REACHING NEW 'HEIGHTS'



Thousands attend grand opening of Rowland Heights Community Center, where the state-of-theart buildings and innovative programming rule.

A n estimated 2,000 residents enjoyed a Saturday morning celebration to mark the opening of Rowland Heights Community Center, as Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe and the Los Angeles County Community Development Commission joined the Department for the unveiling of the \$18.1 million facility.

Held April 18 to coincide with the 23rd Annual Safe Communities Festival at Pathfinder Park, the festivities included a live musical performance by Rowland Heights native and "American Idol" finalist Elijah Liu, along with free food tastings from local restaurants and program demonstrations.

"I want to thank the community for partnering with us to develop this beautiful landmark," said Supervisor Knabe. "Together, we have built a hub for this area, a place where people of all ages can learn, play, grow, get healthy, make new friends and have fun. My sincere congratulations and appreciation to everyone who put so much effort into creating this new, state-of-the-art, environmentally conscious facility."

Rowland Heights Community Center is located at Pathfinder Park (18150 E. Pathfinder Road). The 19,000 square-foot activity center and banquet hall are on the


lower level of the existing park. Amenities include two buildings on both sides of a grand courtyard, which provides ample space for outdoor events. The banquet hall building houses an approximately 4,400-square-foot multi-purpose room with a contractible stage, dance floor and catering kitchen, and will accommodate banquet-style seating for up to 300 people and performance style seating for up to 600; the activity center building on the west has a dance studio, an arts-andcrafts room, art gallery, social lounge, computer room, and meeting room. The lobby of this building also serves as a gallery to house permanent and temporary art exhibits. Three new tennis courts, a new basketball court, and additional on-site parking have been constructed as part of this project. The park area has been enhanced with new landscaping and walking paths.

An excellent place to host large-scale events, the center will also feature many low-cost programs and classes covering a wide variety of topics and interests ranging from yoga, martial arts, ballet and tai chi, to fitness for kids, computer classes and karaoke. Classes are set to begin in mid-May, and more information is available by visiting the center or calling (562) 691-1624. For their contributions to the successful center opening, special thanks go to Joe Mendoza, Mika Yamamoto, Melinda Roundtree, Letty Guerrero and her team, Tim Tuyen, Kathy Medina, Jackie Richardson and William Hayes.

"We are thrilled to open this beautiful, multi-purpose community center to the Rowland Heights community," said Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation Director Russ Guiney. "It is always our goal to deliver high-quality programming and recreational opportunities to the communities we serve, and this outstanding center is a prime example of that commitment."

Many sustainable technologies and design elements — such as natural light, solar panels, and drought tolerant landscaping — make the new center an environmentally responsible addition to the community. For its energy efficiency, the Rowland Heights Community Center is expected to achieve a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver Rating. — Catarah Coleman

n this fantastic and hard-working Department, we come to work each day with our minds on how to best serve the 10 million-plus residents of Los Angeles County. That will always be our mission but now we are adding a once-in-ageneration effort to collect ideas from the people we serve, so they

can play a vital role in shaping the future of parks and recreational opportunities.

With the first-ever Countywide park and recreation needs assessment, approved by the Board of Supervisors on Feb. 3, we have been given the opportunity to deliver a detailed study of the region's park, infrastructure and recreational needs. Led by Deputy Director Norma E. Garcia and Project Director Rita Robinson, the 15-month assessment process began in March and will include parks and facilities owned and operated by the Department of Parks and Recreation, those overseen by the County's 88 cities and others overseen by state and local agencies, town councils and not-for-profit organizations. The analysis will help us build a greater understanding of existing open space and recreation assets, and determine how best to improve, expand and make them more easily accessible to residents in all areas of the County.

By fall, we will kick off the most crucial phase of the assessment process: community outreach. A premium will be placed on collaboration and feedback from residents and park staff in cities and County unincorporated areas. Through community workshops and online portals, residents will be invited to provide their points of view on the needs and desires in their own communities.

