**RECOMMENDATION OF THE SUPERVISORIAL BOUNDARY REVIEW
COMMITTEE TO ADOPT REDISTRICTING PLAN ADJUSTING
SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT BOUNDARIES
(ALL DISTRICTS AFFECTED) (4 VOTES)**

SUBJECT

The County of Los Angeles Supervisorial Boundary Review Committee recommends to the Board of Supervisors the adoption of a redistricting plan that adjusts current supervisorial district boundaries to meet applicable constitutional and statutory requirements, relevant policy considerations, and applicable case law.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD AFTER THE PUBLIC HEARING:

1. Approve and adopt the "2011 Report and Recommendations of the Los Angeles County Supervisorial District Boundary Review Committee."
2. Close the Public Hearing and instruct the Executive Officer of the Board to place the BRC Recommended Plan A2 and accompanying Ordinance for a second public hearing and for adoption on the Agenda for September 6, 2011.
3. Approve and adopt after the second public hearing, the proposed Ordinance establishing the Supervisorial Boundaries as set forth in BRC Recommended Plan A2, and as in accordance with the "Report and Recommendations of the Los Angeles County Supervisorial District Boundary Review Committee."

4. Approve and adopt a series of minor boundary adjustments to unify communities within single districts based on recommendations of County Staff, due to current anomalies in BRC Recommended Plan A2, as detailed in the "Report and Recommendations of the Los Angeles County Supervisorial District Boundary Review Committee."
5. Instruct the Executive Officer of the Board and Chief Executive Officer to:
 - a) Post a public hearing notice in newspapers of general circulation and on the County's Redistricting website, to inform the public of the public hearing on the adoption of the proposed ordinance, and
 - b) Inform the public of the availability for public review of a copy of the submitted Redistricting Plan and proposed Ordinance at the Executive Office of the Board and the County's Redistricting Website.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

On November 16, 2010, your Board approved the mission, policies, and procedures for establishing a 10-member advisory Supervisorial Boundary Review Committee (Committee) for the purpose of examining the existing supervisorial district boundaries and determining, based on Census 2010 population data and applicable legal requirements, if and how supervisorial districts should be adjusted to account for population and demographic changes. Pursuant to California Elections Code, the Committee's advisory recommendation is required to be reported to your Board by August 1, 2011.

On July 13, 2011, on a majority vote, the Committee voted to recommend to your Board BRC Recommended Plan A2 (Plan A2) that reflects adjustments to the current supervisorial district boundaries and reduces the total population deviation among the districts from 9.97 percent, as reflected in the Benchmark (current) Plan, to 1.69 percent. Plan A2 reflects proposed amendments to the Benchmark Plan A1. The Committee's recommendation was based on consideration of redistricting plans submitted by the public; community input solicited under your Board's approved Public Access Plan; and conformance with applicable law and widely-recognized redistricting principles. Details of Plan A2 are included in Attachment I, "Report and Recommendations of the Los Angeles County Supervisorial District Boundary Review Committee."

The Committee in recommending Plan A2 stated that it:

- Minimizes disruption and change in the current districts;
- Complies with the "one-person, one-vote" principle by significantly reducing overall population deviation among the districts;
- Complies with other legal requirements and precedent;

- Respects communities of interest and does not create any additional city splits (the City of Los Angeles is currently split among the five districts, and a small portion of the City of Azusa [predominately in the First District] is currently in the Fifth District); and
- Preserves the ability of cohesive minority groups to elect candidates of their choice and does not use race as a predominant factor in determining boundaries.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The recommended action will result in nominal administrative costs associated with adjusting County supervisorial boundaries, such as realigning voting precincts for Supervisorial elections.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Public Participation

A key focus of the Committee, as set forth by your Board's Public Access Plan, was to solicit and encourage public participation in each step of the Committee's process. The Committee undertook extensive public outreach, which is detailed in Attachment I, and included the following:

- At least two community outreach meetings in each supervisorial district that provided the public access to information and Committee members, and an opportunity to provide input in a more informal setting in their own community.
- Fifteen public meetings of the Committee where formal Committee business was conducted and ample opportunity for public input was afforded.
- Creation and frequent updating of County's Redistricting website that provided the public with all Committee and redistricting information such as community meeting dates, agendas, and notes; Committee meeting dates, agendas, and minutes; comments provided by the public; redistricting law and principles; redistricting data; and other redistricting-related information.
- Provision of ESRI Redistricting Online software by the County to allow the public, free of charge, to develop and submit redistricting plans for Committee consideration. The redistricting software was accessible via the County's Redistricting Website and submitted plans were posted on the Website for public review and comment. In addition, the deadline to submit redistricting plans was extended eight days at the request of the public to allow for additional plans to be submitted.
- Dissemination of redistricting information via press releases and emails to various distributions lists that included individuals, community groups, and government jurisdictions.

Applicable Federal, State, and Local Laws

The Committee was provided with guidance that outlined the applicable constitutional and statutory requirements, policy considerations, and applicable case law. These are discussed in detail in Attachment I and include the following:

- a) *Equalize the population among the supervisorial districts as required by United States Constitution, California Constitution, and other applicable laws* - This refers to consideration of the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment, which requires that electoral districts be afforded equality of representation to their residents, i.e., the “one-person–one vote” principle. In addition, California law requires that supervisorial districts “be as nearly as equal in population as may be.” However, slight population deviation is permissible provided that it is necessary in order to achieve a rational stated policy, such as respecting communities of interest and boundaries of political subdivisions, preserving the cores of prior districts, avoiding contests between incumbent representatives, and minimizing population shifts that result in vote deferral and advancement.
- b) *Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act* – This section prohibits any practice of procedure that, interacting with social and other historical conditions, impairs the ability of minority voters to elect candidates of their choice on an equal basis with other voters. For a redistricting plan to violate Section 2, a court must find racial exclusion resulting in vote dilution, a finding that will be heavily dependent upon the facts of each case.
- c) *County Charter* – The County Charter provides for five supervisorial districts in Los Angeles County, with each supervisor residing in the district they represent. In addition, the Charter provides that boundaries will not be changed so as to affect the incumbency of any supervisor in office.
- d) *State Elections Code* - This Code provides that “in establishing the boundaries of the districts, the board may give consideration to the following factors: (a) topography, (b) geography, (c) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory, and (d) community of interests of the districts.” These factors are consistent with those traditional districting principles considered by courts in reviewing Voting Rights Act compliance.

Consideration of Redistricting Plans

The Committee was presented with 19 redistricting plans from the public, but only 17 were considered (one plan proposed 16 districts that would have required a County Charter amendment, and another plan was rescinded by the author). Each plan was analyzed by County staff and presented at a Committee meeting. Plan authors were invited to address the Committee on their plans. As a result of plans submitted by the public and public testimony, the Committee requested consideration of two additional plans: one included minor amendments to the Benchmark Plan A1, referred to as Proposed Amended Plan A1, and the other included minor amendments to Plan S1 (LACBOS African American Plan), referred to as Proposed Amended Plan S1. Discussion of each submitted plan is provided in Attachment I.

Boundary Review Committee Recommended Plan

The Committee reviewed all submitted redistricting plans and considered public testimony. Outside counsel provided the Committee with preliminary legal analysis that neither Proposed Amended Plan A1 nor Proposed Amended Plan S1 appeared likely to violate applicable law, including Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act. Outside counsel added that, based on initial analysis, creation of two majority Hispanic citizen voting age population districts, as Proposed Amended Plan S1 did, was likely not required for Section 2 compliance, since it appears Hispanic candidates of choice were usually able to be elected.

Following discussion, the Committee voted six (members Acebo, Hollister, Hatanaka, Pedersen, Hoffenblum and Sun) to four (members Andrade, Reyes, Choi, and Harris) to not recommend Proposed Amended Plan S1 and by the same margin, voted instead to recommend Proposed Amended Plan A1 (now identified as BRC Recommended Plan A2) for your Board's consideration. Plan A2 would amend the Benchmark Plan A1 by moving:

- The City of West Covina and a portion of the unincorporated area of Covina Islands from the Fifth District to the First District;
- The City of Santa Fe Springs and the unincorporated area of South Whittier from the First District to the Fourth District;
- The portion of the unincorporated area of Rowland Heights currently in the First District in to the Fourth District, and unify it with the portion of Rowland Heights already in the Fourth District;
- A portion of the City of Los Angeles – Westhills area from the Fifth District to the Third District.

In recommending Plan A2, Committee members stressed their concerns over the major changes in current districts that would be affected if Amended Plan S1 were adopted, and the resulting disruption in current relationships, communities of interest, and voting deferral (delaying the opportunity for citizens to vote). These members cited the overwhelming oral and written public comments to the Committee that recommended little, if any, change in the current Supervisorial districts.

Committee members who voted in favor of Proposed Amended Plan S1 rather than Plan A2, cited what they believed was an overconcentration of Hispanics in the current First District, and the need to create a second Hispanic citizen voting age population district in order to comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act. Committee members Andrade, Reyes, Martinez, Ollague, Holoman, Choi, and Escandon have transmitted a "minority report" recommending your Board's adoption of the Amended Plan S1.

Prior to adoption of a final redistricting plan, the Committee suggests that outside counsel provide a more thorough and detailed analysis to address issues of compliance with the Voting Rights Act and other applicable law.

Additionally, your Board may wish to include a series of minor boundary adjustments to unify communities within single districts based on recommendations of County staff. These current anomalies are mainly due to Census geography errors, and mostly concern unpopulated territory. However, two of the minor adjustments concern populated areas: the small portion of the City of Azusa in the Fifth District (295 residents), and the small portion of the unincorporated community of Avocado Heights/Bassett (26 residents). These minor boundary adjustments are detailed in Attachment I.



I. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Los Angeles County Supervisorial District Boundary Review Committee [BRC], which was created by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors [Board] to review how the County's existing supervisorial districts may be redistricted, has conducted and completed an open process in addressing this issue. That process, as explained in greater detail in this Report, included extensive community outreach and participation, and BRC review of the current benchmark redistricting plan [Benchmark Plan or Plan A1] along with all of the other plans submitted by interested members of the public and various organizations.

Interested members of the public and various organizations submitted a total of 19 plans by the June 10, 2011 submission deadline. During the BRC's review process, it was found that many of these plans would result in movement of a substantial number of people; significantly impact voter deferral and advancement; split a greater number of cities and/or unincorporated areas than in the current Benchmark Plan; group dissimilar communities together; violate the Los Angeles County Charter by moving residences of supervisors out of the districts to which they were elected or failed to provide for five supervisorial districts; and/or lack community support for the reconfigured supervisorial districts.

As a result of this process, the BRC is recommending that the current supervisorial boundaries be modified, as described in this Report and as contained in the BRC Recommended Plan—Plan A2 [Plan A2]. The *Report on Proposed Redistricting Plan A2 – BRC Recommended Plan* [A2 Report], is attached hereto as Attachment A. This plan is intended to provide fair and effective representation for all the people of the County of Los Angeles and enhance the opportunity for all voters to elect candidates of their choice. The plan would lower the total population deviation of the Benchmark Plan from 9.97% to 1.69%. In addition, while further detailed analysis is necessary,¹ the BRC has been advised that the plan is viewed as likely compliant with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act and other legal requirements.

The BRC now recommends that the Board take the following actions:

1. Approve and adopt this "2011 Report and Recommendations of the Los Angeles County Supervisorial District Boundary Review Committee" [Report].
2. Adopt as the County's Decennial Redistricting Plan, the BRC Recommended Plan A2 discussed in this Report, including adopting County staffs' recommendation to correct for minor anomalies in Plan A2.
3. Adopt the ordinance approved by County Counsel, which establishes the supervisorial district boundaries for 2011 in accordance with this Report.

¹ This analysis will be provided to the Board during the course of its deliberations on a redistricting plan.

II. PROCEDURAL HISTORY

A. *Boundary Review Committee*

1. *Creation of BRC*

On November 16, 2010, the Board adopted the recommendation of the Chief Executive Office [CEO] to create the BRC; approve mission, policies, and procedures for the BRC; and approve a Public Access Plan, in concept, to be further refined by the CEO and/or the BRC.² (See also, *Cal. Elec. Code* § 21505.)³

The BRC is comprised of ten (10) voting members and ten (10) alternates, of which two members and two alternates are nominated by each Supervisor and appointed by the Board. The BRC was charged with the following mission:

“To study the existing supervisorial district boundary ordinance and determine, based on Census 2010 population data and applicable legal requirements, if and how supervisorial districts should be adjusted to account for population and demographic changes;

“To convene public hearings to receive, review, and analyze proposed redistricting plans submitted by committee members, the public, and other organizations; and

“To recommend for adoption by the Board of Supervisors a decennial redistricting plan which provides fair and effective representation for all the people of the County, enhances the opportunity for all voters to elect candidates of their choice, and which otherwise meets all the requirements of law. A final Supervisorial Redistricting Plan shall be approved to the Board of Supervisors by October 31, 2011 to comply with the Election Code.”

2. *Organizational Meeting*

The first meeting of the BRC was held on March 2, 2011. The purpose of the meeting was to organize the BRC by: electing a Chair and Vice-Chair; receive information regarding rules and procedures including the Ralph M. Brown Act [Open Meeting Law] (*Cal. Gov. Code*

² By letter dated November 16, 2010, the CEO and County Counsel reported to the Board the "Process for 2011 Decennial Redistricting of Supervisorial District Boundaries," outlining the anticipated process and requirements for County redistricting.

³ *California Elections Code* Section 21505 provides that "[t]he board may appoint a committee composed of residents of the county to study the matter of changing the boundaries of the supervisorial districts. The committee shall make its report to the board of its findings on the need for change of boundaries, and the recommended changes, within six months after the final population figures determined in each federal decennial census have been released, but in any event not later than August 1st of the year following the year in which the census is taken. Recommendations of the committee are advisory only."

§ 54950 *et seq.*) and adopt Robert's Rules of Order; discuss the legal aspects of redistricting; approve the time line and meeting schedule; review and adopt the Public Access Plan approved by the Board in concept on November 16, 2010 and as further refined by the CEO; review the proposed County redistricting website; and complete an initial review of plan analysis and submission forms. [BRC Minutes, 03/02/2011.] Public comment was invited throughout the initial meeting and during all subsequent BRC meetings.

The BRC elected Curt Pedersen, Fourth Supervisorial District appointee, as Chair, and Teresa Holoman, Second Supervisorial District appointee, as Vice-Chair.

3. *BRC Staff*

Staff to the BRC consisted of representatives of the CEO (Operations Cluster, Quality and Enrichment Programs and Services Branch; Office of Public Affairs; Multimedia, Cable & Telecommunication), County Counsel, Executive Officer-Clerk of the Board (Commission Services) [Executive Officer], Chief Information Officer [CIO], Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk [Registrar], Internal Services Department [ISD], Regional Planning Department [Regional Planning] and independent consultants.

In accordance with Board direction, two consultants were retained for purposes of providing specialized services and expertise pertaining to redistricting – David Ely of Compass Demographics LLC and John Hedderson of Hedderson Demographic Services.⁴

B. *BRC Redistricting Process*

1. *Public Access Plan*

A Public Access Plan adopted by the Board in concept on November 16, 2010, and as further refined by the CEO and adopted by the BRC on March 2, 2011, expressed the County's commitment to promote public participation in the redistricting process, ensure the widest practicable participation by the public, and provide for dissemination of pertinent redistricting information by employing innovative technologies.

⁴ Mr. Ely has served as a consultant for numerous redistricting projects for the County of Los Angeles, the City of Los Angeles, and the Los Angeles Unified School District, and has served as a consultant and expert witness in litigation involving database construction and demographic analysis. Mr. Ely assisted in the 1991 and 2001 redistricting efforts for the County, including working on database construction, demographic and voter analysis, and providing technical assistance.

Mr. Hedderson, who was formerly employed as a senior demographer in the then-Chief Administrative Office's (CAO) Urban Research Division, has participated in the County's review of the 1990 and 2000 Census data, construction of the 1991 and 2001 redistricting database, and litigation on the adjustment of undercount and overcount in the 1990 Census. Mr. Hedderson has also prepared annual estimates and projections of the County's census tract populations by age, race and ethnicity, sex and poverty level, and in this year's redistricting effort, analyzed American Community Survey (ACS) data to approximate citizen voting age population (CVAP) and other data in the County.

To accomplish this, the Public Access Plan contained the following major elements:

- Development of a County Redistricting Website;
- Community outreach, including public outreach meetings;
- Process for developing/submitting redistricting plans;
- Review process and public access to review submitted plans; and
- Timetable for adoption of a Supervisorial District Boundary Ordinance.

2. *Development of a County Redistricting Website*

The Supervisorial Redistricting website was developed in-house to provide electronic access for the public and BRC members to redistricting information and materials, and the County's free redistricting software, ESRI Redistricting Online, that could be used to prepare proposed plans for submission at no charge to the public. Equally important, the website provided updated and ongoing information about the County's redistricting process. Website information includes:

- Introduction
- Public Access Plan
- Biographies of BRC members
- Boundary Review Committee agendas and minutes
- Community meeting dates and minutes
- Schedules of meetings and important dates in the redistricting process
- Public comments and letters received from the public
- Instructions for preparing and submitting plans using the County's free redistricting software, including how to use reference layers
- Current district boundaries
- Submitted proposed redistricting plans
- Access to download all proposed plans including maps, reports and other analyses of demographic and voter registration data
- Access to enable downloading of redistricting data
- Listing of County libraries where members of the public preparing redistricting plans could use computers for extended periods of time
- Resources⁵
- Assistance in other languages

⁵ Resources include links to other redistricting sites; additional information sources; Frequently Asked Questions and a glossary of terms used in redistricting. Included are links or references to: U.S. Census Bureau; California Department of Finance; Voting Rights Act, 42 USC § 1973; California State Elections Code [Section 21500 21506]; Los Angeles County Charter (Article II, Section 7); Los Angeles County Code (Title 1, Chapter 1.08); the Boundary Review Committee's Information/Resource Guide; Election data to be used for 2011 Decennial Redistricting of Los Angeles County; County Counsel's Legal Issues Overview of Redistricting Los Angeles County in 2011; July 2010 "Strength in Numbers: Your Guide to Census 2010 Redistricting Data from the U.S. Census Bureau"; and a list of unincorporated areas and cities in the County.

