GROUP HOME PROGRAM MONITORING REPORT -SUBJECT:

> MESA STREET, PACIFIC AVENUE, AND 253RD STREET FUTURE:

**GROUP HOMES** 

We have completed a review of Mesa Street, Pacific Avenue and 253<sup>rd</sup> Street Group Homes (Group Home or Agency) operated by Bright Future, Inc. The Group Homes contract with the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) and the Probation Department (Probation).

The Group Homes are six-bed facilities, which provide care for boys ages 11-17 years who exhibit behavioral, social, and emotional difficulties. At the time of the monitoring visit, Mesa Street and Pacific Avenue Group Homes were each providing services for five Los Angeles County DCFS children; and 253rd Street Group Home was providing services for six Los Angeles County DCFS children. Bright Future Group Homes are located in the Fourth District.

## Scope of Review

The purpose of the review was to determine whether the Agency was providing the services outlined in their Program Statement. Additionally, the review covered basic child safety and licensing issues, and included an evaluation of the Agency's Program Statement, internal policies and procedures, child case records, a facility inspection, and interviews with children placed in the Group Home at the time of the review. Interviews with children were designed to obtain their perspectives on the program services provided by the Agency, and to ensure adherence to the Foster Youth Bill of Rights.

# **Summary of Findings**

Generally, the Agency was providing the services outlined in their Program Statement. However, the Agency needs to address several deficiencies. Specifically, Mesa Street Group Home needs to provide appropriate landscape in the back yard, repair the block wall, and clean or replace the carpets/rugs in the common areas. Pacific Avenue Group Home needs to replace light bulbs, clean the grout around the bathtub, and clean or replace stairway window coverings.

Attached is a detailed report of the review.

## Review of Report

We discussed our report with the Agency's management. The Agency's management is required to provide a corrective action plan to the Children Services Group Home Ombudsman within 20 business days from the date of this report. We thank the management and staff for their cooperation during our review.

# I. Facility and Environment

### Method of assessment – Observation

### Comments:

The Bright Future, Mesa Street Group Home is located in a residential community. The front yard is clean and adequately landscaped. However, the back yard lacks landscaping, and the block wall is severely damaged.

The interior of the Group Home needs improvement to the common quarters. The rugs/carpets in the living room and den have stains in several places. The floor around the indoor water fountain is not clean. There is adequate furniture and lighting in the Group Home. The Group Home provides a home-like environment.

Children's bedrooms are well maintained. The rooms are clean and orderly, and have age-appropriate personalized decorations. There is adequate furniture, lighting, and storage space. Window coverings and window screens are in good repair. The mattresses are comfortable, and the beds all have a full complement of linens. Children's sleeping arrangements are appropriate.

The Group Home maintains age appropriate and accessible recreational equipment. There are also board games, a TV, and a DVD player. There is an appropriate quantity and quality of reading materials, and educational resources and supplies, including a computer readily available to children.

The Group Home maintains a sufficient supply of perishable and non-perishable foods.

### Recommendations

- 1. Bright Future, Inc., management
  - a. Provide appropriate landscape in the back yard.
  - b. Repair the block wall.
  - c. Clean or replace carpets/rugs in the common areas.

### Comments:

Children are informed about the Group Home's policies and procedures. Children report that they feel safe in the Group Home, and are provided with appropriate staff

supervision. Children expressed satisfaction with the quality of their interactions with staff, and report that staff treats them with respect and dignity.

Children report that they are assigned chores that are reasonable and not too demanding. Children are allowed to have private visitors, to make and receive personal telephone calls, and to send and receive unopened correspondence and mail. Children are able to attend religious services of their choice.

Children report that the discipline policies are consistently enforced and that there are fair and appropriate consequences for inappropriate behavior.

Children report satisfaction with meals and snacks.

Children are given the opportunity to receive or reject voluntary medical, dental, and psychiatric care.

# VII. Clothing and Allowance

#### Comments:

The Group Home provides appropriate clothing, items of necessity, and allowances to the children. The Group Home supplies children with the required \$50 monthly clothing allowance, and children are given the opportunity to select their own clothes. Clothing provided to children is of good quality and of sufficient quantity.

The Group Home provides children with the required minimum base allowance. Children are permitted to spend their allowances as they choose.

The Group Home provides children with adequate personal care items.

Children are encouraged and assisted in creating and maintaining photo albums/life books.

# I. Facility and Environment

### Method of assessment – Observation

#### Comments:

The Bright Future, Pacific Avenue Group Home is located in a residential community. The exterior of the Group Home is well maintained. The front and back yards are clean, adequately landscaped.

The interior of the Group Home requires improvement. The stairway light, and the bathroom light in the lower west part of the home lacks the appropriate number and type of light bulbs. In addition, the grout around the bathtub has mold. The window coverings on the two small windows located over the stairway area are not clean. There is adequate furniture in the Group Home. The Group Home provides a home-like environment.

Children's bedrooms are well maintained. The rooms are clean and orderly, and have age-appropriate personalized decorations. There is adequate furniture, lighting, and storage space. Window coverings and window screens are in good repair. The mattresses are comfortable, and the beds all have a full complement of linens. Children's sleeping arrangements are appropriate.

The Group Home maintains age appropriate and accessible recreational equipment. There are also board games, a TV, and a DVD player. There is an appropriate quantity and quality of reading materials, and educational resources and supplies, including a computer readily available to children.

The Group Home maintains a sufficient supply of perishable and non-perishable foods.
