, sanitizing, distancing, temperature testing, employee virus and antibody testing, and limiting public access are all measures that can be adapted by every business. But we can't get to that step without knowing the broader public health goals that need to be met in order to have a phased re-opening of our economy.

Roadmap to Economic Recovery

We believe that a supermajority of representatives on the Task Force should be drawn primarily from LA County's most negatively affected sectors, such as accommodation and food services; retail trade; arts, entertainment and recreation; health care; manufacturing; construction; wholesale trade and logistics; and any number of service-based sectors, most of which support the poorest residents in our community, to establish these protocols and prerequisites for getting county residents back to work safely and as quickly as possible.

Along with providing the LA County Board of Supervisors with recommendations on the progressive steps needed to quickly **reopen** the economy and get residents back to work, we believe that this business-, labor, government- and education-comprised Task Force should be charged with advising the Board on: how best to accelerate the jobs **recovery**; how best to **reinvent** the LA economy to be more inclusive; how best to ensure more **resilient** economy going forward; and how best to promote LA's economic **resurgence**, leveraging, for example, the lessons learned and trends emerging from the crisis, e.g., broad band and communication technology for all, re-shoring of manufacturing, supply chain security. Still, we recommend that for the co-purposes of efficiency and of overall effectiveness that this Task Force be comprised of no more than 25 individuals so that it can act in the quick manner this crisis demands; if additional expertise are required, Task Force members can convene with other leaders to gather input.

As stated, BizFed is here to help with those specifics and provide feedback in areas of uncertainty. We hope you will consider us as a member of this task force and keep us informed of any and all actions taken. We are in this together and want to be as much of a help as possible.

I would like to comment on the items you will consider in the meeting tomorrow with respect to the conduct of live racing at Santa Anita and the fate of the people and animals that reside and work there.

I have been going to the races at Santa Anita since I was in grade school. It is regarded by racing fans world-wide as one of the most beautiful and gracious racing venues in the United States. It is internationally known and respected. I am aware of the horse deaths that occurred during the winter of 2019. I read about how the sport is covered by mainstream media driven by sound bites and 15-second info-nuggets that really do not educate anybody, but are guaranteed to incense. I grew up reading about horse racing in the L.A. Times and am saddened by how the sport I love is now largely ignored by local news media and how little people understand about the sport and industry. Much of the fault lies with organic problems with how the sport lacks centralized leadership, and has done a poor job of communicating to existing and potential fans. All of this is perhaps a long way of saying that as a life-long resident of Los Angeles County I think Santa Anita is a special gem that should be treasured for its historic legacy, its status as an international venue, and as an economic presence in the County.

It is my understanding that the BOS are reluctant to allow live racing to return to Santa Anita since it was closed by the health department. I have never been able to find a comment or reason for this except that racing is considered to be a "non essential" business. I am living the COVID quarantine and I see where people go to recreate and, if this is the reason the BOS will decide it should remain closed, that makes absolutely no sense. I do not sense that the owners of Santa Anita racetrack, or the hundreds of people who live there, are trying to assert that horse racing is somehow an "essential" business. It is, however, a very unique economic and social ecosystem uniquely situated to be able to conduct live racing, with no public attendance, without putting at risk either the employees or the public at large. Some of the relevant considerations I urge you to consider:

1. Horses require 24-hour care 7 days a week. They must be fed and exercised. The racetrack owners have instituted, and will continue to maintain, protocols that maintain the safety of the people who live and work at the track and who much take care of the animals.
2. It takes few additional people to run live racing. I watch live racing at the few other track that are open. They are not like the meat packing workers who were required to work even though at risk. The race tracks have instituted safety protocols for all workers. It not only can be done, it is being done.
3. The economic engine that allows horses to be fed, to receive veterinary care, that allows workers to receive health care and essential services, is wagering. If races are not run, no income is generated. Horse racing is its own economic ecosystem that is driven by wagering. Live racing can be conducted and wagering occurs online. It is televised. Some day I hope to return to the racetrack to see the beautiful thoroughbred athletes. But now I will place online wagers and view the sport on television. To not allow live racing at Santa Anita puts at risk people who are essentially working without pay. Yes there are many people who have been economically displaced by the business closures implemented to control the spread of COVID-19, but why anyone in a politically responsible position would intentionally put people who can be gainfully employed without risking COVID-19 infection is beyond me.

There are many other risky venues open to large numbers of the public (several beaches, the Arboretum). It makes no sense to not allow live racing at a venue that will remain closed to the public and that has implemented safety protocols for employees. How many cases of COVID-19 have been reported from the Santa Anita racetrack community? They were very proactive in closing early on.

As each state contemplates how to safely ramping up economic activity, I hope the BOS will do the right thing and acknowledge the proven ability of Santa Anita race track to safely conduct its business without endangering the health of the public at large, or its employees. The matter is all the more head-scratching because people who claim to be concerned about the horses are not making decisions that are in their best interest.

Once Santa Anita is able to re-open to the public, I urge you to visit and admire the unmatched beauty of thoroughbred horses do what they do best.

You have allowed us to train the horses as a safety factor and while I am grateful for that it is imperative that we be allowed to race. By racing with no spectators the horses will earn their owners enough money to pay for their feed and care. Contrary to what many believe the majority of horse owners are not wealthy enough to pay the daily fees without some hope of making a little money in return. The purse money enables the owner to pay his trainer who then pays the feed bill, his help and several others (shoers, vets, acupuncturists, and others) along with himself. They, then can support their own families. There are hundreds of people depending on you to make a decision based on facts not emotions.

The handle from racing is used to fund many things in the racing industry, a full service medical and dental center for backstretch workers and their families at little or no cost, Self funded Workmans' comp, the Jockeys health insurance, The CHRB staff and costs, and various charitable contributions, again contrary to what some believe it does not all go to the Track ownership.

I believe that your decision to close us down was based on a complaint about compliance. Prior to the shut down all employees at Santa Anita as well as the trainers and their staff were following all of the guidelines set forth and then some. To the Members of the Board of Supervisors:

I write to ask you to direct the LA County Board of Health to permit the re-opening of live racing at Santa Anita Racecourse, without public in attendance, as soon as possible consistent with the safety protocols that have been presented to the Board of Health by the Stronach group and the Thoroughbred Owners of California. The lack of live racing has meant that the lives and the livelihoods of the 750 people who live and work at Santa Anita is threatened with no public benefit to offset this damage. At the time of the shut-down of live racing, Santa Anita had already isolated itself, forbidding the public and even horse owners – anybody not directly involved in the care or preparation of the horses or the operation of the broadcast feed – from being in attendance.

The shutting down of live racing was not consistent with the governor's edict to prevent face-to-face businesses from operation. No betting or personal sales was taking place. Santa Anita had already taken steps on its own to protect its employees, grooms, and jockeys by requiring protective gear, hand-washing, and social distancing.

The shut-down of live racing not attended by the public by the Board of Health did not result in any improvement in public safety or health. On the contrary it meant that the medical health facilities - which the track folks rely on and are supported by purses from racing – were no longer being funded, threatening their health and well-being. In addition, since horse owners depend on purses as an incentive to invest in race horses, it meant that owners may no longer choose to race their horses, thereby putting grooms, hot-walkers, trainers, assistant trainers and veterinarians whose living comes from Santa Anita, out of a job – again, with no resultant public benefit.

Please take action and instruct the Board of Health to respond positively to the proposals for a safe re-opening of Santa Anita racing as soon as possible. People's lives – and animals' lives – depend on it.

There is also the benefit of revenue for the state of CA.

Please consider all of the above when you make your decision.

I am a public school Science teacher with 30 years of teaching experience. I am also a horse owner. I have been a racehorse owner on and off for a good part of those 30 years. I have owned one horse at a time because that was all I could afford. It has been the fulfillment of a life-long dream. I also have experienced the sport of horse racing in many different ways.

As a child, I lived within walking distance of the Del Mar Racetrack. I spend many mornings as a child marveling at the beauty of the magnificent animals and even then could see the joy and competitive spirit displayed by the animals as they exercised on the track.

After graduating from high school, I worked in the Executive Offices as an office aide and was able to observe that aspect of the racing world. During college, I worked as a hot-walker who tends to the horses after they come back from their morning exercise, as an EMT at the Del Mar Racetrack caring for employees and patrons of the races, and as a farm hand at a broodmare and layup farm. Each experience gave me a different perspective of the sport. From those perspectives, I came away with one overarching understanding: the vast majority of people involved in racing have a passion for the sport and a VERY deep love for the horses. I've seen hardened men cry at the loss of a horse. It is most definitely not an industry that abuses the animals. The animals are treated with the finest care I've ever seen. I myself have spent \$6,000 on a one-week stay at a vet clinic for my horse when he had pneumonia. That was a significant amount for a single person on a teacher's salary but I was happy to do it because my horse comes first.

I ask that you visit a farm and witness the yearlings conducting mock races between themselves on an early morning. They don't run and try to beat each other because someone is hitting them with a whip or chasing them in the field, they compete with each other because it's in their blood; it's what they have been bred for generations to do. Just like certain dog breeds are bred to be good police dogs and other dog breeds are bred to be good hunting dogs, thoroughbred horses are bred to run.

There is a misunderstanding about the risks to horses at the track. Some people interpret the statistics to show a high mortality rate at racing tracks. The statistics actually show a low mortality rate. There are over 1,500 horses stabled at Santa Anita. Let's say 1,000 exercise 6 mornings per week, although it's probably a higher number than that. That means 6,000 horses exercise every week. In the 17 weeks of 2020, there have been horses exercising at Santa Anita over 102,000 times. Out of that 102,000 there have been a total of 22 deaths. That is 0.0002 % which, as a Science teacher, is a remarkably small fraction.

The only horse I've ever had die was in his stall at night at a friend's house. My friends who have horses for pleasure have had horses die at home for a variety of reasons. One time it was a twisted intestine, two different horses owned by two different people broke their leg in their corral, one time a miniature pony that was under 6 years old was found dead in his corral standing near the gate. Sadly it happens in all horse environments, not just at the racetrack.

I'm certain that there are ways to safely resume the race meet at Santa Anita that keep all employees safe as well as keeping the horses safe. It is a sport that continues to gain popularity as it's the only sport currently available to fans via broadcasts. Adding Santa Anita to the list of tracks currently holding races would generate revenue for the city, provide added employment in a time when jobs are especially crucial, and give the public a form of entertainment in these unusual times.

Please make a decision that would be beneficial in so many ways, please make a decision to resume racing at Santa Anita.

I am writing to you in regarding items 14, 19, & 20 on your agenda for your 4/28 meeting.

When the LA County Board of Health abruptly stopped non-spectator live racing at Santa Anita on March 27, the careers of two groups were put in jeopardy- the backstretch workers and the Thoroughbred athletes they care for 24/7. I'm attaching the front page story on this situation which appeared in the Pasadena Star News on April 9, in case you didn't have an opportunity to see it.

