Adobe Acrobat Reader

Finding Words

You can use the Find command to find a complete word or part of a word in the current PDF document. Acrobat Reader looks for the word by reading every word on every page in the file, including text in form fields.

To find a word using the Find command:

- 1. Click the Find button (**Binoculars**), or choose Edit > Find.
- 2. Enter the text to find in the text box.
- 3. Select search options if necessary: Match Whole Word Only finds only occurrences of the complete word you enter in the box. For example, if you search for the word *stick*, the words *tick* and *sticky* will not be highlighted.

Match Case finds only words that contain exactly the same capitalization you enter in the box.

Find Backwards starts the search from the current page and goes backwards through the document.

4. Click Find. Acrobat Reader finds the next occurrence of the word.

To find the next occurrence of the word, Do one of the following:

Choose Edit > Find Again Reopen the find dialog box, and click Find Again. (The word must already be in the Find text box.)

Copying and pasting text and graphics to another application

You can select text or a graphic in a PDF document, copy it to the Clipboard, and paste it into another application such as a word processor. You can also paste text into a PDF document note or into a bookmark. Once the selected text or graphic is on the Clipboard, you can switch to another application and paste it into another document.

Note: If a font copied from a PDF document is not available on the system displaying the copied text, the font cannot be preserved. A default font is substituted.



To select and copy it to the clipboard:

1. Select the text tool T, and do one of the following:

To select a line of text, select the first letter of the sentence or phrase and drag to the last letter.

To select multiple columns of text (horizontally), hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option (Mac OS) as you drag across the width of the document.

To select a column of text (vertically), Hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option+Command (Mac OS) as you drag the length of the document.

To select all the text on the page, choose Edit > Select All. In single page mode, all the text on the current page is selected. In Continuous or Continuous – facing mode, most of the text in the document is selected. When you release the mouse button, the selected text is highlighted. To deselect the text and start over, click anywhere outside the selected text. The Select All command will not select all the text in the document. A workaround for this (Windows) is to use the Edit > Copy command. Choose Edit > Copy to copy the selected text to the clipboard.

2. To view the text, choose Window > Show Clipboard

In Windows 95, the Clipboard Viewer is not installed by default and you cannot use the Show Clipboard command until it is installed. To install the Clipboard Viewer, Choose Start > Settings > Control Panel > Add/Remove Programs, and then click the Windows Setup tab. Double-click Accessories, check Clipboard Viewer, and click OK.

WE TOOK A FEW MOMENTS EARLY ON 9 BEFORE THE MEETING TO RECOGNIZE MEMBERS OF OUR PUBLIC HEALTH 10 11 DEPARTMENT WHO HAVE DONE SOME EXTRAORDINARY THINGS DURING SOME VERY DIFFICULT AND EXTRAORDINARY TIMES, SO UNFORTUNATELY WE 12 LIVE IN AN ENVIRONMENT WHERE OFTENTIMES THE ONLY ACTIONS THAT 13 ARE BEING NEWSWORTHY ARE THOSE WHICH ARE NEGATIVE. THERE'S A 14 DESCRIPTIVE SAYING THAT GOES LIKE THIS, "IF IT BLEEDS, IT 15 16 LEADS". WELL THE MASS H1N1 VACCINATION EFFORT HAD NUMEROUS CHALLENGES FROM THE START, NOT OF ALL WHICH WERE THE FAULT OF 17 18 OUR DEPARTMENT. THERE WAS NO DOUBT THAT WE MUST LEARN FROM 19 THESE CHALLENGING EXPERIENCES AND USE THEM FOR OUR FUTURE EFFORTS. HOWEVER, IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT WE DO NOT LOSE SIGHT 20 OF THE GOOD AND EFFECTIVE ACTIONS OF OUR COUNTY EMPLOYEES WHO 21 22 HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO MAKING THE OVERALL EFFORT A HUGE SUCCESS. 23 NUMEROUS EMPLOYEES HAVE GONE ABOVE AND BEYOND OUR NORMAL DUTIES TO PROVIDE H1N1 VACCINATIONS TO OUR HIGH RISK 24 POPULATIONS. FROM OCTOBER 23RD TO DECEMBER 9TH THIS YEAR, 25



