6 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** CALL THE MEETING TO ORDER AND ASK EVERYONE
7 TO PLEASE RISE. WE WILL BE LED IN OUR INVOCATION THIS MORNING
8 BY FATHER ROBERT KEARNS OF THE ST. BRIGIT CATHOLIC CHURCH IN
9 LOS ANGELES, FOLLOWED BY THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE WHICH WILL
10 BE LED BY IRIS PATRICIA MESA, MEMBER, ABRAHAM LINCOLN POST
11 NUMBER 241, THE AMERICAN LEGION.

12
13 **REVEREND ROBERT KEARNS:** GOOD MORNING, MY BROTHERS AND SISTERS.
14 LET US PRAY. GOOD AND GRACIOUS GOD, WE PAUSE AT THE BEGINNING
15 OF THIS SESSION, THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.
16 WE ASK, LORD, THAT WE RECOGNIZE YOUR PRESENCE OF ONE ANOTHER
17 AND IN ALL WE MEET THIS DAY. WE ASK THAT YOUR DIVINE WISDOM
18 GUIDE US IN UNDERSTANDING AND DECISION-MAKING OF THIS BODY OF
19 COMMUNITY SERVANTS. HEAVENLY FATHER, WE ARE AWARE WE ARE ONE
20 PEOPLE, CREATED BY YOUR LOVING HAND AND MADE IN YOUR IMAGE AND
21 LIKENESS. OUR COMMUNITY IS FILLED WITH CRIES OF PAIN, INJURY,
22 INJUSTICE, VIOLENCE, AND DIVISION. GRANT US, LORD, A NEW
23 SPIRIT AND SKILL OF HEALING AND RECONCILING THE DIVERSE
24 MEMBERS OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FOR THE COMMON GOOD OF ALL.
25 FATHER, OFTEN WE GROW WEARIED AND DISCOURAGED BY THE MANY



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1 INTRACTABLE PROBLEMS WE MUST FACE BUT, LORD, INSPIRE US TO
2 REMEMBER, WE ARE NOT ALONE. YOU ARE WITH US, AS WELL AS
3 COUNTLESS CITIZENS, CHURCHES, AND INSTITUTIONS OF THE
4 COMMUNITY STANDING IN SOLIDARITY WITH US TO BRING ABOUT
5 JUSTICE, PEACE, AND TRUTH FOR ALL WHO ARE CITIZENS. LOVING
6 FATHER, AT THE END OF THIS DAY, MAY IT BE SAID THAT THE LOS
7 ANGELES COMMUNITY IS MORE JUST, PEACEFUL, AND HONEST DUE TO

9 GIFTS WITH MINDS OPEN TO YOUR WORD AND HEARTS THAT TRUST IN
10 YOUR ETERNAL LOVE AND CARE. AMEN.

18 **SUP. MOLINA:** THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN. IT'S MY PLEASURE THIS
19 MORNING TO MAKE A PRESENTATION TO-- IS IT IRIS PATRICIA MESA?
20 MS. MESA IS A MEMBER THE AMERICAN LEGION POST 241 OF BALDWIN
21 PARK. SHE SERVED AS A CORPORAL IN THE 86TH COMBAT SUPPORT
22 HOSPITAL OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY IN THE PERSIAN GULF FROM
23 2000 TO 2004. MISS MESA'S NUMEROUS HONORS INCLUDE THE ARMY
24 COMMENDATION MEDAL, THREE ARMY ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS, A MEDAL OF
25 GOOD CONDUCT, A NATIONAL DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL, AN ARMY



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1 OVERSEAS RIBBON AND A GLOBAL WAR ON TERRORISM MEDAL. SHE IS
2 EMPLOYED IN MOUNT SAN ANTONIO COLLEGE AND LIVES IN BALDWIN
3 PARK. WE WANT TO THANK YOU TODAY FOR LEADING US IN OUR PLEDGE
4 OF ALLEGIANCE AND WE'D LIKE TO PRESENT THIS CERTIFICATE OF
5 APPRECIATION. CONGRATULATIONS. [APPLAUSE]

7 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR BURKE?

8

9 **SUP. BURKE:** WELL, WE CERTAINLY WANT TO WELCOME FATHER KEARNS.
10 HE WAS APPOINTED THE PASTOR OF ST. BRIGIT CHURCH IN SOUTH LOS
11 ANGES IN DECEMBER 2003. ORDAINED A PRIEST IN WASHINGTON, D.C.
12 IN 1963, HIS FIRST ASSIGNMENT WAS BALTIMORE, MARYLAND, WHERE
13 HE SERVED ORGANIZED AFRICAN-AMERICAN PARISHES TO WORK
14 COLLABORATIVELY FOR RELIGIOUS, NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT AND
15 CIVIL RIGHTS. HE PARTICIPATED IN THE MARCH ON WASHINGTON IN
16 AUGUST, 1963 AND, IN 1965, FATHER KEARNS WAS ONE OF THE CLERGY
17 WHO RESPONDED TO DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING JR.'S CALL TO COME TO
18 SELMA, ALABAMA, TO SUPPORT PASSAGE OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS
19 LEGISLATION. HE RECEIVED HIS MASTER'S DEGREE IN URBAN AFFAIRS
20 FROM LOYOLA UNIVERSITY IN CHICAGO, ILLINOIS; APPOINTED THE
21 FIRST DIRECTOR OF THE JOSEPHITE PASTORAL CENTER RESEARCH, A
22 TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT CENTER TO SERVE AFRICAN-AMERICAN
23 CATHOLIC CONGREGATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES. HE WAS ELECTED
24 SUPERIOR GENERAL OF THE JOSEPHITE COMMUNITY AND SERVED TWO
25 TERMS AS SUPERIOR GENERAL AND, AMONG OTHER ACTIVITIES, HE



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1 WORKED IN NIGERIA. WE'RE SO PLEASED TO HAVE YOU HERE TODAY
2 AND, ALSO, WE'RE VERY PLEASED TO HAVE YOU IN LOS ANGELES AND
3 WE LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH YOU. AND I KNOW YOU HAVE MANY
4 CHALLENGES HERE BUT WE'RE PLEASED THAT YOU'RE HERE WITH US.

5

3 OF LOS ANGELES, COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, TO HONOR DAN BLOCKER.
4 THE PLAQUE WILL BE PLACED AT DAN BLOCKER BEACH ONCE THE
5 RENOVATIONS HAVE BEEN COMPLETED. FANS AROUND THE WORLD,
6 OBVIOUSLY, COULDN'T ALL BE HERE TODAY BUT THEY'RE HERE IN
7 SPIRIT AND THEY WANTED US TO LET THE BLOCKER FAMILY KNOW THAT,
8 EVEN THOUGH DAN BLOCKER IS NO LONGER WITH US, THAT HE'S NEVER
9 BEEN FORGOTTEN. AND TODAY WE ARE PRESENTING A MOCKUP OF THE
10 PLAQUE THAT WILL GO ON THE BEACH. [APPLAUSE] .

11

12 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS, I THINK MOST PEOPLE
13 KNOW DAN BLOCKER WAS A STAR OF THE HIT TELEVISION SHOW,
14 BONANZA. THE COUNTY NAMED A BEACH IN MALIBU AFTER HIM. WE ARE
15 VERY HONORED TO HAVE A NUMBER OF PEOPLE HERE TODAY, CARLA
16 BEING ONE OF THEM, A NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN ASSOCIATED
17 WITH DAN IN ONE CAPACITY OR ANOTHER AND WITH BONANZA. WE'RE
18 VERY HONORED TO HAVE THE CREATOR OF BONANZA HERE, WHO IS AN
19 OLD-- WELL, HE'S A YOUNG, LONG-TIME FRIEND OF BARBARA'S AND
20 MINE AND ANY CONSTITUENT, THAT'S. DAVID DORTORT. DAVID, WOULD
21 YOU LIKE TO SAY A WORD? [APPLAUSE]

22

23 **DAVID DORTORT:** HI, I JUST WANTED TO SAY THAT THIS IS THE--
24 HAVING THE PLEASURE OF WORKING WITH A FINE GENTLEMAN AND, BY
25 ALL ODDS, ONE OF THE MOST TALENTED ACTORS EVER TO APPEAR ON



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1 THE HOLLYWOOD SCENE. THIS TRIBUTE IS SO WELL DESERVED BUT IT
2 WOULD NOT HAVE OCCURRED IF IT HADN'T BEEN FOR THE WARMTH, THE
3 FEELING THAT RECOGNITION WAS HIS DUE BUT HAD NOT BEEN QUITE
4 RECEIVED. THERE'S A STRETCH OF BEACH ON THE APPROACH TO MALIBU
5 CALLED THE DAN BLOCKER BEACH ON ALL THE MAPS BUT YOU GET DOWN
6 THERE AND LOOK FOR IT AND THERE'S NOTHING TO IDENTIFY IT AS
7 HAVING ANY CONNECTION WITH THIS GREAT ACTOR. WELL, THAT WASN'T
8 GOOD ENOUGH FOR THE BONANZA GIRLS, WHO, SOME OF THEM ARE
9 REPRESENTED HERE, SOME OF THEM COME FROM ENGLAND TO MAKE THIS
10 PRESENTATION, BUT THEY TOOK IT UPON THEMSELVES TO START THE
11 FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN TO PUT TOGETHER THIS SUITABLE PLAQUE
12 WHICH WILL HONOR AND COMMEMORATE THIS FINE ACTOR'S AND HIS
13 CONTRIBUTION TO THE WORLD OF ENTERTAINMENT. IT WILL BE A
14 LANDMARK SIGN FOR COMING GENERATIONS VISITING THIS BEACH TO
15 SEE THAT NOW THEY KNOW WHERE DAN BLOCKER'S BEACH IS AND PAY
16 THE SAME KIND OF REVERENCE FOR THE MOMENT WHEN THEY ACTUALLY
17 OCCUPY THAT SPACE. I WANT TO THANK ALL OF YOU BONANZA GIRLS
18 AND THERE ARE A FEW BONANZA MEN AS WELL. THERE HAS NEVER BEEN
19 ANYTHING LIKE YOUR ENTHUSIASM, YOUR LOVE FOR A SHOW, YOUR
20 LOYALTY, IN THE HISTORY OF TELEVISION. I'M SO PROUD OF YOU
21 AND, AS YOU KNOW, I LOVE ALL OF YOU AND I WANT TO THANK YOU
22 FOR MAKING THE EFFORT TODAY TO COME DOWN FOR THIS GREAT
23 OCCASION, TO HONOR DAN. [APPLAUSE]
24



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1 **DAVID DORTORT:** AND DOLPHIA, DOLPHIA BLOCKER, DAN'S WIFE, SHE
2 SHOULD BE HONORED AS WELL. SHE'S A WONDERFUL LADY AND I WANT
3 TO THANK MY DEAR FRIEND, SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY, FOR TAKING
4 THE TIME TO ARRANGE THIS. [APPLAUSE]

5

6 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** I WANT TO THANK YOU, DAVID, AND THANK YOU
7 FOR BRINGING BONANZA TO AMERICA AND TO THE WORLD. IT WAS, I
8 THINK, ONE OF THE GREAT, GREAT SHOWS OF ALL TIME ON
9 TELEVISION. I WANT TO NOW INTRODUCE THE DAUGHTER OF DAN
10 BLOCKER, DANA. I DON'T KNOW, I SHOULD HAVE FIGURED THAT OUT.
11 WITH A NAME LIKE YAROSLAVSKY, IT SHOULDN'T HAVE BEEN THAT
12 COMPLICATED. DANA BLOCKER, WHO IS WITH US AND, DANA, IF YOU'LL
13 GRACE US WITH A FEW WORDS.

14

15 **DANA BLOCKER:** WELL, I HAVE TO HAVE SOME PAPER SO I WON'T
16 FORGET ANYBODY. AGAIN, I'M DANA BLOCKER-ZEEVE AND SOME OF MY
17 FAMILY IS HERE. UNFORTUNATELY, MOST OF US WERE NOT ABLE TO
18 MAKE IT AND, ON BEHALF OF THOSE HERE AND THOSE NOT HERE, WE
19 WOULD LIKE TO, FIRST OF ALL, EXPRESS OUR DEEPEST APPRECIATION
20 TO THE ESTEEMED BOARD FOR MAKING THE TIME TO HAVE THIS EVENT.
21 AND WE WOULD LIKE TO VERY MUCH THANK LEGACY OWNERS, CARLA
22 LEDFORD, JENNY ALANDER, DEBBIE BASHEERS, AS WELL AS DAWN GAYLE
23 FISHER AND PEGGY FOX AND OUR APOLOGIES TO ANYONE THAT I'VE
24 MISSED, BECAUSE I KNOW THERE ARE A LOT OF YOU, FOR THIS VERY
25 LOVELY TRIBUTE TO MY FATHER AND FOR THEIR UNBELIEVABLE EFFORTS



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1 TO PROCURE THIS PLAQUE FOR THE BEACH. AND, OF COURSE, MANY
2 THANKS TO ALL OF THE FANS WHOSE DONATIONS AND CONTRIBUTIONS
3 MADE IT POSSIBLE. WE APPRECIATE DAVID DORTORT FOR BEING HERE.
4 [LIGHT LAUGHTER]

6 **DANA BLOCKER:** AND I WANT TO THANK BOB BOGS BUT I'M NOT SURE
7 THAT HE'S HERE, THE CINEMATOGRAPHER OF BONANZA. WE THANK
8 POSTHUMOUSLY AND IN LOVING MEMORY LORNE GREEN AND MICHAEL
9 LANDON FOR THEIR DONATION OF THE BEACH PROPERTY AND FOR THEIR
10 REQUEST TO NAME IT FOR MY FATHER. SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY, WE
11 ARE IN SINCERELY GRATEFUL TO YOU FOR THE APPROVAL OF THE FUNDS
12 THAT MADE IT FINALLY POSSIBLE TO OPEN THE DAN BLOCKER BEACH,
13 HOPEFULLY IN THE NOT TOO DISTANT FUTURE. MY DAD WOULD HAVE
14 BEEN HONORED AND DEEPLY TOUCHED BY ALL OF THIS. IT'S
15 REMARKABLE THAT, AFTER SO MANY YEARS HAVE PASSED, THERE ARE
16 STILL THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE OUT THERE WHO LOVE HIM THIS MUCH.
17 MY DAD RECOGNIZED AND WAS HUMBLLED ALWAYS BY HIS VERY GREAT
18 GOOD FORTUNE IN EVERY ASPECT OF HIS LIFE. IT WAS PERHAPS THIS
19 HUMILITY AND HIS CONSTANT GRATITUDE FOR HIS LIFE THAT FED HIS
20 HUGE COMPASSION FOR OTHERS LESS FORTUNATE THAN HE IN HIS
21 PARTICIPATION AND CAUSES TO SUPPORT THEM, AS WELL AS HIS
22 EXTREMELY STRONG FEELINGS AND OUTSPOKENNESS AGAINST INJUSTICE
23 ANYWHERE HE ENCOUNTERED IT AND AT ANY TIME. THESE ARE
24 ATTRIBUTES OF MY FATHER, AN UNABASHED LIBERAL AND FREE THINKER
25 OF WHICH I HAVE ALWAYS BEEN PROUD. BUT WHILE HE WOULD HAVE



