# APPROVAL TO EXECUTE MEMORANDA OF UNDERSTANDING FOR COORDINATION OF MEDI-CAL SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER SERVICES (ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS) (3 VOTES)

# **SUBJECT**

Request approval to: a) execute non-financial Memoranda of Understanding with various health plans to support the coordination of specialty and non-specialty substance use disorder services for Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System patients in Los Angeles County, effective upon execution through June 30, 2024; b) delegate authority to execute future Memoranda of Understanding with other health plans which may include monetary compensation up to \$300,000 annually per agreement; c) delegate authority to execute amendments to these Memoranda of Understanding that extend the term through June 30, 2030, increase or decrease funding, and to make necessary modifications; and d) delegate authority to terminate these agreements based on service needs.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

 Approve and instruct the Director of the Department of Public Health (Public Health), or designee, to execute a non-financial Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) substantially similar to Exhibit I, with: a) Health Net Community Solutions, Inc.; and, b) L.A. Care Health Plan, for the coordination of specialty and nonspecialty substance use disorder (SUD) services to Medi-Cal beneficiaries under the Drug Medi-Cal (DMC) - Organized Delivery System (ODS) in Los Angeles

County's (County) SUD treatment network, effective upon MOU execution through June 30, 2024.

- 2. Approve and instruct the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute non-financial MOUs substantially similar to Exhibit II with: a) L.A. Care Health Plan, Health Net Community Solutions, Inc.; b) Molina Healthcare of California; c) Blue Cross of California Partnership Plan; and, d) Blue Shield of California Promise Health Plan, for the coordination of specialty and non-specialty SUD services to dual-eligible Medicare and Medi-Cal beneficiaries under the DMC-ODS in the County's SUD treatment network, effective upon MOU execution through June 30, 2024.
- 3. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute future MOUs with other health plans through June 30, 2024, to support the delivery of specialty and non-specialty SUD services available to DMC-ODS, Medi-Cal or dual-eligible Medicare and Medi-Cal beneficiaries within the County, which may include monetary compensation up to \$300,000 annually per MOU, subject to review and approval by Counsel and with four weeks advance written notification to your Board and the Chief Executive Office (CEO).
- 4. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute amendments to the MOUs that: a) extend the term for additional one—year terms through June 30, 2030, which may include monetary compensation up to \$300,000 annually per MOU for the new term; b) adjust the term of the MOUs to complete services; and/or, c) provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 10% of the annual base maximum obligation and reflect other necessary modifications, subject to review and approval by County Counsel and notification to your Board and the CEO.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to execute change notices to the MOUs that permit non-material and/or ministerial revisions which may include, but not limited to, budget modifications, service adjustments and/or corrections or updates to the MOU's terms and conditions.
- 6. Delegate authority to the Director of Public Health, or designee, to terminate any of the MOUs in accordance with the MOUs termination provisions, including Termination without Cause, subject to review and approval by County Counsel and notification to your Board and the CEO.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The DMC-ODS continues to afford an opportunity for the County to advance the quality and accessibility of SUD treatment and the network of organizations that provide these services. The DMC-ODS allows the County to service more individuals, more fully leverage County funds and federal and State resources, expand the network of providers, enhance and expand benefits, and elevate the SUD workforce. The program is subject to oversight and regulations of the federal, State, and local levels.

Public Health currently manages over 80 DMC-ODS contracts that provide SUD treatment services that ensure the continuity of care for DMC-ODS beneficiaries. As part of Public Health's continued efforts to improve health outcomes, improve beneficiary satisfaction, and reduce health care costs in the County, Public Health is requesting approval to enter in various MOUs with the aforementioned health plans. These MOUs will establish partnerships with health plans to coordinate Medi-Cal benefits into the SUD system.

Approval of Recommendation 1 will allow Public Health to execute MOUs with Health Net Community Solutions, Inc. and with L.A. Care Health Plan. These MOUs will establish the mutual understandings, commitments, and protocols for the coordination and management of specialty and non-specialty SUD services to DMC-ODS Medi-Cal enrolled patients in the County.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow Public Health to execute MOUs with L.A. Care Health Plan, Health Net Community Solutions, Inc., Molina Healthcare of California, Blue Cross of California Partnership Plan, and with Blue Shield of California Promise Health Plan. The MOUs will establish the mutual understanding, commitments, and protocols for the coordination of management of specialty and non-specialty SUD services to dual-eligible Medicare and Medi-Cal enrolled patients in the County's SUD treatment network.

