7 WILL BE LED IN THE INVOCATION BY FATHER GABRIEL KUMORDJI FROM
8 THE HOLY REDEEMER CHURCH IN MONTROSE, FOLLOWED BY THE PLEDGE
9 OF ALLEGIANCE, WHICH WILL BE LED BY RICHARD D. BENNINGER,
10 COMMANDER, NORWALK POST NUMBER 359, THE AMERICAN LEGION.
11 FATHER?

13 **FATHER GABRIEL KUMORDJI:** BLESSED ARE YOU GOD OF ALL CREATION.
14 YOU CREATED THE WORLD, THE EARTH, AND ALL ITS BEINGS. YOU
15 CREATED A SUN FOR THE DAY AND A MOON FOR NIGHT. YOU CREATED
16 HUMANS TO MANAGE AND CARE FOR THE WORLD. OUR GREED HAS LET US
17 MOVE FROM THE IDEALS. WE HAVE DESTROYED THE BEAUTY OF CREATION
18 FOR PROFIT. WE HAVE EXPLOITED ONE ANOTHER FOR CONTROL. WE HAVE
19 CAUSED VIOLENCE IN THE NAME OF POWER. THESE HONORABLE MEN AND
20 WOMEN ARE CHOSEN TO PUT ORDER IN OUR SOCIETY. YOU SELECTED

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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS, BECAUSE THIS IS BRING
2 YOUR CHILD TO WORK TODAY, AND WE HAVE LITTLE MICHAEL AND MARY
3 WITH ME, WE WERE UPSTAIRS WITH THE EMPLOYEES' CHILDREN TAKING
4 PHOTOGRAPHS BEFORE THE MEETING AND DID NOT HAVE THE
5 OPPORTUNITY TO BE HERE WHEN OUR FATHER GABRIEL KUMORDJI LED US
6 IN PRAYER. FATHER IS FROM MONTROSE AT THE HOLY REDEEMER
7 CATHOLIC CHURCH THERE AND HE WAS BORN IN GHANA, IN WEST
8 AFRICA, AND HE ATTENDED SEMINARY IN NORTH GHANA, WHERE HE WAS
9 ORDAINED A PRIEST BACK IN 1985. HE CAME TO THE UNITED STATES
10 IN 1991 TO DO GRADUATE WORK AT LOYOLA UNIVERSITY IN CHICAGO
11 WHERE HE RECEIVED HIS MASTERS IN PASTORAL STUDIES. HE ALSO
12 ATTENDED, IN THE UNITED STATES, SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY IN
13 SAINT LOUIS WHERE HE RECEIVED A POSTGRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN
14 RELIGIOUS FORMATION. IN 1993, HE RETURNED TO GHANA TO TEACH.
15 THEN HE RETURNED TO THE UNITED STATES IN 2001 TO STUDY AT
16 FULLER THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY, WHERE HE RECEIVED A MASTER'S IN
17 INTERCULTURAL STUDIES AND WHERE HE IS CURRENTLY IS A PH.D.
18 STUDENT IN INTERCULTURAL STUDIES. HIS TOPIC OF RESEARCH IS
19 WORKING IN ETHNIC CONFLICT AREA IN NORTHERN GHANA, A CHALLENGE
20 TO DEVELOPMENT WORKERS AND MISSIONARIES. UPON COMPLETION OF
21 HIS STUDIES, HE WISHES TO RETURN TO GHANA AND TRAIN PEOPLE TO
22 WORK IN CONFLICT SOLUTIONS BUT WE'RE VERY PLEASED THAT HE IS
23 ABLE TO LIVE IN OUR GREAT COMMUNITY OF MONTROSE AND BE A
24 PASTOR AT HOLY REDEEMER CHURCH. SO, FATHER, THANK YOU FOR
25 COMING DOWN AND FOR GIVING YOUR LIFE TO OUR LORD. [APPLAUSE]

2 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** DO YOU HAVE ANY PRESENTATIONS, SUPERVISOR
3 MOLINA? OKAY. WE WILL BEGIN, THEN, WITH THE SECOND DISTRICT.
4 BUT JUST A POINT OF ORDER. I'D LIKE TO MAKE MY FIRST
5 PRESENTATION TO MY GRANDDAUGHTERS.

9 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SHE'S JUST 14 MONTHS OLD. THIS IS CHRISTIE.
10 AND THIS IS KAITLYN. [APPLAUSE]

12 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR BURKE?

13

14 **SUP. BURKE:** I WAS JUST SAYING TO MR. JANSSEN, ONE OF THE THESE
15 DAYS I'LL HAVE SOME GRANDCHILDREN TO BRING, TOO. DON'T THINK
16 I'LL GOING TO BE ALL LEFT OUT FOREVER. [LAUGHTER]

17

18 **SUP. BURKE:** I'D LIKE TO CALL SHARON ST. JAMES HICKS, WHO IS
19 PRESIDENT OF THE LEAGUE FOR AFRICAN-AMERICAN WOMEN, FORWARD.
20 IS SHE HERE WITH US? PLEASE COME FORWARD. MINORITY WOMEN
21 REPRESENT ONE OF THE FASTEST GROWING GROUPS OF NEW H.I.V.
22 PATIENTS. MANY OF THESE PATIENTS ARE MOTHERS AND THEIR
23 CHILDREN ARE DIRECTLY IMPACTED, EITHER BY BEING BORN WITH
24 H.I.V./A.I.D.S., BY CONTRACTING IT AFTER BIRTH FROM MOTHER'S
25 MILK OR BY LIVING WITH A MOTHER WHOSE ENERGIES OR INCOME-



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1 EARNING OPPORTUNITIES HAVE BEEN LESSENERED, OFTEN SEVERELY, BY
2 THIS CONDITION. IN THE LAST FOUR YEARS, EMPLOYEES OF THE
3 OFFICE OF A.I.D.S. PROGRAM AND POLICY IN LOS ANGELES HAVE
4 HELPED GENERATE MORE THAN \$6,000 IN CONTRIBUTIONS AND SUPPORT
5 THROUGH THE ANNUAL SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA REGIONAL A.I.D.S. WALK
6 FOR MINORITY WOMEN AND CHILDREN. UNFORTUNATELY, THE NEED FOR
7 THIS HELP CONTINUES TO INCREASE. THIS WEEK, THE WALK WILL TAKE
8 PLACE ON APRIL 24TH ON THE CAMPUS OF CAL STATE UNIVERSITY
9 DOMINGUEZ HILLS. AND ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND
10 THE PEOPLE OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY, I HEREBY JOIN WITH THE STATE
11 OF CALIFORNIA IN PROCLAIMING APRIL 24TH, 2004, AS SOUTHERN
12 CALIFORNIA A.I.D.S. WALK DAY THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY OF LOS
13 ANGELES. AND, IN THIS OBSERVATION, I HEREBY PRESENT THIS
14 SCROLL TO SHARON ST. JAMES HICKS AND URGE ALL COUNTY EMPLOYEES
15 TO PARTICIPATE AND SUPPORT SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA A.I.D.S. WALK
16 ON APRIL 24TH, AND I KNOW CONGRESSWOMAN JUANITA MCDONALD--
17 MILLENDER MCDONALD HAS BEEN A STRONG SUPPORTER OF THIS AND WE
18 WILL CONTINUE TO WORK WITH HER AND WE WANT TO CONGRATULATE
19 YOU, AND I KNOW WE'LL HAVE A LOT OF SUPPORT FROM THE COUNTY
20 WORKERS. [APPLAUSE]

22 **SHARON ST. JAMES HICKS:** ON BEHALF OF THE LEAGUE OF AFRICAN-
23 AMERICAN WOMEN AND CONGRESSWOMAN JUANITA MILLENDER MCDONALD,
24 OUR FOUNDER, WE WOULD JUST LIKE TO THANK YOU FOR THIS
25 PROCLAMATION TODAY AND WE LOOK FORWARD TO SEEING MANY OF THE



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1 COUNTY WORKERS OUT THERE WALKING WITH US. WE LOVE TO HAVE YOUR
2 MONEY BUT WE WANT COMMITMENT, WE WANT TO SEE WALKERS OUT
3 THERE, TOO, AND IT WILL BE HELD APRIL 24TH, THIS SATURDAY,
4 REGISTRATION AT 7:30 A.M. AND THE WALK STARTS AT NINE, AND THE
5 CONGRESSWOMAN WILL BE THERE AND MANY OTHER DIGNITARIES. SO
6 THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR THIS. [APPLAUSE]

7

8 **SUP. BURKE:** I'D LIKE TO ASK TERRI MAGUIRE TO COME FORWARD. THE
9 COUNTY LIBRARY SYSTEM CONTINUES TO PROVIDE AN ARRAY OF
10 INVALUABLE SERVICES TO INDIVIDUALS SEEKING KNOWLEDGE AND
11 ENJOYMENT. TO STUDENTS AND FORMAL-- THOSE INVOLVED IN FORMAL

14 WOMEN OF OUR ARMED FORCES IN IRAQ THAT-- AS WELL, TOO, SO

4 REMOTELY. IT'S TRULY MY PLEASURE TO JOIN YOU ON THIS OCCASION
5 TODAY. AS A MEMBER OF THE MARCH OF DIMES BOARD OF DIRECTORS
6 FOR THE LOS ANGELES CITY AND, AS MY ROLE AS A REPRESENTATIVE
7 OF FARMERS INSURANCE, IT'S REALLY GREAT WHEN WE SEE THE
8 PRIVATE AND THE PUBLIC SECTORS COME TOGETHER TO JOIN FOR SUCH
9 A COMMON AND A NOBLE GOAL. I MEAN, WE REALLY ARE IN THIS
10 TOGETHER TO RAISE MONEY SO THAT NEWBORN BABIES CAN HAVE A

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** HE SPENT 45 SEASONS AS U.S.C.'S HEAD COACH,
21 LEADING THE TROJANS TO AN UNPRECEDENTED 11 NATIONAL
22 CHAMPIONSHIPS, INCLUDING A RECORD FIVE STRAIGHT TITLES, 28
23 CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS, AND AN OVERALL WINNING RECORD OF
24 NEARLY 700%. HE WAS NAMED COACH OF THE YEAR SIX TIMES BY THE
25 COLLEGE BASEBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION AND INDUCTED INTO ITS



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1 HALL OF FAME IN 1970. IN 1974, U.S.C.'S DEDEAUX FIELD OPEN ITS
2 GATES ON THE UNIVERSITY PARK CAMPUS IN HONOR OF THIS GREAT
3 COACH. HE WAS RECENTLY HONORED BY COLLEGIATE BASEBALL MAGAZINE
4 AS N.C.A.A. DIVISION ONE COACH OF THE CENTURY, AS THE
5 PUBLICATION CALLED HIM "THE GAME'S TRUE MASTER COACH". ROD IS
6 A PERSONAL FRIEND AND SUPPORTER AND A CLOSE NEIGHBOR OF MINE
7 AND, WHEN LITTLE MICHAEL WAS BORN FIVE YEARS AGO, HE SENT OVER
8 A U.S.C. BASEBALL JERSEY FOR HIM TO WEAR. AND WE'RE PROUD TO
9 SAY THAT HE'S NOW IN T- BALL, HE STARTED THIS SEASON, AND HE'S
10 PLAYING FOR THE YANKEES IN THE JEWISH WAR VETERANS LEAGUE IN

6 L.A." AND IT'S ALWAYS "BEAT L.A." AND WE PLAYED IN THE COLLEGE
7 WORLD SERIES ON AN OCCASION OR TWO AT OMAHA AND THERE ARE
8 REPRESENTATIVES FROM ALL OVER THE COUNTRY WITH THE DIFFERENT
9 TEAMS BUT ONE OF THE LITTLE FEATURES THAT THEY HAVE THERE AT
10 OMAHA, THEY BROADCAST THE WEATHER, BECAUSE WEATHER'S A VERY
11 SIGNIFICANT THING, WHETHER YOU PLAY OR WHETHER YOU DON'T, THE
12 RAIN, ET CETERA. SO THEY WILL MAKE ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, THIS IS
6 ONE OF THE SAD POINTS THAT WE RECOGNIZE IN HISTORY, AND THIS
7 OCCURRED 89 YEARS AGO AS WE MARK THE 89TH ANNIVERSARY OF ONE
8 OF THE MOST ABHORRENT CHAPTERS OF DEATH AND DESTRUCTION. AND
9 THIS WAS DURING THE ARMENIAN GENOCIDE WHEN THE TURKISH
10 GOVERNMENT ARRESTED AND MURDERED OVER 1-1/2 MILLION RELIGIOUS,
11 POLITICAL, INTELLECTUAL FAMILIES OF ARMENIAN LEADERS AND
12 LEADERS OF THE COMMUNITY. TO ENSURE THAT THOSE WHO HAVE DIED
13 DUE TO THE HUMAN RIGHTS ATROCITIES ARE NEVER FORGOTTEN, THE
14 ARMENIAN COUNCIL OF AMERICA HAS DEDICATED EACH APRIL 24TH AS A
15 DAY OF REMEMBRANCE FOR THE ARMENIAN GENOCIDE. AND JOINING US
16 TODAY, ONCE AGAIN, AS HE DID LAST YEAR AS WELL, PETER
17 DARAKJIAN, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE AMERICAN COUNCIL OF
18 AMERICA, WHO IS HERE TO ACCEPT THIS PROCLAMATION REPRESENTING
19 THE 10 MILLION CITIZENS OF LOS ANGELES' COUNTIES
20 REPRESENTATIVES, THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, WHO HAVE SIGNED
21 THIS COMMENDATION IN RECOGNITION OF THIS DAY OF REMEMBRANCE.

12 EDITOR ON BEHALF OF THE DAILY NEWS SUNDAY SPORTS SECTIONS,
13 WHICH WAS NAMED THE 20 BEST OF THE NATION'S ASSOCIATED PRESS
14 SPORTS EDITORS FOR THE FOURTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR. COMPETING IN
15 THE 100 TO 250,000 CIRCULATION CATEGORY, THE AWARD UNDERSCORES

16 WHO IS HERE WITH HIS WIFE, CINDY, AND CAPTAIN CARL DEASLY, AND
17 WE'RE RECOGNIZING BRIAN FOR HIS EFFORTS AND INGENUITY IN
18 APPREHENDING A DANGEROUS CRIMINAL INVOLVED IN A 1997 ANTELOPE
19 VALLEY HATE CRIME MURDER. NOW, THIS INVESTIGATION BEGAN IN
20 1997, JULY 18TH, WHEN HOWARD MCCLENDON WAS INSTALLED LAST YEAR
21 WITH NEW INFORMATION WHICH LED THE INVESTIGATORS TO TWO OF THE
22 THREE SUSPECTS AND THAT WAS IN THE MURDER OF HOWARD MCCLENDON.
23 AND IT HAD BEEN STALLED BECAUSE THEY COULDN'T PUT ALL THE
24 PIECES TOGETHER IN THIS VERY COMPLEX MURDER. SO IT WAS BRIAN
25 WHO WORKED FOR THE LANCASTER'S GANG DETAIL FROM '99 TO 2000,



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1 WAS THEN ABLE TO IDENTIFY THE THIRD SUSPECT BY CHECKING INTO
2 THE STATION'S RECORDS AND INTELLIGENCE ON WHITE SUPREMACIST
3 GANGS IN THE AREA. SO HE WAS ABLE TO PROVIDE THE SUSPECT'S
4 FULL NAME AND MUG SHOT TO TARGET-ORIENTED POLICING DEPUTIES,
5 WHO APPREHENDED THE SUSPECT WITHIN THREE HOURS. AND THANKS TO
6 HIS ABILITIES, ALL THREE SUSPECTS WILL NOW BE BROUGHT BEFORE
7 JUSTICE FOR THEIR CRIME. SO, BRIAN, ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY,
8 WE RECOGNIZE YOU FOR YOUR GOING THE EXTRA MILE TO FIND THIS
9 MISSING LINK IN A MURDER THAT HAD NOT BEEN SOLVED. AS A RESULT
10 OF YOUR EXPERTISE, WE ARE NOW BRINGING THOSE PEOPLE TO
11 JUSTICE. [APPLAUSE]

12

13 **CAPTAIN CARL DEASLY:** THE HORROR THAT A FAMILY GOES THROUGH
14 WHEN THEY LOSE A LOVED ONE TO MURDER WAS COMPOUNDED IN THIS
15 CASE, WHICH IS EVEN MORE TRAGIC, BECAUSE THIS MAN WAS MURDERED
16 FOR THE ONLY REASON WAS FOR THE COLOR OF HIS SKIN. THESE THREE
17 PEOPLE HUNTED THIS MAN DOWN AND JUST PICKED HIM OUT OF A CROWD
18 TO KILL HIM AND THIS FAMILY SUFFERED FOR SEVERAL YEARS BEFORE
19 THIS CRIME WAS SOLVED. I'M REALLY PROUD THAT BRIAN WORKS AT
20 LANCASTER STATION AND DID SUCH AN INCREDIBLE JOB IN THIS CASE.