Website information was updated on an ongoing basis to reflect each stage of the redistricting process. Updates included all meeting agendas, minutes of meetings, submitted redistricting plans, and significant redistricting dates of the BRC. In addition, "pop-up" windows were utilized to alert visitors of upcoming BRC meetings and availability of newly submitted redistricting plans for review. The Supervisorial Redistricting website also provided the public with an opportunity to provide written comments, submit questions, or to provide their contact information to the County so they could receive regular email updates and notifications about the redistricting process.

Between March 11, 2011, when the website went live to the public, and July 13, 2011, the last meeting of the BRC, there was a total of 30,000+ unique visitors to the website and its various pages. The most popular pages visited include the "Boundary Review Committee" pages for Biographies, Schedules/Agendas/Minutes, Summary of Public Comments/Letters and the Submitted Plans page. In addition, the "Prepare a Plan" page also received a large number of visitors.

3. *Public Outreach Efforts*

In addition to the website, BRC public outreach efforts included its official public meetings and informal community meetings; solicitation of letters from the public regarding communities of interest; media outreach; technical training and consultation sessions for the County's redistricting software, and "Open Houses" for those seeking information about redistricting, plan preparation or redistricting software.

a. *BRC Meetings*

Fifteen meetings of the BRC were held between March 11, 2011 and July 13, 2011. Each meeting was open to the public and designed to provide as much information to the public as was available and to encourage public comment and participation. Public attendance appeared to increase as the process progressed, with public attendance being highest for the last two meetings of the BRC on July 11 and July 13, 2011. The last two meeting dates coincided with discussion by the BRC regarding which redistricting plan should be proposed to the Board of Supervisors.

All meetings of the BRC were noticed and open to the public in accordance with Board directive and in compliance with the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code § 54950 et seq.). In addition, the meeting dates were listed on the County's Redistricting website and announced via a pop-up window, and were also announced via press releases issued by the CEO's Office of Public Affairs.

At each BRC meeting, staff generated and supplied agenda-related documents to the public. These documents were received by the BRC, and are part of the record of proceedings.

Speakers from the public were encouraged to address the Committee throughout each meeting. Public comment was provided by representatives of a number of organizations at the BRC meetings, including the Mexican American Legal Defense Education Fund (MALDEF), the Community Coalition, League of Women Voters, Los Angeles Civil Rights Association, National Association of Latino Elected Officials (NALEO) Educational Fund, Mexican American Bar Association (MABA), San Fernando Valley Redistricting Coalition, Mayor of Signal Hill, Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce, Asian Pacific Policy and Planning

Council, Mayor Pro Temp for the City of Whittier, Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce, City Council of Manhattan Beach, Mayor of City of Cerritos, Mayor of La Mirada, Independent Cities Association, Marina City Club/Club Management Council, California Contract Cities Association, Hacienda Heights Improvement Association (HHIA), Essex Marina City Club, Wilmington YMCA, Mayor of Rolling Hills, Greater Lakewood Chamber of Commerce, and a number of other members of the public.

The two final meetings of the BRC, held on July 11 and 13, 2011, were streamed live on the County's website. It is estimated that nearly 1,000 unique viewers watched the meetings on July 11 and 13, 2011.

b. *Community Meetings*

Beginning in April 2011, ten community meetings were held throughout Los Angeles County, with at least two meetings in each Supervisorial district.

The BRC hosted these meetings to provide information to the public regarding the redistricting process and to solicit information from the public regarding their concerns and identified communities of interest. In these informal meetings, individuals from the community provided BRC members and County staff with general comments, as well as comments on communities of interest, County demographics, preferences on whether and how the supervisorial boundaries should be changed, and their relationship with their Supervisors. A summary of the public comments received at the community meetings was developed and made available on the County's Redistricting website on the Summary of Public Comments/Letters page.

Meeting agendas and informational handouts were provided in English, Spanish and Russian. Spanish, Russian and sign language interpretation services were made available and provided upon request at meetings. The meetings were conducted in various settings including public libraries, park facilities, senior and recreational centers, and schools.

The community meetings provided the public with direct access to BRC members and an opportunity to hear from staff regarding County procedures and the legal aspects of redistricting. In all, approximately 90 individuals submitted public comments that were recorded during the community meetings.

c. *Letters from the Public*

The BRC encouraged the public to participate in the redistricting process by using a variety of forums. To solicit information on communities of interest, the public were asked for their views on elements comprising the identified communities of interest and were encouraged to visit the County Redistricting website, submit written comments, and submit a redistricting plan, if desired.

As of the last BRC meeting on July 13, 2011, over 1,150 pieces of correspondence were received regarding redistricting. This correspondence discussed various issues including identifying numerous communities of interest, and requesting that certain geographical areas remain in the current district or that a certain community be moved to another district. A number of the letters requested that the current supervisorial lines of the Fourth District remain intact; the

Santa Monica Mountains/San Fernando Valley/Topanga Canyon areas remain in the Third District; Altadena remain in the Fifth District; and Florence/Firestone be united in one district. The letters also discussed general concerns.

Letters from the public were received by the BRC and were subsequently made available to the public on the County's Redistricting website. A summary of the written correspondence was also developed and made available on the County's redistricting website under the Summary of Public Comments/Letters page.

d. *Media and Public Outreach*

Throughout the redistricting process, the CEO's Office of Public Affairs issued a series of press releases and in addition to the Supervisorial Redistricting website, provided information on the Los Angeles County's main webpage. This included information provided to the media and on the County Redistricting website for each community meeting and each BRC meeting. The CEO's Office of Public Affairs sent out a total of 12 advisories and eight news releases, which were disseminated to a master list of media contacts including nearly 400 local journalists and media outlets, including radio, print, and television newsrooms. This resulted in newspaper articles and radio reports, in addition to a variety of press inquiries. Members of the media also attended some community and BRC meetings.

Additionally, the CEO's Office of Public Affairs expanded distribution of BRC advisories and releases via email to leaders in all 88 incorporated cities in the County, and requested that all correspondence and notices be forwarded to all council members. All correspondence and notices were also sent to the LA City Neighborhood Councils, and the national and State delegations of the County. The mailing list maintained by the Executive Officer/Commission Services included scores of community groups, town councils and other community and civic organizations in addition to hundreds of individual constituents.

e. *Technical Consultation*

County staff provided technical consultation to members of the public and the BRC on the use of the County's Redistricting Software, ESRI Redistricting Online, to prepare and review proposed redistricting plans. Technical consultation took the form of public training sessions and one-on-one "Open Houses."

Live online training sessions for the free redistricting software were provided to the public on April 26, 27, 28 and 30, 2011. In addition, the April 30, 2011 training session was recorded and made available on the County's Redistricting website so that any member of the public could access the training session at their convenience.

Technical consultation was also provided through Open Houses, where County staff was available to answer questions from the public regarding use of the redistricting software. The Open Houses occurred on May 4, May 18, and June 1, 2011 at the Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration.

4. *Process For Developing/Submitting Redistricting Plans*

a. *Review of Plans by BRC and Public*

A thoughtful and informative public process for developing and submitting proposed redistricting plans was set forth on the County's Redistricting website and in the Public Access Plan. Plans could be created and submitted using the County's free redistricting software, or by another means, including alternative software programs.

Initially, the BRC set June 2, 2011 as the deadline for submitting redistricting plans to the BRC for consideration. After receiving requests from the public and certain BRC members to extend the deadline for submission due to overlapping time constraints with the California Redistricting Commission's process, the BRC extended the submission deadline to June 10, 2011 at 5:00 PM. [BRC Minutes, 06/01/2011].

Plans submitted to the County were reviewed for data accuracy and conformance with basic requirements. As plans were received, they were quickly uploaded into the County's redistricting website at the "Submitted Plans" tab of the "Prepare a Plan" and "Boundary Review Committee" pages for public review. In addition, pop-up messages were utilized to alert the public that new proposed plans were available for viewing.

County staff analysis of submitted plans using the County-provided redistricting software were generally completed within three business days, although plans submitted using other redistricting software took longer due to technical differences in the submitted content.

All submitted plans were subject to the review and consideration of the BRC and could be revised or modified as the BRC deemed appropriate. Requests by proposers to rescind submitted plans would be recorded and reported to the BRC. However, any rescinded plans would remain available for BRC consideration.

The BRC regularly heard public comments during each of their meetings for the purpose of public input on communities of interest, any submitted redistricting proposal(s), and the general goals of the redistricting process. Each submitted plan was noticed on the BRC agenda in accordance with the Brown Act, and supporting documents detailing the analysis of each plan were made publicly available. These supporting documents included Plan Analyses and Deferral/Advancement Reports for each plan, which were prepared by CEO staff, and summaries highlighting various elements of each plan, which were prepared by County Counsel.

Plan proposers were also notified when their plans were publicly noticed for a BRC meeting, so that they could attend the meetings and provide testimony if they so wished. Attendance by proposers however, was not required. A total of 19 plans were submitted by members of the public or various organizations, with one plan being rescinded by the author and another not being reviewed because it provided for 16 districts. A summary table of the remaining 17 plans, along with the two amended plans the BRC considered, is attached hereto as Attachment B.

b. *The County's Redistricting Software*

Proposed redistricting plans were created and submitted predominantly by the public using the County's redistricting software at no cost to the user. However, a few plans, such as Plans Q1, R1 and S1, were submitted using the Maptitude application.

The County's redistricting software was made accessible directly through the County's Redistricting website. Users were asked to create unique usernames and passwords in order to use the software. Users were then able to view the current supervisorial boundary lines, create redistricting plans, share plans, create and view reports for proposed plans, and submit proposed plans directly to the County. Users were provided various tools in the software so that they could choose a community or a Redistricting Unit (RDU) to move and balance populations between districts (see description of RDUs, below). Users could choose communities/RDUs individually or select from tools to move large numbers of populations quickly. Plans could be saved directly in the software or downloaded locally to a hard drive.

County software users were also able to view tables/charts showing distribution of population within the various districts in proposed plans. These tables/charts were updated as users selected and moved populations between districts. Users were also able to use the "share" features found in the software to invite the public, friends and colleagues to view and /or comment on proposed plans.

A completed plan could be electronically submitted directly to the County through the software. As part of the proposed plan submission, proposers were asked, but were not required to, answer the following questions:

- "The main objectives of the proposed plan are...
- Plan provides fair and effective representation by...
- Plan enhances opportunity for all voters by...
- Plan meets all requirements of law by...
- Optional additional comments are..."

Some proposers responded to these questions and were able to provide the BRC with additional information regarding the considerations used to draw the various plans.

5. *Redistricting Database*

To assist the BRC and the public in preparing and reviewing redistricting plans, County staff and consultants created a database comprised of Census data, American Community Survey [ACS] data, voter information, election results, voter turnout, demographic and socioeconomic data, and countywide data, which was loaded into the County's redistricting software.

The redistricting database consisted of information compiled by Census tract and split tract if a tract straddles a city, supervisorial or other boundary. For simplicity, the database referred to the tracts/split tracts as "Redistricting Units" or "RDUs." (RDUs are primarily census tracts within the County of Los Angeles from which data have been compiled for use in the redistricting software.) The database included city and unincorporated community boundaries, as well as communities within the City of Los Angeles. The database also includes

congressional, state senate and assembly district boundaries, and boundaries of local school districts and Los Angeles City Council districts.

Census information included the population and race/ethnicity categories released in the 2010 Census PL-94 Redistricting Data. Socioeconomic data included self-reported ACS information on household income, assessed value of homes, and homeowners/renters. Poverty, education level and primary language data was also added to the database. Voter information included registration data for age, gender, political party affiliation and Hispanic and Asian surname data. Also included were election results and voter turnout for certain elections and races dating back to 2002.⁷ Countywide information included a County map identifying existing supervisorial boundaries, the location of selected County facilities, and a listing of the Census tract location of certain elected officials' residences.

Reference layers were also made available to the public for use in the County's free redistricting software.⁸ A reference layer is a visual overlay that can be placed over the base map. A reference layer may be turned on or off (displayed or not displayed) by the user or overlaid on top of another reference layer. Information in a reference layer could be used to generate reports or analyze a redistricting plan; however, it could only be used as a visual tool for a user to refer to when drawing a redistricting plan. For example – the user may refer to city council boundaries for purposes of alignment to new supervisorial district boundaries.

All data made available in the County's redistricting software was also made available to the public in Excel spreadsheets. In addition, Shapefiles were also provided that covered different geographical map layers as well as certain election data. Electronic PDF copies of base maps for the current Benchmark Plan were also provided. All data and GIS layers were available for download by the public through the County's Redistricting website.

Selected City of Los Angeles Election Results for Mayor, City Attorney, Controller, Propositions, and Charter Amendments; Major County Facilities; Education Level (% of adult age 25 or up without high school diploma or equivalent); Poverty Level (% of households below poverty level); English Fluency Level (% does not speak English well); and Primary Household Languages (Arabic, Armenian, Chinese, Cambodian, English, Farsi, Korean, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Other) indicated in percentages. In addition, the 2006 Races of Debra Bowen v. Deborah Ortiz and Rocky Delgadillo v. Jerry Brown, were also provided.

6. *Timetable to Adopt a Supervisorial District Boundary Ordinance*

The public and the BRC were provided a timetable for adoption of the 2011 Supervisorial District Boundary Ordinance. Important dates included the BRC meetings; activation of the County's Redistricting website and free redistricting software; the deadline to submit proposed redistricting plans for BRC consideration; commencement of BRC deliberations on recommendations to the Board; and anticipated timeframes for public hearings before the Board and any actions by the Board in considering and adopting a redistricting plan.

The public was also informed of the statutory deadlines for the transmittal of the BRC's recommendations to the Board (August 1, 2011), and the date by which adjustment of the supervisorial districts must be effective (October 31, 2011).

C. *BRC Record*

Numerous documents provide a written record of the County's redistricting process undertaken by the BRC. These include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Press releases
- Agendas
- Hand-out materials
- Maps
- Sign-in sheets
- Meeting minutes
- Meeting transcripts for the July 6, 11 and 13 BRC Meetings.
- DVD recordings of the July 11 and 13 Meetings streamed live on the County's website
- 1,150+ Letters received by the Board and the BRC
- Proposed Redistricting Plans submitted by the public
- Staff analysis and summaries of plans submitted by the public
- Staff analysis and summaries of proposed plans considered for recommendation by the BRC
- County Counsel summaries of plans
- July 13, 2011 Report on the Legal Standards Pertaining to the Los Angeles County Redistricting Process by Professor Justin Levitt, with Exhibits
- July 13, 2011 Letter of Sean Andrade, Steven J. Reyes, Alma D. Martinez, Louisa Ollague, Teresa Holoman, John Choi and Jesus M. Escandon

The record of proceedings, including all related documents, is maintained in the offices of the Executive Officer-Clerk of the Board and is open for public inspection and copying in accordance with the Public Records Act (*Cal. Gov. Code* § 6250 *et seq.*) and relevant County policies.

III. REVIEW OF REDISTRICTING CRITERIA

A. *Introduction*

In making its recommendations to the Board, the BRC followed the federal constitutional requirement of population equality as established by the United States Supreme Court (*Reynolds v. Sims*, 377 U.S. 533 (1964)) and *California Elections Code* section 21500 which requires that supervisorial districts "be as nearly equal in population as may be." In addition, the BRC followed the application of federal law, including the Voting Rights Act (42 U.S.C. § 1971 *et seq.*) and the Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution, and considered provisions of the Los Angeles County Charter and the *California Elections Code*.

The BRC reviewed and discussed redistricting criteria during its July 6, 2011 meeting, including that all plans have five supervisorial districts as provided in the Los Angeles County Charter, comply with the Voting Rights Act and the total population deviation be as nearly equal as may be. The BRC then determined that selection of plans for further consideration would be based on the following criteria:

- Keep total population deviation as nearly equal in population as may be.
- Keep districts contiguous and reasonably compact.
- Take into account the topography and geography of the districts.
- Consider Voting Rights Act, Section 2 compliance, but avoid using race as the predominant factor.
- Avoid splitting Redistricting Units whenever possible.
- Avoid splitting cities / unincorporated areas whenever possible.
- Avoid splitting communities of interest, neighborhoods, or groups that have a clear identity.
- Attempt to preserve core populations of the districts.
- Avoid displacing large segments of populations into different districts.
- Avoid voter confusion.
- Avoid displacing any Supervisor's residence from his/her district.

[BRC Minutes, 07/06/2011.]

Taking these criteria into consideration, the BRC voted on July 13, 2011 to issue a recommendation that the Board adopt the Proposed Amended Plan A1. Following adoption of the Proposed Amended Plan A1 as the recommendation of the BRC, the plan was renamed BRC's Recommended Redistricting Plan—Plan A2. The BRC found that Plan A2 lowers the Benchmark Plan deviation from 9.97% to 1.69%, while minimizing the number of people moved and the impacts to vote deferral and advancement, and which otherwise meets the requirements of law.

General statutory and legal principles underlying the BRC's redistricting criteria are discussed in further detail below.

B. *Population Equality*

The Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment to the United States Constitution requires that electoral districts afford their residents equality of representation – the "one person – one vote" principle. However, in addition to weighting votes equally, equality of representation also means that each person in a given district (whether eligible to vote or not) must have the same opportunity to be represented by his or her elected official as each person in every other district. (See, *Garza v. County of Los Angeles*, 918 F.2d 763 (9th Cir. 1990) [total population rather than voting age population, eligible voters or registered voters is an appropriate standard to measure equal representation].) This is achieved by providing that each district contain the same number of people.

Decennial redistricting is required to equalize population. (*Reynolds v. Sims*, 377 U.S. at 569 [plan must achieve "substantial equality of population among the various districts"]. The language of *California Elections Code* Section 21500 also requires that supervisorial districts be "as nearly equal in population as may be."

Slight deviation is permissible; provided, however, that it is necessary in order to achieve a rational state policy, such as respecting communities of interest and boundaries of political subdivisions, preserving the cores of prior districts, avoiding contests between incumbent representatives, and minimizing population shifts that result in vote deferral and advancement. (See, e.g., *Karcher v. Daggett*, 462 U.S. 725, 740 (1983); *Gaffney v. Cummings*, 412 U.S. 735 (1973); *White v. Regester*, 412 U.S. 755 (1973).)

