6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF
7 SUPERVISORS' JUNE 14TH MEETING IS GOING TO BEGIN. FIRST WE'RE
8 GOING TO BE LED IN PRAYER BY DEACON FRED RIOS OF OUR LADY OF
9 THE MIRACULOUS MEDAL CATHOLIC CHURCH IN MONTEBELLO. AND OUR
10 PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE WILL BE LED BY JAMES LE BERTHON, RETIRED
11 CAPTAIN OF THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS, AMERICAN LEGION,
12 TEMPLE CITY, POST NO. 279, PAST COMMANDER. DEACON?

13
14 **DEACON FRED RIOS:** GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS FRED RIOS, MY
15 PARISH IS OUR LADY OF THE MIRACULOUS MEDAL CHURCH IN
16 MONTEBELLO. I WANT TO THANK EACH AND EVERY ONE OF YOU FOR THIS
17 INVITATION TO DO THE INVOCATIONS, TO THE SUPERVISORS AND TO
18 EVERY ONE OF YOU IN ATTENDANCE. I WAS NOT BORN IN CALIFORNIA.
19 I WAS BORN IN THE STATE OF COLORADO, SON OF A COAL MINER. I
20 HAVE LIVED IN LOS ANGELES SINCE 1942. AT THAT TIME, THE CITY
21 HALL WAS THE TALLEST BUILDING. I HAVE HAD THE OPPORTUNITIES TO
22 SEE LOS ANGELES GROW; AND WHAT WE HAVE TODAY WAS ACCOMPLISHED
23 BY DEDICATED PEOPLE AS SUCH PEOPLE AS OUR SUPERVISORS WHO WORK
24 FOR THE CITY GOVERNMENT. WHEN I AM ASKED "WHERE ARE YOU FROM?"
25 I'M VERY PROUD TO SAY "I'M FROM LOS ANGELES." I BELIEVE THAT



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1 WHEN WE ARE BORN, THERE IS A LIGHT FOR US, A LIGHT THAT COMES
2 FROM ABOVE. AND I BELIEVE THAT LIGHT AT THAT TIME GIVES US THE
3 TALENTS, ALL THE TALENTS THAT WE HAVE TO SHARE WITH THOSE
4 PEOPLE THAT GOD PUTS BEFORE US. YOU, AS SUPERVISORS HAVE THE
5 TALENT TO GOVERN THE CITY, TO MAKE THIS A BETTER CITY BECAUSE
6 WE HAVE SUCH AN ETHNIC GROUP THAT WE HAVE TO UNDERSTAND THE
7 NEEDS FOR EVERY PERSON THAT ARE HERE WITH US. AND IT'S ONLY
8 THROUGH YOUR HARD WORK THAT WE ARE PRIVILEGED TO HAVE THAT. WE
9 HAVE BEEN CALLED TO SERVE THE PEOPLE OF GOD, TO SERVICE WITH
10 UNDERSTANDING HEARTS THAT WE MAY KNOW THE NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE
11 WE TRUST THAT WITH THE GUIDANCE FROM ABOVE WE WILL REACH OUT
12 WITH ALL OUR EFFORTS, ALL OUR TALENTS, GUIDE US AND STRENGTHEN
13 US TO RECOGNIZE OUR RESPONSIBILITY AS WE SERVE OUR PEOPLE OF
14 LOS ANGELES, AMEN.

16 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** CAPTAIN?

18 **JAMES LE BERTHON:** ALL RIGHT. WOULD EVERYONE FACE THE FLAG AND
19 PUT THEIR HAND OVER THEIR HEART AS WE RECITE THE PLEDGE OF
20 ALLEGIANCE? THOSE WHO ARE VETERANS MAY USE THE MILITARY
21 SALUTE.

2 **SUP. MOLINA:** IT IS MY HONOR AND PLEASURE TO WELCOME DEACON
3 FRED RIOS. AS YOU CAN TELL BY HIS PASSION, HE FEELS VERY
4 STRONGLY ABOUT SERVING THE COMMUNITY, BOTH SPIRITUALLY AS WELL
5 AS CIVICALLY. HE IS THE DEACON FROM OUR LADY OF MIRACULOUS
6 MEDAL CATHOLIC CHURCH IN MONTEBELLO. HE HAS BEEN A DEVOTED
7 MEMBER OF THE PARISH SINCE 1960 AND HE SERVED AS DEACON FOR
8 OVER 17 YEARS. HIS MANY CONTRIBUTIONS INCLUDE ASSISTING AT
9 SUNDAY MASS, ROSARIES, VIGILS, MARRIAGE PREPARATION AND
10 CERTAINLY MUCH MORE. WE REALLY APPLAUD HIM FOR HIS DEVOTION TO
11 HIS PARISHIONERS AND DEVOTION TO THE COMMUNITY AND FOR TAKING
12 THE TIME TO COME AND JOIN US AND LEAD US IN OUR INVOCATION,

20 CHILDREN AND HE'S LIVED IN OUR DISTRICT FOR 15 YEARS. AND WE
21 WELCOME HIM FOR LEADING US IN THE PLEDGE. SO THANK YOU VERY
22 MUCH. [APPLAUSE.]

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** LET ME FIRST WE HAVE TWO CONSUL
6 GENERALS THAT ARE HERE. FIRST WE WOULD LIKE TO INVITE JACOB
7 DAYAN, WHO IS THE CONSUL GENERAL FOR ISRAEL IN LOS ANGELES
8 COUNTY WHO WAS ACCREDITED TO HIS POSITION IN 2007. IN THE 3-
9 1/2 YEARS HE'S BEEN THE CONSUL GENERAL FOR ARIZONA, COLORADO,
10 HAWAII, NEVADA, UTAH, WYOMING IN ADDITION TO SOUTHERN
11 CALIFORNIA. HE'S BEEN HIGHLY ACTIVE. HE HAS SPECIAL INTEREST
12 IN THE BUILDING BRIDGES OF UNDERSTANDING TO ALL RESIDENTS IN
13 ALL COMMUNITIES IN OUR COUNTY. BY PERFORMING PARTNERSHIPS WITH
14 CONSUL GENERALS FROM JAPAN, MEXICO AND OTHER COUNTRIES TO HOST
15 SPECIAL EVENTS. HE ALSO HAS OPENED HIS RESIDENCE TO EVENTS
16 WITH ORGANIZATIONS WITH MULTICULTURAL MEMBERSHIPS. AT THE SAME
17 TIME, HE'S STRENGTHENED TIES WITH LOCAL ISRAELI, ISRAELI
18 AMERICAN AND JEWISH AMERICAN RESIDENTS, REACHING OUT TO
19 NONJEWISH AMERICANS, AS WELL. HIS WIFE AND THREE CHILDREN WILL
20 SOON RETURN TO ISRAEL WHERE HE WILL TAKE UP A POST IN THE
21 FOREIGN MINISTRY. CONSUL GENERAL? THANK YOU FOR COMING. DID
22 YOU EVER WIN THE GOLF TOURNAMENT?

24 **JACOB DAYAN:** NOT YET.

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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** WELL NEXT TIME.

2

3 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. MAYOR, BEFORE CONSUL GENERAL MAKES HIS
4 REMARKS, I'D JUST LIKE TO ADD MY PERSONAL COMMENTS ON JACOB
5 DAYAN'S SERVICE HERE IN LOS ANGELES. WE'VE BEEN VERY FORTUNATE
6 OVER THE DECADES TO HAVE SOME EXTRAORDINARY DIPLOMATS WHO HAVE
7 BEEN ASSIGNED BY THE ISRAELI FOREIGN OFFICE TO REPRESENT
8 ISRAEL IN LOS ANGELES AND THE WESTERN STATES. MANY OF THEM
9 HAVE GONE ON TO BIGGER AND BETTER THINGS IN THE FOREIGN
10 SERVICE AND IN GOVERNMENT. JACOB DAYAN IS AS GOOD AS WE'VE
11 EVER HAD FROM THE STATE OF ISRAEL. YOU WILL BE SORELY MISSED.
12 I KNOW YOU'VE MADE A LOT OF FRIENDS, BOTH PERSONALLY AND FOR
13 THE STATE OF ISRAEL. YOU'VE BEEN A GREAT REPRESENTATIVE FOR
14 THE STATE OF ISRAEL. AND YOU'VE BEEN A GREAT ANGELINO. I THINK
15 WE CAN CALL YOU AN ANGELINO. YOU KNOW THE CITY, YOU KNOW THE
16 COUNTY, YOU KNOW OUR INSTITUTIONS. AND ABOVE ALL, BARBARA AND
17 I CONSIDER YOU AND GALIT GREAT PERSONAL FRIENDS AND WISH YOU
18 WELL IN YOUR NEXT CHAPTER.

19

20 **JACOB DAYAN:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THANK YOU, MAYOR ANTONOVICH,
21 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. I WANT TO THANK ALL OF YOU AND TO TELL
22 YOU THAT LOS ANGELES IS A STRATEGIC PLACE FOR THE STATE OF
23 ISRAEL. IT IS THE SECOND LARGEST JEWISH CITY IN THE WORLD, HAS
24 THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF EX-PATRIOTS. THIS IS REALLY A PLACE OF
25 IMPORTANCE FOR THE STATE OF ISRAEL. BUT IT WAS ALSO A PLACE OF



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1 IMPORTANCE BECAUSE WE MANAGE THROUGH ALL THE DIVERSITY OF THIS
2 PLACE WITH SO MANY COMMUNITIES TO BUILD BRIDGES. WE WENT AND
3 CELEBRATED IN BOYD HEIGHTS, THE JEWISH COMMUNITY BUT ALSO THE
4 LATINO COMMUNITY AND THE JAPANESE COMMUNITY WE MANAGED TO WORK
5 WITH L.A.'S BEST AS A VERY IMPORTANT ORGANIZATION IN THIS TOWN
6 AND WE REALLY MANAGED TO BUILD BRIDGES. AND I WANT TO THANK
7 EACH AND EVERY ONE OF YOU FOR HELPING US BUILDING THOSE
8 BRIDGES, ESPECIALLY YOU, ZEV, BEING SUCH A GREAT FRIEND TO THE
9 STATE OF ISRAEL. IN A FEW MONTHS MY OLDEST WILL GO TO THE
10 ARMY. AND I WANT TO SALUTE ALL THE MEN IN UNIFORM HERE. AND I
11 WANT TO TELL YOU THAT WE'LL GO BACK TO ISRAEL STRONGER BECAUSE
12 WE KNOW THAT WHEN WE GO TO THE ARMY, WE REPRESENT NOT ONLY THE
13 VALUES OF THE JEWISH STATE BUT ALSO THE VALUES OF THE UNITED
14 STATES OF AMERICA, OUR GREATEST AND THE MOST IMPORTANT ALLY.
15 VALUES THAT WE SHARE AND DEFINITELY WILL GO BACK STRONGER. AND
16 I WANT TO CONGRATULATE MY COLLEAGUE, HAKAN, THE CONSUL GENERAL
17 OF TURKEY THAT IS HERE THAT HAS DONE A WONDERFUL JOB. AND
18 ALTHOUGH ISRAEL AND TURKEY DO NOT SHARE GREAT RELATIONSHIPS
19 NOW, WE DO. I DON'T KNOW IF IT'S ALL RIGHT THAT I'M SAYING IT
20 PUBLICLY. [LAUGHTER.] BUT WE DO. AND I THINK THIS IS ALSO ONE
21 OF THE GREATEST VALUES AND QUALITIES OF THIS PLACE. AND
22 DIVERSITIES THAT DIFFERENT COMMUNITIES CAN COME TOGETHER AND
23 WORK FIRST AND FOREMOST FOR THEIR STATE BUT THEN FOR THIS
24 SPECIAL PLACE AND FOR THIS CITY BECAUSE I DO BELIEVE, AND THIS
25 WAS MY MISSION AND STATEMENT HERE, THAT IF LOS ANGELES IS



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1 BETTER AND STRONGER, IT MAKES ISRAEL BETTER AND STRONGER AS
2 WELL. SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR ALL OF YOU BEING SUCH GREAT
3 PARTNERS. AND I'M LOOKING FORWARD TO CONTINUING WORKING AND
4 ENHANCING THE STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THIS GREAT PLACE
5 AND THE STATE OF ISRAEL. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE.]