23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** NOW WE WOULD RECOGNIZE A RETIRING MAYOR FROM
24 ONE OF OUR 88 CITIES AND THAT'S THE GREAT CITY OF SIERRA
25 MADRE, AND THAT'S MAYOR BART DOYLE. BART WAS ELECTED TO THE



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1 CITY COUNCIL BACK IN 1996 AND HE FOUGHT TO REPAIR THE CITY'S
2 MOUNTING FINANCIAL PROBLEMS ALONG WITH ITS ONGOING
3 INFRASTRUCTURE PROBLEMS AND, AS A RESULT, HE HELPED DEVELOP
4 SOME DIFFERENT APPROACHES TO SOLVING THE PROBLEMS. AND, TODAY,
5 DUE TO HIS EFFORTS, A LEADING FUNDAMENTAL CHANGE IN THE CITY,
6 BY THE WAY THEY CONTRACT WITH BUSINESS, THE CITY OF SIERRA
7 MADRE HAS INSTALLED FINANCIAL CONTROLS, DEVELOPED A FIVE-YEAR
8 CAPITAL PLAN, HIRED REPRESENTATION IN SACRAMENTO AND, MORE
9 IMPORTANTLY, WE ALSO DEVELOPED A VERY FINE YOUTH PROGRAM
10 CENTER THAT WILL BE OPENING THIS FALL. AND THE ONLY PROBLEM
11 THAT MAYOR DOYLE HAS FACED IS TERM LIMITS AND THIS JUST SHOWS
12 YOU ONE OF THE SHORTCOMINGS OF TERM LIMITS BECAUSE HE'S BEING
13 FORCED OUT OF OFFICE BECAUSE OF THEIR TERM LIMITS THEY HAVE IN
14 THEIR CITY. BUT THIS IS THE TYPE OF LEADER THAT WE HAVE IN OUR
15 GREAT COUNTY AND SIERRA MADRE IS ONE OF THOSE GREAT
16 COMMUNITIES WHERE EVERYBODY VOLUNTEERS, FROM THE FIRE
17 DEPARTMENT ON DOWN. AND, AS A RESULT, THEY'RE ONE OF THE BEST
18 CITIES IN THIS COUNTY. SO, BART, CONGRATULATIONS ON YOUR
19 LEADERSHIP. [APPLAUSE] .

21 **MAYOR BART DOYLE:** I WANT TO THANK THE BOARD FOR THIS
22 RECOGNITION. I REGRET THAT MY COLLEAGUE, DOUG HAYES, WHO IS

14 DENNIS ALFIERI, WHO FAITHFULLY SERVED FROM 1989 TO NOVEMBER OF
15 THIS PAST YEAR, WHERE HE WAS CHAIRMAN FROM SEPTEMBER '91
16 THROUGH DECEMBER OF 2001. FOR MORE THAN A DECADE, HE SERVED AS
17 CHAIRMAN. AND, FOR MORE THAN 14 YEARS OF SERVICE, HE LED THE
18 COMMISSION IN THE MANAGEMENT OF HOUSING OWNED BY THE COUNTY OF
19 LOS ANGELES. HE OVERSAW THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE HOUSING
20 CHOICE VOUCHER PROGRAM, WHICH ALLOWS LOW INCOME FAMILIES TO
21 LEASE OR PURCHASE SAFE, DECENT, AND AFFORDABLE PRIVATELY OWNED

13 **SUP. BURKE:** ALL MEMBERS. AND HAROLD ROWLAND WASHINGTON, JR.,
14 WHO WAS A DEVELOPER, PASSED AWAY AT APRIL 12TH, 2004, AT THE
15 AGE OF 82. A LONG-TIME RESIDENT OF SECOND DISTRICT AND
16 OUTSTANDING MEMBER OF THE COMMUNITY. HIS MOST NOTABLE
17 ACCOMPLISHMENTS INCLUDE THE FIRST BLACK BANK WEST OF CHICAGO,
18 BANK OF FINANCE, WASHINGTON VILLAGE PARK, GIBSON PARK PLAZA,
19 GRAND CIRCLE, SIMON RODEO HOMES. ALL WERE DEVELOPED AND BUILT
20 IN WATTS AFTER THE 1965 RIOT. IN THE LATE '70S, HE CONCEIVED,
21 PLANNED AND DEVELOPED 200 UNIT SENIOR CITIZENS PLAZA KNOW AS
22 VILLA PLAZA, AND THIS PROJECT WAS THE LARGEST HOUSING BOND
23 EVER ISSUED BY THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES UNDER THE STEWARDSHIP
24 OF THEN TOM BRADLEY. AND THIS WAS FOR A SINGLE SUBSIDIZED
25 RENTAL COMPLEX. MANY NATIONAL AWARDS ARE STILL BEING RECEIVED.



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1 HE LEAVES TO CHERISH HIS MEMORY HIS FAMILY, HAROLD III,
2 CAROLINE JOE, AND HIS SON, HANELL, HIS GRANDCHILDREN AND A
3 HOST OF OTHER RELATIVES, BUT MOST OF ALL, A REAL IMPACT ON THE

23 NEWSMAN. HE PASSED AWAY ON APRIL 13TH AT THE AGE OF 81. HE WAS
24 THE SON OF THE FAMED NEWSPAPER MAN, SCREEN WRITER AND
25 BIOGRAPHER, JEAN FOWLER, WHO IS ALSO KNOWN FOR WITHDRAWING AS



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1 THE CO-FOUNDER OF THE GREATER LOS ANGELES PRESS CLUB BACK IN
2 1947 BECAUSE CITY EDITOR AGNES UNDERWOOD WAS REFUSED
3 MEMBERSHIP. THEN, IT WAS AN ALL-MALE ORGANIZATION. HE SERVED
4 IN THE U.S. COAST GUARD DURING WORLD WAR II, WROTE FOR THE LOS
5 ANGELES EXAMINER, SERVED AS NEWS DIRECTOR FOR KTTV, CHANNEL
6 11, MANAGED SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PUBLIC RELATIONS FOR SENATOR
7 BARRY GOLDWATER'S '64 PRESIDENTIAL RUN AND WORKED AS PUBLICIST
8 AND INTERIM PUBLICITY DIRECTOR FOR 20TH CENTURY FOX
9 TELEVISION. HE ALSO AUTHORED SEVERAL BEST- SELLING BOOKS AND
10 PRODUCED TONY-AWARD-WINNING PLAYS. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS FIVE
11 CHILDREN, 16 GRANDCHILDREN, AND SIX GREAT-GRANDCHILDREN. ALSO
12 HENRY DYE GABRIEL, 79-YEAR-OLD LA CRESCENTA RESIDENT, WHO
13 PASSED AWAY ON APRIL 14TH. HE WAS A WORLD WAR II VETERAN,
14 SERVING IN THE US ARMY AIR FORCE AND RECIPIENT OF THE PURPLE
15 HEART. HE SPENT SEVEN MONTHS IN A GERMAN PRISON CAMP AND,
16 AFTER HONORABLE DISCHARGE, HE BEGAN A 32-YEAR CAREER WITH OUR
17 LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS
18 WIFE, WANDA, AND THEIR TWO SONS AND TWO GRANDDAUGHTERS. NORMA
19 BOYLE GIBSON, LONG-TIME EDUCATOR, SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR, PASSED
20 AWAY ON APRIL 12TH AT THE AGE OF 101. SHE GREATLY INFLUENCED
21 THE LIVES OF MANY AS A TEACHER, VICE PRINCIPAL, AND PRINCIPAL
22 IN LOS ANGELES FOR OVER 40 YEARS. I PERSONALLY KNEW HER WHEN I
23 WAS TEACHING. SHE WAS ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN MANY ORGANIZATIONS,
24 INCLUDING THE BRENTWOOD-BEL AIR WOMEN'S CLUB, THE BEVERLY
25 HILLS WOMEN'S CLUB, THE TOWN AND GOWN OF USC, THE BEL AIR



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1 REPUBLICAN WOMEN, THE PHILANTHROPIC FOUNDATION AND NAVY
2 BELLES. SHE WAS A UNIQUE INDIVIDUAL WHO WILL BE REMEMBERED FOR
3 HER WARMTH, AND SHE'S SURVIVED BY NUMEROUS NIECES AND NEPHEWS.
4 AND ALBERTA CAROLINE MANDIC, WHO PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 94
5 ON APRIL 12TH AND SHE WAS QUITE INVOLVED IN THE SAINT
6 COLUMBAN'S CATHOLIC CHURCH, GARDEN GROVE WOMEN'S CLUB AND "DO
7 NUTHINS". SHE WAS SURVIVED BY HER THREE CHILDREN. THANK YOU.

8

9 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SO ORDERED. OKAY. ALL RIGHT. WE'LL THEN GO
10 TO THE AGENDA. WE HAVE ITEM NUMBER 2 WAS HELD FOR A MEMBER OF
11 THE PUBLIC. OKAY. WARREN WILLIAMS. I'LL ASK WARREN TO COME UP,
12 AND HE CAN SPEAK ON ITEM 2 AND 4. I DON'T KNOW IF YOU WERE
13 HERE EARLIER, WARREN, BUT ITEM 4 WILL BE CONTINUED FOR ONE
14 WEEK.

15

16 **WARREN WILLIAMS:** OKAY. THERE ARE SEVERAL DIFFERENT ITEMS
17 RELATED TO THIS AND, BY THE NEW RULES OF THE BOARD OF
18 SUPERVISORS WITH THE LIMITATION OF THREE MINUTES THAT WE STILL
19 OPPOSE, THERE ARE SEVERAL DIFFERENT ITEMS. ITEM NUMBER 2
20 FIRST. ON THE LEAGUE OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN WOMEN HOLDING THE
21 ANNUAL CALIFORNIA A.I.D.S. WALK, IT SHOULD BE A PREVENTION OF
22 A.I.D.S. WALK AND IT SHOULD NOT JUST BE FOR MINORITY WOMEN AND
23 CHILDREN. IT SHOULD SIMPLY BE FOR ALL PEOPLE WHO ARE SUFFERING
24 THIS DISEASE OF A.I.D.S. AND PART OF THAT SHOULD BE A FOCUS ON
25 STOPPING THE FRAUDULENT ADVERTISEMENT IN PORNO AND OTHER SEX



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1 FILMS AND THINGS THAT CONTINUE TO ADVERTISE ADULTS AS
2 TEENAGERS. I USED TO WORK IN THE MEDIA AND TELEVISION AND WE
3 KNOW THE IMPACT OF COMMERCIALS AND THINGS AND, WHEN YOU SEE
4 THOSE TYPE OF IMAGES, THEN IT'S ENCOURAGING THEM TO
5 PARTICIPATE IN SEX. AND IT ALSO RELATES TO THE ITEMS 16
6 THROUGH 18 OF DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES
7 BECAUSE A LOT OF CHILDREN ARE MOLESTED IN THOSE HOMES. SOCIAL
8 WORKERS TURN THEIR BACKS AND ALLOW THAT TYPE OF INAPPROPRIATE,
9 IMMATURE SEX TO GO ON, AND KIDS ARE SEVERELY HARMED BY THAT AS
10 WELL AS IN FOSTER CARE AND IN OTHER AGENCIES. AND THIS COUNTY
11 CONTINUES TO IGNORE THAT, WHICH THEN PROMOTES A.I.D.S., AND
12 THEN THEY MAKE A LOT OF FUNDING BY ALLEGING THAT THEY HAVE TO
13 HAVE THESE SPECIAL PROGRAMS, MILLIONS OF DOLLARS WASTED TO TRY
14 TO CURE SOMETHING THAT IS BEST PREVENTED. ALSO, IN ITEM NUMBER
15 17 AND 18, TALK ABOUT MASSIVE SERVICE. I'VE SPOKEN TO THE
16 BOARD BEFORE THAT I'VE BEEN A VICTIM OF THAT SERVICE AND THEY
17 ALLEGE THAT THEY SENT ME A TELEGRAM OF A COURT NOTICE, WHICH I
18 NEVER RECEIVED. WHEN WE DID A PERSONAL INVESTIGATION AS TO
19 WHICH NUMBER THEY USE, THEY USE A INTERNAL D.C.F.S. NUMBER
20 ALLEGING THAT THEY SENT ME A REPORT. WHEN THE FAMILY COURT HAD
21 DENIED ANY RESTRAINING ORDERS ON ME FINDING THERE WAS NO NEED,
22 THEY THEN USED THIS ILLEGAL MESSAGE SERVICE TO HAVE A HEARING
23 IN THE DEPENDENCY COURT WHERE I HAD NO NOTICE OF THAT HEARING.
24 THEN, WITH THE HELP OF COUNTY COUNSEL, THEY END UP
25 MANIPULATING THE PROCESS TO ALLEGE, SINCE THE ORDER WAS



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1 ALREADY MADE, THEY WOULD DEFEND THAT ORDER. WE ALSO HAVE 64,
2 THE BUDGET APPROPRIATION ADJUSTMENTS, AND THE PROPOSED BUDGET,
3 AGAIN, NEEDS TO BE PUBLICIZED A LOT MORE AND MORE PEOPLE
4 INFORMED ABOUT IT SO THAT THEY CAN PROPERLY BE INVOLVED IN
5 THAT PROCESS. AND ITEM NUMBER 19 ON THE D.C.F.S. IS ABOUT
6 FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICES, AND THOSE SUPPORT SERVICES ARE THE
7 ONLY THING THAT I SEE THAT REALLY ACTUALLY MEETS HUMAN NEEDS
8 AND SHOULD BE EXPANDED, BUT NOT UNDER THE WRONG PROCESS IN
9 WHICH D.C.F.S. HAS OPERATED. ITEM NUMBER 29 TALKS ABOUT
10 CALWORKS, \$25.4 MILLION. AND NONE OF THE D.C.F.S. PROGRAMS
11 SHOULD BE FUNDED OTHER THAN THAT THEY MEET HUMAN NEEDS. I
12 WOULD LIKE TO SUBMIT TO YOU A PACKAGE HERE WHERE WE HAD THE
13 BLACK HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE AND REPARATIONS DAY ON THE 18TH,
14 ON SUNDAY, AND ON MONDAY, ON THE 19TH, WHERE THE MEMORY OF OUR
15 ANCESTORS AND MR. PEOPLES, AND WHEN I SUBMIT THIS, THAT THIS
16 GOES TO ALL THE FOSTER CARE YOUTH, THE CHILDREN, ALL THE
17 EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS OF THE PROGRAM, BECAUSE THEY HAVE
18 KNOWLEDGE-- YES-- IF THEY HAVE KNOWLEDGE OF THE TRUE WORLD
19 HISTORY OF THEMSELVES, IT WILL BOOST ESTEEM, GIVE THEM MORE
20 PRIDE AND CONTROL OF THEIR OWN DESTINY AND FAITH. SO I SUBMIT
21 THIS AS WELL AS A POSTER THAT'S OUTSIDE. THANK YOU.

22

23 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. THANK YOU. ITEM 2 IS BEFORE US. MOVED
24 BY SUPERVISOR BURKE. THE CHAIR WILL SECOND. WITHOUT OBJECTION,
25 SO ORDERED. I'M GOING TO HOLD 4 BECAUSE THERE'S SOMEBODY ELSE



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1 SIGNED UP TO TESTIFY ON THAT. BUT I'LL MOVE UP ITEM NUMBER 5.
2 IT WAS HELD BY SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH BUT WE DO HAVE A
3 SCHEDULING ISSUE WITH ONE OF THE PUBLIC TESTIFIERS, DENNIS
4 DICKERSON, WHO IS EXECUTIVE OFFICER OF THE CALIFORNIA REGIONAL
5 WATER CONTROL BOARD. WE'D ASK DENNIS, IF HE'S STILL HERE, TO
6 COME FORWARD, PLEASE. SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, ITEM NUMBER 5.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS, SOME QUESTIONS THAT WE
9 WOULD LIKE TO ASK TO THE REGIONAL BOARD. IS IT CORRECT THAT,
10 FOR THE LAST 50 YEARS, THE STATE HAS EXEMPTED SINGLE-FAMILY
11 DWELLINGS FROM WATER BOARD SEPTIC TANK SYSTEM OVERSIGHT
12 RESPONSIBILITY AND REQUIREMENTS?

13

14 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** YES, IT IS. WE'VE HAD A WAIVER IN PLACE
15 SINCE 1952.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND WHY IS THE BOARD NOW PROPOSING TO IMPOSE
18 ADDITIONAL SEPTIC SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS ON OWNERS OF SINGLE-
19 FAMILY RESIDENCE?

