	months and put together a budget for next fiscal year (FY) that represents
	and accounts for the needs and challenges the Latino community has
	shared about in the last year.
	Community members shared frustration and anger at DMH not complying
	with MHSA law of incorporating community stakeholder input into budget
	for yet another year despite the Latino UsCC and Latino stakeholders
	requesting this every single year
	Previous DMH Director was not responsive to ongoing and diverse needs
	of Latino community and things have not improved with current Director