Approval of Recommendation 3 will allow Public Health to execute future MOUs which may include monetary compensation with other health plans to enhance and support coordination and delivery of specialty and non-specialty SUD services to DMC-ODS, Medicare and Medi-Cal beneficiaries. These MOUs will establish formal agreements to strengthen the services offered to all DMC-ODS network participants and may require the County to reimburse the health plans for services provided. Additionally, Public Health operates the Antelope Valley Rehabilitation Centers (AVRC). As a service provider, Public Health AVRC may need to enter into agreements with other health service providers in order to ensure its patients have access to services not offered at AVRC; these services may include primary health, mental health, or other services.

Approval of Recommendation 4 will allow Public Health to execute future amendments to the MOUs. These amendments may include monetary compensation that extends the term, adjusting the term to complete services, increasing or decreasing funding, and/or other necessary modifications. The requested extension through June 30, 2030 will align these MOUs with the term of DMC-ODS contracts.

Approval of Recommendation 5 will allow Public Health to execute change notices to the MOUs that permit non-material and/or ministerial revisions to the MOU terms and conditions.

Approval of Recommendation 6 will allow Public Health to terminate the MOUs in accordance with the MOU termination provisions.

### **IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC GOALS**

The recommended actions support Strategy I.2, Enhance Our Delivery of Comprehensive Interventions, of the County's Strategic Plan.

#### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Under the recommended MOUs, all Medi-Cal and non-specialty Medi-Cal SUD services will be the responsibility of the health plans under the Cal MediConnect Program. Funding for those services is included in the health plans' capitation payment from the State Department of Health Care Services (State). Medi-Cal specialty SUD services for beneficiaries that meet DMC medical necessity criteria will continue to be funded by Medi-Cal and other treatment revenues, with services administered through Public Health. Additionally, these MOUs will address shared financial accountability strategies to improve coordination of services.

MOUs with monetary compensation will be supported using funds allocated by Public Health for SUD services. These funds include, but are not limited to, DMC and Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant.

There is no net County cost associated with the recommended actions.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

In January 2012, Governor Jerry Brown announced his Coordinated Care Initiative - Cal MediConnect to enhance health outcomes of both Medicare and Medi-Cal programs, referred to as dual eligible beneficiaries. By 2014, five managed care health plans were selected by the State and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to provide SUD services.

On August 13, 2015, the State received approval from the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to amend the Section 1115 (a) Waiver demonstration project. The State's DMC-ODS Waiver allowed the County to increase access to SUD treatment for youth and adults who are eligible for Medi-Cal. The waiver expands DMC reimbursable services beyond outpatient, intensive outpatient, and opioid treatment programs to create a more robust continuum of care. Public Health's SUD system transformation includes critical elements of the DMC-ODS through the provision of a continuum of care modeled after the American Society of Addiction Medicine Criteria for SUD services and an increase in local control and accountability. It provides additional resources for County residents, ensures use of evidence-based practices in SUD treatment, and increases care coordination with other systems of care.

#### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

In 2014, Public Health entered into MOUs with five health plans for the purpose of providing a seamless system of care coordination and care management for Cal

MediConnect dual eligible enrolled beneficiaries in Los Angeles County seeking SUD services. These MOUs ended on December 31, 2017.

Subsequently, in 2017, Public Health entered into MOUs with health plans for the purpose of providing all Medi-Cal beneficiaries in Los Angeles County access to all medically necessary specialty SUD services covered by DMC and included in Los Angeles County's DMC-ODS Implementation Plan. These MOUs ended on December 31, 2020.

Public Health and the health plans are required to hold regularly scheduled meetings to ensure effective collaboration. Under the recommended MOUs, Public Health Substance Abuse Prevention and Control will administer and monitor adherence to the MOUs' provisions and performance outcomes at least semi-annually to ensure that quality of services is being provided in accordance with the terms and conditions of the MOUs.

Exhibits I and II have been reviewed as to form by County Counsel.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Approval of the proposed actions will allow Public Health to establish MOUs with health plans to coordinate Medi-Cal and dual-eligible Medicare and Medi-Cal beneficiaries into the SUD system of care.