20

21 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THE BOARD IS ACTUALLY CONSIDERING AN
22 EXTENSION OF THE WAIVER. THE REASON WHY WE EVEN HAVE TO HAVE
23 THIS WAIVER BROUGHT BACK BEFORE THE BOARD IS BECAUSE OF STATE
24 LEGISLATION, SB-390, WHICH IMPOSES A DATED OF JUNE 30TH BY
25 WHICH THE WAIVER MUST BE EXTENDED. IF IT IS NOT EXTENDED BY



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1 THE REGIONAL BOARD, THEN INDIVIDUAL RESIDENTIAL SEPTIC SYSTEMS
2 WILL BECOME SUBJECT TO PERMITS BY THE REGIONAL BOARD WITH
3 POTENTIALLY PERMIT-- ANNUAL PERMIT FEES UP TO \$1,800 PER YEAR.
4 REGIONAL BOARD STAFF HAVE BEEN WORKING VERY MUCH WITH COUNTY
5 STAFF OVER THE PAST YEAR, SINCE FEBRUARY OF 2003, TO DEVELOP
6 THE LANGUAGE NECESSARY IN ORDER TO BRING A MEMORANDUM OF
7 UNDERSTANDING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS SO THAT WE CAN REACH
8 AGREEMENT AS TO HOW THOSE WAIVERS MUST BE-- CAN BE RENEWED.
9 THE REGIONAL BOARD, PURSUANT TO SB-390, IS REQUIRED, BY
10 STATUTE, TO MAKE A FINDING THAT INDIVIDUAL SEPTIC SYSTEMS DO
11 NOT-- WILL NOT ADVERSELY AFFECT WATER QUALITY AND THAT'S
12 REALLY WHAT WE'VE BEEN WORKING AND NEGOTIATING WITH COUNTY
13 STAFF ON FOR THIS TIME.

14

15 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO, FOR THE PAST 50 YEARS, THEY WERE
16 EXEMPTED, THEN THERE WAS STATE LEGISLATION THAT CHANGED THAT,
17 AND WHEN WAS THAT LEGISLATION ENACTED?

18

19 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** ROUGHLY TWO YEARS AGO AND THEN IT WAS
20 EXTENDED FOR ONE YEAR, I BELIEVE.

21

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IS THIS REGULATION AN OBLIGATION OF YOUR
23 AGENCY OR IS IT OBLIGATION OF THE COUNTY?

24



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1 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THE EXTENSION OF THE WAIVER IS AN OBLIGATION
2 OF THE BOARD THROUGH THE STATUTE AND, IN ORDER FOR THE BOARD
3 TO EXTEND THE WAIVER, WHICH THE REGIONAL BOARD STAFF, WE WANT
4 TO EMPHASIZE, ARE PROPOSING AN EXTENSION OF THE WAIVER, THE
5 BOARD HAS TO MAKE THAT FINDING. AND THAT'S REALLY THE KEY
6 EFFORT THAT WE'VE BEEN WORKING ON.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THAT'S THE REGIONAL BOARD?

9

10 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** YES.

11

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND WITH RESPECT TO THE SEPTIC REQUIREMENTS
13 PROPOSED BY YOUR BOARD, IS IT YOUR INTENT TO DELEGATE THIS
14 RESPONSIBILITY TO THE COUNTY?

15

16 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** YES.

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF THE COUNTY WERE TO
19 REFUSE OR ACCEPT THIS OBLIGATION? WOULD THE WATER BOARD THEN
20 HAVE TO ISSUE PERMITS ON ITS OWN?

21

22 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** YES.

23

24 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IF IT'S TRUE THAT THE PROPOSED REGULATIONS
25 WOULD IMPOSE UPON OWNERS OF SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENCES A NEW



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1 PROGRAM OF INSPECTIONS AND MONITORING-- OR I SAY IT IS TRUE
2 THAT IT WOULD IMPOSE UPON THEM A NEW SYSTEM OF MONITORING,
3 INSPECTIONS AND FEES?

4

5 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** I ALREADY MENTIONED THAT THERE WOULD BE AN
6 OBLIGATORY FEE THAT'S SET BY THE STATE WATER RESOURCES CONTROL
7 BOARD. THAT FEE COULD BE AS HIGH AS \$1,800 PER YEAR.

8

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AS HIGH AS \$1,800?

10

11 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** YES.

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** OKAY.

14

15 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** AND THERE WOULD POTENTIALLY BE OBLIGATIONS
16 AS WELL FOR MONITORING. HOWEVER, THOSE HAVE NOT BEEN
17 SPECIFICALLY IDENTIFIED.

18

19 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WOULD THIS PROGRAM REQUIRE INDIVIDUAL
20 HOMEOWNERS TO INSTALL MONITORING WELLS?

21

22 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** NOT IN ALL CASES BUT THE REGIONAL BOARD MAY
23 CONSIDER THE POSSIBILITY OF COMMUNITY-WIDE MONITORING EFFORTS.

24



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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND THE TYPICAL YEARLY FEES, THEN, WOULD BE
2 \$1,800?

3

4 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THAT IS A POTENTIAL FEE. THAT'S THE HIGHEST
5 IT COULD BE.

6

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND THE LOWEST WOULD BE?

8

9 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** 800.

10

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE?

12

13 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THE DIFFERENCE HAS TO DO WITH THE THREAT TO
14 WATER QUALITY, WHETHER OR NOT THE SYSTEM IS LOCATED IN A
15 SITUATION WHERE THERE WOULD BE A SIGNIFICANT THREAT TO WATER
16 QUALITY.

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** STAFF INFORMS ME THAT THE WATER BOARD'S
19 PROPOSED REGULATIONS PRESUME THAT ALL SEPTIC SYSTEMS
20 NECESSARILY DEGRADE WATER QUALITY. IS THAT TRUE?

21

22 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** SEPTIC SYSTEMS HAVE BEEN USED FOR MANY
23 DOZENS OF YEARS AND OFTEN VERY SUCCESSFULLY. IF THEY'RE
24 PROPERLY SITUATED, PROPERLY DESIGNED, THEY DON'T POSE A THREAT
25 TO WATER QUALITY BUT THERE ARE SOME LOCATIONS WHICH THEY



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1 CLEARLY DO. I THINK ONE OF THE PREEMINENT EXAMPLES IS THE
2 COMMUNITY OF MALIBU, WHERE YOU HAVE SEPTIC SYSTEMS LOCATED
3 RIGHT ON THE BEACH, RIGHT ALONG MALIBU LAGOON, AND THAT
4 EMPTIES OUT INTO A VERY POPULAR SURFING BEACH WHERE-- WHICH IS
5 CONSISTENTLY SHOWING VERY HIGH LEVELS OF BACTERIA POLLUTION.
6 AND SO THERE'S A-- THERE ARE LOCATIONS WHERE EITHER YOU HAVE
7 BACTERIA PROBLEMS ASSOCIATED WITH SEPTIC SYSTEMS OR YOU HAVE
8 NUTRIENT PROBLEMS AND YOU HAVE THE POTENTIAL FOR IMPACTING
9 DRINKING WATER SUPPLIES IN THE ACTON AGUA DULCE AREA.

10

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND YOU HAVE SCIENTIFIC EVIDENCE TO
12 DEMONSTRATE THAT MOST SEPTIC SYSTEMS ARE FAILING?

13

14 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** NO, I DIDN'T SAY THAT.

15

16 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** DON'T HAVE THAT. OKAY. HAS THE WATER BOARD
17 CONDUCTED A STUDY TO DETERMINE THE PERCENTAGE OF SEPTIC
18 SYSTEMS THAT ARE FAILING OR DEGRADING THE WATER QUALITY?

19

20 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** WE HAVE INVESTIGATED CERTAIN AREAS WHERE
21 SEPTIC SYSTEMS HAVE-- WE BELIEVE HAVE A POTENTIAL THREAT.
22 WE'VE LOOKED AT RELATIVELY FEW OF THOSE AREAS.

23

24 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND IN THE SOUTHERN, SAY, L.A. COUNTY, HAVE
25 YOU EXPLORED ANY AREAS?



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1

2 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** IN SOUTHERN L.A. COUNTY AT THE LONG BEACH
3 AREA? THAT...?

4

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** LONG BEACH, YOU HAVE?

6

7 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** NOT TO MY KNOWLEDGE AT THE MOMENT. I MAY BE
8 MISSING SOMETHING BUT I DON'T RECALL THAT OFFHAND.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IS IT TRUE THAT THE WATER QUALITY CONTROL
11 BOARD COMMISSION, THE CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY OF CHICO TO
12 CONDUCT SUCH A STUDY OF PERCENTAGE OF SEPTIC SYSTEMS THAT ARE
13 FAILING?

14

15 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THE STATE BOARD MAY HAVE DONE SO.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** STATE BOARD MAY HAVE? BASED UPON THE
18 FINDINGS, DO YOU KNOW WHAT THOSE FINDINGS OF THE CHICO STATE
19 STUDY WERE?

20

21 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** I DO NOT.

22

23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU. IS MR. NOYES OR SOMEBODY FROM
24 PUBLIC WORKS...? WHILE MR. NOYES IS COMING UP FOR COUNTY
25 COUNSEL, WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF THE COUNTY WERE TO REFUSE TO



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1 ACCEPT THE OBLIGATION? WOULD THE WATER BOARD THEN HAVE TO
2 ISSUE WATER PERMITS ON ITS OWN?

3

4 **JIM NOYES:** YES, SUPERVISOR.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** OR C.A.O.-- EXCUSE ME, WE'LL DO THE COUNTY--
7 PUBLIC WORKS. ARE SEPTIC SYSTEMS INHERENTLY RIDDLED WITH
8 PROBLEMS AND NECESSARILY DEGRADING OUR WATER QUALITY?

9

10 **JIM NOYES:** SUPERVISOR, JIM NOYES, DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS.
11 OUR OBSERVATION IS THAT, OVERALL, WE'D HAVE TO SAY NO, THAT
12 IT'S NOT A MAJOR, SIGNIFICANT PROBLEM. THERE ARE DEFINITELY
13 LOCAL AREAS, WE THINK, WHERE THERE ARE SOME PROBLEMS THAT MAY
14 NEED TO BE ADDRESSED BUT, OVERALL, OUR ASSESSMENT WOULD BE
15 THAT THE PROBLEMS ARE RELATIVELY SMALL.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** COUNTY-WIDE, WHAT PERCENTAGE OF SEPTIC
18 SYSTEMS WORK WELL? WHAT PERCENTAGE OF THESE SYSTEMS ENCOUNTER
19 PROBLEMS?

20

21 **JIM NOYES:** WE'VE NOT RUN ANY NUMBER, SUPERVISOR, AS TO WHAT
22 THE ANSWER MIGHT BE TO THAT QUESTION. IF YOU WISH SO, WE COULD
23 WORK WITH OUR FRIENDS AT HEALTH SERVICES AND TRY TO COME UP
24 WITH SOME ANSWERS. BASED ON WHAT WE SEE WHEN PEOPLE COME IN TO
25 GET PERMITS FOR REHABILITATION OR REPLACEMENT OF SEPTIC



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1 SYSTEMS, IT APPEARS TO BE A RELATIVELY SMALL PERCENTAGE THAT
2 ARE AFFECTED OR THAT HAVE TROUBLES.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YOUR ASSESSMENT, ARE THE PROPOSED REGULATIONS
5 BY THE WATER BOARD FOR SEPTIC SYSTEMS OVERREACHING OR
6 APPROPRIATE?

7

8 **JIM NOYES:** I DON'T KNOW IF I COULD SAY THEY'RE OVERREACHING AT
9 THIS POINT IN TIME. I COULD SAY, HOWEVER, THAT WE HAVE SOME
10 SERIOUS CONCERNS ABOUT THE RULES AND WE FEEL THAT THE ACTION
11 BEFORE THE BOARD TODAY TO SPEND MORE TIME HAVING A DIALOGUE
12 WITH DENNIS AND HIS STAFF IS APPROPRIATE. IN OUR PERMITTING OF
13 SEPTIC SYSTEMS, WE'VE ALWAYS BEEN VERY CONSERVATIVE TO MAKE
14 SURE THAT THE SYSTEMS MINIMIZE THE OPPORTUNITIES FOR
15 GROUNDWATER DEGRADATION. PART OF THE SYSTEM NOW, AS I
16 UNDERSTAND IT, TALKS ABOUT HIGH RISK AND MEDIUM RISK. THAT
17 CONCERNS US. RETROACTIVITY THAT'S IN THE RULES CONCERNS US. WE
18 FIRST SAW, ON MARCH 29TH, THE WASTE DISCHARGE REQUIREMENTS IN
19 DRAFT FORM THAT WE HAD HEARD ABOUT DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH.
20 WE'D LIKE SOME MORE TIME TO REVIEW THOSE SO THAT WE CAN MAKE
21 MEANINGFUL COMMENTS TO DENNIS AND HIS ORGANIZATION AND, AS
22 DENNIS MENTIONED, THIS IS GOING TO BE AN EXPENSIVE PROGRAM, IT
23 APPEARS, FOR AT LEAST SOME OF THE HOME OWNERS. WE DON'T THINK
24 IT WILL HAVE AN IMPACT ON US TO A SIGNIFICANT DEGREE BUT IT,
25 THINK, WILL HAVE AN IMPACT FROM A COST STANDPOINT ON HEALTH



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1 SERVICES AND THEY CAN CERTAINLY REFER-- ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS
2 YOU MAY HAVE IN THAT REGARD.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO YOU WOULD SUPPORT THE MOTION ON THE AGENDA
5 TODAY?

6

7 **JIM NOYES:** YES, SIR.

8

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MR. JANSSEN, IS THIS AN UNFUNDED MANDATE OR
10 DID THE STATE PROVIDE COUNTIES WITH FUNDING FOR THIS
11 OBLIGATION?

12

13 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** MR. CHAIRMAN, SUPERVISOR, THERE IS NO STATE
14 FUNDING FOR THE PROGRAM. BECAUSE IT'S A-- THERE IS A FEE
15 POSSIBILITY, THE STATE DOES NOT CONSIDER IT A MANDATE. IT'S
16 ONE OF THE OLD TECHNIQUES THAT THEY USE TO AVOID HAVING TO
17 REIMBURSE US. SO, NO, THERE'S NO STATEMENT.

18

19 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** BUT IT IS SORT OF A MANDATE?

20

21 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** OH, IT IS A MANDATE BUT, SINCE WE CAN CHARGE A
22 FEE...

23

24 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SMALL "M"?

25



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1 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** ...IT DOESN'T FALL-- YES, IN THE CONTEXT OF
2 THEIR REIMBURSEMENT FORMULA.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND THE COUNTY IS ALREADY DEALING WITH A
5 SERIES OF UNFUNDED MANDATES IMPOSED BY BOTH THE FEDERAL AND
6 STATE GOVERNMENTS IN THIS AREA, IN WATER QUALITY?

7

8 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** YES, THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS HAS SPENT
9 \$70 MILLION ALREADY FOR THE PROGRAM, FOR K.M.D.L.

10

11 **SUP. BURKE:** I HAVE A QUESTION.

12

13 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** YES, SUPERVISOR BURKE?

14

15 **SUP. BURKE:** DID YOU SAY THAT THE MINIMUM FEE IS GOING TO BE
16 \$800? PER YEAR?

17

18 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THAT WOULD BE IN THE CASE IF THE WAIVERS ARE
19 NOT EXTENDED. IT IS THE REGIONAL BOARD STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION
20 THAT THE WAIVERS DO BE EXTENDED, IN WHICH CASE THE PERMIT FEE
21 WOULD NOT BE APPLIED.

22

23 **SUP. BURKE:** THE REASON WHY THIS CONCERNS ME IS THERE'S SO MANY
24 AREAS OF LOS ANGELES WHERE THEY DON'T EVEN HAVE SEWERS. SO
25 PEOPLE DON'T HAVE A CHOICE. IT'S A MATTER THAT THEY ARE



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1 DEPENDENT UPON SEPTIC AND, IN ORDER TO PUT IN THOSE SEWERS, IT
2 WILL BE A HUGE BOND REQUIREMENT AND I'M NOT FAMILIAR WITH ALL
3 THE OTHER CITIES BUT, IN THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, CERTAINLY
4 THERE ARE MANY AREAS THAT DO NOT HAVE SEWERS.

5

6 **DAVID DICKERSON:** AND THE REGIONAL BOARD IS NOT PROPOSING TO
7 HAVE SEWERS OR TO REQUIRE THE REPLACEMENT OF SEPTIC SYSTEMS.
8 THE INTENT OF THE REGIONAL BOARD STAFF'S RECOMMENDATION IS TO
9 LEAVE THIS PROGRAM WITH THE COUNTY AND THAT IS OUR
10 RECOMMENDATION AND WE HOPE HOPE OBTAIN THAT RESULT BY JUNE
11 30TH SO THAT THIS PROGRAM DOES NOT REVERT TO THE REGIONAL
12 BOARD.