That's where all of you come in! We are counting on you to help spread the word about the assessment in the communities where you work, and to encourage park visitors and program participants to take part in this important process. discipline and how to be team players. It also makes them feel part of something bigger, teaches sportsmanship and encourages them to stay on the path to success through positive extracurricular activities. I want to thank all of the recreation leaders, park supervisors and everyone who is responsible for making this program such a success for two decades!"

Fitted with state-of-the-art theater room, new community center heralds new day at Helen Keller Park.

With a wide range of programs planned, a 4,000-square-foot community center at Helen Keller Park in South Los Angeles opened to the public on Dec. 10. Los Angeles County Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas joined the Department of Parks and Recreation for a grand opening celebration at the center located at 1045 W. 126th Street in Los Angeles.

Hundreds of guests joined in the celebration, which featured several guest speakers and a surprise appearance by characters from "The Lego Movie."

At a park widely-recognized for its series of free film screenings, amenities at the new Helen Keller Community Center include a state-of-the-art theater room with a 5 x 9 foot screen and surround sound. Also open now: a new computer lab, arts-and-crafts room, outdoor patio, staff offices, full kitchen and reception area.

"While construction at Helen Keller Park is underway, we want the West Athens community to start enjoying the



community center during the holiday season," Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas said. "We invite residents and visitors to explore this new amenity and participate in the vast array of activities that will be scheduled at the center."

A number of programs and activities will be offered at the \$7.3 million center, including a low-cost afterschool program, job readiness training, mentoring program for girls, a fitness walking club, and classes in computers, arts-and-crafts and dance.

Funded by Warner Bros. in cooperation with the British Academy of Film and Television Arts (BAFTA) Los Angeles, the technology in the 100-seat theater room provides families with a welcoming, modern space to enjoy activities that include BAFTA-LA's well-attended film screenings hosted at Helen Keller Park.

Reflecting our strong commitment to energy efficiency, the new building is expected to achieve a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold Rating from the U.S. Green Building Council. Due to extensive renovations underway at Helen Keller Park, most of its 6.6 acres of parkland are currently closed to the public.

Along with landscaping, those improvements, expected to be completed later this year, include a new baseball field, playground, exercise cluster, sports lighting system and park monument sign.

"The opening of the new Helen Keller Community Center is a milestone for the Department and the community served by this park," said Director Russ Guiney. "While much of the park will be under construction for the next several months, this state-of-the-art center will enable our dedicated staff, volunteers and partners to deliver high-quality programming to a wonderful and deserving community."


personnel seeking advice on those and other issues.

WHERE IN THE DEPARTMENT

ANSWER—These historic images were captured at the site of what is now Alondra Park —once open marshy fields used for agricultural purposes, and purchased from the Bank of Italy (now known as Bank of America) in 1927. Park development was underway eight years later, and a Public Works Administration (PWA) crew moved in as part of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's New Deal. The tents at the left rear of the image was where the service workers camped out during construction. The rustic craftsman-style bridge, likely spanning the Dominguez Channel, was a PWA project (note the person standing at the left of the bridge for scale). Later in 1937, the labor camp would use mules to excavate the land for the lake. — **Ansley B. Davies**

Historic Trails Magazine Now Available

ack in 1934, the Department, formerly known as the Department of Recreation Camps and Playgrounds, began sponsoring its own quarterly publication, Trails Magazine in conjunction with a non-profit, the Mountain League of Southern California. The magazine, which was fully funded through advertising and subscriptions, was an important way for the Department to inform the public about all the wonderful recreation opportunities that were available in the mountain areas. The publication also carried the educational message of conservation, forest protection, and fire prevention. During the 1937-38 fiscal year, 10,625 copies of Trails Magazine were published and distributed with about 500 issues sent east of the Rocky Mountains and overseas. The magazine cost \$0.10 per issue.

The 540 acre Big Pines Recreation Camp opened in 1922 and was the facility that first established County Recreation. In the 1930's, there were two facilities in the Wrightwood area of the Angeles National Forest, Big Pines Camp and Crystal Lake Camp, so a magazine dedicated to trails and mountain recreation was important. In 1940 and 1943, the Board of Supervisors did not renew the Forest Service's special use permits for Big Pines and Crystal Lake so the land these facilities occupied reverted to the Forest Service. Recreation programing, which included a very popular winter sports program, ceased because at the time the Forest Service did not provide recreation services.