#### **SUBJECT**

Approval of delegated authority to the Director of Health Services and the Director of Public Health, or their respective designees, to extend various contracts in support of the response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### The Departments of Health and Public Health recommend:

1. Delegate authority to the Director of Health Services (DHS Director) and Director of Public Health (Public Health Director), or their respective designee(s), (collectively "The Directors"), to amend the contracts slated to expire by September 30, 2021 to: (i) extend their term on a month-to-month basis until the end of the month of the six (6) month anniversary following the date on which the Proclamation of a Local and Public Health Emergency due to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) (Health Emergency Proclamation) is lifted by the Board of Supervisors (Board), (ii) reaffirm delegations of authority previously provided to The Directors for each contract; and (iii) increase the contract rates by up to 25% and/or increase the maximum County obligation by up to 25%, if any, accordingly for the extension periods, provided that sufficient appropriation is available within the respective Department's existing budget, all subject to prior review and approval by the Chief Executive Office (CEO) and County Counsel.

- 2. Delegate authority to The Directors, or their respective designee(s), to prepare and execute future amendments to the contracts described in Recommendation 1 to modify statements of work, including changes to service delivery sites and scope of services and to reflect federal, State and County regulatory and/or policy changes, provided that: (i) any such amendment does not result in an increase higher than 25% above the applicable previously Board-approved amounts (contract rates and/or maximum County obligation); (ii) sufficient appropriation is available within the respective Department's existing budget, with all amendments subject to review and approval by the CEO and County Counsel.
- Delegate authority to The Directors, or their respective designee(s), to terminate
  the contract(s) described in Recommendation 1 in accordance with the applicable
  contract termination provisions, including for convenience of the County and
  contractor's default, with advance written notification of such termination action to
  your Board and CEO.
- 4. Delegate authority to the Public Health Director, or designee, to execute future amendments to the contracts, as applicable, to: (i) allow for a no-cost adjustment to the term in compliance with the provisions of the corresponding grant used for reimbursement; (ii) allow the rollover of unspent contract funds to subsequent year; (iii) provide for an internal reallocation of funds among budgets for purposes of reimbursement; (iv) make changes to the scopes of work, as applicable; and (v) and/or provide an increase or decrease in funding up to 10% above or below each term's annual base maximum obligation and make corresponding service adjustments, as necessary; provided that sufficient appropriation is available within the Department's existing budget and subject to prior review and approval by CEO and County Counsel.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Public Health Director, or designee, to execute change notices to the contracts that (i) permit revisions to the scopes of work, as necessary; (ii) authorize program revisions within its budget and corresponding service adjustments, as necessary, (iii) changes to hours of operation and/or service locations, and/or (iv) corrections of errors in the terms and conditions.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Approval of recommendation 1 will provide the Department of Health Services (DHS) and the Department of Public Health (Public Health) (collectively "The Departments") with the ability to continue to concentrate contracting resources on The Departments' most immediate needs to prepare for and address a surge in COVID-19 cases in Los Angeles County. In the months since the announcement of the local emergency, The Departments' contracting resources have been diverted to address significant needs in the areas of nursing, physician coverage, environmental services, hoteling for healthcare workers and support for the County's temporary quarantine and isolation sites and managing logistics

activities of the Incident Command System, including contact tracing, and data management of reported positive COVID-19 cases. Additionally, The Departments have been focusing their resources on other urgent contractual requirements that have been necessary to address the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Departments have reviewed their inventories of contracts (Attachments I and II provide a substantial list of contracts that are expiring by September 30, 2021) and have determined that, as contracting resources are currently diverted toward COVID-19 activities, The Departments will need the additional time contemplated in the recommendations to resume work on the replacements for these contracts.

Prior to exercising the requested delegated authority, The Departments will review their respective contractors' performance to ensure that there are no significant issues and are in good standing as a County contractor.

Approval of Recommendation 2 will allow The Directors to execute amendments to the contracts to add, delete, modify or replace the existing Statement(s) of Work including changes to service delivery sites; and/or reflect federal, State, and County regulatory and/or policy changes, as necessary, without interruption to service provision.

Approval of Recommendation 3 will allow The Directors to terminate services in accordance with the Contract's termination provisions, including Termination for Convenience, in a timely manner, as necessary.

Approval of Recommendation 4 will allow Public Health to execute amendments to the contracts to: extend and/or adjust the term of the contract as allowed by the grant; rollover unspent funds; provide for an internal reallocation of funds between budgets, if applicable; and/or increase or decrease funding up to 10 percent above or below the annual base maximum obligation, and make corresponding service adjustments, as necessary. This recommended action will also enable Public Health to amend the contract to adjust the term at no cost for a period of up to six months beyond the expiration date. Such amendments will only be executed if and when there is an unanticipated extension of the term of the applicable grant funding to allow additional time to complete services and utilize grant funding. This authority is being requested to enhance Public Health's efforts to expeditiously maximize grant revenue, consistent with Board Policy 4.070: Full Utilization of Grant funds.

