To the Esteemed Board of Supervisors,
Thank you for your continued service in these challenging times.
The Los Angeles Regional Reentry Partnership is the largest county-wide network of nonprofit organizations, public agencies, and advocates that works to ensure that our justice-involved reentry system meets the needs of those we serve, both in terms of capacity and public policy. We represent stakeholders across the whole of Los Angeles County. We join with dozens of organizations serving and advocating for formerly and currently incarcerated people to voice our support for increasing civilian oversight of the LA County Sheriff and their staff.
Alongside more than 100 community and labor organizations, LARRP is urging you to pass Item 12 on Tuesday, July 12 and propose to the voters an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability of the sheriff.
No matter what office, function or role, our public officials take an oath to support and respect our rights, not inflict harm, and represent the public and the common good. But in Los Angeles County, when a sheriff breaches this oath and abuses their power, our tools for real and meaningful accountability are tragically far and few. ?
For decades, Angelenos have witnessed a culture of corruption and impunity in the sheriff's department, leaving people who are stopped or incarcerated at risk of abuse or worse. For more than 50 years, deputy gangs among the ranks and management of the sheriff's department have terrorized community members, especially in Black and brown communities.
Deputy gangs and other forms of deputy violence have persisted because one sheriff's administration after the next has failed to enact and enforce policies that provide meaningful and consistent discipline when deputies harass, abuse, and kill. This culture of violence has come from the very top and is left unchecked by our dated charter.?
We need a charter that works for the people of Los Angeles County today and tomorrow, and that gives us the tools necessary for when a sheriff violates the law and the public trust.? We need checks and balances, which are pillars of a functioning democracy, aimed at not allowing one person or agency to become too powerful. Creating checks and balances on the sheriff has been long overdue, and changes to our county charter can ensure essential oversight of the sheriff.
Besides good governance, this is a matter of racial justice, and the county can no longer tinker around the edges of significant structural reform of the sheriff's department.
Therefore, LARRP urges the Board of Supervisors (Board) to pass Item 12. The Board should refer to the voters for the November 8, 2022 election a charter amendment that will allow removal of the sheriff by a four-fifths vote of the Board for serious violations of the public trust, reinforce the Board's policy-making authority over the sheriff's department, and ensure permanent and independent civilian oversight.

Deborah G Aschheim	<p>I am pleased that a majority of the supervisors are supporting placing a measure on the November ballot to change the LA County charter to create a process for addressing Sheriff misconduct, which has been a problem with many previous LASD culminating in the disdain Sheriff Villanueva exhibits. I completely support this measure being placed on the ballot, but I feel strongly that it does not go far enough to address longstanding problems in the LASD including well documented deputy gangs, corruption within the department and excessive use of force. An earlier draft I read calling for this amendment provided for increased civilian oversight, which I do not see included in the current version.</p> <p>I work closely with families impacted by law enforcement violence. I have friends whose family members were killed when they called 911 for mental health crisis support, and instead of help were met with LASD violence. I have friends whose unarmed, nonthreatening relatives were shot in the back in what appear to be gang initiation homicides. These shooting were ruled "within policy," which is obscene to me—we need to have more input into the policy, if LASD considers shooting unarmed 19 year olds and people in crisis valid use of force. I was pleased when County created the Citizen Oversight Commission, but even with subpoena power, LASD ignores subpoenas.</p> <p>Please strengthen this measure to give us a real tool for reforming the out of control Sheriff's department beyond punishing what this measure offers. The corruption in LASD has been the subject of massive national attention including FBI. The culture of LASD is completely incompatible with who we are as a County, and frankly they are terrorizing our communities in East LA, and the unincorporated areas where they are law enforcement like Antelope Valley. 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	<p>Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff.</p> <p>The Los Angeles County Sheriff's actions bear on people with disabilities in multiple contexts: from deputy encounters in the field to the treatment of individuals held in custody. Given the potential for violence and excessive use of force perpetrated by deputies, a Sheriff who exercises effective leadership and submits to transparent review of their department is essential to prevent abuse. Unfortunately, this type of leadership has been lacking in LA County, as demonstrated by countless substantiated incidents of violence perpetrated against civilians-many of them disabled- in the jails and in the community. These incidents prompted the Board to form the Citizens' Commission on Jail Violence, the Office of the Inspector General, and the Sheriff Civilian Oversight Commission. Despite these measures, the current Sheriff has chosen to flout and ignore these oversight mechanisms, with no available recourse by the Board.</p> <p>Disability Rights California joins multiple community and labor organizations in urging you to pass Supervisors Mitchell and Solis's motion directing the Board to refer to the voters a charter amendment allowing removal of the sheriff if certain stringent conditions are met. The Sheriff's office has sidestepped most attempts at oversight or accountability.</p> <p>The community has been asking for these checks and balances which are long overdue, and constitutional. The Board's legal authority to remove the sheriff is clear and in line with the California Constitution, state statutes and case law. The CA court of appeals affirmed this power in the Penrod v. County of San Bernardino case, where it ruled that a county charter could permit the board of supervisors to remove a sheriff for cause by a four-fifths vote.</p> <p>Changing our county charter can ensure essential oversight of the sheriff. I am pleased that a majority of the supervisors are supporting placing a measure on the November ballot to change the LA County charter to create a process for addressing Sheriff misconduct, which has been a problem with many previous LASD culminating in the disdain Sheriff Villanueva exhibits. I completely support this measure being placed on the ballot, but I feel strongly that it does not go far enough to address longstanding problems in the LASD including well documented deputy gangs, corruption within the department and excessive use of force. An earlier draft I read calling for this amendment provided for increased civilian oversight, which I do not see included in the current version.

I work closely with families impacted by law enforcement violence. I have friends whose family members were killed when they called 911 for mental health crisis support, and instead of help were met with LASD violence. I have friends whose unarmed, nonthreatening relatives were shot in the back in what appear to be gang initiation homicides. These shootings were ruled “within policy,” which is obscene to me—we need to have more input into the policy, if LASD considers shooting unarmed 19 year olds and people in crisis valid use of force. I was pleased when County created the Citizen Oversight Commission, but even with subpoena power, LASD ignores subpoenas.

Please strengthen this measure to give us a real tool for reforming the out of control Sheriff’s department beyond punishing what this measure offers. The corruption in LASD has been the subject of massive national attention including FBI. The culture of LASD is completely incompatible with who we are as a County, and frankly they are terrorizing our communities in East LA, and the unincorporated areas where they are law enforcement like Antelope Valley. This measure is a good start but it does not go far enough. Please give us real tools for reform.