Like all domesticated animals, Thoroughbreds need daily care. That is provided by the backstretch workers who live on-site. The incomes and health benefits for these workers and their families are directly tied to the purses associated with live racing. The daily care of the horses is funded by owners who rely on the purses for income. Without racing competitions, there are no purses. As a result, these workers' jobs plus the horses' fate are both in jeopardy.

Having reviewed the attached 12 page protocol proposal that was submitted to Supervisor Barger, Dr. Ferrer, and Ms. Hamai by Santa Anita at their meeting on April 16, it appears re-opening live racing should be able to be authorized by the Board of Supervisors this Tuesday (4/28). No cases of COVID-19 have been detected at Santa Anita and they plan to keep it that way, including by fully funding a County Health Officer to monitor all activity and housing jockeys, assistant starters and essential grooms in an area completely separate from the backstretch, thus protecting both communities of workers. Given that the Arboretum, located across the street from Santa Anita, has been allowed during this pandemic to welcome 1300 members of the public every day without having to house workers on-site, surely Santa Anita can offer non-spectator racing under their proposed extremely strict protocols.

Here is a short video about a woman who works with the Jockey Club to let the backstretch workers know (before social distancing was put in place) that they and their families are valued members of society. I hope you will watch it- she truly cares about these people and we should care about them and the Thoroughbreds, too:

STUCK IN THE BACKSTRETCH

At Santa Anita racetrack, coronavirus cuts off horse caretakers from outside world

More than 750 backstretch workers at Santa Anita racetrack now live and work in isolation, largely cut off from the outside world and increasingly from each other to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

They sleep in worn dormitories, sometimes in pairs, tucked among the racetrack's barns. New restrictions bar visitors, and even horse owners, from entering the historic grounds at the foot of the San Gabriel Mountains.

And though nothing prevents these workers who care for the horses at the 320-acre Arcadia park from leaving, many do not have cars or licenses. Even if they did, there's really nowhere to go amid the pandemic.

There is a sense of anxiety in the community, according to those who work and live at Santa Anita. Like everywhere else, their fears are primarily about the coronavirus, though there's increasing worry about the future of their jobs as well.

Rafael Gonzalez, a 61-year-old groom, is burying himself in his work. He begins tending to the horses shortly before 4 a.m. on most days.

He is optimistic the restrictions will lift in time for him to visit his mother and family near Guadalajara this summer.

"I'm working every day now," Gonzalez said. "Six weeks, two months, it'll be OK. If nothing happens by that time, I think everything will be OK."

Currently, the track requires a 14-day quarantine for anyone who has left the state, making travel particularly out of the country nearly impossible for the low-paid stable hands.

No cases of COVID-19, the disease caused by the new coronavirus, have been reported at Santa Anita, which ceased racing last month, though there isn't any proactive testing either. A health clinic, funded by wagering, is open to employees, and executives say they can quarantine people if anyone does present with symptoms.

In an interview, Gonzalez said the track is quiet after the workday ends. He often only sees security officers on their patrols, he said. Gone are the familystyle meals, poker games and music that the workers bonded over.

He doesn't see other grooms, hot walkers and exercise riders socializing outside the dormitories anymore. The rec room is closed. Televisions throughout the track, where the workers gathered to cheer on horse races and soccer, have been turned off and the chairs removed.

"I come and sleep as soon as I can," Gonzalez said. "Everybody is inside. There's no place to go, no one to see, no one to talk to."

The workers rely on food deliveries, an on-site sundry shop and a cafeteria that stops serving food at 4 p.m. for most of their meals. Perishable foods were rounded up and given to the workers who live on-site when the track closed to the public, according to The Stronach Group, which owns the racetrack.

Gonzalez said he typically only travels outside of the track to go to the market to buy cat food now.

The backstretch workers and trainers interviewed for this story say they feel safe at Santa Anita. Newly added hand-washing stations are numerous enough to trip over, according to one trainer. Employees wear masks as they work, and signs warn to practice social distancing.

"It is very strict now," Gonzalez said. "Everybody cleans their hands when they do anything."

The racetrack is strictly controlling access to the backstretch. Outsiders can't bring their horses to the stables anymore; instead, an employee is sent to collect each animal. Horses cannot carry the coronavirus, officials stressed.

The company declined to let a reporter inspect track protocols in person.

Together, but distant

Jayro Lopez started working at Santa Anita as a teenager during his summer breaks, a trend that continues now as he attends Cal State Long Beach. His father, Dagoberto Lopez, has worked in the industry for 35 years. It's the only job he's had since migrating from Mexico.

Workers with families must live off-site, the younger Lopez said, so his father commutes to Santa Anita from the South Bay daily. The work hasn't changed, besides the increased hand washing, but the mood certainly has, Lopez said.

High-fives, fist bumps and hugs have been replaced with distant waves. Lopez said his father has nightmares about getting sick.

"The only people they interact with are the people like them who are literally there 24/7," Lopez said. "They're very connected between themselves and kind of isolated from everyone else."

Santa Anita's restrictions started before the stay-at-home orders went out in California. The Stronach Group closed the venue to the public March 12, the day after the NBA suspended its season, but continued to host live races to empty grandstands until March 27, when the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health ordered the track to shut down.

Several horsemen said they were told a complaint from an animal rights activist triggered the county's decision, but county officials would not confirm this.

Los Angeles County Supervisor Kathryn Barger, whose district includes Santa Anita, declined to comment, instead deferring to the health department. A department spokesman would not answer questions about the decision.

"All the employees are able to continue with their care of the horses, including training," the spokesman said. "Racing is not an essential activity, so the track is not able to hold live racing at this time."

The company's executives argue racing should be allowed to continue because the employees deemed essential to care for the horses, such as Gonzalez, would also run the competitions. They've offered to build a segregated area for jockeys and other employees that wouldn't otherwise be at the racetrack already.

"We have the ability with very little extra risk to continue operating economically while ensuring the health and well-being of the horses," said Aidan Butler, the head of The Stronach Group's California Racing Operations. "We're soon not going to be able to carry on the training, unless we can keep the economic engine going. The second that dries up, we're all going to be in trouble."

At Santa Anita, there's about one person working in the backstretch for every two horses in the stables, according to John Shirreffs, the trainer of Hall of Fame horse Zenyatta. Santa Anita is currently home to about 1,700 horses.

Lobbying to reopen

Without income from racing, horse owners may opt sell their horses or ship them off to another state and then slash their staffs. The horse caretakers may decide to pack up and leave if the trainers can no longer pay them.

"To meet the cost of labor, we need the income the purses generate," Shirreffs said. "It's a very fragile business. If it goes on too long, people will have to start laying off employees, which they will probably hate to do, but it will be the only thing they'll be able to do."

In an open letter April 3, Belinda Stronach, the president of The Stronach Group, urged county leaders to reconsider the shutdown, warning that a stop to racing and wagering could lead to a "unnecessary humanitarian and animal care crisis on top of what we are all already dealing with."

"Simply put, by ceasing live racing operations we are jeopardizing the income stream for backstretch employees and the financial resources required to provide them and the horses they love with the care they both deserve," Stronach wrote.

"For our 750 backstretch employees, the live racing element of the ecosystem allows Santa Anita Park to provide safe and secure housing, enables the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation to offer critical health care services at the on-site medical clinic and ensures that backstretch employees have access to no-cost critical support services."

The concerns wrought by the coronavirus follow on the heels of a difficult past two years for the horse racing industry in California. Dozens of equine fatalities at Santa Anita last year forced The Stronach Group, and other tracks throughout the state, to make significant reforms, including stricter limitations on medications and the number of horses on the track. Santa Anita implemented a bonus system this year to try to draw owners and trainers back.

There are now talks of potentially moving racing dates from Santa Anita to the Los Alamitos racetrack, which has not been ordered to stop racing by the Orange County Health Department. The California Horse Racing Board would have to approve such a deal.

The uncertainty is nervewracking for the employees living at Santa Anita, according to Jayro Lopez.

"A lot of the worries I heard when I was there this past weekend, they were afraid of the track being shut down, of trainers moving to other states, of them not having anywhere to work, or anywhere to stay," he said.

Many do not have skills that are transferable to other jobs, he said.

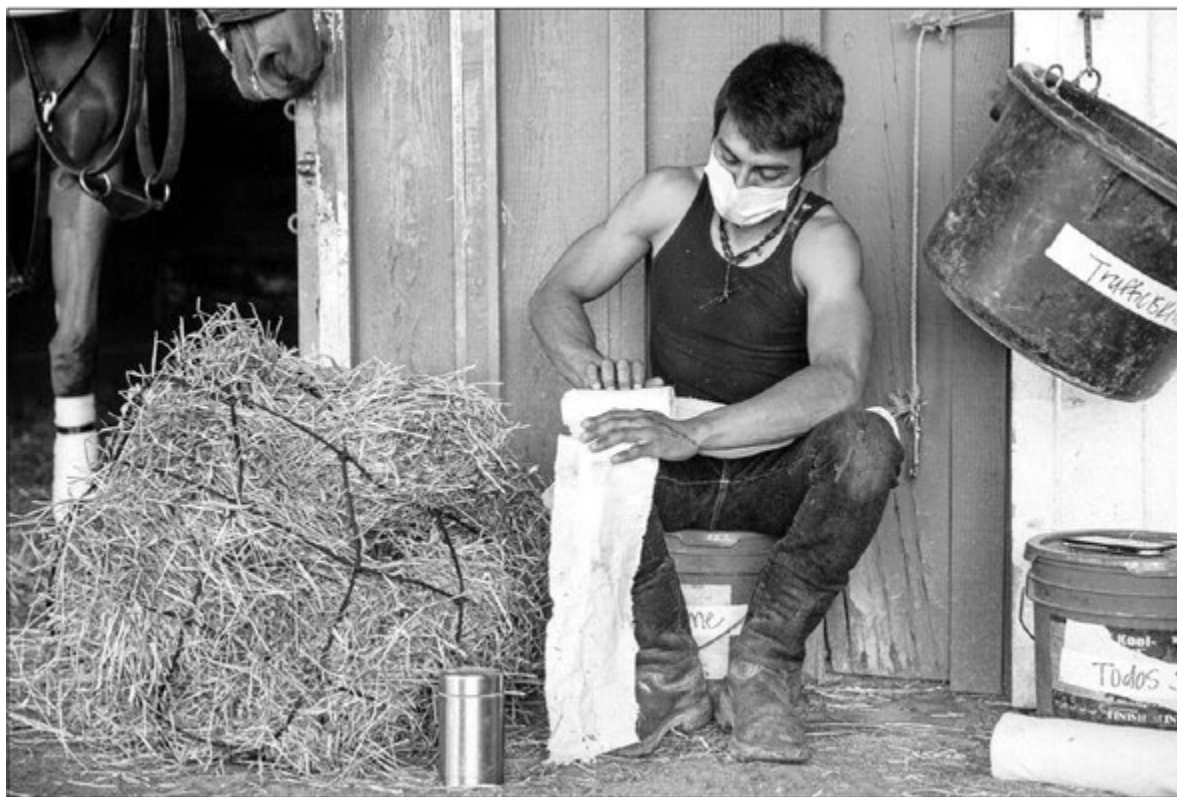
"A lot of families don't have the opportunity where they have someone else providing income," he said. "The racetrack is the only source of income that they have."

