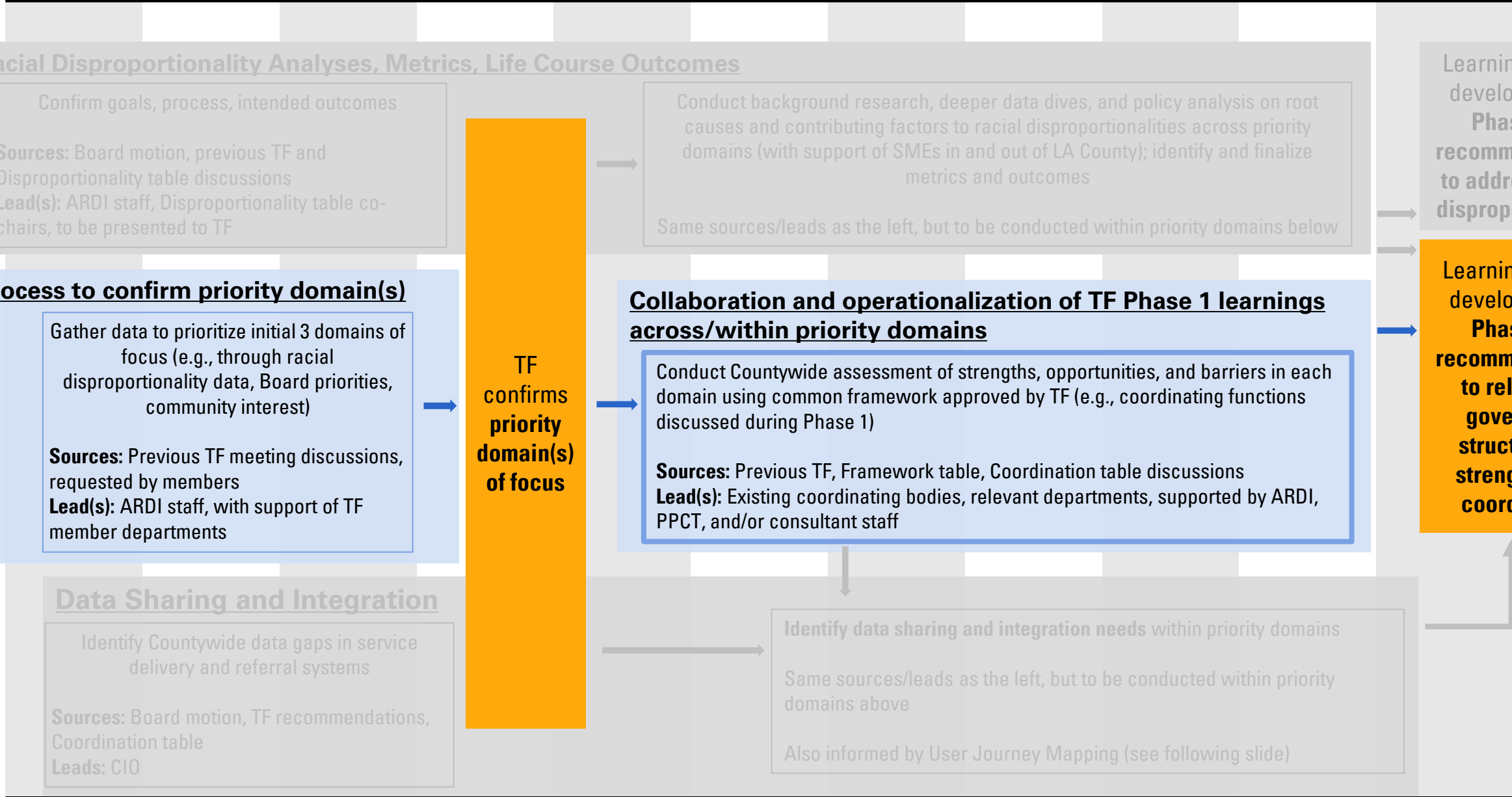

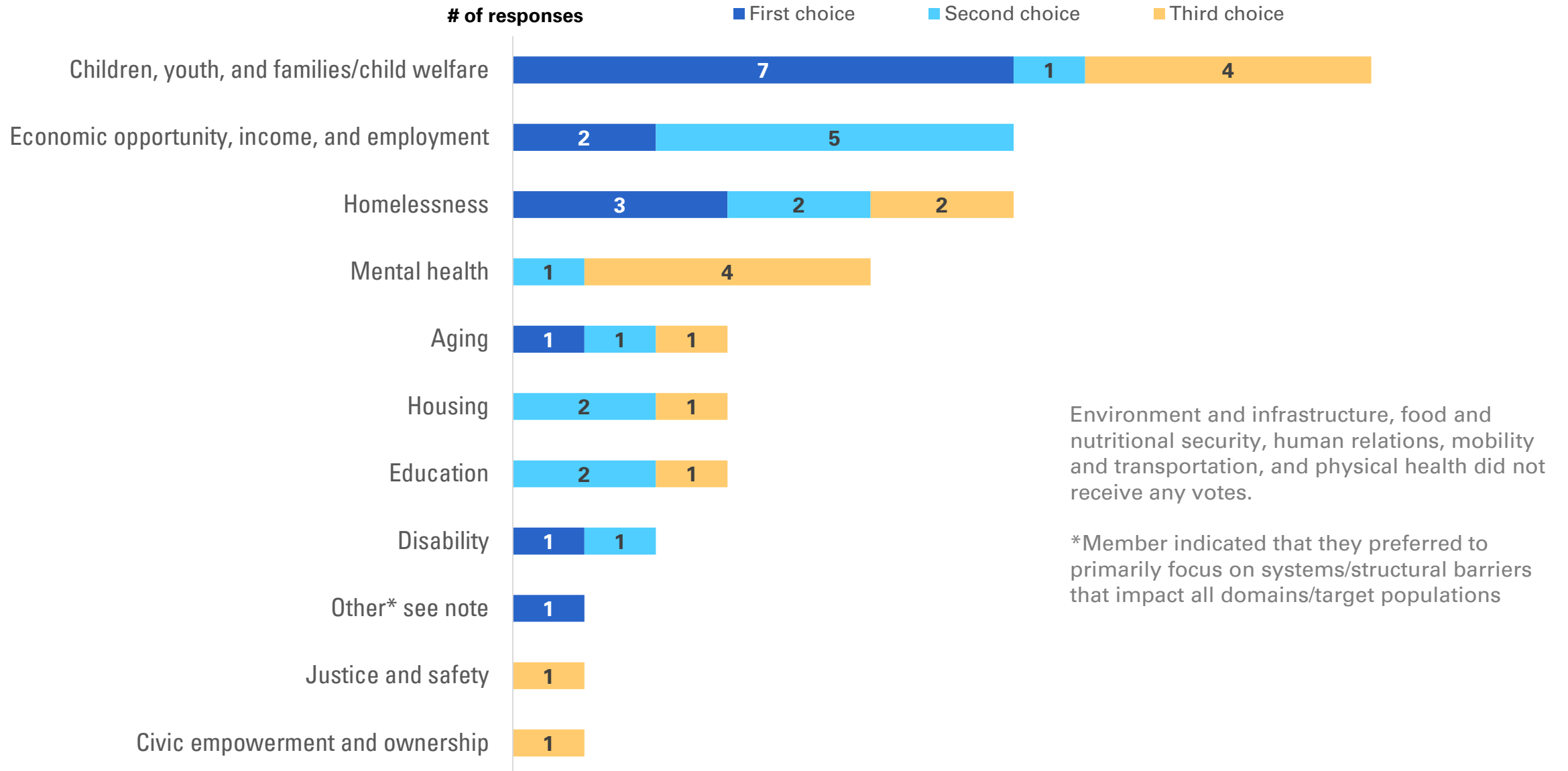

What are top three domains that you believe the Task Force should prioritize researching in Phase 2? (n=15)