13

14 **SUP. BURKE:** WELL, IF THE REGIONAL BOARD RETAINS IT, IS IT
15 THEIR INTENTION THAT THEY'RE GOING TO INSTITUTE THESE FEES?

16

17 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** WE DON'T HAVE A CHOICE. IF WE HAVE TO ISSUE
18 PERMITS, WHEN WE ISSUE PERMITS, THERE WOULD BE A FEE
19 ASSOCIATED WITH THAT.

20

21 **SUP. BURKE:** WELL, IF THE COUNTY TAKES IT OVER, WILL THEY HAVE
22 TO THEN ISSUE PERMITS?

23

24 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** YOU ALREADY ARE ISSUING PERMITS.

25



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1 **SUP. BURKE:** FOR NEW. WE DON'T ISSUE ONGOING PERMITS.

2

3 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** THERE WOULD BE A REQUIREMENT, AS DRAFTED
4 PRESENTLY, AND IT IS A DRAFT PROPOSAL, THAT THERE WOULD BE A
5 REQUIREMENT FOR PERMITS OF ALL SYSTEMS WITHIN A 10-YEAR
6 PERIOD. THAT'S SOMETHING THAT COULD BE NEGOTIATED WITH THE
7 BOARD.

8

9 **SUP. BURKE:** SEE, THAT'S WHAT CONCERNS ME. I MEAN, IF A PERSON
10 IS BUILDING A NEW HOUSE AND THEY DECIDE THEY'RE GOING TO PUT
11 IN A SEPTIC AND MOST-- WHICH-- THIS IS NOT A LOT OF CHOICE AS--
12 - WITH SOME PLACES BECAUSE THERE'S NO SEWERS AND SOME VERY
13 AFFLUENT AREAS OF LOS ANGELES, THERE ARE NO SEWERS. AND-- BUT
14 WHAT BOTHERS ME ARE THOSE PEOPLE WHO PRESENTLY DO NOT HAVE A
15 CHOICE OR, IF THEY HAVE A CHOICE, IT'S A VERY EXPENSIVE
16 CHOICE. I WANT TO TELL YOU, FRANKLY, I JUST PUT IN-- ATTACHED
17 TO A SEWER AND IT COST ME \$25,000. AND, TO ME, THAT'S NOT A
18 CHOICE. FOR A LOT OF PEOPLE THAT'S-- BUT THAT'S WHAT THE COST
19 IS BECAUSE YOU HAVE TO PAY PER FOOT TO GET THERE, YOU HAVE TO
20 GET A PERMIT AND YOU HAVE TO PAY FOR ALL OF THE-- IN THIS
21 CASE, THERE WAS A SEWER SO WE HAD TO PAY ALL THE PREVIOUS
22 SEWER COSTS. BUT OTHER AREAS THAT ARE VERY CLOSE TO THIS, THEY
23 DIDN'T HAVE A CHOICE, THERE ARE NO SEWERS. SO WHAT BOTHERS ME

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1 HAVE A SENIOR CITIZEN WHO CAN'T EVEN AFFORD TO PAY THE KIND
2 FEES YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT AND I RECOGNIZE, YOU'RE SAYING, IN
3 10 YEARS, BUT 10 YEARS COMES BY VERY, VERY FAST. AND BONDS AND
4 SEWER MEASURES AND PUTTING IN NEW SEWERS ARE VERY, VERY
5 EXPENSIVE AND I'M SURE OUR PUBLIC WORKS PEOPLE CAN VOUCH FOR
6 THAT. SO I REALLY WANT TO SEE HOW THIS PROGRESSES BUT I HAVE A
7 LOT OF CONCERN OF WHAT THE CHOICES ARE, WHETHER YOU'RE SAYING,
8 IF YOU DO IT, IT HAS TO BE A FEE OR IF YOU'RE SAYING, EITHER
9 WAY, SOMEONE'S GOING TO HAVE TO PUT IN A LARGE FEE. AND SHOULD
10 WE BE GOING BACK TO SACRAMENTO IN TERMS OF ADDRESSING SOME OF
11 THESE ISSUES?

12

13 **DENNIS DICKERSON:** ONE POINT THAT WAS RAISED EARLIER HAS TO DO
14 WITH THE HEARING THAT'S COMING UP BEFORE THE REGIONAL BOARD.
15 THIS IS SCHEDULED CURRENTLY FOR MAY 6TH AND, AFTER CONFERRING
16 WITH THE CHAIR AND HEARING OF YOUR CONCERNS, THE CHAIR HAS
17 AGREED TO CONDUCT A WORKSHOP ON THIS MATTER ON THE 6TH AND TO
18 DEFER FORMAL ACTION UNTIL THE JUNE BOARD MEETING. SO THAT
19 WOULD ALLOW THE COUNTY ADDITIONAL TIME. NOW I'VE ALREADY MADE
20 A COMMITMENT TO WORK WITH COUNTY COUNSEL AND WHENEVER COUNTY
21 STAFF YOU THINK APPROPRIATE AND ANY MEMBERS OF YOUR STAFF THAT
22 YOU THINK APPROPRIATE TO MEET PERSONALLY WITH THEM, TO GO OVER
23 YOUR CONCERNS. I'D BE HAPPY TO DO THAT.

24

25 **SUP. BURKE:** I'D LIKE TO DO THAT.

23 **MAYOR DOYLE:** THANK YOU. I'LL BE BRIEF. I WANTED TO-- SINCE I
24 WAS GOING TO BE HERE TODAY ANYWAY, I THOUGHT I WOULD SPEAK TO
25 THIS ITEM. THE GENESIS OF THIS IS THAT, AS PART OF OUR ONGOING



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1 EFFORT TO REVIEW LOCAL GOVERNMENT, WE ARE BASICALLY FACED WITH
2 THE SAME PRESSURES AS THE COUNTY IS TO DO MORE WITH LESS
3 FUNDING YEAR TO YEAR. WE'VE BEEN GOING THROUGH EACH ONE OF OUR
4 DEPARTMENTS AND LOOKING AT EACH ONE OF OUR FUNCTIONS AND
5 LOOKING AT WAYS THAT WE CAN CUT COSTS. WE ULTIMATELY GOT TO
6 THE QUESTION OF WHAT ARE WE PAYING TO CONDUCT OUR LOCAL
7 ELECTIONS. THAT'S REALLY THE ORIGIN OF THIS. BASED UPON
8 DISCUSSIONS WITH THE NUMBER OF VENDORS AND WITH THE COUNTY, WE
9 DISCOVERED THAT WE COULD MORE THAN-- WE COULD REDUCE THE COSTS
10 OF OUR LOCAL ELECTIONS MORE THAN 50% BY CONSOLIDATING WITH THE
11 COUNTY. THE REASON FOR CHOOSING THIS PARTICULAR DATE IS THAT
12 WE HAVE HISTORICALLY CONDUCTED OUR ELECTIONS THE SECOND
13 TUESDAY OF APRIL OF EVEN- NUMBERED YEARS AND, WHILE THE COUNTY
14 WANTS TO CONSOLIDATE IN NOVEMBER OF THE ODD YEARS, THAT
15 CREATES A MAJOR DISRUPTION IN OUR FOUR YEAR ELECTION CYCLE AND
16 IT CREATES REAL PROBLEMS IN TERMS OF EITHER TRUNCATING THE
17 TERMS OF SITTING COUNCIL MEMBERS ARE DRASTICALLY EXPANDING

3 RELATIVELY SMALL COMMUNITY, ONLY ABOUT 11,000 PEOPLE, SLIGHTLY
4 LESS THAN 8,000 REGISTERED VOTERS. IF YOU WERE LOOKING FOR A
5 DEMONSTRATION PROJECT TO TEST ONE OF THE NEW ELECTRONIC VOTING
6 TECHNOLOGIES, WE CERTAINLY WOULD BE A GOOD CANDIDATE FOR THAT.
7 OUR-- MY UNDERSTANDING IS THAT, IN THE PAST, THE COUNTY HAS
8 HAD POLICY WHICH LIMITED CONSOLIDATION BECAUSE OF THE NUMBER--
9 THE LIMITED NUMBER OF SLOTS ON THE BALLOT BUT THAT IS NO
10 LONGER AN ISSUE WHEN WE MOVE TO ELECTRONIC VOTING BECAUSE WE
11 HAVE THE CAPACITY TO EXPAND THAT TO AS MANY SLOTS AS
12 NECESSARY. SO THAT IS THE PERSPECTIVE OF OUR CITY COUNCIL.
13 THAT'S WHY WE BROUGHT THIS TO YOU. WE REALIZE THAT VOTING IS
14 IN A SORT OF TRANSITIONAL PHASE RIGHT NOW AND WE'RE HOPING OUR
15 TIMING IS GOOD. WE WOULD APPRECIATE YOUR CONSIDERATION. THIS
16 WOULD BE A BIG HELP TO US IN TERMS OF CUTTING OUR COSTS AND,
17 YOU KNOW, BEING ABLE TO PLAY IN THE BROADER-- IN THE NEW
18 TECHNOLOGY AS IT MOVES FORWARD.

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IS CONNIE MCCORMACK HERE?

21

22 **SUP. BURKE:** IS IT YOUR INTENTION TO HAVE ONLY ELECTRONIC...?

23

24 **MAYOR DOYLE:** YES. NOW, WE UNDERSTAND THERE IS SOME CONTROVERSY
25 ABOUT HAVING TO HAVE PAPER TRAILS AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE



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1 MAY BE REQUIRING THAT IN THE FUTURE BUT WE ANTICIPATE THAT THE
2 WHOLE STATE WILL ULTIMATELY MOVE TO A SYSTEM AND WE WOULD LIKE
3 TO BE PART OF THAT SYSTEM WHEN IT HAPPENS.

4

5 **SUP. BURKE:** DOES THAT REQUIRE STATE AUTHORITY? TO HAVE ALL
6 TOTAL ELECTRONIC...

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** PLEASE COME UP.

9

10 **DEBORAH WRIGHT:** GOOD MORNING. WE'RE HERE FOR CONNIE MCCORMACK.
11 I'M DEBORAH WRIGHT, HER EXECUTIVE LIAISON, AND MIKE
12 PATRICELLO.

13

14 **MIKE PATRICELLO:** MIKE PATRICELLO, INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY.

15

16 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YOU HEARD THE MAYOR TALKING RELATIVE TO GOING
17 INTO ELECTRONIC VOTING AND...?

18

19 **DEBORAH WRIGHT:** YES. WE, AS THE BOARD KNOWS, WE'RE ON A
20 HOLDING PATTERN IN TERMS OF MOVING FULLY TO ELECTRONIC VOTING
21 BECAUSE OF THE ONGOING EVENTS IN THAT ARENA. AND, AS IT
22 CURRENTLY STANDS, WE STILL HAVE A PAPER BALLOT. WE WILL STILL
23 BE USING THE PAPER BALLOT FOR AN UNKNOWN LENGTH OF TIME AND
24 THAT LIMITS US IN TERMS OF THE NUMBER OF CITIES AND OTHER

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1 BALLOT IN THE EVEN-NUMBERED YEARS. WE CERTAINLY WILL BE
2 WANTING TO INVITE CITIES THAT WISH TO CONSOLIDATE ON ANY
3 BALLOT ONCE WE GET THERE. IF IT'S YOUR BOARD'S DESIRE TO, YOU
4 KNOW, AGREE TO THIS CONSOLIDATION, WE'LL DO EVERYTHING WE CAN
5 TO ACCOMMODATE. IT'S JUST THAT WE NEEDED THE CITY TO BE AWARE

12 THE BALLOT WAS FILLED, THAT THEY WOULD CONDUCT THE ELECTION
13 WITH THEIR OWN BALLOT.

14

15 **MAYOR BART DOYLE:** WE HAVE DISCUSSED THAT AT COUNCIL AND-- IN
16 OUR LAST APPROVAL-- THE LAST TIME WE APPROVED THE RESOLUTION
17 TO TRANSMIT TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, WE WERE AWARE OF THAT
18 AND WE-- SORT OF, THAT WAS OUR DEFINED WORST-CASE SCENARIO,
19 THAT WE WOULD HAVE TO GO BACK AND INCUR THAT COST TO CONDUCT
20 THE 2006 ELECTION, IF NECESSARY.

21

22 **DEBORAH WRIGHT:** THE OTHER ISSUE FOR YOUR BOARD TO CONSIDER,
23 BECAUSE IT HAS BEEN YOUR POLICY TO NOT ACCEPT THESE REQUESTS,
24 IT WILL MAKE IT MORE DIFFICULT. WE'VE HAD INQUIRIES FROM OTHER
25 CITIES AND IT'S GOING TO MAKE IT MORE DIFFICULT TO SAY "NO" IN



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1 THE FUTURE. IT JUST UPS THE CHANCE THAT SOME CITY WILL BE IN
2 THAT CONCURRENT POSITION.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IF THE OTHER CITIES WHO WOULD REQUEST-- OFFER
5 TO PROVIDE THE OPERATION OF THEIR OWN ELECTION BECAUSE OF A
6 FILLED BALLOT, THAT WOULD RESOLVE THE PROBLEM?

7

8 **DEBORAH WRIGHT:** WELL, THEY REALLY WOULDN'T HAVE A CHOICE.
9 THEY'D HAVE TO, YOU KNOW. BUT, JUST AS LONG AS THEY KNOW THAT
10 IT CAN BE VERY, VERY DIFFICULT AND CONFUSING FOR VOTERS AND
11 POLLWORKERS TO HAVE-- AND CITIES TELL ME THAT THEY EXPERIENCE
12 CONSIDERABLE DROP-OFF IN THE CITY BALLOT. THE ORDER THAT
13 HAPPENS: A VOTER COMES IN, IS PRESENTED A COUNTY BALLOT, OFTEN
14 A LONG ONE IN A PRIMARY OR GENERAL. THEY VOTE THAT BALLOT AND
15 THEN THEY'RE OFFERED THE CHANCE TO VOTE THE CITY BALLOT AND
16 THERE CAN OFTEN BE A HUGE DROP-OFF. PEOPLE SIMPLY WALK AWAY
17 AND DON'T VOTE IN THE CITY ELECTION.

18

19 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** USUALLY, OFF-YEAR ELECTIONS HAVE LOWER
20 TURNOUT THAN DURING A NORMAL GUBERNATORIAL, PRESIDENTIAL
21 ELECTION YEAR.

22

23 **DEBORAH WRIGHT:** DEPENDS ON THE, YOU KNOW, ON THE JURISDICTION.
24 TURNOUT REALLY IS MORE A FUNCTION OF LOCAL INTEREST, IN OUR
25 EXPERIENCE, THAN IT IS WHAT BALLOT YOU'RE ON.



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1

2 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND IF YOU'RE MOVING TOWARD ELECTRONIC
3 VOTING, THEN YOU WOULD NOT HAVE THAT PROBLEM?

4

7 FIVE, SIX-YEAR-OLD MUNCHKINS, BLACK KIDS IN OUR INNER CITIES,
8 YOU KNOW, PRESCHOOL, KINDERGARTEN, FIRST GRADE. SIR, I SUPPORT
9 THIS RECOMMENDATION BECAUSE THESE \$5,008,539 WILL EXTEND
10 FAMILY PROGRAM SERVICES WHILE ENHANCING THE SAFETY AND WELFARE
11 OF MANY OF THE COUNTIES' ABUSED AND NEGLECTED BLACK CHILDREN.
12 BECAUSE IT'S A TOTALLY FUNDED-- BECAUSE IT'S TOTALLY FUNDED BY
13 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, THIS RECOMMENDATION DOES NOT COST YOU
14 A PENNY. REMEMBER, THIS IS THE MONTH WHEN WE PAY PARTICULAR
15 ATTENTION TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. I'M A VICTIM OF DOMESTIC
16 VIOLENCE AND, IF NOT FOR THE HELP OF A GROUP OF DEDICATED
17 TEACHERS, I WOULDN'T BE SITTING HERE TODAY. WHEN I WAS BORN
18 INTO A GOVERNMENT HOUSING PROJECT, BEFORE THE SECOND WORLD
19 WAR, MY PROSPECTS WERE LIMITED. MOST OF THE YOUNG MEN I WAS
20 RAISED WITH IN THE PROJECTS ARE EITHER DEAD OR IN THE
21 PENITENTIARY. MY FAMILY BELONGS TO THE DETROIT MOB, THE PURPLE
22 GANG. IF IT HAD NOT BEEN FOR MY MOTHER'S DETERMINATION TO
23 PROTECT HER SON AND TWO DAUGHTERS, I WOULDN'T BE HERE. BUT, TO
24 MAKE A LONG STORY SHORT, I KNOW ABUSE AND NEGLECT. THE POINT



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1 IS SIMPLY, WHEN YOU HELP THE COUNTY'S FAMILIES, YOU'RE HELPING
2 GENERATIONS OF THE COUNTY'S CHILDREN. THANK YOU.

