14 BACHELOR'S OF ART DEGREE IN CHRISTIAN BIBLICAL STUDIES FROM
15 MALACHI VERNES BIBLE COLLEGE. DOCTOR JACKSON RECEIVED HIS
16 PH.D. IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FROM U.C.L.A. HE'S RESPONSIBLE
17 FOR MANY MULTI-FACETED OUTREACH PROGRAMS, WHICH INCLUDE A 24-
18 HOUR PRAYER LINE, SATELLITE HOME BIBLE STUDY AND A DAYCARE
19 CENTER IN ZIMBABWE, AFRICA. HE'S MARRIED, HE HAS NINE

3 WE'RE DEALING WITH ON 5. IT IS A NORMAL PLACEHOLDER.

14 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** OUR FIRST PRESENTATION IS THE GREEN
15 LEADERSHIP AWARD. I'D LIKE TO CALL FORWARD SANTA MONICA CITY
16 COUNCILMEMBER PAM O'CONNOR. AND WE'VE ALL WORKED WITH PAM AT
17 M.T.A. AND EXPO. AND I'M GOING TO HAND THIS ONE TO YOU WHILE I
18 READ THIS. LAST EARTH DAY, SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY AND I ASKED
19 THAT THE COUNTY IMPLEMENT A GREEN LEADERSHIP AWARD PROGRAM. WE
20 RECOGNIZED THAT WHILE AWARDS MAY EXIST TO IDENTIFY SPECIFIC
21 ACCOMPLISHMENTS SUCH AS GREEN BUILDINGS, WATER AND RECYCLING
22 PROGRAMS, THERE WAS NO MEANS FOR RECOGNIZING THE DIVERSE LOCAL
23 ACHIEVEMENTS OCCURRING THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRE COUNTY OF LOS
24 ANGELES. IT GIVES ME GREAT PLEASURE TO KICK OFF THIS PROGRAM
25 TODAY BY RECOGNIZING A TRUE TRAILBLAZER IN THIS FIELD WITH THE



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1 FIRST-EVER COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES CHAIR'S GREEN LEADERSHIP
2 AWARD. THERE IS NO ONE MORE SUITABLE OF THIS HONOR THAN THAN
3 SANTA MONICA COUNCILMEMBER, FORMER MAYOR, AND MY FELLOW M.T.A.
4 DIRECTOR, PAM O'CONNOR. PAM O'CONNOR'S LEADERSHIP AND PERSONAL
5 COMMITMENT TO THE ENVIRONMENT HAS PUT BOTH THE CITY OF SANTA
6 MONICA AND M.T.A. ON THE NATIONAL STAGE. AS A COUNCILMEMBER,
7 PAM'S ABILITY TO MOTIVATE AND INSPIRE OTHERS HAS LED TO
8 NUMEROUS INNOVATIONS, INCLUDING THE ADOPTION OF THE FIRST
9 LOCAL GREEN BUILDING CODE AND THE SOLAR SANTA MONICA
10 INITIATIVE. AS CHAIR OF M.T.A., SHE WAS FUNDAMENTAL IN
11 ESTABLISHING THE AD HOC SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE TO ENSURE
12 THAT M.T.A. REDUCES ITS OWN OPERATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL
13 FOOTPRINT AND HAS ENCOURAGED M.T.A. TO PARTNER WITH OTHER
14 STAKEHOLDERS TO IMPLEMENT REGIONALLY EFFECTIVE CLIMATE
15 ADAPTATION STRATEGIES. AS AN ACTIVE MEMBER OF I.C.L.E.I, LOCAL
16 GOVERNMENTS FOR SUSTAINABILITY, SHE WORKS WITH CITIES
17 THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY AND IN FACT AROUND THE WORLD, AROUND THE
18 COUNTRY AND AROUND THE WORLD ON ENVIRONMENTALLY SUSTAINABLE
19 CLIMATE PROTECTION. THROUGH ALL OF HER WORK, PAM IS COMMITTED
20 TO SPEARHEADING POLICIES AND PARTNERSHIPS THAT ENHANCE
21 COMMUNITY LIVEABILITY, TRANSPORTATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL
22 SUSTAINABILITY. IT IS TRULY AN HONOR TO HIGHLIGHT PAM
23 O'CONNOR'S EXCEPTIONAL ADVOCACY AND PERSONAL COMMITMENT TO
24 GREEN LEADERSHIP WITH THE CHAIR'S AWARD TODAY. THANK YOU, PAM.

5 **PAM O'CONNOR:** THANK YOU ALL VERY MUCH, I'M VERY HONORED BY
6 THIS AWARD, ESPECIALLY IT BEING THE FIRST AWARD. AND I LOOK
7 FORWARD TO-- THE KEY HERE IS COLLABORATION. I JUST WANT TO SAY
8 AS WE, IN OUR COUNTRY AND REGION EXPERIENCE A CYCLE OF
9 ECONOMIC DOWNTURN, WE NEED TO REMEMBER THAT THE ENVIRONMENT OF
10 SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE CHANGE IS NOT A CYCLE, THAT IS AN
11 ONGOING PROBLEM. SO I LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUING TO WORK
12 TOGETHER IN A COLLABORATIVE MANNER TO FIND THOSE LONG TERM
13 SOLUTIONS THAT ARE OFTEN THE MOST COST-EFFECTIVE ONES AND
14 THEY'RE THE ONES THAT SAVE OUR RESOURCES. SO I LOOK FORWARD TO
15 CONTINUING WORKING WITH YOU AND THANK YOU. THANK YOU ALL VERY
16 MUCH FOR THIS HONOR.

22 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THIS IS THE THIRD ANNUAL COUNTY P.L.G.A.
23 JUNIOR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP PRESENTATION. SUPERVISOR KNABE, I
24 ASSUME YOU'RE JOINING WITH ALL OF THIS? 2008 WAS THE THIRD
25 YEAR FOR THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY P.L.G.A. JUNIOR GOLF



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1 CHAMPIONSHIP ADMINISTERED BY OUR PARKS AND RECREATION
2 DIVISION. 1,153 JUNIOR GOLFERS COMPETED IN FIVE QUALIFYING
3 EVENTS, ONE IN EACH SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT. JUNIOR GOLF IS
4 GROWING IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY AND THIS EVENT REPRESENTS AN
5 INCREASE IN PARTICIPATION OF 35.3 PERCENT FROM 2007. 128
6 QUALIFIED FOR THE FINAL ROUND AND SEVEN JUNIOR GOLFERS WERE
7 AWARDED AS THE 2008 CHAMPIONS. WE WOULD LIKE TO THANK OUR
8 SPONSORS OF THIS PRESTIGIOUS EVENT, INCLUDING THE PUBLIC LINKS
9 GOLF ASSOCIATION, THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY JUNIOR GOLF
10 FOUNDATION, FRANK AMADOR WITH A.P.B. MANUFACTURING, OUR GOLF
11 COURSE LESSEES, AND LONG TIME JUNIOR GOLF SUPPORTER LYNN
12 KINETT. THEIR SUPPORT OF THIS EVENT AFFORDS OUR JUNIOR GOLFERS
13 THE OPPORTUNITY TO COMPETE IN FIRST CLASS GOLF TOURNAMENTS AT
14 OUR COUNTY GOLF FACILITIES. SIX OF THE SEVEN ARE HERE WITH US
15 TODAY. WE CONGRATULATE YOU ON YOUR LOS ANGELES COUNTY JUNIOR
16 GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP. AND FROM DIAMOND BAR, WELL BETHANY'S NOT
17 HERE ON TOP. GIRLS 12 TO 14 DIVISION, ANNE CHENG FROM

12 COLLEGE SWEETHEART, BECAME MY PATIENT. AND THEN I DISCOVERED
13 THE CAREGIVERS' RESOURCE CENTER AND THE LIFE THAT I HAD TURNED
14 OVER TO MY CARE OF HIM WAS GRADUALLY RETURNED TO ME BY THE
15 SERVICES THAT THEY PROVIDED THROUGH SUPPORT GROUP MEETINGS,
16 THROUGH RETREATS, THROUGH REFERRALS AND THROUGH COUNSELING I
17 LEARNED THAT IN ORDER TO TAKE GOOD CARE OF HIM, I NEEDED TO
18 TAKE GOOD CARE OF MYSELF. AND SO NOW I'M DOING BOTH. THANK
19 YOU. [APPLAUSE.]

20 PROBATION COMMISSION. ALTHOUGH SHE WAS RELUCTANT TO LEAVE THE
21 COMMISSION FOR WOMEN, SHE WAS LOOKING FORWARD TO NEW
22 CHALLENGES FACING HER ON THE PROBATION COMMISSION. DURING THE
23 23 YEARS THAT SHE HAS BEEN A FOURTH DISTRICT PROBATION
24 COMMISSIONER, SHE HAS SERVED AS PRESIDENT 10 TIMES. SHE HAS
25 GUIDED THE COMMISSION TO FOCUS ON MANY CRITICAL EDUCATIONAL



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1 ISSUES FACING THE YOUTH IN OUR JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM. HER
2 FOCUS ON THE YOUTH OF IMPROVING THEIR READING SKILLS BEFORE
3 LEAVING PROBATION CAMPS WAS OF THE UTMOST IMPORTANCE TO HER
4 AND TO ALL OF US HERE. AS A RETIRED EDUCATOR, BETTY HAS BEEN
5 INVOLVED IN HELPING TO REDUCE THE ILLITERACY IN OUR CAMPS AND
6 HALLS BY CHAMPIONING SUCH PROGRAMS AS OPERATION READ, 300
7 MINUTES SCHOOL DAY, THE SAME TEACHER SAME STUDENT INITIATIVE,
8 AND MANY OTHER EDUCATIONAL ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS ON THE CAMPS
9 TODAY. IN ADDITION TO SERVING ON COUNTY COMMISSIONS, DR.
10 ROSENSTEIN EARNED A GENERAL SECONDARY TEACHING CREDENTIAL,
11 MASTERS' DEGREE IN SPANISH LITERATURE, AND A DOCTORATE IN
12 ADULT AND CONTINUING EDUCATION AT U.C.L.A. SHE HAS SERVED AS
13 AN EDUCATIONAL CONSULTANT TO STANFORD UNIVERSITY, UNIVERSITY
14 OF CALIFORNIA AND UNIVERSITIES IN MEXICO AND VENEZUELA. SHE
15 HAS PUBLISHED WORKS IN BOTH ENGLISH AND SPANISH. AND SEVERAL
16 OF HER CHILDREN'S STORIES HAVE RECEIVED AWARDS. IN ADDITION TO

18 **SPEAKER:** I'M HERE ON BEHALF OF CHIEF TAYLOR OF PROBATION
19 DEPARTMENT. AND I WANT TO DO -- HONOR HER, DR. ROSENSTEIN, AS
20 WELL. I HAD A LITTLE STORY FOR HER. I LOOKED AT HER RESUME AND
21 I NOTICED THAT SHE HAS A NEXUS OF WOMEN'S ISSUES AND JUVENILE
22 JUSTICE ISSUES. AND I WANTED TO TELL HER THAT ONE OF THE FIRST
23 PROBATION OFFICERS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA HIRED TWO WOMEN AND
24 THE AUDITOR SAID "I'M NOT GOING TO PAY THESE WOMEN BECAUSE
25 WOMEN SHOULDN'T WORK IN PROBATION. " WELL, THE WOMEN DID NOT



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1 TAKE THIS LIGHTLY. THEY WENT TO FEDERAL COURT. THEY WON THEIR
2 LAWSUIT. THE JUDGE DID A SURVEY AND FOUND THAT AROUND THE TURN
3 OF THE CENTURY WHEN PROBATION WAS FORMED, HUNDREDS OF WOMEN
4 WERE ALREADY WORKING IN PROBATION. AND I KNOW YOU HAVE A GREAT
5 PASSION FOR EQUAL RIGHTS, EQUAL PAY FOR WOMEN. AND I KNOW YOU
6 HAD A GREAT PASSION FOR PROBATION, SO I WANTED TO TELL YOU
7 THAT STORY. YOU'VE CARRIED ON THE TRADITION WITH YOUR WORK IN
8 THE PROBATION COMMISSION. AND LOOKING AT THAT AMAZING RESUME,
9 I NOTICED AS AN EDUCATOR, AUTHOR, ENTREPRENEUR, MOTHER,
10 GRANDMOTHER, GREAT GRANDMOTHER, SHE HAS FOUND TIME TO DONATE
11 TO PUBLIC SERVICE WITH THE PROBATION COMMISSION, THE WOMEN'S
12 COMMISSION. AND ON BEHALF OF CHIEF TAYLOR AND THE 6,000
13 EMPLOYEES OF THE PROBATION DEPARTMENT, WE THANK YOU FOR

16 **SUP. MOLINA:** I JUST WANTED TO SHARE SOMETHING ABOUT BETTY. YOU
17 KNOW, SINCE I FIRST CAME HERE, AND IT'S BEEN A LONG TIME,
18 EVERY TIME I SEE HER IN THE HALLWAY, THIS IS A WOMAN WHO IS A
19 CONSUMMATE ADVOCATE FOR WHAT SHE WANTS TO GET DONE. SHE WILL
20 PULL YOU ASIDE AND TELL YOU THE LITTLE TIDBIT OF WHAT SHE
21 NEEDS DONE AND WANTS YOUR HELP AND RECRUITS YOU FOR THIS. I
22 THINK THAT THERE ARE SO MANY CIVIC LEADERS LIKE BETTY AND THEY
23 DON'T GET THE RECOGNITION THAT THEY DESERVE. THEY PUT IN A LOT
24 OF HOURS, A LOT OF VOLUNTEER HOURS. THEY GIVE FROM THEIR HEART
25 OF THE THINGS THEY KNOW AND THEY SHARE WITH THE COUNTY. AND I



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1 KNOW YOU'VE BEEN VERY, VERY DEDICATED TO THE ISSUES OF
2 JUVENILE JUSTICE AS WELL AS WOMEN'S RIGHTS AND YOU REALLY
3 DESERVE TREMENDOUS COMMENDATION FROM ALL OF US FOR THE
4 OUTSTANDING LEADERSHIP YOU PROVIDE, THE TIME THAT YOU GIVE,
5 THE PROFESSIONALISM AND THE DEDICATION. YOU'VE GOT TO BE ONE
6 OF THE VERY TOP COMMISSIONERS THAT THIS COUNTY HAS KNOWN.
7 CONGRATULATIONS TO YOU, BETTY.

9 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** I'D LIKE TO JUST JOIN IN SAYING THAT THE
10 YEARS THAT I HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO WORK WITH YOU, I KNOW THE
11 WONDERFUL JOB THAT YOU'VE DONE. AND CONGRATULATIONS.

13 **SUP. KNABE:** THOSE ARE MY PRESENTATIONS, MADAME CHAIR.

14

15 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH?

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AT THIS TIME WE WANT TO RECOGNIZE THE TENTH
18 ANNIVERSARY OF THE BUSINESS TECHNOLOGY CENTER AND THE
19 CONTRIBUTIONS THEY'VE MADE TO THE GROWING TECHNOLOGY CLUSTER
20 IN THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY THROUGHOUT LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE
21 HAVE MARK LIEBERMAN, STAN DOSIK AND BILL WONG, WHO IS THE
22 ACTING DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT. MY OFFICE INITIATED THE
23 B.T.C. IN THE EARLY 1990S TO MAXIMIZE THE RESEARCH AND
24 DEVELOPMENT CAPABILITIES OF OUR COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES IN
25 PROVIDING NEW OPPORTUNITIES AND CREATING JOBS. TECHNOLOGY IS



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1 BUILDING A NEW ECONOMY IN OUR COUNTY AND THE SAN GABRIEL
2 VALLEY ESPECIALLY INCLUDING BIOMED, DIGITAL TECH INFORMATION,
3 MULTIMEDIA AND ADVANCED TRANSPORTATION INDUSTRIES.
4 ENTREPRENEURS ARE DREAMING NEW IDEAS AND DEVELOPING NEW
5 APPLICATIONS AND TECHNOLOGIES TO ENRICH AND TRANSFORM OUR
6 LIVES IN THE YEARS TO COME. THE B.T.C. PROVIDES A SUPPORT TO
7 BUILD THESE DREAMS AND ALLOW OUR COUNTY TECHNOLOGY INDUSTRY TO
8 GROW. WE HAVE OVER 30 MENTORS ON SITE. WE PROVIDE ON-THE-SPOT
9 ASSISTANCE AND ADVICE AND ACCESS TO CAPITAL. SINCE ITS
10 INCEPTION, THE CENTER HAS BEEN THE LARGEST HIGH TECHNOLOGY
11 BUSINESS INCUBATOR IN CALIFORNIA AND THE ONLY HIGH TECH IN THE
12 NATION OPERATED BY A COUNTY GOVERNMENT. THE B.T.C. PROVIDES
13 OVER-- THEY HAVE CREATED OVER 1,000 JOBS AND CREATED-- RAISED
14 OVER \$110 MILLION IN VENTURE CAPITAL. WITH NEARBY ASSISTANCE
15 SUCH AS CAL. TECH, J.P.L., CLAIREMONT COLLEGES, THE GRADUATE
16 INSTITUTE, THE CITY OF HOPE, THE ARRAY OF PRIVATE SUCCESSFUL
17 FIRMS, THE B.T.C. CONTINUES TO SUCCEED AND GROW. WE ARE NOW
18 ESTABLISHING A SATELLITE CENTER IN THE SANTA CLARITA VALLEY
19 AND ANOTHER AT CAL. STATE UNIVERSITY LONG BEACH AND AT THE
20 PORT OF LOS ANGELES, AMONG OTHERS, THROUGHOUT OUR GREATER LOS
21 ANGELES COUNTY. SO WE WANT TO CONGRATULATE YOU ON A SUCCESSFUL
22 10 YEARS. WE WISH YOU ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL 10 YEARS SO WE CAN
23 GIVE YOU ANOTHER PROCLAMATION, A LITTLE BIT BIGGER, AT THAT
24 TIME. [APPLAUSE.]

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1 **BILL WONG:** I'D LIKE LIKE TO THANK SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH AND
2 ALL THE SUPERVISORS FOR THE SUPPORT FOR THE BUSINESS
3 TECHNOLOGY CENTER. THE B.T.C. IS THE ONLY COUNTY-OWNED AND
4 OPERATED BUSINESS TECHNOLOGY INCUBATOR IN THE COUNTRY. AND IN
5 OVER THE 10 YEARS OF SERVICE, IT HAS PROVIDED WELL OVER 1,000
6 JOBS AND RAISED OVER \$110 MILLION IN EQUITY CAPITAL. AND GIVEN
7 THESE DIFFICULT ECONOMIC TIMES, FACILITIES LIKE THE SMALL
8 BUSINESS INCUBATOR, LIKE THE BUSINESS TECHNOLOGY CENTER ARE
9 MORE CRITICAL THAN EVER. SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THANK YOU FOR
10 THIS RECOGNITION. [APPLAUSE.]

11

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** NOW WE WOULD LIKE TO BRING UP JOHN BRADY, THE
13 BURBANK HUMAN RELATIONS COUNCIL, AND BARBARA DEIRDA, BURBANK
14 HUMAN RELATIONS COUNCIL, FROM THEIR COUNCIL, TO RECOGNIZE THE
15 BURBANK'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY IN PROMOTING TOLERANCE, PEACE AND
16 POSITIVE YOUTH ENGAGEMENT. THE BURBANK HUMAN RELATIONS COUNCIL
17 WAS ESTABLISHED BACK IN 1958 AS A GRASSROOTS COMMUNITY
18 BUILDING ORGANIZATION COMPRISED OF MEMBERS FROM THE CIVIC AND
19 CHURCH GROUPS IN THE CITY. FROM ITS START, THEY HAVE GIVEN A
20 VOICE TO THE VOICELESS, SOUGHT SHELTER FOR THE HOMELESS,
21 SOUGHT EQUAL TREATMENT FOR HOUSING, FAIR APPLICATION LAWS,
22 FOUGHT FOR CIVIL RIGHTS AND HUMAN DECENCY IN ALL WAYS THAT
23 PEOPLE LIVE. THEY WORKED WITH THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT ON
24 PROGRAMS COVERING RACIAL, ETHNIC AND HUMAN RELATIONS,
25 SENSITIVITY TRAINING FOR THE CITY'S SCHOOLS AND THEIR POLICE



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1 DEPARTMENT. THEY ARE A FOUNDING MEMBER OF THE L.A. COUNTY'S
2 HATE CRIME TASKFORCE AND THE L.A. COUNTY HUMAN RELATIONS
3 MUTUAL ASSISTANCE CONSORTIUM TASKFORCE. BOTH ORGANIZATIONS
4 CHARGED WITH PROMOTING TOLERANCE AND PEACE AND POSITIVE
5 ENGAGEMENT FOR OUR YOUTH AND ALL PEOPLE FOR THE 10 TO 12
6 MILLION PEOPLE THAT LIVE ACROSS OUR COUNTY. THE COUNCIL IS
7 ALSO AN OUTSPOKEN VOICE IN THE REMEMBRANCE OF THE HOLOCAUST.
8 THE PROGRAM HAS PLACED SPEAKERS WHO ARE SURVIVORS IN SCHOOLS
9 TO SPEAK TO OUR YOUTH AND AT THEIR ANNUAL PRESENTATION BEFORE
10 THE CITY COUNCIL THAT NOT ONLY REMEMBERS THE GENOCIDE OF THE
11 JEWS BUT ALL PEOPLE WHO HAVE DIED DUE TO INTOLERANCE. THE
12 COMMISSION IS ALSO A UNIQUELY AMERICAN ORGANIZATION AS A GREAT
13 NATIONAL MOTTO, "FROM THE MANY ONE" INSPIRES THE COMMISSION'S
14 DEDICATION TO THE CONCEPT THAT WHAT WE HAVE IN COMMON AS
15 HUMANS IS ALWAYS STRONGER THAN WHAT DIVIDES US. SO
16 CONGRATULATIONS TO THE BEAUTIFUL CITY OF BURBANK'S HUMAN
17 RELATIONS COUNCIL.

18
19 **JOHN BRADY:** THANK YOU SO MUCH. THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR
20 ANTONOVICH. THE COUNTY PROCLAMATION STATES THAT WE EMBODY THE
21 NATIONAL MOTTO E PLURIBUS UNUM, FROM THE MANY ONE. I SUSPECT
22 OUR FOREFATHERS DID NOT IMAGINE HOW MANY THE MANY WOULD BE OR
23 HOW DIFFERENT THE MANY WOULD BECOME. BUT HERE WE ARE IN THE
24 MOST DIVERSE COUNTY ON THE PLANET. WE HAVE MORE DIFFERENT
25 PEOPLE OF MORE DIFFERENT BACKGROUNDS, ETHNICALLY, RELIGIOUSLY



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1 AND RACIALLY THAN ANY PLACE ELSE. THE BURBANK HUMAN RELATIONS
2 COUNCIL WILL CONTINUE TO SEEK NEW WAYS TO BRING THE COMMUNITY
3 TOGETHER, RAISE AWARENESS BETWEEN OUR DIVERSE POPULATIONS AND
4 SEEK SOLUTIONS TO THE PROBLEMS THAT CONFRONT OUR FELLOW HUMAN
5 BEINGS. WE ARE ONE OF TWO HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSIONS OR
6 COUNCILS IN THE COUNTY THAT ARE INDEPENDENT OF OUR CITIES.
7 SOMETIMES THAT CAN BE-- THAT GIVES US THE FREEDOM TO BE
8 CONTENTIOUS SOMETIMES AND TO BE FREE TO SPEAK TRUTH TO POWER,
9 AS THEY SAY. OUR CIVIL RIGHTS CHAIR, HAROLD TAMPKIN USED TO
10 SAY, "ISN'T THIS FUN?" SOME WOULD SAY THAT HE WASN'T TAKING
11 THAT EFFORT SERIOUSLY. BUT LET ME TELL YOU: THIS IS THE THRILL
12 RIDE OF A LIFETIME. THE ROLLER COASTER RIDE OF DEVELOPING THE
13 EVOLVING AMERICAN CULTURE, ONE THAT IS BASED ON JUSTICE, EQUAL
14 RIGHTS AND RESPECT FOR THE DIGNITY OF ALL WHO LIVE HERE. THANK
15 YOU, SUPERVISORS, AND THE L.A. COMMISSION ON HUMAN RELATIONS
16 FOR HONORING US AND JOINING US IN THIS GREAT AMERICAN
17 ADVENTURE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE.]