Disability Rights California (DRC) is the state's protection and advocacy system, charged under state and federal law with advancing the rights of people with disabilities. **DRC strongly supports Supervisors Mitchell and Solis's Motion to Promote Accountability and Community Safety through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff.**

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's actions bear on people with disabilities in multiple contexts: from deputy encounters in the field to the treatment of individuals held in custody. Given the potential for violence and excessive use of force perpetrated by deputies, a Sheriff who exercises effective leadership and submits to transparent review of their department is essential to prevent abuse. Unfortunately, this type of leadership has been lacking in LA County, as demonstrated by countless substantiated incidents of violence perpetrated against civilians-many of them disabled- in the jails and in the community. These incidents prompted the Board to form the Citizens' Commission on Jail Violence, the Office of the Inspector General, and the Sheriff Civilian Oversight Commission. Despite these measures, the current Sheriff has chosen to flout and ignore these oversight mechanisms, with no available recourse by the Board.

Thank you for your continued service in these challenging times.

The Los Angeles Regional Reentry Partnership is the largest county-wide network of nonprofit organizations, public agencies, and advocates that works to ensure that our justice-involved reentry system meets the needs of those we serve, both in terms of capacity and public policy. We represent stakeholders across the whole of Los Angeles County. We join with dozens of organizations serving and advocating for formerly and currently incarcerated people to voice our support for increasing civilian oversight of the LA County Sheriff and their staff.

Alongside more than 100 community and labor organizations, LARRP is urging you to pass Item 12 on Tuesday, July 12 and propose to the voters an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability of the sheriff.

No matter what office, function or role, our public officials take an oath to support and respect our rights, not inflict harm, and represent the public and the common good. But in Los Angeles County, when a sheriff breaches this oath and abuses their power, our tools for real and meaningful accountability are tragically far and few.

For decades, Angelenos have witnessed a culture of corruption and impunity in the sheriff's department, leaving people who are stopped or incarcerated at risk of abuse or worse. For more than 50 years, deputy gangs among the ranks and management of the sheriff's department have terrorized community members, especially in Black and brown communities.

Deputy gangs and other forms of deputy violence have persisted because one sheriff's administration after the next has failed to enact and enforce policies that provide meaningful and consistent discipline when deputies harass, abuse, and kill. This culture of violence has come from the very top and is left unchecked by our dated charter.

We need a charter that works for the people of Los Angeles County today and tomorrow, and that gives us the tools necessary for when a sheriff violates the law and the public trust. We need checks and balances, which are pillars of a functioning democracy, aimed at not allowing one person or agency to become too powerful. Creating checks and balances on the sheriff has been long overdue, and changes to our county charter can ensure essential oversight of the sheriff.

Besides good governance, this is a matter of racial justice, and the county can no longer tinker around the edges of significant structural reform of the sheriff's department.

Therefore, LARRP urges the Board of Supervisors (Board) to pass Item 12. The Board should refer to the voters for the November 8, 2022 election a charter amendment that will allow removal of the sheriff by a four-fifths vote of the Board for serious violations of the public trust, reinforce the Board's policy-making authority over the sheriff's department, and ensure permanent and independent civilian oversight.

Request Council Review of Incident, Extended Stay America, Lake Forest CA

Hello Lisa,

There is an additional incident that the Lake Forest Mayor and City Council need to be aware of.

I am uncertain of the "date" of the incident, but I believe it was approximately 3 pm Friday, June 3rd 2022. It occurred in the lobby of the Extended Stay America property, 20251 Lake Forest Drive, Lake Forest Ca.

Here is my statement of what occurred:

I was in the hotel elevator. As the doors opened on the lobby floor, a uniformed OC Sheriff sauntered through the glass lobby doors, and directly in front of me, calling out, "Is Karma here?" I recall a lilt in his voice as he emphasized the word, "Karma".

Carla, who is the Extended Stay America Lake Forest property manager, arrived closely behind. Seemingly "on his heels". She arrived through the same glass lobby doorway, and the same direction in the parking lot (left side of parking lot). Carla cheerfully greeted the Sheriff remarking, "This is what, the second or third time you've been here today?"

As I exited the lobby elevator, I remarked to the Sheriff that my name is Heather, and I am the woman who is being harassed by Brett. (Staff had told me the Sheriff had been making repeat visits to the property that day regarding Brett). The Sheriff was facing me, looked at me, but did not reply.

"End" of my statement.

I contacted the OC Sheriff Records, and was provided with the following incident numbers for Friday, June 3rd 2020:

22-0603-0040 (Incident occurred approximately midnight)
22-0603- 0226 (Incident occurred approximately 7 am)
22-0603-0307 (Incident occurred approximately 9 am)

OC Sheriff Records told me that these incidents did involve Brett. However, OC Sheriff Records Specialist saw no incident number for the afternoon of June 3rd, 2022 (which is the time, I believe, when i exited the elevator).

Brett, who is a hotel guest, and is not a friend. He is a predator, and has been threatening me for some time. He stalks me, has threatened to kill me, threatened to kill my dog, and stole my backpack on Saturday May 28th. The Sheriff's found my backpack on May 29th, 2022. He is not a guest here, but has loitered in the third floor hallway, as though waiting outside the door of a friend. On the night of May 28th, 2022 two lady OC Sheriff's responded to my call for assistance. On that night, I reported to the responding Sheriffs that Brett stalks me, has threatened me numerous times, including threatened to kill me. I said he needs to be criminally charged. One of the female Sheriffs replied, "Well, you had an argument". I replied, "That's not what I said." And, in response to my reporting that he has repeatedly threatened to kill me, and to assault me, the same Sheriff said, "Yeah, but were you scared?"

Several days prior to my backpack being stolen a male motorcyclist, engine running, sat on his bike in the center of the parking lot. He appeared to be observing me. I was in the green park area with my dog. This went on for some time. He ultimately parked his bike in a space. I left my dog, walked up to glance at his license plate. As I walked away, the male exploded into a tirade of threats to harm me, kidnap me, and to assault me including sexually. I could not return to where I left my dog, and instead stood with the ESA Lake Forest building side door open, screaming into the stairwell and at the AI camera to call the police. The AI camera recorded it all and also should have caught the man behind me on his bike. I later learned that no one at the hotel front desk heard me, or noticed what happened on the security camera. This went on for several minutes. I reported this incident to the FBI, as domestic terrorism. I also reported this to Sheriff Moondy when he responded to the May 31, 2022 incident.

So having submitting a summary of some of the terror. the Mayor and Council may better grasp how depraved the badged Orange County Sheriff was to make walk in front of me, calling out "Is Karma here?"

Furthermore, it appears the Sheriff conspired with the Hotel Manager to stalk and taunt me regarding the crimes I am being subjected to.

I am asking you to investigate this incident which I believe occurred on Friday, June 3rd, 2022.

