She is grateful to have been given the opportunity to take her lived experience to help those dealing with suicidal thoughts and experiences. After participating in one of Didi Hirsch's attempt survivor support groups in 2013, Ann became a facilitator for those groups and joined the suicide prevention crisis line team as a Crisis Chat Counselor in November 2015. Ann still lives with daily thoughts of suicide but finds her work in suicide prevention inspirational and healing.

For more than three years, Officer Creech has been working diligently on getting suicide prevention on the minds of the local community of San Pedro and the Port of Los Angeles. After seeing firsthand what happens at the Vincent Thomas Bridge, she felt very strongly that something needed to be done. Persistence paid off and she has now been connected with a group of passionate people to bring suicide prevention/intervention training to the entire team at the Los Angeles Port Police with more than seventy officers trained to date. Additional prevention efforts include signs displayed on the bridge with information on suicide crisis support resources as well as possible structural preventions to the bridge to keep these tragedies from continuing to occur.