19 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** NOW WE WOULD LIKE TO RECOGNIZE A YOUNG MAN
20 WHO HAS ACCOMPLISHED A LOT. AND WE HAVE GREAT HOPES THAT HE
21 WILL BE ONE OF OUR GREAT LEADERS PERHAPS SITTING UP HERE ONE
22 DAY OR IN THE WHITE HOUSE. TREVON SMITH AND WITH US IS A
23 SUPPORT GROUP OF LINDA ESTRADA, ARISSA SAUNDERS, RITU SEGAL,
24 RODNEY HAMMONDS, PAUL DENNETS, LETICIA SMITH, LINCA NEWTON,
25 THOMAS MCKEE, CHRISTIAN AROSCO, WENDY ZUNIGA AND REGINA



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1 DICKERSON. WE'RE ALL HERE TO RECOGNIZE ESTABAN ON RECEIVING
2 THE OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT AWARD FROM THE CALIFORNIA
3 DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION'S JUVENILE
4 JUSTICE CENTER. HE HAS SUCCESSFULLY HAS OVERCOME MANY
5 OBSTACLES IN HIS YOUNG LIFE AND HAS SUCCESSFULLY TRANSFORMED
6 INTO A YOUNG ADULthood LEADER. HE GRADUATED FROM THE I.S.D.
7 Y.D.C.P. PROGRAM IN JUNE OF 2006. DURING HIS INTERNSHIP HE
8 WORKED IN P.C.S. MATERIALS MANAGEMENT, HIRED BY P.C.S. AS A
9 PERMANENT COUNTY EMPLOYEE AND CONTINUED WORKING MATERIALS
10 MANAGEMENT UNTIL JUNE OF 2008. AT THAT TIME HE RECEIVED A
11 PROMOTION AND STARTED WORKING IN A.F.S. FINANCE. SINCE 2004 HE
12 WORKED PART-TIME AS A PEER COUNSELOR AT THE PHOENIX HOUSE IN
13 THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY. THE PROGRAM IS SPONSORED BY THE
14 DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES AND PROBATION
15 DEPARTMENT, PROVIDING COUNSELING AND ASSISTANCE TO HIGH RISK
16 YOUTH. TREVON RECEIVES GREAT PLEASURE IN WORKING WITH THESE
17 YOUNG PEOPLE TO TURN THEIR LIVES AROUND. HE'S NOW COMPLETING
18 HIS A.A. DEGREE FROM LOS ANGELES COMMUNITY COLLEGE AT THE LOS
19 ANGELES VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND WILL TRANSFER TO A FOUR-
20 YEAR UNIVERSITY IN 2009. HE'S WORKING TOWARD A DEGREE IN
21 BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION. HIS GOALS INCLUDE PROMOTING I.S.D.
22 MANAGEMENT AND MAYBE EVEN ONE DAY BEING ELECTED TO OUR BOARD

24 PICKED NATIONWIDE TO SERVE ON THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS
25 COALITION FOR FOSTER YOUTH, WHICH IS A TWO-MONTH INTERNSHIP IN



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1 WASHINGTON, D.C. STARTING IN MAY 2009. THE GROUP IS BEING
2 FORMED TO WORK WITH THE CONGRESS TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS
3 REGARDING IMPROVING OUR FOSTER YOUTH PROGRAM. SO, TREVON,
4 WE'RE VERY PROUD OF YOUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND WE KNOW ONE DAY
5 ONE OF THESE FIVE CHAIRS WILL BE YOURS BECAUSE WE KNOW
6 EDUCATION IS THE OPPORTUNITY FOR ALL OF US TO ACHIEVE OUR
7 DREAMS. SO GOD BLESS YOU AND THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.]

25 LEADERSHIP HERE OF THE BAND, I AM JOINED BY STEPHANIE MORALES,



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1 ILIANA SALAZAR, BRITTANY GARCES AND MICHELLE TUDOR. NOW, THIS
2 BAND HAS BEEN WORKING FOR ALMOST TWO YEARS. THERE'S A VERY,

17 AND IMPROVE SOUTH LOS ANGELES NEIGHBORHOOD. SHE PASSED AWAY

23 OF 66. SHE LEAVES TO CHERISH HER MEMORY HER HUSBAND, JUAN
24 QUINTERO, HER DAUGHTER DENISE AND HER SON JAKE, ALONG WITH A

14 EAST RANCHO DOMINGUEZ COMMUNITY BLOCK WATCH. WE WANT TO THANK
15 SUPERVISOR BURKE AND THE BOARD FOR PASSING THE ITEM TO THE
16 LIBRARY. WE'VE BEEN LONG AWAITING THIS LIBRARY. SINCE THE NEED
17 IS GREAT, WE HAVE APPROXIMATELY 20,000 RESIDENTS IN OUR AREA,

4 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. WOULD YOU PLEASE STATE YOUR
5 NAME?

7 **EARNESTINE GATES:** I'M EARNESTINE GATES, I'M THE ASSISTANT
8 SECRETARY FOR OUR EAST RANCHO DOMINGUEZ BLOCK WATCH.

9

10 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** AND YOU'RE APPEARING IN SUPPORT?

11

12 **EARNESTINE GATES:** DEFINITELY IN SUPPORT.

13

14 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** STATE YOUR NAME?

15

16 **MARGARET COMER:** MY NAME IS MARGARET COMER, I'M A FORMER
17 LIBRARY COMMISSIONER APPOINTED UNDER COMMISSIONER DANA, AND I
18 SERVED THERE A NUMBER OF YEARS. AND THIS IS TRULY A BLESSING
19 BECAUSE WE'VE ALWAYS HAD A PROBLEM WITH THAT SITE, THE PARKING
20 AND THE PLACE. SO I'M VERY GRATEFUL THAT FINALLY WE'RE GETTING
21 A LIBRARY THAT BELONGS TO THE COUNTY. THANK YOU.

23 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. PLEASE STATE YOUR NAME.

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1 **PHILLIS WALKER:** PHILLIS WALKER. AND I'M A CONCERNED CITIZEN
2 AND SUPPORTER IN OUR COMMUNITY AND I'VE BEEN IN THAT COMMUNITY
3 FOR APPROXIMATELY 40 YEARS. AND I'M JUST VERY EXCITED ABOUT
4 THAT LIBRARY. THANK YOU.

5

6 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU.

7

8 **ISOM COMER:** MY NAME IS ISOM COMER, AND I'VE LIVED IN THE
9 COMMUNITY FOR 39, GOING ON 40. AND WE'VE BEEN ACTIVELY WORKING
10 IN THIS COMMUNITY TRYING TO KEEP THE LITTLE LIBRARY WE HAVE
11 AND EXPAND TO THE PRESENT ONE WE HAVE. SO WE'RE VERY THANKFUL
12 FOR THIS OPPORTUNITY TO RECEIVE THIS. WE'RE GOING TO MOVE ON.
13 I HOPE THAT ALL OF THE PEOPLE IN OUR AREA APPRECIATE THIS VERY
14 MUCH

15

16 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I'LL MOVE THE ITEM.
17 SECONDED BY YAROSLAVSKY. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. THAT'S
18 ITEM 2 THAT WE RECONSIDERED. IT'S HIM ALONE? I'M GOING THE
19 CALL UP MR. SACHS, WOULD YOU START COMING FORWARD ON ITEM 10?
20 AND WE'RE GOING TO CALL ALL OF YOUR ITEMS. THOSE ITEMS WHERE

24 **ARNOLD SACHS:** GOOD MORNING, THANK YOU. ITEM 10. AGAIN, I'VE
25 BEEN BEFORE THE COUNTY A FEW TIMES. WHEN YOU'RE WORKING WITH



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1 THE STATE LEGISLATIVE BODY, DELEGATION, COULD YOU ALSO, AND I
2 REITERATE WHAT I SPOKE ABOUT, TALK TO THE STATE LEGISLATION
3 REGARDING THE DELEGATION OR THE ASSIGNMENT OF THE GOLD LINE
4 AND ITS CONSTRUCTION AUTHORITY, WHICH WE'VE GONE OVER, HOW THE
5 NAME WAS CHANGED TO THE FOOTHILL CONSTRUCTION AUTHORITY WHEN
6 THE SUNSET FOR THE ORIGINAL GOLD LINE WAS TO BUILD IT OUT PAST
7 SIERRA MADRE VILLAGE TO MONTCLAIR. AND NOW THE FOOTHILL
8 CONSTRUCTION AUTHORITY COVERS THE EXACT SAME OVERLAY, ONLY IT
9 GOES TO AZUSA. IT TECHNICALLY COULD BE THE FOOTHILL PART OF
10 THE GOLD LINE CONSTRUCTION AUTHORITY. AND ALSO REGARDING THE
11 NURSE ACCREDITATION PROBLEM WITH THE STATE, THAT THEY HAVE A
12 BACKLOG IN INVESTIGATING COMPLAINTS AGAINST NURSES OR THEIR
13 CRIMINAL BACKGROUND AND THAT THE COUNTY IN ITSELF HIRES NURSES
14 FROM REGISTERS TO WORK AT THE COUNTY HOSPITALS, I BELIEVE. AND
15 SINCE THEY HAVE A TWO-YEAR BACKLOG ON UPDATING THEIR FILES,
16 MAYBE IT WOULD BEHOOVE THE STATE TO MOVE A LITTLE BIT QUICKER
17 OR TO INVESTIGATE THE NURSES THAT THE COUNTY, AS WE'VE SEEN,
18 WITH THE ACCIDENT AT M.L.K., IS FORCED TO HIRE. THANK YOU FOR
19 YOUR TIME AND YOUR ANSWERS.

20

21 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** MOVED BY ANTONOVICH. SECONDED. THAT IS ITEM
22 10. THE NEXT ITEM 11.

23

24 **ARNOLD SACHS:** ITEM 11. PART OF ITEM 11 MENTIONS THE MANHATTAN
25 BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT. AND I WOULD JUST ASK THE THAT



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1 ONE OF THE CAVEATS FOR THEIR CONFLICT OF INTEREST BE THAT THE
2 OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE THAT'S BEEN CREATED FOR THE NEW
3 CONSTRUCTION BOND MEASURE ACTUALLY MEET THIS TIME? WHEN THEY
4 HAD A PREVIOUS BOND MEASURE IN MANHATTAN BEACH, IT WAS A PART
5 OF A FAILURE OF THE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO MEET THAT ALLOWED
6 \$30 MILLION TO BE SPENT ON COST CHANGES. AND SO THE TWO
7 BUILDINGS THAT THE BOND MEASURE WAS SUPPOSED TO COVER ACTUALLY
8 ENDED UP BEING ONE BUILDING. AND SO THEY HAD TO REDO ANOTHER
9 BOND MEASURE FOR MANHATTAN BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT. BUT
10 FORTUNATELY SANITY REIGNS IN MANHATTAN BEACH.

11

12 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ALL RIGHT. MOVED BY KNABE. SECONDED BY
13 MOLINA ON 11. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. ITEM 20.

14

15 **ARNOLD SACHS:** ITEM 20 DEALS WITH A CONTRACT, I BELIEVE, MADAME
16 CHAIR. I'M JUST CURIOUS, THAT IT'S SOMETHING-- THIS IS SENT
17 OUT. THIS IS A SUBCONTRACT, I BELIEVE, TO SOCIALSERVE FOR
18 \$200,000 TO BASICALLY PROVIDE FUNDS FOR ONGOING MAINTENANCE OF
19 A WEB-BASED LOS ANGELES COUNTY HOUSING RESOURCE CENTER,
20 LISTING SERVICES FOR LANDLORDS, RESIDENTS, HOUSING LOCATORS
21 AND CASEWORKERS IN THE COUNTY. ONCE YOU GET RID OF ALL THE
22 EXCESS VERBIAGE IN THIS ITEM. THIS IS SOMETHING THAT'S BETTER
23 SUITED JUST FOR THE COUNTY DEPARTMENT TO HANDLE? AT \$200,000 A
24 YEAR, YOU'RE FACING SHORTAGES IN FUNDING. AND THIS JUST SEEMS
25 TO BE A LOT OF MONEY FOR A LITTLE BIT OF BANG.

2 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ALL RIGHT. ON 20, MOVED BY YAROSLAVSKY,
3 SECONDED BY KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. ITEM 50 IS
4 YOUR NEXT ITEM.

5

6 **ARNOLD SACHS:** ITEM 50 REGARDS TRAFFIC SYNCHRONIZATION. THIS
7 SEEMS TO BE AN ITEM THAT SHOWS UP FAIRLY REGULARLY ON COUNTY
8 AGENDAS. SO MY QUESTION WOULD BE, HOW MANY CITIES LEFT IN THE
9 COUNTY NEED TO HAVE THEIR TRAFFIC SIGNALS SYNCHRONIZED? AND IS
10 THERE A SCHEDULE THAT'S AFFORDED OR IS THIS FUNDED THROUGH
11 M.T.A.? SO THAT THE PUBLIC GETS AN IDEA OF THE STATUS OF THEIR
12 CITY, WHEN THEIR CITY'S GOING TO HAVE THEIR SIGNALS
13 SYNCHRONIZED, JUST TO MAKE THEM AWARE.

14

15 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** I FORGOT HOW MANY HUNDREDS OF MILES OF
16 SYNCHRONIZED SIGNALS IN THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY HAVE BEEN DONE
17 ALONG WITH OTHER AREAS IN THE COUNTY. THAT'S AN ONGOING
18 OPERATION.

19

20 **ARNOLD SACHS:** I UNDERSTAND. THAT'S WHY I BRING IT UP. THERE'S
21 AN ONGOING OPERATION AND IT'S COME BEFORE THE COUNTY. I'M JUST
22 CURIOUS HOW MANY CITIES ARE LEFT TO HAVE THEIR LIGHTS
23 SYNCHRONIZED. AND I APPRECIATE YOUR ANSWERS.

24



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1 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** IT DEPENDS WHETHER THEY'RE SYNCHRONIZING
2 WITH UNINCORPORATED AREAS AND ALSO WHETHER THEY HAVE THE FUNDS
3 TO CONTRIBUTE. BECAUSE EACH CITY MAKES THAT DETERMINATION WHEN
4 THEY HAVE THE FUNDS.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** BUT THERE'S A JOINT-- THE INDEPENDENT CITIES
7 ARE WORKING WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS. AND WE HAVE
8 AN ONGOING-- WE MEET QUARTERLY ON THIS, AND THEY HAVE AN
9 ONGOING OPERATION TO SYNCHRONIZE ALL OF THE SIGNALS. WE WISH
10 L.A. CITY WAS A PART OF IT BUT THEY WANT TO GO THEIR OWN WAY.
11 BUT WE WISH THEY'D SYNCHRONIZE SECOND, THIRD, FOURTH SIXTH AND
12 SEVENTH STREET TO WEST LOS ANGELES SO WE COULD ELIMINATE SOME
13 OF THE CONGESTION THAT PEOPLE HAVE GOING DOWNTOWN TO THE WEST
14 LOS ANGELES AS WE DID LAST NIGHT WITH THE EDDIE DINNER AWARD
15 WITH ALL THE CONGESTION WE ALWAYS FACE.

16

17 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH MOVES. SECONDED BY
18 KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. YOUR NEXT ITEM IS 55?

19

20 **ARNOLD SACHS:** ITEM 55. WITH THE RECENT TRAGEDIES OF THE FIRES
21 THAT HAVE OCCURRED IN THE COUNTY, THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY AND
22 THE STORIES THAT HAVE APPEARED IN THE L.A. TIMES AND OTHER
23 LOCAL NEWSPAPERS, IT SEEMS THAT A CONTRIBUTING FACTOR TO A LOT
24 OF THE FIRES IS THE QUINTESSENTIAL CALIFORNIA PALM TREE AND
25 THE FACT THAT WHEN THE FIRES-- WHEN THE PALM TREES CATCH, THEY



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1 EXPLODE INTO BURNING EMBERS. AND SO WHILE THE COUNTY AND THE
2 CITIES ARE LOOKING AT FURTHER TIGHTENING RESTRICTIONS ON
3 BUILDING AND SUCH IN FIRE-RELATED ZONES, MAYBE SOMETHING CAN
4 BE LOOKED INTO REGARDING THE USE OF PALM TREES. I KNOW LIKE I
5 SAY IT'S A QUINTESSENTIAL CALIFORNIA LANDMARK. BUT IF IT
6 CONTRIBUTES TO THE FIRE OR THE CAUSE OF FIRE EMBERS SPREADING,
7 IT SHOULD BE LOOKED AT IN A DIFFERENT LIGHT AS JUST PROVIDING
8 SOME KIND OF ENVIRONMENTAL-- WEIGHING THE PROS AND CONS OF
9 USING THEM AS ORNAMENTAL TREES VERSUS THE CON OF BEING A FIRE
10 HAZARD IN WIND-DRIVEN AREAS OF THE COUNTY.

11

12 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. MOVED BY KNABE. SECONDED BY
13 YAROSLAVSKY. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. ITEM 72?

14

15 **ARNOLD SACHS:** ITEM 72. AGAIN, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON
16 CORPORATION. THE FIRE THAT WAS LAST MONTH IN SYLMAR VALLEY I
17 BELIEVE WAS CAUSED-- I BELIEVE IT WAS STATED IN THE NEWSPAPER
18 THAT IT WAS CAUSED BY A POWER LINE THAT FELL, BUT IT WAS A
19 THIRD PARTY. AND THE STATE LAW COVERS OR ALLOWS THIRD PARTIES
20 TO BE OUTSIDE THE RULING WHEN IT COMES TO FIRE-RELATED
21 INCIDENTS LIKE THAT. SO MY QUESTION WOULD BE: IS THERE ANY WAY
22 TO TOUGHEN UP THE RESTRICTIONS?

23

24 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WE ALREADY PASSED THAT MOTION AFTER THE LAST
25 FIRE IN CHADSWORTH TO DO THAT.



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1

ARNOLD SACHS: SEE, THERE YOU GO. ADDITIONALLY, SINCE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON IS INVOLVED HERE, FROM THE DEREGULATION PORTION OF THE STATE FIASCO, COULD WE FIND OUT WHEN THE PREVIOUS GOVERNOR, IN HELPING THE UTILITY COMPANIES, ONE OF THE STEPS THAT WAS TAKEN WAS THE STATE PURCHASED POWER LINES. CAN WE POSSIBLY FIND OUT WHAT POWER LINES WERE PURCHASED BY THE STATE IN L.A. COUNTY TO ASSIST SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON AND WHAT THE STATUS IS OF THOSE POWER LINES? ESPECIALLY RELATED TO POWER PLANT PRODUCTION. I HAVE GRAVE CONCERNS IN REDONDO BEACH REGARDING THE POWER LINES FROM A POWER PLANT THAT'S GOING TO BE OBSOLETE IN ABOUT 10 MORE YEARS.

SUP. BURKE, CHAIR: ALL RIGHT. MOVED BY KNABE. SECONDED BY ANTONOVICH. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. I HAVE ONE ITEM. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I THINK THAT CONCLUDES YOUR ITEMS.

ARNOLD SACHS: I HAVE A COUPLE. BUT I THINK THEY WERE HELD FOR OTHER PEOPLE.

5 BROADCASTING TO DIGITAL TELEVISION BROADCASTING. THE DIGITAL
6 TRANSITION IS EXPECTED TO AFFECT MILLIONS IN L.A. COUNTY
7 RESIDENTS WHO WATCH FREE OVER THE AIR PROGRAMS ON OUTDATED
8 ANALOG TELEVISIONS. RESIDENTS WHO CURRENTLY RELY ON RABBIT
9 EARS OR ROOFTOP ANTENNAS, ANALOG TELEVISION WILL BE NO LONGER
10 ABLE TO RECEIVE TELEVISION PROGRAMS. THE NATIONAL
11 TELECOMMUNICATION AND INFORMATION ADMINISTRATION KICKED OFF
12 THE TV CONVERTER BOX COUPON PROGRAM IN JANUARY OF THIS YEAR
13 AND BEGAN OFFERING A LIMITED AMOUNT OF \$40 DISCOUNTED COUPONS
14 ISSUED TO THE PUBLIC ON A FIRST-COME FIRST SERVE BASIS TO
15 OFFSET THE COST PER T.V. CONVERTER BOXES. MANY NATIONAL
16 EFFORTS HAVE BEEN LAUNCHED TO INFORM CITIZENS AND RESIDENTS
17 ABOUT THE TRANSITION AND HOW TO PURCHASE THE VOUCHERS. BUT
18 DESPITE THIS EFFORT TO INFORM CONSUMERS ABOUT THIS COMPLICATED

3 THE COUNTY, GREAT FRIEND TO OUR OFFICE, DID AN OUTSTANDING JOB
4 AS A MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NATURAL HISTORY
5 MUSEUM. I WOULD ASK ALL MEMBERS TO JOIN IN THAT.

7 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ALL MEMBERS.

8

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** ALSO ASK THAT WE ADJOURN IN THE MEMORY OF
10 BRIAN S. COOPER. RESIDENT OF OUR DISTRICT EMPLOYED AT THE LOS
11 ANGELES COUNTY PROBATION DEPARTMENT WHO RECENTLY PASSED AWAY.
12 HE WAS DEDICATED DEPUTY PROBATION OFFICER II FOR MORE THAN
13 NINE YEARS. AND SERVED HIS CLIENTS, THE COMMUNITY AND THE
14 DEPARTMENT WITH PROFESSIONALISM. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE,
15 AND WE'LL GET THE SECRETARY MORE INFORMATION ON THAT. BY THE
16 WAY DAVID COMSKY IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE CYNTHIA, WIFE OF MANY
17 YEARS. ALSO ASK THAT WE ADJOURN IN MEMORY OF MAE MERCER, BLUES
18 SINGER WHO BECAME A SUCCESSFUL FILM AND TELEVISION ACTRESS WHO
19 PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 76 FOLLOWING SEVERAL ILLNESSES. BORN
20 IN NORTH CAROLINA AS A DAUGHTER OF TOBACCO SHARECROPPERS, SHE
21 BEGAN SINGING IN CHURCH BUT SHE ESTABLISHED HERSELF AS A
22 SULTRY DEEP VOICE JAZZ AND BLUES SINGER IN EUROPE IN THE
23 1960S. SHE IS SURVIVED BY HER DAUGHTER JESSIE MAE FRAZIER AND
24 SON FERNANDO HARPER AND HER SISTER-- SIBLINGS LEONARD MERCER,
25 SAM MERCER, ANNE MOORE AND ARLENE ELLIS. FINALLY ASK THAT WE



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1 ADJOURN IN MEMORY OF JAY FIONDELLA, LEGENDARY SANTA MONICA
2 RESTAURATEUR, WHO RECENTLY SUCCUMBED TO PARKINSON'S DISEASE AT
3 THE AGE OF 82. FORMER ACTOR, ADVENTURER, COMPETITIVE HOT AIR
4 BALLOONIST AND TREASURE HUNTER. HE ESTABLISHED "CHEZ JAY"
5 NEARLY 50 YEARS AGO IN THE SITE OF A FORMER COFFEE SHOP IN
6 SANTA MONICA WHERE IT QUICKLY BECAME ONE OF THE SOUTHLAND'S
7 LEADING CELEBRITY HOT SPOTS FOR ITS STEAKS AND SEA FOOD. HE IS

12 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SO ORDERED.

13

14 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I'D LIKE TO CALL UP ITEM 26, MADAME CHAIR.

15

16 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ITEM 26.

17

18 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** COULD WE HAVE STAFF OR THE COUNTY COUNSEL
19 HERE? I'LL HANDLE IT. WE'VE ALREADY HAD THE PUBLIC HEARING. WE
20 CLOSED THE PUBLIC HEARING. WE CERTIFIED THE ENVIRONMENTAL
21 IMPACT REPORT. THERE WERE SOME ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS THAT HAVE
22 BEEN, AS I UNDERSTAND FROM THE LEGAL POINT OF VIEW, CONSISTENT
23 WITH THE ACTION WE TOOK LAST NOVEMBER, A YEAR AGO ON THIS. AND
24 THOSE CHANGES OR THOSE ADDITIONS AND MODIFICATIONS ARE ON THE



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1 GREEN SHEET IN THE FORM OF A MOTION THAT IS BEFORE THE BOARD
2 TODAY, CORRECT?

3

4 **RICHARD WEISS, COUNSEL:** THAT IS CORRECT.

5

6 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MADAME CHAIR, WE HAVE NINE PEOPLE THAT WISH
7 TO BE HEARD. I WOULD RECOMMEND THAT EVEN THOUGH WE ARE NOT
8 OBLIGATED TO HAVE A PUBLIC HEARING, THAT WE GIVE EACH OF THEM
9 ONE MINUTE TO BE HEARD. AND THEN I THINK I'LL HAVE SOME
10 QUESTIONS, BRIEF QUESTIONS OF THE STAFF AND THEN WE'LL GO ON.
11 SO WITH THAT, LET ME ASK THE OPPONENTS, JESS THOMAS, GEORGE
12 COLMAN, FRANK ANGEL AND ALYSE LAZAR. THERE ARE FOUR SEATS
13 HERE.

14

15 **RICHARD WEISS, COUNSEL:** SUPERVISOR, IF I MIGHT, THE GREEN
16 SHEET ITEM, YOUR MOTION CONTAINS A FULL SET OF TRADEOUT
17 PROJECT CONDITIONS. THERE IS ONE ADDITIONAL CHANGE THAT OUR
18 OFFICE IS ASKING THAT THE BOARD MAKE TODAY WITH RESPECT TO
19 CONDITION NUMBER 8. IT IS SIMPLY CHANGING THE DATE THAT HAD
20 BEEN IN THE VERSION OF NOVEMBER 18TH, 2038 TO OCTOBER 28TH
21 2008. I HAVE A TRADEOUT PAGE HERE. AND THAT IS MERELY TO MAKE
22 IT MORE CONSISTENT WITH THE VERSION THAT WENT OUT TO THE
23 COMMUNITY SEVERAL WEEKS AGO.

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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO I WILL MAKE THAT MOTION TO MAKE THAT
2 CHANGE. AND AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING, CAN WE JUST MAKE SURE
3 THAT THAT GETS APPROVED. MR. THOMAS? THERE YOU ARE. YOU'RE ON.

4
5 **JESS THOMAS:** JESS BENJAMIN THOMAS SPEAKING FOR OLD AGOURA
6 HOMEOWNERS' ASSOCIATION. SINCE WE'RE ALLOWED A MINUTE, I'LL
7 READ THE FIRST AND LAST PARAGRAPHS OF MY STATEMENT AND TURN
8 THE REST IN FOR THE RECORD. DESPITE REPEATED AND DETAILED
9 TESTIMONY DURING THE MANY PUBLIC HEARINGS BEFORE THE REGIONAL
10 PLANNING COMMISSION AND THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS BY THE OLD
11 AGOURA HOMEOWNERS' ASSOCIATION REGARDING THE PUBLIC SAFETY
12 NEED FOR A SPECIFIC FIRE EVACUATION PLAN, THIS HAS NOT BEEN
13 DONE. MUCH HAS BEEN SPELLED OUT IN THE E.I.R. AND C.U.P.
14 DOCUMENTS ABOUT THE ACCESSIBILITY AND EQUIPMENT FEATURES OF
15 THE HESCHEL SCHOOL SITE, BUT NO STUDY HAS BEEN EXPLORED WHICH
16 DETERMINES THE DEGREE TO WHICH THE OPERATION OF THE SCHOOL
17 WILL IMPEDE THE EVACUATION OF OLD AGOURA IN THE EVENT OF A
18 FIRE OR OTHER NATURAL DISASTER. BECAUSE OF THE ABOVE
19 UNRESOLVED ISSUES, THE OLD AGOURA FOUND THAT THE FIRE-RELATED
20 PUBLIC SAFETY IMPACTS CAUSED BY THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD
21 OF SUPERVISORS' APPROVAL OF THE ABRAHAM JOSHUA HESCHEL DAY
22 SCHOOL WEST TO BE A GREAT POTENTIAL HARM TO THE SAFETY AND
23 WELL-BEING OF OUR COMMUNITY. WE FURTHER DETERMINE THAT THE
24 TOTAL COMBINED EFFORTS OF THE FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT
25 REPORT TO SOLVE OR MITIGATE THIS POTENTIAL HARM TO BE VAGUE,



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1 UNCLEAR AND FUNDAMENTALLY UNWORKABLE. AND I'LL TURN IN THE
2 REST OF MY COMMENT FOR THE RECORD.