There is no safe harbor provision for population deviation. (*Cox v. Larios*, 542 U.S. 947 (2004).) *Larios* was a district court case that was summarily affirmed by the U.S. Supreme Court. The *Larios* case confirmed that there was no safe harbor provision for population deviation. In *Larios*, the Court found that a population deviation of 9.98% was deemed unacceptable, given that the factual evidence indicated that the lines were drawn to help one political party over another, and the deviations were not explained by more traditional redistricting principles. Following *Larios*, the County should not rely on an assumed safe harbor provision for population deviation, and if deviations do exist, there should be a consistently applied and rational basis for it.

Legitimate state interests are also identified in *California Elections Code* Section 21500, which provides that "in establishing the boundaries of the districts the board may give consideration to the following factors: (a) topography, (b) geography, (c) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory, and (d) community of interests of the districts." The Los Angeles County Charter also provides that boundary changes may not affect the incumbency in office of any supervisor.

1. *Measuring Deviation*

In measuring deviation, the total number of persons in the jurisdiction is divided by the number of districts to identify the "ideal" population number. Most courts measure deviation by evaluating the total population deviation. Expressed as a percent, total deviation is the difference between the district with the most population and that with the least. To determine the total deviation, which will be used in judicially evaluating a plan, the percentage deviations from the

smallest and largest districts are added together disregarding their negative and positive character.

2. *Deviation of Previous County Redistricting Plans*

In previous Los Angeles County redistricting efforts, it has been possible to achieve a low total population deviation. For example, in September 1991, following the Ninth Circuit's ruling in *Garza v. Los County of Los Angeles*, 918 F.2d 763, 773 (9th Cir. 1990), the Board adopted the Los Angeles Supervisorial Redistricting Plan based upon unadjusted census data (P.L. 94-171). The total deviation in that plan was 1.52%. The plan was pre-cleared by the United States Attorney General in December 1991.

In 2001, following the County's last redistricting effort, the Board adopted a plan with a total population deviation of 1.398%. This plan was also pre-cleared by the United States Attorney General in 2001.

The total population deviation for the BRC's Recommended Plan—Plan A2 is 1.69%.

C. *Section 2 of Voting Rights Act*

The Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 1971 *et seq.*) prohibits states and their political subdivisions from denying or abridging citizens' rights to vote "on account of race or color" (42 U.S.C. §§ 1973a, 1973c) or membership in a "language minority group" (42 U.S.C. § 1973b(f)(2)). Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act is applicable to the County's redistricting process.

Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act, as amended, declares:

(a) No voting qualification or prerequisite to voting or standard, practice, or procedure shall be imposed or applied by any State or political subdivision in a manner which results in a denial or abridgement of the right of any citizen of the United States to vote on account of race or color,⁹ or in contravention of the guarantees set forth in section 1973b(f)(2) of this title,⁹ as provided in subsection (b) of this section.

"(b) A violation of subsection (a) of this section is established if, based on the totality of the circumstances, it is shown that the political processes leading to nomination or election in the State or political subdivision are not equally open to participation by members of a class of citizens protected by subsection (a) of this section in that its members have less opportunity than other members of the electorate to participate in the political process and to elect representatives of their choice. The extent to which members of a protected class have been elected to office

⁹ 42 U.S.C. § 1973b(f)(2) states: [¶] "No voting qualification or prerequisite to voting, or standard, practice, or procedure shall be imposed or applied by any State or political subdivision to deny or abridge the right of any citizen of the United States to vote because he is a member of a language minority group."

in the State or political subdivision is one circumstance which may be considered: *Provided*, That nothing in this section establishes a right to have members of a protected class elected in numbers equal to their proportion in the population."

(42 U.S.C. § 1973.)

In interpreting Section 2, with respect to at-large or district election plans, the United States Supreme Court has held that a plaintiff must satisfy three (3) preconditions before a court undertakes a detailed analysis of a challenged plan. (*Thornburg v. Gingles*, 478 U.S. 30 (1986).) A plaintiff must show that (1) the minority group is sufficiently large and geographically compact to constitute a majority in a single-member district; (2) that it is politically cohesive; and that, (3) in the absence of special circumstances, bloc voting by the white majority usually defeats the minority's preferred candidate. (478 U.S. at 50-51.) The first requirement requires a showing that the minority group is 50 percent or more of a district-sized citizen voting age population. (*Bartlett v. Strickland*, 129 S. Ct. 1231 (2009).) Where substantial "cross-over" voting by non-minorities is present, a plaintiff may not be able to satisfy its burden of showing that minority candidates of choice are usually defeated. (*Cano v. Davis*, 211 F. Supp. 2d 1208 (C.D. Cal. 2002).)

If the preconditions are satisfied, a court will conduct a detailed analysis of a challenged plan under the totality of the circumstances standard. (42 U.S.C § 1973(b); *Thornburg v. Gingles*, *supra*, 478 U.S. at 36-37.) This analysis looks to objective factors, including whether there is any history of official discrimination; whether racially polarized voting exists; whether voting practices exist that enhance opportunity for discrimination; whether there is a denial of access to candidate slating process; whether members of a minority group bear lingering effects of discrimination in education, employment, and health, which hinder effective participation; whether political campaigns have been characterized by racial appeals; the extent to which members of the protected class have been elected; whether there is a significant lack of responsiveness by elected officials to the particularized needs of the group; and whether the policy underlying the use of the voting qualification, standard, practice or procedure is tenuous. (478 U.S. at 36-37.)

The United States Supreme Court has further "explained how manipulation of district lines can dilute the voting strength of politically cohesive minority group members, whether by fragmenting the minority voters among several districts where a bloc-voting majority can routinely outvote them, or by packing them into one or a small number of districts to minimize their influence in the districts next door. [Citation.] Section 2 prohibits either sort of line-drawing where its result, interacting with social and historical conditions, impairs the ability of a protected class to elect its candidate of choice on an equal basis with other voters. [Citation.]" (*Johnson v. De Grandy*, 512 U.S. 997, 1007 (1994); [*internal quotations omitted*].)

Finally, Section 2 does not require the creation of the maximum possible number of majority-minority districts. (*Johnson v. DeGrandy*, *supra*, 512 U.S. at 1017; 42 U.S.C. § 1973(b) [no right to have members of a protected class elected in numbers equal to their proportion in the population."].) Rather, Section 2 prohibits adoption of a redistricting plan that, viewed in the totality of circumstances, would deny minority voters equal measure of political and electoral opportunity. (512 U.S. at 1013-1014.)

D. *Shaw v. Reno*

The United States Supreme Court has held that a violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution may exist where a legislature's boundary drawing, though "race neutral on its face," nonetheless can be understood only as an effort to "separate voters into different districts on the basis of race," and where the "separation lacks sufficient justification." (*Shaw v. Reno*, 509 U.S. 630, 649 (1993).)

In 1996, the Supreme Court reversed a holding by three-judge panel of the United States District Court that the North Carolina legislature's redrawing of boundaries did not violate the Constitution. (*Shaw v. Hunt*, 517 U.S. 899, 902-903, 905-907 (1996).) In so doing, the Court found that the redrawn district's "unconventional," snakelike shape, the way in which its boundaries split towns and counties, its predominately African-American racial make-up, and its history, together demonstrated a deliberate effort to create a "majority-black" district in which race "could not be compromised," not simply a district designed to "protect Democratic incumbents." (*Ibid.*)

E. *Los Angeles County Charter*

The California Constitution provides for the adoption of county charters by a vote of the electors of the county. (*Cal. const.* art. XI, §§ 3 and 4.) The County of Los Angeles adopted its charter in 1912, which was then approved by the Legislature. The provisions of the County Charter are the law of the State and have the force and effect of legislative enactments. (*Cal. const.* art. XI, § 4.)

The California Constitution provides that a county charter shall provide for, among other things, "[a] governing body of 5 or more members, elected (1) by district or, (2) at large, or (3) at large, with a requirement that they reside in a district." (*Cal. const.* art. XI, § 4(a).)

Accordingly, the County Charter provides for five supervisorial districts. (County Charter, art. II, § 5.) A County supervisor must be an elector of the district he/she represents, must reside therein during incumbency, must have been an elector for one year immediately preceding election, and shall be elected by such district. (County Charter, art. II, § 4.)

The County Charter also provides for staggered elections. At each general election at which the Governor is to be elected, and every four years thereafter, supervisors shall be elected from the First and Third Supervisorial districts, whose terms shall be four years. At each general election at which the office of President appears on the ballot, and every four years thereafter, supervisors shall be elected from the Second, Fourth and Fifth districts. (County Charter, art. II, § 6.)

The County Charter also provides:

"The Board of Supervisors may, by a two-thirds vote of its members, change the boundaries of any supervisorial district. No such boundaries shall ever be changed as to affect the incumbency in office of any supervisor. Any change in the boundaries of any supervisorial district must be made within one year after a general election."

(County Charter, art. II, § 7.)¹⁰

F. *California Elections Code*

State law establishes requirements for County redistricting. (*Cal. Elec. Code* § 21500 *et seq.*) Under the statutory scheme, each decennial federal census, the Board of Supervisors is required to "adjust the boundaries of any or all of the supervisorial districts of the county so that the districts shall be as nearly equal in population as may be and shall comply with the applicable provisions of Section 1973 of Title 42 of the United States Code, as amended. (i.e., Section 2 and Section 5, *see above.*) In establishing the boundaries of the districts the board may give consideration to the following factors: (a) topography, (b) geography, (c) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory, and (d) community of interests of the districts." (*Cal. Elec. Code* § 21500.)

The identified factors which may be considered in County redistricting are consistent with those traditional districting principles considered by the Department of Justice and the courts in reviewing Voting Rights Act compliance. For instance, communities of interest (e.g., incorporated cities) which the County has, with limited exception, used as a foundation for its prior redistricting efforts continues to be a viable factor upon which to reasonably support a redistricting plan.

In addition, *California Elections Code* section 21506, provides as follows:

"The term of office of any supervisor who has been elected and whose term of office has not expired shall not be affected by any change in the boundaries of the district from which he or she was elected."

State law also authorizes the Board to adjust supervisorial district boundaries at other times. More specifically, *California Elections Code* Section 21503 provides:

"At any time between the decennial adjustments of district boundaries, the board may cause a census of the county to be taken as provided in Section 26203 of the Government Code, and may adjust the boundaries of the supervisorial districts on the basis of that census, or on the basis of population estimates prepared by the State Department of Finance or the county planning department or planning commission, pursuant to Section 21500."

G. *Vote Advancement and Deferral*

As noted above, the Los Angeles County Charter provides for staggered elections. (County Charter, art. II, § 6.) The California Supreme Court has recognized that redistricting in jurisdictions with staggered election cycles results in some "inequality" among voters. *Legislature v. Reineke*, 10 Cal. 3d 396, 404-05 (1973). While courts have generally been unwilling to go so far as to invalidate staggered election schemes on the basis of such inequality,

there is no case holding that seeking to reduce the effects of such “inequality” would be improper. Indeed, as the Ninth Circuit has recognized, when the inequality unduly burdens a particular group, it may give rise to an equal protection claim. *Republican Party of Oregon v. Keisling*, 959 F.2d 144, 245-46 (9th Cir. 1992) (rejecting equal protection challenge to staggered voting scheme that “does not unduly burden a particular group”).

In the 2011 redistricting process, voters who will be reassigned from the First and Third Districts into the Second, Fourth or Fifth Districts, will have an opportunity to vote for a County supervisor twice in four (4) years (2010, 2012), thus advancing their right to vote for a supervisor. Voters who will be reassigned from the Second, Fourth and Fifth Districts into the First and Third Districts, will not have the opportunity to vote for a County supervisor until 2014. For those reassigned voters, six (6) years will have passed since they last had the opportunity to vote for a supervisor.

IV. THE BENCHMARK PLAN (PLAN A1)

A. *Introduction*

The Benchmark Plan (Plan A1) consists of the current supervisorial boundaries as implemented in 2001, following preclearance by the U.S. Department of Justice. Information on Plan A1 was included in all BRC meetings where other proposed plans as submitted by the public were discussed.

As requested by the BRC, County staff prepared and submitted to the BRC a *Report on Proposed Redistricting Plan for A1 Benchmark (Current Districts)* ["A1 Report" attached hereto as Attachment C].

B. *Plan Analysis of A1*

1. *Plan Summary*

Plan A1 consists of 2837 RDUs which make up 251 cities and communities. The County's current population as reflected in Plan A1 is 9,818,605 based on the Census Bureau's 2010 Census: Public Law 94-171 Redistricting Data. This is an increase of 299,267 people since completion of the last decennial redistricting process in 2001.

Most of the population growth in the County over the last 10 years occurred in the Fifth District. The Fifth District has a current population of 2,088,786 people, indicating an increase of 175,898 people since 2001. In terms of population increase since 2001, the Fifth District is followed by the Third, Second, and Fourth Districts. The Third District has increased by 59,188 people, for a current population of 1,971,921 people. The Second District has increased by 42,958 people, for a current population of 1,944,948 people. The Fourth District has increased by 33,671 people, for a current population of 1,919,949.

The First District has not increased in population since 2001. Following completion of the decennial redistricting process in 2001, the First District's population was 1,905,449 people. Since that time, the district's population has decreased by 12,448 people, and has a current population of 1,893,001.

2. Population Deviation

Plan A1 has a total population deviation of 9.97%.¹¹ The deviations of the individual districts are: -3.6% in the First District; -1.0% in the Second District; 0.4% in the Third District; -2.2% in the Fourth District; and 6.4% in the Fifth District. [A1 Report, p. 4.]

The ideal population per district is 1,963,721. To achieve the ideal population per district, the First District would need to gain 70,720 people, the Second District would need to gain 18,773 people, the Third District would need to decrease by 8,200 people, the Fourth District would need to gain 43,772 people, and the Fifth District would need to decrease by 125,065 people.

The County's population is distributed as follows across the five supervisorial districts:

3. Number of People Moved

Since Plan A1 is the "benchmark" by which proposed plans were reviewed, Plan A1 has no impact on the number of people moved.

4. Deferred/Advanced Voting

Plan A1 has no impact on vote deferral or advancement.

5. Citizen Voting Age Population

CVAP was calculated for each supervisorial district in Plan A1. Data from the American Community Survey (ACS) was used to ascertain the population count and percentages of CVAP

¹¹ Deviation is the degree to which actual population in a district deviates from the ideal equal population; in this case, total County population divided by five. Total deviation is the sum of the greatest percentage of over-population and greatest percentage of under-population.

per district. The ACS is an ongoing statistical survey by the U.S. Census Bureau, sent to approximately 250,000 addresses monthly (or 3 million per year). ACS estimates are based on data collected from January 1, 2005 to December 31, 2009, and are not 2010 Census data. To ascertain the percentages of the voting age citizen population by Race/Ethnicity, data from the ACS was applied to the 2010 Census counts of the voting age population at the census block level, to obtain estimates of the voting age citizen population.

The CVAP information per district in Plan A1 is summarized below:

6. *Incumbency*

Plan A1 reflects that all five supervisors reside in the supervisorial districts to which they were elected.

7. *Contiguity/Compactness*

All five supervisorial districts are contiguous and are reasonably compact.

8. *City/Community Splits*

There are 37 cities/communities currently split between the various districts in Plan A1. [A1 Report, p. 27-35.]

9. *City/Community Unified*

There are 214 cities/communities that are wholly contained within the various districts in Plan A1. [A1 Report, p. 27-35.]

10. *Major Facilities*

Plan A1 reflects the current location of major facilities in the County. Some notable county facilities include the LAC+USC Medical Center, the East LA Civic Center, La Plaza Cultura y Artes, and the Music Center located in the First District. In addition, the Martin Luther King Multi-Service Ambulatory Care Center and Natural History Museum are located in the

Second District. The Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Hollywood Bowl and the Ford Theater are located in the Third District. Marina del Rey, the Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center, the South Coast Botanic Gardens and Harbor UCLA Medical Center are located in the Fourth District. The Olive View-UCLA Medical Center, the Arboretum and Descanso Gardens are located in the Fifth District.

V. PLAN RECOMMENDED FOR ADOPTION – BRC RECOMMENDED PLAN—PLAN A2

The BRC Recommended Plan—Plan A2 (Plan A2) as approved by the BRC at its meeting on July 13, 2011, modifies the current Benchmark Plan A1.

A. *BRC Recommended Plan A2*

1. *July 6, 2011 BRC Meeting Deliberations*

Following completion of County staff's presentation of publicly submitted redistricting plans and the adoption of redistricting criteria by the BRC on July 6, 2011, the BRC commenced its discussion of a redistricting proposal to be recommended to the Board.

Commissioner Herb Hatanaka introduced a motion that the BRC use as one starting point and as a reference point, the Benchmark Plan A1. Commissioner Hatanaka acknowledged that the BRC had received public comment at community meetings and via written correspondence, requesting that certain cities or communities, like Rowland Heights, be joined. Commissioner Hatanaka moved that Plan A1 be amended to move all of Rowland Heights, South Whittier and Santa Fe Springs into the Fourth District.

Following discussion, Commissioner Allan Hoffenblum moved to amend Commissioner Hatanaka's motion to include the move of Rosemead from the First to the Fifth District, and to move Claremont, Covina and West Covina from the Fifth District to the First District. Commissioner Hatanaka accepted the amendment.

Commissioner Alma Martinez amended the motion to look at the movement of Monrovia and Duarte from the Fifth District to the First District, including moving the adjacent slivers of unincorporated areas. The amendment was accepted, and the motion, as amended, passed. County staff was thereafter instructed to analyze the proposed changes to Plan A1, and to report back those changes to the BRC at the next meeting on July 11, 2011. [BRC Minutes, 07/06/2011].

2. *July 11, 2011 BRC Meeting Deliberations*

At the BRC meeting on July 11, 2011, County staff reported back on the requested changes to Plan A1 as a baseline. The following changes were made, and reported back to the BRC: the communities of Rowland Heights, South Whittier and the City of Santa Fe Springs were moved from the First District to the Fourth District; Rosemead was moved from the First District to the Fifth District; and the cities of Claremont, Covina, West Covina, Monrovia and Duarte, including adjoining unincorporated areas, were moved from the Fifth District to the First District.

