DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS: CASTAIC ANIMAL CARE CENTER SPAY/NEUTER CLINIC AND ADMINISTRATION BUILDING PROJECT APPROVE REVISED PROJECT AND BUDGET; AND ADOPT AND ADVERTISE SPECS. 7173; CAPITAL PROJECT NO. 77545 (FIFTH DISTRICT) (3 VOTES)

SUBJECT

Approval of the recommended actions will find the proposed revisions to the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, approve the revisions to the Project and budget, adopt plans and specifications, and allow advertising for construction bids for the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Find the proposed revisions to the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act for the reasons stated in this letter and in the record of the Project.

2. Approve the proposed revisions and the revised budget of \$2,900,000, from the previously approved budget of \$1,860,000, for the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project, Capital Project No. 77545.

3. Adopt plans and specifications that are on file with the Department of Public Works for construction of the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project at an estimated construction cost of \$1,755,000, and instruct the Executive Officer of the Board of Supervisors to advertise the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project for construction bids to be received and opened on September 4, 2013, in accordance with the Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements.

4. Authorize the Director of Public Works, or her designee, to execute a consultant services agreement with the apparent Lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder to prepare a baseline construction schedule for a \$2,000 not-to-exceed amount funded by the existing Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project funds.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended actions will revise the Castaic Animal Care Center Spay/Neuter Clinic and Administration Building Project's (Project) scope and budget to address unforeseen site conditions, adopt plans and specifications, and allow advertising for construction bids for the Project.

On February 14, 2012, the Board approved the proposed Project to include the new construction of a spay/neuter clinic building; acquisition and installation of a new administrative modular building; and repairs of existing site improvements at the existing Castaic Animal Care Center (Center) located at 31044 Charlie Canyon Road in the unincorporated area of Castaic, with the Project budget of \$1,860,000.

The revised Project includes the construction of a new, approximately 1,752-square-foot spay/neuter clinic building; procurement and installation of a new, approximately 1,440-square-foot modular administration building; and work associated with utility connections and site preparation, including modification of the soil for the two new building foundations, and planting of new trees within the Center site, with the revised Project budget of \$2,900,000.

The original budget was based on the assumption that the two new buildings would be supported on traditional spread footing foundations with minimal earthwork and grading for preparation of the building pad areas. However, during the design phase, a geotechnical investigation study conducted at the site determined that the onsite soils are susceptible to liquefaction and differential settlement in a seismic event, making the ground unstable for the new buildings. To address the potential hazards of the soil, the underlying soils will be improved through compaction grouting, a process where grout is injected into the soil under pressure compacting the surrounding soil. The new spay/neuter clinic will then be supported on a concrete mat foundation, while the modular administration building will be supported on a traditional spread footing foundation.

The existing Center is located in a very high fire hazard severity zone. As part of the jurisdictional requirements from the County of Los Angeles Fire Department, a total of eight trees, not previously identified as part of the proposed Project, will be removed for forestry purposes to maintain 30 feet of fuel clearance around the new buildings and protect against potential hazardous fire conditions. Eight new Fire Department approved species of trees will be planted in another location within the Center site to replace the trees that were removed, and to provide wind break and shade, which are beneficial to the Center.

Additional funding has been allocated to fully fund the revised Project based on the final design. Plans and specifications for the revised Project are complete, and we recommend the Board adopt and advertise these documents for construction bids.

The proposed consultant services agreement requires the apparent Lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder to prepare a baseline construction schedule that conforms to the County's schedule specification, which is critical to successfully managing construction activities by both the contractor and the County. The bid specifications provide that if the apparent Lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder fails to complete an acceptable schedule, the Director of Public Works may return to the Board to recommend that the bidder be determined nonresponsible and recommend awarding the construction contract to the next apparent Lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder completing a baseline schedule that conforms to the County's specifications.

Following receipt of bids scheduled for September 4, 2013, we will return to the Board for construction contract award. It is anticipated that construction will begin in December 2013 and be completed in April 2015.

