- I. Updates since previous PPLN
  - Action item follow-up from previous meeting
  - Hot tips or new strategies that are being utilized to integrate outcomes into clinical practice

There were no action items from previous meeting.

Requested participants share issues they want discussed and tips/strategies related to outcome measures. Issues and tips/strategies where shared throughout the meeting. See Section II and III for more details.

- II. Review of Reports

Reviewed reports included: Unique Client Count by Primary Language, Countywide Demographic, Detailed by Legal Entity, Core vs Non-core Services, Expenditures by PEI Plan, Matched Pairs, Unable to Collect (UCS), and Countywide Aggregate Practice Outcomes Dashboard.

K. Pesanti stated that upcoming versions of PEI OMA will allow agencies to run their own data reports and clarified the difference between unable to collect and no data entered. There were some discrepancies in data between reports and K. Pesanti stated she will investigate and followup with the group difference. Group discussed when to give update measured and the difference between treatment cycle and treatment completed. Participants noted that unable to collect is, in part, due to client's fatigue when completing YOQ/YOQ-SR due to length of measure and the small print size, that this often causes the measure to be invalid. Participants also shared the difficulty in getting parents to come back and complete measures after intake. From reviewing the countywide aggregate report a discussion came of what may cause PTSD not to be among the top 5 diagnoses for Seeking Safety.

#### III. Open Forum

Strategies agencies shared to improve data collection and incorporate data into clinical practice included: suggestion that smaller agencies with less infrastructure consider collaborating with each other to improve data collection; incorporating outcome administration into the clinical dialog with client; graphs to show outcome measure data on client progress in treatment; role playing administration of measures in group supervision; and purchasing electronic scoring systems from measures' developers.

S. Alkass asked participants what further support they may need from DMH in their Seeking Safety implementation. Participants responded with the following feedback: having Seeking Safety calls that extend beyond the current number offered during the training period and providing more training. S.