The deviation under this proposal would increase the current total deviation from 9.97% to 11.31%, with the total population reassigned being 375,757. [Boundary Review Committee Scenario 1]. Under this proposal, the County's population is distributed as follows:

Following the County staff presentation, Commissioner Hoffenblum stated that he was very moved by the testimony heard at the July 11th meeting by Fourth District constituents requesting that the current boundaries of the Fourth District remain unchanged. At the start of this meeting, 41 members of the public had signed up to speak at Public Comment. These speakers seem to generally agree that the boundaries of the Fourth District should remain intact and be unchanged, and that they enjoy the representation of Fourth District Supervisor Don Knabe.

Commissioner Hoffenblum then stated that regardless of what plan is implemented, the Fifth District would need to concede several communities, and recommended that the following revisions to the Benchmark Plan A1 be made and considered for recommendation by the BRC at the last meeting on July 13, 2011:

1. Move the City of West Covina to the First District including unincorporated islands labeled RDU 1310 and RDU 1316.
2. Move RDU 293, which is the West Hills area of the San Fernando Valley from the Fifth District to the Third District.

Commissioner Hatanaka also recommended that the Benchmark Plan A1 also be revised to bring in the remainder of Rowland Heights into the Fourth District, consolidate South Whittier in the Fourth District and move the City of Santa Fe Springs to the Fourth District. He further commented that when comparing the Benchmark Plan to the Benchmark Plan with revisions, the Benchmark Plan with revisions appears to do a better job of representing ethnic groups. In addition, in his opinion, the Latino¹² population will be substantial in the next 10 years in the Fourth and Fifth Districts.

Commissioner Martinez commented that a member of the public, Alan Clayton, has made several public comments regarding "packing" in the First District of Latinos and these revisions to the Benchmark Plan do not seem to do much to address this issue.

Commissioner Vincent Harris requested the following revisions be made to Plan S1 and indicated the Second District would introduce a similar motion at the last BRC Meeting on July 13, 2011 to:

1. Move the remaining portion of Wilmington from the Second District into the Third District.
2. Move the East Hollywood portion currently within the Third District into the Second District.

Chair Curt Pedersen indicated that prior to Commissioner Harris' revisions, Plan S1 relocated approximately 3.35 million residents.

Commissioner Hatanaka also expressed his concerns regarding the large population movement associated with Plan S1. Specifically Commissioner Hatanaka is concerned with the impact this may have on local jurisdictions and how they are organized. In addition, Plan S1 in his opinion, separates many of the Asian/Pacific Islander (API) communities. Many of these communities have worked together for 20 years and with Plan S1, they will be separated and divided especially in the Fourth District. Commissioner Harris responded by stating that if one compares the data from Plan S1 to the Benchmark plan, the API community population only declines in the First District but increases in all of the other districts.

¹² The terms "Latino" and "Hispanic" were used interchangeably during the BRC's proceedings. County staff reports generally used the term "Hispanic."

Commissioner Steve Reyes stated that the submitted plan labeled Plan R1 from Steven Ochoa of the Mexican American Legal Defense Fund (MALDEF) should also be included for final consideration at the last BRC meeting. He said that while outside counsel had rendered the opinion at prior BRC meetings that two majority-minority CVAP Latino districts were not mandated, there is nothing preventing the BRC from voting for these types of plans. Additionally, he indicated that the testimony from the Plan R1 and Plan S1 authors, was very helpful in determining the methodology used to draw maps that reflect a willingness to comply with the traditional redistricting criteria, and rely on socio-economic factors and data as well. He added that the authors of Plans S1 and R1 reported that they held town hall meetings where they solicited input from their constituents, and that both Plans S1 and R1 create two 50 percent CVAP Latino districts. In Commissioner Reyes' opinion, these two plans also respect many of the wishes and requests made by constituents at BRC meetings and other community outreach meetings. For example, much of the northern part of the Third District remains intact.

Following further discussion, Commissioner Reyes withdrew his request to carry over Plan R1 to the July 13, 2011 BRC meeting, due to time limitations associated with Plan R1 providing for only three supervisorial districts.

After discussion, the BRC confirmed the two plans being considering for possible recommendation subject to adjustments, and instructed County staff to prepare the applicable plan analyses for the July 13, 2011 meeting. [BRC Minutes, 07/11/2011].

3. *Plan Analysis of BRC Recommend Plan A2*

Following the BRC's deliberations at the July 11, 2011 meeting, County staff prepared the resulting plan analysis and County Counsel summary memo for the plan that became the BRC Recommended Plan—Plan A2. [See A2 Report and County Counsel Summary for Proposed Plan A2, attached hereto as Attachments A and D, respectively.]

a. *Plan Summary*

Plan A2 proposes to reassign 57 RDUs which make up six whole or partial communities.

For the City of West Covina, 33 RDUs are moved (population 106,047) from the Fifth District to the First District. West Covina has 106,116 population in total, and will all be in the First District.

For LA County – Covina Islands, 2 RDUs are moved (population 822) from the Fifth District to the First District. The unincorporated area will now have a total population of 9,623 in the First District and a total population of 3,553 in the Fifth District, and will remain split.

For LA City – Westhills, 1 RDU is moved (population 3,732) from the Fifth District to the Third District. This neighborhood will now have a total population of 29,018 in the Third District and a total population of 12,308 in the Fifth District, and will remain split.

For LA County – South Whittier, 6 RDUs are moved (population 17,525) from the First District to the Fourth District. This unincorporated area has a total population of 57,156, and will be entirely in the Fourth District.

For the City of Santa Fe Springs, all 14 RDUs are moved (population 16,223) from the First District to the Fourth District. The City has a total population of 16,223, and all of which will be in the Fourth District.

For LA County – Rowland Heights, 1 RDU is moved (population 5,772) from the First District to the Fourth District. The unincorporated area has a total population of 49,001, and all of which will be in the Fourth District. However, 2 RDUs remain in the First District with 0 population, therefore Rowland Heights will still appear to be split.

b. *Population Deviation*

The total population deviation in the proposed plan is 1.69%, and is distributed across the County as follows:

c. *Number of People Moved*

This plan reassigns 150,121 people among the five districts. It would move 106,869 people from the Fifth District to the First District and 3,732 people from the Fifth District to the Third District. It would also move 39,520 people from the First District to the Fourth District.

d. *Deferred/Advanced Voting*

Countywide, 1.5% of constituents in the County will be affected by deferral or advancement under this plan.

Voters who will be reassigned from the First and Third Districts into the Second, Fourth or Fifth Districts, will have an opportunity to vote for a County supervisor twice in four (4) years (2010, 2012), thus advancing their right to vote for a supervisor. In the First District, 39,520 constituents will be reassigned to the Fourth District. As a result of Plan A2, 2.1% of all constituents, 2.3% of the CVAP, and 2.5% of registered voters in the First District are advanced. In the Third District, no constituents will be reassigned to either the Second, Fourth or Fifth Districts.

Voters who will be reassigned from the Second, Fourth and Fifth Districts into the First and Third Districts, will not have the opportunity to vote for a County supervisor until 2014. For those reassigned voters, six (6) years will have passed since they last had the opportunity to vote for a supervisor. In the Second and Fourth Districts, no constituents will be reassigned to either the First or Third Districts. In the Fifth District, 110,601 constituents will be reassigned to either the First or Third Districts. As a result of Plan A2, 5.3% of all constituents, 5.1% of the CVAP, and 5.0% of registered voters in the Fifth District are deferred.

e. *Citizen Voting Age Population*

f. *Incumbency*

Plan A2 does not displace any supervisor from his/her district.

g. *Contiguity/Compactness*

All five supervisorial districts are contiguous¹³ and are reasonably compact.

h. *City/Community Splits*

The following cities/communities that are newly split as a result of this plan are LA City – Westhills*¹⁴ as split between the Third and Fifth Districts; LA County – Covina Islands* as split between the First and Fifth Districts; and LA County – Rowland Heights* as split between the First and the Fourth Districts.

¹³ There remain two RDUs (RDUs 1209 and 1210) in the unincorporated area of Rowland Heights with zero population that are contained wholly within the First District. The Benchmark Plan A1 also has the same two RDUs with zero population in the First District. However, County staff is proposing correction or minor anomalies in this plan.

¹⁴ An asterisk (*) designates cities/communities that were previously split, but areas have now changed districts.

B. *BRC Deliberations of Plan A2 on July 13, 2011*

At the final meeting of the BRC on July 13, 2011, 76 members of the public signed up to provide public comments. Most of those public comments requested that the supervisorial boundaries of the Fourth District remain intact and unchanged. Some recommended that either Proposed Amended Plan A1 or Proposed Amended Plan S1 be adopted as the BRC recommendation. [BRC Minutes, 07/13/2011].

Following public comment, County staff presented the analysis for Proposed Amended Plan A1 and Proposed Amended Plan S1. Following discussion of other items on the Agenda, on Chair Pedersen's recommendation there being no objections, Agenda Items Nos. 8 and 9 would be addressed concurrently.

Commissioner Reyes introduced Professor Justin Levitt to present a report on his assessment of Proposed Amended Plan S1 and provided the BRC with additional information about the redistricting process. Professor Levitt is an Associate Professor at Loyola Law School and specializes in the Voting Rights Act, election law and redistricting. Professor Levitt thanked Commissioner Reyes for the invitation to speak before the BRC. Professor Levitt then reported on the legal aspects of redistricting, specifically on the application of the Voting Rights Act.

Professor Levitt provided a report which was distributed to the Committee members at the meeting, that contained his presentation to the BRC. [July 13, 2011 Report on the Legal Standards Pertaining to the Los Angeles County Redistricting Process by Professor Justin Levitt, with Exhibits]. Professor Levitt opined that although the Constitution requires a very compelling reason to allow race to predominate in the drawing of districts, compliance with the Voting

Rights Act, in particular Section 2 has been repeatedly mentioned as one important interest that allows for the consideration of race.

Professor Levitt further opined that his preliminary findings which are based on data that was provided to the BRC members, indicate that there is a serious concern in Los Angeles County about the application of the Voting Rights Act and in particular whether it requires the construction of two districts designed to ensure that the Latino community has an effective opportunity to elect candidates of choice.

Applying the *Gingles* factors to Los Angeles County, Professor Levitt's preliminary assessment was that there are two Latino communities that are sufficiently sizable, sufficiently compact, that vote cohesively and are regularly out voted by the cohesive voting patterns of non-Latinos to give those two communities separate federal rights under the Voting Rights Act. Professor Levitt commented that the original Plan S1 has two communities have a 53 percent and 52 percent Latino CVAP which would satisfy the *Gingles* first threshold requirement. According to Professor Levitt, these areas are compact, they are approximately 30 to 40 miles long, the population is continuously spread across the area and there are substantial socio-economic similarities within these areas.

With respect to *Gingles* factors two and three, they refer to polarization. Professor Levitt relied most of his analysis on a study by Professor Matt A. Barreto, Associate Professor Political Science at the University of Washington. A preliminary draft of that study was included in the report that was distributed to the BRC. The study includes regression analysis which reviews precinct by precinct election data to evaluate exactly how the Latino population within those precincts voted versus the non-Latino population within those precincts. According to Professor Barreto, since 2000, on average, Latinos vote for Latino candidates across Los Angeles County on average approximately 70 percent of the time. Non-Latinos vote against Latino candidates approximately 77 percent of the time. Professor Levitt opined that this constitutes substantial evidence for polarized voting and meets *Gingles* conditions two and three and therefore passing thresholds conditions for each community for protection under the Voting Rights Act.

If the *Gingles* factors were met, Professor Levitt reported that the totality of circumstances must then be considered, this report is also a preliminary attempt to document and layout how those totality of circumstance apply to the Latino community in Los Angeles County. Several of the Senate factors point to extensive reasons to ensure that Latinos have an effective opportunity to elect candidates of choice.

Commissioner Kevin Acebo inquired as to why Los Angeles County Sheriff Baca's other recent elections were not included in the analysis done by Professor Barreto. Professor Levitt indicated the elections chosen were based on Professor Barreto's opinion of which elections best proved a testing ground for whether the electorate was polarized along Latino and non-Latino lines. Commissioner Acebo asked Professor Levitt to identify what data, if any, indicates intentional discrimination in the current redistricting process as it had occurred in *Garza*. Professor Levitt responded by stating the report provided to the Committee did not include any indications of intentional discrimination for the 2011 redistricting process, however, it was his belief that the Voting Rights Act did not require current and present proof of intentional discrimination.

Following additional discussion, on motion of Commissioner Sean Andrade, and seconded by Commissioner Jesus Escandon, the BRC should recommend the Proposed Amended Plan S1, also known as the African American Coalition Plan, to the Board for adoption.

Commissioner Andrade added that Proposed Amended Plan S1 is warranted by the overwhelming growth of the Latino community which represented 65 percent of the growth in the County for the last ten years. Further, Professor Justin Levitt's report demonstrates the new 2010 U.S. Census data and the legal requirements would be satisfied by adopting a plan with two Latino majority districts. Commissioner Andrade also commented that Plan S1 as amended, is one of seven two Latino majority district plans, and that voting within Los Angeles County is still polarized along ethnic lines against Latinos.

Alan Clayton, a member of the public, addressed the BRC prior to its voting on Commissioner Andrade's motion to recommend S1 as amended to the Board. Mr. Clayton stated that he supports the recommendation of S1 to the Board, in that it gives a significant portion of the San Gabriel Valley to the Fourth District and the remaining portion would be represented by the Fifth District; S1 as amended protects the African American communities' ability to elect candidates of their choice; takes into consideration socio-economic factors; and that it provides for two majority-minority Latino districts. Mr. Clayton thereafter thanked the Committee for their time and stated that he is in full support of S1 as amended.

Astrid Garcia, from the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials (NALEO) Educational Fund, provided comment as well. Ms. Garcia stated that the U.S. Census data reveals that the Latino community is nearly 50 percent of Los Angeles County's total population. NALEO urges the BRC to approve a map for Los Angeles County that complies with the Voting Rights Act and provides Latinos within Los Angeles County with a fair opportunity to elect representatives. NALEO urged the BRC to accomplish this by creating at least two districts where the Latino CVAP is over 50 percent. Ms. Garcia thereafter thanked the BRC for the opportunity to speak.

Commissioner Acebo then requested that the County's outside redistricting counsel Laura Brill discuss whether Plan S1 as amended, and Plan A1 as amended, complied with the Voting Rights Act and other criteria. Ms. Brill indicated that based on her preliminary analysis, both Plan S1 as amended and Plan A1 as amended, are likely compliant with the Voting Rights Act and other criteria, subject to final confirmation. Ms. Brill also pointed out that Professor Levitt made a significant omission when he failed to state that there is more than one way to comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act, aside from creating two majority Latino CVAP districts.

The BRC engaged in further discussion about the methodology used and the types of elections that were looked at by Professor Levitt and Professor Barreto. The BRC then voted on Commissioner Andrade's motion to recommend Plan S1, as amended, as the BRC recommended supervisorial redistricting plan to the Board. The motion failed, with four Ayes and six Noes.

Then, on motion of Commissioner Hatanaka and seconded by Commissioner Hoffenblum, it was moved to adopt Plan A1 as amended, as the BRC's recommended Plan to the Board of Supervisors. Commissioner Hatanaka noted that Ms. Brill advised the BRC that her preliminary analysis indicates that the current Benchmark Plan A1 is likely in compliance with the Voting Rights Act, and that a second majority Latino CVAP district does not appear to be

mandated. In his opinion, there is no compelling reason to arbitrarily and drastically alter the current supervisorial boundary structure of how the 9.8 million County residents are to be represented. Commissioner Hatanaka further noted that the BRC received compelling support from over 1000 e-mails, letters, public testimony both at the BRC meetings and in the community asking the BRC to make as little change as possible. He believed that political access for all ethnic populations is protected and not abridged. Further, in his opinion, the S1 Plan as amended clearly uses race as the chief factor in assigning boundaries and in the process is unacceptably disruptive to all County residents. It tramples on communities of interest, it splits political and civic subdivisions, it separates many historic ethnic enclaves and it would interfere with the rich ethnic group diversity that exists with the current supervisorial districts. This ethnic group balance exists not because of a BRC policy or just because of race, but as one of the BRC members noted: "... for many of the County's residents ethnic diversity is reflective of conscious social, economic and educational choices where County residents have chosen to live. Race is only one of those factors."

Commissioner Hoffenblum noted, in order to achieve its plans' objective, Plan S1 as amended reassigns 3.3 million residents. In comparison, Plan A1 as amended only reassigns 150,000 residents. With all of its restructuring, S1 as amended still maintains a higher population deviation of 2.81 percent compared to 1.69 percent in Plan A1 as amended plan. In addition, S1 as amended defers/advances the vote of nearly 23 percent of all County voters compared to Plan A1 as amended, which only defers/advances 1.5 percent of all County voters. Plan S1 as amended divides 32 cities and unincorporated areas as compared to Plan A1 as amended, which only split 3 communities which were previously split. Plan A1 as amended also increases Latino CVAP representation within the Fourth District and alternatively reduces it in the First District.

Alan Clayton, member of the public, addressed the Committee regarding the U.S. Supreme Court ruling for *Bartlett vs. Strickland*, the *Gingles* factors, and election data. Mr. Clayton stated that the BRC is making a sad commentary on progress in Los Angeles County by voting on a plan that he believes is clearly illegal and clearly violates Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act.

Thereafter, the BRC voted on the motion of Commissioner Hatanaka, as seconded by Commissioner Hoffenblum, to recommend Plan A1, as amended, to the Board. The motion passed with six Ayes and four Noes.

Commissioner Andrade then read a transmittal letter he called the "minority" opinion expressing his and several other commissioners concerns about Plan A1, as amended. [July 13, 2011 Letter of Sean Andrade, Steven J. Reyes, Alma D. Martinez, Louisa Ollague, Teresa Holoman, John Choi and Jesus M. Escandon.]

Finally, following additional discussion, Chair Pedersen thanked County staff for their hard work and dedication. Chair Pedersen also thanked BRC Committee members for their patience and civility throughout the entire BRC process.

