The Library can help you find the best tools for learning whatever you want! https://lacountylibrary.org/learn/ Virtual Programming Collection of Live Events and YouTube Playlists https://lacountylibrary.org/virtual-programming/ Subcommittee Recommendations from the subcommittee Resources must be accessible to the deaf and hard of hearing community Include the law on person's rights for reasonable accommodation Educate the deaf and hard of hearing on how to find an alternative/backup when interpreter is not available Create a video in sign language on how to advocate for oneself because of difficulties reading the resources (for the deaf and hard of hearing persons) Youth Advisory Subcommittee – is very similar to the UsCC subcommittee but tailored to youth Presentation: **Youth Advisory** Youth – ages 16-24; recruitment will start once students get back to school Subcommittee • Co-chairs will be attending two (2) meetings monthly: their own Youth Advisory subcommittee meeting and the UsCC subcommittee monthly meeting • Youth Advisory Subcommittee meetings will be arranged based on their school schedules; there is a Dr. Luis Guzman designated subcommittee member to attend the UsCC if co-chairs are not available The UsCC subcommittee will partner and collaborate with the Youth Advisory Commission to support them Dr. Guzman will work closely with the Los Angeles County CEO Youth Commission to align with all their services, programs, and resources. **Suggestion**: Provide Certificate to high school students, signed and awarded by the Board of Supervisors. This can be used by students for college applications. **DMH Updates - Angel Baker DMH Updates:** Capacity Building Project funds increased to \$350,000 • Liaisons to create a Tracking System that will be used to monitor all the issues and concerns to bring to the Angel Baker Executive Management, and work on the resolution. Resolutions will be brought back to the subcommittee or inform the group of what DMH can do. Build structural changes so that communication is back and forth Enhance the community process - Rigo will provide trainings to UsCC co-chairs and liaisons ADA requirements – Angel is currently searching the issues and work with the CEO to find out what the ADA requirements are at a minimum for the County