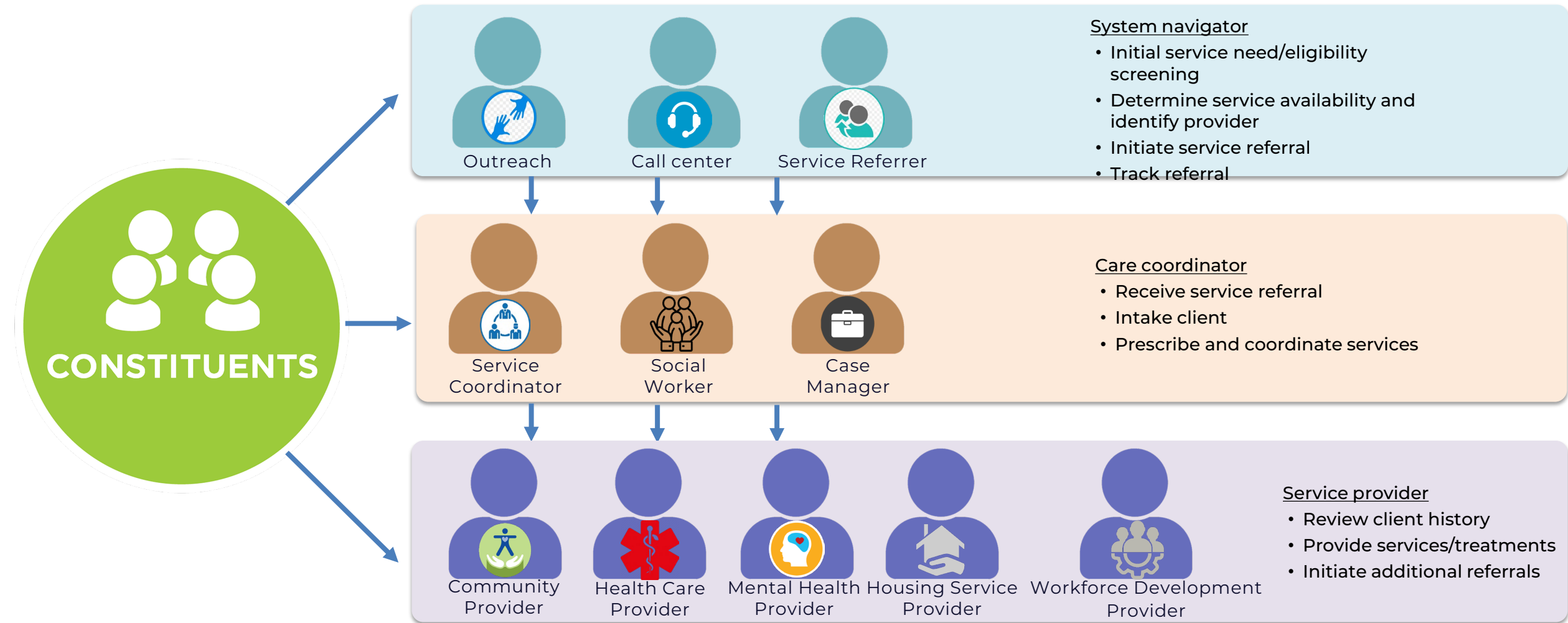

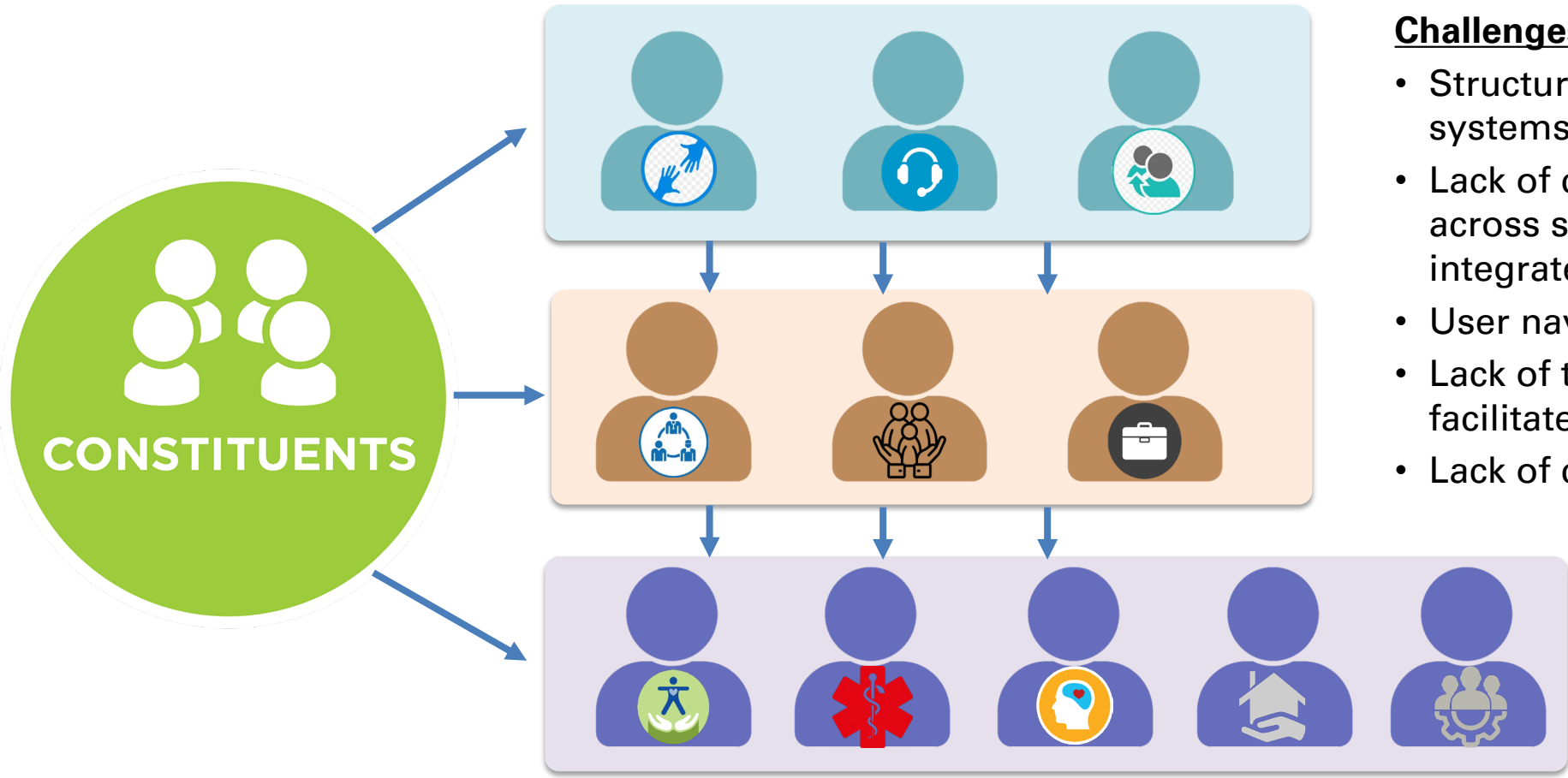

Current model for Service Delivery



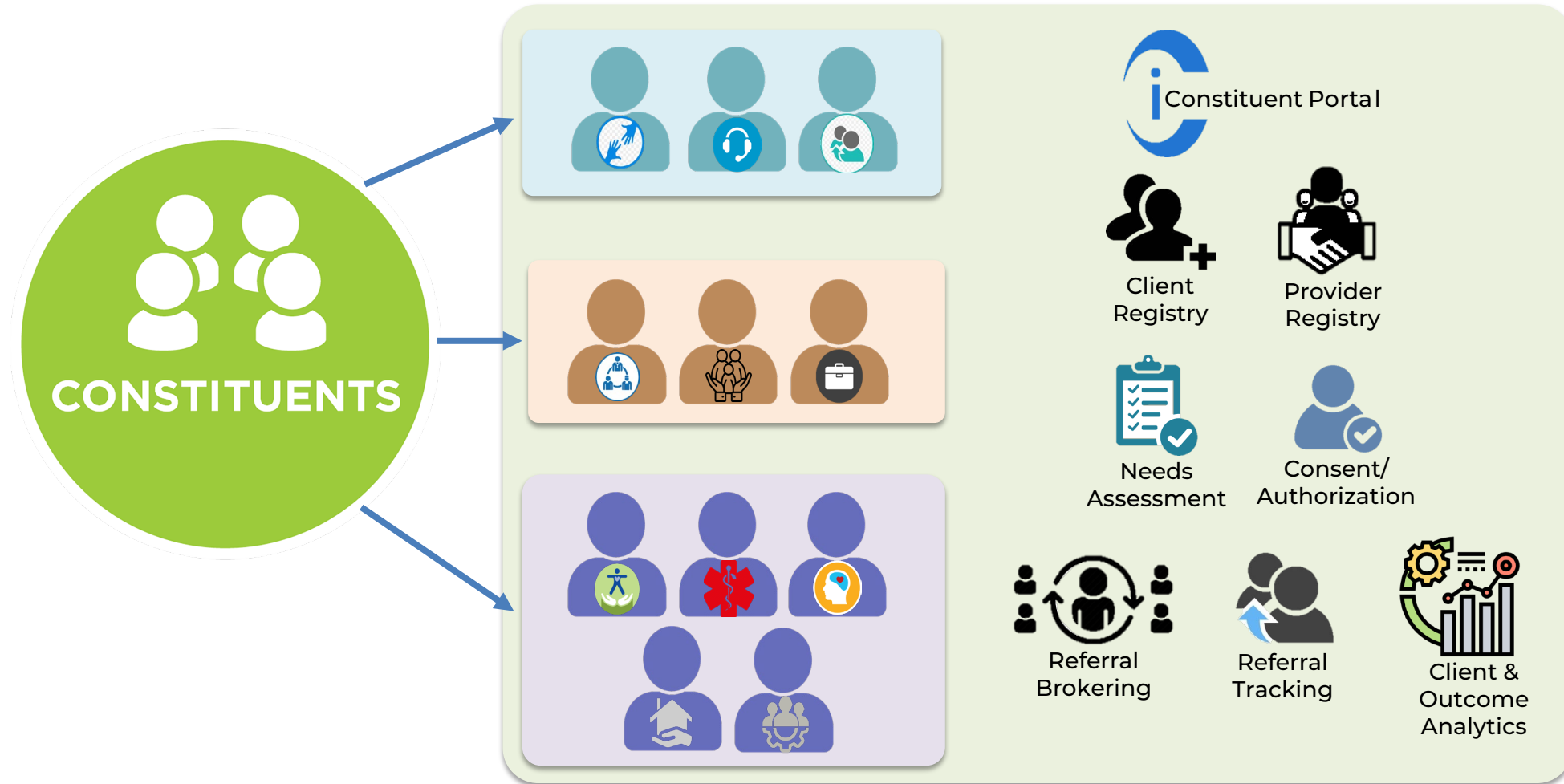

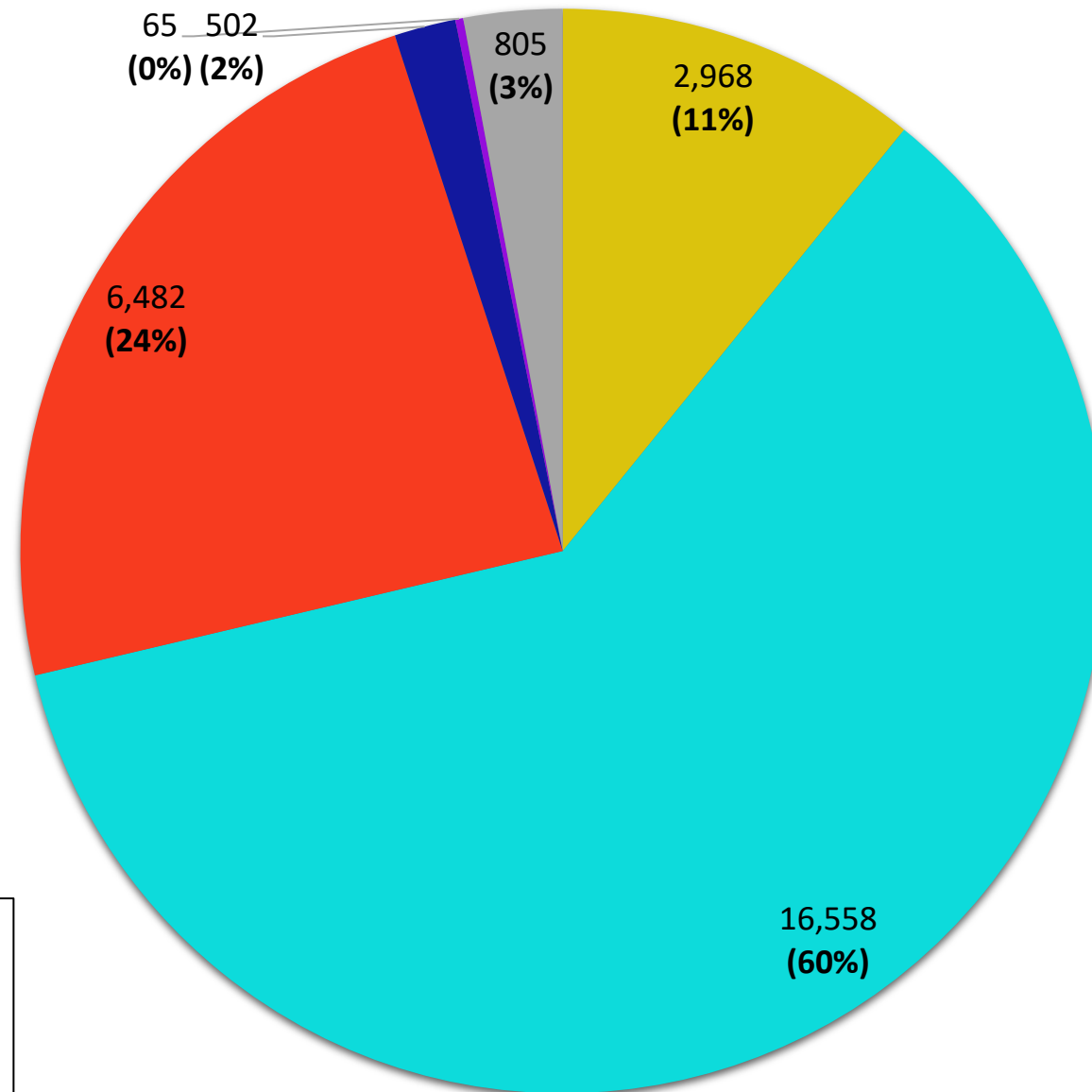

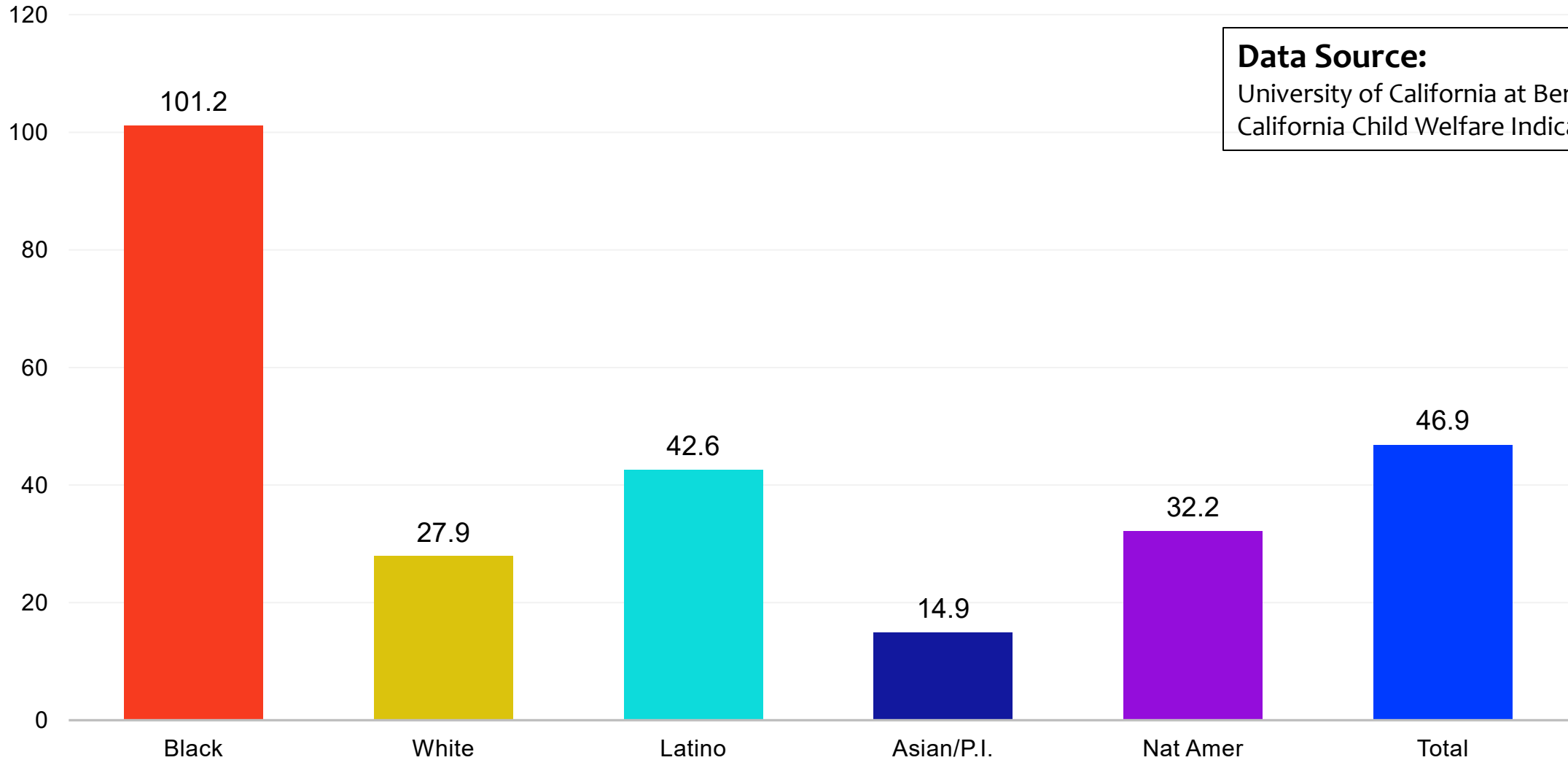

Incidents per 1,000 Children (2022)



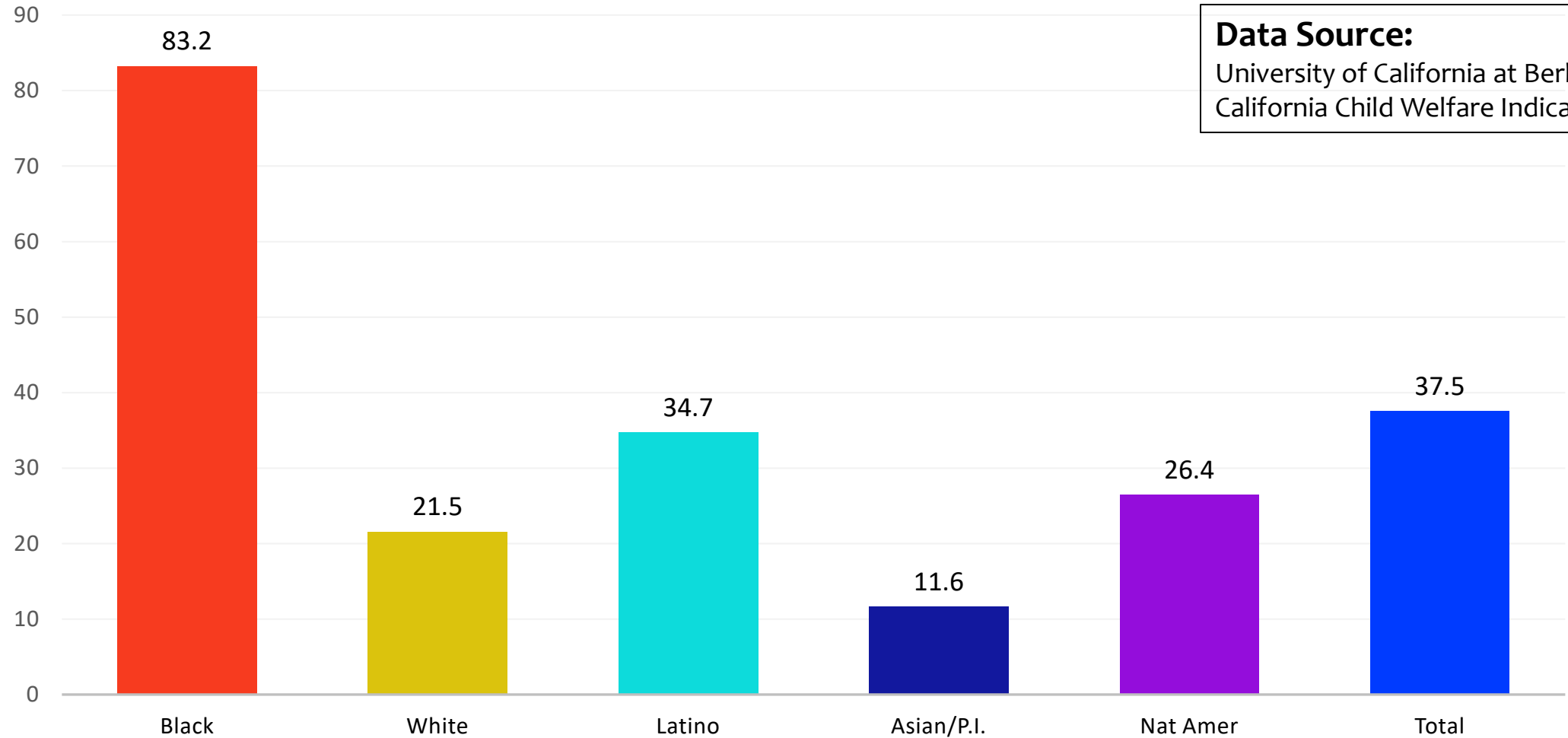

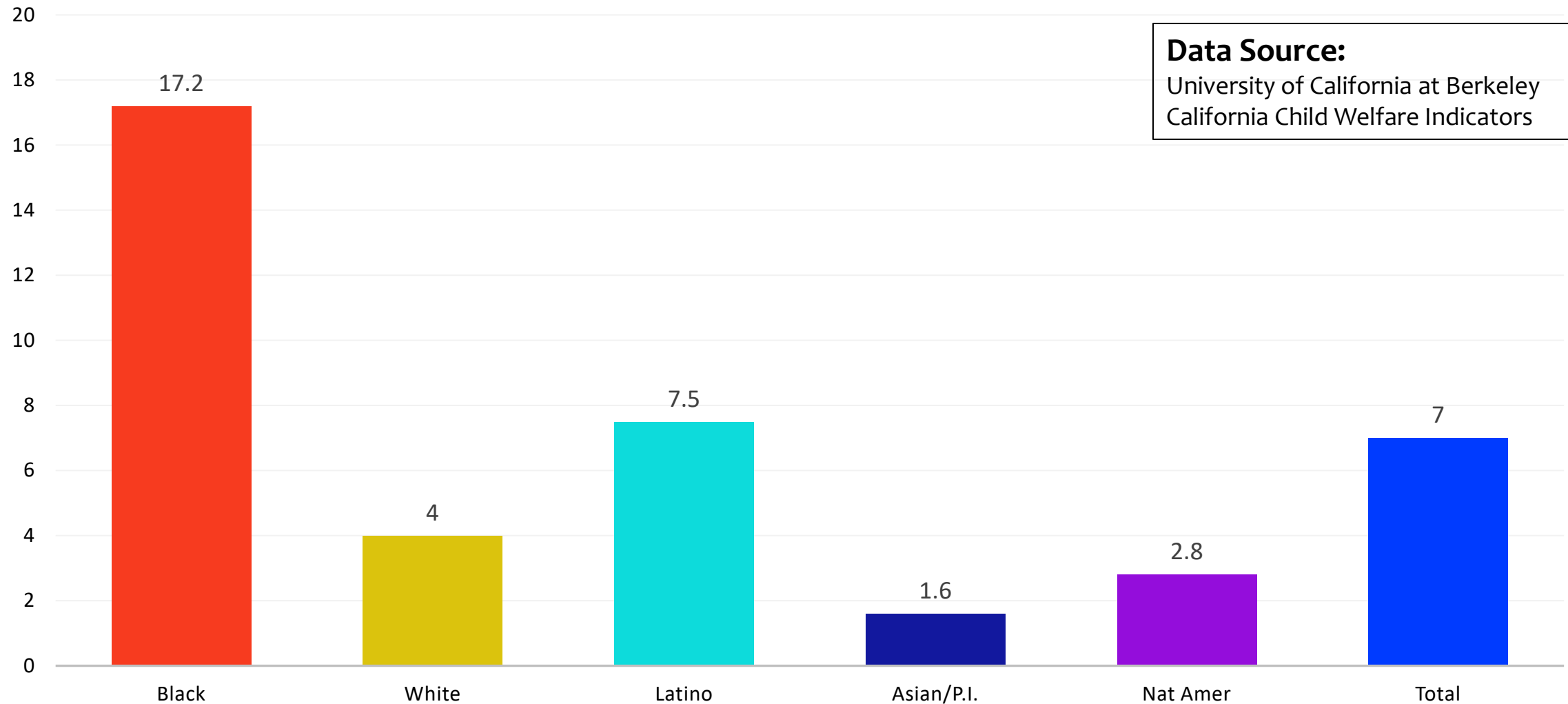