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1 BEEN MOVED BY THE HONOR BESTOWED UPON HIM BY NAMING THIS BEACH
2 FOR HIM AND ALL OF THE TRIBUTE TODAY, I THINK HE WOULD
3 PROBABLY ALSO INSIST THAT WE KEEP IN MIND THAT THE REAL
4 SIGNIFICANCE TODAY IS NOT ABOUT HIM. RATHER, IT'S ABOUT MAKING
5 MORE OF OUR COASTLINE SAFELY ACCESSIBLE FOR THE ENJOYMENT OF
6 ALL. THE CALIFORNIA COASTLINE IS ONE OF OUR COUNTRY'S MOST
7 PRECIOUS NATURAL RESOURCES. MY FATHER LOVED THE OCEAN AND THIS
8 COAST, AS HE DID ALL OF OUR COUNTRY'S GREAT NATURAL SPLENDORS.
9 PERHAPS WOODY GUTHRIE -- ANOTHER OF AMERICA'S TREASURES,
10 DEARLY LOVED BY MY DAD; IN FACT, WE KIDS WERE PRACTICALLY
11 RAISED ON WOODY'S MUSIC -- SAYS IT BEST WITH REGARD TO THE
12 OPENING OF THIS BEACH WITH A SONG THAT WAS ONE OF MY DAD'S
13 FAVORITES, "THIS LAND IS YOUR LAND, THIS LAND IS MY LAND, THIS
14 LAND IS MADE FOR YOU AND ME." SO THANK YOU AGAIN TO THE FANS,
15 TO THE HONORABLE BOARD, AND ESPECIALLY TO SUPERVISOR
16 YAROSLAVSKY. [APPLAUSE] . .

17

18 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU, DANA. THAT WAS A BEAUTIFUL
19 TRIBUTE TO YOUR DAD AND THANK YOU FOR LETTING US HONOR HIM IN
20 THIS WAY AND WE'RE REALLY, REALLY PLEASED THAT THE BEACH WILL
21 SOON BE ACCESSIBLE TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN A WAY THAT IT
22 DESERVES TO BE. THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN. WE HAVE, I THINK,
23 ANOTHER PRESENTATION AFTER THIS ONE. MAYBE I'LL YIELD TO MR.
24 ANTONOVICH ON THAT, ON THE FOSTER CARE, AND I'LL TAKE SOME



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1 PICTURES HERE. MR. CHAIRMAN, I'M SORRY, WE WANTED TO INTRODUCE
2 GARY NICHOLS FOR ONE LAST... [APPLAUSE]

3

4 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** HE LOOKS FAMILIAR.

5

6 **GARY NICHOLS:** THANK YOU. IN 1959, I IMMEDIATELY BECAME
7 ATTACHED TO A WESTERN SHOW, BONANZA. AT THE AGE OF NINE, I
8 WANTED TO BE A CARTWRIGHT. TO BE MORE SPECIFIC, I WANTED TO BE
9 HOSS CARTWRIGHT. I WANTED TO WALK, TALK, EAT, DO EVERYTHING
10 JUST LIKE HOSS. HERE WAS THIS BIG, TALL, STRONG MAN THAT COULD
11 WHIP ANYONE THAT GOT IN HIS WAY. HOSS WAS BIG, HE WAS TALL,
12 AND HE WAS STRONG BUT HE WASN'T OUT TO BULLY HIS WAY AROUND.
13 HE HAD COMPASSION, HE WAS LOVING, KIND, AND GENTLE. THAT IS,
14 UNTIL YOU PUSHED HIM TO HIS LIMIT, THEN WATCH OUT. I WANT TO
15 SHARE JUST A FEW OF MY FAVORITE EPISODES, JUST A FEW. THIS
16 ISN'T NEAR ALL OF THEM, I CAN TELL YOU THAT. ONE OF THE
17 EPISODES, WHICH AIRED THE FIRST YEAR, WAS ONE WHEN BLAKE
18 MCCALL CROSSES THE PONDEROSA ON HIS WAY TO CALIFORNIA. BLAKE'S
19 BUSINESS IS HYDRAULIC MINING, WHICH DESTROYS THE LAND, AND BEN
20 ORDERS BLAKE OFF HIS LAND. BUT BLAKE'S PARTNER, JOHN
21 PENNINGTON, EXPLAINS THAT HE IS BRINGING HIS SISTER, EMILY, TO
22 A BETTER CLIMATE TO CURE HER RESPIRATORY DISEASE. BEN ASKS
23 HOSS TO ESCORT THEM ACROSS THE PONDEROSA. AT FIRST, EMILY
24 WANTS NOTHING TO DO WITH HOSS BUT, AS SHE GETS TO KNOW HIM,
25 SHE FALLS IN LOVE WITH HIM AND HOSS FALLS IN LOVE WITH HER BUT



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1 LATER LEARNS SHE JUST HAS A MONTH OR TWO TO LIVE. I CAN
2 REMEMBER WATCHING THAT EPISODE AND CRYING, WHEN HOSS FOUND OUT
3 THAT EMILY WAS GOING TO DIE. AT THE AGE OF NINE, HOSS WAS
4 ALREADY REAL TO ME. I FELT THE HURT THAT HE FELT. THERE'S
5 ANOTHER EPISODE, A PINK CLOUD COMES FROM OLD CATHAY, WHICH
6 AIRED APRIL 12, 1964. ANOTHER EPISODE OF MY FAVORITES WAS WHEN
7 HOSS ORDERS FIREWORKS FROM THE YIPPEE TRADING COMPANY CANTON,
8 CHINA, BUT GETS A CHINESE BRIDE INSTEAD OF THE FIREWORKS. I
9 CAN STILL SEE THE LOOK ON HOSS' FACE WHEN HE REALIZES HE GOT A
10 BRIDE INSTEAD OF FIREWORKS. THEN THERE'S THE TIME WHEN HOSS
11 AND JOE BRING HOME AN ELEPHANT IN THE EPISODE, "OLD SHEBA."
12 DAN BLOCKER WAS KNOWN TO COME TO THE RESCUE IF AN ANIMAL GOT
13 HURT ON THE SET OF BONANZA. THE STORY IS TOLD OF HOW, ONE
14 TIME, A CALF GOT HURT IN THE FILMING OF A CATTLE STAMPEDE. DAN
15 RAN OVER TO THE CALF, PICKED UP AND CARRIED THE 175-POUND CALF
16 TO HIS SPORTS CAR. IT WAS A TIGHT FIT BUT HE MANAGED TO GET IN
17 BOTH HIMSELF AND THE CALF IN THE CAR AND OFF TO THE VETERINARY
18 HE DROVE. DAN BLOCKER WAS ONCE QUOTED AS SAYING, "I'LL GO DEER
19 HUNTING WHEN THE DEER LEARN TO SHOOT BACK." HOSS CARTWRIGHT
20 HAD A KIND HEART FOR ANIMALS, TOO. IN THE EPISODE, "THE
21 PONDEROSA EXPLOSION" THAT AIRED JANUARY 1ST, 1967, HOSS AND
22 JOE DECIDED THEY WERE GOING TO RAISE GERBI RABBITS TO SELL TO
23 MAKE FUR COATS FOR WOMEN. THE RABBITS MULTIPLIED FASTER THAN
24 HOSS AND JOE THOUGHT POSSIBLE AND STARTED TO TAKE OVER THE
25 PONDEROSA. BEN ORDERS THEM TO GET RID OF THE RABBITS. JOE



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1 DECIDES TO START SKINNING THE RABBITS BUT HOSS WON'T LET HIM
2 BECAUSE HE HAD GROWN FOND OF THE RABBITS. SO HOSS PUTS JOE IN
3 A RABBIT CAGE AND BEN HAS TO COME TO JOE'S RESCUE. OF COURSE,
4 MY FAVORITE EPISODE OF ALL IS HOSS AND THE LEPRECHAUNS. [
5 INTERJECTIONS - SOUNDS OF AGREEMENT]

6

7 **GARY NICHOLS:** MUST BE YOURS, TOO. MY FAVORITE SCENE IN THIS
8 PARTICULAR EPISODE WAS WHEN HOSS STAYS AFTER EVERYBODY HAS
9 GIVEN UP LOOKING FOR THESE LITTLE GREEN MEN. HOSS IS OUT IN A
10 GROVE OF TREES CARRYING A STICK, CALLING FOR THESE LITTLE
11 GREEN MEN. "YOO-HOO, YOO-HOO, WHERE ARE YOU?" MEANWHILE, BEN
12 HAS SENT LITTLE JOE TO BRING HOSS HOME FOR SUPPER. JOE RIDES
13 UP AND SEES HOSS OUT HUNTING FOR THESE LITTLE GREEN MEN AND
14 DECIDES TO HAVE SOME FUN. HOSS CALLS FOR THE LITTLE GREEN MEN
15 AND JOE DECIDES TO ANSWER BACK. "YOO-HOO, YOO-HOO." [LIGHT
16 LAUGHTER]

17

18 **GARY NICHOLS:** SO, HOSS, THINKING HE'S FOUND ONE OF THESE
19 LITTLE GREEN MEN, ANSWERS BACK. "YOO-HOO, YOO-HOO. WHERE ARE
20 YOU?" AND LITTLE JOE ANSWERS BACK, "I'M OVER HERE. HOSS SENT
21 ME HERE TO BRING YOU HOME TO SUPPER." WELL, YOU CAN IMAGINE
22 HOSS' REPLY, "DAD BURN THAT LITTLE JOE." THEN LITTLE JOE IS
23 ROLLING ON THE GROUND WITH THAT FAMOUS LITTLE GIGGLE. I GUESS
24 I LIKE THAT PART BECAUSE, HAVING THREE BROTHERS WHILE GROWING
25 UP, I COULD SEE ANYONE OF THEM DOING THAT TO ME. HOSS AND THE



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1 LEPRECHAUNS WAS ALSO ONE OF DAN BLOCKER'S FAVORITE EPISODES
2 BECAUSE OF THE SPEECH AT THE END OF THE EPISODE. THEY ARE
3 GATHERED IN FRONT OF THE TOWNSPEOPLE AND HOSS SAYS, "YOU'VE
4 NOTICED THESE MEN ARE A WHOLE LOT LOWER THAN YOU ARE. WELL,
5 I'VE NOTICED THE SAME THING ABOUT YOU. I DON'T SEE ANY REASON
6 TO TREAT THEM ANY DIFFERENT." DAN WAS ALSO ABOUT CIVIL RIGHTS.
7 IN FACT, HE WAS INVOLVED IN THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT HERE IN
8 CALIFORNIA IN THE MIDDLE '60S, AND HE THOUGHT EVERYBODY OUGHT
9 TO BE TREATED THE SAME. DAN BLOCKER LIKED TO HAVE FUN, TOO.
10 THE STORY IS TOLD AT THE BONANZA CONVENTION THAT, WHEN THEY
11 WERE ALL ON THE SET GETTING READY TO FILM A SCENE, THIS MUSIC
12 WAS PLAYING. THE MUSIC WAS DRIVING THE SOUND PEOPLE CRAZY.
13 THEY WERE DOUBLE-CHECKING THE CONTROLS AND EVERYTHING.
14 FINALLY, HOSS, DAN BLOCKER CONFESSES, HE KNOWS WHAT THE
15 PROBLEM IS. HE HAS A SMALL TRANSISTOR RADIO UNDER HIS HAT. IN
16 MAY OF 1972, WHEN I HEARD THE NEWS OF DAN BLOCKER'S PASSING, I
17 WAS STUNNED. I KNEW, WITHOUT DAN BLOCKER PLAYING THE PART OF
18 HOSS CARTWRIGHT, THAT WATCHING BONANZA WOULD NEVER BE THE
19 SAME. I FELT AS THOUGH I HAD LOST A BIG BROTHER. DAVID DORTORT
20 ANNOUNCED THAT DAN BLOCKER WOULD NOT BE REPLACED ON BONANZA.
21 IT WAS NEVER EVEN AN OPTION TO REPLACE HIM. THERE MUST HAVE
22 BEEN A LOT OF FANS, BONANZA FANS, WHO FELT THE SAME WAY I DID
23 BECAUSE BONANZA DIDN'T LAST THE WHOLE SEASON WITHOUT HOSS
24 CARTWRIGHT. HE WAS TOO MUCH A PART OF THE SHOW TO GO ON
25 WITHOUT HIM. I NEVER GOT TO PERSONALLY MEET DAN BLOCKER. SINCE



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1 DAN BLOCKER'S DEATH, I'VE LEARNED BY THE ARTICLES I'VE READ
2 AND THE STORIES I'VE HEARD OF BONANZA, AT THE BONANZA
3 CONVENTIONS IN 1999 AND 2002, THAT ALL THE CHARACTERISTICS
4 ABOUT HOSS CARTWRIGHT THAT I LIKED WERE IN DAN BLOCKER. HE WAS
5 FUN, LOVING, COMPASSIONATE, KIND, AND CARING. I HAVE YET TO
6 READ OR HEAR ANYBODY THAT WORKED WITH DAN BLOCKER SAY THEY
7 DIDN'T ENJOY WORKING WITH HIM. IN 1959, WHEN I START WATCHING
8 BONANZA, I HAD ONE HERO: HOSS CARTWRIGHT. NOW I HAVE TWO
9 HEROES: HOSS CARTWRIGHT AND DAN BLOCKER. YOU SEE,
10 UNFORTUNATELY, SOMETIMES, WE WATCH SOMEONE PORTRAY A CHARACTER
11 AND BECOME VERY FOND OF THAT CHARACTER, ONLY TO BE
12 DISAPPOINTED IN REAL LIFE OF THE PERSON PLAYING THAT PART. IN
13 THIS CASE, THAT COULDN'T BE FARTHER FROM THE TRUTH. MRS.
14 BLOCKER WAS ONCE QUOTED AS SAYING, "A KINDER MAN WAS NEVER
15 BORN THAN DAN BLOCKER." DAN BLOCKER WAS NOT ONLY GENTLE, KIND
16 TO PEOPLE AND, YES, EVEN TO ANIMALS, BUT HE TREATED HIS WIFE
17 LIKE A QUEEN AND DEARLY LOVED HIS CHILDREN, AND HE TRULY WAS A
18 FAMILY MAN. WHENEVER I GET TO WEAR MY HOSS HAT AND MY VEST, I
19 FEEL VERY HONORED WHEN SOMEBODY COMES UP TO ME AND SAYS, "HI,
20 HOSS," OR ASKS, "HOW ARE THINGS ON THE PONDEROSA?" BY MY
21 PORTRAYING HOSS, THE HERO HE WAS TO ME, I HOPE I CAN HELP KEEP
22 ALIVE THE MEMORIES OF BONANZA AND THE CARTWRIGHTS. THANK YOU.
23 [APPLAUSE]
24