Approval of Recommendation 5 will allow Public Health to execute change notices to the contract that permit revisions to the scope of work, as necessary; authorize budget modifications, and corresponding service adjustments, as necessary; changes to hours of operation and/or service locations; and/or corrections of errors in the contract's terms and conditions.

The provisions requiring advance review, notification, and identification of funding before undertaking any amendments will ensure the additional flexibility granted to The Directors

by this delegated authority is accompanied by appropriate transparency and prudent fiscal management.

#### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support Strategy II.2, "Support the Wellness of Our Communities," of the County's Strategic Plan.

# FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The Departments will fund their respective costs within their respective budgetary resources. Funding for future fiscal years will be addressed through the County's annual budget process.

### **FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS**

On March 4, 2020, the Board proclaimed a state of emergency regarding the Novel Coronavirus. The recommendations above are presented in anticipation of The Departments' need to address a surge in COVID-19 cases in the County of Los Angeles.

On March 31, 2020, the Board approved a motion delegating certain authorities to the CEO during declared states of emergency as related to COVID-19.

All amendments are subject to prior review and approval as to form by County Counsel.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Approval of the recommendations will give The Departments the necessary flexibility to be nimble in their response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

# PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Approval of the recommended action will authorize ISD, as the County's Purchasing Agent, to issue a confirming PO to enable the Department of Health Services (DHS) to pay outstanding invoices totaling \$266,570.50 for Airway Clearance Therapy Vests prescribed for patients with severe respiratory disease.

#### BACKGROUND

Several Physicians within the Medical Surgical units at LAC+USC MC requested non-agreement DME equipment items from Calox in order for patients to be discharged from

the hospital and to be monitored as outpatient with severe respiratory disease or chronic lung infections. Physicians were prescribing patients an Airway Clearance Therapy Vest for home use as it was more cost effective than inpatient for observation.

Physicians were aware there was an existing ISD master agreement (MA-IS-1940160) with Calox , therefore physicians were issuing prescriptions to the vendor to provide the Airway Clearance Therapy Vest in order to discharge patients. It was unknown to the physicians that the Airway Clearance Therapy Vest being requested was not included on the existing ISD master agreement.

Corrective action has been taken to ensure this does not occur in the future. ISD Purchasing Division amended the master agreement (MA-IS-1940160) with Calox to include Airway Clearance Therapy Vest, effective June 23, 2019 through January 31, 2022. DHS will use this agreement to place orders for Airway Clearance Therapy Vests and physicians have been notified of the non-agreement purchase process to prevent future confirming POs.

DHS recognizes this is a confirming retroactive PO, and will make a presentation to the Retroactive Contract Review Committee (RCRC) to discuss the factors that led to the retroactive situation and to discuss the Corrective Action Plan (CAP) developed by the department to prevent the recurrence of future retroactive POs. Recommendations made by the RCRC members will be incorporated into the final CAP.

### Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The recommended actions support Goal II.2, "Support the Wellness of Our Communities" and III.3, "Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility and Accountability" of the County's Strategic Plan.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The total cumulative retroactive unpaid balance for the Airway Clearance Therapy Vest is approximately \$267,000. Funding is included in the Fiscal Year 2020-21 Final Budget.

# FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The total cost of the invoices is \$266,570.50 from FY 2015-2016, 2016-2017, 2017-2018, 2018-2019 for prescribing Durable Medical Equipment for patient care.

#### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

The PO will be processed by ISD in accordance with the County's purchasing policies and procedures for sole source purchases.

# **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES**

There is no negative impact on current County services. Approval of the recommendation will enable DHS to pay for DME received during prior fiscal years.

#### <u>SUBJECT</u>

Adopt a resolution to authorize acceptance of \$7,998,605 in grant funds from the Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program administered by the Board of State and Community Corrections to support COVID-19 prevention and response strategy for the reentry population; and authorize the Director of Health Services, or designee, to execute the Grant Award Agreement and related documents.

#### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

- Adopt and instruct the Chair to sign a resolution authorizing the Director of Health Services (Director), or designee, to accept an anticipated grant award of \$7,998,605 from the Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program administered by the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) over a 10-month period from March 31, 2021 through January 31, 2022, to support COVID-19 prevention and response strategy for the reentry population, subject to prior review and approval as to form by County Counsel.
- 2. Delegate authority to the Director, or designee, to execute the corresponding BSCC Grant Award Agreement and all other necessary documents to accept the award, effective upon execution, subject to prior review and approval as to form by County Counsel.

