Enhanced Enforcement Against Water Theft and Illegal Cannabis Grows in the Antelope Valley and Illegal Cannabis Dispensaries in Unincorporated Areas

Residents in the unincorporated rural areas in the Antelope Valley continue to be negatively impacted by illegal large-scale commercial cannabis cultivation. Reports of the number of illegal large-scale grows and associated problems including water theft, trespass, use of dangerous pesticides and fertilizers and trash and debris has greatly increased. Due to the enormity of the problem, there are concerns that growers of illegal commercial cannabis may exploit the physical similarities between young cannabis and industrial hemp crops which, if registered, are allowed. Both plants are identical during their early growth stages. Notwithstanding a lack of registration, illegal cannabis growers may claim their illegal cannabis operation is hemp to avoid or delay any enforcement. Residents, and businesses, in the County's unincorporated areas also continue to be negatively impacted by the crime and nuisances that illegal cannabis dispensaries cause and attract.

Since 2016, the County's Cannabis Team (Team), comprised primarily of County Counsel, the District Attorney, Sheriff, the Department of Regional Planning, and the

Department of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management, has monitored all reports of illegal commercial cannabis activity and has conducted enforcement actions against them for operating in the unincorporated areas in violation of State law and the County's ban on commercial cannabis activity. Enforcement against illegal cannabis cultivation in the Antelope Valley has become a significant challenge, especially the difficulty in detecting perpetrators of associated water theft.

Despite efforts by the Department of Public Works ("Public Works") to harden the Waterworks Districts' infrastructure against theft and illegal tapping, the threats to the water system remain significant. These efforts have included: removal of unnecessary fire hydrants; working with customers to restrict operating hours for remote fill stations; re-keying existing key stations; and continually inspecting for illicit connections. In addition, Public Works has increased water delivery capacity to the Hi-Vista area, where the water theft has had the greatest impact to the water system.

Though significant structure hardening efforts have been made, fire hydrants remain the target of water theft. These hydrants must remain in place for fire suppression activities and public safety. While improvements to Waterworks Districts' operations have mitigated the risk of a complete system failure, tapping of the system still persists and may lead to continued low water pressure incidents and sever water shortages.

Currently, the Waterworks Districts have been providing funding to Sheriff's Department for enhanced patrols in the Hi-Vista area. Funding for additional enforcement from the Waterworks Districts has run out; however, \$100,000 of discretionary funds has been allocated by the Fifth Supervisorial District to continue the protection of the County's infrastructure through the end of the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

WE, THEREFORE, MOVE that the Board of Supervisors direct the Chief Executive Office Legislative Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations Branch, in coordination with the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management and County Counsel to support or pursue legislation to seek the following amendments to State law:

- 1. Provide standing to County Counsel to civilly prosecute and enjoin water theft;
- Provide additional enforcement authority for water theft and/or misuse in declared drought emergencies;
- 3. Authorize County Counsel to civilly prosecute and enjoin water pollution from cannabis cultivation;
- Address potential loopholes or exploitation by illegal cannabis growers, pursue increasing local government controls over illegal cannabis and unregistered hemp crops; and,
- 5. Authorize an alternative means of service of process for commercial cannabis businesses when their business entity status is form unknown.

WE, FURTHER, MOVE that the Board of Supervisors:

- 1. Instruct County Counsel, in consultation with the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management, Sheriff's Department, and the Los Angeles County Departments of Regional Planning, and Agricultural Commissioner/Weights and Measures to report back to this board in 90 days with a proposed administrative nuisance abatement ordinance for unpermitted cannabis activity including illegal cannabis cultivation and dispensaries; and,
- Direct Regional Planning to conduct a study on a future ordinance to regulate hemp and report back to the board in 180 days with recommendations.

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WE, FURTHER, MOVE that the Board of Supervisors request the Department of

Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Cannabis Management:

1. In collaboration with the Sheriff's Department and the Chief Executive Officer to

determine the type and cost of equipment that can test quantity levels of THC in

cannabis, and identify any other resources needed for enhanced enforcement

efforts, and report back to this Board in 30 days as to recommended next steps;

and,

2. Collaborate with all local, state and federal authorities who can assist in the

eradication of this environmental and quality of life nuisance including the office

of the District Attorney, the US Attorney, the Drug Enforcement Administration

and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

WE, FURTHER, MOVE that the Board of Supervisors instruct the Chief Executive

Officer to:

1. Approve the attached appropriation adjustment shifting \$250,000 from the Fifth

District's one-time Consumer Protection Settlement fund allocation to finance the

Sheriff's Department's continued targeted enforcement and patrols of the areas

impacted by the massive illegal grows and water theft in the Antelope Valley;

and,

2. Report back during the FY 2021-22 Supplemental Budget on potential funding

sources for the County to sustain eradication of this serious environmental and

quality of life nuisance.