PUBLIC HEALTH EMPLOYEES ADMINISTERED OVER 190,000 DOSES OF 1 H1N1 VACCINE AT 109 PUBLIC VACCINE EVENTS THROUGHOUT OUR 2 3 COUNTY. IN ORDER TO GET A SENSE OF THE MAGNITUDE OF THIS EFFORT, THESE VACCINATIONS REPRESENTED THREE TIMES THE VOLUME 4 5 OF VACCINATION THAT THE DEPARTMENT NORMALLY PROVIDES DURING A REGULAR FLU SEASON. THIS EFFORT COULD NOT HAVE OCCURRED 6 WITHOUT EXTRAORDINARY CONTRIBUTIONS, EXCUSE ME, OF OUR 7 8 DEDICATED AND CARING PUBLIC HEALTH EMPLOYEES, MANY WHICH WORKED LONG HOURS TO MAKE IT WORK. THESE EMPLOYEES ALSO BUILT 9 NEW AND MEANINGFUL RELATIONS WITH MANY COMMUNITY PARTNERS AND 10 11 AS WELL AS OUR CITIES AND WILL BOLSTER OUR FUTURE EFFORTS. SO 12 MANY OF THESE PUBLIC HEALTH EMPLOYEES, SOME ARE UP HERE, BUT MANY ARE IN THE AUDIENCE TODAY. AS I MENTIONED, WE RECOGNIZED 13 THEM EARLIER WITH COMMENDATIONS. I'D LIKE TO HAVE THEM ALL 14 PLEASE STAND UP AND LET'S GIVE THEM A BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE. 15 16 [APPLAUSE.] SO DR. FIELDING ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD BUT THE ENTIRE COUNTY FAMILY, WE WANT TO THANK YOU AND YOUR DEPARTMENT 17 18 FOR THE INCREDIBLE EFFORTS YOU PUT FORTH IN DOING OVER 190,000 19 VACCINATIONS AND JUST SAY KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK.

DR. JONATHAN FIELDING: THANK YOU SO MUCH. THANK YOU,
SUPERVISOR. THANK YOU SO MUCH, SUPERVISOR KNABE AND THE OTHER
BOARD MEMBERS FOR YOUR VERY STRONG SUPPORT. THIS WAS AN
UNPRECEDENTED MOBILIZATION OF PUBLIC HEALTH THAT MAY HAVE
EQUALED OR PERHAPS EXCEEDED WHAT WENT ON DURING THE 1950S IN



THE POLIO EPIDEMIC. AND I'M VERY PROUD OF EVERYBODY IN THE 1 DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH, ALL THOSE THAT ARE HERE AND THE 2 3 MANY THOUSANDS THAT ARE AT WORK AT THIS VERY MOMENT. IT REQUIRED UNBELIEVABLE AMOUNTS OF LOGISTIC SUPPORT. IT 4 5 RECRUITED EMPLOYEES FROM EVERY PART OF THE DEPARTMENT. SO EVERYBODY IN PUBLIC HEALTH IS DUAL ROLE. YOU'RE DOING YOUR DAY 6 JOB. IT COULD BE LEAD POISONING OR TOXIC EPIDEMIOLOGY. WHEN 7 8 THIS KIND OF A PROBLEM HITS, YOU ARE A PUBLIC HEALTH FIRST RESPONDER, AND EVERYBODY REALLY STEPPED UP TO THE PLATE. WE 9 HAD, DURING THIS 109 CLINICS, OVER 6,000 ASSIGNMENTS, STAFF 10 ASSIGNMENTS TO DIFFERENT CLINICS. OFTENTIMES PEOPLE HAD TO 11 JUGGLE SCHEDULES WITH CHILDCARE, WITH ELDER CARE AND THE LIKE 12 TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY WERE AVAILABLE. AND MORE THAN 2,000 OF 13 OUR NONCLINICAL STAFF, 2,000 ASSIGNMENTS FOR OUR NONCLINICAL 14 15 STAFF, AS WELL, BECAUSE THESE WERE VERY WELL-STAFFED 16 ORGANIZATIONAL EFFORTS. WHAT WE DID WAS TO PARTNER WITH A NUMBER OF CITIES. WE WENT, AS SUPERVISOR KNABE SAID, MORE THAN 17 18 190,000 DOSES WE GAVE OURSELVES. IN ADDITION, WE WORKED VERY 19 CLOSELY WITH PROVIDERS IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR. WE WERE RESPONSIBLE FOR ALLOCATING VACCINE TO THEM. AND WHILE IT 20 WASN'T ALWAYS AN EASY PROCESS, IT MADE SURE THAT DURING THIS 21 22 TIME OF SHORTAGE, THAT IN FACT VACCINE WAS EQUITABLY BEING 23 DISTRIBUTED. WE ALSO ESTABLISHED AND MAINTAINED COMMUNICATION WITH THE PUBLIC, AS THERE WERE MANY INACCURATE STATEMENTS THAT 24 WERE BEING MADE OUT THERE, SOMETIMES IN THE MEDIA. WE WORKED 25