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** ALL RIGHT. STEVE WHEATCROFT? CAN YOU GET THE
5 REST OF MR. THOMAS' TESTIMONY? WE'LL MAKE IT PART OF THE
6 RECORD. MR. COLMAN?

7

8 **GEORGE COLMAN:** YES. GEORGE COLMAN. IN VIEW OF THE FACT THAT WE
9 ARE LIMITED, MADAME CHAIRMAN AND SUPERVISORS, I'LL TRY AND-- I
10 ALSO HAVE A HANDOUT TO TURN IN TO WHAT I AM GOING TO SPEAK.
11 BUT ONE POINT I WANT TO MAKE IS FIRST OF ALL THANK YOU FOR
12 GIVING US A RESTORATION BOND. AT LEAST A PORTION OF ONE OF THE
13 THINGS WE ASKED FOR. SECONDLY, I THINK THE REVISED CONDITIONS
14 THAT YOU HAVE BEFORE YOU TODAY ON THE MOTION REQUIRE
15 ADDITIONAL TIME FOR PUBLIC REVIEW AND COMMENT. AN APPROVAL
16 TODAY WILL CREATE WHAT I THINK IS A LACK OF PROCEDURAL DUE
17 PROCESS AS IT EVIDENCES A FAILURE TO PRODUCE-- PROVIDE A FAIR
18 ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING UNDER OUR CALIFORNIA CODES. THESE
19 REVISED CONDITIONS WERE DISCUSSED WITH SUPERVISOR
20 YAROSLAVSKY'S OFFICE ON THE 13TH OF OCTOBER, RESUBMITTED TO
21 THE CITY OF AGOURA HILLS AROUND THE 25TH, 28TH OF OCTOBER.
22 GIVEN TO THE HOMEOWNERS ON NOVEMBER 4TH. SO THE TIME WAS
23 INSIGNIFICANT FOR US TO HAVE PUBLIC COMMENT TO ALL THE
24 CONDITIONS WITH ALL THE CHANGES. MY TIME IS UP BUT I WILL
25 SUBMIT MY DOCUMENTATION.

2 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. COLMAN, ALMOST EVERY ONE OF THE CHANGES
3 ARE CHANGES YOUR COMMUNITY ASKED FOR. SO THEY SHOULD NOT COME
4 AS A SURPRISE. MR. ANGEL?

5

6 **ALYSE LAZAR:** GOOD MORNING. ALYSE LAZAR, I REPRESENT SAVE SANTA
7 MONICA MOUNTAINS. WE ARE OPPOSED TO THE CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL
8 BECAUSE THEY DON'T GO FAR ENOUGH TO PROTECT THE HEALTH, SAFETY
9 AND WELFARE OF THE FUTURE STUDENTS OF THIS SCHOOL. THE HESCHEL
10 PROJECT IS BUILD ON A LIQUEFACTION SEISMIC ZONE ACCORDING TO
11 NATIONAL GEOLOGICAL MAPS. CONSEQUENTLY THE PROJECT HAS NOT
12 TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION THE IMPLICATIONS FOR EARTHQUAKE
13 SAFETY AND ALSO FOR SEEPAGE OF DANGEROUS WASTE ONTO THE SITE.
14 THE SITE IS LESS THAN THREE QUARTERS OF A MILE FROM THE
15 CALABASAS LANDFILL WHERE ROCADYNE AND OTHERS DUMPED EXTREMELY
16 DANGEROUS LIQUID WASTE LONG BEFORE SHALLOW LINERS WERE
17 INSTALLED ON ONLY PARTS OF THE LANDFILL. HESCHEL HAS NEVER
18 BEEN REQUIRED TO TEST THE SOIL, THE AIR, THE SOIL GASES OR THE
19 GROUND WATER ON ITS PROPERTY FOR ANY DANGEROUS CONTAMINANTS.
20 THEREFORE TODAY THIS BOARD HAS NO INFORMATION WHETHER THIS
21 SITE WILL BECOME ANOTHER BELMONT OR IT WILL BE SAFE FOR
22 CHILDREN. BASED ON THESE COMBINATION OF FACTORS, IT IS
23 ESSENTIAL THAT A HEALTH RISK ASSESSMENT OF AIR, SOIL, SOIL
24 GASES AND WATER BE MANDATED FOR A PRECONDITION OF ANY
25 DEVELOPMENT. I DO HAVE WRITTEN COMMENTS AND ALSO NEW



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1 INFORMATION ABOUT WILDLIFE WATER SUPPLIES THAT NEED TO BE
2 PROTECTED. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR TIME.

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU. MR. ANGEL?

5

6 **FRANK ANGEL:** MR. CHAIRMAN, HONORABLE SUPERVISORS, I'M JUST
7 GOING TO HIT ONE IMPORTANT POINT THAT DEALS WITH CONDITION 76
8 OF OUR COMMENTS AND THAT IS, FIRST AND FOREMOST CAL TRANS HAS
9 ALWAYS TREATED THE MITIGATION REQUIRED WITHIN ITS
10 JURISDICTION, INCLUDING THE TWO-LANE ROUNDABOUT AS A
11 MITIGATION FOR DIRECT PROJECT IMPACTS NOT CUMULATIVE IMPACTS.
12 SO THERE'S A MAJOR DISCREPANCY WHICH EXPLAINS IN PART WHY
13 WE'RE ARGUING DEFERRED MITIGATION OCCURS HERE BECAUSE THE
14 BOARD TREATS IT AS A CUMULATIVE IMPACT. SECONDLY, EVEN IF IT
15 WERE A CUMULATIVE IMPACT, IT IS VERY UNCLEAR, THERE IS NO
16 REASONING, NO ANALYSIS THAT LEADS TO THE 10.6 PERCENT
17 DETERMINATION AND, IN FACT, THE 10 PERCENT, IF THAT IS A FAIR
18 SHARE, WHY IS IT CAPPED AT \$2.5 MILLION? BECAUSE IF THE COSTS
19 GO, SAY, 30 MILLION OR 40 MILLION, THEN THEY'RE BEING CAPPED
20 AT 2.5 MILLION, SO IT IS NO LONGER A FAIR SHARE. THERE IS SOME
21 MAJOR LEGAL PROBLEMS WITH THIS MITIGATION. AND LASTLY ALSO IS
22 THE TIMING WITH IT BECAUSE IT IS NOT TIMED TO BE IN PLACE AS
23 THE FULL ENROLLMENT 750-STUDENT CAMPUS GOES INTO PLACE. COURTS
24 HAVE BEEN LOOKING AT THE ISSUE OF TRAFFIC IMPACT MITIGATION



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1 VERY STRICTLY IN RECENT YEARS. AND THIS IS NOT A FINAL PRODUCT
2 THAT WE THINK WILL PASS MUSTER. THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN.

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU MR. ANGEL. THANK YOU ALL FOR
5 STICKING TO THE TIME. I'M GOING TO ASK THE SAME OF THE
6 PROPONENTS. RICHARD WENTZ, BEN REZNIK. TAMMY WEISER AND ARNOLD
7 SACHS. WHO'S GOING TO GO FIRST? MISS WEISER?

8

9 **TAMMY WEISER:** GOOD MORNING. I'M TAMMY WEISER, I'M HEAD OF
10 SCHOOL OF HESCHEL WEST DAY SCHOOL. I RECENTLY RETURNED FROM
11 WASHINGTON, D.C. WHERE WE WERE AWARDED THE "NO CHILD LEFT
12 BEHIND" BLUE RIBBON AWARD FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF
13 EDUCATION. WE ARE THRILLED TO SHARE THAT AS A LEADER AND AN
14 EDUCATIONAL ROLE MODEL TO THE CONEJO VALLEY. AT HESCHEL WEST,
15 WE TEACH OUR STUDENTS TO DO THE RIGHT THINGS AND TO DO THINGS
16 RIGHT. AND IN THAT VEIN, WE LOOK FORWARD TO BEING PART OF THE
17 COMMUNITY, WORKING WITH THE CITY OF AGOURA HILLS, THE ADJACENT
18 HOMEOWNERS AND ALL NEIGHBORS AS WE BUILD A SCHOOL THAT WE LOOK
19 FORWARD TO WORKING WITH THEM TOGETHER. THANK YOU.

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU. MR. WENTZ.

23 **RICHARD WENTZ:** MY NAME IS RICHARD WENTZ, AND I HAVE BEEN A
24 BOARD MEMBER REPRESENTING THE SCHOOL IN THE ENTITLEMENTS.
25 MADAME CHAIR, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, FIRST I'D LIKE TO THANK



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1 THE COUNTY STAFF. THIS HAS BEEN AN ENORMOUSLY LONG PROCESS.
2 AND COUNTY STAFF HAS WORKED WITH US VERY, VERY WELL AND VERY
3 PRODUCTIVELY OVER THE YEARS TO MAKE THIS A VERY GOOD PROJECT
4 FOR THE ENTIRE COMMUNITY. I WANTED JUST TO POINT OUT THE

14 CONGRESSMAN BRAD SHERMAN'S OFFICE ALL HAVE LETTERS OF SUPPORT
15 IN THE RECORD. AND THIS IS JUST A PORTION OF LETTERS OF
16 SUPORT. THERE IS HUNDREDS OF LETTERS OF SUPPORT. WE'RE ALSO
17 SUPPORTED BY THE WESTLAKE OAK PARK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE,
18 REPRESENTING MORE THAN 400 BUSINESSES AND THERE ARE LETTERS OF
19 SUPPORT FROM COUNTRYWIDE, BANK OF AMERICA, K SWISS, ARTS
20 MORTGAGE AND MANY, MANY OTHER BUSINESSES IN THE AREA. THIS IS
21 GOING TO BE A WONDERFUL PROJECT. WE UNDERSTAND OUR NEIGHBORS

BEN REZNIK: GOOD MORNING. BEN REZNIK, WITH JEFFER, MANGELS, BUTLER AND MARMARO, REPRESENTING HESCHEL WEST. THE APPLICATION FOR THIS PROJECT WAS FILED IN 1998. THAT'S IN THE LAST CENTURY, LAST MILLENNIUM. SINCE THAT TIME, THERE HAVE BEEN MANY, MANY PROJECT REVISIONS AS A RESULT OF DIRECT COMMUNITY INPUT, NEGOTIATIONS WITH COMMUNITIES, NEGOTIATIONS WITH COUNTY STAFF, NO LESS THAN FIVE PLANNING COMMISSION MEETINGS AND THE PLANNING COMMISSION DID APPROVE THE PROJECT. THIS IS PROBABLY- - I'VE DONE MANY, MANY CHURCHES, SYNAGOGUES, SCHOOLS, RELIGIOUS, NON IN MY 30 YEARS OF PRACTICE. 10 BECAUSE THERE WILL BE A MID AFTERNOON TRAFFIC LIKE 12:00
11 TRAFFIC MITIGATION? HAS THAT BEEN ADDRESSED? MORNING,
12 AFTERNOON, MID AFTERNOON AND NIGHT? JUST OUT OF CURIOSITY.
13 SAME THING MIGHT OCCUR HERE WITH A MORNING SESSION OF
14 PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN AND AN AFTERNOON SESSION OF
15 PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN, WHICH WILL ACTUALLY BE MORE THAN
16 750 STUDENTS BUT ONLY AT ONE TIME 750 STUDENTS. THANK YOU FOR
17 YOUR TIME, YOUR ANSWERS AND ATTENTION.

19 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU. MADAME CHAIR, I THINK THAT CLOSES
20 THE PUBLIC HEARING. WELL IT IS NOT A PUBLIC HEARING. BUT THAT

4 **BILL WINTER:** AGAIN, BILL WINTER WITH PUBLIC WORKS. YES,
5 SUPERVISOR, THE PROJECT CONDITIONS DO REQUIRE FULL MITIGATION
6 BY THE APPLICANT OF THEIR TRAFFIC IMPACTS.

7

8 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** DOES THE FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT,
9 INCLUDING COMMENTS RECEIVED FROM CAL TRANS AS PART OF THE
10 ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW OF THIS PROJE, T FIND THAT THE THREE
11 PHASE FIVE WAY TRAFFIC SIGNAL CAN MITIGATE THE FULL SIZED 750-
12 STUDENT SCHOOL?

13

14 **BILL WINTER:** YES, THE COMMENT WAS RECEIVED FROM CAL TRANS AND
15 YES, IT DOES ADDRESS THE TRAFFIC SIGNAL.

16

17 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** HOW DOES THE FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT
18 REPORT ACCOUNT FOR CUMULATIVE TRAFFIC GROWTH IN THE REGION OF
19 THE TYPE RAISED IN MR. ANGEL'S COMMENT LETTER WE HAVE
20 RECEIVED?

21

22 **BILL WINTER:** POSSIBLY IN TWO WAYS. ONE IN THE TRAFFIC STUDY,

4 IN THE PLANNING FOR THAT INTERSECTION, AS WELL.

6 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU. IS THERE SOMEBODY FROM THE
7 SANITATION DISTRICT HERE?

9 **BOB ASGIAN:** YES.

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** COULD YOU IDENTIFY YOURSELF.

12

13 **BOB ASGIAN:** BOB ASGIAN, L.A. COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** TWO QUICK QUESTIONS. DOES THE COUNTY
16 SANITATION DISTRICT AND OTHER AGENCIES MONITOR WATER QUALITY
17 SURROUNDING THE LANDFILL ON A REGULAR BASIS TO ENSURE THAT THE
18 LANDFILL IS NOT CAUSING LANDFILL OR WATER SOIL CONTAMINATION?

19

20 **BOB ASGIAN:** YES, WE DO.

21

22 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** HAVE ANY OF THESE TEST RESULTS SHOWN THAT
23 THE LANDFILL WILL CAUSE THE POTENTIAL FOR HEALTH RISK TO THE
24 HESCHEL SCHOOL STUDENTS OR STAFF, WHETHER DIRECTLY THROUGH



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1 CONTAMINATED SOIL OR WATER, OR WATER THROUGH VAPOR INTRUSION
2 OR ANY OTHER KNOWN FACTOR?

3

4 **BOB ASGIAN:** NONE OF THE TESTS INDICATE THAT.

5

6 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** DOES THE SURROUNDING COMMUNITY AT ALL
7 JEOPARDIZED THE ABILITY OF-- ANY TEST RESULTS INDICATE
8 JEOPARDY TO THE SURROUNDING EXISTING RESIDENTS WHO LIVE NEXT
9 TO THE LANDFILL SITE?

10

11 **BOB ASGIAN:** YES, WE MONITOR RIGHT ADJACENT TO SARATOGA HILLS
12 AND OTHER COMMUNITIES THERE, AND THERE ARE NO TEST RESULTS
13 THAT INDICATE THAT THEY'RE IN DANGER.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MADAME CHAIR, I WANT TO MAKE A COUPLE BRIEF
16 COMMENTS. AND I'M NOT GOING TO READ THE WHOLE MOTION. IT'S ON
17 THE GREEN SHEET. AND ANYBODY WHO WANTS TO REVIEW IT CAN TAKE A
18 LOOK AT IT, I'M SURE THEY HAVE REVIEWED IT AND LOOKED AT IT.
19 IT WILL TAKE A LOT OF TIME TO READ IT. BUT I DO WANT TO JUST
20 MAKE A COUPLE OF COMMENTS. MR. REZNIK HAS INDICATED THAT'S HE
21 BEEN INVOLVED IN A LOT OF SCHOOLS AND RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS.
22 I THINK THE ONLY PERSON WHO'S PROBABLY BEEN INVOLVED IN MORE
23 OF THEM IS ME. NOT ONLY HAS THIS BEEN THE LONGEST ONE OVER 10
24 YEARS SINCE IT WAS ORIGINALLY APPLIED FOR FOR THIS SCHOOL,
25 IT'S ALSO BEEN ONE OF THE MOST CONTENTIOUS, UNFORTUNATELY. I



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1 REGRET THAT IT HAD TO BE THAT WAY. I JUST WANT TO SAY TO THE
2 PEOPLE, I KNOW THERE WERE QUITE A FEW PEOPLE AT THE AGOURA
3 HILLS CITY COUNCIL THE OTHER NIGHT WHO CITED MY NAME, LET ME
4 JUST PUT IT THAT WAY. THEY'RE ALL GOOD PEOPLE. AND WE HAVE A
5 LOT OF RESPECT IN OUR OFFICE FOR ALL OF THE PEOPLE, THE

4 BOTH THE CRITICS AND THE SKEPTICS WILL COME BACK AND SAY IT
5 WASN'T AS WE THOUGHT IT WOULD BE. CONDITIONS HAVE BEEN
6 ADEQUATE. AND I THINK IN THIS CASE IF THEY'RE NOT ADEQUATE, I

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO MOVED.

10

11 **SUP. KNABE:** MADAME CHAIR, I'LL SECOND.

12

13 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SECONDED BY KNABE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
14 ORDERED.

15

16 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU, MADAME CHAIR. ITEM 23, THIS IS
17 THE STATE LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM. I HAVE TWO AMENDMENTS THAT I
18 WANT TO MAKE TO THIS, MADAME CHAIR. I THINK MR. ANTONOVICH HAS
19 ONE TOO, BUT LET ME START WITH MINE. FIRST AMENDMENT IS,
20 "JUVENILE COURT SCHOOLS PLAY A PIVOTAL ROLE IN THE EDUCATION
21 OF THE MOST AT RISK YOUTH IN THE STATE. JUVENILE COURT SCHOOLS
22 PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO STUDENTS PLACED BY THE COURTS
23 IN JUVENILE HALLS, JUVENILE HOMES, DAY CENTERS, CAMPS,
24 REGIONAL COMMUNITY EDUCATION CENTERS OR GROUP HOMES. THESE
25 STUDENTS ARE UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF THE JUVENILE COURT AND



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1 HAVE BEEN DETAINED AND ARE AWAITING JUDICIAL DISPENSATION OR
2 HAVE BEEN ADJUDICATED AND BEEN INCARCERATED BY THE COURT. FOR
3 MANY OF THESE STUDENTS THE JUVENILE COURT SCHOOLS WILL BE
4 THEIR FINAL OPPORTUNITY TO VEER WAY FROM FURTHER CRIMINAL
5 BEHAVIOR AND TO RETURN TO A MORE PROMISING FUTURE THROUGH
6 EDUCATION AND GOOD CITIZENSHIP. HOWEVER IN SPITE OF THE
7 CRITICAL NEED FOR THESE SCHOOLS, THE STATE'S CURRENT FUNDING
8 SYSTEM PLACES MANY LOCAL PROGRAMS IN JEOPARDY. UNFORTUNATELY
9 THE CURRENT FUNDING SYSTEM FAILS TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE
10 EXTRAORDINARY OPERATIONAL CONSTRAINTS OF THE JUVENILE COURT
11 SCHOOLS, THE NEEDS OF THIS UNIQUE POPULATION AND THE
12 INADEQUACY OF THE LIMIT BASED FUNDING MODEL. THE CURRENT
13 FUNDING SYSTEM FAILS TO TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION THE PRACTICAL
14 REALITIES OF PROVIDING SERVICES TO THESE STUDENTS RANGING FROM
15 THE UNPREDICTABILITY OF THEIR ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE TO
16 THEIR VASTLY DIFFERENT EDUCATIONAL NEEDS INCLUDING A HIGHER
17 PERCENTAGE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION NEEDS. IN SUMMARY, AS A RESULT
18 OF THE FAILURE OF THE CURRENT FUNDING SYSTEM TO ACCOUNT FOR
19 THESE COST INFLATING FACTORS, COUNTY OFFICES OF EDUCATION ARE
20 FACING GROWING FINANCIAL STRAINS IN MAINTAINING THEIR JUVENILE
21 COURT SCHOOLS. IN ORDER TO ADDRESS THE DEFICIENCIES OF THE
22 CURRENT JUVENILE COURT SCHOOL FUNDING SYSTEM, THE STATE SHOULD
23 ESTABLISH A COURT SCHOOL FUNDING MODEL THAT STABILIZES COUNTY
24 OFFICES OF EDUCATION FUNDING BY MOVING AWAY FROM THE AVERAGE
25 DAILY ATTENDANCE ONLY, THE A.D.A. ONLY FUNDING MODEL. THE



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1 CALIFORNIA COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT'S EDUCATIONAL SERVICES
2 ASSOCIATION IS CURRENTLY WORKING ON A PROPOSAL THAT WOULD
3 MODIFY THE CURRENT FUNDING FORMULA FOR JUVENILE SCHOOLS TO ONE
4 THAT IS BASED ON A BED UNIT ENHANCEMENT A.D.A. MODEL. THE
5 MODEL RECOGNIZES THE FULL COMPLEMENT OF TEACHING STAFF,
6 SUPPORT STAFF, MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES AND ADMINISTRATIVE
7 OVERHEAD THAT IS NEEDED TO OFFER INSTRUCTION TO A COMPLEMENT
8 OF STUDENTS RESIDING AT A JUVENILE HALL OR OTHER COURT SCHOOL
9 SETTING. THE COUNTY NEEDS TO SUPPORT THIS PROPOSAL AND WORK
10 WITH OUR LEGISLATURE AND C.C.S.E.S.A. TO ENSURE ITS ADOPTION.
11 MODIFYING THE CURRENT FUNDING FORMULA WILL CREATE, ENHANCE THE

23 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THAT'S ONE AMENDMENT.

25 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, DID YOU HAVE?

2 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I HAVE ONE MORE. HANG ON. SO THERE'S NO
3 OBJECTION TO THAT ONE?

5 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** NO.

6

7 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** LOOKING FOR THE-- THERE IT IS. TRY NOT TO
8 READ THE WHOLE THING THIS TIME "THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES HAS
9 SUPPORTED THE STATE'S SIGNIFICANT EFFORTS TO ADDRESS GLOBAL
10 WARMING THROUGH THE PASSAGE OF GROUNDBREAKING STATE LAWS. THIS
11 LEGISLATION HAS INCLUDED THE COUNTY-SUPPORTED A.B.-32 ALSO
12 KNOWN AS 'GLOBAL WARMING SOLUTIONS ACT OF 2006.' COUNTY
13 SUPPORTED S.B.-375 AND S.B.-97 WHICH MANDATED THAT THE STATE
14 DEVELOP CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT GUIDELINES
15 REGARDING HOW C.E.Q.A. DOCUMENTS SHOULD ACCOUNT FOR AND
16 MITIGATE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS CREATED BY PROJECTS SUCH TO
17 THE C.E.Q.A. REVIEW. WITH ALL THREE PIECES OF LEGISLATION
18 ESTABLISHED WORTHWHILE-- WHILE ALL THREE PIECES OF LEGISLATION

19

20 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** WE WANT IT TO BE DONE. SO IT SEEMS TO ME WE
21 SHOULD NEGOTIATE SOME KIND OF A TRANSFER TO THE STATE, THEN,
22 OF MOSS FOR THOSE FUNDS.

13 WOULD BE A SUBSTITUTE FOR THE ITEM SO THAT WE'RE NOT GOING TO
14 SEND A LETTER.

16 **SUP. MOLINA:** EXACTLY. THAT'S WHAT IT IS, TO PREVENT THEM FROM
17 SENDING THE LETTER TO SAY WE GIVE UP, BUT INSTEAD LET'S TAKE
18 ANOTHER APPROACH AT IT.

20 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I SECOND THAT.

21

22 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THAT YOU HAVE CONVERSATIONS WITH THE STATE
23 TO DETERMINE IF THEY WISH TO SUBSTITUTE IN.

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1 **C.E.O. FUJIOKA:** YES. THE DIFFICULTY IS, WE UNDERSTAND THE

20 **CHRIS CARLOS:** MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, GOOD MORNING. I'M CHRIS

22 I WANT TO COMMEND THE COUNTY'S PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT STAFF

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1 THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT HAS DEVELOPED AN R.F.P PROCESS
2 THAT IS AMONG THE MOST STRINGENT ANYWHERE IN THE STATE OF
3 CALIFORNIA. IT IS TOUGH BUT IT IS FAIR. IT IS DESIGNED TO

14 THANK YOU VERY MUCH. AS ALWAYS I'M AVAILABLE FOR ANY

17 **SUP. KNABE:** SUZANNE AND THEN I'D ASK RONNIE JONES TO JOIN US
18 UP HERE.