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** NOW WE'D LIKE TO BID FAREWELL TO
8 ANOTHER OUTSTANDING CONSUL GENERAL AND THA'S THE HONORABLE
9 RIZA HAKEN TEKIN WHO IS THE CONSUL GENERAL OF TURKEY. HE WAS
10 ACCREDITED TO HIS POSITION ALSO IN 2007. AND HIS SERVICES
11 INCLUDE THE STATES OF CALIFORNIA, ALASKA, ARIZONA, COLORADO,
12 HAWAII, IDAHO, MONTANA, NEVADA, OREGON, UTAH, WASHINGTON,
13 WYOMING, PACIFIC ISLANDS, GOVERNED BY THE UNITED STATES. AND
14 HE ALSO HAS BEEN QUITE INVOLVED IN THE PROMOTION OF TRADE AND
15 CULTURAL RELATIONS. AMONG THE ACCOMPLISHMENTS WAS THE
16 ESTABLISHMENT OF DIRECT FLIGHTS BETWEEN LAX AND ISTANBUL BY
17 THE TURKISH AIRLINES WHICH WERE INITIATED LAST MARCH WITH FOUR
18 FLIGHTS A WEEK AND IT IS EXPECTED IT WILL BE INCREASED IN THE
19 FUTURE. ALSO BEEN INSTRUMENTAL IN ORGANIZING THE ANNUAL
20 ANATOLIAN FOOD BY THE PACIFICA INSTITUTE WHICH WAS INAUGURATED
21 IN 2009 AND IT'S THE FIRST TIME THAT SUCH AN EXTENSIVE
22 HIGHLIGHTING OF THE HISTORY, CULTURE, AND FOOD OF TURKEY HAD
23 BEEN PRESENTED IN THE WESTERN UNITED STATES. HE WILL BE
24 DEPARTING HIS POST IN AUGUST. AND ON BEHALF OF THE 10 MILLION

4 **RIZA HAKAN TEKIN:** THANK YOU, MAYOR ANTONOVICH AND THANK YOU
5 VERY MUCH ALL THE OTHER MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.
6 IT HAS BEEN REALLY A PLEASURE, HONOR, FOR ME, SERVING IN LOS
7 ANGELES. OF COURSE, WE DON'T HAVE AS BIG COMMUNITY AS MANY OF
8 MY COLLEAGUES DO HERE. WE HAVE A RATHER SMALL TURKISH AMERICAN

4 RECENTLY HONORED GRENADA HILLS HIGH SCHOOL, CHARTER HIGH

11 VITO, WHO WAS WITH THE MONTROSE SHOPPING PARK ASSOCIATION AND
12 THE MONTROSE MERCHANT BILL BAILEY. SUPPORTED BY THE LOCAL
13 ROTARY CLUB, THEIR EFFORT ESTABLISHED A COUNTY-WIDE WEEK OF
14 RECOGNITION TO HONOR THE AMERICAN FLAG. THAT GAINED NATIONAL
15 APPEAL AND WAS SIGNED INTO LAW BY PRESIDENT LYNDON JOHNSON. SO
16 VITO, THANK YOU FOR YOUR LEADERSHIP AND YOUR SERVICE TO OUR
17 COUNTY. AND WE'LL MAKE YOU THIS PROCLAMATION.

18

19 **VITO CANNELLA:** GOOD MORNING. I THINK IT'S PROPER FOR ME, WITH
20 THE PERMISSION OF THE BOARD, TO SAY A FEW WORDS IN REGARD OF
21 FLAG WEEK. IN 1960, LIKE TODAY, OUR COUNTY WAS INVOLVED IN A
22 WAR FAR, FAR AWAY. AND SOME PEOPLE WERE AGAINST THE WAR. AND
23 THEY WERE PROTESTING. AND UNDER OUR SYSTEM, OUR SYSTEM OF OUR
24 COUNTRY, THEY WERE HAVING THE RIGHTS TO DISSENT. BUT SOME OF
25 THEM, THEY WERE EXPRESSING THEIR ANGER BY BURNING THE UNITED



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1 STATES FLAG, THE SYMBOL OF OUR COUNTRY. I SEE A LOT OF YOUNG
2 PEOPLE DON'T REMEMBER, BUT SOME OF THEM, THEY WOULD CALL THOSE
3 PEOPLE THE CHICAGO SEVEN. AND SOME OF THEM THEY ARE
4 RESPECTABLE CITIZENS NOW, BUT AT THAT TIME THEY WERE BURNING
5 THE FLAG. IT WAS ALSO DURING THAT TIME THAT MANY MEMBERS IN
6 OUR COMMUNITY IN MONTROSE, CONCERNED ABOUT UNREST AND ANTI-
7 GOVERNMENT PROTEST, DECIDED THAT SOMETHING NEEDED TO BE DONE
8 TO PROTECT AND HONOR OUR COUNTRY'S MOST PRECIOUS NATIONAL
9 EMBLEM, THE AMERICAN FLAG. AT THAT TIME, I JOINED WITH BILL
10 BAILEY, AN ORPHAN, TO CREATE SOMETHING ON NATIONAL SCALE THAT
11 HAS NEVER EXISTED BEFORE; NAMELY, A WEEK OF RECOGNITION OF OUR
12 FLAG, WHICH WILL COME TO BE KNOWN TO THE UNITED STATES AS THE
13 NATIONAL FLAG WEEK. BILL BAILEY AND I BEGAN BY WORKING WITH
14 THE _____ ROTARY CLUB AND OTHER CIVIC GROUPS IN OUR
15 COMMUNITY TO CONVINCED FORMER UNITED STATES REPRESENTATIVE H.
16 ALLEN SMITH TO INTRODUCE A LEGISLATION IN WASHINGTON THAT
17 WOULD RECOGNIZE THE WEEK SURROUNDING FLAG DAY AS A NATIONAL
18 FLAG WEEK. EVENTUALLY, THIS LEGISLATION PASSED BOTH THE HOUSE
19 OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE UNITED STATES SENATE. AND ON JUNE
20 9TH, 1966, PRESIDENT LYNDON JOHNSON SIGNED THE FIRST
21 PROCLAMATION DESIGNATING THE WEEK IN WHICH JUNE THE 14TH
22 CALLED AS THE NATIONAL FLAG WEEK. THIS WEEK, ACTUALLY. AND
23 CALLING UPON ALL CITIZENS TO DISPLAY THE FLAG OF THE UNITED
24 STATES FROM THAT DAY FORWARD EACH PRESIDENT IS AUTHORIZED AND
25 REQUESTED TO REACH SUCH A PROCLAMATION. SO WHAT'S THE MORAL OF



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1 THE STORY? AS WE GATHER TODAY TO CELEBRATE THE FLAG WEEK AND
2 PATRIOTISM. THE MORAL IS THAT OUT OF THE SMALL TOWN LIKE
3 MONTROSE, THE DREAM AND GOAL OF OUR WORKING CITIZENS CAN BE
4 REALIZED FOR OUR CITY, OUR COUNTY, OUR STATE AND EVEN OUR
5 COUNTRY. AND IN CLOSING, PLEASE REMEMBER TO DISPLAY THE OLD
6 GLORY FROM SUNDAY TO SATURDAY DURING THE WEEK OF JUNE THE 14TH
7 EVERY YEAR. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR LISTENING. [APPLAUSE.]

8

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** AS WE ARE RECOGNIZING THE OUTSTANDING
10 EDUCATORS AND STUDENTS FROM JOHN MARSHALL HIGH SCHOOL THIS
11 MORNING WE HAVE AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS AN OUTSTANDING EDUCATOR,
12 THAT'S KATHLEEN FREDETTE FROM DESERT WILLOW INTERMEDIATE
13 SCHOOL IN PALMDALE. SHE WAS ONE OF SIX TEACHERS CHOSEN
14 NATIONWIDE BY NASA TO RIDE ON A FLYING OBSERVATORY THAT
15 STUDIES THE BLACK HOLES AND THE FORMATION OF STARS. SHE RODE A
16 MODIFIED BOEING 747 AIRCRAFT FITTED WITH A 100-INCH TELESCOPE
17 WHICH IS USED FOR A WIDE RANGE OF PROGRAMS ENCOMPASSING THE
18 PLANETARY SCIENCE, STAR FORMATION AND OTHER ASTRONOMICAL
19 RESEARCH DISCIPLINES. SO KATHLEEN IS GOING TO TELL US A FEW
20 THINGS ABOUT WHAT IT'S LIKE OUT IN OUTER SPACE. WE FIRST WANT
21 TO CONGRATULATE YOU FOR BEING SELECTED, ONE OF SIX IN THE
22 UNITED STATES, AND CONGRATULATE YOU. THAT'S VERY COOL.