Alongside more than 100 community and labor organizations, Reform L.A. Jails urges you to pass the Mitchell/Solis motion, **Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff**, Item 12 on Tuesday, July 12th to propose to the voters an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability of the LA Sheriff.

Reform L.A. Jails (RLJ) represents a coalition of Los Angeles residents, community leaders, businesses, and organizations fighting to permanently reduce the population of people cycling in and out of jail. RLJ envisions a future where LA has divested from incarceration and invested in community-based services. A future that doesn't criminalize Black, Brown, Indigenous, or poor people, and where communities have the power and resources they need to keep themselves safe, heal, and thrive for generations to come.

RLJ's founding by Black Lives Matter co-founder Patrisse Cullors in 2018 grew out of the years of violence, torture and abuse that her brother received at the hands of LA County sheriff deputies, while he suffered ongoing severe mental health crises. In March 2020 when 73% of the voters passed RLJ's Measure R (*the LA Sheriff Oversight and Accountability Ballot Measure*), which gave the Sheriff Civilian Oversight Commission subpoena power and other accountability tools, we thought Sheriff oversight finally had the teeth it needed to bring about the reforms Angelenos have been calling for for decades. But instead Sheriff Villanueva has fought every subpoena order, refused to attend Oversight Meetings, harassed family members of murder victims, launched counter-investigations into those charged with overseeing him, and let the deputy gangs run rampant.

In 2021, in response to Sheriff Alex Villanueva's continuous misconduct, Reform L.A. Jails submitted a complaint with the Los Angeles Civil Grand Jury, calling for the Sheriff's removal under CA Government Code Section 3060, for willful and corrupt misconduct in office. Under the Complaint Sheriff Villanueva is accused of repeatedly breaking federal, state and municipal law, violating over a dozen state penal and civil codes, along with both U.S. and CA constitutional amendments. RLJ's Civil Grand Jury Complaint built on the



collective work of the movement and the many other legal actions that have been filed to stop this dangerous Sheriff, but unfortunately the Civil Grand Jury declined to advance the case to the District Attorney for prosecution.

Despite the significant steps the Board has taken to create a system of accountability and transparency for the Sheriff's Department, and despite the many legal actions families and community groups have initiated, the behavior and actions of the LA Sheriff and the entire Department have only gotten worse over time. The time for the Board to act is now. My name is Cynthia Anderson-Barker. I am a civil rights lawyer on the Board of the National Lawyers Guild. The National Lawyers Guild is supporting agenda item 12. Thank you, Supervisors Mitchell and Solis for your courageous leadership and initiative in addressing the structural issues required to end impunity in the Sheriff's Department. With this motion the Board is exercising its duty under state law to supervise its sheriffs "in order to ensure that they faithfully perform their duties." Local law recognizes that this responsibility includes the authority to direct and approve the development of policy for LASD. The proposed L.A. County Charter amendment should further codify the authority of the Board to oversee and set policies for LASD that do not interfere with the statutory authority of the Sheriff or otherwise conflict with state law. Ideally, the final proposal should include a process for the Civilian Oversight Commission (COC) to improve transparency and accountability in the LASD through civilian oversight. Currently, the COC is conducting hearings into the deputy gangs that exist within the Sheriffs Department. However, the COC can not get the Board to approve a budget for a court reporting service to transcribe these hearings—further impeding the swift progress of the investigation. Loyola Law School has given the COC space in the lecture halls to hold the hearings but when the semester starts the COC needs a new location. The COC also needs its own independent counsel. The Board should appoint such counsel because the Board's lawyers, County Counsel, have a clear conflict of interest. County Counsel defends the Sheriffs Department in pending litigation. The appointment of independent council for the COC will help ensure that civilian oversight is effective and actually works.

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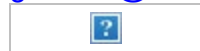

La Defensa writes in strong support of **SB 2 (Bradford & Atkins) - The Kenneth Ross Jr. Police Decertification Act of 2021**, which would increase accountability for law enforcement officers that commit serious misconduct and violate a person's civil rights.

La Defensa, an advocacy organization, is deeply committed to decarcerating the largest jail population in the world—the L.A. County jail system—by reducing the size and scope of law enforcement. SB 2 is a step in the right direction to ensuring that officers who harm our communities will not be able to apply elsewhere and continue to wear a badge.

California leads the nation in police killings. Over the last decade over 1,100 Californians were killed by police officers, according to California Department of Justice data. In 2020 alone, 172 Californians died as a result of police use of force.¹ Yet we are only 1 of 4 states that does not have a process to remove police from our streets who engage in serious misconduct. Police officers who engage in anti-Black racism and abuse their power create unsafe communities for everyone. We all deserve to live in communities where we feel safe and protected. California has an obligation to permanently remove their badges to ensure they can do no more harm.

The California Legislature must do more to protect Black people and other vulnerable populations from police officers who use their power to commit racist, abusive, and often deadly acts. When these officers are not held accountable, it erodes community trust and public safety.

Many of you demonstrated your support of police accountability during last year's uprisings following the brutal murder of George Floyd. We are strongly urging Latino Caucus members to stand in solidarity with the movement for Black lives by voting yes on SB 2, which will also protect Latinx people from police violence. Your constituents and communities are counting on you to help keep them safe by supporting SB 2 and decertifying police officers who commit serious misconduct in their communities.

Kenneth Ross, Jr. was murdered on April 11, 2018 by officer Michael Robbins of the Gardena Police Department, who was previously involved in three other officer-involved shootings. In Los Angeles County, Black people made up about 8.5% of the population between 2000-2020, but 25% of people killed by law enforcement.

Police misconduct also has devastating effects on the Latinx community. Nationally, Latinos are killed by police at [nearly double the rate](#) of White Americans.² A Washington Post investigation found that between 2015 and 2020, Latinos died at a rate of 23 per million residents after encounters with police, second only to Black people, at 31 per million residents.³


The Legislative Black Caucus has made SB 2 a priority and we are urging Latino Caucus members to do the same. Undocumented folks are being killed by police all throughout CA. As was the case with 19-year-old DACA recipient Jesus Adolfo Delgado, who was shot over 99 times and killed by the San Francisco Police Department in 2018. Antonio Guzman Lopez also had no legal status when he was shot and killed by San Jose Campus Police in February 2015. Families whose loved ones were killed face scrutiny and an added barrier if they don't have legal status.

The Kenneth Ross Jr. Police Decertification Act (SB 2) will:

- Establish a statewide process to decertify officers who are fired for specified misconduct such as excessive force, sexual assault, and dishonesty.
- Give the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) the power to independently investigate allegations of misconduct and decertify officers who resign before they are fired.
- Increase accountability by:
 - Requiring that local law enforcement report officers who are fired to the state.
 - Ensuring that during the hiring process law enforcement agencies contact the POST commission to gain information on reasons for separation from previous law enforcement agencies.
 - Adding any officers who are decertified to the National Decertification Index (NDI).
 - Requiring annual reporting on the number of investigations conducted by POST and the total number of certificates revoked.