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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** THANK YOU, GARY. AND THANK ALL OF THE
2 BONANZA FAMILY, EXTENDED BONANZA FAMILY WHO ARE HERE. QUITE A
3 NUMBER OF THEM ARE HERE IN THE AUDIENCE AS WELL. AND, DAVID,
4 AGAIN, THANK YOU FOR COMING DOWN. AND MR. CHAIRMAN, I'LL JUST
5 TAKE ONE PICTURE AND THEN I HAVE ANOTHER PRESENTATION. MR.
6 CHAIRMAN, BEFORE WE DO THE FOSTER CARE, LET ME MAKE ONE MORE
7 PRESENTATION TO CAROL GUNTER. CAROL, IF YOU'LL COME UP HERE,
8 ALONG WITH RAY MOZAC, DAVE AUSTIN, DAVE PINKNEY. I WANT TO
9 PRESENT A SCROLL AND, WHILE THEY'RE WALKING UP, I'LL JUST
10 BEGIN THE PRESENTATION, A SCROLL IN RECOGNITION OF EMERGENCY

4 E.M.S. WEEK AND THAT INJURY PREVENTION AND AN EFFECTIVE E.M.S.
5 SYSTEM CONTRIBUTE TO A HEALTHIER AMERICA. NOW, THEREFORE, BE
6 IT RESOLVED THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF LOS ANGELES
7 COUNTY DOES HEREBY PROCLAIM THE WEEK OF MAY 16TH THROUGH 22ND,
8 2004, AS EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES WEEK AND THE MONTH OF MAY
9 AS TRAUMA AWARENESS MONTH IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. CAROL,
10 IF YOU'LL JOIN ME HERE FOR A SECOND, I'D LIKE TO MAKE THIS
11 PRESENTATION TO YOU AND I THINK EVERYBODY HERE ON THIS BOARD,

12 ALSO HONORING ADVOCATES, SOCIAL WORKERS, A FOSTER MOTHER, AND
13 A COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION, WHO ARE MAKING SUBSTANTIAL
14 CONTRIBUTIONS TO IMPROVE THE LIVES OF CHILDREN IN FOSTER CARE.
15 BEFORE WE DO THAT, I WANT TO ASK MIRIAM CORENSKI TO COME
16 FORWARD TO MAKE THE FIRST PRESENTATION. MIRIAM, WHERE ARE YOU?
17 THERE YOU ARE. COME ON UP.

19 **MIRIAM CORENSKI:** THANK YOU. IT'S OUR PLEASURE THIS MONTH TO
20 HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO PAUSE AND CAST A SPOTLIGHT ON 30,000
21 CHILDREN IN OUR COMMUNITY WHO ARE ABUSED AND NEGLECTED AND WHO
22 ALL OF US, AS A COMMUNITY, HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY TO PARENT.
23 THIS MONTH, WE'RE LOOKING AT WAYS THAT OUR COMMUNITY CAN USE
24 THE EXAMPLES OF THESE UNSUNG HEROES WHO WILL BE RECEIVING
25 AWARDS TODAY, USE THEIR EXAMPLES TO DO MORE TO CHANGE FOR THE



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1 BETTER THE LIVES OF THESE CHILDREN. SO I'D LIKE TO ASK, ON
2 BEHALF OF ALL OF THE HEROES WHO WILL BE PRESENTED AWARDS AND
3 INTRODUCED TO YOU IN A FEW MOMENTS, I'D LIKE TO ASK JULIZA
4 PEREZ, WHO IS A FORMER FOSTER YOUTH AND ONE OF OUR HONOREES
5 HERE TODAY, TO SAY A FEW WORDS AND ACCEPT THE HONORS THAT ARE
6 GOING TO BE BESTOWED TODAY ON ALL OF THESE HEROES. JULIZA IS A
7 FORMER FOSTER YOUTH AND SHE REALLY SHOWS WHAT SPIRIT EXISTS
8 AND WHAT RESILIENCE EXISTS IN THE CHILDREN IN OUR SYSTEM.

10 **JULIZA PEREZ:** GOOD MORNING. ON BEHALF OF ALL THE FOSTER KIDS
11 STILL IN FOSTER CARE, I WOULD LIKE TO THANK THE SUPPORTING
12 COUNCIL MEMBERS FOR THIS AWARD AND THIS AWARD LETS THE FOSTER
13 CARE, AS WELL AS THE REST OF THE COMMUNITY, KNOW THAT SUCCESS
14 IS A REACHABLE GOAL. BECAUSE FOSTER KIDS DO NOT HAVE THE
15 FAMILY TO HELP THEM IMAGINE AND REALIZE THEIR GOALS, CARING
16 INDIVIDUALS AND ORGANIZATIONS ARE ALL THE MORE IMPORTANT FOR
17 THESE KIDS' SUCCESS. THEY WERE TO ME. MY SUCCESS HAS DEPENDED
18 AND CONTINUES TO RELY ON INDIVIDUALS AND ORGANIZATIONS THAT
19 SUPPORTED ME WHEN I FELT LIKE QUITTING, ENCOURAGED ME WHEN I
20 WAS DOWN, AND PUSHED ME TO GREATER HEIGHTS. THESE INDIVIDUALS
21 AND ORGANIZATIONS ARE NOT STRANGERS. THEY HAVE BECOME MY
22 EXTENDED FAMILY. THEY AND YOU ARE THE ROCK I CONTINUE TO RELY
23 ON. [APPLAUSE]

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1 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** JULIZA IS A PHI BETA KAPPA STUDENT IN MASS
2 COMMUNICATIONS AND SOCIOLOGY AT U.C. BERKELEY. WHAT YEAR ARE
3 YOU IN? SENIOR. [APPLAUSE]

4

5 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** YOU'RE GRADUATING NEXT WEEK? DECEMBER. NOW,
6 WHAT ARE YOU DOING HERE WHEN MY SON IS UP STUDYING FOR FINALS?
7 I DON'T KNOW BUT THAT'S WHY YOU'RE PHI BETA KAPPA. [LIGHT
8 LAUGHTER]

9

10 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SO WE WANT TO PRESENT YOU WITH THIS
11 PROCLAMATION, JULIZA. CONGRATULATIONS. [APPLAUSE]

12

13 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** MR. CHAIRMAN, I'D LIKE TO ASK SUPERVISOR
14 ANTONOVICH IF HE'D LIKE TO SAY COUPLE WORDS BEFORE WE MAKE THE
15 REST OF THE PRESENTATIONS.

16

17 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WELL, EARLIER THIS MORNING, SUPERVISOR
18 YAROSLAVSKY AND I HAD A PRESS CONFERENCE WITH JUDGE MICHAEL
19 NASH OF THE SUPERIOR COURT ALONG WITH MIRIAM AND THE AWARDEES
20 THIS MORNING. AND THIS IS A VERY, VERY IMPORTANT ISSUE AND
21 THIS IS REALLY FOSTER CARE AWARENESS MONTH. WE HAVE ABOUT
22 28,000 CHILDREN IN FOSTER CARE. IF YOU PUT THEM ALL TOGETHER
23 AND MADE THEM ON INCORPORATED CITY, THEY'D BE LARGER THAN 31
24 OTHER L.A. COUNTY CITIES TODAY, TWICE THE SIZE OF MALIBU. SO
25 YOU CAN SEE THE RECOGNITION THAT WE NEED TO BRING OUT TO THE



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1 COMMUNITY TO GET PEOPLE INVOLVED, ENCOURAGE OUR FAITH-BASED
2 COMMUNITIES, OUR CHURCHES AND OUR SYNAGOGUES TO GET INVOLVED
3 IN PROVIDING THE OPPORTUNITIES FOR FOSTER PARENTS TO COME
4 FORWARD SO THAT THESE YOUNG PEOPLE WILL HAVE A FOUNDATION THAT
5 THEY CAN BUILD UPON AND THEN GO OUT IN THE WORLD AND BECOME
6 THOSE INDIVIDUALS WHO FIND THE CURES FOR THE INCURABLE
7 DISEASES AND FIND THE OPPORTUNITIES IN THE CLASSROOM TO
8 MOTIVATE THE CHILDREN OF TOMORROW AND TO PROVIDE THAT STABLE
9 RELATIONSHIP IN A COMMUNITY WHICH TAKES STRONG PUBLIC/PRIVATE

11 A SOCIETY OF NO HOPE, WHERE ALL THEY HAVE IS THE COUNTY

13 ARE ABLE TO DO THIS. AND I USED THE ANALOGY EARLIER THIS
14 MORNING, REVEREND BILLY GRAHAM ONCE SAID, IF EVERY CHURCH AND
15 SYNAGOGUE IN THE UNITED STATES WOULD TAKE IN 10 FAMILIES WHO
16 ARE ON WELFARE, YOU COULD ELIMINATE WELFARE. WELL, IF WE COULD
17 ENGAGE EVERY CHURCH AND SYNAGOGUE IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY TO
18 COME FORWARD AND FIND A HOME, FOSTER PARENTS FOR THESE

10 BACHELOR'S IN CHILD PSYCHOLOGY WITH A MINOR IN SPANISH AND A
11 MASTER'S DEGREE AND IS NOW PURSUING HER LCSW. AS A SOCIAL
12 WORKER FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES,
13 JESSICA TAKES A SPECIAL INTEREST IN EVERY FAMILY SHE WORKS
14 WITH, AND SHE OFTEN ACCOMPANIES CHILDREN TO SCHOOL, OBTAINS
15 NEEDED BEDS OR BUS PASSES FOR THEM. IN MARCH, SHE RAN THE L.A.
16 MARATHON IN HONOR OF THE FAMILY SHE WORKS WITH AND SHE RAISED
17 MONEY FOR THE D.C.F.S. CHILDREN'S TRUST FUND. SHE'S AN
18 INSPIRATION FOR OTHER FOSTER AND EMANCIPATED YOUTH. AND,
19 JESSICA, CONGRATULATIONS. [APPLAUSE]

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SHE'S GOING TO DO THE MARATHON AGAIN. WE
22 HAVE A PRESENTATION FOR TRISH CURRY. SHE'S NOT ABLE TO BE WITH
23 US THIS MORNING. I THINK WE ALL KNOW TRISH AND HER UNTIRING
24 EFFORTS ON BEHALF OF CHILDREN IN THIS COUNTY IS LEGEND AND WE
25 WILL PRESENT THIS PROCLAMATION TO HER AT THE APPROPRIATE TIME



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1 BUT WE DID WANT TO MENTION TRISH CURRY. NEXT IS ROBERT
2 HIRSCHBORN. ROBERT IS A D.C.F.S. SOCIAL WORKER. ROBERT, WHERE
3 ARE YOU? COME ON UP. FOR THE LAST 10 YEARS, HE'S BEEN
4 SUCCESSFUL IN REUNIFYING MANY CHILDREN WITH THEIR PARENTS,
5 CREATING SAFETY PLANS TO ENSURE THAT THE CHILDREN ARE SAFE AT
6 HOME AND COMING UP WITH CREATIVE VISITATION PLANS. HE
7 ESTABLISHED A PROTOCOL FOR ASSISTING EMANCIPATED FOSTER YOUTH
8 AND ESTABLISHING SHORT-TERM GOALS AND FUTURE LIFE PLANS.
9 ROBERT REMAINS IN CONTACT WITH MANY OF THE YOUTH HE WORKS WITH
10 AND THEY CONSIDER HIM TO BE A MENTOR AND A FRIEND. ROBERT,
11 THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE TO THE COUNTY AND TO THE KIDS. [
12 APPLAUSE]

13

14 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** OUR NEXT RECIPIENT IS RASHAD MCALLISTER. I
15 DON'T THINK RASHAD WAS ABLE TO BE HERE THIS MORNING BUT HE
16 OVERCAME A VERY DIFFICULT CHILDHOOD AND WAS ABLE TO
17 SUCCESSFULLY GRADUATE FROM CASA LOMA COLLEGE TO BE A NURSE'S
18 AIDE. AND HE'S WORKED AS A SECURITY GUARD TO SUPPORT HIMSELF.
19 HE IS A SUCCESS STORY AND WE WILL PRESENT RASHAD WITH HIS
20 PROCLAMATION AT THE APPROPRIATE TIME. SO THANK YOU TO HIM IN
21 ABSENTIA. NEXT IS ELVIRA RODRIGUEZ. ELVIRA? FOR 30 YEARS,
22 ELVIRA HAS PROVIDED FOSTER CARE FOR SIX TEENAGE GIRLS AT A
23 TIME. MANY OF THESE TEENS ARE MOTHERS AND ELVIRA PROVIDES A
24 POSITIVE PARENTING EXAMPLE FOR THEM. ELVIRA ALSO GIVES THESE
25 PARENTING FOSTER YOUTH CONFIDENCE IN THEIR ABILITY TO BE A



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1 PARENT. SHE ENCOURAGES THE YOUNG MOTHERS TO PARTICIPATE IN
2 SCHOOL, THERAPY, VISITS WITH SIBLINGS, AND SCHOOL ACTIVITIES.
3 ELVIRA IS AN EXAMPLE OF HOW TO BREAK THE CYCLE OF GENERATIONAL
4 FOSTER CARE AND SHE HAS DONE MORE THAN HER FAIR SHARE. SO,
5 ELVIRA, THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR WHAT YOU'VE DONE AND CONTINUE
6 TO DO. [APPLAUSE]