23

24 **KATHELLEN FREDETTE:** WELL THE AIRCRAFT THAT I WAS ON IS CALLED
25 THE SOPHIA. IF YOU DON'T KNOW OR HAVE NEVER HEARD ABOUT THE



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1 SOHIPA THAT'S UNDERSTANDABLE. WHEN I FIRST APPLIED FOR THIS
2 PROGRAM I HADN'T HEARD OF IT, EITHER. IT FLIES OUT OF PALMDALE
3 WHICH IS IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY WHERE WE LIVE, AND THE SOPHIA
4 IS ACTUALLY A 747 THAT HAS BEEN GUTTED. AND THE MOST
5 ASTOUNDING THING ABOUT IT IS THAT WHEN YOU'RE UP, AS THEY GO
6 UP ABOVE THE 99 PERCENT OF THE MOISTURE, SO UP ABOVE THE
7 TROPOSPHERE INTO THE STRATOSPHERE, A BIG GARAGE DOOR TYPE
8 THING OPENS, WHICH IS KIND OF ALARMING WHEN YOU'RE IN A PLANE
9 TO THINK ABOUT THAT. AND THERE IS A VERY LARGE 10-FOOT
10 TELESCOPE THAT IS POINTED UP INTO SPACE AND USES INFRARED,
11 WHICH IS A KIND OF LIGHT THAT YOU KNOW WE CAN'T SEE BUT THAT
12 WE CAN FEEL. SO WE FEEL THAT WHEN WE FEEL HEAT. WELL INFRARED
13 HAS THE ABILITY TO PENETRATE AND CAN GO THROUGH THE STAR DUST.
14 AND SO THE KIND OF SCIENCE THAT IS COMING BACK FROM THE SOPHIA
15 IS BRAND NEW. SO WE'RE GETTING TO UNDERSTAND THINGS ABOUT
16 OUTER SPACE AND ABOUT OUR UNIVERSE THAT WE'VE NEVER SEEN
17 BEFORE. THIS HAS BEEN ASTOUNDING FOR ME AS A TEACHER TO BRING
18 THAT BACK INTO THE CLASSROOM, BUT I THINK ASTOUNDING FOR US AS
19 PEOPLE WHO LIVE IN LOS ANGELES AND THEN FOR ME AS A RESIDENT
20 OF PALMDALE, WE CAN ACTUALLY SEE THE SO IF HE AN TAKE OFF --
21 SOPHIA TAKE OFF FROM OUR SECOND STORY BEDROOM WINDOW. WE'RE
22 THAT CLOSE. WE'RE ABOUT 10 MILES AWAY. I THINK WHAT THIS IS
23 ALSO EXCITING, IF I CAN SHARE THIS, IS THAT THIS PARTICULAR
24 OBSERVATORY GOES UP OVER NIGHT AND THEN COMES BACK DOWN. SO IT
25 WAS A 10-HOUR FLIGHT. I'M SORRY TO SAY IT WASN'T SPACE. IT'S



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1 ACTUALLY A PRESSURIZED CABIN. IT WOULD HAVE BEEN WAY COOLER IF
2 IT WAS SPACE. IT'S JUST A PRESSURIZED CABIN. BUT THE
3 SCIENTISTS ARE RIGHT THERE AND I GOT TO BE INVOLVED WITH THE
4 SCIENTISTS AND TALK WITH FOLKS WHO WERE RIGHT ON THE FLIGHT.
5 AMAZINGLY, THIS PARTICULAR AIRCRAFT HAS A LIFE SPAN OF ABOUT
6 20 YEARS. SO STUDENTS THAT YOU SEE HERE, STUDENTS THAT I
7 TEACH, STUDENTS RIGHT NOW COULD BE ACTUALLY WORKING ON THIS
8 OBSERVATORY AND BEING PART OF THIS AS IT CONTINUES. IT'S ABLE
9 TO COME BACK, CHANGE TECHNOLOGY, UPDATE, WORK WITH THE
10 TECHNOLOGY THAT'S HAPPENING THROUGHOUT RIGHT NOW AND IMPLEMENT
11 THAT. I THINK WHAT'S IMPORTANT FOR US, OR FOR ME AS AN
12 EDUCATOR, IS TO THINK ABOUT HOW THIS SCIENCE CAN IMPACT OUR
13 STUDENTS IN THE CLASSROOM. WE TALK ABOUT BUDGET CUTS A LOT
14 RIGHT NOW. WE TALK ABOUT NOT HAVING MONEY TO BE ABLE TO BRIDNG
15 THESE SORTS OF THINGS TO KIDS. BUT WHAT I FOUND IS THAT NASA
16 HAS SAID TO ME: THE DOOR IS OPEN. WE WANT TO COME TO YOU. AND
17 SO I WANT TO ENCOURAGE ANY OF YOU, YOU KNOW, WE'RE PARENTS.
18 AND WE WANT TO SPARK SOMETHING IN OUR KIDS THAT'S GOING TO
19 ALLOW THEM TO MEET THEIR POTENTIAL. SO I WOULD LIKE TO
20 ENCOURAGE YOU, IF YOU DON'T KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT SOPHIA, YOU
21 CAN GO ON WEBSITES. I HAVE A WEBSITE MYSELF. AND THE DOOR IS
22 REALLY OPEN FOR THESE ENGINEERS. PEOPLE THAT ARE FLIGHT
23 MECHANICS WHO DON'T HAVE TO BE AN ASTRO PHYSICIST TO BE
24 INVOLVED WITH NASA. THEY HAVE AN OPEN DOOR FOR US AS TEACHERS,
25 EDUCATORS, PEOPLE WHO WERE INVOLVED IN COMMUNITY TO COME AND



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1 SPEAK AND TALK WITH US AND TALK WITH OUR CHILDREN. AND SO AS
2 AN AMBASSADOR, I'D LIKE TO REALLY ENCOURAGE YOU TO USE THAT
3 PARTICULAR VEHICLE. WE'LL HAVE, I'M GOING TO STOP NOW, BUT
4 WE'LL HAVE WORLD CLASS SCIENTISTS COMING TO US HERE IN
5 PALMDALE IN L.A. IT'S AMAZING THE KIND OF SCIENCE THAT'S GOING
6 TO CHANGE OUR UNDERSTANDING ABOUT THE UNIVERSE THAT'S
7 HAPPENING HERE. WE'RE VERY FORTUNATE. AND THANK YOU FOR YOUR
8 TIME. [APPLAUSE.]

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THERE'S A STUDENT FROM MARSHALL WHO
11 WANTS TO BE AN ENGINEER. PERHAPS YOU COULD INTRODUCE YOURSELF
12 TO HIM WHEN YOU GO DOWN FROM MARSHALL HIGH SCHOOL. THANK YOU.
13 [APPLAUSE.] THE STUDENT THAT WANTED TO BE THE ENGINEER,
14 INTRODUCE YOURSELF TO KATHLEEN WHEN SHE COMES DOWN. MAYBE
15 SHE'LL TAKE YOU UP IN SPACE. OKAY. WE ALSO HAVE. THIS IS THE
16 MONTH OF ELDER ABUSE DAY. THIS WAS- WE'RE GOING TO HAVE
17 CYNTHIA BANKS, WHO IS OUR DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY SENIOR
18 SERVICES. AND WE WILL PROCLAIM JUNE 14TH AS WORLD'S ELDER
19 ABUSE AWARENESS DAY THROUGHOUT OUR COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES.
20 CURRENTLY WE HAVE 186 SENIOR COMMUNITY CENTERS THROUGHOUT OUR
21 COUNTY. AND THEY'RE INVOLVED IN THE EDUCATION AND OTHER TYPES
22 OF PROGRAMS FOR OUR SENIORS. NOW ELDER ABUSE IS VERY COMPLEX
23 AND IT HELPS CURB THE INCIDENCE OF ELDER ABUSE IN OUR
24 COMMUNITIES. WE HAVE A TEAM OF DEDICATED PROFESSIONALS THAT
25 WILL INCLUDE PROTECTIVE SERVICES, THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY,



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1 MENTAL HEALTH AND THE SHERIFF TO HELP PREVENT IT. RAISING
2 AWARENESS OF MISTREATMENT OF OLDER PERSONS IS AN ONGOING
3 EFFORT AND NOT JUST LIMITED TO THIS ONE DAY. I'M VERY PROUD OF
4 THE LEGISLATION WE HAD ENACTED THIS YEAR THAT TOOK EFFECT ON
5 JANUARY 1ST OF 2011, AND THAT'S WHERE OUR CONVALESCENT HOMES,
6 OUR NURSING HOMES, NOW HAVE A RATING SCORE FOR THE PUBLIC TO
7 SEE BEFORE YOU ENTER A PERSON IN A CONVALESCENT HOME OR A
8 NURSING HOME. IT'S A FIVE-STAR RATING. YOU CAN SEE THE TYPE OF
9 QUALITY OF SERVICE THAT THEY WILL PROVIDE THEIR CLIENTS AT
10 THAT FACILITY. SO ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY, AS WE HAVE
11 CELEBRATION OF OUR AWARENESS DAY FOR ELDER ABUSE,
12 CONGRATULATIONS.

13

14 **CYNTHIA BANKS:** THANK YOU, MAYOR AND SUPERVISORS. WE REALLY
15 APPRECIATE THE OPPORTUNITY TO BE HERE TODAY. WITH ME ARE DAVID
16 COACHEN AND RALPH PASQUELL REPRESENTING THE OVER 150 SOCIAL
17 WORKERS THAT DEAL WITH ELDER AN BUS ON A DAILY BASIS. ELDER
18 ABUSE IS FOUND IN ALL SOCIOECONOMIC LEVELS AND HAS NO
19 BOUNDARIES. WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY WAS INITIATED IN
20 JUNE 2006 TO BROADCAST THIS EPIDEMIC CHALLENGE TO EVERY
21 COMMUNITY. UNFORTUNATELY, STATISTICS SHOW THAT ELDER ABUSE IS
22 RISING IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY. A.P.S. HAS RECEIVED 2,621
23 REPORTS JUST LAST MONTH ALONE. IT HAS BEEN ESTIMATED THAT
24 ELDERS THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES LOSE MORE THAN 2 BILLION
25 ANNUALLY THROUGH ELDER ABUSE. IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY, COMMUNITY



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1 AND SENIOR SERVICES OVERSEES THE ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES
2 PROGRAM, WHICH IS MANDATED IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA TO
3 PROVIDE SOCIAL WORK RESPONSE TO HELP VICTIMS OF ELDER ABUSE.
4 AND THEY DO SO 24/7. A.P.S. IS A PASSIONATE ADVOCATE FOR BOTH
5 ELDERS AND DEPENDENT ADULTS. APS SOCIAL WORKERS ARE OFTEN THE
6 FIRST RESPONDERS, STEPPING INTO THE HOMES OF ELDERS, VISITING
7 THEM WITH PERSONAL ATTENTION TO MAKE SURE THAT THE ABUSE DOES
8 NOT CONTINUE. THE GOAL OF A.P.S. IS ETERNAL: TO STOP ELDER
9 ABUSE. TO SAVE LIVES. THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.]

10

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** NOW WE HAVE LITTLE TEDDY THE TERRIER
12 MIX. HE'S BEEN NEWTERED. POOR TEDDY. THAT'S WHY HE'S GOT THIS
13 EXPRESSION ON HIS FACE. OH MY GOODNESS. ANYWAY, TEDDY IS
14 LOOKING FOR A HOME. HE COMES WITH GOGGLES, IT LOOKS LIKE. YOU
15 COULD CALL 4- THEY DIDN'T PUT THE TELEPHONE NUMBER DOWN HERE.
16 WHAT'S THE NUMBER?

18 **SPEAKER:** WE KNOW IT'S 562.

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** ANYWAY, LITTLE TEDDY IS LOOKING FOR A
21 HOME. YOU CAN CALL FOR LITTLE TEDDY. TEDDY SAYS "WHAT'S GOING
22 ON HERE? WHY DIDN'T YOU TYPE THAT?" WANT TO BE A MASCOT TO A
23 HIGH SCHOOL? IS ANYBODY OUT THERE? YOU CAN CALL 213-974-5555
24 AND ASK FOR TONY BELL. 213-974-5555 AND ASK FOR TONY BELL.
25 HE'S PART OF THE CANINE UNIT IN THE FIFTH DISTRICT.