WITH SCHOOL DISTRICTS. WE WORKED WITH COMMUNITY-BASED AGENCIES 1 AND FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS AND OF COURSE OTHER MEMBERS OF 2 3 THE GREAT COUNTY WORKFORCE. AND WE ALSO, OF COURSE, WORKED TO MANAGE THE MANY OUTBREAKS THAT OCCURRED DURING THIS PERIOD OF 4 5 TIME. I WANT TO ALSO ACKNOWLEDGE THE VERY GOOD WORK OF OUR PARTNERS IN THE COUNTY, THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES, 6 I.S.D., THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND MANY CITIES WITHIN L.A. 7 8 COUNTY WHO ARE PARTNERS, PARTICULARLY L.A. CITY, BUT MANY 9 OTHERS, AS WELL, AND ESPECIALLY PASADENA AND LONG BEACH, THE INDEPENDENT CITY-BASED HEALTH DEPARTMENTS THAT WORKED CLOSELY 10 WITH US AND COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS. AND WE HAVE A GUY 12 WHO ENTERED THE MARINA STRAND PROJECT AND HE HASN'T HAD 13 LIBERTY OR JUSTICE FOR NINE MONTHS NOW. THAT'S RICHARD FINE. 14 HE'S BEEN IN CENTRAL JAIL SINCE MARCH 4TH AND HE DOESN'T 15 16 BELONG THERE. EARLIER IN THE YEAR, THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT RULED IN THE CASE CALLED CAPERTON VERSUS MASSEY THAT ALL 17 18 JUDGES MUST NOT ONLY ACT WITH INTEGRITY BUT MUST ALWAYS HAVE 19 THE APPEARANCE OF ACTING IN INTEGRITY TO ANY REASONABLE AUDIT. AND THEN, NUMBER TWO, 10 11 I'D LIKE JUST AN IDEA FROM THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WHO'S GOING TO BE TAKING COMMAND DURING THIS SIX-MONTH TRANSITION. 12 13

