Introduction: Knowing the Beginning



Sam Chan, Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist and served as countywide District Chief with the Department of Mental Health where he directed the Children's Systems of Care, Family and Community Partnerships, Prevention and Early Intervention Unit. He was the first Co-Chair of the L.A. **County Suicide Prevention** Network. He previously held senior administrative and faculty positions at the California School of Professional Psychology, Chil-

dren's Hospital Los Angeles, the USC School of Medicine, and the UCLA Department of Psychiatry. During his career, he has focused on transdisciplinary workforce development in the health care, education, and human services fields and created model advocacy, leadership, and community-building programs for culturally and linguistically diverse populations.

EMERGENCE: REMARKS ON LIFE, LOSS AND SURVIVAL

Tess Banko, MSW/MPA, is the Executive Director of the first of its kind UCLA/VA Veteran Family Wellness Center (VFWC) that serves Veterans alongside their families through resilience-

based wellness programming and services in partnership with the VA Healthcare System. Tess identifies with fellow Veterans and families on their paths to wellness and empowerment, as a devastating spinal injury in the Marine Corps at age 22 led to a tumultuous return to civilian life and the passionate pursuit of continued public



service through social work and organizational leadership.

Tess lost her husband, an active duty Marine, to suicide while he was deployed overseas in 2004. In 2013, her own PTS surfaced in part due to sexual trauma experienced during military service. Through developing skills and knowledge in the arenas of social work, stress management, trauma, resilience and post-traumatic growth both personally and professionally, Tess believes that resilience, wellness and growth are possible under even the most challenging of circumstances.

Tess is honored to continue to serve the community beside and on behalf of her military and veteran sisters, brothers and their families via assisting with knowledge, resources, and programming. She is an LA County Veterans Advisory Commissioner for 3rd District County Supervisor Sheila Kuehl, a member of the Los Angeles Mayor's Veteran Suicide Prevention Challenge for Miltary and Veteran Families, and the 2nd Vice Chair of the Palisades American Legion Post 283.

A CANDID CONVERSATION ON LOSS AND SURVIVAL MODERATOR



Ann Taylor, is a suicide attempt survivor and a single mother of two. She is a crisis counselor for the Didi Hirsch Suicide Prevention Center 988 Lifeline and peer facilitator for the Survivor of Suicide Attempt (SOSA) support groups also at Didi Hirsch. She has been an advocate in suicide prevention and has been vocal about her experience in the hopes she will reduce the stigma around suicide and help others who may be struggling. She has been featured

in the documentary "The S Word" during which she first voiced much of her pain surrounding suicide ideation and attempts.

PANEL MEMBERS

Julia Zirimu (aka Julia Asea Boyle), is an Office Manager at Crabel Capital Management. Her professional career began as a teacher in Uganda, then a travel professional in the United Kingdom, and for over 20 years, she has been working as an administrative professional in the United States. For the past 11 years, she has participated in the Alive Together walk to raise funds and promote awareness for programs and services to help those struggling with mental illness and



families that have lost loved ones to suicide. She is cofacilitating survivor support groups and helps people that have recently lost someone to suicide. After the loss of her son to suicide, Didi Hirsch Mental Health Services supported her with counseling services and an 8-week survivor support group that enabled her to live through the worst time of her life. Helping



people that have recently lost someone to suicide helps her to honor her son's memory.

Miguel Serricchio lost his youngest son, Alex, to suicide just over six years ago and shortly after found Didi Hirsch. He took advantage of the different programs that Didi Hirsch has to support families with the loss of

a loved one by suicide. Shortly after using Didi Hirsch's services, he felt the need to give back. He didn't want the loss of his son to be just a statistic, so he started volunteering. For the past five years, he has had the opportunity to facilitate eightweek groups and monthly drop-ins in English and Spanish. Additionally, he has written articles for Didi Hirsch's newsletter, has been interviewed or served on panels, and his goal is to become a speaker for Didi Hirsh in their suicideprevention program. Miguel is also an Executive Advisor to Bezyl.com, a digital mental health app with a mission to "help people help people."Originally from Buenos Aires, Miguel now resides with his wife, in Valencia, California. He holds a degree in international finance from the Universidad Argentina de la Empresa in Buenos Aires, Argentina and is a 35+ year veteran of the banking and finance industry. When not working or volunteering, Miguel enjoys cycling, hiking and traveling with his wife and spends as much time as possible backpacking with his oldest son and spending time with his daughter, daughter-inlaw and granddaughter.