Green Building/Sustainable Design Program

The proposed Project is not subject to the Countywide Energy and Environmental Policy adopted by the Board on January 16, 2007, since it involves construction of two new buildings, each less than 10,000 gross square feet in size. However, the proposed Project supports the Board's Policy for Green Building/Sustainable Design Program by incorporating sustainable design features to optimize energy and water use efficiency in the new buildings, and enhance the sustainability of the site. Examples of sustainable design features for the proposed Project are the incorporation of an infiltration system to capture, filter, and percolate stormwater runoff on site; inclusion of solar tube skylights and occupancy sensors for energy efficiency; and the installation of water efficient plumbing fixtures.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The Countywide Strategic Plan directs the provision of Operational Effectiveness (Goal 1) by investing in public infrastructure that will improve animal care and control services in the north County area.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The Department of Public Works' fair construction cost estimate for the revised Project is \$1,755,000. The total revised Project cost, including programming, plans and specifications, plan check, construction, consultant services, miscellaneous expenditures, and County services, is currently estimated at \$2,900,000, which reflects an increase of \$1,040,000 from the previously approved proposed Project budget of \$1,860,000. The increase in the estimated construction costs is due to the additional change order contingency amount and increased budget amount for soil modification, and installation of the low voltage and telecommunication systems by the Internal Services Department (ISD), based on the completed design and associated soft costs for incorporating the Project revisions. The revised Project Schedule and Budget Summary are detailed in Attachment A.

The Fiscal Year 2013-14 Capital Projects/Refurbishment Budget, under Capital Project Number (C.P. No.) 77545, currently includes \$2.8 million in appropriation for the revised Project, including \$1,730,000 from the Fifth Supervisorial District's Community Programs net County cost, \$130,000 from the Fifth Supervisorial District's Capital Improvements net County cost, \$208,000 from the Capital Projects Designation net County cost (savings from the Lancaster Animal Shelter Spay/Neuter Clinic and Expansion Project, C.P. No. 77536), and \$732,000 net County Cost from obligated fund balance assigned for Capital Projects/Extraordinary Maintenance. An additional \$100,000 in carryover funds from the Department of Animal Care and Control's operating budget will be transferred to the Capital Project budget as part of Fiscal Year 2013-14 Supplemental Resolution to fully fund the revised Project.

Operating Budget Impact

Following completion of the revised Project, the Department of Animal Care and Control will work with the Chief Executive Office to determine the appropriate level of associated maintenance and operational costs and will request funding as required.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

On February 14, 2012, the Board approved the proposed Project with an estimated total budget of \$1,860,000, which included the construction of the spay/neuter clinic through the County's competitive low-bid process; the acquisition and installation of a prefabricated modular administration building through a commodity purchase under the statutory authority of the County's purchasing agent; and site repairs to be completed by ISD through the Board approved competitive bid process and Job Order Contract program.

The acquisition and installation of the modular administration building, including associated site work, was originally planned to be completed through a purchase order under the ISD's purchasing program. However, in an effort to save costs by combining the site work for both new buildings under the same contract, the modular administration building was included with the spay/neuter clinic as part of the low bid contract. The bid documents require the contractor to complete the modular administration building within the first eight months of the contract period.

Repairs to the existing site improvements, including installation of a cold soft water line from the existing utility building to the kennel building, replacement of the damaged asphalt pavement around the perimeter of the kennel building with new concrete pavement, and the repair of the facility's existing irrigation system were completed in April 2013.

As part of the revised Project, ISD will procure and install telecommunication systems for the new spay/neuter clinic and modular administration buildings, and an intrusion alarm system for the spay/neuter clinic.

Pursuant to the Board's Civic Art Policy, adopted on December 7, 2004, and revised on December 15, 2009, the revised Project budget includes 1 percent of the design and construction costs to be allocated toward the Civic Arts Fund.

