

Los Angeles County Probation COVID-19 Weekly Update March 5, 2021

Efforts to address the medically fragile population in detention facilities


The Probation Department currently does not have any youth with compromised immune systems or other medical conditions placing them at higher risk for COVID-19 infection. As of March 4, 2021, Juvenile Court Health Services (JCHS) has identified 15 youth in care with underlying medical conditions which might exacerbate the impact of such infection. There are 11 youth in the juvenile halls and 4 in camp. If infection were to occur JCHS and the Probation Department will be working together on individualized plans to address their care.

Efforts to further reduce population in adult and juvenile detention facilities while balancing public safety


The Probation Department's juvenile detention population has declined during the COVID-19 pandemic. On March 2, 2020, the total juvenile detention population was 840.

On March 4, 2021, the total population was 409. The population for the two juvenile halls was 274 and the population for the five camps was 135. Since last week, the population in the juvenile halls decreased by 16 and the camp population decreased by two.

The chart below illustrates the new admissions into detention for February 2021. During the month of February, a total of 174 youth entered juvenile hall. The largest percentage (62%) of new admissions were for felony offenses followed by warrants (23%).




The chart below illustrates the total number of youth that were released from juvenile hall or camp and the number of youth admitted to juvenile hall during the month of February. A total of 225 youth were released from either juvenile hall or camp. Of the 225 youth that were released back into the community, 190 were released from a juvenile hall and 35 youth were released from a camp.



The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) continued to schedule early releases from California prisons to the Probation Department AB109 program. For the month of February, there were 35 early releases. The early releases from CDCR have totaled to 2,918 since April 2020.

The chart below illustrates the CDCR early releases to the Probation Department by month since April 2020.



Efforts to provide resources to support those released from jails, and juvenile detention facilities to prevent homelessness

The Probation Department continues to make efforts to reduce the population in juvenile halls by releasing youth to parents, guardians, and suitable placements when appropriate. Youth are not released into the community without a place to live.

The Probation Department continues to partner with CDCR to receive early releases from California prisons to AB109 supervision in the communities. All homeless adult clients are provided with housing referrals. In the month of February, the AB109 program received 4 CDCR releases that required referrals for housing.

Plans for quarantining and isolating youth in custody

The Probation Department continues to utilize the plans for quarantine and isolation in accordance with the Public Health Order to reduce the transmission of COVID-19. All isolations and quarantines in detention facilities continue to occur in partnership with JCHS personnel. Upon entry to probation facilities, all youth continue to be tested for COVID-19 and remain apart from the general population and living units under quarantine.

The chart below illustrates the number of positive COVID-19 cases for detained youth through February 28, 2021.

As of March 4, 2021, 223 youth have tested positive for COVID-19. There were 110 youth who tested positive for COVID-19 at admission and 113 youth who tested positive while in care. The 113 youth were from the following facilities: 44 at BJNJH, 15 at CJH, 15 at Camp Joseph Paige (CJP), 14 at Dorothy Kirby Center (DKC), 9 at Camp Glenn Rockey (CGR), 7 at Camp Clifton Afflerbaugh (CBA), and 9 at Campus Vernon Kilpatrick (CVK).

As of March 4, 2021, there were 21 youth in quarantine due to a possible exposure to COVID-19: 13 at CJH and 8 at BJNJH. Youth residing in quarantine living units do not interact with youth in non-quarantine living units.

All juvenile hall living units and camps under quarantine have full programming. Youth under quarantine continue to have access to virtual visiting and an increase in telephone communication with families. The youth in quarantine continue to participate in programming with their living unit, with limits set to avoid interaction with the non-quarantined youth. The youth under quarantine in juvenile halls have individual laptops for virtual remote learning services, provided by the Los Angeles County Department of Education (LACOE).

The quarantined youth in camp continue to have programming and activities. The camps under quarantine remain closed to newly admitted youth who have been given camp dispositions from juvenile court. Quarantined units are precautionary measures that have been placed due to a possible COVID-19 exposure and the youth are monitored to identify illness if present.

Increased washing of hands, hygiene, additional cleaning supplies and custodial services

The Probation Department has continued to utilize the hygiene and cleaning plans outlined in the first weekly update. The Probation Department continues to receive additional supplies to assist with cleaning and enhanced safety measures. The field offices have safety plans in place that evolve to keep pace with local and state health orders.

Screening of youth, focus on healthy staffing in the detention facilities

The Probation Department continues to screen newly detained youth upon their arrival to juvenile hall. They are separated from other youth until negative COVID-19 results are received. Employees continue to be screened prior to their entrance into detention facilities. Youth who have tested positive remain in medical isolation and those youth who potentially have been exposed are quarantined and continue to be monitored by JCHS.


Additional information:

- As of March 4, 2021, there have been 3,795 youth that have tested for COVID-19 since testing was initiated on May 3, 2020.
- There have been 2,028 youth tested upon admission in juvenile halls; 1,251 tested from juvenile hall's general population; and 516 tested from the camp population.

Information on Probation Employees' COVID-19 status

As of March 4, 2021, 774 Probation Department employees have tested positive for COVID-19. This is an increase of four additional positive reports since last week's report. Of the 774 employees, 386 employees work in juvenile facilities and 388 work in field offices, which includes 3 contract employees. During the month of February, there were a total of 42 COVID-19 positive cases among employees.

The chart below illustrates the monthly breakdown of COVID-19 positive cases among Probation employees since tracking them in March 2020.



The Probation Department continues monitoring to ensure employees are wearing masks, washing hands, and maintaining physical distancing.

In person visitation and virtual visitation continue to keep families connected and increase communication.

There were 135 in-person visits in the juvenile halls and camps this past weekend, the same amount as the previous weekend. Specifically, 100 visits occurred in the juvenile halls and 35 in the camps.

Additional Information

As of March 4, 2021, there were 240 youth in Short Term Residential Treatment Programs (STRTP) and 20 youth with Resource Families. There are two youth who are quarantining in their STRTP for possible exposure to someone with COVID-19. Currently there are no youth who have tested positive COVID-19.
