COVID-19 in Our Communities What you need to know





Why are we here?

- To share information about COVID-19 in our communities.
- To ask for your help encouraging our friends and family to get tested for COVID-19 when necessary.
- To ask for help promoting the COVID-19 vaccine and showing people how to get vaccinated.







Current state of COVID-19 in our communities:

- COVID-19 rates have dropped in LA County.
 We are moving in the right direction.
 Masks and vaccines are working.
- The majority of Californians ages 12+ have gotten the COVID-19 vaccine.
- Many communities of color still have low vaccination rates and high hospitalization rates.







Current state of COVID-19 in our communities:

- There are still hot spots throughout LA County.
- New surges happen when:
 - Low numbers of people are vaccinated.
 - People don't wear masks or social distance.
 - People don't get tested when they have symptoms.







Remembering the basics - even if you are vaccinated

- **Wear masks** covering your nose and mouth.
- Wash your hands frequently.
- Practice physical distancing.
- Get tested when you are sick or if you have been exposed to someone with COVID-19.
- If you test positive, isolate and tell your close contacts.







Vaccines AND testing are both necessary!

- Everyone should get the vaccine. Vaccines can save your life and the lives of your loved ones.
- As more people get vaccines, there will be smaller and smaller pockets where COVID-19 can spread.
 When we limit the spread, we also limit the virus's opportunities to develop new variants.
- Testing will help people find out early if they have COVID-19 and stop it from spreading.
- Encourage friends and family get tested if they have symptoms.







Who should get tested?

- Everyone who has symptoms of COVID-19 (even if you are vaccinated).
- People who are not fully vaccinated* and have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 (or think you have been exposed).
 - You can still have COVID-19 even if you have no symptoms.
 - If you were exposed, quarantine and get a test 4-5 days after the exposure. The test may miss infection if it's done too early.
- Everyone who was asked by a public health official to get tested (even if you are vaccinated).

*Unless you live or work in a group living setting or crowded workplace AND are around someone who has COVID-19





Slow the spread with contact tracing.

- Contact tracing is when people who test positive tell close contacts that they may have been exposed too.
- Those close contacts can use that information to get tested for COVID-19.
- The public health department also does contact tracing and may call to tell people if they were exposed to COVID-19. It will show on your phone as "LA PublicHealth" or 1-(833) 641-0305.







How can I get a COVID-19 test?

- Call your doctor.
- If you don't have a doctor,
 - Call 2-1-1 to find a testing location near you, or
 - Go to the LA County COVID-19 testing website at <u>covid19.lacounty.gov/testing</u>
 - Click to make an appointment.
 - Some sites don't need appointments.
 - Some residents can get a test mailed to their home.
 For more information, check the website.





Reminders about testing:

- Testing is free.
 - No one should be charged for a test.
 - Health insurers are required to cover COVID-19 tests when ordered by a doctor.
- Testing is easy.
 - You can show up at most sites without an appointment.
 - Testing sites are in places where we live, commute and work like grocery stores and churches.
 - You will not be asked about immigration status.







Vaccines in LA County





Vaccines are easy to access.

- Vaccines are available near you <u>today</u>. Get vaccinated as soon as possible.
 - Vaccines are the most powerful way to keep our friends and family safe and end the pandemic.
- Vaccines are available for free at pharmacies, clinics, places of worship, hospitals and other sites near you. Insurance is not required.
- You will not be asked about your immigration status.
- No appointment is needed at many locations.
- To get the vaccine:
 - Visit the <u>MyTurn.ca.gov</u> website to find a location, or
 - Make an appointment at a pharmacy or clinic that offers vaccinations, or
 - O Dial 2-1-1 on your phone to make an appointment, or
 - Find an LA County vaccination site near you at <u>VaccinateLACounty.com</u>.





Guidelines about vaccines and masking:

- Many locations, events and venues require proof of vaccination.
 - People who go to indoor and outdoor mega events are required to show ID and proof of vaccination or a negative test result prior to entry.
 - People who go inside bars, breweries, wineries and nightclubs will be required to show proof of vaccination.
- Wear a mask in indoor spaces whether you are vaccinated or not.
 - Wearing a mask lowers the risk of getting the virus and giving it to others.
 - Both employees and customers need to wear masks indoors when they are not eating or drinking.





