1882 -- SUPERVISORS VOTED 9-6-1882 TO DIVIDE THE COUNTY INTO SEVEN DISTRICTS. (Minute Book 8, Page 14)

On September 6, 1882, the Board adopted a motion to divide the County into seven districts. The districts are described with the following boundaries:

1st District.-the precincts of Compton, Cienega, Cahuenga, Elizabeth Lake, La Ballona, Monte Vista, Newhall, Las Virgenes, Ravina, San Fernando, Santa Monica and Wilmington;

2nd District-beginning at a point on the easterly boundary of Los Angeles City where the prolongation of the center line of Downey Ave. extends easterly, would intersect...

3rd District-commencing at a point on east boundary of Los Angeles City, when the prolongation of the center line of Downey Ave. extends easterly would intersect said east boundary; thence along said east boundary north to the n.e. corner of the city limits; thence along north boundary of the city west to the n.w. corner of the city limits; thence along north boundaries of the city Wash to the n.w. corner of the city limits; thence along north boundary of the city south to a point when the southern line of Lot 3 Block 25 Hancock's survey intersects said boundary; thence along southern line of lots 3.2.&1 of Block 25 Hancock's survey easterly to the center line of 7th Street; thence along center line of 7th Street easterly to the intersection of 7th Street centerline of Main Street to Upper Main Street, the center line of Downey Ave.; thence north and easterly along center line of Downey Ave. and its easterly extremity; then in a straight line to the point of beginning.

4th District-will comprise of all portions of Los Angeles City not included in the 2nd and 3rd Supervisorial Districts herein before described with the addition of the precincts of Florna and Vernon and which portion included in the city is described more particularly as follows; commencing at a point of intersection of the south lines of Lot 3 Block 25 Hancock's survey with the west boundary of Los Angeles city , said point being the s.w. corner of the 3rd Supervisorial District herein before described; thence south along said west boundary of Los Angeles city to the s.w. corner of the city limit; thence east along south boundary of Los Angeles city to the s.e. corner of the limits; thence north along east boundary of Los Angeles city to the s.e. corner of the 2nd Supervisorial District hereinwith described , said s.e. corner being the intersection of the center line of Stevenson Ave., Chapparall St. and 7th St., the same being the south boundaries of the 2nd and 3rd Supervisorial District hereinbefore described to the point of beginning.

5th District will consist of the precincts of Azusa, Duarte, El Monte, Old Mission, San Gabriel, Pasadena, Pomona and Spadra

6th District will consist of the precincts of Anaheim, Downey, Los Nietos, Norwalk, San Antonio and Westminster.

7th District will consist of the precincts of Fountain Valley, Garden Grove, Orange, Santa Ana, Silvervada, San Juan Capistrano, Tustin and Yorba.