Supervisor Barger's staff has responded to my email about amending the county charter to impeach Sheriff Villanueva. Thank you for responding to my email. I appreciate you taking the time to do so. I understand the hesitation about amending the charter. I want to write my response to all of you so that you understand how I as a citizen, and how many of my peers and friends who are also LA County residents, feel about Supervisor Barger's response.

My response is this.

- LASD has a rampant history of abuse and corruption, not just under Sheriff Villanueva. Amending the charter wouldn't just allow Sheriff Villanueva to be impeached, but would create an actionable accountability check for future sheriffs. The timing of the November election thus has little to do with the request to amend the county charter.
- The "power of the people" Supervisor Barger refers to only allows the people to elect a sheriff and do something about their discontent once every four years. Each time a sheriff is elected and perpetuates a rampage of brutality, racism, and complete disrespect for accountability, we the people have to wait the rest of the sheriff's term to stop them. To me that doesn't seem like very much power. For me, greater power would allow me to advocate for my county representatives (you all) to impeach the sheriff. The power of the people is now asking you to create a way to impeach the sheriff.
- No offense, but the public and I feel Supervisor Barger, the other Supervisors, and the Civilian Oversight Committee have done nothing to hold Sheriff accountable. When Supervisor Barger says she'll continue to work with COC to hold LASD accountable, that just tells me nothing will continue to be done. By all means, I know they've tried. But according to my understanding, their current powers do not have any teeth to do anything. If they have done something besides voice opposition, something that has actually resulted in an action, could you please tell me for my own education? From my and my peers' analysis (which you gotta admit is pretty high compared to most citizens), the Supervisors and COC have done zero things that have actually kept LASD in check and have resulted in negative consequences for them. Yes, the County and COC have published their opposition and listed LASD's abuses, and yes that is extremely helpful in letting the public know about the sheriff, but has that stopped LASD's abuses in any way in the meantime?
- If you really want to respect the "power of the people," then you would implement Measure J according to its full capacity and give it full funding. After all, that is what we and "the power of the people" voted for and continue to advocate for.

Creating checks and balances on the sheriff has been long overdue, and changes to our county charter can ensure essential oversight of the sheriff.

At its heart, this is a matter of racial justice, and the county can no longer tinker around the edges of significant structural reform of the sheriff's department.

Therefore, I urge the supervisors to pass Item 12 at the Board's meeting on Tuesday, July 12. I urge you to refer to the voters for the November 8, 2022 Election a charter amendment that will allow removal of the sheriff by a four-fifths vote of the Board for serious violations of the public trust, reinforce the Board's policy-making authority over the sheriff's department, and ensure permanent and independent civilian oversight.

Joining over 100 community and labor organizations, La Defensa, a Los Angeles County based advocacy organization, urges the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to propose an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability measures of the sheriff and most importantly, give voters the opportunity to support said amendment at the polls.

No matter the office, function or role, our public officials all take an oath to support and respect our rights, not inflict harm, and represent the public and the common good. But in Los Angeles County, when a sheriff breaches this oath and abuses their power, our tools for real and meaningful accountability are tragically far and few. This lack of oversight and accountability has cost Los Angeles County over \$100 million over the past 30 years in lawsuits and settlements.

For decades, Angelenos have witnessed a culture of corruption and impunity in the sheriff's department, leaving people who are stopped or incarcerated at risk of abuse or worse. For more than 50 years, deputy gangs among the ranks and management of the sheriff's department have emerged in Black and brown communities and terrorized community members.

Reports have discovered at least 18 deputy gangs that plague the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department. Deputy gangs and other forms of deputy violence have persisted because one sheriff's administration after the next has failed to enact and enforce policies that provide meaningful and consistent discipline when deputies harass, abuse, and kill. Sheriff gangs have

been responsible for the death of our community members such as 18 year old Andrés Guardado. This culture of violence has come from the very top and is left unchecked by our dated charter.

We need a charter that works for the people of Los Angeles County that gives us the tools necessary for when a sheriff violates the law and public trust. We need checks and balances, which are pillars of a functioning democracy, aimed at not allowing one person or agency to become too powerful. Checks and balances on the sheriff's department are long overdue and changes to our county charter can ensure essential oversight of the sheriff.

Besides good governance, this is a matter of racial justice, and the county can no longer tinker around the edges of significant structural reform of the sheriff's department.

Therefore, La Defensa urges the Board of Supervisors to refer to the voters for the November 8, 2022 election a charter amendment that will allow the Board to remove the sheriff for serious violations of the public trust, reinforce the Board's policy-making authority over the sheriff's department, and ensure permanent and independent civilian oversight.

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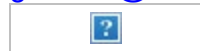

La Defensa writes in strong support of **SB 2 (Bradford & Atkins) - The Kenneth Ross Jr. Police Decertification Act of 2021**, which would increase accountability for law enforcement officers that commit serious misconduct and violate a person's civil rights.

La Defensa, an advocacy organization, is deeply committed to decarcerating the largest jail population in the world—the L.A. County jail system—by reducing the size and scope of law enforcement. SB 2 is a step in the right direction to ensuring that officers who harm our communities will not be able to apply elsewhere and continue to wear a badge.

California leads the nation in police killings. Over the last decade over 1,100 Californians were killed by police officers, according to California Department of Justice data. In 2020 alone, 172 Californians died as a result of police use of force.¹ Yet we are only 1 of 4 states that does not have a process to remove police from our streets who engage in serious misconduct. Police officers who engage in anti-Black racism and abuse their power create unsafe communities for everyone. We all deserve to live in communities where we feel safe and protected. California has an obligation to permanently remove their badges to ensure they can do no more harm.

The California Legislature must do more to protect Black people and other vulnerable populations from police officers who use their power to commit racist, abusive, and often deadly acts. When these officers are not held accountable, it erodes community trust and public safety.

Many of you demonstrated your support of police accountability during last year's uprisings following the brutal murder of George Floyd. We are strongly urging Latino Caucus members to stand in solidarity with the movement for Black lives by voting yes on SB 2, which will also protect Latinx people from police violence. Your constituents and communities are counting on you to help keep them safe by supporting SB 2 and decertifying police officers who commit serious misconduct in their communities.

Kenneth Ross, Jr. was murdered on April 11, 2018 by officer Michael Robbins of the Gardena Police Department, who was previously involved in three other officer-involved shootings. In Los Angeles County, Black people made up about 8.5% of the population between 2000-2020, but 25% of people killed by law enforcement.

