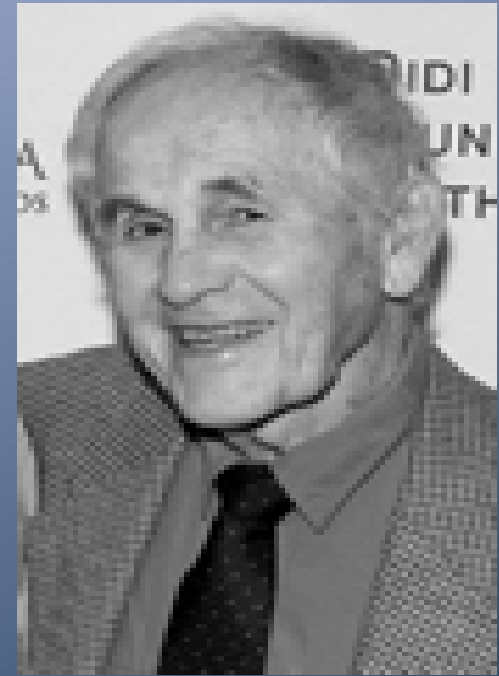
The Founding Fathers of the Suicide Prevention Center

1953 The Beginning

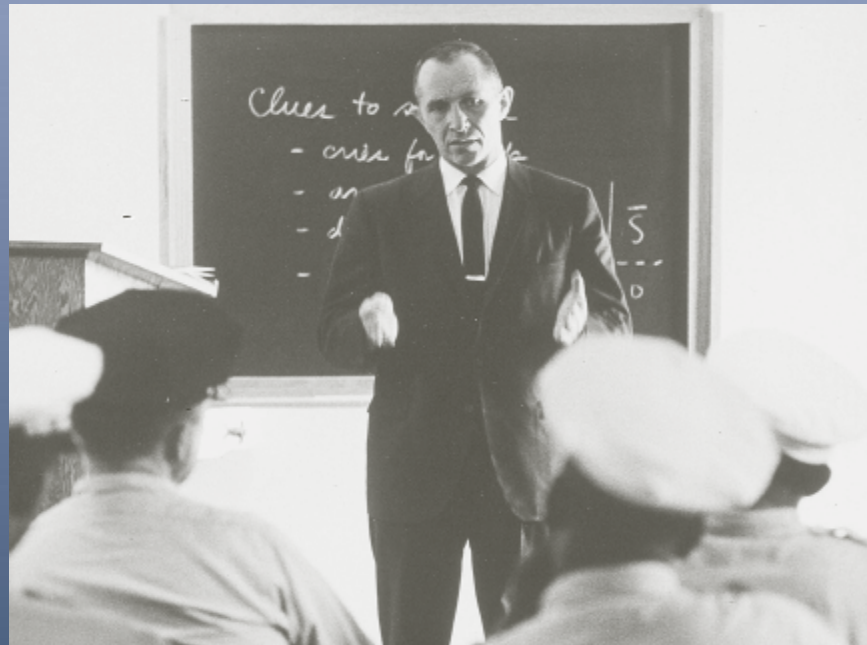
The Suicide Prevention Center is born

- Began with a grant from the National Institute of Mental Health
- Nation's first scientifically and clinically-based program to study and prevent suicide.
- Became the prototype for centers in the U.S. and abroad.
- Included research, training and suicide prevention services.

Training in Suicide Prevention

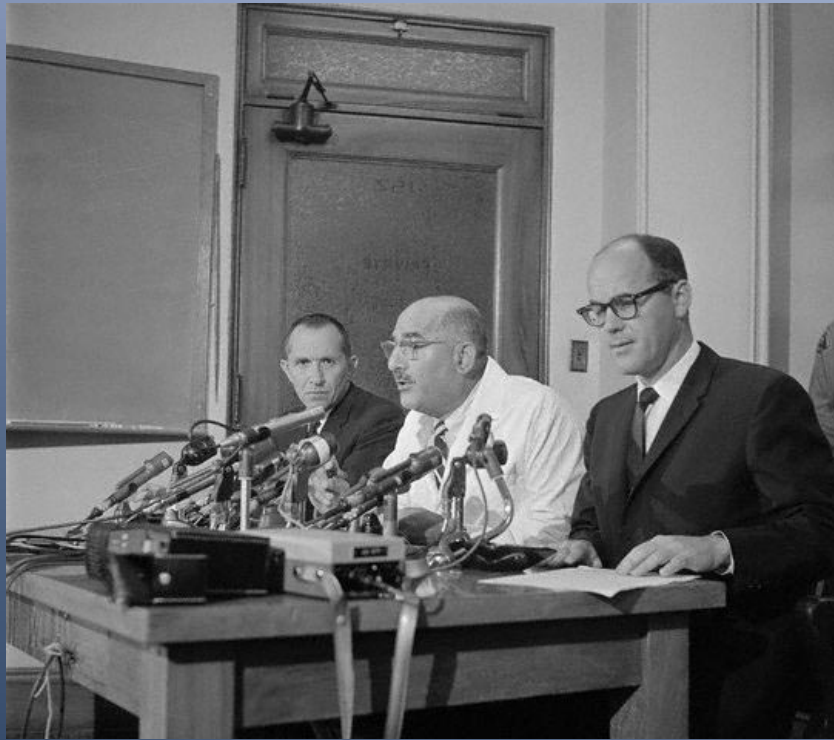
SPC offers extensive training in suicide prevention to local professionals.