20 **SUZANNE FRATTO:** GOOD MORNING AND THANK YOU, MR. KNABE AND
21 SUPERVISORS. MY NAME IS SUZANNE FRATTO, AND I'M A 20-YEAR PLUS
22 RESIDENT IN HACIENDA HEIGHTS. I DID RECEIVE THE ORIGINAL

21 **SUP. KNABE:** I HAVE SOME ADJOURNMENT MOTIONS. FIRST OF ALL, AND
22 THIS WILL BE ALL MEMBERS, CAME TO MY ATTENTION I THINK LAST
23 WEEK AT THE COLISEUM COMMISSION THAT MR. CRAIG FERTIG PASSED
24 AWAY. A 1964 U.S.C. STAR QUARTERBACK, GREW UP IN HUNTINGTON
25 PARK WHERE HIS FATHER WAS A POLICE CHIEF. HE WAS AN ALL-CITY



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1 QUARTERBACK AT HUNTINGTON PARK, SERVED AS ASSISTANT COACH AT
2 U.S.C., ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTER. WAS ALSO A TROJAN
3 FOOTBALL BROADCASTER. AND ALSO HE WAS THE HEAD COACH AT OREGON
4 STATE FOR SEVERAL YEARS IN THE '70S. HE MARRIED NANCY HOOPER
5 HE MET AT S.C. IN 1964. THEY HAD CHILDREN, MARK AND JENNIFER.
6 HE IS THE UNCLE OF FORMER U.S.C. AND N.F.L. QUARTERBACK TODD
7 MARINOVICH. HE BRIEFLY RETURNED TO COACHING AT ESTANCIA HIGH
8 SCHOOL IN COSTA MESA BEFORE HIS PASSING. SURVIVED BY HIS SON
9 MARC, MOTHER VIRGINIA, SISTER TRUDI, AND COMPANION MARGARET
10 O'DONNELL. AND ALSO THAT WE ADJOURN IN MEMORY OF A LONG-TIME
11 ADVOCATE FOR CHILDREN HAL BROWN. HE WAS A SUCCESSFUL
12 BUSINESSMAN, A LONG TIME VOICE FOR THE BETTERMENT OF CHILDREN
13 HERE IN THE COUNTY. HE PASSED AWAY LAST WEEK AFTER A LENGTHY
14 ILLNESS. HE WAS ONE OF OUR ORIGINAL CHILDREN'S SERVICE
15 COMMISSIONERS. HE ALSO COFOUNDED THE FRIENDS OF CHILD
16 ADVOCATES AS WELL AS PASSIONATELY SERVED AS A CHILD ADVOCATE
17 HIMSELF. THE FRIENDS OF CHILD ADVOCATES AND CHILD ADVOCATES
18 OFFICE ALSO WISHES TO SET UP A HAL BROWN MEMORIAL FUND. HE IS
19 SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE GERI, THREE CHILDREN AND SEVERAL
20 GRANDCHILDREN, AND I WOULD ASK ALL MEMBERS TO JOIN ME.

21

22 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ALL MEMBERS.

23

24 **SUP. KNABE:** ALSO THAT WE ADJOURN IN MEMORY OF BEATRICE MARY
25 ELIZABETH THOMPSON, A LONG TIME RESIDENT OF MANHATTAN BEACH.



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1 SHE WAS A VERY QUIET PERSON WHO LOVED HER FAMILY. SPENT MANY
2 HAPPY HOURS WITH THEM, ALSO READING AND SUPPORTING HER CHURCH.
3 SHE TOOK COMFORT AND FAITH AND WAS A DEVOTED MEMBER OF THE
4 AMERICAN MARTYRS CHURCH WORKING WITH THE ALTAR SOCIETY AND THE
5 55 PLUS CLUBS. SHE IS SURVIVED BY HER DEVOTED HUSBAND OF 58
6 YEARS, DAVID, CHILDREN DAVID, CYNDI AND DENISE. AND THOSE WERE
7 MY ADJOURNMENTS, MADAME CHAIR. I DO HAVE A MOTION, A REWARD
8 MOTION. ON NOVEMBER 2ND, 2008, A QUINTUPLE MURDER OCCURRED IN
9 THE CITY OF LONG BEACH IN A HOMELESS ENCAMPMENT. THE
10 INVESTIGATION STARTED WITH AN ANONYMOUS CALLER WHO REPORTED
11 THE CRIME. THE CALLER GAVE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION AND LOCATION
12 WHICH LED C.H.P. OFFICERS TO THE CRIME SCENE. ARRIVING
13 OFFICERS FOUND FIVE PEOPLE DEAD FROM GUNSHOT WOUNDS INSIDE OF
14 A HOMELESS ENCAMPMENT ALONG THE SOUTHBOUND SIDE OF THE 405
15 FREEWAY AT THE SANTA FE OFF RAMP. THE FOLLOWING RESIDENTS OF
16 LOS ANGELES COUNTY WERE IDENTIFIED AS THE VICTIMS OF THE
17 MURDER: CATHERINE VERDON, FROM LONG BEACH, VANESSA MALAPULI
18 FROM CARSON, JOSE VELANCALA FROM LONG BEACH, FREDERICK
19 NEWMEYER FROM LONG BEACH AND HAMID SHAREF FROM SIGNAL HILL. NO
20 ONE HAS BEEN ARRESTED IN THE CASE, ALTHOUGH THE ORIGINAL
21 CALLING PARTY HAS COME FORWARD. ADDITIONAL WITNESSES HAVE NOT
22 COME FORWARD. THE LONG BEACH POLICE DEPARTMENT AND
23 INVESTIGATORS CONTACTED OUR OFFICE AND SAID IT WOULD BE
24 BENEFICIAL TO OFFER A REWARD IN THIS CASE, WHICH MAY PROMPT
25 RELUCTANT WITNESSES TO COME FORWARD TO PROVIDE INFORMATION FOR



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1 THE FOLKS THAT WERE RESPONSIBLE FOR THIS HORRIBLE CRIME. SO I
2 WOULD MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OFFER A \$20,000
3 REWARD FOR INFORMATION LEADING TO THE ARREST AND CONVICTION OF
4 THE PERPETRATORS OF THESE FIVE MURDERS.

5

6 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SECONDED BY MOLINA. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
7 ORDERED.

8

9 **SUP. KNABE:** AND THEN, MADAME CHAIR, I'M HOLDING--

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I JUST WANTED TO READ IN, CAN I READ?

12

13 **SUP. KNABE:** YES.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MY TIME, THANKS. I JUST HAVE-- MR.
16 ANTONOVICH AND I HAVE TWO MOTIONS, I WON'T READ THEM, JUST THE
17 RESOLVED PART. THAT DEALS WITH THE FIRES OVER THE WEEKEND. "WE
18 MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS INSTRUCT THE COUNTY FIRE
19 DEPARTMENT AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO PREPARE
20 RECOMMENDATIONS FOR CHANGES IN THE APPLICABLE COUNTY CODES FOR
21 MOBILE HOME AND MOBILE HOME PARKS AND HIGH FIRE HAZARD AREAS
22 THAT REDUCE THEIR VULNERABILITY TO FIRE. FURTHER MOVE THAT THE
23 COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENT REVIEW WATER FLOW, FUEL MODIFICATION,
24 AND BRUSH CLEARANCE REQUIREMENTS THAT RELATE TO MOBILE HOME
25 PARKS AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS ON HOW THESE CODES CAN BE



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1 STRENGTHENED OR BETTER ENFORCED IN THE INTEREST OF SAFETY OF
2 THESE COMMUNITIES. FURTHER MOVE THE COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENT
3 PREPARE THESE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE BOARD'S CONSIDERATION
4 WITHIN 60 DAYS." THAT'S A REPORT BACK. SECONDLY, WE HAVE TO
5 RATIFY THE DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY. SO "MR. ANTONOVICH AND I
6 MOVE THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RATIFY THE ATTACHED
7 PROCLAMATION OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY MADE ON NOVEMBER 15TH, 2008
8 FOR THE FIRE STARTED IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY AND ON NOVEMBER
9 14TH, 2008. THIS PROCLAMATION SHALL REMAIN IN EFFECT UNTIL ITS
10 TERMINATION IS PROCLAIMED BY THE BOARD. APPROVE AND INSTRUCT
11 THE CHAIR TO SIGN UPON BOARD APPROVAL THE ATTACHED
12 PROCLAMATION OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR LOS ANGELES COUNTY,
13 FORWARD A COPY OF THE PROCLAMATION TO THE GOVERNOR OF
14 CALIFORNIA WITH THE REQUEST THAT HE PROCLAIM THE EXISTENCE OF
15 A STATE OF EMERGENCY THROUGHOUT THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY.
16 REQUEST THAT THE GOVERNOR OF CALIFORNIA FORWARD THE
17 PROCLAMATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY FOR PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED
18 STATES WITH THE REQUEST THAT HE MAKE A DECLARATION OF MAJOR
19 EMERGENCY. FORWARD A COPY OF THE PROCLAMATION TO THE DIRECTOR
20 OF THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE OF EMERGENCY SERVICES WITH A REQUEST
21 THAT THE DIRECTOR FIND IT ACCEPTABLE IN ACCORDANCE WITH STATE
22 LAW, AND FINALLY INSTRUCT THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER TO
23 PROVIDE STATUS REPORTS WHILE THE EMERGENCY RESTORATION ACTIONS
24 ARE UNDERWAY." THIS IS A FORMALITY THAT MR. FUJIOKA SIGNED THE
25 PROCLAMATION ON SATURDAY BUT WE NEED TO RATIFY IT.

2 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** I'LL SECOND IT. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
3 ORDERED.

4

5 **SUP. KNABE:** JUST IN THE THAT VEIN BEFORE I CALL UP MY OTHER
6 ITEM, THERE WERE SOME HEROIC EFFORTS AND THERE WAS A LOT OF--
7 I KNOW THAT THE REST OF YOU WILL ADDRESS IT, AS WELL, TOO, BUT
8 A LOT OF DAMAGE AND A LOT OF TRAGEDY OUT THERE, BUT THERE WERE
9 SOME TRULY HEROIC EFFORTS. I WAS OUT YESTERDAY TO THE DIAMOND
10 BAR PART OF THAT TRI-COUNTY FIRE AND LOOKING AT THAT SITUATION
11 AND WHAT THE FIRE DEPARTMENT DID IN THE MIDDLE OF THE NIGHT TO
12 SAVE THOSE PEOPLE THAT HAD BEEN EVACUATED IN DIAMOND BAR WAS
13 DOING BULLDOZERS IN THE MIDDLE OF THE NIGHT WITH JUST
14 HEADLIGHTS, WAS ABSOLUTELY HEROIC. SO I THINK ONCE AGAIN
15 THROUGH OUR FIREFIGHTERS, THROUGH OUR POLICE DEPARTMENT,
16 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, L.A.P.D., L.A. FIRE, THE MUTUAL AID
17 PACTS THAT WE HAVE HERE IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES ARE THE
18 BEST IN THE THE NATION. ALTHOUGH WE ARE NOT 100 PERCENT
19 SUCCESSFUL SOMETIMES IN SAVING LOSS OF PROPERTY, WHATEVER IT
20 MAY BE, IT WAS JUST AN INCREDIBLE EFFORT BY EVERYONE. I MEAN
21 AS I UNDERSTAND IT, WE HAVEN'T SEEN ANYTHING LIKE THIS IN THE
22 LAST 75, 80, 85 YEARS.

23

24 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IF I CAN JUST ADD ONE WORD TO MR. KNABE. I
25 AGREE WITH EVERYTHING YOU SAID. IT WAS AN INTERESTING



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1 DEVELOPMENT ON SATURDAY WHEN THE OAK RIDGE ESTATES MOBILE HOME
2 PARK WENT UP IN FLAMES. CLOSE TO 500 UNITS, ACTUALLY HOMES,
3 WERE DESTROYED, LEVELED TO THE GROUND. IT LOOKED LIKE A TOTAL
4 MASS DESTRUCTION OF WORLD WAR II. I'VE NEVER SEEN ANYTHING
5 QUITE LIKE IT. THAT'S MORE HOMES THAT WERE DESTROYED IN THE
6 BEL AIR FIRE IN 1961. THAT WAS THE FIRST FIRE I CAN RECALL AS
7 A KID. IT STILL IS THE GOLD STANDARD AS FAR AS WORST FIRES IN
8 THE HISTORY OF LOS ANGELES CITY ARE CONCERNED. MORE HOMES WERE
9 BURNED TO THE GROUND BY THIS FIRE THAN WERE BURNED IN THE BEL
10 AIR FIRE, AND JUST IN THAT ONE LITTLE CONCENTRATED AREA. I
11 SAID ON SATURDAY THAT WHETHER YOU LIVE IN A MOBILE HOME OR
12 WHETHER YOU LIVE IN AN ESTATE IN BEL AIR, WHEN YOUR HOME IS
13 DESTROYED, THE DEVASTATION IS THE SAME IN EVERY RESPECT. AND
14 OUR HEARTS GO OUT TO THOSE FOLKS, INCLUDING A NUMBER OF COUNTY
15 EMPLOYEES WHO LIVE THERE, COUNTY FIRE CAPTAIN LIVED THERE, THE
16 WORK THAT ALL THE FIREFIGHTERS DID, AND SOME LAW ENFORCEMENT
17 WHO CAME IN TO RESCUE PEOPLE, WERE NOTHING SHORT, AS YOU SAY,
18 HEROIC. SO I WANT TO ADD MY THANKS, AS WE ALL DO, AT A TIME
19 LIKE THIS TO THE FIRST RESPONDERS. THEY ARE THE BEST. AND WE
20 ARE LUCKY TO HAVE THEM. WE SHOULDN'T TAKE THEM FOR GRANTED.
21 THANK YOU.

22

23 **C.E.O. FUJIOKA:** AND IF I COULD VERY QUICKLY, AT OLIVE VIEW
24 HOSPITAL, WE KNEW THAT THEY HAD SOME DIFFICULTIES WITH THE
25 EMERGENCY SYSTEM. BUT WE HAVE PICTURES THAT OUR D.H.S.



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1 MANAGEMENT TEAM HAS THAT SHOWED THE FIRE LITERALLY, THE
2 PLANTERS AT THE OUTSIDE THE ENTRANCE OF THE EMERGENCY ROOM
3 IMMEDIATELY ADJACENT TO THE BUILDING WERE ON FIRE. THEY HAD
4 FLAMES AROUND THE ENTIRE FACILITY. WHAT THE STAFF DID INSIDE
5 TO MAINTAIN ORDER, TO CALM THE PATIENTS AND TO MAKE SURE THEY
6 WERE SECURE WAS TRULY EXCEPTIONAL. BECAUSE THEY COULD LOOK OUT
7 THE DOORS AS CLOSE AS I AM TO SUPERVISOR MOLINA AND SEE
8 FLAMES, FAIRLY LARGE FLAMES, RIGHT OUTSIDE THE FRONT DOOR. BUT
9 THEY STILL KEPT THEIR FOCUS AND TOOK CARE OF THEIR PATIENTS
10 AND FULFILLED THEIR DUTIES. THEY DID AN EXCEPTIONAL JOB.

11
12 **SUP. KNABE:** THANK YOU.

13
14 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THEY DID DO A JOB. WHO WAS MAKING THE
15 DECISION AS TO EVACUATION? WAS IT THE FIRE DEPARTMENT?

16
17 **C.E.O. FUJIOKA:** IT WAS PART FIRE BUT ALSO D.H.S. STAFF ON
18 SITE. AND WHAT PATIENTS, STARTING WITH THOSE ON VENTILATORS,
19 THOSE WHO WERE IN INTENSIVE CARE, THERE'S A WHOLE PROCESS,
20 THERE'S A TRIAGE PROCESS FOR DETERMINING WHO NEEDS, WHO COULD
21 STAY AND WHO MUST BE MOVED OUT VERY QUICKLY. AND THAT WAS
22 HANDLED IN AN EXCEPTIONAL MANNER. THE OUTCOMES ARE ALWAYS THE
23 FINAL MEASUREMENT, AND WE HAD SOME VERY, VERY POSITIVE
24 OUTCOMES. WHEN YOU THINK ABOUT THE BUILDINGS THAT WERE BURNED
25 ON THE PROPERTY AT OLIVE VIEW, LET ALONE THE FACT THE FIRE



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1 LITERALLY CAME UP TO THEIR MAIN ENTRANCE AT THE EMERGENCY
2 ROOM, TO KNOW THAT FOLKS INSIDE THE BUILDING STILL PERFORMED
3 AND CARRIED OUT THEIR DUTIES, THAT WAS TRULY EXCEPTIONAL,
4 ALSO.

5

6 **SUP. KNABE:** MADAME CHAIR, I HAVE A COUPLE OF OTHER ITEMS, IF
7 SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY IS THROUGH.

8

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I'M THROUGH.

10

11 **SUP. KNABE:** FIRST OF ALL I HAVE ITEM NUMBER 6. I JUST FEEL
12 THAT TO SORT OF BEGIN THE LAST FEW WEEKS OF THANK YOUS TO
13 SUPERVISOR BURKE. THIS IS THE RENAMING OF ADMIRALTY PARK IN
14 MARINA DEL REY TO THE YVONNE B. BURKE PARK, IN RECOGNITION OF
15 HER DEDICATED PUBLIC SERVICE THROUGHOUT HER PROFESSIONAL
16 CAREER OF OVER 15 YEARS, THE LAST 16 HERE AS A COLLEAGUE ON
17 THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

18

19 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** TWO PEOPLE HAVE ASKED TO SPEAK.

20

21 **SUP. KNABE:** THEY HAVE.

22

23 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ARNOLD SACHS AND JON NAHHAS.

24

25 **CLERK SACHI HAMAI:** I BELIEVE MR. NAHHAS HAS LEFT.

2 **SUP. KNABE:** YEAH, HE COULDN'T SHOW HIS D.V.D.

3

4 **ARNOLD SACHS:** THANK YOU, ARNOLD SACHS. VERY QUICK
5 CONGRATULATIONS, BUT I ALSO WOULD LIKE TO KNOW THAT I GUESS
6 THAT'S A NO ON CREATING SCRIPT WHEN YOUR FACE IS ON IT TO
7 HONOR THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS LIKE I SUGGESTED A COUPLE
8 MONTHS AGO.

9

10 **SUP. KNABE:** THANK YOU, ARNOLD, FOR YOUR WISDOM. [LAUGHTER.]

11

12 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** YOU CAN PUT MY FACE ON IT? MOVED BY KNABE.

13

14 **SUP. KNABE:** WITH THAT, MADAME CHAIR, I AM DULY HONORED TO MOVE
15 THAT MOTION. WITH THE RECORDATION OF THE SECOND BEING MY THREE
16 COLLEAGUES, SUPERVISOR MOLINA, YAROSLAVSKY AND ANTONOVICH.

17

18 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

19

20 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MADAME CHAIR, IF I COULD JUST ADD ONE
21 COMMENT TO THIS. YOU KNOW SUPERVISOR BURKE IS THE ONLY PERSON-
22 - THE ONLY PUBLIC OFFICIAL THAT I KNOW OF WHO HAD SOMETHING
23 NAMED AFTER HER IN MY DISTRICT THAT SHE VOLUNTEERED TO HAVE
24 TAKEN OFF, THE "YVONNE BURKE HEALTH CENTER" AT SANTA MONICA
25 WAS NAMED AFTER YVONNE BURKE, OBVIOUSLY. AND WHEN A DONOR CAME



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1 ALONG WHO WAS GOING TO MAKE A SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION AND A
2 NAMING OPPORTUNITY, YVONNE ALLOWED HER NAME TO BE VACATED FROM
3 THE NAME OF THE FACILITY, WHICH MOST POLITICIANS I KNOW WOULD
4 HAVE GONE KICKING AND SCREAMING AND WOULD NEVER HAVE EVEN
5 TOLERATED IT. AND SO I THINK IT'S DOUBLY APPROPRIATE IN THIS
6 CASE.

8 **SUP. KNABE:** VERY GOOD.

9

10 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU.

11

12 **SUP. KNABE:** ANYWAY, CONGRATULATIONS, YVONNE.

13

14 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.] I HAVE BEEN
15 RELUCTANT IN MOST CASES. THIS HAPPENS TO BE ONE THAT I'M NOT
16 RELUCTANT. [LAUGHTER.]

17

18 **SUP. KNABE:** YEAH. I EVEN ACED YOUR STAFF OUT ON THIS ONE. THEY
19 THOUGHT I WAS WRONG. BUT I WAS RIGHT. OKAY.

20

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** YOU'RE ALWAYS RIGHT.

22

23 **SUP. KNABE:** THANK YOU. I GOT THAT IN. IT'S RECORDED IN
24 POSTERITY THAT YOU SAID I WAS ALWAYS RIGHT.

25



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1 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** IT WAS ALL RIGHT.

2

3 **SUP. KNABE:** ONE OTHER THING, JUST SOME COMMENTS, ITEM 28. I
4 HELD. I'M GOING TO MOVE APPROVAL OF THAT. I'M NOT SURE-- I
5 DON'T THINK THAT HOWARD CAME OVER. I JUST WANT TO MAKE A
6 COUPLE POINTS BEFORE THIS MATTER IS APPROVED. OBVIOUSLY FIRST
7 AND FOREMOST, I WANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE AND THANK OUR PARTNERS AT
8 THE STATE AND L.A. CARE HEALTH PLAN. THIS PROJECT HAS BEEN
9 SEVERAL YEARS IN THE MAKING AND WILL BRING AT LEAST \$75
10 MILLION IN ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDING TO OUR HEALTH SYSTEM FOR
11 A TWO-YEAR PERIOD. IN THE LAST SEVERAL MONTHS, THE GOVERNOR'S
12 OFFICE HAS INITIATED SIMILAR EFFORTS THROUGHOUT THE STATE TO
13 BRING BADLY NEEDED FEDERAL HEALTHCARE DOLLARS HERE TO

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1 BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO ASSIST LOS ANGELES COUNTY IN
2 DEALING WITH THE INCREDIBLE BUDGET SHORTFALLS THAT WE FACE IN
3 OUR HEALTHCARE SYSTEM. AND WITH THOSE COMMENTS, MADAME CHAIR,
4 I WOULD MOVE APPROVAL OF THE ITEM.

5

6 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SECONDED BY MOLINA. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
7 ORDERED.

8

9 **SUP. KNABE:** MADAME CHAIR, THOSE ARE MY ITEMS.

10

11 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH FOR YOUR
12 ADJOURNMENTS?

13

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** I'D LIKE TO MOVE THAT WE ADJOURN IN MEMORY OF
15 FORMER LOS ANGELES COUNTY DEPUTY SHERIFF WALTER E. SHAW WHO
16 PASSED AWAY ON NOVEMBER 17TH. HIS LAST ASSIGNMENT WAS AT THE
17 NORWALK STATION. FRANCES COLE RESIDENT OF ANTELOPE VALLEY. SHE
18 WAS INVOLVED WITH VOLUNTEER WORK AT ANTELOPE VALLEY HOSPITAL,
19 MEMBER OF THE DESERT ALPHA AUXILIARY OF OF CHILDREN'S HOME
20 SOCIETY AND A CONTRIBUTING ARTIST TO MANY OF THE LOCAL
21 CHARITIES. SHE IS SURVIVED BY HER HUSBAND BOB AND DAUGHTER
22 SUSAN. RALPH CLEMENT EATON, A VETERAN OF THE KOREAN WAR. WAS
23 HEAD OF THE LOS ANGELES PARKS AND RECREATION AND THE
24 DEPARTMENT FOR 10 YEARS AND THE CITY OF MANHATTAN BEACH FOR 20
25 YEARS FOR THEIR DEPARTMENT OF PARKS RECREATION. HE IS SURVIVED



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1 BY HIS WIFE JOANN. AND AS WAS STATED FOR HAL BROWN, WHO WAS
2 QUITE INVOLVED IN COUNTY DEALING WITH CHILDREN'S ISSUES AND
3 LEADER IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR, AS WELL.

4

5 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SO ORDERED.

6

7 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND LET ME JUST STATE THAT LAST NIGHT, THE
8 CITIES OF VERNON AND SANTA CLARITA VALLEY WERE RECOGNIZED AS
9 THE MOST BUSINESS-FRIENDLY, VIBRANT CITIES IN THE COUNTY OF
10 LOS ANGELES. THERE WAS TOUGH COMPETITION WITH LA MIRADA, LONG
11 BEACH, CERRITOS AND WHO WERE THE OTHER CITIES, DON?

12

13 **SUP. KNABE:** I THINK THAT WAS IT.

14

15 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** ANYWAY, IT WAS A-- WE HAD OVER 700 PEOPLE AT
16 THE DINNER SPONSORED BY THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION,
17 BILL ALLEN, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, AND IT WAS A GOOD EVENT.
18 BUT IT WAS A COMPETITIVE AWARD, AND THEY WERE THE RECIPIENTS.
19 SO TO MAYOR MALBERG AND MAYOR KELLER, WE CONGRATULATE THEM AND
20 THEIR CITY BUREAUCRACY BECAUSE THEY ELIMINATE BUREAUCRACY AND
21 THEY TEND TO RESPOND TO THE CONSTITUENTS VERY EFFECTIVELY. AS
22 A RESULT, THEY'VE RECEIVED THAT-- WERE THE RECIPIENT OF THOSE
23 AWARDS. THE TRAGIC FIRE AT OLIVE VIEW WAS A CASE THAT REALLY
24 IMPACTED THE COMMUNITY. AND ONCE AGAIN SHOWS THE NEED WHY HOLY
25 CROSS HOSPITAL NEEDS TO HAVE THAT EXPANSION, BECAUSE ONCE



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1 AGAIN, HOLY CROSS HOSPITAL WAS THE RECIPIENT OF OUR PATIENTS
2 FROM OLIVE VIEW JUST AS THEY WERE THE PREVIOUS MONTH WITH THE
3 CHATSWORTH FIRE AND THE TRAIN WRECK. A WEEK AGO FRIDAY WE HAD
4 THE OLIVE VIEW FOUNDATION DINNER, WHICH TOMMY LASORDA WAS
5 RECOGNIZED FOR HIS CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES IN THE SAN FERNANDO
6 VALLEY. IT WAS A GREAT PRIVATE/PUBLIC PARTNERSHIP THAT OLIVE
7 VIEW HAD. AND THEN THE FOLLOWING WEEK THEY HAVE THE
8 DEVASTATING FIRE. BUT DUE TO THE SUPERB RESPONSE BY COUNTY
9 FIRE, HEALTH SERVICES HOSPITAL AND THE COUNTY POLICE STAFF WAS
10 ABLE TO EVACUATE THE MOST VULNERABLE PATIENTS AT OLIVE VIEW
11 WHEN FIRE THAT SURROUNDED THE FACILITY. EVACUEES FROM THE
12 NEONATAL INTENSIVE CARE, INTENSIVE CARE UNIT AND OTHER AT RISK
13 PATIENTS WERE TRANSPORTED TO OTHER AREA HOSPITALS AND OVERALL
14 DISRUPTION OF THE HEALTHCARE WAS MINIMAL. 40 PLUS BUILDINGS ON
15 THE HOSPITAL CAMPUS WERE DAMAGED, INCLUDING THE CHILDCARE
16 CENTER, WHICH WAS TOTALLY DESTROYED. FURTHERMORE, THERE
17 APPEARS TO HAVE BEEN A MECHANICAL FAILURE WHEN THE EMERGENCY
18 GENERATORS WERE ACTIVATED, DUE TO THE DESTRUCTION OF THE LINES
19 FROM THE FIRE. SO I MOVE AND NOW HAVE SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY
20 JOIN ME WITH THIS THAT THE BOARD DIRECT THE C.E.O. AND THE
21 I.S.D. DEPARTMENT AND DIRECTOR OF HEALTH SERVICES AND THE FIRE
22 CHIEF TO ASSESS THAT DAMAGE SUSTAINED BY THE CHILDCARE CENTER,
23 DEVELOPING PLANS FOR ITS RECONSTRUCTION, SECURING ALTERNATIVE
24 SITES FOR EMPLOYEES AT OLIVE VIEW U.C.L.A .MEDICAL CENTER TO
25 TAKE THEIR CHILDREN, REPORT ON THE INVENTORY OF THE 40 PLUS



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1 FACILITIES AND THEIR FUNCTIONS THAT WERE DAMAGED AT OLIVE
2 VIEW. THIS REPORT OUGHT TO INCLUDE BUSINESS RECOVERY ACTIONS
3 THAT ARE CURRENTLY UNDER WAY TO ENSURE THAT SERVICES ARE NOT
4 INTERRUPTED, EVALUATING A REPORT ON ANY AVAILABLE FUNDING FROM
5 THE STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR DISASTER RELIEF. DEVELOP
6 RECOMMENDATIONS TO LIMIT DAMAGE FROM FIRES THAT MAY OCCUR IN
7 THE FUTURE, CONSULTING WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO
8 HIRE AN APPROPRIATE CONSULTANT. PARTICIPATE IN THE ROOT CAUSE
9 ANALYSIS OF THE EMERGENCY GENERATORS AND THE FUEL PUMP SYSTEMS
10 AT OLIVE VIEW AND REPORT BACK IN TWO WEEKS. SO THIS IS JUST TO
11 BE A REPORT BACK IN TWO WEEKS TO THE BOARD.