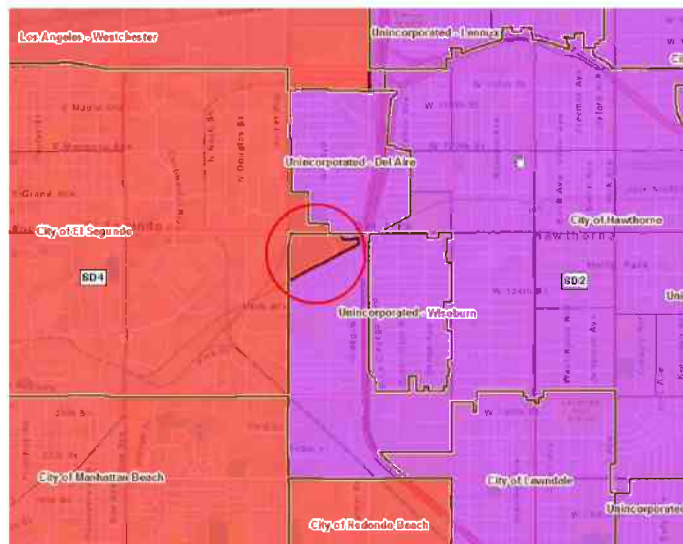

C. *County Staff Recommendation for Plan A2*

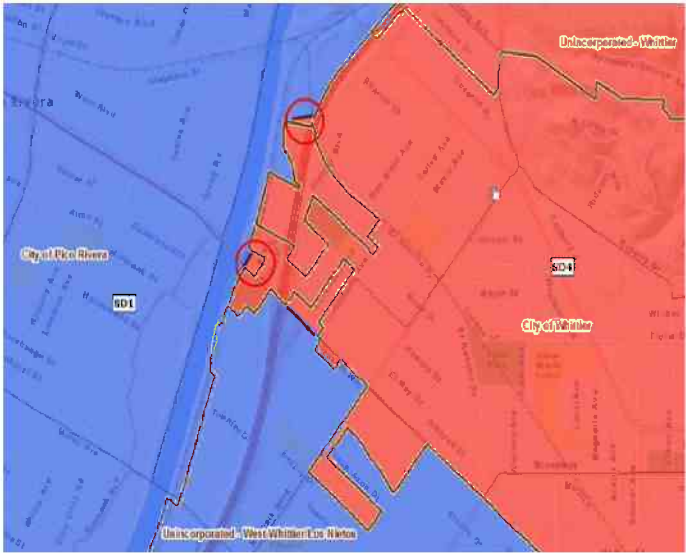
Following adoption of the BRC's recommendation, Proposed Amended Plan A1 was designated by County staff as "BRC Recommend Plan—Plan A2" (Plan A2). Staff examined Plan A2 and discovered minor anomalies that can be adjusted by the Board, should Plan A2 be adopted as the 2011 Decennial Redistricting Plan. These adjustments will move areas with zero or negligible population to appropriate supervisorial districts, and eliminate "islands" within districts or the appearance of a resulting split in a city or unincorporated area.

County staff therefore recommends the following adjustments be made to Plan A2, and as illustrated below:

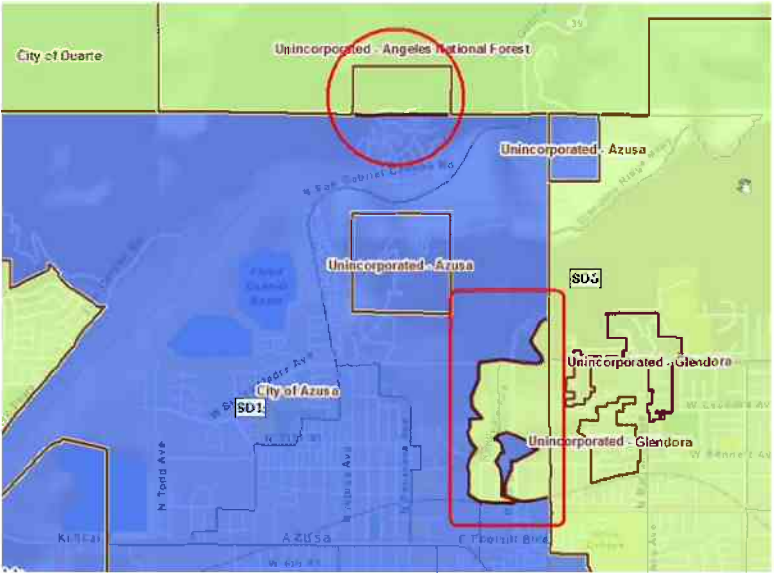
1. Reassign that portion of Census Tract 602302 currently in the City of Hawthorne and the Fourth District to the Second District, resulting in the City of Hawthorne entirely contained in the Second District (zero population impact).



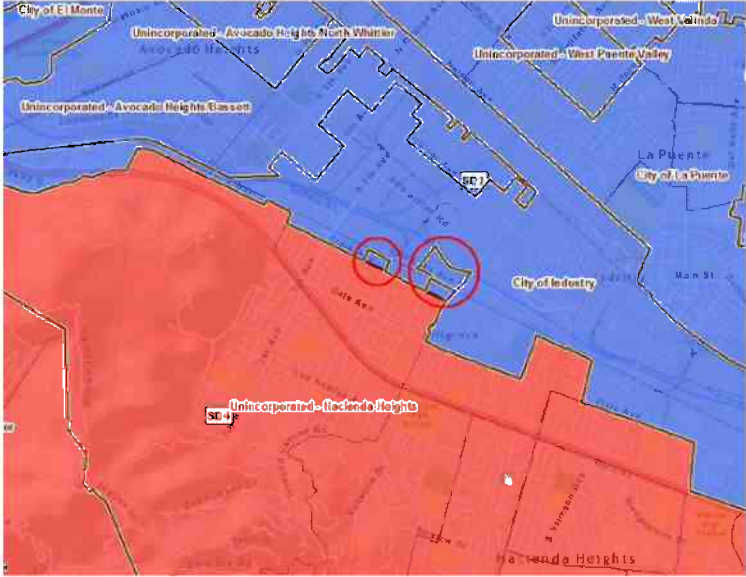
- 2. Reassign that portion of Census Tracts 500403 and 501200 currently in the City of Pico Rivera and the Fourth District to the First District, resulting in the City of Pico Rivera entirely contained in the First District (zero population impact).



- 3. Reassign that portion of Census Tracts 930301, 400604, and 400800 currently in City of Azusa and the Fifth District to the First District, resulting in the City of Azusa entirely contained in the First District (295 population impact).



- 4. Reassign two separate portions of Census Tract 408401 currently in the unincorporated area of Rowland Heights (zero population impact) and the First District, plus that portion of Census Tract 408202 currently in the unincorporated area of Avocado Heights/Bassett (26 population impact) and the First District, all to the Fourth District, resulting in the southern city boundary for the City of Industry being the same as the Supervisorial district boundary.



VII. BRC'S CONSIDERATION OF PROPOSED AMENDED PLAN S1

Proposed Amended Plan S1, as amended by Commissioner Harris, was based on Plan S1 - LACBOS African American that was submitted by Jackie Dupont-Walker, Tunua Thrash and Marqueece Harris-Dawson on June 10, 2011. The organizations also listed on the plan were Ward AME EDC District 5, West Angeles CDC and the Community Coalition.

The Proposed Amended Plan S1 reassigned 1010 RDUs which made up 128 whole or partial communities. The total population deviation in the proposed plan was 2.81% and reassigned 3,375,553 people among the five districts. Under this plan, 1,66,524 of constituents were advanced and 1,157,632 of constituents were deferred. Countywide, 22.7% of constituents in the County would be affected by advancement or deferral.

The Proposed Amended Plan S1 provided for two majority-minority Hispanic CVAP districts. The CVAP information for each of the five supervisorial districts is as follows:

At the June 29, 2011 meeting of the BRC, Marqueece Harris-Dawson of the Community Coalition appeared on behalf of all of the authors to testify on Plan S1. Mr. Harris-Dawson stated that in drawing the plan, the authors used input from a number of civil rights, faith-based, and community-based organizations, as well as business leaders in the community and members of the organized labor movement, and community of interest data was the primary driver for Plan S1. The authors also worked to keep the coastal environmental community united as well as both ports in a single district, and wanted to respect both valleys by keeping the San Fernando Valley and the San Gabriel Valley each in a single district and keeping the Gateway cities in only two districts. Mr. Harris-Dawson stated that the authors believe that "two Voting Rights Act Section 2, Latino opportunity districts exist in LA County" and drew such districts in Plan S1, and requested that the BRC respect the Voting Rights Act and more specifically Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act. [BRC Minutes, 06/29/2011].

As discussed above, Plan S1 and as amended by Commissioner Harris, did not secure enough votes from the BRC to be approved for recommendation to the Board.

VII. OTHER PUBLICLY SUBMITTED PLANS

There were a total of 19 proposed plans submitted to the BRC.¹⁵ Upon considering all of the testimony, data and analysis presented during its proceedings and factoring in time constraints, the BRC did not select any of the following plans for recommendation:

Review of the submitted plans was not completed until the meeting of June 29, 2011. Recognizing that the BRC must submit a recommended plan to the Board by August 1st and there were only a few meetings left for deliberations, the BRC focused its attention to Plan A1 and Plan S1, with some discussion of Plans Q1 and R1.

Discussion of Plans A1 and S1 and amendments thereto are detailed above.

Steven Ochoa, author of MALDEF's Plan Q1 and R1, appeared at the BRC Meeting on June 29, 2011 to provide testimony on the submissions. [BRC Minutes, 06/29/2011]. Mr. Ochoa reported that the main objective of the two plans was:

"MALDEF Submissions [1] and [2], are partial plans with intentionally unnumbered districts. Together, there are two iterations of MALDEF Districts A/B and MALDEF Districts C that are easily interchangeable with each other, as to offer options for the Commission to consider plans which create two Latino Section 2 mandated districts along with preserving an effective opportunity district for the African-American community."

¹⁵ Plan H1 submitted by Professor Leo Estrada was rescinded by the author and was not considered.

Mr. Ochoa further reported that the plan provides fair and effective representation by complying with the Voting Rights Act and respecting communities of interest.

MALDEF Submission 1 and Plan R1 – MALDEF Submission 2, submitted by Steven Ochoa of MALDEF on June 10, 2011 also was not recommended by the BRC to the Board. Both Plan Q1 and R1 provide for two majority-minority Hispanic CVAP districts. Both plans also placed Supervisor Gloria Molina's residence in District B and Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas' residence in District C. The residences of Supervisors Zev Yaroslavsky, Don Knabe and Michael D. Antonovich were placed in the unassigned areas of the County. The submission also did not provide for an incumbent supervisor in District A.

Plans Q1 and R1 were partial plans that only accounted for three supervisorial districts designated as Districts A, B and C, and were not prepared with the County's redistricting software. The County's standard analysis could not be performed for these submissions given they did not provide for five supervisorial districts. These submission, however, were available to the BRC for considering aspects of the submissions for informational and discussion purposes.

CONCLUSION

All of the plan analyses and County Counsel summaries for each of these plans are available to the public and are part of the record of BRC proceedings. Additional information regarding these plans can be found in the plan analyses and County Counsel summaries.