Oscar de la Torre, an advocate for Santa Anita's backstretch workers, said Los Angeles County should send someone to assess Santa Anita's protocols, and, if deemed safe, it should allow racing to resume.

Other economically beneficial work, such as construction of the NFL stadium in Inglewood, continues without the same scrutiny, despite having a positive COVID-19 case.

The shutdown of Santa Anita feels political, he said.

"If they lose their houses, and they lose their jobs, and they lose their medical benefits, you're going to have more than 750 people out in Los Angeles County struggling," he said. "They can't just go and get another job. These people don't get it."

Dear Supervisor Barger, Dr. Ferrer and Ms. Hamai,

We appreciate and respect that you have an incredible responsibility to safeguard all citizens of Los Angeles County during this unprecedented public health crisis. We also greatly appreciate your willingness to review our proposal for safe live racing to resume at Santa Anita Park within a self-contained community.

On March 12th, we voluntarily closed Santa Anita Park to the public, a full week prior to the issuance of the Los Angeles County mandate against public gatherings, and have since been operating under stringent measures to maintain social distancing and limit exposure to COVID-19 while continuing to protect the welfare of our personnel and the horses we love. In addition to the numerous and extensive protocols that we have already put in place and in direct response to your concerns related to the movement of the jockeys involved in training and racing at Santa Anita Park, **we have added a protocol requiring all jockeys involved in training or racing to relocate to onsite housing and live within this self-contained community.** This relocation protocol will go one step further by adding a requirement for an independent, third-party Los Angeles County Health Officer to provide supervision and monitoring, paid for by Santa Anita Park.

We invite you to review the attached document that outlines our extensive operating protocols and details procedures for the resumption of safe live racing in compliance with the Los Angeles County's public gatherings order. This document has been created in collaboration with infectious disease expert, current member of Stanford University's COVID-19 task force and Medical Director at Golden Gate Fields, Dr. David Seftel, MD, MBA. We are confident that our measures address our ability to maintain all social distancing requirements to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 while maintaining the highest possible level of human and horse safety.

The following represent key considerations and rationale to support our request for the resumption of safe live racing:

1. **SANTA ANITA PARK WILL REMAIN CLOSED TO THE PUBLIC:** Santa Anita Park will continue to be closed to the public and will operate in compliance with all public gathering mandates.
2. **SANTA ANITA PARK IS A SELF-CONTAINED COMMUNITY:** In addition to the essential personnel who are already living onsite, we will relocate jockeys, starting gate crew and racing officials, to onsite housing. All of whom will be required to adhere to all health and safety measures. Our residential community is secure, tightly controlled and under the supervision of California State Inspectors in Arcadia.
3. **SAFE LIVE RACING CAN SAFEGUARD AGAINST A HUMANITARIAN AND HORSE WELFARE CRISIS:** The continued suspension of safe live racing will soon create an unintended crisis for the horses and those who care for them. Safe live racing, even without customers at our venue during this time, and the income that comes from live racing, is an essential part of the ecosystem of horseracing. Without live racing, there is no income stream for trainers, backstretch employees and jockeys or the necessary financial resources required to look after the horses in their care. Los Angeles is already facing a housing shortage as homelessness surges due to COVID-19. The consequences of a continued suspension of live racing may lead some of our nearly 750 backstretch personnel to leave their home at Santa Anita Park, not because they want to, but because they have no other choice in order to make a living. To add, finding alternative adequate care and shelter for horses will be a monumental challenge.
4. **SAFE LIVE RACING PROVIDES HEALTHCARE AND SUPPORT SERVICES:** The live racing element of the ecosystem enables the California Thoroughbred Horsemen's Foundation to offer critical, no-cost, onsite health care and other support services to our backstretch personnel, the vast majority of whom are uninsured. If live racing continues to be suspended, free healthcare services will end due to lack of funding leaving a serious and potentially life altering void during a health pandemic.
5. **RACING AND TRAINING PERSONNEL ARE ONE IN THE SAME:** The majority of essential personnel who work in the morning for training and who are responsible for daily care are also those who work in the afternoon to conduct live racing. A fact that demonstrates that we have the ability to operate safe live racing without the volume of additional personnel.
6. **SANTA ANITA PARK OPERATES OVER 320 ACRES:** Santa Anita Park is a large, open space uniquely positioned to operate over vast acreage enabling us to adhere social distancing requirements. Over our 320 acres and more than one million square feet of grandstand space, we have been able to make critical adjustments that provide our essential personnel with the personal space they need to stay safe and the horses we love with the space for the exercise and care they require and deserve. Unlike the Los Angeles County Arboretum and Botanic Gardens, which remains open across the street, our community has effectively been sheltered-in-place by design and is able to provide the required physical distancing space.
7. **SANTA ANITA PARK'S PROTOCOLS ARE INDUSTRY LEADING:** It is important to note that Los Alamitos Race Association, located in Orange County, was given permission by that County to continue racing without spectators. That permission was granted thanks to the implementation of the precautions created and instituted by Santa Anita Park. The protocols presented and adopted by Los Alamitos were developed by and directly lifted from the Santa Anita Park protocols.

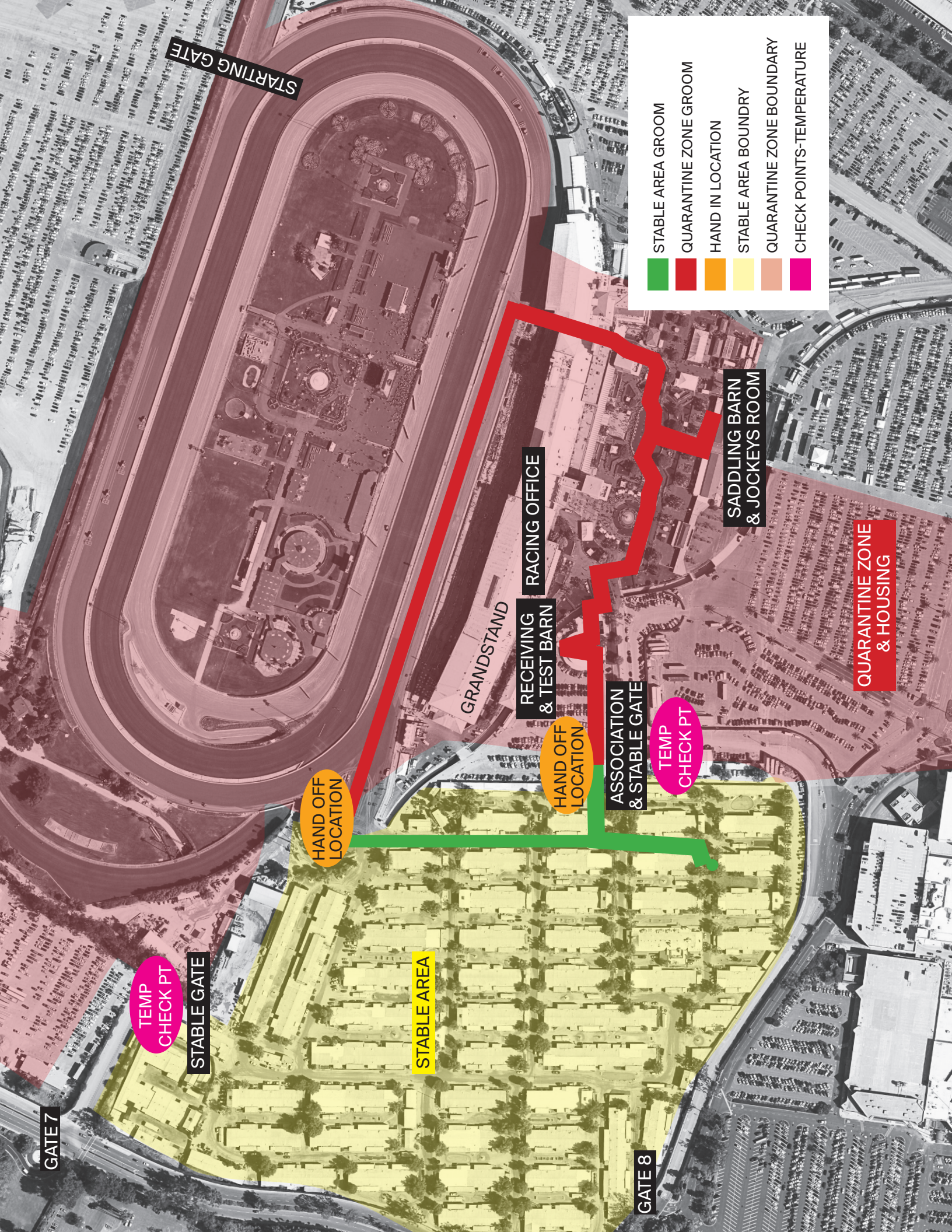

Santa Anita Park COVID-19 Protocols

April 16, 2020

At Santa Anita Park, the health, safety and welfare of every person and every horse in our community is our top priority.

We strive to be in compliance with all government and local health orders regarding social distancing and are following all recommended CDC precautions and safeguards to ensure the health and safety of the limited number of essential racing personnel required to operate racing without fans.

The horse racing industry is unique in several respects and now, perhaps more than ever in these difficult times, we must be mindful of our responsibility to prioritize the safety and well-being of the horses and those who care for them.

We can limit exposure per health and governmental regulations while continuing to support our industry.

The following protocols are in force at Santa Anita Park.