Applicable law, including the State Public Contract Code, requires the County to award construction contracts to the Lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder, which refers to the firm that: 1) submits the lowest bid price; 2) is deemed by the County to be "responsive" to specific criteria under the

solicitation, including, but not limited to, licensure, bonding, and insurance requirements; and 3) is determined by the County to be a "responsible" bidder by exhibiting the quality, fitness, capacity, experience, and trustworthiness, to satisfactorily perform the work required under the bid solicitation.

As part of their bids, contractors are required to provide unit prices for the compaction grouting and for the extended daily overhead rate. As specified in the bid documents, the lowest bid price shall be determined by adding the lump sum bid, the extended overhead daily rate multiplied by 30 calendar days, the unit price for the injection casing multiplied by 1,000 linear feet, the unit price for compaction grout multiplied by 3,000 cubic feet, and the Local Small Business Enterprise preference (5 percent of the lowest bid price up to a maximum of \$50,000), if applicable.

A standard construction contract, in a form previously approved by County Counsel, will be used. The contract will contain terms and conditions supporting the Board's ordinances, policies, and programs, including, but not limited to: County's Greater Avenues for Independence (GAIN) and General Relief Opportunities for Work (GROW) Programs; Board Policy No. 5.050; Contract Language to Assist in Placement of Displaced County Workers; Board Policy 5.110; Reporting of Improper Solicitations; Board Policy No. 5.060; Notice to Contract Employees of Newborn Abandonment Law (Safely Surrendered Baby Law), Board Policy No 5.135; Contractor Employee Jury Service Program, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.203; Notice to Employees Regarding the Federal Earned Income Credit (Federal Income Tax Law, Internal Revenue Service Notice 1015); Contractor Responsibility and Debarment, Los Angeles County Code Chapter 2.202; and the Los Angeles County's Child Support Compliance Program, Los Angeles County Code, Chapter 2.200; and the standard Board-directed clauses that provide for contract termination or renegotiation.

To ensure that the contract is awarded to the Lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder with a satisfactory history of performance, bidders are required to report violations of the False Claims Act, criminal convictions, civil litigation, defaulted contracts with the County, complaints filed with the contractor's State License Board, labor law/payroll violations, and debarment actions. As provided for in Board Policy No. 5.140, the information reported by the contractor will be considered before making a recommendation to award.

The Project specifications contain provisions requiring the contractor to report solicitations of improper consideration of County employees and allowing the County to terminate the contract if it is found that the contractor offered or gave improper consideration to County employees.

The plans and specifications include the contractual provisions and material requirements necessary for the Project and are on file with Public Works Architectural Engineering Division.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

On February 14, 2012, the Board found the proposed Project to be categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), pursuant to Sections 15301(a) and (d), 15303(c) and (d), and 15304(a) of the State CEQA Guidelines, and Classes 1(c) and (d); 3(a), (d), and (k); and 4(a) of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines, Appendix G.

The Project's revisions including the removal of trees for forestry purposes to maintain fuel clearance around the new buildings, the planting of new trees, and the ground improvement by compaction grouting for the new building pad areas are also exempt from CEQA because they are within certain classes of Projects that have been determined not to have a significant effect on the environment in

that the revised work meets the criteria set forth in Sections 15304 (b) and (i) of the State CEQA Guidelines, and Class 4 of the County's Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines. The Project is not located in a sensitive environment and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, or other limiting factors that would make the exemption inapplicable based on the Project records.

Upon the Board's approval of the revisions to the approved Project, Public Works will file a Notice of Exemption with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk pursuant to Section 15062 of the State CEQA Guidelines.

CONTRACTING PROCESS

Advertising for construction bids will be in accordance with the County's standard Instruction Sheet for Publishing Legal Advertisements (Attachment B).

As requested by the Board on February 3, 1998, this contract opportunity will be listed on the "Doing Business with Us" website.

Participation by Community Business Enterprises (CBE) in the Project is encouraged through Public Works' CBE Outreach Program and by monitoring the good faith efforts of bidders to utilize CBE.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

Approval of the recommended actions will have no impact on current County services or Projects. The existing animal care center will remain operational during construction of the Project.