12
13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SECOND.

14
15 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** WITHOUT OBJECTION.

16
17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND ON ITEM NUMBER 25? MR. BROWNING?

18
19 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** WE HAVE MARGARET LAUB, DOUG HOWARD, PAUL
20 HAYES AND ED ROMAN. PLEASE COME FORWARD. ALL RIGHT. PLEASE
21 STATE YOUR NAME. WHO WOULD LIKE TO GO FIRST?

22
23 **MARGARET LAUB:** I'LL GO FIRST, THANK YOU VERY MUCH. GOOD
24 MORNING. MY NAME IS MARGARET LAUB. AND AS P.S.I.'S C.E.O., I'M
25 HERE ON BEHALF OF OUR EMPLOYEES AND OUR BOARD TO LET YOU KNOW



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1 THAT THIS CONTRACT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO US AS IT REPRESENTS
2 THE CORE OF OUR MISSION, WHICH IS TO DO SOCIALLY USEFUL WORK.
3 I ASSURE YOU THAT BY SELECTING P.S.I. YOU ARE MAKING THE RIGHT
4 DECISION FOR THE PEOPLE OF YOUR COMMUNITY. WE ARE PROUD OF OUR
5 RECORD OF OUTSTANDING SERVICE AND THE GAIN PROGRAM WILL
6 RECEIVE NOTHING LESS FROM P.S.I. WE'RE READY TO GET STARTED
7 AND HAVE, TO THE BEST OF OUR ABILITY, DEMONSTRATED THE
8 STRENGTH OF OUR COMMITMENT TO L.A. COUNTY BY OUR GOOD FAITH
9 INVESTMENT OF TIME, PEOPLE AND RESOURCES IN A NUMBER OF PRE-
10 IMPLEMENTATION AND PRE-START UP ACTIVITIES. WE'RE EXCITED TO
11 BEGIN WORKING WITH YOUR COMMUNITY. I ASK YOU TO APPROVE THE
12 RECOMMENDATION, AND I PROMISE YOU OUR VERY BEST. THANK YOU.

13

14 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** PLEASE STATE YOUR NAME.

15

16 **DOUG HOWARD:** HI, MY NAME IS DOUG HOWARD, I'M A SENIOR VICE
17 PRESIDENT WITH P.S.I.. AND I WANTED TO LARGELY ECHO WHAT OUR
18 C.E.O. HAS STATED BUT REALLY ADD A FEW DETAILS. I SPENT MOST
19 OF MY ADULT LIFE IN HUMAN SERVICES. I SPENT 13 YEARS IN THE
20 IOWA DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES, INCLUDING FIVE YEARS
21 RUNNING THE STATE'S WELFARE PROGRAM, FOUR YEARS RUNNING THE
22 MICHIGAN STATE EQUIVALENT OF D.P.S.S. SO VERY FAMILIAR WITH
23 SOME OF THE SAME POLICY ISSUES. THREE YEARS HEADING AMERICAN
24 PUBLIC HUMAN ASSERTION SERVICES ASSOCIATION, YEAR AND A HALF
25 CONSULTING WITH STATES ON PERFORMANCE-BASED CONTRACTS. AND THE



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1 LAST 4 1/2 YEARS WORKING WITH P.S.I. IN THE OVER 30 STATES IN
2 WHICH WE DO BUSINESS. AND I WOULD SAY THAT THIS HAS BEEN A
3 VERY INTERESTING PROCESS, INTERESTING IN A NUMBER OF WAYS. I
4 WOULD TELL YOU FROM MY PERSPECTIVE JUST AS SUPERVISOR KNABE
5 NOTED ON THE TRASH COMPACT, THIS HAS BEEN A VERY RIGOROUS
6 PROCESS, THOSE WEREN'T YOUR EXACT WORDS, BUT IT'S REALLY THE
7 SAME PROCESS. THIS PROCESS BEGAN LAST SPRING. OBVIOUSLY IT'S
8 BEEN THROUGH A NUMBER OF PROTEST STEPS. WE HAVE WORKED AT
9 EVERY STEP TO PROVIDE INFORMATION. IT'S BEEN VERY INTERESTING
10 TO US BECAUSE NOT ONLY HAVE WE BEEN DEALING WITH PROCESS BUT
11 WE'VE DEALT WITH SOME BOTHERSOME ACCUSATIONS ALONG THE WAY,
12 SUCH AS THE FINANCIAL QUALIFICATIONS OF THE COMPANY. WE'VE
13 PROVIDED THE INFORMATION THAT SHOWS WE ARE A STRONG COMPANY,
14 HAVE THE CAPACITY. WE'VE RUN PROJECTS LARGER THAN THIS. WE
15 HAVE BEEN ATTACKED FOR AN ALLEGED LOST CONTRACT IN IOWA WHERE
16 IN FACT THE TRUTH OF THAT MATTER IS WE HAD A POTENTIAL PROJECT
17 THAT WAS TO START SERVICE IN JANUARY OF NEXT YEAR, IN THE LAST
18 MONTH THE STATE TALKED TO US ABOUT MOVING A DIFFERENT
19 DIRECTION. WE JUST IN THE THE LAST FEW WEEKS ENTERED INTO AN
20 AGREEMENT FOR MUTUAL TERMINATION. NO FAULT ON EITHER PARTY.
21 JUST DECIDED TO GO A DIFFERENT DIRECTION. THAT WAS A PROJECT
22 THAT WAS LARGELY TECHNOLOGY-RELIANT. AND WE'VE EVEN, I THINK,
23 BEEN ATTACKED A LITTLE ON OUR PERFORMANCE. AND WE'VE PROVIDED
24 A LOT OF PERFORMANCE BOTH IN TERMS OF THE PROPOSAL AND IN
25 TERMS IN FOLLOW UP WHERE WE SHOW WE DRIVE PERFORMANCE UP,



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1 PARTICULARLY IN OUR TENOR FOR GAIN-LIKE PROJECTS IN EVERY
2 STATE. ALL THIS TIME, DURING THIS TIME, I'VE BEEN VERY PROUD
3 OF THE WAY OUR COMPANY HAS RESPONDED. WE HAVE INVESTED A LOT
4 OF TIME AND MONEY AND RESOURCES, A LOT OF TIME AND MONEY AND
5 RESOURCES IN THIS PROJECT. AND IT'S NOT JUST IN THE PREPARING
6 A PROPOSAL. IT'S BEEN DOING THE THINGS THAT MARGARET ALLUDED
7 TO. WE HAVE A TEAM THAT MEETS EVERY MONDAY FOR THE LAST TWO
8 MONTHS TALKING ABOUT START UP ACTIVITIES. WE HAVE A TEAM OF
9 INTERNAL EXPERTS GETTING TOGETHER THIS WEEK TO DO PROCESS
10 MAPPING AROUND A WORK FLOW AND CLIENT FLOW. LAST WEEK THE
11 PROJECT MANAGER THAT WE'VE HIRED WHO HAS LOS ANGELES GAIN
12 EXPERIENCE, AND I MET WITH SOME REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
13 BUSINESS COMMUNITY AND ARE VERY EXCITED ABOUT THE POTENTIAL TO
14 ENTER INTO SOME PARTNERSHIPS TO BRING BOTH SOME GOOD JOBS AND
15 SOME TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES AND RECOGNIZE THAT NOT ONLY ARE
16 THE JOB SEEKERS A CUSTOMER BUT SO ARE EMPLOYERS. SO IT'S BEEN
17 A RIGOROUS PROCESS. WE HOPE THAT YOU RECOGNIZE THAT. WE'VE
18 RESPECTED THE PROCESS. WE ASK YOU TO. WE'RE VERY PLEASED TO
19 HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK TODAY AND APPRECIATE YOUR
20 SUPPORT. THANK YOU.

21
22 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. PLEASE STATE YOUR NAME.

23
24 **ED ROMAN:** HONORABLE SUPERVISORS, THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THIS
25 OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK ON BEHALF OF 85,000 CIVIL SERVANTS AND



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1 GOVERNMENT-SPONSORED EMPLOYEES. MY NAME IS ED ROMAN. I'M A
2 GAIN SERVICES WORKER. AND I HAVE BEEN EMPLOYED AT THE
3 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES FOR THE LAST 16 YEARS. 16
4 YEARS AGO WHEN I LEFT THE CAMPUS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF
5 CALIFORNIA AT SANTA CRUZ, I WAS INFORMED THAT THERE WAS A
6 SHORTAGE OF SOCIAL WORKERS AND NURSES IN THE STATE OF
7 CALIFORNIA, AND I CAME BACK HOME TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY TO
8 FOLLOW MY PASSION. MY PASSION WAS ABOUT HELPING TO IMPROVE
9 WORKING CONDITIONS AND TO CREATE EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES. AND
10 SO WE WOULD LIKE TO CONVEY OUR OPPOSITION TO CONTRACTING OUT
11 OF THE STATE MANDATED GAIN SOCIAL SERVICES PROGRAM. GAIN CASE
12 MANAGEMENT WORKERS PLAY AN IMPORTANT ROLE IN HELPING LOS
13 ANGELES COUNTY'S NEEDIEST CITIZENS OVERCOME BARRIERS TO
14 EMPLOYMENT AND ACHIEVE FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE. IN THE PAST,
15 SUPERVISOR MOLINA AND BURKE HAVE BOTH FOLLOWED GOOD PUBLIC
16 POLICY AND VOTED IN FAVOR OF HAVING COUNTY WORKERS PERFORM
17 GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT WORK. IT IS THE POSITION OF S.E.I.U.
18 LOCAL 721 THAT HAVING COUNTY WORKERS PERFORM THIS WORK IN
19 REGIONS 2 AND REGION 7 WILL PROMOTE QUALITY AND EFFICIENCY IN
20 THE PROVISIONS OF THE GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES.
21 REPRESENTATIVES FROM S.E.I.U. LOCAL 721 HAVE COME HERE BEFORE
22 THE BOARD ON PREVIOUS OCCASIONS TO MAKE THIS POINT. AND MANY
23 OF THE ARGUMENTS UTILIZED ON BOTH OCCASIONS STILL REMAIN THE
24 SAME TODAY, AND THEY STILL STAND. THE TRACK RECORD OF CONTRACT
25 WORKERS WHO PERFORM GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT WORK DOES NOT COMPARE



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1 FAVORABLY TO THE TRACK RECORD OF COUNTY EMPLOYEES PERFORMING
2 THE SAME WORK IN THE REGIONS OF THE COUNTY. FOR EXAMPLE,
3 ACCORDING TO THE DATA FOR THE PERIOD BETWEEN APRIL AND JUNE
4 2007, THE MOST RECENT DATA PROVIDED TO THE UNION BY THE
5 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES, COUNTY WORKERS
6 OUTPERFORMED CONTRACT WORKERS IN FIVE OF THE SEVEN PERFORMANCE
7 REVIEW STANDARDS UTILIZED BY THE COUNTY, WHICH COMPARE COUNTY
8 AND CONTRACT WORKERS. IN FACT, COUNTY WORKERS HAVE GENERALLY
9 OUTPERFORMED CONTRACT WORKERS ALONG THESE STANDARDS AT LEAST
10 AS FAR BACK AS 2005. AND IF YOU MAY RECALL, IT WAS ABOUT 2005
11 THAT THE RIGHT CONTRACTS, WHO WERE SUPPOSED TO BE SERVING NON
12 ENGLISH AND NON SPEAKING SPANISH PARTICIPANTS OF THE GAIN
13 PROGRAM INITIATED WHAT TURNED OUT TO BE A \$4 MILLION FRAUD
14 SCHEME, DEMONSTRATING AND HIGHLIGHTING THE PITFALLS OF
15 CONTRACTING OUT, OR ONE OF THE POSSIBLE PITFALLS OF
16 CONTRACTING OUT, WERE DRIVEN BY PASSION, AS I SAID, 16 YEARS
17 AGO. CONTRACTORS ARE DRIVEN BY THE BOTTOM LINE, PROFIT.
18 FURTHERMORE, THE CONTRACTOR MAXIMUS HAS A LONG RECORD OF
19 FAILING TO MEET THESE PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS STANDARDS.
20 MAXIMUS ALSO HAS ESTABLISHED A RECORD OF FAILING TO FOLLOW
21 THROUGH ON CORRECTIVE ACTION PLANS, WHICH HAVE BEEN ISSUED AS
22 A RESULT OF ITS INABILITY TO ACHIEVE THE AFOREMENTIONED
23 PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS STANDARDS. CIVIL SERVANTS ARE THE
24 BEST EQUIPPED TO PERFORM THIS IMPORTANT FUNCTION. AND CIVIL



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1 SERVANTS CONTINUE TO BE THE ROLE MODEL ON HOW TO TURN PASSIONS
2 INTO EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES.

3

4 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** YOUR TIME HAS EXPIRED.

5

6 **ED ROMAN:** THANK YOU.

7

8 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** PLEASE STATE YOUR NAME.

9

10 **PAUL HAYES:** HELLO. MY NAME IS PAUL HAYES. I WANT TO THANK THE
11 SUPERVISORS FOR GIVING US THE TIME TO SPEAK ON THIS. I'M
12 SPEAKING FROM S.E.I.U. LOCAL 721. IN ADDITION TO THE CONCERNS
13 JUST RAISED BY MR. ED ROMAN, MAXIMUS HAS ESTABLISHED A POOR
14 TRACK RECORD OUTSIDE OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. FOR EXAMPLE IN
15 JULY 2007, MAXIMUS AGREED TO PAY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT \$30.5
16 MILLION TO RESOLVE A CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION INTO WHETHER IT
17 FALSIFIED TENS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN MEDICAL CLAIMS. JUST
18 LAST WEEK THE ATTORNEY GENERAL OF CONNECTICUT ANNOUNCED A \$6
19 MILLION LAWSUIT AGAINST MAXIMUS FOR BREACHING A CONTRACT IT
20 HAD TO PROVIDE THE STATE WITH A COMPUTER SYSTEM TO ACCESS
21 CRIMINAL JUSTICE INFORMATION AND CONDUCT CRIMINAL BACKGROUND
22 CHECKS. MAXIMUS HAS ALSO BEEN INVOLVED IN SIMILAR LITIGATION
23 IN TEXAS. FURTHERMORE, BOTH OF THE CONTRACTORS WHICH WERE
24 CONSIDERED FOR THIS CONTRACT, POLICY STUDIES INC. OR P.S.I.
25 AND MAXIMUS, HAVE BEEN CITED WITH LABOR LAW VIOLATIONS. OTHER



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1 COUNTY CONTRACTORS PROVIDING SIMILAR SERVICES, SUCH AS THE
2 WRIGHT CONTRACTORS, HAVE DEFRAUDED L.A. COUNTY OF SEVERAL
3 MILLION DOLLARS. HELPING INDIVIDUALS OVERCOME BARRIERS TO
4 EMPLOYMENT IS ESPECIALLY VITAL IN THESE TOUGH ECONOMIC TIMES.
5 THEREFORE IT IS IMPORTANT THAT THIS WORK BE PERFORMED BY THOSE
6 WHO ARE BEST EQUIPPED TO ACHIEVE THE BEST POSSIBLE OUTCOMES.
7 GIVEN THE CONCERNS RAISED IN OUR TESTIMONY REGARDING GAIN
8 CONTRACT WORKERS, AND THE HIGH QUALITY OF SERVICES PROVIDED BY
9 COUNTY GAIN WORKERS, S.E.I.U. RESPECTFULLY REQUESTS THAT THE
10 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RECONSIDER THE DECISION TO CONTRACT OUT
11 GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES. S.E.I.U. LOCAL 721 FINDS IT
12 ESPECIALLY PUZZLING THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MAY STILL BE
13 ENTERTAINING THE IDEA OF AWARDING THIS CONTRACT, OR SOME PART
14 OF THIS CONTRACT, TO MAXIMUS, GIVEN THEIR EXTREMELY POOR TRACK
15 RECORD, BOTH WITHIN AND OUTSIDE OF L.A. COUNTY. THEREFORE, IT
16 IS THE POSITION OF S.E.I.U. LOCAL 721 THAT IN THE INTEREST OF
17 PROTECTING QUALITY AND EFFICIENT PUBLIC SERVICES, GAIN CASE
18 MANAGEMENT SERVICES OUGHT TO BE PERFORMED BY COUNTY EMPLOYEES.
19 THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME.

20
21 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. ALL RIGHT. SHOULD WE GET A
22 REPORT FROM THE C.E.O.?

23
24 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** PHILIP BROWNING?
25



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1 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** OR PHILIP BROWNING?

2

3 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MADAME CHAIRMAN, WHAT WE HAVE BEFORE US TODAY
4 IS AN ISSUE THAT I'M CONCERNED ABOUT. IT'S NOT ABOUT MAXIMUS.
5 AND IT'S NOT ABOUT POLICY STUDIES. BUT IT'S ABOUT THE
6 ACCOUNTABILITY AND SERVICE EXCELLENCE TO GAIN PARTICIPANTS IN
7 MEETING THE FEDERAL WORK REQUIREMENTS, THE WORK PARTICIPATION
8 RATES WHICH CAN BE ACHIEVED THROUGH THE PRIVATIZATION OF
9 SERVICES. THE BOARD LETTER CONTAINS DETAILS THAT SUGGEST THAT
10 THE CONTRACTOR EXCELLENCE JEOPARDIZES THE COST-EFFECTIVENESS
11 OF CONTRACTING OUT GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES AND GAIN
12 REGIONS 2 AND 7. BUT IN OTHER WORDS MEDIOCRE PERFORMANCE WOULD
13 THEN PRESERVE THE CONTRACT. EXCELLENT PERFORMANCE WOULD RENDER
14 THE CONTRACT OBSOLETE. ON PAGE 4, THE BOARD LETTER, IT STATES
15 THAT THE ESTIMATED COST OF UTILIZING COUNTY STAFF TO PROVIDE
16 GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES FOR AN 18-MONTH PERIOD IS \$25.35
17 MILLION. THE CONTRACTOR'S PROPOSED COST IS \$22.68 MILLION,
18 WHICH INCLUDES A BASIC COST OF \$19.38 MILLION PLUS THE
19 REQUIRED DEPARTMENTAL MONITORING COST OF \$3.3 MILLION. SO THE
20 QUESTION, MR. BROWNING, ON WHAT BASIS DID THE COUNTY ARRIVED
21 AT AN ESTIMATE OF \$25.35 MILLION?

22

23 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I THINK OUR GOAL WAS TO BRING TO YOUR BOARD
24 THE BEST PRODUCT FOR THE BEST PRICE. AND I THINK THIS PROCESS
25 STARTED A LONG TIME AGO WHEN AN R.F.P. WAS ISSUED THAT WAS



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1 OVER 300 PAGES AND WE HAD TWO POTENTIAL VENDORS BID AND THEIR
2 PROPOSALS WERE BOTH 800 PAGES APIECE. SO THERE WAS A
3 COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF ALL OF THE ACTIVITIES WITH THE PRIMARY
4 PURPOSE OF US IDENTIFYING A PROVIDER WHO COULD PERFORM THE
5 SERVICES THAT WOULD MOVE US TO THE NEXT LEVEL IN TERMS OF
6 WELFARE TO WORK. YOU KNOW, CALIFORNIA HAS A CHALLENGE OF
7 PUTTING PEOPLE BACK TO WORK. WE HAVE, I THINK IN L.A. COUNTY,
8 MOVED OUR PERFORMANCE UP TO OVER 30 PERCENT, WHICH IS NOT
9 WHERE WE WANT TO BE, BUT IT'S MUCH BETTER THAN WHERE WE
10 HAVE BE. THAT'S ABOUT A 50 PERCENT INCREASE OVER WHERE WE WERE
11 A YEAR AGO. IN TERMS OF THE SPECIFICS THAT YOU'RE TALKING
12 ABOUT, I THINK WHAT WE USED WAS PRIOR PRACTICE, WHERE IN THE
13 PAST WE HAD A PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE IN OUR CONTRACT AND A
14 PENALTY. IN TERMS OF INCENTIVES, WE STEPPED UP IN THIS
15 CONTRACT AND PROVIDED MUCH LESS OF A BASE COMPENSATION AND
16 TIED MORE OF THE COMPENSATION TO PERFORMANCE. I THINK WHAT WE
17 ACTUALLY DID WAS BASED ON SOME PRIOR CONTRACT WORK THAT WE HAD
18 WITH SOMETHING YOU MAY BE FAMILIAR WITH, WHICH IS S.S.I.
19 APPEALS. THAT'S ONE OF OUR CONTRACTS THAT'S 100 PERCENT
20 PERFORMANCE-BASED. YOU KNOW, MOST OF OUR CONTRACTS ARE NOT 100
21 PERCENT PERFORMANCE-BASED. BUT THAT ONE IS. AND THE WAY WE
22 ESTIMATED THE COST FOR THAT, THE BASE COST, WAS TO LOOK AT
23 COUNTY COUNSEL'S COST AND LOOK AT WHAT THE PROVIDERS' PRACTICE
24 HAD BEEN IN THE PAST AND CAME UP WITH A METHODOLOGY FOR THIS
25 S.S.I. APPEALS. FOR THE CONTRACT THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT NOW,



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1 WHAT WE LOOKED AT WAS THE PERFORMANCE THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY,
2 NOT ONLY BY THE CURRENT VENDOR BUT BY US, AND SET A FLOOR. WE
3 WORKED WITH COUNTY COUNSEL, AUDITOR-CONTROLLER. WE USED THE
4 I.S.D. PROCUREMENT PROCESS TO COME UP WITH A METHODOLOGY SO
5 THAT WE WOULD HAVE A FLOOR AGAINST WHICH A VENDOR COULD
6 ACTUALLY COMPLETE THEIR PROPOSAL. SO THEY GAVE US A PRICE
7 AFTER EVERYTHING WAS SAID AND DONE THAT WAS BASED ON THIS
8 LEVEL OF EXPECTATION. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF MEASURES THAT THEY
9 WILL BE PENALIZED FOR IF THEY FAIL TO MEET. THERE ARE ALSO
10 THREE PRETTY IMPORTANT MEASURES THAT THEY COULD GET ADDITIONAL
11 COMPENSATION FOR. AND ONE OF THE THINGS WE'RE STRUGGLING WITH
12 WAS HOW DO WE IDENTIFY THE BEST WAY TO MOVE FORWARD IN TERMS
13 OF THE PRICING? WE LOOKED AT THE PRIOR PRACTICE, THE PRIOR
14 EXPERIENCE AND DETERMINED THAT IF THE CURRENT VENDOR HAD MET
15 ALL OF THOSE OBJECTIVES, MET ALL THOSE PERFORMANCE MEASURES,
16 WHAT WOULD THEIR ADDITIONAL AMOUNT OF COMPENSATION BE? AND
17 THAT WAS 1 PERCENT. SO WE AND THE AUDITOR-CONTROLLER WORKED
18 TOGETHER TO USE THE-- TO EXCLUDE PERFORMANCE INCENTIVES FROM
19 THE COMPARISON WITH PROP A, WHICH I THINK IS WHAT YOU'RE--

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** ON WHAT BASIS THE THE COUNTY ARRIVE-- I
22 SHOULD SAY, THE CONTRACTOR, ARRIVE AT THE PROPOSED ESTIMATE OF
23 \$19.38 MILLION?

24



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1 PHILLIP BROWNING I THINK THE CONTRACTOR LOOKED AT THE
2 PROPOSAL, THE R.F.P., AND IDENTIFIED WHAT THEY THOUGHT COULD
3 BE DONE. AND WE DIDN'T CONSTRAIN THEM. WE DIDN'T SAY, AS WE
4 HAD IN THE PAST, THAT YOU HAD TO BE A D.P.S.S. CLONE. WE SAID,
5 "WE WANT YOU TO BE INNOVATIVE. WE WANT YOU TO BE CREATIVE. WE
6 WANT YOU TO DO THINGS THAT MAYBE WE HAVEN'T BEEN ABLE TO DO."
7 AND SO THEY GAVE US A PROPOSAL, BOTH PROVIDERS GAVE US A
8 PROPOSAL THAT WAS NOT NECESSARILY TIED TO THE WAY THINGS ARE
9 IN OUR D.P.S.S. OFFICES. AND SO THEY GAVE US A PRICE BASED
10 UPON WHAT THEY BELIEVED WAS NECESSARY IN ORDER TO MEET THE
11 OBJECTIVES.

