**NAMING OF THE INPATIENT BUILDING AT LOS ANGELES COUNTY+USC MEDICAL CENTER
AND THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY FAMILY SUPPORT CENTER PROJECT
(FIRST AND THIRD DISTRICT)
(3 VOTES)**

SUBJECT

This letter recommends approval to name the inpatient building at Los Angeles County + USC Medical Center to the "Gloria Molina Medical Pavilion," and to name the new San Fernando Valley Family Support Center to the "Zev Yaroslavsky Family Support Center," in recognition of both Supervisor Gloria Molina and Supervisor Zev Yaroslavsky's long and distinguished records of public service to the County of Los Angeles and the First and Third Districts, respectively.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. Approve the naming of the inpatient building at Los Angeles County + USC Medical Center to the "Gloria Molina Medical Pavilion."
2. Approve the naming of the new San Fernando Valley Family Support Center, scheduled to be completed in 2015, to the "Zev Yaroslavsky Family Support Center."

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Supervisor Gloria Molina has championed countless public health and wellness efforts throughout her decades-long career in public service. When County fiscal challenges threatened the viability of the Los Angeles County (LAC)+USC Medical Center (Medical Center) in the 1990s, Supervisor Molina mobilized efforts to ensure that this vital public facility survived, ultimately culminating in the successful construction of a state-of-the-art Medical Center in Boyle Heights, to replace the aging,

antiquated hospital. She was involved in every aspect of the construction of the new campus, from the design of the facility itself, to the complete rethinking of how to deliver preventative care and community wellness services.

Supervisor Molina's singular leadership to deliver a major public hospital, which is focused on improving the quality of healthcare for the community, can be witnessed every day at LAC+USC. Thanks to Supervisor Molina's efforts, the new hospital has been able to attract some of the top medical practitioners in the world, who want to work and teach at the new facility.

In November 2012, the Board approved the implementation of the San Fernando Valley Family Support Center (Center) Project in the Van Nuys area. The purpose of the Center is to provide the public with essential assessments, services, and referrals linked to a range of County and community resources that are family-focused, culturally sensitive, responsive, and accessible. Supervisor Yaroslavsky has provided key leadership and vision in planning and executing this critical constituent project, which will benefit County residents in a variety of ways.

The concept of a unified family support center was first brought forth and championed by Supervisor Yaroslavsky. Under his leadership and guidance, the project was conceived as more than just the construction of a building – it was an opportunity to build a better service delivery model, jointly locating related services including health care, public social services, children's services, child support services, and virtually every other safety program provided by the County under one roof. It is expected that this new model will significantly improve the accessibility and effectiveness of County service delivery.

In November 2014, both Supervisor Molina and Supervisor Yaroslavsky will complete their final terms on the Board of Supervisors. Given their long careers in public service and accomplishments, it would be an appropriate tribute for the Board to name the inpatient facility at the Medical Center the "Gloria Molina Medical Pavilion" and the new San Fernando Valley Support Center the "Zev Yaroslavsky Family Support Center" in their honor respectively.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

For the renaming of the inpatient facility at the Medical Center, there will be some cost associated with the signage replacement both inside and outside the existing structure. The Medical Center may choose to deplete existing stationary before the new name is placed on all forms and documentation in order to reduce associated costs.

The costs associated with the naming of the San Fernando Valley Service Center, are included in the approved Project budget.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

The Medical Center, founded in 1878 and located in the Boyle Heights community of Los Angeles, is a public teaching hospital owned and operated by the County of Los Angeles and affiliated with the University of Southern California. In November 2008, a new \$1.0 billion, state of the art 600-bed hospital was completed and opened for service, replacing the adjacent original hospital and the

Women's and Children's Hospital. LAC+USC operates special units that serve patients from throughout Southern California, including a Burn Center, a Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, and a Level-One Trauma Center for the most severe injuries. LAC+USC is home to the Rand Schrader HIV/AIDS Clinic, the Violence Intervention Program offering medical, mental health, protective, and social services to over 20,000 victims of family violence and sexual assault each year, and a renowned medical clinic for children at risk for or already in foster care.

The San Fernando Valley Support Center Project is a 212,000 square foot 5-level office campus that will co-locate and integrate services of seven Los Angeles County departments. The Project is anticipated to be completed in mid-2015. With the Board's approval, the building will be named the Zev Yaroslavsky Family Support Center upon its opening.

IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

There are no anticipated impacts to current services and projects associated with the proposed action.
