APPROVAL TO ACCEPT A GRANT AWARD FROM THE SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ADMINISTRATION

AND

### **SUBJECT**

Request approval to accept a six-year grant award from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to implement a Child Mental Health Initiative entitled Project ABC Family Wellness Network to serve children birth to five-year-olds and approval of an appropriation adjustment.

### IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:

- 1. Approve and authorize the acceptance of a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) grant award, a copy of which is attached as Attachment I, of up to \$9,000,000, over a six-year period commencing on September 30, 2010 and ending on September 29, 2016, to implement a Child Mental Health Initiative entitled Project ABC Family Wellness Network (Project ABC FWN). The Year One award is \$1,000,000. Future awards are subject to availability of federal funds, and satisfactory progress of the project.
- 2. Delegate authority to the Director of Mental Health, or his designee, to accept additional funding awards under the same SAMHSA grant in subsequent years, provided that the in-kind match requirements can continue to be met for the provision of mental health services to young children

ages birth to five years, and their families. Appropriate advance notification of acceptance of such future SAMHSA funding awards, including DMH's report on its ongoing plan to meet the match requirements for the grant award, will be provided to your Board and the Chief Executive Officer (CEO).

- 3. Authorize DMH to fill two full-time equivalent (FTE) ordinance positions as detailed in Attachment II, pursuant to Section 6.06.020 of the County Code and subject to allocation by the CEO. The positions will be funded through the federal SAMHSA grant award.
- 4. Approve and authorize the Director of Mental Health, or his designee, to prepare, sign, and execute retroactive sole source amendments, effective September 30, 2010, substantially similar to Attachment III, to three existing DMH Legal Entity (LE) Agreements with Children's Institute, Inc. (CII), For the Child, Inc. (FTC), and Pacific Asian Counseling Services (PACS), for FY 2010-11. These amendments, funded by the Project ABC FWN grant, will increase the Maximum Contract Amounts (MCA) of these three LE Agreements, as follows: 1) \$427,509 for CII, with a revised MCA of \$20,567,177; 2) \$66,955 for FTC, with a revised MCA of \$1,626,705; and 3) \$76,744 for PACS, with a revised MCA of \$2,541,096.
- 5. Delegate authority to the Director, or his designee, to prepare, sign, and execute future Amendments to these LE Agreements and establish as a new MCA, the aggregate of the original Agreement and all Amendments through and including these Amendments, provided that: 1) the County's total payments to each contract provider for each fiscal year will not exceed an increase of 20 percent from the last Board approved MCA; 2) any such increase will be used to provide additional services or to reflect program and/or policy changes; 3) your Board has appropriated sufficient funds for all changes; 4) approval of County Counsel, or designee, is obtained prior to any such Amendment; 5) County and contract providers may, by written Amendment, reduce programs or services without reference to the 20 percent limitation and revise the applicable MCA; and 6) the Director notifies your Board and the CEO of Agreement changes in writing within 30 days after execution of each Amendment.
- 6. Approve an appropriation adjustment (Attachment IV) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2010-11 in the amount of \$674,000 consisting of \$59,000 for Salaries and Employee Benefits (S&EB), and \$615,000 in Services and Supplies (S&S) to provide spending authority for the implementation of Project ABC FWN, fully funded by the federal SAMHSA grant award.

### PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Board approval of the recommended actions will allow DMH to accept a federal SAMHSA grant award totaling \$9,000,000 over a six-year period and, consequently, increase DMH's spending authority by \$674,000 for FY 2010-11 to implement Year One of the Project ABC FWN program.

On August 30, 2010, the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, notified DMH of the SAMHSA grant award as the outcome of a competitive application solicitation process. This SAMHSA award is retroactive to September 30, 2010. The Board actions are consistent with your Board's policy on timely submission for Board approval, as noted in the Chief Administrative Office's memo dated September 7, 2000, to your Board, under paragraph heading Overall Policies, Circumstances No. 2, "The County is receiving funds (normally from a higher level of government)."

No services have been delivered at this point in time. It is DMH's intent, with your Board's approval, to make the amendments for CII, FTC, and PACS effective September 30, 2010, consistent with the effective date of the SAMHSA grant award, in order to enable the contractors to claim costs involved for the planning process.