20 FEW. SHE WAS A VERY SPECIAL LADY, VERY ELOQUENT, KNOWN FOR HER
21 SOPHISTICATED DEMEANOR. SHE HAD A GREAT HUMOR. AND I WOULD ASK
22 THAT ALL MEMBERS JOIN ME IN THIS RESOLUTION IN HER HONOR. SHE
23 IS SURVIVED BY HER SON JOSEPH, HER TWO DAUGHTERS, STEPHANIE,
24 WHO HAS JOINED US HERE TODAY. AND DEBRA. SHE WILL BE GREATLY
25 MISSED BY ALL. SHE TOUCHED MANY, MANY LIVES. A VERY SPECIAL

10 TO HER YANG. AND HE WILL BE DEEPLY MISSED BY THE MANY FRIENDS
11 AND NEIGHBORS WHOSE LIVES HE TOUCHED. BILL IS SURVIVED BY HIS

24 OUT," "PRETTY WOMAN," "TO DIE FOR," AND MOST RECENTLY THE

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1 **LOUISE MCCARTHY:** GOOD MORNING. LOUISE MCCARTHY WITH THE
2 COMMUNITY CLINIC ASSOCIATION OF L.A. COUNTY. WE REPRESENT 45
3 NONPROFIT FREE COMMUNITY CLINICS AND COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS
4 ACROSS L.A. COUNTY THAT SERVE OVER 800,000 INDIVIDUALS
5 REGARDLESS OF ABILITY TO PAY. 62 PERCENT OF THE PATIENTS SEEN
6 IN OUR MEMBER CLINICS ARE UNINSURED. 38 OF OUR MEMBERS ARE
7 PARTICIPATING IN THE HEALTHY WAY L.A. PROGRAM. AND WE ARE VERY
8 EXCITED ABOUT THIS MAJOR EXPANSION THAT THE HEALTHY WAY L.A.
9 CONTRACTS WILL CONSTITUTE FOR L.A. FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF
10 HEALTH SERVICES AND FOR THE COMMUNITY CLINICS, THE COMMUNITY
11 PARTNERS IN THIS ORGANIZATION. THIS IS A MAJOR RESHAPING OF
12 THE SYSTEM. AND IT'S REALLY LOOKING AT TRANSFORMING L.A.'S

3 THE REAL IMPORTANT PART OF THIS IS ACTUALLY IN THIS ITEM ON
4 YOUR AGENDA REFERS TO THE NEW MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

10 STANDARDS BUT THE COMMUNITY MEMBERS CAME FORWARD AND TALKED

5 **FERNANO SOLIS:** GOOD MORNING, L.A. COUNTY SUPERVISORS. MY NAME
6 IS FERNANDO SOLIS. I AM A RESIDENT OF THE CITY OF BELL. AND
7 I'M A MEMBER OF C-4, CONCERNED CITIZENS FOR COMMUNITY CLINICS.
8 I LIVE IN SUPERVISOR MOLINA'S DISTRICT. WE URGE YOU TO
9 CAREFULLY REVIEW THE ADDED RESULTS AND MAKE INFORMED DECISIONS
10 REGARDING SOME OF THE PROBLEMS IN COMMUNITY CLINICS THAT WE
11 KNOW THE AUDIT WILL ADDRESS. PATIENTS, TAX PAYERS, CLINIC

22 SOME OF YOU, AND C4 HAS PROPOSAL WORKS FOR HEALTH PUBLIC

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1 PRACTICE. GET THE FACTS BEFORE YOUR BOARD. I URGE YOU NOT TO
2 RENEW THE P.P.P. CONTRACTS TODAY. SUPERVISORS, WHEN CAN WE
3 EXPECT TO GET THE RESULTS OF THE AUDIT BACK? THANK YOU FOR
4 YOUR TIME.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU, SIR.

7

8 **SUP. MOLINA:** WOULD YOU, MAYOR? SUPERVISOR MOLINA?

9

10 **SUP. MOLINA:** LET ME ASK YOU A QUESTION. WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO
11 COME HERE TODAY?

12

13 **FERNANDO SOLIS:** BECAUSE THE LAST WE CAN I COULDN'T GET. I
14 WANTED TO COME LAST WEEK BUT YOU GUYS DIDN'T GIVE ME TIME TO.

16 **SUP. MOLINA:** WHY IS IT THAT YOU'VE COME HERE TODAY?

17

18 **FERNANDO SOLIS:** BECAUSE TODAY IS WHEN YOU GUYS GOING TO VOTE

21 **SUP. MOLINA:** RIGHT. AND YOUR ISSUE IS WHAT?

25 AREAS IS JUST NOT THE ROUTE TO GO. AND IF THAT IS THE PATTERN



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1 THAT IS GOING TO BE PURSUED HERE, I THINK WE NEED TO LOOK IN
2 THE MIRROR AND LOOK ACROSS-THE-BOARD. SO WE ARE IN FAVOR OF
3 TRYING TO ACCESS MORE DOLLARS TO MAKE SURE THAT OUR COMMUNITY

14 RESULTS BEFORE THE VOTE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

16 **MARIA AMARO:** GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS MARIA AMARO. I LIVE IN
17 THE FIRST DISTRICT OF SUPERVISOR MOLINA. I LIVE IN THE CITY OF
18 BELL. I'M A MEMBER OF C4. AND I'M WORRIED ABOUT SOME OF THE
19 THINGS THAT ARE HAPPENING IN THE CLINICS IN THE COMMUNITIES OF
20 ALTAMED, ROMERO CLINIC IN CENTRAL CITY. PLEASE EXAMINE THE

3 **EMMA SOLIS:** GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS EMMA SOLIS. AND I LIVE

5 LIVE IN THE CITY OF BELL. I AM VERY WORRIED NOBODY SENT US

10 ASKING FOR A FULL INVESTIGATION AND TO BE VERY CAREFUL IN THE
11 DECISION. AS YOU RENEW CONTRACTS FOR THE CLINICS FOR THE
12 ASSOCIATION PRIVATE AND PUBLIC UNTIL YOU HAVE ALL THE RESULTS.
13 AND ALL THE DETAILS. THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME.

15 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. ALSO ANTONIA RAMIREZ? YES,
16 SIR.

18 **RAUL SOTO:** GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS RAUL SOTO. I'M A
19 PATIENT, I'M A DIABETIC IN THE CLINIC. NOBODY HAS SENT ME
20 HERE. AND SUPERVISOR GLORIA MOLINA CAN CHECK MY ARCHIVAL
21 RECORD. I AM WORRIED ABOUT THE CLINIC ROMERO. THE

17 **MANNY BELTRAN, INTERPRETER:** WE HAD WORKED WITH THE CLINIC UP
18 TO THIS POINT AND THE DIRECTOR HAS BEEN MEETING WITH US. WHAT
19 WE KNOW, THAT THE CLINICS ARE ONE OF THE BEST CLINICS FOR THIS
20 COMMUNITY. AND THEY KNOW THEY HAVE TO GIVE THESE SERVICES,
21 PROVIDE THESE SERVICES. THERE'S NOT ENOUGH MONEY TO PAY TO THE
22 DIRECTOR. AND THEY'VE BEEN ATTACKED ABOUT THEIR SALARIES THE

14 WITH A TABLE WHERE ALL THE ONES THAT ARE CONTRIBUTORS. AND I
15 ASKED HIM _____ AND ONE OF THEM SAID NO, HE WOULD NOT
16 DONATE IF THEY DON'T THIS MANAGED PROPERLY. WE'RE NOT GOING TO
17 BE MAKING ANY KIND OF DONATIONS TO PUBLIC HEALTH PROGRAMS.
18 SAID THERE WAS A CONFLICT OF THE WAY THEY HANDLE HIS PROGRAM.
19 SAID VERY LOW LEVEL POVERTY. AND NOBODY KNOWS WHAT'S
20 HAPPENING.

22 **SUP. MOLINA:** (IN SPANISH)

24 **MANNY BELTRAN, INTERPRETER:** DO YOU THINK THAT'S THE BEST THING
25 IS TO JUST CLOSE THE CLINICS?

2 **RAUL SOTO:** THAT'S WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO AVOID.

3

4 **SUP. MOLINA:** (SPANISH)

5

6 **MANNY BELTRAN, INTERPRETER:** HOW ARE WE GOING TO DO THAT?

7

8 **RAUL SOTO:** IF YOU LOOK AT IT APPROPRIATE TO DO THIS KIND OF
9 WORK.

10

11 **SUP. MOLINA:** (SPANISH)

12

13 **MANNY BELTRAN, INTERPRETER:** I DON'T HAVE THE FUNDS TO DO THAT.
14 YOU HAVE TO UNDERSTAND THE CLINICS ARE TRYING THEIR VERY BEST
15 TO DO WHAT THEY HAVE TO DO. WE ARE HELPING IN EVERY WAY WE
16 CAN, IN DIFFERENT MANNERS. WITH ALL THE CHANGES IN PLACE IN
17 THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES AND THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WOULD
18 PROVIDE FUNDS. YOU CAN GO TO SAN DIEGO, YOU CAN GO TO ORANGE

21 **SPEAKER:** ANY WAY YOU LOOK FOR SUPPORT-

22

23 **SUP. MOLINA:** (SPANISH) AS LONG AS YOU WORK [INAUDIBLE] I WOULD
24 ACCEPT IT.

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1 **RAUL SOTO:** (SPANISH) WE ARE FIGHTING SO THAT YOU GUYS KNOW THE
2 PROBLEM. AND OTHER PEOPLE, THEY JUST WANT TO MANAGE FROM THEIR
3 SEATS. [APPLAUSE.] THANK YOU.

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** LET ME ALSO, BECAUSE IT'S ON 24, AS

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THE ITEM IS ON THE HEALTH, PUBLIC
19 HEALTH. PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS ON HEALTH.

20

21 **ANTONIA RAMIREZ:** WELL, I AM OPPOSED TO ANY FUNDING OR ANY
22 PRIVATE HELP HEALTH SERVICES BEING PROVIDED TO ILLEGAL
23 CRIMINAL ALIENS AND GANG BANGERS AND UNDESIRABLES. I DEMAND
24 THAT THIS COUNTRY START PUTTING ITS PRIORITIES AND FIRST AND
25 FOREMOST HELP AND PROVIDE HEALTH SERVICES FIRST AND FOREMOST

21 SUPERVISORS. MY NAME IS MARCEDONIO OLIVA. I HAVE COME HERE TO
22 ASK YOU PLEASE DO NOT CLOSE THOSE CLINICS. THAT'S WHERE WE GO
23 WITH VERY LOW INCOME. I ASK ALL THE SUPERVISORS NOT TO CLOSE.
24 THERE'S BEEN RUMORS THAT THEY'RE GOING TO CLOSE THEM DOWN. THE
25 SERVICES ARE NOT EVEN THE SAME ANYMORE. THE PEOPLE, WHEN THEY



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1 GET THERE, THEY SEND THEM BACK. AND THAT'S WHY WE'RE HERE
2 ASKING YOU AS A FAVOR. IF YOU ARE GOING TO VOTE, PLEASE MAKE
3 SURE YOU DO THE RIGHT VOTES FOR THE NEW RENEWAL OF THE
4 CONTRACT. ALL THE CLINICS ARE SUFFERING FROM FINANCIAL

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.]

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** YES, SIR?