Controlled Access Areas and Documentation for Racing:

Restricted Facility Access

- 1) Quarantine Zone (for all Essential Personnel outside of the stable gate):
 - **Any personnel who could come in close contact with another person will be housed on the grounds in a Quarantine Zone. This will include Jockeys, Assistant Starters and Essential Grooms**
 - Individual, temporary housing located in the South Parking Lot, secured with fencing and security
 - Personnel will be logged in and out of housing enclosure and temperatures will be monitored upon entrance and egress
- 2) Racing Office:
 - Jockey agents are not permitted onsite at any time
 - Entries for all races will be taken by telephone only
 - Post-position draws will be conducted via teleconference only
 - All racing officials in the racing office must wear masks
 - Racing office officials must adhere to social distancing requirements by providing each individual with the required six feet of space
 - Official chart caller will be permitted to use their designated office space only

3) Grandstand/Walking Ring/Winners Circle/Press Box:

- Grandstand has been closed to the public since March 12
- Non-essential personnel will not be permitted to enter the facility
 - Non-essential personnel include all public service employees (e.g., food service, wagering tellers, ushers, admission staff, etc.)
 - To limit outside exposure, no owners, media or fans will be allowed at the track at any time
 - No guests, no exceptions
- Security will be present at Grandstand entrances to sign in and grant access to essential personnel only
- Hand sanitization available at all Grandstand entrances
- All public areas of the Grandstand closed for morning workouts and no private clockers are allowed on site
- The following spaces have been closed and will not be in use for any purpose:
 - Walking Ring
 - Winners Circle; includes temporary suspension of all Winners Circle ceremonies and photo opportunities
 - Press Box

4) Receiving Barn:

- **Horses will be handed off to Grooms / Attendants at the stable entrance at the Hand In location prior to the horse entering the Quarantine Zone**
 - All grooms will have their temperatures taken prior to entering the Hand In location
 - Horse will be received by a Groom who has been housed in the Quarantine Zone
 - All equipment accompanying the horse must be able to be disinfected prior to entering the Saddling Paddock
 - All grooms / attendants will be wearing gloves and bridles will be wiped down at points at points of hand contact

5) Saddling Barn:

- **Only those essential personnel licensed by the California Horse Racing Board who have horses entered on race day will be permitted on the track in the afternoon**
 - Essential personnel include racing officials, safety staff, ambulance drivers, track maintenance crew and specialized janitorial staff
- No congregating in the saddling barn
- All horses will be saddled in the saddling barn and will be walked out of the saddling barn onto the walking ring to meet their jockeys
- Horses will be saddled in two groups keeping a minimum of ten feet of space between them - meaning that every other stall in the saddling area will be empty
- Jockeys will mount their horses outside of the saddling barn in the walking ring and will proceed directly to the racetrack for the post parade and warm up
- **Saddling barn will be disinfected with a bleach solution between each race**

6) Jockeys' Room and Jockeys' Room Protocols:

- **All jockeys will have their temperatures tested daily prior to entry**
 - Any jockey showing signs of illness will be denied access to the premises
- Only jockeys scheduled to ride in races will be permitted entry to the Jockeys' Room
- The jockeys' quarters are off limits to all except for the jockeys
 - Additional jockeys' quarters have been added to allow for proper social distancing reflecting the required minimum of six feet
 - Jockeys will maintain their own riding equipment
 - Sauna in the jockeys' quarters is closed
- All jockeys will be required to wear gloves; including during races
- Jockeys who choose to leave the state to ride at other racetracks will not be permitted to ride at Santa Anita Park - no exceptions

Additional Protocols During Live Racing

1) Essential Grooms:

- All grooms will be required to wear protective eyewear, masks and gloves when escorting horses to the racetrack

2) Essential On-Track Personnel:

- All pony riders on the track will be required to wear masks and gloves
- All gate personnel will be required to wear masks and gloves
- All starting gates will be disinfected between races
- All gate crew will be required to wear protective eyewear, masks and gloves and will have no physical contact between them

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

1) The following PPE is being installed and utilized at Santa Anita Park:

- Masks must be worn by all personnel onsite
- Protective eyewear and gloves for essential employees
- Temperature Monitoring Stations at all check points
 - Provides a fast assessment without personal contact
 - Thermal temperature stations will be set up at backstretch security entrance points, Grandstand entrance points and Jockeys' quarters

Controlled Access Areas and Documentation for Training:

Restricted Facility Access

1) Backstretch and Stable Areas:

A) Access:

- **Symons Ambulance will be present at the stable gate entrance each morning and will administer temperature testing for all personnel prior to entry**
- Masks must be worn by all personnel onsite, including the stable area and racetrack during morning training
- Only trainers with horses presently stabled at Santa Anita Park and essential personnel licensed by the state who are responsible for the care of the horses (veterinarians, grooms, exercise riders, farriers, etc.) will be permitted access to the backstretch and stable areas
- **Only horses racing and shipping from in-state training centers and who are accompanied by essential, licensed personnel will be allowed on to enter the stable gate**
 - Horse transportation into the stable area is permitted only from 5:30 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. daily
 - Only in-state horse transportation drivers are permitted to enter the facility
 - All drivers will be required to have their temperatures taken prior to entry
 - Additional transportation personnel will not be permitted to enter
 - No out-of-state horses or their accompanying personnel are permitted to enter the facility
- A stable area curfew is in force between 9:00 p.m. and 5:30 a.m.
 - No entries into the backstretch will be permitted between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 5:30 a.m. unless it is an emergency
 - Veterinarians attending to emergencies are required to go through all applicable security protocols prior to entry
- No jockeys will be permitted on the backstretch
- Security personnel will retain a log of all personnel who enter and exit the backstretch - recording name, date and time of entry and exit
- All security personnel will be required to wear masks and gloves
- Security vehicles will be limited to two security personnel per vehicle
- All essential employees will be educated on the proper removal of masks and gloves and will receive regular protocol updates

B) Track Kitchen:

- The track kitchen will remain open for take-out service for essential personnel only
- Six-foot social distancing spacing lines have been set up in the track kitchen
- Dedicated security for the track kitchen will be present to ensure that essential personnel respect required social distancing protocols

C) Veterinarians & Trainers – Stable Protocols (complete veterinary protocol attached as Appendix 1):

- Santa Anita Park employed veterinarians will be required to wear masks and gloves for all horse inspections
- Each barn will be required to designate one point of contact to interact with their veterinarian
- Veterinarians will be required to follow strict handwashing and hand sanitization protocols between barns and examinations
- Trainers will be limited to essential personnel only in their designated barns
- Only one person will be permitted in the tack rooms and/or offices at any given time
 - Tack rooms and offices will be sanitized after individual use
- Tack and barn equipment will be assigned to specific personnel only
- All tack and barn equipment will be sanitized daily
 - Tack and barn equipment will not be stored with other equipment until it has been cleaned and sanitized

D) Other:

- Portable water stations have been installed throughout the facility and will be sanitized regularly
- Disposable and portable hand sanitizers have been installed throughout the property and will be sanitized regularly
- All SAP facilities will be subject to enhanced cleaning and sanitization protocols



Santa Anita Park Standard Operating Procedures for Human Infectious Disease Control

1. PURPOSE

The Stronach Group (“TSG”) Veterinary Team’s role as Association Veterinarians is to promote horse safety and welfare. This includes protecting the people who care for horses during outbreaks of human infectious diseases.

2. SCOPE

This document covers the best practices and guidelines for minimizing the spread of human infectious disease at TSG tracks during:

1. Examination of horses for training
2. Observation of racing and training, including responding to incidents on the track
3. Furosemide administration
4. Any other interaction with TSG staff, trainers or trainers’ staff

3. RESPONSIBILITIES

The Association Veterinarians are responsible for the following:

1. Minimizing the risk of spread of human infectious diseases in the case of widespread viral outbreaks or pandemics

4. PROCEDURES

1. At all times, the Association Veterinarians should follow current recommended guidelines from the CDC.
2. During visits to the backside, including examinations of working horses, Association Veterinarians should observe the following:
 - a. Wear a face mask and gloves – please note, these should be changed daily and conserved

- b. Maintain a 6-foot distance from trainers and staff whenever possible
 - c. Do not shake hands or come into other physical contact with trainers or staff
 - d. Do not share pens or equipment
 - e. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer between each barn at a minimum
- 3. During observation of training or racing, Association Veterinarians should observe the following:
 - a. Maintain a 6-foot distance from staff and horsemen
 - b. Cover mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing
 - c. Do not shake hands or come into other physical contact with staff or horsemen
 - d. Do not share pens or equipment
 - e. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer between each barn at a minimum
- 4. When providing furosemide administration, Association Veterinarians should observe the following:
 - a. Maintain a 6-foot distance from staff and horsemen
 - b. Ask the individual holding the horse to stay on the other side of the horse while furosemide is administered, if possible
 - c. Do not shake hands or come into other physical contact with staff or horsemen
 - d. Do not share pens or equipment – the requirement for signatures from horsemen is suspended. Please write the name of the horsemen’s representative on all necessary documentation
 - e. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer between each barn at a minimum
- 5. If responding to an incident on the track, Association Veterinarians should observe the following:
 - a. Wear a mask and gloves
 - b. Put the care of the horse first, but try to maintain distance from others attending to the scene when possible
 - c. Limit the number of people on the scene to required individuals only
 - i. The use of screens is suspended
 - ii. For most emergencies, the horse ambulance driver, the employee holding the horse and the veterinarian should be sufficient. The veterinarian on the scene can request additional assistance as needed through the outriders
 - d. Only one person should ride in the ambulance with the horse – no grooms or trainers should be in the horse ambulance at any time.
 - e. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer following the incident and interaction with others
- 6. When interacting with other veterinarians or other TSG staff, Association Veterinarians should observe the following:
 - a. Maintain a 6-foot distance whenever possible
 - b. Wear a mask and gloves
 - c. Do not shake hands or come into other physical contact

- d. Cover mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing
 - e. Do not share supplies unless necessary and sanitize shared equipment such as radios
 - f. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer frequently
7. If an Association Veterinarian feels sick or is displaying symptoms consistent with the current infectious disease, the Association Veterinarian will:
- a. Notify the Chief Veterinary Officer. The CVO will communicate with the appropriate individuals at each track and TSG corporate.
 - b. Notify fellow Association Veterinarians
 - c. Stay home during duration of symptoms or as mandated by local health authorities and track policy
8. If an Association Veterinarian receives a positive test result or diagnosis of the infectious disease, the Association Veterinarian will:
- a. Notify the Chief Veterinary Officer; the CVO will work with the Association Veterinarian to identify and notify veterinarians, staff or trainers that they have been in contact with or could have been exposed to the virus. The CVO will communicate with the appropriate individuals at each track and TSG corporate.
 - b. Self-isolate for 14 days and seek medical care as needed

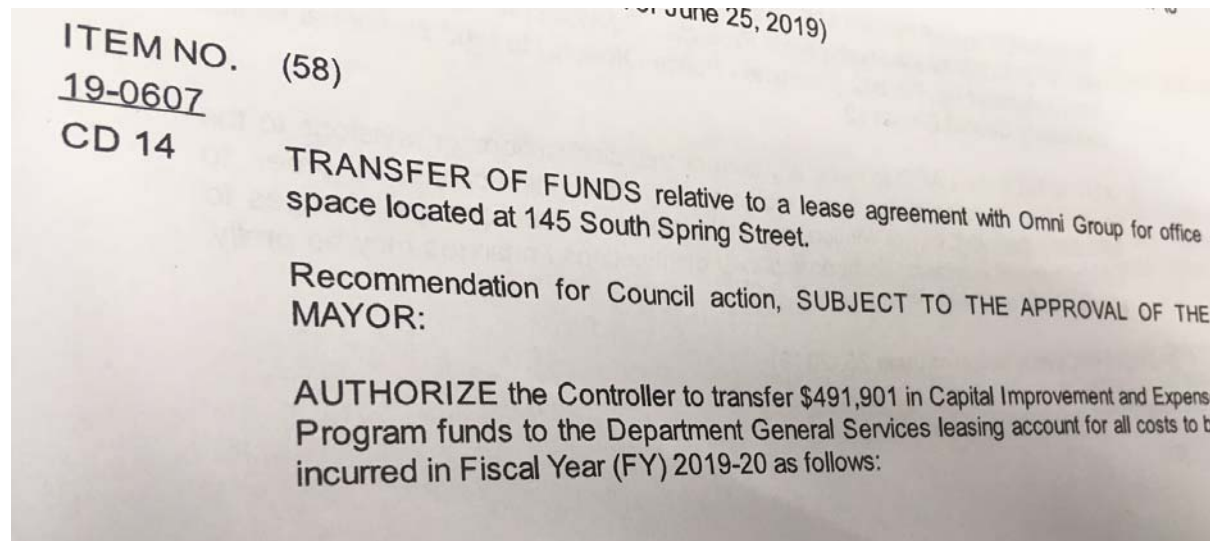

would like to comment on the items you will consider in the meeting tomorrow with respect to the conduct of live racing at Santa Anita and the fate of the people and animals that reside and work there.