### **Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals**

The recommended actions are consistent with County's Strategic Plan Goal 4, Health and Mental Health.

### FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

There is no net County cost.

The appropriation adjustment will increase S&EB, \$59,000, and S&S, \$615,000, for a total of \$674,000 for the implementation of Year One of the Project ABC FWN, fully funded by the federal SAMHSA grant award. The appropriation adjustment will provide spending authority for two full-time equivalent (FTE) ordinance positions and associated operating costs.

The appropriation adjustment will also increase the MCA of three DMH Legal Entity contractors, as follows: 1) \$427,509 for CII, with a revised MCA of \$20,567,177; 2) \$66,955 for FTC, with a revised MCA of \$1,626,705; and 3) \$76,744 for PACS, with a revised MCA of \$2,541,096.

There is a grant requirement for the increasing ratio of non-federal matching dollars to federal dollars for the term of the grant. The in-kind match will be provided by DMH, the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), CII, FTC, and PACS, among other Service Planning Area (SPA) 8 providers. SAMHSA funding and the in-kind match for the six year term of the grant totals \$17,578,792.

SAMHSA funding for subsequent fiscal years will be subject to renewal requirements and will be included in DMH's annual budget process. Upon completion of the project, the FTE ordinance positions will be eliminated from the budget and terminated unless another funding source can be identified.

### FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On August 30, 2010, the DMH received notification from the Department of Health and Human Services of the SAMHSA grant Project ABC FWN Year One award of \$1,000,000. This award is renewable for up to five years and is subject to the availability of federal funds, as well as the satisfactory progress of the program. Proposed funding for Year One through Year Six is \$1,000,000, \$1,500,000, \$2,000,000, \$1,500,000 and \$1,000,000, respectively. The required Grant Management Statement is attached (Attachment V) for your reference.

DMH, in collaboration with DCFS, CII, FTC, and PACS, will provide comprehensive, family-centered, culturally-competent mental health services to young children ages birth to five years who are either involved with, or at risk of entry into, the child welfare system, who have a serious emotional or behavioral problem, and who reside in Service Planning Area (SPA) 8. SPA 8 was specifically

chosen for this program due to the high concentration of children ages birth to five years who require mental health intervention and services.

This program represents an innovative and important step in addressing the significant lack of expertise among mental health clinicians with regard to the mental health assessment and treatment of children ages birth to five years. In order to improve access to services, reduce stigma associated with emotional and behavioral problems in children, develop evidence-based treatments and translate research findings into community practice, identification and treatment of these problems in very young children must occur and barriers must be reduced. These challenges will be addressed by this program and replication of the successes will be promoted in other SPAs through training and technical assistance provided by program staff and through other resources, including the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA). Approximately 500 young children and families residing in SPA 8 will be enrolled during the six-year period of the grant, which represents a 73 percent increase in the number of birth to five-year-old children served.

The goals of this project align fiscally and philosophically with SAMHSA priorities, the California statewide child welfare improvement effort, and the goals of Los Angeles County to establish new mental health prevention and early intervention services. This program has the potential to efficiently coordinate funding streams in order to sustain this service network beyond the six-year term of the SAMHSA grant award.

This project, by statutory mandate, requires an increasing ratio of non-federal matching dollars to federal dollars in the amount of \$8,578,792 during the term of this grant. All of the involved mental health agencies, DMH, CII, FTC, and PACS, as well as, DCFS and other SPA 8 providers, will provide in-kind matching funds throughout the six-year period of the grant. In-kind matching resources for FY 2010-11 and FY 2011-12 primarily consist of identified salary and consultant costs related to the coordination, planning, and implementation of this program. Increasing in-kind matching resources for the remaining fiscal years will include identified salary and consultant costs, as well as, potential State and local funds that support a variety of services offered by this program, including, but not limited to, substance abuse treatment, special education services, State-funded child care, Partnerships for Families services, Healthy Families services, MHSA-funded Children's Full Service Partnerships, DCFS Alternative Response services, health services, and Regional Center (for developmentally disabled children) services.

The acceptance of this grant will not obligate DMH to continue this program if the existing in-kind match requirements cannot be met. In this event, DMH could scale down the program to a level that would ensure that it could still continue to meet the corresponding in-kind match requirements.