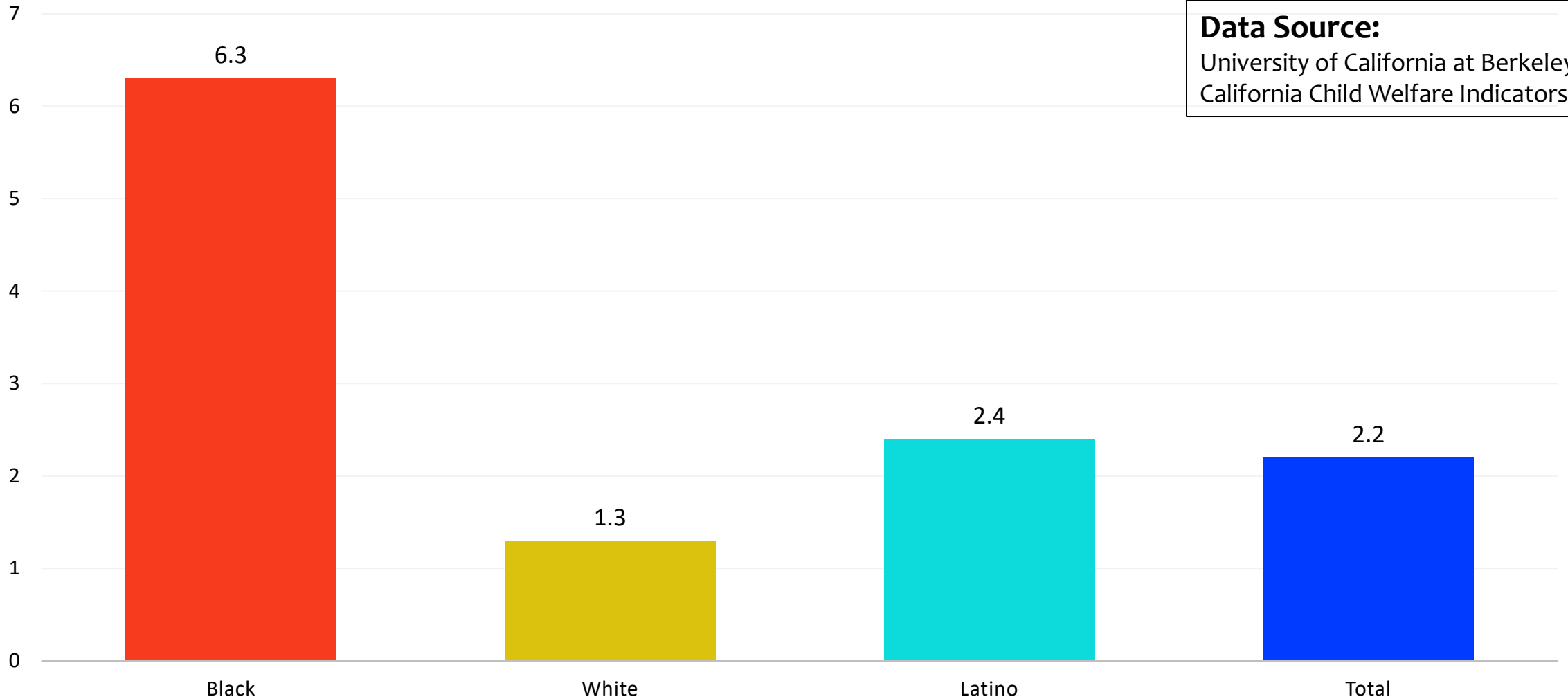

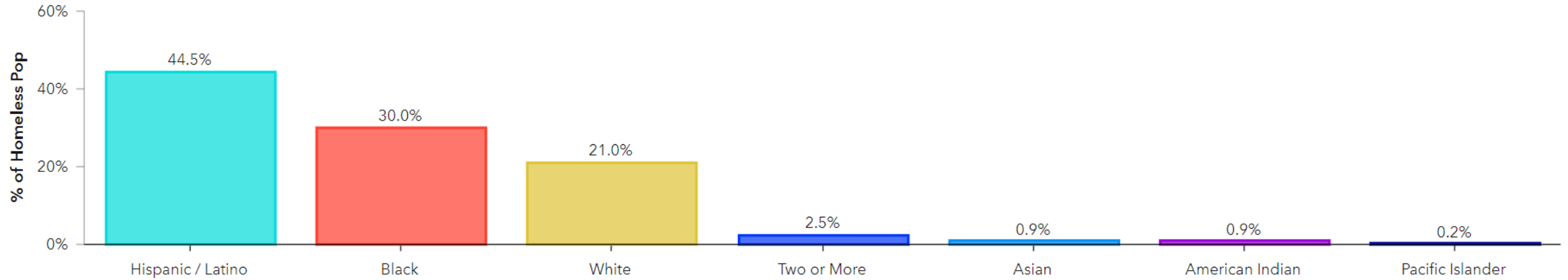

Homeless Population by Race



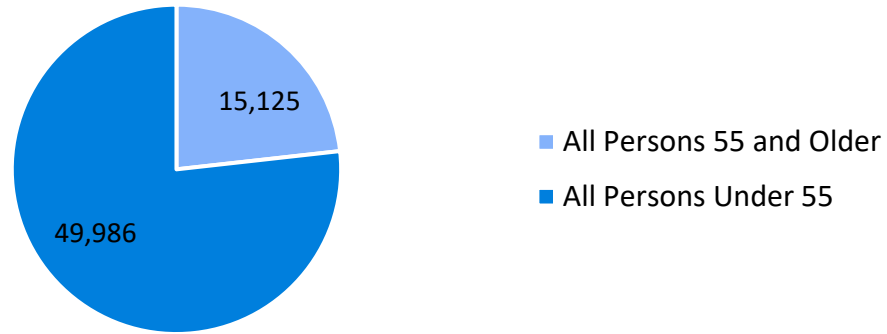

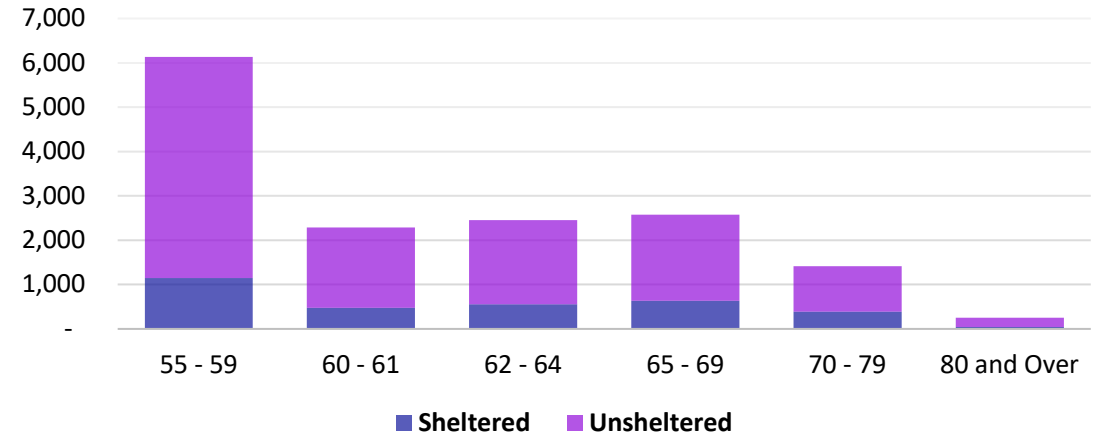

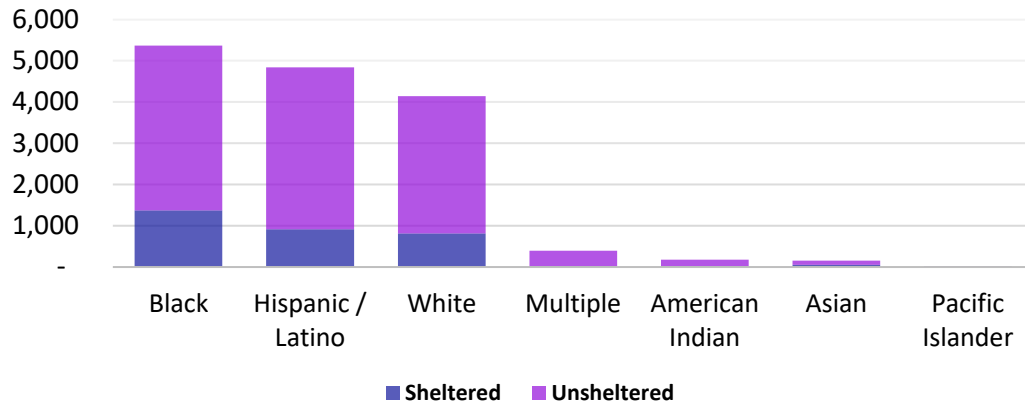
**2022 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count
Older Population - Los Angeles Continuum of Care**