12

13 **DANIEL GUZMAN:** (SPANISH) GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS DANIEL
14 GUZMAN. I'M HERE. I'M A MEMBER OF THE COMMUNITY AND CLINIC
15 ROMERO. THE SITUATION AT THE ROMERO CLINIC, THERE IS NO
16 RETURN, VOLUNTARILY, ALL THE PATIENTS HAVE GOTTEN TOGETHER AND
17 FORMED AN ASSOCIATION TO DEAL WITH THIS ISSUE. WE HAVE
18 DISCOVERED THAT BAD MANAGEMENT INVOLVED IN THIS CLINIC. THEY

24 OPERATING. BUT WE'RE HERE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR ALLOWING US
25 TO BE HERE. AND SUPERVISOR GLORIA MOLINA JUST TO LET YOU KNOW



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1 NOBODY _____ HERE. WE JUST NEED YOUR HELP. WE HOPE TO
2 RESOLVE THIS PROBLEM WITH MY COLLEAGUES WITH THE SITUATION OF
3 CLINICA ROMERO. WE HAVE PROVEN THE LEADERS AT OUR CLINICS ARE
4 THE OBSTACLE. AND HERE WE ARE ASKING FOR YOUR HELP BEFORE YOU
5 CLOSE THE CLINIC ROMERO, PLEASE ANALYZE ALL OUR POINTS AND
6 CONCERNS AND THE INFORMATION THAT WE ARE OFFERING YOU. IF YOU

12 **MANNY BELTRAN, INTERPRETER:** (IN SPANISH) THERE IS SOME
13 TRANSLATION EQUIPMENT PROVIDED TO THE PUBLIC HERE. IF YOU WANT
14 TO USE IT, YOU'RE MORE THAN WELCOME.

16 **SPEAKER:** (SPANISH)

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** OKAY?

19

20 **ROSA MARIA AGUILERA:** (SPANISH) MY NAME IS ROSA MARIA AGUILERA.
21 I LIVE AT 4739 _____ CALIFORNIA. I AM A PATIENT OF
22 ALTAMED IN EAST L.A. AND I'M ALSO A PATIENT OF HEALTHY WAY
23 L.A. AND THIS IS MY THIRD YEAR ON THE PROGRAM. I TAKE CARE OF
24 MY TWO GRANDKIDS WHILE MY DAUGHTER WORKS. SHE WORKS IN A
25 CLINIC AND MY SON-IN-LAW GOES TO COLLEGE. THIS PROGRAM HAS



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1 HELPED ME A LOT. ESPECIALLY MY VISITS WITH MY DOCTORS IN
2 REGARDS TO MY MEDICATION. I HAVE SEVERAL. I HAVE HIGH BLOOD
3 PRESSURE, PHLEBITIS, ARTHRITIS, AND DIABETES. I AM VERY
4 THANKFUL FOR THIS PROGRAM AND I'M SPEAKING ON BEHALF OF
5 MILLIONS OF PATIENTS AND THEY'RE NOT HERE TODAY, BUT I'M
6 SPEAKING ON THEIR BEHALF. IF THEY WOULDN'T HAVE THIS KIND OF
7 CARE, I DON'T KNOW WHAT WOULD HAPPEN. AND IT WOULD BE VERY

14 **JUAN TORRES:** (SPANISH) MY NAME IS JUAN TORRES. I WAS RAISED IN
15 EAST L.A. IN YEAR 2006, I WAS TOLD THAT I WOULD HAVE TO BE ON
16 MEDICATION FOR THE REST OF MY LIFE. BY THEN I WAS WORKING AND
17 I REALLY DIDN'T NEED ANY INSURANCE AT THAT TIME. I WAS ABLE TO
18 GET IT THROUGH MY EMPLOYER'S INSURANCE. AND I KNOW DUE TO THE
19 CRISIS NOW, COMPANY MOVED OUT OF TOWN. AND I LOST MY
20 INSURANCE. AND MEDICAL IS THE ONLY ONE COVERING ME. NOT ONLY
21 ME BUT MY WIFE ALSO LOST HER INSURANCE, TOO. I FIND MYSELF IN
22 A FINANCIAL HARDSHIP. IT WAS HARD FOR ME TO SURVIVE. SOMEBODY
23 INFORMED ME ABOUT THESE PROGRAMS, ALTAMED. THEY'RE GOOD
24 PROGRAMS. THEY HAVE GIVEN ME THE HELP. FOR ME NOT TO QUALIFY
25 FOR MEDICARE AND MEDICAL. I'M 64 NOW. AND THIS IS THE ONLY



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1 PROGRAM THAT WILL HELP ME WITH ALL MY MEDICATIONS AND THE
2 MEDICAL ATTENTION. PLEASE I'M ASKING YOU, SUPERVISORS, TO
3 PLEASE VOTE FOR THE CONTINUATION OF THESE PROGRAMS, THAT THEY
4 HAVE HELPED A LOT OF PEOPLE LIKE ME THAT WE DON'T QUALIFY FOR
5 NOTHING ELSE OR INSURANCE OF ANY KIND. THEY HAVE GIVEN ME VERY
6 WELL, GOOD CARE. AND I SPEAK ON BEHALF OF OTHER PEOPLE LIKE

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU, SIR. ITEM 4 AND 24,
11 SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS, YOU HELD THIS.

12

13 **SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS:** THANK YOU, MR. MAYOR AND COLLEAGUES. I
14 HAVE PRESENTED A MOTION ENTITLED "PROTECTING THE COUNTY'S
15 SAFETY NET, A SYSTEM OF CLINICS." AND IT ESSENTIALLY SEEKS TO
16 ACKNOWLEDGE THE SENTIMENT THAT HAS BEEN EXPRESSED BY ALL
17 MEMBERS OF THE BOARD THAT THERE IS A NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT
18 EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES IS IN PLACE AND WOULD
19 DIRECT THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND THE DIRECTOR OF THE
20 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES TO REPORT BACK IN 90 DAYS AND
21 MONTHLY THERE AFTER WITH DATA REGARDING ENROLLMENT TRENDS AND
22 HEALTHY WAY L.A. MATCHED AND UNMATCHED PROGRAMS. THIS WAY, MR.
23 MAYOR AND COLLEAGUES, WE WILL BE ABLE TO DO WHAT WE THINK IS
24 APPROPRIATE IN UNDERGIRDING THE PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP
25 CLINIC PROGRAM AND, SECONDLY, PREPARE OURSELVES MORE



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1 ASSERTIVELY FOR HEALTH REFORM. EACH OF US HAS EXPRESSED OUR
2 INTENSE INTEREST IN MAKING SURE THAT THE SAFETY NET THROUGHOUT
3 THE COUNTY IS UNDERGIRDDED, AND THAT MEANS THROUGH ALL FIVE
4 DISTRICTS. IT SEEMS TO ME THAT IT'S TIME NOW FOR US TO BE
5 EQUIPPED WITH THE APPROPRIATE DATA TO MAKE MORE INFORMED AND
6 MORE FAIR DECISIONS. AND WE SHOULD DO SO WITHOUT ADVERSELY
7 AFFECTING THE PROVISION OF PATIENT CARE IN ANY OF THE EXISTING
8 CLINICS. AND HOPEFULLY, THEN, WHEN WE EVALUATE THE OPTIONS
9 THAT WILL NECESSARILY COME TO US FOR DISPOSITION OF THE
10 MATTER, WE CAN DO SO IN LIGHT OF DATA. WE SHOULD BE DATA-
11 DRIVEN WITH RESPECT TO OUR DECISION MAKING AND, FINALLY, DO SO
12 IN FAIRNESS TO ALL CURRENT PROVIDERS WHO I WANT TO STIPULATE
13 WORK VERY HARD AND HAVE A BIG, BIG TASK BEFORE THEM, FROM ONE
14 END OF THIS COUNTY TO THE NEXT. AND THIS BOARD HAS ROUTINELY
15 MADE IT CLEAR THAT ITS MISSION ENSCONCED IN THE CHARTER OF
16 THIS COUNTY IS TO PROVIDE CARE, QUALITY CARE TO THE MEDICALLY
17 INDIGENT. THE PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP SCENARIO THAT HAS
18 UNFOLDED ESSENTIALLY IS A WAY FOR US TO DO SO IN A MORE COST-
19 EFFECTIVE WAY THAN WHAT WOULD HAVE OTHERWISE BEEN THE CASE. WE
20 NEED TO SIMPLY MAKE SURE THAT WE CAN CONTINUE TO DO THAT IN A
21 DEFENSIBLE WAY AND IN A WAY THAT ENSURES QUALITY TO THE
22 PATIENTS THAT ARE BEING SERVICED. AND SO ITEM NUMBER 4, THIS
23 LANGUAGE THAT IS BEING SUBMITTED BY WAY OF SUBSTITUTE MOTION,
24 I TRUST WILL ENJOY THE SUPPORT OF ALL MEMBERS. THANK YOU, MR.
25 MAYOR.

2 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** MOTION AND SECOND SUPERVISOR KNABE?

3

4 **SUP. KNABE:** I'M SUPPORTING THE MOTION AS IT'S AMENDED, BUT I
5 WOULD JUST HOPE BECAUSE I HAVE A VERY STRONG CONCERN, IF YOU
6 REALLY LOOK AT THE NUMBERS AND MATCHING UP AT SPA 7 IS
7 PROBABLY THE MOST UNDEREQUITY SPA IN THE COUNTY. AND I WOULD
8 HOPE THAT WHEN THE REPORT COMES BACK, THERE'S A HIGHWAY TO
9 SHOWING HOW WE GET SPA 7 BACK ON TRACK TO BE A PART OF A
10 SUCCESSFUL PROGRAM, AS WELL, TOO. BECAUSE THIS TRULY IS AN
11 IMPORTANT PIECE OF WHAT WE DO AS IT RELATES TO THESE THINGS,
12 BUT IT NEEDS TO BE FAIR ALL THE WAY ACROSS-THE-BOARD. SO I'M
13 JUST ARTICULATING A CONCERN ABOUT SPA 7, WHICH REALLY IMPACTS
14 SUPERVISOR MOLINA AND MYSELF, THAT WE LOOK AT ROAD 4 WHEN THAT
15 COMES BACK. WITH THAT, I DO SUPPORT THE MOTION.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SUPERVISOR MOLINA, THEN SUPERVISOR
18 YAROSLAVSKY?