12
13 >>SUP. ANTONOVICH: OKAY. IF ADDED TOGETHER, THE 70 PERCENT
14 FIXED MONTHLY AMOUNT, PLUS THE 30 PERCENT MONTHLY PERFORMANCE
15 BASED PAYMENT PLUS THE \$3.9 MILLION PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE PLUS
16 THE \$3.3 MILLION DEPARTMENTAL MONITORING FEES GIVES US
17 ARTIFICIALLY INFLATED CONTRACTING COSTS WHICH EXCEED COST-
18 EFFECTIVENESS. SO WHAT IS THE COUNTY'S CURRENT WORK
19 PARTICIPATION RATE?

20
21 PHILLIP BROWNING: OUR CURRENT WORK PARTICIPATION RATE IS ABOUT
22 32 PERCENT. OUR CURRENT WORK PARTICIPATION RATE AS WE'RE
23 TALKING ABOUT FOR THE LAST YEAR. BUT THE PERFORMANCE THAT
24 WE'RE TALKING ABOUT, THEIR INCENTIVES ARE BASED ON THEM GOING
25 TO A LEVEL THAT HAS NOT BEEN ACHIEVED BY ANYBODY IN THE



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1 COUNTY, IT IS MY UNDERSTANDING, YET. SO OUR GOAL WAS TO MAKE
2 PERFORMANCE THE KEY, TO MAKE PERFORMANCE THE DRIVER. WE WANT
3 PERFORMANCE TO BE THEIR MAJOR GOAL. AND I THINK THEY HAVE
4 INDICATED THAT THAT WILL BE THEIR PRIMARY GOAL.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT IS THE WORK PARTICIPATION RATE REQUIRED
7 BY T.N.F. RE-AUTHORIZATION?

8

9 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I MAY HAVE MISUNDERSTOOD BUT I THINK YOU
10 ASKED WHAT'S THE FEDERAL RATE?

11

12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT IS THE FEDERAL WORK PARTICIPATION RATE?

13

14 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** 50 PERCENT IS THE MINUS THE CASELOAD
15 CRITERIA. I HAVE AN EXPERT HERE, PHIL ANSELL, WHO I THINK MOST
16 OF YOU KNOW, WHO COULD GET INTO THE COUNTY--

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO THE COUNTY'S CURRENT WORK PARTICIPATION
19 RATE IS 50 PERCENT?

20

21 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THE CURRENT FEDERAL STANDARD IS 50 PERCENT
22 LESS THE CREDITS. PHIL, YOU MIGHT WANT TO GO THROUGH A LITTLE
23 BIT OF HOW THEY TAKE THAT 50 PERCENT.

24



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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO THE COUNTY'S CURRENT WORK PARTICIPATION
2 RATE IS 50 PERCENT. AND THE WORK PARTICIPATION RATE REQUIRED
3 BY THE T.N.F. RE-AUTHORIZATION IS WHAT?

4

5 **PHIL ANSELL:** SUPERVISOR, THE FEDERAL REQUIRED WORK
6 PARTICIPATION RATE IS 50 PERCENT MINUS THE APPLICABLE CASELOAD
7 REDUCTION CREDIT. FOR CALIFORNIA, THE CASE REDUCTION CREDIT,
8 FOR THE MOST RECENTLY COMPLETED FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR, WAS 15
9 PERCENT, WHICH MEANS THAT THE REQUIRED WORK PARTICIPATION RATE
10 FOR CALIFORNIA FOR THAT FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR WAS 35 PERCENT.
11 LOS ANGELES COUNTY'S RATE FOR THAT FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR WAS 32
12 PERCENT. HOWEVER, IN THE LAST QUARTER OF FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR
13 2008, FROM JULY THROUGH SEPTEMBER, LOS ANGELES COUNTY'S WORK
14 PARTICIPATION RATE WAS A FULL 43 PERCENT.

15

16 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** DO COUNTY STAFF UNDER PERFORM A NON CONTRACT
17 AT GAIN REGIONS, AND IF THEY DO, HOW ARE THEY HELD
18 ACCOUNTABLE?

19

20 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THAT'S A FAIRLY GENERAL QUESTION, BUT I DO
21 THINK THAT WE HAVE STANDARDS SET FOR ALL OF OUR STAFF,
22 EXPECTATIONS FOR ALL OF OUR STAFF THAT ARE BASED ON WHAT THE
23 CURRENT MERIT SYSTEM ALLOWS US TO DO. WE HAVE MEETINGS WITH
24 STAFF AND SUPERVISORS IN THE GAIN REGIONS. THEY KNOW HOW



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1 CRITICAL IT IS TO MOVE OUR PERFORMANCE UP. WE'VE MET WITH THEM
2 ON A NUMBER OF OCCASIONS--

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN THEY DON'T PERFORM?

5

6 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** ACTION IS TAKEN, DISCIPLINARY ACTION IS
7 TAKEN, IF THAT'S NEEDED. THERE ARE EXPECTATIONS.

8

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND HOW MANY PEOPLE DO YOU HAVE UNDER
10 PERFORMING? INCENTIVES WHEN THE TERM OF THE CONTRACT AND THE
11 CONTRACTORS' EXCELLENCE MAKE THIS CONTRACT NO LONGER COST-
12 EFFECTIVE?

13

14 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I COULDN'T ANSWER THAT OFF THE TOP OF MY
15 HEAD, AND I'M NOT SURE THAT WE HAVE A STANDARD THAT SAYS
16 UNDERPERFORMANCE EQUALS WHY.

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** HOW MANY PEOPLE HAVE YOU RETRAINED FOR UNDER
19 PERFORMING, AND HAS THAT UNDER PERFORMANCE THEN IMPROVED WHERE
20 THEY ARE ABLE TO PERFORM? OR DO WE HAVE A SITUATION AS WE HAD
21 AT MARTIN LUTHER KING HOSPITAL?

22

23 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I DON'T THINK WE HAVE INDIVIDUALS, TO MY
24 KNOWLEDGE, WHO ARE UNDER PERFORMING, UNLESS THEY HAVE A



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1 CORRECTIVE ACTION PLAN THAT'S ALREADY BEEN ESTABLISHED,
2 ALTHOUGH I COULD BE WRONG.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** BUT YOU DON'T KNOW.

5

6 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I DON'T KNOW. I'LL BE HONEST AND SAY, BUT I
7 THINK WE CAN FIND OUT.

8

9 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** DO YOU THINK YOU COULD LET THE BOARD KNOW,
10 YOU COULD GIVE US SOME INFORMATION ON THAT?

11

12 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** CERTAINLY.

13

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IF THE CONTRACTOR PERFORMED AT THE LEVEL THAT
15 WOULD EARN THE \$3.9 MILLION IN ADDITIONAL PERFORMANCE
16 INCENTIVES, WOULD THAT LEVEL OF SERVICE THEN EQUAL THAT WHICH
17 THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES STAFF WOULD PERFORM?

18

19 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I THINK THAT WOULD BE A STANDARD HIGHER THAN
20 WHAT THE CURRENT STAFF WITH THE DEPARTMENT IS PERFORMING AT.

21

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** BASED ON THE PAYMENT STRUCTURE OF THE NEW
23 CONTRACT, IF THE CONTRACTOR EARNS ALL OF THE AVAILABLE
24 PERFORMANCE INCENTIVES FOR THE TERMS OF THE CONTRACT, CAN THE



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1 CONTRACTOR'S EXCELLENCE MAKE THIS CONTRACT NO LONGER COST
2 EFFECTIVE?

3

4 **SPEAKER:** I THINK THAT-- IT'S OUR BELIEF THAT THE CONTRACTOR
5 WILL HAVE A HARD TIME MEETING ALL OF THOSE EXPECTATIONS. BUT
6 IF FOR SOME REASON THEY DO, I THINK THAT WILL HAVE
7 DEMONSTRATED THE VALUE OF THE PERFORMANCE METHODOLOGY, THE
8 PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE METHODOLOGY. BUT WHAT WE'LL DO IS RE-
9 ADJUST, JUST LIKE WE DID NOW, WE'LL LOOK AT WHAT THE PRIOR
10 EXPERIENCE HAS BEEN AND RESET THE BASE SO THAT THE INCENTIVES
11 WILL BE BASED ON PRIOR EXPERIENCE. I THINK WE'VE ESTIMATED
12 THAT THE COUNTY'S COST FOR THE SERVICE IS AT A 14 PERCENT
13 LEVEL DIFFERENT FROM THE PROVIDER. SO IF THE PROVIDER WERE TO
14 HAVE HAVE A SUCCESSFUL YEAR AND EARN 14 PERCENT MORE IN
15 INCENTIVES, THAT WOULD PUT THEM AT A VERY CLOSE LEVEL WITH OUR
16 COUNTY COST. BUT, HOWEVER, IF THE PROVIDER, P.S.I, AS WE
17 RECOMMENDED, WERE TO DO SO WELL THAT THEY MET ALL THE
18 EXPECTATIONS, I THINK WE IN D.P.S.S. WOULD HAVE TO REASSESS
19 WHAT IT WOULD TAKE FOR US TO GET TO THAT SAME LEVEL. AND MY
20 BELIEF IS THAT WE WOULD HAVE TO DO THINGS DIFFERENTLY. IT
21 WOULD PROBABLY COST US MORE THAN WHAT IT'S CURRENTLY COSTING
22 US.

23



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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SO THE ANSWER WOULD BE YES, THE CONTRACTOR'S
2 EXCELLENCE MAKES THE CONTRACT NO LONGER COST-EFFECTIVE. THE
3 ANSWER WOULD BE YES?

4

5 **PHIL ANSELL:** NO, SUPERVISOR. THERE'S TWO CONTRACT PERIODS
6 HERE. THERE'S THE INITIAL 18-MONTH CONTRACT, WHICH IS BEFORE
7 YOU TODAY. AND THEN AN OPTION FOR THE DEPARTMENT TO EXTEND FOR
8 AN ADDITIONAL 18-MONTH PERIOD. THE PROPOSITION A ANALYSIS IS
9 COMPLETED PRIOR TO EACH OF THOSE TWO PERIODS. SO THE
10 DEPARTMENT COMPLETED A PROPOSITION A ANALYSIS IN CONSULTATION
11 WITH THE AUDITOR REGARDING THE INITIAL CONTRACT THAT'S
12 RECOMMENDED. AND FOR PURPOSES OF THAT PROPOSITION A ANALYSIS,
13 IN CONSULTATION WITH THE AUDITOR, THE CONTRACTORS' COSTS ARE
14 ESTIMATED BASED ON THE 100 PERCENT OF THE CONTRACTORS' AMOUNT,
15 NOT LESS WITH ANY PENALTIES AND NOT MORE WITH ANY INCENTIVES
16 BECAUSE BASED ON THE HISTORIC PERFORMANCE OF BOTH THE COUNTY
17 AND THE CURRENT CONTRACTOR, THE AUDITOR ESTIMATED THAT THE
18 MOST REALISTIC ESTIMATE WAS THAT THE NEW CONTRACTOR WOULD
19 NEITHER BE PENALIZED NOR EARN INCENTIVES AND THEREFORE THAT
20 THEIR CONTRACT PAYMENT WOULD BE EQUAL TO 100 PERCENT OF THE
21 CONTRACT AMOUNT. AS MR. BROWNING INDICATED, AT THE POINT THAT
22 WE ARE CONSIDERING WHETHER TO EXERCISE THE EXTENSION OPTION, A
23 NEW PROPOSITION A ANALYSIS WILL HAVE TO BE COMPLETED. AT THAT
24 POINT IN TIME, IF THE CONTRACTOR HAS EARNED INCENTIVES, THEN
25 FOR THE NEXT 18-MONTH PERIOD, IT WILL BE PROJECTED THAT THEY



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1 WOULD CONTINUE TO EARN THOSE INCENTIVES. AND IF THE INCENTIVES
2 ARE SO HIGH THAT THEY ARE EARNING MORE THAN 14 PERCENT OUT OF
3 A TOTAL MAXIMUM OF 21 PERCENT INCENTIVES, THEN IN THE CONTRACT
4 EXTENSION, THE DEPARTMENT WOULD NEED TO RE-NEGOTIATE THAT
5 PAYMENT STRUCTURE WITH P.S.I. TO ENSURE THAT THE CONTRACT
6 REMAIN COST-EFFECTIVE. SO THERE IS NO SCENARIO HERE WHERE HIGH
7 PERFORMANCE WOULD RESULT IN A CONTRACT NOT BEING COST-
8 EFFECTIVE AND NOT BE COMPLIANT WITH PROPOSITION A.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT PAGE IS THAT ON IN THE CONTRACT? WHAT
11 PAGE IS THAT ON IN THE CONTRACT?

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHAT YOU JUST SAID. WHERE IN THE CONTRACT
14 DOES IT REFLECT WHAT YOU JUST SAID? HERE'S THE CONTRACT. SHOW
15 ME WHERE IT SAYS THAT.

16

17 **PHILL ANSELL:** AS FAR AS I'M AWARE, SUPERVISOR, THE CONTRACT
18 ONLY SPEAKS TO THE DEPARTMENT'S RIGHT TO OPTION TO EXTEND THE
19 CONTRACT. THE REQUIREMENT TO CONDUCT A NEW PROPOSITION A
20 ANALYSIS, WHICH INCLUDES BOTH THE COUNTY'S PROJECTED AVOIDABLE
21 COSTS FOR THE EXTENSION PERIOD AND THE CONTRACTORS' PROJECTED
22 COSTS IS NOT REFLECTED IN THE CONTRACT BUT RATHER IS PART OF
23 THE COUNTY'S ESTABLISHED CONTRACTING REQUIREMENTS PER THE
24 DIRECTIVES OF THE AUDITOR. AND THEREFORE IN ANY CONTRACTS THAT
25 INVOLVE AN EXTENSION OPTION SUCH AS THE CURRENT CONTRACT WITH



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1 MAXIMUS, AS WELL, FOR EXAMPLE, THERE WAS NO LANGUAGE IN THE
2 CONTRACT DESCRIBING THE REQUIREMENT FOR A NEW PROPOSITION A
3 ANALYSIS TO BE CONDUCTED FOR EACH SUCCESSIVE CONTRACT
4 EXTENSION.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THAT MEANS THAT THE CURRENT PROP A ANALYSIS
7 DID NOT ANTICIPATE EXCELLENCE. BECAUSE IF IT DID, THE CONTRACT
8 WOULDN'T BE COST-EFFECTIVE?

9

10 **PHIL ANSELL:** SUPERVISOR, THE AUDITOR CONCLUDED THAT IT WOULD
11 NOT HAVE BEEN ALLOWABLE UNDER THE REQUIREMENTS OF PROPOSITION
12 A TO ASSUME THAT THE BIDDER WOULD ACHIEVE A LEVEL OF
13 PERFORMANCE THAT EXCEEDED THE LEVEL EVER ACHIEVED BY THE
14 COUNTY OR BY ITS PRIOR CONTRACTORS AND THEREFORE WOULD HAVE
15 UNFAIRLY DISADVANTAGED PROSPECTIVE BIDDERS BY REQUIRING THEM
16 TO BID LESS THAN WOULD OTHERWISE BE ALLOWABLE BY REQUIRING
17 THEM TO MEET THE BURDEN THAT WOULD BE ASSOCIATED WITH
18 RECEIVING 100 PERCENT OF THE MAXIMUM PAYMENT. IF I MIGHT SAY,
19 BY ANALOGY, MR. BROWNING REFERENCED OUR S.S.I. APPEALS
20 REPRESENTATION CONTRACT, WHICH YOUR BOARD MAY RECALL RECENTLY
21 APPROVED WITH HEALTH ADVOCATES L.L.P. FOR PURPOSES OF THAT
22 CONTRACT, WE ESTIMATED IN THE PROP A ANALYSIS A CONTRACTOR
23 SUCCESS RATE OF 60 PERCENT OF THE S.S.I. CASES REFERRED TO
24 THEM BASED ON THE HISTORIC PERFORMANCE UNDER THE PREDECESSOR
25 CONTRACT. IF WE HAD ESTIMATED THAT CONTRACTORS' COSTS AT 100



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1 PERCENT WIN RATE DESPITE A HISTORIC WIN RATE OF 60 PERCENT,
2 THAT WOULD HAVE FORCED THE CONTRACTOR TO BID SUCH A LOW COST
3 THAT IT WOULD HAVE BEEN EFFECTIVELY IMPOSSIBLE FOR THEM TO
4 SECURE THE CONTRACT-- TO PERFORM THE WORK OR TO MEET THE
5 REQUIREMENTS OF PROPOSITION A. SO ARTIFICIALLY ASSUMING A HIGH
6 RATE OF INCENTIVES OR PERFORMANCE-BASED PAY WOULD EFFECTIVELY
7 MAKE IT IMPOSSIBLE FOR A PROSPECTIVE BIDDER TO MEET THE
8 REQUIREMENTS OF PROP A AND WOULD RESULT IN ELIMINATING FROM
9 THE COUNTY'S CONTRACTING ARSENAL THE OPTION OF INCENTIVES OR
10 PERFORMANCE-BASED CONTRACTING.

11
12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHY WOULD THE COUNTY BUILD CONTRACTING
13 OBSOLESCENCE INTO THE NEW CONTRACT?

14
15 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** WE DON'T THINK WE'VE DONE THAT, SUPERVISOR.
16 WE THINK WHAT WE'VE DONE IS TO HAVE A FAIR MEASURE OF
17 INCENTIVES AND ALSO PENALTIES. IF THE CONTRACTOR, THE CURRENT
18 CONTRACTOR OR THE NEW CONTRACTOR FAIL TO MEET CERTAIN
19 REQUIREMENTS, THERE ARE PENALTIES THAT ARE ASSESSED TO THEM.
20 THOSE PENALTIES, THAT CONCEPT RUNS THROUGHOUT ALL OF OUR
21 D.P.S.S. CONTRACTS.

22
23 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YEAH, BUT WHY ARE YOU PAYING A BONUS FOR THEM
24 TO DO THEIR JOB?



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1 **SPEAKER:** WE DON'T THINK THIS IS A BONUS.

2

3 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YOU'RE CREATING A NEW CLAUSE, THOUGH.

4

5 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** WHAT WE TOOK WAS THE BASE WHERE WE ARE NOW
6 AS THE BASE LEVEL, OUR PERFORMANCE NOW WAS LOOKED AT. AND WE
7 SAID THIS IS THE EXPECTATION BASED ON OUR PRIOR YEAR'S HISTORY
8 OF WHAT WE THINK CAN BE DONE. IF THAT PROVIDER, WHOEVER IT IS,
9 CAN DO BETTER THAN THAT, WE'RE WILLING TO PAY YOU. WE'RE
10 WILLING TO PAY YOU SO THAT THE PERFORMANCE CAN BE IMPROVED. WE
11 USED PRIOR EXPERIENCE TO MOVE THE INCENTIVE OR TO ESTABLISH
12 THE INCENTIVE MECHANISM.

13

14 **PHIL ANSELL:** IF I MIGHT ADD, SUPERVISOR. OF THE THREE PRIMARY
15 PERFORMANCE MEASURES, THE ONES WHERE INCENTIVES CAN BE EARNED,
16 ONE OF THOSE, THE WORK PARTICIPATION RATE THAT YOU ASKED ABOUT
17 EARLIER, IS A RELATIVE MEASURE COMPARED TO THE COUNTY. THERE'S
18 NOT AN ABSOLUTE STANDARD. SO IF THE COUNTY'S PERFORMANCE
19 IMPROVES, AS IT HAS VERY SUBSTANTIALLY EVEN SINCE THE R.F.P.
20 WAS ISSUED, IN ORDER FOR THE CONTRACTOR TO EARN THAT
21 INCENTIVE, THEY HAVE TO BEAT THE COUNTY. THEY ARE NOT
22 COMPETING WITH AN ABSOLUTE STANDARD. SO IF THE COUNTY RAISES
23 THE BAR, FOR EXAMPLE, OUR RATE THAT WE CALCULATED WAS 43
24 PERCENT FOR THE MOST RECENT QUARTER, IF THE CONTRACT HAD BEEN



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1 IN EFFECT NOW, THE CONTRACTOR WOULD HAVE HAD TO BEAT THAT 43
2 PERCENT LEVEL IN ORDER TO EARN THE INCENTIVE FOR THAT MEASURE.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YOU EXPLAINED WHY WE HAVE TO HAVE A NEW
5 R.F.P., BUT THOSE END MY QUESTIONS, MADAME CHAIR.

6

7 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY?

8

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I WANT TO FOLLOW UP ON SOME OF THOSE
10 QUESTIONS AND THEN GO INTO SOME OTHER AREAS OF PROCESS. BUT AS
11 LONG AS IT IS FRESH IN OUR MINDS, LET ME JUST FOLLOW UP ON MR.
12 ANTONOVICH'S QUESTIONS. I THINK THE QUESTION THAT I HAVE, THAT
13 MR. ANTONOVICH WAS ALLUDING TO, IS THE MONITORING COST-- LET
14 ME PREFACE THIS. IS THE MONITORING COST OF \$3 MILLION AS
15 CONTAINED IN HERE, IS THAT PART OF THE CONTRACT COST?

16

17 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I CAN'T HEAR YOU, SIR.

18

19 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IS THE \$3 MILLION MONITORING COST PART OF
20 THE COST OF THE CONTRACT?

21

22 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** MONITORING COST IS IDENTIFIED AS AN
23 EXPENDITURE THAT THE COUNTY HAS TO INCUR IN ORDER TO--

24

25 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IT'S A RELATIVELY SIMPLE QUESTION.



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1

2 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** YES, IT IS.

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IT IS. SO ON PAGE 23 OF THE CONTRACT,
5 SECTION 7.11 WHERE IT SAYS THE MAXIMUM CONTRACT AMOUNT IS
6 \$23,292,769 AND IT'S PAYABLE TO THE COUNTY TO THE CONTRACTOR
7 FOR THE 18-MONTH CONTRACT TERM. THIS CONTRACT AMOUNT INCLUDES
8 THE BASIC COMPENSATION OF ONE MONTH'S STARTUP ACTIVITIES AT
9 \$767,447 AND 17 MONTHS OF DIRECT CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES AT
10 \$18,659,969. THIS CONTRACT AMOUNT ALSO-- AND THE EMPHASIS IS
11 YOURS, NOT MINE. IN THE CONTRACT, BOLD AND UNDERLINED-- ALSO
12 INCLUDES A MAXIMUM COMPENSATION AMOUNT OF \$3,909,353. THAT'S
13 THE BONUS, RIGHT? WHATEVER YOU WANT TO CALL IT. THAT'S THE
14 INCENTIVE PAY.

15

16 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THAT'S INCENTIVES, RIGHT.

17

18 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THAT'S THE MAXIMUM INCENTIVE PAY. THAT'S THE
19 MOST THEY CAN MAKE, IS \$3.9 MILLION. IF YOU ADD ALL THOSE
20 NUMBERS TOGETHER, THEY COME UP TO 23.2 PLUS 3.9 IS OVER \$27
21 MILLION.

22

23 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THAT'S CORRECT.

24



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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO I GUESS MY QUESTION IS: MAYBE IT'S MORE
2 TO MR. FORTNER OR MAYBE IT'S TO YOU, IS THAT THIS THING SEEMS
3 TO BE DESIGNED TO SELF-IMMOLATE, BECAUSE THE WAY I READ THIS--
4 AND THERE'S NOTHING ELSE IN THE CONTRACT TO THE CONTRARY-- THE
5 WAY I READ THIS IS THAT IF THEY DO THE BEST BANGUP JOB THEY
6 CAN DO, THEY'RE GOING TO BE MORE EXPENSIVE THAN OUR FOLKS,
7 BASED UPON WHAT THIS SAYS IN THE CONTRACT. NOT WHAT YOU SAY.
8 NOT WHAT YOU PROMISE. NOT WHAT YOU IMPLY, SUGGEST OR
9 OTHERWISE. IT SAYS IN THE CONTRACT, WHICH IS WHAT WE'RE ALL
10 GOING TO LOOK TO 18 MONTHS DOWN THE LINE. SO ONE OF TWO THINGS
11 IS GOING TO HAPPEN. ONE OF THREE THINGS IS GOING TO HAPPEN.
12 THEY'LL EITHER DO C AVERAGE WORK, MIDDLE OF THE SPECTRUM WORK
13 LIKE THEY DO NOW OR LIKE THE CURRENT CONTRACTOR DOES NOW AND
14 LIKE THE REST OF THE COUNTY WORKFORCE DOES NOW, SOMEWHERE IN
15 THE MIDDLE OF THE SPECTRUM. OR THEY'RE GOING TO DO THIS
16 OUTSTANDING WORK AND THEY'RE GOING TO PRICE THEMSELVES OUT OF
17 THE CONTRACT UNDER PROPOSITION A. OR THEY'RE GOING TO FLUNK
18 AND JUSTIFIABLY LOSE THEIR CONTRACT BECAUSE THEY HAVEN'T
19 PRODUCED. ONE OF THOSE THREE THINGS IS GOING TO HAPPEN. AND
20 IT'S THAT LAST, IT'S THE ONE WHERE THEY EXCEED AND VIOLATE
21 PROP A THAT MAKES ME-- MAKES A NUMBER OF US WONDER, WHAT
22 GIVES? IS THIS A POISON PILL?
23



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1 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** MY HOPE IS THAT THEY EXCEED EVERY
2 EXPECTATION AND THAT THEY EARN EVERY BIT THAT WE HAVE SET
3 ASIDE IN THIS CONTRACT.

4
5 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I UNDERSTAND THAT.