7

8 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** AARON RUBEN. WHY DON'T YOU STAY RIGHT THERE.
9 STAY RIGHT THERE AND WE'LL PRESENT IT TO YOU. MR. RUBEN IS 90
10 YEARS OLD AND HAS BEEN A COURT-APPOINTED SPECIAL ADVOCATE FOR
11 FOSTER CHILDREN FOR 16 YEARS. HE STARTED A NEW CAREER AT THE
12 AGE OF 74. THERE'S HOPE FOR ALL OF US. HE CREATE AN
13 IMPROVISATIONAL COMEDY CAMP FOR FOSTER YOUTH AT MACLAREN
14 CHILDREN'S CENTER. MR. RUBEN ESTABLISHED A SCHOLARSHIP FUND
15 FOR FOSTER YOUTH WHO WANT TO GO TO COLLEGE AND, AFTER NEARLY
16 TWO DECADES ADVOCATING FOR FOSTER YOUTH, HE SHOWS NO SIGN OF
17 SLOWING DOWN. SO, AARON, ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY BOARD OF
18 SUPERVISORS, WE WANT TO PRESENT YOU WITH THIS PROCLAMATION AND
19 THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONTINUED SERVICE. [APPLAUSE]

21 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** AND LAST BUT CERTAINLY NOT LEAST, WOODLAND
22 HILLS ROTARY CLUB. DON SCHULTZ AND SHERRY POLLOCK, WHO ARE
23 GOING TO ACCEPT ON BEHALF OF THE WOODLAND HILLS ROTARY CLUB,
24 HI. THE WOODLAND HILLS ROTARY CLUB HAS BEEN SUPPORTING FOSTER

7 OVERWHELMING GENEROSITY IS AN EXAMPLE OF HOW THE COMMUNITY CAN
8 HAVE A SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON THE LIVES OF FOSTER CHILDREN. THE
9 WOODLAND HILLS ROTARY CLUB HAS CERTAINLY MADE A DIFFERENCE. WE

12 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** SHERRY SAYS THERE ARE 76 PEOPLE WHO WORKED
13 ON THIS PROJECT FOR THE WOODLAND HILLS ROTARY CLUB. THAT'S
14 VOLUNTEERISM. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE]

16 **SUP. YAROSLAVSKY:** DAVID SANDERS, WOULD YOU JOIN US AND SAY A
17 FEW WORDS? HEAD OF OUR DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY

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1 ANTONOVICH IN BRINGING FORTH THE SCROLL AND PROCLAMATION IS
2 JUST REFLECTIVE OF THEIR SUPPORT AND THE SUPPORT OF THE ENTIRE

23 TAKING CENTER STAGE PROGRAM. CALIFORNIA SCHOOLS TO WATCH
24 TAKING CENTER STAGE IS A MAJOR ACTIVITY OF THE CALIFORNIA
25 MIDDLE GRADES ALLIANCE. THERE ARE VERY STRICT ELIGIBILITY



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1 CRITERIA, AS WELL AS WRITTEN APPLICATIONS THAT WERE RESTRICTED
2 TO SCHOOLS WITH THE HIGHEST STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT SCORES.
3 ALVARADO REPRESENTS EXAMPLES OF HIGH PERFORMING MIDDLE SCHOOL
4 THAT MEET THE CHALLENGE OF EDUCATING A BROAD, DIVERSE GROUP OF
5 STUDENTS. ALVARADO IS A NATIONAL BLUE RIBBON AND CALIFORNIA
6 DISTINGUISHED SCHOOL, THE TOP AWARDS GIVEN BY THE CALIFORNIA
7 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

24 ANNIVERSARY, HAVING BEEN ESTABLISHED BY THIS BOARD OF
25 SUPERVISORS BACK IN 1979. WE HAVE PAMELA BOOTH, WHO IS THE



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1 CHAIRMAN OF THE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNCIL;, MARY MOORHEN,
2 EXECUTIVE MEMBER; SHEILA HASLETT, INTERIM DIRECTOR FOR THE
3 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNCIL; LISA HAMILTON, WHO IS EXECUTIVE
4 ASSISTANT TO THE DOMESTIC CALENDAR-- COUNCIL; LYDIA BOWDEN,
5 CO-CHAIR; AND RACHEL ZUPPA, WHO IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE
6 COORDINATOR. THE PURPOSE OF THIS COUNCIL IS TO STUDY THE
7 PROBLEMS OF DOMESTIC AND FAMILY VIOLENCE THROUGHOUT OUR COUNTY
8 AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS PERTAINING TO THE EDUCATION,
9 COORDINATION, PUBLIC INFORMATION, TRAINING, SHELTER SERVICES,
10 LEGISLATION, AND THE DEVELOPMENT AND AREAS TO ENHANCE THESE
11 PROGRAMS. THE COUNCIL IS CALIFORNIA'S JOINT PUBLIC/PRIVATE
12 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PARTNERSHIP, WHICH WAS LAUNCHED TO HAVE A
13 COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH TO FAMILY VIOLENCE. IT'S VIEWED
14 NATIONALLY AS A LEADER IN THE FIELD OF BATTERED WOMEN'S
15 ISSUES. THE COUNCIL'S 40 MEMBERS INCLUDE PUBLIC SECTOR
16 REPRESENTATIVES FROM BOTH THE COUNTIES AND THE CITIES, AS WELL
17 AS COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES FROM VARIOUS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE
18 SERVICE AGENCIES. THE COUNCIL SERVES AS A FOCAL SETTING AT
19 WHICH THESE AGENCIES AND INTERESTED PERSONS ARE ABLE TO
20 RECEIVE INFORMATION, RECEIVE COORDINATION ISSUES, INCREASE
21 PUBLIC AWARENESS, AND DEVELOP STRATEGIC PLANS FOR TRAINING
22 PERSONNEL, BOTH IN THE PUBLIC AND THE PRIVATE SECTORS. SO, ON
23 BEHALF OF THE COUNTY, HAPPY 25TH ANNIVERSARY. [APPLAUSE]

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1 **LISA HAMILTON:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR THIS HONOR. THE
2 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNCIL, FOR THE PAST 25 YEARS, HAS
3 STRUGGLED WITH THE ISSUE OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, TRYING TO KEEP
4 MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY SAFER, PROVIDE OUTREACH AND
5 EDUCATION. ALL COUNTY DEPARTMENTS ARE IMPACTED BY DOMESTIC
6 VIOLENCE, EITHER PERSONALLY, PHYSICALLY, EMOTIONALLY BY THE
7 PEOPLE THAT THEY SERVE OR BY THE PEOPLE WHO SERVE IN THOSE
8 DEPARTMENTS. THERE IS NO SEGMENT OF SOCIETY THAT IS NOT
9 IMPACTED BY DOMESTIC VIOLENCE. EMERGENCY PERSONNEL WHO WERE
10 HONORED EARLIER, THEY SEE THE EFFECTS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE.
11 THE PEOPLE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILY SERVICES
12 WHO WERE HONORED EARLIER, THEY SEE THE IMPACT OF DOMESTIC
13 VIOLENCE. IT'S A CONSTANT STRUGGLE. IT IS ONGOING. WE ARE
14 MAKING EVERY EFFORT TO PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO THE VICTIMS OF
15 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SO THAT THE ULTIMATE END, WHICH IS THE DEATH
16 OF ONE OF THE PARTNERS IN THAT RELATIONSHIP, DOES NOT OCCUR.
17 AND WE THANK THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FOR RECOGNIZING OUR
18 EFFORTS IN THAT AREA. [APPLAUSE]

20 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** NOW WE WOULD LIKE TO REPRESENT TO THE BOARD
21 OF SUPERVISORS REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE CITY OF TEMPLE CITY
22 FOR DONATING AN AUTOMATIC DOORS AT THE TEMPLE CITY, CITY
23 LIBRARY IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE AMERICAN DISABILITIES ACT. WE
24 HAVE WITH US MAYOR PETER ZOVAC, COUNCILWOMAN JUDY WONG AND
25 CITY MANAGER, MARTIN COLE. NOW, THESE DOORS HAVE REPLACED THE



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1 PREVIOUS MANUAL DOORS, WHICH WERE DIFFICULT TO USE FOR THE
2 OLDER AND DISABLED PATRONS AND NOT IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE
3 A.D.A. REGULATIONS. THIS ADDITION WILL RESULT IN BETTER
4 SERVICE TO LIBRARY CUSTOMERS WITH DISABILITIES AND ENHANCE
5 CUSTOMER SERVICES AND IMPROVE STATE EFFICIENCY. THE TEMPLE
6 CITY LIBRARY IS OPERATED BY THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, WHICH
7 WAS FIRST OPENED BACK IN 1963. SO, AT THIS TIME, MR. MAYOR AND
8 MISS COUNCILMAN AND MR. CITY MANAGER, LET US GIVE YOU THIS
9 PROCLAMATION AND THANK YOU FOR BEING PROACTIVE. [APPLAUSE]

10

11 **MARTIN COLE:** YES. THANK YOU, MR. CHAIR AND MEMBERS OF THE
12 BOARD AND SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH FOR THIS RECOGNITION. THIS
13 CITY IS VERY SUPPORTIVE OF THE COUNTY. WE CERTAINLY UNDERSTAND
14 THE CONSTRAINTS THAT YOU HAVE PLACED ON YOU IN THE LAST FEW
15 YEARS. WE SEE THIS AS JUST A SMALL GESTURE OF MAKING AN
16 IMPROVEMENT TO A VERY IMPORTANT SERVICE IN OUR CITY AND IN A
17 WAY OF CONTINUING THE IMPORTANT PARTICIPATION BETWEEN THE
18 COUNTY AND CONTRACT CITIES. SO, THANK YOU VERY MUCH AND WE
19 APPRECIATE IT.

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MARGARET, DO YOU WANT TO SAY SOMETHING? WE
22 HAVE OUR LIBRARIAN, MARGARET TODD. I DIDN'T SEE YOU OVER
23 THERE.

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1 **MARGARET TODD:** I JUST WANT TO THANK THE CITY. IT'S WONDERFUL
2 WHEN OUR CITIES STEP UP TO THE PLATE AND HELP US MAKE
3 IMPROVEMENTS IN OUR SERVICE AND WE ARE SO APPRECIATIVE OF THE
4 CITY'S GENEROSITY. [APPLAUSE]

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** NOW WE WOULD LIKE TO RECOGNIZE ONE OF OUR
7 OUTSTANDING DEPUTY DISTRICT ATTORNEYS WHO IS RETIRING AFTER
8 ABOUT 35 YEARS WITH THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S
9 OFFICE AND THAT'S MALCOLM JORDAN, WHO, ALONG WITH... [APPLAUSE]

10

11
12 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** ...ALONG WITH-- WE HAVE FROM THE DISTRICT
13 ATTORNEY'S OFFICE WITH US IS ALSO CRAIG GOLD AND MALCOLM'S
14 WIFE. MALCOLM, AS I SAID, IS RETIRING AFTER 35 YEARS. HE
15 EARNED HIS LAW DEGREE AND MASTER'S DEGREE IN GOVERNMENT
16 SIMULTANEOUSLY WHILE HOLDING DOWN A FULLTIME JOB DELIVERING
17 NEWSPAPERS. AT THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA, HE
18 CONTINUED HIS EDUCATION WHERE HE OBTAINED HIS PH.D. SINCE HE
19 BEGAN HIS CAREER AS A PUBLIC DISTRICT ATTORNEY IN '69, HE HAS
20 PROSECUTED MORE THAN 1,000 CRIMINAL CASES AT MORE THAN 50
21 COURTHOUSES THROUGHOUT OUR COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. AND HE HAS
22 ALSO BEEN ABLE TO OBTAIN CONVICTIONS IN NEARLY 90% OF HIS
23 TRIALS AND THOSE CRIMES INCLUDING FELONIES INCLUDING RAPE,
24 ELDER ABUSE, CHILD MOLESTATION, PORNOGRAPHY, OBSCENITIES,
25 DOMESTIC AND GANG VIOLENCE, BEFORE SPECIALIZED UNITS WERE



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1 CREATED TO HANDLE THOSE CASES. NOW, HE'S ALSO SERVED AS THE
2 ASSISTANT DEAN OF THE CALIFORNIA COLLEGE OF LAW AND AS AN
3 INSTRUCTOR IN INTERNATIONAL LAW AND SENIOR LECTURER IN
4 CONSTITUTIONAL LAW IN THE POLITICAL SCIENCE DEPARTMENT AT THE
5 UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. AND, AGAIN, ALONG WITH
6 BEING A DEPUTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY, HE WAS A PROFESSOR, SCHOLAR,
7 AND ALSO A POLITICAL LEADER. AND I APPRECIATED HIS SUPPORT AND
8 FRIENDSHIP THROUGH THE YEARS AND WE'VE KNOWN EACH OTHER EVEN
9 BEFORE WE WERE BOTH IN ELECTED OFFICE AND SERVING AS A
10 DISTRICT ATTORNEY IN THIS COUNTY. SO, MALCOLM, CONGRATULATIONS
11 AND WE WISH YOU CONTINUED SUCCESS BUT YOU'RE VERY YOUNG TO BE
12 RETIRING. [APPLAUSE]

13

14 **MALCOLM JORDAN:** THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MIKE, MEMBERS OF THE
15 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, AND DON I'VE KNOWN FOR MANY YEARS, ALSO.
16 I CAME ON IN 1969 AS A DEPUTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY TO DO ONE
17 THING. THE FIRST DUTY OF A PROSECUTOR IS TO SEEK JUSTICE AND
18 THAT'S WHAT I SOUGHT TO DO. AND AT THE BOTTOM LINE, AT THE END
19 OF THE DAY, IT'S DOING THE RIGHT THING IN EVERY CASE.
20 SOMETIMES YOU WIN, SOMETIMES YOU DON'T, BUT JUSTICE DOES NOT
21 GET MEASURED ONLY IN WINS AND LOSSES IN THE COURTROOM. FOR
22 EVERY LIFE THAT IS IMPACTED, THAT'S WHAT COUNTS. IF WE CAN DO
23 SOMETHING, WE TRY TO DO IT, AND I'VE BEEN FORTUNATE TO WORK
24 THROUGH A NUMBER OF DISTRICT ATTORNEYS, A NUMBER OF GOOD,
25 GREAT COLLEAGUES. SOME OF THEM ARE STILL HERE IN THE OFFICE