Police misconduct also has devastating effects on the Latinx community. Nationally, Latinos are killed by police at [nearly double the rate](#) of White Americans.² A Washington Post investigation found that between 2015 and 2020, Latinos died at a rate of 23 per million residents after encounters with police, second only to Black people, at 31 per million residents.³


The Legislative Black Caucus has made SB 2 a priority and we are urging Latino Caucus members to do the same. Undocumented folks are being killed by police all throughout CA. As was the case with 19-year-old DACA recipient Jesus Adolfo Delgado, who was shot over 99 times and killed by the San Francisco Police Department in 2018. Antonio Guzman Lopez also had no legal status when he was shot and killed by San Jose Campus Police in February 2015. Families whose loved ones were killed face scrutiny and an added barrier if they don't have legal status.

The Kenneth Ross Jr. Police Decertification Act (SB 2) will:

- Establish a statewide process to decertify officers who are fired for specified misconduct such as excessive force, sexual assault, and dishonesty.
- Give the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) the power to independently investigate allegations of misconduct and decertify officers who resign before they are fired.
- Increase accountability by:
 - Requiring that local law enforcement report officers who are fired to the state.
 - Ensuring that during the hiring process law enforcement agencies contact the POST commission to gain information on reasons for separation from previous law enforcement agencies.
 - Adding any officers who are decertified to the National Decertification Index (NDI).
 - Requiring annual reporting on the number of investigations conducted by POST and the total number of certificates revoked.

Supervisor Barger's staff has responded to my email about amending the county charter to impeach Sheriff Villanueva. Thank you for responding to my email. I appreciate you taking the time to do so. I understand the hesitation about amending the charter. I want to write my response to all of you so that you understand how I as a citizen, and how many of my peers and friends who are also LA County residents, feel about Supervisor Barger's response.

My response is this.

- LASD has a rampant history of abuse and corruption, not just under Sheriff Villanueva. Amending the charter wouldn't just allow Sheriff Villanueva to be impeached, but would create an actionable accountability check for future sheriffs. The timing of the November election thus has little to do with the request to amend the county charter.
- The "power of the people" Supervisor Barger refers to only allows the people to elect a sheriff and do something about their discontent once every four years. Each time a sheriff is elected and perpetuates a rampage of brutality, racism, and complete disrespect for accountability, we the people have to wait the rest of the sheriff's term to stop them. To me that doesn't seem like very much power. For me, greater power would allow me to advocate for my county representatives (you all) to impeach the sheriff. The power of the people is now asking you to create a way to impeach the sheriff.
- No offense, but the public and I feel Supervisor Barger, the other Supervisors, and the Civilian Oversight Committee have done nothing to hold Sheriff accountable. When Supervisor Barger says she'll continue to work with COC to hold LASD accountable, that just tells me nothing will continue to be done. By all means, I know they've tried. But according to my understanding, their current powers do not have any teeth to do anything. If they have done something besides voice opposition, something that has actually resulted in an action, could you please tell me for my own education? From my and my peers' analysis (which you gotta admit is pretty high compared to most citizens), the Supervisors and COC have done zero things that have actually kept LASD in check and have resulted in negative consequences for them. Yes, the County and COC have published their opposition and listed LASD's abuses, and yes that is extremely helpful in letting the public know about the sheriff, but has that stopped LASD's abuses in any way in the meantime?
- If you really want to respect the "power of the people," then you would implement Measure J according to its full capacity and give it full funding. After all, that is what we and "the power of the people" voted for and continue to advocate for.

Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors:

Disability Rights California (DRC) is the state's protection and advocacy system, charged under state and federal law with advancing the rights of people with disabilities. **DRC strongly supports Supervisors Mitchell and Solis's Motion to Promote Accountability and Community Safety through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff.**

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's actions bear on people with disabilities in multiple contexts: from deputy encounters in the field to the treatment of individuals held in custody. Given the potential for violence and excessive use of force perpetrated by deputies, a Sheriff who exercises effective leadership and submits to transparent review of their department is essential to prevent abuse. Unfortunately, this type of leadership has been lacking in LA County, as demonstrated by countless substantiated incidents of violence perpetrated against civilians-many of them disabled- in the jails and in the community. These incidents prompted the Board to form the Citizens' Commission on Jail Violence, the Office of the Inspector General, and the Sheriff Civilian Oversight

Commission. Despite these measures, the current Sheriff has chosen to flout and ignore these oversight mechanisms, with no available recourse by the Board.

Alongside more than 100 community and labor organizations, UNITE HERE Local 11 urges you to propose to the voters an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability of the Sheriff.

On June 18, 2020, Sheriff's deputies shot Andres Guardado five times in the back, killing him, while he was working at his part time job as a security guard in Gardena. Andres had gotten the job to help provide for his family after his father, Cristobal, a UNITE HERE Local 11 member and cook at the LA Grand Downtown Hotel, was laid off due to COVID-19.

In our attempts to get justice for the Guardado family, we have subsequently seen LASD officials refuse to cooperate with an independent investigation, stonewalling the Inspector General. The deputy who shot Andres and two other LASD detectives involved refused to testify in the coroner's inquest into Andres' killing, the first of its kind in 30 years, stating they would invoke the Fifth Amendment. Sheriff Villanueva himself consistently refuses to appear at Civilian Oversight Commission meetings, even when lawfully subpoenaed to do so by the Commission.

We commend the Board for voting twice, in June and September of 2020, to call for an independent investigation into Andres' killing. However, in the two years since that tragic day, we have learned that the existing mechanisms to bring long overdue and urgently needed accountability to the Sheriff's Department are simply too weak. As leaders in the labor movement, we know that an injury to one is an injury to all. The Sheriff's Department has never demonstrated a commitment to this basic principle of justice.

This measure creates common sense checks and balances. The Board of Supervisors needs the ability to remove a Sheriff that endangers the lives of the voters they are elected to serve. Just like Congress can impeach a President, the Board of Supervisors should have the power to protect us by removing a Sheriff when necessary.

No Sheriff is above the law and we are committed to making this so in LA County, for all of our members and the Guardado family especially. Therefore, UNITE HERE Local 11 urges the Board of Supervisors (Board) to refer to the voters for the November 8, 2022 election a charter amendment that will allow the Board to remove the sheriff for serious violations of the public trust, reinforce the Board's policy-making authority over the sheriff's department, and ensure permanent and independent civilian oversight.

Dear L.A. County Supervisors,

From L.A. County Sheriff Alex Villanueva's repeated violations of the law and obstruction of oversight and his secret police unit's politically-motivated investigations intended to intimidate and harass oversight officials to the unchecked scourge of deputy gang violence that he has enabled and the dramatic increase in deputy shootings and record-level deaths in the jails under his watch, we have reached a crisis point yet again with the L.A. County Sheriff's Department (LASD).