C.E.O. FUJIOKA: I CAN GIVE YOU A GENERAL OVERVIEW, BUT ALSO WE 14 HAVE STEVE ROTNER HERE. WE HAVE -- NO. STEVE? ED. ED ROGNER. WE 15 16 HAVE STEVE LIEBERMAN, OUR ACTING CHIEF, WHO WILL COME UP, WHO ALSO PERSONALLY HANDLED THE NOTIFICATION PROCESS. AND HE'LL BE 17 18 COMING IN SHORTLY. ED'S THE REPRESENTATIVE FOR THE SHERIFF'S 19 DEPARTMENT. D.H.S.'S RESPONSE TO OUR QUESTIONS RAISED 10 11 SEVERAL NEW QUESTIONS, IN PARTICULAR WE ARE CONCERNED THAT THE CONTRACTING AUTHORITY CLAIMED IN THE URGENT CARE ASSOCIATE'S 12 AGREEMENT, WHICH IS DIFFERENT THAN THE CONTRACTING AUTHORITY 13 IN THE CURRENT CONTRACT WITH EPIC AMERICA, CITES BOTH 14 GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 31,000 AND PROPOSITION A. THE UNION 15 16 HAS LONG HELD THAT THESE STATUTES CONTRADICT ONE ANOTHER. WE'RE VIGILANT ABOUT THIS ISSUE BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT SUCH 17 18 CONTRADICTORY, DUAL CONTRACTING AUTHORITY CAN BE USED TO 19 CONTRACT OUT WORK THAT SHOULD BE DONE BY UNION MEMBERS WHO HAVE A LONG-TERM COMMITMENT TO DELIVERING OUALITY PUBLIC 20 SERVICES. ALSO IT CONTINUES TO TROUBLE US THAT WHILE D.H.S. 21 22 CLAIMS THAT THE USE OF CONTRACTED NURSE PRACTITIONER SERVICES 23 WILL BE MINIMAL UNDER THIS AGREEMENT, THE AGREEMENT ITSELF ALLOWS U.C.A. TO USE TWO 30-HOUR PER WEEK NURSE PRACTITIONERS. 24 GIVEN THE NATURE OF OUR CONCERNS, WE FEEL IT NECESSARY TO GO 25



ON RECORD STATING THAT WE THINK THAT NURSE PRACTITIONER 1 LANGUAGE IN THIS AGREEMENT IS NOT APPROPRIATE AND THAT WE WILL 2 CONTINUE TO MONITOR THE USE OF NURSE PRACTITIONERS UNDER THIS 3 AGREEMENT UNTIL IT EXPIRES IN 2011. BUT MOST IMPORTANTLY I 4 5 WANT TO TAKE THE OPPORTUNITY TODAY TO COMMUNICATE OUR BASIC GOAL GOING FORWARD. WE ANTICIPATE THAT THE COUNTY WILL ENTER 6 INTO A NUMBER OF PUBLIC PRIVATE AGREEMENTS AS PART OF THE 7 8 PROCESS OF OPENING A NEW M.L.K. HOSPITAL AND EXPANDING HEALTHCARE SERVICES IN THE SECOND DISTRICT. GIVEN THIS, IT IS 9 IMPORTANT THAT EACH PARTNERSHIP, INCLUDING CONTRACTS FOR 10 URGENT CARE AND OTHER DIRECT CARE SERVICES BE DONE RIGHT. IT 11 IS IN THE BEST INTEREST OF OUALITY PATIENT CARE. WITH OUR LONG 12 TERM GOAL OF PROVIDING QUALITY HEALTHCARE SERVICES TO MEET THE 13 COMMUNITY NEEDS IN SOUTH L.A., WE NEED TO AVOID ANY MISTAKES 14 OR EXPERIMENTS THAT COULD PUT THIS ALL AT RISK. THIS MEANS 15 16 THAT D.H.S. NEEDS TO CONSIDER THE LONG TERM NEED FOR NURSE PRACTITIONER AND OTHER SERVICES AT HUMPHREY. COUNTY NURSES' 17 18 ROLE SHOULD BE SUPPORTED AND STRENGTHENED, NOT DIMINISHED BY 19 CONTRACTORS WHO, AS THIS EXAMPLE ILLUSTRATES, COME AND GO. THE GOAL OF PROVIDING OUALITY HEALTHCARE SERVICES IN SOUTH L.A. 20 21 ALSO NECESSITATES GREATER TRANSPARENCY IN THE CONTRACTING 22 PROCESS. WE HOPE IT PLEASES THE BOARD TO HEAR THAT BECAUSE OF 23 THE MEETINGS SET AT THE BEHEST OF SUPERVISOR MOLINA, D.H.S. AND LOCAL 721 HAVE ALREADY BEGUN DISCUSSING THE WAYS THAT WE 24 CAN WORK TOGETHER IN THE FUTURE TO ENSURE THAT THE COUNTY'S 25