For the first time, twenty-one magazines

n eager crowd of more than 200 people turned out for the Feb. 25 opening of the revamped Placerita Canyon Nature Center, as a set of visually striking, museum-style exhibits made their public debut at the California state park managed by the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation.

Made possible in large part by a \$1 million grant from California State Parks, through the Prop. 84 Nature Education Facilities Program, the \$1.4 million project represents a significant overhaul of the nature center first built in 1971.

The upgrades — which add new and exciting dimensions to a facility devoted to educating the public about native animals, plants and natural resources — include large diorama displays depicting Placerita Canyon's three primary ecosystems; a wall-sized freshwater aquarium; a specially-designed bird-viewing area, featuring an observation deck and viewing scopes that allow visitors to watch wild birds along a nearby hillside; informative interpretive displays on native flora and fauna; renovated bird enclosures with a natural soil base; a room dedicated to native mammals; and the wall-to-wall mural "Daylight to Nocturnal," which serves as a colorful



backdrop for a collection of lifelike taxidermy animals that include a mountain lion.

Among those appearing at the grand opening was Los Angeles County Mayor Michael D. Antonovich, whose office provided \$465,000 toward the improvements. "In addition to providing our Santa Clarita Valley residents with a vital resource for learning and appreciation of wildlife and the environment, the \$1.4 million in improvements at the nature center help highlight the vital role Placerita Canyon plays in our efforts to preserve our County's diverse natural heritage," said Mayor Antonovich.

Additional improvements to the park property include a new roof and exterior restoration for historic Walker Cabin; new potable water system at Walker Ranch Campground; and Americans with Disabilities Act-accessibility for a pedestrian bridge.

As part of the grand opening event, representatives of the Tatavium Band of Mission Indians provided a traditional blessing of the land - which was inhabited by their ancestors beginning in ancient times, and has long been central to the region's cultural and natural history. It was in 1769 that the Portola



Expedition arrived in the Santa Clarita Valley helping to bring about the mission era, which transformed this state in so many ways. Less than 100 years later, Francisco Lopez discovered gold in Placerita Canyon, ultimately leading to a rush of fortune-seekers throughout the state who gave birth to modern California.

Other speakers at the Wednesday morning gathering included Placerita Canyon Nature Associates President Jim Southwell, whose volunteer organization contributed close to \$30,000 for completion of conceptual and master plans for the renovations; and L.A. County Department of Parks and Recreation Director Russ Guiney, who said the new-look nature center "tells a compelling story about the animals and plants that make L.A. County such a unique place to experience the beauty of the natural world. We look forward to welcoming visitors of all ages who can embrace these new opportunities for learning and fun."

Rimgrove Park - Nutrition Collaboration (East Agency)

Mike Timperio (North Agency -not pictured)

On September 25, 2014, Mike saw a vehicle with smoke and flames coming out from under the hood. He also saw that there was an elderly woman in the vehicle, and tapped on the window to tell her to get out of the car. When she did not respond, he opened the door and assisted her to safety. He was able to put the fire out with his own vehicle's fire extinguisher, and another borrowed from a market. His quick thinking and bravery saved a life that day.



Elisa Salas (East Agency)

On December 6, 2014, Elisa Salas opened her office door to see a man firing a gun at a park patron. She also saw a woman and her child frozen in terror on the nearby playground. Without regard for her own safety, Ms. Salas rushed to the playground and brought the lady and child to her office and locked the doors. She then remembered that the gymnasium was open, and again ran out to secure that building and the patrons inside. Sheriff's deputies arrived quickly, and the shooter ran off; but most importantly, no patrons were injured thanks to Elisa's brave actions.

