LACDMH and L.A. Metro Sign Agreement to Provide Crisis Response and Outreach Services Within Metro Transit System

LACDMH and Metro this week entered into an agreement for LACDMH to provide crisis response services to individuals experiencing mental health crises while onboard Metro vehicles or at Metro stations, as well as outreach to the community.

As part of this innovative partnership, LACDMH will staff Metro-dedicated psychiatric mobile response, co-response, and community ambassador network teams. Once assigned, LACDMH and Metro will work together to deploy these teams where needed within the Metro system to de-escalate crises, provide linkage to appropriate mental health services and educate the public.

“This novel agreement heralds the creation of a powerful, collaborative partnership between LACDMH and Metro that will allow us to apply multiple approaches to improve community safety and increase access to services,” said Dr. Jonathan Sherin. “At the end of the day, this mutual commitment will help us realize a better transportation system and at the same time triage those in need to relevant resources including behavioral health treatment and housing.”

New Research Highlights Prevalence of Serious Mental Illness Among Unsheltered L.A. Residents Enrolled in Street Outreach Services

A new report published this week by the nonpartisan California Policy Lab reveals that roughly 10% of the homeless population studied in L.A. County suffers from a psychotic spectrum disorder. This important research provides insight into the LACDMH target client population and informs our response to ensure that resources are in place to meet the needs of this group to help them access care and exit homelessness. The analysis links enrollment data from L.A.’s Street Outreach programs to data from LACDMH and L.A. County Department of Health Services to provide estimates of the prevalence of psychotic spectrum

disorders and other serious mental illnesses among people who receive Street Outreach services. See the full report [here](#).



VPAN Support Helps Army Vet Reset and Pursue His Dreams

Recently discharged Army veteran and LA native Hugo was facing some serious obstacles during his transition to civilian status.

That's when he was introduced to [Veteran Peer Access Network \(VPAN\)](#).

"I was trying to figure out mental health care through my Medi-Cal insurance. I was talking to them and I gave them a little about myself, that I was a veteran and recently separated, and I asked, 'What could I use out here?'" he recounted. "They said since you're a veteran and you're in L.A. County there's this thing called VPAN. I went online and filled out the submission form and they contacted me within just a day or two."

VPAN is a program within the LACDMH connecting veterans and their families to a wide range of services including housing and shelter, income support, benefits navigation, employment assistance, health care, and individual and family support. The program is staffed

exclusively by other veterans and military family members as peer support specialists.

Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Month, nationally recognized throughout May, has traditionally celebrated AAPI cultures and their numerous contributions to American society, but this year's observance takes on heightened significance as AAPI Hate incidents continue to remain prevalent throughout the United States and in L.A. County. Combined with unique mental health challenges facing the AAPI community and barriers to accessing care, overall wellbeing is more precarious when compounded with acts of harassment, discrimination, and violence along with the toll of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Of particular significance are the unique historical traumas faced by individual AAPI populations and how they contribute to mental health challenges. Dr. Derek Hsieh, Program Head of our Long Beach Asian Pacific Islander Family Mental Health Clinic, recently presented on this topic and highlighted some strategies to help overcome those barriers. Our department is also engaged in addressing these barriers and challenges through our outreach and services with input from our Asian Pacific Islander UsCC subcommittee, and we encourage interested stakeholders to learn more about this group's efforts and participate in an upcoming meeting.