Today, on behalf of families directly impacted by LASD violence and a growing coalition of more than 100 community and labor organizations, we submit the enclosed letter urging the L.A. County Board of Supervisors (Board) to propose to the voters for the November 2022 general election a common-sense amendment to the L.A. County Charter that will strengthen civilian oversight and create meaningful checks and balances of the sheriff's office and LASD.

As you know, on May 19, the Sheriff's Civilian Oversight Commission passed a resolution in support of our charter amendment proposal (please see attached and also linked [here](#)). In addition, on April 15, constitutional law expert and dean of U.C. Berkeley School of Law Erwin Chemerinsky and former federal prosecutor and executive director of the Citizens' Commission on Jail Violence Miriam Krinsky published an [op-ed in the L.A. Times elevating our coalition's charter amendment proposal](#). The op-ed followed a [scathing report](#) released more than two months ago by L.A. County Jails monitors that revealed ongoing abuse under Villanueva's watch; it also expanded on a [letter to the editor](#) in the L.A. Times by NAACP San Fernando Valley Chapter President Rev. James Thomas.

No matter who the sheriff is, whether Villanueva or any future sheriff, we must act now and create greater mechanisms to rein in any sheriff who abuses power.

Re: L.A. County Charter Amendment for Accountability, Oversight, and Checks and Balances of the Sheriff and the Sheriff’s Department

Yet again, Los Angeles County has reached a crisis point with its sheriff and Sheriff’s Department (LASD). The most recent spate of deputy gang violence has thrown a spotlight on this crisis that has gone unchecked for decades and demands an immediate and proportionate response by the Board of Supervisors (Board). Deputy gangs and other forms of deputy violence have persisted because one sheriff’s administration after the next has failed to enact and enforce policies that provide meaningful and consistent discipline when deputies harass, abuse, and kill. Among them, Sheriff Baca oversaw rampant and extreme violence in the jails—much of it perpetuated by deputy gangs—and now sits in federal prison for obstructing civil rights intervention; current Sheriff Villanueva has gone from denying the existence of deputy gangs to claiming that they are harmless fraternities, all the while defying subpoenas and violating laws on transparency and oversight. Villanueva’s disinterest in stemming deputy violence, including deputy gangs, is the most recent illustration of how existing County structures are insufficient to guard against sheriffs who are hostile to civilian oversight, transparency, and accountability.

The Board must seize this moment and take decisive actions to protect the public from the scourge of deputy gangs, sheriffs’ violations of the law and obstruction of oversight, and the underlying conditions leading to unchecked deputy misconduct and violence particularly towards Black and brown communities policed by LASD. The undersigned stakeholders urge the Board to propose to the voters an amendment to the L.A. County Charter that will create an impeachment and removal process to provide common sense checks and balances over the sheriff, reinforce its policy-making authority over LASD, and strengthen civilian oversight.

1. Create a procedure to allow impeachment and removal of the sheriff by a four-fifths vote of the Board for serious violations of the public trust, including serious crimes, unconstitutional conduct, and abuse of power.¹ While the Board has a duty to supervise the conduct of the sheriff under state and local laws, and it bears the ultimate responsibility for the safety of the public, the Board currently has no meaningful mechanism to enforce this

authority, or even to take action against a sheriff who directly violates the law.² A “don’t elect me” system of sheriff accountability every four years has proven wholly inadequate.³ The threat of removal would finally provide the Board with a more direct means to protect the public from serious sheriff misconduct. The U.S. Congress has the duty and authority to impeach and remove an elected president when necessary; even more so should the *civilian* Board have the power to impeach and remove an elected sheriff, a *paramilitary* official akin to an elected general.⁴ Besides the limited circumstances for removal grounds, to further guard against concerns that this removal authority places too much power in the Board, the procedure should direct the Civilian Oversight Commission (COC) to create a list from which the Board may select an interim replacement in the event of a sheriff’s removal.

2. ***Reinforce the Board’s authority to create policies for LASD and delegate initial policy development to the COC.*** The Board has the duty under state law to supervise its sheriffs “in order to ensure that they faithfully perform their duties,”⁵ and local law recognizes that this responsibility includes the authority to direct and approve the development of policy for LASD.⁶ Yet, the Board has rarely exercised this authority and, as a result, sheriffs have adopted and maintained policies that directly contravene the letter and spirit of various local, state, and federal laws.⁷ The proposed L.A. County Charter amendment should further codify the authority of the Board to oversee and set policies for LASD that do not interfere with the statutory authority of the sheriff or otherwise conflict with state law. Moreover, the proposal should include a process for the COC—the civilian body established to “improve transparency and accountability with respect to [LASD]”⁸—to develop and propose policies for the Board’s consideration and action.
3. ***Establish permanent, independent, and more robust civilian oversight of LASD.*** To make sure that future Boards less committed to civilian oversight cannot undermine the existing oversight bodies, the proposed measure should explicitly incorporate the COC and the Office of Inspector General into the L.A. County Charter, including their ability to subpoena records and testimony as needed to fulfill their functions.⁹ The proposal should provide the COC with independent counsel and funding commensurate with its duties, and ensure membership of community members directly impacted by LASD and the criminal legal system.

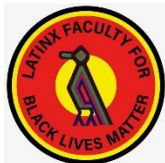

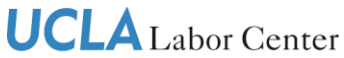
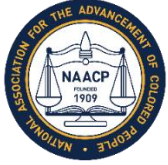

Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors,

Alongside more than 100 community and labor organizations, Reform L.A. Jails urges you to pass the Mitchell/Solis motion, **Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff**, Item 12 on Tuesday, July 12th to propose to the voters an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability of the LA Sheriff.

Reform L.A. Jails (RLJ) represents a coalition of Los Angeles residents, community leaders, businesses, and organizations fighting to permanently reduce the population of people cycling in and out of jail. RLJ envisions a future where LA has divested from incarceration and invested in community-based services. A future that doesn't criminalize Black, Brown, Indigenous, or poor people, and where communities have the power and resources they need to keep themselves safe, heal, and thrive for generations to come.

RLJ's founding by Black Lives Matter co-founder Patrisse Cullors in 2018 grew out of the years of violence, torture and abuse that her brother received at the hands of LA County sheriff deputies, while he suffered ongoing severe mental health crises. In March 2020 when 73% of the voters passed RLJ's Measure R (*the LA Sheriff Oversight and Accountability Ballot Measure*), which gave the Sheriff Civilian Oversight Commission subpoena power and other accountability tools, we thought Sheriff oversight finally had the teeth it needed to bring about the reforms Angelenos have been calling for for decades. But instead Sheriff Villanueva has fought every subpoena order, refused to attend Oversight Meetings, harassed family members of murder victims, launched counter-investigations into those charged with overseeing him, and let the deputy gangs run rampant.