Rebecca Russell works with Didi Hirsch Mental Health Services as a Program Coordinator for the Suicide Prevention Center's 24/7 crisis line. Her lived experience as a suicide attempt survivor informs the way she approaches her work in the fields of suicide prevention and community mental health.

Rebecca has her MA in Human Services and is currently earning a MA in Marriage & Family Therapy.

Juan Diego Sanabria is a United States Marine Corps combat veteran and recent graduate of California State University, Los Angeles with my Bachelor's Degree in Rehabilitation Services. Juan has just started Master's degree program for Rehabilitation Counseling and his new calling and passion in



life is to work for and serve our veteran community with getting help for their mental health issues using my firsthand experience of suicidal ideation and loss to help improve the overall quality of life for our brothers and sisters in arms.

David Leonard has almost 20 years of experience working in the non-profit sector in Los Angeles including serving children & families with the YMCA, supporting Iraq/Afghanistan War Veterans at the Salvation Army, and now caring for those who are bereaved. David currently serves as the Executive Director at New Hope Grief Support Community in Long Beach, where he attended a

grief support group in 2008 after the sudden death of his mother after a lifelong battle with addiction. David is a member of the National Alliance for Children's Grief, serves on the Long Beach Trauma Recovery Center's Advisory Board, and has helped serve thousands of bereaved adults, children, and families through connection and support during his time at New Hope.

Alyesha Wise-Hernandez, in addition to her teaching, performing, curriculum-writing and community-building work with Street Poets, Alyesha helps lead the all-women open mic "She Writes." and a variety of other community events. The author of Carnival (NOT A CULT media), Alyesha Wise is a poet, teaching artist & TEDx speaker from Cam-



den. She is the co-founder of Spoken Literature Art Movement (S.L.A.M.) and served as the Hollywood (Da Poetry Lounge) Slam Team head coach, leading the team to finals both years, most recently to 2nd place. She also served as the Los Angeles (Get Lit) Youth Slam Team co-coach from 2014-2017. Along with other slam highlights, she is a 2-time Women of the World Poetry Slam finalist.



Chris Cano attended Fuller Theological Seminary and graduated with a Masters of Divinity in 2009 and spent many years working in fulltime pastoral ministry with both teens and adults in the Los Angeles area. In addition to working in ministry, Chris spent several years as a funeral service professional working with the bereaved and later went

on to become an adjunct instructor in the Mortuary Science Dept. at Cypress College equipping other professionals. Chris experienced significant loss in his own life and his personal and professional experiences have given him a heart and passion to work with those who are living with grief. In 2016, Chris volunteered and led grief support groups for adults with New Hope Grief Support Community. In 2018, New Hope hired Chris as their Director of Bereavement services where he has developed programs for bereaved adults, children, and families - especially those impacted by the death of a child and by suicide. Chris is a member of the National Alliance for Children's Grief, has facilitated training on grief and loss, and is currently pursuing his Certificate in Thanatology.



Frank Escamilla, known in the streets and open-mic venues of Los Angeles as "Bus Stop Prophet" for his propensity to bust rhymes in unexpected places, Frank has been deeply engaged in creative peacemaking work for over 16 years, both here in LA, and as far away as South Africa and Sweden. A gifted poet, spoken word-artist, open-mic host,

community-builder and teacher, Frank first connected with Street Poets in 2013 and has been working with us ever since. As our Director of School programs, Frank oversees Street Poets school partnerships, community events and outreach. In his capacity as a master teaching artist, Frank facilitates writing workshops for everyone from Compton elementary school 5th graders to formerly incarcerated adults at Homeboy Industries. In any setting, his passion for the healing power of poetry and storytelling is truly infectious.