The amendment format for contract amendments with CII, FTC, and PACS has been reviewed and approved by County Counsel as to form.

### **CONTRACTING PROCESS**

To comply with your Board's contracting policy requirements for sole source contracts, DMH notified your Board on January 13, 2011, (Attachment VI) of its intent to negotiate sole source contract amendments with CII, FTC, and PACS for the new SAMHSA grant-funded program. In addition, attached is the required Sole Source Contract Checklist (Attachment VII), identifying and justifying the need for a sole source contract amendment that has been approved by the CEO

Subsequent to Board approval of these actions, DMH, in collaboration with CII, FTC, and PACS, will develop and coordinate the delivery of comprehensive, family-centered, and culturally-competent mental health services specifically targeted to young children ages birth to five years, and their families. These agencies have a history of extensive service provision to culturally-diverse populations, particularly monolingual communities, in SPA 8.

### **IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)**

Acceptance of SAMHSA grant funds for the Project ABC Family Wellness Network will ensure that specifically integrated and comprehensive services will be provided to very young children who have severe emotional or behavioral problems and their families. The special focus of this program, tailored to meet the needs of this very vulnerable population in SPA 8, will greatly benefit the lives of these children and their families by providing effective case management, as well as, greater access to and coordination of needed services.

While the responsibility for conducting these activities lies primarily with the grantee organization, Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS), Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), through its designated representatives shall provide continuing technical assistance, consultation, and coordination in the conduct of the project during the period of this agreement. In addition to these terms and conditions and the applicable statutes and regulations, grantees are bound by the HHS Grants Policy Statement and all requirements in the Request for Applications (RFA) document.

Role of Grantees:

### Grantees must

- (1) Comply with terms and conditions of the cooperative agreement award.
- (2) Collaborate with CMHS staff in project implementation and monitoring,

### Role of Federal Project Officer.

The Project Officer (PO) will have overall responsibility for monitoring the conduct and progress of Grantee Sites, including conducting site visits. The PO will provide substantial input, in collaboration with the grantees, both in the planning and implementation of the program and in evaluation activities, and will make recommendations regarding program continuance. Likewise, POs will participate in the publication of results and packaging and dissemination of products and materials in order to make the findings available to the field. CSAT/CSAP/CMHS/SAMHSA staff will receive authorship/co-authorship credit on all publications to which they have made substantial contributions.

### Role of the Grants Management Officer.

The Grants Management Officer (GMO) is responsible for all business management aspects of negotiation, award, and financial and administrative aspects of the cooperative agreement. The GMO utilizes information from site visits, reviews of expenditure and audit reports, and other appropriate means to assure that the project is operated in compliance with all applicable Federal laws, regulations, guidelines, and the terms and conditions of award. Questions concerning the applicability of regulations and policies to this cooperative agreement, and all requests for required prior approvals such as requests for permission to expend funds for certain items should be directed to the GMO. Required approvals must be provided in writing and the GMO is the only person, except for the SAMHSA Administrator, who may grant such required approvals. - 2) The grantee organization is legally and financially responsible for all aspects of this grant, including funds provided to sub-recipients.
- 3) Grant funds cannot be used to supplant current funding of existing activities. Under the HHS Grants Policy Directives, 1.02 General — Definition: Supplant is to replace funding of a recipient's existing program with funds from a Federal grant.

The \$9,000,000 grant covers a period of six (6) years and was awarded to the County of Los Angeles on behalf of DMH as a result of a successful competitive application solicitation process. DMH accepted the Fiscal Year (FY) 2010-11 award totaling \$1,000,000, effective September 30, 2010, for the implementation of the new program and will request the authority to expend this amount during the FY 2010-11 budget process.

Project ABC-Wellness will work to establish a system of care for children ages birth to five (5) years old who are either involved with, or at risk of involvement with, the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) in Service Area 8. A system of care is an organizational philosophy and framework that involves collaboration across agencies, families, and youth for the purpose of improving access and expanding the array of coordinated community-based, culturally- and linguistically-competent services and supports for children and youth with a serious emotional disturbance and their families. Research has demonstrated that systems of care have a positive effect on the structure, organization, and availability of services for children and youth with serious mental health needs. This project will build upon and expand the accomplishments of Project ABC-About Building Connections in Service Area 4, a system of care grant led by DMH and in place since 2005.