In 2021, in response to Sheriff Alex Villanueva's continuous misconduct, Reform L.A. Jails submitted a complaint with the Los Angeles Civil Grand Jury, calling for the Sheriff's removal under CA Government Code Section 3060, for willful and corrupt misconduct in office. Under the Complaint Sheriff Villanueva is accused of repeatedly breaking federal, state and municipal law, violating over a dozen state penal and civil codes, along with both U.S. and CA constitutional amendments. RLJ's Civil Grand Jury Complaint built on the collective work of the movement and the many other legal actions that have been filed to



stop this dangerous Sheriff, but unfortunately the Civil Grand Jury declined to advance the case to the District Attorney for prosecution.

Despite the significant steps the Board has taken to create a system of accountability and transparency for the Sheriff's Department, and despite the many legal actions families and community groups have initiated, the behavior and actions of the LA Sheriff and the entire Department have only gotten worse over time. The time for the Board to act is now. An amendment to the LA County Charter allowing for the Sheriff's removal is desperately needed as the last resort to hold the Sheriff accountable where nothing else has worked. As is stated in the motion, "Lack of accountability has been an enduring feature of County sheriffs."

No matter what office, function or role, our public officials take an oath to support and respect our rights, not inflict harm, and represent the public and the common good. But in Los Angeles County, when a sheriff breaches this oath and abuses their power, our tools for real and meaningful accountability have been far, few, and ineffective.

We need a Charter that works for the people of Los Angeles County today and tomorrow, one that gives us the tools necessary for when a sheriff violates the law and the public trust. We need checks and balances, which are pillars of a functioning democracy, aimed at not allowing one person or agency to become too powerful. Creating impactful checks and balances on the Sheriff's Department has been long overdue, and changes to our County Charter can ensure essential oversight of the Sheriff. Dear L.A. County Supervisors,

From L.A. County Sheriff Alex Villanueva's repeated violations of the law and obstruction of oversight and his secret police unit's politically-motivated investigations intended to intimidate and harass oversight officials to the unchecked scourge of deputy gang violence that he has enabled and the dramatic increase in deputy shootings and record-level deaths in the jails under his watch, we have reached a crisis point yet again with the L.A. County Sheriff's Department (LASD).

Today, on behalf of families directly impacted by LASD violence and a growing coalition of more than 100 community and labor organizations, we submit the enclosed letter urging the L.A. County Board of Supervisors (Board) to propose to the voters for the November 2022 general election a common-sense amendment to the L.A. County Charter that will strengthen civilian oversight and create meaningful checks and balances of the sheriff's office and LASD.

As you know, on May 19, the Sheriff's Civilian Oversight Commission passed a resolution in support of our charter amendment proposal (please see attached and also linked [here](#)). In addition, on April 15, constitutional law expert and dean of U.C. Berkeley School of Law Erwin Chemerinsky and former federal prosecutor and executive director of the Citizens' Commission on Jail Violence Miriam Krinsky published an [op-ed in the L.A. Times elevating our coalition's charter amendment proposal](#). The op-ed followed a [scathing report](#) released more than two months ago by L.A. County Jails monitors that revealed ongoing abuse under Villanueva's watch; it also expanded on a [letter to the editor](#) in the L.A. Times by NAACP San Fernando Valley Chapter President Rev. James Thomas.

No matter who the sheriff is, whether Villanueva or any future sheriff, we must act now and create greater mechanisms to rein in any sheriff who abuses power.

Re: L.A. County Charter Amendment for Accountability, Oversight, and Checks and Balances of the Sheriff and the Sheriff’s Department

Yet again, Los Angeles County has reached a crisis point with its sheriff and Sheriff’s Department (LASD). The most recent spate of deputy gang violence has thrown a spotlight on this crisis that has gone unchecked for decades and demands an immediate and proportionate response by the Board of Supervisors (Board). Deputy gangs and other forms of deputy violence have persisted because one sheriff’s administration after the next has failed to enact and enforce policies that provide meaningful and consistent discipline when deputies harass, abuse, and kill. Among them, Sheriff Baca oversaw rampant and extreme violence in the jails—much of it perpetuated by deputy gangs—and now sits in federal prison for obstructing civil rights intervention; current Sheriff Villanueva has gone from denying the existence of deputy gangs to claiming that they are harmless fraternities, all the while defying subpoenas and violating laws on transparency and oversight. Villanueva’s disinterest in stemming deputy violence, including deputy gangs, is the most recent illustration of how existing County structures are insufficient to guard against sheriffs who are hostile to civilian oversight, transparency, and accountability.

The Board must seize this moment and take decisive actions to protect the public from the scourge of deputy gangs, sheriffs’ violations of the law and obstruction of oversight, and the underlying conditions leading to unchecked deputy misconduct and violence particularly towards Black and brown communities policed by LASD. The undersigned stakeholders urge the Board to propose to the voters an amendment to the L.A. County Charter that will create an impeachment and removal process to provide common sense checks and balances over the sheriff, reinforce its policy-making authority over LASD, and strengthen civilian oversight.

- 1. Create a procedure to allow impeachment and removal of the sheriff by a four-fifths vote of the Board for serious violations of the public trust, including serious crimes, unconstitutional conduct, and abuse of power.**¹ While the Board has a duty to supervise the conduct of the sheriff under state and local laws, and it bears the ultimate responsibility for the safety of the public, the Board currently has no meaningful mechanism to enforce this

authority, or even to take action against a sheriff who directly violates the law.² A “don’t elect me” system of sheriff accountability every four years has proven wholly inadequate.³ The threat of removal would finally provide the Board with a more direct means to protect the public from serious sheriff misconduct. The U.S. Congress has the duty and authority to impeach and remove an elected president when necessary; even more so should the *civilian* Board have the power to impeach and remove an elected sheriff, a *paramilitary* official akin to an elected general.⁴ Besides the limited circumstances for removal grounds, to further guard against concerns that this removal authority places too much power in the Board, the procedure should direct the Civilian Oversight Commission (COC) to create a list from which the Board may select an interim replacement in the event of a sheriff’s removal.

2. ***Reinforce the Board’s authority to create policies for LASD and delegate initial policy development to the COC.*** The Board has the duty under state law to supervise its sheriffs “in order to ensure that they faithfully perform their duties,”⁵ and local law recognizes that this responsibility includes the authority to direct and approve the development of policy for LASD.⁶ Yet, the Board has rarely exercised this authority and, as a result, sheriffs have adopted and maintained policies that directly contravene the letter and spirit of various local, state, and federal laws.⁷ The proposed L.A. County Charter amendment should further codify the authority of the Board to oversee and set policies for LASD that do not interfere with the statutory authority of the sheriff or otherwise conflict with state law. Moreover, the proposal should include a process for the COC—the civilian body established to “improve transparency and accountability with respect to [LASD]”⁸—to develop and propose policies for the Board’s consideration and action.
3. ***Establish permanent, independent, and more robust civilian oversight of LASD.*** To make sure that future Boards less committed to civilian oversight cannot undermine the existing oversight bodies, the proposed measure should explicitly incorporate the COC and the Office of Inspector General into the L.A. County Charter, including their ability to subpoena records and testimony as needed to fulfill their functions.⁹ The proposal should provide the COC with independent counsel and funding commensurate with its duties, and ensure membership of community members directly impacted by LASD and the criminal legal system.