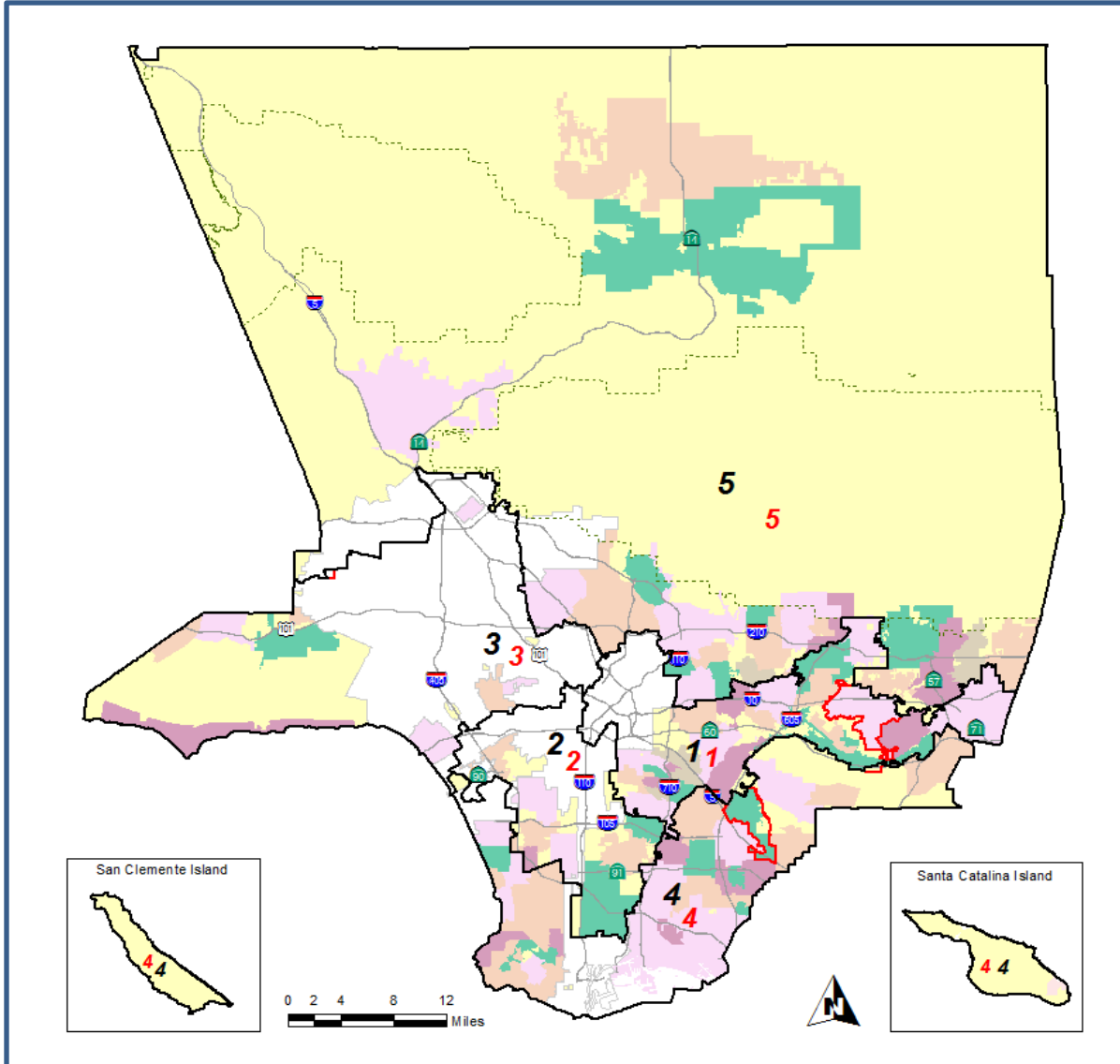

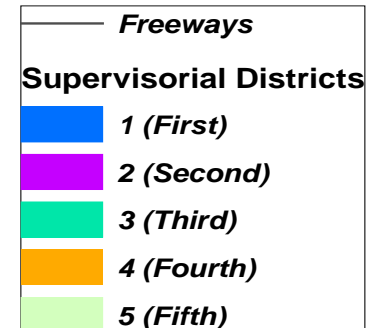

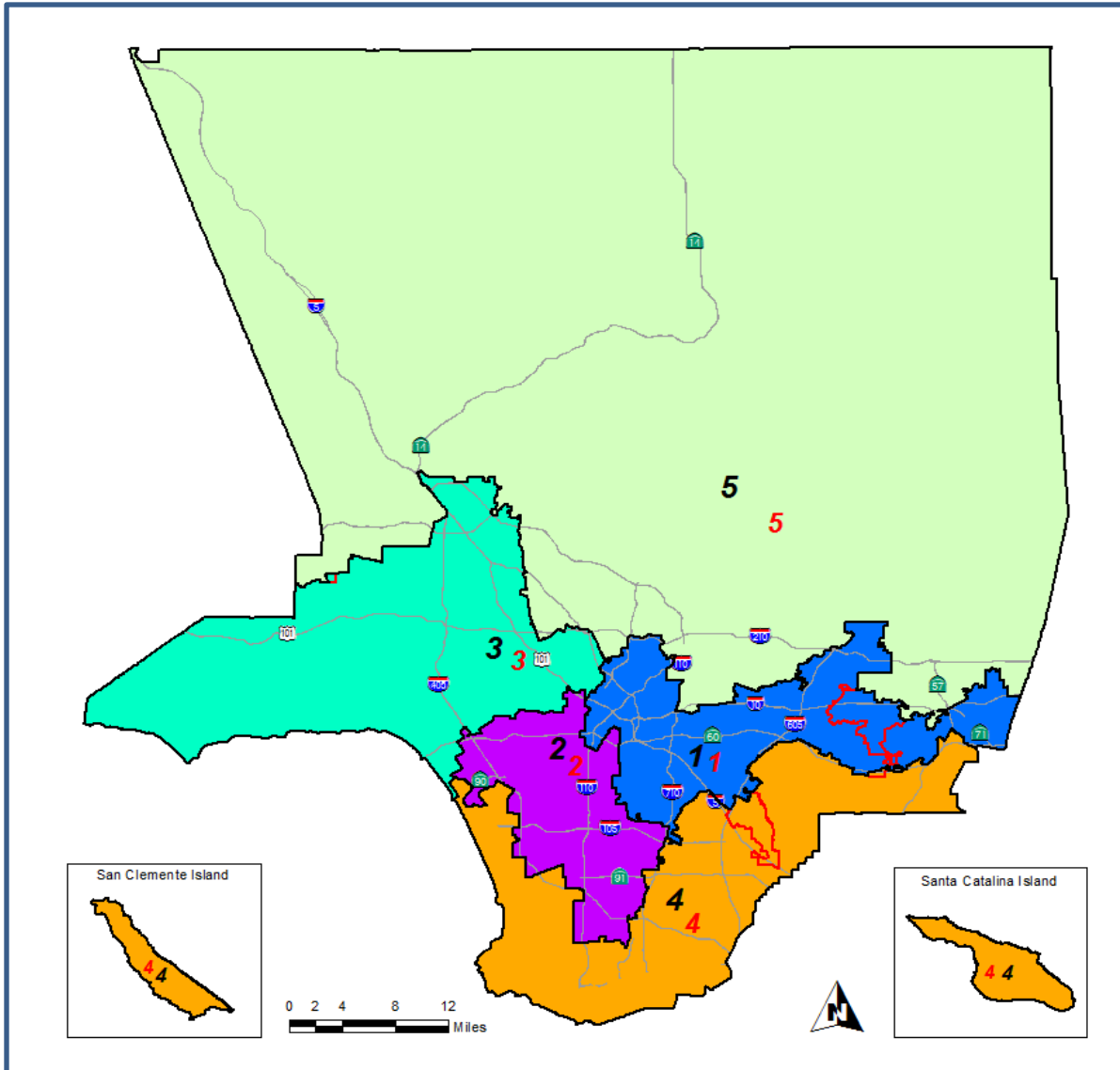

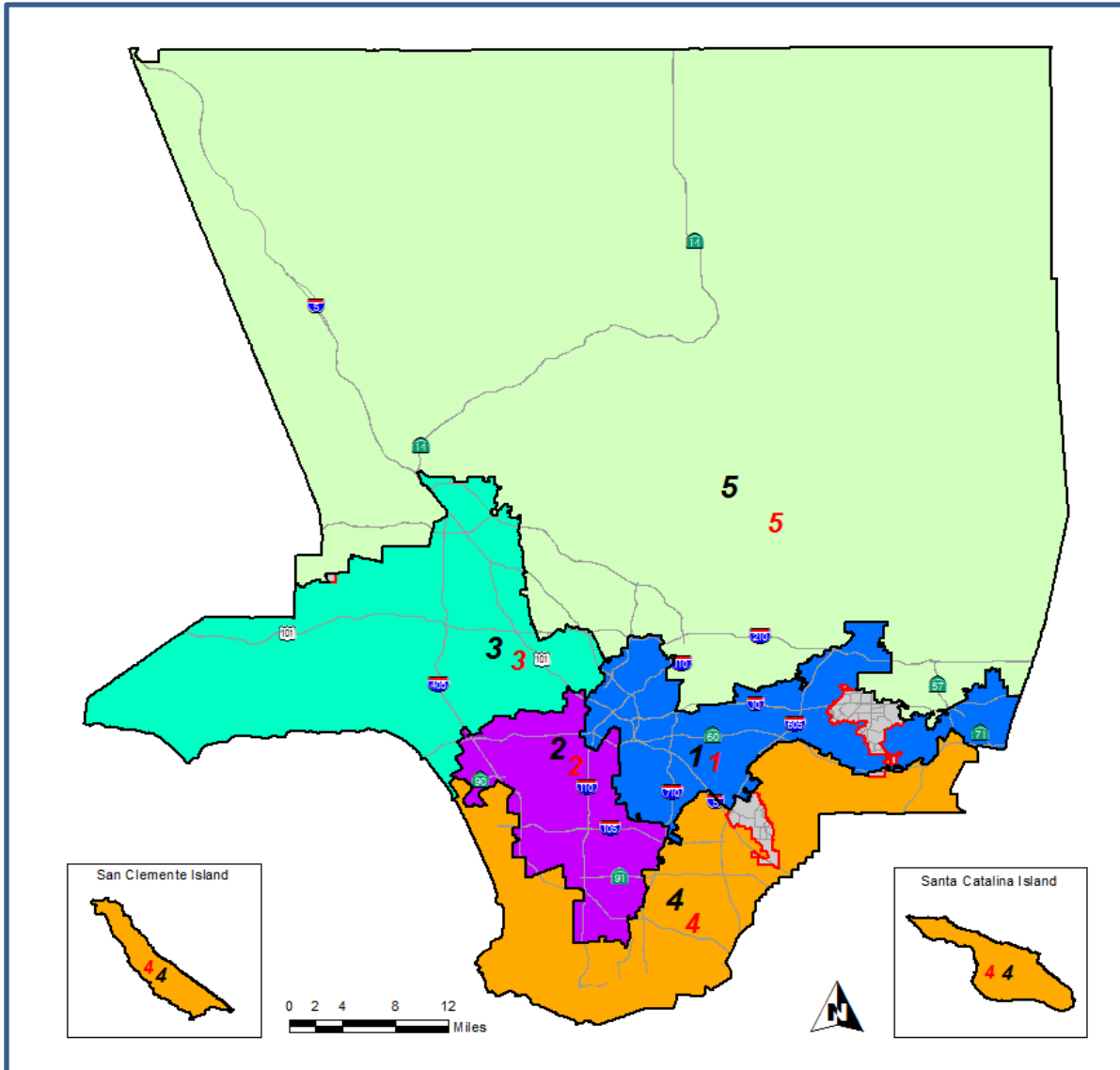

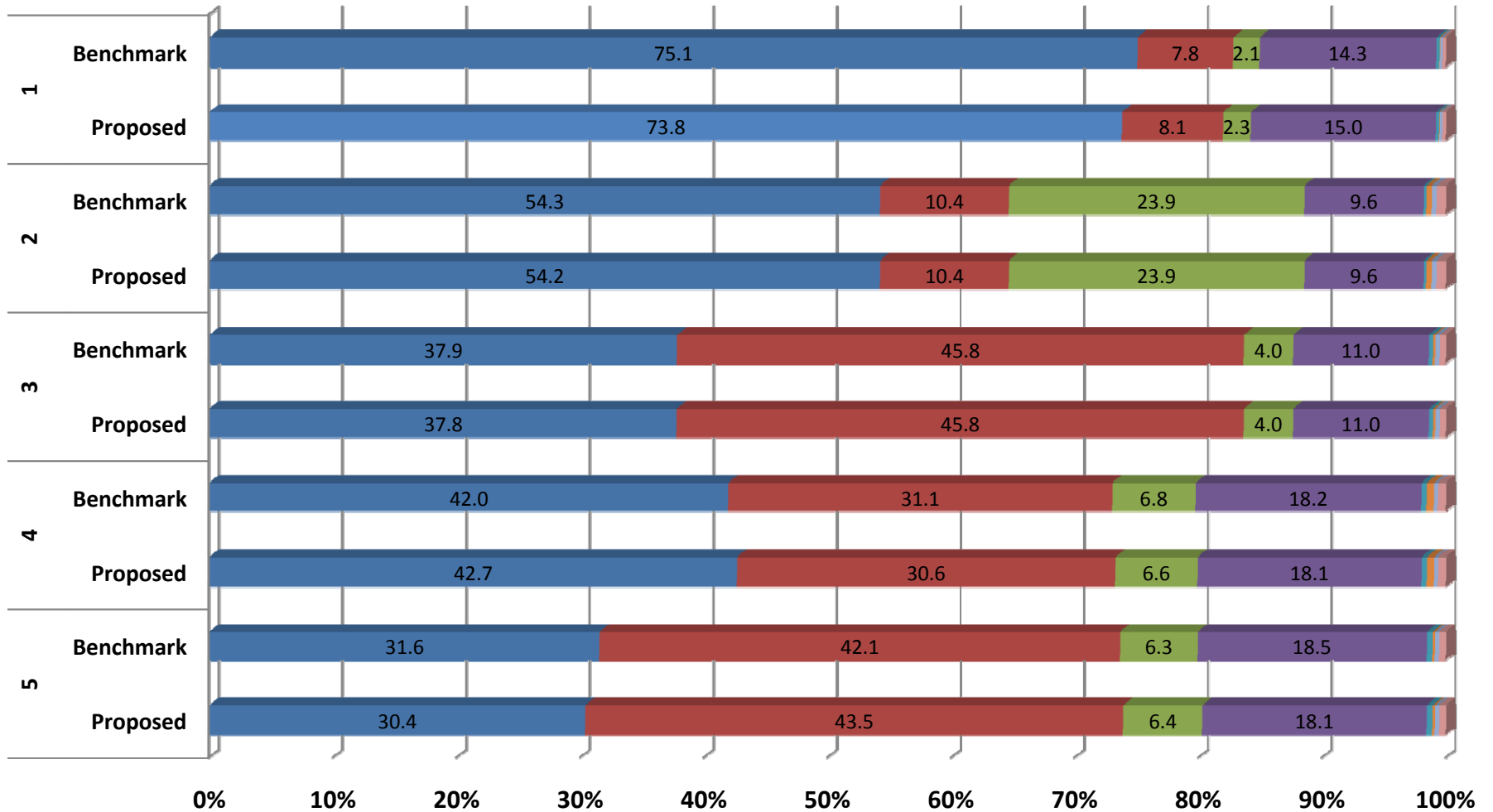

Distribution of Total Population among Districts by Race/Ethnicity

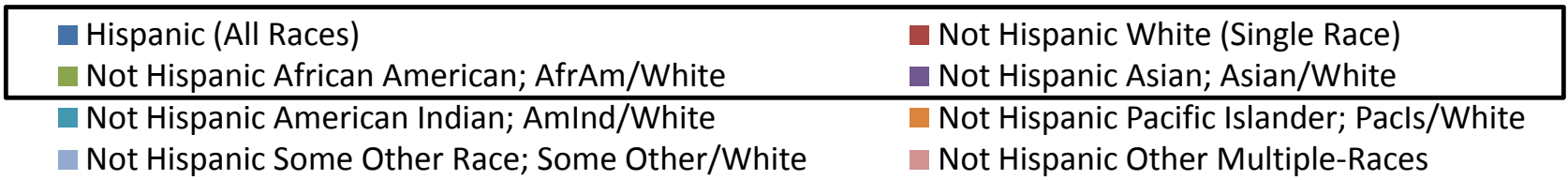

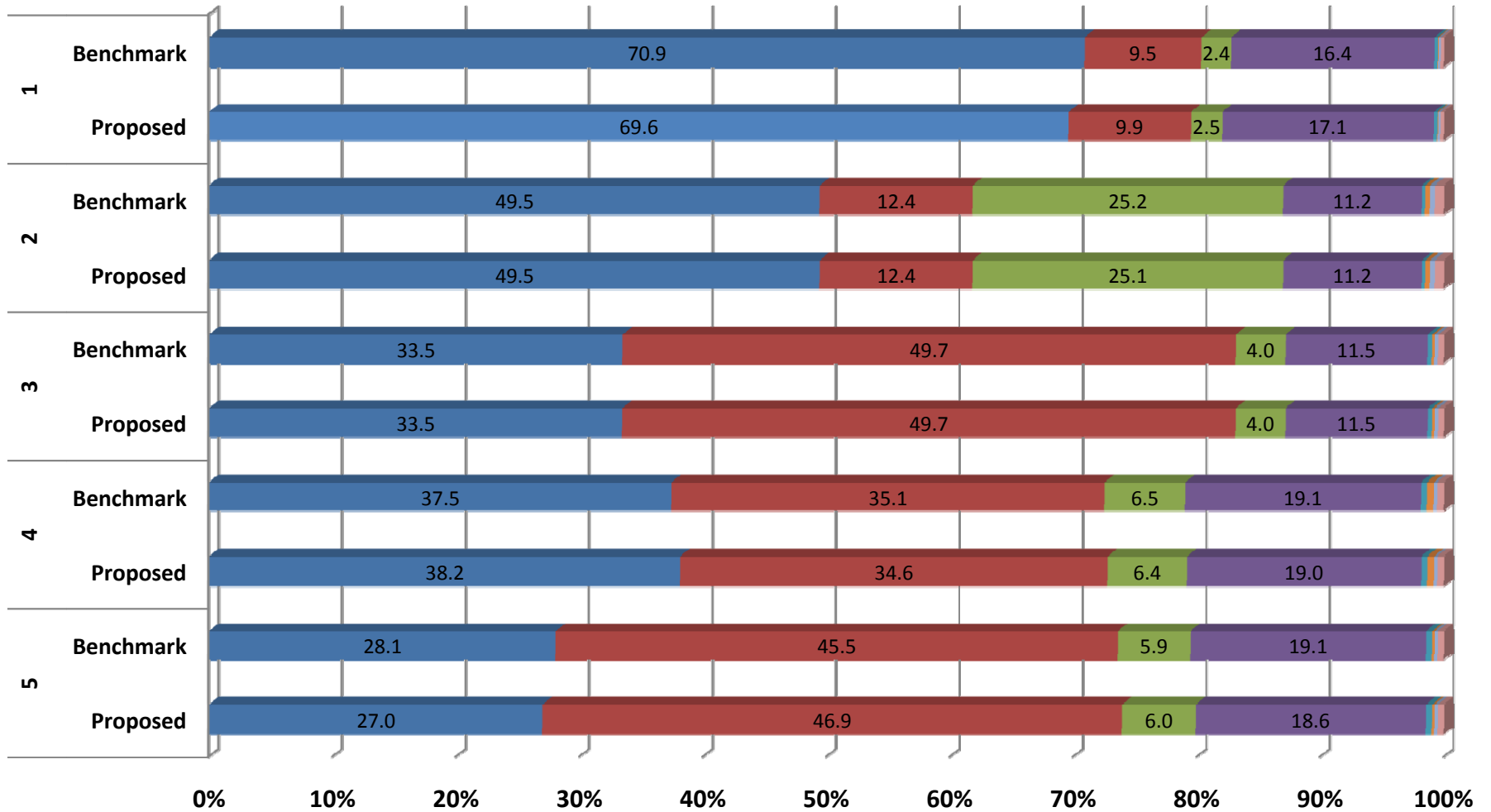

Distribution of Voting Age Population among Districts by Race/Ethnicity