3

4 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU, RICHARD. ITEM MOVED BY
5 SUPERVISOR BURKE. THE CHAIR WILL SECOND. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
6 ORDERED. ITEM NUMBER 21 WAS HELD FOR A MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC,
7 PLEASE. PETER BAXTER? MR. BAXTER?

8

9 **PETER BAXTER:** MR. CHAIR, MEMBERS OF YOUR HONORABLE BOARD, MR.
10 JANSSEN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, MY NAME IS PETER BAXTER AND I
11 LIVE IN LOS ANGELES. IT IS RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED THAT THIS
12 ITEM ASKS FOR AN AMENDMENT TO AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF
13 POMONA AND THE CONSOLIDATED FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT. THIS IS
14 FOR FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES. SUCH SERVICES DO NOT INCLUDE THE
15 USE OF NONCOMBUSTIBLE GASSES TO PUT OUT FIRE. STANDARD
16 PRESSURE OF THE ATMOSPHERE IS 14.7 POUNDS WEIGHT PER SQUARE
17 INCH. THE DENSITY OF THE ATMOSPHERE AT ZERO DEGREES CENTIGRADE
18 AND STANDARD PRESSURE IS 0.0807 POUND PER CUBIC FOOT. THE
19 VOLUME OF THE SMOKE IN THE TWIN TOWERS ON FIRE ON 9/11 COULD
20 BE MEASURED IN POUNDS WEIGHT, APPLYING THE EMISSIONS FROM A
21 TURBO JET ENGINE MOUNTED ON A HELICOPTER AT THE BREACHES IN
22 THE WALLS AND WINDOWS OF THE TOWERS ON FIRE WOULD MEAN THAT
23 NONCOMBUSTIBLE GASSES WOULD ENTER THAT BURNING BUILDING,
24 IMMEDIATELY DOMINATE THE ATMOSPHERE IN THAT BUILDING BY VIRTUE
25 OF THE HIGHER DENSITY AND PRESSURE, THEREBY DENYING THE FIRE



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1 OF OXYGEN FORTHWITH. THE FIRE GOES OUT IN LESS THAN ONE SECOND
2 FROM THE MOMENT OF THE APPLICATION OF NONCOMBUSTIBLE GASSES TO
3 THE FIRE. DR. CONDOLEEZA RICE TESTIFIED, TOTALLY UNAWARE THAT
4 THERE IS THE METHOD OF FIREFIGHTING WITH THE EMISSIONS FROM A
5 TURBO JET ENGINE, EVEN THOUGH I HAVE BEEN PRESENTING THIS
6 THEORY FOR MORE THAN 10 YEARS. AND THIS IS A VIDEO SHOWING HOW
7 IT WORKED IMMEDIATELY ON AN OIL WELL FIRE IN KUWAIT, A
8 VIDEOTAPE THAT MR. MERRITT HOLLOWAY HAS ASKED THREE TIMES TO
9 HAVE SHOWN IN THIS AUDITORIUM. ALL OF WHICH IS RESPECTFULLY
10 SUBMITTED. THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN. IF I MIGHT MENTION, I'VE
11 STILL GOT SOME TIME, I JUST WOULD LIKE TO MENTION TO YOU, SIR,
12 THAT I HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO OBJECT TO THE USE OF THE NAME OF
13 A MEMBER OF THE POLITICAL BRANCH OF GOVERNMENT ABOVE
14 COURTHOUSE. A COURTHOUSE IS A CITADEL OF JUSTICE AND I BELIEVE
15 THAT SOMETHING LIKE "MOSES" OR LAWGIVERS IN THAT RESPECT IS
16 WHAT THE COUNTY COURTHOUSE IS ALL ABOUT AND I FEEL THAT IT'S
17 TOTALLY MISPLACED TO CALL IT THE MICHAEL D. ANTONOVICH
18 COURTHOUSE, ALL OF WHICH IS RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED. I THANK
19 YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN.

20

21 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. NEXT WE HAVE ITEM 63, WHICH IS A
22 PUBLIC HEARING. OH, ON 21, EXCUSE ME. MOVED BY SUPERVISOR
23 BURKE, THE CHAIR WILL SECOND. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.
24 WE HAVE AN PUBLIC HEARING ON THE EXTENSION OF INNER EMERGENCY
25 ORDINANCE NUMBER 2003-0025U. DO WE HAVE ANYONE TO TESTIFY HERE



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1 UNDER ITEM NUMBER 63? PUBLIC HEARING IS OPEN. IF NOT, THE
2 PUBLIC HEARING IS CLOSED. THE ITEM IS BEFORE US. MOVED BY
3 SUPERVISOR MOLINA, SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR BURKE. WITHOUT
4 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR BURKE HAS A
5 MOTION THAT SHE'D LIKE TO BRING IN BEFORE WE GO TO THE BUDGET.

6

7 **SUP. BURKE:** YES. I HAD A MOTION. I'D LIKE TO SEE IF I CAN GET
8 DR. FIELDING IN SO THAT-- WE'LL PASS IT OUT.

9

10 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** IS IT FOR URGENCY OR FOR NEXT WEEK?

11

12 **SUP. BURKE:** IT'S A REPORT BACK. IN JANUARY 2003, THE BOARD
13 APPROVED MY MOTION TO INSTRUCT THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH
14 SERVICES TO REPORT BACK ON WAYS TO ENHANCE EDUCATION AND
15 OUTREACH EFFORTS TO WORKERS IN THE ADULT FILM INDUSTRY AND,
16 TWO, TO CONSULT WITH COUNTY COUNSEL TO IDENTIFY THE
17 APPROPRIATE REGULATORY ENTITY TO ENSURE WORKER PROTECTION AND,
18 THREE, WORK WITH THE C.A.O. ON ANY LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVE
19 NECESSARY FOR REGULATION. ON FEBRUARY 27TH, THE DEPARTMENT
20 ISSUED A COMPREHENSIVE REPORT WITH RECOMMENDATIONS. ON MARCH
21 25TH, THE BOARD APPROVED THE FOLLOW-UP MOTION TO SEND LETTERS
22 TO THE GOVERNOR AND DIRECTOR OF CAL-O.S.H.A. FORWARDING THE
23 DEPARTMENT'S REPORT AND REQUESTING CAL-O.S.H.A. TO TAKE
24 ACTION. SINCE THAT TIME, THE DEPARTMENT HAS HAD SEVERAL
25 MEETINGS WITH CAL-O.S.H.A. BUT CAL-O.S.H.A. HAS NOT INTERVENED



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1 IN THE ADULT INDUSTRY. RECENT NEWS REPORTS INDICATE THAT TWO
2 PERFORMERS IN THE ADULT FILM INDUSTRY HAVE TESTED POSITIVE FOR
3 H.I.V. AND MANY OF THE PRODUCERS OF FILMS HAVE SUSPENDED
4 FILMING FOR A MONTH. THIS MORNING'S NEWS INDICATES THAT CAL-
5 O.S.H.A. IS NOW BECOMING INVOLVED. WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THE
6 QUICK ACTION IS TAKEN TO FURTHER PREVENT INFECTION AND I,
7 THEREFORE, MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS INSTRUCT THE
8 DIRECTOR OF HEALTH SERVICES TO WORK WITH CAL-O.S.H.A. TO
9 DETERMINE ANY ACTION WHICH CAN BE TAKEN EITHER BY CAL-O.S.H.A.
10 OR ANY LOCAL HEALTH OFFICER TO ASSURE SAFETY IN THE ADULT FILM
11 INDUSTRY AND REPORT BACK IN THREE WEEKS. AND I WOULD LIKE TO
12 HAVE AN UPDATE ON WHAT THEIR MEETINGS WITH OSHA HAVE BEEN SO
13 FAR OR WHAT'S HAPPENING.

14

15 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** MR. SCHUNOFF?

16

17 **JOHN SCHUNOFF:** SUPERVISOR BURKE AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, OUR
18 STD PROGRAM HAS TALKED WITH CAL-O.S.H.A. IT'S MY
19 UNDERSTANDING, ALSO. FROM WHAT I SAW IN THE PAPER TODAY THAT
20 THEY'RE GOING TO BECOME INVOLVED. THERE ARE LETTERS THAT HAVE
21 BEEN DRAFTED THAT WE'RE REVIEWING WITH COUNTY COUNSEL TO GO TO
22 BOTH CAL-O.S.H.A. AND TO THE ADULT INDUSTRY MEDICAL GROUP AND
23 WE WILL BE WORKING WITH THEM. I'M PLEASED THAT THEY'RE NOW
24 INVOLVED BECAUSE WE THINK THAT ONE OF THE ANGLES ON THIS IS A
25 WORKPLACE SAFETY ISSUE.



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1

2 **SUP. BURKE:** WHAT WILL THE COUNTY'S ROLE BE IN THIS?

3

4 **JOHN SCHUNOFF:** WELL, WE COME TO IT FROM THE COMMUNICABLE
5 DISEASE OR HEALTH OFFICER PERSPECTIVE. CAL-O.S.H.A. COMES AT
6 IT FROM, HOPEFULLY, FROM THE PERSPECTIVE AS SOMEONE WHO
7 REGULATES WORKPLACE SAFETY AND WE BELIEVE THAT THE PERFORMING
8 WITHOUT A CONDOM IN THIS CASE IS UNSAFE.

9

10 **SUP. BURKE:** SO WE WILL BE CONTINUING TO WORK WITH THEM TO TRY
11 TO GET THEM TO TAKE SOME KIND OF SPECIFIC ACTION?

12

13 **JOHN SCHUNOFF:** THAT'S CORRECT.

14

15 **SUP. BURKE:** COULD YOU LET US KNOW WHAT HAPPENS?

16

17 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** DO WE NEED A FINDING, THEN?

18

19 **RAY FORTNER, COUNSEL:** NO, MR. CHAIRMAN. THIS IS ESSENTIALLY A
20 REPORT BACK AND CAN BE DONE TODAY WITHOUT A FINDING.

21

22 **SUP. BURKE:** OKAY. MOVED BY SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR BURKE. THE
23 CHAIR WILL SECOND. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. I BELIEVE
24 THAT COVERS THE AGENDA WITH THE EXCEPTION OF MR. JANSSEN'S
25 PRESENTATION, AND WE'RE GOING TO GET...



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1

2 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** I ALSO HAVE A MOTION FOR A REPORT BACK, MR.
3 CHAIRMAN.

4

5 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. MR. ANTONOVICH?

6

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THE GOVERNOR'S BLUE RIBBON FIRE COMMISSION,
8 THE STATE PANEL CREATED TO EXAMINE THE WILDFIRES THAT RECENTLY
9 OCCURRED IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA ISSUED THEIR FINAL REPORT WITH
10 48 RECOMMENDATIONS HOW LOCAL FIRE AGENCIES CAN IMPROVE THE
11 SAFETY OF THEIR COMMUNITIES. CRITICS OF THE REPORT STATE THAT
12 NOT ENOUGH ATTENTION WAS FOCUSED ON FIRE PREVENTION.
13 FURTHERMORE, THE REPORT STATES THAT CONFLICTING PUBLIC POLICY
14 MANDATES AND LENGTHY BUREAUCRATIC ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES
15 ARE THE MOST SIGNIFICANT BARRIERS IN REDUCING THE THREAT OF
16 WILDFIRES. OF SEVERAL COUNTIES THAT EXPERIENCED FIRES LAST
17 FALL, L.A. COUNTY SUFFERED THE LATEST AMOUNT OF DAMAGE. IN
18 SPITE OF THIS, OUR COUNTY IS AT GREAT RISK FOR DAMAGE AND LOSS
19 AS A RESULT OF FUTURE WILDFIRES. IT'S IMPERATIVE THAT OUR
20 COUNTY LOOK AT THOSE RECOMMENDATIONS AND DETERMINE WHAT
21 MEASURES COULD TAKE-- BE IMPROVED UPON OR ARE ALREADY IN
22 PLACE. AND I WOULD MOVE THAT THE BOARD DIRECT THE COUNTY FIRE
23 CHIEF TO REPORT BACK TO THE BOARD IN 45 DAYS REGARDING THE
24 BLUE RIBBON COMMISSION'S RECOMMENDATIONS, THE STATUS OF THE
25 BARK BEETLE AND OTHER INFESTATIONS OF TREE DISEASES IN OUR



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1 COUNTY AND THE FIRE DEPARTMENT'S PLAN TO ADDRESS ANY
2 CONFLICTING POLICY MANDATES.

3

4 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. SO, AGAIN, NO NEED FOR A FINDING.
5 MOVED BY SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, THE CHAIR WILL SECOND. WITHOUT
6 OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU.

9

10 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. THAT COMPLETES THE ITEMS EXCEPT FOR
11 PUBLIC COMMENT. WE ARE GOING TO PROCEED WITH THE BUDGET
12 PRESENTATION BY OUR C.A.O., MR. JANSSEN. DAVID?

13

14 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** THANK YOU. THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MR. CHAIR.
15 MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, YOU HAVE A PACKAGE IN A BLACK FOLDER IN
16 FRONT OF YOU THAT HAS A PREPARED STATEMENT AND THE BUDGET
17 CHARTS IN IT THAT, HOPEFULLY, WILL HELP YOU FOLLOW ALONG.
18 THERE ARE 55 SLIDES. I'M NOT GOING TO COVER ALL OF THEM BUT I
19 WOULD REALLY LIKE TO BE ABLE TO GIVE THE PUBLIC THAT'S
20 WATCHING. YOUR BOARD CERTAINLY IS VERY FAMILIAR WITH THE
21 BUDGET, I THINK A LOT OF PEOPLE ARE NOT FAMILIAR WITH COUNTY
22 BUDGETS AND HOW UNUSUAL THEY ARE AND HOW DIFFERENT FROM
23 CITIES. BEFORE I BEGIN MY PREPARED REMARKS, THOUGH, LET ME
24 JUST MAKE A COUPLE OF OPENING COMMENTS. NUMBER ONE, THE ITEM
25 BEFORE YOU TODAY IS SIMPLY TO RECEIVE, ACCEPT THE BUDGET AND



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1 THEN RELEASE IT FOR PUBLIC COMMENT. ON MAY THE 12TH OF THIS
2 YEAR, IN THESE CHAMBERS, YOU WILL BEGIN YOUR PUBLIC HEARING
3 PROCESS AND ANYBODY FROM THE PUBLIC THAT'S INTERESTED IN
4 COMMENTING ON THE BUDGET, YOU KNOW, CALL THE COUNTY AND WE'LL
5 SIGN YOU UP DURING THAT TIME PERIOD. THE ACTUAL DELIBERATIONS
6 OF THE BUDGET WILL NOT TAKE PLACE UNTIL THE LAST WEEK OF JUNE.
7 TO KIND OF FRAME A LITTLE BIT THE BUDGET THAT WE'RE LOOKING AT
8 THIS YEAR. I'VE PERSONALLY BEEN DOING COUNTY BUDGETS FOR ABOUT
9 12 YEARS, IN SAN DIEGO AND LOS ANGELES, AND THIS IS, WITHOUT A
10 DOUBT, THE MOST COMPLICATED BUDGET ENVIRONMENT THAT I HAVE
11 EVER EXPERIENCED IN CALIFORNIA. THE STATE, NOT THAT LONG AGO,
12 HAD A 38-BILLION-DOLLAR STATE DEFICIT. THAT'S CRITICAL TO US
13 BECAUSE 90% OF OUR BUDGET IS FOR REGIONAL SERVICES, MOST OF
14 THEM STATE AND FEDERAL. WE HAD A RECALL OF THE GOVERNOR. JUST
15 AS RECENTLY AS NOVEMBER, WE WERE LOSING \$2 MILLION A DAY IN
16 REVENUE BECAUSE OF THE VEHICLE LICENSE FEE ACTION OF THE
17 GOVERNOR. AND THEN THAT WAS OVERTURNED BY A CONTROVERSIAL
18 DECISION OF THE GOVERNOR TO BACKFILL THE VEHICLE LICENSE FEES
19 AND, ALL OF A SUDDEN, THAT PARTICULAR TWO-MILLION-DOLLAR
20 PROBLEM WAS GONE. IT HASN'T, AS FAR AS I KNOW, BEEN RESOLVED
21 IN SACRAMENTO YET BUT IT'S BEEN FORGOTTEN. THE GOVERNOR'S
22 PROPOSED BUDGET FOLLOWED SHORTLY AFTER THAT. HE'S PROPOSED A
23 TRANSFER OF \$1.3 BILLION IN PROPERTY TAX FROM LOCAL
24 GOVERNMENT, TWO SCHOOLS TO HELP SOLVE THE BUDGET DEFICIT. 70%
25 OF THAT IS FROM COUNTIES. \$900,000 MILLION, \$289 WILL BE FROM