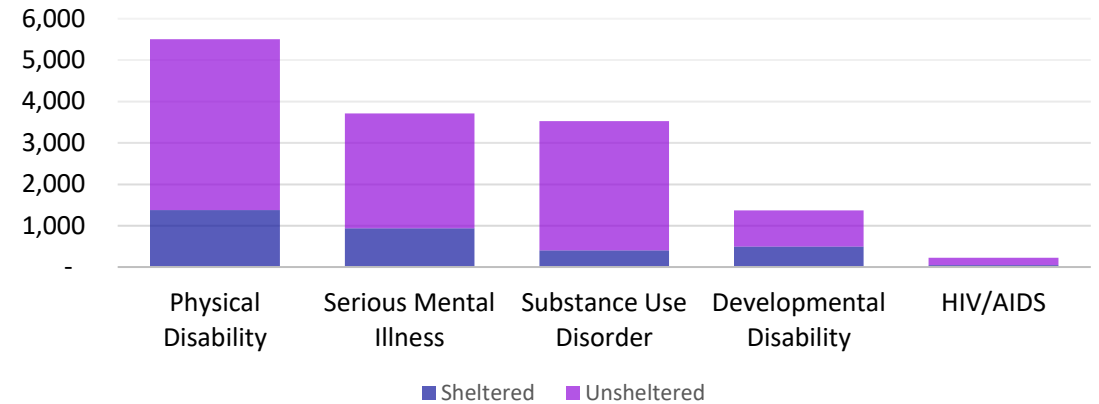
AGE 55+ HOMELESS POPULATION BY AGE



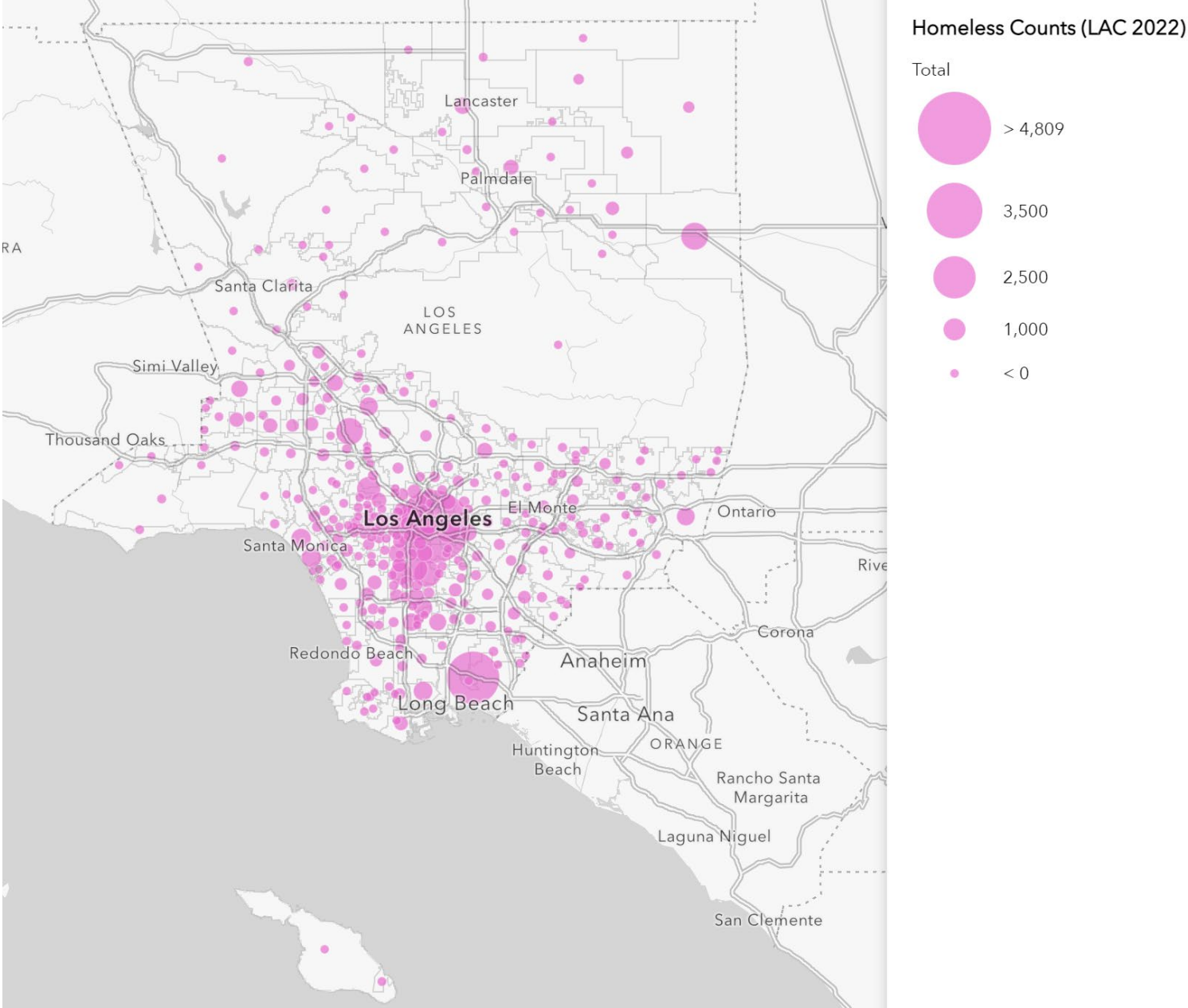
**AGE 55+ HOMELESS POPULATION BY
RACE / ETHNICITY**



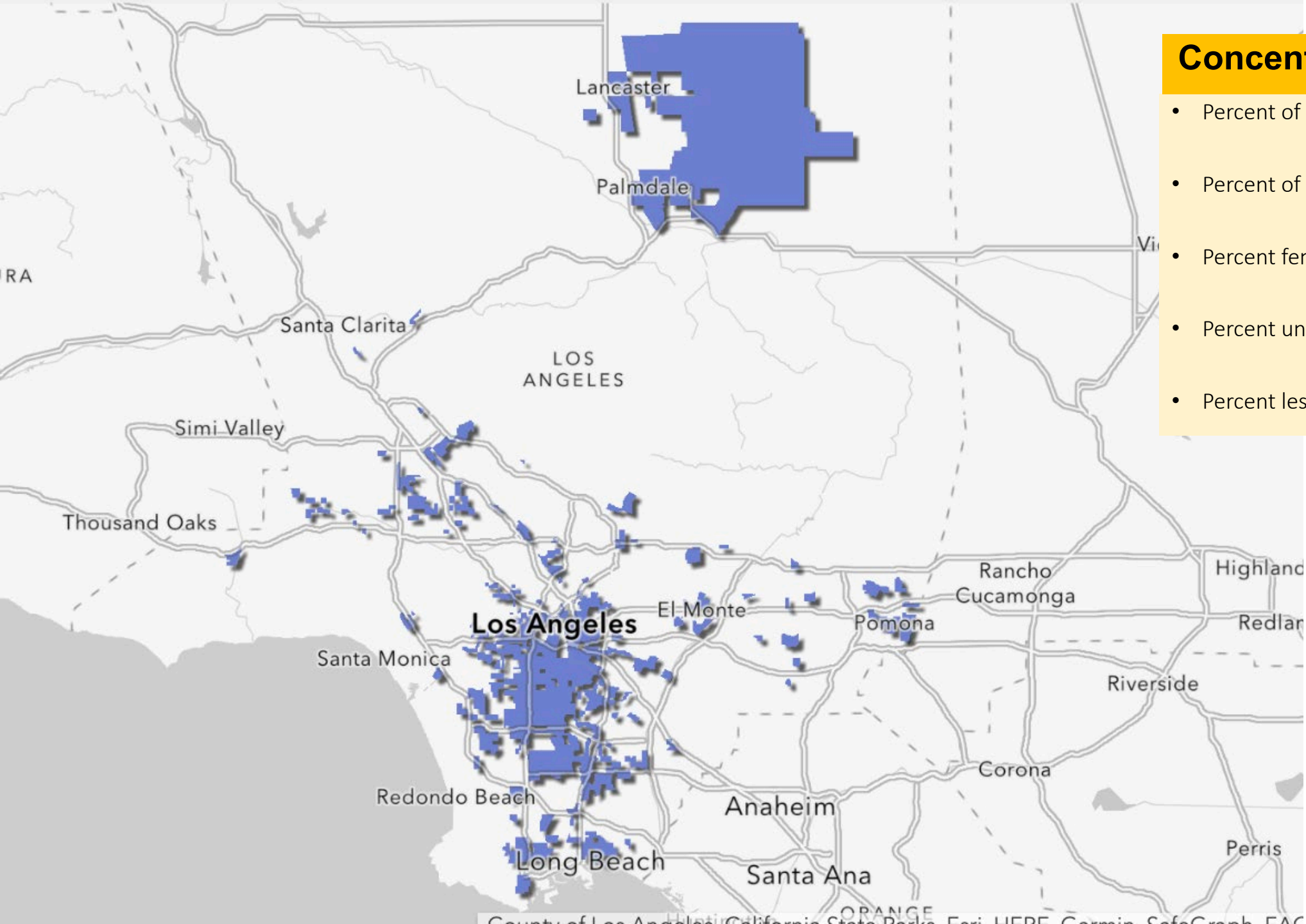

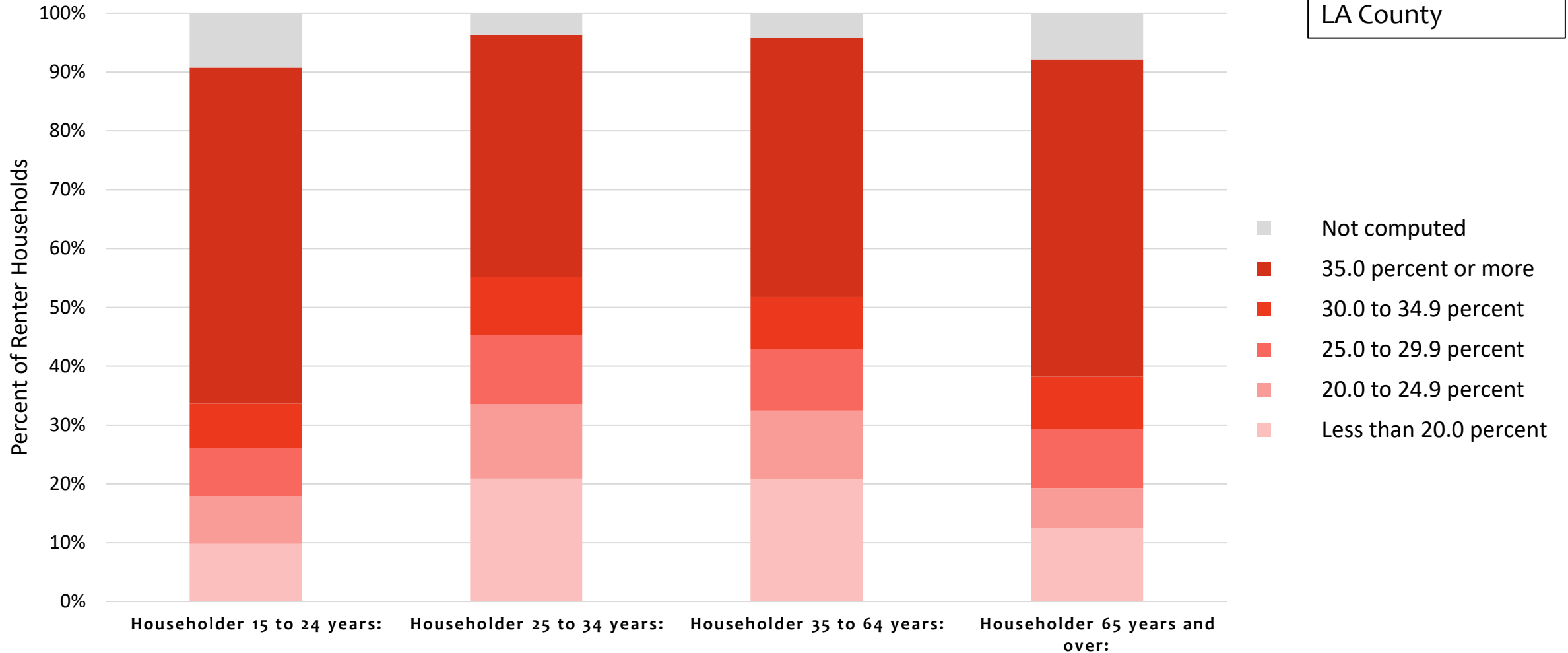

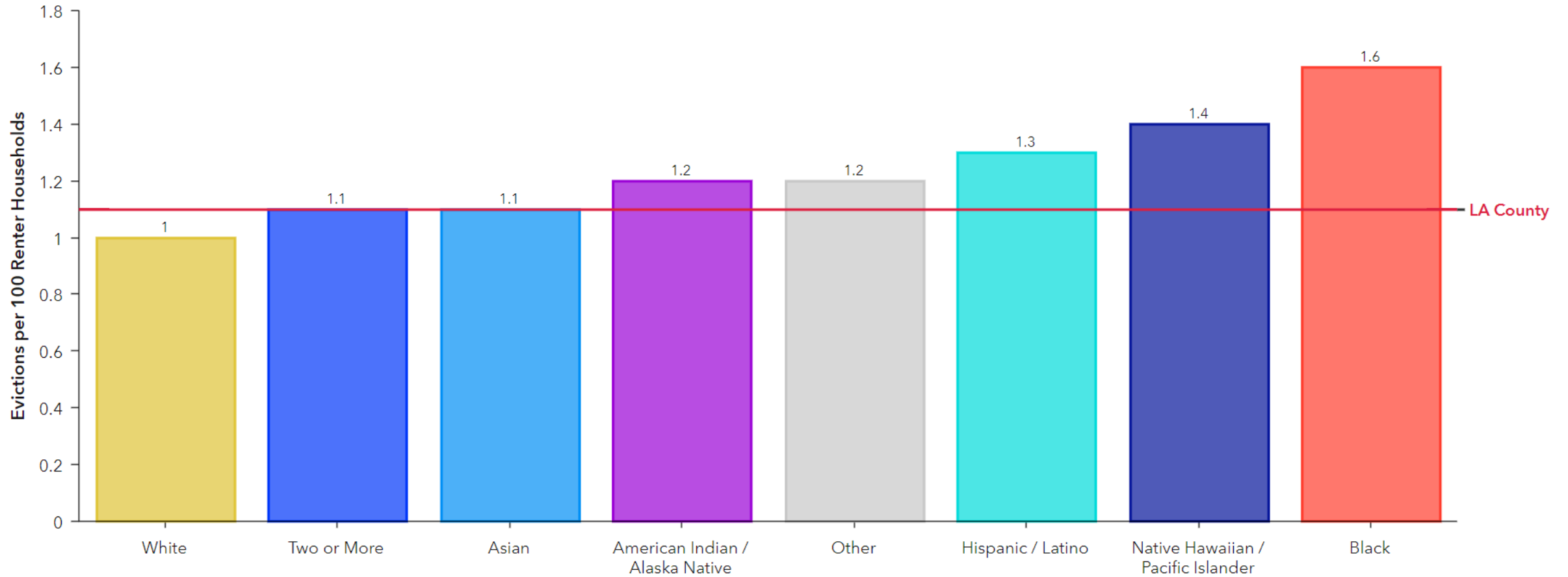
GROSS RENT AS A PERCENTAGE OF HOUSEHOLD INCOME

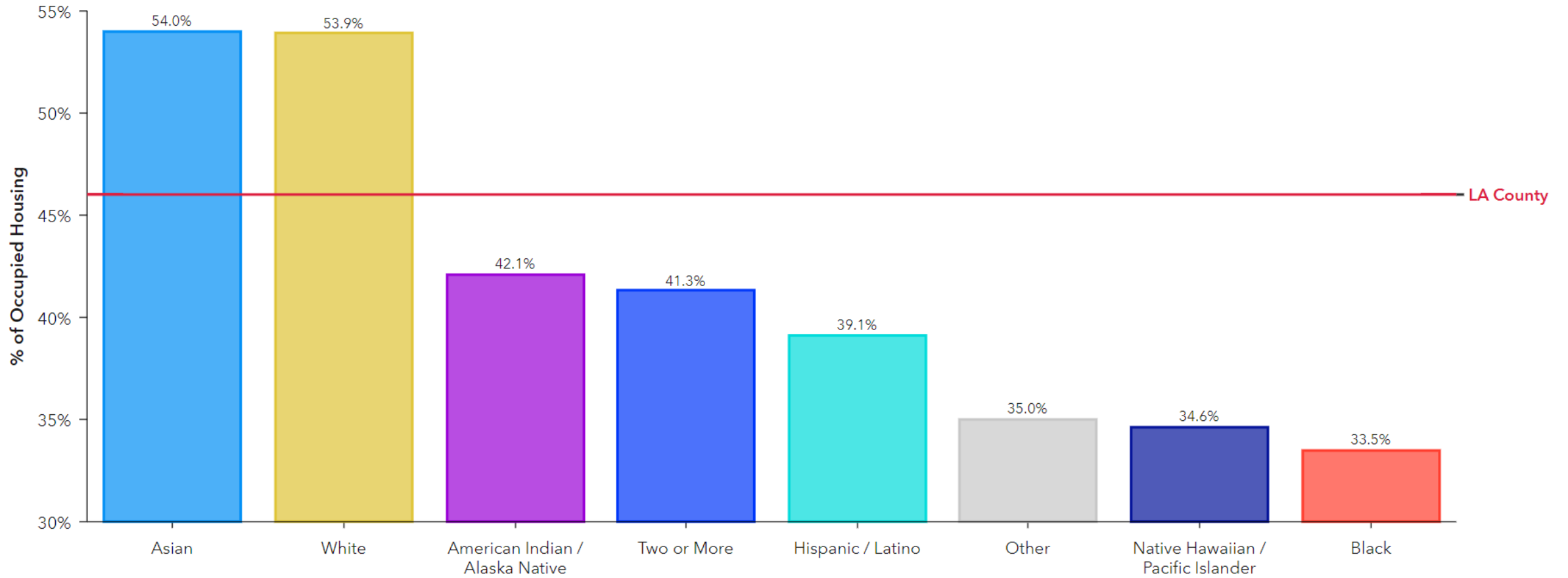

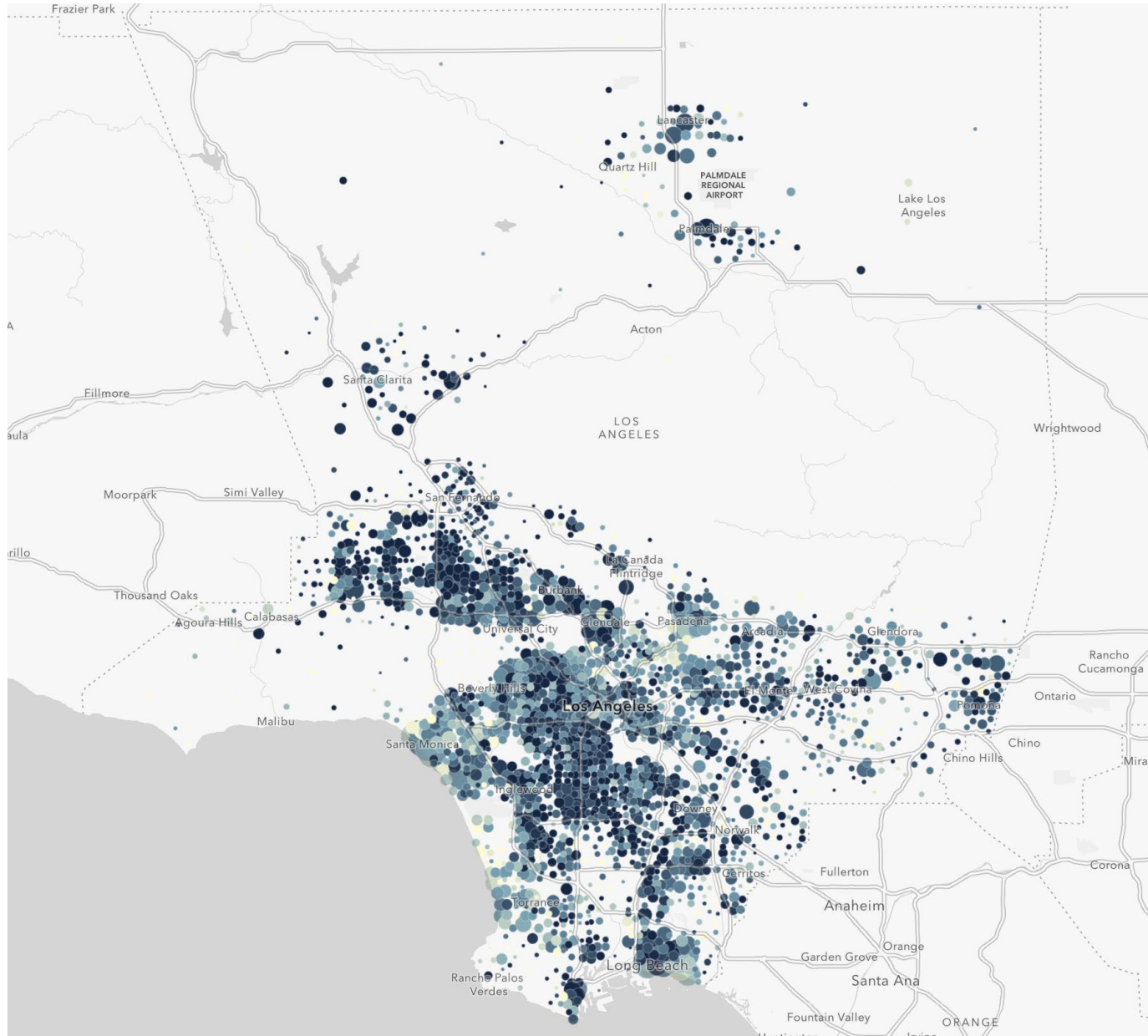

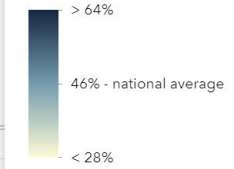

Percent of Renter Households for whom Gross Rent (Contract Rent Plus Tenant-Paid Utilities) is 30.0 Percent or More of Household Income

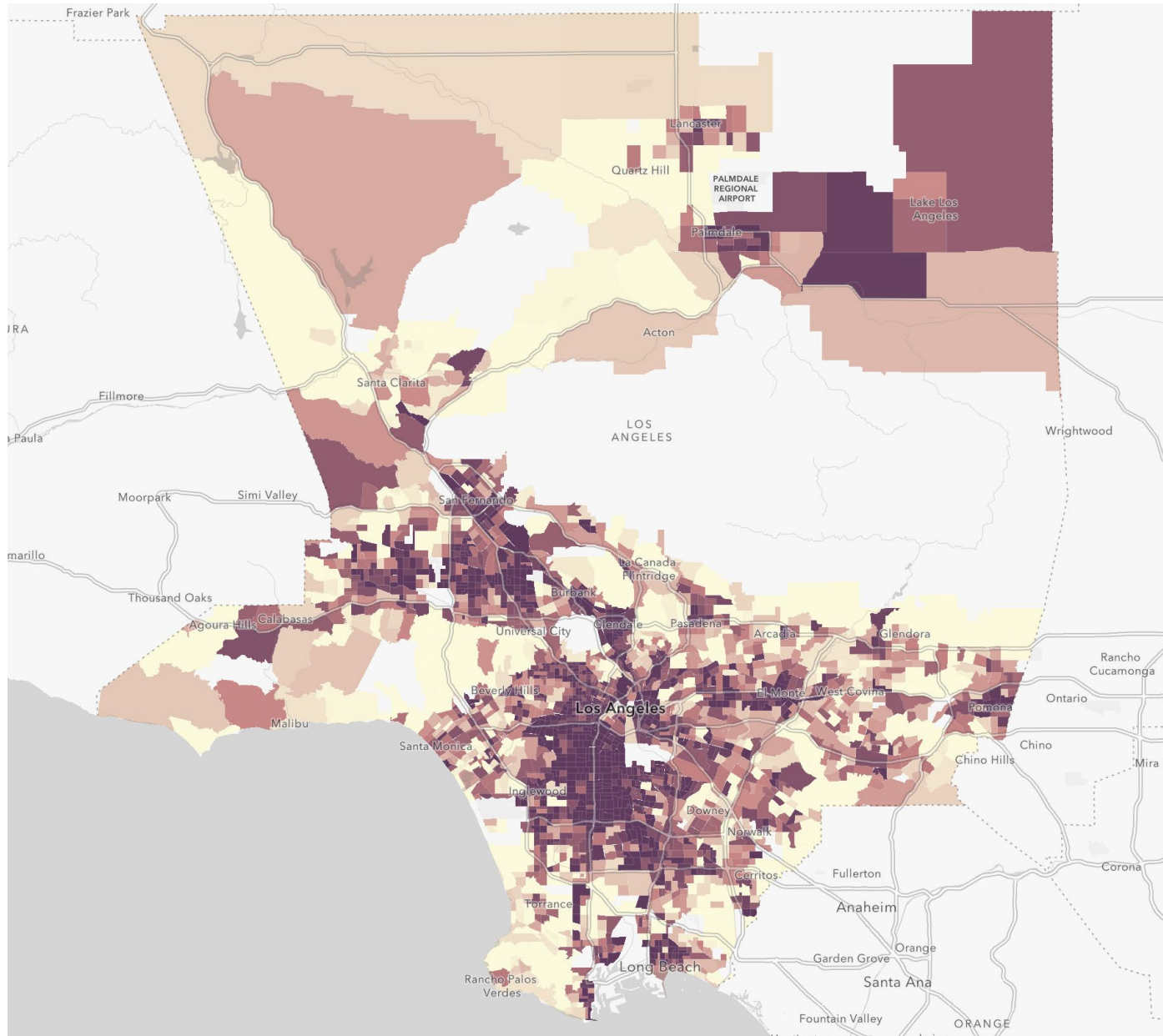


Total Renter-Occupied Housing Units (Renter Households)