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1 STANDING RIGHT NOW. I'D LIKE TO HAVE THEM STAND AT THIS TIME,
2 SOME WONDERFUL COLLEAGUES, SOME ARE RETIRED. IF YOU WOULD
3 STAND. SOME ARE STILL CURRENTLY EMPLOYED. AL, BILL, LARRY.
4 THESE ARE... [APPLAUSE]

5

6 **MALCOLM JORDON:** THESE ARE THE UNSUNG HEROES OF THE PUBLIC'S
7 WAR AGAINST CRIME. VERY FEW OF THEM GET PUBLICITY. WE DON'T
8 SEEK IT. I'M NOT GOING TO GIVE A MONOLOGUE HERE BUT IT'S THE
9 BOTTOM LINE IN EVERY CASE. YOU'RE GOING, TRYING TO DO JUSTICE,
10 AND WE HOPE WE DID THE RIGHT THING IN THE CASES. WE DON'T KNOW
11 BECAUSE WE'LL NEVER SEE THE VICTIMS, CHANCES ARE, AGAIN IN
12 LIFE, AND THANK YOU VERY MUCH. GOD BLESS YOU. [APPLAUSE]

13

14 **CRAIG GOLD:** GOOD MORNING, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN. MY NAME IS
15 CRAIG GOLD. I'M THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE ASSOCIATION OF
16 DEPUTY D.A.S OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. IT'S MY PLEASURE TO GIVE
17 THIS AWARD TO MALCOLM JORDAN. THE PLAQUE SAYS THAT THE
18 ASSOCIATION OF DEPUTY D.A.S, AN ORGANIZATION OF OVER 900
19 DEPUTY D.A.S DEDICATED TO PURSUING JUSTICE IN THE COUNTY OF
20 LOS ANGELES, THANKS MALCOLM JORDAN, DEPUTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY,
21 FOR 35 YEARS OF TIRELESS DEDICATION TO THE PURSUIT OF JUSTICE
22 AS A DEPUTY D.A. WITH THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES FROM JUNE OF
23 1969 THROUGH MARCH OF 2004. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE]

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1 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IS THAT MY OLD CLASSMATE, HERB STEINBERG, OUT
2 THERE? HOW ARE YOU, HERB? THAT'S THE GREAT POLITICAL
3 STRATEGIST, ARNIE STEINBERG'S BROTHER, YOUNGER BROTHER.
4 ANYWAY, TODAY, WE INTRODUCED TO THE PUBLIC THOSE INDIVIDUALS
5 WHO ARE REALLY UNSUNG HEROES IN FOSTER CHILDREN AND HELPING
6 CHILDREN AND PREPARING THESE YOUNG CHILDREN, TRYING TO FIND
7 HOMES FOR THEM. WE HAVE ANOTHER GROUP OF CHILDREN IN OUR
8 COUNTY AND NATION AND THOSE ARE THOSE WHO ARE PHYSICALLY
9 CHALLENGED. WELL, TODAY, WE'RE GOING TO RECOGNIZE AN
10 INDIVIDUAL WHO HAS DONE A LITTLE SOMETHING EXTRA, AND THAT'S
11 JAMIE BARTHOLOMEW, THE DIRECTOR OF THE CHALLENGE DIVISION--
12 CHALLENGER DIVISION OF THE MISSION HILLS LITTLE LEAGUE. NOW,
13 THIS IS A SPECIAL LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL DIVISION FOR
14 CHALLENGED CHILDREN WHO WOULD OTHERWISE NOT HAVE THAT
15 OPPORTUNITY TO PLAY BASEBALL. IT'S A FIELD OF DREAMS TO
16 PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED YOUNG PEOPLE PROVIDING STRUCTURE, THE
17 ABILITY TO CLING ON TO THE GAME OF BASEBALL PLAYING, A BREAK
18 FROM EVERYDAY ISSUES THEY FACE, AND THAT OPPORTUNITY TO PLAY
19 THEMSELVES, AS THEY WATCH ON TELEVISION OUR GREAT BASEBALL
20 TEAMS PLAY. AND IT'S SOMETHING THAT OTHER CHILDREN TAKE FOR
21 GRANTED AND IS SO IMPORTANT. IT WAS FOUNDED BACK IN 1993. THEY
22 HAVE GROWN FROM TWO TEAMS TO FOUR TEAMS WITH 43 PLAYERS WHO
23 ARE NOT PENALIZED FOR ERRORS OR BAD PLAYS. THE NAME OF THE
24 GAME IS A DIVISION FOR CHILDREN TO HAVE FUN. IT PROVIDES
25 PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED CHILDREN THE OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE



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1 IN LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL, THE SAME WAY MILLIONS OF OTHER
2 CHILDREN DO ACROSS THIS NATION. I KNOW I HAVE A LITTLE BOY
3 THAT JUST STARTED T-BALL AND, TO HIM, THAT'S THE GREATEST
4 OPPORTUNITY TO PLAY. HE'S A YANKEE AND HE REALLY RELATES TO
5 THE GAMES ON TELEVISION NOW BECAUSE IT'S NOW PART OF HIS LIFE
6 WHERE HE LEARNS TO WORK WITH OTHERS, TO SHARE, AND TO COMPETE.
7 AND NOW, HAVING CHALLENGED CHILDREN HAVE THIS SAME OPPORTUNITY
8 IS SOMETHING THAT IS TO COMMEND THOSE LEADERS IN THE SAN
9 FERNANDO VALLEY WHO HAD THAT VISION AND FORESIGHT. SO, JAMIE,
10 ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, WE WANT TO RECOGNIZE
11 THE CHALLENGER DIVISION FOR DOING THIS. [APPLAUSE]

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** IT'S JAMIE, NOT JAMIE.

14

15 **JAMIE BARTHOLOMEW:** I'D JUST LIKE TO THANK SUPERVISOR
16 ANTONOVICH AND THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FOR THIS HONOR. THE
17 PROGRAM IS SOMETHING THAT'S NEAR AND DEAR TO MY HEART BUT IT'S
18 ABOUT THE KIDS. UNFORTUNATELY, THEY CAN'T BE HERE BECAUSE THEY
19 ARE ALL IN SCHOOL. AND IT'S JUST A FABULOUS PROGRAM THAT GIVES
20 THEM SOMETHING TO LOOK FORWARD TO EVERY WEEK. THANK YOU.

22 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND BATTING CLEAN-UP IS LITTLE TOBY. THIS IS
23 PART OF OUR CINCO DAY MEOW. FRANK BOCHECK OF KNX RADIO SAID,
24 NOW, NEXT TIME WHEN YOU HAVE CINCO DE MAYO WITH THE LITTLE
25 KITTY, IT'S CINCO DE MEOW. SO THIS IS LITTLE TOBY. SHE'S A



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1 WHITE BLACK MALE, SHE'S EIGHT WEEKS OLD. SHE'S A DOMESTIC
2 SHORT HAIR, AND SHE-- CAN YOU TALK? NO, SHE'S QUIET. ANYWAY,
3 ANYBODY WHO WOULD LIKE TO ADOPT LITTLE TOBY, SHE IS AVAILABLE
4 AND A LITTLE-- DON'T BE SO NERVOUS. IT'S OKAY. YOU'RE FINE. SO
5 THIS IS LITTLE TOBY. THOSE AT HOME CAN CALL (562) 728-4644
6 OR... SEE ANYBODY? OKAY. THANK YOU.

7

8 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** ALL RIGHT. SUPERVISOR MOLINA?

9

10 **SUP. MOLINA:** THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN. I'M BRINGING UP A GROUP
11 OF PEOPLE THAT ARE PART OF A PRESENTATION TODAY AND, MORE
12 IMPORTANTLY, DESERVE RECOGNITION. TODAY, WE ARE RECOGNIZING
13 THE U.D.L.A., THE UNIFICATION OF DISABLED LATIN AMERICAN
14 CITIZENS. IF WE COULD ALL TURN AROUND A LITTLE BIT. AND, OF
15 COURSE, ITS FOUNDER, RUBEN HERNANDEZ. THEY'VE JOINED US HERE
16 TODAY BECAUSE THEY'RE CELEBRATING 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF THIS
17 ORGANIZATION AND THIS NETWORK. IT WAS 30 YEARS AGO THAT A
18 GROUP OF BLIND LATINO STUDENTS UNITED TO FORM AN ORGANIZATION
19 AND TO ACT AS A SUPPORT GROUP FOR THEMSELVES AND OTHER
20 DISABLED INDIVIDUALS. THESE-- THREE SUCCESSFUL YEARS LATER,
21 THEY RECEIVED NONPROFIT STATUS FROM THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA
22 AND, OVER THE YEARS, IT HAS BLOSSOMED INTO ONE OF THE MOST
23 OUTSTANDING ADVOCACY ORGANIZATIONS, WHICH NOT ONLY ASSISTS IN
24 SUPPORT OF SERVICES BUT PROVIDES DIRECT SERVICES TO OVER THE
25 10,000 PEOPLE THAT THEY ASSOCIATE AND HELP EVERY SINGLE YEAR,



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1 AND WE'RE VERY PROUD OF THE WORK THAT THEY DO. AND THESE
2 SERVICES INCLUDE INDIVIDUAL AND GROUP COUNSELING, SUPPORT
3 GROUPS FOR THE PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED INDIVIDUALS, SUPPORT
4 GROUPS FOR THE PARENTS AND THE SIBLINGS, AND SPECIAL EDUCATION
5 FOR THE CHILDREN, JOB TRAINING AS PLACEMENT AS WELL. THEY HAVE
6 A THEATRE GROUP THAT GETS TOGETHER. THEY HAVE SPORTS REHAB
7 THAT GOES ON, AND THERE'S A WHOLE SERIES OF ACTIVITIES THAT
8 ARE CARRIED OUT ON A REGULAR BASIS. THE MEMBERS OF U.D.L.A.
9 HAVE EMPOWERED THEMSELVES AND WE'RE VERY PROUD OF THAT. THEY
10 WORK DILIGENTLY TO EMPOWER OTHERS AND TO ASSIST OTHER
11 INDIVIDUALS AND, OF COURSE, TO REMIND ALL OF US OF OUR
12 RESPONSIBILITY AND OUR DUTY TO MANY OF THOSE WHO ARE
13 PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED AND WHO NEED OUR HELP FROM TIME TO TIME.
14 I'M VERY PROUD THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IS HONORING THEM
15 TODAY BECAUSE WE NEED TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE THREE DECADES OF
16 OUTSTANDING SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY. AS FOUNDER AND
17 PRESIDENT, RUBEN HERNANDEZ HAS BEEN A VITAL FACTOR IN THE
18 GROWTH AND SUCCESS OF U.D.L.A., AS I SAID, A VERY FINE
19 ORGANIZATION THAT DESERVES OUR COMMENDATION AND WE'RE SO PROUD
20 TO HAVE THEM HERE. WE WANT TO PRESENT A SPECIAL SCROLL, SIGNED
21 BY ALL FIVE BOARD MEMBERS, ACKNOWLEDGING ALL OF THE WORK AND
22 THE EFFORT THAT HAS BEEN CARRIED OUT THROUGHOUT THE YEARS AND
23 SIGNED BY ALL OF US AND WE EXPRESS OUR CONGRATULATIONS. [
24 APPLAUSE]

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1 **SUP. MOLINA:** ALL RIGHT. LET'S DO THE PICTURE FIRST.

2

3 **RUBEN HERNANDEZ:** THANK YOU, EVERYONE. THANK YOU, THANK YOU
4 VERY MUCH, THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AND LA SENORA, GLORIA
5 MOLINA, FOR THIS WONDERFUL AWARD. TO BE A MEMBER AND FOUNDER
6 OF U.D.L.A. HAS BEEN A WONDERFUL EXPERIENCE. WHY? BECAUSE I
7 BECAME BLIND WHEN I WAS 23 AND, AT THAT TIME, I NOTICED THERE
8 WAS VERY, VERY, VERY LITTLE FOR THE DISABLED COMMUNITY. SO I
9 DECIDED TO ESTABLISH AN ORGANIZATION OR A CENTER IN WHICH WE,
10 THE DISABLED, WILL PERFORM. WE, THE DISABLED, WILL COME
11 TOGETHER. BECAUSE, AT THAT TIME, I AM TALKING 32 YEARS AGO, WE
12 DID NOT HAVE ACCESSIBILITY OF ANY WAY, OF ANY FORM. SO THAT'S
13 WHY I DECIDED TO FORM THAT ORGANIZATION AND IT'S BEEN A
14 WONDERFUL EXPERIENCE. WHY? BECAUSE MANY OF US, HUNDREDS AND
15 HUNDREDS AND HUNDREDS OF US, WE HAVE FOUND OUR WAY AND WE
16 BECAME, HOW CAN I SAY, FULL CITIZENS OF THIS GREAT COUNTRY. SO
17 THE THING IS, THIS HAS BEEN A BLESSING FOR ME AND FOR ALL OF
18 US THAT FORM U.D.L.A. I WOULD LIKE TO REALLY, REALLY THANK THE
19 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FOR RECOGNIZING WITH THIS EXCELLENT
20 AWARD. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. [APPLAUSE]

21

22 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR BURKE.

24 **SUP. MOLINA:** THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN.