6
7 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** AND AS PHIL SAID, WE WILL RE-EVALUATE FOR
8 THE NEXT 18-MONTH PERIOD. THEY WILL HAVE TO BE A COST-
9 EFFECTIVE PROPOSAL FOR US TO GO FORWARD. WE WILL RESET THE
10 BASE. THE BASE FOR THE PROPOSAL THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT
11 TODAY, THIS COMPENSATION HERE, WAS BASED ON A PRIOR YEAR'S
12 EXPERIENCE AND THE BEST DISCUSSIONS WITH AUDITOR-CONTROLLER
13 ABOUT HOW TO CRAFT A PROPOSED CONTRACT. WHEN WE GET TO THE
14 POINT WHEN WE'RE HAVING TO DECIDE WHETHER THERE SHOULD BE AN
15 EXTENSION, WE'LL LOOK BACK AT HISTORY AND SEE HOW WELL THEY'VE
16 DONE. WE'LL HAVE TO CRAFT ANOTHER PERFORMANCE EXPECTATION, BUT
17 THEY CANNOT BE HIGHER THAN THE COUNTY.

18
19 **PHIL ANSELL:** SUPERVISOR --

20
21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THE PROBLEM, PHIL, IS THAT WHAT'S WHAT YOU
22 SAY. IT'S NOT WHAT THE CONTRACT SAYS. IT'S NOT WHAT THE UNION
23 IS GOING TO SAY 18 MONTHS OUT WHEN THEY SEE THAT THEY'VE COST
24 THE COUNTY 27 MILLION AND THEY COULD HAVE, BY YOUR OWN
25 ANALYSIS, PRODUCED THE SERVICE, EVEN THOUGH IT WOULDN'T HAVE



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1 BEEN AT THAT LEVEL, THAT'S NOT THE ISSUE HERE, BUT WOULD HAVE
2 BEEN ABLE TO PRODUCE THE SERVICE-- THEY COULD HAVE PRODUCED IT
3 AT 25 MILLION. AND UNDER THAT KIND OF A PROP A ANALYSIS, AT
4 LEAST ARGUABLY, YOU HAVE AN ISSUE. AND THAT'S THE CONCERN. LET
5 ME TURN TO ANOTHER ISSUE. FIRST OF ALL, I WOULD LIKE TO JUST
6 CLEAR THE RECORD. I KNOW THAT EVERYBODY HAS THEIR VIEW OF
7 WHAT'S GOING ON IN THESE AREAS, BUT I FOUND IT KIND OF
8 DISINGENUOUS. AND SINCE I THINK YOU GUYS MUST HAVE PROVIDED
9 THE INFORMATION TO US AND THE PUBLIC AT LARGE. IN MY PART OF
10 THE COUNTY THAT IS COVERED BY THIS, IN OUR DISTRICT, REGION 7,
11 THE VALLEY, THE EXISTING CONTRACT EXCEEDS THE EMPLOYEES'
12 PERFORMANCE IN 8 OUT OF 11 OR 5 OUT OF 8 CATEGORIES? I FORGOT.
13 DO YOU KNOW, PHIL?

14

15 **PHIL ANSELL:** I DON'T RECALL SPECIFICALLY. BUT IT IS CERTAINLY
16 THE CASE THAT IN REGION 7, THE CONTRACTOR HAS GENERALLY
17 EXCEEDED THE COUNTY REGION PERFORMANCE.

18

19 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IN MY AREA, WHICH IS MOSTLY THE FLAT LANDS
20 OF THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY, THEY EXCEED THE COUNTY
21 PERFORMANCE, COUNTY EMPLOYEE PERFORMANCE IN 8 OUT OF 11 CASES,
22 CATEGORIES. IN THE ONE THAT WAS CITED IN THE NEWSPAPER AND WAS
23 CITED BY THE UNION REPRESENTATIVE THIS MORNING, IS THE OTHER
24 REGION, WHICH IS THE ANTELOPE VALLEY REGION, PROBABLY A LITTLE
25 GLENDALE MAY BE IN THERE, TOO, BUT THE ANTELOPE VALLEY. NOW,



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1 THEY'RE NOT COMPARING, IN THIS SITUATION, THE ANTELOPE VALLEY
2 PERFORMANCE OF THE CONTRACTOR TO WHAT THE COUNTY PERFORMANCE
3 WOULD HAVE BEEN IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY, CORRECT? THEY'RE
4 COMPARING WHAT THE CONTRACTOR-- HOW THE CONTRACTOR'S
5 PERFORMING IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY TO HOW THE COUNTY EMPLOYEES
6 ARE PERFORMING IN THE FLAT LANDS, CORRECT? IN THE URBAN CORE
7 OF THE COUNTY, CORRECT?

8

9 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** CORRECT.

10

11 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** YES OR NO?

12

13 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** YES.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I'M LOOKING AT PHIL. I GUESS THE PROTOCOL IS
16 ONLY THE TOP DOG GETS TO ANSWER. THAT'S ALL RIGHT. I DON'T
17 HAVE A PROBLEM IF YOU GUYS WANT TO SHARE THAT RESPONSIBILITY.
18 SO IT'S REALLY A DISINGENUOUS COMPARISON, IN FACT A MEANING
19 LESS COMPARISON BECAUSE IN FACT WHAT WOULD BE MORE MEANINGFUL
20 TO ME IS HOW WOULD COUNTY EMPLOYEES HAVE PERFORMED IN
21 LANCASTER AND PALMDALE COMPARED TO HOW MAXIMUS PERFORMED IN
22 LANCASTER OR PALMDALE. NOT TO COMPARE MAXIMUS IN LANCASTER TO
23 COUNTY EMPLOYEES IN THE WILSHIRE DISTRICT. THAT'S, TO ME-- AND
24 I DON'T UNDERSTAND WHY YOU GUYS DIDN'T FERRET THIS OUT IN THE
25 DISCUSSION. I JUST WANTED TO MAKE THAT POINT. NOW, I KNOW THAT



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1 P.S.I. DOESN'T WANT TO DISCUSS THIS, AND MAYBE I SHOULD ASK
2 THEM TO COME FORWARD, THEIR REPRESENTATIVE. BUT I CAN'T NOT
3 DISCUSS IT. AND THAT IS THE SITUATION THAT OCCURRED AFTER THE
4 R.F.P. CONCLUDED, AT LEAST CAME TO OUR ATTENTION AFTER THE
5 R.F.P. WAS COMPLETED IN THE STATE OF IOWA. IN ALL FAIRNESS, I
6 WANT TO GIVE THEM THE OPPORTUNITY TO ANSWER THAT., BUT I HAVE
7 A LETTER, I THINK WE ALL HAVE IT, THAT IS DATED OCTOBER 1ST,
8 2008, FROM THE STATE OF IOWA DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES.

9 WHAT IS YOUR NAME, SIR?

10

11 **DOUG HOWARD:** DOUG HOWARD.

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. HOWARD, OKAY. WHERE IT STATES, AND I'LL
14 JUST READ BRIEFLY FROM IT, "THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN
15 SERVICES HAS DETERMINED THAT IT WILL TERMINATE THE AGREEMENT
16 WITH POLICY STUDIES INC., P.S.I.," THAT'S YOUR COMPANY, "FOR
17 THIRD-PARTY ADMINISTRATION OF THE IOWA HAWKEYE PROGRAM." I
18 WISH WE HAD MASCOTS LIKE THAT. THE LOS ANGELES BRUIN PROGRAM.
19 I KNOW, I KNOW. "IT IS CLEAR THAT P.S.I. WILL NOT HAVE A FULLY
20 OPERATIONAL SYSTEM BY JANUARY 1ST, 2009 CONSISTENT WITH THE
21 CONTRACTUAL REQUIREMENTS." SO WHEN I RECEIVED THIS, I READ
22 THIS TO MEAN THAT YOU MADE A CONTRACTUAL-- YOU HAD A
23 CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATION, PART OF YOUR BID, I GUESS IT WAS
24 WRITTEN INTO THE CONTRACT THAT YOU WOULD BE FULLY OPERATIONAL
25 BY JANUARY 1ST, 2009. YOU WERE UNABLE TO FULFILL THE TERMS OF



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1 THAT CONTRACT. THEY PULLED THE PLUG ON YOU. CAN YOU SHED SOME
2 LIGHT? AND THIS HAPPENED AFTER YOU GUYS CLOSED THE BOOKS ON
3 THIS, BUT I'LL GET TO THAT IN A SECOND. I'D LIKE TO FIND WHAT
4 YOUR EXPLANATION IS.

5

6 **DOUG HOWARD:** COULD I CLARIFY ONE THING? YOU SAID THE LETTER
7 WAS DATED OCTOBER 1ST, RIGHT? WHO IS IT ADDRESSED TO?

8

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** IT IS ADDRESSED TO MICHAEL LEMBERG.

10

11 **DOUG HOWARD:** THAT IS NOT AN INDIVIDUAL WITH OUR COMPANY. I
12 HAVE A SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT I BELIEVE DATED NOVEMBER 6TH OR
13 7TH.

14

15 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** YOU KNOW WHO THIS LETTER IS ADDRESSED TO.
16 IT'S ADDRESSED TO YOUR COMPETITION, BECAUSE THEY TURNED TO
17 YOUR COMPETITION.

18

19 **DOUG HOWARD:** I HAVE A LETTER SAYING THAT ANY PRIOR LETTERS ARE
20 RESCINDED, THAT WE ARE TERMINATING THIS CONTRACT FOR MUTUAL
21 CONVENIENCE. THERE ARE NO FAULTS OR LIABILITIES ON EITHER
22 SIDE. I CAN EXPLAIN. WOULD YOU LIKE TO KNOW WHAT THE PROJECT
23 IS?

24



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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** ACTUALLY I'M MORE INTERESTED IN WHAT
2 HAPPENED PRIOR TO OCTOBER 1ST THAT CAUSED THEM TO WRITE THIS
3 LETTER? >DOUG HOWARD: I CAN TALK ABOUT WHAT THE PROJECT IS A
4 LITTLE BIT BUT QUITE FRANKLY, IF YOU WERE TO CALL IOWA, YOU
5 WOULD GET THE SAME ANSWER BECAUSE THERE'S SOME DISAGREEMENT ON
6 HOW THE HISTORY RAN. WE'RE LIMITED ON WHAT WE CAN SAY BECAUSE
7 OF THE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT. BUT ESSENTIALLY IOWA PROCURED A
8 COUPLE OF TIMES IN THE LAST YEAR, RE-PROCURED FOR A CONTRACT
9 FOR THE HAWKEYE PROGRAM, WHICH IS ESSENTIALLY THEIR STATE
10 CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM. AND A LARGE COMPONENT OF
11 THAT WAS TECHNOLOGY. WE HAD A COUPLE OF AVENUES WE COULD GO IN
12 DELIVERING THAT TECHNOLOGY. WE BELIEVED WE COULD MAKE THE
13 DATE. THEY WANTED TO GO A DIFFERENT DIRECTION. THERE WAS NEW
14 LEADERSHIP, SUBSEQUENT TO THE AWARD OF THAT CONTRACT WHICH WAS
15 NOT ACTUALLY SUPPOSED TO BECOME OPERATIONAL UNTIL THIS COMING
16 JANUARY 1ST, SO THIS WASN'T EVEN AN OPERATIONAL CONTRACT YET.
17 THE NEW LEADERSHIP CAME IN AND LITERALLY FAIRLY QUICKLY AFTER
18 THEY CAME IN SAID, "WE WANT TO GO A DIFFERENT DIRECTION." SOME
19 OF THOSE LETTERS CAME OUT. IN SUBSEQUENT CONVERSATIONS THEY
20 SAID THOSE LETTERS WERE A MISTAKE, THEY NEVER SHOULD HAVE GONE
21 OUT. HERE IS A COPY OF THE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT. THEY ISSUED
22 THE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT, WHICH WAS SIGNED AND FINALIZED BY
23 US, EXECUTED NOVEMBER 3RD, AND BY THEM NOVEMBER 6TH WHICH SAYS
24 TERMINATION FOR MUTUAL CONVENIENCE, CONSIDERATION OF ALL
25 COVENANTS AND AGREEMENTS. THERE ARE NO LIABILITIES OR



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1 RESPONSIBILITIES ON EITHER SIDE FOR WHAT HAS HAPPENED WITH
2 THIS CONTRACT. THEY'VE DECIDED TO GO A DIFFERENT DIRECTION.

4 THAT IF WE WERE GOING TO GET INTO THAT IN THIS HEARING, WE
5 WOULD HAVE HAD ALL OF THE THINGS THAT WERE BROUGHT UP IN TERMS
6 OF EVERY MAXIMUS CONTRACT THAT WAS CANCELED IN THE LAST THREE
7 YEARS, EVERY ONE THAT THEY'VE STARTED AND DID NOT GO THROUGH
8 WITH PERFORMANCE. I THINK THAT'S THE WAY I WOULD HAVE-- WITH
9 DUE RESPECT TO ALL THE STUFF WE'VE HEARD, I MEAN I JUST HEARD
10 ONE PART OF SOMETHING. IT'S JUST TO ME THIS WHOLE THING HAS
11 BEEN INCREDIBLE.

12

13 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** PART OF THE CONCERN, SUPERVISOR, IS IF WE DO
14 HAVE TO RE-BID THIS IS NOT ONLY THE COST THAT YOU MENTIONED,
15 SUPERVISOR MOLINA, BUT WE'LL HAVE TO GET CONCURRENCE FROM THE
16 STATE THAT WE'VE-- 100 PERCENT OF THESE FUNDS COME FROM THE
17 STATE AND THE FEDS. SO THEY HAVE AN INTEREST IN WHAT WE DO.
18 IT'S NOT THAT THEY HAVE AN OVERSIGHT THAT THEY'RE HERE TODAY,
19 BUT WE WILL HAVE TO BE TALKING WITH THEM ABOUT WHY WE'VE DONE
20 WHAT WE'VE DONE. AND WE WILL HAVE TO GET THEIR APPROVAL FOR
21 ANY EXTENSION OF THE CURRENT CONTRACT.

22

23 **SUP. MOLINA:** SO, AGAIN, POTENTIALLY WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THAT
24 THIS WHOLE ENTIRE PROCESS IS GOING TO COST US A HALF MILLION
25 DOLLARS FOR AN 18-MONTH CONTRACT OR LONGER?



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1

2 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** WELL A QUARTER OF A MILLION, 250,000,
3 239,000 FOR THE R.F.P. PROCESS, IS THAT WHAT YOU'RE TALKING
4 ABOUT? HAVING THAT REDONE? WELL I GUESS WE WOULD HAVE TO GET
5 WITH YOUR BOARD OFFICES AND SEE WHAT WOULD BE ACCEPTABLE IN
6 TERMS OF INCENTIVES SO THAT WE WOULDN'T HAVE TOO MANY
7 INCENTIVES OR TOO LITTLE INCENTIVES. SO THAT'S SOMETHING THAT
8 WE THOUGHT WE HAD WORKED OUT.

9

10 **SUP. MOLINA:** WELL IF YOU DO THE INCENTIVES, YOU'RE ALREADY
11 OVER THE PROP A, RIGHT?

12

13 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** IF WE ASSUME THAT EVERY DOLLAR WOULD BE
14 EARNED, YES. IF WE ASSUMED THAT ONLY 14 PERCENT WOULD BE
15 EARNED, THEN WE'RE STILL UNDER THE THRESHOLD. SO THE NEW
16 CONTRACTOR COULD EARN UP TO 14 PERCENT AS OPPOSED TO THE 21
17 PERCENT.

18

19 **SUP. MOLINA:** THAT WOULD BE A VIOLATION OF PROP A.

20

21 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** AND WOULD STILL BE WITHIN THE PROP A.

22

23 **SUP. MOLINA:** THE WAY IT'S WRITTEN, IT'S IN VIOLATION OF PROP
24 A.

25



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1 **PHIL ANSELL:** SUPERVISOR, WE CONSULTED WITH THE AUDITOR-
2 CONTROLLER IN DETERMINING THE CONTRACT COST. AND THE AUDITOR'S
3 JUDGMENT WAS THAT THE CALCULATION OF THE CONTRACTORS' COST
4 SHOULD NOT INCLUDE ANY INCENTIVE PAYMENTS BECAUSE BASED ON THE
5 HISTORIC PERFORMANCE OF BOTH THE COUNTY AND THE CURRENT AND
6 PRIOR CONTRACTORS, WE WOULD PREDICT THAT THE NEW CONTRACTOR
7 WOULD INCUR NO PENALTIES AND WOULD NOT EARN ANY INCENTIVES. AS
8 I INDICATED PREVIOUSLY, IF-- ANY TIME THAT THE COUNTY CHOOSES
9 TO INCLUDE INCENTIVES OR PERFORMANCE-BASED PAY OF ANY SORT
10 THERE WAS A REQUIREMENT TO ASSUME MAXIMUM EARNINGS BY THE
11 BIDDER, THE EFFECT WOULD BE TO MAKE IT EXTREMELY DIFFICULT OR
12 IMPOSSIBLE FOR A BIDDER TO ACTUALLY MEET THE PROPOSITION A
13 REQUIREMENTS. AND WE DISCUSSED EARLIER OUR CONTRACT FOR S.S.I.
14 APPEALS REPRESENTATION SERVICES WHERE THE WIN RATE IS 60
15 PERCENT. IF WE HAD ASSUMED A WIN RATE OF 100 PERCENT, THE
16 BIDDER WOULD HAVE TO BID ABOUT HALF OF WHAT WE CURRENTLY PAY
17 THEM.

18

19 **SUP. MOLINA:** WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

20

21 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THAT MEANS THAT IT'S ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE TO
22 STRUCTURE-- TO PREDICT WHAT'S GOING TO HAPPEN IN THE FUTURE.
23 IT'S LIKE ME TRYING TO PREDICT THE STOCK MARKET.

24



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1 **SUP. MOLINA:** IF YOU PREDICT THAT THEY'RE GOING TO PERFORM AT
2 THE MAXIMUM, THE ANSWER IS YES.

3

4 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** IF WE PREDICT THAT THEY WILL PERFORM AT THE
5 MAXIMUM, THIS WOULD NOT BE COST-EFFECTIVE.

6

7 **SUP. MOLINA:** WAIT.

8

9 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** WE COULDN'T DO THAT. BECAUSE THE AUDITOR-
10 CONTROLLER SAID THAT THAT WASN'T ACCEPTABLE. THAT WASN'T
11 REASONABLE.

12

13 **MIGUEL SANTANA:** IT'S IMPORTANT TO POINT OUT THAT AT THE END OF
14 THE 18 MONTHS, THERE'S GOING TO BE A NEW PROP A ANALYSIS. AND
15 THAT NEW PROP A ANALYSIS WILL BE AN APPLES TO APPLES
16 COMPARISON. SO IF THIS CONTRACTOR DOES A BETTER JOB THAN THE
17 COUNTY DOES, THE QUESTION THAT WILL BE ASKED OF THE DEPARTMENT
18 IS: HOW MUCH WOULD IT COST YOU TO PERFORM AT THAT SAME LEVEL?
19 SO THE EXISTING PROP A ANALYSIS WILL NOT BE THE ONE THAT'S
20 USED. A NEW ONE WILL BE DONE. SO AN APPLES TO APPLES
21 COMPARISON WILL BE ACHIEVED.

22

23 **SUP. MOLINA:** SO WE DON'T HAVE THAT AT THIS POINT?

24



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1 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** NO. WE WON'T HAVE ANY OF THAT UNTIL THERE'S
2 AN 18-MONTH PERFORMANCE BECAUSE IT WILL BE BASED ON THE MOST
3 RECENT STATISTICS WE HAVE, JUST LIKE THE CURRENT PROPOSAL WAS.

4

5 **SUP. KNABE:** THE MONITORING COSTS ARE ALSO EXCESSIVE. I MEAN
6 THEY'RE VERY, VERY HIGH IN RELATIONSHIP. WE'VE ASKED FOR YOU
7 TO LOOK AT THAT AND THE WHOLE PROCESS TO BEGIN WITH AND WE'VE
8 NEVER REALLY RECEIVED A REPORT BACK AS TO WHY THEY'RE SO
9 EXCESSIVE OR WHY THEY COULDN'T BE REDUCED AS FAR AS THIS
10 CONTRACT REGARDLESS OF WHO THE WINNING CONTRACTOR IS. THOSE
11 COSTS ALSO DRIVE IT VERY, VERY CLOSE TO THE PROP A.

12

13 **PHIL ANSELL:** SUPERVISOR, THE MONITORING COSTS FOR THIS
14 CONTRACT INCLUDE THREE COMPONENTS, ONE OF WHICH IS THE
15 STANDARD MONITORING COSTS THAT APPLY TO ALL CONTRACTS. BUT
16 THERE ARE TWO ADDITIONAL COMPONENTS OF THE MONITORING THAT ARE
17 UNIQUE TO-- ONE OF WHICH IS UNIQUE TO THIS CONTRACT, ONE OF
18 WHICH APPLIES ONLY TO THIS AND SOME OTHER SIMILAR CONTRACTS,
19 AND THAT'S WHAT'S INFLATED THE MONITORING COSTS. WE ARE
20 PREPARING TO COME BACK TO YOUR BOARD WITH A RECOMMENDED
21 MODIFICATION TO WHAT'S CALLED THE COUNTY ISSUANCE APPROVAL
22 PROCESS, WHICH IS A BOARD-MANDATED POLICY AROUND COUNTY STAFF
23 APPROVAL OF TRANSPORTATION AND ANCILLARY ISSUANCES. IF YOUR
24 BOARD APPROVES THOSE CHANGES, THERE WILL BE SOME REDUCTION IN
25 THE MONITORING COSTS, BUT THE MONITORING COSTS FOR THIS



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1 CONTRACT WILL STILL REMAIN SUBSTANTIALLY HIGHER THAN FOR MOST
2 CONTRACTS BECAUSE THERE ARE CERTAIN THINGS THAT COUNTY
3 EMPLOYEES HAVE TO DO IN REVIEWING THE WORK OF THIS CONTRACTOR
4 THAT ARE NOT REQUIRED OF MOST CONTRACTS.

5

6 **SUP. KNABE:** BUT ON THE OTHER HAND, THOUGH, OBVIOUSLY YOU'RE
7 PREDICTING INTO THE FUTURE AGAIN, TOO. SO THAT ESTIMATE IS
8 SIGNIFICANT.

9

10 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THE ESTIMATE DOESN'T ASSUME THE REDUCTION IN
11 THE STAFF, WHICH WE HOPE THE BOARD WILL APPROVE AT A TIME IN
12 THE FUTURE, WHICH WOULD ALLOW US TO REDUCE THOSE COSTS FOR THE
13 MONITORING COMPONENT, YOU'RE CORRECT.

14

15 **SUP. MOLINA:** BUT WHAT WE DO KNOW NOW, AT LEAST WHAT WE KNOW
16 NOW, THAT MONITORING IS VERY, VERY HIGH. WELL OVER 3 MILLION.
17 ALMOST 4 MILLION. WHICH IS UNBELIEVABLE. AND THE OTHER PART OF
18 IT, AS WELL, IS THAT IT COSTS US 240 GRAND TO GET HERE. AND
19 NOW THE PROPOSAL ON THE TABLE IS THAT POTENTIALLY SPEND
20 ANOTHER 240 GRAND TO GO SOMEWHERE ELSE OR MAYBE END UP IN THE
21 SAME PLACE, WE DON'T KNOW. BUT WE DO KNOW THAT IF IT ENDS UP
22 IN THE SAME PLACE, WE'RE GOING TO HAVE THIS ARGUMENT AGAIN. WE
23 KNOW THAT, WHICH IS SHAMEFUL. BUT THE POINT IS THAT WE ARE
24 SPENDING AN AWFUL LOT OF MONEY, AN AWFUL LOT OF MONEY, AND
25 PARTICULARLY WHEN IT'S ONLY A SMALL PORTION OF THE WORK THAT



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1 WE DO, IT REALLY IS SMALL BY COMPARISON TO WHAT WE DO WITH
2 GAIN OVERALL. AND IT'S GOING TO BE TOUGHER THAN EVER TO GET
3 THIS THING GOING AND CONSIDERING THE ECONOMY AND ALL. I LOOK
4 AT THIS, AND I'VE ALWAYS BEEN STARTLED BY CONTRACTING THIS OUT
5 WHEN WE HAVE DONE SUCH AN EFFICIENT JOB ON THE INSIDE. AND
6 WHEN YOU LOOK AT THE NUMBERS, CONSIDERING THE CASELOADS THAT
7 WE HANDLE AND THE OUTCOMES, THEY'RE PRETTY AMAZING. AND VERY
8 MUCH MATCHING OR OVER WHAT WAS BEING DONE BY PORTIONS OF THIS
9 CONTRACT, WHICH CONCERNS ME. I REALLY THINK THAT-- AND WE HAVE
10 AN OPPORTUNITY TO KEEP COUNTY EMPLOYEES. I MEAN AND WE ARE
11 TALKING ABOUT A SITUATION IN WHICH THIS IS MONEY THAT WOULD
12 COME BACK INTO THE COUNTY THAT WE COULD UTILIZE FOR OUR
13 EMPLOYEES. AND IF WE HAVE ANY SITUATION WHERE WE HAVE-- IT
14 JUST IS VALUABLE TO HAVE THESE EMPLOYEES HERE. SO I AM GOING
15 TO READ IN A MOTION THAT IS DIFFERENT BECAUSE I TRULY BELIEVE
16 THAT FOR THE LONGEST TIME THESE CONTRACTS WERE OUT OF PLACE.
17 AND REALLY WHAT TODAY DEMONSTRATES IS HOW CLEARLY THEY ARE OUT
18 OF PLACE, CONSIDERING THEY'RE A SMALL COMPONENT. IT IS MY
19 UNDERSTANDING THAT IN THE LAST-- IN A THREE-MONTH PERIOD, THE
20 INFORMATION THAT I WAS GIVEN, WE HAD, IN A THREE-MONTH PERIOD,
21 5,500 PLACEMENTS COMPARISON TO MAXIMUS WHO HAD, WHAT, 800 PLUS
22 600? WE'RE DOING SO MUCH MORE OF THIS WORK. AND WE SHOULD DO
23 IT ALL. AND IT WOULD JUST PROBABLY BE MORE EFFECTIVE AND MORE
24 EFFICIENT IF YOU REALLY LOOKED AT IT. SO MY AMENDMENT TO THIS
25 ITEM IS THAT "OVER THE PAST DECADE, LOS ANGELES COUNTY



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1 TAXPAYERS HAVE PAID TENS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN CONTRACTING
2 OUT TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES JOB PLACEMENT
3 PROGRAM FOR CALWORKS CLIENTS IN THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY AND
4 THE ANTELOPE VALLEY. THE GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES WERE
5 SOLICITED THROUGH A COMPETITIVE PROCESS IN MARCH OF 2008. IN
6 RESPONSE TO THE R.F.P., THE DEPARTMENT RECEIVED PROPOSALS FROM
7 TWO VENDORS, MAXIMUS INC. THE INCUMBENT WITH A SUBCONTRACT TO
8 JEWISH VOCATIONAL SERVICES AND A NEW CONTRACT P.S.I. WITH A
9 SUBCONTRACT OF BUILD REHABILITATION INDUSTRIES INC. ON MAY
10 20TH, 2008, D.P.S.S. COMPLETED ITS EVALUATION. BASED ON ITS
11 EVALUATION, P.S.I. WAS RECOMMENDED. THE P.S.I. BUSINESS
12 PROPOSAL HAS AN OVERALL HIGHEST RATING AND THE LOWEST COST
13 BID. SUBSEQUENTLY, THE COUNTY HAS ENGAGED IN A PROLONGED
14 PROTEST PROCESS THAT HAS COST TAXPAYERS AN ADDITIONAL \$3.5
15 MILLION. THIS INCLUDES A SECOND-LEVEL REVIEW AT THE DEPARTMENT
16 LEVEL, A COUNTY REVIEW PANEL, AN AUDITOR-CONTROLLER REVIEW AND
17 THE ONGOING COST OF MONITORING THE CONTRACT. THESE THREE
18 REVIEWS UPHOLD THE DEPARTMENT'S RECOMMENDATION TO AWARD THE
19 CONTRACT TO P.S.I. A TOTAL OF 3,347 HOURS, WHICH INCLUDE STAFF
20 AND D.P.S.S., THE AUDITOR-CONTROLLER, THE COUNTY REVIEW PANEL
21 AND COUNTY COUNSEL, HAS BEEN DEVOTED TO THIS PROCUREMENT
22 PROCESS. AT A TIME WHEN COUNTY REVENUE IS DECREASING AND DUE
23 TO THE DEMANDS OF COMPLYING WITH NEW WELFARE JOB PLACEMENT
24 GOALS, IT MAY BE THE APPROPRIATE TIME TO RETURN THESE CRITICAL
25 SERVICES IN-HOUSE. I THEREFORE MOVE THAT THE BOARD, NUMBER



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1 ONE, DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES
2 TO DEVELOP A PLAN TO RETURN THE CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES FOR
3 THE ANTELOPE VALLEY, WHICH IS REGION 2, AND THE SAN FERNANDO
4 VALLEY, WHICH IS REGION 7, TO THE DEPARTMENT, TO ADMINISTER
5 GAIN CASE MANAGEMENT FOR THE CASELOAD IN THOSE AREAS AND
6 REPORT BACK IN 45 DAYS. TWO, TO EXECUTE AN AMENDMENT SIX TO
7 MAXIMUS TO EXTEND ITS CONTRACT FOR TWO MONTHS WHILE THE
8 MAXIMUS SERVICES TRANSITIONS TO D.P.S.S.