19

20 **SUP. MOLINA:** LET ME THANK SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS AND HIS
21 STAFF. I THINK THEY'VE RAISED A VERY SIGNIFICANT ISSUE. AS WE
22 GO THROUGH THE NEW HEALTH REFORM, THERE ARE GOING TO BE
23 OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES THAT WILL CONTINUE TO BE THERE.
24 BUT I THINK THAT THE POTENTIAL OF MAYBE NEW MONEY, MAYBE NOT,
25 WE DON'T KNOW YET. WE UNDERSTAND THAT AS MORE AND MORE PEOPLE



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1 BECOME ELIGIBLE FOR SOME KIND OF MEDI-CAL INSURANCE, WE'RE NOT
2 SURE THAT THEY'RE GOING TO CONTINUE TO VISIT THE KIND OF
3 CLINICS THAT WE'RE LOOKING AT. WE HOPE THAT THEY WILL. WE HOPE
4 THAT WHAT THEY WILL PROVIDE IN SERVICES WILL BE ATTRACTIVE
5 ENOUGH. BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT THAT'S GOING TO BRING MORE
6 DOLLARS INTO THOSE CLINICS SO THAT THEY CAN CARRY OUT THEIR
7 GOOD WORK. WHAT WE DON'T KNOW AND WHAT WE WORRY ABOUT IS
8 WHETHER THE INEQUITY WILL GET LARGER OR WHETHER IT WILL GET
9 STABILIZED. WE HAVE NO IDEA. THE POINT IS THAT WHILE THERE
10 SHOULD BE NO BOUNDARY AS POLITICAL OR OTHERWISE AS TO HOW
11 PEOPLE ACCESS HEALTHCARE, THE REALITY IS THAT COMMUNITY
12 CLINICS ARE A CRITICAL COMPONENT. THEY'RE CALLED COMMUNITY FOR
13 A REASON. THEY SHOULD BE WITHIN COMMUNITIES AND BE ACCESSIBLE.
14 THE PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS HAVE GONE A LONG WAY. AND I
15 KNOW I VALUE THEM TREMENDOUSLY BECAUSE I WAS ONE OF THOSE
16 SKEPTICS THAT DID NOT BELIEVE INITIALLY THAT THAT PROGRAM
17 WOULD WORK AS EFFECTIVELY AS IT HAS CONTINUED TO WORK
18 THROUGHOUT THE YEARS. I'VE BEEN IMPRESSED WITH THE COMMUNITY
19 CLINIC ORGANIZATIONS IN HOW THEY HAVE FOSTERED NEW FACILITIES,
20 HAVE JOINED IN AND SO ON. BUT THE REALITY IS THAT WHEN WE LOOK
21 AT THE SPAS, WE STILL SEE THE INEQUITY THERE. SO THERE IS AN
22 OPPORTUNITY UNDER THE MOTIONS THAT SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS
23 HAS BROUGHT TO START LOOKING AT THE ISSUE OF REAL EQUITY AS WE
24 UTILIZE OUR NET COUNTY COST DOLLARS. AND I THINK THAT'S AN
25 OPPORTUNITY. IT'S STILL NOT AN EFFORT TO TAKE AWAY FROM ONE TO



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1 GIVE TO THE OTHER. BUT IF IN FACT WE ARE SUCCESSFUL AND THE
2 CLINICS ARE MOST SUCCESSFUL IN AN ATTRACTING THAT INSURED
3 PATIENT, THEN HOPEFULLY WE'RE GOING USE OUR NET COUNTY COST
4 MONEY TO FIND THOSE OPPORTUNITIES TO EQUALIZE THOSE
5 UNDEREQUITY SPAS. AND I THINK THAT EFFORT THAT IS BEING LED BY
6 SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS WILL GO A LONG WAY IN MANY OF US WHO
7 HAVE SPAS THAT SHOW THAT ARE UNDEREQUITY, PER SE. BUT AT THE
8 SAME TIME, YOU CAN'T DO IT WITHOUT THE FACTS, WITHOUT THE
9 INFORMATION, WITHOUT THE DATA. SO HOPEFULLY WHAT WE'RE GOING
10 TO ENTRUST, AND I WANTED DOCTOR KATZ TO JOIN US IS TO TALK
11 ABOUT THIS TRANSITION THAT WE'RE GOING THROUGH OF THE MEDI-CAL
12 MATCH AND WHAT THAT MEANS AND WHAT WE'RE GOING TO BE LOOKING
13 FOR SO THAT HOPEFULLY BY SEPTEMBER, WE'RE GOING TO HAVE A
14 BETTER IDEA OF WHERE MEDI-CAL OR INSURED PATIENTS OR NEW MATCH
15 PATIENTS GO SO THAT WE HAVE A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF
16 POTENTIALLY HOW WE CAN UTILIZE THE LIMITED RESOURCES THAT WE
17 HAVE SO THAT WE CAN, IN FACT, CREATE A MORE BALANCED AND
18 EQUITABLE FUNDING PATTERN WITH A NET COUNTY COST. WE DON'T
19 KNOW THAT INFORMATION AS YET, BUT AT THE SAME TIME, WE DO NEED
20 TO MAKE SURE THAT COMMUNITY CLINICS ARE ACCESSIBLE TO FOLKS.
21 THERE ARE SOME CLINICS THAT PROVIDE BETTER SERVICE FOR LESS
22 DOLLARS, WE KNOW THAT. THERE ARE SOME CLINICS THAT ARE BETTER
23 AT FUNDRAISING ON THEIR OWN. WE DON'T WANT TO PENALIZE THEM
24 FOR THOSE KINDS OF THINGS AND THAT KIND OF EFFORT. SO WE HAVE
25 TO FIND A WAY TO CREATE A BALANCE. BUT I THINK IF THERE'S ANY



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1 DUTY FOR US UNDER OUR PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP AND OUR
2 COMMUNITY CLINIC RESPONSIBILITY IS TO REALLY FIND A WAY THAT
3 WE CAN BRING MORE EQUALITY AND EQUITY TO ALL COMMUNITIES.
4 EVERYBODY NEEDS HEALTHCARE. NOBODY LIKES WAITING MORE THAN
5 ANYONE ELSE DOES. BUT AT THE END OF THE DAY, WE NEED TO MAKE
6 SURE THAT WE'RE NOT TAKING WAY FROM OTHERS TO DEPRIVE A
7 COMMUNITY OF THOSE SERVICES TO EQUALIZE IT IN ANOTHER AREA.
8 BUT AT THE SAME TIME, WE HAVE TO RESPECT WHEN THERE ARE NEW
9 DOLLARS THAT ARE COMING INTO THE SYSTEM, THERE IS POTENTIAL TO
10 CREATE MORE EQUITY ACROSS-THE-BOARD. SO I AM HOPEFUL THAT WE
11 WILL GET THERE AND RECOGNIZE WHAT IT IS. AND YOU SHARED WITH
12 ME THAT BUY SEPTEMBER, WE WOULD HAVE MORE DATA, THAT MAYBE WE
13 WOULD BE ABLE TO HAVE A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF HOW THOSE
14 DOLLARS ARE UTILIZED. SO I ASKED DR. KATZ IF HE WOULD SHARE
15 WITH US HOW HE LOOKS AT THIS MOTION AND HOW IT'LL WORK
16 POTENTIALLY WITH THE P.P.P.S AND HOW THE DATA WILL BE
17 GATHERED.

19 **DR. MITCHELL KATZ:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH, SUPERVISOR, MR. MAYOR,
20 SUPERVISOR FOR INTRODUCING THIS RESOLUTION. IT REALLY IS A
21 HISTORIC MOMENT THAT WE ARE FACING AT THIS POINT WITH HEALTH
22 REFORM. PRIOR TO JULY 1, EVERY SINGLE DOLLAR THAT THIS BOARD
23 SPEND ON THE COMMUNITY CLINICS WAS 100 PERCENT COUNTY DOLLARS.
24 STARTING FOR JULY 1, FOR PROBABLY ABOUT HALF OF THE PEOPLE
25 WE'RE CURRENTLY PROVIDING SERVICE FOR, WE HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY



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1 TO GET 50 PERCENT MATCH FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. SO THIS
2 IS A WONDERFUL OPPORTUNITY FOR THE COUNTY BECAUSE IT MEANS
3 THAT WE'RE DRAWING IN FEDERAL DOLLARS TO PROVIDE THE KIND OF
4 CARE WE WANT, WHICH IS I THINK, A GREAT MISSION TO DO. THE WAY
5 THAT IT CHANGES OUR PROGRAM IS THAT THERE'S NO LIMIT ON THE 50
6 PERCENT MATCH. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WILL ALLOW US AND
7 PROVIDE 50 CENTS ON EVERY DOLLAR COMPLETELY TO AS MANY PEOPLE
8 AS WE CAN CARE FOR WHO FIT THAT DEFINITION. AND SO IT'S
9 INCUMBENT UPON US FOR THE FUTURE OF OUR SYSTEM TO WANT TO
10 MAXIMIZE THAT. IN 2014, ALL OF THOSE PEOPLE BECOME 100 PERCENT
11 MEDICAID, AS THE SUPERVISOR WAS REFERRING TO. THAT'S IMPORTANT
12 BECAUSE THEN THE COUNTY COST IS ZERO. SO NOT ONLY WILL YOU GO
13 FROM A DOLLAR TO 1 DOLLAR TO 50 CENTS BUT YOU WILL GO FROM 50
14 CENTS TO ZERO. AND BETTER PAYMENT RATES. 2013-2014, HEALTH
15 REFORM PAYS AT THE LEVEL OF MEDICARE FOR MEDICAID LIVES. SO
16 PEOPLE WILL GET A BETTER RATE OF REIMBURSEMENT. AND IF THOSE
17 PEOPLE DO NOT CHOOSE US OR OUR PARTNERS, AND OUR PARTNERS ARE
18 EQUALLY IMPORTANT BECAUSE THEY'RE A GREAT NETWORK OF COMMUNITY
19 PROVIDERS, BUT NOT HOSPITALS. AND GENERALLY NOT SPECIALTY
20 CARE. WE'RE THEIR PARTNERS. IF THESE CLIENTS LEAVE OUR SYSTEM
21 STARTING IN THE NEXT YEAR OR TWO AND GO TO ANOTHER SYSTEM,
22 THERE WILL BE NO SUPPORT. THERE WILL BE NO REVENUE FOR OUR
23 HOSPITALS. AND THAT'S WHY IT'S SO IMPORTANT THAT WE BE VERY
24 AGGRESSIVE ABOUT ENROLLING PEOPLE, GIVING THEM A GREAT PATIENT
25 EXPERIENCE, ENCOURAGING THEM TO CHOOSE US SO THAT IN 2014 WE



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1 STILL HAVE REVENUE TO SUPPORT OUR SYSTEM. SUPERVISORS, I CARE
2 DEEPLY ABOUT MAKING SURE THAT EVERY LOW INCOME PERSON WHO IS
3 UNINSURED SAVE CARE IN THIS COUNTY. I THINK THAT THAT SHOULD
4 REALLY BE OUR GOAL. THAT EVERY LOW INCOME PERSON RECEIVE CARE.
5 IT DOES NOT HELP US IF PEOPLE COME ONLY IN EXTREMES. THAT'S
6 THE MOST EXPENSIVE AND LEAST EFFICIENT CARE. WE KNOW WE CAN DO
7 BETTER. AND I'M COMMITTED TO WORKING WITH ALL OF YOU ON THAT.

8

9 **SUP. MOLINA:** THANK YOU, DR. KATZ. [APPLAUSE.]

10

11 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** ITEM 4 WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.
12 EXCUSE ME. SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY. I'M SORRY.