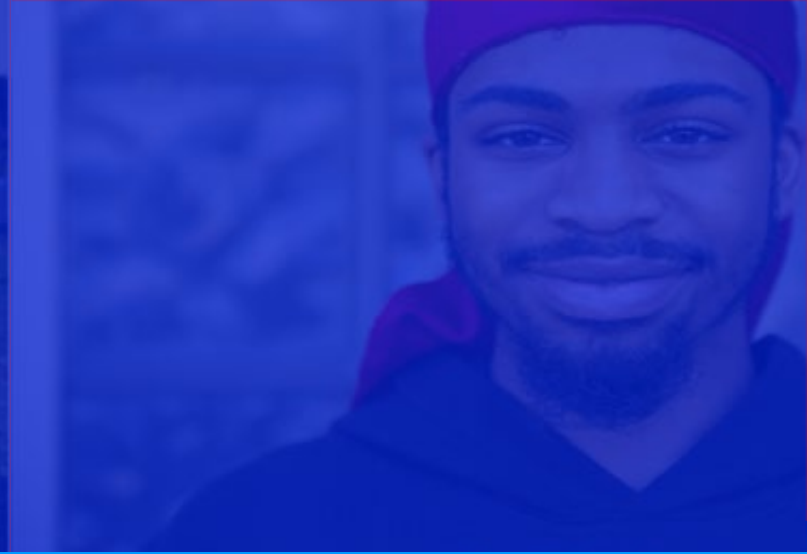

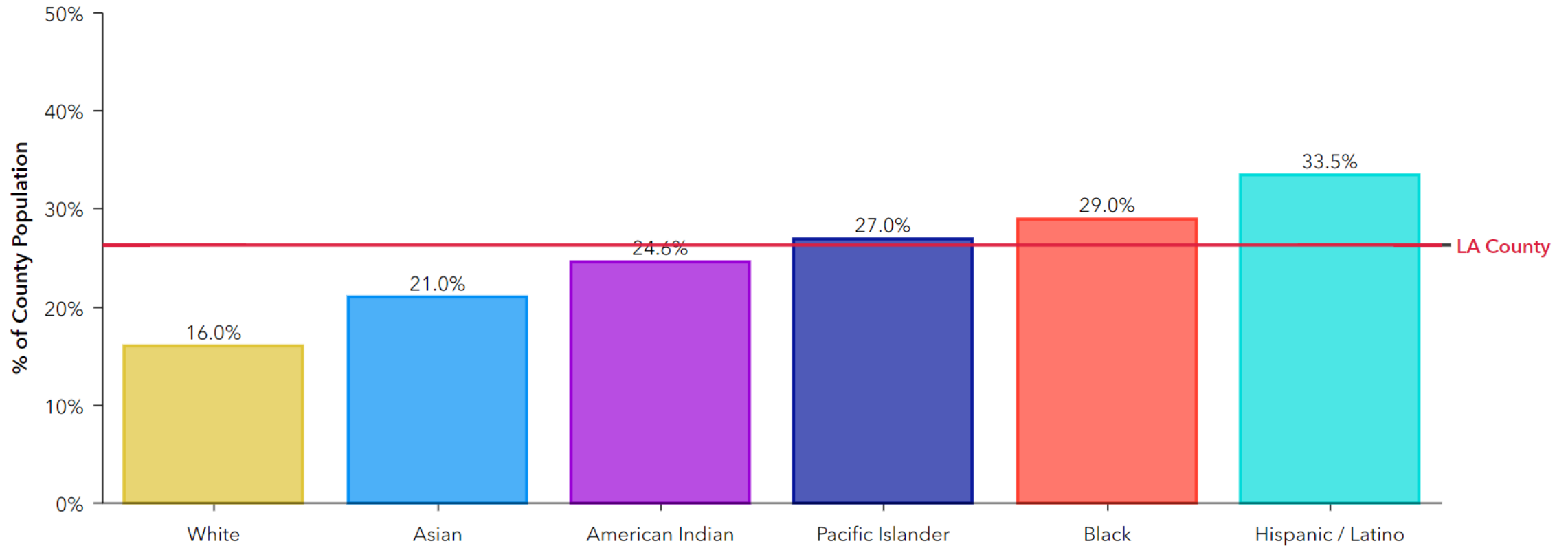

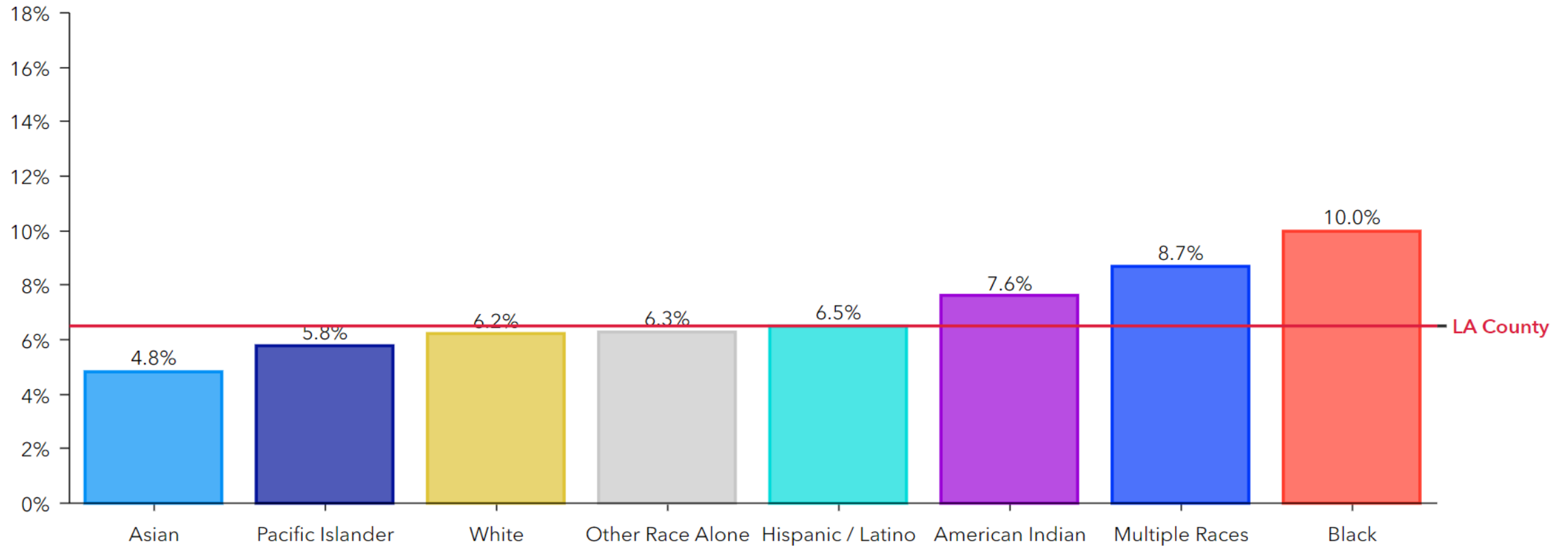


Population and Poverty Estimates of Los Angeles County, 2021

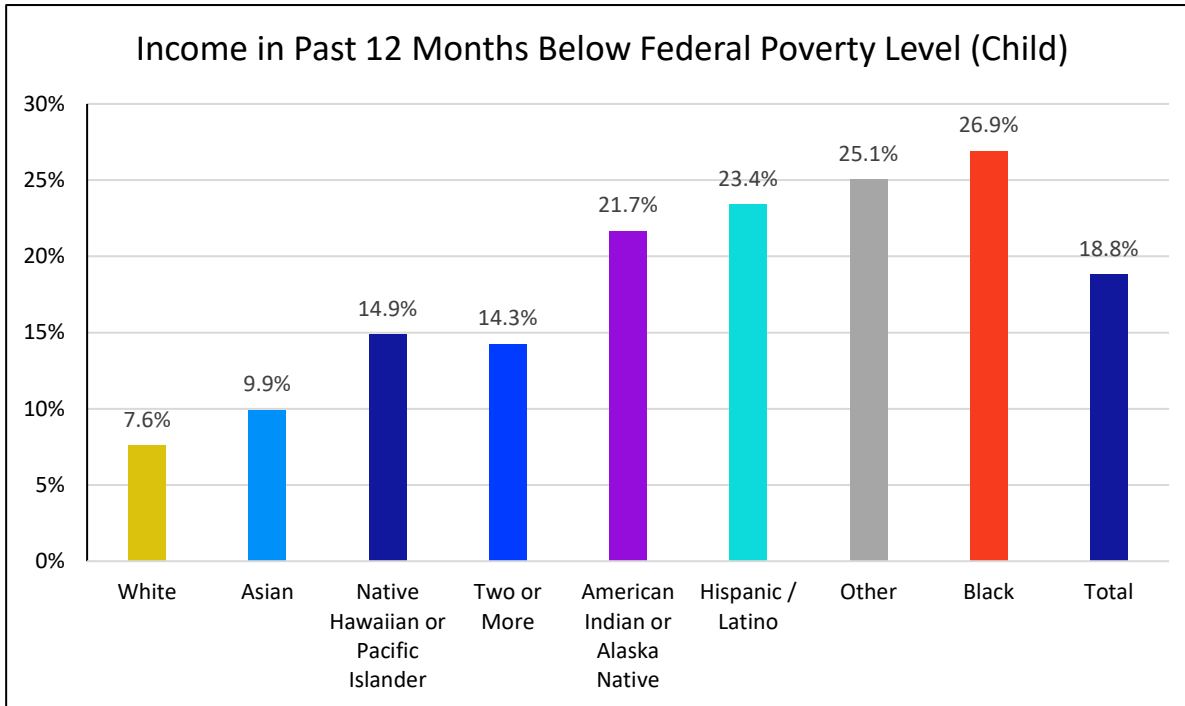

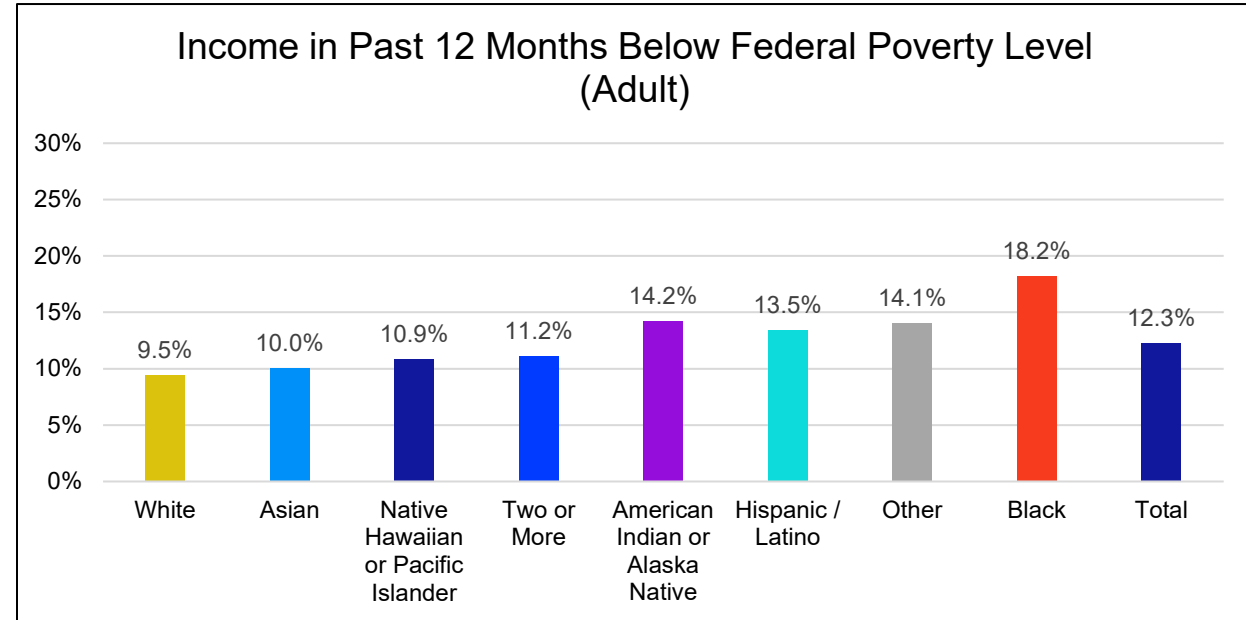

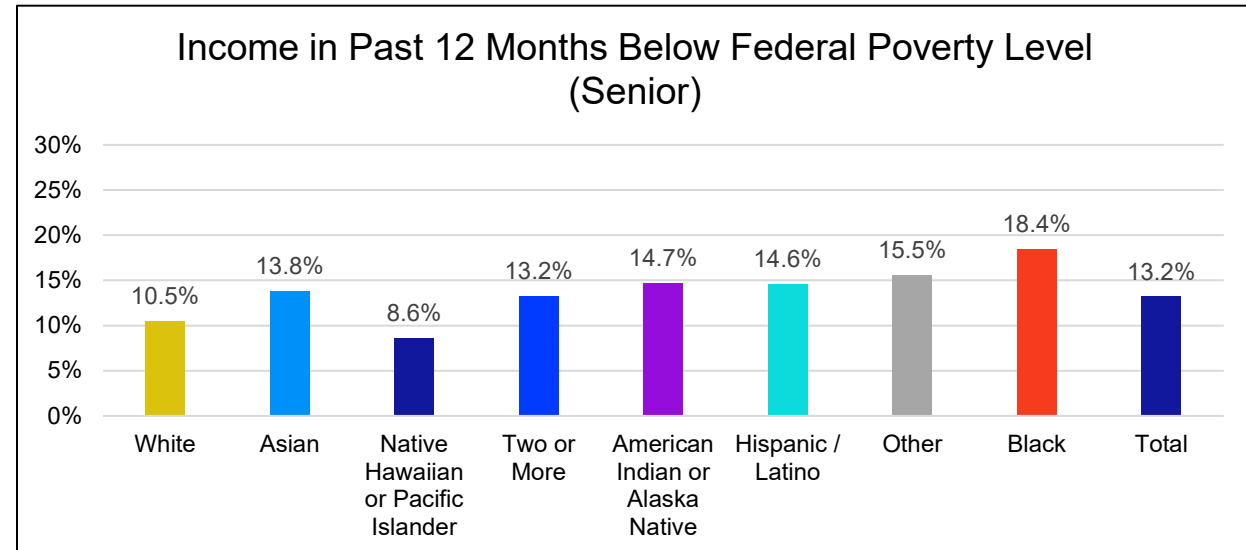
Income in Past 12 Months Below Federal Poverty Level (Child)