CONTRACTING PROCESS IS CONSISTENT WITH THE MISSION-DRIVEN 1 HEALTHCARE SYSTEM CENTERED AROUND DELIVERING THE HIGHEST 2 3 QUALITY CARE TO COUNTY PATIENTS. WE ACTUALLY 13 INCLUDED THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH AS PART OF OUR REVIEW 14 IN DETERMINING THE MISSIONS FOR EACH OF THE DEPARTMENTS AND IN 15 16 LOOKING AT THE PROGRAMS WITHIN THE DEPARTMENTS TO ENSURE THE CONSISTENCY OF THE PROGRAMS TO THE SPECIFIC MISSIONS OF THE 17 18 DEPARTMENTS. FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES, AS 19 MENTIONED IN OUR REPORT, D.H.S. D.H.S. 23 SERVICE POPULATIONS ARE PRINCIPALLY LOW INCOME, UNINSURED AND MEDI-CAL PATIENTS. D.H.S. ALSO ORGANIZES MANAGED CARE THROUGH 24 ITS COMMUNITY HEALTH PLAN, WHICH WAS MENTIONED EARLIER IN THE 25



AGENDA, AND ORGANIZES AND MANAGES THE COUNTY'S OVERALL 1 EMERGENCY MEDICAL NETWORK COMPRISED OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE 2 3 HOSPITALS THROUGH THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AGENCY. THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH FOCUSES ON POPULATION-BASED 4 5 DISEASE DETECTION AND CONTROL, HEALTH PROMOTION AND PREVENTION SERVICES AND SERVICES TO UNIQUE AND/OR VULNERABLE POPULATIONS 6 WHICH REQUIRE HIGHLY SPECIALIZED SERVICES SUCH AS 7 8 TUBERCULOSIS, SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES, HUMAN 9 IMMUNODEFICIENCY VIRUS, MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE. BUT ALL THE HARBOR SUBDIVISION TRANSIT CORRIDOR STUDY 10 PAPERWORK, THERE'S NO DISCUSSION ABOUT A LINE FROM THE 11 IMPERIAL HIGHWAY STATION INTO TORRANCE, INTO REDONDO BEACH, 12 ANYTHING. SO WHY AN E.I.R.? CAN'T GET AN E.I.R. FOR THE GATES 13 ON THE EAST SIDE EXTENSION BECAUSE, OOPS, NOBODY REALIZED YOU 14 15 NEEDED IT, BUT YOU CAN GET AN E.I.R. FOR AN EXTENSION THAT'S 16 NOT GOING TO BE BUILT. THAT BEING SAID, GOING OVER SOME WORK, I HAPPENED TO LOOK AT AN ARTICLE FROM OCTOBER I BELIEVE 21ST, 17 18 "LEGISLATORS CHALLENGE MAYOR ON WEST SIDE SUBWAY FUNDING." AND 19 IT SHOWS A MAP, A SCHEMATIC MAP, OF THE METRO CORRIDOR. AND WHAT'S STRIKING ABOUT THIS MAP IS IT SHOWS THAT, LO AND 20 21 BEHOLD, THE LIGHT RAIL REGIONAL CONNECTOR THAT IS SO ADAMANTLY 22 BEING PUSHED RUNS FROM SEVENTH AND METRO SOUTH TO FIRST AND ALAMEDA. ALL THESE YEARS LIVING IN L.A., 22, WHICH MAY NOT BE 23 AS LONG AS EVERYBODY ELSE, AND I ALWAYS THOUGHT THAT FIRST AND 24 ALAMADA WAS NORTH OF SEVENTH AND FIGUEROA. AND YET THIS 25