I have been going to the races at Santa Anita since I was in grade school. It is regarded by racing fans world-wide as one of the most beautiful and gracious racing venues in the United States. It is internationally known and respected. I am aware of the horse deaths that occurred during the winter of 2019. I read about how the sport is covered by mainstream media driven by sound bites and 15-second info-nuggets that really do not educate anybody, but are guaranteed to incense. I grew up reading about horse racing in the L.A. Times and am saddened by how the sport I love is now largely ignored by local news media and how little people understand about the sport and industry. Much of the fault lies with organic problems with how the sport lacks centralized leadership, and has done a poor job of communicating to existing and potential fans. All of this is perhaps a long way of saying that as a life-long resident of Los Angeles County I think Santa Anita is a special gem that should be treasured for its historic legacy, its status as an international venue, and as an economic presence in the County.

It is my understanding that the BOS are reluctant to allow live racing to return to Santa Anita since it was closed by the health department. I have never been able to find a comment or reason for this except that racing is considered to be a "non essential" business. I am living the COVID quarantine and I see where people go to recreate and, if this is the reason the BOS will decide it should remain closed, that makes absolutely no sense. I do not sense that the owners of Santa Anita racetrack, or the hundreds of people who live there, are trying to assert that horse racing is somehow an "essential" business. It is, however, a very unique economic and social ecosystem uniquely situated to be able to conduct live racing, with no public attendance, without putting at risk either the employees or the public at large. Some of the relevant considerations I urge you to consider:

1. Horses require 24-hour care 7 days a week. They must be fed and exercised. The racetrack owners have instituted, and will continue to maintain, protocols that maintain the safety of the people who live and work at the track and who much take care of the animals.
2. It takes few additional people to run live racing. I watch live racing at the few other track that are open. They are not like the meat packing workers who were required to work even though at risk. The race tracks have instituted safety protocols for all workers. It not only can be done, it is being done.
3. The economic engine that allows horses to be fed, to receive veterinary care, that allows workers to receive health care and essential services, is wagering. If races are not run, no income is generated. Horse racing is its own economic ecosystem that is driven by wagering. Live racing can be conducted and wagering occurs online. It is televised. Some day I hope to return to the racetrack to see the beautiful thoroughbred athletes. But now I will place online wagers and view the sport on television. To not allow live racing at Santa Anita puts at risk people who are essentially working without pay. Yes there are many people who have been economically displaced by the business closures implemented to control the spread of COVID-19, but why anyone in a politically responsible position would intentionally put people who can be gainfully employed without risking COVID-19 infection is beyond me.

There are many other risky venues open to large numbers of the public (several beaches, the Arboretum). It makes no sense to not allow live racing at a venue that will remain closed to the public and that has implemented safety protocols

for employees. How many cases of COVID-19 have been reported from the Santa Anita racetrack community? They were very proactive in closing early on.

As each state contemplates how to safely ramping up economic activity, I hope the BOS will do the right thing and acknowledge the proven ability of Santa Anita race track to safely conduct its business without endangering the health of the public at large, or its employees. The matter is all the more head-scratching because people who claim to be concerned about the horses are not making decisions that are in their best interest.

Once Santa Anita is able to re-open to the public, I urge you to visit and admire the unmatched beauty of thoroughbred horses do what they do best.

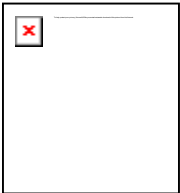

Honorable Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors:

I would like to request that the Board of Supervisors and the Los Angeles County Health Department immediately allow Santa Anita Park to reopen for spectatorless racing in the afternoons without the public present.

The decision to force Santa Anita to not run races in the afternoons was a poor one and probably stems from a lack of understanding of the thoroughbred racing business.

Here is a list of facts that pertain to the situation at Santa Anita Park:

1. Training of horses is taking place daily in the mornings and thank you for allowing that to continue. Racing in the afternoons 4 days a week (Thurs - Sun) would not require very many more people than are already onsite involved in the training in the morning hours 7 days a week. There really isn't much difference in necessary manpower. Maybe a dozen extra people would be required -- gate crew, outriders, and stewards. These people could and would easily follow the protocols that are already in place and have been successful. There has not been a single COVID-19 positive at Santa Anita Park yet.
2. The business of thoroughbred horseracing is essentially an internet business. Spectators are not necessary. I'm not sure that the Board of Supervisors realizes this fact
3. Revenue from legal online gambling on the races funds the backstretch employee's health care services. *Without racing, this is directly affecting the ability to keep necessary health care services running.*
4. Horseracing is our business. You have taken away our ability to generate any revenue in this business by not having racing in the afternoons. This is an unsustainable predicament for racehorse owners and it is so unnecessary because there is almost zero extra COVID-19 exposure if you allow the afternoon races to be run.
5. **The County owned Arboretum across the street from Santa Anita Park is currently OPEN to the public.** *The optics are such that you are discriminating against Santa Anita Park! We are not asking to be open to the public.*

I fully realize that there are tough decisions that have to be made in balancing public health benefits versus the economic effects of doing so.

However this is a business that doesn't have to be harmed unnecessarily.

This is a no-brainer. Please do the right thing and do it soon before the damage done is irreparable.

As a supporter of Thoroughbred racing I have followed the challenges of Thoroughbred Racing amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. The ban put in place by LA County for an industry that supports nearly a thousand people in the LA community seems to be an unnecessary action that will place a significant hardship on those same individuals who perform essentially the same functions with the racing ban in effect or not.

There are several upsides to allowing the racing to continue with few downsides. Santa Anita provides an ideal environment that could operate safely under current conditions. Most staff needed to care for the horses already live on site and have been following the protocols that have been put in place. Those few who commute back and forth such as trainers and veterinarians take the corona virus seriously and do all the things requisite to maintaining sanitary conditions.

Allowing racing to continue provides for continued purse distributions that generates the revenue needed to keep staff employed in addition to much needed revenues for the city, county and state. For people locally, nationwide and worldwide it provides a wonderful mental pause to the pandemic and allows fans to stay in their homes to enjoy the sport on TV or laptops. The absence of racing not only creates a hardship for the owners and trainers but also for the staff that live check to check.

If these workers continue to lose the revenue provided by purse distributions it will certainly create a tremendous hardship and added stress to an already stressful situation. I would like to thank you for taking the time to read this and I would like to introduce myself. My name is Ryan Carpenter and I am a veterinarian and board certified equine surgeon that works at Santa Anita racetrack. As a doctor and scientist, I've been keeping a close eye on the COVID-19 outbreak over the past several months and am well aware of the health risk this crisis poses to our community. When we look at this epidemic both at a local and global level, I applaud Governor Newsom and Mayor Garcetti for taking a very proactive approach to what was obviously going to have a dramatic impact on our world. It's clear from an epidemiologic standpoint that we have flattened the curve and because of the leadership in our community and state. Now it's time to look at what the next step will be and I think it's clear that we need to safely reintroduce business in order to keep people employed and drive the economy. The question that you were posed is a simple one, is horse racing an essential business and should it be allowed to continue given the current climate. The answer among all veterinary health professionals is racehorses need to be cared for, exercised and allowed to exercise. So if training in the morning is acceptable to the county then we need to ask the question, what added risk to our community is involved with conducting business in the afternoon with spectator less racing. I applaud The Stronach Group for taking a very proactive stand putting together a very comprehensive plan that was presented to the health department on April the 16th. If you have a chance to read this proposal you will quickly realize that a tremendous amount of effort was put into the development of a strategy that will eliminate any additional risk in the afternoon. With this in mind you can confidently allow racing to resume at Santa Anita in the afternoon with no worry this will have a negative effect on what our community has accomplished in the past several months. Running races in the afternoon is the driving force of our industry and if racing is not allowed to be conducted for the coming months, this poses a great threat to the viability of our industry. More importantly there are hundreds of individuals that care for thousands of horses that will become unemployed. These individuals call the backside their home and immediately these individuals will become homeless which will add to the crisis at hand. I suspect this will pose a greater risk of community spread because these individuals will be forced to come together instead of being allowed to stay at the

racetrack where they are actively practicing social distancing. Additionally, a portion of money generated by races goes into the health care of the members of our community and the care for horses once they are retired from racing. Sadly CARMA, which is a very notable organization that cares for racehorses once retired, has announced that they can not accept horses into there program at this time because of the lack of funding to the organization without races being run. Once races begin, they will be accepting horses again and this animal welfare issue will be greatly minimized because as it stands now this is having a significant impact on the aftercare of our retired athletes.

I'm proud of the measures that have been put in place so far and look forward to any additional steps we can take to ensure safety of our community form a balanced approach. Several friends of mine work in construction and they are allowed to continue working normally and we can all agree that most of these projects are not essential at this time. Additionally, I spent several hours at Costco this morning and it was clear that while not perfect several changes to the flow of people have been put in place to help minimize risk. This is a balanced approach and I ask that this type of approach be considered at Santa Anita for afternoon live racing so our industry, like the ones I just mentioned can continue to provided jobs in the face of an ever growing unemployment and money to the state that will provide aid to fellow members of our community. Additionally please consider The Stronach Group's commitment to the community and being a leader within our industry.

Thank you for you're time and service to our county in this difficult time. I'm confident we will emerge stronger then we were before and know we are committed to the health and safety of our racing community as you are to LA County, but we have got to get working again with a safe balance approach to minimize the risk and I'm confident The Stronach Group's plan accomplishes this.

Dear Board of Supervisors:

I appreciate your Department's continued engagement with Santa Anita Park regarding protocols to safely reopen horse racing activities at the track without spectators. As an owner and breeder, our operations have been affected by the pandemic. While we are obviously not at all unique in the suffering that many are experiencing, we owe a responsibility to the well-being of our horses and those who take care of them. This is highly challenging when our expenses remain the same, as horses cannot be put away in a storage shed as furniture can, and cannot be furloughed and put into an unemployment line either. I am extremely concerned about the welfare of both the horses and the workers at the track if racing income cannot be reinstated in the near future, and I believe that the protocols are in place to properly balance public health during the Covid-19 pandemic.