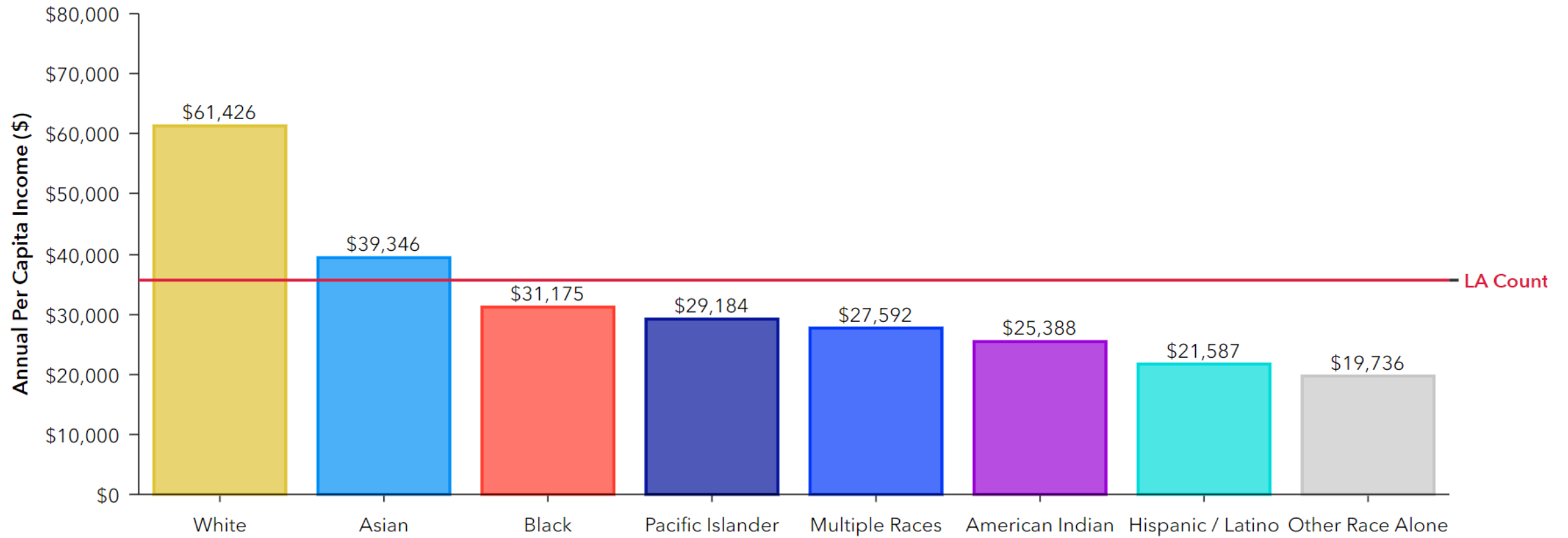

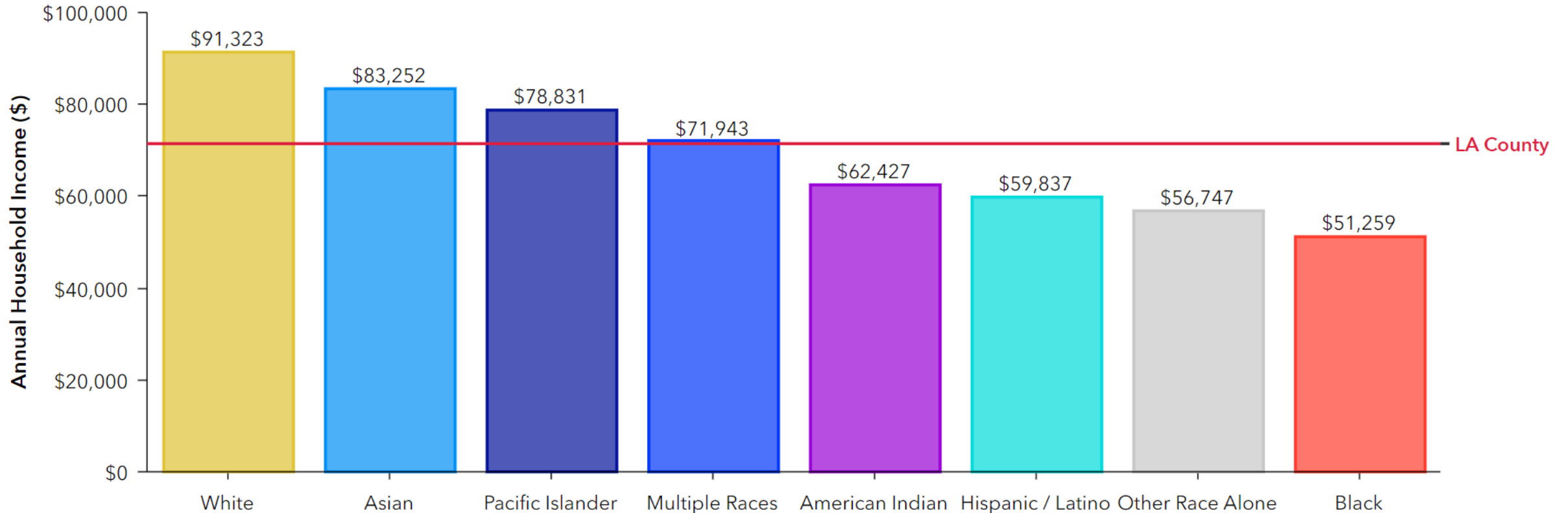

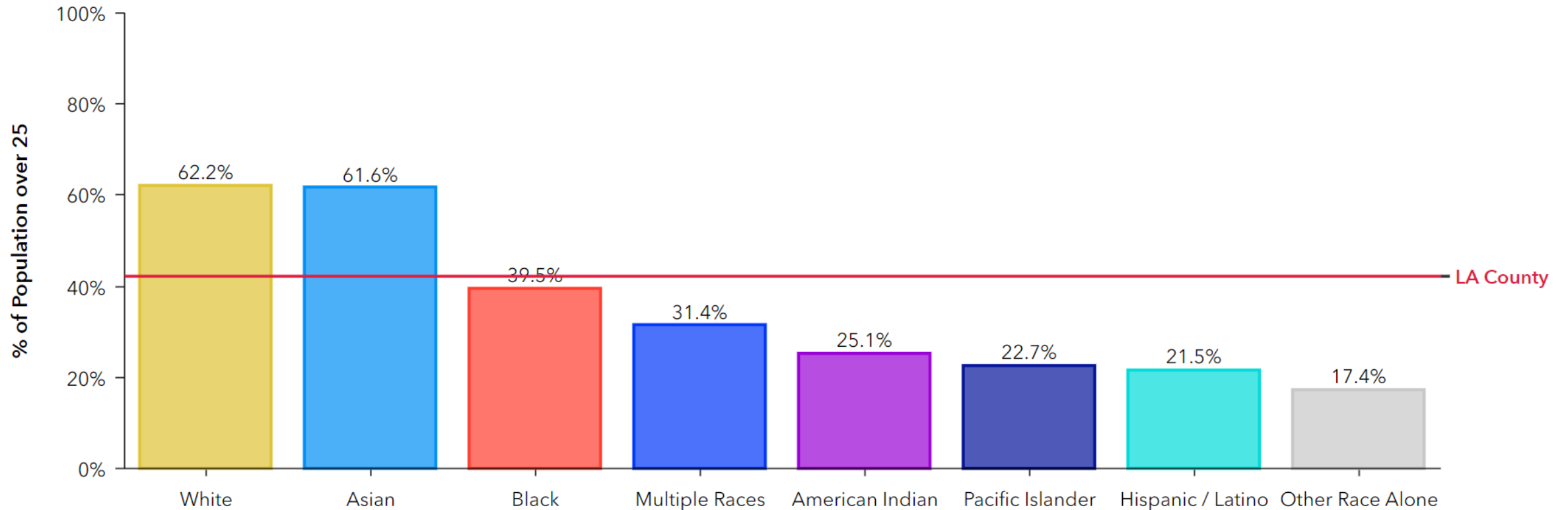

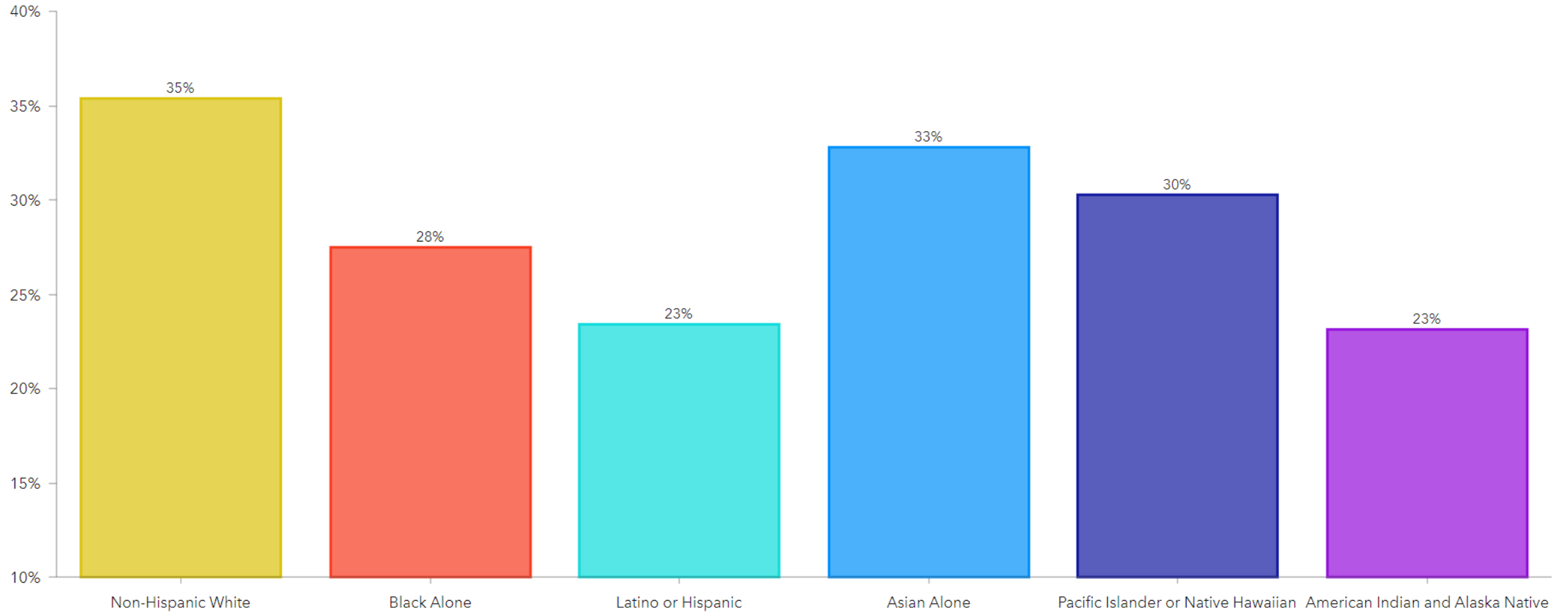

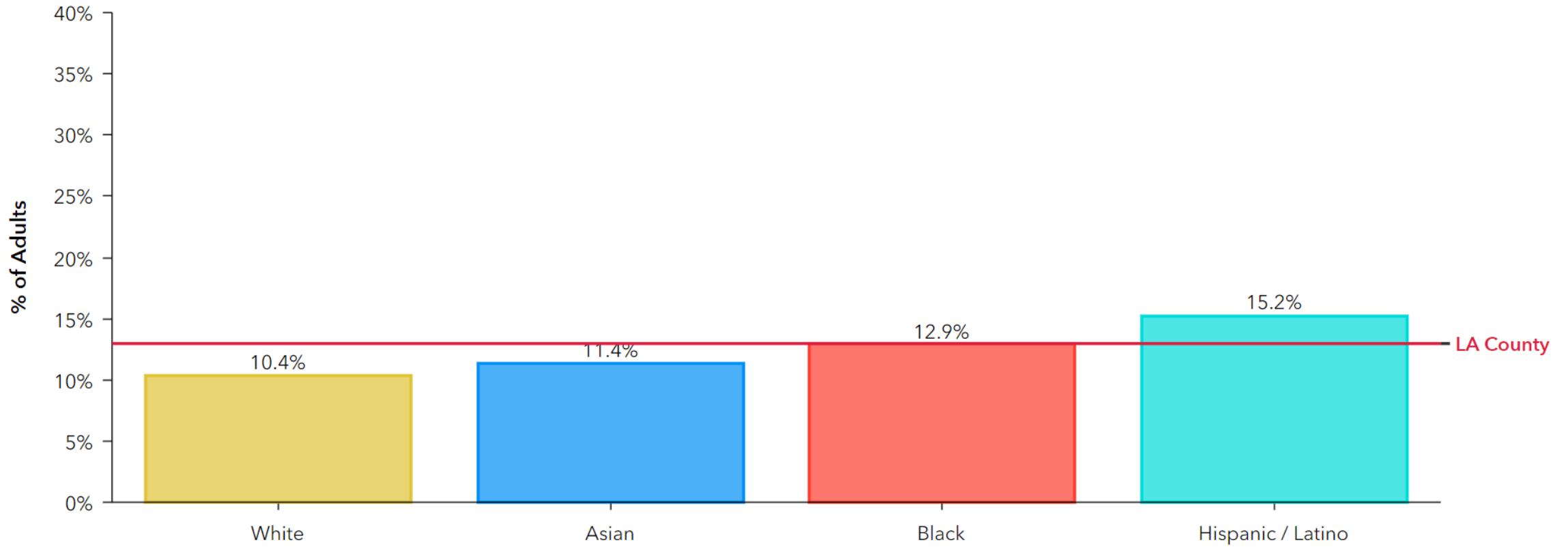

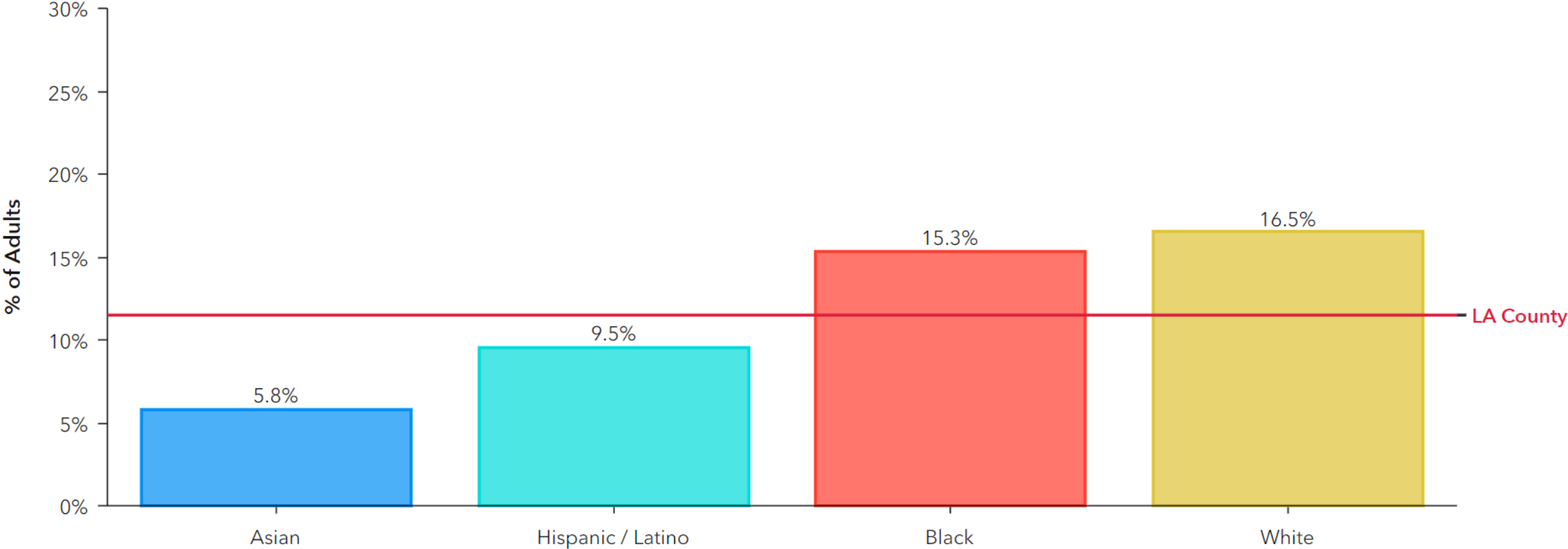

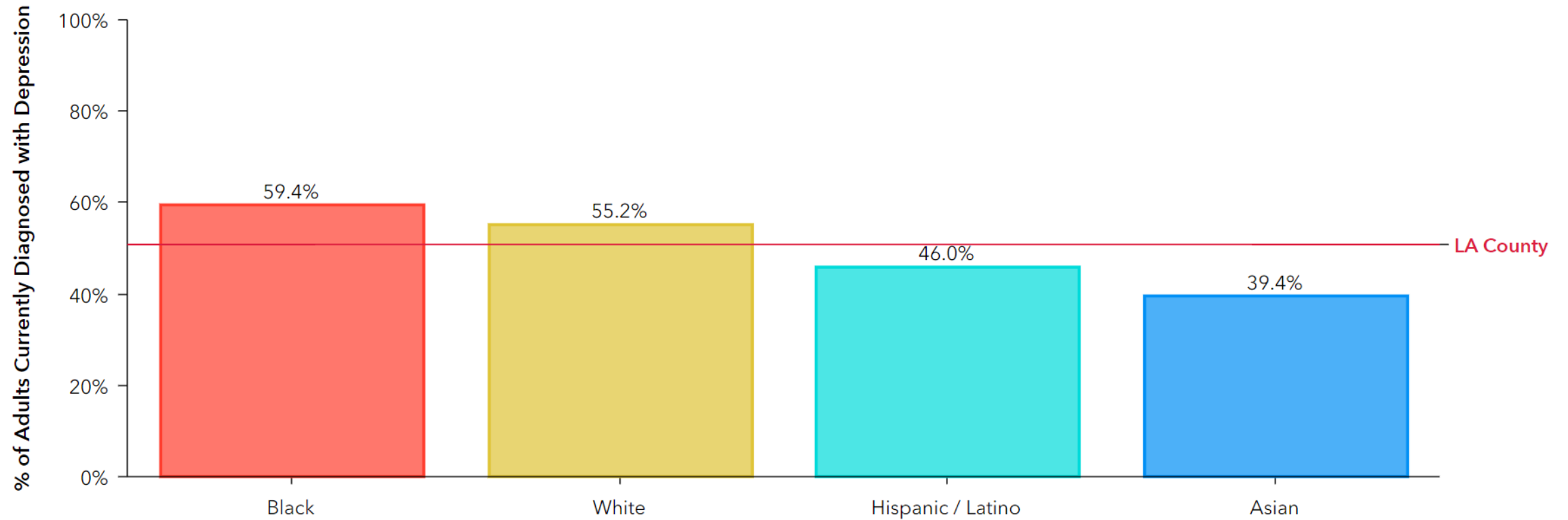
% Currently Depressed

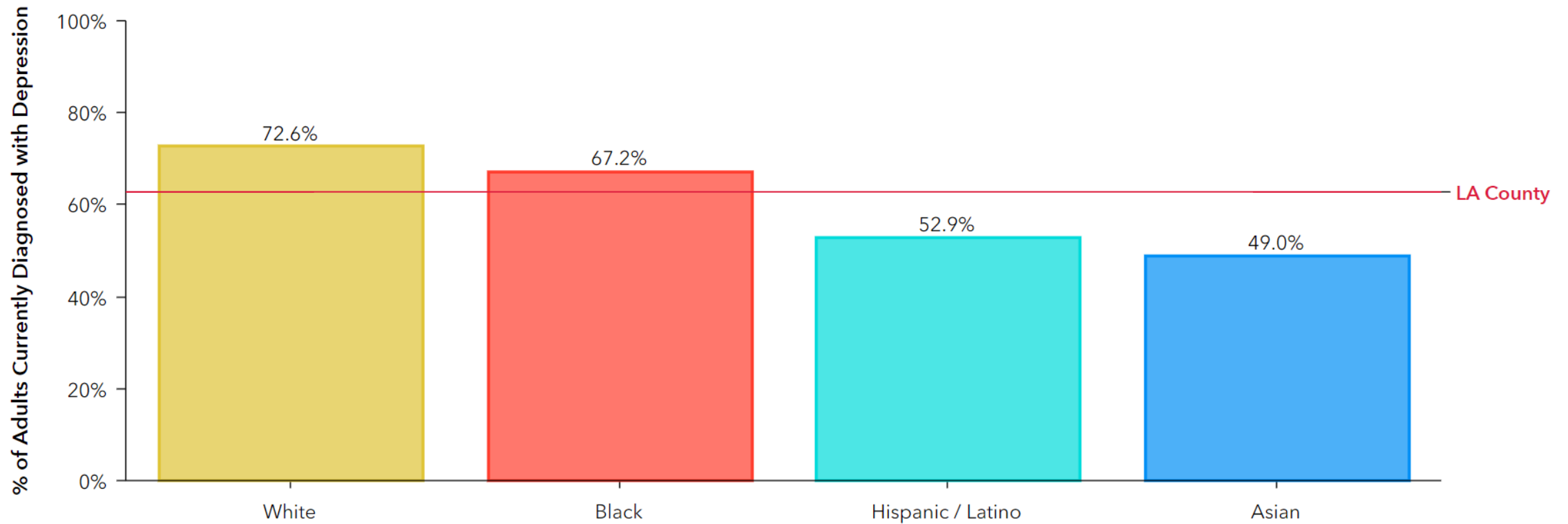

of adults currently diagnosed with depression



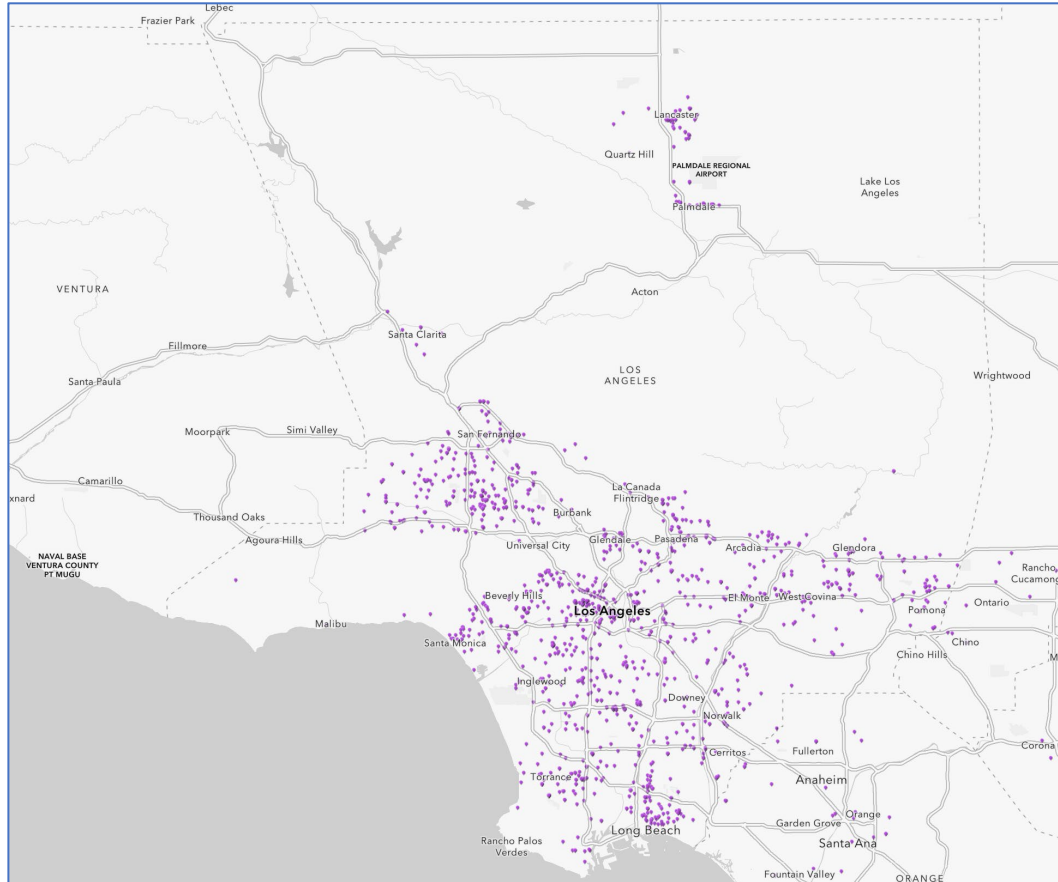

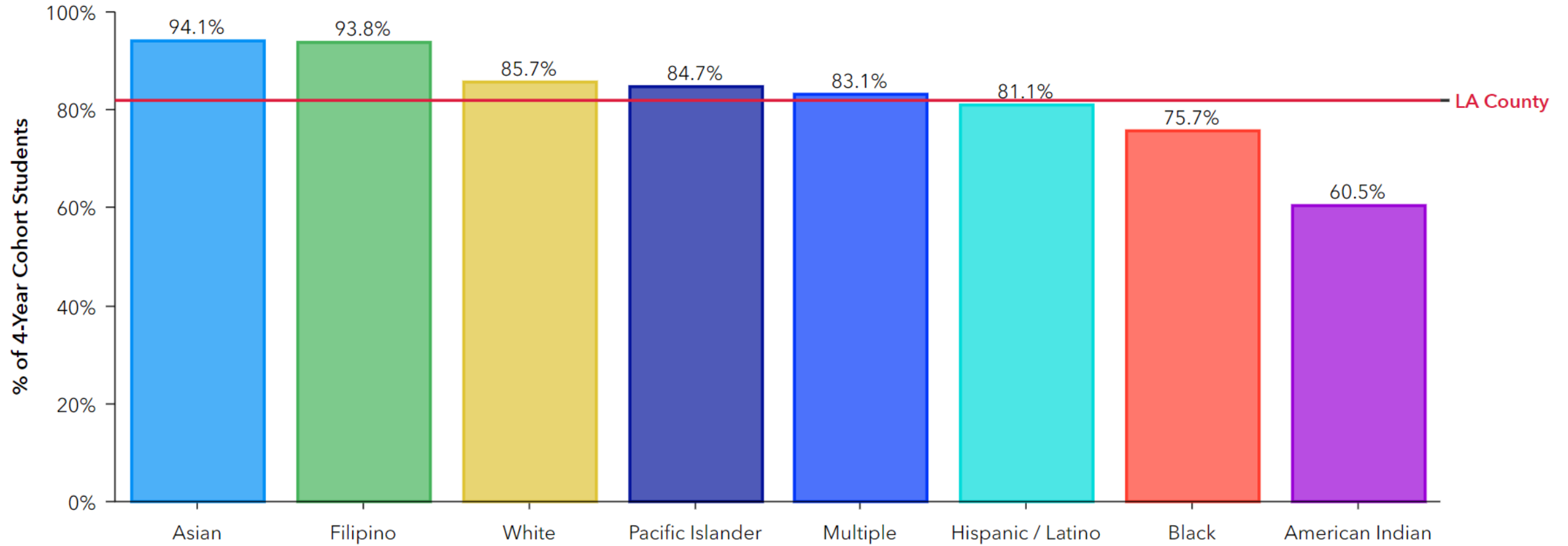

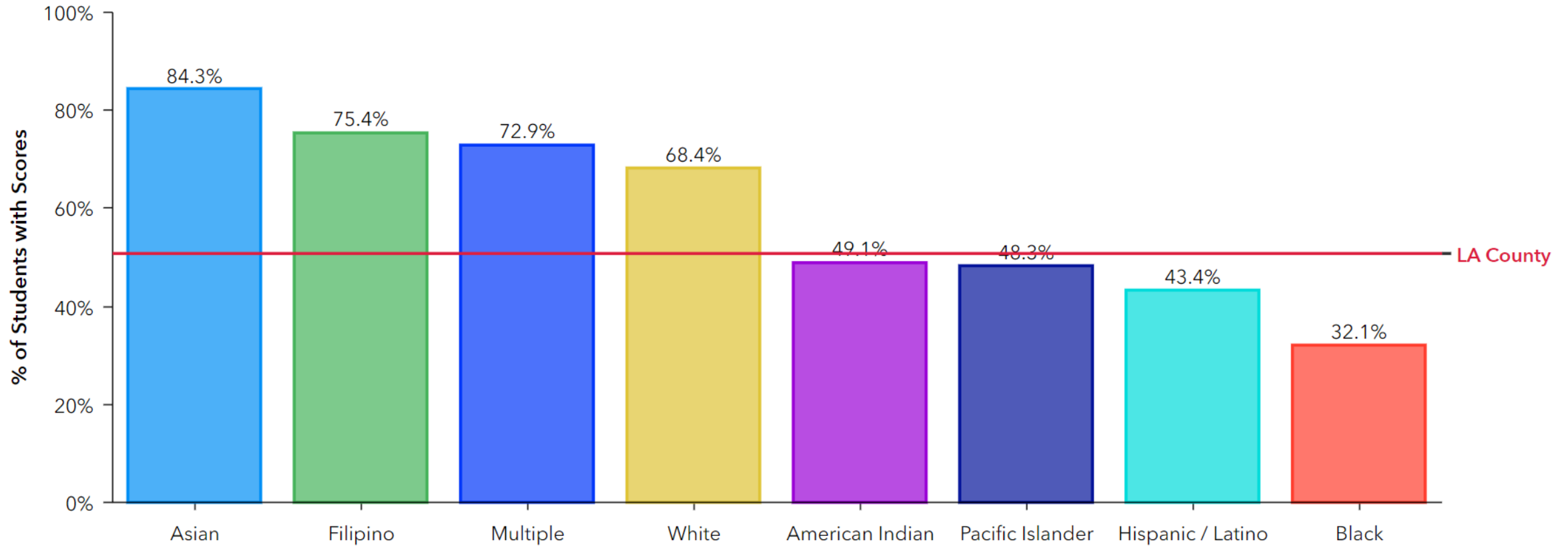
High School Graduation Rate

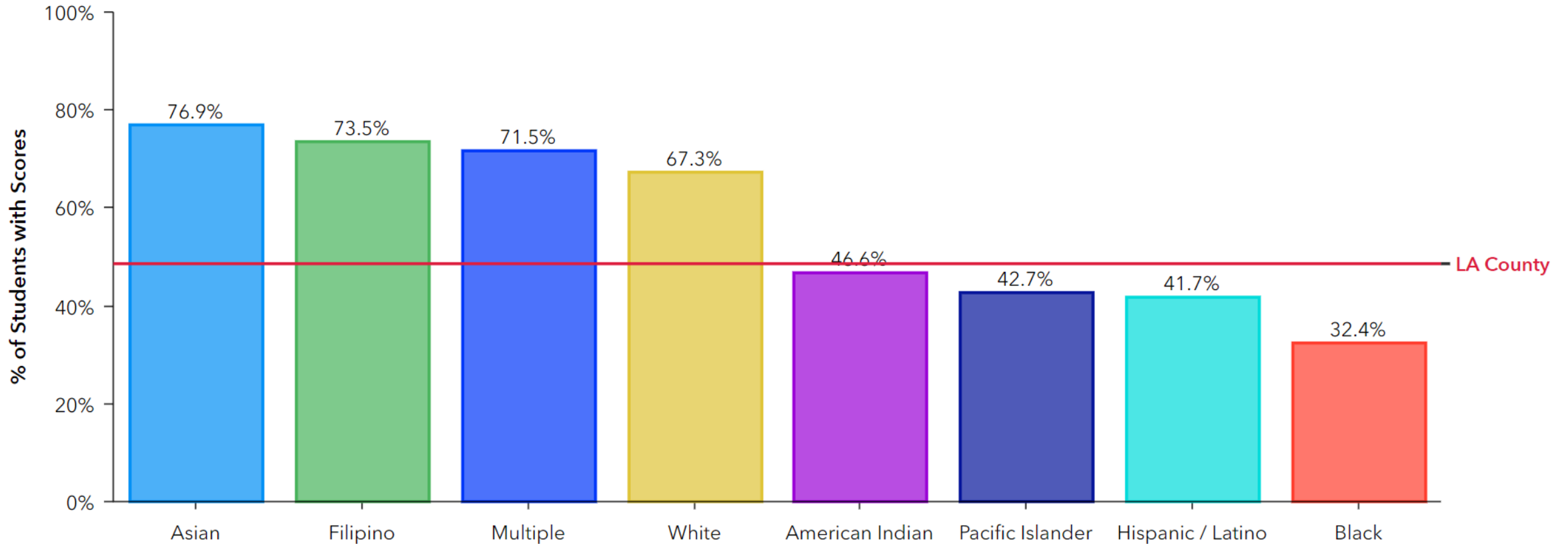
3rd Grade Math Test Scores: Met or Exceeded Standard