The Psychological Autopsy



Dr. Farberow, L.A. Coroner,
Thomas Curphey, and Dr. Litman

SPC gained international recognition after performing a psychological autopsy on Marilyn Monroe.

1963

Suicide hotline expands to 24-hour coverage

- Pioneered an approach in which trained nonprofessionals took crisis calls.
- Developed the idea that most people who became acute suicidal were in that state for a relatively brief time and emphasized the need for active intervention.
- “Where do you hurt” and “How can I help?”

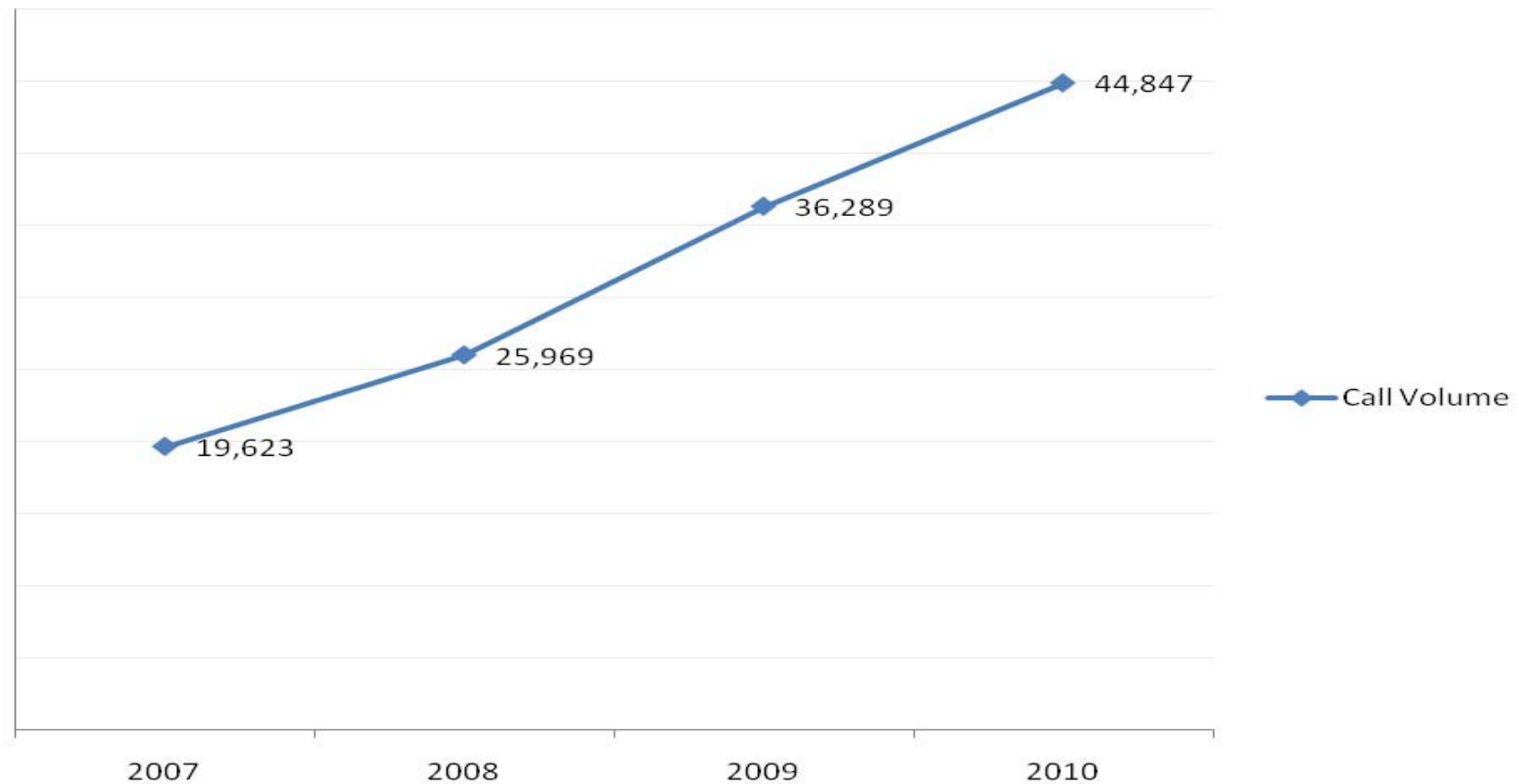