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1 LOS ANGELES. AND THEN WE HAD THE MARCH BALLOT: \$15 BILLION
2 BOND THAT WAS CRITICAL TO THE GOVERNOR'S WORKOUT PROGRAM FOR
3 THE STATE DEFICIT. POISON PILL REALIGNMENT ISSUE POPPED UP
4 AFTER THAT. THAT IS, WE BELIEVE, BEING RESOLVED BUT IT'S YET
5 ANOTHER SUDDEN PROBLEM THAT FACED THE STATE DURING THIS
6 PERIOD. AND THERE OBVIOUSLY HAS BEEN A GOOD DEAL OF FOCUS ON
7 WORKERS' COMP REFORM IN SACRAMENTO AND THE BUDGET HAS NOT YET
8 REALLY BEGUN TO BE CONSIDERED. THE STATE DEFICIT IS STILL 20-
9 PLUS BILLION DOLLARS FOR THE NEXT TWO YEARS. EVERYONE IS
10 WAITING TO SEE WHAT MAY REVISE HOLDS AND WE'VE HEARD, REALLY,
11 NO GOOD ASSESSMENTS YET ON WHETHER IT'S GOING TO BE UP OR DOWN
12 BUT WE HAVEN'T HEARD THAT IT'S GOING TO BE UP. AND, EVEN IF
13 THE LEGISLATURE ADOPTS THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET AS PRESENTED, THE
14 STATE WILL STILL HAVE A 7-BILLION-DOLLAR PROBLEM IN 2005 AND
15 2006. I THINK EVERYONE WAS VERY CLEAR THAT THE BOND ISSUE
16 DIDN'T SOLVE THE PROBLEM. IT HELPED WITH THE PROBLEM
17 DRAMATICALLY BUT IT DIDN'T SOLVE IT. AND, IN OUR BUDGET,
18 BECAUSE WE DO PERFORM PRIMARILY STATE AND FEDERAL PROGRAMS,
19 THE GOVERNOR HAS MADE PROPOSED CHANGES IN VIRTUALLY EVERY
20 SERVICE THAT WE PROVIDE FOR AN IN-HOME SUPPORTIVE SERVICES;
21 MEDI-CAL REFORM, THEY'RE ASSUMING \$400 MILLION SAVINGS; AND
22 THEY ARE DEVELOPING THE REFORM PACKAGE, WE HAVEN'T SEEN THAT
23 YET. CAPS IN WELFARE, CAPS IN HEALTH PROGRAMS FOR FAMILIES.
24 TRANSPORTATION REDUCTION. THERE ISN'T A SINGLE PART OF THE
25 GOVERNOR'S BUDGET THAT DOESN'T AFFECT US IN ONE WAY OR



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1 ANOTHER. SO THAT'S THE ENVIRONMENT THAT WE ARE PRESENTING THIS
2 BUDGET AND, AS WE HAVE HISTORICALLY DEVELOPED A BUDGET THAT
3 DEALS WITH THE LOCAL PROBLEM, THERE ARE A FEW AREAS WHERE WE
4 HAVE TRIED TO ADDRESS KNOWN STATE IMPACTS. BUT IT'S BASICALLY
5 ATTEMPTING TO ADDRESS OUR OWN LOCAL BUDGET PROBLEM AT THIS
6 POINT, WORK WITH THE STATE, FIND OUT WHAT HAPPENS BY THE TIME
7 THEY COMPLETE DELIBERATIONS. THE BUDGET IS GOING UP VERY
8 SLIGHTLY, ONLY 20 MILLION-- 20 POINT-- \$20,800,000. THAT'S THE
9 ONLY CHANGE, BUDGET-TO-BUDGET, THAT'S BEING PROPOSED. THERE'S
10 A LOT OF CHURNING, HOWEVER, UNDERNEATH THAT DOLLAR FIGURE, UPS
11 AND DOWNS, BUT THE BUDGET ITSELF IS ONLY CHANGING BY A VERY
12 SMALL AMOUNT. WE'RE REDUCING, NET, 379 POSITIONS. AGAIN, WE'RE
13 REDUCING OVER 800 BUT WE'RE ADDING POSITIONS IN VARIOUS
14 DEPARTMENTS AS WELL. TOTAL COST. THIS IS HOW THE COUNTY SPENDS
15 ITS MONEY. 17.148 BILLION DOLLARS IS THE PROPOSED BUDGET. 27%
16 IS IN HEALTH AND SANITATION. 30%, PUBLIC ASSISTANCE; 24% IN
17 PUBLIC PROTECTION. THOSE ARE THE THREE MAJOR AREAS WHERE WE
18 SPEND OUR MONEY. WHERE DO WE GET OUR MONEY? WE GET 19% OF THE
19 TOTAL BUDGET FROM THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA. WE GET 26% FROM THE
20 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. SO, RIGHT THERE, 45% OF OUR BUDGET COMES
21 FROM THE STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. ONLY 22% OF IT IS
22 LOCALLY GENERATED AND SPECIAL FUNDS AND DISTRICTS ARE 20%. IF
23 YOU PULL SPECIAL FUNDS OUT, FIRE DEPARTMENT, FOR EXAMPLE, IS A
24 SPECIAL FUND; ROAD TRANSPORTATION, GAS TAX ARE SPECIAL FUNDS;
25 YOU PULL THEM OUT OF THE BUDGET, THE GENERAL REVENUE IS A 12-



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1 BILLION-DOLLAR BUDGET. AND YOU CAN SEE THAT THE STATE AND
2 FEDERAL ASSISTANCE JUMPS TO 55% OF OUR REVENUE. SO WE ARE VERY
3 DEPENDENT ON WHAT HAPPENS IN SACRAMENTO AND WASHINGTON. WE DO
4 HAVE LOCALLY GENERATED REVENUE IN THE BUDGETS, \$3.8 BILLION.
5 THAT IS AN INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR. PROPERTY TAX: 48% OF ALL
6 OF OUR LOCAL REVENUE IS PROPERTY TAX. THAT INCREASES A LITTLE
7 BIT EACH YEAR, EVEN THOUGH WE'RE TRANSFERRING A SIGNIFICANT
8 ADDITIONAL PORTION TO SCHOOLS. THIS IS A MAJOR PART OF OUR
9 LOCAL REVENUE. SALES TAX. HUGE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CITIES.
10 CITIES ARE-- RELY ON SALES TAX. ONLY \$34 MILLION OF OUR
11 GENERAL BUDGET IS SALES TAX. THE BOTTOM, VEHICLE LICENSE FEES,
12 YOU CAN SEE, 707 MILLION, 412 MILLION FOR STATE REALIGNMENT.
13 THIS IS WHY WE HAVE BEEN SO CONCERNED ABOUT VEHICLE LICENSE
14 FEES IN THE COUNTY. THEY FUND OVER \$1.1 BILLION OF OUR
15 PROGRAMS IN THE COUNTY. IF YOU LOOK AT THE BUDGET A LITTLE BIT
16 DIFFERENTLY AND YOU DON'T TALK ABOUT THE 17 BILLION, HOW HAVE--
17 - HOW HAS THE BOARD, IN THE PAST, SPENT THE LOCAL DOLLARS, THE
18 3.8 BILLION THAT ARE PAID BY THE TAXPAYERS THAT COME DIRECTLY
19 TO US? 41% GOES TO PUBLIC SAFETY. IN THE OVERALL BUDGET, THE
20 PUBLIC SAFETY FIGURE WAS 24%. SO YOU CAN SEE, AGAIN, YOU CAN
21 ALMOST DO ANYTHING WITH STATISTICS. THE LOCAL DOLLARS, THE
22 PRIORITY OF THE BOARD IS PUBLIC SAFETY, 41% INTO PUBLIC
23 SAFETY. AN EQUAL AMOUNT GOES INTO HEALTH AND TO PUBLIC
24 ASSISTANCE. THOSE ARE THE PROGRAMS FOR THE POOR. THAT'S THE
25 SAFETY NET PROGRAMS IN THE COUNTY BUDGET. AN EQUIVALENT AMOUNT



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1 GOES INTO HEALTH AND SAFETY. RECREATION, CULTURE, THE MUSEUMS,
2 HOLLYWOOD BOWL, L.A.C.M.A., 114 MILLION FOR THOSE PROGRAMS.
3 AND HERE YOU CAN SEE, JUST SIDE BY SIDE, TOTAL COST VERSUS
4 LOCAL DOLLARS, PUBLIC PROTECTION, 24%. AND THE TOTAL BUDGET,
5 41% LOCAL DOLLARS. NOW, WE HAVE TALKED FOR MANY YEARS IN
6 COUNTY GOVERNMENT ABOUT HOW MUCH FLEXIBILITY DOES THE BOARD OF
7 SUPERVISORS REALLY HAVE WHEN IT MAKES DECISIONS ABOUT THE
8 BUDGET? 77.7% OF THE REVENUE THAT WE RECEIVE HAS TO GO INTO
9 SPECIFIC PROGRAMS. YOU CAN'T TAKE MONEY OUT OF WELFARE AND PUT
10 IT INTO PARKS OR PUT IT INTO LIBRARIES; IT HAS TO BE SPENT ON
11 WELFARE. ANOTHER 22.3% OF THE BUDGET GOES INTO NONFLEXIBLE
12 COSTS, AND I'LL TALK ABOUT THAT A LITTLE BIT, AND THEN
13 FLEXIBLE COSTS, 8.2% IS WHAT THE BOARD HAS AS DOLLARS THAT YOU
14 CAN PUT ANYWHERE YOU WANT. A SIGNIFICANT THING ABOUT 8.2%,
15 WHILE THAT SEEMS LIKE A SMALL FIGURE, TWO YEARS AGO, THAT WAS
16 9.9%. CURRENT YEAR, IT'S 8.3%. NEXT YEAR, 8.2%, SO THE TREND
17 IS, OBVIOUSLY NOT IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION. THE DISCRETIONARY
18 REVENUE IS BECOMING SMALLER AND SMALLER. JUST QUICKLY, THE
19 PROGRAM. WHAT ARE THE PROGRAM REVENUES? THE 77%, AS I SAID.
20 \$7.5 BILLION GOES INTO HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES. IT HAS TO
21 BE SPENT THERE. 541 MILLION, PROP 172. THIS HAS BEEN A
22 CONTROVERSIAL ISSUE, LITERALLY, SINCE 1995 WHEN THE STATE
23 TRANSFERRED PROPERTY TAX. THE VOTERS AUTHORIZED SALES TAX FOR
24 PUBLIC SAFETY. THIS MONEY HAS TO BE SENT-- SPENT IN PUBLIC
25 SAFETY. SPECIAL FUNDS DISTRICT, MENTIONED FIRE AND ROADS AS



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1 TWO EXAMPLES. THEY HAVE TO BE SPENT THERE. THEY CANNOT GO
2 ANYWHERE ELSE. AND WE'RE STILL SPENDING OVER \$200 MILLION TO
3 SUPPORT THE COURTS, EVEN THOUGH WE'RE NO LONGER RESPONSIBLE
4 FOR THEM. NONFLEXIBLE PORTION OF THE BUDGET. WE ARE OBLIGATED
5 TO PROVIDE MATCHING LOCAL DOLLARS TO DRAW DOWN THE STATE AND
6 FEDERAL DOLLARS. IN SOCIAL SERVICES, FOR EXAMPLE, WE BRING IN
7 BILLIONS OF FEDERAL AND STATE DOLLARS BY SPENDING \$553 MILLION
8 OF OUR LOCAL DOLLARS. SAME IS TRUE ON HEALTH AND MENTAL
9 HEALTH. THERE ARE FORMULAS THAT ARE ESTABLISHED IN STATE LAW
10 THAT REQUIRE THE COUNTY TO SPEND DOLLARS IN A FIXED WAY TO
11 MATCH FEDERAL AND STATE DOLLARS. DEFENSE, THE COUNTY IS 100%
12 RESPONSIBLE FOR FUNDING DEFENSE IN THE COUNTY. THE STATE DOES
13 NOT HAVE THAT OBLIGATION AND IT COSTS THE COUNTY 128 MILLION
14 THE PUBLIC DEFENDER 34 MILLION AND THE ALTERNATE PUBLIC
15 DEFENDER AND ANOTHER 36 MILLION THAT IS CONTRACTED, ALMOST 200
16 MILLION DOLLARS FOR DEFENSE. AND, FINALLY, IN THE SHERIFF'S
17 DEPARTMENT, WE'RE REQUIRED TO SPEND 412 MILLION IN LOCAL
18 DOLLARS TO MATCH-- TO MEET A MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT REQUIREMENT
19 FOR PROP 172 SALES TAX. AND THEN 3% OF THE 2.9% OF THE
20 DISCRETIONARY MONEY GOES INTO PUBLIC PROTECTION AND 5.3% INTO
21 THE REST. THIS IS THE CHART THAT WE WORK FROM WHEN WE HAVE TO
22 MAKE REDUCTIONS IN THE LOCAL BUDGET FOR GENERAL NET COUNTY
23 COST. THE GOVERNOR'S PROPOSED BUDGET. WE'VE TALKED A LOT IN
24 THE LAST COUPLE OF MONTHS ABOUT THE IMPACT OF THE PROPERTY TAX
25 TRANSFER. THE TOTAL IMPACT OF THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET, AT THIS



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1 POINT, IS \$470 MILLION. 289 MILLION IS BASED ON THE SHIFT OF
2 PROPERTY TAXES AND THAT WOULD REQUIRE US TO CUT 37.7% OF
3 FLEXIBLE MONEY, THAT GREEN SHEET THAT I JUST SHOWED YOU. NOW,
4 I DO WANT TO NOTE, AND I MENTIONED JUST BRIEFLY YESTERDAY AS
5 WELL, THE LOCAL INITIATIVE THAT YOUR BOARD SUPPORTED THAT THE
6 LEAGUE AND C.S.A.C. SUBMITTED ON FRIDAY WITH 1.1 MILLION
7 SIGNATURES, WE ANTICIPATE THAT IT WILL QUALIFY BUT THERE ARE
8 ACTIVE NEGOTIATIONS GOING ON WITH THE ADMINISTRATION RIGHT
9 NOW, ON BEHALF OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT, TO TRY TO NEGOTIATE BOTH A
10 BUDGET AND A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT DEAL THAT WOULD GO ON
11 THE NOVEMBER BALLOT AND BE PART OF THE BUDGET FOR THE NEXT TWO
12 YEARS. SO WE'LL SEE WHAT HAPPENS IN THAT PROCESS. BUT RIGHT
13 NOW, WE HAVE THE GOVERNOR'S ORIGINAL PROPOSAL. AGAIN, EVERY--
14 MANY PROGRAMS ARE IMPACTED. PROBATION, TANIF, THE CUTS THERE
15 WILL FORCE US TO CLOSE OUR PROBATION CAMPS AND COST, IN FACT,
16 COST THE STATE MORE MONEY BECAUSE A NUMBER OF THOSE YOUTH WILL
17 HAVE TO GO TO C.Y.A. AND THEY'RE NOT THE COUNTY
18 RESPONSIBILITY. OTHERS WILL HAVE TO GO TO GROUP HOMES. THAT
19 WILL COST US \$19 MILLION. THEY'RE DEFERRING MANDATES AGAIN.
20 THIS IS THE THIRD YEAR OF MANDATE REIMBURSEMENT DEFERRAL.
21 PUBLIC WORKS, ROADS, CHILD SUPPORT. THE STATE IS RESPONSIBLE
22 FOR AUTOMATION OF CHILD SUPPORT. WE OPERATE THE PROGRAM BUT
23 THEY'RE NOW CHARGING US A SHARE OF THEIR PENALTY TO FUND THAT.
24 THE GOVERNOR IS PROPOSING TO ELIMINATE CHILDREN SYSTEM OF
25 CARE. BOOKING FEES ARE BEING ELIMINATED IN CALIFORNIA AS A



