October 3rd Board Motion: Enhancing the Pool of Funds to Increase the Supply of Affordable Housing Countywide



Directs DMH to:

- Report back to Board within 30 days identifying potential sources of funding for an allocation of \$50 million in FY 2017-18 to be administered County-wide through Community Development Commission's (CDC) Notice of Funding Availability
- Work with CDC to develop an MOU and delegates authority to enter into the MOU and for the Auditor Controller to transfer the funds to CDC
- Report back within 90 days with a proposed funding level to be allocated to the CDC for permanent supportive housing and affordable housing in future fiscal years


Background to Motion



- No Place Like Home (AB 1618) signed into law on July 1, 2016
- Authorization of \$2 billion in bond proceeds to finance the capital costs and Capitalized Operating Subsidy Resources of Assisted Units in rental housing developments for persons who have a mental illness and are experiencing homelessness, chronic homelessness, or who are at risk of chronic homelessness
- Allocations are based on homeless population -- Los Angeles is estimated to receive a total of approximately \$700 million
- ➤ The bonds are repaid through Mental Health Services Act (Proposition 63) revenues

NPLH Target Population



- Chronically Homeless (HUD Definition at 24 CFR 578.3)
- Homeless (HUD Definition at 24 CFR 578.3)
- At risk of Chronic Homelessness (NPLH Definition)
 - Persons exiting institutions that were homeless prior to entering the institution
 - Transition Age Youth experiencing homelessness or with significant barriers to housing stability including one or more convictions and history of foster care or involvement with the juvenile justice system
- Adults living with a diagnosed Serious Mental Disorder or children or adolescents with a Serious Emotional Disturbance as defined under MHSA (WIC Section 5600.3)

NPLH Key Features



- Program administered by Housing Community and Development (HCD) and bonds released by California Health Facilities Financing Authority
- Counties with over 5% of share of state homeless population can apply to be an Alternative Program County which would allow them to administer their own NPLH funds (LA, San Francisco, San Diego and Santa Clara)
 - This option provides more flexibility and local control
 - County Board of Supervisors has authority to make this decision
 - Board offices support applying for the Alternative Program which would be jointly administered by Community Development Commission (CDC) and DMH

NPLH Key Features



- Funding is to develop permanent supportive housing that must utilize:
 - Low barrier tenant selection practices that prioritize vulnerable populations (e.g. Coordinated Entry System)
 - Offer flexible, voluntary, and individualized supportive services
 - > A housing first approach
- Counties must commit to provide mental health services and help coordinate access to other community-based supportive services.
