



Another successful summer for a program offering Los Angeles County residents a safe, fun experience in their own communities.

n partnership with the Los
Angeles County Department of
Public Health, the Department of
Parks and Recreation, kicked off
the enormously popular Parks After
Dark (PAD) at six Los Angeles
County parks on June 20, and
successfully concluded the 2013
edition of the program on Aug. 17.

With a focus on youth and families, PAD offered surrounding communities extended park hours and activities on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings from 6 p.m. -10 p.m. Activities included organized sports, resource fairs for residents of all ages, classes on acting and film and free concerts and movie screenings.

By providing young people and families with positive recreational activities in their communities, the initiative plays an important part in reducing the likelihood of participation in at-risk behaviors.

Initially implemented in three parks as a component of the County's Gang Violence Reduction Initiative, the program transforms areas that have been adversely affected by gang activity into vibrant community centers that provide health and other resources in locations where residents can feel safe.

PAD was highly successful Memorial Park; City Terrace during its first three summers, resulting in decreased violent crime and high community participation. Memorial Park; City Terrace Jesse Owens Community Resulting in decreased violent crime Park; Pamela County Park; Pranklin D. Roosevelt Park;

Between 2010 and 2012, there were more than 120,000 visits to the PAD parks. A 2012 survey of participants found that 94% would participate in the program again, and 96% felt safe during the program. Serious and violent crimes in the communities

surrounding the original three parks declined 40% during the summer months between 2009 and 2012.

With support from the Board of Supervisors, the Los Angeles County Chief Executive Office, the LA84 Foundation and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, our Department partnered with the Department of Public Health's Choose Health LA initiative at these six parks: Ted Watkins Memorial Park; City Terrace Park; Jesse Owens Community Regional Park; Pamela County Park; Franklin D. Roosevelt Park; and Loma Alta Park.

t has been the Department's pleasure to partner with the Department of Human

Resources and our healthcare providers to host several Countywide Fitness Challenge events in 2013. It is always rewarding to see County employees enjoying all that our parks have to offer, especially as part of this important effort to improve overall health and fitness.

Hundreds turned out for the year's first Challenge event, "Walk It Off!" at Whittier Narrows, on May 18. We have since had enthusiastic crowds of County employees at both Castaic Lake State Recreation Area (June 15)

and, most recently, the Hollywood Bowl (August 24).

At these events, employees have not only been able to receive important health screenings, but had the opportunity to take part in such activities as kayaking, dragon boat races, choreographed dance, paddleboarding and 3K hikes to picturesque destinations.

This fall, the 2013 Challenge closes out with stops at two amazing facilities. On Saturday, Oct. 5, Kenneth Hahn State Recreation Area played host to "Take a Hike!" Participants were given the opportunity to take part in hikes at several skill levels, followed by

volleyball games and the opportunity to enjoy healthy snacks.

At "Play for Life!," set for Saturday, Oct. 19 at Santa Fe Dam Recreation Area, employees can test their mettle in our version of a "triathlon": a two-mile power walk through a wildlife sanctuary, a bicycle/buggy fun ride and pedal boat/kayak rides.

I want to extend very special thanks to all of our dedicated employees. You work so hard to ensure fun and wonderful events for all who participate, by making everyone feel welcome and helping provide them with beautiful surroundings and great resources!

ith more than \$570,000 in combined grant funding by Los Angeles County Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich and the State of California Habitat Conservation Fund, the Department is set to proceed with two initiatives that will yield immeasurable benefits in the beautiful Placerita Canyon Natural Area.

The projects – riparian habitat restoration and establishment of a Golden Braille Trail for the visually-impaired – enabled by the grant funding are meant to help preserve habitat in Placerita Canyon and expand opportunities for all people to enjoy natural beauty in Los Angeles County.

With a \$200,000 grant from the State of California Habitat Conservation Fund and \$300,000 provided by Supervisor Antonovich, the Placerita Canyon Riparian Habitat Restoration project will help protect and preserve the delicate ecosystem of the Placerita Canyon Creek, which is crucial to the survival of diverse native species found near the vital water source. It will accomplish this in large part by creating a buffer zone to prevent trail users from negatively impacting the habitat. Plans also include planting of native riparian species.