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1 PROPOSAL. THE NET LOSS, \$470 MILLION. SO THE 289 IS IN
2 ADDITION TO ALL OF THESE-- EXCUSE ME. THE 289 IS A PART OF THE
3 470 BUT THE REST OF THEM ARE CUTS THROUGHOUT THE GOVERNOR'S
4 BUDGET. AND I'M NOT GOING TO GO THROUGH THE POTENTIAL
5 CURTAILMENTS. WE HAVE-- THEY'RE DETAILED OUT. WE'VE PRESENTED
6 THESE TO YOU IN JANUARY. NOW, THE LOCAL PROBLEM. WHAT ARE WE
7 DEALING WITH LOCALLY? WE'VE IDENTIFIED ABOUT A 269-MILLION-
8 DOLLAR SHORTFALL IN THE BUDGET, IF YOU WILL, THAT WE HAVE TO
9 SOLVE LOCALLY. THIS IS INDEPENDENT OF WHAT THE STATE MAY OR
10 MAY NOT DO TO US. THE MOST SIGNIFICANT INCREASED COSTS FOR THE
11 COUNTY: WORKERS' COMPENSATION INCREASE. EVEN THOUGH WE ARE
12 SEEING SAVINGS FROM THE FIRST WORKERS' COMPENSATION DEAL, WE
13 EXPECT TO SAVE ANOTHER 25 MILLION FROM THE BILL THAT THE
14 GOVERNOR SIGNED YESTERDAY. THE COSTS, STILL, ARE INCREASING.
15 THERE'S, I BELIEVE, A DIFFERENTIAL, CLEARLY, A DIFFERENTIAL
16 BETWEEN THE PRIVATE SECTOR IMPACT OF THE BILL AND THE PUBLIC
17 SECTOR BECAUSE WE'RE SELF-INSURED. SO WE'RE NOT GOING TO SEE
18 SOME OF THE SAVINGS, I THINK, AS THE PRIVATE SECTOR BUT \$58
19 MILLION OF THE PROBLEM IS IN WORKERS' COMPENSATION INCREASE,
20 17%. RETIREE HEALTH INSURANCE: THE COUNTY, IN 1982, 22 YEARS
21 AGO, AGREED TO PICK UP THE FULL COST OF RETIREE HEALTH. IT'S
22 INCREASING BY \$43 MILLION NEXT YEAR AND THEN THERE'S A
23 SIGNIFICANT BUT SMALL DOLLAR INCREASE IN UNEMPLOYMENT
24 INSURANCE. THESE ARE COSTS THAT DEPARTMENTS, THAT WE REQUIRE
25 DEPARTMENT TO ABSORB, WHICH IS WHY YOU'RE SEEING PROPOSED



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1 REDUCTIONS IN MOST OF THE DEPARTMENTS. AND THEN, IN ADDITION
2 TO THAT, WE HAVE REDUCTIONS IN STATE AND FEDERAL DOLLARS,
3 ELIMINATION OF GRANTS, LOSS OF ONE-TIME FUNDING, THAT REDUCE
4 THE BUDGET AS WELL. SO WE HAVE 167 MILLION IN ABSORPTIONS, WE
5 HAVE 102 MILLION IN ELIMINATING POSITIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES
6 DUE TO SPECIFIC LOSS OF REVENUE. SOME OF THE AREAS ON THE
7 ABSORPTION, ALTERNATE PUBLIC DEFENDERS, DELETING THREE DEPUTY
8 PUBLIC DEFENDER POSITIONS. WE ARE, IN FACT, TAKING MONEY AWAY
9 FROM THEM BECAUSE WE GAVE THEM MONEY FOR RAMPART. THE WHOLE
10 JUSTICE SYSTEM, BUDGETARILY, IS, AS I MENTIONED YESTERDAY, AN
11 INTELLECTUALLY CHALLENGING AREA BECAUSE THE SIMPLE ARREST OF
12 AN INDIVIDUAL CREATES COSTS AND RIPPLES THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRE
13 JUSTICE SYSTEM FROM THE COURTS TO THE JAILS TO PUBLIC
14 DEFENDER. AND THE ACCUSATION THAT A SINGLE POLICE OFFICER HAS
15 EITHER LIED OR, AS IN RAMPART, DONE SOMETHING UNTOWARD CAUSES
16 THE DEFENSE, OF COURSE, TO REVIEW EVERY SINGLE CASE THAT THAT
17 OFFICER HAD BEEN INVOLVED IN AND IT IS AN ENORMOUS COST, AS A
18 RESULT TO THE COUNTY PUBLIC DEFENDER. CHILDREN AND FAMILY
19 SERVICES ADJUSTMENT OF STATEMENT FUNDING, VACANT POSITIONS
20 BEING ELIMINATED. CHILD SUPPORT. WE JUST HAD PROBLEMS THIS
21 YEAR. WE'RE GOING TO HAVE LAYOFFS, LIKELY, IN CHILD SUPPORT
22 DEPARTMENT OF ABOUT 40 POSITIONS. E.A.: 23 ATTORNEY POSITIONS,
23 2-1/2 MILLION DOLLARS. SAW THE COMMENTS FROM THE DISTRICT
24 ATTORNEY THIS MORNING IN THE PAPER. HE'S NOT THE LEAST BIT
25 HAPPY ABOUT FURTHER REDUCTIONS IN HIS OFFICE AND WILL BE HERE



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1 ON THE 12TH TO TALK ABOUT IT. HEALTH DEPARTMENT CONTINUES TO
2 BE A CHALLENGE. WE'VE MADE PROGRESS IN THE LAST TWO YEARS BUT
3 THE PROGRESS HAS BEEN IN MOVING THE CLIFF A YEAR, MAYBE TWO
4 YEARS. THE CLIFF IS STILL IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF \$700 MILLION,
5 IN PART BECAUSE THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS PROHIBITED US FROM
6 TAKING ACTION ON RANCHO AND ON THE HUNDRED BEDS AT
7 L.A.C./U.S.C. THE DEPARTMENT, AT THIS POINT, IS PROPOSING TO
8 USE \$87 MILLION OF ITS DESIGNATION NEXT YEAR TO BALANCE THE
9 BUDGET. ALTERNATE PUBLIC DEFENDER-- DARN, I KEEP HITTING THE

11 POSITIONS. NOT AS SIGNIFICANT AS PROPOSED THE REDUCTIONS THIS
12 YEAR, AT THIS POINT, ANYWAY. PROBATION: 3.1 MILLION, 54 DEPUTY
13 PROBATION OFFICERS. THE SCHOOL-BASED SUPERVISION PROGRAM,
14 WHICH PUTS PROBATION OFFICERS IN SCHOOLS. IT IS A TREMENDOUS
15 PROGRAM, DOES WONDERS FOR THE SCHOOLS, BUT IT'S A
16 DISCRETIONARY PROGRAM AND NOT ONE THAT WE FEEL WE CAN AFFORD
17 AT THIS TIME. PUBLIC DEFENDERS, DEPUTY POSITIONS, AND THE
18 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, \$34 MILLION. WE HAVE, AT THIS POINT,
19 ONLY REDUCED SERVICES AND SUPPLIES IN THE SHERIFF'S
20 DEPARTMENT. IN PART, WE'RE WAITING TO SEE WHAT HAPPENS AT THE

2 BUDGET HAS BEEN REDUCED BUT IT HAS NOT BEEN IDENTIFIED AS TO
3 THE AREAS. WHEN WE REQUIRE THAT, THE SHERIFF WILL PRODUCE IT
4 OR WE HAVE OUR OWN PLAN AS WELL. THE OTHER SIDE OF THE
5 EQUATION, 102 MILLION. AGAIN, CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES HAS
6 VACANT POSITIONS, REDUCTION OF STATE FUNDING, A COMMUNITY AND
7 SENIOR SERVICES ELIMINATION OF ONE-TIME FUNDING FOR THE
8 HOMELESS SERVICES AUTHORITY. THE BOARD ADDED \$2-1/2 MILLION IN

17 PUBLIC DEFENDER, PUBLIC LIBRARY: WE GO THROUGH THIS EVERY YEAR
18 WITH PUBLIC LIBRARY. THIS IS INDEPENDENT OF WHAT THE STATE MAY
19 DO. 8.8-MILLION-DOLLAR DECREASE IN THE LIBRARY. LAST YEAR, I
20 THINK WE WERE LOOKING AT CLOSING ABOUT 16 LIBRARIES, 23, 25%.
21 I UNDERSTAND THE BOARD, LAST WEEK, DIRECTED THE DEPARTMENT TO
22 COME BACK WITH OPTIONS FOR CONSIDERATION AND WE CERTAINLY WILL
23 DO THAT FOR THE LIBRARY. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT: THEY HAVE LOST

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1 THE MONEY IS GONE AND SO WE'RE CUTTING THE POSITIONS. SOME
2 OTHER CHANGES. IN ADDITION TO THAT, THE RETIREMENT BUY DOWN:
3 WE ARE CONTINUING TO INCREASE THE CONTRIBUTION OF THE COUNTY
4 TO THE RETIREMENT SYSTEM TO AVOID A CLIFF THERE THAT HAS BEEN
5 IN EXISTENCE FOR 10 YEARS. PARKS AND RECREATION: FOR
6 REINSTATING BUDGETED POSITIONS FOR CASTIAC LAKE, PLACERITA
7 CANYON AS WELL AS THE TRAIL SYSTEM. FIRE: FIRE DEPARTMENT IS
8 ADDING 48 BUDGETED POSITIONS TO PROVIDE SERVICES TO SIGNAL
9 HILL AND THE ANNEXATION OF THE CITY OF LA HABRA. SO THEY'RE
10 ACTUALLY ADDING TO THE SYSTEM. AND THE BOARD PREVIOUSLY
11 APPROVED USING PROP B FUNDS TO INCREASE-- TO PROVIDE EMERGENCY
12 SERVICES TO THE RESIDENTS OF SANTA CLARITA AND ANTELOPE
13 VALLEY. THAT ALSO IS A GOOD NEWS STORY BECAUSE THOSE SERVICES
14 HAVE PREVIOUSLY NOT BEEN AVAILABLE BUT THE VOTERS APPROVED
15 PROP B AND THAT ALLOWED THAT TO HAPPEN. YOU HAVE AN ITEM, I
16 THINK, ON THE AGENDA TODAY THAT WAS CONTINUED TO ENHANCE THE
17 SERVICES IN THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY AS WELL FOR SIMILAR
18 PURPOSES. IN THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT: POSITIONS ARE-- \$14
19 MILLION AND 300 POSITIONS ARE BEING ADDED FOR A NUMBER OF
20 DIFFERENT AREAS OF THE DEPARTMENT. ONE SIGNIFICANT ONE IS
21 CLINICAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT. IT'S PART OF THE WAIVER
22 REQUIREMENT. IT WILL ALLOW THEM TO BETTER MANAGE SPECIFIC
23 DISEASES AND THEREBY REDUCE THE OVERALL COSTS TO THE
24 ORGANIZATION. AND THE HEALTH PLAN: THEY HAD ORIGINALLY PLANNED
25 TO CONTRACT IT OUT TO L.A. CARE. THAT DIDN'T HAPPEN, SO



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1 THEY'RE ADDING STAFF TO BE ABLE TO OPERATE THAT PROPERLY.
2 THERE ARE TRANSITION FIGURES BEING INCLUDED BECAUSE THE NEW
3 HOSPITAL WILL BE COMPLETED AND OPENED IN EARLY 199-- 1987--
4 2007 IS A HARD NUMBER TO CONCEPTUALIZE. THE HOSPITAL WILL OPEN
5 IN 2007. TRANSITION IS BEGINNING AND IT REFLECTS THE VOTER-
6 APPROVED MEASURE B MONEY FOR THE FIRST TIME IN THE BUDGET.
7 REGISTRAR RECORDER: \$15 MILLION ADDITION TO ACQUIRE HARDWARE
8 AND SOFTWARE TO MEET FEDERAL A.D.A. REQUIREMENTS. AS WAS
9 MENTIONED IN YOUR DISCUSSION EARLIER TODAY WITH THE CITY,
10 THERE ARE HEARINGS TOMORROW AND THURSDAY IN SACRAMENTO ON THE
11 POTENTIAL DECERTIFICATION OF ELECTRONIC VOTING IN CALIFORNIA.
12 WE SPECIFICALLY CHOSE TO DEFER A HUNDRED MILLION-DOLLAR
13 EXPENDITURE, BASICALLY, IN ELECTRONIC RECORDING FOR VOTING
14 BECAUSE THE SECRETARY OF STATE REQUIRED THAT THERE BE A PAPER
15 TRAIL AND NO ONE PRODUCES SUCH A SYSTEM. SO NOW WE'RE IN KIND
16 OF THE MIDDLE OF A VERY COMPLICATED SYSTEM-- ISSUE IN
17 CALIFORNIA. THERE'S LEGISLATION THAT WOULD DECERTIFY
18 ELECTRONIC VOTING, REGARDLESS OF THE PAPER TRAIL. ELECTRONIC
19 VOTING IS A WAY TO MEET THE A.D.A. FEDERAL REQUIREMENT AND
20 THERE IS A SUIT AGAINST US IN-- WITH RESPECT TO THAT. WE ARE
21 LOOKING AT PAPER, MAYBE, FOR SOME TIME UNTIL THEY FIGURE OUT
22 HOW TO RESOLVE ALL THE ISSUES RELATED TO ELECTRONIC VOTING.
23 HEALTH SERVICES: THIS IS JUST A PIE CHART OF HOW THE
24 DEPARTMENT SPENDS ITS MONEY. 61% IS IN HOSPITALS. THAT FIGURE,
25 SEVERAL YEARS AGO, WAS AS HIGH AS 64, 65%. SO THE HOSPITAL



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1 EXPENDITURE IS DECREASING. CAPITAL PROJECTS: ABOUT HALF A
2 BILLION DOLLARS IN CAPITAL PROJECTS. MOST OF THAT IS REVENUE
3 OFFSET. A LOT OF IT, PARKS, PROP "A" FUNDS. LARGEST SINGLE
4 EXPENDITURE IS FOR THE NEW HOSPITAL, \$234 MILLION FOR HEALTH
5 PROJECTS. THE MOST SIGNIFICANT, HOWEVER, IS MED CENTER
6 REPLACEMENT AND I WON'T GO THROUGH ALL OF THE CAPITAL
7 PROJECTS, EITHER. BRIEFLY, ON PERFORMANCE COUNTS, YOU HAVE,
8 NATIONWIDE, BEEN SEEING MORE AND MORE ATTENTION IN GOVERNMENT
9 TO DEALING WITH THE WHOLE ISSUE OF: ARE WE HAVING AN IMPACT?
10 IS ANYONE BETTER OFF? ARE OUR PROGRAMS ACCOMPLISHING ANYTHING?
11 AND I'VE HEARD YOUR BOARD MEMBERS AND I REMEMBER,
12 SPECIFICALLY, SUPERVISOR MOLINA, IN A DISCUSSION IN COMMUNITY
13 AND SENIOR SERVICES, ABOUT A CONTRACT PROGRAM. IT'S
14 INTERESTING THAT YOU CAN TELL ME HOW MANY CLIENTS YOU SERVED
15 BUT DID YOU HAVE ANY IMPACT? AND THAT'S WHAT PERFORMANCE
16 COUNTS IS ALL ABOUT. WE ARE STARTING-- AND THIS IS A MULTI-
17 YEAR EFFORT BECAUSE IT IS EXTRAORDINARILY COMPLICATED TO
18 IDENTIFY YOUR OUTCOME AND THEN TRY TO DEVELOP AN INDICATOR FOR
19 SUCCESS BECAUSE THERE IS NO CONTROL GROUP FOR SOCIETY. WE ARE
20 THE CONTROL GROUP. BUT THE QUESTION IS, WHAT IS THE INTENDED
21 RESULT OF THE EFFORT? WHAT INDICATORS CAN YOU USE TO TELL
22 WHETHER YOU'RE MAKING A DIFFERENCE? AND THEN, WHAT THE
23 TAXPAYERS ARE EQUALLY INTERESTED IN, ARE THE OPERATIONAL
24 MEASURES. HOW WELL WAS THE SERVICE BEING PROVIDED? WAS IT DONE
25 EFFICIENTLY? WAS THERE A COST BENEFIT TO THE SERVICE? IT'S THE



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1 DIFFERENCE BETWEEN ARE WE DOING THE RIGHT THINGS? AND ARE WE
2 DOING THEM THE RIGHT WAY? AN EXAMPLE OF THE PROGRAM RESULT:
3 ARE YOUTH EXITING JOB TRAINING PROGRAMS EMPLOYED IN MILITARY
4 SERVICE OR SECONDARY EDUCATION SIX MONTHS AFTER THE EXIT? THE
5 OPERATIONAL QUESTION IS HOW MANY DID YOU PROCESS? WE HAVE
6 MEASURES INCLUDED IN SOME PROGRAMS IN THE BUDGET, NOT ALL THE
7 PROGRAMS. AS I SAID, IT'S GOING TO TAKE THREE TO FOUR YEARS.
8 ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA, WHICH IS-- FAIRFAX COUNTY, VIRGINIA, IS
9 ONE OF THE BEST IN THE NATION. THEY'VE BEEN WORKING ON IT FOR
10 SEVEN YEARS. IT IS NOT AN EASY UNDERTAKING BUT IT'S CRITICAL
11 AND PARTICULARLY WHEN YOU LOOK AT CHILDREN AND FAMILY
12 SERVICES. SEPARATE BUDGET DOCUMENT. YOUR BOARD APPROVED, IN
13 1993, THESE FIVE OUTCOMES FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES AND ALL OF
14 YOU HAVE CHAIRED OVER THE YEARS THE CHILDREN'S PLANNING
15 COUNCIL, WHOSE PRIORITY IS TO TRY TO MOVE THE ORGANIZATION
16 TOWARD MEETING THESE OUTCOMES. IT'S ONE THING TO SAY IT, IT'S
17 ANOTHER TO FIGURE OUT WHAT IT MEANS AND HOW DO YOU KNOW IF AND
18 WHEN YOU'VE ARRIVED? THESE ARE JUST BUDGET FIGURES THAT I'LL
19 SKIP. THIS IS THE PROBLEM: THESE ARE STATE AND FEDERAL RULES
20 AND REGULATIONS THAT-- AND THERE ARE ONLY 40 OF THEM THAT ARE
21 MENTIONED. THERE ARE THREE TIMES AS MANY CONGRESSIONAL
22 COMMITTEES INVOLVED IN EACH OF THESE PROGRAMS. THIS IS THE
23 CHALLENGE THAT THE BUREAUCRACY HAS IN TRYING TO INTEGRATE
24 SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND FAMILIES AT A COMMUNITY LEVEL. THE
25 MONEY COMES IN CATEGORIES, PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS ARE IN