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1 **SUP. BURKE:** I'D LIKE TO CALL ROBERT TAYLOR FORWARD. THERE YOU
2 ARE. ON MAY 16, 1994, THE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF OMBUDSMAN
3 OPENED TO THE PUBLIC. IT HAD BEEN CREATED BY THE BOARD OF
4 SUPERVISORS IN RESPONSE TO THE COLES COMMISSION. THE MISSION
5 OF THE NEW DEPARTMENT WAS TO PROVIDE INDEPENDENCE AND
6 INTEGRITY, ASSURING THAT COMPLAINTS INVOLVING THE SHERIFF'S
7 DEPARTMENT AND OFFICE OF PUBLIC SAFETY PERSONNEL ARE
8 THOROUGHLY INVESTIGATED IN A TIMELY MANNER AND THAT THE
9 PROGRESS AND RESULTS OF INVESTIGATIONS WERE FAITHFULLY
10 COMMUNICATED TO COMMUNITY MEMBERS. IN THE ENSUING 10 YEARS,
11 THE DEPARTMENT OF OMBUDSMAN HAS SERVED IMPARTIALLY AND WITH
12 INTEGRITY. IT HAS PROVIDED UNBIASED AND VALUABLE
13 RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND THE BOARD OF
14 SUPERVISORS CONCERNING CITIZENS' COMPLAINTS. IT HAS TREATED
15 ALL INDIVIDUALS WITH RESPECT AND EMPATHY, AND THIS DEPARTMENT
16 HAS EVOLVED INTO A MODEL FOR NEW AND EXISTING OMBUDSMAN
17 PROGRAMS AND HAS PROVIDED EXPERTISE TO CITY AND COUNTY
18 AGENCIES, NOT ONLY THROUGH CALIFORNIA, BUT THE UNITED STATES,
19 AS WELL. THE COUNTY PROGRAM HAS RECEIVED THE NATIONAL
20 ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES ACHIEVEMENT AWARD IN RECOGNITION OF
21 ITS DISTINGUISHED AND INNOVATIVE CONTRIBUTION TO IMPROVING AND
22 PROMOTING PUBLIC SERVICE IN COUNTY GOVERNMENT IN THE UNITED
23 STATES. IN VIEW OF THESE AND IN NUMEROUS OTHER CONTRIBUTIONS
24 AND ACHIEVEMENTS, I'M VERY PLEASED TO PRESENT THIS SCROLL AND
25 HIGHLY COMMEND THE DEPARTMENT OF OMBUDSMAN FOR 10 YEARS OF



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1 VALUABLE SERVICE TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY. AND I'M PRESENTING
2 THIS TO ROBERT TAYLOR, WHO IS OUR OMBUDSMAN WHO CONTINUES TO
3 PROVIDE THAT KIND OF SERVICE AND KEEP UP THE INTEGRITY OF THE
4 OFFICE.

5

6 **ROBERT TAYLOR:** I'D LIKE TO THANK SUPERVISOR BURKE FOR
7 ARRANGING THIS PRESENTATION AND I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO THANK THE
8 ENTIRE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FOR THEIR LEADERSHIP AND THEIR
9 VISION IN CREATING THIS DEPARTMENT. NOT ONLY DO WE PROVIDE
10 OVERSIGHT INTO THE POLICE FUNCTION AND HAVE SORT OF BEEN A
11 LEADER IN THAT ROLE THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES, BUT WE ALSO
12 PROVIDE, I THINK, NECESSARY SERVICES TO THE PUBLIC WHO ARE
13 SEEKING TO UNDERSTAND HOW THE COUNTY CAN BEST SERVE THEM. AND
14 SO WE ARE PLEASED TO PROVIDE THAT SERVICE TO YOU AND TO
15 MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY. I'D LIKE TO RECOGNIZE MY STAFF, WHO

17 DELEON. RUDY, OF COURSE, YOU KNOW, WE'VE HAD 10 YEARS OF
18 OMBUDS SERVICE IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY, BUT EIGHT OF THOSE YEARS
19 WERE UNDER THE SUPERVISION AND GUIDANCE OF RUDY DELEON. RUDY?

6 YOU VERY MUCH.

18 SAME OFFICE, THEY WERE ON DIFFERENT FLOORS OF THIS BUILDING IN
19 THE VERY BEGINNING OF THE OMBUDS SERVICE. DEBORAH PRITCHETT,
20 WHO IS OUR BUDGET PERSON AND TRIES TO KEEP ALL OF OUR
21 ADMINISTRATIVE TASKS IN LINE. LEWIS JASPER, WHO IS AN
22 ASSISTANT IN THE OFFICE AND HELPS WITH A LOT OF THE CLERICAL
23 DUTIES. STEPHANIE MAXBURY, WHO IS MY ASSISTANT AND A VERY,
24 VERY CAPABLE ONE AND A LONG-TIME MEMBER OF COUNTY SERVICE.

2 MARTELL, WHO IS ASSISTANT OMBUDSMAN. SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

5 FEW YEARS, TOM BRADLEY, JOHN VAN DE KAMP, AMONG OTHERS. HE WAS
6 A FORMER NEWSMAN. HE WAS AN UNABASHED PROGRESSIVE, KNOWN AND
7 RESPECTED AS ARDENT ENVIRONMENTALIST AND COMMITTED ADVOCATE
8 FOR A NUMBER OF CAUSES AND HE WILL BE REMEMBERED. I KNEW HIM
9 VERY WELL AND HE WAS A GREAT PERSON. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS
10 WIFE, JAN, A DAUGHTER, MARGARET, SONS LOU, DIRK, VERNON AND
11 JACK AND FIVE GRANDCHILDREN. ASK THAT WE ALSO THAT WE ADJOURN
12 IN THE MEMORY OF RICHARD JONES, A LONG-TIME RESIDENT OF OUR
13 DISTRICT, A RETIRED MEMBER OF THE COUNTY FAMILY AND THE
14 DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES, IN THE AREA OF WORKERS'
15 COMPENSATION. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS DAUGHTER, MEREDITH. ROLAND
16 MARSH, DIED AT THE AGE OF 74, AND HE WAS ALSO A COUNTY--
17 MEMBER OF THE COUNTY FAMILY. HE WAS A SENIOR CONTRACT PROGRAM
18 AUDITOR FOR THE ALCOHOL AND DRUG PROGRAM OF THE DEPARTMENT OF
19 HEALTH SERVICES. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS LONG-TIME PARTNER,
20 BRENDA, A DAUGHTER, ROBIN AND THREE GRANDCHILDREN. ALSO ASK
21 THAT WE ADJOURN IN THE MEMORY OF ALAN KING, A LEGENDARY
22 COMEDIAN, ACTOR, AUTHOR, AND PRODUCER WHO RECENTLY DIED OF
23 LUNG CANCER AT THE AGE OF 76 IN NEW YORK CITY. I THINK WE ALL
24 KNEW HIS WORK. HE MADE HIS ORIGINAL DEBUT ON THE ED SULLIVAN
25 SHOW IN THE LATE 1950S, APPEARING ON THAT SHOW NEARLY 100



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1 TIMES. HE LATER BECAME A SUCCESSFUL CHARACTER ACTOR AND
2 DIRECTED TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURE PRODUCTIONS AND HE WAS
3 ALSO KNOWN FOR HIS PHILANTHROPIC ACTIVITIES AND WE HAVE A
4 VARIETIES OF CAUSES, JEWISH COMMUNITY AND MEDICAL CHARITIES,
5 AMONG OTHERS. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE OF 57 YEARS,
6 JEANETTE, TWO SONS, ROBERT AND ANDREW, A DAUGHTER, ELAINE
7 GAGNE, AND SEVEN GRANDCHILDREN. AND, LAST, ASK THAT WE ADJOURN
8 IN THE MEMORY OF TOM GOLDEN. TOM, A LONGTIME FRIEND OF OUR
9 OFFICE, BOTH IN-- WELL, IN THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES. TOM WAS A
10 RETIRED CHIEF ZONING ADMINISTRATOR FOR THE CITY OF LOS
11 ANGELES. HE RETIRED IN 1982 AFTER MORE THAN 20 YEARS IN THAT
12 POSITION OF THE CITY'S PLANNING DEPARTMENT. HE WAS A MAN OF
13 GREAT INTEGRITY AND GREAT KNOWLEDGE. HE WAS A WALKING
14 ENCYCLOPEDIA OF THE CITY'S ZONING CODE AND HE WAS VERY, VERY
15 HELPFUL TO ME. HE TAUGHT ME A LOT ABOUT THE PLANNING PROCESS
16 WHEN I FIRST BECAME A CITY COUNCILMAN. I RELIED HEAVILY ON HIS
17 JUDGMENT ON TOO MANY CASES THAT I-- SOME I DON'T EVEN WISH TO
18 REMEMBER BUT HE WAS A GREAT FRIEND AND THE CITY FAMILY HAS
19 LOST ONE OF ITS GREAT FORMER MEMBERS. ASK THAT WE ADJOURN
20 MEMORY OF TOM GOLDEN. THANK YOU.

22 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SO ORDERED.

24 **SUP. MOLINA:** I'D LIKE TO JOIN ON THE LOU HAAS, PLEASE, IF I
25 COULD. GREAT MAN.

14 CASE FURTHER. OR THAT HE'S EVEN LOCATED MY REPORT. I CALLED
15 EVERY SINGLE ONE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' DEPUTIES AND DID
16 NOT RECEIVE ONE RETURN PHONE CALL. ALSO, YOU SHOULD NOTE THAT,
17 WHEN YOU'RE INCARCERATED, YOU CAN NO LONGER CALL THE COUNTY
18 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. HERE IN AMERICA, WE'RE OBSERVING THE
19 MISTREATMENT OF IRAQI CITIZENS IN PRISON. AND I'M HERE TO SAY
20 THAT THE MISTREATMENT OF OUR OWN CITIZENS RIGHT HERE IN THE
21 MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL AND IN THE TWIN TOWERS NEEDS TO BE
22 ADDRESSED. THE SHERIFFS PROTECT THEIR OWN BEFORE THEY PROTECT
23 THE INMATES AND THEY FAIL TO FOLLOW THEIR OWN POLICIES AND
24 PROCEDURES THAT THEY CREATE THEMSELVES. THIS ALSO RELATES TO
25 ITEM NUMBER 92, THE 1,827,000 FEDERAL DOLLARS TO BE



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1 DISTRIBUTED FOR SPECIALIZED SERVICES TO WOMEN VICTIMIZED BY
2 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, EVEN WHEN THE SYSTEM VICTIMIZES THEM
3 FURTHER. UNDER FOSTER CARE AWARENESS MONTH, IT SHOULD BE
4 ADDRESSED THAT THE INCARCERATED PARENTS CANNOT CONTACT THEIR
5 PANELED ATTORNEYS COLLECT. THEY CANNOT CONTACT THEIR SOCIAL
6 WORKERS COLLECT AND THEY CANNOT EVEN RECEIVE A COPY OF THEIR
7 OWN COURT FILE. HOW CONVENIENT. THE COUNTY CAN SELL THEIR
8 CHILDREN UNDER THE DISGUISE OF ADOPTION. AND, FINALLY, MIKE
9 ANTONOVICH, IT'S TOO BAD THAT PAUL-- I'M SORRY, RAOUL DIDN'T
10 SEND A LETTER FROM THE GRAVE LIKE RON CAULDRY. THIS RIGHT HERE
11 IS A COPY OF MY BADGE THAT SAYS I WAS A KEEP-AWAY. I WAS
12 INCARCERATED BECAUSE I WAS DOWN THERE VISITING A FRIEND OF
13 MINE AND I WAS HELPING HIS MOTHER, WHEN MY PUBLIC PRETENDER,
14 AS I CALL THEM, BECAUSE THEY PRETEND TO REPRESENT YOU, FAILED
15 TO INFORM ME THAT I HAD A COURT DATE TO ENROLL IN MY
16 COUNSELING. I WAS TWO DAYS GETTING IN. THE WOMAN THAT HIT ME
17 HAD BEEN SITTING IN THIS ROOM FOR FOUR DAYS COMING OFF OF HER
18 MEDICATION. PEOPLE ARE FORCED TO SIT AND EAT PEANUT BUTTER AND
19 JELLY SANDWICHES. I SAT THERE FOR FOUR DAYS AND THE COUNTY
20 MADE \$150 ON EACH DAY I WAS INCARCERATED. I WAS DENIED MY
21 ACCESS TO MAKE MY THREE FREE PHONE CALLS AND THERE WAS NO
22 NUMBER POSTED FOR ME TO CONTACT A BAIL BONDSMAN. I REALLY HOPE
23 THAT THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WILL ATTEND TO THIS
24 MATTER AND I REALLY HONESTLY TRULY FEEL FOR THE MOTHER WHO



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1 LOST HER SON AND HAD TO GO THIS MOTHER'S DAY WITHOUT HER SON.
2 THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

4 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU, CANDACE. THE ITEMS-- THANK YOU.
5 THE ITEMS BEFORE US ARE 12, 92, AND 104-B. MOVED BY SUPERVISOR
6 YAROSLAVSKY, SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR BURKE. WITHOUT OBJECTION,
7 SO ORDERED. WE HAD ITEM 21 WAS HELD. MR. TOM MYERS.

8

9 **TOM MYERS:** GOOD MORNING. CAN YOU HEAR ME OKAY? MY NAME IS TOM
10 MYERS. I'M GENERAL COUNSEL FOR AIDS HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION. I
11 WISH TO SPEAK-- THANK YOU. I WISH TO SPEAK IN SUPPORT OF
12 SUPERVISOR BURKE'S RECOMMENDATION AND STATE THAT A.I.D.S.
13 HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION SUPPORTS ALL EFFORTS TO RAISE AWARENESS
14 OF A.I.D.S. AND H.I.V. IN THAT REGARD, I WANT TO DRAW
15 ATTENTION TO THE RECENT COMMISSION ON H.I.V./A.I.D.S. HEALTH
16 SERVICES VOTE TO REDUCE COUNTY FUNDING FOR H.I.V. MEDICAL
17 CARE, PRESUMABLY BASED ON A REDUCTION OF RYAN WHITE FEDERAL
18 FUNDING TO THE COUNTY. THERE ARE GRAVE CONSEQUENCES STEMMING
19 FROM THE FACT THAT, WHILE YOU ARE URGING GREATER AWARENESS OF
20 H.I.V., YOU'RE SIMULTANEOUSLY PLANNING TO CUT TREATMENT. THESE
21 CUTS ARE GRAVE FOR A NUMBER OF REASONS. FIRST, THEY COME AT A
22 TIME WHEN THE NUMBER OF A.I.D.S. CASES AND THE NEED FOR
23 TREATMENT ARE INCREASING. FUNDING FOR NEW TREATMENT SLOTS IS
24 NEEDED, NOT REDUCTIONS. SECOND, THESE CUTS APPEAR TO BE DONE
25 ACROSS THE BOARD, AFFECTING THE ENTIRE CONTINUUM OF CARE



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1 WITHOUT REGARD FOR INDIVIDUAL PROGRAMS AND THEIR NEEDS AND
2 EFFECTIVENESS. THIS, IN EFFECT, WORKS TO DISMANTLE AND
3 UNDERMINE THE AIDS HEALTHCARE SYSTEM THAT HAS PAINSTAKINGLY
4 BEEN PUT IN PLACE OVER THE YEARS AND WHICH FURTHER EXACERBATES
5 THE HARMFUL EFFECTS OF THE CUTS. FINALLY, THERE HAVE BEEN NO
6 BEILENSEN ACT HEARINGS ON THIS MATTER. AS THESE PROPOSED CUTS
7 WILL RESULT IN A DECREASE IN COUNTY MEDICAL SERVICES, THE
8 MANDATORY NOTICE, HEARING AND COMMENT PROVISIONS OF HEALTH AND
9 SAFETY CODE SECTION 1442.5 ARE REQUIRED. THE BOARD IS FULLY
10 AWARE OF THIS AS IT HAS UTILIZED THE ACT PREVIOUSLY, SUCH AS
11 WHEN REDUCTIONS IN SERVICES AT HIGH DESERT HOSPITAL WERE
12 PROPOSED. ALTHOUGH A.H.F. SENT A LETTER TO COUNTY COUNSEL ON
13 MAY 3RD REQUESTING CONFIRMATION THAT SUCH HEARINGS WILL BE
14 HELD, IT HAS RECEIVED NO RESPONSE. A.H.F., THEREFORE, AGAIN
15 REQUESTS THAT BEILENSEN ACT HEARINGS BE HELD ON THESE PROPOSED
16 CUTS AND I WOULD LIKE TO KNOW THE DATE AND TIME OF THESE
17 HEARINGS. AT THAT TIME, THE MYRIAD PROBLEMS PROPOSED BY THESE
18 CUTS AS WELL AS THE COUNTY'S ONGOING OBLIGATION TO PROVIDE
19 MEDICAL SERVICES REGARDLESS OF FEDERAL FUNDING CAN BE FULLY
20 ADDRESSED BY THE CITIZENS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. THANK YOU
21 VERY MUCH.