Thanks to a \$45,000 State of California Habitat Conservation Fund grant and \$28,500 from Supervisor Antonovich, the Department will develop a Golden Braille Trail along the last 1/8 mile on the existing Heritage Trail (including the Heritage Tunnel, pictured). The Golden Braille Trail will include several features: installation of an orientation area, with benches and Braille signage describing the trail; audio elements; curb guides allowing the visuallyimpaired to independently navigate the path;



planting of fragrant and brightly colored (for low-vision visitors) native flora; high-contrast and Braille interpretive signs and interpretive opportunities through self-guided signage; and strategically placed points of interest to encourage a memorable experience.

more than \$80,000 in in-kind labor toward the completion of both projects.

Thanks go to Special Assistant Faith Parducho, State Grants Manager Imee Perius, Natural Areas Administrator Kim Bosell. Retirement is a time to look back on a career and celebrate the positive impact an individual has made on colleagues and the community as a whole. By that measure, Kimel L. Conway — who retired in August as Regional Operations Manager for the Regional Facilities Agency — can spend his retirement reflecting on a job well done at the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation.

As Regional Operations Manager, Conway — who began his tenure at the Department in 1999 as Chief of Planning, and also served as Deputy Director of the Capital Projects Agency and Chief of Grants — played a central role in a long list of accomplishments. Among them: new operating agreements with the Los Angeles County Arboretum and Botanic Garden and the South Coast Botanic Garden; the William S. IMPROVEMENTS COMMENCE AT EL CARISO COMMUNITY REGIONAL PARK

More than \$13 million in upgrades at the popular park will include several exciting elements: a Universal Access Playground; artificial turf soccer field with bleachers; natural turf practice field; new concession stands and restrooms; handball court; and a number of upgrades to pathways, picnic shelters, and landscaping.

The Universal Access Playground reflects a key goal of the Department: making play accessible to children of all abilities. Modeled after the nation's first playground of its type — "Shane's Inspiration," located in Griffith Park — it will feature ADA-compliant pathways, sensory-rich play structures and independent play apparatuses. Tiffany Harris, CEO and co-founder of the Shane's Inspiration organization, also attended the groundbreaking to show support for the project.

Building on a unique program geared toward helping young people develop a deeper appreciation of the natural world, the Department, with strong support from Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe, kicked off a second year of the innovative Eco-Ranger Camp on July 15.

Dedicated to leadership development, environmental awareness and human relations training for 40 participants ages 13-18, this year's Teen Eco-Ranger Leadership Academy was expanded from one day to a full week prior to the start of the day camp. This was accomplished thanks to the hard work of a team that included Legislative, Community and Parks Foundation Liaison Joseph Matthews, and staff at four County parks serving unincorporated South and West Whittier: Sorensen. Adventure, Amigo and Amelia Mayberry.

Leadership Academy activities included Community Emergency

Response Team (CERT) training; a tour of Rio Hondo College that emphasized higher education and green jobs; a visit to a meeting of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors; and a trail improvement service project at Castaic Lake.

"Due to the success of last year's program, I am delighted that we expanded the Eco-Ranger Camp this year," said Supervisor Knabe. "These types of experiences give young people an opportunity to learn about nature and the environment in a hands -on and fun way. Hopefully, it will also expand their minds as they consider careers for their future and prepare themselves for the jobs of tomorrow."

The day camp included more than 200 youth, ages 6-12. Its programming placed a strong emphasis on principles of conservation, and reinforcing the unique role that young people play in protecting the environment. The topics covered included water conservation; recycling; alternative energy aware-

ness; preservation of natural resources; and lessons on local ecosystems, plant and animal habitats.

Among the activities in the weeklong series of environmental awareness workshops and field trips, which began July 22: a trip to Dockweiler State Beach, where campers swam in the ocean and took part in a beach cleanup service project; and a weekending, overnight trip to Castaic Lake State Recreation Area – where participants saw animal demonstrations, participated in nature hikes and experienced camping, some for the very first time.

COMMUNITY DIVES INTO NEW CASTAIC SPORTS COMPLEX AQUATIC CENTER







undreds of residents, community leaders, and excited young people turned out on May 31 for the Grand Opening and Dedication of the Castaic Sports Complex Aquatic Center.

Los Angeles County Supervisor
Michael D. Antonovich was among
those on hand to help dedicate the
Aquatic Center. An exciting addition to
the Castaic community, the \$13
million aquatic center is the result of a
dynamic joint effort by Supervisor
Antonovich, the Department of Parks
and Recreation, the Department of
Public Works and the Los Angeles
County Arts Commission.

Featuring a competition-sized 6,425 square foot pool, splash pad with integrated 4,435 square-foot recreation pool and 12,500 square-foot pool building, the aquatic center has proven to be a popular draw for the local community. Programs and services available at the center include swimming lessons, a junior

lifeguard program, aqua aerobics, synchronized swimming and much more.