SCHEMATIC MAP SHOWS IT'S SOUTH. NOW, IT MAY NOT BE A WORLD 1 BEATER HERE IN L.A., BUT WHEN THE TIMES GETS PUBLISHED IN 2 3 OTHER CITIES AND IS USED AS A REFERENCE POINT, LIKE MAYBE IN WASHINGTON, AND SOMEBODY SAYS "WE NEED FUNDING FOR THIS LIGHT 4 5 RAIL REGIONAL CONNECTOR BECAUSE TO MAKE THIS CONNECTION" AND THEY SHOW THIS SCHEMATIC MAP, PEOPLE SAY "THAT'S A GREAT 6 IDEA." THAT AND YOU WANTED TO DEDICATE-- YOU GAVE THEM A LOAN FOR \$9 1 MILLION TO ASSIST IN THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE PROJECT. BUT I'M 2 3 HAVING A PROBLEM WITH THE LEASE AGREEMENT. I HAVE A PERPETUAL LEASE AT THE FORD HOTEL THAT RUNS WITH THE LAND. AND THE 4 5 CURRENT OWNER S.R.O. IS HONORING THE LEASE FOR THE RENT. I'M STILL PAYING THE AMOUNT WHERE I SIGNED THE LEASE ALMOST 20 6 YEARS AGO. THEY ARE STILL HONORING THE LEASE. BUT THE PROBLEM 7 8 I HAVE IS WHEN WE COME BACK, THEY'RE UPGRADING THE PROPERTY, THEY'RE GOING TO ADD, AFTER THEY FIX THE HOTEL, THEY'RE GOING 9 TO ADD COOKING, THEY'RE GOING TO ADD A KITCHENETTE AND A 10 REFRIGERATOR TO EACH ROOM, BUT I'VE BEEN TOLD BY THE SOCIAL 11 SECURITY DEPARTMENT TO DO SO IS GOING TO KICK IN A REGULATION 12 THAT FORCES THEM TO REDUCE OUR MONTHLY PAYMENTS. IF SOMEHOW 13 14 YOU COULD TELL THEM OVER THERE IN THEIR PROJECT THAT HAVING A 15 STOVE AND REFRIGERATOR WOULD BE OPTIONAL, I THINK WE AND NOT 16 JUST MYSELF, EVERYBODY ON SOCIAL SECURITY WOULD CERTAINLY APPRECIATE THAT. YOU WOULDN'T HAVE THE STOVE-- THEY ALSO TOLD 17 18 ME THE SOCIAL SECURITY YOU CAN'T ACTUALLY HAVE THE STOVE WITH 19 THE REFRIGERATOR IN THE UNIT. I DON'T SEE ANY REASON WHY IT HAS TO BE ANYTHING BUT AN OUTLET THERE. THE STOVE AND 20 21 REFRIGERATOR CAN BE LOCATED SOMEWHERE ELSE. S.R.O. HAS PLENTY 22 OF PROPERTY AND I'M SURE THEY HAVE PLENTY OF STORAGE. I DON'T 23 SEE WHY THAT HAS TO BE CONNECTED OR LOCATED WITHIN THE ROOM. I CERTAINLY WOULD APPRECIATE IT SO THAT-- WE WOULD APPRECIATE IT 24 SO OUR CHECKS WON'T BE REDUCED. THE AMOUNT THAT SOCIAL 25



SECURITY IS REDUCING OUR CHECK IS 10 PERCENT. AND 10 PERCENT 1 OF A CHECK THAT'S ALREADY BELOW THE POVERTY LEVEL IS QUITE A 2 3 BIT OF MONEY. SO I DON'T KNOW WHO TO TALK TO, BUT I KNOW THAT AGAIN YOU SUPERVISORS COULD ASCERTAIN A \$9 MILLION LOAN FOR 4 5 THE PROJECT, SO YOU CERTAINLY HAVE A LOT OF WEIGHT WHEN IT COMES TO SUGGESTING THINGS. WE, NOT JUST MYSELF, WE WOULD 6 7 APPRECIATE THEM PUTTING THAT FORWARD AS AN OPTION. THANK YOU. 8 9 SUP. MOLINA, CHAIR: THANK YOU, SIR. MR. O'ROURKE? 10 11 PATRICK O'ROURKE: YES. I'M COMING IN HERE ABOUT D.C.F.S. AGAIN. I RECEIVED A LETTER AFTER MY LAST SPEECH HERE TELLING 12 ME THAT I HAD A FAIR TRIAL, THAT I SHOULD NOT BE COMING UP 13 HERE TO SPEAK MY GRIEVANCES.