22

23 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THANK YOU. THE ITEM IS BEFORE US. MOVED BY
24 SUPERVISOR BURKE, THE CHAIR WILL SECOND. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO
25 ORDERED. WE ALSO HAVE HELD ITEM NUMBER 48 FOR A MEMBER OF THE



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1 PUBLIC. GENEVIEVE? MADE IT BACK OKAY, HUH? WASN'T THAT A FUN
2 TIME AT DULLES, HUH?

3

4 **GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL:** YES. GOOD MORNING, BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. I
5 MUST SAY THAT THE LAST WEEK IN WASHINGTON, D.C., WAS A GOOD
6 LEARNING FOR ME. I DEFINITELY FEEL THAT YOU NEED TO TAKE
7 LOBBYING 101 AND TAKE SOME LESSONS FROM THE ACTIVISTS WHO
8 REALLY LOBBY. BUT, ANYWAY, I WANT TO THANK MANY OF YOU WHO
9 WERE SO GRACIOUS WITH ME. I WOULD BE CONCERNED WHEN, YOU KNOW,
10 WE HAVE A READJUSTMENT OF BUDGET OF AN AMOUNT OF 8.3 MILLION.
11 YOU KNOW, THAT'S A LOT TO SWITCH AROUND. I MEAN, IT SHOWS TO
12 ME THAT, YOU KNOW, WHEN YOU ESTABLISH A BUDGET, MAYBE WE DON'T
13 KNOW WHAT WE ARE DOING. TO ALL OF A SUDDEN HAVE TO SWITCH AND
14 REALIGN 8.3 MILLION IS NOT SOMETHING MINOR. I THINK MAYBE FOR
15 NEXT YEAR, WE NEED TO BE MORE AWARE OF WHAT THE BUDGET IS ALL
16 ABOUT. I MEAN, THE PROBLEM WITH THE NURSING SHORTAGE, THE
17 SHORT STAFF, WE ALL KNEW THAT LAST YEAR. WE KNEW THAT TWO OR
18 THREE YEARS AGO. SO AS YOU WILL BE LOOKING AT THE BUDGET, YOU
19 KNOW, NEXT FEW DAYS, I THINK MAYBE YOU NEED TO, YOU KNOW, LOOK
20 AT IT IN DETAIL SO THIS DOESN'T HAPPEN. THAT WILL BE GREAT.
21 AND I WILL NOT BE HERE FOR THE BUDGET. I-- YOU KNOW, SO I
22 WON'T BE ABLE TO DISCUSS IT SO THAT'S WHY I BRING IT TODAY.
23 NO. I HAVE TO GO TO LAS VEGAS AND, YOU KNOW...

24

25 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OH, YOU HAVE TO GO TO LAS VEGAS?



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1

2 **GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL:** I HAVE TO BE INFORMED ABOUT TECHNOLOGY,
3 YOU KNOW, BECAUSE I DON'T THINK THAT'S OUR FORTE HERE IN THE
4 COUNTY, YOU KNOW?

5

6 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THIS KIND OF TECHNOLOGY?

7

8 **GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL:** NO, NO, NO, INTEROP, YOU KNOW, INTEROP,
9 YOU KNOW. I'M NOT A GAMBLER OR I WOULD NOT COME HERE EVERY
10 WEEK, YOU KNOW. [LAUGHTER]

11

12 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. THANK YOU.

13

14 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** SAFE TRIP.

15

16 **GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL:** OH, BY THE WAY, WE KNOW OUR LOBBYISTS, YOU
17 KNOW, ARE SUPPOSED TO BE NICE AND LOBBY, YOU KNOW, FOR US?
18 MAYBE THE NEXT YEAR YOU CAN TELL MR. DALE SMITH NOT, EVERY
19 TURN OF THE WAY, TO ASK ME WHEN I WAS GOING TO GIVE UP BECAUSE
20 YOU SHOULD TELL HIM I NEVER GIVE UP.

21

22 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** WE TOLD HIM THAT. WE TOLD HIM THAT FROM THE
23 VERY BEGINNING BUT THEY FELT THEY HAD TO ASK THAT QUESTION BUT
24 WE KEPT SAYING, SHE'S NEVER GOING TO GIVE UP, SO... YOU
25 DIDN'T.



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1

2 **GENEVIEVE CLAVREUL:** NO, THAT'S CORRECT, BUT IT WOULD BE NICE,
3 YOU KNOW, TO BE-- PROFESSIONAL IS A GOOD THING.

4

5 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** ALL RIGHT. THEY MEANT IT IN A NICE WAY.
6 MOVED BY SUPERVISOR BURKE. WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED. WE
7 HAVE THE ONE REMAINING ITEM THAT SUPERVISOR BURKE HELD, ITEM
8 NUMBER 33.

9

10 **SUP. BURKE:** I'D LIKE TO ASK THE ACTING DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY
11 SENIOR CITIZENS, BUT MAYBE IT WOULD BE BETTER FOR THE AUDITOR
12 SO I CAN GET A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT THE PROBLEMS ARE.

13

14 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** GOOD MORNING. TYLER MCCAULEY, AUDITOR-
15 CONTROLLER.

16

17 **SUP. BURKE:** YES. I WANTED TO ASK YOU A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THIS
18 CHART IN TERMS OF THE GROW AND EXACTLY HOW SOME OF THESE
19 PROBLEMS CAME ABOUT. IN LOOKING AT THE CHART, IT LOOKS LIKE
20 THERE WERE TWO DIFFERENT PEOPLE WHO WERE COLLECTING MONEY. AND
21 COULD YOU, FROM THE AUDITOR'S STANDPOINT, FIRST OF ALL, HOW
22 THIS CAME ABOUT.

23

24 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** WE'RE LOOKING INTO THAT PARTICULAR ISSUE
25 RIGHT NOW, SUPERVISOR, SO I DON'T HAVE THE FINAL ANSWERS BUT



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1 IT IS PART OF THE ISSUE OF THE DEPARTMENT WHERE THE PROGRAM
2 SIDE IS NOT NECESSARILY COMMUNICATING WITH THE FISCAL SIDE.
3 THE RESULT IN THE GROW PROGRAM WAS A DOUBLE BILL OF THE
4 ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS TO THE D.P.S.S., WHO THEN TURNED AND
5 BILLED-- IN TURN, BILLED IT TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, WHO
6 PAYS HALF. SO, IF THE ESTIMATE WE'VE BEEN GIVEN AND WE'RE
7 LOOKING AT IS THAT THE TOTAL OVER BILL WAS \$3 MILLION FOR
8 FIVE-YEAR PERIOD, IF THAT HOLDS UP, HALF OF THAT, ROUGHLY, OR
9 1.5, WILL HAVE TO BE RETURNED TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. SO
10 THAT'S, IN A NUTSHELL, WHAT WE'RE LOOKING AT. WE'RE JUST
11 TRYING TO CONFIRM THE NUMBERS, SUPERVISOR.

12

13 **SUP. BURKE:** WHEN WAS THIS FIRST DISCOVERED?

14

15 **CYNTHIA BANKS:** IT WAS DISCOVERED-- CYNTHIA BANKS FOR COMMUNITY
16 AND SENIOR SERVICES. CYNTHIA BANKS FOR COMMUNITY AND SENIOR
17 SERVICES. IT WAS ORIGINALLY DISCOVERED IN MARCH OF THIS YEAR,
18 THE END OF MARCH.

19

20 **SUP. BURKE:** SEE, IT SEEMS VERY STRANGE THAT DOUBLE BILLING
21 COULD GO ON WITH NO ONE PICKING IT UP.

22

23 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** THIS IS PART OF THE ORGANIZATION PROBLEM,
24 SUPERVISOR.

25



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1 **CYNTHIA BANKS:** RIGHT.

2

3 **SUP. BURKE:** BUT THERE HAS TO BE SOME FLOW OF BILLS.

4

5 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** YES.

6

7 **CYNTHIA BANKS:** WHAT OCCURRED WITHIN C.S.S. WAS THAT THERE WERE
8 A-- TWO INVOICES DONE. ONE, INCLUDING ONLY THE ADMINISTRATIVE
9 COST GOING THROUGH OUR FISCAL PERSONNEL, AND THE OTHER GOING
10 THROUGH OUR PROGRAM PERSONNEL, INCLUDING ADMINISTRATION AND
11 THE PROGRAM COST. THOSE WERE SENT INDEPENDENTLY TO TWO
12 DIFFERENT SECTIONS WITHIN D.P.S.S. AND THEN PAID.

13

14 **SUP. BURKE:** NOW HOW WOULD THIS 1.5 MILLION-- HAS THE DEMAND
15 COME IN FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT YET?

16

17 **CYNTHIA BANKS:** NO.

18

19 **SUP. BURKE:** BUT WE KNOW IT WILL BE COMING, IS THAT IT?

20

21 **CYNTHIA BANKS:** YES, IT WILL.

22

23 **SUP. BURKE:** ARE WE NEGOTIATING IN SOME WAY TO REDUCE IT?

24



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1 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** WE'RE JUST TRYING TO FIND OUT THE EXACT
2 NUMBERS, SUPERVISOR, AND I THINK THE BEST THING, WHEN WE DO
3 THAT, IS JUST TO PAY WHAT IS DUE AND-- WE DON'T KNOW EXACTLY,
4 THOUGH. IT'S IN THE ORDER OF MAGNITUDE, I TALKED TO MY STAFF
5 ABOUT IT AND I TOLD YOU, SO THE-- PROBABLY A MILLION-THREE,
6 MILLION-FIVE MAY BE THE NUMBER.

7

8 **SUP. BURKE:** MILLION THREE-FIVE?

9

10 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** NO, EXCUSE ME, A MILLION THREE TO A
11 MILLION FIVE.

12

13 **SUP. BURKE:** OH, A MILLION THREE OR A MILLION FIVE. OKAY.

14

15 **TYLER J. MCCAULEY:** MAY BE THE NUMBER THAT-- A CLOSE ESTIMATE
16 OF THE NUMBER WE HAVE TO RETURN.

17

18 **SUP. BURKE:** ALL RIGHT. I WOULD CERTAINLY HOPE THAT WE CAD KEEP
19 UP-- IF YOU'D KEEP GIVING US THE REPORT UPDATE ON THIS, AS YOU
20 SEE IT, AND IF THERE ARE OTHER THINGS THAT FOLLOW THIS-- YOU
21 KNOW, THIS IS JUST LIKE THE WRIGHT ISSUE, WHERE WE HAVE TOO
22 MANY DEPARTMENTS INVOLVED AS GOING INTO TOO MANY DIFFERENT
23 WAYS. WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO REALLY LOOK AT THAT IN TERMS OF
24 HOW YOU END UP WITH THIS KIND OF A STRUCTURE.

25



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1 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** JUST FOR YOUR INFORMATION, SUPERVISOR, MY
2 OFFICE IS DOING A LOT OF WORK ON SOME-- WHAT WAS FISCAL OVER
3 BILLS THAT WERE THOUGHT TO BE AS HIGH AS \$10 MILLION AND NOW
4 WE GOT DOWN TO \$80,000 OR SOMETHING.

5

6 **SUP. BURKE:** OKAY.

7

8 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** BUT WE HAVE HIRED, TO WORK ALONGSIDE MY
9 STAFF, A CONSULTING FIRM WHO IS LOOKING AT JUST WHAT YOU
10 TALKED ABOUT: WHY IT IS ORGANIZED IN A MANNER THAT WOULD HAVE
11 SOMETHING THIS OR THE OTHER THING WHERE THE COMMUNICATION
12 EITHER BETWEEN-- WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OR WITH THE DEPARTMENT
13 AND WHO THEY DEAL WITH, BUT MOSTLY D.P.S.S., BUT ALSO OTHER
14 DEPARTMENTS SO THAT WE CAN HAVE-- THAT THESE TYPE OF THINGS
15 WOULD NOT HAPPEN.

16

17 **SUP. BURKE:** IT SEEMS SYSTEMIC IN THIS ORGANIZATION, THIS
18 DEPARTMENT.

19

20 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** IN THE INITIAL DRAFT AUDIT OF THE
21 CONSULTANT, IT SHOWED THIS WAS AN ISSUE.

22

23 **SUP. BURKE:** BECAUSE IT'S THE SAME THING AS WRIGHT?

24

25 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** YES, IT IS.



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1

2 **SUP. BURKE:** ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU.

3

4 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** LET ME ASK A QUESTION, MR. CHAIRMAN.

5

6 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH.

7

8 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WHAT'S THE STATUS MANAGEMENT AUDIT OF CSS?

9

10 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** IT IS DUE ON JUNE 30TH, SUPERVISOR, AND
11 IT'S WELL UNDERWAY.

12

13 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND IS IT POSSIBLE TO USE A PORTION OF THE
14 \$3.7 MILLION TO PAY FOR THE CALWORKS YOUTH PROGRAM?

15

16 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** THE MONEY, AT THIS POINT, WE'RE SHORT ON
17 THE MONEY, WE'VE OVER BILLED THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, SO THERE
18 WILL BE NO NEW MONEY. IT WILL BE A SHORT. WE HAVE TO MAKE UP
19 THE MONEY TO THE FEDS.