13

14 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I JUST WANTED TO ASK IF WE COULD GET A
15 REPORT BACK EITHER IN 90 DAYS COMMENSURATE WITH THE REPORT
16 ASKED FOR HERE OR EARLIER ON HOW THE FUNDS THAT WERE
17 APPROPRIATED 2-1/2 YEARS AGO TO BEGIN ADDRESSING THE EQUITY
18 ISSUES, HOW THEY HAVE BEEN SPENT AND HOW THEY HAVE IMPACTED
19 SERVICE IN THE SPAS, ALL OF THE SPAS OF THE COUNTY, ALL NINE.
20 I THINK THAT WOULD BE USEFUL TO KNOW. BUT I APPRECIATE THE
21 WORK YOU'VE DONE WITH OUR CLINICS ON THE BROADER ISSUE HERE,
22 NOT SO MUCH ON THIS MOTION BUT ON ITEM 24. WE HAVE A LONG WAY
23 TO GO. AND THERE'S GOING TO BE A LOT OF UNCERTAINTY. AND I
24 THINK THE ONE THING THE COUNTY SHOULD TRY TO DO AS MUCH AS
25 POSSIBLE IS BE TRANSPARENT, BE OPEN, NO SURPRISES, INVOLVED



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1 AND ENGAGED IN THE STAKEHOLDERS THAT WE HAVE IN ALL PARTS OF
2 THE COUNTY SO THAT WHATEVER ADJUSTMENTS NEED TO BE MADE GOING
3 FORWARD CAN BE MADE IN A RATIONAL WAY, WHICH DOESN'T HURT OUR
4 CLIENTS, DOESN'T DESTABILIZE THE INSTITUTIONS THAT WE HAVE NOW
5 THAT ARE SERVING OUR CLIENTS. SO I THINK THERE'S A LOT OF
6 OPPORTUNITY HERE. AND I APPRECIATE MR. RIDLEY-THOMAS'S
7 SUBSTITUTE MOTION. I THINK THIS GIVES US SOME BREATHING ROOM.
8 WE'LL GET THE FACTS. WE'LL KNOW WHERE WE ARE IN SEPTEMBER AND
9 GIVE US A BETTER HANDLE ON WHERE WE NEED TO GO. THANK YOU.

15 COORDINATED MANY DATA SHARING INITIATIVES INVOLVING THE

16 DEPARTMENTS OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES AND/OR PROBATION.

17 WITH THE RECENT CHANGES TO THE INTERIM GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE,

18 THE BOARD MAY TAKE ACTION TO DELEGATE ADMINISTRATIVE OVERSIGHT

19 OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES AND/OR

20 PROBATION TO THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICE FOR THE PURPOSE OF

21 COORDINATING SPECIFIC DATA SHARING INITIATIVE SO THOSE

22 INITIATIVES CAN CONTINUE. I THEREFORE MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF

23 SUPERVISORS DELEGATE ADMINISTRATIVE OVERSIGHT AUTHORITY TO THE

24 CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICE FOR THE PURPOSE OF COORDINATING THE

10 **SUP. KNABE:** I BELIEVE I HELD, SACHI, I HELD SOMETHING, DIDN'T
11 I?

12

13 **CLERK SACHI HAMAI:** YOU HELD ITEM 1-P, SINCE IT RELATES TO ITEM
14 NUMBER I BELIEVE 36? EXCUSE ME, 50.

15

16 **SUP. KNABE:** NO IT'S ITEM 36. THIS IS FOR THE C.E.O. I HAVE A
17 QUESTION IN REGARDS TO AN ITEM ON THE AGENDA, PLEASE? ITEM
18 NUMBER 36 AND 1-P ARE RELATED. AND I UNDERSTAND THE
19 RAMIFICATIONS OF ALL BOND REPORTING IN OUR AUDITOR-CONTROLLER.
20 I THOUGHT THIS WAS A MISTAKE ON THE AGENDA. I THOUGHT MAYBE IT
21 WAS 1.78 MILLION OR SOMETHING. IT'S 1 DOLLAR 78 AND PARKS AND

6 **SUP. KNABE:** I'M SURE THE COUNTY COUNSEL CAN GIVE US A GENEROUS
7 OPINION ABOUT OUR ABILITY TO DELEGATE AUTHORITY UNDER TWO
8 BUCKS FOR A BOND ISSUE. WHO KNOWS. IT MIGHT EVEN WORK. SO WITH
9 THAT, GOT CHANGE FOR TWO BUCKS? WITH THAT, I'LL MOVE BOTH
10 ITEMS.

11

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** SECOND WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

13

14 **CLERK SACHI HAMAI:** AND YOU WERE ALSO HOLDING ITEM NUMBER 3 AND
15 50?

16

17 **SUP. KNABE:** ITEM 3, I JUST WANT TO RAISE THE ISSUE, WE HAVE A
18 CURRENT ORDINANCE IN PLACE. AND I UNDERSTAND WE HAVE SOME
19 ISSUES WITH COUNTY COUNSEL AND ALL THIS KIND OF THING. BUT TO
20 ME, YOU'RE EITHER ALL IN OR ALL OUT. YOU KNOW, EITHER YOU
21 PROHIBIT IT OR YOU DON'T. AND FOR SOMEONE TO SAY THAT WE CAN
22 DO IT BY SECTIONS, SO LET'S INCLUDE IMPERIAL HIGHWAY TODAY. SO
23 THEY CAN'T DO IMPERIAL HIGHWAY ANYMORE, SO THEY MOVED TO
24 TELEGRAPH. OH WE CAN DO TELEGRAPH NOW. SO MY ISSUE IS: I
25 SUPPORT DOING WHATEVER IS NECESSARY. WE HAVE SOMETHING IN



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1 PLACE THAT WE DON'T ENFORCE. WE'RE BEING PUSHED AROUND A
2 LITTLE BIT BY SOME OPINIONS FROM SOME OF THE LAWYERS SAYING WE
3 CAN'T DO IT THAT WAY. BUT DO YOU KNOW WHAT? ALL YOU'RE DOING
4 IS- I MEAN, LISTEN, THOSE OF US UP HERE HAVE ALL LIVED THROUGH
5 THIS WITH RECREATIONAL VEHICLES. AND ONCE YOU PROHIBIT IT IN
6 ONE AREA, THEY JUST MOVE TO ANOTHER AREA. AND THEN YOU KEEP

14 HAVE BEEN FOUND TO BE UNCONSTITUTIONAL AS A VIOLATION OF
15 COMMERCIAL FREE SPEECH.

16

17 **SUP. KNABE:** CAN I JUST SAY? WHY DON'T WE INTERJECT? WHY DON'T
18 WE LET SOMEBODY SUE US AND FIND THAT OUT FOR A FACT?

19

20 **ANDREA ORDIN:** WE CERTAINLY CAN DO THAT. WE CERTAINLY CAN DO
21 THAT. EXCEPT NOW WE KNOW IT'S NOT A BRAND NEW ISSUE. THERE ARE
22 OTHER CASES WHICH HAVE ALREADY RULED ON THIS. SO NOW WE ARE
23 ACTING IN GOOD FAITH TO COMPLY WITH THE LAW AS WE BEST
24 UNDERSTAND IT. AND IF THERE HAD BEEN NO OTHER LAW AND IT WAS
25 TRULY UNCLEAR, THEN OF COURSE YOU SAY LET'S HAVE A COURT



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1 DECIDE BECAUSE WE DON'T KNOW. IN THIS CIRCUMSTANCE, IT IS OUR
2 BEST JUDGMENT THAT A BLANKET ORDINANCE WOULD NOT BE UPHELD.
3 THEREFORE, WE WOULD LIKE TO ALLOW FOR SOME PROTECTION. AND
4 THIS IS HOW THE LAWYERS AND THE PEOPLE-

5

6 **SUP. KNABE:** SO WE CAN BUILDUP TIME AND MONEY AND EXPENSE FOR
7 THOSE OF US THAT ARE IMPACTED BY ONCE WE ELIMINATE ONE STREET,
8 LET THE NEXT STREET CLOG UP, THEN ELIMINATE THAT STREET, AND
9 THE NEXT CLOG UP. AND SO WE JUST KEEP MOVING THROUGH AND
10 COSTING US MORE MONEY. YOU CAN SAY WE CAN DO IT STREET BY
11 STREET BUT YOU CAN'T DO A BLANKET. THAT DOESN'T MAKE ANY
12 SENSE. I'M NOT AN ATTORNEY, BUT I KNOW WHAT HAPPENS. I KNOW
13 WHAT HAS HAPPENED WITH RECREATIONAL VEHICLES AND OTHERS THAT
14 WE JUST DO THE SAME THING. WE LET ONE AREA BUILDUP AND THEN WE
15 ELIMINATE THAT. THAT'S CRAZY. SO MY FEELING IS EITHER YOU'RE
16 ALL IN OR YOU'RE ALL OUT. MAYBE PUBLIC WORKS, HOW MUCH IS IT
17 GOING TO COST US?

18

19 **GAIL FARBER:** SUPERVISOR, WE TOO SUPPORT DOING WHATEVER IS
20 NECESSARY TO ADDRESS THIS ISSUE. BASED UPON THE COUNSEL'S
21 RECOMMENDATION AS FAR AS WHAT IS ENFORCEABLE, GOOD, BAD, RIGHT
22 OR WRONG. IF IT'S DECIDED TO INSTALL THE SIGNS IN ORDER TO
23 MAKE IT ENFORCEABLE, I THINK ABOUT 1,000 BLOCKS HAVE BEEN
24 IDENTIFIED. AND IF YOU PUT ONE SIGN, MAYBE TWO SIGNS PER
25 BLOCK, THAT'S SEVERAL THOUSAND SIGNS. SO OUR INITIAL ESTIMATES



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1 WOULD BE AROUND THE MAGNITUDE OF \$400,000 INITIALLY PER THE
2 SEGMENTS THAT HAVE BEEN IDENTIFIED. AND THEN WHATEVER THE
3 ONGOING MAINTENANCE COST IS TO MANAGE AND MAINTAIN THOSE
4 SIGNS.

5

6 **SUP. KNABE:** BECAUSE OF COUNTY COUNSEL'S GRAVE CONCERN FOR THE
7 FIRST AMENDMENT AND USED CARS BEING SOLD ON HIGHWAYS AND
8 STREETS, HOW DO YOU PICK THE STREETS AND HIGHWAYS? WE'D TAKE
9 THEM OUT OF A HAT?

10

11 **SPEAKER:** NO, WE ACTUALLY, PAT _____, DEPUTY DIRECTOR FOR
12 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS. WE ACTUALLY WORKED WITH EACH OF
13 THE BOARD OFFICES AND GOT AN INITIAL LIST THAT MY STAFF IN
14 TRAFFIC AND LIGHTING WENT THROUGH WORKING WITH COUNTY COUNSEL
15 TO ENSURE THAT THEY WOULD MEET THE INTENT OF THE NEW
16 ORDINANCE.