Jesse Bautista (North Agency)

While returning to North Agency Headquarters on Lake Hughes Road, Jesse came across a mudslide that had already trapped a pickup and a tractor trailer. Jesse assisted the pickup owner to safety and hooked up a chain to help pull the tractor out of the still-flowing mud. Jesse was able to provide updates to the Fire Department on deteriorating road conditions and ensured the safety of drivers in harm's way.



Miguel Felix (SouthAgency)

On July 17, 2014, Miguel was setting up the trailer stage for Parks After Dark at Ted Watkins Park. When gunshots suddenly rang out, he ran to the aid of one of the three victims. Miguel applied direct pressure to the victim's wound, called police and stayed with the victim until relieved by authorities. Miguel went above and beyond the call of duty to save another life while in the line of fire.



Albert Trujillo (North Agency—not pictured)

While working at Bassett Park, Albert was notified by a patron that a man was exposing himself in front of children by the exercise equipment. Albert asked park staff to call the police, but saw the man was walking toward the children on the playground. Albert intervened to keep the children safe, and helped detain the man until police arrived and arrested the suspect.



DRAWING ON THEIR KNOWLEDGE

At a park named for a giant of history, a special art contest helps young people express themselves.

As the nation paused in February to reflect on the many contributions that African-Americans have made to our history and culture, the annual Black History Art Contest at Los Angeles County's Jackie Robinson Park showed that it has grown into a highlight of the month in Littlerock, Calif.

Held this year on Feb. 18, the event invites Keppel Union School District students from kindergarten through eighth grade to contribute original works of art depicting significant figures in black history. Members of the local community are then invited to vote on their favorites among well over 1,000 pieces of art displayed at the park. The final selections are evaluated by a panel of judges — with first, second and third-place awarded in four age groups.

Many submissions depicted the park's namesake, who broke the color barrier in Major League Baseball. Others honored figures ranging from the heroic Harriet Tubman, who freed slaves on the Underground Railroad, to present-day astrophysicist Neil DeGrasse Tyson.

While artistic skills may vary among the contest submissions, what is important about the Jackie Robinson Park Black History Art Contest is the inspiration it brings to the participating young people. They can also achieve great things, and perhaps one day be the subject of a kindergartner's drawing of a great man or woman. Eleventh-grader Jaraun Griggs — a member of the Littlerock High School African-American Males Club, whose members were tapped to judge the art contest — said it was vital that younger children know about the contributions of African-Americans and "understand the importance of Black history, of where we came from and where we are trying to go." — *Heather Larson*

When 9,000 miles away is right next door

#ParksMakeLifeBetter

Though the planet we live on may often seem unfathomably large, we sometimes experience moments that underscore just how small it can be. Like, for example, when a T-shirt from an annual fishing derby at Cerritos Community Regional Park, sponsored by Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe, is found on a girl in Uganda.

What makes the world seem even smaller? As demonstrated by the backstory of this photograph, it is frequently pure coincidence: Posing with the young girl is Shannon Abdulwahab, a 4th District resident who met her in April while on a medical mission to the Otino-Waa orphanage in Lira, Uganda.

Sponsored by Cottonwood Church in Los Alamitos, "the purpose of this trip was to provide vision screenings and care to the children and teachers of this orphanage and the surrounding community," said Abdulwahab. Over the course of five days, the 11-woman team screened almost 700 patients, distributed about 200 pairs of eyeglasses and identified 20 people who will receive needed cataract surgery later this year.

"The most amazing thing about this trip wasn't giving sight to the blind ... it was seeing that, despite having next to nothing, these kids had so much hope — and with hope comes happiness," she said. "They had huge smiles. Every time I looked at them I felt hopeful and happy and I just knew everything would be okay.

"I saw the little girl wearing the Don Knabe shirt on our last day at

the orphanage. ... I literally could not believe my eyes. In that moment, I felt like I was truly meant to be at Otino-Waa and I had all of Southern California behind me. But then I went to the girl to ask for a picture. After the picture, I asked what her name was. Her name is Hope. It still gives me chills."

Derby, though Abdulwahab noted that Otino-Waa is supported by a number of churches in the 4th District. It is likely that its original owner outgrew the shirt and donated it — not realizing that this token of a great day at an L.A.