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** AND IS THERE ANY PROCESS, PROCEDURE THAT
22 COULD IMMEDIATELY IDENTIFY OVER-BILLING PRACTICES? OR OVER-
23 BILLING REQUESTS?

24



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1 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** WE NEED TO LOOK AT EACH OF THE PROGRAMS,
2 SIR, BEFORE WE'D FIND THOSE. WE ARE WORKING WITH THE
3 DEPARTMENT AND THAT EVENTUALLY-- ON THE FINANCIAL SIDE TO TRY
4 TO IDENTIFY THINGS LIKE THAT.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** DOES AN AGENCY LIKE A.T. AND T. OR SOCIAL
7 SECURITY HAVE A COMPUTER PROGRAM THAT FLAGS DOUBLE BILLING?

8

9 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** IN THIS CASE, YES, THEY DO, FOR, LIKE, A
10 VENDOR PAYMENT AND SO FORTH, AND WE DO, TOO, AND ESPECIALLY
11 OUR NEW SYSTEM, WE HAVE IT. BUT WHAT YOU'RE TALKING HERE,
12 THOUGH, SUPERVISOR, IS THE CLAIMING OF COSTS AND THEY WERE
13 DONE INDEPENDENTLY. THEY SHOULD HAVE BEEN DONE UNDER ONE UNIT
14 AND I KNOW CYNTHIA WOULD AGREE AND, HAD THEY BEEN DONE THAT
15 WAY, IT WOULD HAVE BEEN VERY OBVIOUS WHAT HAD HAPPENED AND IT
16 WOULDN'T HAVE HAPPENED. YOU COULD HAVE SEEN THE TWO SETS OF
17 ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS. HOWEVER, HOW IT WAS ORGANIZED RESULTED
18 IN THIS. THAT'S THE GOAL OF WHAT WE'RE DOING -- TO REORGANIZE
19 SO IT WOULDN'T HAPPEN AGAIN.

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** WILL YOUR AUDIT REPORT IN JUNE HAVE THE
22 RECOMMENDATIONS TO ENSURE THAT THIS DOES NOT OCCUR IN ANY OF
23 THE OTHER CONTRACTING THAT WE DO WITH AGENCIES?

24



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1 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** IT WILL MOSTLY-- THE ONE IN JUNE WILL DEAL
2 WITH D.C.S.S. IN PARTICULAR. WE CAN, OF COURSE, LEARN ANYTHING
3 FROM THAT THAT WE COULD APPLY ELSEWHERE.

4

5 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** OKAY. HOW DO WE IMPLEMENT POLICIES TO ENSURE
6 THAT THERE'S A CONSISTENT CHECK ON OVER-BILLINGS WITHIN THE
7 COUNTY?

8

9 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** THAT'S PART OF THE DEPARTMENT SUPERVISORY
10 AND IT'S PART OF MY JOB AS AN INTERNAL AUDITOR TO GET AROUND
11 TO SEE WHAT'S HAPPENING. WHAT I DO, GENERALLY, IN THE LARGEST
12 BILLS THAT COME TO THE COUNTY, THE CLAIMS THEY SEND TO ME FOR--
13 - I HAVE TO SIGN THEM, I RECONCILE-- MAKE SURE THEY RECONCILE
14 TO THE ACCOUNTING REPORT SYSTEM, WHICH IS C.A.P.S. NOW, SO
15 THAT I HAVE A COMFORT LEVEL THAT THE DEPARTMENT IS NOT OVER-
16 BILLING IN TOTAL. YOU DO GET DOWN TO THE NUANCES, THOUGH,
17 SUPERVISOR, OF ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS THAT ARE INCLUDED OR NOT
18 INCLUDED, AND THOSE USUALLY HAVE TO BE DONE ON AN INDIVIDUAL
19 BASIS.

20

21 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** MR. JANSSEN, TO ENSURE THAT WE HAVE A PROGRAM
22 IN PLACE, WOULD WE GO TO THE C.I.O.? DO WE GO TO YOUR OFFICE
23 IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE C.I.O. OR DO WE GO TO THE AUDITOR-
24 CONTROLLER WITH YOU AND THE C.I.O.? OR WHAT FORMAT DO YOU
25 RECOMMEND THAT WE REVIEW THIS PROCESS?



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1

2 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** MR. CHAIRMAN, SUPERVISOR, LET ME TAKE THE LEAD
3 AND THEN WE'LL TALK TO TYLER AND TO JOHN AND COME BACK WITH A
4 PROCESS THAT WE CAN RECOMMEND TO YOU.

5

6 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** REPORT ON A TIME FRAME.

7

8 **C.A.O. JANSSEN:** YES.

9

10 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU.

11

12 **J. TYLER MCCAULEY:** I JUST WANT TO LET YOU KNOW, THERE ARE A
13 LOT OF CHECKS AND BALANCES IN OTHER _____ SO THAT WE
14 WOULDN'T HAVE A VERY LARGE ONE. THAT'S OUR MAIN CONCERN. THIS
15 WAS RELATIVELY SMALL. IT WAS UNFORTUNATE BUT, FORTUNATELY, IT
16 WAS VERY SMALL.

17

18 **SUP. ANTONOVICH:** THANK YOU, TYLER.

19

20 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. ANY OTHER QUESTIONS? ANY AMENDMENTS?
21 THE ITEM IS BEFORE US.

22

23 **SUP. BURKE:** I MOVE THE ITEM.

24



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1 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** OKAY. SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH.
2 WITHOUT OBJECTION, SO ORDERED.

3

8 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** THAT IS THE HELD ITEMS. SUPERVISOR
9 ANTONOVICH, YOUR ADJOURNMENTS.

18 ACCOMPLISH ALL THAT HE HAD ACCOMPLISHED. HE WAS A COLONEL IN
19 THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE. HE WAS AN ASTRONAUT. HE WAS A WAR
20 HERO. HE WAS A COMMUNITY LEADER. AND HE WAS AN EFFECTIVE STATE
21 LEGISLATOR. HE LEAVES A LEGACY OF PUBLIC SERVICE AND DEFENSE
22 OF FAMILIES. ON OCTOBER 3RD OF 1967, HE FLEW AN X-15
23 EXPERIMENTAL AIRCRAFT AND SET THE FASTEST MAN AIRPLANE VOYAGE
24 IN THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD AT 4,520 MILES PER HOUR, 6.7 TIMES
25 FASTER THAN THE SPEED OF SOUND. THAT FEAT EARNED HIM THE



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1 DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS. WHEN HE RETIRED IN 1982 AT THE
2 RANK OF FULL COLONEL, HE HAD FLOWN 253 COMBAT MISSIONS IN
3 SOUTHEAST ASIA WITH MORE THAN 6,000 HOURS IN ABOUT 100
4 DIFFERENT AIRPLANES. COMING BACK TO HIS COMMUNITY WHEN HE
5 RETIRED, HE WAS ELECTED TO THE CITY COUNCIL IN PALMDALE IN
6 1984 AND THEN, IN 1988, WAS ELECTED MAYOR. IN 1992, HE WENT TO
7 THE CALIFORNIA STATE ASSEMBLY AND THEN WAS ELECTED TO THE
8 CALIFORNIA STATE SENATE IN 1966 AND REELECTED IN THE YEAR
9 2000. THROUGHOUT HIS POLITICAL CAREER, HE STOOD BY HIS PRO

17 ENCOURAGE MEMBERS TO ATTEND. ANOTHER INDIVIDUAL WHO PASSED
18 AWAY WAS FORMER COMMISSIONER OF MINE, LUCILE BALLANTINE, WHO
19 SERVED ON THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SOCIAL SERVICES COMMISSION.
20 SHE PASSED AWAY ON MAY 8TH AT THE SOLHEIM LUTHERAN HOME IN
21 EAGLE ROCK AT THE AGE OF 95. SHE WAS A STRONG COMMUNITY
22 SUPPORTER, ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN BASICALLY EVERY ONE OF MY
23 CAMPAIGNS, AND SHE IS SURVIVED BY HER TWO CHILDREN AND WILL BE
24 DEEPLY MISSED. AN INDIVIDUAL THAT I HAD A GREAT DEAL OF
25 RESPECT FOR WHEN I WAS IN THE LEGISLATURE, AS A PERSON WHO



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1 GAVE A LOT OF GOOD INFORMATION TO THE COUNTY, STATE, AND
2 WORLD, AND THAT WAS CONRAD JAMISON, WHO PASSED AWAY. HE WOULD
3 SERVE 42 YEARS AT THE SECURITY PACIFIC NATIONAL BANK OF LOS
4 ANGELES AS THEIR VICE PRESIDENT AND CHIEF ECONOMIST. AND HE
5 WAS THE INDIVIDUAL WHO WAS THE GURU OF ALL THE ECONOMIC DATA

14 OF THE ALHAMBRA. AND LEE ALLEN DEGRAFFENRIED, JUNIOR.

16 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** KAREN?

17

18 **KAREN OCAMB:** DID YOU NOT CALL HER FIRST?

19

20 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** YES.

21

22 **KAREN OCAMB:** DO YOU WANT ME TO GO FIRST?

23

24 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** IT MAKES...

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1 **KAREN OCAMB:** OKAY. I'M GOING TO GO FIRST, THEN. OKAY. OKAY.
2 GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS KAREN OCAMB. I'M THE HEAD OF THE
3 LOS ANGELES SUNSHINE COALITION. FOR TWO YEARS NOW, I'VE BEEN
4 COMING BEFORE YOU AS HEAD OF THE L.A. SUNSHINE COALITION
5 CRITICIZING YOU WHEN WE THOUGHT YOU WERE WRONG AND PRAISING
6 YOU WHEN YOU DEMONSTRATED YOUR COMMITMENT TO TRANSPARENCY AND
7 ACCESS TO GOVERNMENT. I WAS, THEREFORE, SHOCKED TO READ IN THE
8 DAILY NEWS, IN THE DAILY JOURNAL LAST WEEK, THAT COUNTY
9 GOVERNMENT IS ONCE AGAIN A CAULDRON OF SECRECY. HAVE YOU
10 LEARNED NOTHING FROM TWO YEARS' WORTH OF PUBLIC OUTCRY AND
11 EXPENSIVE LAWSUIT THAT YOU LOST, AT TAXPAYERS' EXPENSE? LAST
12 WEEK, WE READ THAT A SUPERVISOR-APPOINTED SECRET PANEL HAS
13 REVIEWED 55 APPLICANTS FOR THE COUNTY COUNSEL POSITION AND A
14 DEPUTY COUNSEL, UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF ONE OF THE FIVE
15 FINALISTS, ARGUED THAT REVEALING THE NAMES OF THAT SECRET
16 PANEL MIGHT JEOPARDIZE THE SELECTION PROCESS. HOWEVER, WHEN
17 THE DAILY JOURNAL LEARNED THAT ONE OF THE COMMITTEE MEMBERS
18 WAS KENNETH BROWN, WHOSE LAW FIRM HOLDS LUCRATIVE CONTRACTS
19 WITH THE COUNTY, SUDDENLY THE NAME BECAME AVAILABLE. WAS THE
20 PURPOSE OF THE SECRECY TO HIDE THE COZY KEN BROWN/COUNTY
21 COUNSEL CONNECTION? LET'S LOOK AT THIS. BILL PELLMAN RETIRES
22 AFTER CONSIDERABLE PRESSURE FROM OPEN GOVERNMENT ADVOCATES AND
23 HIS FAILURE TO STAUNCH THE HEMORRHAGING OF TAXPAYER MONEY FOR
24 LEGAL COSTS. SEVERAL REPORTERS HAVE BEEN TRYING TO FIND OUT
25 EXACTLY HOW MUCH KNOWN COUNTY COUNSEL HAS SPENT FOR THE PAST



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1 FEW YEARS AND ON WHAT BUT NO ONE SEEMS TO KNOW. DO YOU? THE

16 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** YOU'RE WELCOME AND I JUST WOULD RESPOND TO
17 THAT, SINCE I'M THE ONE THAT APPOINTED KEN BROWN

18

19 **KAREN OCAMB:** YES, SIR.

20

21 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** AND I FEEL IT NECESSARY TO RESPOND ONLY IN
22 THE SENSE THAT-- TO TRY TO IMPUGN HIS INTEGRITY LIKE THAT IS,
23 TO ME, NOT THE RIGHT THING TO DO. I APPOINTED KEN BECAUSE OF
24 HIS EXPERIENCE WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENT, BEING A CITY ATTORNEY
25 FOR VARIOUS CITIES FOR OVER 30 YEARS. I MEAN, OBVIOUSLY, HE



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1 DOES HAVE COUNTY CONTRACTS BUT, ALSO, HE HAS TO HAVE
2 EXPERIENCE WITH THE COUNTY. HE IS ONE OF FIVE PEOPLE THAT
3 PARTICIPATED IN THAT. SO HE'S NOT CONTROLLING ANYTHING. HIS
4 ISSUE WAS NOT THE BROWN ACT OR ANYTHING LIKE THAT BUT I JUST
5 DID IT OUT OF VALUE FOR HIS INTEGRITY, HIS HONESTY ABOUT
6 PEOPLE, AND A GREAT SENSE OF HISTORY HERE IN LOS ANGELES
7 COUNTY. SO THAT WAS THE REASON FOR THE APPOINTMENT. IT HAD
8 NOTHING TO DO WITH YOUR INSINUATIONS.

10 **KAREN OCAMB:** IT DIDN'T OCCUR TO YOU THAT THERE MIGHT BE, AT
11 LEAST, A CONFLICT OF INTEREST, THE APPEARANCE OF A CONFLICT OF
12 INTEREST, THAT MR. PELLMAN WENT TO WORK FOR KENNETH BROWN'S
13 LAW FIRM? THAT THERE WAS A COZY RELATIONSHIP, PERHAPS, PRIOR
14 TO HIS RETIREMENT? THAT THAT MAY SEND SUGGESTIONS TO OTHER
15 PEOPLE APPLYING FOR THOSE JOBS THAT THERE MIGHT BE A, YOU
16 KNOW, GOLDEN PARACHUTE AFTER COUNTY COUNSEL? I MEAN, THERE ARE
17 A NUMBER OF QUESTIONS THAT ARE RAISED IN OUR-- IN THE PUBLIC'S
18 MIND.

19

20 **SUP. KNABE, CHAIR:** FINE. CLEARLY WAS NOT THE INTENT OF MY
21 APPOINTMENT BUT ONE OF EXPERIENCE. SO, ANYWAY, THANK YOU FOR
22 YOUR INPUT.

24 **KAREN OCAMB:** THANK YOU.