I understand the immense responsibility that your Department holds to protect human health, and I appreciate your taking it seriously. I believe that the decisive actions taken by Governor Newsom and implemented by the Health Departments across the state have had significant positive impact on California's ability to keep Covid-19 within manageable parameters, certainly compared to states like New York and its neighbors. I understand the immense "damned if you do, damned if you don't" challenges in deciding where to strike the balance between keeping people at home and allowing enough economic activity to ensure that the "cure" (indefinite lockdown) isn't worse than the "disease". I understand the added challenge of having only partial data (such as testing) on which to base these decisions in a balanced way, and that it appears easier to strike the balance on the side of caution rather than risk when coronavirus cases are still being identified in the LA area. I would respectfully submit that there are sufficient scientific and objective reasons to allow racing to proceed at this time or the very near future, based on the information currently known about Covid-19 (understood modes of transmission, mitigation through PPE and social distancing protocols, susceptibility of virus through sanitization efforts, increased testing options in the coming weeks, currently vulnerable-but-manageable hospital resources, unprecedented scientific cooperation on therapeutics, treatment, therapeutic and vaccine research, assumed outbreak peak having passed, flattening and decreasing caseload curves, hopeful seasonal decreases in transmission, etc.).

My heart goes out to your position in these difficult times and the pressure I am sure you feel with many competing interests. Many people across the county and globally are being affected with loss of their loved ones, job losses and fears about the future. I have experienced the resilience of the people in the racing industry and their commitment to the horses in their care. Many are scared, just as in other industries, yet they are still there every day to do what needs to be done. They inspire me. I sincerely believe that allowing racing to return to Santa Anita will be part of the fabric the community will need to survive and rebuild in the months to come. Thank you for working with our industry to allow for us all to create a future in which economic health and public health can coexist hand in hand.

Agenda Item 14 - Worker Protections:

RACETRACK WORKER CONSIDERATIONS

1. Santa Anita racetrack has put in place a number of stringent safety rules to minimize the impact of Covid-19, such as installing multiple hand sanitizer locations and providing face masks to track employees. To the best of my knowledge, Santa Anita continues to be open to any further protocols to maximize health at the racetrack.
2. There are approximately 750 racetrack workers who live on the racetrack grounds to take care of approximately 1700 horses stabled there. and, as such, are essentially a closed system. Santa Anita has made significant adjustments to maintain the workers' health and safety without a need to leave the community and mingle with the outside-racetrack community.
3. The racetrack workers have take-out access to the racetrack kitchen, make their meals in their living quarters and are therefore largely self-sufficient for their needs on the track.
4. While working, the workers have paid health insurance and there is an onsite medical clinic to attend to their needs. Should they lose their jobs, they would immediately lose access to their health insurance and could become a more significant health and safety concern to California.
5. The racetrack workers rely on their racetrack employment for their housing needs. Should they lose their jobs, they could become part of the homeless population and add to an already significant health and safety concern that the homeless population experiences in Los Angeles County. They are safer in their jobs than without them.
6. Santa Anita has announced further protocols over the weekend regarding jockeys and jockeys' agents not being allowed to attend the backside (where the grooms and horses reside), to further tighten social distancing.

Agenda Items 19-Safely Reopening LA County, and 20-LA County Roadmap to Economic Recovery:

LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITY TO CREATE PROTOCOLS THAT BALANCE PUBLIC HEALTH AND ECONOMIC HEALTH

- The American public has shown tremendous willingness and patience to embrace social distancing when it was announced, but it is evident that the economic damage on businesses and individuals is straining this willingness. 26 million applications for unemployment benefits, PPP program being exhausted within a couple of days and hundreds of thousands of applications outstanding for the second round, and increasing demonstrations to return the country to work are just the beginning of examples that will force governments and health departments to struggle with imperfect answers to what, when and how much to reopen the economy and how to do so without significant risk of an unmanageable wave of new Covid-19 infections.
- In the coming future, it will be crucial to develop protocols for both essential and non-essential sectors of business that allow for economic activity while minimizing negative effects to public and individual health. Some business structures may be well poised to provide such risk management earlier than others. Racetrack environment such as Santa Anita, is well placed to be one of these early adopters due to its existing necessary safety protocols to allow racehorse training, as well as the ability of these protocols to have been tested with success at other tracks across the USA under strict spectator-free racing.
- Racetracks like Santa Anita are unique in that a large percentage of their income (off-site betting) is not dependent on fans' presence at the racetrack, nor on personnel that

isn't required to be on the grounds for essential services (training and care of horses). Santa Anita is also unique with its onsite health clinic, and better able to prevent and mitigate health risks than many other businesses, essential or not.

- There are other racetracks in the United States that have been able to race without spectators under stringent protocols and without known Covid-19 cases. These racetracks are in areas with reasonably comparable per-capita county caseload as LA County (data below is taken from 4/24/20 data reported by the Johns Hopkins Coronavirus Center:
 - Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, AR. Garland County: 109 confirmed cases, equal to 109.93 per 100,000 residents
 - Tampa Bay in Tampa, FL. Hillsborough County: 1008 confirmed cases, equal to 70.15 per 100,000 residents
 - Gulfstream Park in Hallandale Beach, FL. Broward County: 4431 confirmed cases, equal to 227.08 per 100,000 residents
 - Los Alamitos in Orange County, CA. Orange County: 1827 confirmed cases, equal to 57.35 per 100,000 residents
 - In comparison, Los Angeles County has 17,537 confirmed cases, equal to 173.54 per 100,000 residents. While this is somewhat higher per capita than some of the other jurisdictions, it is less than Gulfstream Park with higher per-capita rates in Broward County, FL, which has been able to operate safely as well. The numbers above, with the history of no known cases at these tracks, show that the protocols in place go a long way to balancing public health with the ability to continue racing and funding horse care.
- Santa Anita has had protocols in place voluntarily and in consultation with an infectious disease expert involved in a Covid-19 panel. The currently operating racetracks have protocols, as well as the HBPA (Horsemen's Benevolent Protective Association, which provides guidance to horsemen nationally) that have been shared within the racing industry:
https://www.horseracingnation.com/news/National_HBPA_provides_template_for_spectator_free_racing_123
- Santa Anita has an onsite clinic which provides free healthcare to track workers, and is ready to assist with necessary isolation and treatment if required. This places it ahead of most businesses in the County in being able to conduct operations with managed risk. The clinic's ability to continue is directly dependent on it being funded through racing income.
- In an article entitled "How do we get back to work? One hospital's procedures show the way", Mass General Hospital's Dr. Poznansky and Dr. Hart spoke about the protocols at MGH designed to mitigate the risks of infection, while allowing the hospital to function and provide care. The protocols mentioned in the article are very much in line with the Santa Anita existing protocols and protocols at other tracks. Article link:

- The American economic system is in the process of collapsing. The safety net of programs such as the initial PPP program or SBA loans, while helpful, will be insufficient to absorb the devastating economic impact or the horrific losses to state and local budgets. It will not be possible to maintain full-lockdown social distancing for the 12-18 months (optimistic timeframe) it is expected to take for a viable vaccine to be created. Governments, health departments and businesses will need to work together to craft protocols that decrease public health risk and improve chances of R0 of Covid-19 getting below 1, while making it feasible for populations to maintain their housing, food sources, exercise, and mental health needs.

Santa Anita, with their carefully crafted protocols, is eager to provide leadership and science-based strategies, to lead the way for Los Angeles County and other businesses, as we are forced to design a vision that allows continued public health cautions while allowing economic activity.

- To the extent that Santa Anita is able conduct racing, earn income, pay vendors for services and pay tax revenue, it is in better position to provide economic and inspirational value to the community it serves in Los Angeles County, California and nationwide, not just the racing community within its enclosure.

OPPORTUNITY TO POSITIVELY IMPACT MENTAL HEALTH

- Americans are experiencing increased mental health challenges, as evidenced by studies showing 47% people with negative mental health effects in those sheltering-in-place compared to 37% of those not sheltering-in-place, and crisis lines all over the country reporting many-fold increases in calls from people anxious about health effects of the coronavirus as well as suicidal thoughts and anxiety due to economic or loneliness worries. While continued sheltering-in-place will need to be utilized as part of public health strategies, its mental health effects can be minimized with access to programming with positive effects on mental health, such as sports, as well as responsible return-to-work protocols being utilized and proposed by Santa Anita.
- Most other sports leagues cannot be conducted with sufficient social distancing protocols at this time, but horse racing is uniquely positioned to be able to continue due to the unusual and ironic reality that the part of the activity designated as non-essential by the Health Department (afternoon racing) poses far smaller social distancing challenges than the activity designated as essential (training and horse care). Therefore, for risk management purposes, it makes much sense to allow the less risky "racing" activity when that is the activity that provides the necessary funding for the "essential" training and horse care activity.
- The loneliness and social isolation due to lockdown orders has also resulted in Americans' increased appreciation for animals in our lives (The Humane Society of the United States reports that pet adoptions are up by 90% and organizations in New York have seen foster applications up ten-fold). While this increase doesn't translate to increased horse adoptions due to different dynamics (high expenses, horses cannot isolate in the home like dogs and cats), Americans have been more drawn to animal-related programs (the Tiger King phenomenon, is just one example of this, even with very dysfunctional humans in the series). Increased betting handle at those tracks able to run also evidence this.
- Virtual horse farm tours at certain Kentucky breeding farms have received praise from the public, and specifically stressed health care workers, appreciative of being able for horse viewing to lift spirits in tough times. Here are some sample comments in response to a Claiborne Farm (KY) virtual tour:

- A racehorse has been said to be able to "take a 1000 people for a ride at the same time". Seabiscuit provided inspiration after the Great Depression (as did the namesake movie). Secretariat inspired many, as have California-based racehorses such as Zenytta and California Chrome, or the two most recent Triple Crown winners, American Pharoah and Justify. In the absence of other sports, and in line with the identified human desire

to identify with animals at a time of increased loneliness, horse racing provides a much-needed mental health outlet that can be watched on TV by fans, while providing in-state and out-of-state betting revenue that directly supports the care for horses, workers, owners and trainers.

HORSE CARE CONSIDERATIONS

1. Care of horses has been deemed to fall within the agricultural essential business designation. Therefore, the care of horses can continue at Santa Anita. As an owner, I am appreciative of this designation, as I am very concerned about our horses' well-being without this designation.
2. Care of a backyard family horse out in a pasture herd is dramatically different from the care of a fit athletic racing Thoroughbred, and the care of a backyard horse may be changed more easily in response to the health shutdowns in California. The distinction in care needs may not be fully appreciated by those without inside knowledge of the care of the Thoroughbred.
3. The fit, athletic, racing Thoroughbred requires not only feed and bedding, but also daily exercise under a rider on the racetrack.
4. There is no reasonable safe alternative for the racing Thoroughbred to receive sufficient exercise in the racetrack environment without decreasing safety to both horses and their caretakers. While hand-walking is a reasonable alternative for up to three days or so, these athletic horses get too wound up without their regular gallops, breezes and racing schedule. When they get wound up, they pose greater danger of physical injury or health issues to themselves and/or their caretakers. They thrive both on routine as well as the physical ability to get their energy out through exercise.
5. Due to space and safety considerations, there are no turnout accommodations at the racetrack and therefore the horses rely on their exercise needs by their human caretakers (grooms, exercise riders and jockeys). Due to the number of horses at Santa Anita (approximately 1700) and the lack of area horse farms able to absorb this number of horses if the track could not function, it is safest for these horses to remain in the racetrack environment and be well taken care of by the trainers and caretakers they know and trust.
6. Racing at appropriate 3-5 week intervals per horse is part of the exercise regimen, and part of the safe maintenance of the Thoroughbred racehorse.
7. There is minimal added difference to the care needed for the Thoroughbred at the racetrack for only training purposes, vs. with racing allowed. In other words, approximately 95% of the care required is concentrated on the training end, not the racing end.
8. The racing part of the activity is what allows for the Thoroughbred industry to earn its income. Without the health risk of crowds of spectators removed, the racing component adds very minimal social distancing issues over the necessary daily care required for the daily care and exercise. Santa Anita has been conscientious with stringent protocols both in training and racing.