What to know about vaccines for children:

- All LA Unified School District students age 12 and older are required to be fully vaccinated by January 10th, 2022. Some students might have medical exemptions.

- Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine is now available for children 5-11 years old. The vaccine is safe, effective, and approved by the FDA and CDC

LA County is now offering free booster doses.

LA County is offering booster doses of all COVID-19 vaccines - Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson. People can choose to a receive booster dose that is different than their original vaccine. Currently eligibility includes:

- 65 years or older ,
- Residents of long-term care facilities,
- 18 to 64 years old with existing medical conditions,
- 18 to 64 years at a higher risk based on where they work.
 - This includes healthcare workers, first responders, teachers and day care staff, grocery workers, and workers in homeless shelters and prisons.

Note: Received a J&J dose at least 2 months ago & are 18+







What to know about booster doses

- Boosters are currently available to people who received any COVID-19 vaccine.
 All COVID-19 vaccines are now approved for booster doses.
- Booster doses are common for many vaccines. Data shows that protection against COVID-19 might get weaker over time after vaccination. Boosters help make sure protection against COVID-19 lasts as long as possible.
- If you qualify, you can get a booster dose **at any site offering any vaccine in LA County.**This includes your local pharmacy, clinics, places of worship, hospitals, & other sites where you live, work, play and pray.
- Vaccines and booster doses are always free. You will not be asked about immigration status. Insurance is not required.





What to know about "additional doses"

- People with weak immune systems may not build enough protection against COVID-19 after two doses. These individuals should get an additional dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.
- Only people with certain serious illnesses qualify. This includes:
 - Being treated for cancer
 - With advanced HIV
 - With chronic kidney disease
 - Taking drugs that weaken (or suppress) the immune system
- If you received a Pfizer or Moderna vaccine, you should get a third dose of the same vaccine.
- If you received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, you should get a booster dose at least two months after your original dose.
- If you qualify, you can get an additional dose at any vaccine site in LA County.





People with weakened immune systems may not build enough protection after two doses.

WHO SHOULD GET A THIRD DOSE?

A third dose is now recommended for moderately or severely immunosuppressed people who got the Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine. This includes people:

- Being treated for cancer
- With advanced HIV
- With chronic kidney disease
- Taking drugs that weaken (or suppress) the immune system

The third dose is recommended at least 28 days after 2nd dose of Pfizer/Moderna.

Booster shots are common and given for many vaccines.

WHO SHOULD GET A BOOSTER?

Booster shots are now recommended for the following people:

JOHNSON & JOHNSON (J&J) -

at least 2 months after initial series

 Everyone who got J&J as their first shot should get a booster

PFIZER/MODERNA -

at least 6 months after the final dose of the initial series

- 65+
- 18+ and the following
 - At high-risk of severe COVID-19 (immunocompromised and other medical
 - O Live in long-term care facility
 - With frequent institutional or occupational exposure to COVID-19, including essential workers

If you meet any of these qualifications, you can have any of the available boosters from Pfizer, Moderna, or Johnson & Johnson, no matter which vaccine you received.





How to get a booster dose

- Make an appointment.
 - Visit the <u>MyTurn.ca.gov</u> website, or
 - Make an appointment at a pharmacy or clinic that offers any COVID-19 vaccinations, or
 - Dial 2-1-1 on your phone to make an appointment, or
 - Find an LA County vaccination site near you at <u>VaccinateLACounty.com</u>
- Show your Vaccine Record Card. You will need to bring proof that you are fully vaccinated. You can bring the white vaccination card, a photo of the white card, or a digital record.







Vaccine Record Card

- **Keep your Vaccine Record Card safe.** It's important that you store it safely in a secure location.
 - You will be asked to show proof of vaccination based on guidelines and requirements.
- Take a picture of your Vaccine Record Card. If you don't want to carry your card you can take a picture of it to show proof of vaccination when needed.
- Digital Vaccine Record Card. You can request a digital copy of your card at: <u>myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov</u>
 If you lose your vaccine record card request a digital copy