The three (3) providers specified as DMH partners in the grant, CII, FTC and PACS, are each uniquely qualified to provide services under Project ABC-Wellness. All three (3) providers were selected to receive contract dollars in Service Area 8 to provide specialized assessment services for children newly-detained by DCFS specifically due to their experience serving children aged zero to five (5) years. They are all very active in the service area Birth to Five Collaborative and have considerable experience providing training that, through this project, could be directed toward early childhood workforce development. There is currently a limited capacity for trained family advocates in early childhood service systems as most existing family organizations are focused on older children or non-mental health issues. FTC and CII have strong, committed parent programs and have been working successfully in the community for years. These providers will serve as core leaders to strengthen the project's crucial family advocacy component.

In addition to their common qualifications, each provider has a distinctive contribution to the four (4) primary components of the grant, including: Clinical Expertise, Social Media and Marketing Expertise, Cultural and Linguistic Competency, and Training. Cll brings a wealth of knowledge and experience from its successful implementation of Project ABC-About Building Connections in Service Area 4. It has been heavily involved in the application and establishment of the current grant and will continue to transfer knowledge from its previous experience. It will spearhead the Social Media and Marketing component of the grant, while contributing significant clinical expertise and extensive cultural competency serving Latino and African-American families. Cll has a long history of expertise in providing services to young children and is both a foster family and Family Preservation agency.

FTC will be significantly involved in the Clinical component of the grant. It has a significant history of, and experience with, providing services specifically targeting children from birth to five (5) years old and their families. FTC has specialized programs for children traumatized by physical and sexual abuse, serious neglect and exposure to family and community violence, as well as a Child Abuse Response Team that responds to relevant 911 calls and works in partnership with the Long Beach Police Department and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. It has been a leader in developing, implementing, and consulting to early care and education programs. FTC was responsible for initiating, hosting, and co-facilitating the successful Birth to Five Collaborative in Service Area 8, which has been an invaluable resource for local providers and will play a key role in developing, implementing and sustaining Project ABC-Wellness.

PACS will contribute substantially to the Cultural and Linguistic Competency component of the grant and brings unparalleled expertise working with Asian-American and Pacific-Islander populations, the community least served by County mental health services. It also has extensive experience in providing services to African-American and Latino populations. In addition to its array of services for young children and their families, PACS has been committed to advocating for the needs of the Asian/Pacific-Islander communities. It participates in a variety of collaborations and networks to continue to identify and serve the populations' priority needs. The Cultural and Linguistic Competence Coordinator for Project ABC-Wellness will be hired by PACS and will lead the Cultural and Linguistic Competency Committee, whose task will be to ensure that services to all cultural and ethnic populations will be linguistically-appropriate, sensitive to cultural differences, in harmony with cultural values and able to build upon culture-specific strengths and resources.

Sole source contract amendments with these three (3) providers will allow DMH to:

- Provide comprehensive, family-centered, culturally-competent mental health services to young children ages birth to five (5) years and their families.
- Enroll approximately 500 young children and their families residing in Service
  Area 8 during the six (6) year period of the grant; this represents a 73 percent
  increase over the number of children served in 2007 in the same age range.
- Identify and coordinate a broad palette of community-based services, including primary care, nutrition, early education, child care, family support, family mental health, and alcohol and drug treatment services.
- Develop an Interagency Care Team, comprised of staff from DMH, DCFS, Regional Center, CII, FTC and PACS, to develop services in true collaboration

with families to ensure integrated and coordinated care utilizing promising and evidence-based practices.

- Coordinate the birth to five (5) system of care and funding streams in order to sustain the service network beyond the six (6) year term of the grant award.
- Replicate the successes of the program in other service areas through training and technical assistance to improve the quality of early childhood mental health services throughout the entire County.

Unless otherwise instructed by a Board office, DMH will proceed with negotiating sole source contract amendments with CII, FTC, and PACS within two (2) weeks. DMH will work closely with both the Office of the County Counsel and the Chief Executive Office in preparing the amendments.