3. Delegate authority to the Director, or designee, to execute any future amendments to the BSCC Grant Award Agreement and all other related documents, subject to prior review and approval as to form by County Counsel.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

#### Background

On March 31, 2020, a motion by Supervisor Hilda Solis and seconded by Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas was approved to ensure adequate efforts are made to prevent COVID-19 among the justice-involved populations in the County. The motion instructed that several County departments and relevant stakeholders develop a plan to increase safe release of, or care for, those who are currently incarcerated who may be particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, based on age, or existing medical conditions, as well as those who are pretrial, are approaching their scheduled release date, or may otherwise qualify for safe and early release with the goal to reduce overcrowding without compromising community safety, in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The anticipated grant award of \$7,998,605 will address the motion and support COVID-19 prevention and response strategy for the reentry population in the County. The Department of Health Services plans to implement a multi-collaborative effort between the Office of Diversion and Reentry (ODR) and Correctional Health Services (CHS). The grant award will be used to continue to address the needs of homeless and medically vulnerable individuals in, or released from, custody due to COVID-19 jail reduction plans.

ODR will use \$6,522,528 for the COVID-19 jail release beds made up of 183 beds in eight (8) community-based housing facilities to provide housing and related support services to medically vulnerable individuals being released from custody in the Los Angeles County Jail system. ODR anticipates serving 250 individuals released from jail during the 10-month grant period. These facilities were implemented within weeks of the COVID-19 outbreak in Los Angeles County. Services include interim housing, clinical services, intensive case management services, and support with obtaining permanent housing.

CHS will use the remaining \$1,476,077 to support nursing staff on CHS' COVID Medically Vulnerable Population Team to provide medical oversight, COVID-19 testing and vaccinations for over 5,500 medically vulnerable patients remain in custody. The supervising staff nurse will oversee patient care and ensure adherence to established processes and protocols to reduce and prevent the introduction of new individuals with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 into congregate areas within the jail, by identifying cases, and isolating patients to follow COVID-19 recovery protocols. The nursing staff will provide patient care including administering vaccines and performing nasal swabs, as well as educating patients about COVID-19.

#### Recommendations

Approval of the first recommendation will allow the Chair to sign the Governing Board Resolution (Attachment I) that is required to be submitted to BSCC prior to the Grant Award Agreement execution. The resolution was not required to be submitted at the time of the grant application.

Approval of the second and third recommendations will enable the Director, or designee, to accept the BSCC grant and execute the Grant Award Agreement and all other necessary documents to accept the award, as well as execute any future amendments to the Grant Award Agreement and all other related documents. The grant period is from March 31, 2021 through January 31, 2022.

## **IMPLEMENTATION OF STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS**

The recommended actions support "Strategy II.2 Support the Wellness of Our Communities" and "Strategy III.3 Pursue Operational Effectiveness, Fiscal Responsibility, and Accountability" of the County's Strategic Plan.

DHS will include the necessary appropriation and revenue changes during the Final Changes Budget process for Fiscal Year 2021-22 and will include the necessary changes for future fiscal years in the annual budget requests.

WHEREAS, by motion adopted on March 31, 2020 (Attachment A), the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors directed County departments and relevant stakeholders to provide updates on plans to increase the safe release of, or care for, those who are currently incarcerated who may be particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, as well as those who are pretrial, are approaching their scheduled release date, or may otherwise qualify for safe and early release, with a goal to reduce overcrowding and safely lower the jail population without compromising community safely, in order to prevent the spread of the virus; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) has made available up to \$58,518,568 in grant funding to counties through the Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding (CESF) Program to fund approaches that prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS**, the County of Los Angeles desires to participate in the CESF Program funded through the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance and administered by the BSCC; and

**WHEREAS**, the anticipated grant award of \$7,998,605 will support a multi-collaborative effort between the Office of Diversion and Reentry and Correctional Health Services to continue to address the needs of homeless and medically vulnerable individuals in, or released from, custody due to COVID-19 jail reduction plans; and

**WHEREAS**, as a requirement of the Grant Award Agreement, the Department of Health Services is required to provide BSCC with a Governing Board Resolution that identifies an authorized official to sign and accept the Grant Award Agreement and other grant related transactions; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Director of Health Services, or designee, be authorized on behalf of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to submit the grant proposal for this funding and sign the Grant Award Agreement with the BSCC, including any amendments thereof.

