The program was initiated by the San Gabriel Unified School District G.A.T.E program as part of the 4th grade curriculum to teach students about the ecosystem. At Whittier Narrows Nature Center, the staff taught the 4th graders about the San Gabriel and Rio Hondo Rivers, the wildlife habitat, the importance of water conservation, as well as native vegetation. The program ended with the students' artistic representation of the Life Science in their Art Exhibit and iMovie, so that visitors – including families and teachers – were educated about the ecosystem. In the spring, the students' art will be exhibited at Jefferson Middle School. This program is designed to meet the California State "Next Generation Science Standards." It's a true example of "Parks Make Life Better!"

Throughout the year, electricians are busy replacing obsolete lights with new LED fixtures that are more energy efficient. A total of 180 units were replaced in 384 hours. These new fixtures use less electricity than standard light bulbs, and also last 30 times longer than incandescent bulbs. Department electricians worked around the clock to ensure that programming was not affected at any of the parks.

In 2016, the William S. Hart Regional Park Barnyard experienced a lot of growth and improvement in ways that positively affected all of its visitors. In an effort to create a better and safer playground experience, the North Agency Construction Division put together a special team to focus on improvements to existing structures. The team – which included Dinah Quinones, Park Project Coordinator, and General Maintenance Worker, Daniel Yawn – ensured that each playground in the North Agency underwent a rigorous inspection, and any broken, unsafe or aging equipment was repaired or renovated. In 2016, this resulted in 70 work orders totaling 600 hours of labor aimed at making our playgrounds safer. The North Agency Construction Division worked painstakingly on the details of this project to enhance the beauty and safety of our facilities, and to ensure that "Parks Make Life Better!"

On July 22, 2016, Jaime Padilla received a phone call from a co-worker who felt ill and needed to go home. Something about that call made Jaime feel that something wasn't quite right, and he drove the 10 miles from Pearblossom Park to Stephen Sorensen Park

to check up on her. Upon arrival, Jaime found the building locked, though he knew that his co-worker was still in there. He continued searching and knocking, trying to get her attention, and when he was finally able to get her to open the door, he immediately realized that she was not very responsive, and was slipping in and out of consciousness. Jaime called 911 for help, and the arriving emergency personnel immediately began treatment and confirmed that she was having a medical emergency. Jaime's intuition, quick action and determination helped save a life, and for that, he received this Valor Award.

A crowd of bystanders was yelling "Fire," so Eric grabbed his sledge hammer, broke the front windshield and freed the occupants. As a result, no further injuries occurred, and the parties were carried to safety. This example of disregard for personal injury to himself and assisting an innocent victim is in accordance with the finest values of this Department and the County. For his actions above and beyond the call of duty, Eric was presented this Valor Award.

The suspect fled upon William's arrival, and his co-worker was spared further harm.