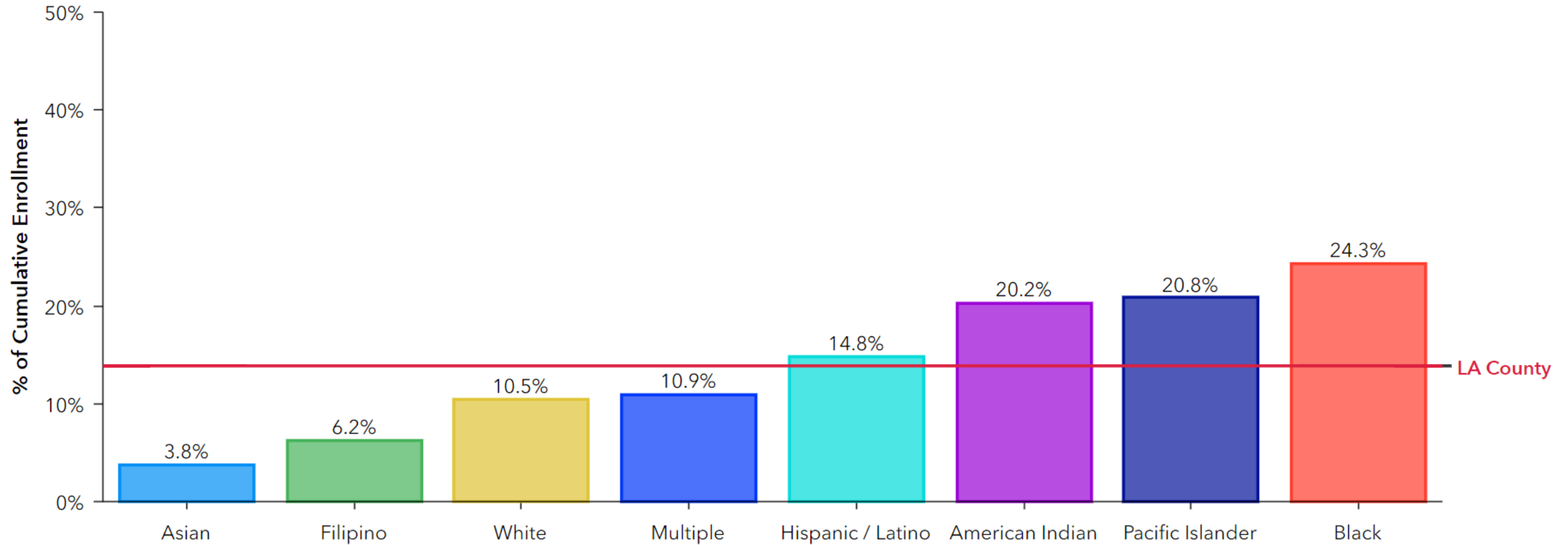

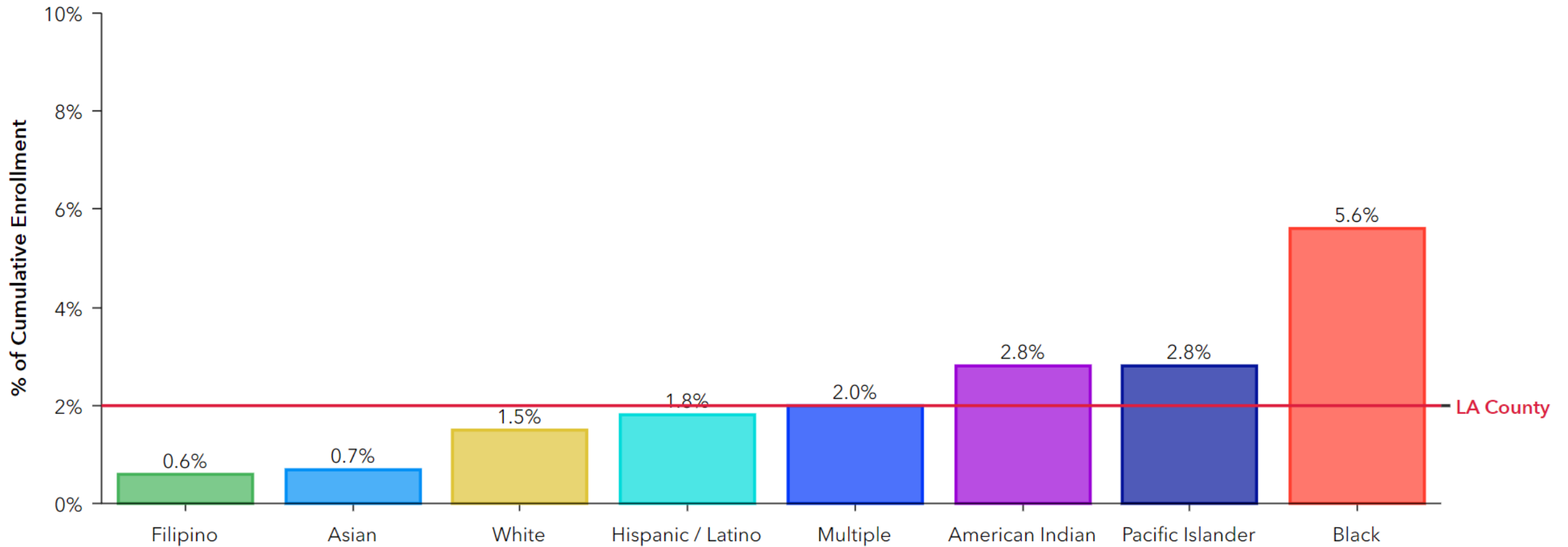

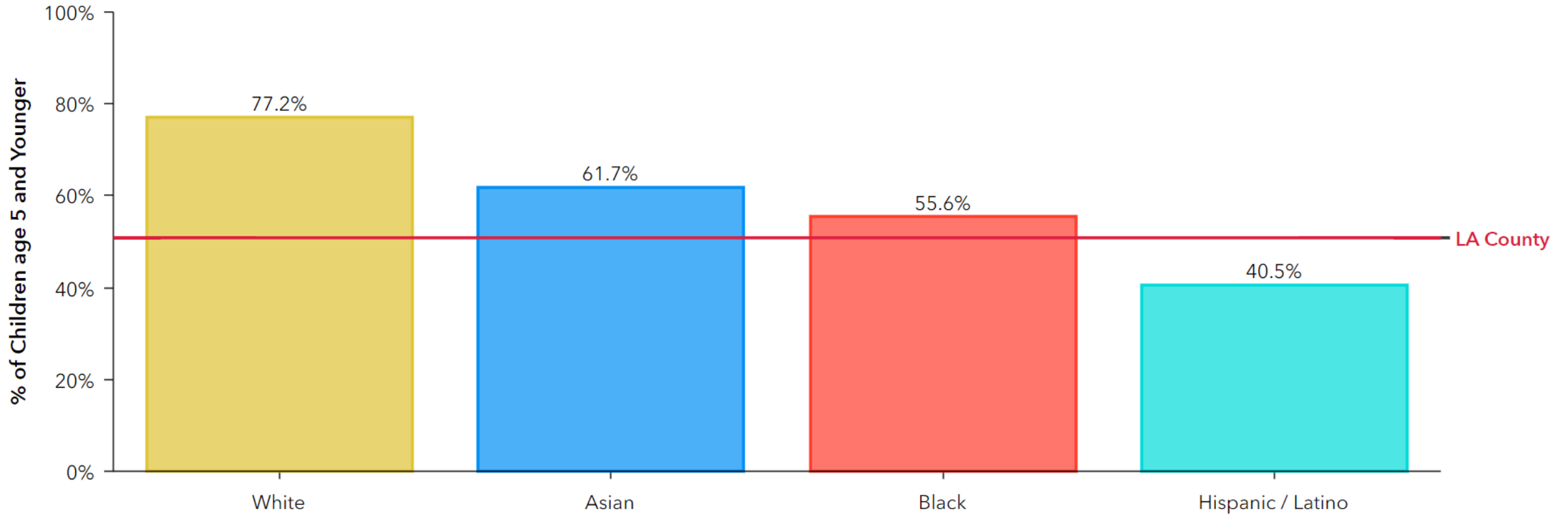

Percent of Children Who Are in Any Kind of Childcare

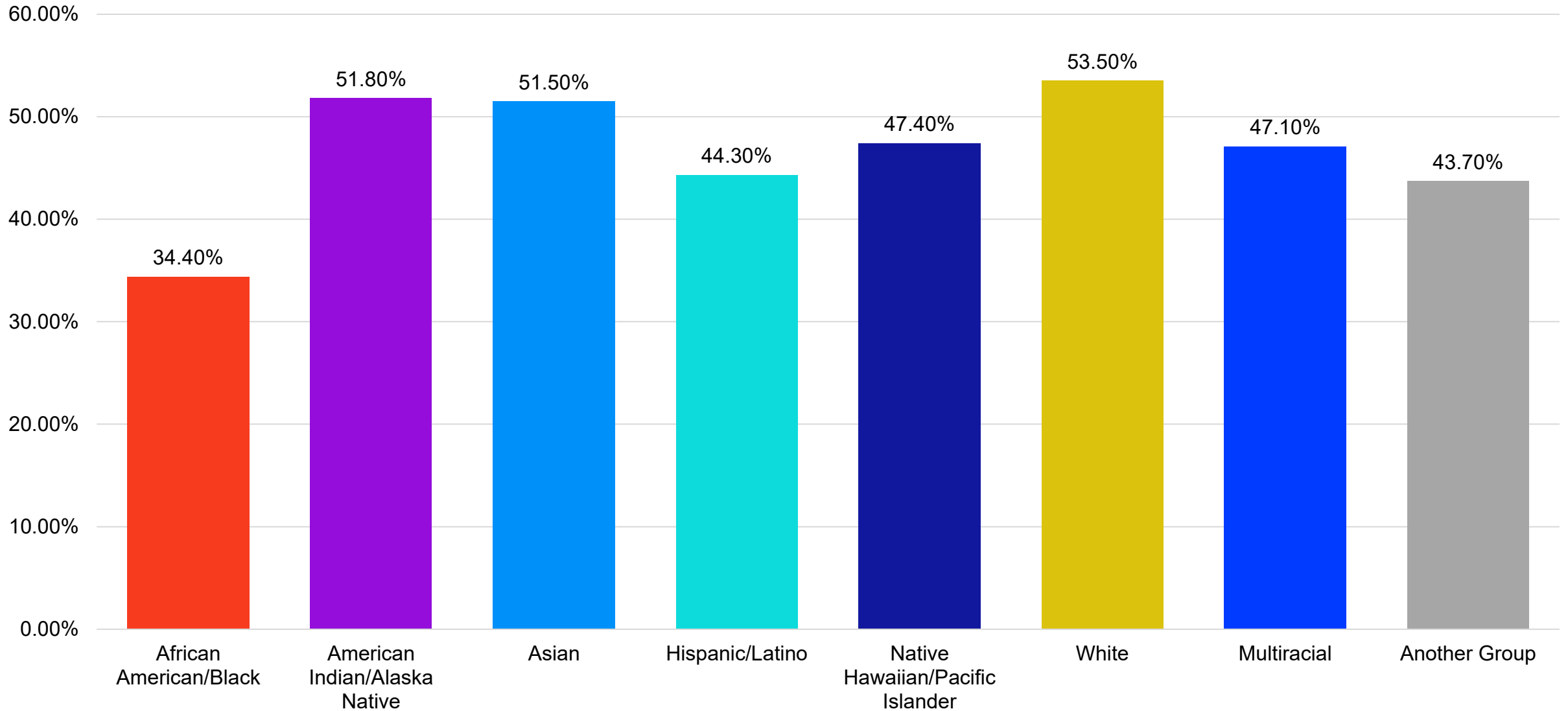

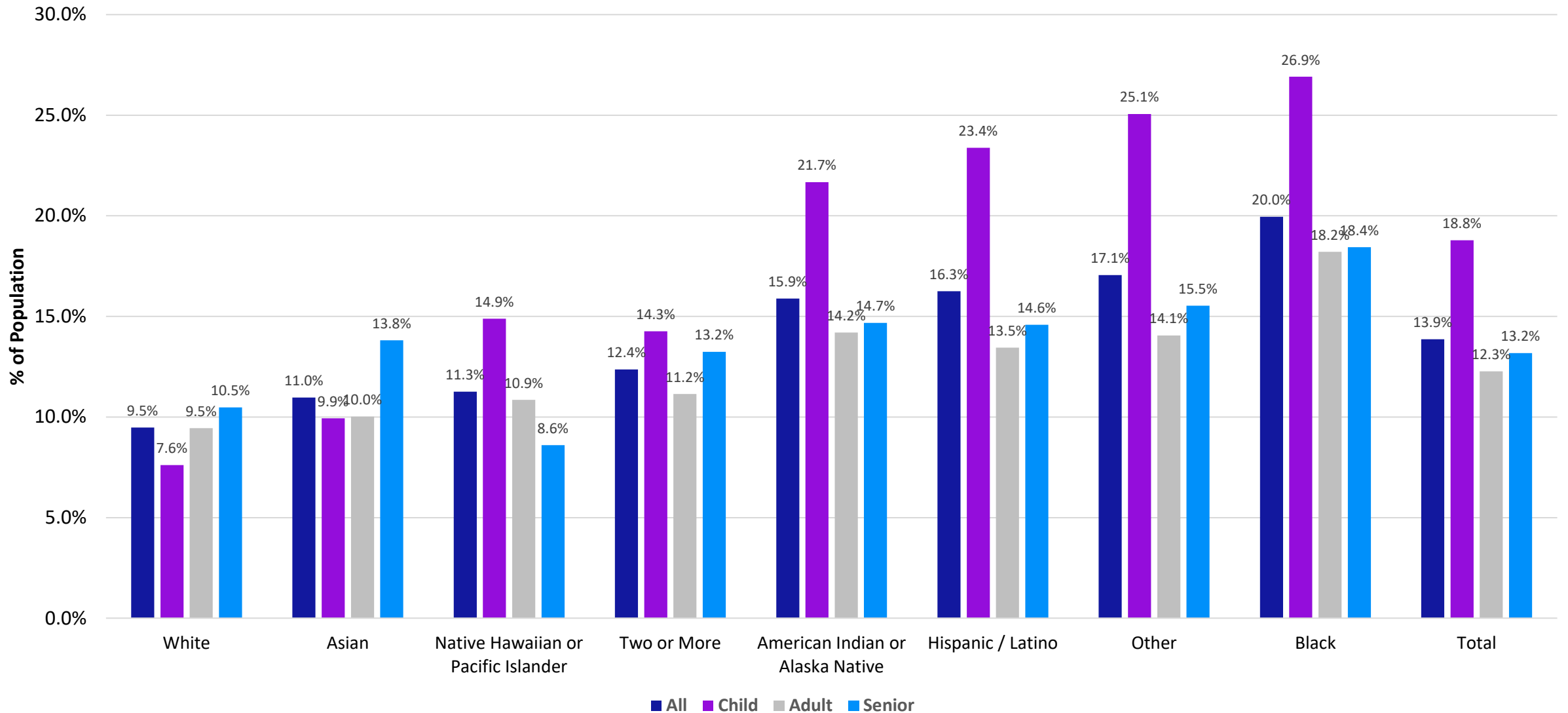

Poverty Rate by Life Stage

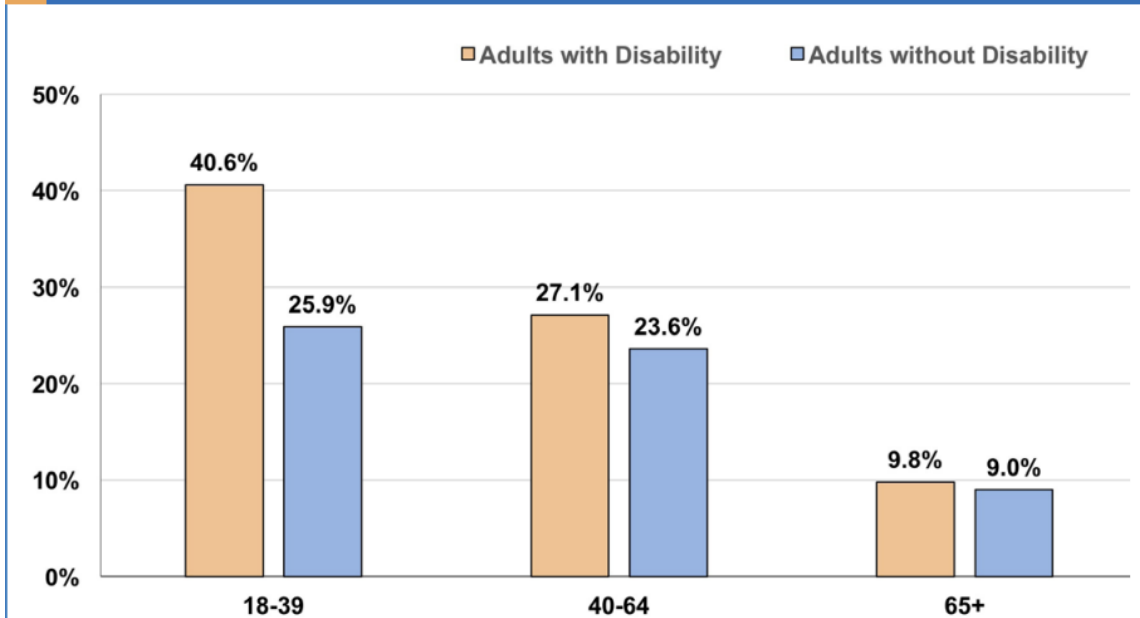

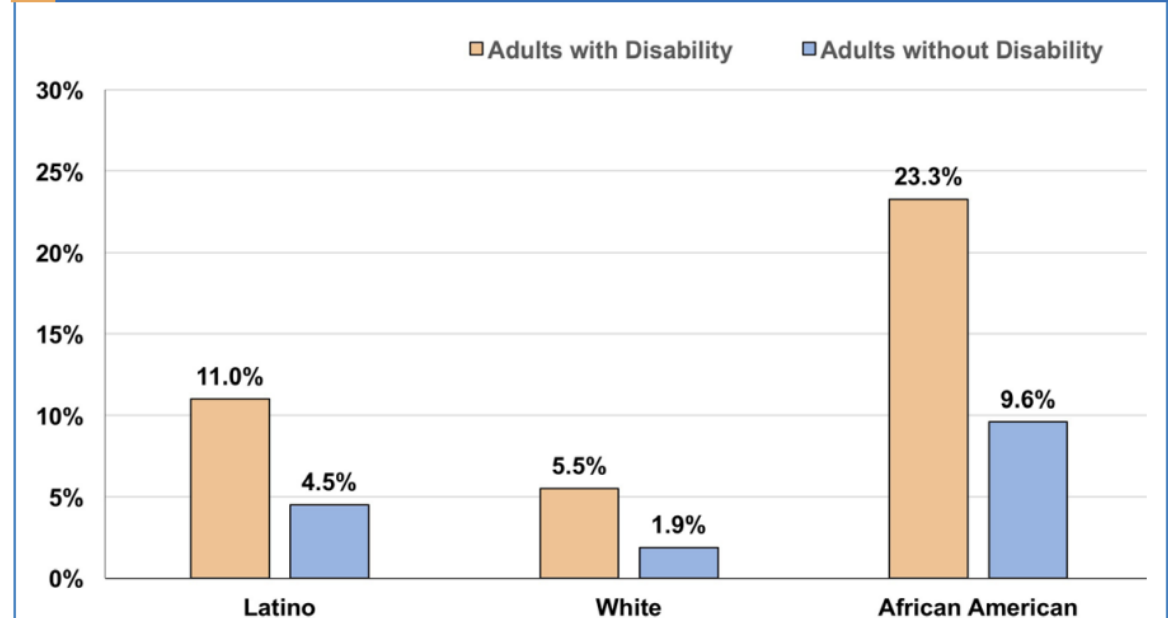

Figure 6. Prevalence of Difficulty Obtaining Care by Age Group and Disability Status