HORSE WELFARE ISSUES WITHOUT RACING

1. Without racing, some affected horse owners and owners may struggle significantly with their ability to cover the continuing costs of care until racing may again continue. Even one week of missed scheduled racing dates may shift available race schedules and horse

fitness by four or six weeks.

2. Due to Covid-19, there are already significant concerns in the Thoroughbred community about this situation causing horsemen to need to retire horses they may not afford to pay bills for. While horse retirement options have improved significantly over recent years (I am on the Board of Directors of the Retired Racehorse Project, and I am well aware of off-track Thoroughbred retirement issues), other equestrian disciplines are also suffering due to impacts of Covid-19. It is unlikely that there would be sufficient retirement options for horses with no homes to go to.
3. The industry-funded horse after-care organization, CARMA, had to suspend taking in new horses as of April 9th. Their funding comes through percentage of racing income. This is a significant welfare issue. With private owners and trainers losing income, they cannot easily increase private funding to this organization at a time when it is needed more than ever. <https://www.carma4horses.org/archives/placement-program-temporarily-suspended>
4. The financial value of a racing Thoroughbred can decrease significantly by potentially tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars when they are unable to race. While financial considerations should not be a significant consideration where health is concerned, the financial value has a domino effect on the ability of owners, trainers and caretakers to afford the horses' care. Therefore, value issues become a horse welfare issue.
5. Allowing racing, under stringent health protocols, gives the horses and their owners the highest chance to bridge these difficult times without becoming a severe equine welfare concern in California.

POLITICAL AND PRACTICAL CONSIDERATIONS

1. It has come to my attention that animal rights activists have been lobbying the Health Department to shut down Santa Anita and other racetracks within California under the guise of health considerations. I am aware of social media posts within the animal rights activist community which claim they have inside access to the Health Department to do so, and plan further phone and other campaigns to pressure the Health Department. This is inappropriate and political interference due to the Covid-19 crisis to accomplish their ideological goals without consideration on horse welfare and worker welfare.
2. Please be aware that animal rights activists operate from an ideological point of view. Some extreme activists advocate for no horse to have a saddle on them, nor for humans to have pets. Some of the activists have advocated for the extinction of entire horse breeds, such as the Thoroughbred. While I expect the Health Department and Santa Anita to take actual health issues seriously, I would respectfully request for the Health Department to take activist complaints with a very large grain of salt as being politically and ideologically motivated.
3. If there are any ways to augment health-related procedures at the track, I am confident that the Santa Anita and horsemen community will be very open to any Health Department suggestions which can allow the balancing of the horse care needs with the health care needs of California in the middle of the Covid-19 outbreak. All of the racing community is highly incentivized for all the racetrack personnel to remain safe, as we depend on each other to take care of each other and of the horses.

I appreciate the opportunity to contact you about these issues. We appreciate your willingness to work with the industry to find ways for us to continue doing so and being part of the solution for California, rather than part of the problem. The entire Thoroughbred racing

community is working very hard together to ensure the safety and health of the horses and the humans involved, and we appreciate the chance to continue to balance these needs at this time.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

I am writing in support of a proposal from The Stronach Group that would permit thoroughbred horse racing to resume at Santa Anita Park. As I reside in Orange County, I am not your constituent, but I have been a dedicated patron of horse racing at Santa Anita for many years, so I have contributed to the economic well-being of Los Angeles County.

The terms of the current orders related to the COVID-19 outbreak make clear that those involved in the care of animals are considered essential. It has thus been permitted that the staff required to care for the over 1000 horses housed at Santa Anita be able to continue their work, subject to appropriate precautions such as PPE and maintaining social distance. They have done this well, and maintained an excellent record concerning staying safe from infection. What may not be apparent to some who are not familiar with the practices of horse racing is that the number of people required to conduct racing in the afternoons is dwarfed by the number involved in horse care. Gate workers, riders, and trainers of horses racing amount to a few dozen people, most of them also involved in horse care in the mornings. There is very little if any incremental risk of the pandemic to conducting racing and horse care, compared to only horse care. It is also true that racing is the way that all involved in the enterprise of horse racing earn their living. In the absence of that income, I cannot fathom how we would begin to give racehorses the kind of care they deserve going forward.

I realize that TSG made a detailed proposal to the County concerning the terms and procedures of resuming racing, which likely goes into far more detail about how they believe they can do so safely. My opinions echo theirs, so I do not need to repeat their arguments, only to endorse them.

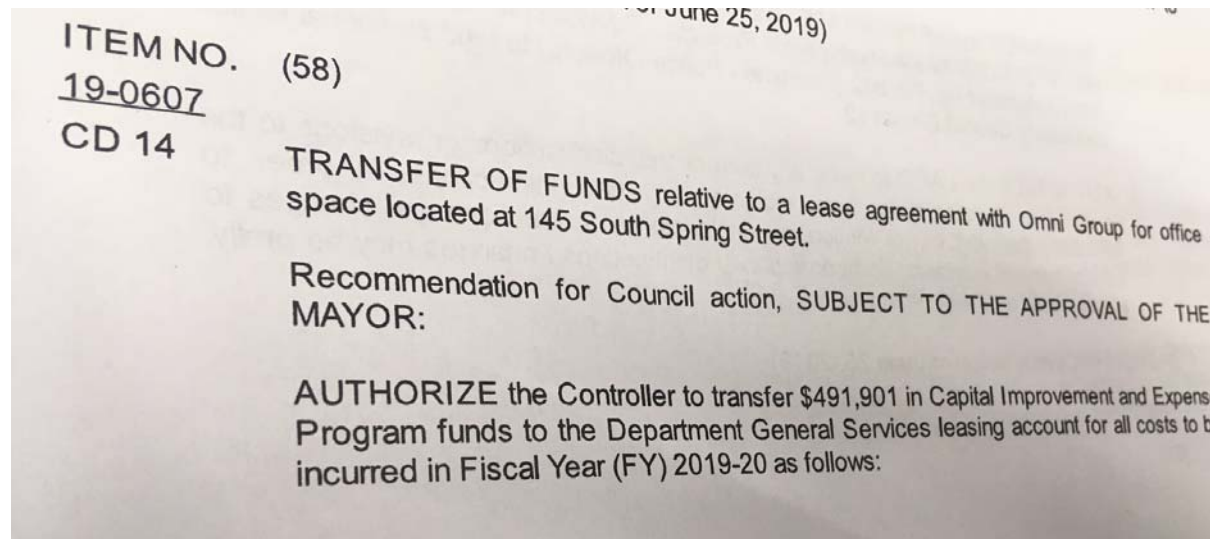

would like to comment on the items you will consider in the meeting tomorrow with respect to the conduct of live racing at Santa Anita and the fate of the people and animals that reside and work there.

I have been going to the races at Santa Anita since I was in grade school. It is regarded by racing fans world-wide as one of the most beautiful and gracious racing venues in the United States. It is internationally known and respected. I am aware of the horse deaths that occurred during the winter of 2019. I read about how the sport is covered by mainstream media driven by sound bites and 15-second info-nuggets that really do not educate anybody, but are guaranteed to incense. I grew up reading about horse racing in the L.A. Times and am saddened by how the sport I love is now largely ignored by local news media and how little people understand about the sport and industry. Much of the fault lies with organic problems with how the sport lacks centralized leadership, and has done a poor job of communicating to existing and potential fans. All of this is perhaps a long way of saying that as a life-long resident of Los Angeles County I think Santa Anita is a special gem that should be treasured for its historic legacy, its status as an international venue, and as an economic presence in the County.

It is my understanding that the BOS are reluctant to allow live racing to return to Santa Anita since it was closed by the health department. I have never been able to find a comment or reason for this except that racing is considered to be a "non essential" business. I am living the COVID quarantine and I see where people go to recreate and, if this is the reason the BOS will decide it should remain closed, that makes absolutely no sense. I do not sense that the owners of Santa Anita racetrack, or the hundreds of people who live there, are trying to assert that horse racing is somehow an "essential" business. It is, however, a very unique economic and social ecosystem uniquely situated to be able to conduct live racing, with no public attendance, without putting at risk either the employees or the public at large. Some of the relevant considerations I urge you to consider:

1. Horses require 24-hour care 7 days a week. They must be fed and exercised. The racetrack owners have instituted, and will continue to maintain, protocols that maintain the safety of the people who live and work at the track and who much take care of the animals.
2. It takes few additional people to run live racing. I watch live racing at the few other track that are open. They are not like the meat packing workers who were required to work even though at risk. The race tracks have instituted safety protocols for all workers. It not only can be done, it is being done.
3. The economic engine that allows horses to be fed, to receive veterinary care, that allows workers to receive health care and essential services, is wagering. If races are not run, no income is generated. Horse racing is its own economic ecosystem that is driven by wagering. Live racing can be conducted and wagering occurs online. It is televised. Some day I hope to return to the racetrack to see the beautiful thoroughbred athletes. But now I will place online wagers and view the sport on television. To not allow live racing at Santa Anita puts at risk people who are essentially working without pay. Yes there are many people who have been economically displaced by the business closures implemented to control the spread of COVID-19, but why anyone in a politically responsible position would intentionally put people who can be gainfully employed without risking COVID-19 infection is beyond me.

There are many other risky venues open to large numbers of the public (several beaches, the Arboretum). It makes no sense to not allow live racing at a venue that will remain closed to the public and that has implemented safety protocols

for employees. How many cases of COVID-19 have been reported from the Santa Anita racetrack community? They were very proactive in closing early on.

As each state contemplates how to safely ramping up economic activity, I hope the BOS will do the right thing and acknowledge the proven ability of Santa Anita race track to safely conduct its business without endangering the health of the public at large, or its employees. The matter is all the more head-scratching because people who claim to be concerned about the horses are not making decisions that are in their best interest.

Once Santa Anita is able to re-open to the public, I urge you to visit and admire the unmatched beauty of thoroughbred horses do what they do best.

