In January 2022, the Los Angeles County Probation department began providing volunteer chaplains to assist officers and staff. Chaplaincy programs are designed to provide spiritual guidance to staff members across various religious belief systems. Our chaplains are trained men and women who are available to give support to staff in times of need. Most law enforcement agencies around the country maintain a chaplaincy program to work with staff in the high-stress positions of law enforcement, fire and rescue, probation, and other jobs where the stakes and pressures are high.

The Los Angeles County Probation Department Volunteer Chaplaincy Program got its start at the request of former department Chiefs Terri McDonald and Ray Leyva. "Chief Leyva asked me to start putting together a plan for a volunteer chaplaincy program," said Steve Gores, Coordinator of the Reserve Deputy Probation Officer Program. "Chief McDonald had also asked staff to start a similar program." The Executive Chaplaincy Committee, headed by Senior Probation Director Randal Pineda, included SDPO Georgina Clink, PTSI John Dolorfino, SDPO Arthur Mayfield II, Head of Marketing and Communications Karla Tovar, and HR Director Deanna Carlisle.

Under Chief Deputy Adam Bettino's leadership, the chaplaincy unit teams were merged. After a rigorous clearance process, including interviews, panel reviews, and background checks, five chaplains were accepted into the program and are now ready to support the Los Angeles County Probation Department.

We are pleased to add the Chaplaincy Program to our many staff wellness programs including Peer Support, Probation Support Services, the County EAP, and other programs that help promote well-being.

Father David Bedros, Lead Chaplain

David Bedros was born in Kameshli, Syria and received his elementary and secondary education in Hasaki City, Syria. David attended law school at Aleppo University and completed 3 years of law degree studies in 1989. He earned his bachelor's degree (equivalent) in 1999 from Saint Paul's Institute of Philosophy and Theology. He received a master's degree in Intercultural Studies in 2019 from Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, CA.

Currently a chaplain for the Burbank Police Department as well as Pastor at Our Lady of Martyrs Armenian Catholic church, Father Bedros was ordained a priest on September 18, 1999. He has served for twenty-six years.

In 2002, Fr. Bedros held a very successful and important role with the Armenian Catholic church and its communities between Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, and Washington DC as the lead clergy position in St. Mark's Armenian Catholic Church in Philadelphia. David had been appointed by the Bishop Manuel Batakian, Exarch of the Armenian Catholic Church in the USA and Canada. In July of 2010, he was appointed as assistant pastor in St. Gregory Armenian Catholic Church, Glendale, California. In September 2012, he was appointed to his current assignment as pastor of the first Armenian Catholic Parish in California, Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Armenian Catholic Church in Los Angeles. Fr. Bedros also currently leads the Armenian Catholic Missions in San Diego, San Jose and San Francisco.




Father John Kouki

Father John George Kouki was born in Hassakeh, Syria on May 6th, 1973. As a youth he moved to Aleppo, Syria and soon after graduating high school served with Archbishop Youhanna Ibrahim. He studied at the St. Aphrem Seminary Theology College in Damascus for 4 years. 2001 was a memorable year as Father Kouki was married, and ordained as Archdeacon, and as a Priest.

Rabbi Langsam is an Ordained Rabbi from The West Coast Talmudical Seminary. He is Certified Mohel by the Chief Rabbinate in Israel. Married with four children, he served in the United States Coast Guard as LT, ACS Chaplain on the USCGC Halibut.
