**APPROVE THE 2013 LOS ANGELES COUNTY CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT
NEEDS ASSESSMENT AND 2013 GEOGRAPHIC PRIORITIES FOR EXPANSION OF
SUBSIDIZED CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT SERVICES
(ALL DISTRICTS) (3-VOTES)**

SUBJECT

Local Child Care Planning Councils, funded by the California Department of Education (CDE), are required to complete a Countywide child care needs assessment at least once every five years and, on an annual basis, to determine geographic priorities for the expansion of subsidized child care services. Both documents are to be approved by the County Superintendent of Schools and the Board of Supervisors prior to submission to CDE. The Los Angeles County Child Care Planning Committee, in conjunction with the Chief Executive Office, are submitting the 2013 Los Angeles County Child Care and Development Needs Assessment (Needs Assessment), and the 2013 Los Angeles County Geographic Priorities for Child Care and Development Services (Priorities Report) for approval by the Board of Supervisors.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Approve the 2013 Needs Assessment (Attachment I).
2. Approve the 2013 Los Angeles County Geographic Priorities for Child Care and Development Services and authorize the Chief Executive Officer, or his designee, to sign the Priorities Report (Attachment II). The Office of Child Care (OCC) will submit the signed report to CDE.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Pursuant to State requirements, formal approval by the Board and by the County Superintendent of Schools is needed before submitting the Needs Assessment and the Priorities to the CDE. The Education Code 8499.5 requires local planning councils in each County to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment at least every five years. The last needs assessment for Los Angeles County was completed in 2011. An approved 2013 Needs Assessment Report ensures compliance with the regulations.

Priorities are reviewed after each needs assessment and more frequently, to determine if circumstances have changed, creating new or different areas of need. The results are compiled in the Priorities Report required by CDE.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

Approval of the Needs Assessment and Priorities Report supports Goal 3: Integrated Services Delivery by providing stakeholders with accurate information on child care supply and demand. The information available in these reports will assist both County personnel and community based organizations in addressing the most pressing needs for child care and development services for County clients and the general public.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

CDE contracts require and fund the data collection efforts needed to complete the Countywide child care needs assessment and priority setting processes. Approval by the Board of these documents is needed to fulfill contract requirements. There is no direct fiscal impact to the County in approving these documents.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

To comply with all statute and Education Code requirements, the Needs Assessment included data on: all children ages zero through 12 in working families; children zero through 12 in low-income working families; and three to four-year olds in low-income working families. It also included data on services for CaWORKS families and the number of children in Child Protective Services.

The process for approving the Needs Assessment and the Priorities Report includes not only the Board's approval, but also that of the Superintendent of Schools. Dr. Arturo Delgado has indicated his approval on the endorsement form attached (Attachment III). In addition, the Needs Assessment and Priorities were presented to the Planning Committee on June 5, 2013, where they were both approved. A public hearing on the Priorities is required by statute. The Public hearing was held on May 1, 2013, as part of the Planning Committee meeting.

Child Care and Development Needs Assessment

The 2013 Los Angeles County Child Care and Development Needs Assessment used data on

available subsidized programs collected by the Office of Child Care in collaboration with Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), Head Start/State Preschool, and Los Angeles Universal Preschool (LAUP). Some of the key findings of the Los Angeles County Child Care and Development Needs Assessment are:

1. There are fewer children 0-12 based on a recalibration using 2010 census data.

The previous assessment (2011) used projections based on 2000 data. This “recalibration” in the data resulted in reduced population sizes for each age group, and for specific income populations.

2. The ratio of served to un-served low-income children in half-day preschool programs has improved.

Despite the loss to subsidized half-day preschool resulting from recent and multi-year reductions, four out of every five eligible children can be served in a subsidized program. This is most likely explained by the decrease in the count of three and four year old children. Most half-day programs (97 percent) in Los Angeles County are subsidized and specifically serve low-income families. However, when we look at all three and four year old children without regard to income, the current supply of half-day preschool enrichment programs is sufficient for only 51 percent of the population.

3. There are decreases in the percent of un-served children in available licensed spaces for children in working families.

While there is a decrease in the percent of un-served children, this is due primarily to the recalibration of population numbers. The gap in available care for preschool-age children in working families has decreased to only 16 percent. It should also be noted that even though Countywide the shortfall is only 16 percent, in some areas the shortfall is much more, while in other areas there are apparent surpluses in preschool-age care.

The biggest shortfall remains in the area of infant/toddler care where 85 percent of all children aged birth to three, in working families, will not find a licensed space available.

4. Shortfall in licensed or licensed-exempt center care has increased for school-age children.

While both the shortfall in spaces for infants, toddlers, and preschool-age children has declined, the short fall for school-age has increased. The shortfall in spaces for school-age children seems to stem both from a loss of Family Child Care spaces (-9.3 percent) and in a decrease in the number of available spaces through the After School Education and Safety program (ASES) which is State funded and the 21st Century program which has Federal funding. The funds for these programs have not been reduced however; utilization of the funds by school districts has decreased.

Geographic Priorities

Geographic priorities for the expansion of subsidized child care and development services were calculated at the zip code level. The Needs Assessment identified the number of eligible children, ages 0 to 12, in working families and not receiving subsidized child care and development services in each zip code. The Needs Assessment also indicated the number of three and four-year old children in low-income families with at least one parent at home for purposes of determining the need for half-day preschool programs. Formulas were applied to the data on both populations, ranking each zip code as a first, second, or third priority, or as not eligible for expansion funding. The formulas used were developed and approved by the Planning Committee and then approved by CDE.

This analysis identified 127 zip codes for expansion of full-day child development services which is an increase from 102 zip codes in 2011. Of these, 58 zip codes have been designated as Priority 1. In contrast, only 24 zip codes have been given a priority for expansion of half-day preschool services. This is down from 40 zip codes in 2011-12. Only four of these zip codes are designated as Priority 1 areas. Even though the number of young children living in the County has dropped considerably, the unmet demand for subsidized, full-day child development services for children birth to 12 continues to grow in both breadth and depth in Los Angeles County.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Compiling, analyzing, and sharing the data produced in the Needs Assessment and the Priorities Report assists those currently serving young children in child care and development programs; those considering the development of or expansion of programs; and those service providers working with families needing these services. It provides an accurate estimation of conditions that affect access and availability of various types of care which can be used in planning and implementation of projects to enhance the availability of care for specific populations or geographies. It should also be considered a tool for advocating for public investment in child care and development services for under-served populations which include many County client families.

CONCLUSION

Should the Federal government or the State legislature approve additional funds for child development programs, the Needs Assessment and the Priorities Report will guide their distribution.