17

18 **SUP. KNABE:** I KNOW. AND FOR THOSE OF US THAT HAVE LARGE
19 INCORPORATED AREAS AND HAVE BEEN IMPACTED BY BOTH THE SIGNAGE
20 FOR SALES OF VEHICLES AS WELL AS RECREATIONAL VEHICLE ISSUES,
21 I DON'T KNOW HOW YOU PICK AND CHOOSE, YOU KNOW. UNLESS YOU
22 START ON A STREET THAT'S A SIDE STREET THAT REALLY IS NOT
23 IMPACTED, I MEAN EVERY MAJOR STREET THAT I KNOW OF IN MY
24 DISTRICT IN THE UNINCORPORATED, AND WE'VE DRIVEN IT, IS
25 IMPACTED BY THE EITHER RVS OR CARS FOR SALE. SO MAYBE AS A



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1 PART OF THIS MOTION WE COULD HAVE A REPORT BACK IN 30 DAYS
2 THAT WHAT OPTIONS MAY BE AVAILABLE FOR US FOR BOTH SIGN
3 INSTALLATION AS WELL AS MAINTENANCE? I WOULD LIKE A BETTER
4 IDEA HOW YOU'RE GOING TO PICK AND CHOOSE. BECAUSE I DON'T KNOW
5 OF A MAJOR STREET IN A FOURTH DISTRICT THAT WOULD NOT BE
6 IMPACTED BY THIS ORDINANCE. AND IT'S NOT IMPACTED ALREADY BY
7 VEHICLES ONE, TWO, THREE, TEN. THERE'S A PIECE OF IMPERIAL,
8 I'VE SEEN AS MANY AS 12 CARS OUT THERE. I'M JUST SO HAPPY THAT
9 OUR JUSTICE SYSTEM ALLOWS FIRST AMMENDMENT PROTECTION FOR
10 EYESORES.

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** DO YOU WANT AN AMENDMENT TO INCLUDE IT
13 COUNTY-WIDE?

14

15 **SUP. KNABE:** NO. WE ALREADY HAVE ONE. WE ALREADY HAVE A COUNTY-
16 WIDE BAN. WHAT COUNTY COUNSEL IS SAYING, WE CAN'T ENFORCE THAT
17 BECAUSE OF POTENTIAL FREE SPEECH ISSUES.

18

19 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** CONCEPTS.

20

21 **SUP. KNABE:** I'M TELLING YOU. IT'S ON THE BOOKS. IT'S ON THE
22 BOOKS, RIGHT?

23

24 **ANDREA ORDIN, COUNSEL:** AND IT'S A SPECIFIC CASE WITH THE CITY
25 OF LOS ANGELES THAT ATTEMPTED TO HAVE A SIMILAR ORDINANCE



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1 ENFORCED AND IT WAS DEEMED TO BE A VIOLATION AS THE SUPERVISOR
2 SAID FREE SPEECH, COMMERCIAL FREE SPEECH. WHICH WE CAN
3 REGULATE. WE CAN REGULATE. BUT WE CAN'T HAVE, ACCORDING TO
4 THAT DECISION, A BLANKET ORDINANCE.

5

6 **SUP. KNABE:** SO AS PART OF THIS MOTION, THEN, CAN WE HAVE THE
7 C.E.O. AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS COME BACK IN 30 DAYS
8 WITH VARIOUS OPTIONS THAT WE MAY HAVE BOTH ON SIGN
9 INSTALLATION AS WELL AS THE ONGOING MAINTENANCE AND THE
10 SELECTION PROCESS?

11

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** WHY CAN'T YOU HAVE THE SIGN IS
13 PERMITTED IF THE VEHICLE IS IN THE DRIVEWAY BUT NOT ON A
14 PUBLIC STREET?

15

16 **SPEAKER:** WE HAVE ONE SIGN PER BLOCK ON EACH SIDE OF THE
17 STREET. SO THERE'S TWO SIGNS PER BLOCK. AND THERE'S OVER 1,000
18 BLOCKS IDENTIFIED. THERE ARE SIGNIFICANT, SUPERVISOR KNABE,
19 THERE ARE SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF STREETS IN THIS ORDINANCE. 78
20 STREETS, OVER 1,000 BLOCKS IDENTIFIED. THESE ARE THE BLOCKS
21 THAT EACH OF THE BOARD OFFICES IDENTIFIED AS HIGH USAGE AREAS
22 THAT MY TRAFFIC AND LIGHTING STAFF VERIFIED MEET THE INTENT OF
23 THE NEW ORDINANCE.

24



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1 **SUP. KNABE:** WHATEVER, DOESN'T SATISFY ME. I'M HAPPY WITH WHAT
2 IT IS AND WE SHOULD ENFORCE IT. BUT IF WE'RE NOT, I JUST WANT
3 SOMETHING BACK IN 30 DAYS WHAT'S GOING ON. I'D LIKE TO KNOW,
4 THEN. MAYBE YOU COULD HIGHLIGHT MY FOURTH DISTRICT STREETS. I
5 MIGHT BE ABLE TO ADD A COUPLE WHAT THE INSTALLATION COSTS AND
6 THE ONGOING MAINTENANCE IS GOING TO BE. COULD WE DO THAT IN 30
7 DAYS?

8

9 **SPEAKER:** YES, SIR.

10

11 **SUP. KNABE:** PART OF THIS MOTION?

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** WE HAVE A WALKER? DECATUR WALKER?

14

15 **DECATUR WALKER:** MY NAME IS WALKER. WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THE
16 PEOPLE SELLING CARS ON THE STREETS STILL?

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** YES, THAT'S WHAT IT IS.

19

20 **DECATUR WALKER:** YEAH, I HAVE A PROBLEM IN MY AREA THAT IT'S
21 GOT VERY LARGE THAT THEY RESTRICTED A LITTLE BIT BECAUSE IT'S
22 BY A SCHOOL. BUT EVERY WEEKEND, I GET CARS FROM EVERYWHERE. IF
23 THEY RESTRICT IT IN ORANGE COUNTY, WHAT THEY DO IN ORANGE
24 COUNTY, I SEE THEM RESTRICTING IT. WHAT THEY DO IN ORANGE
25 COUNTY IS THEY LET THE SCHOOLS RENT PART OF, FOR THE SUMMER,



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1 THEY OPEN UP THE SCHOOL PARKING LOT AND THEY LET SOMEBODY

24 ABOUT. THEY MOVE FROM SECTION TO SECTION. ONCE YOU OUTLAW,
25 THEY GO TO NEXT SECTION.



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1

2 **DECATUR WALKER:** IT'S A WHOLE THING RIGHT THERE ON HUNTINGTON
3 DRIVE. RIGHT IN THE COUNTY RIGHT PAST SAN MARINO NOW. I DON'T
4 KNOW ABOUT YOU'RE SAYING WE'RE BREAKING THE LAWS, BUT IF YOU
5 GO TO CITIES, WHAT DO THEY DO ABOUT IT? THEY TICKET PEOPLE.
6 THEY DON'T ALLOW IT. CERTAIN COUNTIES DON'T ALLOW IT. CERTAIN
7 CITIES DON'T ALLOW IT. I DON'T BELIEVE WE'RE BREAKING ANY LAWS

14 **DECATUR WALKER:** THAT'S IT. AND WHAT WE'VE DONE IS PUT SIGNS UP
15 "NO PARKING" FOR THAT ONE THING. BUT THEN THE CARS ARE EITHER
16 THERE LEFT OVERNIGHT FOR THE WEEKEND BECAUSE IT GOT IN THE WAY
17 OF A SCHOOL.

18

19 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** YOU MADE YOUR POINT VERY WELL.

20

21 **DECATUR WALKER:** I JUST THINK YOU NEED TO DO MORE RECERTAIN
22 MUCH OF WHAT COUNTIES AND CITIES HAVE DONE.

23

24 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** THANK YOU. OKAY. LET ME MOVE FOR MR.
25 PREVEN? MOVE RECONSIDERATION OF ITEM NUMBER 2, SECONDED BY



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1 SUPERVISOR KNABE. SO ORDERED. AND MR. PREVEN SIGNED UP FOR 2
2 AND 3.

3

4 **ERIC PREVEN:** THIS PARTICULAR ITEM IS THE CAR ITEM. MY NAME IS
5 ERIC PREVIN AND I AM THE COUNTY RESIDENT FROM DISTRICT 3. I
6 SEE THAT THIS IS A PROBLEM. AND MR. KNABE HAS BROUGHT A TEENY

10 YOU KNOW, THE IDEA THAT SOMEBODY IS GOING TO SUE OVER THIS OR
11 OVER THE ENFORCEMENT OF IT IS AN EGREGIOUS WASTE OF COUNTY
12 RESOURCES, TO BE FIGHTING THOSE KIND OF LAWSUITS AND TO BE
13 GENERATING THOSE KINDS OF LAWSUITS. AS YOU POINT OUT, IF THEY
14 PARK ON ONE SECTION OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD AND YOU ENFORCE, THEY
15 WILL MOVE TO THE OTHER SECTION OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD. THE
16 NOTION, MS. ORDIN, OF DEFENDING THE CONSTITUTION, WHICH IS AN
17 AREA WHERE I KNOW YOU EXIST SOMETIMES, IS A GOOD ONE. WE
18 SHOULD ALLOW PEOPLE TO PUT A FOR SALE SIGN UP IF THEY HAVE TO.
19 I DON'T LIKE IT. IT IS ANNOYING SOMETIMES. BUT WE SHOULD NOT
20 SPEND \$400,000 PUTTING UP SIGNS LIKE THIS. DO YOU KNOW HOW
21 MANY CARS THERE ARE IN L.A. COUNTY?

23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH, MAYOR:** LOTS. THANK YOU. ON 2, SUPERVISOR
24 YAROSLAVSKY MOVES. SECOND BY KNABE WITH SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-
25 THOMAS THOMAS. YES, SIR.

2 **ERIC PREVEN:** VERY BRIEF. I'LL MAKE IT INSIDE THE SAME REMARKS.
3 ITEM 2 IS YOUR REQUEST FOR SOME FUNDING FOR A VARIETY OF VERY

20 WHERE HE TAUGHT TEACHING AND PUBLIC SERVICE. HIS
21 ACCOMPLISHMENTS INCLUDED DEVELOPMENT OF A DEPARTMENT AND
22 RUNNING THE INPATIENT PAIN MANAGEMENT PROGRAM THERE. BRENDA
23 KAY MYRON, THE WIFE OF RETIRED UNDERSHERIFF PAUL MYRON PASSED
24 AWAY AT THE AGE OF 67. BRENDA KAY. AND SHE LEAVES HER HUSBAND
25 PAUL. LELIA VICKI CHIMBOLE PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 84. SHE



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1 WAS LONG TIME RESIDENT OF ANTELOPE VALLEY. HER HUSBAND WAS ONE
2 OF THE FOUNDERS OF THE CITY OF PALMDALE. I SERVED WITH HER
3 HUSBAND LARRY IN THE STATE LEGISLATURE WHERE HE WAS A MEMBER
4 OF THE STATE ASSEMBLY. LEAVES HER HUSBAND LARRY, DAUGHTERS
5 WYNNE AND SUSAN AND STEPSON STEVEN, FOUR GRANDCHILDREN AND
6 THREE GRANDCHILDREN. VICKI WAS INVOLVED IN REAL ESTATE,

8 IT'S ACTUALLY TWO LEASES. THERE'S A BONELLI PARK LEASE AND
9 PUDDINGSTONE LAKE LEASE. SO I WAS JUST WONDERING, YOUR REPORTS
10 THAT YOU GOT IN THE COUNTY ONLY CHANGES FROM TWO LEASES TO ONE