# Ensuring Adequate Efforts to Prevent COVID-19 Among Justice-Involved Populations

People who are incarcerated are highly vulnerable to the spread of contagious illnesses, especially one such as COVID-19, because they are often in crowded quarters with large numbers of people, have limited control over their movement and exposure, and therefore have limited ability to employ strategies like social distancing. Furthermore, people who are incarcerated often have reduced access to basic hygiene practices, despite these factors and the sanitation challenges often found in detention facilities. Moreover, a significant number of incarcerated individuals have compromised immune systems or otherwise are considered vulnerable to this virus (e.g., the elderly and pregnant women). Reducing the risk of spreading of the virus within Los Angeles County's (County) jail system, as well as in the juvenile halls and camps, is critical for those who are in the County's care as well as for the personnel who work in those facilities. Protective measures will reduce possible increased exposure to the community, upon a person's release or from staff returning home after a shift.

The County's justice partners have already taken impressive and important steps to address this issue through unprecedented creativity and collaboration. The Public Defender convened the County justice partners to begin communicating and collaborating to address the overlapping public safety and public health concerns of its clients. Correctional Health has released protocols around testing and treatment. As of mid-

March, the Sheriff's Department had lowered the jail population by over 600 by taking common sense approaches to provide early release for those in custody for non-violent offenses, and continues to explore opportunities to reduce the population further while caring for those who remain incarcerated. Law enforcement agencies have dramatically reduced unnecessary arrests to curb the flow of people into the jails. And while there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19 in either the jails or juvenile halls or probation camps at this time, there are efforts to both test and quarantine individuals who are symptomatic or may be at risk.

While we commend County departments and the courts for taking this issue seriously and continuing to work to address these issues, we also know that more is needed, and urgently, to protect those in the County's custody, particularly vulnerable populations, as well as thousands of County employees.

WE, THEREFORE, MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS request the Sheriff's Department, the Department of Health Services and the Probation Department, with the assistance of the Office of Inspector General, the Department of Public Health, the Department of Mental Health, the Office of Diversion and Reentry, the Public Defender's office, the Alternative Public Defenders office, the District Attorney's office, County Counsel, Chief Executive Office, Homeless Initiative, Department of Public Social Services, Internal Services Division (ISD), the courts, and any other relevant stakeholders, to update the Board of Supervisors consistently and frequently, on the following:

- 1) Plans and/or efforts underway to increase the safe release of, or care for, those who are currently incarcerated who may be particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, based on age, or existing medical conditions, as well as those who are pretrial, are approaching their scheduled release date, or may otherwise qualify for safe and early release, with a goal to reduce overcrowding and safely lower the jail and juvenile hall and probation camp populations, without compromising community safety, in order to prevent the spread of the virus, with updates on how many people are being impacted;
- 2) Updates on efforts to further reduce the introduction of new individuals into the jail and juvenile facilities while balancing public safety and risk to the physical

- safety of the community;
- 3) Updates on efforts to provide resources to support those who are released from the jails, juvenile halls or camps to avoid becoming homeless upon release; including:
  - a. <u>Screening of health and housing status of all adults and youth upon</u> release,
  - b. Collaborating with the existing and new housing resources within the County and the community, including the Office of Diversion and Reentry, Department of Health Services, Department of Mental Health, Chief Executive Office, and the Office of Emergency Management to link inmates who are being released from County jail to medical housing or other available housing, when deemed appropriate;
- 4) Plans to ensure adequate space for quarantining or isolating individuals currently in custody who may become infected or who are vulnerable and cannot be released, and thus require extra protections to ensure their wellbeing;
- 5) Updates on efforts to provide increased and sufficient handwashing, hygiene, and cleaning supplies, and policies to support best practices in personal and institutional hygiene (such as handwashing and cleaning), including providing sufficient information and education on proper hygiene measures and effective strategies to reduce infection to all individuals within our care within detention facilities, and staff and personnel who work in those facilities. This should also include efforts to control rumors and reduce unnecessary fear among prisoners and staff as much as possible;
- 6) Updates on efforts to ensure effective screening of all new admissions, along with plans to ensure staff entering the facilities are healthy (e.g. taking temperatures), and plans to ensure appropriate staffing levels and treatment should individuals become infected, and adequate data collection and tracking based on public health approaches;
- 7) A plan to support increased virtual contact and visitation with people in custody at no cost, as well as communication with families regarding when visitation will resume once determined in order to minimize anxiety and increase