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1 CATEGORIES, BUT THE FAMILY-- THE FAMILIES AND KIDS AREN'T
2 CATEGORIES. AND THE CHALLENGE IS HOW YOU INTEGRATE ALL OF
3 THESE LINES INTO SOMETHING THAT'S USER-FRIENDLY FOR THE
4 FAMILIES AND WORKS. SOME OF THE PROGRAM SUCCESSES, IF YOU
5 WILL: IN THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT: THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN INSURED
6 HAS INCREASED FROM THE 89.7% FROM 75% IN 1997. SAFETY AND
7 SURVIVAL, PROBATION, COMMUNITY CAMP TRANSITION: INCREASING
8 NUMBER OF YOUTH LEAVING CAMP WHO ARE SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETING
9 PROBATION WITH NO SUBSEQUENT PETITION, FROM 70% TO 78%. AND,
10 AGAIN, THE TRENDS ARE WHAT YOU'RE LOOKING AT. HOURLY WAGE OF
11 PARTICIPANT IN CALWORKS HAS INCREASED STEADILY FROM \$7.83 TO
12 \$9.10? I CAN'T READ THAT. SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL WELLBEING,
13 YOUTH DECREASED MENTAL DISTRESS AND EDUCATION WORKFORCE
14 READINESS, THE NUMBER OF EMANCIPATED YOUTH ENROLLING IN HIGHER
15 EDUCATION HAS GONE FROM 15.7% TO 5%. THESE ARE ALL PRELIMINARY
16 FIGURES. THESE ARE THE KINDS OF INDICATORS THAT ARE GOING TO
17 BE USED TO SEE IF WE ARE MAKING PROGRESS. ARE WE MAKING A
18 DIFFERENCE? YOU ARE THE CITY COUNCIL FOR A MILLION PEOPLE. WE
19 SPEND ABOUT \$850 MILLION OF OUR BUDGET. BUT, OF A 17-BILLION-
20 DOLLAR BUDGET, IT'S A VERY SMALL PERCENTAGE. AND WE ARE
21 LOOKING AND WORKING WITH YOUR OFFICES ON A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT
22 MODELS FOR DELIVERING SERVICES IN THE UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITY
23 BECAUSE THEY'RE ALL VERY DIFFERENT. CIVIC CENTER MODEL,
24 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PLANNING, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, THESE ARE
25 DIFFERENT MODELS FOR DIFFERENT COMMUNITIES. THE ECONOMY, YOU



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1 KNOW, WHO KNOWS? AT THIS POINT, THE RECESSION APPEARS TO BE
2 OVER BUT IT'S A JOBLESS RECOVERY AND SO THEY'RE NOT SEEING-- I
3 THINK THE ECONOMISTS DON'T REALLY KNOW WHAT TO DO WITH THE
4 DATA AT THIS POINT. THINGS ARE GETTING BETTER. THE IRONY IS
5 THAT, REALLY, LOCAL REVENUES, PROPERTY TAX, VEHICLE LICENSE
6 FEES OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS HAVE BEEN DOING JUST FINE.
7 IT'S THE STATE DEFICIT THAT'S CAUSING EVERYBODY GREAT ANXIETY.
8 THE COST OF THE RETIREMENT SYSTEM IN L.A. IS GOING UP LIKE
9 EVERYWHERE ELSE BECAUSE OF THE MARKET. L.A.C.E.R.A. IS
10 AMORTIZING, FINALLY, THE LOSSES, ABOUT \$4 BILLION, I THINK, IN
11 THE RETIREMENT SYSTEM. AND, IN '04/'05, WE HAVE AN INCREASE OF
12 OVER \$200 MILLION IN THAT YEAR ALONE; 95% OF WHICH IS BASED ON
13 THE MARKET LOSSES. AND WE HAVE, FOR SIX YEARS NOW, BEEN USING
14 LESS AND LESS OF OUR SURPLUS EARNINGS TO PAY FOR THE COST OF
15 THE RETIREMENT SYSTEM BECAUSE THE SURPLUS EARNINGS WILL EXPIRE
16 IN '06/'07, '07/'08. THIS JUST SHOWS THE HISTORIC LOSS OF THE
17 PROPERTY TAX THE STATE TRANSFERRED IN '92/'93, AND '93/'94 AND
18 THE BACK FILL, PROP 172 THAT THEY GAVE US. WE'RE ALMOST \$800
19 MILLION SHORT ANNUALLY. WORKERS' COMPENSATION: THE GOVERNOR
20 AND THE LEGISLATURE ARE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT, THIS IS A HUGE
21 ISSUE, NOT JUST FOR THE PRIVATE SECTOR BUT FOR GOVERNMENT AS
22 WELL. OUR COSTS CONTINUE TO ESCALATE. WE'RE OPTIMISTIC THAT WE
23 CAN SLOW THAT TREND LINE DOWN BASED ON THE LAWS THAT WERE
24 PASSED. WITH THAT, THAT CONCLUDES THE PRESENTATION. THANK YOU



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1 FOR YOUR PATIENCE. I'D BE HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS THAT
2 YOU HAVE AT THIS TIME.

3

4 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. THANK YOU, DAVID. WELL DONE.
5 OBVIOUSLY, ONE OF THE IMMEDIATE QUESTIONS YESTERDAY WAS AT
6 THAT PRESS CONFERENCE WITH THE GOVERNOR, WHERE HE SIGNED THAT
7 LEGISLATION. WHAT ARE WE ANTICIPATING OR DO WE HAVE A ROUND
8 NUMBER AT THIS POINT THAT MAYBE SAVE DUE TO THE WORKERS'
9 COMPENSATION LEGISLATION THAT WAS SIGNED YESTERDAY?

10

11 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** OUR STAFF IS ESTIMATING ABOUT \$25 MILLION
12 ANNUALLY THAT WE'LL SAVE FROM THE BILL THAT THE GOVERNOR
13 SIGNED YESTERDAY AND THAT-- I'M NOT SURE, I HAVEN'T HEARD A--
14 WHICH FISCAL YEAR, WHETHER THAT'S NEXT YEAR OR NOT, BUT \$25
15 MILLION. AND THAT'S ON TOP OF 26 MILLION, WHICH THE
16 LEGISLATURE AND THE GOVERNOR ENACTED LAST YEAR. SO, FOR THE
17 COUNTY, YOU KNOW, 50 PLUS MILLION DOLLARS IS A GOOD START BUT
18 OUR COSTS ARE 400 MILLION.

19

20 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. ARE THERE ANY OTHER QUESTIONS?

21

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** I'D LIKE TO ASK, IT'S MY UNDERSTANDING THAT
23 THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY RECEIVED \$2.5 MILLION AND, ON EXPECTED
24 SB-90 AND OTHER CLAIMS THIS YEAR. COULD THOSE MONEYS BE USED
25 TO COVER THE DEPARTMENT'S COST ABSORPTION ISSUE?



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1

2 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** CERTAINLY THEY COULD BE USED IF WE HAVEN'T
3 ALREADY USED THEM FOR SOMETHING ELSE OR USED THEM IN HIS
4 OFFICE BUT, YES, THAT WOULD BE A WAY. AND, BETWEEN NOW,
5 SUPERVISOR, AND DELIBERATIONS, WE CONTINUE TO WORK WITH ALL OF
6 THE DEPARTMENTS ON THEIR BUDGET, EXAMINE ALTERNATIVES FOR YOUR
7 BOARD TO CONSIDER. WE HAD TO STOP THE PROCESS AT A FIXED POINT
8 TO PRODUCE A BUDGET ON TIME. SO WE WILL CONTINUE TO WORK WITH
9 ALL OF THE DEPARTMENTS TO FIND OUT IF THERE ARE ANY OTHER
10 OPTIONS IN LIEU OF REDUCTIONS.

11

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU.

13

14 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** ANY OTHER QUESTIONS? OKAY. IF NOT, THE
15 ACTION WE NEED TO TAKE TODAY IS TO ADOPT IT AS A WORKING
16 DOCUMENT WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT THE PUBLIC HEARINGS,
17 THOSE THAT ARE INTERESTED, START ON MAY 12TH.

18

19 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** MAY 12TH, THAT'S CORRECT.

20

21 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** AND THEN, IN JUNE, WE'LL BEGIN OUR
22 DELIBERATIONS. AND SO...

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1 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** RIGHT. YOU HAVE A BOARD LETTER, HOPEFULLY, IN
2 FRONT OF YOU THAT ORDERS SUCH REVISIONS, ADDITIONS, CHANGES AS
3 DEEMED NECESSARY, APPROVE THE REVISED FIGURES...

4

5 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. BEFORE US, THEN, WOULD BE THE
6 RECOMMENDATION OF ITEM 1 AND 2 OF THE BOARD LETTER. UNDER THE
7 RECOMMENDATIONS, MOVED BY SUPERVISOR BURKE. THE CHAIR WOULD
8 SECOND. IS THERE ANY OBJECTION?

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** ABSTAIN.

11

12 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** ABSTAINED. IT'S GETTING CLOSER. MAKING
13 PROGRESS. OKAY. WITH THE ONE ABSTENTION RECORDED, THEN WE WILL
14 PROCEED. THANK YOU. THANK YOU AGAIN, DAVID. GREAT
15 PRESENTATION. OKAY. WE HAVE PUBLIC COMMENT BEFORE WE GO TO
16 CLOSED SESSION AND IF I... DEBRA RAYFORD. JACK MARTIN. ROBERT
17 MCCORDIC AND DAVID WHEATLEY. OKAY. DEBRA, IF YOU WOULD
18 PROCEED.

19

20 **DEBRA RAYFORD:** YES. MY NAME IS DEBRA RAYFORD AND I RESIDE IN
21 THE FIFTH DISTRICT. SEVERAL MONTHS AGO, I CAME INTO THIS
22 OFFICE TO ASK FOR ASSISTANCE IN A HOMELESS MATTER AND I WAS
23 GIVEN THAT ASSISTANCE. THE DEPARTMENT OF D.P.S.S. HAVE HELPED
24 ME BUT I WAS ALSO REFERRED AND ENTERED INTO A PROGRAM CALLED
25 L.A.H.S.A., AND L.A.H.S.A. HAS NOT SERVICED ME PROPERLY. I



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1 HAVE REPEATEDLY MADE PHONE CALLS ASKING FOR THE ASSISTANCE AND
2 THEY'VE JUST REALLY REFUSED TO SERVICE ME. THEY'RE NOT--
3 THEY'RE NOT USING GOOD JUDGMENT IN HELPING ME. EVERYONE
4 USUALLY HAS A GAME PLAN. WHAT ASSISTANCE IS NEEDED AND WHAT
5 THE GOALS ARE IN ORDER TO ACCOMPLISH THAT AND THAT HAS NOT
6 BEEN DONE. THEY HAVE ME DRIVING OVER 3,000 MILES A MONTH
7 PARTICIPATING IN THIS PROGRAM AND I'M DOING EVERYTHING THAT
8 THEY HAVE ASKED ME TO DO. I WAS VOUCHERED IN THE SANTA CLARITA
9 WINTER SHELTER, WHICH I THANK YOU ALL FOR APPROVING THE MONEY
10 FOR THAT PROGRAM TO CONTINUE, AND I WAS TOLD THAT, THROUGH
11 L.A.H.S.A., THAT I WOULD BE CONTINUED VOUCHERED IN THAT
12 PROGRAM UNTIL I GOT PERMANENT HOUSING THROUGH THEIR PROGRAM
13 WITH A SECTION 8 VOUCHER AND THAT HAS NOT HAPPENED. THEY
14 PLACED ME AND MY DAUGHTER IN A SHELTER WHERE THEY TOOK HER
15 CLOTHES AWAY FROM HER AND, TO THIS DAY, I DON'T KNOW WHY THEY
16 TOOK HER CLOTHES AND THEY ONLY RETURNED PART OF THEM. A GAIN
17 WORKER TRIED TO ASSIST IN GETTING MY DAUGHTER'S CLOTHES
18 BECAUSE SHE DIDN'T HAVE THE APPROPRIATE CLOTHES. THE CLOTHING
19 THAT SHE HAD, SHE WOULD HAVE BEEN SUSPENDED FROM SCHOOL. THE
20 ONLY WAY I GOT THE CLOTHING THAT SHE DOES HAVE IS I PUT IN A
21 9-1-1 CALL TO THE PAGER AND, BECAUSE I DID THAT, THEY ASKED US
22 TO LEAVE.

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1 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** MAYBE SOMEONE FROM SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH'S
2 OFFICE COULD MEET WITH YOU, JUST MEET HIM OVER HERE TO THE
3 SIDE AND SEE HOW THEY MIGHT BE ABLE TO ASSIST YOU.

4
5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** RIGHT HERE. DR. RICHARD WILL TALK TO YOU ON
6 THAT.

7
8 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. THANK YOU FOR COMING DOWN. MR.
9 MARTIN.

10

11 **JACK MARTIN:** HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, I AM JACK MARTIN,
12 THE CHAIRPERSON FOR THE N.A.M.I. WALKS FOR LOS ANGELES COUNTY.
13 ITEM 26 OF TODAY'S AGENDA IS INDICATIVE OF THE PROBLEMS OF THE
14 MENTALLY ILL AND THE HOMELESS. N.A.M.I., OR THE NATIONAL
15 ALLIANCE FOR THE MENTALLY ILL, IS A GRASSROOT ORGANIZATION
16 DEDICATED TO WORKING WITH THE MENTALLY ILL, THEIR FAMILIES,
17 AND THEIR LOVED ONES. ON MAY THE 22ND OF THIS YEAR, WE HAVE
18 PLANNED AND ORGANIZED A WALK WHICH IS DESIGNED TO RAISE FUNDS
19 AND THE PUBLIC AWARENESS OF THE NEEDS OF THE MENTALLY ILL AND
20 THE HOMELESS. WE ARE ASKING YOU TO WAIVE THE PARK AND VEHICLE
21 FEES AT THE SANTA FE DAM RECREATIONAL AREA. THIS WILL ENABLE
22 N.A.M.I. TO CONTINUE OUR RESEARCH AND EDUCATION WORK WITH THE
23 MENTALLY ILL AND THE HOMELESS AND THEIR FAMILIES. THANK YOU,
24 SIR.

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1 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. I THINK YOU'RE A RESIDENT OF
2 COVINA. IF YOU'D ADDRESS A LETTER TO MR. ANTONOVICH OR TO MS.
3 MOLINA. OH, YOU'RE WORKING WITH MS. MOLINA?

4

5 **JACK MARTIN:** YEAH.

6

7 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** YEAH. WE NEED A FORMAL REQUEST AND WE'LL
8 SEE WHAT WE CAN DO TO ASSIST YOU ON THAT WAIVER.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK.

11

12 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** YEP. MR. MCCORDIC AND THEN I'M ALSO GOING
13 TO ASK GRACIE GRAY FORWARD AS WELL, TOO.

14

15 **ROBERT L. MCCORDIC:** I'M MCCORDIC, SIR. YES. I BECAME A
16 NATIONAL HERO THREE TIMES, A INTERNATIONAL HERO TWICE WHEN I
17 EXPOSED THE ISLAM AND MUSLIM GOVERNMENT ABSOLUTE CONTROL OVER
18 THE LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT. NOW, SINCE I DID THAT, WHY,
19 COLONEL TIBBITS, WHO HAD ATOMIC BOMBED JAPAN, CONTACTED ME
20 IMMEDIATELY AND HAD HIS PERSONAL SECRETARY MOVE INTO OUR HOME
21 IN GRANADA HILLS AND, AS A THREESOME, OUR JOB WAS TO
22 INVESTIGATE TREASON IN THE LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT. SO
23 HE GOT US BOTH JOBS IN LAW ENFORCEMENT, SO HE HAD THE LEGAL
24 RIGHT TO MAKE ARRESTS AND HE GOT ME INTO THE FBI. NOW, THE CAR