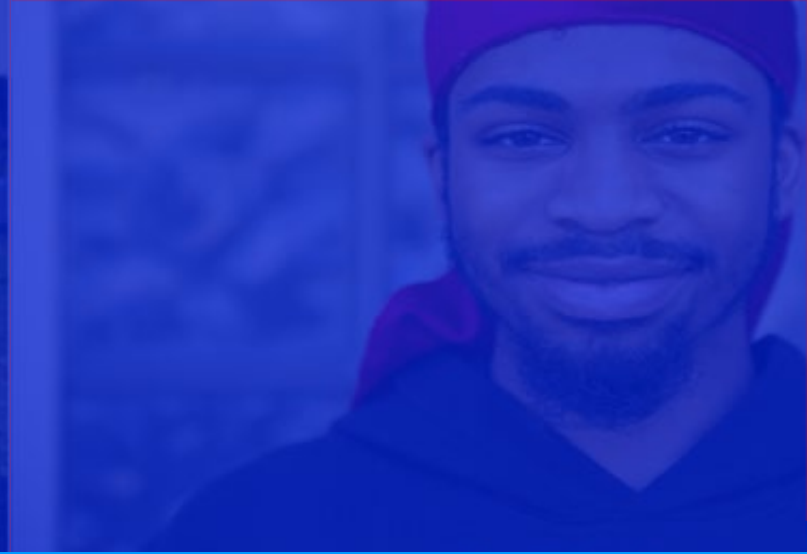

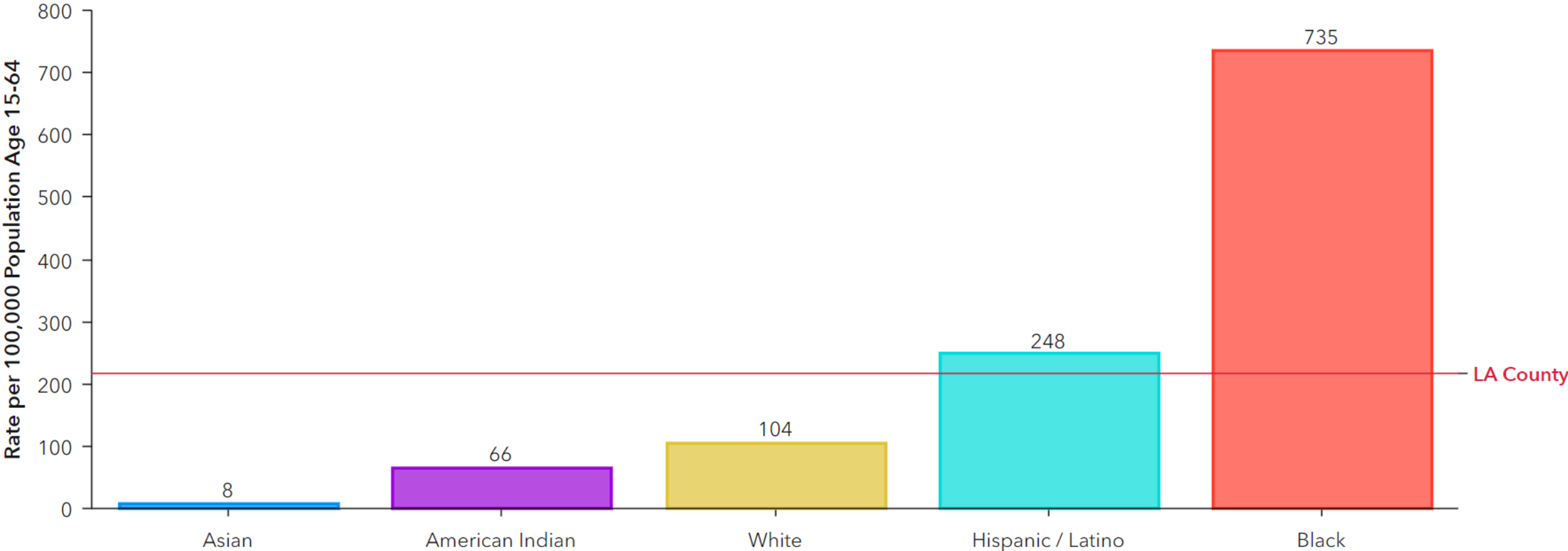

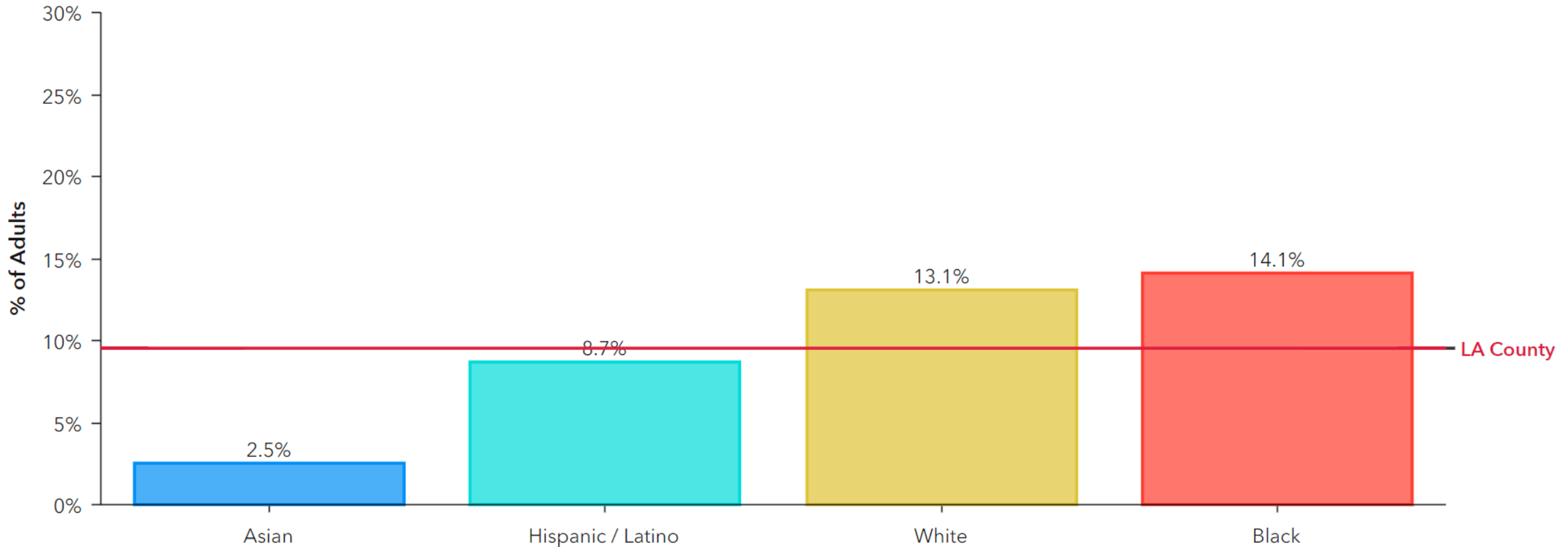
Incarceration Rate (Jail) Per 100,000 Population Age 15-64

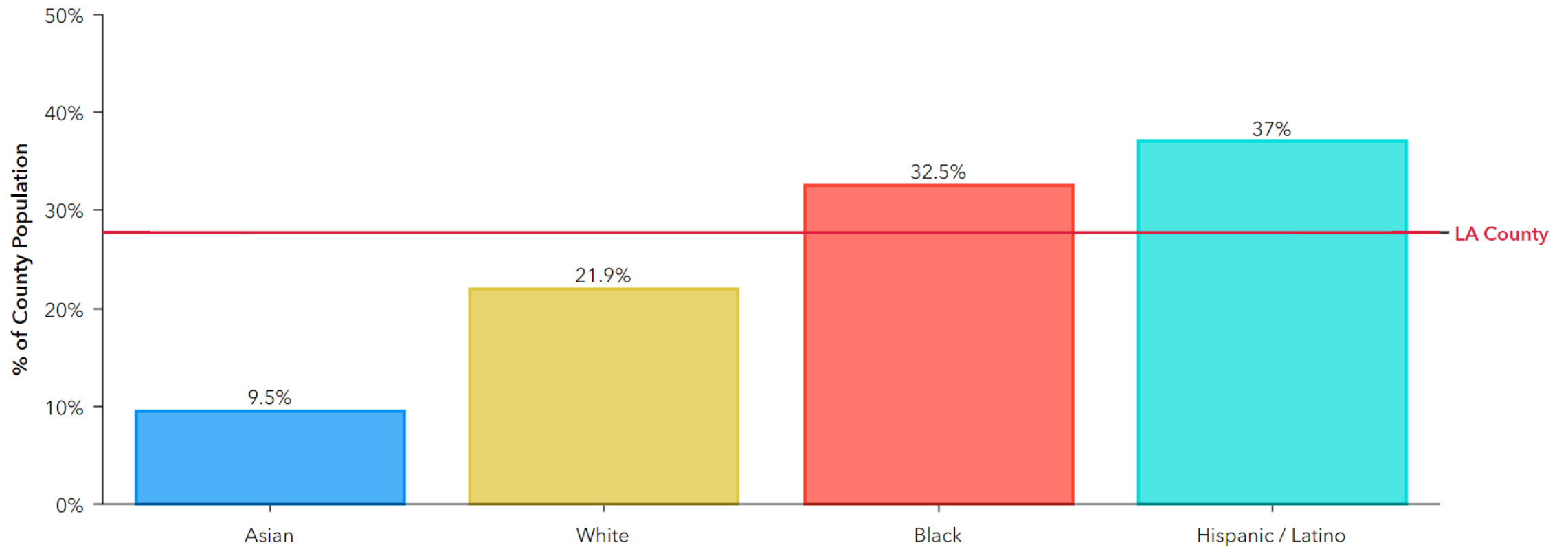

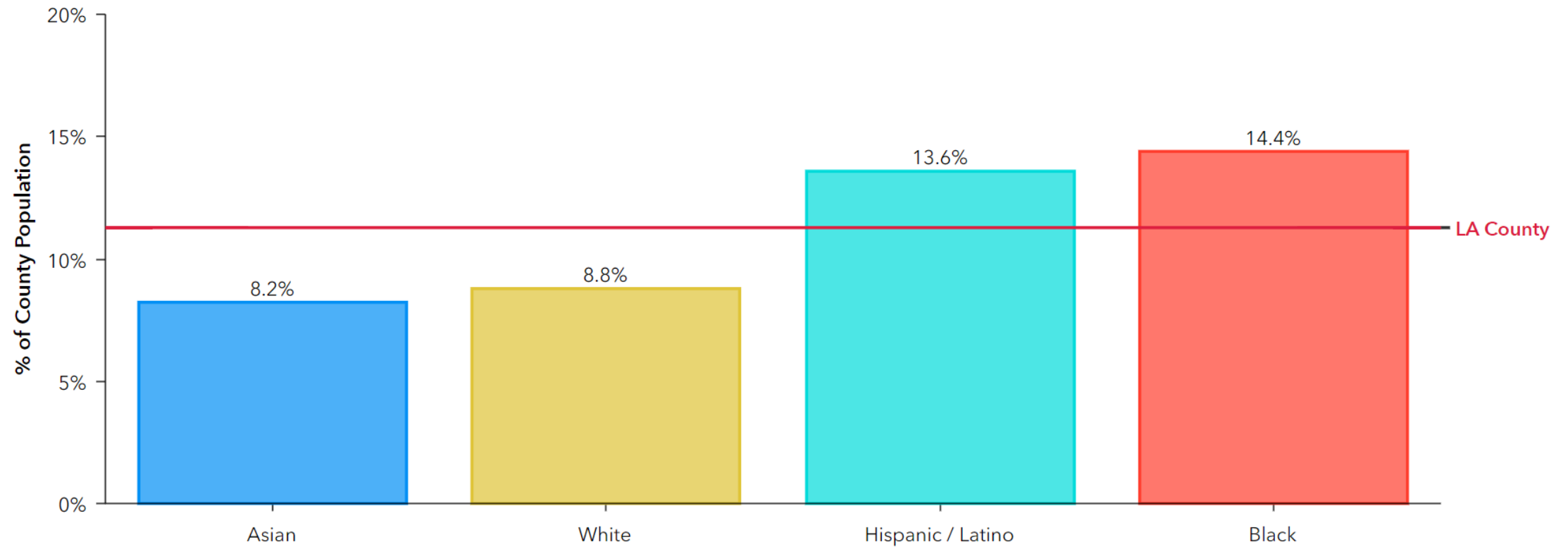

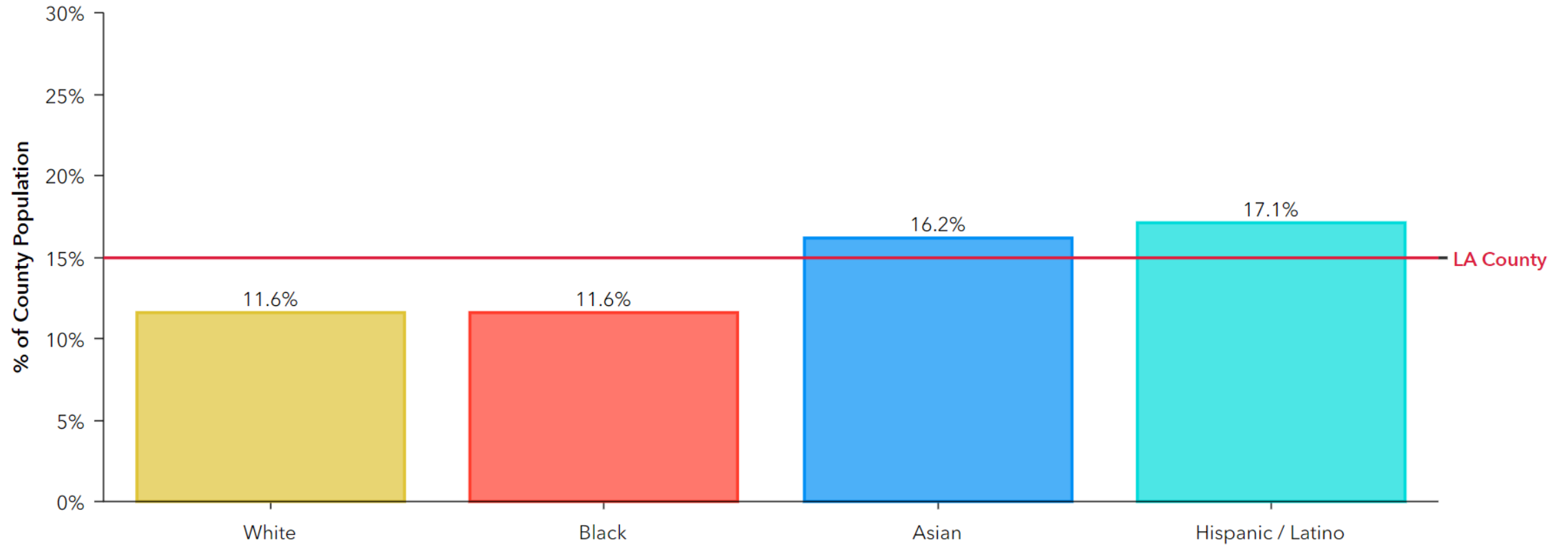

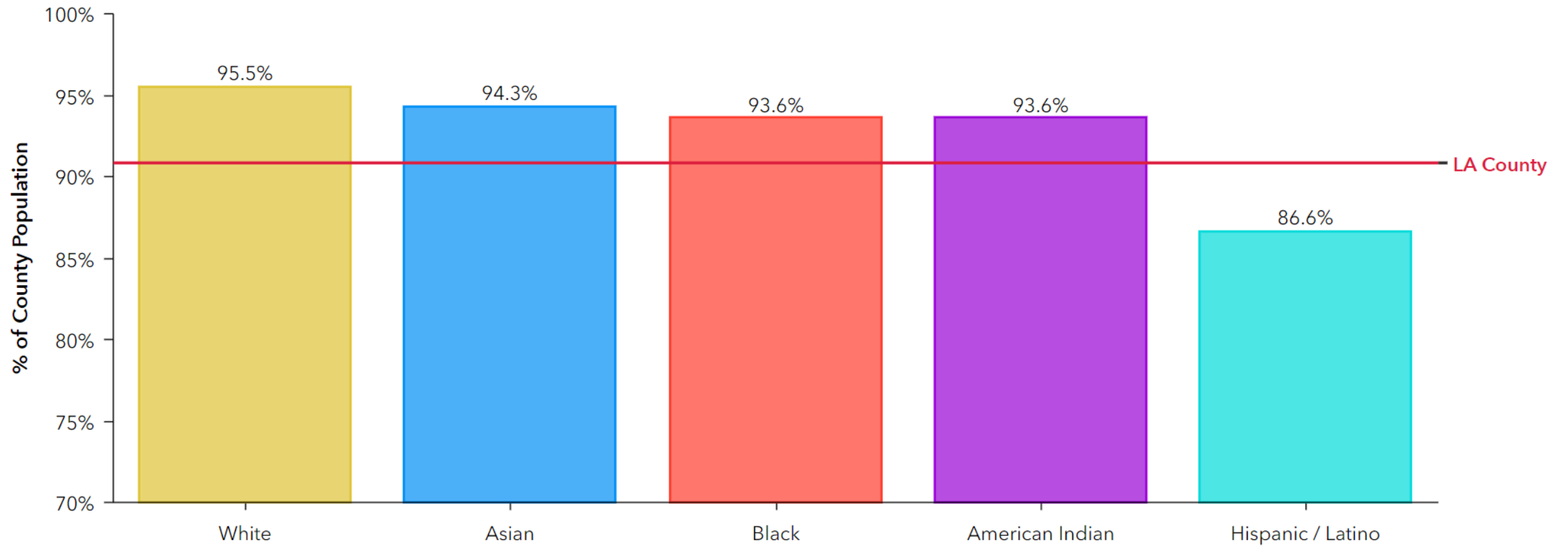

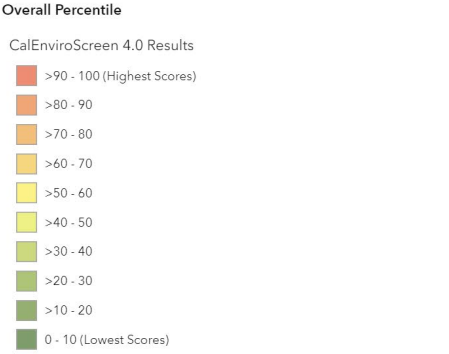

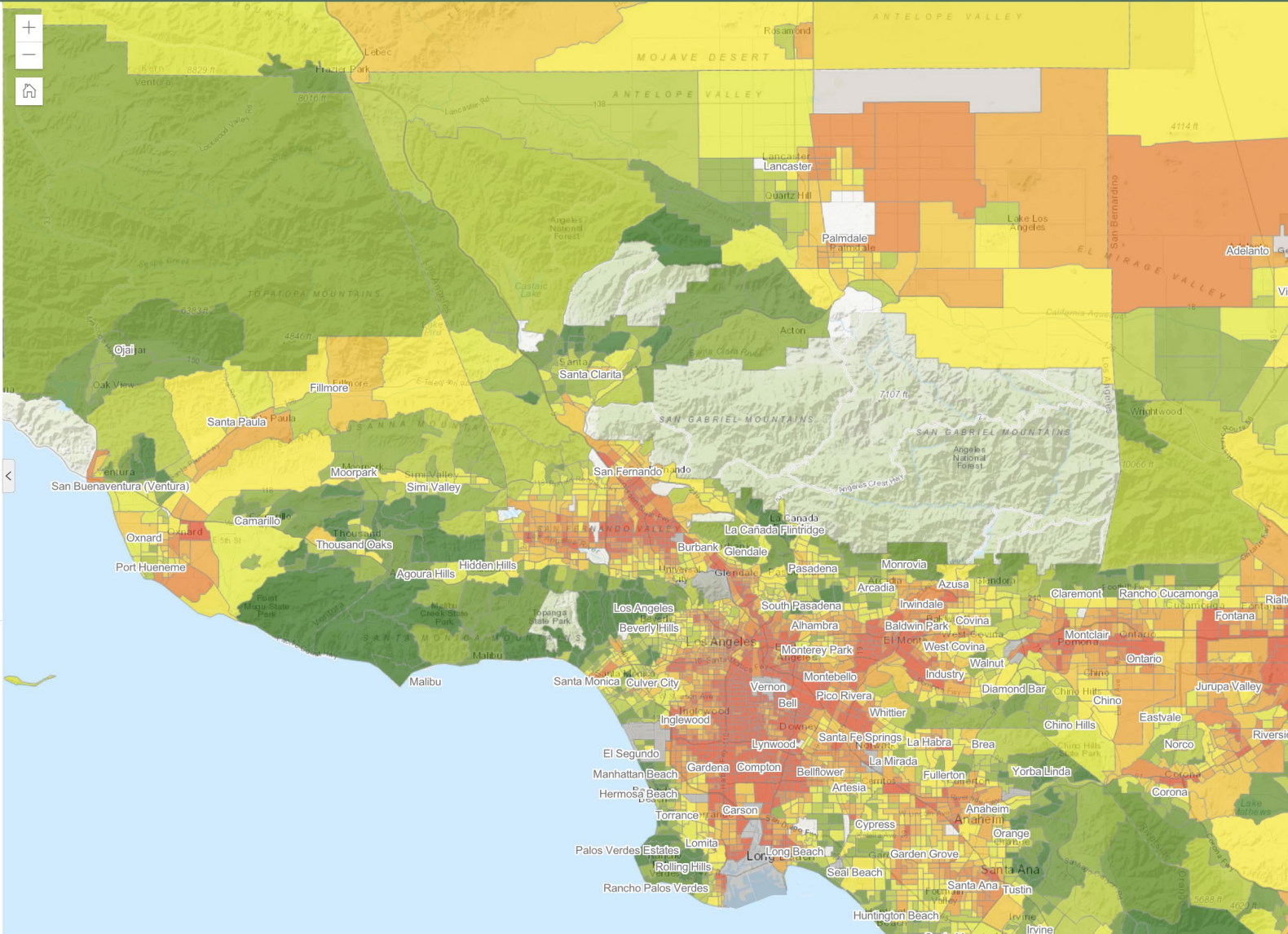