Marking the entrance to the aquatic center is artwork by renowned Los Angeles visual artist Bob Zoell. The piece, entitled "Bbubbles," consists of 21 glass panels depicting bubbles in water. To create the largescale artwork's rich blue color, Zoell's fabricator used a process that involves melting ceramic glaze at an extremely high temperature. Each glass panel is sandwiched between clear glass in one inch thick insulated glass units, making the design and construction of the artwork consistent with the project's goals for LEED Silver Certification.

NEW FUTSAL COURTS THRILL SOCCER ENTHUSIASTS

Adding an exciting new element to our competitive sports offerings, the Department, with support from Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors Chairman Mark Ridley-Thomas and the LA84 Foundation, officially opened futsal courts at two parks on July 6.

Located at Col. Leon H. Washington Park and Lennox Park, the courts are the first of their kind in the Department.

With usage of soccer-friendly fields at an all-time high, county officials emphasized the importance of delivering new recreational opportunities to players.

"Many of our parks were not built with soccer in mind," said Ridley-Thomas. "So, we had to be creative in designing new



features to accommodate all of the aspiring soccer players in these communities. The state-of-the-art futsal courts will be a tremendous asset to these parks."

On July 6, hundreds attended a grand opening celebration at the Lennox Park courts. Members of the Chivas USA professional soccer team hosted a clinic aimed at teaching young people the basics of this fast-paced game -- which is played by five-a-side squads on a turf court, and features a ball smaller than the one used

for traditional soccer. In total, the facilities provide three adult-size futsal courts, each roughly one-quarter of the size of an average professional soccer field, that can be converted as needed into six courts tailored for children.

MAKING A SPLASH AT EUGENE A. OBREGON PARK





With festive decorations, synchronized swimming and diving demonstrations and hundreds of residents in attendance, the June 15 reopening of the Eugene A. Obregon Park Pool was a day of celebration for the East Los Angeles community.

The morning was highlighted by an appearance by Los Angeles County Supervisor Gloria Molina, a key supporter of the \$3.6 million in improvements that include an ADA-compliant pool building; family changing

room; refurbished dressing rooms, showers and office; and a new pool lift. The depth of the pool was also increased to 13 feet to allow for more aquatic programs such as diving.

Originally built in 1969, the pool draws thousands of people each year for free recreational swim, low-cost swimming lessons and other aquatic programs.

At the pool reopening ceremony, the assembled crowd marveled at the skills of the divers and synchronized swimmers — who provided entertainment and showcased talents and skills honed in Los Angeles County pools.

"This pool is a vital community resource, which provides healthy recreation," Molina said. "And, I can already see East L.A.'s very own Olympic hopefuls!"

Rocks Natural Area Park.

Impressed by this exciting addition to one of Los Angeles County's most breathtaking natural areas, Linsley told the County Channel that the new center celebrates "a place that preserves nature and animals and things that are disappearing — so our kids can come and see them, and experience them."

The innovative, 3,700 square-foot center features live animal exhibits, a

state-of-the-art video component about the area's geological and cultural history and exhibits chronicling Vasquez Rocks' storied relationship with Hollywood moviemaking.

Some of the informative exhibits detail the history of the area's indigenous population, and trace the story of the early settlers. Other upgrades include complete refurbishment of the historical 1,100-square-foot ranger station, which serves as comfortable office space for employees at Vasquez Rocks Natural Area.

At the open house, the new \$9.7 million facility received a warm

welcome from Los Angeles County Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich, who provided strong support to the project.

ompeting in daytime heat that pushed the mercury upwards of 94 degrees, the Lake Lifeguards of the County of Los Angeles Department of Parks and Recreation placed first in the Invitational Division of the 2013 Baker to Vegas Challenge Cup Relay.

Not only did the lifeguards win the Invitational Division, they excelled: In the 120-mile relay through the punishing Mojave Desert, they set a new team record with a time of 14 hours, 22 minutes – earning fourth place overall in a field of more than 260 teams from across the world, including squads representing the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and agencies from such international locales as Hamburg, Germany.

Chief Lake Lifeguard Hugo Maldonado said each runner on the 20-member team – which represents 200 lifeguards stationed at three of Los Angeles County's recreational lakes – ran a leg of race that ranged from four to ten miles across the California and Nevada deserts. The race ended April 14 in Las Vegas.
