DMH Annual Budget update	DMH gave budget presentation to Mental Health Commission

- LA County DMH receives approximately 1/3 of annual budget from
   Prop. 63 better known as the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA)
- Five (5) Components of MHSA which also dictate how funding can be spent and include:
  - 1. Community Services & Support (CSS) is largest component and provides direct services to individuals with severe mental illness
    - a. Contracted Community Clinics fall under this component
  - 2. Prevention & Early Intervention (PEI) component aims to prevent negative outcomes by intervening early in the onset of the mental health needs of the person with timely access to services and support by working with consumers and family members
  - Innovation (INN) component aims to explore and develop new mental health models that improve the quality of services, promote collaboration, and increase access to services
  - 4. Capital Facilities & Technologies Needs (CFTN) component supports the development of facilities and technologies used for administrative services or delivery of mental health services
  - Workforce Education & Training (WET) component supports the building of more diverse mental health workforces and to provide services that are more linguistically and culturally component
    - a. MHSA allocates 20% of the budget for this category
- Annual MHSA process requires 30-day community input on DMH budget to determine allocation of DMH budget for the next FY