9

10 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** I TELL YOU I AM NOT PREPARED TO SECOND A
11 MOTION TO DEVELOP A PLAN, BUT I WOULD SECOND A MOTION TO
12 EVALUATE A PLAN.

13

14 **SUP. MOLINA:** THAT WOULD BE FINE.

15

16 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** AND THE ISSUES THAT HAVE BEEN BROUGHT UP BY
17 SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH I THINK HAVE TO BE RESPONDED TO. AND
18 THOSE NUMBERS NEED TO BE EVALUATED. I THINK HE HAS MADE THE
19 POINT THAT ACTUALLY THE AMOUNT THAT WE'RE SPENDING PULLS IT
20 OUT OF-- AND IF THEY'RE SUCCESSFUL AND WE HOPE THEY'RE
21 SUCCESSFUL, WHO GIVES A CONTRACT WHERE YOU DON'T WANT THE
22 PEOPLE TO BE SUCCESSFUL? I CAN'T UNDERSTAND THAT. SO IF
23 THEY'RE SUCCESSFUL, YOU HAVE A PROP A PROBLEM. AND I JUST
24 THINK THAT YOU NEED TO EVALUATE IT AND EVALUATE THE WHOLE
25 APPROACH AND COME BACK AND DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT FIRST OF



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1 ALL THERE'S A VIOLATION OF PROP A. I THINK THAT THERE'S A VERY
2 STRON-- FROM ALL THE THINGS THAT HE HAS SAID, IT SOUNDS LIKE
3 THERE'S A VERY STRONG ISSUE THAT IF THEY'RE SUCCESSFUL, IT'S
4 GOING TO VIOLATE PROP A. NOW, YOU SAY GIVE 18 MONTHS AND THEN
5 YOU'LL DETERMINE IT. BUT I THINK THAT WHAT YOU NEED TO DO IS
6 TO ACTUALLY EVALUATE IT RIGHT NOW.

7

8 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** WELL, THE PROBLEM FOR US, SUPERVISOR, IS
9 THAT WE DON'T KNOW IF THEY WILL PERFORM.

10

11 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** YOU CAN TAKE THE LAST NUMBERS AND GET SOME
12 KIND OF IDEA. YOU CAN TAKE WHAT THEIR PROPOSED NUMBERS ARE.

13

14 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** WELL, AND WE DID, SUPERVISOR. WE TOOK
15 MAXIMUS AND THEIR PERFORMANCE AND WE ESTIMATED BASED UPON
16 THEIR PRIOR PERFORMANCE IF THEY HAD THIS NEW CONTRACT, THEY
17 WOULD GET 1 PERCENT MORE.

18

19 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** I KNOW. BUT WE ALSO KNOW THAT WE'VE HAD A
20 LOT OF MAXIMUS EXPERIENCES. I THINK THAT YOU CAN'T JUST TAKE
21 THAT. YOU HAVE TO TAKE WHAT IS THE BEST PERFORMANCE ANYWHERE
22 IN THE SYSTEM, WHICH WOULD BE WHAT YOUR EXPECTATIONS ARE. NOT
23 TAKE A HIGHER LEVEL OF PERFORMANCE THAN WHAT YOU HAVE. IF YOU
24 TAKE THE BEST PERFORMANCE IN THE SYSTEM AND ADD THAT



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1 INCENTIVE, YOU SHOULD BE ABLE TO GET SOME IDEA, I WOULD THINK.

2 IS THERE ANY OTHER DISCUSSION?

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** YOU HAVE TWO AMENDMENTS.

5

6 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** ON THE FIRST AMENDMENT. OH, WE HAVE ONE
7 PERSON TO SPEAK. YES, I'M SORRY, YOU DIDN'T GET A CHANCE.

8

9 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** WHAT ARE THE TWO AMENDMENTS?

10

11 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** TO EVALUATE PROP A.

12

13 **CLERK SACHI HAMAI:** THE FIRST AMENDMENT WAS TO APPROVE A SIX-
14 MONTH EXTENSION ON A MONTH-TO-MONTH BASIS AS THE SOLICITATION
15 PROCESS IS COMPLETED. AND THE SECOND ONE IS--

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** LET ME ALSO ADD ESTABLISH A NEW R.F.P. THAT
18 HAS A FLAT FEE WITH INCENTIVE PAYMENTS THAT IS COST-EFFECTIVE
19 AND DOESN'T VIOLATE PROP A AND SHOULD HAVE INITIAL TERM OF TWO
20 YEARS WITH OPTIONS TO RENEW THEREAFTER. IT SHOULD NOT BE
21 SCORED BY A CONSENSUS METHOD OF SCORING. NO SHREDDING OF
22 DOCUMENTS. WE NEED BACKUP.

23

24 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** THE SECOND MOTION?

25



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1 **SUP. MOLINA:** LET ME UNDERSTAND. IN THAT MOTION, IS THE R.F.P.
2 COMING BACK TO US FOR APPROVAL?

3

4 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I HOPE SO.

5

6 **SUP. MOLINA:** NO. IN THAT MOTION.

7

8 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THE PROBLEM WITH RELEASING THE R.F.P.--

9

10 **SUP. MOLINA:** AFTER ALL THIS ARGUMENT, I WANT TO MAKE SURE IT'S
11 ALL DONE RIGHT. SO I'M ASKING A QUESTION.

12

13 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** WHAT DOES THE STATE HAVE TO DO, ALSO?

14

15 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** I THINK THE STATE'S GOING TO HAVE SOME
16 CONCERN, TO BE HONEST. BUT THE R.F.P., WE WOULD HAVE TO BE
17 VERY CAREFUL IN HOW IT WAS CRAFTED AND DRAFTED AND WHO SAW IT
18 OTHERWISE IT WOULD GIVE POTENTIAL BIDDERS AN ADVANTAGE THAT
19 THEY WOULDN'T OTHERWISE HAVE. SO I'M NOT SURE IF I'M HEARING
20 YOU SAY, SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, THAT YOU'D LIKE SOME OF THE
21 BOARD STAFF TO PARTICIPATE, WHICH IS FINE WITH ME. WE JUST
22 NEED TO EMBARGO THAT R.F.P. SO THAT IT DOESN'T GET PUBLIC
23 DISTRIBUTION, OTHERWISE WE WILL ENDANGER THE PROCESS.

24

16 BOARDS OF SUPERVISORS, CITY COUNCILS, WHATEVER, COMMISSIONS,
17 WHO AWARD CONTRACTS, SO THEY CAN EVALUATE WHAT THE PROCESS WAS
18 BY THE RATERS. OTHERWISE, WHAT'S THE POINT OF BRINGING IT TO A
19 DECISION MAKING BODY LIKE OURS? YOU'RE BASICALLY SAYING "TRUST
20 US. WE REACHED THE CONSENSUS. WE KNEW WHAT WE WERE DOING."
21 THERE'S REALLY NO PURPOSE IN YOU BRINGING IT TO US. I DON'T
22 UNDERSTAND THAT AT ALL. IN ANY CASE, I'LL BET YOU THAT IF I
23 CALLED MR. CHRISTIE AND I ASKED HIM IF WE HAVE ANY OBJECTION
24 IF WEDO AN AVERAGING THAT MAINTAINS ALL THE DOCUMENTS FOR THE



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1 PURPOSES OF TRANSPARENCY, HE WOULD NOT HAVE THE PROBLEM WITH
2 THAT.

3

4 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** HE SAID WE COULD USE AVERAGING IF IF PEOPLE
5 DO NOT AGREE.

6

7 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** YOU SAID AT THE OUTSET THAT YOU WERE TOLD
8 THAT THEY WHAT THEY WANTED YOU TO DO.

9

10 **PHILLIP BROWNING:** THIS IS WHAT THEY WANT. BUT THE PROCESS ALSO
11 ALLOWS IF YOU DON'T HAVE PEOPLE WHO AGREE, THEN YOU AVERAGE.

20 **SUP. MOLINA:** I'M GOING TO DISAGREE WITH THIS. I DON'T
21 UNDERSTAND WHAT'S GOING ON. CONSENSUS BUILDING IS A VERY, VERY
22 CLEAR ISSUE. WHAT'S SO DIFFICULT TO UNDERSTAND. CONSENSUS IS
23 WHEN FIVE PEOPLE WALK INTO THE ROOM AND IF THE GOAL IS TO
24 REACH CONSENSUS, THAT'S THE GOAL. IF THE GOAL IS TO REACH

13

14 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THAT'S WHAT HIS MOTION SAYS.

15

16 **SUP. MOLINA:** SO YOU'RE GOING TO PUT FIVE PEOPLE IN THE ROOM.

17

18 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** GLORIA, THE WAY WE'VE BEEN DOING IT FOR 100
19 YEARS.

20

21 **SUP. MOLINA:** OH, NO, NO. WE HAVEN'T BEEN DOING THIS FOR 100
22 YEARS BECAUSE WE'VE SEEN THIS BEFORE. COME ON. SO IS THAT
23 CLEAR, THEN? I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE--

24

25 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** IS THERE AN OBJECTION TO ALLOWING HIM THE--

2 **SUP. MOLINA:** NO, WAIT, YVONNE. LET ME CLARIFY THIS ARE YOU

20 DIRECTIONS. FROM THE SENATE BILL NUMBER 504, CHAPTERS 827, THE
21 EXPOSITION METRO LINE CONSTRUCTION AUTHORITY, EXISTING LAW
22 ESTABLISHES THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION
23 AUTHORITY AS A SINGLE SUCCESSOR AGENCY TO SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA
24 RAPID TRANSIT DISTRICT. NOW, IF THE STATE LEGISLATION
25 RECOGNIZES THE L.A.C. M.T.A. AS THE TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION-



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1 - OR TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY, HOW CAN THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA
2 GOVERNANCE RECOGNIZE THE COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION AS
3 SOMETHING ELSE? THEN ALSO IN YOUR LENGTHY DISCUSSION YOU HAD
4 ON ITEM 25, PROP A WAS BROUGHT INTO THE DISCUSSION. NOW, GOING

18 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** OKAY. THANK YOU. REVEREND TILLMAN. PLEASE
19 STATE YOUR NAME, SIR.

21 **JAIME AMAYA:** YES. FIRST I'D LIKE TO SAY THANK YOU FOR THE
22 OPPORTUNITY TO ADDRESS THE BOARD. MY NAME IS JAIME GUILLERMO
23 AMAYA AND I REPRESENT THE TOM BOSCOE TECHNICAL INSTITUTE, THE
24 SCHOOL OF TENNIS, AND _____ PARK. MY PRESENCE HERE TODAY IS
25 TO LET THE BOARD KNOW THAT WE ARE VERY DISAPPOINTED, THE WAY



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1 THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION HAD HANDLED THE BIG
2 CONTRACT ISSUE FOR THE LEASE OF THE _____ TENNIS CLUB.
3 NUMEROUS EMAILS, LETTERS AND PHONE CALLS HAVE BEEN PLACED TO
4 MRS. MOLINA'S OFFICE AND THAT WE FELT THAT LITTLE ATTENTION
5 HAS BEEN PUT INTO THIS ISSUE. WE FELT THAT THE NEW MANAGEMENT
6 WHICH IS COMING PROBABLY DECEMBER 1ST IS JEOPARDIZING ALL THE

2 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** LET'S SEE IF THERE'S SOMEONE FROM THE
3 DEPARTMENT.

5 **SUP. MOLINA:** I ALREADY KNOW THIS ISSUE. THIS IS AN ISSUE WHERE
6 THEY PETITIONED AND IT'S THE SAME THING, WHERE THE OUTCOME
7 WASN'T WHAT THEY WANTED, AND WE HAVE A PROCESS THAT HAS BEEN
8 PUT IN PLACE. I THINK MY STAFF IS ADDRESSING IT AND WE CAN
9 TALK TO YOU DIRECTLY. I THINK THE PETITION, WE TRIED TO REACH
10 SOME OF THE PEOPLE. THE PETITION JUST WANTS THE SAME VENDOR,
11 AND THAT'S IT. AND I KNOW YOU'RE LOOKING INTO SOME WAYS TO--

13 **JAIME AMAYA:** WELL, I FELT LIKE FROM YOUR OFFICE, WE DON'T HAVE
14 THE-- FOR THE WAY THEY'VE BEEN TALKING BACK TO US, THEY DON'T
15 SEE IT IN HOW DIFFICULT IT IS FOR US TO CHANGE ADMINISTRATIONS
16 RIGHT NOW. WE'RE IN THE MIDDLE OF THE SEASON. IT'S CLEARLY--

18 **SUP. MOLINA:** I UNDERSTAND, BUT THAT WAS THE PROCESS FROM DAY
19 ONE. YOU UNDERSTOOD THAT.

21 **JAIME AMAYA:** WE'RE NOT TALKING ABOUT VENDING AND HOW MUCH
22 YOU'RE GOING TO CHARGE FOR A COCA- COLA. WE HAVE OVER THERE
23 COACHES THAT ARE COACHING KIDS FOR TWO, THREE, FOUR YEARS IN A
24 ROW, AND NOW WITH THE NEW ADMINISTRATION, ALL --

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1 **SUP. MOLINA:** BUT SIR, WAIT, WAIT. THAT'S THE WHOLE IDEA OF
2 SOME OF THESE CONCESSIONS, AND WE'VE PUT THEM OUT FOR A
3 PROCESS, AN R.F.P. PROCESS, AND THEY RESPOND AND THEN THERE'S
4 A WHOLE, YOU KNOW, EVALUATION THAT IS DONE. I MEAN, YOU CAN'T,

12 **SUP. MOLINA:** WE'RE TALKING ABOUT A PROCESS THAT WAS FAIR AND
13 EQUITABLE.

14

15 **JAIME AMAYA:** NO, WE'RE NOT TALKING ABOUT THE PROCESS BEING
16 FAIR AND UNFAIR. WE'RE TALKING ABOUT A KID THAT IS BEEN
17 TRAINED FOR A SPECIFIC PERSON AND NOW YOU'RE DRAMATICALLY
18 GOING TO CUT IT AND NOW HE HAVE TO GO SOMEWHERE ELSE FOR HIS
19 TRAINING.

20

21 **SUP. MOLINA:** NO, HE DOESN'T HAVE TO GO SOMEWHERE ELSE. THAT'S
22 NOT TRUE. THE PROGRAM WILL STAY THERE IT'S JUST THE SAME COACH
23 WON'T BE THERE.

24



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1 **JAIME AMAYA:** YOU DON'T HAVE PROVISIONS IN THE CONTRACT THAT
2 ALLOWS FOR US TO STAY. YOU GIVE THE NEW PERSON DELIVERY TO
3 HIRE OR NOT TO HIRE THE EXISTING COACHES.

4

5 **SUP. MOLINA:** THE BEST THING TO DO IS NOT ARGUE. WE CAN GO OVER
6 TO THE SIDE. I HAVE TWO STAFF PEOPLE THAT HAVE BEEN ASSIGNED
7 THIS. THEY'VE BEEN LOOKING AT IT.

8

9 **JAIME AMAYA:** I JUST WANT TO ADDRESS ONE MORE POINT BEFORE I GO
10 OUT. THIS PARTICULAR CORPORATION THAT IS TAKING OVER THIS
11 PARK, IT HAS 15 MORE PARKS THAT THEY MANAGE IN THE SAN GABRIEL
12 VALLEY, PASADENA AND ALL THE AREA, SO THEY CLEARLY ARE TAKING
13 THIS AS A MONOPOLY AND CONTROLLING ALL THE TENNIS COURTS IN
14 THE AREA. I MEAN, HOW ARE YOU GOING TO ALLOW TO DO THAT? HOW
15 CAN THAT BE IN THE BEST INTEREST OF THE COMMUNITY?

16

17 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** SOMEONE OVER THERE FROM HER STAFF CAN TALK
18 TO YOU ABOUT IT IN TERMS OF HOW THE PROCESS IS, EVEN THOUGH I
19 KNOW FROM LISTENING, YOU PROBABLY THINK YOU'LL BE OVERTURNED,
20 BUT SOMEONE OVER THERE WILL TALK TO YOU.

21

22 **JAIME AMAYA:** THANK YOU FOR THE OPPORTUNITY.

23

24 **SUP. BURKE, CHAIR:** STATE YOUR NAME, REVEREND TILLMAN.

25



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1 **REVEREND C. R. TILLMAN:** YES. REVEREND TILLMAN OUT OF ALTADENA.
2 WE THANK YOU FOR ALLOWING ME TO COME BEFORE YOU AND THE OTHER
3 BOARD MEMBERS AND OF COURSE, MY SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH. I'M
4 HERE ON THE KEY ISSUE THAT WAS ON THE BALLOT IN REFERENCE TO
5 SAME-SEX MARRIAGES, AS YOU PROBABLY KNOW, AT THE LAST MEETING
6 OF THIS BOARD. ANTONOVICH, YOU WERE ABSENT, SO MAYBE YOU
7 DIDN'T KNOW EXACTLY WHAT WENT ON, BUT THERE WAS QUITE A BIT OF
8 DISCUSSION AND THERE WAS A DECISION TO PURSUE AND JOIN IN THE
9 LAWSUIT THAT WAS FILED BY OTHER ENTITIES IN REFERENCE TO THE
10 SAME-SEX MARRIAGE. AND THIS ISSUE OF MARRIAGE IS DEFINED AS A
11 UNION BETWEEN A MAN AND A WOMAN TO PROTECT THIS DEFINITION
12 HELD BY WORLDWIDE CULTURES, RELIGIOUS SINCE THE BEGINNING OF
13 HUMAN KIND. IT IS OUR DUTY AS CITIZENS TO SUPPORT THROUGH OUR
14 ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES AND OFFICERS AN AMENDMENT TO THE
15 UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION. I THINK THAT'S REALLY THE SOLUTION
16 WHERE THIS NEEDS TO GO, IS THE UNITED STATES NEEDS TO HAVE AN
17 AMENDMENT IF WE'RE GOING TO DO IT RIGHT. WHY? BECAUSE IF WE
18 PASS A PROPOSITION HERE IN CALIFORNIA AND CONNECTICUT PASS IT
19 THAT THEY CAN GET MARRIED, WE HAVE FULL FAITH CREDIT ISSUES AS
20 COUNTY COUNSEL IS GOING TO LAY OUT TO YOU, AND SO EVENTUALLY
21 IT'S GOING TO BE A MESS, SO EITHER WE NEED TO DO A UNITED
22 STATES AMENDMENT OR WE NEED TO GET OUT OF THE BUSINESS OF
23 LICENSING MARRIAGES AND LET THE CHURCH CONTINUE TO DO IT, BUT
24 I ASK THIS QUESTION, WHY IS IT THIS DECADE THAT ALL OF A
25 SUDDEN WE HAVE THESE ISSUES COMING UP THAT WE DON'T WANT TO



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1 DEAL WITH AND WHY IS IT COMING UP NOW? THAT'S A QUESTION FOR
2 YOU TO THINK ABOUT, AND WHAT KIND OF MESS IS GOING TO BE
3 CREATED. FOR EXAMPLE, IF PETER MARRIED JESUS, WHAT WOULD WE
4 GET? WE'D GET PE-US. YOU'D GET A MESS. AND THAT'S WHAT'S GOING
5 ON. THE REASON WHY WE'RE CONCERNED, EVEN AS AN ADULT, WE CAN
6 SEPARATE THINGS AND LOOK AT THE LEGAL ISSUES. CHILDREN CAN'T.
7 SO A FIVE-YEAR-OLD CHILD, HE HEARS PETER AND JOHN GOT MARRIED
8 AND THEY SANCTIONED IT, HE THINKS, "WELL, MAYBE IT'S OKAY FOR
9 ME TO GET MARRIED TO JOHN AND PAUL." SO I THINK THAT'S WHAT
10 WE'RE DEALING WITH, AND THE DECAY OF OUR SOCIETY IS GOING TO
11 BE BUILT ON HOW WE DEAL WITH THIS ISSUE, AND WE CAN LEGISLATE
12 IT AND WE CANNOT ACT ON THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE, WE CAN DO A
13 LOT OF OTHER ISSUES. MY TIME IS SHORT, SO I WANT TO SAY, WE'RE
14 CONCERNED ABOUT RIGHTS. MADAME CHAIR, YOU MENTIONED THAT,
15 WE'RE CONCERNED ABOUT PEOPLE'S RIGHTS. WE'RE CONCERNED ABOUT
16 PEOPLE'S RIGHTS TO BE MARRIED AS GAYS, WE SHOULD ALSO BE
17 EQUALLY CONCERNED AS THE RIGHT OF ALTADENA TO HAVE A FAIR
18 ELECTION, THE RIGHT OF MISAPPROPRIATION OF FUNDS, GIVE \$1.1
19 BILLION TO JUDGES BY THE COUNTY'S MONEY THAT'S NOT
20 UNAUTHORIZED. WE ALSO SHOULD BE CONCERNED ABOUT A LOT OF OTHER
21 ISSUES THAT WE'RE NOT DEALING WITH, SO IF YOU'RE GOING TO DEAL
22 WITH EQUAL RIGHTS, LET'S DEAL WITH ALL OF THEM FAIRLY AND NOT
23 JUST ONE OF THEM BECAUSE ONE MAKES MORE NOISE THAN THE OTHER
24 ONE, AND I THANK YOU FOR YOUR TIME.

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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** CONSTITUTIONALITY, DOES A CHURCH HAVE A RIGHT
2 RELATIVE TO DENYING HOMOSEXUAL MARRIAGE IN THEIR CHURCH, AND
3 UNLIKE COMMUNION THAT HAS BEEN RAISED, IT'S A DOGMA OF THE
4 CHURCH, IT'S NOT IN THE STATE CONSTITUTION, WHICH THIS
5 PROPOSAL WOULD BE IN THE STATE CONSTITUTION, SO WE'RE TALKING
6 ABOUT CONSTITUTIONAL ISSUES. DOES THE CHURCH HAVE THAT RIGHT
7 TO DENY WITHOUT LOSING THEIR 503 OR THEIR ABILITY TO BE TRUE
8 TO THEIR FAITH, OR SYNAGOGUE, TRUE TO THEIR FAITH?

10 **REV. C. R. TILLMAN:** YOU'RE VERY BRILLIANT AND YOU HAVE ASKED
11 SOME OF THE KEY QUESTIONS, AND ASKED FOR SOME OF THE
12 INFORMATION. I THINK THE BIGGEST THING YOU ASK FOR IS WHY THEY
13 WAIT UNTIL AFTER IT GETS PASSED TO CHALLENGE IT? WHY NOT DO IT
14 BEFORE AND SAVE \$100 MILLION? I DON'T KNOW WHY ANY OF THE
15 OTHER SUPERVISORS DIDN'T COME UP WITH THIS, BECAUSE IT MAKES
