Current Resources:

- Suggestion to work with non-profits and philanthropic organizations to help the Latino community, particularly to support Undocumented Latinos. Non-profits currently have a lot of untapped resources
- CHIRLA is also provided resources and support for Latinos, particularly undocumented immigrants
- > AARP Helping the Helper for Latinos

Current Needs:

- New strategies to engage/foster social closeness as well as for youth to help older adults in their families to connect / be able to use technology
- > There are resources available for the Latino community, but the community, may not know how to access those services / fill out applications
- > Support for parents to help children access educational technological platforms
- > Resources to help children understand COVID-19
- How to provide support for older Latino adults with depression and isolation who currently do not have supportive family systems
- Depression, anxiety, stress, and alcohol consumption is increasing in the Latino community (qualitative report from clinicians) – need to communicate that MHS are available and clinics are still open
- > To use TV and radio to engage in outreach in both English and Spanish