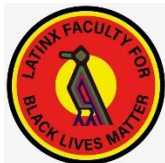

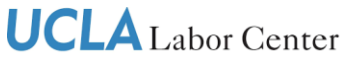
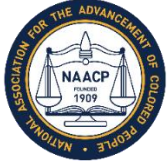

Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors,

Alongside more than 100 community and labor organizations, Reform L.A. Jails urges you to pass the Mitchell/Solis motion, **Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff**, Item 12 on Tuesday, July 12th to propose to the voters an amendment to the county charter that will create common sense checks and balances and accountability of the LA Sheriff.

Reform L.A. Jails (RLJ) represents a coalition of Los Angeles residents, community leaders, businesses, and organizations fighting to permanently reduce the population of people cycling in and out of jail. RLJ envisions a future where LA has divested from incarceration and invested in community-based services. A future that doesn't criminalize Black, Brown, Indigenous, or poor people, and where communities have the power and resources they need to keep themselves safe, heal, and thrive for generations to come.

RLJ's founding by Black Lives Matter co-founder Patrisse Cullors in 2018 grew out of the years of violence, torture and abuse that her brother received at the hands of LA County sheriff deputies, while he suffered ongoing severe mental health crises. In March 2020 when 73% of the voters passed RLJ's Measure R (*the LA Sheriff Oversight and Accountability Ballot Measure*), which gave the Sheriff Civilian Oversight Commission subpoena power and other accountability tools, we thought Sheriff oversight finally had the teeth it needed to bring about the reforms Angelenos have been calling for for decades. But instead Sheriff Villanueva has fought every subpoena order, refused to attend Oversight Meetings, harassed family members of murder victims, launched counter-investigations into those charged with overseeing him, and let the deputy gangs run rampant.

In 2021, in response to Sheriff Alex Villanueva's continuous misconduct, Reform L.A. Jails submitted a complaint with the Los Angeles Civil Grand Jury, calling for the Sheriff's removal under CA Government Code Section 3060, for willful and corrupt misconduct in office. Under the Complaint Sheriff Villanueva is accused of repeatedly breaking federal, state and municipal law, violating over a dozen state penal and civil codes, along with both U.S. and CA constitutional amendments. RLJ's Civil Grand Jury Complaint built on the collective work of the movement and the many other legal actions that have been filed to



stop this dangerous Sheriff, but unfortunately the Civil Grand Jury declined to advance the case to the District Attorney for prosecution.

Despite the significant steps the Board has taken to create a system of accountability and transparency for the Sheriff's Department, and despite the many legal actions families and community groups have initiated, the behavior and actions of the LA Sheriff and the entire Department have only gotten worse over time. The time for the Board to act is now. An amendment to the LA County Charter allowing for the Sheriff's removal is desperately needed as the last resort to hold the Sheriff accountable where nothing else has worked. As is stated in the motion, "Lack of accountability has been an enduring feature of County sheriffs."

No matter what office, function or role, our public officials take an oath to support and respect our rights, not inflict harm, and represent the public and the common good. But in Los Angeles County, when a sheriff breaches this oath and abuses their power, our tools for real and meaningful accountability have been far, few, and ineffective.

We need a Charter that works for the people of Los Angeles County today and tomorrow, one that gives us the tools necessary for when a sheriff violates the law and the public trust. We need checks and balances, which are pillars of a functioning democracy, aimed at not allowing one person or agency to become too powerful. Creating impactful checks and balances on the Sheriff's Department has been long overdue, and changes to our County Charter can ensure essential oversight of the Sheriff. Besides good governance, this is a matter of racial justice, and the county can no longer tinker around the edges of significant structural reform of the Sheriff's Department.

Whereas, law enforcement misconduct, including by deputies of the LA Sheriff, has triggered community resistance and many of the largest episodes of racial violence in LA County’s history, including the uprising and riots after the Rodney King verdicts in 1992, the Watts Rebellion in 1965, and the Zoot Suit Riots of 1943 (which laid bare law enforcement prejudices against racial minorities of the time, and led to the formation of our Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations (“Commission”));

Whereas, “equitable law enforcement” is at the heart of our Human Relations Commission’s mission to transform prejudice into acceptance, inequity into justice, and hostility into peace, and is a core concept of our Commission’s report “Redefining Policing with Our Community,” led by its committee on Policing and Human Relations. “Equitable law enforcement” is explained in our report as “a change from unilateral asymmetrical power dynamics...to robust, transparent oversight by the communities they serve;”

Whereas, our Commission’s Strategic Priority on Increasing Equity and Justice in LA County’s Criminal Justice and Community Safety Systems and our “Redefining Policing” report take into account the pernicious impact of intentional discrimination in our criminal justice system, but also the powerful role of implicit biases that are automatically and unconsciously created in all of us from our life experiences, and have particularly dire consequences when they are not recognized, managed, and reduced in law enforcement. As noted in the Commission’s Strategic Priority, “[w]hen the likelihood of being arrested, jailed, shot, executed, or rearrested after being released from incarceration in LA County is tied to one’s race, ethnicity, gender or other protected characteristics, fundamental human rights are at issue;”

Whereas, our Commission specifically recommends in our “Redefining Policing” report to “[e]nsure that all civilian oversight bodies have the necessary authority to perform their mission, including subpoena power and the power to censure and/or discipline” (Recommendation #8);

Whereas, in the process of creating our report on “Redefining Policing With Our Community,” which included multiple public hearings/community listening sessions in all five Supervisorial Districts, the Commission became aware of many incidents of law enforcement misconduct experienced by community members, and strong community support for effective checks and balances needed to ensure true accountability of the

office of the LA County Sheriff;

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors has responsibility under law (California Government Code § 25303) for guiding and setting County policy and supervising the conduct of County officers and employees, which include the Sheriff;

THEREFORE, the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations resolves and recommends to the Board of Supervisors that it unanimously approve the *Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances of the Los Angeles County Sheriff* motion, and take all actions necessary towards achieving greater accountability of the largely unbridled power of the office of the L.A. Sheriff, reinforcing the Board’s policy-making authority regarding the Sheriff’s Department, and ensuring permanent and independent civilian oversight.