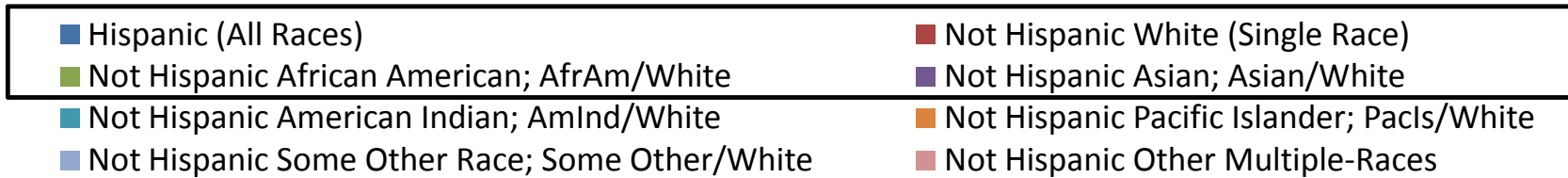

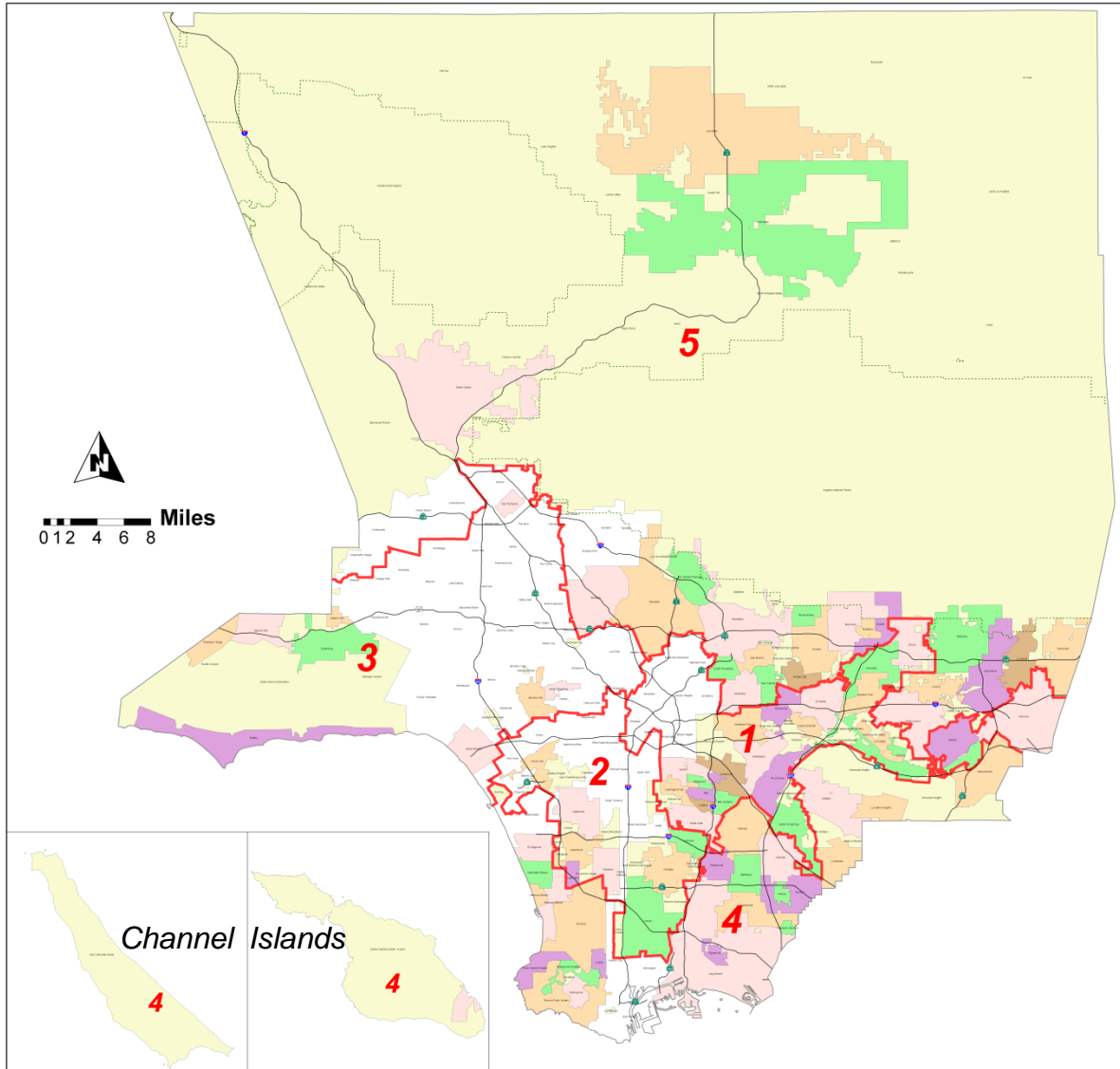

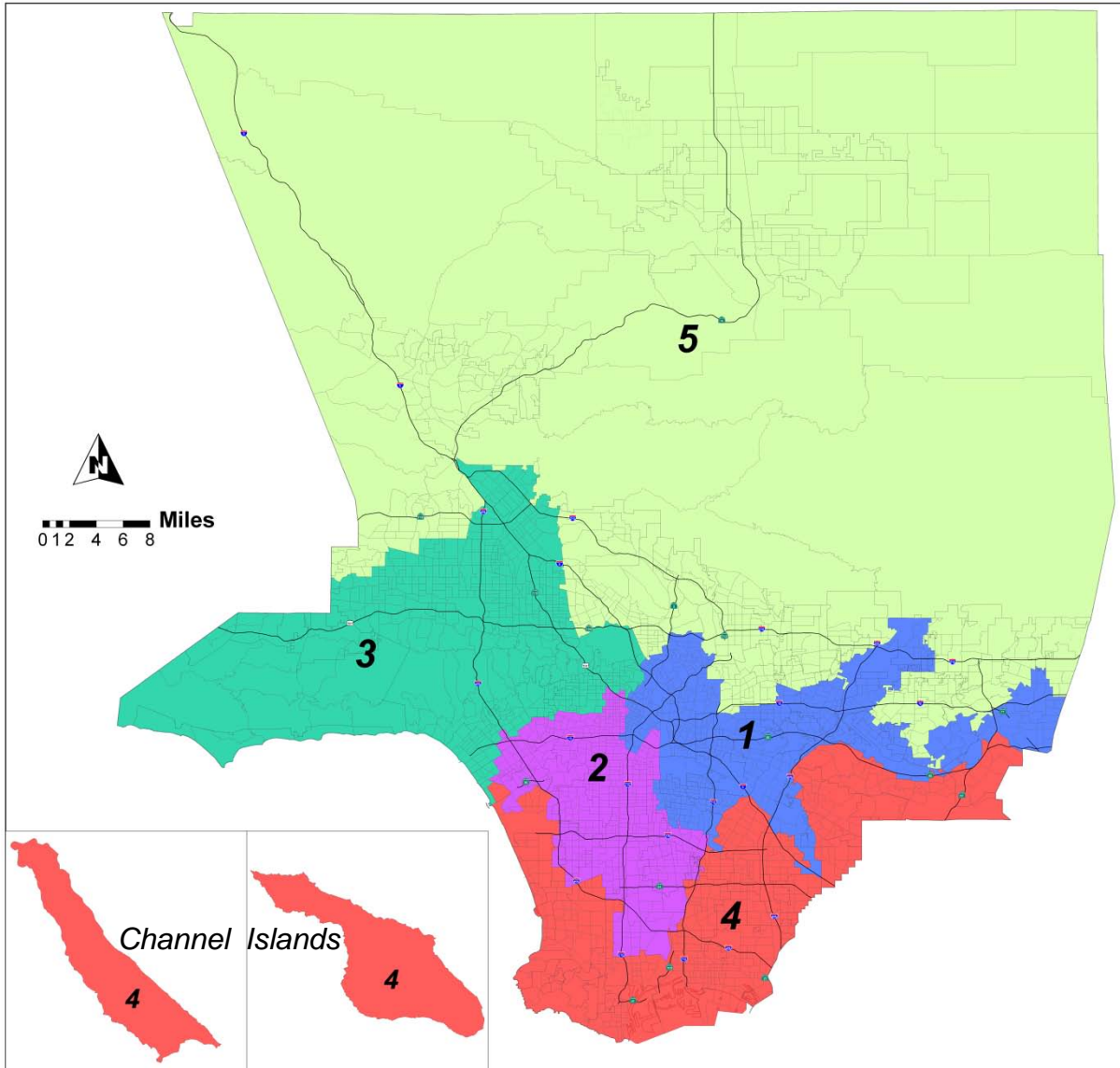

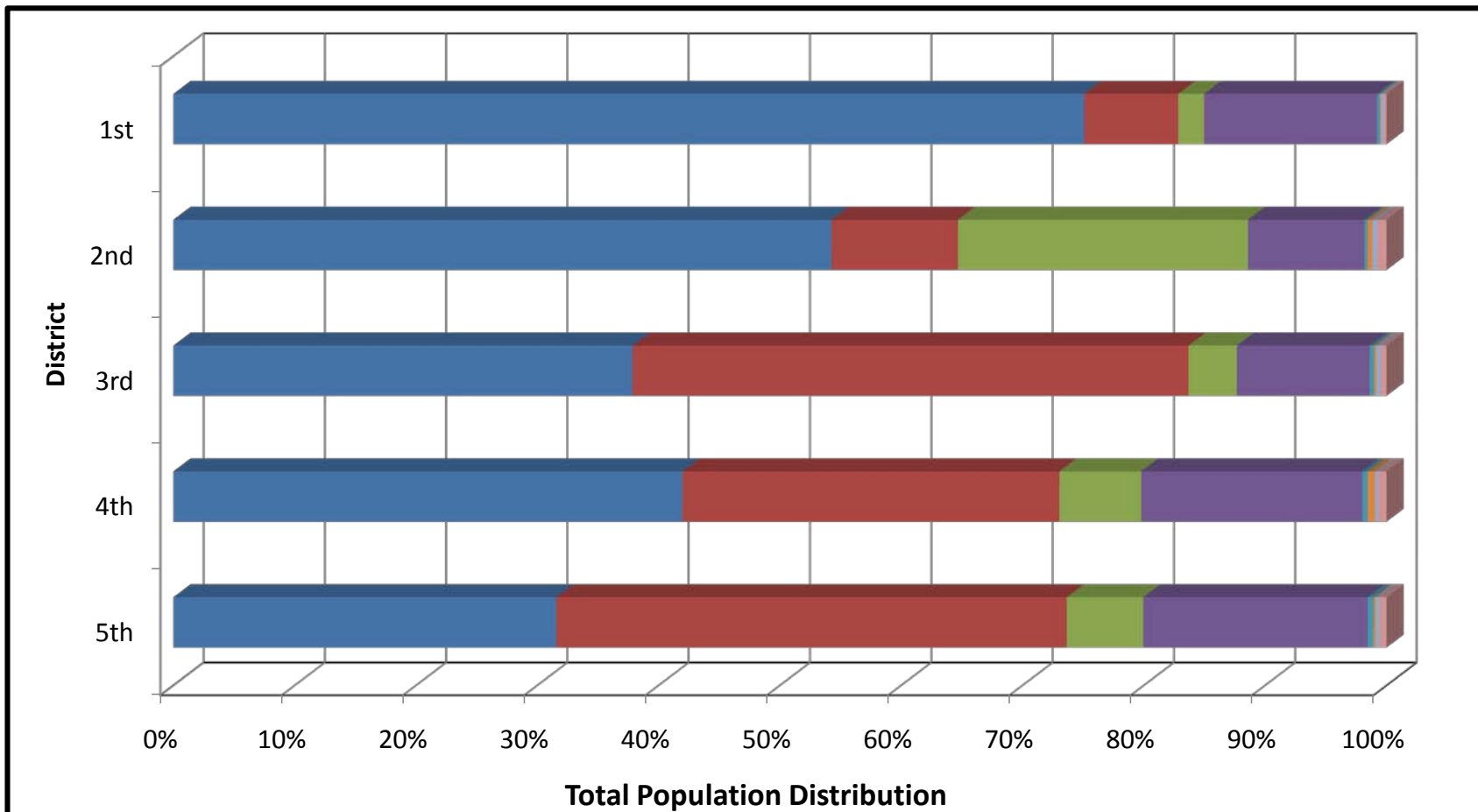

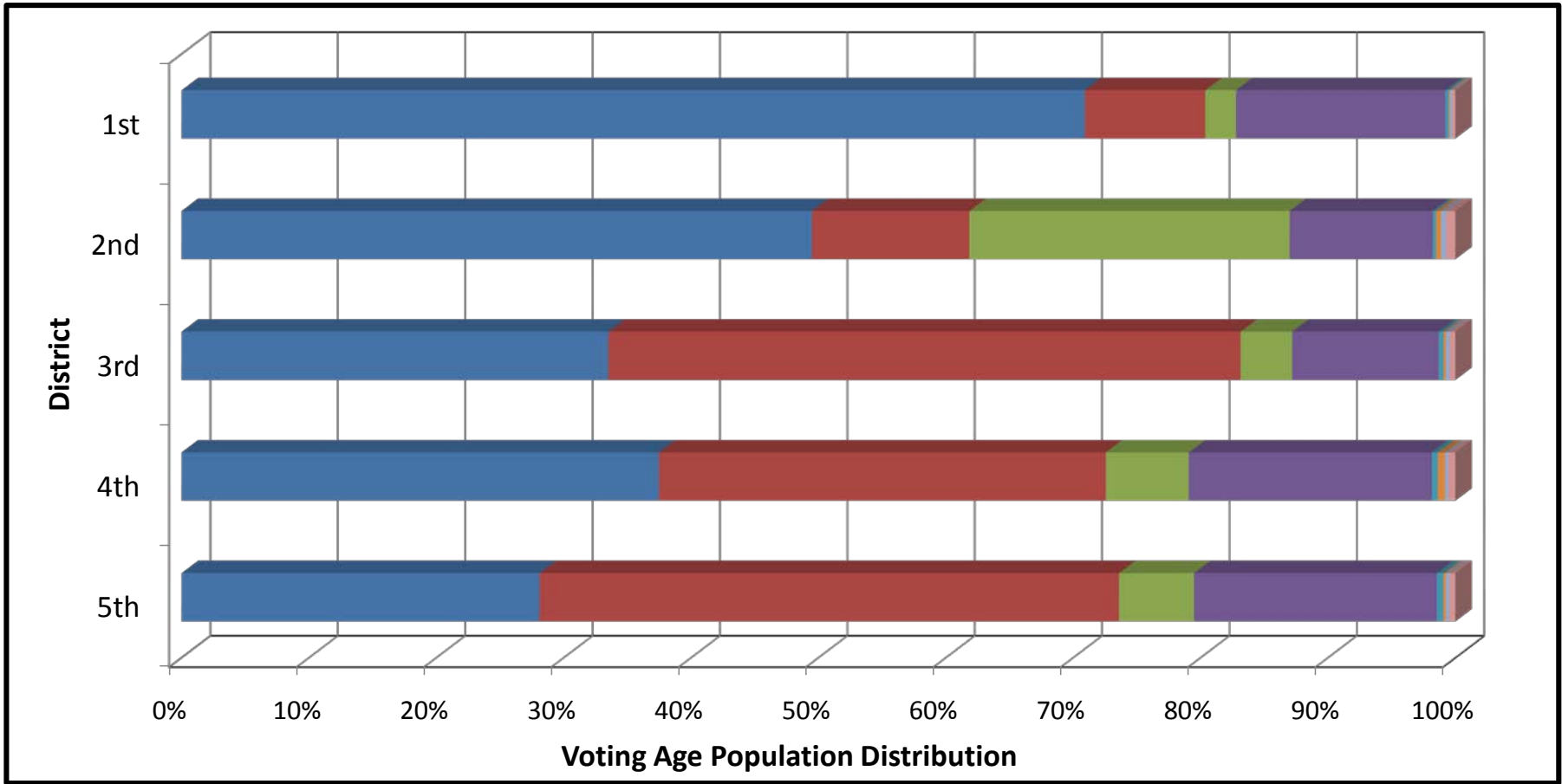

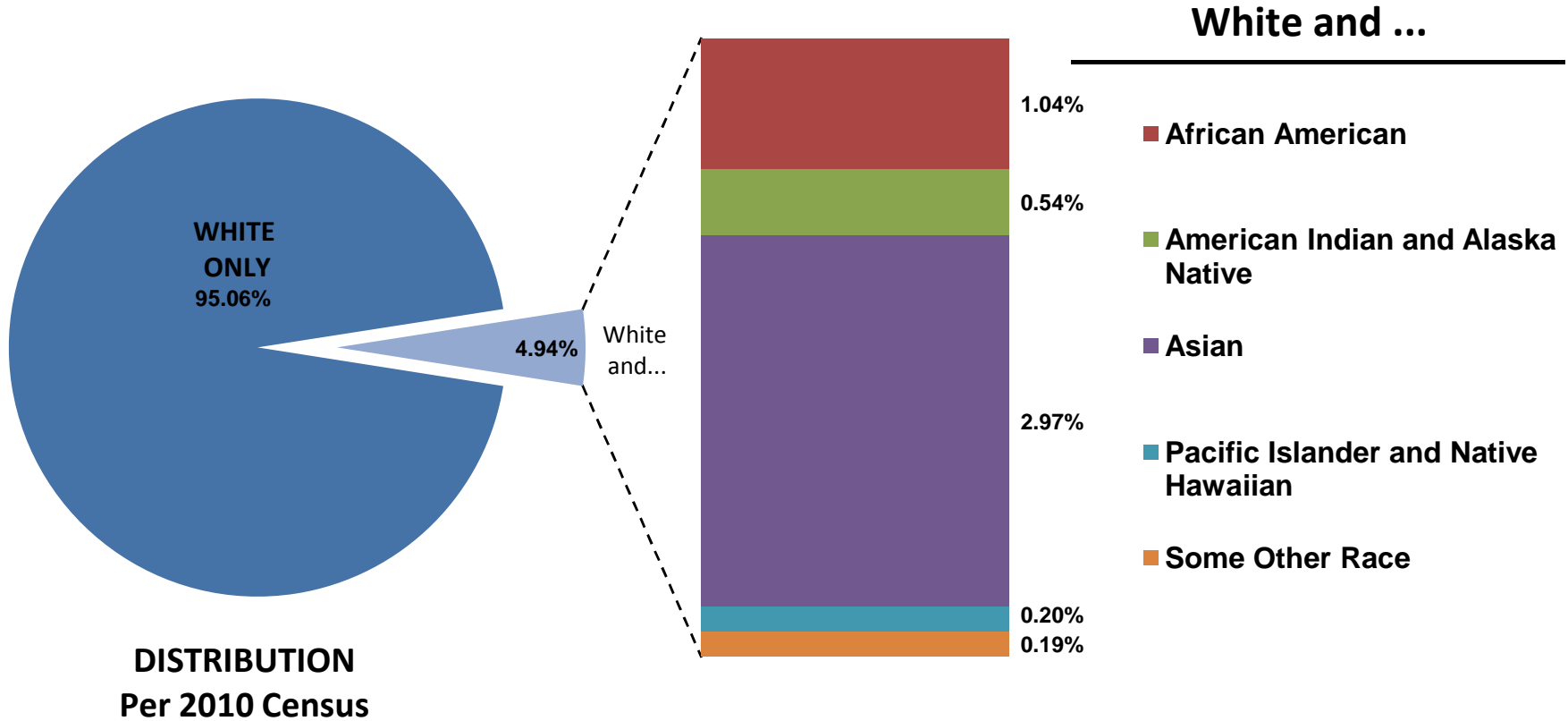

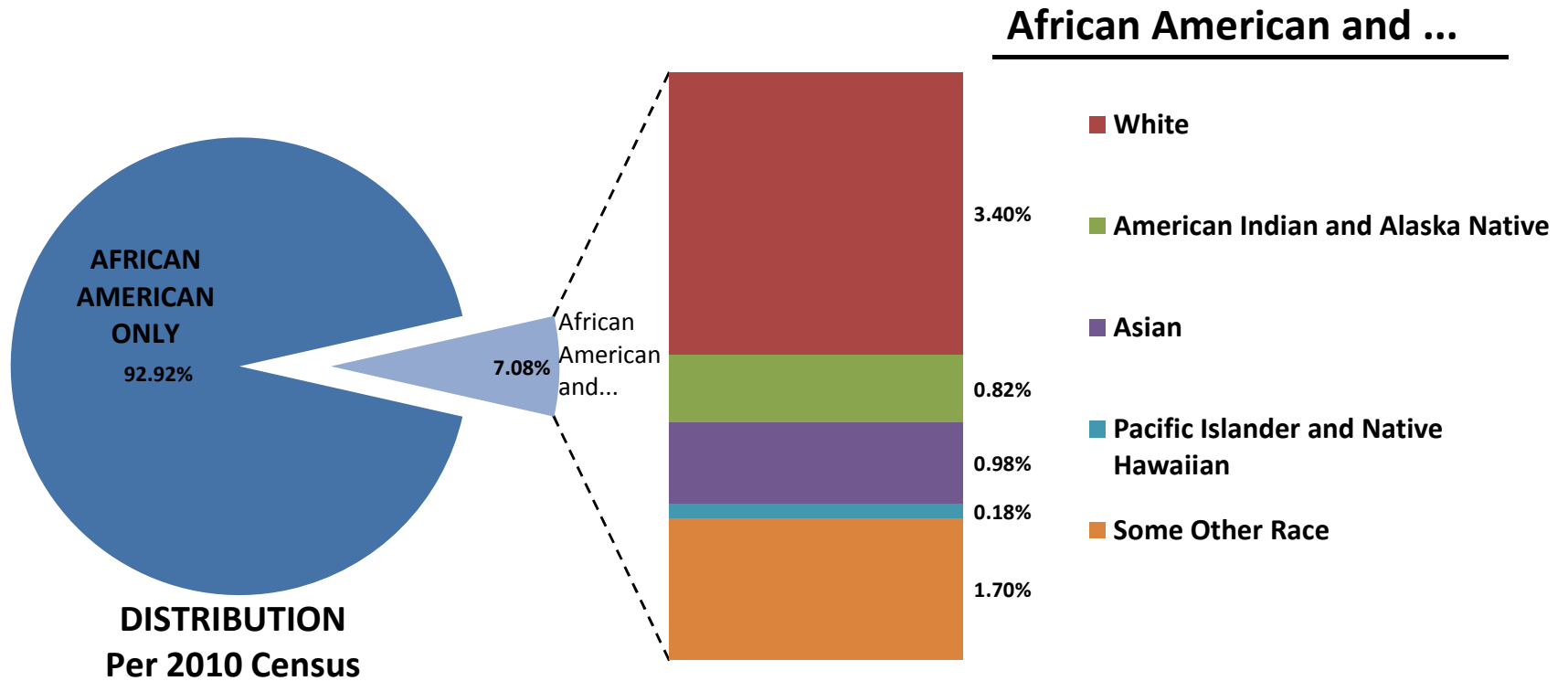
White Not Hispanic Population by LA County's "Detailed" Race/Ethnicity Categories