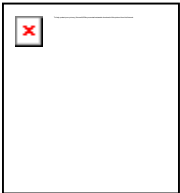

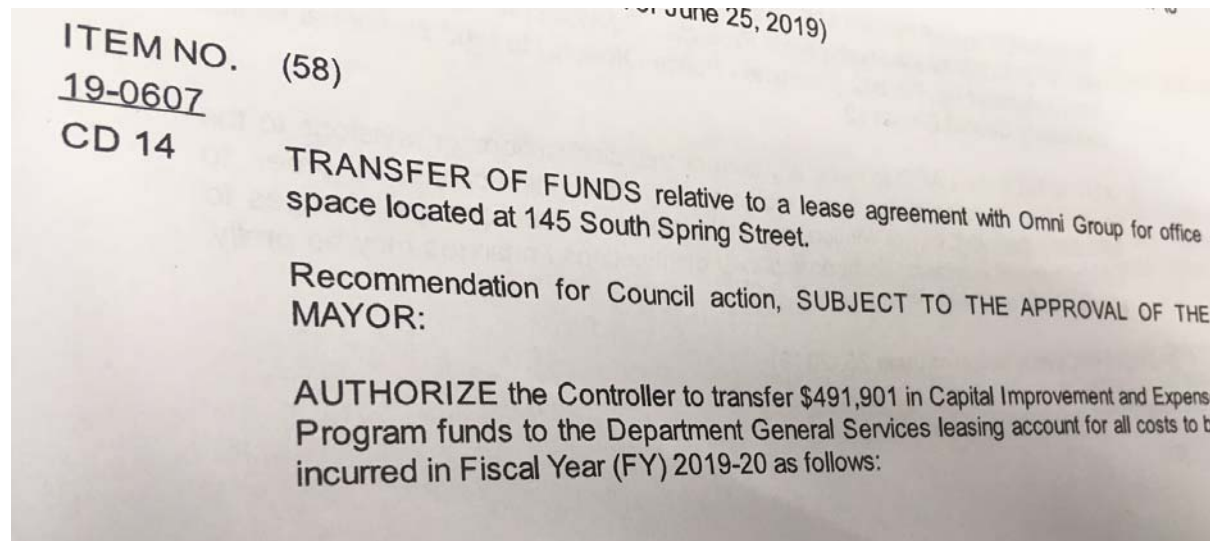

The outbreak of Covid19 has caused many unprecedented challenges all across the world. While slowing the spread of this virus through the use of social distancing should be the priority for all governing bodies, we should also be considering the economic and social implications of the restrictions that are being put in place as well as the efficacy and necessity of these restrictions.

To date, there have been no reported cases of Covid19 at Santa Anita Park. All workers have abided by strict precautionary measures and are committed to doing so going forward. Despite the successful efforts of race participants based at Santa Anita, on March 27th, 2020, live racing was suspended. On behalf of BizFed, a grassroots alliance of more than 195 business organizations representing 400,000 employers with over 3.5 million employees in Los Angeles County, we are writing to respectfully express some concerns with item 36 on the April 28 agenda with regards to supplemental paid sick leave.


We appreciate the county's leadership during COVID-19 and the desire protect and serve workers during the COVID-19 crisis.

As you are aware, Mayor Eric Garcetti passed his own executive order on Paid Sick Leave on April 7th. While we appreciate that the county has sought to mirror that policy, there are still some differences between that order and this ordinance that we hope the county will reconcile.

- LA County's Paid Sick Leave ordinance applies to businesses only with 500 or more employees nationwide. LA City's order applies to businesses with 500 or more in the region or 2,000 or more nationwide. We believe this prevents small businesses from being negatively impacted by this ordinance and request the ordinance reflect this.
- We also ask that section 8.200.060 "Employer Offset" be made clearer. Several of our business organizations are afraid that as currently written an employer may have to provide additional paid sick leave, even if they already provided it prior to March 31st. We believe an additional sentence would be helpful: "This section does not require an employer who provided paid sick leave prior to March 31 to provide additional sick leave above the required amount under section 8.200.030."

Honorable Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors:

My name is Oscar de la Torre and I am the current President of the California Latino School Board Association and the Founder of the Pico Youth & Family Center in Santa Monica. All of my life I have worked for social justice causes and I now work closely with back stretch workers at Santa Anita. These trainers, assistant trainers, grooms, exercise riders, and hot walkers are some of the hardest working people in the County of Los Angeles. They are also some of the most vulnerable. More than 98% are Latino, immigrant, threatened constantly by our federal government and at risk of losing their jobs, housing and health benefits.

I am writing to express my concern with the prohibition of live horse racing at Santa Anita. On March 27, 2020 based on a complaint, live racing was prohibited by the LA County Health Dept. at Santa Anita as a "non-essential" business. I understand that the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and the Los Angeles County Health Department is currently reviewing a proposal from Santa Anita to resume "spectatorless" live racing. As you know, live racing provides the financial support for the well-being of horses and the workers who take care of them. Many of the workers I represent have expressed their concern that if live horse racing is not allowed, horse owners will begin closing their stables at Santa Anita and this will cause irreparable harm to the economy of the horse industry that employs 77,000 workers statewide.

Like every other governing body in our State, you are responding to the COVID-19 pandemic and the repercussions of the public health directives that is intended to save lives. I commend you for your work and in no way am I advocating for things to return to normal. I am asking you to consider the proposal that was submitted by officials at Santa Anita to resume live horse racing with strict safety protocols. My request is based on a few facts that you should consider:

1. There have been ZERO reports of positive COVID-19 infections at Santa Anita and live racing at Los Alamitos (under the jurisdiction of the Orange County Board of Supervisors) has continued unabated with ZERO reports of workers testing positive for COVID-19.
2. Santa Anita has implemented strict protocols to strengthen public health and safety for workers and horses. Many workers on the back stretch are self-quarantined and have access to a medical clinic on site. Live racing does not increase the risk to the activities that the Los Angeles County Health Department has already allowed at Santa Anita.
3. Horse Racing can lead the responsible re opening of professional sports by hosting televised competitions without spectators. "Spectatorless" sport competitions such as live horse racing can protect public health and the thousands of unionized and non-unionized jobs that keep our families safe and secure. Of all professional sports, horse racing provides a best test case for a responsible re opening of professional sports because unlike other sports, our equine athletes cannot be infected and cannot transmit COVID-19. Furthermore, the science on COVID-19 transmission shows that people are more susceptible to infections in enclosed environments and Santa Anita operates with more than 300 acres of open space.
4. More than 750 back stretch workers risk losing income, housing and health benefits without the financial support that live racing provides. Currently, many other union jobs in horse racing have experienced lay-offs causing workers to lose

health benefits and wages. It is a greater threat to the well-being of workers to lose their income, housing and health benefits and public health will be at greater risk having more people homeless in the middle of a pandemic.

We are making a responsible and reasonable request to protect public health and the well-being of horses and workers. I truly believe that California horse racing can help power our economic recovery. Resuming live racing, with the strict protocols proposed by Santa Anita and approved by the Los Angeles County Health Department, will be a positive step in leading the responsible economic recovery of the County of Los Angeles.

The race track is no different from any other business, small or large. Not even the zoo, Universal Studios, Disneyland, any other business big or small... Many people are out of work because of potential spreading of this deadly virus, these horses to not need to race to keep healthy. The track owners and horse owners should be responsible for those that work for them, they do not need to do horse racing betting, to sustain.

We only think it's right that the race track stay quarantined and keep people safe and not continue horse racing, as we know that they cannot keep their promises in any mandatory protocols or regulations. (I included a few live racing footage from Santa Anita, from March 23rd 2020, even with the modified protocols, via the Governor) The same people that are in clusters of groups, in muck and mud, also touch each other's equipment and do not take any safety precautions at the track.

Every day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, by 4:00am horses and grooms, trainers, and assistant trainers, Outriders, hot walkers, exercise riders, assistant starters (gatemen); track officials, CA State officials, Stewarts; feed helpers, **delivery people, Veterinarians and Veterinarian assistants, farriers (horseshoers), muckers, jockey agents and cooks and kitchen staff, medical personnel, ambulance drivers, camera operators, timers, and many other backstretch and support personnel go to work.**

They prepare horses and care for them.

Horses are saddled, led to the track, put in the starting gate and take off running. By late morning, most training is done and the horse are cared for, bandaged, massaged, fed and watered.

All the above goes on every single day. Whether or not actual horse racing is going on. If Actual horse racing was allowed, everything above still goes on. NOTHING CHANGES except sometimes instead of exercise riders, licensed jockeys get on the horse and the trainer puts a number on the saddle and they ride them in a race.

99% of what goes on day to day still goes on. Adding a jockey and a number on the horse will not make Santa Anita a hot bed of Covid 19.

Please allow Santa Anita to resume racing.

As a supporter of Thoroughbred racing I have followed the challenges of Thoroughbred Racing amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. I've spoken with various stake holders, community leaders and citizens inside and outside the industry. The ban put in place by LA County for an industry that supports nearly a thousand people in the LA community seems to be an unnecessary action that will place a significant hardship on those same individuals who perform essentially the same functions with the racing ban in effect or not.

There are several upsides to allowing the racing to continue: Santa Anita provides an ideal environment that could operate safely under proper conditions. Most staff needed to care for the horses already live on site and have been following the protocols that have been put in place. Those few who commute back and forth such as trainers and veterinarians take the pandemic seriously and do all the things requisite to maintaining sanitary conditions.

Allowing racing to continue provides for continued purse distributions that generates the revenue needed *to keep staff employed* in addition to much needed revenues for the city, county and state. For people locally, nationwide and worldwide it provides a wonderful mental pause to the pandemic and allows fans to stay in their homes to enjoy the sport on TV or laptops. The absence of racing not only creates a hardship for the owners and trainers but especially for the staff who often earn significantly less money in a better economy than this one.

If these workers continue to lose the revenue provided by purse distributions it may cause irreversible hardship and added pain to an already stressful situation. The absence of racing will likely force many of these workers into homelessness.

Dear Members of the Board,

As a supporter of Thoroughbred racing I have followed the challenges of Thoroughbred Racing amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. I've spoken with various stake holders, community leaders and citizens inside and outside the industry. The ban put in place by LA County for an industry that supports nearly a thousand people in the LA community seems to be an unnecessary action that will place a significant hardship on those same individuals who perform essentially the same functions with the racing ban in effect or not.

There are several upsides to allowing the racing to continue with few downsides. Santa Anita provides an ideal environment that could operate safely under current conditions. Most staff needed to care for the horses already live on site and have been following the protocols that have been put in place. Those few who commute back and forth such as trainers and veterinarians take the corona virus seriously and do all the things requisite to maintaining sanitary conditions.

Allowing racing to continue provides for continued purse distributions that generates the revenue needed to keep staff employed in addition to much

needed revenues for the city, county and state. For people locally, nationwide and worldwide it provides a wonderful mental pause to the pandemic and allows fans to stay in their homes to enjoy the sport on TV or laptops. The absence of racing not only creates a hardship for the owners and trainers but also for the staff that live check to check.