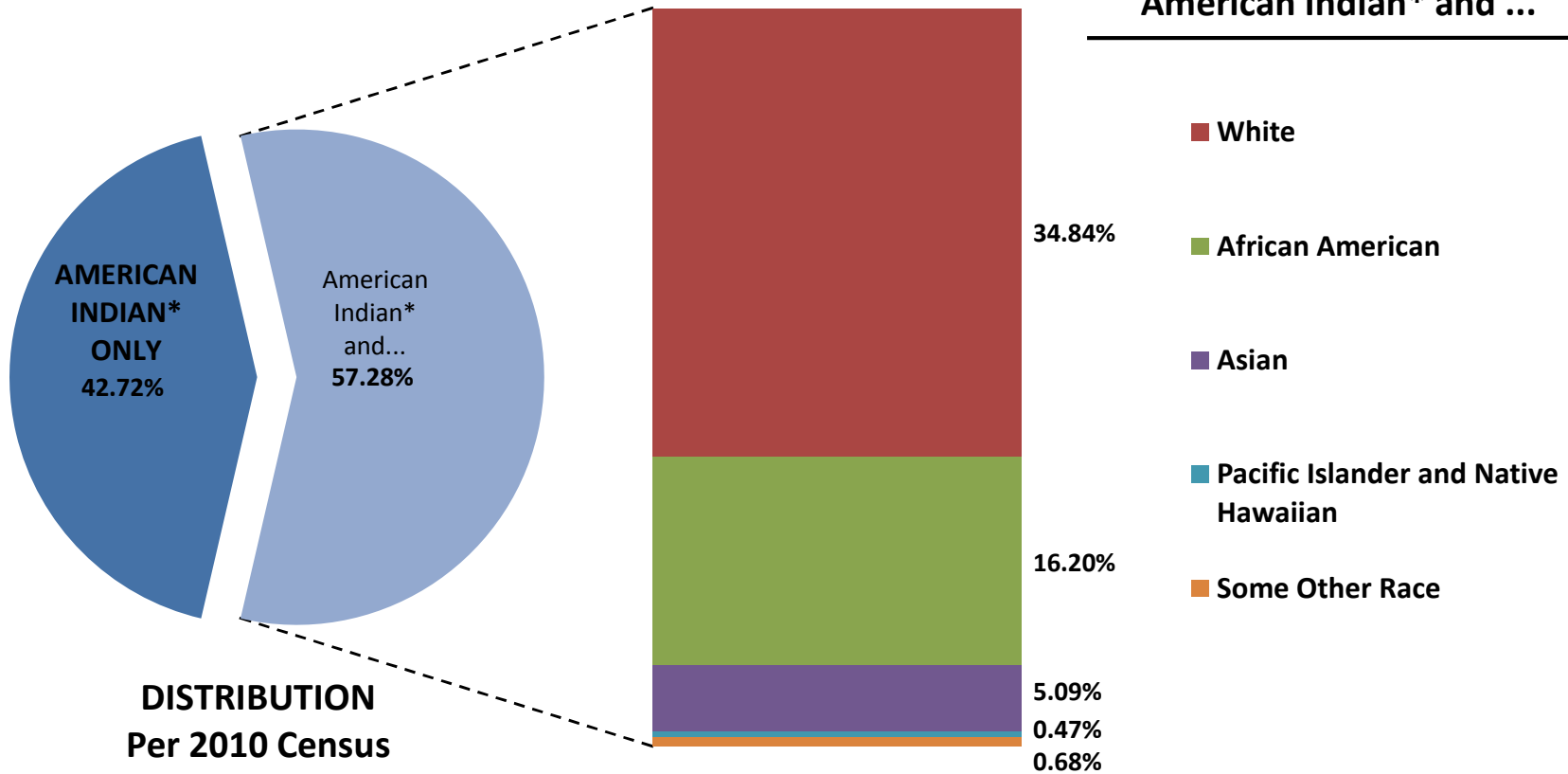

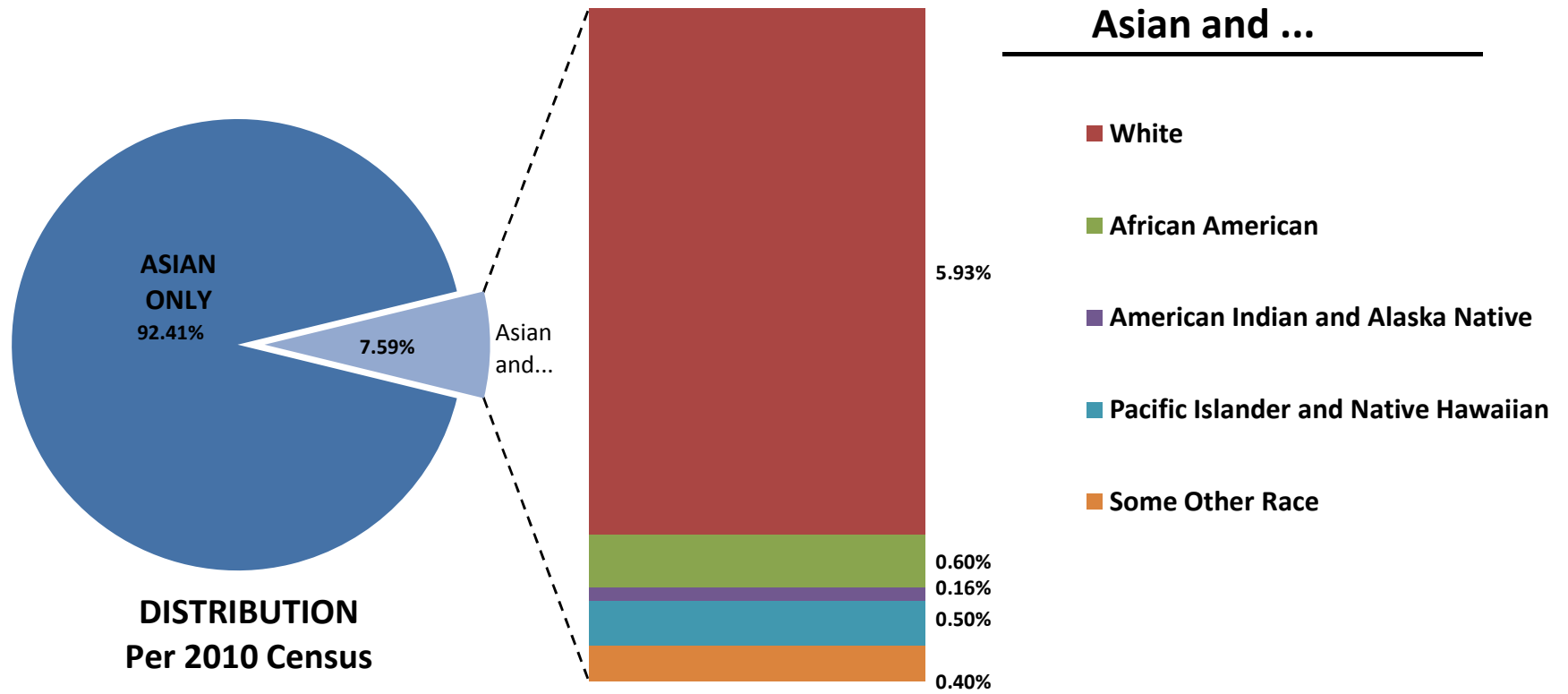

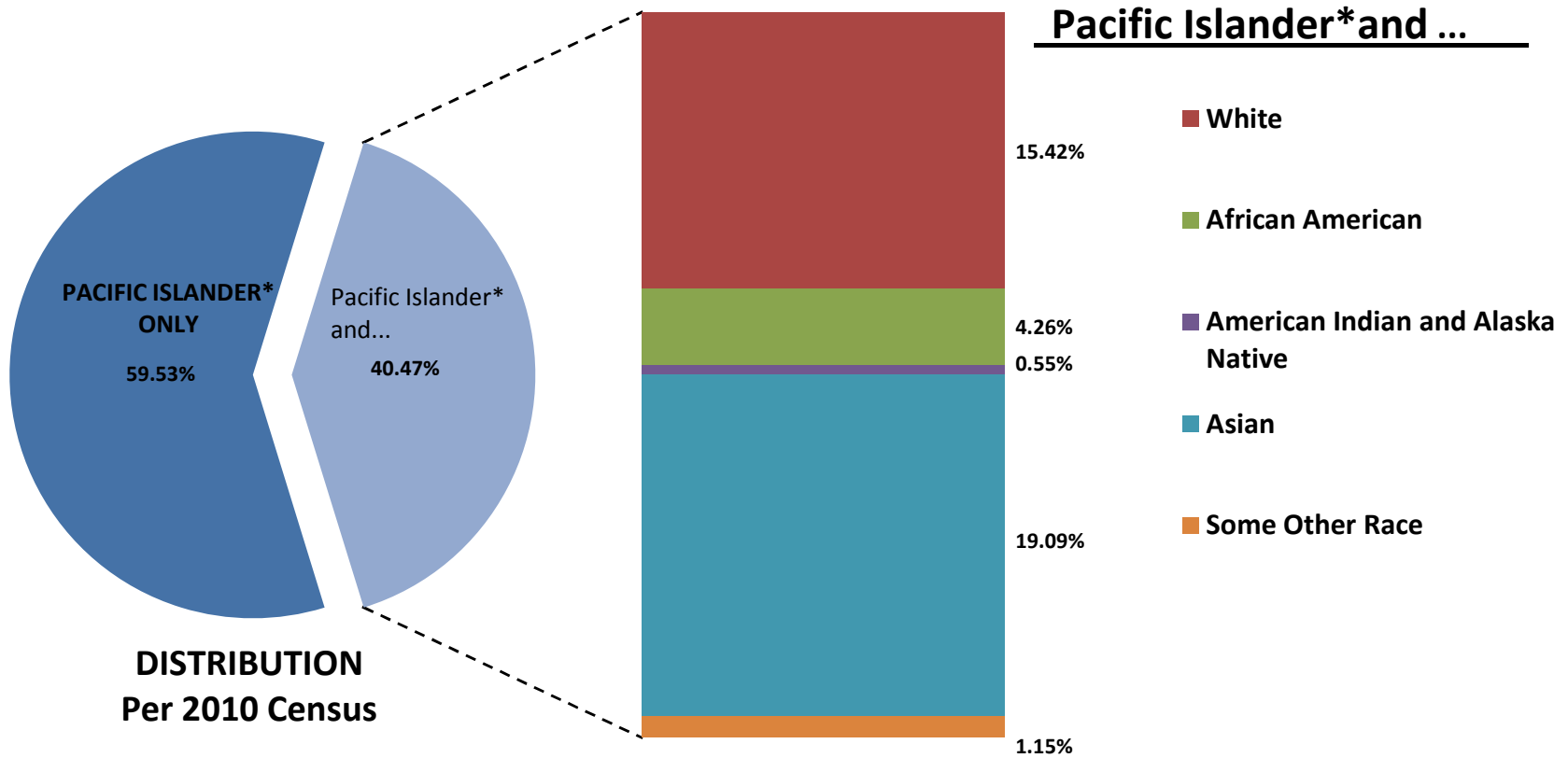
Asian Not Hispanic Population by LA County's "Detailed" Race/Ethnicity Categories

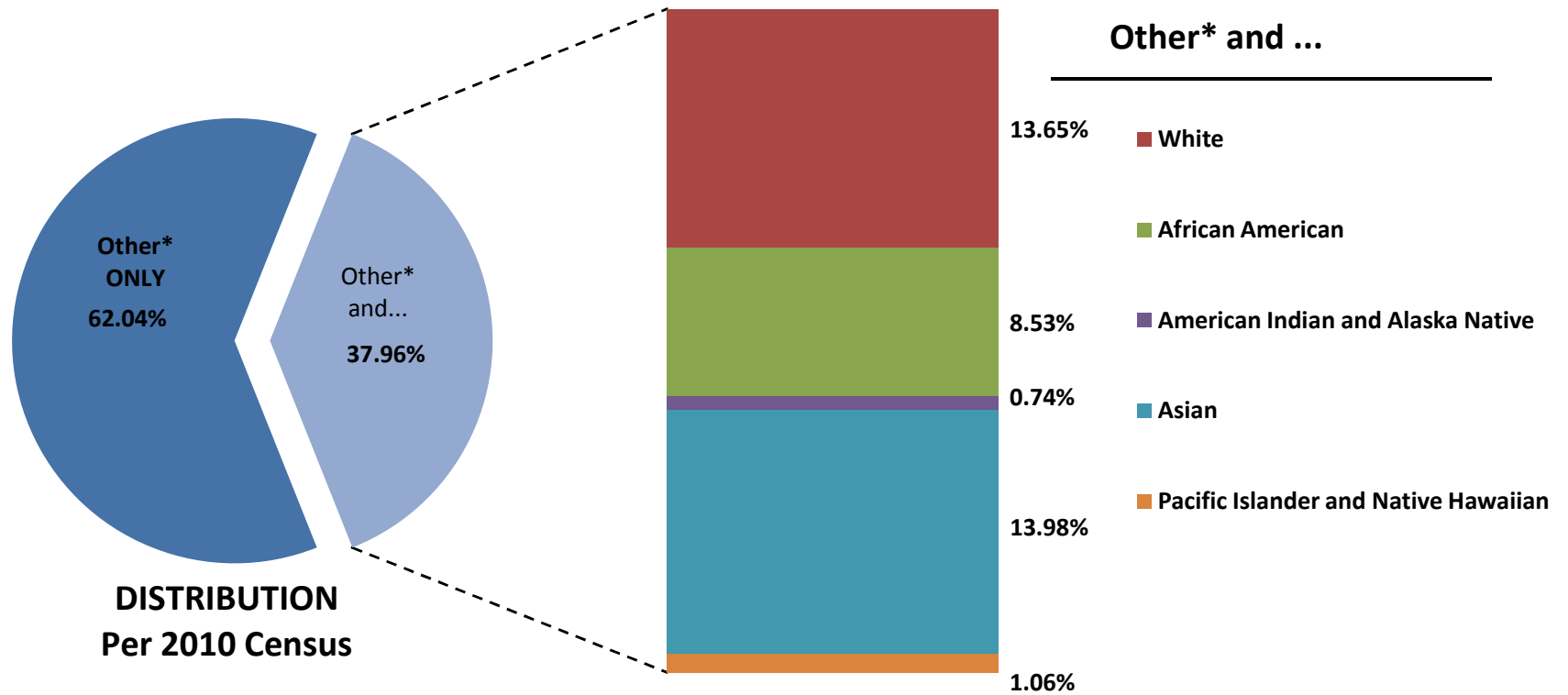

Consideration of Plan Proposed Amended A1**

The following is a summary of Plan Proposed Amended A1, as discussed at the Committee meeting on July 11, 2011.

1. Plan Summary: This plan proposes to reassign 57 redistricting units (RDUs) which make up 6 whole or partial communities. The moves of these areas are summarized on page 4, and are further detailed on pages 9-11 of the *Report on Proposed Redistricting Plan – Proposed Amended A1*. The relevant summary page (Page 4) is included here as Attachment 1.

2. Population Deviation: The total population deviation in the proposed plan is 1.69%.

3. Number of People Moved: This plan reassigns 150,121 people among the five districts. The total population moved to and from each district, is summarized on page 8 of the *Report on Proposed Redistricting Plan – Proposed Amended A1*. The relevant page is included here as Attachment 2.

4. Deferred/Advanced Voting: County supervisors are elected to staggered four-year terms. The First and Third Districts elect supervisors at each general election at which the Governor is to be elected (i.e. 2010, 2014, 2018). The Second, Fourth and Fifth Districts elect supervisors at each election which the President appears on the ballot (i.e. 2008, 2012, 2016, etc.). Countywide, 1.5% of constituents in the County will be affected by deferral or advancement under this plan. A table containing deferral and advancement information is included here as Attachment 3 and is summarized below.

Advancement

Voters who will be reassigned from the First and Third Districts into the Second, Fourth or Fifth Districts, will have an opportunity to vote for a County supervisor twice in four (4) years (2010, 2012), thus advancing their right to vote for a supervisor.

In the Benchmark First District, 39,520 constituents will be reassigned to either the Second, Fourth or Fifth Districts. As a result of this proposed plan, 2.1% of all constituents, 2.3% of the citizen voting age population (CVAP), and 2.5% of registered voters in the Benchmark First District are advanced.

In the Benchmark Third District, no constituents will be reassigned to either the Second, Fourth or Fifth Districts.

Deferment

Voters who will be reassigned from the Second, Fourth and Fifth Districts into the First and Third Districts, will not have the opportunity to vote for a County supervisor until 2014. For those reassigned voters, six (6) years will have passed since they last had the opportunity to vote for a supervisor.

In the Benchmark Second and Fourth Districts, no constituents will be reassigned to either the First or Third Districts.

In the Benchmark Fifth District, 110,601 constituents will be reassigned to either the First or Third Districts. As a result of this proposed plan, 5.3% of all constituents, 5.1% of the CVAP, and 5.0% of registered voters in the Benchmark Fifth District are deferred.

5. Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP): The CVAP information per district is summarized on page 25 of the *Report on Proposed Redistricting Plan – Proposed Amended A1*. The relevant page is included here as Attachment 4.

6. Incumbency: This plan does not displace any supervisor from his/her district.



ORDINANCE NO. _____

An ordinance repealing the Boundary Ordinance, Chapter 1.08 of Title 1 – General Provisions of the Los Angeles County Code, and reenacting it to adjust the district boundaries in accordance with the federal decennial census as required by California Elections Code Sections 21500, *et seq.*

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles ordains as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 1.08 of Title 1 of the Los Angeles County Code is repealed in its entirety.

Section 2. Chapter 1.08 of Title 1 of the Los Angeles County Code is reenacted to read as follows:

CHAPTER 1.08

SUPERVISOR DISTRICTS

1.08.010 Intent. It is the intent of the board of supervisors in enacting this chapter to adopt a redistricting plan in a manner consistent with the boundary descriptions maintained by the Los Angeles county registrar-recorder, and which provides fair and effective representation for all the people of the county, enhances the opportunity for all voters to elect candidates of their choice, and which otherwise meets all the requirements of law.
